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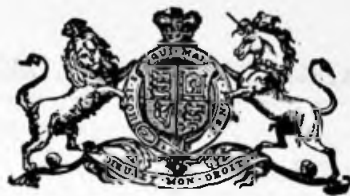

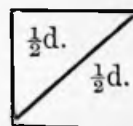

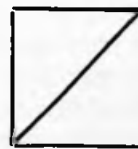

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS
of
THE HONOURABLE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

29th December, 1890.

Present :

His Excellency the Governor.

The Minutes of the last Meeting, held on the 14th May last, were read and confirmed.

His Excellency said that the first Bill which he had to introduce pursuant to notice was

“An Ordinance for taking the Census of the Falkland Islands.” The taking of the Census in 1891 in the Colonies was one of the subjects considered at the Colonial Conference of 1887, with a view to securing uniformity throughout the Empire, but the Census Act, recently passed, of which he laid a copy on the table, did not differ from that for 1881, to which the Bill now before them was almost precisely similar. He moved the suspension of the standing Rules and Orders and the first reading of the Bill. The Hon. J. J. Felton seconded the motion and the Bill was read a first time.

The Governor moved the second reading of the Bill, seconded by the Hon. the Colonial Surgeon, and the Bill was read a second time.

His Excellency then moved the third reading and passing of the Bill, seconded by the Hon. F. E. Cobb, and the Bill was read a third time and passed.

His Excellency then introduced “An Ordinance to provide for the Insurance of Parcels in the Post,” which he said was framed in consequence of a representation from the Postmaster General, who stated that the system of insurance on parcels from Great Britain to India had already been established, and had worked so satisfactorily that it would probably be established in all the Colonies, and that he was prepared, if this Colony responded, to commence it from the 1st of January, 1891.

Ordinance No. 9 of 1889 would be repealed, but provision was made in Section 2 of the present Ordinance to give compensation for loss or damage of uninsured parcels as in that Ordinance.

His Excellency moved the suspension of the standing Rules and Orders and the first reading of the Bill, this was seconded by the Hon. J. J. Felton, and the Bill was read a first time.

His Excellency then moved the second reading of the Bill, seconded by the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, and the Bill was read a second time.

The Governor then moved the third reading and passing of the Bill, seconded by the Hon. the Colonial Surgeon, and the Bill was read a third time and passed.

The Governor then introduced “An Ordinance for authorizing the Sale and Convey-

ance of certain lands of the Crown to the Falkland Islands Company,” and said: It appears that the object of this Bill is misunderstood, and as it has come to my knowledge that some persons have objected to it, I will before moving the first reading endeavour to explain the circumstances which have led to its introduction.

By the Land Ordinance of 1871 the price of country lands of the Crown is fixed at 4/- per acre, and by Ordinance No. 1 of 1872, lessees of Crown lands are required within ten years from the date of their leases, to purchase 160 acres of land on every section of 6000 acres, and that Ordinance contains a provision that the lessee may at any time during the continuance of the lease, purchase at the upset price of and any further quantity of land comprised in his station. By Ordinance No. 1 of 1879, the price of the land which the lessees were required to purchase was fixed at 2/- an acre.

The price of Crown lands may from time to time be raised or lowered by the Secretary of State.

Most of the leases now in force were granted by Governor D'Arcy in accordance with the provisions of an Ordinance passed in 1870 which gave the lessees the preemptive right of purchase at 2/- an acre. That Ordinance was disallowed, but the lessees were confirmed in the enjoyment of their leases by subsequent Ordinances and for a long time they contended that they had the right to purchase their lands at 2/- an acre. Mr. Blake, Mr. Waldron and others, applied to me for the purchase of their land on those terms, but on my pointing out that they had no such legal right, and that the revenue to be derived from the purchase money at that rate would be less than the rent when raised to £20 a section, they asked me to favour their applications to the Secretary of State for the purchase of their lands at a price which when capitalized would give the same amount of revenue as the £20 rent. This appeared to be as nearly as possible 3/- an acre, and I agreed to forward to the Secretary of State for his consideration any applications which might be made by any of the lessees, for the purchase at that price, of the whole of the land held by them. The first application of this nature was made by the Falkland Islands Company on the 9th September last, which I transmitted to the Secretary of State for his consideration, and he has authorized the sale to be made; but as it would not be expedient to lower the price

of country lands generally to 3/- an acre, which would enable persons to select the best portions of their holdings at that price and reject the valueless land, it has become necessary to pass Ordinances in respect of each sale which is made on these terms to enable the land to be sold at a lower rate than the rate fixed by the Ordinance of 1871. Within the last few days I have received an application from Mr. Bertrand to the Secretary of State for the purchase of his Station at Roy Cove, which will be forwarded in due course, and which when sanctioned will require an Ordinance to enable the sale to be made as in the present case, and so with regard to others who intend to make similar applications.

Previous to the year 1881 all the money received for the sale of Crown Lands had been treated as ordinary revenue, and had been expended in the current service of the Government. In that year I was instructed by the Secretary of State to pass an Ordinance to provide for the renewal of the existing leases at a rental of £10 a section as they respectively expired, in consequence of which I made a full report respecting the Crown Lands, and advised that on the renewal of the leases the rents should be raised to £20 a section, and that all money received from the Land Sales should be capitalized and the interest only be used for current expenditure. I received authority to change the provisions of the Ordinance from £10 to £20, and in that form it was passed as No. 9 of 1882.

Lord Kimberley also approved of my suggestion for capitalizing the proceeds of the sale of Crown Lands, subject to the proviso that the revenue proper to the year in which any sale took place was sufficient to meet the expenditure of the year.

Since that time the proceeds of such sales have not been expended, but are intended to form part of a fund which will produce a sum in aid of revenue equal to that which would have been received in rent had the land not been sold.

The rent of the land now about to be sold to the Falkland Islands Company is at present £226 a year, and if all the leases were renewed it would be £331, while the interest from the purchase money will be £364. In the case of Mr. Bertrand his present rent is £109—if the lease should be renewed it would be £218, and the interest on his purchase money (£9,490) will be £237.

Down to the year 1867 there was not a single settler on the West Falklands. In that year Mr. James Waldron settled on 42,000 acres, and at once expended £10,000 in stocking it with sheep from the River Plate.

At that time the revenue raised in the Colony was only £1000, and of that amount £100 was derived from the sale of Crown Lands, £300 from rent of land, and the rest from Licenses, Auction duties, Wild cattle, and other small receipts. The Imperial Government granted £5875 in aid, besides an expenditure of £1200

by the War Office. In 1869 the whole of the West Falklands was settled, and the revenue from the rents of that Island was £1900—and in 1891 the revenue will be £3457 for the whole Colony. In 1898, when the whole of the rents will have been raised to £20 a section, the revenue from Crown lands will be £5298, and should the lessees purchase the lands on the terms of the proposed Ordinance, the revenue will be still further increased.

It should be a matter of rejoicing to all who have the welfare and prosperity of the Colony at heart, that the settlers on the Crown lands have succeeded, after the expenditure of a large amount of capital and after long years of unremunerative toil, exposure and anxiety, in securing the reward which they deserve, had it been otherwise the Colony would have been in a very miserable condition; as it is, the population since the Colony has been fully settled has increased threefold, employment at good wages has been afforded to a large number of people, and those among them who have been thrifty have saved considerable sums of money, as is evidenced by the large amount deposited in the Government Savings Bank, which now amounts to £20,000, and is regularly increasing, and the fact that many of the industrious shepherds and others are forming grazing Settlements in the neighbouring Republics.

My long term of administration has enabled me to observe accurately the progress which has been and is being made, which, with the opportunities I have had of consulting the records left by my predecessors, enables me to speak with some authority on this question.

I satisfied myself before proposing the increase of the land rent to £20 a section, that it was a fair and just rent for fully stocked stations as shown by the returns to which I had access, and to the statements which were furnished to me, and (looking to the risk attending the price of wool) the calculation of the value of the land in fee at 3/- per acre is in accordance with that rate of rent.

His Excellency then moved the suspension of the standing Rules and Orders and the first reading of the Bill. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded the motion.

The Honourable J. J. Felton moved as an amendment that the following section be added to the Ordinance, which he said applied, as it stood, solely to the Falklands Islands Company.

“Should any other lessee or lessees of country lands of the Crown desire to purchase his or their lands without selection, it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the sanction of one of Her Majesty’s principal Secretaries of State, to sell and convey such lands on the terms hereinbefore provided in the case of the Falkland Islands Company.”

The Honourable F. E. Cobb seconded the motion, and said, he had much pleasure in seconding the amendment proposed by his honourable friend, as it would tend to remove the absurd impression that the Company was specially favoured by the Ordinance; so far

from that being the case he understood that Mr. Blake could have secured the same terms over two years ago. He considered that the policy of selling land outright at a fair value was a proper one, for people would always spend more on their own property than on leased Crown land, however long the leases might be. As an instance of this he said that the Company had ordered the whole of their purchase to be fenced in at once, and that further sub-divisions would follow, thereby leading to the employment of a good deal of labour and doing good all round. No doubt other purchasers would do the same.

The motion was carried without a division and the Bill was amended accordingly.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon said there had been a great deal of secrecy about this Bill, which he opposed on the following grounds. First, that the price of four shillings an acre was the proper value of the land, and Second, that the Crown land should not be sold at all. He also said the two unofficial members were interested in the Bill as representing the sheep farmers and he did not see how they could vote in the matter,

His Excellency the Governor reminded the honourable member that the existing law gave the lessees the right of purchase of the land during the term of their leases, and that he had already gone fully into the question of its value, which was a matter for the decision of the Secretary of State.

The Honourable F. E. Cobb said that had this Ordinance been introduced before the sale had been arranged by the Secretary of State, he might as an interested person have felt some hesitation in voting, but as the Ordinance was framed to carry out the Secretary of State's instructions, he looked upon it as a matter of form and would disregard the honourable member's suggestion.

The Bill was then read a first time.

His Excellency then moved the second reading of the Bill, seconded by the Honourable F. E. Cobb, and the Bill was read a second time.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved that the title of the Ordinance be amended by adding the words "and other lessees of the Crown" to the original title.

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously, and the title of the Bill was amended accordingly.

His Excellency then moved the third reading and passing of the Bill, seconded by the Hon. J. J. Felton, and the Bill was then read a third time and passed.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said that

he hoped the explanatory remarks which His Excellency had addressed to them respecting the Crown lands would be embodied in the minutes of the proceedings.

His Excellency the Governor then said that as the time of his departure from the Colony was drawing near and as in the absence of any immediate necessity for legislation it would probably be the last occasion on which he would meet honourable members in their places, he wished to say a few words before taking leave of them. Although there had on several occasions been differences of opinion between them on public questions, he felt quite sure that in opposing him they were always actuated by honest convictions and motives, and he was certain they gave him credit also for acting according to his views and convictions of right. His sole aim had been the welfare of the Colony and its inhabitants, and it was a matter for which he thought he could justly claim credit that the resources of the Colony had been largely developed during his administration and that the welfare and prosperity of the inhabitants had been increased. It had been his constant wish and endeavour that this end might be attained and he felt sure that he had succeeded in achieving it. No public man, especially the Governor of a Crown Colony such as this one, could expect to escape misrepresentation, but he could afford freely to forgive whoever had maliciously tried to injure him, because he was sensible that they had never been able to do him any harm, and he thought they would probably regret their conduct before they died, or afterwards.

The Honourable F. E. Cobb said, he congratulated his Excellency upon leaving the Colony in a more flourishing condition than it was when he arrived and that although it could not be denied that there had been at times considerable differences of opinion on public matters, and the atmosphere had been much heated on several occasions, he was glad to think that their differences had been confined to public affairs and that he was sure he might say both for the other unofficial member and for himself that they had the greatest respect for his Excellency personally and wished him prolonged life and every happiness in his retirement.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said that he had received every kindness and consideration at His Excellency's hands and that he joined with Mr. Cobb in wishing His Excellency health and prosperity in his retirement.

The Council was then adjourned *sine die*.

No. 7 of 1890.

An Ordinance for taking the Census of the Falkland Islands.

WHEREAS it is expedient to take the Census of the Falkland Islands in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Census to be taken in 1891.

1. A Census for the Falkland Islands shall be taken in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and the Census day shall be Sunday the fifth day of April in that year.

Governor in Council to superintend the taking of the Census.

2. The Governor in Council shall have the care of superintending the taking of the Census, and shall cause to be prepared and printed, for the use of the persons to be employed in taking it, such forms and instructions as he shall deem necessary, and the Colonial Secretary shall issue all such forms and instructions to the persons for whose use they shall be intended; and all expenses which shall be incurred by authority of this Ordinance shall be paid by the Colonial Treasurer on the warrants of the Governor in Council.

Enumerators' divisions to be formed and enumerators to be appointed.

3. The Colony shall be formed into enumerators' divisions according to instructions prepared under the direction of the Governor in Council, and the Governor shall appoint enumerators for taking the Census, and shall assign a division to each enumerator and shall cause to be distributed to the several enumerators the forms and instructions which shall have been issued for that purpose.

Householders' schedules to be left at dwelling houses.

4. Schedules shall be prepared for the purpose of being filled up by or on behalf of the several occupiers of dwelling houses as hereinafter provided, with particulars of the name, sex, age, rank, profession or occupation, condition as to marriage, relation to head of family, and birthplace of every living person who abode in every house on the night of Sunday the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and also whether any were blind, or deaf and dumb, or imbecile or lunatic; and the enumerators shall in the course of the week ending on Saturday the fourth day of April in the said year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one leave or cause to be left at every dwelling house within their respective divisions one or more of the said Schedules for the occupier or occupiers thereof, or of any part thereof, and upon every such Schedule it shall be plainly expressed that it is to be filled up by the occupier of such dwelling-house (or where such dwelling-house is let or sub-let in different storeys or apartments, and occupied distinctly by different persons or families, by the occupier of each distinct story or apartment) and that the enumerator shall collect all such Schedules within his division on the Monday next then following.

Occupiers to fill up the schedules and sign and deliver them to the Enumerator.

(2.) Every occupier of any dwelling house, or of any distinct story or apartment in any dwelling-house, with or for whom any such Schedule shall have been left as aforesaid, shall fill up the said Schedule to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, so far as relates to all persons dwelling in the house, story, or apartment occupied by him or her, and shall sign his or her name thereunto, and shall deliver the Schedule so filled up, or cause the same to be delivered to the enumerator when required so to do.

Penalty for neglect.

(3.) Every such occupier who shall wilfully refuse, or without lawful excuse neglect to fill up the said Schedule to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, or to sign and deliver the same as herein required, or who shall wilfully make, sign, or deliver, or cause to be made, signed, or delivered, any false return of all or any of the matters specified in the said Schedule, shall forfeit a sum not more than five pounds nor less than twenty shillings.

Schedules to be collected from house to house and corrected if found to be erroneous.

5. The enumerators shall visit every house in their respective divisions, and shall collect all the Schedules so left within their divisions from house to house, so far as may be possible on Monday

the sixth day of April in the said year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and shall complete such of the Schedules as upon delivery thereof to them shall appear to be defective, and correct such as they shall find to be erroneous, and shall add thereunto an account according to the best information which they shall be able to obtain of all the other persons living within their divisions who shall not be included in the Schedules so collected by them.

Enumerators to take an account of houses, &c.

6. Every enumerator shall also take an account of the occupied houses, and of the houses then building and therefore uninhabited, and also of all other uninhabited houses within his division and shall also take an account of all such particulars hereinbefore mentioned, and none others, according to the forms and instructions which may be issued under this Ordinance, and shall make a correct return of all such information, and shall sign a form or declaration to the effect that to the best of his information, the same is correct, which form of declaration shall be prepared by or under the direction of the Governor in Council, and shall deliver or transmit all such reports together with the householders' Schedules collected by him to the Colonial Secretary.

Enumerators to deliver returns with householders' schedules to the Colonial Secretary.

An abstract of returns to be prepared by Registrar General and transmitted to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

7. The Colonial Secretary shall, so soon as the reports and Schedules are received by him, place the same in the hands of the Registrar General of Births, Deaths and Marriages, and it shall be the duty of the said Registrar General to revise all such returns and prepare a detailed abstract of the same, to be laid before the Governor in Council, and the Governor shall as soon as possible transmit copies of such abstract to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Returns of persons travelling or on ship-board or not in houses.

8. The Governor in Council shall obtain by such ways and means as shall appear best adapted for the purpose, returns of the particulars required by this Ordinance with respect to all persons who during the said night of Sunday the fifth day of April were travelling or on Ship-board, or for any other reason were not abiding in any house of which account is to be taken by the enumerators and other persons aforesaid, and shall include such returns in the abstract to be made as aforesaid.

Table of allowances to enumerators and others, and payment of the same.

9. The Governor in Council shall cause to be prepared a table of allowances to be paid to the enumerators and other persons employed in the execution of this Ordinance, and the Colonial Treasurer shall pay the amount of such allowances to the persons entitled thereto, on the warrant of the Governor in Council.

Penalty on persons for wilful default.

10. Every enumerator or other person employed under this Ordinance who shall make wilful default in any of the matters required of them respectively by this Ordinance, or wilfully making any false declaration shall for every such wilful default or false declaration forfeit a sum not exceeding five pounds and not less than two pounds.

Penalty for refusing information or giving false answers.

11. The Enumerators and other persons employed in the execution of this Ordinance shall be authorised to ask all such questions as shall be directed in any instructions to be prepared by or under the direction of the Governor in Council, which shall be necessary for obtaining the returns required by this Ordinance, and every person refusing to answer or wilfully giving a false answer to such questions or any of them, shall for every such refusal or wilfully false answer forfeit a sum not exceeding five pounds nor less than twenty shillings.

Recovery of penalties.

12. All penalties imposed under this Ordinance shall be recovered in manner provided by the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance.

Title of the Ordinance.

13. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Census Ordinance 1891."

Passed the Legislative Council the 29th day of December 1890.

No. 8 of 1890.

Preamble.

An Ordinance to provide for the insurance of parcels in the post.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make fuller provision in compensation for damage or loss in this Colony or in transit from this Colony of parcels exchanged between it and the United Kingdom by means of a system of Insurance.

Ordinance No. 9 of 1889 repealed.

If articles sent by parcels post are insured payment to be made for loss or damage.

Governor may give compensation for loss or damage of uninsured parcels.

No compensation to be greater than £50, nor exceed value of article lost or damaged.

Parcels must be carefully and substantially packed.

Postmaster not to insure perishable articles.

Short title.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1. Ordinance No. 9 of 1889, entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the payment of compensation in respect of the loss or damage of parcels in the post," is hereby repealed.

2. If any article of pecuniary value enclosed in or forming part of a parcel be lost or damaged whilst in the course of conveyance by the post in this Colony to any place outside the Colony payment will be made to the sender who shall have insured the same according to the scale laid down in the Schedule annexed to this Ordinance; but no liability shall attach in respect of any article not so insured: it being optional however in the discretion of the Governor to give compensation up to the sum of but not exceeding twenty shillings for the loss or damage of an uninsured parcel.

3. In no case will compensation be granted to a greater amount than £50 in respect of any one parcel, nor will the amount paid as compensation in any case exceed the value of the article lost, or the damage sustained, or in case the sum for which the parcel has been insured shall be the less amount the sum in question.

4. In dealing with claims for compensation it shall be competent for the Governor to require evidence that any parcel in respect of which an Insurance fee has been paid was carefully and substantially packed.

5. The Postmaster may in his discretion, refuse to insure any parcel which is in his opinion improperly packed so far as he is in a position to judge of its contents, or any parcel containing perishable articles.

6. This Ordinance may be cited as the Parcels Post Insurance Ordinance 1890.

Passed the Legislative Council the 29th day of December 1890.

No. 9 of 1890.

An Ordinance for authorizing the Sale and Conveyance of certain lands of the Crown to the Falkland Islands Company and other Lessees of the Crown Lands.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is provided by the sixth section of the Land Ordinance 1871, that the upset price of country lands of the Crown shall not be lower than at the rate of four shillings per acre, and whereas it is expedient to sell and convey to the Falkland Islands Company certain country lands of the Crown now held by them on lease, at the rate of three shillings per acre.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Certain Country Crown lands to be sold to the Falkland Islands Company at 3/- per acre.

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor to sell and convey to the incorporated Company known as the Falkland Islands Company, at the rate of three shillings per acre, all those country lands of the Crown now held on lease by the said Falkland Islands Company and more particularly described in the Schedule to this Ordinance annexed, containing in the whole ninety-seven thousand one hundred and twenty-eight acres.

Lands to be conveyed by Crown Grant.

2. The lands aforesaid shall be conveyed to the Falkland Islands Company in a Crown grant and subject to all the conditions and reservations contained in the printed Crown Grants of Land in this Colony.

Other lessees of Country Crown Lands may purchase on like terms with sanction of Secretary of State.

3. Should any other lessee or lessees of country lands of the Crown desire to purchase his or their lands without selection, it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the sanction of one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, to sell and convey such lands on the terms hereinbefore provided in the case of the Falkland Islands Company.

Passed the Legislative Council the 29th day of December 1890.

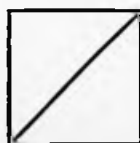

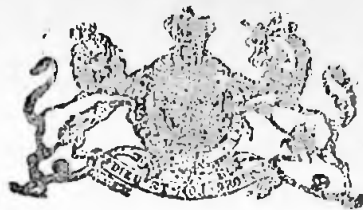

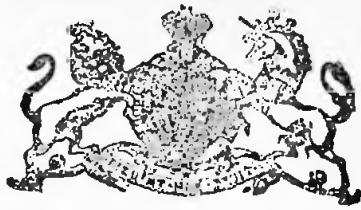

The President said he should be entirely guided by the report of the Medical Officer on board that vessel.

A discussion ensued as to the necessity of isolating the vessel for any lengthened period, but it was the opinion of the President that risk of contagion existed for fourteen days after a patient's convalescence from small pox. It was therefore determined to keep the ship isolated until the 16th of the month, if on her arrival there should be found no symptoms of disease on board.

The Colonial Secretary requested it to be placed on the minutes, that in assenting to the proposal to isolate the “Basilisk” for so long a period he deferred to the professional opinion of the President.

Précis of REPLIES.

Falkland Islands
Co.'s. Manager.

Having assisted in drafting the proposed Ordinance thinks it unnecessary to give an opinion regarding its specific clauses, beyond saying that in Clause 4 and Section 5, b. & c., to adopt a period of 12 months for the season, that it is possible for the disease to lie dormant over six months and not show itself until the Autumn rains come on.

Though formerly opposed to further legislation on the subject is reluctantly obliged to say that he now considers nothing but a stringent act will be efficacious. Some farmers do not employ hands enough to make a clean muster of their sheep. Points out the effect of this and the effect of an opposite policy on the part of the Company. What the Company have done others can do. Thinks the proposed Ordinance will merely serve to open the question, but in itself it will be powerless to stop the evil.

Illustrates by the example of legislation in the Australian and other Colonies that scab can be stamped out in this Colony, and expresses surprise why it should be allowed to exist year after year for want of it.

Bertrand W. W.
Roy Cove Station.

Is entirely opposed to the terms of the proposed Ordinance, thinking them prejudicial to the interests of the farmers for certain reasons, viz.

1 & 2. Fencing Ordinance should precede it, as it is impossible with the best shepherding to prevent sheep from straying upon an adjoining Station.

3. A driving Clause absolutely necessary to be inserted in the present Sheep Ordinance, subject to certain conditions for mutual protection, and in this connection points out the power which the existing Sheep Ordinance gives to neighbours to boycott one another and ruin the promising trade in frozen mutton which has lately sprung up.

Draft of a proposed Ordinance to amend the Sheep Ordinance, 1867.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to extend and amend the Sheep Ordinance No. 3 of 1867.

Be it enacted &c., as follows :—

Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Sheep Ordinance Amendment Ordinance 1890."

Governor to make regulations.

2. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by Proclamation, to make such regulations as he may consider necessary or expedient for the eradication of scab in sheep.

Amendment of Ordinance No. 3 of 1867, clause 2.

3. Clause 2 of Ordinance No 3 of 1867 shall be amended by adding to it as it stands the words "for every sheep so driven, depastured, or suffered to be at large."

Construction of words "infected sheep."

4. In the construction of this Ordinance "infected sheep" shall mean—

(a) Any sheep infected with scab.

(b) Any sheep which have within the preceding $\left\{ \begin{array}{c} 3 \\ 6 \\ 12 \end{array} \right\}$

months been in direct or indirect contact with any sheep so infected.

(c) Any sheep which have been infected and dipped

within a period of $\left\{ \begin{array}{c} 3 \\ 6 \\ 12 \end{array} \right\}$

months after such dipping.

Notice of infection to be given by owners of sheep.

5. Whenever the owner of any sheep shall be or shall become aware or shall have reasonable grounds to suspect that the same are or have become infected with scab, he shall within seven days thereafter give personal notice thereof in writing, with particulars as to where such infected sheep are running, to the owners or managers or all the adjoining runs, and shall also by the first opportunity give the same notice and particulars to the Governor. Any person offending against the provisions of this clause shall, for every case in which he shall fail to give the prescribed notices, be liable to a penalty of not less than £10 nor exceeding £50.

Précis of replies to Circular letter dated 26th September 1890, from the Colonial Secretary to Sheep Farmers on the subject of proposed legislation in the matter of Scab in Sheep.

(Continued from the Gazette of 12th February 1891.)

Birch. T. S.
Wyrley.

Is of opinion that no law to be effectual in the matter of eradicating Scab can be so unless no owner or occupier of land shall be able to give his consent to infected sheep crossing his land.

Draws an example between a Small Pox patient landed in Stanley and a farmer giving his consent to infected sheep crossing his land surrounded by neighbours.

Is of opinion that a time should be fixed, and after that date no person should be allowed to move any of his flock over another's land on any pretext if he have any infected sheep in his flocks.

Prosecutions for infringement of any Ordinance should be directed by the Governor and in no way left for one farmer to institute against another.

Blake. Robert

Having again and again urged Government to take the matter up, is in favour of anything and everything which may tend to help the eradication of Scab.

Thinks the proposed alterations very insufficient, but they are nevertheless steps in the right direction.

Never work "underhanded" or it is impossible to gather the sheep clean off the ground and Scab is ever present.

Pressure must be brought to bear on people utterly careless of their neighbour's weal, or Scab will never be stamped out.

Refers to the example of the Australian Colonies, and some instances in the Falklands, where isolation has been followed by immunity from Scab.

Thinks if a flock be declared Scabby a period of twelve months ought to elapse before that flock can be safely declared clean.]

Mr. Blake further observes, "every flock master knows, that in "the summer very little scab is apparent in sheep, but as soon as the "winter sets in, or even at the close of a wet autumn, the sheep begin "to break, and it depends entirely on the season how soon they "break out, how quickly the disease spreads. Sheep then get a "winter dip, in June or July, this, if properly applied, checks the "spread of the disease, no scab, or hardly any, shows at the following "shearing. That flock is almost certain to break again the following "winter; if it passes through the winter without an outbreak it may "be declared clean."

No man with any experience, would dare give a lean certificate, during the first six months of the year, to a flock that had been dipped for scab during the previous winter.

What some farmers have done in these Islands, in the way of cleaning their stock, others can do.

Cannot comprehend why scab should be allowed to exist here when in other places stringent laws are in existence to stamp it out.

Speaks of a great loss by winter dipping and hopes that the matter will be taken up for legislation. Will do all he can to that end.

Dettleff. William

Is of opinion that Ordinance No. 3 of 1867 has been successful till now and needs no amendment.

Thinks clauses 3 & 4 of the proposed Ordinance would be very hurtful, as farmers have tried varieties of sheep dip and have gone to expenses. The Monopolists would have great advantage over small farmers.

Buckworth.

Considers Section 2 quite unnecessary.

Russell H.

Section 3 is good and cannot well be improved upon.

Section 4 is also good and highly necessary.

(a) should stand.

(b) should be 2 months, and taking out the words "or indirect" in the 2nd line, as indirect would apply from one end of the Island to the other.

The rest of (b) is good.

(c) is also good and should be six months.

Section 5 very good indeed.

Felton. J. J.

The Hon.

Does not think it advisable to alter the existing law by the addition of the proposed amendments.

The unfenced state of many of the boundaries and the boundaries themselves being still matters of question and dispute, make it certain that the proposed alterations would lead to constant disputes and litigation.

States that a new enterprise for the export of frozen mutton has been started at great expense by Messrs. Spearing & Waldron, who are now about to put up works at San Carlos, to enable farmers upon the East to co-operate with them, and who were guaranteed a sufficient quantity of sheep for a term of years, to be delivered at Port Howard and San Carlos, and that the effects of the proposed amendments must be considered in connection with this trade. The proposed amendments would place two or three parties in a position to debar others from obtaining a profitable outlet for surplus stock, or to carry out their arrangements to supply stock for freezing purposes.

The addition of clause 5, and a modified portion of some of the preceding clauses might be of advantage, also the compulsory registration of ear marks and brands, the killing of stray sheep, a right to drive sheep from infected runs through infected runs, &c.

Thinks however that as most of the leases expire next year and as an Ordinance has only lately been passed enabling Lessees to purchase their land, all proposed amendments had better be deferred until boundaries are clearly defined, fresh leases renewed, or arrangements for purchase made.

Going. J. A.

Is of opinion that no fresh legislation on the subject of scab is required.

Scab would be a thing of the past if section 1 of Sheep Ordinance No. 3 of 1867 were rigidly carried out.

Only flaw in that section is a doubt as to the exact meaning of "herded by a shepherd."

Hennah. Henry H.

Does not think there is any need for any such Ordinance provided the Sheep Ordinance of 1867 be rigidly enforced.

Packe. Vere

Thinks the proposed amendment would be very beneficial. At same time thinks a fence law would be more so, making each farmer fence his boundary, or put up so much fencing every year till this is done. It would enable flocks to be more separated, and so to a great extent check scab from spreading.

Fine of £50 in clause 3 for every sheep will be heavy on those who have no boundary fence, as it is impossible to keep sheep from intermixing to a certain extent, without a fence.

Clause 4 (b). Persons ought to be able to tell if sheep are infected six months after direct or indirect contact with infected sheep.

In his opinion sheep infected with scab and dipped cannot be guaranteed clean under 12 months after dipping.

Clause 5. Thinks any farmer could comply with this Clause.

Smith. James

Is of opinion that the present flourishing position of most of the farmers is a proof that the Sheep Ordinance 3 of 1867 is quite sufficient to meet all requirements for the suppression and extinction of Scab.

Thinks Clauses 3 & 4 of proposed Ordinance would be very hurtful to the smaller farmers and would tend to strengthen the already strong monopoly.

Suggests that if possible Ordinance No. 4 of 1870 be strictly adhered to.

Stickney. Bernard

Thinks it is absolutely necessary for the good of the Colony that there should be a Scab Ordinance, and that the Sheep Ordinance No. 3 of 1867, with the amendments attached to Clause 2 in the proposed Ordinance, will be a great improvement. Then the Ordinance will be quite severe enough, and a very good one for a small Colony like this, without any further addition.

As to the construction of words "infected sheep," is of opinion this should mean

(a) Any sheep infected with scab.

(b) Any sheep which have been in contact with any sheep so infected until the flock have been dipped.

(c) Any sheep which have been infected and dipped within a period of twelve months.

Respecting the specific Clauses of the proposed Bill, thinks Clause 5 should most decidedly be inserted.

Stickney. Bros.

Are pleased to see a move has been made at last, and with the opinions of all the Sheep Farmers before Government something ought to be done to protect those who have cleaned their flocks.

Their opinions on the specific Clauses of Bill are

Clause 3. A penalty of £1 sterling per head. When it is known that a neighbour has scab on his station a Farmer should be allowed to seize, kill, and burn any quantity of such neighbour's sheep found at large on his land in addition to the penalty.

Clause 4. Sheep that have been in contact with scab, can by an experienced man be declared clean after six months.

(c) Sheep that have been infected with scab, or Station that has had scab on it, cannot be declared clean within twelve months.

Waldron. Henry.

Remarks—1. A Stringent Sheep Ordinance is necessary to the future prosperity of the Colony.

2. (b & c) in Clause 4 of proposed Bill do not go far enough. What about a neighbour wilfully driving scabby sheep through a neighbour's clean flocks?

Some Clauses of the Canterbury, (New Zealand) Sheep Act would be desirable. Compulsory curing of scab is necessary.

REDUCTION OF LETTER POSTAGE.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Acts, or any of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same) and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Definition.

1. In this Warrant the expression “United Kingdom” includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

Rates of Postage.

2. On every letter transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Falkland Islands or British Honduras there shall be charged and paid (in lieu of any rates now payable) for every half of an ounce in weight of such letter, or fractional part of half of an ounce in weight, a rate of postage of two pence halfpenny.

Unpaid and Insufficiently Prepaid Letters.

3. Any Letter posted in the United Kingdom addressed to the Falkland Islands or British Honduras, or posted in the Falkland Islands or British Honduras, addressed to the United Kingdom, upon which the postage chargeable under this Warrant is wholly or in part unpaid, shall be charged with double the amount of the deficient postage.

Application of Provisions of other Warrants.

4. All such Letters as are hereinbefore referred to shall, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to the provisions of any Treasury Warrant now or for the time being in force applicable thereto.

Commencement of Warrant.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

Mariners are warned that during and after long continued S.-Ely. gales, when a heavy sea is rolling in on the S. and S.E. coasts of the Falkland Islands, there is stated to be a strong set to the N.-Wrd., to which set has been attributed the loss of several vessels in the neighbourhood of Bull Point. Vessels from Cape Horn, therefore, intending to sight Beauchère Island, should make due allowance against a possible set of 20 to 30 miles a day to the N.-Wrd.

JASON ISLANDS.—During March 1890, a patch of kelp (always indicative of a rocky bottom and often of a hidden danger) about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile in extent, is reported to have been passed in P.D., 50° 53 $\frac{1}{4}$ ' S., 61° 16 $\frac{3}{4}$ ' W., Nrd., of the Islands, with the W., end of Steeple Jason, approx. S.E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 7 to 8 miles. At the time of passing, the wind was N.Ely. strong, with a rough sea, but no breakers were seen; it was estimated to be slack water, and that the kelp would be under water when the tidal stream (which in this locality attains considerable velocity) is running. *December.*

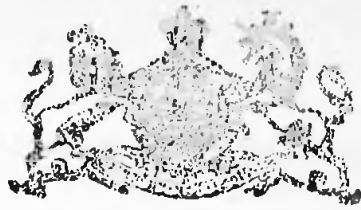

CAUTION TO MARINERS.—CURRENTS.—Mariners are warned that during and after long continued S.-Ely. gales, when a heavy sea is rolling in on the S. and S.E. coasts of the Falkland Islands, there is stated to be a strong set to the N.-Wrd., to which set has been attributed the loss of several vessels in the neighbourhood of Bull Point. Vessels from Cape Horn, therefore, intending to sight Beauchêre Island, should make due allowance against a possible set of 20 to 30 miles a day to the N.-Wrd.

JASON ISLANDS.—During March 1890, a patch of kelp (always indicative of a rocky bottom and often of a hidden danger) about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile in extent, is reported to have been passed in P.D., 50° 53 $\frac{1}{4}$ ' S., 61° 16 $\frac{3}{4}$ ' W., Nrd., of the Islands, with the W., end of Steeple Jason, approx. The Governor, after consultation with the Executive Council, directs the publication for the information of Land-holders of the following draft Fencing Ordinance, which it is considered would be advantageously applicable in this Colony before any further consideration of a Scab Ordinance.

An Ordinance to provide for the construction of Dividing Fences.

WHEREAS it is expedient that Dividing Fences should be constructed by the occupiers of adjoining pastoral lands at the joint expense of such occupiers.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council; as follows:—

Title of Ordinance.

1. This Ordinance shall be called and may be cited as "*The Fences Ordinance 1891*," and shall come into operation on the first day of January one-thousand eight-hundred and ninety-two, and shall be divided into Parts, as follows:—

Part I.—Introduction.

Part II.—Construction of Dividing Fences.

Part III.—Maintenance and repairs of Fences.

Part IV.—Proceedings for the Recovery of Contributions.

Part V.—General Provisions.

PART I. Introduction.

Interpretation of terms.

2, In the construction of this Ordinance the following words and expressions shall, unless there be something on the context repugnant to such construction have the several meanings hereby assigned to them:—

"Justices." Wherever the words justices appear in this Ordinance they shall respectively be deemed to mean three justices of the peace.

"Occupier." Shall include any person who is in the actual occupation of or entitled as owner to occupy any land alienated from the Crown by grant, lease or license, but shall not mean or include any person in the occupation of land held by yearly license, or for any term less than ten years.

"Dividing Fence shall mean a fence separating the lands of different occupiers.

Sufficient fence.

3. Any fence of any of the kinds hereinafter mentioned and described shall be a sufficient fence within the meaning of this Ordinance,

(1). A post and rail fence at least three feet six inches in height of substantial material firmly erected, with no greater distance between the rails or the bottom rail and the ground than one foot. unless there be a wire inserted between the rails and the posts not more than nine feet asunder.

(II). A substantial paling fence at least three feet six inches in height, with no greater distance between the palings than four inches.

(III). A substantial wire fence at least three feet three inches in height, having not less than six wires tightly stretched, with no greater distance between each of the three lowest wires, or the bottom wire and the ground than $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and the posts or standards of which are not more than 20 yards apart with intermediate iron or wooden droppers or swingers between them, securely bound to the wires, not more than six feet apart and with not less than six straining posts to the mile.

(IV). A bank or wall of substantial materials at least four feet in height and not less than two feet wide at the bottom and nine inches at the top.

(V). A combination of any of the above mentioned fences at least four feet in height.

Part II. Construction of Dividing Fences.

4. The occupiers of adjoining lands not divided by a sufficient fence shall be liable to join in or contribute to the construction of a dividing fence between such lands in equal proportions.

5. When a river, creek or natural watercourse forms the boundary of contiguous lands, but is not capable of resisting the trespass of cattle, it shall be competent for the occupants of such contiguous lands to agree upon such a line of fence on either side of such river, creek or natural watercourse, as shall secure such fence from the action of floods, and in the event of their not agreeing upon a line of fence it shall be competent for either party to call on the nearest justices they may agree to select, who shall determine the line of fence to be erected, and decide whether any and what compensation in the shape of an annual payment shall be paid to either of the parties occupying such contiguous lands in consideration of loss of occupation of land, and the justices so called in shall be entitled to receive from such occupiers in equal proportions the actual cost of their travelling expenses (if any) incurred by them in visiting and inspecting the ground: But the occupation of lands on either side of such line of fence shall not be deemed adverse possession, and shall not affect the title to or the possession of any such lands save for the purposes of this Ordinance.

6. Any person desiring to compel any other person to contribute to the construction of a dividing fence under the provisions of this Ordinance may serve on such person a notice to fence, which shall be in writing or in print, or partly in writing and partly in print, and shall specify the boundary to be fenced and contain a proposal for fencing the same, and shall specify the kind of fence proposed to be constructed.

Liability of occupiers of adjoining lands to fence.

When river, &c., natural boundary, power to agree on line of fence.

Service of notice to fence.

Proceeding in default
of agreement consequent
on notice of fence.

7. If within one month after the service of any notice to fence, the person serving and the person served with such notice do not agree as to the construction and kind of a fence, any three justices on the complaint of either of them may make an order prescribing the kind of fence to be constructed, and what portion thereof shall be constructed by each such person, and in cases where such further order is necessary the position of such fence, or may refer the determination of the matters to be prescribed by such order to the award of some arbitrator who shall be appointed by an order of such justices, and the award of such arbitrator shall have the same effect as, and be deemed an order of justices, and in case and as often as any arbitrator so appointed die, or neglect, decline, or become incapable to act, any three or more justices may appoint another arbitrator in his place, who shall have the like powers and duties: Provided that in making any such order or award the justices or arbitrator, as the case may be, shall be guided as to which of the kinds of fence hereinbefore described, such justices or arbitrator shall order or award to be constructed by the kind of fence usually constructed in the place where it is proposed to erect such fence.

Proceeding on failure
to carry out agreement
or order of justices.

8. If the person serving and the person served with such notice agree as to the construction of such fence, or if in default of such agreement an order of justices or an award of an arbitrator is made as aforesaid, and in either case either of such persons fail within the time named in that behalf in such agreement, order or award, or if no such time be named within three months after the date of such agreement, order or award, to perform his part of such agreement or to comply with such order or award, then the other of such persons may construct the whole fence as agreed upon or prescribed by such order or award, and may recover half the cost of constructing the same in any court of competent jurisdiction.

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Draft of "An Ordinance to provide for the construction of Dividing Fences."
(Continued from Gazette of 12th March, 1891.)

Cases where occupier
cannot be found.

9. When the occupier of any land is absent from the Colony cannot be found on any land is unoccupied, the occupier of any adjoining land may insert in the Official Gazette a notice addressed to the occupier of such land, inviting him as the occupier of such land, and requiring him to contribute to the construction of a fence, and may then proceed *ex parte* to obtain from three justices or an arbitrator appointed by them, an order or award (as hereinafter provided in the case of persons not agreeing as to the construction or kind of fence) authorizing the construction of such fence and specifying the kind of fence to be constructed and the position thereof, and may construct a fence in compliance with such order or award; and if afterwards during the continuance of such fence, any person go into occupation of such adjoining land may within one month thereafter serve any person, who if such fence were not in existence, would be liable to the construction of a fence in the place thereof, with a copy of such order or award, and shall after the expiration of one month from the date of such service be entitled to recover one half of the then value of such fence, but if such order made *ex parte* be inequitable any three justices on the complaint of any person interested in disputing the same made within one month after service of such order or award may relieve the complainant from the whole or any portion of the sum claimed as the value of such fence, and may order that the line of such fence be altered on such terms as may be just.

PART III.—Maintenance and Repairs of Fences.

Adjoining occupiers to
keep dividing fences in
repair.

10. When any dividing fence made or to be made shall be out of repair or become insufficient, the occupiers of land on either side thereof shall be liable to the cost of repairing such fence in equal proportions.

Procedure to compel con-
tribution to the repair
of dividing fences

11. The occupier of any land separated from any adjoining land by a dividing fence, may serve a notice upon the occupier of such adjoining land requiring him to assist in repairing such fence, and if such occupier shall refuse or neglect for the space of one week after the service of such notice to assist in repairing such fence, it shall be lawful for such first mentioned occupier to repair such fence and to demand and recover of and from such other occupier half the cost of repairing the same: Provided that if any dividing fence or any portion thereof shall be destroyed by accident the occupier of land on either side may immediately repair the same without any notice, and shall be entitled to recover half the expense of so doing from the occupier of the adjoining land: Provided always that in case such dividing fence shall have been destroyed by fire, the occupier through whose neglect (if any) such fire shall have originated, or have caused injury to the fence, shall be the party bound to repair the entire of the fence so damaged as aforesaid.

PART IV.—Proceedings for the Recovery of Contributions

From whom money re-
coverable under this
Ordinance may be
recovered.

12. All money recoverable under this Ordinance in respect of the construction or repairing of any fence by any person serving any notice to fence or repair or any *ex parte* order or award may be recovered from any person liable to contribute to the cost of

constructing or repairing such fence who is served with notice to fence or repair or such *ex parte* order or award, or any person who may come in and defend under the provisions of this Ordinance any proceedings consequent on such notice or the service of such order or award: All such moneys recoverable by any person served with such notice may be recovered from the person serving the same or any person liable to contribute to the construction or repair of such fence as tenant of whom the person serving such notice may hold the lands bounded by such fence.

Jurisdiction of justices.

13. All proceedings for orders and for the recovery of sums of money shall be in a summary manner before any three or more justices or a Police Magistrate.

Complaints under this Ordinance.

14. Every complaint by this Ordinance directed to be heard before justices shall be heard in a summary way, and the costs of every such complaint shall be in the discretion of the justices hearing the same, but notwithstanding when any such justices shall appoint an arbitrator such justices may if they think fit refer the costs of the reference to the award of such arbitrator.

PART V.—General Provisions.

Ordinance not to interfere with agreements.

15. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall be deemed or taken to affect any covenant contract or agreement made or hereafter to be made relative to fencing between occupiers of adjoining land.

Ordinance not to apply to Matted Crown lands.

16. This Ordinance shall not apply to any unalienated Crown lands; nor shall the Crown, the Governor nor any public officer appointed by the Governor or by the Governor in Council, for the administration, management, or control of the Crown Lands or Public Works or who may by virtue of his office however styled have any such management or control be liable under the authority of this Ordinance to make any contribution towards the construction or repairing of any dividing fence between the land of any occupier and any Crown land.

Persons constructing fences can enter upon contiguous lands.

17. Every person engaged in constructing or repairing a fence under this Ordinance, his agents and servants may with or without horses, cattle, carts, or carriages, at all reasonable times during such construction or repairing enter upon the contiguous lands and do thereon such acts, matters and things as are necessary or reasonably required to carry into effect the construction or repairing of such fence.

Not to affect substantial fence already erected.

18. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to affect any substantial fence already erected.

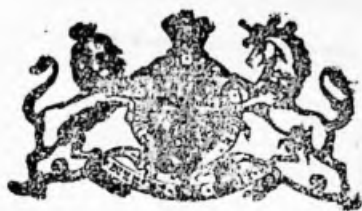

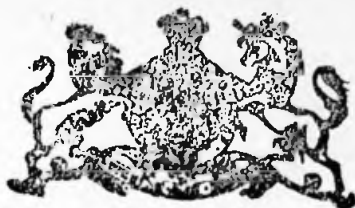

Sub-Section K. M. & C.

(K). Any person who in any public place other than such as may be authorised for that purpose by the Governor, shall throw or lay, or cause to be thrown or laid, any dirt, ashes, litter, or any carrion, fish, birds, offal, or rubbish, broken glass, delf, or bottles, or any other sharp substances.

(M). Any owner or occupier of a house, tenement, or land, who shall not keep sufficiently swept and cleansed all public footpaths, drains and water-courses adjoining his premises; and if any house or tenement shall be empty or unoccupied, the owner thereof shall be deemed the occupier with reference to this enactment.

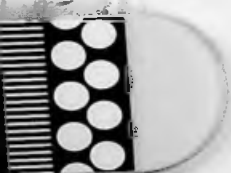

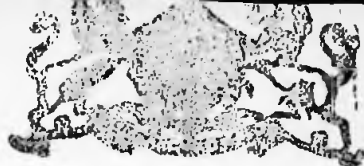

3. The notice is to contain a statement of the christian and surnames, the calling or description, and the age of the person to be buried; the date of death; the town, settlement, &c., in which it occurred; the day and hour of intended burial, &c., in accordance with the form to be drawn up.
4. A drawing of every monument and gravestone, in ink, with an accurate copy of every proposed inscription, to be submitted to the Board for approval before erection.
5. All monuments, railings, grave-stones, vaults and purchased places of burial, to be kept in repair by the owner, or the same not to be considered as private.
6. In all unbricked graves, coffins of wood only to be used. No interment will be allowed nearer the surface than four feet for an adult, and three feet for a child under twelve years of age. Each grave to be separated by at least twelve inches of solid earth on each side.
7. All applications of urgency to be decided by the President and Secretary.
8. No children are to be admitted into the Cemetery without an adult.
9. First class ground is that on either side of the principal walks. The rest is second class ground.

Scale of Fees to be charged in the case of those who are desirous of purchasing the exclusive right of burial and for the erection of monuments, &c.

1. For single freehold grave space 7 ft. x 2½ ft.
First class 40/- Second class 20/-

For every freehold grave space in addition:

5. For every additional square foot enclosed by fence, either on purchased or unpurchased ground, 2/.

6. For digging and filling grave. Adult 15/. Child 7/6.

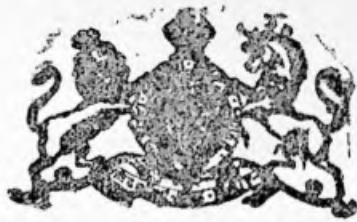

The following Draft Ordinance which it is proposed to submit to the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL of the FALKLAND ISLANDS, to prohibit the payment of wages in Goods or otherwise than in the Current Coin of the Falkland Islands, is published for general information.

WHEREAS it is necessary to prohibit the payment of Wages in Goods or otherwise than in the Current Coin of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies. Be it enacted by the Legislative Council—

Definition of Terms.

1. That for the purpose of this Ordinance the word "Workman" shall be construed and understood to comprise any persons employed to perform any bodily labour, and the word "Contract" shall be construed and understood to comprise any agreement whether oral or written, whether express or implied and which any person falling within the before mentioned description of the word workman shall enter into with any other person or persons for the performance of any work or labour of any kind.

Term "Workman" to be defined.

The wages of any workman must be paid in the Current Coin.

2. That in all Contracts hereafter to be made for the hiring of any workman in any trade, the wages of such workman shall be made payable in the Current Coin of these Islands and not otherwise and that if any such Contract the whole or any part of such wages shall be made payable in any manner other than in the Current Coin aforesaid, such wages shall notwithstanding be payable in such Current Coin.

Contracts must not contain any stipulations, &c.

3. That if in any Contract hereafter to be made between any workman and his employer any provision shall be made directly or indirectly respecting the place where or the manner in which or the person or persons with whom the whole or any part of the wages due or to become due to any such workman shall be laid out or expended so much of such contracts shall be and is hereby declared illegal null and void.

All wages must be paid in Coin.

4. That the entire amount of the wages earned by or payable to any workman shall be actually paid to such workman in the Current Coin of the Colony and not otherwise and every payment made to any such workman by his employer of or in respect of any such wages by the delivery to him of goods or otherwise than in the Current Coin aforesaid shall be and is hereby declared illegal null and void.

In an action brought for wages no set off shall be allowed for goods supplied by the employer &c.

5. That in any action, suit or other proceeding to be hereafter brought or commenced by any such workman as aforesaid against his employer for the recovery of any sum of money due to any such workman as the wages of his labour the defendant shall not be allowed to make any set-off nor to claim any reduction of the plaintiff's demand by reason or in respect of any goods, wares, or merchandize had or received by the plaintiff as or on account of his wages, or in reward for his labour or by reason or in respect of any goods, wares or merchandize sold delivered or supplied to such workman or in the profits of which such employer shall have any share or interest.

The employer shall not have any action against his workman for goods supplied to him on account of wages.

6. That the employer of any workman shall not have or be entitled to maintain any suit or action in any Court of Law or Equity against any such workman for or in respect of any goods, wares, or merchandize sold delivered or supplied to any such workman by any such employer whilst in his employment as or on account of his wages or reward for his labour or in respect of any goods wares, or merchandize sold delivered or supplied to any such workman at or from any Shop or Warehouse kept by or belonging to such employer or in the profits of which such employer shall have any share or interest.

Particular exceptions to
the generalities of the law.

7. That nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prevent any employer from advancing money or provisions other than Spirituous Liquors to any workman for his relief in sickness, or for the support of himself or family during such seasons of the year when there is no work to be procured, nor from making or contracting to make any stoppage or deduction from the future wages of any such workman for or in respect of any such money or provisions advanced for any such purpose as aforesaid. Provided always the agreement or contract for such deduction shall be in writing and signed by such workman.

Penalty for infringement
of Ordinance.

8. That every employer acting contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance shall on conviction before the Police Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace of the District in which such offence is committed forfeit a sum not exceeding Ten Pounds one half of which sum when recovered shall be paid into the Public Treasury for and towards the support of the Government of these Islands and the other half shall be paid to the informer. Provided always that every proceeding whatsoever for any offence against this Ordinance shall be commenced within One Calendar month after such offence shall have been committed.

Commencement of Ordinance.

9. This Ordinance shall come into operation from and after the Governor's assent thereto in the Government Gazette.

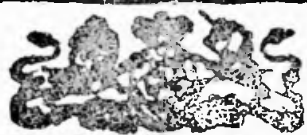

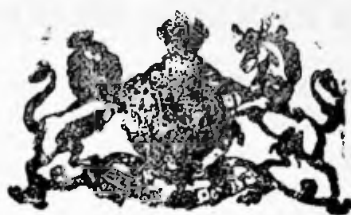

Every importer of goods shall within three days after the arrival of the importing vessel, make due entry of such goods, and in default of such entry it shall be lawful for the officers of Customs to convey such goods to the warehouse, and if the duties due upon the same be not paid within three months after such three days shall have expired, together with all charges of removal and warehouse rent, or if the same shall not be bonded, the same shall be sold in the manner hereinbefore described, and the produce thereof applied first to the payment of charges, next of duties, and the overplus (if any) paid to the proprietor of the goods or other person authorised to receive the same.

26. The Government store shall be the proper warehouse for the warehousing of goods imported without the payment of duty, and should the Government store at any time prove insufficient for that purpose, the Collector of Customs shall procure such other warehouses as may be necessary, and he shall cause a scale of charges for such purpose to be prepared and laid before the Governor in Council for approval and when approved the same shall be published in the Official Gazette or notice board, and such charges may from time to time be altered with the consent of the Governor in Council, and such alterations shall in like manner be published in the Official Gazette or notice board.

Until further notice "the proper place" mentioned in section 10 above stated shall mean the Government Bonded Store.

The Governor directs the publication of the following Report of the Commission on Scab, with His Excellency's reply thereto

By Command.

We have the honour to inform your Excellency that in accordance with the terms of your Commission we have made inquiry as to the desirability or otherwise, of legislation for the eradication of Scab.

2. To facilitate the taking of evidence, a list of questions was drawn up by the Commission, which list we beg to hand your Excellency herewith.

3. We have the honour to transmit herewith a full report as to the names of the witnesses examined before the Commission and of their evidence.

4. We, the Members of the Commission, beg to make the following recommendations; from the weight of evidence taken and in our opinion, a Scab Ordinance is necessary, in the interests of the staple industry of the Colony.

As a Scab Ordinance is wanted as soon as possible, and in order to make it effective, legislation for fencing is also required, the two matters should be embodied in one Ordinance.

The present arrangements for the erection of boundary fences having so far worked satisfactorily and without friction, and as there can be no question, but that the expense and delay occasioned by a survey would be prejudicial to the eradication of Scab, a general survey as a preliminary to a Fencing Ordinance is unnecessary.

(Rider). (President.) I dissent from the conclusion to question (3) as the positions of the fences cannot be defined unless boundaries are established, and much additional expense to the Colony would be entailed in most cases.

SUB HEADS.

It is the general view of the witnesses examined, that the machinery for working a joint Fencing and Scab Ordinance should consist of a Board of practical men for each main Island.

That infected sheep shall mean any sheep infected with Scab, any sheep which have been infected, or exposed to infection, until a clean certificate shall have been granted for the same by the Board.

That there should be a penalty on owners who fail to clean their sheep within a reasonable time—such time to be left to the discretion of the Board.

That in the event of an outbreak of Scab written notice shall be sent at once to neighbours, Board and Governor, and Gazetted.

It is practically the universal opinion that persons should be punished by penal servitude for wilfully communicating Scab, and by a fine in case of negligence.

That Station earmarks should be registered, that imported sheep should be quarantined at the discretion of the Board. That the Board should draw up Bye-Laws and Regulations for driving clean or infected sheep, and for the quarantining of infected sheep and for other matters.

That straying infected sheep should be killed and buried, or burnt. As regards the definition of a Sheep-proof fence, it is the opinion of the Commission, borne out by the evidence, that it will be sufficient if it is passed as Sheep-proof by the Board.

The Commission is further of opinion that where a Farmer is unable to bear the cost of putting up a boundary fence, the adjoining occupier should be entitled to do so, and recover half the cost, such repayment to be spread over a period not exceeding five years, the unpaid balances bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 7½ o/o.

(Rider). (President.) I think that the rate should not exceed 5 o/o.

The Commission are of opinion that the Board should have full powers to order the erection of Sheep-proof paddock fences if necessary in their judgment for the eradication of Scab.

That existing boundary fences should be kept in repair at joint expense.

5. The Commission beg permission to state that in their opinion one of the chief reasons why Scab is still so general in the Falkland Islands is, that Farmers, either from want of means or of knowledge, have attempted to carry on the work of their Stations with too few hands.

6. The Members of the Commission would have been glad to make recommendations in detail to your Excellency on the numerous complicated points included in a Scab Ordinance, and regret that their President has ruled that, as their recommendations were in the form of a draft Scab Ordinance, to do so is not within the scope of their Commission but they will on a future occasion be happy to place their experience at your Excellency's disposal.

7. We trust that your Excellency will see your way to give effect to the recommendations of the Commission, and, by furthering legislation that would help the Farmers to eradicate Scab, take a course which will tend to increase the production of wool and improve the resources of the Colony.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and confirmed.

The President submitted a draft of certain Bye-Laws which it was proposed should be passed under Section 3 of the Board of Health Ordinance No. 1 of 1886, and Section 2 of the Board of Health Ordinance No. 3 of 1891.

Considerable discussion ensued and it was agreed that in order that the matter affected should be carefully considered the proposed Bye-Laws should stand over until the next Meeting.

The President then proposed to hold the next Meeting on Wednesday, the 19th instant, at 3 p.m., (Mail excepted). The Meeting then adjourned.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and confirmed.

The following Bye-Laws were then passed unanimously.

Bye-Laws and Regulations made under Section 3 of Board of Health Ordinance No. 1 of 1886 and Section 2 Board of Health Ordinance No. 3 of 1891.

1. Before the erection of any new building shall be commenced, plans of the same shall be submitted to the Board of Health, with particulars as to water closets, earth closets, ash-pits and cesspools, together with a statement of the proposed drainage.

Before any alteration contemplated to be made with regard to any of the subjects of which the particulars are as above required shall be commenced, the alteration so proposed must have been sanctioned by the Board of Health.

2. Every occupier of a tenement shall be bound to protect the water supply attached to the building in such a way as may be considered necessary by the Board of Health, to secure the utmost purity possible. The owner or occupier of any premises shall be required to keep in a thorough state of cleanliness and repair all water-courses, open ditches, or gutters upon his premises, and to prevent the accumulation of noxious matter, by the removal thereof to any place of deposit to which the Board of Health may order.

3. All fowl-houses, fowl-coops, pig-stys, or any buildings in which animals are kept, must be placed in such position as to the Board of Health may seem best for the prevention of a nuisance, and the protection of the inhabitants of the neighbourhood.

4. Until a proper hospital or building has been provided, to which cases of contagious or infectious diseases can be removed, every person on whose premises any case of a disease of a contagious

person to adopt for the purpose of preventing the spread of such contagious or infectious disease. If the Board of Health consider it necessary to order the burning or destroying of any articles in order to prevent the spread of any disease, the owner of such articles shall be entitled to recover compensation not exceeding the sum of five pounds (£5), by order of the Board of Health, with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

5. Before any building intended to be used as a Slaughter house can be erected or converted into such, the Board of Health must have submitted to it, for approval, a statement detailing the position of such building, and must be satisfied of the necessity for the same, and may withhold or grant its sanction under such regulations as may be considered necessary.

6. Before any person intending to carry on any noxious or offensive trade, as that of a soap-boiler, tallow-melter, or such like, shall commence to take steps for the starting such trade, it shall be necessary for such person to obtain in writing the sanction of the Board of Health, and the Board of Health taking into consideration the district in which it is proposed to carry on such trade, shall have power to define what is a noxious or offensive trade, and shall satisfy themselves before granting such sanction, that every precaution is taken to prevent any noxious exhalations from chimneys and such like.

7. Before any markets shall be held the Board of Health must first approve of the same, and sanction some place for the holding of such markets, and such markets shall be conducted under rules and regulations to be issued by the Board of Health at the time of giving its sanction.

8. If it shall become necessary to alter in any way the existing Burial Grounds, or to lay out any new Burial Grounds, the alterations or laying out of the same, as the case may be, must be submitted by the Burial Board or Committee of Management to the Board of Health for its approval, the same to be submitted to the Governor in Council for his approval.

9. All lots lying to the Westward of the boundary of the Cemetery, extending Westward to the Government Reservoir, North to the Sea shore, and South facing the North of Fitzroy road, also including all Pensioners allotments, whether occupied or not, must be carefully fenced in by a substantial fence, the sufficiency of which shall be determined by the Board, and the owner or occupier shall be required to keep such fence in repair. In the case of mutual fences, it shall be lawful for the person who repairs the fence, to recover a moiety of the cost of such repair from the mutual owners. Every owner or occupier must see to the cleanliness of the lot occupied by him, and it shall be competent for the Board of Health to inspect any lot, and to cause any removal of any nuisance found to exist. If any person fail to comply with the requirements of any of the above Bye-Laws or Regulations, or any hereafter to be made, or neglect to carry out any orders issued by the Board of Health, such offender shall be liable for each time of offending, to such fine not exceeding five pounds (£5) or term of imprisonment, as the Court may determine.

The President then brought to the notice of the Board that the Government hulk and jetty were an eyesore to the place and dangerous to life; already one man had been drowned in the hulk and another had had his leg broken, he said that by making this report the Government might take the necessary steps to remove the hulk.

Mr. Felton thought the hulk, though an eyesore, was not detrimental to health.

Then there were the hulks of the Falkland Islands Company, which are injurious to health, owing to the offensive smell emanating from them at low water. Also the roadway in front of the Company's lower Store was in a most unsatisfactory state.

Mr. Smith said, to his knowledge, the hulk "Snow Squall" was considered a receptacle for filth of all kinds, also the cellars under the Store were in a filthy state after any heavy wet weather.

Mr. Felton thought it would be impossible to remove the inner hulk totally, it could partly be blown to pieces, but still sufficient would be left to be a danger to boats, &c., what he thought could be done was to cut it down to the level of the jetty.

The President said he thought the Company should be informed of what is required to be done for sanitation.

The Inspector was directed to inspect the hulk "Snow Squall," and corners of the jetties, and if he found a nuisance to act accor-

CIRCULAR of ENQUIRY.

The Department of Fisheries of the Dominion of Canada, in connection with questions relating to the Fur Seal Fishery of the North Pacific, is desirous of obtaining all possible information relating to the Fur Seal Fisheries of the Southern Hemisphere. The Southern Fur Seal or "Sea bear" (of the family of eared seals, *vr. Otariidae*) is known to have formed the object of an important industry in the early part of the present century, but the Islands on which it once abounded are now reported, and believed to be, almost entirely depleted of Seals. As the habits and life history of the Fur Seal of the North Pacific Ocean appear to be closely similar to those of the allied Seals of

the Southern Hemisphere, it is thought probable that the history of the decline of the Southern Fisheries may afford some facts having a direct bearing on the Fur Seal Fisheries of the North Pacific, and may serve to indicate a proper mode of protection to be accorded to these fisheries, if such should be found necessary.

In this connection it would be of practical interest to know for each of the Seal Islands, or Sealing grounds of the Southern Hemisphere:—

(1). Whether the decline or destruction of the Fishery is attributable to the slaughter of the Seals while on shore at their breeding places, or to their pursuit at large on the circumjacent Ocean.

(2). In what manner the Fur Seal Fishery has been, or is conducted in each particular locality.

(3). Whether any, and if any, what measures have been taken by various Governments toward the protection of the Fur Seal Fisheries in their territories, or in places within their jurisdiction: and further, if any such measures are known to have proved successful in preserving or re-habilitating the Fisheries

(4). Generally any particulars as to the life history of the animal, its migrations, season of bringing forth its young, and habits of the Seals while engaged in suckling and rearing the young.

It is also particularly requested that copies of any printed documents or reports referring to the Fur Seal Fisheries, or embodying Regulations provided for these fisheries may be furnished.

Present: The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, President.

The Colonial Secretary thought the remains should be disinterred in the early hours of the morning, and everything should be under the supervision of the Colonial Surgeon and the Police.

The Board concurred and sanctioned the removal of the remains with the necessary precautions.

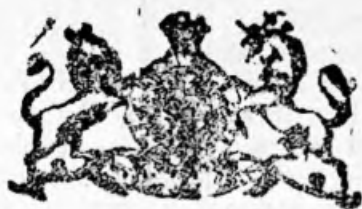

Attention was called by Mr. Felton to Rule No. 9 of the Regulations and Bye-Laws, and the following Amendment suggested. “That the word “Cottage” be placed between the words “Pensioners” and “Allotment,” which was agreed to.

The President said that he had summoned the Members for two reasons:

1st. That he had received an application from the United States Consul, to know if the Board would give permission to exhume the body of the late Captain Carver, who died of heart disease on board the wreck “St. Mary,” on the 12th August, 1890.

He, the President, thought there could be no danger, if a leaden coffin were provided ready in which to place the remains for transit to the vessel which was to convey it away.

The Colonial Secretary thought the remains should be disinterred in the early hours of the morning, and everything should be under the supervision of the Colonial Surgeon and the Police.

The Board concurred and sanctioned the removal of the remains with the necessary precautions.

The President stated secondly that a large amount of rubbish had been gathered from the Falkland Islands Company's back yard and premises, and that the Company wished to know where they were to deposit it. He understood that His Excellency had given permission for it to be placed along the sea wall, to the Westward of the Reservoir Jetty.

It was considered that this would be a proper place of deposit; but it was conditional that the rubbish should be rammed down to the satisfaction of the Inspector of Nuisances.

The Inspector then asked if he should serve notices on those parties who had not begun to fence in, according to the Bye-Law.

It was considered proper that time should be given; meanwhile that persons should be warned of their obligations in this respect.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend Waite Hockin Stirling, Doctor of Divinity, Bishop of the Church of England in the Falkland Islands, and the Reverend Lowther E. Brandon, Master of Arts, Colonial Chaplain, the present grantees, acting under a Deed of Grant dated the third day of February One thousand eight hundred and seventy two, whereby was granted to the said Right Reverend Waite Hockin Stirling and the Reverend Charles Bull, Master of Arts, Colonial Chaplain, and their Successors in Office, a certain portion of land in Stanley for the purposes of a Cemetery or Burial ground for all denominations, And whereas the said Right Reverend Waite Hockin Stirling and the said Reverend Lowther E. Brandon have assumed, as additional grantees, under the grant aforesaid, for the purpose aforesaid, the Reverend C. E. Lawson Good, Pastor of the Baptist Chapel in Stanley, and the Reverend Father O'Grady, Priest in charge of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Stanley, and their successors in Office, it is expedient to reconstruct the Burial Board in Stanley, be it enacted:

1. Clause 4 of the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888 is hereby repealed and the following clause substituted therefor:

2. There shall be a Burial Board composed of nine Members as follows; The Colonial Chaplain and his successors in office. Two unofficial Members of the Legislative Council, and two persons residing in the Town of Stanley, or within one mile thereof, to be appointed by the Governor. The Clergyman for the time being in charge of the Baptist Chapel in Stanley, and the Priest for the time being in charge of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Stanley and their successors in Office. One lay representative to be chosen by the adherents of the Baptist Chapel and one lay representative to be chosen by the adherents of the Roman Catholic Chapel. Such lay representatives to be elected annually but to be eligible for re-election.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888 Amendment Ordinance 1891."

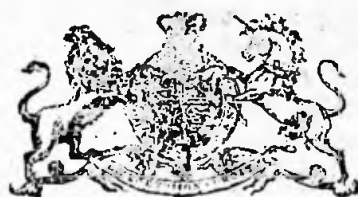

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatches No. 65 of the 15th of May, No. 81 of the 23rd of June and No. 102 of the 23rd July, on the subject of the subject of the leases held by the sheep farmers, and the necessity for a survey of the Colony.

2. There appear to be good grounds for believing that in the leases and grants of Crown land the area of the land leased and granted has been very considerably understated, and that consequently the lessees and purchasers have occupied more land than could be lawfully leased or granted to them for the rent and purchase money which they have paid.

3. If this be so, I do not think that the lessees and grantees, or those who derive title through them, can claim to retain the advantage which they have derived contrary to the law through the mistake of the Government Surveyor, although that mistake has been allowed to remain uncorrected for many years.

4. I am opinion therefore that a survey of the Colony is required and I am in communication with the Crown Agents for the Colonies as to obtaining the services of a Surveyor and the requisite staff for that purpose.

5. Should the survey prove such errors to have been made in all or any of the leases and grants as are alleged, I consider that the lessees or grantees should have the option of either retaining (subject to the conditions of the leases or grants and to the provisions of the Ordinances) the whole of the land comprised within the boundaries described in the leases or grants on payment of additional rent or additional purchase money for any excess of acreage which may be found on survey to exist over the acreage stated in the leases or grants, or of having the boundaries of their land readjusted so as to reduce it to the acreage so stated. Such readjustment which would be a matter of some difficulty should be made either by agreement or by some impartial Commissioner, or Arbitrator to be appointed by the Judge.

6. In any case however, where the boundary line is not defined by the lease or grant except by specifying the distance from a stated point and it may be found on survey that the lessee or grantee has assumed a much more extended boundary, I am of opinion that he should not be allowed the option of retaining and paying rent or purchase money for the land so occupied through his own mistake in excess of the lease or grant.

7. Should the survey prove in any case that the acreage in the lease or grant has been overstated the lessee or grantee should have a rebate of rent or purchase money.

8. In making the survey all absolutely unproductive ground, whether rock or pond, may properly be excluded from computation.

9. The acreage of the lands recently purchased by the Falkland Islands Company must be considered subject to correction by the result of the survey.

10. In granting renewed leases to the lessees whose leases fall in before the survey and who are entitled under the Ordinances to renewal, a clause should be inserted in the new leases referring to the intended survey and providing for the increase or diminution of the rent in accordance with the result of the survey, or, at the option of the lessee, for the readjustment of the boundaries or, in the case of an undefined boundary as referred to in paragraph 6 of this Despatch, for the surrender of any land occupied by the lessee in excess of what he was entitled to.

11. If any lessee declines to accept a renewed lease containing such a clause you may issue to him a temporary license as proposed in your Despatch No. 102.

12. No claim should be made for back rent for excess of land or for back interest on the purchase money for such excess.

2. That the owner of every dog outside Stanley shall from this date prevent by fastening up or otherwise, the wandering of such dog from his station or holding into Stanley or any other part of these Islands.
3. That no dog be allowed to be brought off any vessel or boat except under such regulations as may be deemed requisite to prevent the further introduction of the said disease into these Islands.
4. That every owner in Stanley whose dog becomes afflicted with Distemper shall report the same at once to the Chief Constable and every owner outside Stanley of a dog similarly affected shall report the same to the neighbouring station-holders, in order that such steps may be taken as may seem necessary to prevent contagion, and if the destruction of any dog for such purpose be considered advisable compensation, not exceeding Two Pounds, may be paid out of general revenue to the owner of the dog so destroyed.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is expedient to take further steps to prevent the spreading of the disease of "Distemper," at present raging amongst dogs in these Islands I, Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander in Chief of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby make the following Order.

1. That the owner of every dog in Stanley shall from this date prevent by fastening up or otherwise, the wandering of such dog from the premises of such owner about Stanley, nor shall he permit any dog to be removed from Stanley to any other part of these Islands.

2. That the owner of every dog outside Stanley shall from this date prevent by fastening up or otherwise, the wandering of such dog from his station or holding into Stanley or any other part of these Islands.

3. That no dog be allowed to be brought off any vessel or boat except under such regulations as may be deemed requisite to prevent the further introduction of the said disease into these Islands.

4. That every owner in Stanley whose dog becomes afflicted with Distemper shall report the same at once to the Chief Constable and every owner outside Stanley of a dog similarly affected shall report the same to the neighbouring station-holders, in order that such steps may be taken as may seem necessary to prevent contagion, and if the destruction of any dog for such purpose be considered advisable compensation, not exceeding Two Pounds, may be paid out of general revenue to the owner of the dog so destroyed.

5. Any person found contravening any part of the above Orders will be liable on prosecution to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

6 This Order shall take effect from this date and remain in force until such time as I, with the advice and consent of my Executive Council, shall deem it expedient to revoke it.

An Ordinance to amend the Commissions of Enquiry Ordinance 1891,

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the holding of Commissions of Enquiry and for taking evidence thereunder upon Oath.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council; as follows:—

1. This Ordinance shall be cited as "The Commission of Enquiry Amendment Ordinance 1892."

2. It shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, as he shall see fit, to nominate and appoint persons to constitute a Commission to enquire into and take evidence on oath upon any subject as shall to him seem necessary.

3. It shall be lawful for such Commission of Enquiry so appointed, to summon (as per Schedule A), any person or persons to attend before it, and to produce any books, plans and documents as to the Commission may appear necessary for the purpose of such Enquiry.

4. Any person or persons refusing, without sufficient cause, to attend and give evidence or to produce any books, plans and documents as aforesaid, shall be liable for such default to a fine of £10, to be recoverable summarily before the Police Magistrate.

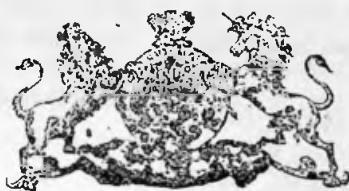

The Governor directs the publication for the information of those interested in the matter the following advice of the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, with regard to the prevailing Distemper amongst Dogs in this Colony.

ADVICE.

No Camp dogs should on any account be brought into Stanley or vice versa.

All dogs suspected of having Distemper should be kept apart from healthy dogs.

Every dog should be given sulphur, even if distemper has not declared itself.

Should the disease be manifest Cod Liver Oil should be given at least three times a day, (half a wine glass-full as a dose.)

Sulphur should always be put in the drinking water.

Should the dog show symptoms of failing, Liebig's Extract of Meat may be given with great advantage. A small lump placed in a bit of tissue paper and put down the throat as a pill.

The excreta should be carefully cleaned away and disinfected with Carbolic or Little's dip.

And when a number of dogs are affected it should be the special duty of one man to attend upon them.

When Liebig cannot be obtained strong beef tea should be given, the disease having such a lowering tendency. The great object in view should be to support the powers of life.

PROPOSED VOLUNTEER FORCE.

A Public Meeting was held in the Court House on Wednesday, 24th February, with a view to discussing the question of the enrolment of a Volunteer Force in the Falkland Islands, His Excellency the Governor in the chair.

His Excellency in introducing the subject stated that Captain Lang, H. M. S. "Cleopatra," the Senior Naval Officer on the South East Coast of America, had kindly attended the Meeting and would address a few remarks. His Excellency then gave an outline of the proposed scheme.

Captain Lang said he had little to add to the remarks made by His Excellency but would refer to the probability in the near future of the establishment of a Depot in the Falkland Islands and stated his conviction that if the inhabitants of the Falkland Islands showed a desire to assist the Home Government in carrying out their defence schemes by enrolling themselves as a Volunteer Force, the Home Government would be more ready to expedite the establishment of a Depot. If a body of Marines, which would be a small body, were to be sent out, a Volunteer Force would be in a position to render valuable assistance. Captain Lang concluded by undertaking so long as he retained the position of Senior Naval Officer on the Station to further the movement as far as possible by giving orders to all ships visiting the Falkland Islands to render every possible assistance.

Mr. Rowell moved the following resolution :

"That a Volunteer Force be formed to consist of 60 Infantry, or more, of whom 6 shall be available as Mounted Infantry and Scouts, and 20 Artillerymen, or more."

His Honor the Judge seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Packe moved

"That the Officers to be appointed be balloted for, and that His Excellency be asked to assign the position and rank as he may deem best to be held by such Officers in the Force."

Mr. Noble seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Hon. C. A. Fraser informed the Meeting of the regulations as to capitation grant and the grant of ammunition in force at home and moved the following :

"That the Officers shall consist of

- 1 Captain of Infantry.
- 1 Lieutenant of Infantry.
- 1 Second Lieutenant of Infantry.
- 1 Lieutenant of Artillery,
- 1 Second Lieutenant of Artillery
- 1 Drill Instructor.
- 1 Sergeant Major of the whole Force.
- 1 Quartermaster Sergeant of the whole Force."

Mr. F. Hardy seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Captain Lang moved the following :

"That a Committee comprised as under be formed to consider the details as to the uniform and equipment of the Force, which should be of grey, with facings of a darker shade—buttons bronze—breeches and gaiters with darker shade—brown leggings—brown belts, &c.' remarking on the desirability of having a uniform of a shade similar to that of the ground.

Committee. Captain Lang, Hon. C. A. Fraser, Messrs Durose, Harding & Rowell, with power to add to their number.

Mr. J. Smith seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

The Meeting terminated with votes of thanks to His Excellency and Captain Lang.

His Excellency in introducing the subject stated that Captain Lang, H. M. S. "Cleopatra," the Senior Naval Officer on the South East Coast of America, had kindly attended the Meeting and would address a few remarks. His Excellency then gave an outline of the proposed scheme.

Captain Lang said he had little to add to the remarks made by His Excellency but would refer to the probability in the near future of the establishment of a Depot in the Falkland Islands and stated his conviction that if the inhabitants of the Falkland Islands showed a desire to assist the Home Government in carrying out their defence schemes by enrolling themselves as a Volunteer Force, the Home Government would be more ready to expedite the establishment of a Depot. If a body of Marines, which would be a small body, were to be sent out, a Volunteer Force would be in a position to render valuable assistance. Captain Lang concluded by undertaking so long as he remained in the position of Senior Naval Officer on the Station to further the movement as far as possible by giving orders to all ships visiting the Falkland Islands to render every possible assistance.

Mr. Rowell moved the following resolution :

"That a Volunteer Force be formed to consist of 60 Infantry, or more, of whom 6 shall be available as Mounted Infantry and Scouts, and 20 Artillerymen, or more."

His Honor the Judge seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Packe moved

"That the Officers to be appointed be balloted for, and that His Excellency be asked to assign the position and rank as he may deem best to be held by such Officers in the Force."

Mr. Noble seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Hon. C. A. Fraser informed the Meeting of the regulations as to capitation grant and the grant of ammunition in force at home and moved the following :

"That the Officers shall consist of

- 1 Captain of Infantry.
- 1 Lieutenant of Infantry.
- 1 Second Lieutenant of Infantry.
- 1 Lieutenant of Artillery,
- 1 Second Lieutenant of Artillery
- 1 Drill Instructor.
- 1 Sergeant Major of the whole Force.
- 1 Quartermaster Sergeant of the whole Force.

Mr. F. Hardy seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

Captain Lang moved the following :

"That a Committee comprised as under be formed to consider the details as to the uniform and equipment of the Force, which should be of grey, with facings of a darker shade—buttons bronze—breeches and gaiters with darker shade—brown leggings—brown belts, &c." remarking on the desirability of having a uniform of a shade similar to that of the ground.

Committee. Captain Lang, Hon. C. A. Fraser, Messrs Durose, Harding & Rowell, with power to add to their number.

Mr. J. Smith seconded and the motion was carried unanimously.

The Meeting terminated with votes of thanks to His Excellency and Captain Lang.

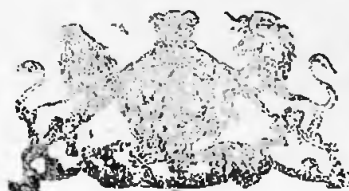

The following Ordinance which it is proposed to introduce into the Legislative Council is published for general information.

Auctioneers' Ordinance Amendment Ordinance.

No. of 1892.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Auctioneers' Ordinances No. 5 of 1853 and No. 2 of 1858.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :

1. Any Auctioneer who shall directly or indirectly purchase on his own account, or bid or procure to be made a bid for anything being offered for sale by him as such Auctioneer, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding for each offence and such bid or sale shall be void.

2. Every bid made directly or indirectly by any person at any Sale or Auction shall be void if the Auctioneer presiding at the auction is a salaried servant of the person making such bid.

3. It shall be lawful for the Governor (or such person as the Governor may at his discretion appoint) on the application of a holder of an Auctioneers' license to grant to the nominee of such holder a temporary license.

4. Such temporary license shall only authorise the person named therein to act as auctioneer at any single sale or auction of goods catalogued and advertised as required by Section 5 of Ordinance 5 of 1853.

5. There shall be paid for such temporary license the sum of ten shillings sterling per diem.

6. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Auctioneers Ordinance Amendment Ordinance 1892," and shall be read with and form part of Ordinances No. 5 of 1853 and No. 2 of 1858

The minutes of the last Meeting held on 29th March were read and confirmed.

The Colonial Secretary accepted the objection to the Section in its present form and it was decided to withdraw the present Section and submit it in an amended form at the next sitting of the Council.

His Excellency undertook to consult with the legal adviser as to altering the law to meet cases of auctions in the West Falklands.

No further amendments were proposed and the Bill was left in Committee.

Royal Order.

(Translation).

CONSIDERING the inquiries which have been addressed to this Ministry with regard to the interpretation of Articles 1 and 6 of the Royal Decree of the 31st December last, as to the date on which the new Tariff is to come into force, and as to the duties which are to be charged on goods from countries whose Commercial Treaties with Spain terminates on the 30th June next ;

And considering that England and the Netherlands continue to enjoy up to the 30th June next the benefits in general which are secured to them by their respective Treaties in addition to these contained in the Treaties concluded between Spain and Germany on the 12th July, 1883, and with France on the 6th February, 1882 ;

His Majesty the King, and in his name the Queen Regent, decrees :—

1. That merchandize which enters the Customs lines of Spain, either by sea or land, until midnight of the 31st of this month of January will enjoy the benefits of the Tariff now in force inasmuch as the new Tariff does not come into force till the 1st February next.

2. In accordance with the above Article, the Custom-houses will remain open until midnight in order to receive the manifests and way bills. On these documents will be entered carefully the hour at which they are presented, provided always that they conform with the Marine and Sanitary Regulations of the port of entry.

3. Merchandize of British or Dutch origin will continue to enjoy to the 30th June of the present year the benefits of the duties contained in the Tariffs, Letter (B), annexed to the Treaties of Commerce and Navigation between Spain and Germany of the 12th July, 1883, and of France of the 6th February, 1882.

4. In order that the duties in those Tariffs (which were annexed to the Treaties for merchandize to which the said Tariffs refer) may be applied, it is necessary that a certificate of origin should be presented at the Custom-house, drawn up in the form laid down in Rule 12 of the new Tariff approved of by the Royal Order of the 31st December, 1891.

5. All British and Dutch goods not specified in the above Tariffs, Letter (B), annexed respectively to the French and German Treaties, will, up to the 30th July, 1892, pay duty in accordance with the second column of the new Tariff approved by the Royal Decree of the 31st December 1891.

6. Goods of Finnish origin comprised in the Tariff, Letter (B), annexed to the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation between Spain and Russia of the 2nd July, 1887, will up to the 30th June of the present year, pay in accordance with the duties specified in the above Tariff, Letter (B), it being understood that, in order to enjoy this privilege, Finnish goods must be imported direct from Finland without transshipment on the voyage ; no necessity of justifying their origin by means of a certificate being required.

7. The Regulations referred to in Rule 8 of the Tariff of the 31st December last, as well as that at present in force, are those laid down in the law of Commercial Relations with the Colonies of the 30th June, 1882, as well as in the Article 13 of the Budget Law of the 29th June, 1887 ; and they are only of a temporary nature which will last until the treatment to which the foreign flag will be subjected in the trade and navigation between the Peninsula and the Colonies has been definitely settled.

8. For the carrying out of the preceding Regulations relative to British, Dutch, and Finnish goods the Custom-houses must refer to the official edition of the Tariff of the 31st December, 1889, which is still in force, and which contains the respective Treaties of Commerce.

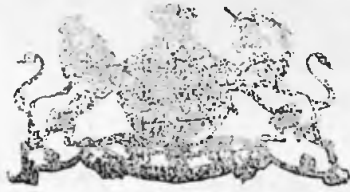

At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 6th day of February, 1892

PRESENT,

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY

LORD PRESIDENT

MR. RITCHIE

MR. JACKSON.

WHEREAS by "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," it is provided that where Her Majesty the Queen has made a Convention with a foreign State respecting the postal service between such foreign State and the United Kingdom, or respecting the privileges of mail ships, that is to say, ships engaged in any postal service of such foreign State, or of any part of Her Majesty's dominions, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to order that the said Act shall, subject to any conditions, exceptions, and qualifications contained in the Order, apply during the continuance of the Order as regards such Convention and foreign State and the postal service and mail ships described in the Convention ;

And whereas by section 8 of the said Act it is also provided that an Order in Council may for the purpose of a Convention with a foreign State apply the said Act, subject to any exceptions or modifications not inconsistent with the provisions of the said Act, to any British possession, and that the said Act when so applied should, subject to those exceptions and modifications, and subject as therein-after mentioned, have effect as if it were re-enacted, with the substitution of such British possession for the United Kingdom, provided that, before it should be applied to any British possession named in the Schedule to the said Act, the Government of such possession should have adhered to the Convention ;

And Whereas on the 30th day of August, 1890, a Convention was made at London between Her Majesty and the President of the French Republic respecting the postal service between France and French possessions and the United Kingdom and British possessions, the terms of which Convention are set forth in the Schedule to this Order ;

And whereas the ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged on the 23rd day of March, 1891 ;

And whereas the Governments of certain of the British possessions named in the Schedule to the said Act, namely, Newfoundland, Queensland, New Zealand, Cape of Good Hope, and Natal, have adhered to the said Convention ;

And whereas it is expedient that "The Mail Ships Act 1891," should apply as regards the said Convention and the French Republic and the postal service and mail ships described in the said Convention ;

And whereas it is also expedient that the said Act should, for the purpose of the said Convention, apply to the above-mentioned British possessions, and also to all British possessions not named in the Schedule to the said Act, subject to the exceptions and modifications in this Order contained :

NOW, THEREFORE, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," or otherwise in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," shall apply during the continuance of this Order as regards the Convention set forth in the Schedule to this Order, and as regards the French Republic and the postal service and mail ships described in that Convention.
2. The said Act shall apply as regards any public ship of the French Republic when employed as a mail ship in the cases authorised by Article V. of the said Convention.
3. The said Act shall for the purpose of the said Convention apply to the following British possessions, namely, Newfoundland, Queensland, New Zealand, Cape of Good Hope, and Natal, and also to every British possession not named in the Schedule to the said Act, subject, however, to the provisions of section 8 of the said Act, and also to the exceptions and modifications following, that is to say :

- (i.) The expression "officer of Customs" shall mean an officer of the Customs Department of the possession or, where there is no such Department, an officer or one of the officers appointed for the purposes of the said Act by the Governor in Council, of which appointment notice shall be published in the Gazette of the possession.
- (ii.) The provisions of the said Act as to the amount of fines shall, in possessions having a dollar or rupee currency, be read as if the amounts were stated in dollars or rupees, as the case may be, at the rate of 5 dollars or 10 rupees to the pound sterling. In Gibraltar the said provisions shall be read as if the amounts were stated in pesetas, at the rate of 25 pesetas to the pound sterling.
- (iii.) In lieu of subsections (1) and (2) of section 7 of the said Act the following provisions shall be substituted, that is to say : Every offence may be prosecuted and every fine may be recovered by action or other legal proceeding in any Court of the possession competent to impose fines, but any fine imposed by a Court of inferior or limited jurisdiction shall not exceed either the amount authorised by the said Act and this Order, or the amount of fine which the Court may impose in the exercise of its ordinary jurisdiction, whichever of the said amounts shall be the less ; and there shall be the same right of appeal (if any) against any such fine as in other cases of fines imposed by the same Court in the exercise of its ordinary jurisdiction ; and every Court, whether of original or appellate jurisdiction, may reduce the amount of any fine.
- (iv.) The regulations required to be made under subsection (4) of section 7 of the said Act, by the Commissioners of Customs with the consent of the Treasury, shall in the possession be made by the Governor in Council.
- (v.) Section 5 of the said Act, so far as relates to the Commissioners of Customs, shall not apply in the possession.

4. This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (France) Order in Council, 1892."

GAOL REGULATIONS.

Made in accordance with Section 54 of the Administration of Justice Ordinance No. 10 of 1853, by His Excellency Sir Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy, K. C. M. G., Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies.

1. The Gaoler shall keep a Book (Form A) in which shall be entered the name of every prisoner committed to Gaol, the offence for which committed, age, nationality and previous conviction, if any. The Gaoler shall keep a Conduct Book (Form B) in which the conduct of prisoners shall be entered, with such other particulars as may be required from time to time, which book shall be submitted to the Visiting Justices at each visit.

2. All prisoners on entering the Gaol must be searched, everything not necessary for their use while in custody must be taken from them and retained by the Gaoler until their release, and all articles so taken must be entered in a book (Form C). The name of the prisoner, and other particulars required, shall be entered at the time in the Gaol book.

3. The Colonial Secretary, the Colonial Chaplain, the Colonial Surgeon, and every Justice of the Peace, shall at all times have free access to the Gaol and to any prisoner therein; they shall sign their names in the Official Visitors Book, and make such remarks or suggestions as they may deem necessary.

4. All offences committed by prisoners in gaol shall be heard before one or more of the Visiting Justices, but offences of a graver nature which can be summarily dealt with shall always be heard and tried before two Visiting Justices, provided that no sentence shall carry with it an extended term of imprisonment over the original sentence. The names of the Visiting Justices and their rotation shall be published annually in the Government Gazette.

5. Prisoners may see their friends every Saturday from twelve to one o'clock by order of the Colonial Secretary but in the event of misconduct such indulgence will not be granted.

6. Prisoners not at hard labour or in solitary confinement shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every day; but all prisoners, other than those under solitary confinement, shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every Sunday.

7. The prisoners shall rise at 5 a.m. in Summer and 6.30 in Winter, and be locked up in their respective cells at 8 p.m. in the Summer and 5.30 p.m. in the Winter.

8. In case of any riotous conduct or disobedience of orders by any prisoner, the Gaoler shall take such measures as may be necessary to enforce discipline forthwith, and report the case to the Colonial Secretary and to the Visiting Justices for the month, as early as possible, with the view to their dealing with the matter.

9. Two persons shall not at any time be kept in one cell.

10. Prisoners convicted of felony are never to be locked in the same cell with other prisoners.

11. A light is to be kept burning in the passage of the gaol all night.

12. Prisoners sentenced by any Court or Justice to solitary confinement shall be locked up in separate cells. They shall not be allowed to leave their respective cells except in custody of the Gaoler or Warder. Their meals are to be taken in their cells.

13. Prisoners committed for trial or for debt may purchase provisions for their own use, with the sanction of the Gaoler; provided that spirits shall not be allowed to be so purchased, and not more than one pint of beer or wine per day for each prisoner so committed.

14. Spirits shall not be conveyed into the gaol for the use of any prisoner nor shall smoking be allowed without the written order of the Colonial Surgeon.

Prisoners in solitary confinement are to receive the same as Prisoners at hard labour—except in cases where bread and water has been ordered as a punishment, when the allowance will be 1½ lb. for males and 1 lb. for women.

A copy of the Diet Table is to be hung up in the Day room of the gaol.

15. The labour to be performed by the prisoners will be directed from time to time by the Colonial Secretary under orders from the Governor.

The following shall be the Time Table for work, &c.

(1.)—Prisoners will rise and dress, sweep out and tidy their cells, and perform such other work as they may be called upon to do until breakfast time.

(2.)—After breakfast until 12 o'clock work in or out of doors.

(3.)—From 12 to 12.30 p.m. dinner. From 12.30 to 1 p.m. clean day room and gaol.

(4.)—From 1 p.m. until the last bell work in or out of doors.

(5.)—After the last bell, supper, carry water and peat.

(6.)—Prisoners at work in the cells are to have exercise in the Prison yard from 1 to 2 o'clock p.m. daily, weather permitting.

(7.)—Prisoners are to be discharged at noon on the day of their release.

16. The prisoners will be employed every Saturday afternoon to clean the gaol, wash their clothes, or on such other duties as may be ordered.

17. Female prisoners are to be kept separate from the male prisoners at all times, except during the performance of divine service and they will be under the exclusive charge of the Gaoler's wife, or a matron appointed for that purpose.

18. Each prisoner will be supplied with the following articles, viz.: one palliasse, a panakin and a spoon and fork and a sufficiency of blankets. Clothing will be supplied for use of the prisoners from time to time, for which requisition must be made by the Gaoler through the Colonial Secretary.

19. The Colonial Surgeon, as Medical Officer of the Gaol, shall visit it at least twice a week and see that the proper sanitary arrangements are carried out. He shall keep a book (Form D) and enter all cases of illness therein.

20. Letters shall not be allowed to pass to or from any prisoner unless the same shall be first sanctioned by the Colonial Secretary. The Gaoler shall at once on receiving any letter addressed to any prisoner, or on receipt of any letter written by any prisoner, (the writing of which letter must be by permission granted by the Colonial Secretary) submit the same to the Colonial Secretary for instructions.

21. The Colonial Secretary will be responsible for the general discipline of the gaol, the labour which the prisoners are to perform, and for all disbursements of public money in connection therewith, subject to the instructions of the Governor.

22. Remission of 3 days in each month may be granted for good behaviour to prisoners sentenced to short terms of imprisonment.

Prisoners sentenced to long terms of imprisonment, or to penal servitude, may, by steady industry accompanied by good conduct, if males, obtain remission of one fourth of the sentence, and if females, one third of the sentence—under the system of marks as laid down in enclosure to Circular Despatch of Secretary of State, dated 21st January, 1892.

At the Court at Windsor, the 16th day of March, 1892.

PRESENT,

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the Coinage Act, 1891, it is enacted as follows :—

- " (1.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, to direct that gold coins of the realm which have not been called in by proclamation and are below the least current weight as provided by the Coinage Act, 1870, shall, if they have not been illegally dealt with, and subject to such conditions as to time, manner, and order of presentation as may be mentioned in the Order, be exchanged or paid for by or on behalf of the Mint at their nominal value :
- " (2.) For the purposes of this Act a gold coin shall be deemed to have been illegally dealt with where the coin has been impaired, diminished, or lightened otherwise than by fair wear and tear, or has been defaced by having any name, word, device, or number stamped thereon, whether the coin has or has not been thereby diminished or lightened : "

And whereas it is expedient to provide for the exchange of such gold coins :

NOW, THEREFORE, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act, and of all other powers enabling Her Majesty in this behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

Any gold coins of the realm which have not been called in by proclamation and are below the least current weight as provided by the Coinage Act, 1870, shall at any time after the seventeenth day of March, 1892, if they have not been illegally dealt with, be exchanged or paid for by or on behalf of the Mint at their nominal value, subject to the condition that they must be tendered during business hours at the Bank of England in London, in parcels of a nominal value not less than one hundred pounds each, and must be left there for such time before the exchange or payment as may be reasonably necessary for examination and weighing in order to ascertain whether any coin has been illegally dealt with within the meaning of the said Act.

And the Master of Her Majesty's Royal Mint is hereby directed to carry into effect the provisions of the said Act for exchanging or paying for at their nominal value all such coins as are so tendered, and have not been illegally dealt with.

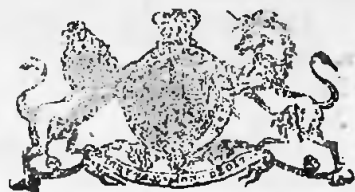

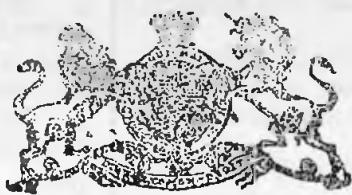

No. 5 of 1892.

An Ordinance to provide for the prevention of the spreading of any contagious or infectious disorders amongst dogs or other animals within the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

WHEREAS it is expedient to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst dogs or other animals within the Colony,

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

Governor in Council may issue proclamation to deal with disease.

1.—That it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time by proclamation to make such orders as he may deem necessary for preventing the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst dogs or other animals within the Colony.

Penal clause

2.—That if the owner of any dog or other animal shall, after the proclamation of any such order, contravene the same, such owner shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £5 to be recovered according to the provisions of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance 1853.

Governor in Council may revoke Order or any part of Order.

3.—That it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to revoke the whole or any part of any Order made under this Ordinance by any further Order issued under the authority of this Ordinance.

ORDER IN COUNCIL,

ISSUED UNDER ORDINANCES No. 4 of 1870 and No. 5 of 1892.

WHEREAS it is expedient to take steps to prevent the spreading of the disease of Dis'emper amongst dogs in these Islands ; I, Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby make the following Order :

1.—No dog shall be landed in any part of the Colony from off any vessel until such dog has been inspected by the proper Sanitary Officer, and a certificate from such Officer to the effect that such dog is free from disease, has been handed to the Master of the vessel.

2.—The owner of every dog in Stanley shall, from this date, prevent the wandering of such dog from Stanley.

3.—The owner of every dog outside Stanley shall, from this date, prevent the wandering of such dog from his station or holding into Stanley.

4.—Every owner in Stanley whose dog becomes affected with Distemper shall report the same at once to the Chief Constable, and every owner of a dog outside Stanley similarly affected shall report the same to the neighbouring Station-holders, in order that such steps may be taken as may seem necessary to prevent contagion, and if the destruction of any dog for such purpose be considered advisable, compensation, not exceeding Two pounds, may be paid out of general revenue to the owner of the dog so destroyed.

5.—No dog shall be removed from the East Falkland Island to any other part of the Colony.

6.—Any person contravening this Order will render himself liable, for each offence, to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

7.—This Order shall take effect from this date, and remain in force until such time as I, with consent of my Executive Council, shall deem it expedient to revoke the same.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit to you for the consideration of Lord Knutsford a copy of a protest made by the Unofficial Members of the Legislative Council of the Falkland Islands against the passing of the Ordinance relating to sales by Auction.

The original Auctioneers' Ordinance of 1853, No. 5, provided that it should be lawful for the Governor to grant to any person or Company a license to carry on the business of an Auctioneer on his or their own account or by his or their Agent, and this Company have for many years held a license under that Ordinance in the name of their head Storekeeper. It happens at times that property of considerable value is brought to the hammer in Stanley, and the connection of the Auctioneers with this Company has hitherto been regarded as a guarantee of respectability, so necessary a qualification in an office of this kind. The present holder of the license has been in our services for nearly 30 years, and has frequently been employed by the Government as Auctioneer. No complaint has ever, to my knowledge, been made against him, or against the Company in connection with the way his duties have been performed. The proposed Ordinance would deprive him of the post that he has held so long, and, further, is regarded by this Board as a direct imputation upon the honour and integrity of the Company, which they desire very strongly to repudiate. If any valid objections could have been raised to the arrangements for conducting auctions which have been in force for nearly 40 years, they would have occurred long before this to the minds of former Governors, several of whom were practised in the law, but this has not been the case, and we now find Sir Roger Goldsworthy proposing an alteration at a time coincident with the date of the renewal of our license. The Board are unable to understand the attitude that he has thought fit to assume towards the Company in this matter.

In reply to your letter of the 16th instant, transmitting a copy of a protest made by the Unofficial Members of the Legislative Council of the Falkland Islands against clause 2 of the proposed Ordinance relating to Auctioneers, I am directed by Lord Knutsford to inquire whether if the Storekeeper of the Falkland Islands Company continues to be licensed as Auctioneer the Company are prepared to give up the practice of receiving a share of the Commission earned by him as Auctioneer, a practice which, as far as is known, is without precedent and does not commend itself to his Lordship's views, though there is no evidence before him of any actual complaint having been made.

I am to add that Lord Knutsford cannot agree with you in considering the Ordinance as "a direct imputation on the honour and integrity of the Company."

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th May, with reference to the proposed Auctioneer's Ordinance, which has been laid before the Board.

I do not wish upon this occasion to question the competence of the Governor to inquire into and regulate the pecuniary relations existing between the Company and their servants: on the contrary, I am glad of the opportunity of showing once more that he has allowed himself to be misled by imperfect and inaccurate information into making proposals of an unjust and unnecessary nature. It is not a fact that the Storekeeper of the Company is himself licensed as an Auctioneer, nor is it true that the Company are in the habit of receiving a share of the commission earned by him: such a practice would no doubt be without precedent as Lord Knutsford observes.

The actual facts of the case, without the slightest reservation, are that this Company take out and pay for this license, not one penny of the cost of which is charged to him, and that he, their salaried servant, is nominated according to Ordinance No. 5 of 1853, (clause 1 and schedule A) to sell in their name, receiving, although this work is mainly performed in their time, a liberal share of their commission, a share sufficiently liberal, at all events, to be satisfactory to him, although, if it were not so, Lord Knutsford will probably admit that it is not a question of interest to any but the parties concerned. Upon this explanation his Lordship will observe that the facts, as presented to him, have been completely inverted.

The Board are glad to learn that there is no evidence before Lord Knutsford of any actual complaint having been made; that this should have been so, in such a small and highly critical community as the inhabitants of Stanley for a period of nearly 40 years is surely an argument in favour of leaving well alone that I may safely commend to his Lordship's judgment.

I venture to point out that if the principle of annulling the bids at auctions of any person pecuniarily interested in the result be pushed to its logical conclusions, the Government, which receives two-and-a-half per cent. on the proceeds would necessarily be debarred from competing. I question however, whether this would commend itself to the views either of Lord Knutsford or the Governor.

I owe an apology to Lord Knutsford for not having sufficiently explained the Board's view with regard to the imputation conveyed by this Ordinance. Were there half-a-dozen or more Auctioneers in the place, its tenor would be understood to be more general and less significant; but since the Company have been for some years, to the best of my knowledge the only people who have taken out licenses, it is not possible to conceive any reason for a change that does not imply a suspicion of collusion or some other misconduct equally dishonourable on their part. I am glad to gather however, from the last paragraph of your letter that we have been over sensitive on the subject.

I am directed by Lord Knutsford to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 31st May, on the subject of the proposed Ordinance relating to Auctioneers in the Falkland Islands.

In your previous letter of the 16th May you stated that the Falkland Islands Company held a license as Auctioneer in the Colony in the name of their head Storekeeper, and if the license is granted to the Storekeeper, he, and not the Company is the Auctioneer, unless the license states that he holds it merely as the Agent of the Company. Assuming however that the Storekeeper is licensed as the Agent being allowed to bid at the Auctions is stronger than it would be if they only received a part of the Commission earned by the Auctioneer.

If the Falkland Islands Company are willing that their head Storekeeper shall be licensed as Auctioneer on his own account and receive the whole of the Commission, Lord Knutsford will instruct the Governor to license him, and in that case it will be unnecessary to enact the proposed Ordinance.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 13th instant, on the subject of the Falkland Islands Auctioneers' Ordinance.

Judged from an English standpoint, the Company's position as sellers and purchasers at the same sale must be admitted to be peculiar, though in a small place like the Falkland Islands, where all persons of any consequence from the Government Officials downwards, act in several capacities, it has for nearly 40 years been recognized as being in the natural order of things, and has not been considered objectionable up to the present time. However having placed the matter before the Board yesterday, I have to state for the information of Lord Knutsford, that they are willing to defer entirely to his Lordship's wishes on the subject, and that our Colonial Manager will be instructed accordingly.

I beg leave to add, as a suggestion for Lord Knutsford's consideration, that if the Auction question is to be governed by English practice, it would be only consistent to abolish the Government duty of two-and-a-half per cent. upon the proceeds of sales. The tax, I am informed, is without precedent in this country, the Government do nothing whatever to earn it and it has for years been the subject of much complaint as an unjust and unreasonable impost.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit to you for the consideration of Lord Knutsford a copy of a protest made by the Unofficial Members of the Legislative Council of the Falkland Islands against the passing of the Ordinance relating to sales by Auction.

The original Auctioneers' Ordinance of 1853, No. 5, provided that it should be lawful for the Governor to grant to any person or Company a license to carry on the business of an Auctioneer on his or their own account or by his or their Agent, and this Company have for many years held a license under that Ordinance in the name of their head Storekeeper. It happens at times that property of considerable value is brought to the hammer in Stanley, and the connection of the Auctioneers with this Company has hitherto been regarded as a guarantee of respectability, so necessary a qualification in an office of this kind. The present holder of the license has been in our services for nearly 30 years, and has frequently been employed by the Government as Auctioneer. No complaint has ever, to my knowledge, been made against him, or against the Company in connection with the way his duties have been performed. The proposed Ordinance would deprive him of the post that he has held so long, and, further, is regarded by this Board as a direct imputation upon the honour and integrity of the Company, which they desire very strongly to repudiate. If any valid objections could have been raised to the arrangements for conducting auctions which have been in force for nearly 40 years, they would have occurred long before this to the minds of former Governors, several of whom were practised in the law, but this has not been the case, and we now find Sir Roger Goldsworthy proposing an alteration at a time coincident with the date of the renewal of our license. The Board are unable to understand the attitude that he has thought fit to assume towards the Company in this matter.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th May, with reference to the proposed Auctioneer's Ordinance, which has been laid before the Board.

I do not wish upon this occasion to question the competence of the Governor to inquire into and regulate the pecuniary relations existing between the Company and their servants: on the contrary, I am glad of the opportunity of showing once more that he has allowed himself to be misled by imperfect and inaccurate information into making proposals of an unjust and unnecessary nature. It is not a fact that the Storekeeper of the Company is himself licensed as an Auctioneer, nor is it true that the Company are in the habit of receiving a share of the commission earned by him: such a practice would no doubt be without precedent as Lord Knutsford observes.

The actual facts of the case, without the slightest reservation, are that this Company take out and pay for this license, not one penny of the cost of which is charged to him, and that he, their salaried servant, is nominated according to Ordinance No. 5 of 1853, (clause 1 and schedule A) to sell in their name, receiving, although this work is mainly performed in their time, a liberal share of their commission, a share sufficiently liberal, at all events, to be satisfactory to him, although, if it were not so, Lord Knutsford will probably admit that it is not a question of interest to any but the parties concerned. Upon this explanation his Lordship will observe that the facts, as presented to him, have been completely inverted.

The Board are glad to learn that there is no evidence before Lord Knutsford of any actual complaint having been made; that this should have been so, in such a small and highly critical community as the inhabitants of Stanley for a period of nearly 40 years is surely an argument in favour of leaving well alone that I may safely commend to his Lordship's judgment.

I venture to point out that if the principle of annulling the bids at auctions of any person pecuniarily interested in the result be pushed to its logical conclusions, the Government, which receives two-and-a-half per cent. on the proceeds would necessarily be debarred from competing. I question however, whether this would commend itself to the views either of Lord Knutsford or the Governor.

I owe an apology to Lord Knutsford for not having sufficiently explained the Board's view with regard to the imputation conveyed by this Ordinance. Were there half-a-dozen or more Auctioneers in the place, its tenor would be understood to be more general and less significant; but since the Company have been for some years, to the best of my knowledge the only people who have taken out licenses, it is not possible to conceive any reason for a change that does not imply a suspicion of collusion or some other misconduct equally dishonourable on their part. I am glad to gather however, from the last paragraph of your letter that we have been over sensitive on the subject.

I am directed by Lord Knutsford to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 31st May, on the subject of the proposed Ordinance relating to Auctioneers in the Falkland Islands.

In your previous letter of the 16th May you stated that the Falkland Islands Company held a license as Auctioneer in the Colony in the name of their head Storekeeper, and if the license is granted to the Storekeeper, he, and not the Company is the Auctioneer, unless the license states that he holds it merely as the Agent of the Company. Assuming however that the Storekeeper is licensed as the Agent of the Company, and that they are really the Auctioneers, the objection to their being allowed to bid at the Auctions is stronger than it would be if they only received a part of the Commission earned by the Auctioneer.

If the Falkland Islands Company are willing that their head Storekeeper shall be licensed as Auctioneer on his own account and receive the whole of the Commission, Lord Knutsford will instruct the Governor to license him, and in that case it will be unnecessary to enact the proposed Ordinance.

However having placed the matter before the Board yesterday, I have to state for the information of Lord Knutsford, that they are willing to defer entirely to his Lordship's wishes on the subject, and that our Colonial Manager will be instructed accordingly.

I beg leave to add, as a suggestion for Lord Knutsford's consideration, that if the Auction question is to be governed by English practice, it would be only consistent to abolish the Government duty of two-and-a-half per cent. upon the proceeds of sales. The tax, I am informed, is without precedent in this country, the Government do nothing whatever to earn it and it has for years been the subject of much complaint as an unjust and unreasonable impost.

LOCAL TAXATION ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE to raise a sum of money by a tax on tenements in Stanley and to provide for the application thereof, and other local taxes for the proposed Local Improvements :—

Whereas Ordinance No. 14 of 1882 entitled "An Ordinance to raise a sum of money in aid of Revenue by a tax on Lands and Tenements for a limited period" expires on the 31st day of Dec., next, and it is expedient to continue the taxation of tenements in Stanley to provide thereby along with certain local taxes hereinafter mentioned a sum of money to be applied exclusively to expenditure in or in the immediate vicinity of the township of Stanley—

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—For all tenements in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect of the property thereof for every twenty shillings of the annual value thereof the sum of six pence ; such value to be assessed in the first week of January in every year by the Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley. Provided always that whilst subject to this tax such tenements shall be exempt from any acreage tax on lands which it may be found necessary hereafter to impose throughout the Islands ; and provided further that the sum so raised under this section shall be known as local revenue and disposed of as hereinafter mentioned.

2.—The annual revenue arising within the township of Stanley from the Dog Tax, the Publican's Retail License, the Tobacco and Billiard Table Licences under the several Ordinances relating thereto and from the charge hereafter to be made for each horse or head of cattle for the privilege of commonage, shall be applied for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

3.—The revenue arising under Section 1 of this Ordinance and from the taxes enumerated in Section 2 of this Ordinance shall be known as "local revenue," and shall be exclusively applied to local improvements in or in the immediate vicinity of the township of Stanley.

At a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held at Government House on Friday, the 30th day of September, 1892.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon arrived and took his seat.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the introduction and first reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to raise a sum of money by a tax on tenements in Stanley and to provide for the application thereof and other local taxes for the proposed local improvements."

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer seconded and the Bill was read a first time.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon said there was a strong feeling in Stanley against the Ordinance though time had not allowed for a petition to be presented. The Honourable Member admitted the necessity of providing a fund to be raised by local taxation for the object in view, but considered that the opposition to the renewal of the "Tenement Tax" was justified as the people, looking at the provisions of the Bill of 1882, were naturally led to believe that the tax would be discontinued after a period of ten years and it would be a breach of faith if it were continued. The Honourable Member suggested therefore that some other means, such as a wheel tax, might not be devised for raising local revenue.

His Excellency said that this was not the time, being its First reading, to enter into any discussion on the Bill, but he would be ready to hear anything any Member had to say when the Second reading had been moved. At the same time there would be no objection to the postponement of the Third reading until time had allowed of a conference being had with some of the leading townspeople.

His Excellency then proposed the suspension of the Standing Orders, which was seconded by the Colonial Treasurer. The same was carried with a view to proceeding with the Second Reading of the Bill and consideration in Committee.

The Colonial Secretary moved the Second reading and going into Committee thereon, explained the intention and nature of the Bill, and said that he did not see how a wheel tax would give the necessary funds.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon then entered a protest against the provisions in the Bill for the renewal of the "Tenement Tax." The Honourable Member said he would not oppose the Bill going into Committee, but would avail himself of His Excellency's proposal that the Third reading be postponed in order that he might obtain the sense of some of the leading members of the community upon the Bill.

His Excellency said that the object of the Bill was to provide for "local revenue." At present there was no sum available for expenditure on drainage, roads, sanitation, and general improvements in Stanley, and it was not fair that these works should be charged to "general revenue," as had hitherto been done, by which the other portion of the Colony would be taxed for "local improvements." To obtain funds therefore for this purpose it was proposed that the Tobacco, Dog, Publican's and Billiard Table Licenses, all of which are raised in Stanley itself, be eliminated from general revenue and applied to local purposes. These would, it is estimated, bring in about £230, but would be insufficient to meet the expense of fencing in the Commonage. This cost, therefore, it was proposed, should be defrayed from general revenue, and be recouped by a tenement tax to be raised (say for five years) under the proposed Ordinance.

His Excellency added that he would not press for the re-imposition, particularly of the "Tenement Tax," if some other mode were suggested for paying off the debt to be incurred by local to general revenue; but in the absence of such, whether the Bill were opposed or not, he would feel it his duty to bring the Bill in.

The Bill was read a Second time.

The Council then went into Committee.

In Clause 1, line 5, after "Stanley," the words "and payable to the Colonial Treasurer before the 30th day of January in each year" were inserted.

Clauses 2 and 3 were agreed to.

Some discussion took place as to the duration of the Bill, but was postponed until next Meeting.

The Bill was left in Committee stage.

The Council resumed its sitting in Committee on the Estimates for 1893.

The items of expenditure were read and discussed.

On vote 6, "Port & Marine." The Honourable A. E. Baillon said that complaints had been made of the inefficiency of the Pilot Service, vessels having on more than one occasion, citing recent instances, found it impossible to obtain the services of a pilot, although the pilotage had been paid.

His Excellency explained the circumstances under which the present acting pilot was also assistant pilot, and said that when Mr. Wilmer was absent arrangements would be made to provide, whenever possible, for the service of a pilot in Stanley. He pointed out also that under previous arrangements the exceptional presence of three vessels waiting for pilots could not have been provided for.

Under vote 6, "Mail Schooner." The Honourable A. E. Baillon commented on the unsatisfactory manner in which, in his opinion, the Mail Service to the West Falklands is conducted. The Honourable Member believed the Postmaster had received complaints on the subject and he questioned, if the figures were gone into, whether the "Hadassah" is running to advantage.

His Excellency drew attention that the Honourable Member was suggesting that the return which had been furnished to him was incorrect and said that he could not allow such a statement to pass unnoticed.

The Honourable Member (Mr. Baillon) deprecated having any intention of impugning the correctness of the Return, but suggested that a more detailed statement might be given. During his short experience he considered that the service was better performed, was more regular, and complaints less frequent than when an outside Schooner was engaged at £300 a year, and unless it was distinctly shown that the "Hadassah" was running at a profit it was a pity to take her from what she was intended and not run her service successfully. The Honourable Member also referred to the certificate held by the Pilot.

His Excellency reminded the Honourable Member to one thing that had not been taken into consideration, namely, that the present arrangement afforded a double service, and explained the items in the account, which showed that the "Hadassah," while affording this double service, was not running at an increased cost, and that her upkeep would be comparatively far heavier if she were not utilised on the service, for besides the £300 subsidy to another Schooner, the insurance, one hand with allowance for messing, wages of the crew, painting and repairs on her, would still have to be paid. As regards the way in which the service was performed His Excellency was aware that there had been a proposal made by some of the inhabitants of the West Island, on his first arrival, that a further subsidy of £300, making £600, should be given for the service to be conducted by an outside schooner.

His Excellency further reminded the Honourable Member that the Mail service had been conducted as nearly as possible on the lines discussed and agreed upon in a conversation with Mr. Goodhart, of the West Falklands, and taking everything into consideration the services had not been unsuccessfully carried out, and every endeavour had been made to meet the convenience of the public. With regard to the certificate held by the pilot, he said that the Insurance Company had not objected to a person not holding a Master's certificate being in charge of the "Hadassah," if he qualified in local navigation, which the pilot would be required to do.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon said he felt obliged to give his vote against the item of £466 18 11 "Mail Schooner."

Under Vote 17, "Public Works," the item "Maintenance and Repair of roads" was reduced to £250—and a new item £70 as "an instalment on loan for fencing in the Commonage was introduced."

The item "forage for cart horses" was increased to £30.

Making a sum total for Public Works of £1000

No further amendments were proposed and the Estimates were left in Committee.

The Council resumed its sitting.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the introduction and First reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to make provision for the Service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1893."

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Bill was read by title.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary gave notice that at the next Meeting of the Council he would move a resolution "that, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, a sum of £500 be set apart from the special vote for "sea walls" and jetties" for making and repairing of roads in Stanley."

The Council adjourned until Monday the 3rd of October.

THE ROYAL IMPERIAL INSTITUTE.

At a Meeting held at the Court House, Stanley, Falkland Islands, on Wednesday, the 26th day of October, 1892, called at the request of His Excellency the Governor.

Present.

The Honourables R. M. Routledge, C. A. Fraser, J. J. Felton, A. E. Baillon. The Very Reverend Dean Brandon, Messrs. G. A. Cobb, Vere Packe, R. Nichol, C. Williams, W. Coulson & G. Hurst. Mr. Routledge explained the objects and constitution of the Imperial Institute as set forth in the pamphlets which had been received in the Colony.

Mr. Routledge referred to the contribution already given by the Colony, which thus afforded the conclusive evidence of its earnest desire to be thoroughly represented in the Mother Country, and to be associated in the work initiated by the Institute.

In accordance with the provisions embodied in the Constitution, Field Marshal Sir Lintorn Simmons had been appointed by the Colonial Authorities as representative of these Islands to serve upon the Governing Body. A letter by Sir Lintorn Simmons addressed to His Excellency stating that a room had been set apart

for exhibits from the Falkland Islands, and adding, that it would give him great pleasure to bring forward the name of any gentlemen in the Falklands whom the Governor might recommend for admission to the honour of Membership was read.

His Excellency's reply of the 17th September stating that steps had already been taken for fitting up the room appropriately was also read.

Mr. Routledge then dwelt on the mode of procedure to be carried out with a view to meeting the object the Institute had in view, and suggested that a general Committee should be formed, consisting of the heads of all Stations, owners if possible, but in their absence the Managers, to whom, owing to their local knowledge, should be added Drs. Dale and Goings.

A local Committee resident in Stanley should be also appointed to receive articles, &c., sent in, and select and forward to the Institute, such as may be conducive to the benefit of the Colony, and the development and completion of the undertaking. Mr. J. J. Felton seconded the proposal which was carried unanimously.

Mr. Routledge proposed that the local Committee should consist of nine Members, and it was eventually decided that the Honourables R. M. Routledge, S. Hamilton, and J. J. Felton, the Colonial Chaplain. Messrs Packe, Watson, Lewis & Rowell, should be asked to serve on the Committee. Mr. Baillon was unanimously elected Chairman of the Committee, and taking the chair read His Excellency's letter, reminding the Meeting that as the Colony had already recognised the advantage of such an Institute, it should not stop there, but should "endeavour to fill, and "worthily fill, the space allotted to it."

Mr. Hill accepted the post of Honorary Secretary.

Several of those present subscribed their names as desirous of being elected Fellows.

It was proposed that a Circular letter be addressed to the Heads of Stations, asking assistance in supplying articles for exhibition.

The proceedings concluded with a vote of thanks to the Honourable R. M. Routledge and to the Chairman.

Letter from His Excellency the Governor to the Chairman of Committee in connection with Imperial Institute, Stanley.

Sir,

Though I have conferred with you personally on this matter and the objects of the Institute are before you in the letter addressed to myself by Field Marshal Sir Lintorn Simmons, G. C. B., and in the printed accounts which accompanied his letter, still I am desirous of reminding you that as the Colony has recognized the advantage of such an Institute by a handsome contribution towards the building fund, that it should not stop there, but endeavour by its samples of wool, skins, specimens of natural history, and such like, to fill the place apportioned to it.

Feeling that the Falkland Islands Company have the greatest stake in the Colony, I have already asked their representative here (Mr. Baillon) to take such steps as he might deem necessary through his Head Office, in London, to see that the Colony of the Falkland Islands is not behind other Colonies as regards the fittings of the space allotted to it, at the same time asking their co-operation.

In a work of this nature, however much differences of opinion may arise in respect to questions connected with the past, present, or the future, I sincerely trust that all may be sunk, and that one and all will co-operate with the Government in doing that which will, I feel assured, show that the Falkland Islands, though not so well known as other Colonies, have residents who are neither wanting in the "grit" which pertains to those claiming to be of the mother country, or in the powers of developing, comparatively speaking, new countries, for which the mother country has gained a reputation throughout the world.

One word in conclusion—numerically small though we are—yet let us show how in purpose we are strong and working to one end for the good of the Colony.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

No. of 1892.

An Ordinance to amend "The Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888."

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1888.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

From date of this Ordinance the entire Cemetery vested in Governor and his Successors in Office for the purposes of a Cemetery for use of the Colony.

1.—From and after the date of the passing of this Ordinance, that portion of the Cemetery at Stanley, which, by Deed of Grant, dated the Third day of February, One-thousand eight-hundred and seventy-two, was vested in the Right Reverend Waite Hockin Stirling, Doctor of Divinity, Bishop of the Church of England in the Falkland Islands, and the Reverend Charles Bull, Master of Arts, and their Successors, for the purposes of a Cemetery or Burial ground of the dead of all religious denominations, shall cease to be so vested; and the whole of the said Cemetery as described in Section 1, of the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1888, shall be vested in the Governor of the Falkland Islands, and his Successors in Office, for the purposes of a Cemetery for the use of the Colony.

Section 4 of Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888, repealed.

2.—Section 4, of the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888, is hereby repealed, and the following enactment shall be substituted therefor.

How Burial Board composed.

3.—There shall be a Burial Board composed of the following Members, that is to say. The Colonial Chaplain for the time being, the Priest, if any, for the time being, in charge of the Roman Catholic Chapel, in Stanley, and the Clergyman, if any, for the time being attached to the Baptist Chapel in Stanley, two unofficial Members of the Legislative Council, and two persons residing in the Town of Stanley, or within one mile thereof, to be appointed by the Governor. Provided always that the two persons appointed by the Governor, shall not continue in Office longer than two years without being reappointed.

This Ordinance to be read with and form part of Ordinance 6 of 1888.

4.—This Ordinance shall be read with and form part of the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, No. 6 of 1888.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs duties and Trade."

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs duties and trade."

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance the tariff of Import duties attached to Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 is hereby amended as follows :—

Exemption from duty of Perfumed Spirits, Cologne water, Lemonade, Ginger ale and Ginger beer. Conditions under which Methylic Alcohol and Tobacco may be free of duty.

Perfumed Spirits and Cologne water, Lemonade, Ginger ale and Ginger beer without admixture of spirits, Naptha or Methylic Alcohol in its crude state and not fit for use as a potable spirit or for admixture with a potable spirit; and Tobacco forming an ingredient in sheep wash or hop powder manufactured in bond in the United Kingdom, shall be admitted free of duty.

Foreign Consulates in this Colony exempted from duties on bona fide official supplies imported.

2.—The Consulates in this Colony of any foreign Countries in which is accorded or in which hereafter may be accorded to British Consular officers the privilege of exemption from Customs duties in respect of official goods imported into such foreign Countries by Her Majesty's Government for the use of Her Majesty's Consulates shall have a like privilege granted to them of exemption from any duties that may be levied in this Colony on goods which may be imported by their respective Governments as bona fide official supplies for the use of such Consulates.

An Ordinance to amend "The Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888."

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1888.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

From date of this Ordinance the entire Cemetery vested in Governor and his Successors in Office for the purposes of a Cemetery for use of the Colony.

1.—From and after the date of the passing of this Ordinance, that portion of the Cemetery at Stanley, which, by Deed of Grant, dated the Third day of February, One-thousand eight-hundred and seventy-two, was vested in the Right Reverend Waite Hockin Stirling, Doctor of Divinity, Bishop of the Church of England in the Falkland Islands, and the Reverend Charles Bull, Master of Arts, and their Successors, for the purposes of a Cemetery or Burial ground of the dead of all religious denominations, shall cease to be so vested; and the whole of the said Cemetery as described in Section 1, of the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1888, shall be vested in the Governor of the Falkland Islands, and his Successors in Office, for the purposes of a Cemetery for the use of the Colony.

Section 4 of Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888, repealed.

2.—Section 4, of the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888, is hereby repealed, and the following enactment shall be substituted therefor.

How Burial Board composed.

3.—There shall be a Burial Board composed of the following Members, that is to say. Conditions under which Methylic Alcohol and Tobacco may be free of duty.

Perfumed Spirits and Cologne water, Lemonade, Ginger ale and Ginger beer without admixture of spirits. Naptha or Methylic Alcohol in its crude state and not fit for use as a potable spirit or for admixture with a potable spirit; and Tobacco forming an ingredient in sheep wash or hop powder manufactured in bond in the United Kingdom, shall be admitted free of duty.

Foreign Consulates in this Colony exempted from duties on bona fide official supplies imported.

2.—The Consulates in this Colony of any foreign Countries in which is accorded or in which hereafter may be accorded to British Consular officers the privilege of exemption from Customs duties in respect of official goods imported into such foreign Countries by Her Majesty's Government for the use of Her Majesty's Consulates shall have a like privilege granted to them of exemption from any duties that may be levied in this Colony on goods which may be imported by their respective Governments as bona fide official supplies for the use of such Consulates.

Section 4 of Stanley Cemetery Ordinance 1888, repealed.

An Ordinance to make further provision for the local postal service of the Falkland Islands.

No. of 189 .

WHEREAS it is desirable to make further provision for the payment of postal rates within the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance letters, (except such as hereinafter mentioned) books, newspapers, packets, (as hereinafter defined) shall not be transmitted from one part of the Colony to any other part of the Colony with which there is declared to be postal communication by the Governor in Council except through the Post Office, and the Governor in Council shall, from time to time, as may be deemed expedient, fix the rates of postage for the same.

(3).

2.—The Master of every vessel shall, on arrival in Stanley, from any Port in the Colony, deliver to the Postmaster in Stanley, every letter, newspaper and book, and all packets not exceeding ounces in weight (except letters relating to the ship and cargo or bills of lading) liable to postage and every such letter, newspaper, book, or packet, shall be delivered over to the addressee or his agent, by the Postmaster, provided the rate of postage chargeable for the same shall have been prepaid by the sender, or in the event of such postage not having been prepaid by the sender then, on payment by the addressee to the Postmaster in Stanley of double the rate of postage payable on prepayment.

3.—The Master of a vessel shall not receive for conveyance from Stanley to any other Port in the Colony, any letter, newspaper, book or packet, (except such as relate to the vessel or cargo) unless the same shall have first passed through the Post Office in Stanley.

4.—Every Master of any vessel (not under contract with the Government for the carriage of Mails) sailing from Port Stanley to any other Port in the Colony, or from any Port in the Colony to Port Stanley, who shall receive on board any mail, shall be entitled to demand and receive from the Postmaster the sum of for every letter, and the sum of for every newspaper, book or packet, or other article contained in such mail, and any Master who shall refuse to carry any mail from or to the Postmaster at Stanley, shall be liable to a penalty of

5.—The Master of any vessel who shall contravene any of the provisions of Sections 2 and 3 of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £ for each offence.

6.—It shall be lawful for the Postmaster if he has reason to suspect that any letter or package transmitted through the Post Office contains anything of a dangerous, explosive or offensive nature, to seize the same and cause it to be destroyed, and the sender of such dangerous explosive or offensive article shall, if discovered, render himself liable on prosecution to a fine not exceeding

7.—Any penalty imposed by virtue of this Ordinance shall be sued for and recovered in the same way as penalties are sued for and recovered under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance No. 11 of 1853.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to appoint Justices of the Peace to be Visiting Justices of the Gaol in Stanley.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

(4).

Governor may appoint Justices and assign to them duties under Regulations.

1.—The Governor shall have power to appoint from time to time, as Visiting Justices of the Gaol, Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley, and to assign to such Visiting Justices by any Regulations framed or to be framed by the Governor in Council, such duties as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the Gaol.

Rotation of Visiting Justices and time for which appointed during the year to be notified.

2.—The Visiting Justices so appointed shall, by notification in the Government Gazette, have assigned to them the period during which any two of them shall hold office as Visiting Justices.

An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of property in Stanley against injury from the trespassing of animals within the town.

WHEREAS it is expedient for the better protection of the public interest, as also in the interests of the owners of private property within the town of Stanley, that that part of the land known as the Commonage should be fenced in, and that from and after the completion of the same the owners of horses, mules, cattle, &c., should be compelled to restrain the trespassing of such animals within the said town,

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—After the coming into operation of this Ordinance the owner of every animal mentioned in the Schedule hereto annexed shall, on payment of the sum to be charged as per said Schedule for such animal, be entitled to obtain a license to maintain such animal within the fenced-in land known as the Commonage lying to the south of the town of Stanley ; and the owner of any animal taking advantage of the said fenced-in land without having paid for such license shall render himself liable to a penalty not exceeding £ for each offence.

2.—All animals included in the Schedule hereto found wandering or grazing within the town of Stanley after the coming into operation of this Ordinance, shall be liable to be seized and to be detained in the enclosure hereinafter called the Government Pound, and notice of such impounding with a description of the animal so impounded shall be placed upon the Notice Board within twenty-four hours.

3.—The owner of every animal so seized and detained shall before its release from the Pound pay to the Pound-keeper the sum of £ by way of penalty, together with the further sum of per diem for the cost of maintaining the animal whilst detained in the Pound, and every person, whether the owner of said animal or not, who shall in any way attempt to rescue any animal impounded or about to be impounded shall render himself liable to a fine not exceeding the sum of £

(5).

4.—If no owner shall claim any animal seized as above-mentioned within days after such animal shall have been impounded, the Pound-keeper shall, by public notice placed on the Gazette Board advertise such animal for sale, and the money to be derived from such sale, after payment of all expenses, shall be deposited in the Colonial Treasury, and unless claimed within three months by the owner or his representatives shall be appropriated for the purposes of local revenue.

5.—An enclosure lying immediately to the south of the Gaol in Stanley, and situated within the grounds attached to the said Gaol shall be, and is hereby declared to be, the Government Pound; but it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to substitute any other enclosure to be used for that purpose.

6.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such rules and regulations for the management of the Pound as may seem necessary, and to appoint a Keeper of the Pound who shall for any breach of the duties allotted to him under this Ordinance or under such Rules and Regulations be liable to a fine not exceeding the sum of £ for each offence.

7.—All fines or penalties imposed by virtue of this Ordinance shall be sued for and recovered in the same way as penalties are sued for and recovered under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance No. 11 of 1853.

8.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on completion of the fencing-in of the Commonage, and the date on which the same shall become Law shall be declared by Proclamation under the hand of the Governor, and shall be cited as "*the Pound Ordinance, 1893.*"

No. 11 of 1892.

An Ordinance to provide for the appointment of Visiting Justices for the Gaol in Stanley.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to appoint Justices of the Peace to be Visiting Justices of the Gaol in Stanley.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Governor may appoint Justices and assign to them duties under Regulations.

1.—The Governor shall have power to appoint from time to time, as Visiting Justices of the Gaol, Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley, and to assign to such Visiting Justices by any Regulations framed or to be framed by the Governor in Council, such duties as may be deemed necessary.

Rotation of Visiting Justices and time for which appointed during the year to be notified.

2.—The Visiting Justices so appointed shall, by notification in the Government Gazette, have assigned to them the period during which any two of them shall hold office as Visiting Justices.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer seconded and the Bill was read by title.

His Excellency moved the suspension of the Standing Orders with a view to the Bill passing through its various stages at once, the same being carried the Colonial Secretary moved the Second reading and going into Committee thereon, and explained the general principles of the Bill, which, he added, had already received the approval of the Right Honourable the Secretary of State. The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer seconded and the motion was carried.

The Council then went into Committee.

The following amendment was proposed and agreed to :—

Clause 3, line 4. The word "Minister" was substituted for the word "Clergyman."

The Council having resumed its sitting, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the Third reading and passing of the Bill. The Colonial Treasurer seconded and the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

At a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held at Government House on Wednesday, the 28th day of December, 1892.

The minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency drew attention to the difference between the Bill entitled "An Ordinance to make further provision for the Postal Service of this Colony," as Gazetted, and that now laid before the Council.

The Colonial Treasurer, as Postmaster, took charge of the Bill and, in moving the Second reading and consideration in Committee, explained that it was intended to provide for the regularity and uniformity of the postal system, wherever possible, throughout the Islands.

The Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read a second time.

The Council then resolved itself into Committee.

The following amendments were agreed to:—

In line 3, after the word "transmitted," the words "by vessel" were added, as the unofficial members considered that as at present drafted much inconvenience would be caused if communication with certain ports, such as Port Howard or San Carlos, could only be carried on through Port Stanley.

In line 8, after the word "same" the words "make such appointments and frame such Rules and Regulations as may be necessary for the carrying out such postal communication" were added.

Clause 2. Some discussion as to the time of delivery and despatch of postal matter took place on the reading of this clause. It was eventually agreed that that was a matter which should be dealt with by the Governor in Council as he should deem fit under Clause 1.

In line 5, the word "six" was inserted before the word "ounces."

Clause 3. After the word "letter" in line 2, the following words were added in parenthesis "except letters relating to the vessel and cargo or bills of lading," and in line 3 the words in parenthesis "except such as relate to the vessel or cargo" were deleted.

Clause 4, line 5. The words "the sum of" were struck out and the words "one half the rate of postage" inserted in lieu thereof; and in line 6 the words "the sum of for every" were struck out. In line 9, after the word "penalty" the words "not exceeding five pounds" were inserted.

Clause 5, line 3. The words "five pounds" were inserted after the word "exceeding."

Clause 6, line 7. The words "twenty pounds" were inserted after the word "exceeding."

The Council resumed its sitting.

The Colonial Treasurer gave notice that at the next meeting of the Council he would move the Third reading and passing of the Bill.

The Colonial Secretary moved the introduction and First reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the appointment of Visiting Justices for the Gaol in Stanley." The Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Bill was read by title.

The Standing Orders were suspended with a view to the Bill going through its various stages.

The Colonial Secretary in moving the Second reading explained that the Bill had been brought forward in accordance with instructions received from the Secretary of State. The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded and with the omission in Clause 1, agreed to in Committee, of the words "for the proper management of the Gaol" which had been unintentionally inserted and if retained, as pointed out by His Excellency, might be assumed to give powers to the Visiting Justices over the Colonial Secretary, the Bill went through its Second and Third reading and was passed.

DISTEMPER AMONG DOGS.

Amendment of Order in Council of 19th August, 1892.

His Excellency the Governor desires it to be notified that Clause 4, of the Order in Council of the 19th August, 1892, is amended as follows:—

4. Every owner in Stanley whose dog becomes affected with distemper shall report the same at once to the Chief Constable, and every owner of a dog outside Stanley similarly affected shall report the same to the neighbouring Station-holders, in order that such steps may be taken as may seem necessary to prevent contagion, and if the destruction of any dog for such purpose be considered advisable and ordered by a Justice of the Peace, compensation, not exceeding two Pounds, may be paid out of general revenue to the owner of the dog so destroyed.

GAOL REGULATIONS.

—o—

Made in accordance with Section 54 of the Administration of Justice Ordinance No. 10 of 1853, by His Excellency Sir Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy, K. C. M. G., Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies.

1.—The Gaoler shall keep a Book (Form A) in which shall be entered the name of every prisoner committed to Gaol, the offence for which committed, age, nationality and previous conviction, if any. The Gaoler shall keep a Conduct Book (Form B) in which the conduct of prisoners shall be entered, with such other particulars as may be required from time to time, which book shall be submitted to the Visiting Justices at each visit. All punishments, by whosoever order inflicted, shall be entered in this book.

2.—All prisoners on entering the Gaol must be searched, everything not necessary for their use while in custody must be taken from them and retained by the Gaoler until their release, and all articles so taken must be entered in a book (Form C). The name of the prisoner, and other particulars required, shall be entered at the time in the Gaol book. The Colonial Surgeon shall examine each prisoner on admission. He shall, if possible, see every prisoner once a week, and prisoners in solitary confinement at shorter intervals. No dietary or corporal punishment shall be inflicted without his certificate that the prisoner is able to bear it. The Colonial Surgeon shall keep a book (Form D) and enter all cases of illness therein.

3.—The Colonial Secretary, the Colonial Chaplain, the Colonial Surgeon, and every Justice of the Peace, shall at all times have free access to the Gaol and to any prisoner therein; they shall sign their names in the Official Visitors Book, and make such remarks or suggestions as they may deem necessary. Any prisoner having a complaint to make or a request to prefer to them shall be given every facility for doing so.

4.—All offences committed in gaol shall be heard before one or more of the Visiting Justices. The Gaoler shall report to the Visiting Justices, as soon as possible, any complaint respecting any of the offences following, that is to say :—

- 1.—Disobedience of the Regulations of the prison by any prisoner.
- 2.—Common assaults by one prisoner on another.
- 3.—Profane cursing and swearing by any prisoner.
- 4.—Indecent behaviour by any prisoner.
- 5.—Irreverent behaviour at Divine Service by any prisoner.
- 6.—Insulting or threatening language by any prisoner to any officer or prisoner.
- 7.—Absence from Divine Service without leave by any criminal prisoner.
- 8.—Idleness or negligence at work by any convicted criminal prisoner.

9.—Wilful mismanagement of work by any convicted criminal prisoner.

And it shall be lawful for any one of the Visiting Justices to examine any person touching such offences and to determine thereupon, and to punish such offences by ordering the offender for any time not exceeding three days to close confinement to be kept there upon bread and water.

If any criminal prisoner is guilty of repeated offences against prison discipline, or is guilty of any offence against prison discipline which one Visiting Justice is not empowered by these Regulations to punish, the Gaoler shall report the same to the Visiting Justices, and the Visiting Justices shall have power to enquire upon oath and to determine concerning any matter so reported to them, and to order the offender to be punished by confinement in a punishment cell for any term not exceeding one month, or in the case of prisoners convicted of felony or sentenced to hard labour by personal correction not exceeding 36 lashes, in the case of prisoners over 18, and half that number of strokes with a birch when the prisoner is 18 years of age or under.

5.—Prisoners may see their friends every Saturday from twelve to one o'clock by order of the Colonial Secretary but in the event of misconduct such indulgence will not be granted.

6.—Prisoners not at hard labour or in solitary confinement shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every day; but all prisoners, other than those under solitary confinement, shall be allowed one hour's exercise in the gaol yard every Sunday.

8.—The prisoners shall rise at 5 a.m. in Summer and 6 30 in Winter, and be locked up in their respective cells at 8 p.m. in the Summer and 5 30 p.m. in the Winter.

8.—In case of any riotous conduct or disobedience of orders by any prisoner, the Gaoler shall take such measures as may be necessary to enforce discipline forthwith, and report the case to the Colonial Secretary and to the Visiting Justices for the month, as early as possible, with a view to their dealing with the matter.

9.—Two persons shall not at any time be kept in one cell.

10.—Prisoners convicted of felony are never to be locked in the same cell with other prisoners, nor adults with juveniles, nor reconvicted criminals with first offenders.

11.—A light is to be kept burning in the passage of the gaol all night.

12.—Prisoners sentenced by any Court or Justice to solitary confinement shall be locked up in separate cells. They shall not be allowed to leave their respective cells except in custody of the Gaoler or Warder, but they shall be given such amount of exercise as is necessary for health, and they shall not be kept in solitude for any length of time without constant medical supervision. Their meals are to be taken in their cells.

13.—Prisoners committed for trial or for debt may purchase provisions for their own use, with the sanction of the Gaoler; provided that spirits shall not be allowed to be so purchased, and not more than one pint of beer or wine per day for each prisoner so committed.

14.—Spirits shall not be conveyed into the gaol for the use of any prisoner, nor shall smoking be allowed without the written order of the Colonial Surgeon.

Prisoners in solitary confinement are to receive the same as prisoners at hard labour—except in cases where bread and water has been ordered as a punishment, when the allowance will be $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb. for males and 1 lb. for women. Bread and water diet shall not be given continuously for more than three days.

A copy of the Diet Table is to be hung up in the Day room of the gaol.

15.—The labour to be performed by the prisoners will be directed from time to time by the Colonial Secretary under orders from the Governor.

The following shall be the Time Table for work, &c.

- (1).—Prisoners will rise and dress, sweep out and tidy their cells, and perform such other work as they may be called upon to do until breakfast time.
- (2).—After breakfast until 12 o'clock work in or out of doors.
- (3).—From 12 to 12-30 p.m. dinner. From 12.30 to 1 p.m. clean day room and gaol.
- (4).—From 1 p.m. until the last bell work in or out of doors.
- (5).—After the last bell, supper, carry water and peat.
- (6).—Prisoners at work in the cells are to have exercise in the Prison yard from 1 to 2 o'clock p.m. daily, weather permitting.
- (7).—Prisoners are to be discharged at noon on the day of their release. If the day of release falls on a Sunday they shall be released on the preceding Saturday.

16. The prisoners will be employed every Saturday afternoon to clean the gaol, wash their clothes, or on such other duties as may be ordered.

17.—Female prisoners are to be kept separate from the male prisoners at all times, except during the performance of divine service and they will be under the exclusive charge of the Gaoler's wife, or a matron appointed for that purpose.

18.—Each prisoner will be supplied with the following articles, viz. : one palliasse, a panakin and a spoon and fork and a sufficiency of blankets. Clothing will be supplied for use of the prisoners from time to time, for which requisition must be made by the Gaoler through the Colonial Secretary.

19.—Letters shall not be allowed to pass to or from any prisoner unless the same shall be first sanctioned by the Colonial Secretary. The Gaoler shall at once on receiving any letter addressed to any prisoner, or on receipt of any letter written by any prisoner, (the writing of which letter must be by permission granted by the Colonial Secretary) submit the same to the Colonial Secretary for instructions.

20.—The Colonial Secretary will be responsible for the general discipline of the gaol, the labour which the prisoners are to perform, and for all disbursements of public money in connection therewith, subject to the instructions of the Governor.

21.—Remission of 3 days in each month may be granted for good behaviour to prisoners sentenced to short terms of imprisonment.

Prisoners sentenced to long terms of imprisonment, or to penal servitude, may, by steady industry, accompanied by good conduct, if males, obtain remission of one fourth of the sentence, and if females, one third of the sentence—under the system of marks as laid down in enclosure to Circular Despatch of Secretary of State, dated 21st January, 1892.

22.—The Governor may, by an order in writing under his hand and Seal, grant to any prisoner whose term of imprisonment shall exceed six months, a licence to be at large within the Colony during the unexpired portion of the term of imprisonment, upon such conditions as to the Governor shall seem fit, and it shall be lawful for the Governor to revoke or alter such licence by a like order at his pleasure. Provided always that if such licence shall be revoked, the Governor shall cause to be signified to the Police Magistrate the revocation of such licence, and require such Magistrate, or any Justice of the Peace, to issue his warrant for the apprehension of the person holding such licence.

23.—Any matters for which provision has not been made in the above rules shall be governed by the Regulations in force for local prisons in England, so far as they are applicable to the circumstances of the Colony.

An Ordinance to make further provision for the local postal service of the Falkland Islands.

No. 12 of 1892.

WHEREAS it is desirable to make further provision for the payment of postal rates within the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance letters, (except such as hereinafter mentioned) books, newspaper, postal packets, (as hereinafter defined) shall not be transmitted by vessel from one port of the Colony to any other port of the Colony with which there is declared to be postal communication by the Governor in Council except through the Post Office, and the Governor in Council shall, from time to time, as may be deemed expedient, fix the rates of postage for the same, make such appointments, and frame such Rules and Regulations as may be necessary for the carrying out such postal communication.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

2.—The Master of every vessel shall, on arrival in Stanley, from any Port in the Colony, deliver to the Postmaster in Stanley, every letter, (except letters relating to the ship and cargo or bills of lading) newspaper and book, and all postal packets, not exceeding six ounces in weight, liable to postage and every such letter, newspaper, book, or packet, shall be delivered over to the addressee, or his agent, by the Postmaster, provided the rate of postage chargeable for the same shall have been prepaid by the sender, or in the event of such postage not having been prepaid by the sender then, on payment by the addressee to the Postmaster in Stanley of double the rate of postage payable on prepayment.

3.—The Master of a vessel shall not receive for conveyance from Stanley to any other Port in the Colony, any letter, (except letters relating to the vessel and cargo or bills of lading) newspaper, book or postal packet, unless the same shall have first passed through the Post Office in Stanley.

4.—Every Master of any vessel (not under contract with the Government for the carriage of Mails) sailing from Port Stanley to any other Port in the Colony, or from any Port in the Colony to Port Stanley, who shall receive on board any mail, shall be entitled to demand and receive from the Postmaster one half the local rate of postage for every local letter, newspaper, book or postal packet, or other article contained in such mail, and any Master who shall refuse to carry any mail from or to the Postmaster at Stanley, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

5.—The Master of any vessel who shall contravene any of the provisions of Sections 2 and 3 of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds for each offence.

6.—It shall be lawful for the Postmaster if he has reason to suspect that any letter or package transmitted through the Post Office contains anything of a dangerous, explosive or offensive nature, to seize the same and if necessary, on examination, cause it to be destroyed, and the sender of such dangerous explosive or offensive article shall be liable on prosecution to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.

7.—The Postmaster may examine any newspaper, postal packet, book packet, or other article, whether sent by the post without a cover or in a cover open at the sides or ends, in order to discover whether it is contrary in any respect to the conditions required to be observed; and in case any one of the required conditions has not been fulfilled, the whole of every such newspaper, parcel, book packet or other article, may be charged at letter rates.

8.—Any penalty imposed by virtue of this Ordinance shall be sued for and recovered in the same way as penalties are sued for and recovered under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance No. 11 of 1853.

9.—This Ordinance may be cited as the "Local Postal Ordinance, 1892," and shall come into operation on the first day of February 1893.

An Ordinance to make further provision for the local postal service of the Falkland Islands.

No. 12 of 1892.

WHEREAS it is desirable to make further provision for the payment of postal rates within the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance letters, (except such as hereinafter mentioned) books, newspaper, postal packets, (as hereinafter defined) shall not be transmitted by vessel from one port of the Colony to any other port of the Colony with which there is declared to be postal communication by the Governor in Council except through the Post Office, and the Governor in Council shall, from time to time, as may be deemed expedient, fix the rates of postage for the same, make such appointments, and frame such Rules and Regulations as may be necessary for the carrying out such postal communication.

2.—The Master of every vessel shall, on arrival in Stanley, from any Port in the Colony, deliver to the Postmaster in Stanley, every letter, (except letters relating to the ship and cargo or bills of lading) newspaper and book, and all postal packets, not exceeding six ounces in weight, liable to postage and every such letter, newspaper, book, or packet, shall be delivered over to the addressee, or his agent, by the Postmaster, provided the rate of postage chargeable for the same shall have been prepaid by the sender, or in the event of such postage not having been prepaid by the sender then, on payment by the addressee to the Postmaster in Stanley of double the rate of postage payable on prepayment.

3.—The Master of a vessel shall not receive for conveyance from Stanley to any other Port in the Colony, any letter, (except letters relating to the vessel and cargo or bills of lading) newspaper, book or postal packet, unless the same shall have first passed through the Post Office in Stanley.

4.—Every Master of any vessel (not under contract with the Government for the carriage of Mails) sailing from Port Stanley to any other Port in the Colony, or from any Port in the Colony to Port Stanley, who shall receive on board any mail, shall be entitled to demand and receive from the Postmaster one half the local rate of postage for every local letter, newspaper, book or postal packet, or other article contained in such mail, and any Master who shall refuse to carry any mail from or to the Postmaster at Stanley, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

5.—The Master of any vessel who shall contravene any of the provisions of Sections 2 and 3 of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds for each offence.

6.—It shall be lawful for the Postmaster if he has reason to suspect that any letter or package transmitted through the Post Office contains anything of a dangerous, explosive or offensive nature, to seize the same and if necessary, on examination, cause it to be destroyed, and the sender of such dangerous explosive or offensive article shall be liable on prosecution to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.

7.—The Postmaster may examine any newspaper, postal packet, book packet, or other article, whether sent by the post without a cover or in a cover open at the sides or ends, in order to discover whether it is contrary in any respect to the conditions required to be observed; and in case any one of the required conditions has not been fulfilled, the whole of every such newspaper, parcel, book packet or other article, may be charged at letter rates.

8.—Any penalty imposed by virtue of this Ordinance shall be sued for and recovered in the same way as penalties are sued for and recovered under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance No. 11 of 1853.

9.—This Ordinance may be cited as the "Local Postal Ordinance, 1892," and shall come into operation on the first day of February 1893.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

In virtue of the Powers vested in me by Clause I. of the Local Postal Ordinance 1892, (No 12). I, Roger Tuckfield Goldsworthy, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander in Chief of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby order that:—

Postal centres.

From and after the 1st February, the following places are declared to be in Postal communication with Stanley, viz.:—Fox Bay and Port Howard on the West Falkland, and San Carlos on the East Falkland.

Postal rates.

The prepayment of letters and other postal matters can only be effected by means of postage stamps, at the following rates:—

Letters.

LETTERS.—For a letter not exceeding 1 oz., 1d., and so on at the rate of 1d. for every additional oz. or fraction thereof.

Any letter, with the ordinary postage, and bearing the words "Express Delivery," together with an express fee of One Shilling, prepaid in stamps by the sender, will be delivered at its destination in Stanley by a special messenger.

No letter shall exceed 18 inches in length, 9 inches in width, and 6 inches in depth, with a limit of weight of 6 ounces.

BOOKS. NEWSPAPERS and POSTAL PACKETS.

Not exceeding 2 oz.	½d.
Over 2 oz. and not exceeding 4 oz.	1d.
“ 4 oz. “ “ “ 6 oz.	1½d.

Newspapers.

Every newspaper, or packet of newspapers, must be posted either without a cover or in a cover open at both ends, and so that the same can easily be removed for the purpose of examination.

A newspaper must not bear on any part of it any words of the nature of a letter, and must not contain any enclosure of any kind, except the supplement or supplements relative to the newspaper or newspapers.

A packet of newspapers must not weigh over 8 ounces, or exceed 18 inches in length, and 9 inches in width and 6 inches in depth.

Books and Postal Packets.

Books, and all literary publications, photographs, prints and drawings on paper, and generally any paper or other substance in ordinary use for printing or writing upon, as also trade patterns, are transmissible by book post, and should be posted either without covers or in covers open at both ends, the dimensions and weight of any packet may not exceed that of newspaper packets.

Delivery at Post Office.

Mails shall be delivered at the Post Office, Stanley, as soon after the arrival of any vessel carrying the same as may be possible.

Sir,

I have the honour, by command of the Governor, to acknowledge the receipt through the Colonial Secretary, of your letter of the 10th January, forwarding communications from certain Justices of the Peace of the East and West Falklands, (in which former your signature appears) tendering their resignations of their positions as Justices.

Firstly. The Governor in Council is desirous of pointing out that the Governor is unable to accept a tender of resignation of these Justices *en bloc*, and of reminding you that all applications to resign should be made individually in writing by the Justice immediately concerned, and addressed through the proper channel.

Secondly. The Governor in Council would remind you that all applications should be couched in courteous and respectful terms to the Governor as representing Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen.

Thirdly. The Governor in Council suggests that Justices holding other offices under the Crown should take into consideration the advisability of resigning such offices, or state the reasons for their not doing so, *i. e.*, if they desire to act consistently.

Fourthly. The Governor in Council cannot but regret that a body of English gentlemen should so far forget their obligations as such, and what is due to Her Majesty's representative as to act as they have done, and he must deprecate most strongly the fact of the agent of a powerful Corporation, such as that of the Falkland Islands Company, not only lending himself to a conspiracy to defeat the conscientious action of the Governor in Council, but even being a party to the discourtesy evinced in the correspondence forwarded through him.

In view of the opinion of the Justices the Governor in Council only feels it right to inform

you that he has already asked for a Commission of Enquiry on the Land Question, and that the expression of opinion as to his "*ability to understand the equitable right of the settlers*" must tend to His Lordship the Secretary of State acceding to his request.

As the Legal Adviser of the Government considers it doubtful whether the Governor is bound to accept the resignation as tendered, the Council advises that, on the receipt of the individual resignations, in accordance with paragraph 2 of this letter, a new Commission, from which the names of those resigning will be cancelled, will issue, and such Commission, with the correspondence which has taken place, will then be duly published in the Government Gazette.

has been treated as a Government reserve must in any case be excluded from the renewed lease. I am advised however that such land when it was leased, ceased to be a Government reserve and that it must be dealt with on the same footing as any other land comprised in a lease.

7. In two instances reservations proposed on the ground that they were formerly Government reserves are mapped out in such a way that they would most injuriously affect the lessees, viz:—two sections leased to Mr. Greenshields, known as Rincon del Moro and the Station leased to Mr. Cameron known as Fannings Head:—in each of these cases, if it should finally be decided to reserve for sale part of the land held by the lessee under his expired leases, some other part should be selected. This was indeed contemplated in Mr. Greenshield's case as stated in paragraph 11 of Sir R. Goldsworthy's despatch No. 127. I enclose an extract from a letter which I have received from Mr. Cameron on the subject of Fanning's Head Station.

8. With regard to paragraph 12 of Sir R. Goldsworthy's despatch No. 127, it is I think quite clear that the expression "within six miles by land" must be construed to include only land which can be reached by land without going more than six miles from Stanley or any township, this construction was adopted by Governor Callaghan and accepted by the Earl of Carnarvon in the correspondence noted in the margin* the question therefore of reserving for sale Kidney Island Station and part of Port Harriet Station must be dealt with on the assumption that they are not suburban but country lands. Captain Packe has strongly objected to the reservation of these stations, and has in a letter, of which I enclose an extract, made a proposal to surrender his leases of certain other stations on the conditions mentioned in his letter—I should wish you to consider this proposal.

9. I do not think it necessary to remark specifically upon any of the other proposed reservations as it would be necessary before I could come to any decision upon them that the several lessees should have an opportunity of making any representations or raising objections affecting the particular properties apart from the general objection which I have overruled to any reservation.

10. I request that you will carefully reconsider the whole question of the reservations—first endeavouring to ascertain the probable demand for the purchase of land by inhabitants of the Colony and then proceeding to select land for reservation for sale in concurrence as far as possible with the former lessees who will I trust on learning my decision assist in giving effect to it by coming to an agreement with the Government as to the land to be reserved for sale.

11. I am taking steps to obtain the services of a surveyor which will be required for surveying the lands to be put up for sale and also for surveying blocks of land which have been compulsorily purchased by lessees under the Ordinances but have not yet been allocated. In the case of expired leases where part of the Station is reserved for sale such blocks should

of course be allocated on the part not so reserved and if the whole station (except the purchased block) is reserved the former lessee should have the option of (1) having the block purchased by him allocated at the extremity of the Station (2) having such block allocated on another Station leased to him or (3) having such block sold with the rest of the reserved Station he joining in the conveyance to the purchaser to the extent of the number of acres which he had compulsorily purchased and receiving a proportionate amount of the purchase money for the whole Station.

12. I do not object to the proposal of the Governor and Executive Council that by the conditions of sale of land reserved from expired leases and put up for sale the purchasers should have the option of paying the purchase money by instalments with interest on the unpaid balances. This proposal follows the precedent set in the case of the large sales to the Falkland Islands Company and others under Ordinance 9 of 1890.

13. It will also be necessary to impose conditions as to fencing the land sold, and I should wish you to consider what such conditions should be.

14. With regard to the difficulty suggested in paragraph 3 of Sir R. Goldsworthy's despatch No. 127 of fixing the rent under a renewed lease if part of the land were reserved for sale and proved on survey to contain a greater acreage than that ascribed in the old lease to the entire station, such a case does not seem likely to arise; as if so large a proportion of the Station were reserved for sale it is scarcely probable that the lessee would care to renew the lease of the remaining portion.

15. It should be understood that if, when land reserved for sale is put up to auction, there is no bidding at or above the upset price, the former lessee will have the option of having a renewed lease of such land as if it had not been reserved for sale.

16. I have carefully considered the reasons stated by the Colonial Secretary for dissenting from the views of the majority of the Executive Council, but I am unable to concur in his views as to either the effect of the Ordinance or the injurious consequences to be apprehended from the sale of comparatively small areas of land; having learnt my views on the general question I have no doubt that he, as well as the other members of the Executive Council, will render you valuable advice and assistance in carrying them into effect.

17. If these questions are, as I trust they will be, approached in a spirit of moderation and conciliation, and with a determination to give full consideration to all reasonable representations, there should be no occasion for so exceptional a course as the appointment of the Special Commission recommended by the majority of the Executive Council.

18. I request that you will communicate a copy of this despatch to the memorialists.

SAVINGS' BANK REPORT, 1891---2.

Stanley, 16th March, 1893.

Sir,

I have the honour of forwarding for submission to His Excellency the Balance Sheet of the Savings' Bank for 1891---2.

The number of depositors and the amount of deposits have been as follows in the financial years since the opening of the Bank on 1st April, 1888 :—

The amount deposited has increased by £3,312 16s. 7d., and the number of depositors by twenty-one. Forty-two depositors have closed their accounts during the year, and sixty-three new accounts have been opened.

The average amount standing to the credit of each account is £127 4s. 11½d., and computing the population of the Colony at 1800, the average savings per head of population is £13 17s. 2d., a result which shows that wages are high and the investment of capital difficult.

The amount of deposits received during the year was £8,112 5s. 3d., and deposits repaid amounted to £5,355 9s. 2d.

The depositors have been credited with £556 0s. 6d. in interest during the year,

On 30th September, 1892, the sum of £20,661 13s. 1d. stood invested on account of the Savings' Bank, leaving a balance of £4,278 16s. 4d. due to the Savings' Bank by the Colonial Treasury. This balance is unduly large and should be decreased by investing a considerable amount as soon as possible.

The income earned by the Bank has been £583 6s. 0d., and the expenses incurred £560 4s. 6d., leaving a small profit of £23 1s. 6d., but no charge for management has been debited against the Bank this year; had this been done there would have been a loss. On the other hand the Bank has not been credited with any interest on the large balance held by the Colonial Treasury.

Should the business of the Bank increase at the present ratio it will be necessary before long to appoint a special manager for it.

Authorization of expenditure.

3. The said sum of 11,002 8 5 shall be, and is hereby declared to be, charged upon and made payable from and out of the Revenues of the said Colony, and shall be taken to have begun and commenced on and immediately after the first day of January 1893, and the Colonial Treasurer of the said Colony is hereby authorized and required from time to time upon the warrant or order of the Governor for the time being, to pay such services as specified out of such monies as have arisen or may arise from and out of the Colonial Revenues without any further order or formality, and all payments made by the Colonial Treasurer under Section 2 of the Ordinance hereby repealed, are hereby declared valid and effectual. An Ordinance for Incorporating the Trustees of Christ Church, Stanley, Falkland Islands, as a body Corporate.

No. of 1893.

WHEREAS certain persons have by voluntary subscription built within the town of Stanley, for the public worship of Almighty God, in harmony with the Doctrine and Discipline the Rites and Ceremonies of the Church of England, a Church known as "Christ Church," and whereas it is expedient for the proper management of the property and concerns of said Church that certain persons nominated under a Deed of Constitution and Consecration dated the 21st day of February, and recorded the 28th day of April 1892, as Trustees for the holding and management of the property of said Church, should be incorporated as a body Corporate.—

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The several persons nominated under clause 18, or hereafter to be assumed under Clause 19 of said Deed of Constitution and Consecration shall be, and are hereby declared and adjudged to be, one body politic and Corporate by the name of "The Trustees of Christ Church, Stanley," and by that name shall and may have perpetual succession, and shall and may sue and be sued in all Courts and before all Magistrates, Justices and others in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever, and shall and may have a common seal, and the same may vary and alter at their pleasure, and by the name aforesaid shall be in law capable of holding all such estate real or personal as hath already been acquired by them, or of taking and holding for ever hereafter other estate real and personal either by purchase, gift, devise or legacy, for the use of the said Church.

An Ordinance to provide for the establishment of a Volunteer Force.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the establishment of a Volunteer Force:

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Preliminary.

1.—This Ordinance may be cited as “The Volunteer Ordinance 1892.”

2.—In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires—

Interpretation

“Commanding Officer of a Corps” means the officer or other member of the Corps who holds the highest rank in such corps.

“Officer” means a person holding a commission as officer in a Volunteer Corps.

“Volunteer” means a member of a Volunteer Corps not being an officer.

“Appointments” includes accoutrements and equipments of every kind other than clothing.

PART I.

Organization of Volunteer Corps.

Governor may accept services of corps.

3. (1)—It shall be lawful for the Governor to accept the services of any persons desiring to be formed under this Ordinance into a Volunteer Corps and offering their services and on such acceptance being notified in the *Gazette* the proposed corps shall be deemed lawfully formed under this Ordinance.

(2)—Any such corps shall be designated by such style as the Governor shall order.

Officers commission to be issued by Governor.

4. (1)—The officers of a Volunteer Corps shall be commissioned by the Governor and such commission shall not be deemed vacated by the death or retirement from office of the Governor by whom the same was issued,

Rank of officers.

(2)—Officers of Volunteer Corps shall rank with Officers of Her Majesty's Regular and Militia Forces but as junior of their respective ranks.

Power of volunteer to quit corps on conditions.

5. (1)—Subject as hereinafter mentioned any volunteer may except when on active service quit his corps on complying with the following conditions:—

- (i) giving to the commanding officer of his corps fourteen days' notice in writing of his intention to quit the corps ;
- (ii) delivering up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) all arms clothing and appointments being public property or property of his corps issued to him ; and
- (iii) paying all money due or becoming due by him under the rules of his corps either before or at the time or by reason of his quitting it

and thereupon he shall be struck out of the muster roll of the corps by the commanding officer.

(2)—If any volunteer gives such notice and the commanding officer refuses to strike him out of the muster roll and the volunteer considers himself aggrieved thereby the volunteer may appeal to a Magistrate who shall hear and determine the appeal and may for the purposes thereof administer oaths and examine any person as a witness and if it appears to such Magistrate that the arms clothing and appointments issued to the volunteer being public property or property of his corps have been delivered up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) and that he has paid or is ready to pay sufficient compensation for any damages that such articles may have sustained and that all moneys due or becoming due by him under this Ordinance or under the rules of his corps either before or at the time of or by reason of his quitting it have been paid such Magistrate may order the commanding officer forthwith to strike such volunteer out of the muster roll of his corps and such determination shall be binding on all persons.

(3)—Nothing in this section contained shall authorise any volunteer to obtain his discharge except with the consent of the Governor before the expiration of any period of service for which he may have by writing engaged to serve.

6. Whenever any volunteers are on active service or are undergoing drill exercise or inspection or are voluntarily doing any duty together with Her Majesty's regular forces they and their officers shall subject to regulations under this Ordinance be under the command of the officers of Her Majesty's regular forces so nevertheless that the volunteers shall when the circumstances of the service admit be led by their own officers under such command.

Volunteers to be under command of officers of regular forces.

7. Inspections of every Volunteer Corps may be held by some officer of Her Majesty's regular forces nominated by the Governor at such times as the Governor may direct and such inspecting officer shall report to the Governor as to the efficiency or otherwise of the corps.

Annual inspection.

8. The Governor may by regulations declare what is requisite to entitle a volunteer to be deemed an efficient volunteer by defining for that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to be given by the volunteer and the course of instruction to be gone through by him and the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to be attained by him and his corps such proficiency to be judged of by the inspecting officer at the annual inspection of the corps or otherwise as prescribed.

Requisites of efficiency to be declared by Governor.

9. The Governor may disband or discontinue the services of any Volunteer Corps or any part thereof whenever it seems to him expedient to do so.

Disbanding of corps.

10. (1)—The Governor may at any time assemble a Court of Enquiry composed of members of the Volunteer Corps to enquire into any matter relative to any Volunteer Corps or to any officer or volunteer and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained on

Courts of Enquiry

such enquiry and if required to report on the same for his information.

(2)—The commanding officer of a Volunteer Corps may at any time assemble a Court of Enquiry composed either of officers and volunteers belonging to the corps or of such officers or of such volunteers to enquire into any matter relative to the corps or any volunteer not being an officer and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained on such enquiry and if required to report on the same for the information and assistance of the commanding officer.

11. The Governor may make regulations respecting anything in this Ordinance directed or authorised to be done or provided by regulation and also such regulations as may seem fit (not being inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Ordinance) respecting :—

Power of Governor to make regulations for government of Volunteer Force.

- (a) The appointment promotion and rank of officers.
- (b) The assembling and proceedings of Courts of Enquiry.
- (c) Generally the execution of this Ordinance and the general government and discipline of the Volunteer Force.

PART II.

Active Service.

12. (1)—In case of great national emergency or in case of actual or apprehended invasion of or attack on the Colony the Governor may call out any Volunteer Corps for active service.

Governor may call out Volunteers for active service in case of national emergency, invasion, &c.

(2)—Every officer and volunteer belonging to every corps so called out shall be bound to assemble at such place and perform such service as may be directed by the Governor.

(3)—Every such officer and volunteer from the time of his corps being so called out shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be deemed on active service. If any such officer or volunteer not incapacitated by infirmity for service refuses or neglects so to assemble he shall be deemed a deserter.

(4)—The period of such service shall continue so long as the Governor shall consider necessary and shall end only by order of the Governor.

(5)—Nothing in this Ordinance shall render any officer or volunteer liable to serve or proceed on duty without his consent beyond the limits of the Colony.

13. All persons enrolled in any Volunteer Corps when called out on active service by the Governor shall be entitled to pay and allowances in such manner and after such rates and conditions and to be quartered or billeted in like manner in every respect and under and subject to the same regulations as Her Majesty's other forces as far as the same shall by the Governor be deemed applicable to the Volunteer Corps.

Volunteers when called out to be entitled to pay and quarters.

14. All persons enrolled and who shall when called out on such active service as aforesaid leave families unable to support themselves shall during the period of their absence on active service be entitled to relief for their wives and families and it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix the amount of such relief.

Relief to families of Volunteers called out on service.

15. Whenever any person enrolled as aforesaid shall be called out on active service as aforesaid away from his place of residence he shall be entitled to receive if willing to do so his travelling expenses from and to such residence and it shall be lawful for the

When travelling expenses are payable to Volunteers.

Governor to fix the rate and amount of such expenses.

Pensions to officers and volunteers disabled on service and to widows and families of those killed on service.

16. All officers and volunteers who shall have received wounds or injuries when called out on active service as aforesaid and the widows and families of all such officers and volunteers who may have been killed or have died within twelve months after having been wounded of wounds received during such active service or have died within twelve months from illness directly traceable to fatigue or exposure incident to such active service shall be entitled to such pensions or gratuities as shall be fixed by the Governor in Council provided that no pension or gratuity under this section shall exceed the sum of two hundred pounds (£200).

PART III.

Discipline.

As to discipline while not on active service.

17. With respect to the discipline of officers and volunteers while they are not on active service or undergoing drill exercise training or inspection together with or voluntarily doing any duty together with Her Majesty's regular forces or any part thereof the following provisions shall take effect:—

- (i) The Commanding Officer of a Volunteer Corps may subject to such appeal to the Governor as hereinafter mentioned discharge from the corps any volunteer and strike him out of the muster roll either for disobedience of orders by him while doing any duty with his corps or for neglect of duty or misconduct by him as a member of the corps or for other sufficient cause the existence and sufficiency of such causes respectively to be judged of by the Commanding Officer or in case of appeal by the Governor.
- (ii) The volunteer so discharged shall nevertheless be liable to deliver up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) all arms clothing and appointments being public property or property of his corps issued to him and pay all moneys due or becoming due by him under this Ordinance or under the rules of his corps either before or at the time or by reason of his discharge but any volunteer who feels aggrieved by such discharge may appeal to the Governor within a reasonable time after such discharge and the Governor may cancel or confirm such discharge or give such other directions with reference thereto as to him may seem just and proper and such determination shall be binding on all persons.
- (iii) If any such officer or volunteer as aforesaid while—
 - (a) on the line of march or on duty with the corps to which he belongs or any part thereof; or
 - (b) engaged in any exercise or drill with such corps or any part thereof; or
 - (c) wearing the clothing or accoutrements of such corps and going to or returning from any place of exercise drill or assembly of such corps or otherwise on duty disobeys any lawful order of any officer under whose command he then is or is guilty of misconduct the officer then in command of the corps or any superior officer under whose command the corps then is may order the offender if an officer into arrest and if

not an officer into the custody of any volunteer belonging to the corps provided that the offender be not kept in such arrest or custody longer than during the time of the corps or such portion thereof as aforesaid then remaining on march or duty or continuing engaged in any such exercise or drill as aforesaid or otherwise on duty and for the purposes of this provision any such officer or volunteer while going to or returning from any place of exercise drill or assembly of his corps shall be deemed to be on duty so long as he continues to wear the clothing or accoutrements of such corps.

- (iv) Every such arrest shall be forthwith reported to the commanding officer of the corps or such other officer as may be prescribed.

18. (1)—With respect to the discipline of officers and volunteers when on active service or undergoing drill exercise training or inspection together with or voluntarily doing any duty together with Her Majesty's regular forces or any part thereof the following provisions shall take effect:—

As to discipline while on active service.

The provisions of the Imperial Act Forty-four and Forty-five Victoria chapter Fifty-eight and of any other Imperial Act for the time being amending the same shall so far as the same are applicable to officers and are consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance apply to all officers and volunteers with the following modifications only:—

44 & 45 Vict., c 58

- (a) That no officer or volunteer shall for any offence against such Act or Acts be subject to the penalty of death.
- (b) That no sentence of a Court Martial for the trial of an officer or volunteer shall be carried into execution unless confirmed by the Governor.

(2)—Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to limit or derogate from the power given by section one hundred and seventy-seven of the said Imperial Act to the General Officer commanding Her Majesty's forces with which the corps is serving of making such exceptions or modifications as in the same section are referred to.

PART IV,

Rules and Property of Corps.

19. (1)—The members of a Volunteer Corps may from time to time make rules for the management of the property finances and civil affairs of the corps and may alter or repeal any such rules but any such rules shall not have effect unless and until the commanding officer of the corps thinks fit to transmit the same to the Governor for his approval and such approval has been notified by the Governor to the commanding officer of the corps to be by him forthwith communicated to the corps whereupon the rules so approved shall be binding on all members of the corps and shall be published in the *Government Gazette*.

Power for Corps to make rules.

(2)—A copy of the rules in print or writing or partly in print and partly in writing certified under the hand of the commanding officer as a true copy of the rules whereof such approval has been notified as aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of the rules of the corps.

20. All moneys subscribed by or to or for the use of a Volunteer Corps and all effects belonging to any such corps or lawfully used by it not being the property of an individual member of the corps and the exclusive right to sue for and recover current subscrip-

Vesting of property of Corps in commanding officer ex officio.

tions arrears of subscriptions and other moneys due to the corps shall vest in the commanding officer of the corps for the time being and his successors in office with power for him and his successors to sue to make contracts and conveyances and to do all other lawful things relating thereto and any civil or criminal proceedings taken by virtue of this section by the commanding officer of a corps shall not be discontinued or abated by his death resignation or removal from office but may be carried on by and in the name of his successor in office.

Volunteers failing to give up arms, &c., when liable to do so to pay value thereof.

21. If any person fails to deliver up in good order (fair wear and tear excepted) any arms, clothing or appointments, which he is liable under this Ordinance, or the rules framed thereunder, to deliver up, he shall be liable to pay to the Commanding Officer of the Corps the value thereof, as such value shall be determined by a General Committee constituted in accordance with the rules framed under this Ordinance.

Recovery of subscriptions and fines.

22. If any person belonging or having belonged to a Volunteer Corps neglects or refuses to pay anything subscribed or undertaken to be paid by him towards any of the funds or expenses of such corps or due under the rules of such corps and actually payable by him or to pay any fine incurred by him under the rules of such corps such money or fine shall (without prejudice to any other remedy) be recoverable from him with costs at any time within eighteen months after the same becomes due and payable in manner hereinafter mentioned and when recovered shall be applied as part of the general fund of the corps.

PART V.

Miscellaneous.

Summary recovery of fine.

23. Any money or fine recoverable under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary way in the Police Magistrate's Court notwithstanding the amount may be in excess of the ordinary jurisdiction of that Court.

Appearance in Court of commanding officer.

24. The commanding officer of any Volunteer Corps may be represented in any Police Magistrate's Court or before any Magistrate or Magistrates by any member of the corps authorised by him in writing under his hand.

Capitation grant.

25. It shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer to pay to the commanding officer of every Volunteer Corps for the purposes of the corps such sum in each year as shall be fixed by the Governor in Council not exceeding two pounds (£2) for every efficient member holding a certificate of proficiency in accordance with any regulations passed under section eight who is certified by the commanding officer to have satisfied the requirements for receiving such certificate of proficiency within the year but such payment shall not be made except by the sanction of the Governor to whose satisfaction the state of efficiency of the Corps must be satisfied.

Oath of allegiance

26. Every member of a Volunteer Corps shall on his admission or as soon afterwards as may be take the oath set forth in the Schedule to this Ordinance to be administered by a Justice of the Peace or by an officer of his corps who has taken such oath.

Assaulting or resisting
member of corps.

27. Whoever assaults or resists or abets any person in assaulting or resisting any member of the corps in the discharge of his duty shall be punishable on conviction before a Magistrate with a fine not exceeding twenty pounds (£20) or with imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months or with both,

PROPOSED SALE of LAND in the EAST and WEST FALKLANDS.

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An Ordinance to provide for the establishment of a Volunteer Force.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the establishment of a Volunteer Force:

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Preliminary.

1.—This Ordinance may be cited as “The Volunteer Ordinance 1892.”

2.—In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires—

Interpretation

“Commanding Officer of a Corps” means the officer or other member of the Corps who holds the highest rank in such corps.

“Officer” means a person holding a commission as officer in a Volunteer Corps.

“Volunteer” means a member of a Volunteer Corps not being an officer.

“Appointments” includes accoutrements and equipments of every kind other than clothing.

PART I.

Organization of Volunteer Corps.

Governor may accept services of corps.

3. (1)—It shall be lawful for the Governor to accept the services of any persons desiring to be formed under this Ordinance into a Volunteer Corps and offering their services and on such acceptance being notified in the *Gazette* the proposed corps shall be deemed lawfully formed under this Ordinance.

(2)—Any such corps shall be designated by such style as the Governor shall order:

Officers commission to be issued by Governor.

4. (1)—The officers of a Volunteer Corps shall be commissioned by the Governor and such commission shall not be deemed vacated by the death or retirement from office of the Governor by whom the same was issued.

Rank of officers.

(2)—Officers of Volunteer Corps shall rank with Officers of Her Majesty's Regular and Militia Forces but as junior of their respective ranks.

Power of volunteer to quit corps on conditions.

5. (1)—Subject as hereinafter mentioned any volunteer may except when on active service quit his corps on complying with the following conditions:—

- (i) giving to the commanding officer of his corps fourteen days' notice in writing of his intention to quit the corps ;
- (ii) delivering up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) all arms clothing and appointments being public property or property of his corps issued to him ; and
- (iii) paying all money due or becoming due by him under the rules of his corps either before or at the time or by reason of his quitting it

and thereupon he shall be struck out of the muster roll of the corps by the commanding officer.

(2)—If any volunteer gives such notice and the commanding officer refuses to strike him out of the muster roll and the volunteer considers himself aggrieved thereby the volunteer may appeal to a Magistrate who shall hear and determine the appeal and may for the purposes thereof administer oaths and examine any person as a witness and if it appears to such Magistrate that the arms clothing and appointments issued to the volunteer being public property or property of his corps have been delivered up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) and that he has paid or is ready to pay sufficient compensation for any damages that such articles may have sustained and that all moneys due or becoming due by him under this Ordinance or under the rules of his corps either before or at the time of or by reason of his quitting it have been paid such Magistrate may order the commanding officer forthwith to strike such volunteer out of the muster roll of his corps and such determination shall be binding on all persons.

(3)—Nothing in this section contained shall authorise any volunteer to obtain his discharge except with the consent of the Governor before the expiration of any period of service for which he may have by writing engaged to serve.

6. Whenever any volunteers are on active service or are undergoing drill exercise or inspection or are voluntarily doing any duty together with Her Majesty's regular forces they and their officers shall subject to regulations under this Ordinance be under the command of the officers of Her Majesty's regular forces so nevertheless that the volunteers shall when the circumstances of the service admit be led by their own officers under such command.

Volunteers to be under command of officers of regular forces.

7. Inspections of every Volunteer Corps may be held by some officer of Her Majesty's regular forces nominated by the Governor at such times as the Governor may direct and such inspecting officer shall report to the Governor as to the efficiency or otherwise of the corps.

Annual inspection.

8. The Governor may by regulations declare what is requisite to entitle a volunteer to be deemed an efficient volunteer by defining for that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to be given by the volunteer and the course of instruction to be gone through by him and the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to be attained by him and his corps such proficiency to be judged of by the inspecting officer at the annual inspection of the corps or otherwise as prescribed.

Requisites of efficiency to be declared by Governor.

9. The Governor may disband or discontinue the services of any Volunteer Corps or any part thereof whenever it seems to him expedient to do so.

Disbanding of corps.

10. (1)—The Governor may at any time assemble a Court of Enquiry composed of members of the Volunteer Corps to enquire into any matter relative to any Volunteer Corps or to any officer or volunteer and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained on

Courts of Enquiry.

Governor to fix the rate and amount of such expenses.

Pensions to officers and volunteers disabled on service and to widows and families of those killed on service.

16. All officers and volunteers who shall have received wounds or injuries when called out on active service as aforesaid and the widows and families of all such officers and volunteers who may have been killed or have died within twelve months after having been wounded of wounds received during such active service or have died within twelve months from illness directly traceable to fatigue or exposure incident to such active service shall be entitled to such pensions or gratuities as shall be fixed by the Governor in Council provided that no pension or gratuity under this section shall exceed the sum of two hundred pounds (£200).

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Discipline.

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17. With respect to the discipline of officers and volunteers while they are not on active service or undergoing drill exercise training or inspection together with or voluntarily doing any duty together with Her Majesty's regular forces or any part thereof the following provisions shall take effect:—

- (i) The Commanding Officer of a Volunteer Corps may subject to such appeal to the Governor as hereinafter mentioned discharge from the corps any volunteer and strike him out of the muster roll either for disobedience of orders by him while doing any duty with his corps or for neglect of duty or misconduct by him as a member of the corps or for other sufficient cause the existence and sufficiency of such causes respectively to be judged of by the Commanding Officer or in case of appeal by the Governor.
- (ii) The volunteer so discharged shall nevertheless be liable to deliver up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) all arms clothing and appointments being public property or property of his corps issued to him and pay all moneys due or becoming due by him under this Ordinance or under the rules of his corps either before or at the time or by reason of his discharge but any volunteer who feels aggrieved by such discharge may appeal to the Governor within a reasonable time after such discharge and the Governor may cancel or confirm such discharge or give such other directions with reference thereto as to him may seem just and proper and such determination shall be binding on all persons.
- (iii) If any such officer or volunteer as aforesaid while—
 - (a) on the line of march or on duty with the corps to which he belongs or any part thereof; or
 - (b) engaged in any exercise or drill with such corps or any part thereof; or
 - (c) wearing the clothing or accoutrements of such corps and going to or returning from any place of exercise drill or assembly of such corps or otherwise on duty disobeys any lawful order of any officer under whose command he then is or is guilty of misconduct the officer then in command of the corps or any superior officer under whose command the corps then is may order the offender if an officer into arrest and if

not an officer into the custody of any volunteer belonging to the corps provided that the offender be not kept in such arrest or custody longer than during the time of the corps or such portion thereof as aforesaid then remaining on march or duty or continuing engaged in any such exercise or drill as aforesaid or otherwise on duty and for the purposes of this provision any such officer or volunteer while going to or returning from any place of exercise drill or assembly of his corps shall be deemed to be on duty so long as he continues to wear the clothing or accoutrements of such corps.

- (iv) Every such arrest shall be forthwith reported to the commanding officer of the corps or such other officer as may be prescribed.

18. (1)—With respect to the discipline of officers and volunteers when on active service or undergoing drill exercise training or inspection together with or voluntarily doing any duty together with Her Majesty's regular forces or any part thereof the following provisions shall take effect:—

As to discipline while on active service.

The provisions of the Imperial Act Forty-four and Forty-five Victoria chapter Fifty-eight and of any other Imperial Act for the time being amending the same shall so far as the same are applicable to officers and are consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance apply to all officers and volunteers with the following modifications only:—

44 & 45 Vict., c 58]

- (a) That no officer or volunteer shall for any offence against such Act or Acts be subject to the penalty of death.
- (b) That no sentence of a Court Martial for the trial of an officer or volunteer shall be carried into execution unless confirmed by the Governor.

(2)—Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to limit or derogate from the power given by section one hundred and seventy-seven of the said Imperial Act to the General Officer commanding Her Majesty's forces with which the corps is serving of making such exceptions or modifications as in the same section are referred to.

PART IV,

Rules and Property of Corps.

19. (1)—The members of a Volunteer Corps may from time to time make rules for the management of the property finances and civil affairs of the corps and may alter or repeal any such rules but any such rules shall not have effect unless and until the commanding officer of the corps thinks fit to transmit the same to the Governor for his approval and such approval has been notified by the Governor to the commanding officer of the corps to be by him forthwith communicated to the corps whereupon the rules so approved shall be binding on all members of the corps and shall be published in the *Government Gazette*.

Power for Corps to make rules.

(2)—A copy of the rules in print or writing or partly in print and partly in writing certified under the hand of the commanding officer as a true copy of the rules whereof such approval has been notified as aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of the rules of the corps.

20. All moneys subscribed by or to or for the use of a Volunteer Corps and all effects belonging to any such corps or lawfully used by it not being the property of an individual member of the corps and the exclusive right to sue for and recover current subscrip-

Vesting of property of Corps in commanding officer ex officio

tions arrears of subscriptions and other moneys due to the corps shall vest in the commanding officer of the corps for the time being and his successors in office with power for him and his successors to sue to make contracts and conveyances and to do all other lawful things relating thereto and any civil or criminal proceedings taken by virtue of this section by the commanding officer of a corps shall not be discontinued or abated by his death resignation or removal from office but may be carried on by and in the name of his successor in office.

Volunteers failing to give up arms, &c., when liable to do so to pay value thereof.

21. If any person fails to deliver up in good order (fair wear and tear excepted) any arms, clothing or appointments, which he is liable under this Ordinance, or the rules framed thereunder, to deliver up, he shall be liable to pay to the Commanding Officer of the Corps the value thereof, as such value shall be determined by a General Committee constituted in accordance with the rules framed under this Ordinance.

Recovery of subscriptions and fines.

22. If any person belonging or having belonged to a Volunteer Corps neglects or refuses to pay anything subscribed or undertaken to be paid by him towards any of the funds or expenses of such corps or due under the rules of such corps and actually payable by him or to pay any fine incurred by him under the rules of such corps such money or fine shall (without prejudice to any other remedy) be recoverable from him with costs at any time within eighteen months after the same becomes due and payable in manner hereinafter mentioned and when recovered shall be applied as part of the general fund of the corps.

PART V.

Miscellaneous.

Summary recovery of fine.

23. Any money or fine recoverable under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary way in the Police Magistrate's Court notwithstanding the amount may be in excess of the ordinary jurisdiction of that Court.

Appearance in Court of commanding officer

24. The commanding officer of any Volunteer Corps may be represented in any Police Magistrate's Court or before any Magistrate or Magistrates by any member of the corps authorised by him in writing under his hand.

Capitation grant.

25. It shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer to pay to the commanding officer of every Volunteer Corps for the purposes of the corps such sum in each year as shall be fixed by the Governor in Council not exceeding two pounds (£2) for every efficient member holding a certificate of proficiency in accordance with any regulations passed under section eight who is certified by the commanding officer to have satisfied the requirements for receiving such certificate of proficiency within the year but such payment shall not be made except by the sanction of the Governor to whose satisfaction the state of efficiency of the Corps must be certified.

Oath of allegiance

26. Every member of a Volunteer Corps shall on his admission or as soon afterwards as may be take the oath set forth in the Schedule to this Ordinance to be administered by a Justice of the Peace or by an officer of his corps who has taken such oath.

such enquiry and if required to report on the same for his information.

(2)—The commanding officer of a Volunteer Corps may at any time assemble a Court of Enquiry composed either of officers and volunteers belonging to the corps or of such officers or of such volunteers to enquire into any matter relative to the corps or any volunteer not being an officer and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained on such enquiry and if required to report on the same for the information and assistance of the commanding officer.

11. The Governor may make regulations respecting anything in this Ordinance directed or authorised to be done or provided by regulation and also such regulations as may seem fit (not being inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Ordinance) respecting :—

Power of Governor to make regulations for government of Volunteer Force.

- (a) The appointment promotion and rank of officers.
- (b) The assembling and proceedings of Courts of Enquiry.
- (c) Generally the execution of this Ordinance and the general government and discipline of the Volunteer Force.

PART II.

Active Service.

12. (1)—In case of great national emergency or in case of actual or apprehended invasion of or attack on the Colony the Governor may call out any Volunteer Corps for active service.

Governor may call out Volunteers for active service in case of national emergency, invasion, &c.

(2)—Every officer and volunteer belonging to every corps so called out shall be bound to assemble at such place and perform such service as may be directed by the Governor.

(3)—Every such officer and volunteer from the time of his corps being so called out shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be deemed on active service. If any such officer or volunteer not incapacitated by infirmity for service refuses or neglects so to assemble he shall be deemed a deserter.

(4)—The period of such service shall continue so long as the Governor shall consider necessary and shall end only by order of the Governor.

(5)—Nothing in this Ordinance shall render any officer or volunteer liable to serve or proceed on duty without his consent beyond the limits of the Colony.

13. All persons enrolled in any Volunteer Corps when called out on active service by the Governor shall be entitled to pay and allowances in such manner and after such rates and conditions and to be quartered or billeted in like manner in every respect and under and subject to the same regulations as Her Majesty's other forces as far as the same shall by the Governor be deemed applicable to the Volunteer Corps.

Volunteers when called out to be entitled to pay and quarters.

14. All persons enrolled and who shall when called out on such active service as aforesaid leave families unable to support themselves shall during the period of their absence on active service be entitled to relief for their wives and families and it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix the amount of such relief.

Relief to families of Volunteers called out on service.

15. Whenever any person enrolled as aforesaid shall be called out on active service as aforesaid away from his place of residence he shall be entitled to receive if willing to do so his travelling expenses from and to such residence and it shall be lawful for the

When travelling expenses are payable to Volunteers.

Assaulting or resisting
member of corps.

27. Whoever assaults or resists or abets any person in assaulting or resisting any member of the corps in the discharge of his duty shall be punishable on conviction before a Magistrate with a fine not exceeding twenty pounds (£20) or with imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months or with both,

At a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held at Government House, on Thursday, the 27th day of April, 1893, at 11 a.m.

The minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency referred to the measures on the Orders of the Day, all of which, with the exception of the Volunteer Ordinance and the Ordinance for incorporating the Trustees of Christ Church, Stanley, Falkland Islands, as a Body Corporate, had already been put before the Council and did not call for any special observation.

The principal object of the Volunteer Ordinance was to provide for the organisation of a Volunteer Force and to legalise a capitation grant.

The reasons for introducing an Ordinance for incorporating the Trustees of Christ Church as a Body Corporate will be explained by the Colonial Secretary when the Ordinance comes on for reading. His Excellency added that it would seem but discourteous if he did not express his pleasure in meeting the Members of the Council for the first time, and he felt a conviction that he would receive the loyal support of the Council so as to enable him to give effect to the Secretary of State's instructions in the matter of the Land Question and such other measures as might be brought before them to advance the welfare of the Colony.

His Excellency then laid on the table a despatch, No. 16, of 31st January, 1893, giving the Secretary of State's views in detail on the Land Question. The Honourable J. J. Felton thanked His Excellency on behalf of the Honourable A. E. Baillon and himself, for his kind remarks, and assured His Excellency that he would receive their loyal support in every way. If differences of opinion should exist they would, the Honourable Member added, arise as a purely business matter.

On the Council resolving itself into Committee the Honourable the Colonial Secretary suggested that the consideration of the Ordinance to provide for the better protection of property in Stanley against injury from the trespassing of animals within the town should remain in abeyance until the fencing round the town was completed, as it would be impossible at the present time to fix a date on which the Bill should come into operation.

His Excellency was of opinion that the consideration of the Bill should be proceeded with as it could be brought into operation by proclamation at any time.

The Honourable J. J. Felton & A. E. Baillon asked that the Bill might be allowed to remain in Committee stage, as it could be brought up again before next Spring, by which time the fence would be completed, and the towns people would have brought in their animals from the Camp for pasturage on the Commonage. This was agreed to.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the introduction and First reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Local Taxation Ordinance 1892."

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read by title.

On a motion duly made and carried the Standing Orders were suspended with a view to the Bill going through its various stages.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer in moving the Second reading explained that the Bill was introduced in accordance with instructions received from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State. The Bill went through its second and third readings and was passed.

His Excellency explained that the introduction of an Ordinance to repeal Ordinance No. 8 of 1892, and to provide for the Service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1892, was necessitated by the amendments made in the Estimates for 1893, in accordance with instructions contained in the Secretary of State's despatches No. 3 & 4 of 4th January, 1893, which were read, and that, as in making the amendments, it was found that the totals differed from those in the Schedule of Ordinance No. 8 of 1892, it was considered more convenient to repeal that Ordinance and introduce the present one.

During the explanation by the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer of the various amendments in the Estimates the Honourable A. E. Baillon called attention to the fact that the addition to the Mail Subsidy for San Carlos Mail had not been sanctioned. The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer explained that the vote

"Mail Schooner" was taken as the "Hadassah" was then running, and that consequently no item providing for a subsidy for a local Mail service was ever before the Council. It was now proposed to eliminate the vote "Mail Schooner," and to insert an amount in lieu of that item.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer having further explained the differences in the Estimates as amended moved the introduction and first reading of a Bill entitled—"An Ordinance to repeal Ordinance No. 8 of 1892, and to provide for the service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1893." The Hon. J. J. Felton seconded the motion, and the Bill was read a third time.

On motion duly made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill went through its various stages and was passed.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the introduction and first reading of a Bill entitled—"An Ordinance to make further provision for the service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1892." The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read by Title.

On motion duly made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended in order that the Bill might be proceeded with.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the second reading and consideration in Committee. The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded, and the motion was carried.

The Council then resolved itself into Committee.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer explained in detail the reasons for the various excesses.

The Honourable J. J. Felton observed that the expenditure on Pilotage exceeded that of the revenue, and remarked on the unsatisfactory state of the Pilot Service.

His Excellency said he thought it would be better to license pilots, especially as the Government had not at present any pilot boat; and stated that any resolution of the Council moved with a view to rendering the pilot service more efficient would receive consideration.

After the Honourable J. J. Felton had related the system of licensing pilots which had been in force in previous years, the Honourable the Un-official Members expressed a hope that before any permanent arrangement as to Pilotage was made for 1894 His Excellency would consider whether it would not be better to return to the former system as provided by Ordinance No. 5 of 1871.

The Honourable the Un-official Members also expressed a hope that there would be no excess of expenditure on the £350 voted by the Council last year for the erection of a Custom and Bonded Warehouse and Drill Hall. His Excellency informed the Council of the cost up to the 15th April, and expressed the opinion that if a portion of the building were partitioned off as a Bonded Warehouse insufficient space would be left for the purposes of a Drill Hall. He added that the present Queen's Warehouse met the requirements of the Colony.

The Council having resumed its sitting the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the third reading and passing of the Bill, the Honourable A. E. Baillon seconded and the Bill was read a third time and passed.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the introduction and first reading of an Ordinance for "Incorporating the Trustees of Christ Church, Stanley, as a Body Corporate." The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded and the Bill was read by Title.

On motion duly made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended, and on the second reading being moved the Honourable the Colonial Secretary explained that the Bill showed what had taken place under the Constitution of the Church, and gave the Trustees the usual powers as a Body Corporate.

The motion for the second reading being carried the Council resolved itself into Committee and the Bill was considered.

On the Council resuming its sitting the Honourable Member in charge moved the third reading, this was seconded by the Honourable A. E. Baillon, and the Bill was read a third time and passed.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the introduction and first reading of "An Ordinance to provide for the establishment of a Volunteer Force." The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read by Title.

The Council adjourned until the 28th instant.

At a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, held at Government House, on Monday, the 1st day of May, 1893, at 11 a.m.

Present: His Excellency George Melville, Esq., C.M.G., Administrator,

The minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency observed that according to adjournment the Council should have met on the 28th of April, but had been postponed till the 1st of May, as the Admiral of the Pacific Station had visited the Port and had desired to see His Excellency on business matters.

In the absence of the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer the Colonial Secretary took charge of the Bill to provide for the establishment of a Volunteer Force. The Honourable Member having explained that the Bill had been framed on the basis of the Volunteer Ordinance in force in the Straits Settlements, and had been brought forward, with the approval of, and as amended by the Right Honourable the Secretary of State, moved the introduction and first reading of the Bill. The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Bill was read by title.

On a motion duly made and carried the Standing Orders were suspended with a view to the consideration of the Bill being proceeded with.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the Second reading, the Hon. J. J. Felton seconded and the Bill was read a Second time.

The Council then went into Committee.

The Honourable J. J. Felton questioned the need of legislating for the provisions set forth in the Draft Bill and asked if it was considered that the feeling displayed was such as to prove the true wish of the people to join the movement. So far he considered legislation on the lines before the Council was premature, but thought that perhaps it would be necessary to legislate for the enrolment of Volunteers and for the proper care of the arms, accoutrements, &c., which had been supplied by the Imperial Government. The Honourable Member asked for information as to the minimum number of efficient men that would be required to entitle the Corps to be deemed in a state of efficiency and the extent to which the Colony would be liable by the expense that would be entailed by way of capitation grants.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon expressed a doubt as to the necessity of the movement, as he was of the opinion that the security of the Colony would be better conserved by its defenceless position. The Honourable Member added that last year he had opposed the vote for a Drill Instructor, and felt that an extra expense would be unnecessarily incurred under the proposed Bill if it were passed.

His Excellency said that the Bill was a Government measure, but that he had not received definite instructions from the Secretary of State to pass it. It would however be as well to go through the clauses of the Draft Bill and, if necessary, to leave it in Committee stage that a report might be made to the Secretary of State on any views that might be expressed in opposition to it. His Excellency added that it would be a pity that the movement having gone so far, and having regard to the liberal way in which the Imperial Government had assisted it, that it should be now discouraged. Regulations would be framed, His Excellency further added declaring what would be required by a volunteer to earn the capitation grant, but the Colony would not render itself liable to any extent unless the Corps was passed as being in an efficient state. A report, showing the attendance at drills, &c., would be called for and submitted to the Council.

After some questions had been put to the Drill Instructor, who was summoned to give information as to the strength, arrangements for the armoury, opportunities of inspecting arms, and as to the number of parades, and had been replied to, the Bill was left in Committee stage.

Before adjourning to the Council His Excellency stated that, owing to neglect, extra expenditure would probably have to be incurred to prevent the Government House garden from getting beyond reclamation. The Council agreed with His Excellency and unanimously approved of the vote being exceeded under the circumstances explained.

His Excellency the Administrator in directing the publication for general information of the following Resolutions dealing with the conditions under which any land to be reserved for sale will be exposed to public auction, directs also that the following extracts from a Despatch of the Right Honourable the Secretary of State dated 12th March, 1892, be now made public, so that the inhabitants of the Colony generally may be informed as to why there is no land available for leasing to applicants for grazing leases.

Downing Street,
12th March, 1892.

Falkland Islands,
No. 25.

Sir,

With reference to previous correspondence respecting the rights of the Government of the Falkland Islands in relation to certain lessees and purchasers of Crown Lands in that Colony, I have the honour to inform you that in view of the claims put forward by the lessees and the possibility of the Colonial Government being involved in litigation, I have consulted the Law Officers of the Crown upon the rights of the Colonial Government in respect of the Crown Lands, and I am advised that, if a survey should prove that the quantity of land occupied by any lessee and comprised within the boundaries defined in his lease exceeds the quantity which was stated in the lease and upon which the rent reserved by the lease was computed at the rate prescribed by the Ordinance under which the lease was granted, the Colonial Government is not legally or equitably entitled to have the lease rectified either by correcting the statement of the acreage of the land leased in accordance with the survey and increasing the rent in proportion to the increased acreage or by altering the boundaries of the land leased so as to include only the quantity of land stated in the lease.

2. I am further advised that upon the expiration of a lease the Colonial Government is not legally or equitably entitled in granting a new lease to the former lessee under Section 2 of Ordinance 9 of 1882 to comprise in the new lease so much only of the land comprised within the boundaries defined in the old lease as shall be ascertained by survey to contain the number of acres specified in the old lease and to lease to any other person or persons the surplus of such land-

or to comprise in the new lease the whole of such land and to reserve the rent at the rate of £20 for every six thousand acres of the actual quantity of such land as ascertained by survey.

3. Having regard to this opinion I am * * * to instruct you to grant to the holders of the expired leases new leases of such of the lands comprised in the expired leases as the Governor in Executive Council shall not think it expedient to sell, or reserve for public uses, at the rate of £20 for every six thousand acres of the quantities stated in the expired leases without any stipulations for increase or diminution of rent in the event of such quantities proving on survey to be greater or less than the actual quantities of land comprised within the boundaries stated in the leases and defined in the official chart.

4. The effect of this will be that there will be no land available for leasing to the applicants for grazing leases, but it is possible that some of them may be willing to purchase land, and you should consider with your Executive Council and report to me whether it is expedient that any portions of the land comprised in any of the expired leases should be put up for sale under Sec. 2 of Ordinance 9 of 1882, and you should reserve out of the new lease any land which you think it expedient to sell pending the decision of the Secretary of State.

5. I am also advised that in the case of a lease in which the boundaries were not completely defined but were stated as extending for a specified distance from a given point, if it appeared that the lessee had occupied no more land than according to the practice and interpretation at the time of the granting of the lease he was entitled to occupy, the Colonial Government would not be legally or equitably entitled (a) to resume possession of any land occupied by the lessee beyond the boundaries stated in the lease as ascertained by survey, or (b) to recover back rent for the use and occupation of such land.

* * * * *

8. You will have the goodness to inform the Memorialists, whose petition accompanied your despatch No. 118 of 19th August last that, having regard to the advice which I have received from the Law Officers of the Crown as to the legal rights and powers of the Colonial Government, I am unable to comply with their petition.

In these circumstances it is obviously inexpedient that the Colony should incur the expense of a general survey and it will depend upon your reply to paragraphs 3 and 5 of this despatch whether there will be any necessity for a surveyor to proceed to the Colony for the purpose of making particular surveys.

Resolutions referred to above.

Whereas the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies by a Despatch No. 25, of the 12th of March, 1892, issued an instruction to the effect that there was no land available in the Falkland Islands for the purpose of leasing, and by further instructions contained in Despatch No. 16 of the 31st January, 1893, directed certain steps to be taken for the purpose of ascertaining the probable demand for the purchase of land by the inhabitants of the Colony; and

Whereas applications have been received from certain inhabitants of the Colony for the purchase of land; and

Whereas it is now deemed expedient to carry out the several

instructions of the Secretary of State as set forth in His Lordship's Despatch of last-mentioned date ;

Be it resolved that the following conditions be published for the information of intending purchasers as the conditions under which any land to be reserved for sale will be exposed to public auction :

- I.—That the latest date up to which applications for the purchase of reserved land by intending purchasers shall be received by the Government shall be the 31st July, 1893 ;
- II.—That all land reserved shall be exposed to public auction at an upset price of four shillings per acre ;
- III.—That the purchasers shall be allowed ten years to complete the purchase of the land bought by equal yearly payments ;
- IV.—That the first instalment of the purchase money shall be paid by the purchaser immediately after the sale to him, and interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per centum per annum shall be payable half yearly on the unpaid balance of the purchase money.
- V.—That no title shall issue to the purchaser until the last instalment of the purchase money shall have been paid ;
- VI.—That any payments to be claimed by the outgoing lessee for improvements shall be payable by the purchaser on valuation at date of entry, or at some later date by special agreement with the outgoing lessee, approved of by the Government ;
- VII.—That before any stock shall be placed by the purchaser on the lands so purchased, a suitable dwelling-house shall be erected ; proper arrangements for the dipping of sheep provided ; and the lands shall be completely fenced in by a proper sheep-proof fence, the cost to be borne equally by the purchaser and the lessee of the surrounding land ;
- VIII.—That any alienation of the lands purchased before the purchaser shall have paid up all instalments of the purchase-money due under the said purchase shall render the purchase null and void, and the lands so alienated shall revert to and become the property of the Crown ; provided always that on the death of any purchaser before the completion of the purchase and the issue of the title to him shall have been made, the Governor in Council shall in the event of the heirs of the purchaser declining to fulfil the contract for purchase direct a sale of the said lands to be made by public auction and allow compensation to the heirs of the deceased for any improvements on the land so directed to be sold. Provided, however, that any purchase made under the foregoing proviso shall not entitle the purchaser to any extension of the period of purchase over and above the original period of purchase.

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Minutes of Proceedings at a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held at Government House on Monday, the 12th day of June, 1893.

The minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency, in referring to the Orders of the Day, observed that the Pound Ordinance would remain in Committee in accordance with the decision of the Council expressed at a meeting held on the 27th day of April, 1893.

With regard to the next item of business before the Council, His Excellency reminded the Council of what had passed at the last meeting in connection with the Volunteer Ordinance, but after the correspondence that had subsequently taken place, in which the origin and history which led to the introduction of the Bill was expressed, said that the consideration of the Bill would now be proceeded with.

On a motion by the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, the Council resumed its sitting, and the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the third reading and passing of the Bill. The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Bill was read a third time and passed.

His Excellency then laid before the Council Resolutions showing the conditions under which it was proposed that intending purchasers should purchase land, the need for the drafting of which was shown in a preamble to the Resolutions which had been drawn up in Executive Council for submission to the Legislative Council before being published, and for the information of the several applicants who had asked for details as to such conditions.

His Excellency read through the Resolutions touching on certain clauses which would require especial attention, remarking that there might be some difficulty as to the question of fencing.

The Hon. J. J. Felton asked that the position of the lessee might be considered before that of the purchaser. So long as two years ago Governor Goldsworthy had cautioned lessees not to proceed any further with fencing. Lessees were now called upon to surrender land, and as perhaps they may have to surrender more than they have already offered the Hon. Member asked to be informed whether any more land would be required. The Hon. Member dwelt on the hardship of having to pay for fencing again simply because a needy farmer was introduced to land adjoining that of the leaseholder. He mentioned the difficulty, trouble and expense experienced in keeping sheep clean, and the risk of the welfare of the Colony being jeopardised by the introduction of dirty sheep. All previous records, the Hon. Member continued, of small holdings had practically proved a failure; and if the Government was going to try it again it would be only an experiment and the Government ought to protect the leaseholder on whom, together with other conditions, a condition as to stocking to a certain amount within a given time had been imposed.

His Excellency replied that applicants for land must be first informed of the conditions of their liabilities, and on which an answer to the Hon. Member's question much depended; but that sufficient land had in his opinion been already offered to meet the present demand of applicants. The Government could therefore safely inform the leaseholders who had come forward and met the Government half-way that no further land would be required from them.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary then moved the clauses of the Resolutions *seriatim*.

On Clause 1, the Hon. A. E. Baillon asked if the conditions now before the Council would be embodied in an Ordinance.

His Excellency replied that the former land laws would probably be repealed and an Ordinance, in parts, introduced containing the conditions under discussion; if the former Ordinances were not repealed an Ordinance would be introduced embodying the conditions.

The Hon. J. J. Felton asked if the sales would take place under the conditions as they stood.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary explained the action that had been taken and which had led to the framing of the Resolutions. He did not altogether agree with the terms of the conditions. It was proposed, however, that the sale of land should take place under these conditions, and if an Ordinance were subsequently introduced they would be embodied in it.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary then moved that Clause 1 should remain part of the Resolution. The Hon. J. J. Felton seconded and the motion was carried.

Clause 2 on being moved by the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, and seconded by the Hon. A. E. Baillon was carried.

On Clause 3 being read, the Hon. the Col. Sec. remarked that the words "or longer" did not meet with his approval, it was not in the original draft as the Secretary of State had stated that the terms of sale should follow the precedent set in the case of sales to the Falkland Islands Company and others under Ordinance 9 of 1890 which only allowed ten years. If the time were prolonged some trouble would be caused to Government Officials, and but little assistance would be given to the purchaser as it would delay the issue of a title. He thought that if the time were extended the interest of two-and-a-half per centum per annum would be too small. He, however, did not object to the clause as it stood, as the decision of the Secretary of State would be required before it could be acted upon.

The Hons. J. J. Felton and A. E. Baillon quite agreed that ten years was ample time within which all instalments should be paid up, and thought the interest too low if time were extended.

The Hon. the Col. Treasurer said he was in favour of an extension of time, but it would not prevent a man from paying up before the 10 years if he wished to do so as to obtain his title. He thought two-and-a-half per centum per annum was a fair rate taking the present price of consols as the Government would receive a larger amount than hitherto per acre as the price would be fixed on a surveyed and accurate acre.

His Excellency thought it would be well to keep the words as they stood but asked that the sense of the Council as to the limit of time might be recorded, if necessary, in an amendment.

The Honourable J. J. Felton then moved that the words "or longer should the Secretary of State sanction it" be removed from the Clause, the Honourable A. E. Baillon seconded.

The Council then divided.

The amendment was therefore carried and read as follows:—

3.—"The purchaser shall be allowed ten years to complete the purchase of the land bought by equal yearly instalments."

His Excellency stated that in forwarding the Resolutions he would inform the Secretary of State of the debate that had taken place on the Clause.

Clause 4 on being moved by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton was carried.

Clause 5 on being moved by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Honourable A. E. Baillon was carried.

Clause 6 on being moved by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton was carried.

Clause 7. Referring to what had already fallen from the Honourable J. J. Felton, His Excellency was aware of the difficulty experienced in framing this clause, and perhaps it would be necessary to refer the matter again to the Secretary of State before a decision was arrived at. His Excellency explained that, as to the cost, he had added the words "the cost thereof to be met equally by the purchaser and the lessee of the surrounding land" but that the question as to what

would be a fair way of settling the matter should be fully discussed. In reply to the Honourable J. J. Felton's question as to what liability would be incurred if the cost of fencing was not paid up and as to the kind of fence to be erected, His Excellency said that it would not be practicable to enter into details in these Resolutions, but that they would probably be met either by the provisions in a new Ordinance or by regulations passed under such an Ordinance.

The Honourable J. J. Felton repeated that it was hard on leaseholders who had already been obliged to fence in to pay up for another, and having given up a sea boundary to be now obliged to pay for the half of the cost of a divisional fence. A leaseholder, moreover, might have two or more freeholders round him and it would fall hard upon the leaseholders to manage the cost within the time defined; he quite recognised the difficulty on the other hand to the incoming tenant to have to pay for the whole cost.

It was explained to the Honourable member that compensation to the leaseholders for existing fences would be compulsory on the new tenant, and perhaps if the clause were amended so as to leave it optional to the leaseholders to call upon the incoming tenant to fence it would meet the views of both parties.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon thought that Clause 7 should run concurrent with Clause 8, so as to ensure the risk of the leaseholder against any infection from dirty sheep.

After further discussion His Excellency thought that it would be better to defer the discussion on this clause to another meeting by which time the clause might be amended and re-submitted for the consideration of the Council.

This was agreed to.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer moved the following Resolutions :—

“Resolved that a vote of £6 2 9 be taken to settle claims received for compensation in respect of parcels lost in the wreck of the steamer “Neko.”

The Honourable A. E. Baillon seconded and the motion was carried.

“Resolved that a free grant of certain materials be given to Dean Brandon towards the erection of a lean-to to the South side of the Government building known as the Par-sonage.”

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded and the motion was carried.

“Resolved that a vote be taken for a contribution of £15 12 towards the maintenance of an idiot child in an English asylum.”

After consideration an amendment to the Resolution was made, and the Resolution stood as follows :—

“Resolved that a vote be taken for the contribution of £6 18 0 and that it be placed on the Estimates for 1894, towards the maintenance of an idiot child in an English Asylum for the period 1st January to 10th June, 1894, when the Government guarantee of 3 years would terminate.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon seconded and the Resolution as amended was carried.

“Resolved that a vote of £7 9 be taken towards the erection of a partition fence between Church and Government land on the South side of Christ Church.”

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded and the motion was carried.

The Council adjourned until Wednesday the 14th instant.

PROPOSED SALE OF LAND IN THE EAST AND WEST FALKLANDS.

With reference to the Resolutions published in the Supplementary Gazette of the 17th June, 1893, setting forth the conditions under which the sale of land in the Falkland Islands will take place, His Excellency the Administrator directs it to be notified, for general information, that the following is a list up to date of certain portions of lands, with an aggregate of 97000 acres, which, having been surrendered by the present leaseholders in terms of paragraph 10 of the Secretary of State's Despatch, No. 16, of 31st January, may, after survey of the acreage contained therein, be offered for sale in whole or in part as the Government may consider advisable, subject to the terms of the Resolutions above referred to.

EAST FALKLAND ISLAND.

1. Sections Nos. 58, 59, 60, 61 & 62, situated in the East Falkland Islands, at present in the occupation of Captain R. C. Packe.
2. Section No. 53, known as Salt Lagoon, at present in the occupation of W. K. Cameron, Esq.
3. Two sections known as Whittington's Rincon, at present in the occupation of J. Greenshields, Esq.
4. Sections 35 & 38, at present in the occupation of the Falkland Islands Company.
6. A section of land, being part of Station known as Cape Frehel, at present in the occupation of Mr. A. M. Pitaluga.

Minutes of Proceedings at a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held at Government House, on the 14th day of June, 1893.

The minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

Before resuming the consideration of Clause 7 of the Resolutions relating to the proposed sale of land, His Excellency said that he desired it recorded on the minutes that he had read the Secretary of State's despatch No. 25 of March 12th, 1892, which it was his intention to publish as a preliminary notice to the Resolutions as, among other things, it would clearly show to the inhabitants of the Colony that the Government had no land available for leasing in these Islands. His Excellency added that had such a notification been made directly after the receipt of this despatch in April, 1892, he was of opinion that it would have saved a good deal of misunderstanding and have limited the applications which had been received to those for purchase and not for lease and the applicants would no doubt then have been only genuine small sheep farmers.

The Hon. J. J. Felton expressed the hope that if His Excellency was satisfied with the offers made by the lessees, who, in their desire to comply with the request of the Secretary of State, had surrendered portions of their holdings, and that the same were sufficient to meet the probable demand that they might be notified to that effect and that their leases might be renewed accordingly; as it was important that they should be relieved from the uncertainty which for the last two years they had been subjected to and as it had seriously retarded a lot of necessary work.

The Hon. A. E. Baillon also asked His Excellency if he were not now in a position, in accordance with the instructions laid down in the despatch which had just been read, to renew the leases at once as enquiries were constantly being made of him on the subject. The Hon. member referred to the position of the long-suffering leaseholders who had borne the heat and burden of the day and thought they ought to be considered now that the position of the new comers in the shape of the small freeholders was under discussion.

His Excellency replied that in sending the Resolutions home, as they may be passed by the Council, he would recommend to the Secretary of State that the leases should be renewed to those who had given up portions of their leaseholds in accordance with paragraph 10 of the Secretary of State's despatch of January 31st. His Excellency reminded the Hon. member that the leaseholders had not been made aware of the terms of the despatch of March 12th, 1892, as to there being no land available for leasing until December 21st of the same year and then only the Falkland Islands Company and Mr. Smith, the latter presumably as the representative of the memorialists whose petition accompanied Sir R. Goldsworthy's despatch of August 19th, 1891, a copy of which petition by the way, or of the reply to it, His Excellency, had been unable to find. Meanwhile he would point out that the large reservations proposed by Sir R. Goldsworthy had been notified to the leaseholders.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer mentioned that certain leaseholders had refused to accept the renewal of their leases after reservations had been proposed, and, that being so, they had no cause of complaint as to their non-renewal.

The Hon. J. J. Felton remarked that he was well aware of the fact that leaseholders were naturally disinclined to accept the renewal of their leases under the state of matters as existed when the first reservations were being made.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary explained that unquestionably leaseholders had refused to accept renewals of their leases as offered to them by Governor Goldsworthy and rightly so, when, by a fell scoop, the leaseholder in many cases was to be deprived of his homestead and plant and left with an unworkable station but that action was now being taken under the despatch of January 31st, 1893. By despatch of March 12th, 1892, the Governor was instructed that reservations for

sale should be made and that the leases of the remaining portions should be renewed. Certain portions, as directed by paragraph 10 of the Secretary of State's despatch of January 31st, with the concurrence of the leaseholders, were now being reserved for sale and it entirely rested with His Excellency to act upon the instructions laid down in despatch 25 of March 12th, 1892, and at once renew the leases of the remaining portions to the leaseholders if His Excellency considered a sufficiency of land had been given up.

The consideration of Resolution No. 7 was then resumed.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary remarked that the greatest difficulty met with at the last meeting was that of fencing under Clause 7. Suggestions had been made so as to protect the interest of the leaseholders against the risk of the freeholder introducing new flocks which might have scab, and he hoped that the amended Resolution he was now about to move would meet with general approval.

He then moved that Clauses 7 and 8 be deleted and that the following clause be substituted, namely :—

Clause 7. "That before any stock shall be placed by the purchaser on the lands so purchased, a suitable dwelling-house shall be erected, proper arrangements for dipping of sheep provided, and the lands shall be completely fenced in by a proper sheep-proof fence, the cost of the erection of such fence to be borne equally by the purchaser and the lessee of the surrounding land."

The Honourables J. J. Felton and A. E. Baillon having regard to the great object of preventing as far as possible the spread of scab, approved of the amended clause, as they were willing to give way to the cost of the fence being met equally by the purchaser and the lessee, if the fence were to be put up before stock was brought on to the land.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer said he preferred the former Clauses 7 and 8 as they were not so drastic as the amended one which would run too much into a man's capital at first. He thought that the views expressed as to the risk of infection had been somewhat exaggerated.

His Excellency in comparing the two Resolutions observed with reference to the remarks of the Hon. Member who had just spoken, that the words "providing for the cost of fencing being met equally by the leaseholder and the small freeholder" had been added by himself (His Excellency) and that he understood now that, on the guarantee given in the new clause, security so far would be given against the risk of the spread of disease from the sheep of small holders who might not have the proper arrangements for dipping; the leaseholders were willing to meet half the cost of the fencing of those portions of their leaseholds which they had given up to assist the Government in meeting a genuine demand for land. His Excellency also pointed out that whereas in the clause as first submitted three years might probably elapse before sheep could be put on the farms of intending purchasers they would be enabled by the clause now proposed to stock whenever fencing was completed and proper arrangements for sheep farming had been made. His Excellency was under the impression that the first arrangements a sheep farmer would make would naturally be to set up his plant for managing his farm before stocking. His Excellency concluded by saying that in dealing with this question it had been his duty to endeavour to settle it amicably, and to show fair play and justice all round.

On His Excellency asking to be favoured with the views of all members on the question under discussion, the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon stated that he was of the opinion that if small farmers wish to start on their own account, they ought to be encouraged, there should be a give and take between the leaseholder and the new tenant. It is imperative upon the Government, he considered, to give the head shepherds encouragement and their interests, as hard working men, should be fostered; they should not be over encumbered with the cost of fencing as they may not have the wherewithal to meet it, though they have the knowledge and experience of sheep farming. The money lying dormant in the Savings' Bank, if these men were to obtain freeholds, would, he considered, be properly utilised.

His Excellency stated that in the opinions expressed by the Colonial Surgeon he entirely agreed and he took it that every member of the Council did the same. His interpretation of the words "real demand for the purchase of land" in the 4th paragraph of the Secretary of State's Despatch of the 31st January, was a demand

for land by the class of men mentioned by the Colonial Surgeon—the head shepherds in these Islands—and to these men every help and encouragement should and would be given.

After some further discussion between the Honourable the Colonial Secretary and the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon as to the probable effect of the introduction of small holders,

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded the motion as amended.

The amendment was therefore carried.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary explained that the last Clause which now stood as Clause 8, would require, in order to secure compliance with Clause 3 as passed, the deletion of the words, “as under condition No. 3,” and with permission he would move the Clause accordingly.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon seconded and the motion was carried.

The Resolutions as passed were then ordered to be recorded on the Minutes.*

His Excellency laid before the Council certain papers relating to a promise made by Sir R. Goldsworthy that the son of the Treasury Clerk, William Coulson, who appears on the Estimates under “Governor” as Office-Keeper and Messenger, but who is also messenger to the Government Offices, should have an increase of salary. He explained that this young officer had been now two years in the service, and recommended that he should have a slight increase of salary which could be added to if he continued to perform his duties in a satisfactory manner.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved the following Resolution:—

“Resolved that a sum of ten shillings per mensem be voted as an increase in the salary of the Office-Keeper and Messenger.”

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded and the motion was carried.

His Excellency then referred to the estimated cost of putting in windows and doors and for flooring the new Customs Shed which, as it exceeded the funds in hand, would necessitate the work being postponed for the present.

The Council left it open to His Excellency to decide what would be the best way to turn this building to some account as also as to how the Stable at Government House should be best disposed of.

The Council was then adjourned *sine die*.

LETTERS PATENT passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, and providing for the Government thereof.

Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India: To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting.

Preamble.

WHEREAS, by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-third day of June 1843, We did make provision for the Government of Our Settlements in the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies:

and 28th April, 1876.

And whereas by certain other Letters Patent under the said Great Seal, bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-eighth day of April 1876, We did constitute the office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our said Settlements in the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, and did make further provision for the government of Our said Settlements:

And whereas We are minded to make further provision for the government of Our said Settlements in the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies:

Revokes Letters Patent of
23rd June 1843 and 28th
April 1876.

Now know ye that We do by these presents revoke and determine Our said Letters Patent of the Twenty-third day of June 1843 and the Twenty-eighth day of April 1876, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder; and We do by these Our Letters Patent declare Our will and pleasure as follows:—

Colony.

Office of Governor
constituted.

I. Our said Settlements in the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies shall, until We shall otherwise provide, be called the Colony of the Falkland Islands (herein-after called the Colony), and appointments to the said office shall be made by Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet.

Governor's powers and
authorities.

II. Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief (herein-after called the Governor) shall do and execute all things that belong to his said office, according to the tenour of these Our Letters Patent and of such Commission as may be issued to him under Our Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him under Our Sign Manual and Signet or by Our Order in Our Privy Council or by Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and according to such Laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the Colony.

III. Every person appointed to fill the office of Governor shall, with all due solemnity, before entering on any of the duties of his Office, cause the Commission appointing him to be Governor to be read and published in the presence of the chief Officers and other the principal inhabitants of our said Colony, which being done, he shall then and there take before them the Oath of Allegiance in the form provided by an Act passed in the Session holden in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second years of Our reign, intituled, "An Act to amend the Law relating to Promissory Oaths;" and likewise the usual Oath for the due execution of the office of Governor, and for the due and impartial administration of justice, which oaths the Judge for the time being of Our said Colony or in default of any Judge the Senior Magistrate present not being the Governor, shall and he is hereby required to administer.

Public Seal.

IV. The Governor shall keep and use the Public Seal of the Colony for sealing all things whatsoever that shall pass the said Seal.

Executive Council.

V. There shall be an Executive Council in and for the Colony, and the said Council shall consist of such persons as We shall direct by any Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, and all such persons shall hold their places in the said Council during Our pleasure.

Legislative Council.

VI. There shall be a Legislative Council in and for the Colony, and the said Council shall consist of the Governor and such persons, not being less than two at any time, as We shall direct by any Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, and all such persons shall hold their places in the said Council during Our pleasure.

VII. In pursuance of the powers vested in Us by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Session holden in the Fiftieth and Fifty-first years of Our reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to provide for the Government of Her Possessions acquired by

"settlement," We do hereby delegate to the persons who shall from time to time compose the said Legislative Council full power and authority, subject always to any conditions, provisoes, and limitations prescribed by any Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, to establish such Ordinances, not being repugnant to the Law of England, and to constitute such Courts and Officers, and to make such provisions and regulations for the proceedings in such Courts and for the administration of justice, as may be necessary for the peace, order, and good government of the Colony.

VIII. We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, full power and authority, and Our and their undoubted right, to disallow any such Ordinances, and to signify such disallowance through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State. Every such disallowance shall take effect from the time when the same shall be promulgated by the Governor in the Colony.

We do also reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, Our and their undoubted right, with the advice of Our or their Privy Council, from time to time to make all such Laws or Ordinances as may appear to Us or them necessary for the peace, order, and good government of the Colony.

IX. In the making of any Ordinances the Governor and the Legislative Council shall conform to and observe all rules, regulations, and directions in that behalf contained in any Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet.

X. The Governor, in Our name and on Our behalf, may make and execute, under the Public Seal, grants and dispositions of any lands within the Colony which may be lawfully granted or disposed of by Us : Provided that every such grant or disposition be made in conformity, either with some law in force in the Colony, or with some Instructions addressed to the Governor under Our Sign Manual and Signet or through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, or with some regulation in force in the Colony.

XI. The Governor may constitute and appoint all such Judges, Commissioners, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers and Ministers as may be lawfully constituted or appointed by Us, all of whom, unless otherwise provided by law, shall hold their offices during Our pleasure.

XII. The Governor may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, suspend from the exercise of his office any person holding any office within the Colony, whether appointed by virtue of any Commission or Warrant from Us or in Our name or by any other mode of appointment. Every such suspension shall continue and have effect only until Our pleasure therein shall be signified to the Governor. In proceeding to any such suspension, the Governor is strictly to observe the directions in that behalf given to him by any Instructions as aforesaid.

XIII. When any crime has been committed within the Colony, or for which the offender may be tried therein, the Governor may, as he shall see occasion, in Our name and on Our behalf, grant a pardon to any accomplice in such crime who shall give such information as shall lead to the conviction of the principal offender, or of any one of such offenders, if more than one ; and further, may grant to any offender convicted in any Court, or before any Judge or other Magistrate within the Colony, a pardon either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any remission of the sentence passed on such offender, or any respite of the execution of such sentence for such period as the Governor thinks fit ; and may remit any fines,

XV. And We do hereby require and command all Our Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, and all other the inhabitants of the Colony, to be obedient, aiding, and assisting unto the Governor and to such person or persons as may from time to time under the provisions of these Our Letters Patent administer the Government of the Colony.

XVI. In the construction of these Our Letters Patent, the term "the Governor," unless inconsistent with the context, shall include every person for the time being administering the Government of the Colony.

XVII. And We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, full power and authority from time to time to revoke, alter or amend these Our Letters Patent as to us or them shall seem fit.

XVIII. And We do direct and enjoin that these Our Letters Patent shall be read and proclaimed at such place or places within the Colony as the Governor may think fit.

Preamble.

Whereas it is expedient to make provision for the Service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1894.

Minutes of Proceedings at a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held at Government House, on the 4th day of September, 1893.

Present : His Excellency George Melville, Esq., C.M.G., Administrator.

Before proceeding with the business standing on the Orders of the Day, His Excellency referred to two matters upon which Resolutions had been passed by the Executive Council, and which at this meeting, being the first meeting since the events to which they relate had been made known here, His Excellency desired to bring before the Legislative Council for the acquiescence of honourable members, the one recorded, His Excellency said, the condolences on behalf of the Colony on the occasion of the loss of H. M. S. "Victoria," the other, of a different nature, conveyed congratulations to the Royal Family on the occasion of His Royal Highness the Duke of York's marriage to Her Serene Highness Princess Victoria Mary of Teck. After the reading of the Resolutions by His Excellency the unofficial members fully endorsed the terms in which they were couched, and, on the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourables J. J. Felton and A. E. Baillon, respectively, the Resolutions were unanimously carried.

On referring to the Orders of the Day His Excellency stated that in the Draft Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for 1894, which would be shortly laid before the Council, an item of £60 had been inserted under Head 7, as a prospective Estimate of Revenue to be derived from the rents of the Commonage, which would become leviable under the Bill now in Committee entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of property in Stanley against injury from the trespassing of animals within the town."

It had not been deemed necessary that this Bill should be passed before the Estimates were taken into consideration, as, until the provisions of the Bill had been put into operation for some time, it would be difficult to arrive at the amount that would be collected under it. The same sum as that estimated last

year had therefore been inserted. Now, however, that the Town Fence had been completed, His Excellency thought it would be well to obtain information, especially as to the charges to be levied under the Schedule to the Draft Ordinance, and for this object the papers, His Excellency added, will be circulated amongst the unofficial Members, so that the Bill may be proceeded with at the next meeting of the Council on the 21st instant.

After explanation by His Excellency that a vote of £6 was required as an increase of £1 per month, from the 1st July inclusive, to the wages of the Government House Gardener in lieu of a supply of peat, a motion was made for this vote by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, and, being seconded by the Honourable A. E. Baillon, was carried.

His Excellency stated that a vote of £22 11 7 as wages for an Assistant Gardener and Labourer at Government House, from the 16th August, was necessitated by the inconveniences arising from the former Labourer being also employed on the Public Works Department as Carter, which would be removed by dividing his duties and assigning to him those of an Assistant Gardener when he would be also available as horsekeeper. The motion for this vote being made by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, and seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton was carried.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer then moved for a vote of £100, being a refund to J. Luchtembourg of the amount paid for a Sealing Licence. After some information had been asked for by the Honourable J. J. Felton as to the disposal of the skins already taken, and replied to by His Excellency, who explained that the refund had been ordered by the Right Honourable the Secretary of State by Despatch No. 43 of the 23rd May, 1893, which was read to the Council, the Honourable J. J. Felton seconded the motion and it was carried.

The draft Estimates of Expenditure for 1894 were then laid before the Council. In going through the various items the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer explained the sums to be appropriated and pointed out where they differed from those voted for the present year.

Under Vote 8, Police, the Honourable J. J. Felton asked for the conditions under which the constables were employed, as during the past few years the increase of the department had caused an increased expenditure not only in wages but in transport and in the supply of peat, and stated that we now had the Volunteers to fall back upon in cases of emergency. Formerly, when a greater number of ships visited the Port there was but one constable, and this increase of constables would lead anyone to believe that there is also an increase of crime in the Colony, which was not the fact.

His Excellency said that the constables were engaged for a term of three years and most of them had only been recently engaged, but considered that the staff of six which was now up to its complement, was sufficient.

The Vote was agreed to.

Under Vote 15. The Honourable J. J. Felton considered that the item of £360 for the West Falklands Mail Subsidy was a large amount for a schooner that called in at three stations only, and that there was but little benefit extended to the San Carlos station, as the schooner only called in on her return voyage. The Honourable Member proposed that the mails for the North Camp should be run to Salvador and then be taken across by land to Douglas Station and Teal Inlet.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer drew the Honourable Member's attention to the fact that the schooner called twice at San Carlos, on her way out and on her return journey, and that if she only called in once on any occasion it was exceptional.

His Excellency, after being informed that the present contract had not been put up to tender, stated that when it expires tenders should be called for in the usual way for the performance of this service, which should be carried out on the principle of convenience being given to the greater number.

The Vote was agreed to.

Under Vote 17—Public Works—The Honourable J. J. Felton asked if there might not be some means of increasing the item “for maintenance and repair “of roads, &c.,” as the greater portion of the £250 now proposed to be voted would have to be expended on undoing certain bad work done by prison labour on a road in the town during the course of last year. The Honourable Member said that as these repairs are very necessary he would like to see a larger vote, if possible, without a burden by taxation being placed on the people. It would give employment to men from the camp during the winter months.

His Excellency informed the Honourable Member of the Secretary of State's instructions to economise under this Head of Expenditure and pointed out, as already explained by the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer, that the amount of £250 now proposed represented not only the wages of carting but the expenditure on the up-keep of carts and horses, previously charged against the Votes “Maintenance, and Repairs of Roads, Drains and Public Buildings,” and that these Votes had consequently been reduced by the sums of £50 and £100 respectively, so that there was no actual reduction on the Votes for Public Works. Any additional revenue for Public Works, His Excellency added, might fairly, and without being an undue burden, be obtained by increasing the Customs Duties on Spirits and Tobacco.

The Vote was agreed to.

The totals under the various heads were read and the Estimates as submitted were agreed to and passed.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved the introduction and first reading of a Bill entitled—“An Ordinance to make provision for the service of the “Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1894,” the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer seconded and the Bill was read by title.

The Standing Orders, on the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, were suspended, and the Bill went through its various stages and was passed.

The Council was then adjourned until the 21st September.

Regulations of the Falkland Islands Volunteer Corps.

1.—The Corps is serving under the Volunteer Ordinance of 1893, and the Members are consequently subject to the provisions of that Ordinance, and of any other Ordinance by which it has been or shall be amended, and to all regulations which have been or shall be issued under the authority of the Governor.

2.—The Corps shall consist of two classes—(1) Enrolled Members, consisting of efficient and non-efficient, and of (2) Honorary Members, the latter contributing to the funds of the Corps a sum not less than 10/- per annum, but not being enrolled for service.

3.—All subscriptions shall fall due on, and the necessary drills and musketry exercises shall be completed by, the 31st of March in each year.

4.—Any Officer, or Member who has been supplied with uniform, and who is returned as non-efficient in the annual return of the Corps, shall pay to the funds of the Corps a sum equal to the Capitation Grant which he failed to earn. The Commanding Officer may, with the advice of the Finance Committee, remit such payment in special cases.

5.—The Non-Commissioned Officers shall be appointed by the Commanding Officer after qualifying in proficiency.

6.—No person shall be admitted as a Member unless with the approval of the Commanding Officer, and on the proposal of two or more Members of the Corps.

7.—Each Member shall be responsible for the due preservation of all articles issued to him, which are the property of the Corps, fair wear and tear only excepted.

8.—The expression "property of the Corps" shall include all articles which have been purchased out of the funds of, presented to, or lent to, the Corps.

9.—A Committee shall be appointed yearly termed a Finance Committee, to aid the Commanding Officer in the management of the finances of the Corps, this Committee shall consist of two Officers, two Non-Commissioned Officers, two Privates or Gunners, with the Commanding Officer as President.

10.—The Commanding Officer shall cause an abstract of the accounts to be annually prepared for the information of every Member of the Corps.

11.—Honorary Members may, in accordance with regulations, wear the uniform of privates of the Corps, with such distinguishing marks on the sleeve as may be approved by the Commanding Officer. They are not to interfere in any way with the military duties of the Corps, but they may, when the Commanding Officer approves, attend "plain clothes" drill.

12.—Every Member is expected to provide himself with a copy of the rules of the Corps.

13.—The Commanding Officer shall fix the time and place for parades, drills and rifle practice.

14.—The Senior Officer in command shall have power, subject to the approval of the Commanding Officer, to inflict the following fines :—

No. 7 of 1893.

An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of property in Stanley against injury from the trespassing of animals within the town.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient for the better protection of the public interest, as also in the interests of the owners of private property within the town of Stanley, that that part of the land known as the Commonage should be fenced in, and that from and after the completion of the same the owners of horses, mules, cattle, &c., should be compelled to restrain the trespassing of such animals within the said town,

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Owners of animals to have licences granted before placing animals within the fenced-in Commonage.

1.—After the coming into operation of this Ordinance the owner of every animal mentioned in the Schedule hereto annexed shall, on payment of the sum to be charged as per said Schedule for such animal, be entitled to obtain a license to maintain such animal within the fenced-in land known as the Commonage lying to the south of the town of Stanley ; and the owner of any animal taking advantage of the said fenced-in land without having paid for such license shall render himself liable to a penalty not exceeding £2 (two pounds) for each offence, one half thereof to be paid to the informer.

Penalty for using fenced-in land without licence.

Animals found wandering in the town of Stanley liable to seizure or impounding.

2.—All animals included in the Schedule hereto found wandering or grazing within the town of Stanley after the coming into operation of this Ordinance, shall be liable to be seized and to be detained in the enclosure hereinafter called the Government Pound, and notice of such impounding with a description of the animal so impounded shall be placed upon the Notice Board within twenty-four hours.

Penalty and cost of maintaining animals in pound to be paid by owner before animal released.

3.—The owner of every animal so seized and detained shall before its release from the Pound pay to the Pound-keeper the sum of 5/- (five shillings) by way of penalty, together with the further sum of 1/- (one shilling) per diem for the cost of maintaining the animal whilst detained in the Pound, and every person, whether the owner of said animal or not, who shall in any way attempt to rescue any animal impounded or about to be impounded shall render himself liable to a fine not exceeding the sum of £5 (five pounds).

Penalty for attempting rescue of animal seized.

Animal seized and not claimed to be advertised for sale.

4.—If no owner shall claim any animal seized as above-mentioned within ten days after such animal shall have been impounded, the Pound-keeper shall, by public notice placed on the Gazette Board advertise such animal for sale, and the money to be derived from such sale, after payment of all expenses, shall be deposited in the Colonial Treasury, and unless claimed within three months by the owner or his representatives shall be appropriated for the purposes of local revenue.

Government Pound defined.

5.—An enclosure lying immediately to the south of the Gaol in Stanley, and situated within the grounds attached to the said Gaol shall be, and is hereby declared to be, the Government Pound ; but it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to substitute any other enclosure to be used for that purpose.

Governor in Council to have power to make rules, regulations, &c.

6.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such rules and regulations for giving due effect to all the provisions of this Ordinance as may seem necessary, and to appoint a Keeper of the Pound who shall for any breach of the duties allotted to him under this Ordinance or under such Rules and Regulations be liable to a fine not exceeding the sum of £5 (five pounds) for each offence.

Penalty for leaving gates open.

7. Any person or persons who shall wilfully, negligently or maliciously leave open any gate or gates on the fences leading to or from the Common, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding a sum of £10 (ten pounds).

How fines and penalties recoverable.

8.—All fines or penalties imposed by virtue of this Ordinance shall be sued for and recovered in the same way as penalties are sued for and recovered under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance No. 11 of 1853.

Date of Ordinance coming

9.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the first day of November, 1893, and shall be cited as "*the Pound Ordinance, 1893.*"

Rules and Regulations made in accordance with Clause 6 of "The Pound Ordinance, 1893."

1.—The licences required by Clause 1 of the Ordinance shall be issued under the signature of the Colonial Treasurer or Officer for the time being discharging the duties of that office.

2.—All applications for licences shall be made to the Principal Pound Keeper, to be hereinafter named, who shall enter in a book, to be kept by him for the purpose, full particulars as to the description and number of animals for which the licence is applied for, and also the dates of issue and expiry of such licence.

3.—Every person whose station lies beyond the six miles radius from Stanley, and every person employed on any such Station shall, on taking out an Annual Licence, be at liberty to vary and change from time to time, as he may deem expedient, the horse or horses belonging to him pasturing under such licence, provided that each time any animals are placed by him on the Common he gives to the Principal Pound Keeper notice as to the number and description of the same.

4.—The Chief Constable shall be the Principal Pound Keeper, and every Constable shall, for the purposes of the Pound Ordinance, be a Pound Keeper.

5.—Every Pound Keeper shall be entitled to receive for his own use one moiety of the penalty of 5/- to be recovered under Clause 3 of the Ordinance, for every animal legally seized by him and impounded, and the Principal Pound Keeper shall be entitled to retain the remaining moiety for his own use.

6.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall be responsible that the Pound is not used for any other purpose than for carrying out the provisions of the Ordinance.

7.—He shall be responsible for the keeping of the Pound in good condition, and the fences in repair, and shall submit any recommendations he may deem necessary for the carrying out of the same to the Colonial Secretary for approval.

8.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall cause the Commonage to be patrolled at least once in every week by a Pound Keeper, and shall, once in every month, direct the number of animals grazing thereon to be counted.

9.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall have power to order, whenever he may deem the same necessary, the whole of the animals grazing on the Common, to be driven up to the Stone Corral, or any more convenient place, by their owners, for the purpose of inspection and detection, and any animals, the owners of which fail to do so when required, shall be seized and impounded until such time as the owner shall satisfy the Principal Pound Keeper of his right to have such animal grazing on the Common, and any animal so impounded shall be dealt with in the manner laid down in the 4th Clause of the Ordinance.

10.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall inspect and report, or cause to be inspected and reported, on all defects in the division walls, fences and gates, surrounding the Commonage.

11.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall receive into the Pound such stock as are defined in the Schedule to the Ordinance, and are there declared to be liable to be impounded, and shall cause due notice as required under Clause 2 of the Ordinance, to be placed on the Gazette Board, after such notice shall have been signed by him.

12.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall require any party bringing any animal which may have been seized under Clause 2 of the Ordinance, into the Pound, to state his name, and place of abode, or the name and place of abode of the person sending such animal, and also the time and place at which the animal so seized was found, and shall enter all such particulars in a book called "The Pound Book," to be kept for that purpose.

13.—In such Pound Book he shall also enter the date and hour of the day when the stock is received into the Pound, the colour, mark (if any) and description, and shall state how such stock has been disposed of, whether delivered to the owner, sold, or still remaining in the Pound, the amount paid by way of penalty, together with the sum paid under Regulation III; also the cost of maintaining the animal during its detention in the Pound, or the price obtained from the sale thereof.

14.—On or before the 7th day of each month the Principal Pound Keeper shall forward to the Treasurer the Pound Book, together with the balance of all monies received during the month last past, and declare to the truth of the same.

15.—The Principal Pound Keeper shall cause each and every animal during its detention in the Pound, to be supplied daily with sufficient fodder and water.

16.—No charge shall be made for the feeding of any stock lodged in the Pound if taken out within two hours after being brought there, and on no account shall any animal be removed until claimed by the owner or sold.

17.—Stock suffering from any infectious disease or distemper, or considered as such, shall not be received into the Pound, and should any stock become diseased or distempered after being received into the Pound the Principal Pound Keeper shall immediately report the same to the Colonial Secretary, who, upon proof to his satisfaction, that such stock ought not to be kept in the Pound, shall authorize and direct the removal thereof, and should he consider it advisable, shall order such stock to be destroyed and the carcass to be buried or burned.

18.—No liability shall be incurred by the Government for any loss or injury which may be caused to the owner of any animal lodged in the Pound.

"Any person or persons who shall wilfully, negligently or maliciously leave open any gate or gates on the fences leading to or from the Common, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of £10 (Ten Pounds)."

Clause 7 was re-numbered clause 8. Clause 8 was re-numbered clause 9, and the words "completion of the fencing-in of the Commonage, and the date on which the same shall become Law shall be declared by Proclamation under the hand of the Governor," were deleted, and the words, "the first day of November, 1893," substituted therefor.

An Ordinance to provide for the payment of certain Fees into the Colonial Treasury.

Preamble.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the payment into the Treasury of the Falkland Islands of certain Fees of Office payable under Ordinances 3 and 12 of 1853.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Amendment of Ordinance 3 of 1853, as to the disposal of fees.

1.—The words “received to the use of the officers and persons therein mentioned” in Section 11 of Ordinance 3 of 1853, are hereby repealed, and the words “shall be paid into the Colonial Treasury for purposes of General Revenue,” substituted therefor.

Repeal of Section 16 of Ordinance 12 of 1853, and new disposal of fees.

2.—Section 16, of Ordinance 12 of 1853, is hereby repealed and the following Section substituted in place thereof:—

That any Clergyman may demand and receive to his own use the fees allowed to him in Schedule E, ~~herein mentioned~~, but those payable to the Registrar in the aforesaid Schedule E, shall be received by him and paid into the Colonial Treasury for purposes of General Revenue, and it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, to make any alteration in the said Schedule.

An Ordinance to give authority to lease Town Lands.

Preamble.

Whereas Ordinance No. 4 of 1871 makes no provision for the disposal of Town Lands otherwise than by sale in fee simple and by public auction, and it is expedient to give authority to the Governor in Council to grant leases thereof, as the Governor in Council may think proper, subject to the approval of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the time being.

At a Meeting of the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL held on the 9th day of October, 1893.

Present : His Excellency George Melville, Esq., C.M.G., Administrator,
(President).

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency mentioned, with reference to the first items on the Orders of the Day for a vote of £50 towards the cost of the reconstruction of the Conservatory and an alteration to the front entrance at Government House, that the Executive Council had already unanimously concurred in the need for this work being carried out; and, after remarking on the inconvenience of the present arrangements, stated that the matter was now brought before the Council for its favourable consideration. His Excellency further informed the Council that expenditure had already been incurred upon the roof over the Hall, which had now been made waterproof, and as this, with other works, had cost larger sums than had been anticipated, it was more than likely that the item Vote B of the Public Works Vote would be exceeded. After consulting the Honourable the Colonial Treasurer he however trusted there would be savings on the other sub-heads and that the total vote would not be exceeded. The Council unanimously considered that this work, and the execution of the other works which had been carried out, had been justified and approved of the sums that had been expended upon them.

With reference to the second item, His Excellency said that he had well considered the application which had been received through Dean Brandon for a Medical Practitioner and Surgeon Dentist before bringing the matter forward. The correspondence relating thereto had been transmitted to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State, who had been informed that it would be brought before the Council to obtain further information as to the general wishes of the people. His Excellency said that he had ascertained that the people did not want another Government Medical Officer, but a private Medical Practitioner, of course in such a case, His Excellency added, any man would be at liberty to come out and endeavour to obtain a practice for himself.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon said, that with all due respect, it would have been better to have first brought such information before the Executive Council for its advice in the first instance. He took exception to the Colonial Chaplain having brought the matter forward, and he was convinced that there was no need for such assistance as he had only been called out two or three times into the North Camp during his fourteen years residence here. It would be against the interests of the Government to afford such assistance as there were no officials to be attended, and the sheep farmers were quite in a position to support their own doctor if he were required, for the same reason he was opposed to the Government providing for an Assistant Colonial Surgeon on the West Falklands. The Honourable Member added, that on receipt of a private letter from the Colonial Chaplain, referring to this matter, he had visited one of the Members of the Council, who was now present, and he had been told by the Honourable Member that the scheme was a stroke aimed against him (the Colonial Surgeon) in consequence of his unswerving hostile action towards the farmers in relation to the Land Question.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer mentioned that it remained to be proved whether this medical assistance was really required as it had not yet been so shewn, and asked for some further information as to how the matter originated, as

this desire had apparently come forward suddenly from the movers, though fully armed, at present only a bald statement was before the Council. His Excellency asked the Honourable Member if he had not seen the papers on the subject, and received a reply that he had not.

His Excellency then read Dean Brandon's letter, dated 6th September, and stated that he had pointed out to the Colonial Chaplain that he had disapproved of his advertising for the assistance of an "Assistant Colonial Surgeon" in the Falkland Islands Magazine, but that he was quite at liberty to call attention to the necessity of a private medical practitioner.

The Honourable the Colonial Treasurer pointed out that the letter does not name any guarantors and he was without information on this point. The Honourable Member thought that three doctors amongst a population of 1700 was sufficient. He added that he would like to know how this agitation had commenced. He would not recommend that Government should assist more than it does already.

His Excellency expressed it as his opinion that the Colonial Chaplain was acting on behalf of the Community, and that there was no personal feeling against the Colonial Surgeon. It was for assistance to private persons.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon referred to the meetings that had been held by the Colonial Chaplain; to the Colonial Chaplain's house to house visits to obtain guarantors and questioned his action throughout as a brother official. The Honourable Member further added that he did not think that a selection as proposed should be given to Mr. Cobb, as he thought, if Government did assist, it ought to be able to manage its own affairs. The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon asked His Excellency why an expression of opinion had been asked of the Legislative Council on this matter, and thereby increasing the importance of a scheme which had been first secretly formulated without a previous reference to himself as head of the Medical Department. To find a Medical Practitioner combined with a Surgeon Dentist would be difficult, if not impossible, as Medical Practitioners do not become tradesmen, such offices were not found together, they were entirely separate. The Honourable Member did not consider that Government should be burdened with any extra amount for such medical aid.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, on rising, said he would like to have heard an expression of opinion from the unofficial members, especially the senior unofficial member of the Council, before giving his own. He, however, took exception to the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon's view, as to the non-combination of the offices of a Medical Practitioner and Surgeon Dentist. He stated that since the Colonial Surgeon had arrived in the Colony—fourteen years ago—the profession had changed, as a qualified medical man does now take out a dentist's qualification and, in fact, it is not at all unusual that he qualifies in medicine, surgery and dentistry. The Honourable Member continued that the letter referred to had been received in the usual way through the Secretariat from Dean Brandon, and had been immediately forwarded to the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon for his observations and report. There had been no secrecy in the matter. Dean Brandon on visiting had been informed of, and had seen, the need of another medical man, and he agreed with Dean Brandon that such was necessary. The Honourable Member asked the Colonial Treasurer and Colonial Surgeon if there is a place in the United Kingdom with a population of 700 with only one doctor? He pointed out that we are now in the hands of one doctor, and if anything happened to him, such as sudden decease, at the very shortest space of time three months would elapse before another man could arrive. In the meantime an epidemic might occur with very serious results; and he considered that any Government would be reprehensible with such facts staring it in the face that did not provide against such a contingency. This alone, he felt convinced, would be sufficient for the Secretary of State to approve of a Government grant in aid. Authorities here should guard themselves against any medical aid not being forthcoming in case of need.

The Honourable J. J. Felton took exception to the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon's assertion that this scheme had been got up by parties to injure him on

account of his loyalty to the Government, that was most unfounded. The Honourable Member stated that he himself was a guarantor. He thought accidents might happen, epidemics might break out, and Government ought to prepare itself especially as it was the wish of the people. He recommended that a small sum should be voted for this extra medical assistance, but did not make such a recommendation because of any personal feeling against the Colonial Surgeon. He supposed, should the Government make any provision, that it would be considered as a grant-in-aid, and would not carry any Government control with it.

His Excellency acquiesced in the Honourable Member's supposition.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon said he was somewhat diffident in speaking on the matter owing to his short residence here. He had, however, made most careful enquiries into the matter, and those enquiries in addition to several voluntary statements made to him, enabled him to say without hesitation that there was a much-felt and wide-spread need for extra medical assistance. The Honourable Member repudiated any personal feeling towards the Colonial Surgeon in this matter, and said that the guarantee fund spoke for itself as, in his opinion, a man's pocket was a sure guide to his feeling and opinions, and that the amount subscribed was a complete answer to the questions put. If the Secretary of State did not approve of any Government grant being given, he thought that the scheme would be carried out independent of Government aid.

His Excellency thanked the Honourable Members for their opinions.

His Excellency then informed the Council that he had been informed by the Secretary of State that Governor Goldsworthy's leave had been extended for a month from September, and that he therefore expected His Excellency to arrive by this Mail. He thanked the members, both official and unofficial, on this the last occasion that he would have the honour of presiding over them, for their assistance, and especially in dealing with the Secretary of State's instructions conveyed in His Lordship's despatch of 31st January, last, regarding the Land Question. As a parting request His Excellency asked the Members, in order to complete the settlement of this question, to give Governor Goldsworthy the same loyal support as they had given him.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said he felt sure that Honourable Members, but no one more than himself, would regret His Excellency's departure which, however, he hoped would be a gain to his Excellency, and added that he would support the Governor if he met us in the same spirit as Mr. Melville had done in carrying out the instructions as conveyed in the despatch from the Marquis of Ripon.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon thanked His Excellency for the consideration and courtesy which always attended the Meetings of the Council; and in fully endorsing the expressions which had just fallen from his colleague wished His Excellency "God-speed."

The Council was then adjourned *sine die*.

The Minutes of the previous meeting having already been circulated and assented to as recorded were taken as read and, on the motion of the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton, were confirmed.

His Excellency mentioned that Mr. C. W. Hill would take the Minutes as Clerk while sitting as a Member of the Council.

His Excellency stated that as the original Resolutions regarding the Sale of Land had been considered in Legislative Council, he now brought them up again amended in certain respects according to instructions received from the Secretary of State. His Excellency added that in the absence of one of the unofficial members any final decision on them would be postponed to a subsequent meeting to be held after the Honourable A. E. Baillon's return to Stanley, so as to give the unofficial members an opportunity of conferring together. Of course, His Excellency added, if the other unofficial member now present desired to say anything now he would be glad to hear it.

The Amended Resolutions were then considered *seriatim*.

On Clause 2, Mr. Felton observed that he agreed to the proposed extension of time to 15 years within which the purchaser should be allowed to complete the purchase. He pointed out that the period of ten years was inserted in order to carry out the Secretary of State's wishes expressed in His Lordship's despatch of 31st January, 1893. He would even agree to a further extension of 20 years, as he did not consider that land was worth four shillings an acre. It is evident, he thought, that by an extension of time being deemed necessary there was a doubt as to the actual value of, and real demand for, land, or otherwise land would be put up for sale on terms cash.

His Excellency explained the object of the Government reserving land and using the powers given by Clause 2, of Ordinance 9 of 1882. His Excellency referred to the opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown as to the disposal of the excessive acreage over the survey of certain stations, and added that it was fair

average land that the Government considered should be put up for sale. With regard to the price of the land, and the time within which such should be paid, His Excellency reminded the Honourable Member that in the case of the large sales in 1890, the Falkland Islands Company, and others even did not pay cash down although land was then sold to them at three shillings an acre. It was the desire of the Government that the terms of payment should be made as easy as possible for those who may desire to purchase land. Government would not thereby be the loser as interest would be payable. His Excellency hoped that the unofficial members would give every help to the Government they could in dealing with this matter, and said that he was glad to hear from Mr. Felton that he considered that even 20 instead of 15 years would not be too long within which the purchase-money should be paid up; and thought it would be a graceful act on the part of the unofficial members to make such a proposal.

On discussing Clause 3 the Honourable J. J. Felton said that he thought that it was somewhat inconsistent with Clause 4 of the Resolutions of 17th June, 1893. He did not consider that a mere bid constituted a sale, and could not agree that power should be given to the Government to do what it liked with the land if the first instalment had not even been paid. Land would be alienated from the present lessee by the mere fact of a bid having been made for it.

His Excellency reminded the Honourable Member that he was arguing on the assumption of a *mala-fide* transaction. His Excellency hoped that if a bid were made it would be made in all good faith.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary pointed out that such a case would be met by the provisions of the Auction Laws. The defaulter would have to pay for all expenses and the land would be put up for sale again.

With reference to Clause 4 the Honourable J. J. Felton observed that this clause opened the door to what he might call gambling and a land-jobbing business. A man might run up the sale price with the object of obtaining the balance, and might clear a few hundred pounds by buying it in at the second sale.

His Excellency remarked that what the Honourable Member had pointed out was not intended, but as there might be some misunderstanding if the clause were left as it now stands, the wording of it would be altered.

There was no discussion on Clauses 5 and 6.

On Clause 7 His Excellency informed the Council that the Secretary of State desired to receive the views of the Council as to the necessity of the condition requiring the erection of a suitable dwelling-house before the tenant stocked his land. His Excellency thought that it would be hard on a man if he were prevented from entering simply because he may not have sufficient money to meet the cost of building a suitable house. He thought it was unnecessary, and in view of the expenses that he would have to incur under the conditions, hoped that the Members would be unanimous in considering that this condition should be omitted.

The final discussion on these conditions was then postponed until the next meeting of the Council.

On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to give authority to lease Town Lands," was read a first time.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary gave notice of the Second reading of the Bill at the next meeting of the Council.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Treasurer moved the first reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the payment of certain fees into the Colonial Treasury."

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read a first time.

The Members in charge of the Bill gave notice of its Second Reading at the next meeting of the Council.

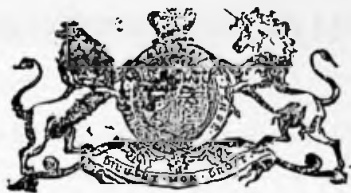

An Ordinance to amend and make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination.

Preamble.	Whereas it is expedient to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and to make further provision for the Compulsory Vaccination of Children resident in the Falkland Islands.
Enacting clause.	Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—
Repeal of clause 12 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1868.	1. Clause 12 of Ordinance No. 1, of 1868, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—
Registrar of Stanley to be supplied with quarterly returns.	Every Public Vaccinator and any Medical Practitioner, before whom any child has been brought for Vaccination, shall, every Quarter, send to the Registrar in Stanley, a Return, according to the Form in the Schedule hereto annexed; and any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner who shall neglect or refuse to do so shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.
Mode of prosecuting defaulters.	2. Should there be any defaulters in the Return referred to in the foregoing Section. The Registrar shall, by communicating with the Chief Constable or other Officer responsible in the carrying out the provisions of the Vaccination Ordinance, cause such defaulter to be prosecuted.
Justices shall make an Order for the Vaccination of any child under 14 years.	3. If any Registrar, or any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance, shall give information in writing to a Justice of the Peace, that he has reason to believe that any child under the age of fourteen years, being within the District for which the informant acts, has not been successfully vaccinated, and that he has given notice to the parent or person having the custody of such child to procure its being vaccinated, and that this notice has been disregarded, the Justice may order further enquiry to be made, or shall summon such parent or person to appear with the child before him at a certain time and place, and upon the appearance, if the Justice shall find, after such examination as he shall deem necessary, that the child has not been vaccinated, nor has already had the small pox, he shall make an order under his Hand and Seal directing such child to be vaccinated within a certain time; and if at the expiration of such time the child shall not have been so vaccinated, or shall not be shown to be unfit to be vaccinated, or to be insusceptible of Vaccination, the person upon whom such order shall have been made shall be proceeded against summarily, and, unless he can show some reasonable ground for his omission to carry the order into effect, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings for this and every subsequent disobedience of an order to vaccinate, but no further orders shall be made at a less interval than one calendar month from the date of the previous conviction.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read, amended and confirmed.

After the reading of the Orders of the Day, the Honourable J. J. Felton moved the reading of 2 petitions received from Mr. R. Aldridge and the widow of the late Mr. Pinazo, asking for a mitigation of the penalty imposed on them for selling tobacco on which Customs Duties had not been paid. The same being read, the Honourable Member stated that although he had no sympathy with the offenders, yet the circumstances which had since occurred, which he reviewed, might perhaps allow the Members of the Government to reconsider the matter.

His Excellency explained the action which had been taken in the matter by Administrator Melville and by himself, and, as the power was vested in the Governor, and not with the Members, to deal with the case, if the Honourable Members wished him to move in the matter he would be willing to reconsider it. The unofficial Members then asked His Excellency if he could see any grounds to mitigate the penalty inflicted they hoped he would do so.

His Excellency said that he would consider what the Honourable Members had said.

The Council then went into Committee and proceeded to amend the Conditions of Sale of Land, dated 14th June, 1893, clause by clause, in accordance with the Secretary of State's suggestions made in Despatch No. 74, of 11th of September, 1893.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary explained the reasons for the various amendments.

It was explained by Mr. Felton that the reason for the insertion of Clause 1 in the conditions dated 14th June, 1893, was to fix a certain time within which information could be obtained as to the real demand for land, and so as to have some basis to work upon. It was not intended to debar persons who might wish to purchase from coming forward after the 31st July. The Clause was then expunged.

Before discussion took place on Clause 2, the Honourable J. J. Felton remarked that he could hardly be expected to vote for what he had already opposed, and which was inconsistent with the views already expressed by Lord Ripon, he thought that it was needless to enter upon a further discussion, the more especially as the Secretary of State's instructions on which the now proposed conditions had been framed could not be amended.

His Excellency informed the Honourable Member that the conditions as amended by the Secretary of State were referred back to the Council for discussion. The Secretary of State had not given an instruction, but a request that the conditions might be amended in accordance with his suggestions. The fact that the Secretary of State sent them back to the Legislative Council showed that he wished the amendments to be further discussed. His Excellency thought that it would be better that the Clauses which were not discussed at the last meeting of the Council should be now passed, and that the unofficial Members should express their opinions in writing on any alterations, after hearing the views of the Government on them, for submission to the Secretary of State.

The Honourable Members thanked His Excellency, and considered this the better course to adopt.

The discussion on the Clauses then proceeded. Clause 2 was re-numbered Clause 1 in the amended resolutions. Clause 3 was re-numbered Clause 2. The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary explained that this Clause, as amended, was suggested, as the former Clause was not considered elastic enough. He referred to the remarks made at the last Meeting of the Council, and agreed with

the Honourable J. J. Felton that the time within which the purchase money might be paid should be extended to 20 years.

The Honourable J. J. Felton observed that the period of 10 years had been inserted in accordance with the Secretary of State's Despatch of 31st January, 1893, (No. 16), which was the same period as that extended to the large purchasers in 1890.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon thought the words "not exceeding 15 years" should be allowed to stand. He thought that the words "Governor in Council" were superfluous, and that it would be hard on the lessee, if he bought in the land, for the Governor to fix the time within which he should pay.

His Excellency said that the Clause would effect one and all alike, and that if the term in one case were fixed for a certain number of years it must be the same in all: Mr. Baillon expressed himself satisfied.

The words "ten years" were struck out, and the following words "such period not exceeding 15 years, as the Governor in Council may think fit," were substituted therefor, and the Clause was passed as so amended.

Clause 4 was re-numbered Clause 3, and on the words "and in default of payment of any instalment of purchase money or interest the land may be re-sold" being proposed to be added, the Honourable J. J. Felton referred to his contention, at the previous Meeting, that there could be no re-sale when no sale had taken place. He remarked on the hardship that the present lessee had to undergo by conditions which had compelled him to sink all his capital in the land. He objected to the re-sale.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary pointed out that if the conditions which were applicable to the lessee were hard, that was no reason that the present conditions should be made hard.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon did not agree with the proposed amendment, as with it he could not reconcile the condition with paragraph 15, of the Secretary of State's despatch, 31st January, 1893. He did not consider a bid constituted a sale.

His Excellency told the Honourable Member that he could include his objection to this Clause in any protest that he might put in writing.

His Excellency then read the Clause as proposed to be amended.

The Council divided.

The Clause was declared carried, and was inserted in the conditions.

Before Clause 5 a Clause numbered 4 was inserted but consideration of it postponed to a subsequent meeting.

Clause 5 remained unaltered.

In Clause 6 the words "approved of by the Governor" were struck out.

Clause 7 was rescinded and read as follows:—

That, except with the consent of every owner or lessee of land adjoining the land no stock shall be placed on the land purchased until proper arrangements for the dipping of sheep are provided, and the lands completely fenced in by a proper sheep-proof fence, half the cost of fencing to be borne by the purchaser, and the other half by the lessee or lessees or owner or owners of the adjoining land, and, if more than one, in proportion to the length of the fence, separating their respective lands from the purchased lands.

Reference was made by His Excellency to the retention of the words, "suitable dwelling-house shall be erected," and asked the unofficial Members for their views on this subject.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said that so far as he was personally concerned he did not care whether these words were omitted or not. But if a man had no house and fell ill he would have to fall back upon his neighbour, a lessee probably, for shelter, to whom he might become a burden, and so might tend to increase the expenses of the lessee. He did not think that a man could carry on his work properly without the comforts a house would give him, and it would be going backwards if a man were allowed to live in a hovel or under a peat-bank. He thought that, as in the town of Stanley, huts should not be allowed to be erected under certain dimensions. As a small farmer, he added, would not employ labour at

the rates given by the present lessee he feared that this might cause the introduction of foreign labour.

His Excellency reminded the Council that the provision in the former Ordinances for lessees to erect suitable dwelling-houses did not hold good now in the case of proposed purchasers. That provision was made to ensure a man settling on his land and not to throw it up after having killed off all the cattle. This necessity had now disappeared.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary thought that the Honourable Member had overlooked the intention of the Clause as it at present stood, namely, that a suitable house should be built before the land was stocked. He referred to the system of Club Farms in the United Kingdom, where one plant provided for wants of one or more farms. He proposed that the words be struck out.

The Conditions were then left in Committee Stage so that Clause 4 might be re-considered and brought up again.

The Council having resumed its sitting, the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the Second Reading and consideration in Committee of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to give authority to lease Town Lands." The motion being carried, the Council resolved itself into Committee. In Clause 1, the Honourable J. J. Felton proposed that the words "or in any other township" which hereafter may be proclaimed" be expunged, as it was premature to legislate for such, and people who might reside in any township to be hereafter created might like to have a say in the matter.

His Excellency mentioned that these words appeared in the Ordinance dealing with the Sale of Town Lands.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Treasurer thought that the same principles which led to the introduction of the Ordinance as dealing with the Town of Stanley should apply to any towns that might come into existence in the future. It would be inexpedient to have a Bill affecting one town and not another.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon suggested that leases should be put up to auction as provided by Clause 9, of Ordinance 4, of 1871.

It was pointed out to the Honourable Member that law only provided for sales by auction, and if the Honourable Member's suggestion were adopted the whole object of the Bill would be defeated, namely, the prevention of the man with the longest purse becoming a Town Land monopolist.

The Honourable Member thought that some provision should be made for the individual rights, as freeholders would not care for a blacksmith's shop, for instance, in front of them.

On it being put to the vote, Clause 1 stood part of the Bill and was passed as drafted.

In Clause 2, the word "Town" was inserted in line 1, before the words "Land Ordinance, 1893."

In the preamble the words "subject to the approval of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the time being" were struck out, the unofficial Members dissenting.

The Council having resumed, the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary gave notice of the Third reading of the Bill at the next Meeting of the Council.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Treasurer then moved the Second reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the payment of certain fees into 'the Colonial Treasury.'" The same being carried the Council resolved itself into Committee, and the Bill passed through the Committee Stage without amendment.

The Council adjourned until Wednesday the 8th instant.

The amended conditions of sale of land were brought up again so that Clause 4 might be considered. It was however suggested in place of amending this Clause that the following words should be added to Clause 3, "at an upset price not less than that bid by the defaulting purchaser," in order that Government should not be the loser if the land were sold at a lower price than Government previously obtained for it.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said that he had already opposed the Clause and did not agree to the additional words as it would alter the constitution of the conditions of sale, which provided for 4/- being the upset price. He asked what would become of the land if there were no bid at the higher price and suggested that the payment of any instalment should give a man a title to a block of so many acres and become the freeholder of such.

His Excellency replied that in the event of there being no bid at the higher price the Government would have to consider if any circumstances had altered the value of the land as to justify the land being put up at the original upset price. He did not agree with the Honourable Member's suggestion for the purchase of a title of a small block by payment of an instalment, as the man who failed to complete his purchase might thus retain a small block and lower the value of the remainder.

His Excellency, on further consideration, thought that it would be better perhaps, after all, to leave Clause 3 as amended by the Secretary of State, and asked the unofficial members to insert their views on the Clause in their memorial regarding the various amendments proposed in the conditions of sale of June, 1893, this was agreed to. Clause 4 was then read and on a division.

The Honourable Member then stated that he considered that the system that has obtained of dealing with town lands by auction, as provided by Clause 9 of Ordinance 4 of 1871, should be followed when they are leased. As for the man with the longest purse being so able to lease, he thought that this would tend to the benefit of the Revenue as the sites would be the most valuable to such a man.

His Excellency informed the Honourable Member that such might be so, but that it would prevent a man, who is not in business, setting up for himself, as the longest purse would carry the day and thus prevent fair competition in trade.

The Honourable J. J. Felton thought that the rental of a lease should bear a fair proportion to that what it would fetch if sold by public auction. He considered that individual rights should be protected.

The Bill was then read a Third time and was passed.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Treasurer moved the Third reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the payment of certain fees into the Colonial Treasury," and being seconded by the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary was read a Third time and passed.

The Council was adjourned *sine die*.

An Ordinance to amend and make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination.

Preamble.

Whereas it is expedient to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and to make further provision for the Compulsory Vaccination of Children resident in the Falkland Islands.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Repeal of clause 12 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1868.

1. Clause 12 of Ordinance No. 1. of 1868, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

Registrar of Stanley to be supplied with quarterly returns.

Every Public Vaccinator and any Medical Practitioner, before whom any child has been brought for Vaccination, shall, every Quarter, send to the Registrar in Stanley, a Return, according to the Form in the Schedule hereto annexed; and any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner who shall neglect or refuse to do so shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

Mode of prosecuting defaulters.

2. Should there be any defaulters in the Return referred to in the foregoing Section. The Registrar shall, by communicating with the Chief Constable or other Officer responsible in the carrying out the provisions of the Vaccination Ordinance, cause such defaulter to be prosecuted.

Justices shall make an Order for the Vaccination of any child under 14 years.

3. If any Registrar, or any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance, shall give information in writing to a Justice of the Peace, that he has reason to believe that any child under the age of fourteen years, being within the District for which the informant acts, has not been successfully vaccinated, and that he has given notice to the parent or person having the custody of such child to procure its being vaccinated, and that this notice has been disregarded, the Justice may order further enquiry to be made, or shall summon such parent or person to appear with the child before him at a certain time and place, and upon the appearance, if the Justice shall find, after such examination as he shall deem necessary, that the child has not been vaccinated, nor has already had the small pox, he shall make an order under his Hand and Seal directing such child to be vaccinated within a certain time; and if at the expiration of such time the child shall not have been so vaccinated, or shall not be shown to be unfit to be vaccinated, or to be insusceptible of Vaccination, the person upon whom such order shall have been made shall be proceeded against summarily, and, unless he can show some reasonable ground for his omission to carry the order into effect, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings for this and every subsequent disobedience of an order to vaccinate, but no further orders shall be made at a less interval than one calendar month from the date of the previous conviction.

Penalty for disobedience

Proviso for costs to person improperly summoned.

Provided that if the Justice shall be of opinion that the person is improperly brought before him, and shall refuse to make any order for the vaccination of the child, he may order the informant to pay to such person such sum of money as he shall consider to be a fair compensation for his expenses and loss of time in attending before the Justice.

4. This Ordinance shall be read with and form part of the Vaccination Ordinance No. 1 of 1868.

PORT REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Port Regulations, I do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in the Governor by the Pilot Ordinances, No. 5 of 1871, No. 2 of 1880, and No. 13 of 1882, repeal all the Port Regulations hitherto in operation, and direct that, from and after the date hereof, the following Regulations shall be substituted in the place thereof, and shall henceforth be duly enforced.

Master to supply information.

1.—Every Master of a ship is bound to truly declare her draught of water to the Pilot who takes charge of her and shall furnish him on demand, with a correct statement of the following particulars, for the information of the Governor.—That is to say:—The name of the vessel, Registered tonnage, Port of Registry, Port of Departure, Port of Destination, Number of days out, Number of passengers, Number of crew, Nature of cargo, Whether sickness on board, Whether gunpowder on board, Draught of water.—For which purpose a blank form will be presented to the Master by the Pilot in charge.

Deposit of Ship's papers.

2.—The Masters of all vessels anchoring in this harbour or in Port William to the Westward of a line drawn from Cape Pembroke to William Point, shall, within twenty-four hours after their arrival, deposit their ship's papers at the Government Office, which papers will be returned to the Masters on application within a reasonable time before their departure:—provided always that the papers of foreign vessels after having been examined by the Collector of Customs may be transferred to the custody of the Consul or Commercial Agent of the nation to which such vessel belongs, but such ship's papers must be again produced by such Consul or Commercial Agent, or by the Master, before the Collector of Customs, when such vessel is ready for sea, and before clearance of such vessel.

Every vessel anchoring in Stanley Harbour to pay dues whether she employs a Pilot or not.

3.—Every vessel anchoring in Stanley Harbour,—as it is defined by Ordinance No. 5 of 1861,—whether she employs a Pilot or not, (except vessels of War and Colonial vessels trading between Cape Horn and Montevideo) shall pay to the Shipping-Master of the Port of Stanley the same dues specified to be paid for Pilotage inwards and outwards in Ordinance No. 5 of 1871, as set forth in rules 5 & 6.

Pratique.

4.—No vessel entering the Port may be boarded except by the Pilot until she is at anchor and pratique has been given by the authorities, except in the case of vessels which have been at sea more than twenty days from their last port of departure, in which case they may be boarded before coming to anchor after the Pilot has declared that there is no sickness on board, and after being visited by an Officer of Customs.

Pilotage inwards.

5.—The rate of pilotage inwards for every vessel drawing less than ten feet shall be sixty shillings; and for every vessel drawing ten feet or more six shillings per foot.

Pilotage outwards.

6.—The rate of pilotage outwards shall be one half the rate inwards.

Leading a ship.

7.—If, when unable from circumstances to get on board, a Pilot leads a ship, the inward pilotage will be demanded.

Signalling for a pilot.

8.—All vessels signalling for a Pilot shall, upon the pilot boat going to its assistance, be required to pay the inward pilotage whether she is boarded by a pilot or not.

9.—If any Pilot should of necessity be detained on board any ship under his charge, he shall be entitled to twelve shillings for every day's detention on board such ship.

Detention of pilot.

10.—All Colonial and other vessels will, on arrival, be boarded by the Harbour-Master or his Deputy.

Harbour Master to board all vessels.

11.—Pilots are required to board the nearest vessel having a signal flying for a Pilot, except there should be a vessel in sight with a signal of distress.

Pilot to board nearest vessel.

12.—Pilots must carry in the pilot boat a flag to be approved by the Governor.

Pilot flag.

13.—Immediately on landing the Pilot shall give the information required in Clause 1 to the Governor.

Pilot to furnish information to Governor.

14.—No hulk shall be permanently moored to the North of a line drawn from East to West along the middle of the harbour, nor to East of a line drawn North from Hebe street, nor to the West of a line drawn North from the Gazette or Notice Board. Where any doubt may arise as to the true position of these limits, they shall in every case be defined by the Harbour-Master. All hulks shall be so securely moored that they cannot change their position.

Position of hulks.

15. In every case where it may be necessary to change the position of a vessel or hulk for the purpose of receiving or discharging cargo, or for any other purpose, such vessel or hulk must be moved under the direction of the Harbour-Master or his Deputy.

Moving hulks.

16.—For moving any vessel or hulk in Stanley Harbour, the Harbour-Master shall demand a fee of One Pound, which fee shall be paid into the Colonial Treasury for the purposes of general revenue. Vessels or hulks must not be moved without the sanction of the Harbour-Master in writing.

Fee for moving hulk.

17.—Any vessel requiring water may obtain it from the Government Reservoir on application to the Harbour-Master and on payment of two shillings and sixpence a tun.

Watering.

18.—No person shall throw or cause to be thrown into Stanley Harbour any dead animal, ballast, damaged goods, rubbish or other material. Shipmasters wishing to discharge ballast shall communicate with the Harbour-Master, who will point out where it may be placed.

Discharging ballast.

19.—No person shall take shingle, sand or stone, for ballast or otherwise, from the beach in Stanley Harbour, without first having obtained permission from the Harbour-Master and pre-payment of the sum of 1/- per tun.

Ballasting.

20.—Any merchant vessel, having on board more than one hundred pounds of gunpowder, must be anchored either in Port William or in Stanley Harbour, East of Navy Point, until the Master shall have deposited the same (for the term of his stay) in the powder magazine, for which a charge of sixpence per package will be made; but it shall be in the power of the Governor to grant certain privileges for the ready discharge of ammunition consigned for the use of the Government or Merchants of this Colony, should such be deemed advisable by him.

Gunpowder.

21.—No master or other officer commanding any vessel (except a vessel of war) shall keep, or cause or permit to be fired on board such vessel, any cannon loaded with ball, while such vessel shall lie or be in Stanley Harbour.

No shotted cannon to be allowed.

22.—Ships when at anchor in any part of the Harbour, outside and eastward of the limits allowed to hulks are required to exhibit a white light half way up the forestay, or other conspicuous place, from sunset to sunrise.

PORT REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Port Regulations, I do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in the Governor by the Pilot Ordinances, No. 5 of 1871, No. 2 of 1880, and No. 13 of 1882, repeal all the Port Regulations hitherto in operation, and direct that, from and after the date hereof, the following Regulations shall be substituted in the place thereof, and shall henceforth be duly enforced.

Master to supply information.

1.—Every Master of a ship is bound to truly declare her draught of water to the Pilot who takes charge of her and shall furnish him on demand, with a correct statement of the following particulars, for the information of the Governor.—That is to say:—The name of the vessel, Registered tonnage, Port of Registry, Port of Departure, Port of Destination, Number of days out, Number of passengers, Number of crew, Nature of cargo, Whether sickness on board, Whether gunpowder on board, Draught of water.—For which purpose a blank form will be presented to the Master by the Pilot in charge.

Deposit of Ship's papers.

2.—The Masters of all vessels anchoring in this harbour or in Port William to the Westward of a line drawn from Cape Pembroke to William Point, shall, within twenty-four hours after their arrival, deposit their ship's papers at the Government Office, which papers will be returned to the Masters on application within a reasonable time before their departure:—provided always that the papers of foreign vessels after having been examined by the Collector of Customs may be transferred to the custody of the Consul or Commercial Agent of the nation to which such vessel belongs, but such ship's papers must be again produced by such Consul or Commercial Agent, or by the Master, before the Collector of Customs, when such vessel is ready for sea, and before clearance of such vessel.

Every vessel anchoring in Stanley Harbour to pay dues whether she employs a Pilot or not.

3.—Every vessel anchoring in Stanley Harbour,—as it is defined by Ordinance No. 5 of 1861,—whether she employs a Pilot or not, (except vessels of War and Colonial vessels trading between Cape Horn and Montevideo) shall pay to the Shipping-Master of the Port of Stanley the same dues specified to be paid for Pilotage inwards and outwards in Ordinance No. 5 of 1871, as set forth in rules 5 & 6.

Pratique.

4.—No vessel entering the Port may be boarded except by the Pilot until she is at anchor and pratique has been given by the authorities, except in the case of vessels which have been at sea more than twenty days from their last port of departure, in which case they may be boarded before coming to anchor after the Pilot has declared that there is no sickness on board, and after being visited by an Officer of Customs.

Pilotage inwards.

5.—The rate of pilotage inwards for every vessel drawing less than ten feet shall be sixty shillings; and for every vessel drawing ten feet or more six shillings per foot.

Pilotage outwards.

6.—The rate of pilotage outwards shall be one half the rate inwards.

Leading a ship.

7.—If, when unable from circumstances to get on board, a Pilot leads a ship, the inward pilotage will be demanded.

Signalling for a pilot.

8.—All vessels signalling for a Pilot shall, upon the pilot boat going to its assistance, be required to pay the inward pilotage whether she is boarded by a pilot or not.

9.—If any Pilot should of necessity be detained on board any ship under his charge, he shall be entitled to twelve shillings for every day's detention on board such ship.

10.—All Colonial and other vessels will, on arrival, be boarded by the Harbour-Master or his Deputy.

11.—Pilots are required to board the nearest vessel having a signal flying for a Pilot, except there should be a vessel in sight with a signal of distress.

12.—Pilots must carry in the pilot boat a flag to be approved by the Governor.

13.—Immediately on landing the Pilot shall give the information required in Clause 1 to the Governor.

14.—No hulk shall be permanently moored to the North of a line drawn from East to West along the middle of the harbour, nor to East of a line drawn North from Hebe street, nor to the West of a line drawn North from the Gazette or Notice Board. Where any doubt may arise as to the true position of these limits, they shall in every case be defined by the Harbour-Master. All hulks shall be so securely moored that they cannot change their position.

15. In every case where it may be necessary to change the position of a vessel or hulk for the purpose of receiving or discharging cargo, or for any other purpose, such vessel or hulk must be moved under the direction of the Harbour-Master or his Deputy.

16.—For moving any vessel or hulk in Stanley Harbour, the Harbour-Master shall demand a fee of One Pound, which fee shall be paid into the Colonial Treasury for the purposes of general revenue. Vessels or hulks must not be moved without the sanction of the Harbour-Master in writing.

17.—Any vessel requiring water may obtain it from the Government Reservoir on application to the Harbour-Master and on payment of two shillings and sixpence a tun.

18.—No person shall throw or cause to be thrown into Stanley Harbour any dead animal, ballast, damaged goods, rubbish or other material. Shipmasters wishing to discharge ballast shall communicate with the Harbour-Master, who will point out where it may be placed.

19.—No person shall take shingle, sand or stone, for ballast or otherwise, from the beach in Stanley Harbour, without first having obtained permission from the Harbour-Master and pre-payment of the sum of 1/- per tun.

20.—Any merchant vessel, having on board more than one hundred pounds of gunpowder, must be anchored either in Port William or in Stanley Harbour, East of Navy Point, until the Master shall have deposited the same (for the term of his stay) in the powder magazine, for which a charge of sixpence per package will be made; but it shall be in the power of the Governor to grant certain privileges for the ready discharge of ammunition consigned for the use of the Government or Merchants of this Colony, should such be deemed advisable by him.

21.—No master or other officer commanding any vessel (except a vessel of war) shall keep, or cause or permit to be fired on board such vessel, any cannon loaded with ball, while such vessel shall lie or be in Stanley Harbour.

22.—Ships when at anchor in any part of the Harbour, outside and eastward of the limits allowed to hulks are required to exhibit a white light half way up the forestay, or other conspicuous place, from sunset to sunrise.

Bye-Laws and Regulations made under Section 3 of Board of Health Ordinance No. 1 of 1855, and Section 2 Board of Health Ordinance No. 3 of 1891.

1.—Before the erection of any new building shall be commenced, plans of the same shall be submitted to the Board of Health, with particulars as to water closets, earth closets, ash-pits and cesspools, together with a statement of the proposed drainage.

Before any alteration contemplated to be made with regard to any of the subjects of which the particulars are as above required shall be commenced, the alteration so proposed must have been sanctioned by the Board of Health.

2.—Every occupier of a tenement shall be bound to protect the water supply attached to the building in such a way as may be considered necessary by the Board of Health, to secure the utmost purity possible. The owner or occupier of any premises shall be required to keep in a thorough state of cleanliness and repair all water-courses, open ditches, or gutters upon his premises, and to prevent the accumulation of noxious matter, by the removal thereof to any place of deposit to which the Board of Health may order.

3.—All fowl-houses, fowl-coops, pig-stys, or any buildings in which animals are kept, must be placed in such position as the Board of Health may seem best for the prevention of a nuisance, and the protection of the inhabitants of the neighbourhood.

4.—Until a proper hospital or building has been provided, to which cases of contagious or infectious diseases can be removed, every person on whose premises any case of a disease of a contagious or infectious nature occurs, shall be bound to take whatever precautions the Board of Health may deem necessary to order such person to adopt for the purpose of preventing the spread of such contagious or infectious disease. If the Board of Health consider it necessary to order the burning or destroying of any articles in order to prevent the spread of any disease, the owner of such articles shall be entitled to recover compensation not exceeding the sum of five pounds (£5), by order of the Board of Health, with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

5.—Before any building intended to be used as a Slaughter House can be erected or converted into such, the Board of Health must have submitted to it, for approval, a statement detailing the position of such building, and must be satisfied of the necessity for the same, and may withhold or grant its sanction under such regulations as may be considered necessary.

6.—Before any person intending to carry on any noxious or offensive trade, as that of a soap-boiler, tallow-melter, or such like, shall commence to take steps for the starting such trade, it shall be necessary for such person to obtain in writing the sanction of the Board of Health, and the Board of Health taking into consideration the district in which it is proposed to carry on such trade, shall have power to define what is a noxious or offensive trade, and shall satisfy themselves before granting such sanction, that every precaution is taken to prevent any noxious exhalations from chimneys and such like.

7.—Before any markets shall be held the Board of Health must first approve of the same, and sanction some place for the holding of such markets, and such markets shall be conducted under rules and regulations to be issued by the Board of Health at the time of giving its sanction.

8.—If it shall become necessary to alter in any way the existing Burial Grounds, or to lay out any new Burial Grounds, the alterations or laying out of the same, as the case may be, must be submitted by the Burial Board or Committee of Management to the Board of Health for its approval, the same to be submitted to the Governor in Council for his approval.

9.—All lots lying to the Westward of the boundary of the Cemetery extending Westward to the Government Reservoir, North to the Sea shore, and South facing the North of Fitzroy road, also including all Pensioners allotments, whether occupied or not, must be carefully fenced in by a substantial fence, the sufficiency of which shall be determined by the Board, and the owner or occupier shall be required to keep such fence in repair. In the case of mutual fences, it shall be lawful for the person who repairs the fence, to recover a moiety of the cost of such repair from the mutual owners. Every owner or occupier must see to the cleanliness of the lot occupied by him, and it shall be competent for the Board of Health to inspect any lot, and to cause any removal of any nuisance found to exist. If any person fail to comply with the requirements of any of the above Bye-Laws or Regulations, or any hereafter to be made, or neglect to carry out any orders issued by the Board of Health, such offender shall be liable for each time of offending, to such fine not exceeding five pounds (£5) or term of imprisonment, as the Court may determine.

An Ordinance to extend the provisions of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891, entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs Duties and Trade."

Preamble.

Whereas it is expedient to extend the provisions of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891, entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the laws relating to Customs Duties and Trade."

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows—

1.—The Master of every vessel, on board of which any Officer or Officers of Customs may have been placed by the Collector of Customs under the power given him in Section 3 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891, shall provide, to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs, such Officer or Officers with suitable sleeping accommodation and board, apart from the crew, and for such board a sum of 2/- per diem shall be chargeable by the Master.

The result of the establishment of the Bank therefore shows that there are 220 Depositors with a balance of £30,073 7 4, or an average of £136 13 10, standing to the credit of each account.

Computing the population of the Colony at 1890 the average savings per head is £16 14 1 $\frac{3}{4}$, an increase of £2 16 11 $\frac{3}{4}$ over last year.

The Depositors have been credited with £633 14 8 in interest during the year, being £77 14 2 in excess of that credited last year, while the balance of deposits over withdrawals is £4,499 3 3 as against £2,756 16 1 at the end of the previous year.

The Investments on account of the Bank are in English Consols and Colonial Inscribed Stock, bearing interest at the rates of 3 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 4 per centum. On the 30th September, 1893, they stood thus:—

2.—The Master of every vessel, on board of which an Officer or Officers of Customs may have been placed, shall at the discretion of the Collector of Customs either give an undertaking for payment or make a deposit with such Collector of Customs of such sum as, in the opinion of the Collector of Customs, shall be sufficient, on the termination of the duties of such Officer or Officers of Customs, to pay his or their return passage from the Port at which the cargo of such vessel may have been discharged.

3.—This Ordinance shall be read with and form part of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891.

Despatches No. 84, 83 and 92 of 27th October and 7th December, recording the thanks of the Royal Family to the Executive and Legislative Councils and the inhabitants of the Colony for their congratulations on the occasion of the marriage of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, and those of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, for an expression of grief received from this Colony on receipt of the news of the loss of H. M. S. "Victoria," were read by His Excellency.

The Acting Colonial Secretary moved the First reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to extend the provisions of Ordinance 5 of 1891, entitled 'An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs Duties and Trade,'" and being seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the Ordinance was read a first time.

The suspension of the Standing Orders having been carried so that the consideration of the Bill might be proceeded with, the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary in moving the Second reading and going into Committee, which was seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, explained that the reason for the introduction of the Bill was owing to a statement made by the Master of the "Ruth Waldron" that he would make it uncomfortable for the officer if he was put on board, and by his subsequent action in providing him with accommodation in the forecabin with the crew. It had therefore become necessary to make arrangements for the accommodation of these officers and for their return passage so that, as had been the case, they should not purposely be landed at an out of the way place from which it is not easy for them to return.

The Council went into Committee.

Question put—that Clause 1 stand part of the Bill. Carried. The unofficial Members dissenting.

Question put—that Clause 2 stand part of the Bill. Carried. The unofficial Members dissenting.

Question put—that Clause 3 stand part of the Bill. Carried. The unofficial Members dissenting.

On the preamble being read the Honourable J. J. Felton asked "is it expedient" and after referring to the necessity of the terms of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 and its working, asked if the Government had any information as to whether smuggling was being carried on by lessees, or if the provisions of the laws were being obstructed.

His Excellency informed the Honourable Member that the reasons for introducing the recent Ordinance had already been explained and old ground could not be gone over in arguing as to the necessity or not of the provisions of the Ordinance already in existence. His Excellency added that it was to accommodate the consignee and owner that a Customs Officer was put on board.

The Honourable A. E. Bailion asked if Government could guarantee the respectability of Customs Officers and referred especially to the Customs Officer who had been put on board of the Falkland Islands Company's Schooner "Thetis." He also asked if any money would be laid down to be provided for 2/- a day: and stated that there was no provision made for expenses if a ship were blown away.

His Excellency replied that the Government would always endeavour to obtain the most respectable men possible, but the Government could not be put to expense in the eventuality just mentioned by the Honourable Member.

The Honourable A. E. Bailion said it only remained then for him to make his protest in writing to the Secretary of State.

His Excellency said he would be most happy to forward any protest or memorial he might receive on the subject.

Questions put—that the preamble, enacting clause and title stand part of the Bill. Carried. The unofficial Members dissenting.

The Council resumed.

The Honourable Colonial Secretary gave notice that he would move the Third Reading of the Bill entitled "An Ordinance to extend the provisions of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891, entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating "to Customs Duties and Trade," on to-morrow the 10th instant.

Draft.

Bill entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Land Ordinance, 1882."

Be it enacted, &c.,

1.—The following provisions shall have effect with respect to any land comprised in a lease of Crown lands which upon the expiration or determination of such lease or at any time after such expiration or determination and the grant of a new lease to the former lessee under the provisions of the Land Ordinance 1882, the Governor in Council shall deem it expedient to sell and with respect to any land comprised in a lease of Crown lands which shall be or shall have been surrendered by the lessee to the Crown for the purpose of being offered for sale;

(1) The land shall be put up for sale by public auction in such lots as the Governor in Council shall determine at the upset price for the time being for country lands.

(2) Every lot of land so put up for sale shall before the sale be surveyed by a Surveyor employed by the Government and a plan shewing the situation and boundaries of the lot, the number of acres which it contains as ascertained by the survey, the names of the owners or lessees of the adjoining lands, and the length of the boundary line between the lot and the land of each adjoining owner or lessee shall be made by such Surveyor and exhibited at the sale by the Auctioneer and a copy or plan of the tracing shall be given to the purchaser. The matters hereby required to be shewn on the map shall also be stated in printed particulars of Sale.

(3) The purchase money shall be payable by such number (not exceeding 15) of equal yearly instalments as the Governor in Council shall determine and as shall be notified in the Government Gazette before the sale. The first instalment shall be paid at the conclusion of the sale and each subsequent instalment together with interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per centum per annum on the unpaid balance of the purchase money for the time being from the date of the payment of the last previous instalment shall be paid at the expiration of one year from the day on which the last previous instalment was payable. But the purchaser may at any time pay the whole of the purchase money remaining unpaid with the interest thereon which has accrued since the date of the last previous payment of an instalment.

(4) The highest or only bidder for every lot put up for sale at or above the upset price shall be the purchaser.

Immediately upon the conclusion of the sale the purchaser shall pay the first instalment of the purchase money and sign an agreement to complete the purchase and to fulfil the conditions of sale. If any purchaser, whether the original purchaser or a purchaser substituted under this sub-section, shall fail to pay the first instalment or to sign the said agreement, the sale to him shall be void and the next highest bidder (if any) at or above the upset price shall be the purchaser.

(5) If any purchaser shall fail to pay the second or any subsequent instalment of purchase money or any interest for the time being payable by him on the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable or within 21 days thereafter, the Governor may, and if such default shall continue for 3 months from the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable, the Governor shall cause the land purchased by such purchaser to be again put up for sale by public auction at the same upset price and on the same conditions as at the previous sale.

(6) If any land shall be again put up for sale as aforesaid the previous sale thereof shall thenceforth become void and the purchaser at the previous sale shall give up possession thereof and shall have no further right or interest in or lien upon such land.

(7) If after payment in full of the purchase money and interest payable by the purchaser at the second sale the Government shall have received in respect of such purchase money and interest an amount exceeding the purchase money and interest which the Governor would have received from the purchaser at the previous sale if he had complied with the conditions of sale then out of such excess, after deducting therefrom the expenses of the second sale the Government shall repay to the purchaser at the previous sale the amount of the instalments of purchase money and interest which he shall have actually paid or so much thereof as such excess shall suffice to repay but in no other event shall a purchaser have any claim for repayment of instalments of purchase money or interest paid by him.

8.—Every purchaser whether at a first or second sale shall be let into possession of the land purchased by him upon payment of the first instalment of purchase money and upon his signing the above-mentioned agreement, but no grant of the land shall be issued to him until he shall have paid the whole of the purchase money and all interest payable under the conditions of sale.

9.—The sum of money (if any) payable by the purchaser of each lot put up for sale to the former lessee of such lot as the value of improvements thereon under Sec. 3 of the Land Ordinance 1882, shall be determined in the manner provided by that section before the lot is put up for sale and shall be stated in the Particulars of Sale, and shall be paid by the purchaser to the former lessee, or his legal personal representatives, within 7 days from the date of the sale or at such later date as may be agreed upon by the parties. If the purchaser at a first sale shall not pay the said sum of money within the said 7 days, or on the day agreed upon, as the case may be, the lot shall be again put up for sale by auction in the same manner, and with the same consequences as if such purchaser had made default for three months in payment of an instalment of purchase money.

10.—No stock shall be placed on any lot so sold as aforesaid until proper arrangements for the dipping of sheep to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council have been provided thereon, or on some adjoining land occupied by the same person, or occupied by some other person if such lot and such adjoining land are farmed in common, or until such lot has been completely fenced in by proper sheep-proof fence to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council, provided that with the consent of the owner or lessee of any land adjoining such lot the erection of a fence between such and such adjoining land may be dispensed with.

11.—The purchaser of every lot, his heirs or assigns shall, before the expiration of 2 years from the date of the sale, erect on such lot a suitable and substantial dwelling house to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council. Default in compliance with this sub-section shall entail the same consequences as default in pay-

ment of a second or subsequent instalment of purchase money for three months.

12.—In either of the following cases—viz.: (i) If at any sale, whether an original sale or a resale under sub-section (5) there shall be no bidding for a lot put up for sale equal to or above the upset price: (ii) if at any sale whether an original sale or a resale under sub-section (5) the purchaser and every purchaser (if any) substituted under sub-section (4) of any lot shall fail to pay the first instalment of purchase money on the day of sale: (iii) if the purchaser at a second sale of any lot shall fail to pay to the former lessee the money payable under sub-section (9) within 7 days from the date of the sale or on the day agreed upon (as the case may be): then the former lessee (if any) of such lot shall be entitled to have a new lease thereof on the same terms as if the Governor in Council had not deemed it expedient to sell such lot, or if such lot had been surrendered for the purpose of being put up for sale, then it shall revert to the lessee for the residue of the term of the lease as if it had not been surrendered.

13.—Land comprised in an expired lease which the Governor in Council shall deem it expedient to put up for sale shall, if the former lessee so desires, remain in his possession until it has been actually sold, subject to the payment of the same rent therefor as if it had been comprised in a new lease to him under the provisions of Section 2 of the Land Ordinance 1882; but the Surveyor employed by the Government shall be entitled to enter on and survey such land for the purpose of the sale thereof and for the purpose of determining the value of the lessee's improvements thereon.

14.—The cost of the fences to be erected between any lot which shall be sold as aforesaid and the adjoining lands shall be borne by the purchaser of the lot and the owner or lessee of the adjoining land in equal shares. In the absence of any agreement to the contrary the fence shall be erected by the purchaser, and he shall have the right to recover from each adjoining owner or lessee a proportion of the half of the entire cost thereof according to the length of the fence between the lot and the land of such adjoining owner or lessee.

An Ordinance to provide for the custody and control of Lunatics.

Whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for the arrest and safe custody and control of persons of unsound mind.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The following words and expressions in this Ordinance shall have the meaning hereby assigned to them unless there be something in the subject or context repugnant thereto.

Lunatic.—Shall mean every person of unsound mind and every person being an idiot.

Police Magistrate.—Shall mean the person for the time being in the discharge of the duties of Judge and Police Magistrate of the Falkland Islands.

Gaol.—Shall mean any place within the walls of the Gaol or Gaol yard which may be set apart for the custody of lunatics.

Officer.—Shall mean any Police Constable.

Medical Practitioner.—Shall mean a Medical Practitioner duly registered under the Medical Act 1868 of the Imperial Parliament.

Governor.—Shall mean the Officer Administering the Government of the Falkland Islands for the time being.

2.—Every Constable who has knowledge that any person wandering at large within any district is deemed to be a Lunatic shall immediately apprehend and take such person before the Police Magistrate or before a Justice of the Peace, which Justice is hereby empowered to issue all necessary orders for detaining such person in some secure place until he or she can be brought before the Police Magistrate.

3.—The Police Magistrate upon an alleged lunatic being brought before him as having been found wandering at large, shall call in and examine upon oath the Colonial Surgeon or any Medical Practitioner, and shall also examine the alleged lunatic and make such enquiries as may be thought advisable, and if satisfied that the alleged lunatic is a lunatic and a proper person to be detained, may issue his Warrant directing such person to be received and detained in the Gaol, or in any Institution or place which may be approved of by the Governor in Council as a proper place for the care and safe custody of lunatics.

4.—Every Constable who has knowledge that any person not wandering at large is deemed to be a lunatic and is not under proper care and control, or is cruelly treated or neglected by any relative, or other person having the care or charge of such lunatic, shall, as soon as practicable after obtaining such knowledge, give information upon Oath, to the Police Magistrate, or a Justice of the Peace, which Justice upon this information being made to him, shall visit and examine the alleged lunatic, and if satisfied that he is a lunatic, and that further enquiry should be made by the Police Magistrate, shall issue all necessary orders for keeping and detaining the alleged lunatic in some fit and proper place until he or she can be brought before the Police Magistrate.

5.—(i) The Police Magistrate upon information being laid

before him under the third Section of this Ordinance, shall visit the alleged lunatic and shall direct the Colonial Surgeon or any Medical Practitioner to visit and examine the alleged lunatic and to certify an opinion as to his mental state.

(ii) The Police Magistrate shall, upon an alleged lunatic being brought before him by order of a Justice of the Peace under the third Section, summon the Colonial Surgeon to examine the alleged lunatic and to certify an opinion as to his mental state.

(iii) If upon this certificate or after such further enquiry as the Police Magistrate thinks necessary he is satisfied that the alleged lunatic is a lunatic and is not under proper care and control or is cruelly treated or neglected by the person having care or charge of him or her and that the lunatic is a proper person to be taken charge of and detained under care and treatment the Police Magistrate may, by order, direct the lunatic to be received and detained in the Gaol or in any Institution or place which may be approved by the Governor in Council as a fit and proper place for the care and custody of lunatics.

6.—If during the examination into the lunacy of any person brought before the Police Magistrate it should be thought proper by the said Magistrate to remand the said person to Gaol for the purpose of his being subjected to careful watch and examination, the Police Magistrate is hereby empowered to remand the alleged lunatic by Warrant to Gaol for a period not exceeding eight days.

7.—When it shall appear to the Police Magistrate that a person brought before him charged with any offence punishable summarily is a lunatic he shall make similar enquiry to that directed by the second Section of this Ordinance, and if satisfied that the prisoner is a lunatic shall issue his Warrant directing that such person shall be received and detained in the Public Gaol.

8.—(i) If it shall be made to appear to the Police Magistrate that the father, mother, husband, wife, child or children of any lunatic confined in accordance with this Ordinance in any place within this Colony or elsewhere as hereinafter provided for is or are possessed of sufficient means to support or contribute to the support of such lunatic it shall be lawful for the said Police Magistrate to summon such relative or relatives, and if satisfied by evidence upon oath that he she or they are able to maintain or assist in the maintenance of the lunatic to issue an order requiring such relative or relatives to pay to the Colonial Treasurer for the maintenance or as contribution to the maintenance of the lunatic such sum of money weekly or otherwise as the said Police Magistrate shall think reasonable according to the circumstances of the parties.

(ii) The Police Magistrate shall have power from time to time to vary his order upon proof that the means of such relative or relatives have become altered in amount since the original order or any subsequent order varying it shall have been made.

9.—Should the party upon whom such order of maintenance is made fail to obey the same a Warrant of Distress shall issue by the Police Magistrate for the purpose of levying the amount due under the order and all costs incurred therein, and if return shall be made by the Officer executing the Warrant of Distress that he could find no, or not sufficient, goods and chattels whereon to levy it shall be lawful for the Police Magistrate to issue his Warrant for the commitment of the party making default in payment of the order

to Gaol, there to be kept with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twenty days, unless the sum of money ordered to be paid and all costs and charges of levy and commitment and conveying of the defendant to Gaol (the amount thereof being stated in the commitment) shall be sooner paid.

10.—It may be lawful for the Governor in Council upon the petition of any relative or friend of a lunatic confined within the Colony under the provisions of any of the preceding sections of this Ordinance, and on the certificate of the Colonial Surgeon that such lunatic is not a dangerous lunatic grant an order for the discharge of the lunatic upon such relative or friends entering into recognizances with approved sureties to be taken before the Police Magistrate for the safe custody, due maintenance, proper care, treatment and supervision of such lunatic, as well as for his peaceable behaviour.

11.—It shall be the duty of the Colonial Surgeon to report immediately to the Governor whenever in the opinion of the said Surgeon any person confined in Gaol under the provisions of any of the preceding sections of this Ordinance has recovered his reason and may with propriety and safety to the public peace be discharged, and the Governor upon the receipt of such report is hereby empowered to order the immediate release of such person from custody.

12.—Any Visiting Justice of the Gaol shall have authority upon the same being recommended by the Colonial Surgeon as being desirable and necessary to direct and permit any lunatic confined in Gaol, when his state of health requires it, to take exercise without the grounds of the Prison under the control of an Officer or Officers in such manner as the Colonial Surgeon may direct. Lunatics whilst being allowed this privilege shall be deemed to be in custody under the warrant by virtue of which they were originally detained and may be taken back to Prison and there again kept without any further or other authority than the original warrant.

13.—If upon the trial of any person charged with any offence not punishable summarily it shall appear that such person was insane at the time of the commission of the offence and such person shall be acquitted on that ground, or if any person charged with any such offence shall be found to be insane, or if, during the trial of any person upon the charge of any offence not punishable summarily it shall be found that such person is insane such verdict and finding shall be recorded and the Judge of the Supreme Court shall order such person to be conveyed to the Gaol there to be kept until discharged or removed by order of the Governor in Council.

14.—The Judge of the Supreme Court may whenever he deems it expedient make enquiries as to the property of any person detained as a lunatic and summon and examine such parties as he may think proper; and require all statements which he may consider necessary, in order to discover particulars of the property of the lunatic and generally exercise all powers necessary for the proper discovery application and protection of this property. The Judge of the Supreme Court may also order any property of the lunatic to be sold or dealt with as the Judge thinks most expedient for the purpose of raising or securing money for the payment of or provision for the expenses of the lunatic's future maintenance or for any purpose which in the opinion of the Judge is for the benefit and restraint of the said lunatic.

15.—(i) And as there is no Lunatic Asylum or Institution for the proper care and custody of Lunatics in these Islands be it enacted that whenever any person shall be confined as a

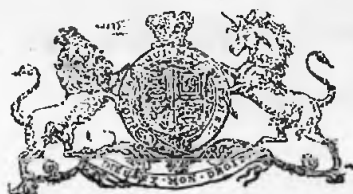
lunatic in the Gaol it may be lawful for the Governor in Council, whenever it shall be made to appear desirable and necessary, to order the said lunatic to be removed in safe custody to the United Kingdom there to abide such order as may be necessary for securing the detention of the said lunatic in a fit and proper Asylum or Institution for the care of lunatics in the said Kingdom.

ii) In all such cases a transcript of the proceedings in the matter of the lunacy of such person shall be transmitted by the Governor to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

16.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make alter or rescind all rules and orders and to incur all expenses which may be found necessary for carrying this Ordinance into execution.

17.—All Proceedings, Inquiries, Warrants and Orders which have been at any time begun made and issued by the Officials of this Government for the custody care and control of lunatics are hereby recognized as good and valid as if begun made and issued under the authority of this Ordinance.

18.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894; and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

A Commission appointing His Honour T. A. Thompson, Judge, to be a Member of the Council, was read, and the Honourable Member took his seat on the Council.

His Honour the Judge moved the introduction and first reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Land Ordinance, 1882." The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read a First time.

The suspension of the Standing Orders being duly carried, His Honour the Judge moved the Second reading and consideration in Committee of the Bill, and explained its general principles. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded.

The Council then went into Committee and considered Clause 1 and the sub-sections one by one.

Sub-section (1). The Honourable J. J. Felton asked if the Law under consideration would affect existing rights of lessees or deprive them of such rights as they already held under Ordinance 9 of 1882, as it had not been always certain as to the meaning of certain conditions. He asked His Honour the Judge the intention of the words "should be sold or reserved for any public purpose" in Sec. 2 of Ordinance 9, 1882.

His Honour replied that the proposed law did not interfere with existing rights, that the Governor in Council has the power to reserve for sale under the section referred to, but that was not affected at all by the present law. He was surprised at any legal man putting any other interpretation on the meaning of the words quoted.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon asked if the lots offered for surrender for sale to Mr. Melville would be the lots that would be put up for auction.

His Excellency said he was not prepared at the present moment to say which lots will be put up for sale as there were several questions to be settled first.

Sub-section (1) was passed.

Sub-sections (2) and (3) on being read were passed.

Sub-section (4). His Honour the Judge, in reply to the Honourable J. J. Felton, explained that in the case of a failure to obtain bids the land would revert to the original lessee.

The sub-section was passed.

Sub-sections (5), (6) and (7) on being read were passed.

Sub-section (8). The Honourable J. J. Felton asked that the present lessee might be allowed some time within which to move his stock off the land, as a new man being let into possession immediately on payment of a first instalment might cause injury and inconvenience to the lessee.

His Excellency agreed with the Honourable Member, and did not consider that the incoming tenant should be allowed to make use of his powers of possession over the stock until the original lessee had had reasonable time in which to remove them. His Excellency also considered that as the rents were paid in advance the balance of rent in respect of the unexpired portion of the lease should be refunded to those lessees whose lands were sold. After some discussion it was unanimously agreed that the above should be referred to the Secretary of State for his favourable consideration and the insertion in the Particulars of Sale of the time granted for the removal of stock in each case, it being considered better to leave the Ordinance intact.

Sub-section (9). The Honourable J. J. Felton asked if the present Surveyor was competent to assess the value of improvements, and proposed that the lessee should be able to demand a board to make such assessments, and to remove his buildings, &c.

His Excellency said that he was unaware if Mr. Creegan was a sworn Surveyor, but this could be ascertained. If he was not considered fit there was nothing under Section 3 of Ordinance 9 of 1882 to prevent him from obtaining the assistance of experts. The Committee agreed to this question being referred to the Secretary of State.

Sub-section (9) was passed.

Sub-sections (10), (11), (12), (13) and (14) on being read were passed,

On the Council resuming, his Honour the Judge moved the Third reading and passing of the Bill. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was passed.

After an explanation by His Excellency as to the necessity of asking for a sum of £500 from the surplus fund for Expenditure on Public Works; the Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the following resolution:—"For a sum of £500 as a special vote towards the expenses to be incurred on local roads, sea walls and jetties during the year 1894." This sum, the Colonial Secretary added, was not taken last year from the Reserve Fund although voted, it having been met out of General Revenue which had proved more elastic than had been anticipated. The Council was therefore really now asked to vote for what it had voted last year, the Reserve Fund still standing at £2,000. After some discussion as to the way labour was performed and the system of employment peculiar to the place, which it was unanimously agreed might be advantageously altered if possible, his Honour the Judge seconded the resolution, and the resolution was adopted.

On his Honour the Judge withdrawing.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the following resolution:—"For a vote of £20 per annum as an allowance for the services of an Auditor" It was explained that this duty would be performed by his Honour the Judge, and would thus provide for a pre-audit and post-audit in the Colony in conjunction with the Imperial Audit.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon seconded and the resolution was adopted.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved the following resolution:—"For a vote of £100, being the refund of the amount paid by Messrs. Luchtenberg and H. Grant for a Sealing Licence in 1893." This vote it was explained was passed last year under the circumstances then given, but lapsed owing to the parties failing to make a demand for the payment. Application having been recently made caused it now to be brought forward.

His Honour the Judge seconded and the resolution was adopted.

The Council adjourned *sine die*.

An Ordinance to make provision for the eradication of Scab or other Infectious or Contagious diseases in Sheep.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—For the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance the Governor may appoint a duly qualified person to act as Inspector, and also when necessary appoint a duly qualified person to act as Sub-Inspector for such periods and at such salaries and on such terms and conditions as may be thought proper by the Governor in Council.

2.—The Inspector shall have power at any time in the execution of his duty, between sunrise and sunset, to enter upon any lands, or into any enclosure or building, not being a dwelling-house; and if any person in possession or charge of such land or premises as aforesaid refuse to permit such Inspector, upon his demand and stating his business, so to enter upon or into the same—or refuse to collect within any enclosure upon such land any sheep, or if any person impede or hinder such Inspector in the discharge of his duty he shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

3.—If any owner shall refuse or neglect to gather in the sheep for inspection when required so to do by the Inspector, it shall be in the power of the Inspector to engage labour for the purpose of gathering in the sheep for inspection. The expenses of, and incident to this, shall be paid by such owner to the Inspector on his demand of the same, with an account thereof in writing.

4.—The Inspector is empowered hereby when sheep are suffering from scab or are, in his opinion infected sheep, to give such orders in respect thereto as he may deem advisable consistent with this Ordinance or the Rules and Regulations made in pursuance thereof; and any owner of such infected sheep who shall neglect to conform to and carry out the same shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding

5.—Any Inspector in the discharge of his duty as such may demand suitable board and lodging of the owner of any station, and there shall be payable by him in respect thereof the sum of s.
d. per day and night.

6.—It shall be lawful for the Inspector to call upon all persons concerned in the charge, control or management, of any sheep, to give information to him as to the facts within their knowledge relating to such sheep, and if any person being so called upon shall refuse or neglect to give such information, or shall make any statement, knowing the same to be false, he shall be liable to a penalty of pounds.

7.—When the owner of any sheep shall become aware of any of his sheep being infected he shall forthwith keep them separate from other flocks, and at once give notice thereof in writing to the Inspector and to the occupiers of all adjoining Stations. The owner shall also, pending the arrival of the Inspector, conform to the instructions contained in any Rules and Regulations that may be made for his guidance in such cases under this Ordinance.

8.—If the owner of any infected sheep shall omit immediately to separate them from other sheep, or omit to give the notices, or conform to the instructions referred to in the immediately preceding section, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds for every twenty-four hours during which such omission shall have continued.

9.—Where the sheep on any Station are infected the Inspector shall, immediately on his becoming aware of the fact, report the same to the Governor, and cause a notice in the Form in Schedule B, hereto annexed, to be inserted in the Government Gazette, which shall also contain a weekly notice of all infected Stations.

10.—Every such infected sheep shall be forthwith branded and kept branded till clean with the letter S, on the rump or back with red paint, (the said letter to be not less than 6 inches in length), and any person obliterating or defacing the brand until the sheep have been declared clean by the Inspector, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

11.—Every owner who shall omit to brand and keep branded any infected sheep shall be liable to a penalty of three pence for each sheep so infected and unbranded. Provided that the minimum fine shall not be less than pounds, nor the maximum more than pounds for every day during which any of such sheep shall so remain unbranded.

12.—Every owner of infected sheep shall, within days after he has become aware that the same are infected, dip all such sheep in some suitable manner and with approved medicaments, as provided in the Rules and Regulations made under this Ordinance, and every such owner failing to comply shall, on conviction, pay a sum not exceeding pounds.

13.—The owner of infected sheep shall, unless the same be running within well and securely enclosed paddocks, cause some competent person during the day to follow and keep them in sight whilst depasturing, and during the night see that they are enclosed in properly secured paddocks, or in default thereof he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

14.—It shall be lawful for the Inspector to require any owner of sheep to disinfect any premises, yard, or articles, occupied by or used about any infected sheep, and in the event of the owner's non-compliance with such order he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

15.—Any person who shall slaughter any sheep suffering from Scab or other infectious or contagious disease for sale, or expose for sale, or export the carcase of any such sheep, shall be liable for every such offence, to a penalty not exceeding pounds, one moiety of such penalty, after payment of expenses, to be paid to the informer.

LICENCES.

16.—The Inspector shall, on being applied to by the owner of any infected sheep, on any Station, issue to him (without fee) a First Licence in Form C, in Schedule hereto, bearing date the day of such application, to keep such sheep for the purpose of cleansing them for a period of calendar months.

17.—If on the expiration of that period any sheep be found to be infected and no renewed licence as hereinafter provided be granted, such owner shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty at the rate of for each sheep upon such Station, provided that such penalty be not less than pounds,

18.—If before the expiration of the period limited in such First Licence, such owner apply for a renewal thereof, the Inspector may, on payment of for each sheep on that Station, issue to such owner a renewed licence as from the date of the expiration of the First Licence, to keep such sheep for the purpose of cleansing them for a further period of months.

19.—If at any time during the time limited by such renewed Licence the owner of the sheep is not taking such measures as are considered by the Inspector necessary to insure their being clean within the time so limited, any two Justices of the Peace may, on complaint by the Inspector, order that such Licence be cancelled.

20.—If the owner to whom any such First Licence has been issued shall not prior to the expiration of such First Licence have cleansed the sheep referred to in such First Licence, and shall not have before the expiration of the period limited thereby, made application for a renewed licence and shall not have made the payment herein required in respect thereof, or if any renewed licence issued to any owner have been cancelled or have expired, and there be after month from the issue of the First Licence infected sheep on the Station to which such First Licence, renewed licence or cancelled Licence as the case may be related; the owner of such sheep shall pay a penalty computed at the rate of pence for every sheep on the Station, provided that no such penalty shall be less than pounds; provided also that if the Inspector has certified that any sheep were clean after the issue of the First Licence, and it be proved before the Police Magistrate, or two Justices, that such sheep subsequently became infected from circumstances over which the owner had no control, then such penalty shall not be inflicted, and a First Licence shall issue as if none had been previously issued.

21.—If any sheep kept on any Station, and in respect of which a First Licence has been issued shall, at the expiration of months from the date of such licence, or within a period of three months thereafter be found suffering from scab, then from time to time any two Justices, on the complaint of the Inspector, may order that such sheep shall be destroyed, and the Inspector shall cause such sheep to be destroyed, and the remains may be disposed of for the benefit of the owner as the Inspector may direct.

22.—Where any Licence has been issued under this Ordinance by the Inspector, if for a period of at least three months commencing at any time after such issue none of the sheep referred to in such licence shall, in the opinion of the Inspector or a competent person

deputed by him, have been infected then, but not otherwise, the Inspector may grant a certificate in the Form D, in Schedule hereto, that such sheep are not infected sheep.

TRAVELLING OR STRAY SHEEP.

23.—Any owner of sheep who shall drive, depasture, or suffer to be at large any infected sheep upon any Station in the occupation or possession of any other person without his consent, and without a permit from the Inspector in the Form E in the Schedule, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds, and such infected sheep may be destroyed by the person upon whose land such sheep have been driven, depastured, or suffered to be at large.

24.—If any person shall abandon any infected sheep, whether the same be alive or dead, and shall not in the case of any such infected sheep immediately destroy or bury the same, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds, and it shall be lawful for the Inspector or other person to seize, destroy or bury such sheep, or to cause the same to be seized, buried or destroyed.

IMPORTATION OF SHEEP.

25.—Every owner of sheep imported from parts beyond the sea, shall report the fact at once to the Inspector, and shall not land any of such sheep until they shall have been examined by the Inspector, or by some other person appointed by the Governor for the purpose, who may pass the sheep forthwith, or order them to be quarantined or dipped at his discretion, and any owner whose sheep shall be landed before such examination, or who shall remove them without permission of the Inspector, or other person appointed as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds for every sheep so landed or removed.

26.—Any master or owner of any ship, boat or vessel, who shall suffer any sheep, whether newly imported or not, to be put ashore on any land without the consent of the owner or occupier of the land, and without a certificate in the Form A, in the Schedule hereto, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

MISCELLANEOUS.

27.—Where in the Ordinance it is authorized or required that sheep be destroyed all expenses attending such destruction shall be payable by the owner of such sheep. No owner or other person having any interest therein shall be entitled to or recover any damages or compensation whatever for any sheep destroyed under the authority of this Ordinance.

28.—Any person who wilfully communicates either directly or indirectly, to any sheep, Scab, or any other infectious or contagious disease, shall be liable to imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding years.

29.—The ear marks adopted by sheep farmers shall within months after the coming into operation of this Ordinance, be registered in the Office of the Colonial Secretary, by whom they shall be first approved, and any owner who shall wilfully neglect or omit to report such ear marks shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds for every week's default.

30.—For defraying the cost and expenses of carrying this Ordinance into effect there shall in each year on and after the day of be levied and paid upon all sheep depastured and kept in any part of the Colony, for every one thousand sheep a contribution of and so in proportion for any greater or smaller number not less than 300 possessed by one owner, such contribution to be paid on or before the day of in each year, at the Office of the Colonial Treasurer.

31.—Every owner shall, on or before the day of in each year, make a return in writing, signed and declared to by him before a Justice of the Peace, of all sheep kept and depastured by the said owner, and shall deliver, or cause to be delivered, such return within days after the same shall have been made to the Colonial Treasurer. Any owner who shall make default herein shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

32.—If the owner liable to pay such contributions shall not on or before the day of pay the amount to the Colonial Treasurer, the same, together with an additional sum equal to one sixth part thereof, by way of penalty, may be recovered summarily in like manner as any penalty under this Ordinance.

33.—All persons infringing any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or any Rules or Regulations to be made hereunder, shall, where no punishment for the same is provided herein, be liable to a penalty not exceeding pounds.

34.—All penalties under this Ordinance, and all expenses directed to be paid by any owner, or any other person, may be recovered in a summary way before the Police Magistrate, or any two Justices of the Peace, on the complaint of the Inspector, and all penalties, or moiety of penalties, when the half is payable to an informer, shall be paid into the Colonial Treasury for the public use of the Colony.

35.—All sums of money paid by owners for the renewal of Licences to keep sheep for the purpose of cleansing them, as hereinbefore provided for, shall be applied, with the yearly contributions from owners, in defraying the cost and expenses of carrying this Ordinance into effect.

36.—The Governor may make, and from time to time amend or rescind any Rules or Regulations made under this Ordinance.

For determining the powers and duties of the Chief Inspector and Sub-Inspector.

For establishing proper places for dipping on Stations, and prescribing the mode and times of dipping and the medicaments to be used and for prescribing the precautions and measures to be adopted by the owner of infected sheep before notice to and arrival of Inspector.

For establishing proper paddocks on Stations in which sheep may be kept after being gathered for inspection.

For the inspection and landing of sheep.

For establishing proper quarantine as regards Stations and sheep.

For all purposes connected with the execution of this Ordinance.

And every such Rule or Regulation shall, upon publication in the Government Gazette, have the same effect as if it were inserted in this Ordinance.

37.—In this Ordinance, except where inconsistent with the context, the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them as under.

"*Destroy*."—Shall mean kill and either bury at a depth of not less than two feet under the ground or consume by fire or boil down.

"*Infected Sheep*."—Shall mean any sheep infected with scab or other infectious or contagious disease, or which within months shall have been exposed to infection or contagion, unless a clean certificate shall have been granted by the Inspector.

"*Inspector*."—Shall include the Chief Inspector and Sub-Inspector.

"*Owner*."—Shall include not only the person to whom the sheep belong, but likewise the Manager or Overseer in charge of the sheep, whether travelling or otherwise.

"*Station*."—Shall mean the land occupied or used for depasturing sheep by any person, together with all land occupied by such person adjacent thereto.

38.—This Ordinance shall be cited for all purposes as "The "Scab Ordinance, 1894," and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Honour the Judge moved the introduction and first reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the custody and control of Lunatics." The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Bill was read by title.

The suspension of the Standing Orders having been proposed by His Honour the Judge and seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, His Honour the Judge moved the second reading and going into Committee of the Bill. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded.

The following amendments were made in Committee:—

Clause 2, line 1. The word "officer" was substituted for the word "constable."

Clause 4, line 1. The word "officer" was substituted for the word "constable."

Clause 5, Sub-section (ii) line 3. The word "direct" was substituted for the word "summon" and after the word "Surgeon" the following words were inserted "or any Medical Practitioner."

Replying also to the Honourable Member, His Excellency stated that when a vote was exceeded it was the correct principle to ask for a Supplementary vote before incurring extra expenditure, at the same time it was not always possible, as the Crown Agent's accounts sometimes exceeded the estimated cost, added to which the saving generally ascertainable only at the end of the year under one sub-head often balanced the excess in expenditure on another sub-head under the same vote.

Scab Ordinance, 1894.

The attention of the owners of Sheep Stations is called to the following synopsis of a Scab Ordinance passed unanimously by the Legislative Council and which will come into operation upon the publication of a Notice in the Government Gazette that Her Majesty has not been advised to disallow the same.

The Ordinance will be rigidly enforced against all who wilfully violate its provisions, but every care will be taken not to embarrass or harass those who endeavour, as far as possible, to conform to its requirements.

It will be advisable for the owners of Stations who may possess only a limited supply of proper medicaments for dipping sheep or of material for erecting paddocks and suitable dipping places to obtain these articles as soon as practicable.

The term "Infected Sheep" means not only sheep suffering from Scab but also those which within three months have been subject to infection from scabby sheep.

Every owner as soon as he becomes aware that any of his sheep are infected shall keep them separate from other flocks which are not infected and at once give notice in writing to the occupiers of adjoining Stations and to an Inspector. The owner shall also follow the instructions given by the Inspector in such cases.

The owner shall within twenty-one days after he learns that his sheep are infected dip them properly with approved medicaments and also as soon as practicable brand or mark them on the rump or back with the letter S six inches long at least and renew this so as to prevent the letter becoming illegible. He must also when required by the Inspector disinfect all premises or articles used by infected sheep.

No person shall slaughter for sale or expose for sale or export the carcass of infected sheep.

The Inspector on becoming satisfied that the sheep on any Station are infected will issue an order to clean them within six months. If they are not clean at the end of that period the owner will be liable to pay two-pence for every infected sheep and so on for every succeeding period of three months. At the end of a year or within three months thereafter such infected sheep may be destroyed by order of two Justices of the Peace.

It will be most important to owners if scab has disappeared in a flock and there has been no fresh outbreak after the lapse of three months to obtain a clean certificate from the Inspector. If this be obtained and scab reappears then a new order to clean will issue and the owner will then be in the same position, so far as regards these particular sheep, as when the original order issued.

No person will be allowed to drive sheep whether infected or not across a Station not belonging to the owner of the Station without a written notice to the adjoining proprietor. See 17 Section.

No infected sheep shall be driven upon other Stations without the consent of the owners thereof and a permit from the Inspector. See 19 Section.

No person shall abandon infected sheep or leave the carcase of infected sheep unburied or undestroyed by fire. When it is impossible to bury or destroy the carcase it must be skinned and the skin taken away carefully in a bag.

Sheep imported from abroad shall not be landed without a permit. See Section 21. Nor shall sheep whether newly imported or not be landed on any Station without notice to the owner of the Station and a permit. See Section 22.

The ear marks of sheep must be sent to the Colonial Secretary within three months after the Ordinance comes into force.

The Governor in Council is empowered to make Rules for establishing proper paddocks on Stations in which sheep may be kept.

The owners of sheep will be required to pay into the Treasury on the 31st of July in each year a rate of £1. 0. 0 for every one thousand sheep. A true return of the number of sheep kept on the 1st of March preceding, signed and declared to by the owner before a Justice of the Peace, must be sent to the Colonial Secretary before the 31st day of May in each year.

Scab Ordinance, 1894.

The attention of the owners of Sheep Stations is called to the following synopsis of a Scab Ordinance passed unanimously by the Legislative Council and which will come into operation upon the publication of a Notice in the Government Gazette that Her Majesty has not been advised to disallow the same.

The Ordinance will be rigidly enforced against all who wilfully violate its provisions, but every care will be taken not to embarrass or harass those who endeavour, as far as possible, to conform to its requirements.

It will be advisable for the owners of Stations who may possess only a limited supply of proper medicaments for dipping sheep or of material for erecting paddocks and suitable dipping places to obtain these articles as soon as practicable.

The term "Infected Sheep" means not only sheep suffering from Scab but also those which within three months have been subject to infection from scabby sheep.

Every owner as soon as he becomes aware that any of his sheep are infected shall keep them separate from other flocks which are not infected and at once give notice in writing to the occupiers of adjoining Stations and to an Inspector. The owner shall also follow the instructions given by the Inspector in such cases.

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No person will be allowed to drive sheep whether infected or not across a Station not belonging to the owner of the Station without a written notice to the adjoining proprietor. See 17 Section.

No infected sheep shall be driven upon other Stations without the consent of the owners thereof and a permit from the Inspector. See 18 Section.

No person shall abandon infected sheep or leave the carcase of infected sheep unburied or undestroyed by fire. When it is impossible to bury or destroy the carcase it must be skinned and the skin taken away carefully in a bag.

Sheep imported from abroad shall not be landed without a permit. See Section 21. Nor shall sheep whether newly imported or not be landed on any Station without notice to the owner of the Station and a permit. See Section 22.

The ear marks of sheep must be sent to the Colonial Secretary within three months after the Ordinance comes into force.

The Governor in Council is empowered to make Rules for establishing proper paddocks on Stations in which sheep may be kept.

The owners of sheep will be required to pay into the Treasury on the 31st of July in each year a rate of £1 0 0 for every one thousand sheep. A true return of the number of sheep kept on the 1st of March preceding, signed and declared to by the owner before a Justice of the Peace, must be sent to the Colonial Secretary before the 31st day of May in each year.

It will be advisable for the owners of Stations who may possess only a limited supply of proper medicaments for dipping sheep or of material for erecting paddocks and suitable dipping places to obtain these articles as soon as practicable.

The term "Infected Sheep" means not only sheep suffering from Scab but also those which within three months have been subject to infection from scabby sheep.

Every owner as soon as he becomes aware that any of his sheep are infected shall keep them separate from other flocks which are not infected and at once give notice in writing to the occupiers of adjoining Stations and to an Inspector. The owner shall also follow the instructions given by the Inspector in such cases.

The owner shall within twenty-one days after he learns that his sheep are infected dip them properly with approved medicaments and also as soon as practicable brand or mark them on the rump or back with the letter S six inches long at least and renew this so as to prevent the letter becoming illegible. He must also when required by the Inspector disinfect all premises or articles used by infected sheep.

No person shall slaughter for sale or expose for sale or export the carcass of infected sheep.

The Inspector on becoming satisfied that the sheep on any Station are infected will issue an order to clean them within six months. If they are not clean at the end of that period the owner will be liable to pay two-pence for every infected sheep and so on for every succeeding period of three months. At the end of a year or within three months thereafter such infected sheep may be destroyed by order of two Justices of the Peace.

It will be most important to owners if scab has disappeared in a flock and there has been no fresh outbreak after the lapse of three months to obtain a clean certificate from the Inspector. If this be obtained and scab reappears then a new order to clean will issue and the owner will then be in the same position, so far as regards these particular sheep, as when the original order issued.

No person will be allowed to drive sheep whether infected or not across a Station not belonging to the owner of the Station without a written notice to the adjoining proprietor. See 17 Section.

No infected sheep shall be driven upon other Stations without the consent of the owners thereof and a permit from the Inspector. See 18 Section.

No person shall abandon infected sheep or leave the carcass of infected sheep unburied or undestroyed by fire. When it is impossible to bury or destroy the carcass it must be skinned and the skin taken away carefully in a bag.

Sheep imported from abroad shall not be landed without a permit. See Section 21. Nor shall sheep whether newly imported or not be landed on any Station without notice to the owner of the Station and a permit. See Section 22.

The ear marks of sheep must be sent to the Colonial Secretary within three months after the Ordinance comes into force.

Scab Ordinance, 1894.

The attention of the owners of Sheep Stations is called to the following synopsis of a Scab Ordinance passed unanimously by the Legislative Council and which will come into operation upon the publication of a Notice in the Government Gazette that Her Majesty has not been advised to disallow the same.

The Ordinance will be rigidly enforced against all who wilfully violate its provisions, but every care will be taken not to embarrass or harass those who endeavour, as far as possible, to conform to its requirements.

It will be advisable for the owners of Stations who may possess only a limited supply of proper medicaments for dipping sheep or of material for erecting paddocks and suitable dipping places to obtain these articles as soon as practicable.

The term "Infected Sheep" means not only sheep suffering from Scab but also those which within three months have been subject to infection from scabby sheep.

Every owner as soon as he becomes aware that any of his sheep are infected shall keep them separate from other flocks which are not infected and at once give notice in writing to the occupiers of adjoining Stations and to an Inspector. The owner shall also follow the instructions given by the Inspector in such cases.

The owner shall within twenty-one days after he learns that his sheep are infected dip them properly with approved medicaments and also as soon as practicable brand or mark them on the rump or back with the letter S six inches long at least and renew this so as to prevent the letter becoming illegible. He must also when required by the Inspector disinfect all premises or articles used by infected sheep.

No person shall slaughter for sale or expose for sale or export the carcass of infected sheep.

The Inspector on becoming satisfied that the sheep on any Station are infected will issue an order to clean them within six months. If they are not clean at the end of that period the owner will be liable to pay two-pence for every infected sheep and so on for every succeeding period of three months. At the end of a year or within three months thereafter such infected sheep may be destroyed by order of two Justices of the Peace.

It will be most important to owners if scab has disappeared in a flock and there has been no fresh outbreak after the lapse of three months to obtain a clean certificate from the Inspector. If this be obtained and scab reappears then a new order to clean will issue and the owner will then be in the same position, so far as regards these particular sheep, as when the original order issued.

No person will be allowed to drive sheep whether infected or not across a Station not belonging to the owner of the Station without a written notice to the adjoining proprietor. See 17 Section.

No infected sheep shall be driven upon other Stations without the consent of the owners thereof and a permit from the Inspector. See 18 Section.

No person shall abandon infected sheep or leave the carcass of infected sheep unburied or undestroyed by fire. When it is impossible to bury or destroy the carcass it must be skinned and the skin taken away carefully in a bag.

Sheep imported from abroad shall not be landed without a permit. See Section 21. Nor shall sheep whether newly imported or not be landed on any Station without notice to the owner of the Station and a permit. See Section 22.

The ear marks of sheep must be sent to the Colonial Secretary within three months after the Ordinance comes into force.

The Governor in Council is empowered to make Rules for establishing proper paddocks on Stations in which sheep may be kept.

The owners of sheep will be required to pay into the Treasury on the 31st of July in each year a rate of £1 0 0 for every one thousand sheep. A true return of the number of sheep kept on the 1st of March preceding, signed and declared to by the owner before a Justice of the Peace, must be sent to the Colonial Secretary before the 21st day of May in each year.

An Ordinance for the Preservation of Public Health.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—There shall be a Board of Health for the Falkland Islands composed of the following Members:—

The Colonial Surgeon, who shall be President of the Board; the Colonial Secretary, and such other Members not exceeding five as shall be appointed annually by the Governor, or Officer Administering the Government, and it shall be lawful for the Governor or Officer Administering the Government from time to time to fill up any vacancy or vacancies which may occur during any year on the said Board.

2.—The Board shall meet from time to time as may be necessary by order of the Governor, or Officer Administering the Government, or on a Summons from the President, or in his absence the senior Member present in Stanley.

3.—At all Meetings of the Board four Members shall form a quorum for the transaction of business and in the absence of the President the senior Member present shall preside, seniority being determined by the date and order of appointment as published in the Government Gazette.

4.—Minutes of the Proceedings of the Board shall be entered in a book kept for the purpose by the President and a copy of the minutes shall be forwarded as soon as practicable to the Governor or Officer Administering the Government of the Colony.

6.—If it shall be represented to the Board of Health either by one of their own officers or by any other person that the water in any well, tank, pump or cistern used or likely to be used for any drinking purposes or for manufacturing drinks, or for domestic purposes, is so polluted as to be injurious to health, it shall be lawful for the Board to cause such water to be tested or analysed, and if necessary to direct the said well, tank, pump or cistern to be temporarily or permanently closed, or the water to be used for certain purposes only, or to make such other order as may appear to them to be requisite to prevent injury to the health of persons drinking the water.

Provided that no Public Fountain, Reservoir, or Well shall be closed without the sanction of the Governor, to whom the Board shall make such report upon its condition as may be necessary.

Any person failing to comply with an order made under the above section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and should he still fail to comply with the order, it shall be lawful for the Board to do whatever may be necessary for the execution of that order and to recover any expenses incurred in so doing from the person on whom the order was made.

7.—The Governor is hereby empowered from time to time to appoint an Inspector or Inspectors of Nuisances to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance at such salary or salaries as may be determined by the Governor in Council and it shall be the duty of any Inspector so appointed to ascertain what nuisances exist calling for abatement, and upon order of the Board to enter any building, house, or premises for the purposes of inspection.

8.—The following shall for the purpose of this Ordinance be deemed to be nuisances:—

Any building, house, yard or premises in or about which any deposit or collection, fluid or otherwise, so foul or in such a state as to be injurious to health shall be allowed to remain.

Any pool, ditch, gutter, water-course, pig-stye, stable, cow-house, sheep or goat-pen, fowl-house, poultry yard, privy, urinal, cesspool, drain, ash-pit, or dung-heap, so foul or in such a state as to be injurious to health.

Any animal so kept as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

Any house so over-crowded with residents as to be injurious to the health of the inmates.

Any accumulation or deposit, fluid or otherwise, so foul or in such a state as to be injurious to health.

Any factory, workshop, or other place not kept in a clean and perfectly sanitary condition.

9.—It shall be lawful for the Board of Health to make bye-laws for regulating the duties of Inspectors of Nuisances in like manner as the bye-laws hereinafter mentioned, and any person wilfully obstructing any Inspector of Nuisances in the execution of his duty shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, or in default of payment imprisonment for any term not exceeding one month.

10.—On receipt of information from an Inspector of Nuisances or any two inhabitant freeholders of any nuisance the Board of Health shall if satisfied of the existence of a nuisance serve a notice on the person by whose act, default, or sufferance, the nuisance continues, or if such person cannot be found on the owner or occupier of the premises on which the nuisance arises requiring him to abate the same within a time specified in such notice and to execute such works and do such things as may be necessary for the purpose. Provided that where the nuisance arises from the want or defective construction of any structural convenience or where there is no occupier of the premises notice shall be served on the owner and where the person causing the nuisance cannot be found and it is clear that the nuisance does not arise or continue by the act default or sufferance of the owner or occupier of the premises the Board may themselves abate the same without further order.

11.—In the event of the owner of any premises being absent from the Colony the agent or the person entitled to receive on the owner's behalf the rents for the same shall be considered for all the purposes of this Ordinance as the owner.

12.—Should any house or building complained of as uninhabitable and a nuisance be unoccupied and the owner be absent from the Colony without leaving any known agent the Board shall report the matter to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction and upon satisfactory proof being afforded to the said Court that the removal or demolition of the said premises or any part thereof is necessary the Court is hereby empowered to issue orders to the Board of Health for the removal or demolition of the said premises or such part thereof as may be necessary and the Board shall immediately carry such orders into effect.

13.—If the person on whom a notice to abate a nuisance has been served makes default in complying with such notice the Board shall cause a complaint to be made before a Justice of the Peace and such Justice shall thereupon issue a summons requiring such person to appear before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

14.—If the Court is satisfied that the nuisance exists it shall make an order on such person requiring him to comply with all or any of the requisitions of the notice or otherwise abate the nuisance within a specified time. The Court may also impose a penalty not exceeding £5 on the person on whom the order is made and shall also give directions as to the payment of all costs incurred up to the time of hearing or making the order. Any person not obeying the order of the Court to comply with the requisitions of the

Board shall if he fails to satisfy the Court that he has used all diligence to carry out such order be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings per day during his default. And the Board of Health may abate the nuisance and recover the expenses of so doing from the defaulting party.

15.—Where the nuisance proved to exist is such as to render a house or building in the judgment of the Court unfit for human habitation the Court may prohibit the using thereof for that purpose until in its judgment the house or building is rendered fit for human habitation.

16.—The occupier of any house or the owner or agent of the owner of any uninhabited house within the town of Stanley shall at all times keep the same and the yards and enclosures thereto attached and all ways, paths, roads, drains and water-courses in front of such house and also the piece or lot of land whereof he may be occupier or owner or agent clean or clear of filth or of decaying or offensive animal or vegetable matter under a penalty not exceeding £2 or in default of payment of imprisonment for any term not exceeding two weeks for each offence.

17.—Any Inspector of Nuisances shall have power to enter any market-place, wharf, shop, yard or building used for the sale of butcher's meat and also to enter into any slaughter-house and examine any animal, carcase, meat, or flesh intended for the food of man and if it shall appear that the same is unfit for food it shall be seized and the matter at once reported to a Justice of the Peace and if it appears to the said Justice that any such animal or any of the said articles are unsound or unfit for the food of man he shall order the same to be destroyed and the person to whom the same belongs or in whose possession or on whose premises the same was found shall be liable on conviction before two Justices or the Police Magistrate of the Colony to a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence or at the discretion of the Justices or Police Magistrate without the infliction of a fine to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two months.

18.—The Board of Health shall have power whenever the Board shall deem it necessary for the preservation of the public health so to do to require by written notice the owner or agent of the owner of any lot of land in the town of Stanley to properly fence to the satisfaction of the said Board any such lot within a specified time and if any owner being so required shall refuse or neglect to carry out the requirements of the notice the Board shall cause a complaint to be made before a Justice of the Peace who shall thereupon issue a summons requiring the person on whom the notice was served to appear before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction which Court shall make an order on such person directing him to comply with all of the requisitions of the notice within a specified time. The Court may also impose a penalty not exceeding £5 on the person on whom the order is made and any person disobeying such order of the Court shall if he fails to satisfy the Court that he has used all diligence to carry out such order be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings per day during his default. In the case of fences common to the lands of two or more owners it shall be lawful for the person who erects the fence under the authority of this Section to recover a moiety of the expense of erection from the adjoining owner or owners.

19.—The Board of Health may make bye-laws and from time to time amend or rescind bye-laws so made with respect to the following matters:—

I. The level width and construction of new streets and the cleaning drainage or sewerage thereof.

II. The structure of new buildings in any town or settlement and the drainage, water closets, earth closets, urinals, privies, ashpits and cesspools to be provided in the erection of such buildings.

III. The protection of water, the cleansing of water-courses, drains, ditches, streets, lanes and roads and the removal of noxious matter therefrom.

IV. The keeping of animals in or near dwelling-house so as to prevent their becoming a nuisance or injurious to health.

V. The checking and preventing the spread of any contagious or infectious disease.

VI. The carrying on of any offensive trade in any town or settlement so as to prevent or diminish the causes or injurious effects thereof.

VII. The abatement or removal of nuisances.

VIII. The proper regulation of markets and slaughter-houses.

IX. The keeping of burial grounds and the proper interment of the dead.

X. The cleaning and keeping of lots of land whether adjoining dwelling-houses or not.

XI. The cleansing and disinfecting of houses and buildings.

XII. The inspection, drainage, accommodation and cleansing of common lodging houses.

XIII. The inspection of shipping in the harbour of Stanley and the cleansing and disinfecting of the same.

XIV. The protection of drains from injuries by cattle or otherwise.

XV. The removal or demolition of buildings so ruinous as to be dangerous to the public safety.

XVI. The payment by parties in default of expenses incurred thereby by the Board under this Ordinance.

20.—The Board of Health is also empowered to make bye-laws for enforcing such other sanitary measures for the prevention and mitigation of disease and for the care and preservation of the public health as the said Board may deem fit and proper and the Board may by all bye-laws made under this Ordinance impose upon offenders against the same such reasonable penalties as it may think fit not exceeding the sum of two pounds for each offence and in case of a continuing offence a further penalty not exceeding five shillings for each day after written notice of the said offence from the said Board. Provided that all such bye-laws imposing a penalty shall be so framed as to allow of the recovery of any sum less than the full amount of the penalty and all bye-laws made by the Board shall upon approval by the Governor in Council and publication in the Government Gazette have the same effect as if inserted in this Ordinance.

21.—All fines and penalties under this Ordinance shall be recovered in a Court of Summary Jurisdiction before two Justices or the Police Magistrate of the Colony who are hereby empowered to issue a Warrant or Warrants of Distress for levying the same by distress and sale of the defendant's goods and chattels or if needful all such proceedings shall be had as in cases of a conviction imposing a penalty.

22.—All moneys recoverable for expenses incurred by the Board against any person or persons under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary way in the name of the President of the Board before two Justices or the Police Magistrate for the Colony in the same manner as fines and penalties are directed to be recovered by this Ordinance.

Ordinance No. 1 of 1886 and Ordinance No. 3 of 1891 are hereby repealed.

This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Public Health Ordinance of 1894," and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

Scab Ordinance, 1894.

The attention of the owners of Sheep Stations is called to the following synopsis of a Scab Ordinance passed unanimously by the Legislative Council and which will come into operation upon the publication of a Notice in the Government Gazette that Her Majesty has not been advised to disallow the same.

The Ordinance will be rigidly enforced against all who wilfully violate its provisions, but every care will be taken not to embarrass or harass those who endeavour, as far as possible, to conform to its requirements.

It will be advisable for the owners of Stations who may possess only a limited supply of proper medicaments for dipping sheep or of material for erecting paddocks and suitable dipping places to obtain these articles as soon as practicable.

The term "Infected Sheep" means not only sheep suffering from Scab but also those which within three months have been subject to infection from scabby sheep.

Every owner as soon as he becomes aware that any of his sheep are infected shall keep them separate from other flocks which are not infected and at once give notice in writing to the occupiers of adjoining Stations and to an Inspector. The owner shall also follow the instructions given by the Inspector in such cases.

The owner shall within twenty-one days after he learns that his sheep are infected dip them properly with approved medicaments and also as soon as practicable brand or mark them on the rump or back with the letter S six inches long at least and renew this so as to prevent the letter becoming illegible. He must also when required by the Inspector disinfect all premises or articles used by infected sheep.

No person shall slaughter for sale or expose for sale or export the carcass of infected sheep.

The Inspector on becoming satisfied that the sheep on any Station are infected will issue an order to clean them within six months. If they are not clean at the end of that period the owner will be liable to pay two-pence for every infected sheep and so on for every succeeding period of three months. At the end of a year or within three months thereafter such infected sheep may be destroyed by order of two Justices of the Peace.

It will be most important to owners if scab has disappeared in a flock and there has been no fresh outbreak after the lapse of three months to obtain a clean certificate from the Inspector. If this be obtained and scab reappears then a new order to clean will issue and the owner will then be in the same position, so far as regards these particular sheep, as when the original order issued.

No person will be allowed to drive sheep whether infected or not across a Station not belonging to the owner of the Station without a written notice to the adjoining proprietor. See 17 Section.

No infected sheep shall be driven upon other Stations without the consent of the owners thereof and a permit from the Inspector. See 18 Section.

No person shall abandon infected sheep or leave the carcass of infected sheep unburied or undestroyed by fire. When it is impossible to bury or destroy the carcass it must be skinned and the skin taken away carefully in a bag.

Sheep imported from abroad shall not be landed without a permit. See Section 21. Nor shall sheep whether newly imported or not be landed on any Station without notice to the owner of the Station and a permit. See Section 22.

The ear marks of sheep must be sent to the Colonial Secretary within three months after the Ordinance comes into force.

The Governor in Council is empowered to make Rules for establishing proper paddocks on Stations in which sheep may be kept.

The owners of sheep will be required to pay into the Treasury on the 31st of July in each year a rate of £1 0 0 for every one thousand sheep. A true return of the number of sheep kept on the 1st of March preceding, signed and declared to by the owner before a Justice of the Peace, must be sent to the Colonial Secretary before the 31st day of May in each year.

An Ordinance for the Preservation of Public Health.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—There shall be a Board of Health for the Falkland Islands composed of the following Members:—

The Colonial Surgeon, who shall be President of the Board; the Colonial Secretary, and such other Members not exceeding five as shall be appointed annually by the Governor, or Officer Administering the Government, and it shall be lawful for the Governor or Officer Administering the Government from time to time to fill up any vacancy or vacancies which may occur during any year on the said Board.

2.—The Board shall meet from time to time as may be necessary by order of the Governor, or Officer Administering the Government, or on a Summons from the President, or in his absence the senior Member present in Stanley.

3.—At all Meetings of the Board four Members shall form a quorum for the transaction of business and in the absence of the President the senior Member present shall preside, seniority being determined by the date and order of appointment as published in the Government Gazette.

4.—Minutes of the Proceedings of the Board shall be entered in a book kept for the purpose by the President and a copy of the minutes shall be forwarded as soon as practicable to the Governor or Officer Administering the Government of the Colony.

6.—If it shall be represented to the Board of Health either by one of their own officers or by any other person that the water in any well, tank, pump or cistern used or likely to be used for any drinking purposes or for manufacturing drinks, or for domestic purposes, is so polluted as to be injurious to health, it shall be lawful for the Board to cause such water to be tested or analysed, and if necessary to direct the said well, tank, pump or cistern to be temporarily or permanently closed, or the water to be used for certain purposes only, or to make such other order as may appear to them to be requisite to prevent injury to the health of persons drinking the water.

Provided that no Public Fountain, Reservoir, or Well shall be closed without the sanction of the Governor, to whom the Board shall make such report upon its condition as may be necessary.

Any person failing to comply with an order made under the above section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and should he still fail to comply with the order, it shall be lawful for the Board to do whatever may be necessary for the execution of that order and to recover any expenses incurred in so doing from the person on whom the order was made.

7.—The Governor is hereby empowered from time to time to appoint an Inspector or Inspectors of Nuisances to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance at such salary or salaries as may be determined by the Governor in Council and it shall be the duty of any Inspector so appointed to ascertain what nuisances exist calling for abatement, and upon order of the Board to enter any building, house, or premises for the purposes of inspection.

8.—The following shall for the purpose of this Ordinance be deemed to be nuisances:—

Any building, house, yard or premises in or about which any deposit or collection, fluid or otherwise, so foul or in such a state as to be injurious to health shall be allowed to remain.

Any pool, ditch, gutter, water-course, pig-stye, stable, cow-house, sheep or goat-pen, fowl-house, poultry yard, privy, urinal, cesspool,

drain, ash-pit, or dung-heap, so foul or in such a state as to be injurious to health.

Any animal so kept as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

Any house so over-crowded with residents as to be injurious to the health of the inmates.

Any accumulation or deposit, fluid or otherwise, so foul or in such a state as to be injurious to health.

Any factory, workshop, or other place not kept in a clean and perfectly sanitary condition.

9.—It shall be lawful for the Board of Health to make bye-laws for regulating the duties of Inspectors of Nuisances in like manner as the bye-laws hereinafter mentioned, and any person wilfully obstructing any Inspector of Nuisances in the execution of his duty shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5, or in default of payment imprisonment for any term not exceeding one month.

10.—On receipt of information from an Inspector of Nuisances or any two inhabitant freeholders of any nuisance the Board of Health shall if satisfied of the existence of a nuisance serve a notice on the person by whose act, default, or sufferance, the nuisance continues, or if such person cannot be found on the owner or occupier of the premises on which the nuisance arises requiring him to abate the same within a time specified in such notice and to execute such works and do such things as may be necessary for the purpose. Provided that where the nuisance arises from the want or defective construction of any structural convenience or where there is no occupier of the premises notice shall be served on the owner and where the person causing the nuisance cannot be found and it is clear that the nuisance does not arise or continue by the act default or sufferance of the owner or occupier of the premises the Board may themselves abate the same without further order.

11.—In the event of the owner of any premises being absent from the Colony the agent or the person entitled to receive on the owner's behalf the rents for the same shall be considered for all the purposes of this Ordinance as the owner.

12.—Should any house or building complained of as uninhabitable and a nuisance be unoccupied and the owner be absent from the Colony without leaving any known agent the Board shall report the matter to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction and upon satisfactory proof being afforded to the said Court that the removal or demolition of the said premises or any part thereof is necessary the Court is hereby empowered to issue orders to the Board of Health for the removal or demolition of the said premises or such part thereof as may be necessary and the Board shall immediately carry such orders into effect.

13.—If the person on whom a notice to abate a nuisance has been served makes default in complying with such notice the Board shall cause a complaint to be made before a Justice of the Peace and such Justice shall thereupon issue a summons requiring such person to appear before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

14.—If the Court is satisfied that the nuisance exists it shall make an order on such person requiring him to comply with all or any of the requisitions of the notice or otherwise abate the nuisance within a specified time. The Court may also impose a penalty not exceeding £5 on the person on whom the order is made and shall also give directions as to the payment of all costs incurred up to the time of hearing or making the order. Any person not obeying the order of the Court to comply with the requisitions of the Board shall if he fails to satisfy the Court that he has used all diligence to carry out such order be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings per day during his default. And the Board of Health may abate the nuisance and recover the expenses of so doing from the defaulting party.

15.—Where the nuisance proved to exist is such as to render a house or building in the judgment of the Court unfit for human habitation the Court may prohibit the using thereof for that purpose until in its judgment the house or building is rendered fit for human habitation.

16.—The occupier of any house or the owner or agent of the owner of any uninhabited house within the town of Stanley shall at all times keep the same and the yards and enclosures thereto attached and all ways, paths, roads, drains and water-courses in front of such house and also the piece or lot of land whereof he may be occupier or owner or agent clean or clear of filth or of decaying or offensive animal or vegetable matter under a penalty not exceeding £2 or in default of payment of imprisonment for any term not exceeding two weeks for each offence.

17.—Any Inspector of Nuisances shall have power to enter any market-place, wharf, shop, yard or building used for the sale of butcher's meat and also to enter into any slaughter-house and examine any animal, carcase, meat, or flesh intended for the food of man and if it shall appear that the same is unfit for food it shall be seized and the matter at once reported to a Justice of the Peace and if it appears to the said Justice that any such animal or any of the said articles are unsound or unfit for the food of man he shall order the same to be destroyed and the person to whom the same belongs or in whose possession or on whose premises the same was found shall be liable on conviction before two Justices or the Police Magistrate of the Colony to a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such offence or at the discretion of the Justices or Police Magistrate without the infliction of a fine to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two months.

18.—The Board of Health shall have power whenever the Board shall deem it necessary for the preservation of the public health so to do to require by written notice the owner or agent of the owner of any lot of land in the town of Stanley to properly fence to the satisfaction of the said Board any such lot within a specified time and if any owner being so required shall refuse or neglect to carry out the requirements of the notice the Board shall cause a complaint to be made before a Justice of the Peace who shall thereupon issue a summons requiring the person on whom the notice was served to appear before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction which Court shall make an order on such person directing him to comply with all of the requisitions of the notice within a specified time. The Court may also impose a penalty not exceeding £5 on the person on whom the order is made and any person disobeying such order of the Court shall if he fails to satisfy the Court that he has used all diligence to carry out such order be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings per day during his default. In the case of fences common to the lands of two or more owners it shall be lawful for the person who erects the fence under the authority of this Section to recover a moiety of the expense of erection from the adjoining owner or owners.

19.—The Board of Health may make bye-laws and from time to time amend or rescind bye-laws so made with respect to the following matters:—

I. The level width and construction of new streets and the cleaning drainage or sewerage thereof.

II. The structure of new buildings in any town or settlement and the drainage, water closets, earth closets, urinals, privies, ashpits and cesspools to be provided in the erection of such buildings.

III. The protection of water, the cleansing of water-courses, drains, ditches, streets, lanes and roads and the removal of noxious matter therefrom.

IV. The keeping of animals in or near dwelling-house so as to prevent their becoming a nuisance or injurious to health.

V. The checking and preventing the spread of any contagious or infectious disease.

VI. The carrying on of any offensive trade in any town or settlement so as to prevent or diminish the causes or injurious effects thereof.

VII. The abatement or removal of nuisances.

VIII. The proper regulation of markets and slaughter-houses.

IX. The keeping of burial grounds and the proper interment of the dead.

X. The cleaning and keeping of lots of land whether adjoining dwelling-houses or not.

XI. The cleansing and disinfecting of houses and buildings.

XII. The inspection, drainage, accommodation and cleansing of common lodging houses.

XIII. The inspection of shipping in the harbour of Stanley and the cleansing and disinfecting of the same.

XIV. The protection of drains from injuries by cattle or otherwise.

XV. The removal or demolition of buildings so ruinous as to be dangerous to the public safety.

XVI. The payment by parties in default of expenses incurred thereby by the Board under this Ordinance.

20.—The Board of Health is also empowered to make bye-laws for enforcing such other sanitary measures for the prevention and mitigation of disease and for the care and preservation of the public health as the said Board may deem fit and proper and the Board may by all bye-laws made under this Ordinance impose upon offenders against the same such reasonable penalties as it may think fit not exceeding the sum of two pounds for each offence and in case of a continuing offence a further penalty not exceeding five shillings for each day after written notice of the said offence from the said Board. Provided that all such bye-laws imposing a penalty shall be so framed as to allow of the recovery of any sum less than the full amount of the penalty and all bye-laws made by the Board shall upon approval by the Governor in Council and publication in the Government Gazette have the same effect as if inserted in this Ordinance.

21.—All fines and penalties under this Ordinance shall be recovered in a Court of Summary Jurisdiction before two Justices or the Police Magistrate of the Colony who are hereby empowered to issue a Warrant or Warrants of Distress for levying the same by distress and sale of the defendant's goods and chattels or if needful all such proceedings shall be had as in cases of a conviction imposing a penalty.

22.—All moneys recoverable for expenses incurred by the Board against any person or persons under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary way in the name of the President of the Board before two Justices or the Police Magistrate for the Colony in the same manner as fines and penalties are directed to be recovered by this Ordinance.

23.—All Members of the Board of Health appointed before the passing of this Act shall continue Members of the Board until the appointment of other Members and the Inspector of Nuisances employed at the time of the passing of this Act shall continue to hold his office without any new appointment.

24.—Ordinance No. 1 of 1886 and Ordinance No. 3 of 1891 are hereby repealed.

25.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Public Health Ordinance of 1894," and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

An Ordinance to make provision for due investigation into causes of Shipping Casualties.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—It shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time and whensoever occasion shall arise or require by Warrant under his hand and seal of the Colony to appoint a Court of Enquiry in any of the following cases:—

- (a) Whenever any ship is lost abandoned stranded or materially damaged on or near the coasts of the Colony.
- (b) Whenever any ship causes loss or material damage to any other ship on or near such coasts.
- (c) Whenever by reason of any casualty happening to or on board of any ship on or near such coasts loss of life ensues.
- (d) Whensoever any of the cases enumerated in the third section of "The Merchant Shipping (Colonial Inquiries) Act 1882" shall occur subject however to the provisions and restrictions contained in the said section.

2.—The Court of Inquiry shall consist of the Police Magistrate of the Colony who shall preside and any two persons of nautical experience and skill to be appointed by the Governor of the Colony and also when considered necessary by the Governor any person of engineering or other special skill or knowledge as the Governor may think fit to appoint.

3.—It shall be lawful for such Court to hear and enquire into the cases referred to in the first Section of this Ordinance and for such purposes the Court shall have the powers given by the first part of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854" to Inspectors appointed by the Board of Trade and the powers given by Section 23 of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862" and the Court shall be governed by the Rules of the said last-mentioned Section subject to the regulations of any Imperial Act or Local Ordinance which may be from time to time enacted.

4.—The Court may also exercise the following further powers:—

- (a) It may if unanimous that the safety of the ship or crew or the interest of the owner absolutely requires it supersede the master of any British ship then being within the waters of the Colony and may appoint another properly qualified person to act in his stead but no such appointment shall be made without the consent of the consignee of the ship if within the Colony.

- (b) It may discharge any mate engineer or seaman from his ship and order the wages of any mate or engineer so discharged or any part of such wages to be forfeited and may direct the same to be returned by way of compensation to the owners.

5.—Every master or mate or engineer whose certificate is suspended or cancelled under this Ordinance shall upon demand of the Court deliver his certificate to the Court under a penalty not exceeding £50.

1.—It shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time and whensoever occasion shall arise or require by Warrant under his hand and seal of the Colony to appoint a Court of Enquiry in any of the following cases:—

- (a) Whenever any ship is lost abandoned stranded or materially damaged on or near the coasts of the Colony.
- (b) Whenever any ship causes loss or material damage to any other ship on or near such coasts.
- (c) Whenever by reason of any casualty happening to or on board of any ship on or near such coasts loss of life ensues.
- (d) Whensoever any of the cases enumerated in the third section of "The Merchant Shipping (Colonial Inquiries) Act 1882" shall occur subject however to the provisions and restrictions contained in the said section.

2.—The Court of Inquiry shall consist of the Police Magistrate of the Colony who shall preside and any two persons of nautical experience and skill to be appointed by the Governor of the Colony and also when considered necessary by the Governor any person of engineering or other special skill or knowledge as the Governor may think fit to appoint.

3.—It shall be lawful for such Court to hear and enquire into the cases referred to in the first Section of this Ordinance and for such purposes the Court shall have the powers given by the first part of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854" to Inspectors appointed by the Board of Trade and the powers given by Section 23 of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862" and the Court shall be governed by the Rules of the said last-mentioned Section subject to the regulations of any Imperial Act or Local Ordinance which may be from time to time enacted.

4.—The Court may also exercise the following further powers:—

- (a) It may if unanimous that the safety of the ship or crew or the interest of the owner absolutely requires it supersede the master of any British ship then being within the waters of the Colony and may appoint another properly qualified person to act in his stead but no such appointment shall be made without the consent of the consignee of the ship if within the Colony.
- (b) It may discharge any mate engineer or seaman from his ship and order the wages of any mate or engineer so discharged or any part of such wages to be forfeited and may direct the same to be returned by way of compensation to the owners.

5.—Every master or mate or engineer whose certificate is suspended or cancelled under this Ordinance shall upon demand of the Court deliver his certificate to the Court under a penalty not exceeding £50.

His Honor the Judge then moved the introduction and First reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to make provision for the eradication of Scab and other Infectious or Contagious diseases in Sheep," the Acting Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read by title.

His Honor the Judge then gave notice that at the next Meeting he would move the introduction and First reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance for the preservation of Public Health."

With reference to the remarks made by the Honourable A. E. Baillon at a Meeting held on 9th February last, His Excellency laid on the table, for the information of the Council, papers connected with the respectability of Customs Officers, and stated that from enquiries made the Customs Officer referred to had been well reported on by his superiors who had expressed satisfaction at the way on which he had performed his duties.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon said that he could endorse that expression of opinion from what the master of the "Thetis" had reported on the Officer while he was engaged as Customs Officer on board the "Thetis."

The Council then adjourned until Friday, 2nd June.

Board of Health Bye-Laws framed under Ordinance 5 of 1894.

1.—Before any new street in the town of Stanley shall be commenced, its proposed width, manner of construction, drainage and sewerage, shall be submitted to and approved by the Board.

2.—Before the erection of any new building shall be commenced plans of the same shall be submitted to the Board of Health with particulars as to water-closets, earth-closets, ash-pits and cesspools, together with a statement of the proposed drainage. Before any alteration contemplated to be made with regard to any of the subjects of which the particulars are as above required shall be commenced, the alteration so proposed must have been sanctioned by the Board of Health.

3.—Every occupier of a Tenement shall be bound to protect the water supply attached to the building in such a way as may be considered necessary by the Board of Health to secure the utmost purity possible.

The owner or occupier of any premises shall be required to keep in a thorough state of cleanliness and repair all water-courses, open ditches or gutters, upon his premises, and to prevent the accumulation of noxious matter by the removal thereof to any place of deposit to which the Board of Health may order.

4. No person shall discharge or deposit in or on any public road or street or in any water-course, drain or ditch, any stones, earth, weeds, sweepings, filth, paper, rags, or rubbish of any kind, under a penalty not exceeding £2.

5.—It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Nuisances to have at once removed from all public drains, water-courses, ditches, streets, lanes or roads, any noxious matter which may be found therein, and the expense of removing the same shall be borne by the party (if any) who shall have placed or allowed the same to remain therein.

6.—All fowl-houses, fowl-coops, pig-stys or any building in which animals are kept, must be placed in such position as to the Board of Health may seem best for the prevention of a nuisance and the protection of the inhabitants of the neighbourhood.

7.—Until a proper hospital or building has been provided to which cases of contagious or infectious diseases can be removed, every person on whose premises any case of a disease of a contagious or infectious nature occurs, shall be bound to take whatever precautions the Board of Health may deem necessary to order such person to adopt for the purpose of preventing the spread of such contagious or infectious disease.

If the Board of Health consider it necessary to order the burning or destroying of any article in order to prevent the spread of any disease, the owner of such articles shall be entitled to receive compensation not exceeding the sum of five pounds (£5) by order of the Board of Health, with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

8.—Before any building intended to be used as a Slaughter House can be erected or converted into such, the Board of Health must have submitted to it for approval a statement detailing the position of such building, and must be satisfied of the necessity for the same, and may withhold or grant its sanction under such regulations as may be necessary.

9.—Before any person intending to carry on any noxious or offensive trade as that of a Soap boiler, Tallow melter, or such like, shall commence to take steps for the starting such trade, it shall be necessary for such person to obtain in writing the sanction of the Board of Health, and the Board of Health taking into consideration the district in which it is proposed to carry on such trade shall have power to define what is a noxious or offensive trade, and shall satisfy themselves before granting such sanction that every precaution is taken to prevent any noxious exhalations from chimneys and such like.

10.—Before any markets shall be held the Board of Health must first approve of the same and sanction some place for the holding of such markets, and such markets shall be conducted under Rules and Regulations to be issued by the Board of Health at the time of giving its sanction.

11.—If it shall become necessary to alter in any way the existing Burial Grounds or to lay out any new Burial Grounds, the alterations or laying out of the same, as the case may be, must be submitted by the Burial or Committee of Management to the Board of Health for its approval, the same to be submitted to the Governor in Council for his approval.

12.—It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Nuisances to enter and inspect between sunrise and sunset, once in every three months, the yards and out-buildings of all premises in the Town of Stanley, and to immediately report the condition thereof to the President of the Board, who shall at once summon a Meeting of the Board if any action is necessary.

13.—Before any place shall be opened as a Common Lodging House a plan of the same shall be submitted to and approved by the Board of Health.

14.—It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Nuisances to enter and inspect between sunrise and sunset, once in every three months, all Common Lodging Houses in the Town of Stanley, and immediately report the condition thereof to the President of the Board, who shall at once summon a Meeting of the Board if any action is necessary.

15.—When it shall be reported to the Inspector of Nuisances that any vessel in the harbour of Stanley is in an insanitary condition, he shall at once board and inspect the said vessel and report in writing her condition to the Board, and the Board shall thereupon make such order for cleaning and disinfecting the vessel as may be shewn to be necessary, and the Captain or Owner shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding 5/- (five shillings) for each day the offence shall continue after written notice of the offence from the Board.

16.—It shall be unlawful to wilfully drive, or lead or take, horses, cattle or vehicles, over open drains, or to tether horses or cattle in the vicinity of such drains, under a penalty not exceeding £1.

17.—Upon its being shewn to the satisfaction of the Board that a building is so ruinous as to be dangerous to the public safety, the Board may order the immediate removal or demolition of the building, and the owner or occupier shall at once proceed to obey the said order. In the event of the owner or occupier neglecting to obey such order he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding 5/- (five shillings) for each day the offence continues after written notice of the offence from the Board, and it shall be lawful for the Board to do whatever may be necessary for the execution of the order, and to recover any expenses incurred in so doing from the person or persons on whom the order was made.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and to make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—Every Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner to whom a child has been brought for vaccination shall send to the Registrar in the town of Stanley within seven days thereafter in the case of a child presented for vaccination in Stanley or its suburbs or within six weeks in the case of a child presented for vaccination in any other place in the Colony than the town of Stanley and its suburbs, a certificate of successful vaccination, or unfitness for, or insusceptibility of vaccination, as the case may be, in the Form A, B or C in the Schedule annexed to Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, as may be applicable to the particular case. And any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner who shall refuse or neglect to do so shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

2.—All such certificates shall upon receipt at the Registrar's Office be entered by the Registrar in a book to be provided for that purpose, and it shall be the duty of the Registrar once in every quarter to compare this book with the Registrar of Births and to send a list to the Chief Constable of all children whose births have been registered and with respect to whom no certificates under the first Section of the Ordinance have been received by the said Registrar within four months from their birth.

3.—The Chief Constable immediately upon the receipt of this list shall when the parents of the children or other parties required by law to take the children named therein to be vaccinated are resident in Stanley or its suburbs, apply to the Police Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace of the Colony for the issue of summonses for the offending parties, and in cases where the offending parties are resident elsewhere in the Colony than in Stanley or its suburbs the said Chief Constable shall forward a list of such last-mentioned cases to any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance whose duty it shall be immediately to charge the said parties before a Justice of the Peace.

4.—If any Registrar or any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance shall give information in writing to the Police Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace that he has reason to believe that any child under the age of fourteen years being within the District for which the informant acts has not been successfully vaccinated and that he has given notice to the parent or person having the custody of such child to procure the vaccination of the child and that this notice has been disregarded the Police Magistrate or Justice may order further enquiry to be made or shall summon such parent or person to appear with the child before him at a certain time and place and upon the appearance if the Police Magistrate or Justice shall find after such examination as he shall deem necessary

that the child has not been vaccinated nor has already had the small pox he shall make an order under his Hand and Seal directing such child to be vaccinated within a certain time; and if at the expiration of such time the child shall not have been so vaccinated, or shall not be shown to be unfit to be vaccinated, or to be insusceptible of vaccination, the person upon whom such order shall have been made shall be proceeded against summarily when such person is resident in Stanley or its suburbs by the Chief Constable, and when such person is resident elsewhere in the Colony than in Stanley or its suburbs by any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of the Ordinance; and, unless the person charged can show some reasonable ground for his omission to carry the order into effect he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Shillings.

5.—All penalties imposed under this Ordinance or Ordinance No. 1 of 1868 shall be recovered in a summary way before the Police Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace of the Colony, but in default of payment a sentence of imprisonment without hard labour only shall be imposed.

6.—Sections 12 and 14 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and Ordinance No. 10 of 1893 are hereby repealed.

7.—This Ordinance shall be read with, and form part of, the Vaccination Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

1.—Every Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner to whom a child has been brought for vaccination shall send to the Registrar in the town of Stanley within seven days thereafter in the case of a child presented for vaccination in Stanley or its suburbs or within six weeks in the case of a child presented for vaccination in any other place in the Colony than the town of Stanley and its suburbs, a certificate of successful vaccination, or unfitness for, or insusceptibility of vaccination, as the case may be, in the Form A, B or C in the Schedule annexed to Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, as may be applicable to the particular case: And any Public Vaccinator or Medical Practitioner who shall refuse or neglect to do so shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

2.—All such certificates shall upon receipt at the Registrar's Office be entered by the Registrar in a book to be provided for that purpose, and it shall be the duty of the Registrar once in every quarter to compare this book with the Registrar of Births and to send a list to the Chief Constable of all children whose births have been registered and with respect to whom no certificates under the first Section of the Ordinance have been received by the said Registrar within four months from their birth.

3.—The Chief Constable immediately upon the receipt of this list shall when the parents of the children or other parties required by law to take the children named therein to be vaccinated are resident in Stanley or its suburbs, apply to the Police Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace of the Colony for the issue of summonses for the offending parties, and in cases where the offending parties are resident elsewhere in the Colony than in Stanley or its suburbs the said Chief Constable shall forward a list of such last-mentioned cases to any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance whose duty it shall be immediately to charge the said parties before a Justice of the Peace.

4.—If any Registrar or any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance shall give information in writing to the Police Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace that he has reason to believe that any child under the age of fourteen years being within the District for which the informant acts has not been successfully vaccinated and that he has given notice to the parent or person having the custody of such child to procure the vaccination of the child and that this notice has been disregarded the Police Magistrate or Justice may order further enquiry to be made or shall summon such parent or person to appear with the child before him at a certain time and place and upon the appearance if the Police Magistrate or Justice shall find after such examination as he shall deem necessary

that the child has not been vaccinated nor has already had the small pox he shall make an order under his Hand and Seal directing such child to be vaccinated within a certain time; and if at the expiration of such time the child shall not have been so vaccinated, or shall not be shown to be unfit to be vaccinated, or to be insusceptible of vaccination, the person upon whom such order shall have been made shall be proceeded against summarily when such person is resident in Stanley or its suburbs by the Chief Constable, and when such person is resident elsewhere in the Colony than in Stanley or its suburbs by any Officer appointed by the Governor to enforce the provisions of the Ordinance; and, unless the person charged can show some reasonable ground for his omission to carry the order into effect he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Shillings.

5.—All penalties imposed under this Ordinance or Ordinance No. 1 of 1868 shall be recovered in a summary way before the Police Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace of the Colony, but in default of payment a sentence of imprisonment without hard labour only shall be imposed.

6.—Sections 12 and 14 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and Ordinance No. 10 of 1893 are hereby repealed.

7.—This Ordinance shall be read with, and form part of, the Vaccination Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

*An Ordinance for the Regulation of the Post Office.*No. of 1894.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The Governor in Council may from time to time make orders for carrying into effect in the Postal Service of this Colony the various Regulations of the International Postal Union, so as to enable the Colony to preserve an efficient membership of such Union.

2.—The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations respecting all matters relating to the general management and government of the Post Office and of the officers and servants thereof.

3.—All Orders in Council and Regulations made under authority of this Ordinance shall upon publication in the Government Gazette and while the same are in force have the same effect as if they were inserted in this Ordinance.

4.—(1) A person shall not send or attempt to send a letter or a postal packet which either—

a Encloses any explosive substance, any dangerous substance, any filth, any noxious or deleterious substance, any sharp instrument not properly protected, any living creature which is either noxious or likely to injure other postal packets in course of conveyance or an officer of the Post Office, or any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure either other postal packets in course of conveyance or an officer of the Post Office, or—

b Encloses any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not, or—

c Has on such letter or packet or the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs, of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(2) Such letter or packet shall be considered a prohibited article, and any person who acts in contravention of this Section shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds, or on conviction on Indictment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months.

(3) The detention in the Post Office of any postal packet on the ground of its being in contravention of this Section shall not exempt the sender thereof from any proceedings which might have been taken if the same had been delivered in due course of post.

5.—All letters or postal packets coming within the definition of a prohibited article if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such manner as may be directed and authorized by orders or regulations framed for the government of the Post Office by the Governor in Council.

6.—The following shall be considered prohibited articles, *i.e.*—all letters or postal packets containing or bearing any fictitious postage stamp, that is to say, any fac-simile or imitation or representation of any stamp for denoting any rate or duty of postage including any stamp for denoting a rate or duty of postage (of the United Kingdom) of any of Her Majesty's Colonies or of any foreign country, or purporting to be prepaid with any postage stamp which has been previously used to prepay any other letter or postal packet.

It has been determined by the Administrator in Council that the purchase money of the above land may be paid by fifteen equal yearly instalments, but, as will be seen by the conditions, the value of the lessee's improvements on the land, namely:—£1,067, shall be paid by the purchaser within seven days from the date of the sale or at such later period as may be agreed upon by the lessee and purchaser.

CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The Conditions of Sale will be found in the following clauses of Ordinance No. 2 of 1894.

The purchase money shall be payable by such number (not exceeding 15) of equal yearly instalments as the Governor in Council shall determine and as shall be notified in the Government Gazette before the sale. The first instalment shall be paid at the conclusion of the sale and each subsequent instalment together with interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per centum per annum on the unpaid balance of the purchase money for the time being from the date of the payment of the last previous instalment shall be paid at the expiration of one year from the day on which the last previous instalment was payable. But the purchaser may at any time pay the whole of the purchase money remaining unpaid with the interest thereon which has accrued since the date of the last previous payment of an instalment.

The highest or only bidder for every lot put up for sale at or above the upset price shall be the purchaser.

Immediately upon the conclusion of the sale the purchaser shall pay the first instalment of the purchase money and sign an agreement to complete the purchase and to fulfil the conditions of sale. If any purchaser, whether the original purchaser or a purchaser substituted under this sub-section, shall fail to pay the first instalment or to sign the said agreement, the sale to him shall be void and the next highest bidder (if any) at or above the upset price shall be the purchaser.

If any purchaser shall fail to pay the second or any subsequent instalment of purchase money or any interest for the time being payable by him on the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable or within 21 days thereafter, the Governor may, and if such default shall continue for 3 months from the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable, the Governor shall cause the land purchased by such purchaser to be again put up for sale by public auction at the same upset price and on the same conditions as at the previous sale.

If any land shall be again put up for sale as aforesaid the previous sale thereof shall thenceforth become void and the purchaser at the previous sale shall give up possession thereof and shall have no further right or interest in or lien upon such land.

If after payment in full of the purchase money and interest payable by the purchaser at the second sale the Government shall have received in respect of such purchase money and interest an amount exceeding the purchase money and interest which the Governor would have received from the purchaser at the previous sale if he had complied with the conditions of sale then out of such excess, after deducting therefrom the expenses of the second sale the Government shall repay to the purchaser at the previous sale the amount of the instalments of purchase money and interest which he shall have actually paid or so much thereof as such excess shall suffice to repay but in no other event shall a purchaser have any claim for repayment of instalments of purchase money or interest paid by him.

Every purchaser whether at a first or second sale shall be let into possession of the land purchased by him upon payment of the first instalment of purchase money and upon his signing the above-mentioned agreement, but no grant of the land shall be issued to him until he shall have paid the whole of the purchase money and all interest payable under the conditions of sale.

The sum of money (if any) payable by the purchaser of each lot put up for sale to the former lessee of such lot as the value of improvements thereon under Section 3 of the Land Ordinance 1882, shall be determined in the manner provided by that Section before the lot is put up for sale and shall be stated in the Particulars of Sale, and shall be paid by the purchaser to the former lessee, or his legal personal representatives, within 7 days from the date of the sale or at such later date as may be agreed upon by the parties. If the purchaser at a first sale shall not pay the said sum of money within the said 7 days, or on the day agreed upon, as the case may be, the lot shall be again put up for sale by auction in the same manner, and with the same consequences as if such purchaser had made default for three months in payment of an instalment of purchase money.

No stock shall be placed on any lot so sold as aforesaid until proper arrangements for the dipping of sheep to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council have been provided thereon, or on some adjoining land occupied by the same person, or occupied by some other person if such lot and such adjoining land are farmed in

common, or until such lot has been completely fenced in by proper sheep-proof fence to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council, provided that with the consent of the owner or lessee of any land adjoining such lot the erection of a fence between such and such adjoining land may be dispensed with.

The purchaser of every lot, his heirs or assigns shall, before the expiration of 2 years from the date of the sale, erect on such lot a suitable and substantial dwelling-house to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council. Default in compliance with this sub-section shall entail the same consequences as default in payment of a second or subsequent instalment of purchase money for three months.

The cost of the fences to be erected between any lot which shall be sold as aforesaid and the adjoining lands shall be borne by the purchaser of the lot and the owner or lessee of the adjoining land in equal shares. In the absence of any agreement to the contrary the fence shall be erected by the purchaser, and he shall have the right to recover from each adjoining owner or lessee a proportion of the half of the entire cost thereof according to the length of the fence between the lot and the land of such adjoining owner or lessee.

An Ordinance for the Regulation of the Post Office.

No. ⁵²₂ of 1894.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—The Governor in Council may from time to time make orders for carrying into effect in the Postal Service of this Colony the various Regulations of the International Postal Union, so as to enable the Colony to preserve an efficient membership of such Union.

2.—The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations respecting all matters relating to the general management and government of the Post Office and of the officers and servants thereof.

3.—All Orders in Council and Regulations made under authority of this Ordinance shall upon publication in the Government Gazette and while the same are in force have the same effect as if they were inserted in this Ordinance.

4.—(1) A person shall not send or attempt to send a letter or a postal packet which either—

a Encloses any explosive substance, any dangerous substance, any filth, any noxious or deleterious substance, any sharp instrument not properly protected, any living creature which is either noxious or likely to injure other postal packets in course of conveyance or an officer of the Post Office, or any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure either other postal packets in course of conveyance or an officer of the Post Office, or—

b Encloses any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not, or—

c Has on such letter or packet or the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs, of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(2) Such letter or packet shall be considered a prohibited article, and any person who acts in contravention of this Section shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds, or on conviction on Indictment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months.

(3) The detention in the Post Office of any postal packet on the ground of its being in contravention of this Section shall not exempt the sender thereof from any proceedings which might have been taken if the same had been delivered in due course of post.

5.—All letters or postal packets coming within the definition of a prohibited article if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such manner as may be directed and authorized by orders or regulations framed for the government of the Post Office by the Governor in Council.

6.—The following shall be considered prohibited articles, *i.e.*—all letters or postal packets containing or bearing any fictitious postage stamp, that is to say, any fac-simile or imitation or representation of any stamp for denoting any rate or duty of postage including any stamp for denoting a rate or duty of postage (of the United Kingdom) of any of Her Majesty's Colonies or of any foreign country, or purporting to be prepaid with any postage stamp which has been previously used to prepay any other letter or postal packet.

BY THE QUEEN, A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We are happily at peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States ;

And whereas a state of war unhappily exists between his Majesty the Emperor of China and his Majesty the Emperor of Japan, and between their respective subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions ;

And whereas We are on terms of friendship and amicable intercourse with each of these States, and with their subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories or dominions ;

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal subjects reside and carry on commerce, and possess property and establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within the territory of each of the aforesaid States, protected by the faith of Treaties between Us and each of the aforesaid States ;

And whereas We, being desirous of preserving to Our subjects the blessings of peace which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the said state of war unhappily existing between the aforesaid States ;

We therefore have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation ;

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving subjects to govern themselves accordingly, and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid war, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the Laws and Statutes of the realm in this behalf, or the law of nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril ;

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the 33rd and 34th year of Our reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the Conduct of Her Majesty's Subjects during the Existence of Hostilities between Foreign States with which Her Majesty is at Peace," it is, amongst other things, declared and enacted as follows :—

"This Act shall extend to all the dominions of Her Majesty, including the adjacent territorial waters ;

"Illegal Enlistment."

"If any person, without the licence of Her Majesty, being a British subject, within or without Her Majesty's dominions, accepts or agrees to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any foreign State at peace with Her Majesty, and in this Act referred to as a friendly State, or, whether a British subject or not, within Her Majesty's dominions, induces any other person to accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any such foreign State as aforesaid,—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person, without the licence of Her Majesty, being a British subject, quits or goes on board any ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's dominions, with intent to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State, or whether

British subject or not, within Her Majesty's dominions, induces any other person to quit or to go on board any ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's dominions with the like intent,—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person induces any other person to quit Her Majesty's dominions, or to embark on any ship within Her Majesty's dominions, under a misrepresentation or false representation of the service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State,—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If the master or owner of any ship without the licence of Her Majesty, knowingly either takes on board, or engages to take on board, or has on board such ship within Her Majesty's dominions any of the following persons, in this Act referred to as illegally enlisted persons, that is to say:

"(1.) Any person who, being a British subject, within or without the dominions of Her Majesty, has, without the licence of Her Majesty, accepted or agreed to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State;

"(2.) Any person, being a British subject, who, without the licence of Her Majesty, is about to quit Her Majesty's dominions with intent to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State;

"(3.) Any person who has been induced to embark under a misrepresentation or false representation of the service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State;

"Such master or owner shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue, that is to say:

"(1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour; and

"(2.) Such ship shall be detained until the trial and conviction or acquittal of the master or owner, and until all penalties inflicted on the master or owner have been paid, or the master or owner has given security for the payment of such penalties to the satisfaction of two Justices of the Peace or other Magistrate or Magistrates having the authority of two Justices of the Peace; and

"(3.) All illegally enlisted persons shall, immediately on the discovery of the offence, be taken on shore, and shall not be allowed to return to the ship.

"Illegal Shipbuilding and Illegal Expeditions."

"If any person within Her Majesty's dominions, without the licence of Her Majesty, does any of the following acts, that is to say:

"(1.) Builds, or agrees to build, or causes to be built, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State, or

"(2.) Issues or delivers any commission for any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State, or

" (3.) Equips any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State, or

" (4.) Dispatches, or causes or allows to be dispatched, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State:

" Such person shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue:

" (1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" (2.) The ship in respect of which any such offence is committed, and her equipment, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

" Provided, that a person building, causing to be built, or equipping a ship in any of the cases aforesaid, in pursuance of a contract made before the commencement of such war as aforesaid, shall not be liable to any of the penalties imposed by this section in respect of such building or equipping, if he satisfies the conditions following, that is to say:

" (1.) If forthwith upon a Proclamation of Neutrality being issued by Her Majesty he gives notice to the Secretary of State that he is so building, causing to be built, or equipping such ship, and furnishes such particulars of the contract and of any matters relating to, or done, or to be done under the contract as may be required by the Secretary of State:

" (2.) If he gives such security, and takes and permits to be taken such other measures, if any, as the Secretary of State may prescribe for insuring that such ship shall not be dispatched, delivered, or removed without the licence of Her Majesty until the termination of such war as aforesaid.

" Where any ship is built by order of or on behalf of any foreign State when at war with a friendly State, or is delivered to or to the order of such foreign State, or any person who to the knowledge of the person building is an agent of such foreign State, or is paid for by such foreign State or such agent,

and is employed in the military or naval service of such foreign State, such ship shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been built with a view to being so employed, and the burden shall lie on the builder of such ship of proving that he did not know that the ship was intended to be so employed in the military or naval service of such foreign State.

" If any person within the dominions of Her Majesty, and without the licence of Her Majesty,—

" By adding to the number of the guns, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any equipment for war, increases or augments, or procures to be increased or augmented or is knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting the warlike force of any ship which at the time of her being within the dominions of Her Majesty was a ship in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State,—

" Such person shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" If any person within the limits of Her Majesty's dominions, and without the licence of Her Majesty—

" Prepares or fits out any naval or military expedition to proceed against the dominions of any friendly State, the following consequences shall ensue:

" (1.) Every person engaged in such preparation or fitting out, or assisting therein, or employed in any capacity in such expedition, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" (2.) All ships and their equipments, and all arms and munitions of war, used in or forming part of such expedition, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

" Any person who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the commission of any offence against this Act shall be liable to be tried and punished as a principal offender."

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that ships built, commissioned, equipped, or dispatched in contravention of the said Act may be condemned and forfeited by Judgment of the Court of Admiralty; and that if the Secretary of State or chief executive authority is satisfied that there is a reasonable and probable cause for believing that a ship within Our dominions has been or is being built, commissioned, or equipped contrary to the said Act, and is about to be taken beyond the limits of such dominions, or that a ship is about to be dispatched contrary to the Act, such Secretary of State, or chief executive authority, shall have power to issue a warrant authorising the seizure and search of such ship and her detention until she has been either condemned or released by process of law: And whereas certain powers of seizure and detention are conferred by the said Act on certain local authorities:

Now, in order that none of Our subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said Statute, We do hereby strictly command that no person or persons whatsoever do commit any Act, matter, or thing whatsoever contrary to the provisions of the said Statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said Statute imposed and of Our high displeasure.

And we do hereby further warn and admonish all Our loving subjects and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, to observe towards each of the aforesaid States, their citizens, subjects, and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever, with whom We are at peace, the duties of neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those belligerent rights which We and Our Royal predecessors have always claimed to exercise.

And We hereby further warn all Our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, that if any of them shall presume in contempt of this Our Royal Proclamation, and of Our high displeasure, to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a neutral Sovereign in a war between other States, or in violation or contravention of the law of nations in that behalf, as more especially by breaking, or endeavouring to break, any blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of either of the said States, or by carrying officers, soldiers, despatches, arms, ammunition, military stores or materials, or any article or articles considered and deemed to be contraband of war according to the law or modern usages of nations, for the use or service of either of the said States, that all persons so offending, together with their ships and goods, will rightfully incur and be justly liable to hostile capture, and to the penalties denounced by the law of nations in that behalf.

And we do hereby give notice that all Our subjects and persons entitled to Our protection who may misconduct themselves in the premises will do so at their peril, and of their own wrong; and that they will in nowise obtain any protection from Us against such capture, or such penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary, incur Our high displeasure by such misconduct.

HER Majesty being fully determined to observe the duties of neutrality during the existing state of war between the Emperor of China and the Emperor of Japan, and being moreover resolved to prevent, as far as possible, the use of Her Majesty's harbours, ports and coasts, and the waters within Her Majesty's territorial jurisdiction, in aid of the warlike purposes of either belligerent, has commanded me to communicate to your Lordship, for your guidance, the following rules, which are to be treated and enforced as Her Majesty's orders and directions:—

Her Majesty is pleased further to command that these rules shall be put in force in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands, on and after the twelfth day of this month, and in Her Majesty's territories and possessions beyond the seas, six days after the day when the Governor, or other chief authority of each of such territories or possessions, respectively, shall have notified and published the same; stating in such Notification that the said rules are to be obeyed by all persons within the same territories and possessions.

1. During the continuance of the present state of war, all ships of war of either belligerent are prohibited from making use of any port or roadstead in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station, or place of resort, for any warlike purpose, or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities for warlike equipment; and no ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to sail out of or leave any port, roadstead, or waters subject to British jurisdiction, from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war or a merchant ship) shall have previously departed, until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

2. If any ship of war of either belligerent shall, after the time when this Order shall be first notified and put in force in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands, and in the several colonies and foreign possessions and dependencies of Her Majesty, respectively, enter any port, roadstead, or waters belonging to Her Majesty, either in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, such vessel shall be required to depart and to put to sea within twenty-four hours after her entrance into such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessary for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases the authorities of the port, or of the nearest port (as the case may be), shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use; and no such vessel which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repair shall continue in any such port, roadstead, or waters, for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall have been completed. Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases in which there shall be any vessel (whether ships of war or merchant ships) of the said belligerent parties in the same port, roadstead, or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twenty-four hours between the departure therefrom of any such vessel (whether a ship of war or merchant ship) of the one belligerent and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of war of the other belligerent; and the time hereby limited for the departure of such ships of war respectively shall always, in case of necessity, be extended so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but no further or otherwise.

3. No ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew, and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer destination, and no coal shall again be supplied to any such ship of war in the same or any other port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, without special permission, until after the expiration of three months from the time when such coal may have been last supplied to her within British waters as aforesaid.

4. Armed ships of either party are interdicted from carrying prizes made by them into the ports, harbours, roadsteads, or waters of the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, or any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions abroad.

BY THE QUEEN, A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We are happily at peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States ;

And whereas a state of war unhappily exists between his Majesty the Emperor of China and his Majesty the Emperor of Japan, and between their respective subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions ;

And whereas We are on terms of friendship and amicable intercourse with each of these States, and with their subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories or dominions ;

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal subjects reside and carry on commerce, and possess property and establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within the territory of each of the aforesaid States, protected by the faith of Treaties between Us and each of the aforesaid States ;

And whereas We, being desirous of preserving to Our subjects the blessings of peace which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the said state of war unhappily existing between the aforesaid States ;

We therefore have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation ;

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving subjects to govern themselves accordingly, and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid war, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the Laws and Statutes of the realm in this behalf, or the law of nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril ;

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the 33rd and 34th year of Our reign, intituled " An Act to regulate the Conduct of Her Majesty's Subjects during the Existence of Hostilities between Foreign States with which Her Majesty is at Peace," it is, amongst other things, declared and enacted as follows :—

" This Act shall extend to all the dominions of Her Majesty, including the adjacent territorial waters ;

" Illegal Enlistment.

" If any person, without the licence of Her Majesty, being a British subject, within or without Her Majesty's dominions, accepts or agrees to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any foreign State at peace with Her Majesty, and in this Act referred to as a friendly State, or, whether a British subject or not, within Her Majesty's dominions, induces any other person to accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any such foreign State as aforesaid,—

" He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" If any person, without the licence of Her Majesty, being a British subject, quits or goes on board any ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's dominions, with intent to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State, or whether

British subject or not, within Her Majesty's dominions, induces any other person to quit or to go on board any ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's dominions with the like intent,—

" He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" If any person induces any other person to quit Her Majesty's dominions, or to embark on any ship within Her Majesty's dominions, under a misrepresentation or false representation of the service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State—

" He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" If the master or owner of any ship without the licence of Her Majesty, knowingly either takes on board, or engages to take on board, or has on board such ship within Her Majesty's dominions any of the following persons, in this Act referred to as illegally enlisted persons, that is to say:

" (1.) Any person who, being a British subject, within or without the dominions of Her Majesty, has, without the licence of Her Majesty, accepted or agreed to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State:

" (2.) Any person, being a British subject, who, without the licence of Her Majesty, is about to quit Her Majesty's dominions with intent to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State:

" (3.) Any person who has been induced to embark under a misrepresentation or false representation of the service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with a friendly State:

" Such master or owner shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue, that is to say:

" (1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour; and

" (2.) Such ship shall be detained until the trial and conviction or acquittal of the master or owner, and until all penalties inflicted on the master or owner have been paid, or the master or owner has given security for the payment of such penalties to the satisfaction of two Justices of the Peace or other Magistrate or Magistrates having the authority of two Justices of the Peace; and

" (3.) All illegally enlisted persons shall, immediately on the discovery of the offence, be taken on shore, and shall not be allowed to return to the ship.

" Illegal Shipbuilding and Illegal Expeditions.

" If any person within Her Majesty's dominions, without the licence of Her Majesty, does any of the following acts, that is to say:

" (1.) Builds, or agrees to build, or causes to be built, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State, or

" (2.) Issues or delivers any commission for any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State, or

" (3.) Equips any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State, or

" (4.) Dispatches, or causes or allows to be dispatched, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State:

" Such person shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue:

" (1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" (2.) The ship in respect of which any such offence is committed, and her equipment, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

" Provided, that a person building, causing to be built, or equipping a ship in any of the cases aforesaid, in pursuance of a contract made before the commencement of such war as aforesaid, shall not be liable to any of the penalties imposed by this section in respect of such building or equipping, if he satisfies the conditions following, that is to say:

" (1.) If forthwith upon a Proclamation of Neutrality being issued by Her Majesty he gives notice to the Secretary of State that he is so building, causing to be built, or equipping such ship, and furnishes such particulars of the contract and of any matters relating to, or done, or to be done under the contract as may be required by the Secretary of State:

" (2.) If he gives such security, and takes and permits to be taken such other measures, if any, as the Secretary of State may prescribe for insuring that such ship shall not be dispatched, delivered, or removed without the licence of Her Majesty until the termination of such war as aforesaid.

" Where any ship is built by order of or on behalf of any foreign State when at war with a friendly State, or is delivered to or to the order of such foreign State, or any person who to the knowledge of the person building is an agent of such foreign State, or is paid for by such foreign State or such agent,

and is employed in the military or naval service of such foreign State, such ship shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been built with a view to being so employed, and the burden shall lie on the builder of such ship of proving that he did not know that the ship was intended to be so employed in the military or naval service of such foreign State.

" If any person within the dominions of Her Majesty, and without the licence of Her Majesty,—

" By adding to the number of the guns, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any equipment for war, increases or augments, or procures to be increased or augmented or is knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting the warlike force of any ship which at the time of her being within the dominions of Her Majesty was a ship in the military or naval service of any foreign State at war with any friendly State,—

" Such person shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" If any person within the limits of Her Majesty's dominions, and without the licence of Her Majesty—

" Prepares or fits out any naval or military expedition to proceed against the dominions of any friendly State, the following consequences shall ensue:

" (1.) Every person engaged in such preparation or fitting out, or assisting therein, or employed in any capacity in such expedition, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

" (2.) All ships and their equipments, and all arms and munitions of war, used in or forming part of such expedition, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

" Any person who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the commission of any offence against this Act shall be liable to be tried and punished as a principal offender."

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that ships built, commissioned, equipped, or dispatched in contravention of the said Act may be condemned and forfeited by Judgment of the Court of Admiralty; and that if the Secretary of State or chief executive authority is satisfied that there is a reasonable and probable cause for believing that a ship within Our dominions has been or is being built, commissioned, or equipped contrary to the said Act, and is about to be taken beyond the limits of such dominions, or that a ship is about to be dispatched contrary to the Act, such Secretary of State, or chief executive authority, shall have power to issue a warrant authorising the seizure and search of such ship and her detention until she has been either condemned or released by process of law: And whereas certain powers of seizure and detention are conferred by the said Act on certain local authorities:

Now, in order that none of Our subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said Statute, We do hereby strictly command that no person or persons whatsoever do commit any Act, matter, or thing whatsoever contrary to the provisions of the said Statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said Statute imposed and of Our high displeasure.

During the continuance of the present state of war, all ships of war of either belligerent are prohibited from making use of any port or roadstead in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station, or place of resort, for any warlike purpose, or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities for warlike equipment; and no ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to sail out of or leave any port, roadstead, or waters subject to British jurisdiction, from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war or a merchant ship) shall have previously departed, until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

2. If any ship of war of either belligerent shall, after the time when this Order shall be first notified and put in force in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands, and in the several colonies and foreign possessions and dependencies of Her Majesty, respectively, enter any port, roadstead, or waters belonging to Her Majesty, either in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, such vessel shall be required to depart and to put to sea within twenty-four hours after her entrance into such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessary for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases the authorities of the port, or of the nearest port (as the case may be), shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use; and no such vessel which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repair shall continue in any such port, roadstead, or waters, for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall have been completed. Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases in which there shall be any vessel (whether ships of war or merchant ships) of the said belligerent parties in the same port, roadstead, or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twenty-four hours between the departure therefrom of any such vessel (whether a ship of war or merchant ship) of the one belligerent and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of war of the other belligerent; and the time hereby limited for the departure of such ships of war respectively shall always, in case of necessity, be extended so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but no further or otherwise.

3. No ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew, and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer destination, and no coal shall again be supplied to any such ship of war in the same or any other port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, without special permission, until after the expiration of three months from the time when such coal may have been last supplied to her within British waters as aforesaid.

4. Armed ships of either party are interdicted from carrying prizes made by them into the ports, harbours, roadsteads, or waters of the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, or any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions abroad.

The Council then went into Committee for consideration thereon.

Line 4. The word "persons" was substituted for the word "person" and the words "Sub Inspectors" for "Sub-Inspector."

Clause 2, line 10. After the word "exceeding" and before the word "pounds" the word "fifty" was inserted.

Clause 3, line 3. The word "that" was substituted for the word "the" before the word "purpose" and the following words "of gathering in the sheep for inspection" were struck out.

Clause 4. At the end of this Clause the words "fifty pounds for each offence" were added.

Clause 5, line 3. The words "four shillings" were inserted after "of" in the third line and before "per" in line 4.

Clause 6. The word "of" was struck out and the words "not exceeding twenty-five" before the word "pounds" were inserted.

Clause 8, line 1. The word "omit" was deleted and the words "not take steps" were inserted in lieu thereof. Line 4. The word "five" was inserted before the word "pounds" and in line 5, the words "neglect or" were inserted after the word "such" and before the word "omission."

Clause 9. The letter B after the word "Schedule" was re-lettered A, and in the Schedule A referred to was inserted as a footnote "here define exact locality."

Clauses 10 and 11 were deferred for further consideration.

Clause 12, line 1. The words "twenty-one" were inserted before the word "days." In line 2, after the word "infected" the words "or on such date as may be ordered by the Inspector" were inserted. In line 5, the words "pay a sum" were deleted and the words "be liable to a penalty" were inserted. The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

On the motion of His Honour the Judge seconded by the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary the Council went into Committee for the further consideration of the Bill entitled, "An Ordinance to make provision for the eradication of Scab and other Contagious or Infectious Diseases in Sheep."

The following further amendments were made—

Clauses Nos. 10, 11 and 13 as numbered in the draft Bill, after further consideration, were struck out of the Bill.

Under the head of "Travelling or Stray Sheep," the following clauses were inserted :—

No person shall drive any sheep upon or across any Station not being in the occupation of the owner of such sheep without giving notice in writing to the owner of such Station not less than 24 hours before such driving, or the intention so to do, and of the place whence and whither such sheep are being driven and the point at which such person driving such sheep is to enter such Station, under a penalty for each offence not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

Clause 23 in the draft Ordinance, after the word "pounds," the remainder of the clause was struck out.

Clause 24 was struck out and a new clause as follows substituted in lieu thereof. "If any person shall abandon any travelling sheep which may be infected or shall leave the dead carcass of any such infected sheep unburied, or undestroyed by fire, when it is possible to bury or so destroy the same, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds. In cases where it is impossible to bury or destroy by fire such carcasses he will at once give notice in writing to the owner of the Station upon or adjacent to which such carcasses are left of the fact, under a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds."

Clause 25, line 10, after the word "exceeding," and before the word "pounds," the word "ten" was inserted. After the word "removed," line 10, the words "and if any such sheep be infected any Justice may on satisfactory proof thereof order such sheep to be forthwith destroyed."

Clause 26, line 3, after the word "without," the words "the consent of" was struck out and the words "previous notice in writing to" was inserted. In line 5, after the word "hereto," the words "from the Inspector or other person appointed by the Governor" were inserted; and also in line 5, after the word "exceeding," the words "twenty-five" were inserted.

Clause 28, line 1, the words "either directly or indirectly" were struck out, and the words "or attempt to communicate" were inserted. In line 3, after the word "be," the words "deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be" were inserted, and line 4 after the word "exceeding" the word "three" was inserted.

Clause 29, line 1, after the word "within," the word "two" was inserted, and line 6 after the word "exceeding," the word "one" was inserted, and after the word "default," the words "a description of such ear marks shall be published in the Government Gazette."

Clause 30, line 5, after the word "of," and before the word "and," the following words were inserted. "Twenty-five shillings or such other less sum as the Governor in Council may determine and as may be notified in the Government Gazette." Line 6, "500" was substituted for the words "300." Line 8, the words "at the Office of the Colonial Treasurer," were struck out and the words "into the Colonial Treasury," were substituted.

Clause 31, line 7, after the word "pounds," the words "for every week he remains in default," were added.

Clause 33 was struck out of the Bill.

Clause 36, line 1, after the word "Governor," the words "in Council" were inserted. After the word "sheep," in line 14, the following sub-clause was inserted, "For requiring travelling sheep to be distinguished by a mark to be approved by the Inspector." Line 18, after the word "Ordinance," the following clause was inserted—

"The Governor in Council may by all Rules and Regulations under this Ordinance impose upon offenders against the same such reasonable penalties not exceeding the sum of Ten Pounds for each offence, and in case of a continuing offence a further penalty not exceeding One Pound for each day's default. Provided that all such rules and regulations imposing a penalty shall be so framed as to allow the recovery of any sum less than the full amount of the penalty."

Clause 37, line 7, after the word "within," and before the word "month," the word "four" was inserted.

Clause 38, at the end of this clause the words "passing thereof" were struck out, and the words "date of publication in the Government Gazette" were inserted.

The Council resumed and on the motion of His Honour the Judge seconded by the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, the Bill providing for the Custody and Control of Lunatics was read a third time and passed.

The Council then adjourned until Friday the 15th, at 11 a.m.

The Minutes of the previous Meetings were read and confirmed.

On the motion of His Honor the Judge, seconded by the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary the Council resumed its consideration in Committee of the Bill entitled "An Ordinance to make provision for the eradication of "Scab and other Infectious or Contagious diseases in Sheep," when the further following amendments were made :

Clause 4 in the draft Ordinance was struck out, Clauses 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 were re-numbered 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8, and the following amended Clause No. 9 was inserted :

9.—Every owner of such infected sheep shall as soon as practicable cause the same to be branded or marked on the rump or back thereof with the letter S, such letter not being less than 6 inches in length, and such brand or mark shall from time to time be renewed as occasion may require so that the brand or mark shall always be distinct and legible, and every such owner shall be liable to a fine of not more than three pence for every such sheep not being so branded or marked as aforesaid.

The following new clauses were inserted and passed :

13.—If the Inspector shall be satisfied that any sheep on a Station are infected sheep it shall be lawful for him to give the owner of such sheep an order in writing directing him effectually to clean such sheep within six months from the date of such order, and if at any time during such period of six months such owner shall not in the opinion of the Inspector have made or be making reasonable exertions to clean such sheep or if at the expiration of the said six months such sheep shall in the opinion of the Inspector still be infected sheep the owner thereof shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty of two-pence for every such infected sheep. Provided always that if the Inspector should have certified that such sheep were clean at any time after the issue of the said order and it can be shown to his satisfaction that such sheep subsequently became infected from circumstances not within the control of the owner of such sheep the Inspector shall issue an order to clean such sheep as if no order had been previously issued.

14.—If after the expiration of three months from the date of a conviction under the immediately preceding Section such sheep shall in the opinion of the Inspector still be infected sheep the owner of such sheep shall upon conviction be liable to a further penalty of two-pence for every such infected sheep and so on for every succeeding period of three months each save and except action shall be taken by the Inspector under Section XV, and subject always to the Proviso contained in the immediately preceding Section.

15.—If any sheep in respect of which an order under the 13th Section has been issued by the Inspector shall at the expiration of twelve months from the date of the issue of such order or within a period of three months thereafter be infected then from time to time within such period of three months any two Justices may on the complaint of the Inspector order that such sheep shall be destroyed by such Inspector and the Inspector shall cause such sheep to be destroyed and the remains to be disposed of for the benefit of the owner as the Inspector may direct.

16.—If after a period of at least three months commencing at any time after the issue of an order under Section XIII, any number of the sheep referred to in such order shall in the opinion of the Inspector or a competent person appointed by him no longer remain infected sheep the Inspector may grant a certificate in the Form B in the Schedule that such number are not infected sheep.

TRAVELLING SHEEP.

17.—No person shall drive any sheep upon or across any Station not being in the occupation of the owner of such sheep without giving notice in writing to the owner of such Station not less than twenty-four hours before such driving of the intention so to do and of the place whence and whither such sheep are being driven and the point at which the person driving such sheep is to enter such Station under a penalty for each offence not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

18.—Line 4, the letter "C" was inserted after "Form."

19.—In lines 6, 7, and 8, after the word "once," the words "give notice in writing to the owner of the Station upon or adjacent to which such carcasses are left of the fact," were struck out and the following words were inserted, "remove the skins thereof and take them away well and securely packed in a bag or bale under a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds."

The following new Clauses 24, 25 and 26, were amended and inserted :

24.—If it shall appear to the Inspector upon his own view that any infected sheep upon a Station may because of their vicinity to the flocks of sheep on an adjacent Station cause damage to the owner of these flocks it shall be lawful for the Inspector to order the owner of such infected sheep to cause them to be removed to such other place on his Station as may be approved by the Inspector or to cause such sheep to be constantly herded by day and kept at night within a proper enclosure. Any owner who shall neglect to obey such order shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds for any day or night he shall remain in default.

25.—Any person who wilfully communicates or attempts to communicate to any sheep, Scab, or any other infectious or contagious disease, shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable to imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding three years.

26.—The ear marks adopted by sheep farmers shall within three months after the coming into operation of this Ordinance, be registered in the Office of the Colonial Secretary, by whom they shall be first approved, and any owner who shall wilfully neglect or omit to report such ear marks shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Pound for every week's default. A description of such ear marks shall be published in the Government Gazette.

27.—As amended, was inserted as follows:—For defraying the costs and expenses of carrying this Ordinance into effect there shall in each year on and after the 1st day of June be levied upon all sheep depastured and kept in any part of the Colony, for every one thousand sheep a contribution of Twenty Shillings or such other less sum as the Governor in Council may determine and as may be notified in the Government Gazette and so in proportion for any greater or smaller number possessed by one owner, such contribution to be paid on or before the 31st day of July in each year to the Colonial Treasurer by the owners of such sheep: And it shall be lawful for the Governor by Warrant to order the payment from such contributions of all expenses which may have been incurred prior to the coming into operation of this Ordinance in securing the service of Inspectors and in the payment of their travelling and other expenses or which may be found necessary for carrying this Ordinance into effect. No contribution shall be required of a less number of sheep than two-hundred-and-fifty

28.—Every owner shall on or before the 31st day of May in each year deliver or cause to be delivered to the Colonial Treasurer a true and correct return in writing signed and declared to by such owner before a Justice of the Peace of all sheep kept and depastured by the said owner on the first day of March preceding. Every owner neglecting to deliver or cause to be delivered such return as aforesaid without reasonable cause for such delay being shown shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for every week he shall remain in default.

29.—Line 2, after the word "the" the words "thirty-first" were inserted. and after the word "of" the word "July" was inserted. After the word "amount" the words "due by him according to the return aforesaid," were inserted.

32.—After the word “Inspector,” in line 17, the following words were added, “For protecting travelling sheep from infected sheep when passing upon or along any customary or recognised paths or roads.”

33.—After the word “penalty,” at the end of the clause, the words “and every such rule or regulation shall upon publication in the Government Gazette have the same effect as if it were inserted in this Ordinance.”

34.—After the Section “Destroy,” and before the Section “Travelling Sheep” the word “Sheep” is defined as follows:—“Sheep” shall mean any ram, ewe, wether, or lamb.

Under the head of “Travelling Sheep” the following words were inserted “shall mean sheep being driven from one place to another upon or along any road or upon or across any Station not in the occupation of the owner of such sheep.”

35.—Ordinance No 3 of 1867 is hereby repealed.

36.—Was amended as follows:—“This Ordinance shall not come into operation until the publication of a notice in the Government Gazette that Her Majesty has been advised not to disallow the same, and may be cited for all purposes as “The Scab Ordinance, 1894.”

The Council then adjourned until the 19th June.

On the Council resuming His Honour the Judge moved the third reading of the Bill, which was seconded by the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary and the Bill was read a Third time.

His Excellency said he would reserve his assent to the Bill, but he would have pleasure in forwarding it to the Secretary of State for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon.

The Council was then adjourned *sine die*.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The 14th Section of the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor.

2.—As there is no Lunatic Asylum or Institution for the proper care and custody of lunatics in the Colony:—

Be it enacted—That whenever any person shall be confined as a lunatic in the Gaol, it may be lawful for the Governor in Council upon being satisfied that adequate arrangements have been made for the safety and care of the Lunatic while on board ship and for his reception at the Port of Landing, in order to secure his proper and legal disposal in an Institution for Lunatics in the United Kingdom, to order the said Lunatic to be removed from the Colony in a ship bound for a port in the United Kingdom.

This Section shall not apply however to Criminal Lunatics, the removal of whom is regulated by the "Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884." (Imperial).

3.—In all cases when a Lunatic is removed from the Colony under this Ordinance a transcript of the proceedings in the matter of the lunacy of such person shall be transmitted by the Governor to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

4.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of the "Lunacy Ordinance, 1894."

The following Draft Ordinance is published for general information prior to being introduced into the Legislative Council.

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Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The 14th Section of the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor.

2.—As there is no Lunatic Asylum or Institution for the proper care and custody of lunatics in the Colony:—

Be it enacted—That whenever any person shall be confined as a lunatic in the Gaol, it may be lawful for the Governor in Council upon being satisfied that adequate arrangements have been made for the safety and care of the Lunatic while on board ship and for his reception at the Port of Landing, in order to secure his proper and legal disposal in an Institution for Lunatics in the United Kingdom, to order the said Lunatic to be removed from the Colony in a ship bound for a port in the United Kingdom.

This Section shall not apply however to Criminal Lunatics, the removal of whom is regulated by the "Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884." (Imperial).

3.—In all cases when a Lunatic is removed from the Colony under this Ordinance a transcript of the proceedings in the matter of the lunacy of such person shall be transmitted by the Governor to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

4.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of the "Lunacy Ordinance, 1894."

If any purchaser shall fail to pay the second or any subsequent instalment of purchase money or any interest for the time being payable by him on the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable or within 21 days thereafter, the Governor may, and if such default shall continue for 3 months from the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable, the Governor shall cause the land purchased by such purchaser to be again put up for sale by public auction at the same upset price and on the same conditions as at the previous sale.

If any land shall be again put up for sale as aforesaid the previous sale thereof shall thenceforth become void and the purchaser at the previous sale shall give up possession thereof and shall have no further right or interest in or lien upon such land.

If after payment in full of the purchase money and interest payable by the purchaser at the second sale the Government shall have received in respect of such purchase money and interest an amount exceeding the purchase money and interest which the Governor would have received from the purchaser at the previous sale if he had complied with the conditions of sale then out of such excess, after deducting therefrom the expenses of the second sale the Government shall repay to the purchaser at the previous sale the amount of the instalments of purchase money and interest which he shall have actually paid or so much thereof as such excess shall suffice to repay but in no other event shall a purchaser have any claim for repayment of instalments of purchase money or interest paid by him.

Every purchaser whether at a first or second sale shall be let into possession of the land purchased by him upon payment of the first instalment of purchase money and upon his signing the above-mentioned agreement, but no grant of the land shall be issued to him until he shall have paid the whole of the purchase money and all interest payable under the conditions of sale.

provided that with the consent of the owner or lessee of any land adjoining such lot the erection of a fence between such and such adjoining land may be dispensed with.

The purchaser of every lot, his heirs or assigns shall, before the expiration of 2 years from the date of the sale, erect on such lot a suitable and substantial dwelling-house to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council. Default in compliance with this sub-section shall entail the same consequences as default in payment of a second or subsequent instalment of purchase money for three months.

The cost of the fences to be erected between any lot which shall be sold as aforesaid and the adjoining lands shall be borne by the purchaser of the lot and the owner or lessee of the adjoining land in equal shares. An Ordinance to amend the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The 14th Section of the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor.

2.—As there is no Lunatic Asylum or Institution for the proper care and custody of lunatics in the Colony:—

Be it enacted—That whenever any person shall be confined as a lunatic in the Gaol, it may be lawful for the Governor in Council upon being satisfied that adequate arrangements have been made for the safety and care of the Lunatic while on board ship and for his reception at the Port of Landing, in order to secure his proper and legal disposal in an Institution for Lunatics in the United Kingdom, to order the said Lunatic to be removed from the Colony in a ship bound for a port in the United Kingdom.

This Section shall not apply however to Criminal Lunatics, the removal of whom is regulated by the "Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884." (Imperial).

3.—In all cases when a Lunatic is removed from the Colony under this Ordinance a transcript of the proceedings in the matter of the lunacy of such person shall be transmitted by the Governor to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

4.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of the "Lunacy Ordinance, 1894."

The purchase money shall be payable by such number (not exceeding 15) of equal yearly instalments as the Governor in Council shall determine and as shall be notified in the Government Gazette before the sale. The first instalment shall be paid at the conclusion of the sale and each subsequent instalment together with interest at the rate of 2½ per centum per annum on the unpaid balance of the purchase money for the time being from the date of the payment of the last previous instalment shall be paid at the expiration of one year from the day on which the last previous instalment was payable ; but the purchaser may at any time pay the whole of the purchase money remaining unpaid with the interest thereon which has accrued since the date of the last previous payment of an instalment.

The highest or only bidder for every lot put up for sale at or above the upset price shall be the purchaser.

Immediately upon the conclusion of the sale the purchaser shall pay the first instalment of the purchase money and sign an agreement to complete the purchase and to fulfil the conditions of

sale. If any purchaser, whether the original purchaser or a purchaser substituted under this sub-section, shall fail to pay the first instalment or to sign the said agreement, the sale to him shall be void and the next highest bidder (if any) at or above the upset price shall be the purchaser.

If any purchaser shall fail to pay the second or any subsequent instalment of purchase money or any interest for the time being payable by him on the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable or within 21 days thereafter, the Governor may, and if such default shall continue for 3 months from the day on which such instalment or interest becomes payable, the Governor shall cause the land purchased by such purchaser to be again put up for sale by public auction at the same upset price and on the same conditions as at the previous sale.

If any land shall be again put up for sale as aforesaid the previous sale thereof shall thenceforth become void and the purchaser at the previous sale shall give up possession thereof and shall have no further right or interest in or lien upon such land.

If after payment in full of the purchase money and interest payable by the purchaser at the second sale the Government shall have received in respect of such purchase money and interest an amount exceeding the purchase money and interest which the Governor would have received from the purchaser at the previous sale if he had complied with the conditions of sale then out of such excess, after deducting therefrom the expenses of the second sale the Government shall repay to the purchaser at the previous sale the amount of the instalments of purchase money and interest which he shall have actually paid or so much thereof as such excess shall suffice to repay but in no other event shall a purchaser have any claim for repayment of instalments of purchase money or interest paid by him.

Every purchaser whether at a first or second sale shall be let into possession of the land purchased by him upon payment of the first instalment of purchase money and upon his signing the above-mentioned agreement, but no grant of the land shall be issued to him until he shall have paid the whole of the purchase money and all interest payable under the conditions of sale.

The sum of money (if any) payable by the purchaser of each lot put up for sale to the former lessee of such lot as the value of improvements thereon under Section 3 of the Land Ordinance 1882, shall be determined in the manner provided by that Section before the lot is put up for sale and shall be stated in the Particulars of Sale, and shall be paid by the purchaser to the former lessee, or his legal personal representatives, within 7 days from the date of the sale or at such later date as may be agreed upon by the parties. If the purchaser at a first sale shall not pay the said sum of money within the said 7 days, or on the day agreed upon, as the case may be, the lot shall be again put up for sale by auction in the same manner, and with the same consequences as if such purchaser had made default for three months in payment of an instalment of purchase money.

No stock shall be placed on any lot so sold as aforesaid until proper arrangements for the dipping of sheep to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council have been provided thereon, or on some adjoining land occupied by the same person, or occupied by some other person if such lot and such adjoining land are farmed in common, or until such lot has been completely fenced in by proper sheep-proof fence to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council,

provided that with the consent of the owner or lessee of any land adjoining such lot the erection of a fence between such and such adjoining land may be dispensed with.

The purchaser of every lot, his heirs or assigns shall, before the expiration of 2 years from the date of the sale, erect on such lot a suitable and substantial dwelling-house to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council. Default in compliance with this sub-section shall entail the same consequences as default in payment of a second or subsequent instalment of purchase money for three months.

The cost of the fences to be erected between any lot which shall be sold as aforesaid and the adjoining lands shall be borne by the purchaser of the lot and the owner or lessee of the adjoining land in equal shares. In the absence of any agreement to the contrary the fence shall be erected by the purchaser, and he shall have the right to recover from each adjoining owner or lessee a proportion of the half of the entire cost thereof according to the length of the fence between the lot and the land of such adjoining owner or lessee.

An Ordinance to amend the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The 14th Section of the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor.

2.—As there is no Lunatic Asylum or Institution for the proper care and custody of lunatics in the Colony:—

Be it enacted—That whenever any person shall be confined as a lunatic in the Gaol, it may be lawful for the Governor in Council upon being satisfied that adequate arrangements have been made for the safety and care of the Lunatic while on board ship and for his reception at the Port of Landing, in order to secure his proper and legal disposal in an Institution for Lunatics in the United Kingdom, to order the said Lunatic to be removed from the Colony in a ship bound for a port in the United Kingdom.

This Section shall not apply however to Criminal Lunatics, the removal of whom is regulated by the "Colonial Prisoners Removal Act, 1884." (Imperial).

3.—In all cases when a Lunatic is removed from the Colony under this Ordinance a transcript of the proceedings in the matter of the lunacy of such person shall be transmitted by the Governor to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies.

4.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of the "Lunacy Ordinance, 1894."

An Ordinance to extend the provisions of the Quarantine Ordinance, 1875.

WHEREAS it is expedient that when any port or place in this Colony shall appear to be threatened with or affected by any contagious or infectious disease measures of precaution shall be taken with promptitude according to the exigency of the case.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—Whenever it shall appear that any disease of a contagious or infectious character prevails at any port or place in the Colony it may be lawful for the Governor in Council if it should be deemed advisable or necessary so to do by Order in Council to declare such port or place to be an infected place.

2.—All vessels arriving from any port or place which may have been declared infected under the preceding Section or having on board any person who has come from such infected place and also all vessels arriving from any port in the Colony whether infected or not and having on board any person who is ill of any contagious or infectious disease or on board of which any person shall have within fourteen days died from any such disease shall be liable to perform quarantine in such place for such time and in such manner as the Governor in Council shall by Order direct. It shall also be lawful for the Governor in Council to adopt all such other measures as may be considered necessary for preventing the spread of the disease throughout the Colony and every Order issued by the Governor in Council under this Ordinance and all Acts performed under authority of any such Order shall be held to be as good and valid as if authorized in express words by this Ordinance and every person who shall disobey any such order or any part of such order or shall resist, obstruct, or otherwise oppose any other person in carrying such order or any part thereof into execution shall be liable on summary conviction before the Police Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three calendar months or at the discretion of the said Police Magistrate or Justices to pay a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds.

3.—The Governor in Council is hereby authorized to incur and defray all expenses which may be necessary for carrying the provisions of this Ordinance or any Order in Council issued thereunder into effect.

An Ordinance to Regulate the Attendance of Children at School.

Whereas it is expedient to make provision for the regular attendance of children at school and for the remission of school fees in the case of children attending the Government Schools whose parents are unable from poverty to pay such fees

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—The parents or guardians of all children residing in Stanley of not less than five and not more than thirteen years of age are hereby required to cause such children to attend school unless there be some reasonable excuse as hereinafter-mentioned shewn to the satisfaction of the Police Magistrate. Provided always that nothing herein contained shall prevent the exemption of any child between ten and thirteen years of age from attending school totally or partially if the Police Magistrate is satisfied that such child is able to pass the Standard of Examination contained in Form A in the Schedule to this Ordinance annexed.

Any of the following reasons shall be a reasonable excuse.

- (a) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner.
- (b) That the child has been prevented from attending school by illness or any other unavoidable cause.

Any parent or guardian acting in contravention of this Section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding : Provided always that a complaint for continued non-attendance shall not be repeated at any less interval than two weeks.

2.—It shall be the duty of the Chief Constable to keep and from time to time revise, add to and correct, a list (in the form B in the Schedule to this Ordinance annexed) of all children between the ages of five and thirteen years residing in Stanley and it shall be the further duty of the said Chief Constable to lodge a complaint before the Police Magistrate against the parent or guardian of any of such children who shall fail and omit to send them daily to school.

3.—It shall be the duty of the Head Teachers of the Government Schools and the Teachers of all Schools receiving grants from the Government in aid of their Schools in Stanley to furnish the Chief Constable once in every two weeks (Holy days excepted) with a list in the Form C in the Schedule to this Ordinance annexed of the children on the Register of such Schools who have without reasonable excuse failed to attend School on any day during such period. The production of any such list shall be evidence before the Police Magistrate of the absence from school of the child or children named therein on the date or dates mentioned.

4.—The Governor in Council may from time to time upon being satisfied of the establishment of a Public School in any other Town or District than Stanley make Bye-Laws for all or any of the following purposes.

(a). Requiring the parents in such Town or District of children of not less than five years nor more than thirteen years of age (as may be fixed by the Bye-Laws;) to cause such children to attend school unless they are able to pass to the satisfaction of a Justice of the Peace the Standard of Examination contained in Form A in the Schedule or unless the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner or has been prevented from attending School by illness or any other unavoidable cause or resides a greater distance than two miles from a School.

(b). Imposing penalties not exceeding for breach of any Bye-Law.

Such Bye-Laws shall upon publication in the Government Gazette have the same effect as if inserted in this Ordinance.

5.—All penalties under this Ordinance or under the Bye-Laws framed hereunder shall be recoverable in a summary manner in Stanley before the Police Magistrate on the complaint of the Chief Constable and in any other place than Stanley before a Justice of the Peace of the Colony on the prosecution of any person named or appointed by the Governor.

6.—The Governor of the Colony is hereby empowered to sanction the remission of the whole or any part of the school fees of any child attending a Government School upon being satisfied that the parent or guardian of such child is unable because of indigent circumstances to pay the same.

7.—In this Ordinance the following words shall have the meanings respectively assigned to them as under:

“*Governor*.”—Shall include and mean the Officer Administering the Government.

“*Guardian*.”—Shall include and mean the person with whom the child alleged to have been absent from school was at the time residing.

“*Police Magistrate*.”—Shall include and mean the person discharging the duties of Police Magistrate in Stanley for the time being.

“*Chief Constable*.”—Shall include and mean the person discharging the duties of that Office.

8.—Ordinance No. 5 of 1887 is hereby repealed.

9.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as “The School Attendance Ordinance, 1895,” and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

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An Ordinance to extend the provisions of the Quarantine Ordinance, 1875.

WHEREAS it is expedient that when any port or place in this Colony shall appear to be threatened with or affected by any contagious or infectious disease measures of precaution shall be taken with promptitude according to the exigency of the case.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—Whenever it shall appear that any disease of a contagious or infectious character prevails at any port or place in the Colony it may be lawful for the Governor in Council if it should be deemed advisable or necessary so to do by Order in Council to declare such port or place to be an infected place.

2.—All vessels arriving from any port or place which may have been declared infected under the preceding Section or having on board any person who has come from such infected place and also all vessels arriving from any port in the Colony whether infected or not and having on board any person who is ill of any contagious or infectious disease or on board of which any person shall have within fourteen days died from any such disease shall be liable to perform quarantine in such place for such time and in such manner as the Governor in Council shall by Order direct. It shall also be lawful for the Governor in Council to adopt all such other measures as may be considered necessary for preventing the spread of the disease throughout the Colony and every Order issued by the Governor in Council under this Ordinance and all Acts performed under authority of any such Order shall be held to be as good and valid as if authorized in express words by this Ordinance and every person who shall disobey any such order or any part of such order or shall resist, obstruct, or otherwise oppose any other person in carrying such order or any part thereof into execution shall be liable on summary conviction before the Police Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three calendar months or at the discretion of the said Police Magistrate or Justices to pay a fine not exceeding Ten Pounds.

3.—The Governor in Council is hereby authorized to incur and defray all expenses which may be necessary for carrying the provisions of this Ordinance or any Order in Council issued thereunder into effect.

AMENDED PORT REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the power conferred by the Pilot Ordinances No. 5 of 1871, 2 of 1880, and Ordinance No. 13 of 1882, Rule 14, of the Port Regulations is hereby repealed and the following Regulation substituted in place thereof and shall henceforth be enforced.

No hulk shall be moored so as to swing to the North of a line drawn from East to West along the middle of the Harbour, nor to the West of a line drawn North from the Gazette or Notice Board, and in no case shall a hulk be moored except by written permission from the Harbour Master indicating the exact berth to be occupied.

In cases where, upon the report of the Harbour Master it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that it is advisable, having regard to the safe and commodious navigation of Stanley Harbour, and the order and management of vessels therein that any hulk be removed, it shall be lawful for the Governor, and he is hereby empowered to order the removal of the said hulk to another berth, no fee however shall be chargeable by the Harbour Master.

The Harbour Master is also empowered, when he considers it necessary for the convenience of shipping entering the Port, to order the removal of any vessels lying at anchor in the Harbour to another berth. No fee to the Harbour Master shall be payable in respect of removal unless such vessel has taken up its position without the necessary authority.

Supplementary Bye-Laws of the Board of Health.

Approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council under the provisions of Clause 19 of Ordinance 5 of 1894.

1.—Whenever it is brought to the knowledge of the Board of Health that any contagious or infectious disease exists at any port or place in the Colony the Board may order the discontinuance to such an extent as to the said Board may seem advisable and necessary of communication between such infected place and other places in the Colony at which such contagious or infectious disease does not exist and notice upon such an order being made shall be at once issued by the Board.

2.—All persons and all vessels arriving from such infected place shall be subjected to such period of detention before being allowed to enter any uninfected place as the Board may consider proper and by order direct.

The Inspector of Nuisances shall also take such steps as may be necessary for cleansing and disinfecting all such vessels.

3.—All proper and necessary steps shall be taken by the Health Officer to prevent the crew and passengers of vessels suspected of having had communication within fourteen days with any such infected place from landing before being boarded for inspection.

4.—Any person violating any of the above Rules or any order issued thereunder shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Two Pounds.

The minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

A Despatch No 84, of 23rd October, 1894, from the Secretary of State conveying Her Majesty and Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York's thanks, also a letter from the Comptroller of Their Royal Highnesses household, for the congratulatory addresses passed on the occasion of the birth of Prince Edward of York, were read.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance for the Regulation of the Post Office," which being seconded by His Honour the Judge was read by title.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894," seconded by His Honour the Judge, and the Bill was read by title.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and to make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination." The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded and the Bill was read by title.

His Honour the Judge then moved that the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to make provision for the eradication of scab or other Infectious or Contagious diseases in sheep" be referred back to Committee with a view to the amendments proposed by the Secretary of State being inserted.

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded.

His Honour the Judge stated that all the amendments proposed by the Secretary of State had been engrafted into the Ordinance with the exception of that relating to the importation of sheep which through the want of frequent communication would be impracticable if adopted, while Cause 21 was deemed sufficient to meet the requirements in this respect.

The following amendments were then made :

Clause 1, line 6, the following words were added, "No Inspector shall either directly or indirectly be an owner of nor dealer in sheep nor act as the agent of any owner of sheep under a penalty for any such offence not exceeding Fifty Pounds."

Clause 3 was struck out and the following Clause inserted in lieu thereof:

Clause 6, the words "and shall affix on such Station where directed by the Inspector a notice or notices to the following effect—'Scab on this Run.'" were inserted at the end of the Clause.

A new Clause numbered 7, ran as follows:

"Any person who shall pull down deface or otherwise destroy any notice or placard required by this Ordinance or any Regulation under this Ordinance to be posted shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

Clause 7 in the Ordinance was re-numbered Clause 8.

Clause 8 was struck out.

The following Causes were inserted as Clauses 9, 10 & 11.

9.—The Inspector on being satisfied that any Station or part thereof is infected shall on ascertaining the extent to which the infection has spread define the boundaries of and place the infected land in quarantine by giving notice in writing to the proprietor or person in charge of such Station in the Form A in the Schedule hereto and by notification in the Gazette signed by the Inspector of the establishment of such quarantine; and such quarantine shall extend to such distance beyond the boundaries of the infected or suspected land as the Inspector may consider necessary, and shall continue in force until the land contained in such boundaries shall have been released from quarantine as hereinafter mentioned; and all sheep within, or which may be brought within such boundaries during the existence of such quarantine shall be included and kept therein until released by order of the Inspector.

*An Ordinance to amend the law relating to the granting of
Probate of Wills and Letters of Administration.*

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The Supreme Court of the Falkland Islands and the Judge thereof shall have and exercise within the Colony all the jurisdiction, powers and authorities whatsoever possessed and vested in the Court of Probate in England and the Judge thereof at the time of the passing of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act, 1873, (Imperial).

2.—No Probate of the Will nor Letters of Administration of the estate and effects of any person deceased shall be granted by the Judge of the Supreme Court until the person or persons applying for such Probate or Letters of Administration shall have paid to the Colonial Treasurer the probate duty payable under this Ordinance in respect of the estate of the deceased and shall have given bond to the Judge for the time being which bond shall be in such form as the Judge shall by any general or special order direct: Such bond shall be in a penalty of double the amount of the probable value of the estate of the deceased person as stated in the accounts delivered with the petition on which the grant is made or in such other amount as the Judge may by any order to be made in any particular case direct.

3.—If any person shall take possession of and in any way administer any part of the personal estate and effects of any person deceased without obtaining Probate of the Will or Letters of Administration of the estate and effects of the deceased person within six calendar months after his death, every person so offending shall on summary conviction forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds and such additional sums as would be equal to the amount of duty which would be payable on the grant of Probate of the Will or Letters of Administration of the estate of the deceased.

4.—Applications for Probate or Letters of Administration shall be made by petition to the Judge of the Supreme Court and to every such petition there shall be subjoined or annexed an affidavit verifying the allegations contained in such petition.

5.—In the case of a will the petition must state the death of the testator, that the document produced is believed to be his last will and testament, that the petitioner is the person named as the executor and that the petitioner knows of no other later will made as the last will of the testator.

6.—In the case of intestacy the petition must state the death of the intestate and that he died without leaving a will and it must briefly set forth the grounds on which the petitioner has applied for Letters of Administration.

7.—In the case of a petition for Letters of Administration with the will annexed the petition must set forth the grounds on which the application is based.

8.—Together with every petition for Probate or Letters of Administration there shall be delivered an account signed by the petitioner of the particulars of the personal estate of the deceased situate in this Colony and of the estimated value thereof in such form as shall be prescribed by rules made under this Ordinance.

9.—If any executor or administrator at any time within one year after having paid probate dues shall discover that the estate of the deceased person was estimated at too high a value in the account delivered by him, and that the amount of duty paid by him was consequently greater than he was liable to pay and shall make the same appear to be the case to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council it shall be lawful for the Governor to issue his Warrant on the Public Treasury for the return to such executor or administrator of any excess of payment so shown to have been made by him.

10.—If any executor or administrator shall through mistake or misapprehension or otherwise without fraud have omitted from the account delivered by him any part of the personal effects or estate of the testator or intestate situate in this Colony such executor or administrator shall immediately after the discovery of such omission notify the Judge of the same and within three calendar months thereafter amend his account and pay the additional duty due on the estate of the deceased without being liable to any penalty or forfeiture under this Ordinance.

11.—The Court may on application made on motion or petition in chambers in a summary way and on being satisfied that the condition of any bond given to the Judge has been broken, order the assignment of the same to some person to be named in such order, and such person, his executors, or administrators, shall thereupon be entitled to sue in his or their own name as if the same had been originally given to him instead of to the Judge and shall be entitled to recover thereon as trustee for all persons interested the full amount recoverable in respect of any breach of the condition of the said bond.

12.—Notice of application for Letters of Administration must be given in the Government Gazette for three successive weeks before such letters shall be granted, except in cases where the Judge shall be satisfied by affidavit or otherwise of the existence of any urgent necessity that such grant should be made before the expiration of such three weeks and shall likewise be satisfied that notice of the application has been given to all persons residing within the Colony whose claim to such grant may be prior or preferable to that of the applicant. In every such case the Judge shall have the power to grant to such applicant Letters of Administration, limited or otherwise, as the circumstances of the case shall seem to require within such time before the expiration of such three weeks as to him may seem necessary: Provided always that in no case shall such administration be granted until notice of application therefor shall have been published once at least in the Gazette.

13.—Where a caveat shall be entered against the grant of any probate or to any application for Letters of Administration before any grant of probate or of administration shall have been made or when in the opinion of the Judge sufficient objection shall appear against the making of any such grant before such grant shall be made all parties concerned or interested therein or so many of them as the Judge may think necessary shall be cited to show cause before the Judge why probate or administration as the case may be should not be granted to the applicant and such

parties shall on the day to be named in the citation file an answer setting forth succinctly the grounds of their objection and shall at the same time serve a copy of such answer on the applicant, after which on a day to be fixed by the Judge after having heard the case and the parties and having considered the evidence the Judge shall make such order touching the premises as may seem just.

14.—When any of the parties do not appear and answer (due proof of citation on them having been made) the proceedings may be heard and determined *ex parte* or such further time may be given for appearance and on such terms as the Court may direct.

15.—The Court may require the attendance of any party or of any person whom it may think fit to examine or cause to be examined in any proceedings in respect of matters and causes testamentary and may examine or cause to be examined upon oath or affirmation as the case may require parties and witnesses by word of mouth and may either before or after or with or without such examination cause them or any of them to be examined on interrogatories or receive their or any of their affidavits or solemn affirmations as the case may be and the Court may by writ require such attendance and order to be produced before itself or otherwise any deed, evidences, or writings being or purporting to be testamentary or otherwise in the same form or as nearly as may be as that in which a writ of "subpoena ad testificandum," or of "subpoena duces tecum," is now issued out of the Supreme Court and every person disobeying any such writ shall be considered as in Contempt of Court and also be liable to forfeit a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

16.—Any party interested in a will may compel proof thereof in solemn form by serving on the executor or party having execution of such will or praying therefor a citation, whereupon such executor or party shall within ten days after such service file in the office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court a petition verified by affidavit praying that such will may be proved in solemn form and such further proceedings shall thereupon be had for such proof, and if required for contestation of such will as may be directed by any rules of procedure made under this Ordinance.

17.—Any executor or party desiring or having execution of a will may have the same proved in solemn form at any time before the court by filing a petition therefor verified as aforesaid and thereupon such further proceedings shall be had for such proof and if required for contestation of such will as may be directed by any such rules of procedure.

18.—The Court upon sufficient cause being shown may set aside any order or decree obtained in a default upon such terms as to the payment of costs or otherwise as to it may seem just.

19.—When an Executor or Administrator to whom probate or administration has been or shall be granted shall depart from and remain absent from this Colony for the period of one year without having appointed an attorney to act for and represent him the court may on petition verified by affidavit showing to the satisfaction of the court that the interests of parties concerned in the estate are or will be prejudiced by the absence of such Executor or Administrator appoint an Administrator with the will annexed or an Administrator *de bonis non* as the case may be, who shall respectively during the absence of such Executor or Administrator, on giving sufficient security have, possess, and exercise the same power and authority as the Executor or Administrator so absent as aforesaid would have had if personally present and in case of contested proceedings the practice and procedure shall be similar to that provided by the thirtieth section hereof.

20.—In any contested suit for probate or letters of administration the hearing and adjudication thereof shall be in open court and subject thereto, all other proceedings and business under this Ordinance may unless the Court shall otherwise direct be transacted in chambers.

21.—Service of citations shall be made personally upon the party to whom the same shall be directed unless in cases where for sufficient cause the Court shall otherwise direct.

22.—Under special circumstances where it may appear to the Court to be just or expedient probate or administration may be granted to some person other than the person ordinarily or by law entitled to such probate or administration.

23.—All grants of administration and all wills of which probate is granted shall be recorded and such grants and wills together with all the papers in any wise relating thereto shall be in all cases made up and filed together in a convenient form and arranged and preserved in alphabetical order.

24.—It shall be lawful for the Judge of the Supreme Court to make rules for regulating the practice procedure forms pleadings and costs in all suits and other proceedings in the probate side of the court; Provided that no such rules shall be in force until the same have been approved by the Governor in Council.

25.—The following duties shall be payable to Her Majesty for the service of this Colony on the granting of Probate or Letters of Administration in respect of the personal estate of the deceased situate in this Colony, *i. e.*—When such personal estate shall be under the value of £50 ... 2/.

Of the value of £50 and under £100 ... 4/.

Of the value of £100 and under £200 ... 12/.

Of the value of £200 and under £500 ... £2 per cent.

Of the value of £500 and over ... £2 10/ per cent.

26.—The Probate of any will or Letters of Administration granted by a Court of Probate in the United Kingdom or in any British Possession may on being produced to the Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony and a copy thereof deposited in the probate side of the said court be sealed with the seal of the Supreme Court and thereupon shall be of the like force and effect and have the same operation in the Falkland Islands as if granted by the said court: Provided that the Court shall before sealing a Probate or Letters of Administration under this Section be satisfied

(a) That probate duty has been paid in respect of so much of the estate as is liable to probate duty in this Colony,

(b) In the case of Letters of Administration that security has been given under and in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

27.—So much of the 1st Section of Ordinance No. 10 of 1853, as relates to the power authority and jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of the Colony therein described as the Magistrate's Court, in and over the granting of administration of the effects of all persons dying possessed of personal property in the Falkland Islands or the granting of probate of the last wills and testaments of such persons is hereby repealed.

*An Ordinance to amend the law relating to the granting of
Probate of Wills and Letters of Administration.*

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The Supreme Court of the Falkland Islands and the Judge thereof shall have and exercise within the Colony all the jurisdiction, powers and authorities whatsoever possessed and vested in the Court of Probate in England and the Judge thereof at the time of the passing of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act, 1873, (Imperial).

2.—No Probate of the Will nor Letters of Administration of the estate and effects of any person deceased shall be granted by the Judge of the Supreme Court until the person or persons applying for such Probate or Letters of Administration shall have paid to the Colonial Treasurer the probate duty payable under this Ordinance in respect of the estate of the deceased and shall have given bond to the Judge for the time being which bond shall be in such form as the Judge shall by any general or special order direct: Such bond shall be in a penalty of double the amount of the probable value of the estate of the deceased person as stated in the accounts delivered with the petition on which the grant is made or in such other amount as the Judge may by any order to be made in any particular case direct.

3.—If any person shall take possession of and in any way administer any part of the personal estate and effects of any person deceased without obtaining Probate of the Will or Letters of Administration of the estate and effects of the deceased person within six calendar months after his death, every person so offending shall on summary conviction forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty Pounds and such additional sums as would be equal to the amount of duty which would be payable on the grant of Probate of the Will or Letters of Administration of the estate of the deceased.

4.—Applications for Probate or Letters of Administration shall be made by petition to the Judge of the Supreme Court and to every such petition there shall be subjoined or annexed an affidavit verifying the allegations contained in such petition.

5.—In the case of a will the petition must state the death of the testator, that the document produced is believed to be his last will and testament, that the petitioner is the person named as the executor and that the petitioner knows of no other later will made as the last will of the testator.

6.—In the case of intestacy the petition must state the death of the intestate and that he died without leaving a will and it must briefly set forth the grounds on which the petitioner has applied for Letters of Administration.

7.—In the case of a petition for Letters of Administration with the will annexed the petition must set forth the grounds on which the application is based.

7.—In the case of a petition for Letters of Administration with the will annexed the petition must set forth the grounds on which the application is based.

8.—Together with every petition for Probate or Letters of Administration there shall be delivered an account signed by the petitioner of the particulars of the personal estate of the deceased situate in this Colony and of the estimated value thereof in such form as shall be prescribed by rules made under this Ordinance.

9.—If any executor or administrator at any time within one year after having paid probate dues shall discover that the estate of the deceased person was estimated at too high a value in the account delivered by him, and that the amount of duty paid by him was consequently greater than he was liable to pay and shall make the same appear to be the case to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council it shall be lawful for the Governor to issue his Warrant on the Public Treasury for the return to such executor or administrator of any excess of payment so shown to have been made by him.

10.—If any executor or administrator shall through mistake or misapprehension or otherwise without fraud have omitted from the account delivered by him any part of the personal effects or estate of the testator or intestate situate in this Colony such executor or administrator shall immediately after the discovery of such omission notify the Judge of the same and within three calendar months thereafter amend his account and pay the additional duty due on the estate of the deceased without being liable to any penalty or forfeiture under this Ordinance.

11.—The Court may on application made on motion or petition in chambers in a summary way and on being satisfied that the condition of any bond given to the Judge has been broken, order the assignment of the same to some person to be named in such order, and such person, his executors or administrators, shall thereupon be entitled to sue in his or their own name as if the same had been originally given to him instead of to the Judge and shall be entitled to recover thereon as trustee for all persons interested the full amount recoverable in respect of any breach of the condition of the said bond.

12.—Notice of application for Letters of Administration must be given in the Government Gazette for three successive weeks before such letters shall be granted, except in cases where the Judge shall be satisfied by affidavit or otherwise of the existence of any urgent necessity that such grant should be made before the expiration of such three weeks and shall likewise be satisfied that notice of the application has been given to all persons residing within the Colony whose claim to such grant may be prior or preferable to that of the applicant. In every such case the Judge shall have the power to grant to such applicant Letters of Administration, limited or otherwise, as the circumstances of the case shall seem to require within such time before the expiration of such three weeks as to him may seem necessary: Provided always that in no case shall such administration be granted until notice of application therefor shall have been published once at least in the Gazette.

13.—Where a caveat shall be entered against the grant of any probate or to any application for Letters of Administration before any grant of probate or of administration shall have been made or when in the opinion of the Judge sufficient objection shall appear against the making of any such grant before such grant shall be made all parties concerned or interested therein or so many of them as the Judge may think necessary shall be cited to show cause before the Judge why probate or administration as the case may be should not be granted to the applicant and such

parties shall on the day to be named in the citation file an answer setting forth succinctly the grounds of their objection and shall at the same time serve a copy of such answer on the applicant, after which on a day to be fixed by the Judge after having heard the case and the parties and having considered the evidence the Judge shall make such order touching the premises as may seem just.

14.—When any of the parties do not appear and answer (due proof of citation on them having been made) the proceedings may be heard and determined *ex parte* or such further time may be given for appearance and on such terms as the Court may direct.

15.—The Court may require the attendance of any party or of any person whom it may think fit to examine or cause to be examined in any proceedings in respect of matters and causes testamentary and may examine or cause to be examined upon oath or affirmation as the case may require parties and witnesses by word of mouth and may either before or after or with or without such examination cause them or any of them to be examined on interrogatories or receive their or any of their affidavits or solemn affirmations as the case may be and the Court may by writ require such attendance and order to be produced before itself or otherwise any deed, evidences, or writings being or purporting to be testamentary or otherwise in the same form or as nearly as may be as that in which a writ of "subpoena ad testificandum," or of "subpoena duces tecum," is now issued out of the Supreme Court and every person disobeying any such writ shall be considered as in Contempt of Court and also be liable to forfeit a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

16.—Any party interested in a will may compel proof thereof in solemn form by serving on the executor or party having execution of such will or praying therefor a citation, whereupon such executor or party shall within ten days after such service file in the office of the Registrar of the Supreme Court a petition verified by affidavit praying that such will may be proved in solemn form and such further proceedings shall thereupon be had for such proof, and if required for contestation of such will as may be directed by any rules of procedure made under this Ordinance.

17.—Any executor or party desiring or having execution of a will may have the same proved in solemn form at any time before the court by filing a petition therefor verified as aforesaid and thereupon such further proceedings shall be had for such proof and if required for contestation of such will as may be directed by any such rules of procedure.

18.—The Court upon sufficient cause being shown may set aside any order or decree obtained in a default upon such terms as to the payment of costs or otherwise as to it may seem just.

19.—When an Executor or Administrator to whom probate or administration has been or shall be granted shall depart from and remain absent from this Colony for the period of one year without having appointed an attorney to act for and represent him the court may on petition verified by affidavit showing to the satisfaction of the court that the interests of parties concerned in the estate are or will be prejudiced by the absence of such Executor or Administrator appoint an Administrator with the will annexed or an Administrator *de bonis non* as the case may be, who shall respectively during the absence of such Executor or Administrator, on giving sufficient security have, possess, and exercise the same power and authority as the Executor or Administrator so absent as aforesaid would have had if personally present and in case of contested proceedings the practice and procedure shall be similar to that provided by the thirteenth section hereof.

20.—In any contested suit for probate or letters of administration the hearing and adjudication thereof shall be in open court and subject thereto, all other proceedings and business under this Ordinance may unless the Court shall otherwise direct be transacted in chambers.

21.—Service of citations shall be made personally upon the party to whom the same shall be directed unless in cases where for sufficient cause the Court shall otherwise direct.

22.—Under special circumstances where it may appear to the Court to be just or expedient probate or administration may be granted to some person other than the person ordinarily or by law entitled to such probate or administration.

23.—All grants of administration and all wills of which probate is granted shall be recorded and such grants and wills together with all the papers in any wise relating thereto shall be in all cases made up and filed together in a convenient form and arranged and preserved in alphabetical order.

24.—It shall be lawful for the Judge of the Supreme Court to make rules for regulating the practice procedure forms pleadings and costs in all suits and other proceedings in the probate side of the court; Provided that no such rules shall be in force until the same have been approved by the Governor in Council.

25.—The following duties shall be payable to Her Majesty for the service of this Colony on the granting of Probate or Letters of Administration in respect of the personal estate of the deceased situate in this Colony, *i.e.*—When such personal estate shall be under the value of £50 ... 2/.

Of the value of £50 and under £100 ... 4/.

Of the value of £100 and under £200 ... 12/.

Of the value of £200 and under £500 ... £2 per cent.

Of the value of £500 and over ... £2 10/ per cent.

26.—The Probate of any will or Letters of Administration granted by a Court of Probate in the United Kingdom or in any British Possession may on being produced to the Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony and a copy thereof deposited in the probate side of the said court be sealed with the seal of the Supreme Court and thereupon shall be of the like force and effect and have the same operation in the Falkland Islands as if granted by the said court: Provided that the Court shall before sealing a Probate or Letters of Administration under this Section be satisfied

(a) That probate duty has been paid in respect of so much of the estate as is liable to probate duty in this Colony.

(b) In the case of Letters of Administration that security has been given under and in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.

27.—So much of the 1st Section of Ordinance No. 10 of 1853, as relates to the power authority and jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of the Colony therein described as the Magistrate's Court, in and over the granting of administration of the effects of all persons dying possessed of personal property in the Falkland Islands or the granting of probate of the last wills and testaments of such persons is hereby repealed.

28.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Probate Ordinance 1895," and shall come into operation upon the passing thereof.

An Ordinance to regulate and restrict the wearing of Naval and Military Uniforms.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—It shall not be lawful for any person not serving in Her Majesty's Forces to wear without Her Majesty's permission the uniform of any of those forces or any dress having the appearance or bearing any of the regimental or other distinctive marks of any such uniform; Provided that this enactment shall not prevent any person from wearing any uniform or dress in the course of a stage play performed in a place approved by the Governor of the Colony, or in the course of a music hall or circus performance or in the course of any *bona fide* Military representation. If any person contravenes this Section he shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Five Pounds.

2.—If any person not serving in Her Majesty's Naval or Military Forces wears without Her Majesty's permission the uniform of any of those forces or any dress having the appearance or bearing any of the regimental or other distinctive marks of any such uniform in such a manner or under such circumstances as to be likely to bring contempt upon that uniform or employs any other person so to wear that uniform or dress he shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Ten pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month.

3.—In this Ordinance the expression "Her Majesty's Military Forces" means the Regular Forces, the Reserve Forces and the Auxiliary Forces within the meaning of the Imperial Army Act, other than the Naval Coast Volunteers and Naval Volunteers.

The expression "Her Majesty's Naval Forces" means the Navy, the Naval Coast Volunteers and the Naval Volunteers.

4.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Uniforms Ordinance, 1895." and shall come into operation on the passing thereof.

An Ordinance to provide for the appointment of a Stipendary Magistrate for the Island of West Falkland.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

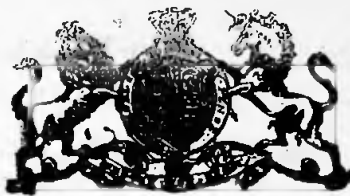
1.—On and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace of these Islands to be Stipendary Magistrate of the West Falkland Island at such salary and allowances as may be fixed by the Governor in Council, which Magistrate shall be stationed at _____ in the said Island and shall visit such other settlements on the Island as he may be directed to do from time to time by the Governor.

2.—Such Stipendary Magistrate shall have and exercise the same powers and jurisdiction at and throughout the West Falkland Island and the small Islands adjacent thereto as are now exercised by the Police Magistrate of the Colony, and shall discharge the duties of Coroner for the said Island and be ex-officio Officer of Customs for the various Ports and Districts thereof.

3.—Either party to any charge or action tried by the said Magistrate shall have the right of appeal from the judgment of such Magistrate if dissatisfied with the same to the Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony. Provided that the party desiring to appeal shall give immediate notice to the said Magistrate of the intention to appeal and shall enter into a recognizance with one or more sureties in such reasonable amount as the said Magistrate shall fix for prosecuting the appeal without delay, and for submitting to such judgment or order as the Judge of the Supreme Court may make and upon this security being given the Magistrate shall abstain from carrying the decision appealed against into execution.

4.—The costs in all cases heard by the said Stipendary Magistrate shall be similar to those allowed in the trial of similar cases in the Police Court at Stanley.

5.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the West Falkland Justice Ordinance and shall come into operation on such day as may be fixed by a notice in that behalf published in the Government Gazette.

An Ordinance to provide for the appointment of a Stipendary Magistrate for the Island of West Falkland.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—On and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace of these Islands to be Stipendary Magistrate of the West Falkland Island at such salary and allowances as may be fixed by the Governor in Council, which Magistrate shall be stationed at _____ in the said Island and shall visit such other settlements on the Island as he may be directed to do from time to time by the Governor.

2.—Such Stipendary Magistrate shall have and exercise the same powers and jurisdiction at and throughout the West Falkland Island and the small Islands adjacent thereto as are now exercised by the Police Magistrate of the Colony, and shall discharge the duties of Coroner for the said Island and be ex-officio Officer of Customs for the various Ports and Districts thereof.

3.—Either party to any charge or action tried by the said Magistrate shall have the right of appeal from the judgment of such Magistrate if dissatisfied with the same to the Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony. Provided that the party desiring to appeal shall give immediate notice to the said Magistrate of the intention to appeal and shall enter into a recognizance with one or more sureties in such reasonable amount as the said Magistrate shall fix for prosecuting the appeal without delay, and for submitting to such judgment or order as the Judge of the Supreme Court may make and upon this security being given the Magistrate shall abstain from carrying the decision appealed against into execution.

4.—The costs in all cases heard by the said Stipendary Magistrate shall be similar to those allowed in the trial of similar cases in the Police Court at Stanley.

5.—This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the West Falkland Justice Ordinance and shall come into operation on such day as may be fixed by a notice in that behalf published in the Government Gazette.

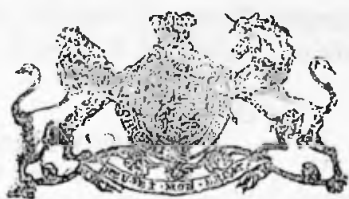

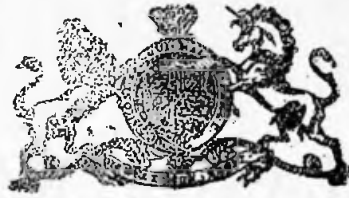

An Ordinance to create the Office of Official Administrator.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint some fit and proper person to be called the Official Administrator of Estates.

2.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to and it shall be his duty to apply for Letters of Administration to the Estates of all persons who shall die intestate without leaving a widower, widow, brother, sister or any lineal ancestor or descendant, or leaving any such relation, if no such relation shall take out Letters of Administration within three months or within such longer or shorter term as the Judge of the Supreme Court to which application is made may direct; and also to the estates of all persons who shall die leaving a Will but leaving no Executor or no Executor who will act if no such relative as aforesaid of such deceased shall within the time aforesaid take out Letters of Administration to the Estate.

3.—The Official Administrator shall keep a full complete and accurate account of all transactions with respect to all estates administered by him and he shall keep all such books as may be necessary for that purpose.

4.—The Official Administrator shall once at least in each year furnish to the Governor a complete and accurate statement of the payments receipts and transactions of his office.

5.—The Official Administrator shall keep all money which shall come into his hands as such Administrator in the Government Savings' Bank, and interest shall be allowed on such money in the same way as interest is allowed on the deposits of private persons. The Official Administrator shall in all cases pay such money into the Savings' Bank as soon as possible after he receives it, and a separate account shall be kept in the Savings' Bank for each estate. The Official Administrator may draw in the same manner as any other depositor any money standing to the credit of any estate for the purposes of the due administration of such estate.

6.—Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator shall be granted on the payment of the same fees and duties and in the same way as Letters of Administration are usually granted.

7.—On the grant of Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator the personal property of the deceased shall vest in the Official Administrator and be assets in his hand for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the deceased in the same way and to the same extent in all respects as such property would have vested in and been assets in the hands of any other Administrator, and the Official Administrator shall discharge the debts and liabilities

of the deceased and shall distribute the surplus in the same way and in the same order of priority and to the same extent that any other Administrator would have been bound to discharge such debts and liabilities and to distribute such surplus if this Law had not been passed.

8.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to a commission of five pounds per centum on the value of all property administered by him: Such commission shall be the remuneration for the time and responsibility of the Official Administrator, but any expenses in respect of any other matters including travelling expenses may be charged by him in the same way that such expenses might be charged under similar circumstances by any other Administrator.

9.—All monies which at the time of the passing of this Ordinance may be deposited in the Government Savings' Bank and entered in the Books of the said Bank to the credit of Intestate Estates shall vest in the Official Administrator and shall be dealt with as it is directed by the fifth and seventh Sections of this Ordinance that monies received by him under this Ordinance shall be dealt with. No commission shall however be allowed to him upon the amount of this deposit. All books, papers and other documents relating to the said deposit and in the hands of the Police Magistrate shall be delivered to and taken charge of by the Official Administrator.

WHEREAS section 8 (3) of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," provides that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make Rules for carrying into effect, as respects British Possessions, the provisions of that Act with respect to the security given by mail ships, and in particular with respect to the commencement of a legal proceeding by service of a writ or process in the Possession, and to the notices to be given to arresting authorities in the Possession, and the evidence to be receivable by such authorities of the security having been given or withdrawn, and the application of the security in discharge of any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture, where the same are or is recovered or payable either in the British Possession, or under proceedings pending concurrently in that British Possession, and in any other British Possession or the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Notices of Exemption.

1.—Any rules of the High Court of Justice in England, made under the provisions of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891" (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a Convention, and shall be published by such Government in the Gazette of the Possession, and also in such local official Gazettes published in the Possession as the Government of the Possession may prescribe.

2.—A copy of every notice and list published by the Board of Trade under the Act, shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a particular Convention.

3.—A copy of every such Notice and list, signed by a Secretary to the Government of the Possession, or other prescribed officer shall be published in the official Gazette of the Possession, and a copy of such Gazette Notification shall be kept publicly exhibited in the Court-room of every Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession, and a copy of the said Gazette containing any such Notification shall be receivable in evidence by every arresting authority in the Possession.

4.—If notwithstanding its exemption, an exempted mail ship is arrested in the Possession, the Government of the Possession, on being informed by the owner of such arrest and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that the ship is an exempted mail ship, shall forthwith send a special Notice to the arresting authority, informing him that the ship is an exempted mail ship, and as such entitled to release.

Actions Against Exempted Ships.

5.—An action may be commenced against the owners of an exempted mail ship in the like cases, in the same manner and subject to the same rules as an Admiralty action *in rem*, and in any Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession in which such an action might have been brought if the ship were not an exempted mail ship.

Orders, by Courts in British Possessions, for Application of the Security.

6.—Any order of a Court in a British Possession directing any security to be applied shall recite the name of the Court and of the action or proceeding, the cause of action, and the judgment debt, and shall comprise a certificate by the Judge of the Court that the ship in respect of which the Judgment is given is an exempted mail ship, and might but for such exemption have been arrested and sold in execution thereof, and that the judgment debt is still unsatisfied, and is payable out of the security lodged in respect of the ship in the High Court of Justice in England.

7.—The order may require payment to be made either in London to a named agent of the execution creditor, or in the Possession to some named officer of the Court from which the order issues.

8.—Every such order shall be sealed with the seal of the Court, and shall be drawn up in duplicate, addressed to the Admiralty Registrar, Royal Courts of Justice, London, and shall be transmitted under cover to the prescribed officer of the Government of the Possession.

9.—The said duplicate orders when received by the prescribed officer shall be countersigned by him, and shall be forthwith transmitted to a Secretary of State, who shall cause one of such orders to be delivered to the Admiralty Registrar, and the Admiralty Registrar shall, subject to any direction of the High Court, make an order upon the Paymaster-General for payment of the required sum out of the security in accordance with these Rules.

10.—Unless the High Court shall otherwise order, and subject to existing rights of priority of liens, orders for the application of any security shall be paid in the order in which they are received by the Admiralty Registrar; but where two or more orders are received at the same time, they shall be paid in the order of their respective dates.

11.—Where the order requires payment to a named agent of the execution creditor in London, the money shall be payable at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State.

12.—If the order requires payment to be made to a named officer of the Court from which the order issues, such an amount shall be paid out by the Paymaster-General, to a person nominated by the Secretary of State, as will at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State be necessary to purchase a draft for the amount of the order payable at sight in the Possession, and such draft shall be in favour of the said named officer of the said Court.

13.—Where any action or proceeding against the owners of an exempted mail ship is pending in a Court in a British Possession, involving a claim against the security lodged in the High Court in England, the Court in the British Possession shall transmit to the Admiralty Registrar notice of the pendency of such action or proceeding, stating the nature and amount of the claim and the proceedings taken in regard thereto; and in case of the subsequent discontinuance or other conclusion of such action or proceeding, whereby the security ceases to be affected, the Court shall transmit notice of such discontinuance or conclusion. Every such notice shall be sealed, drawn up, addressed and transmitted to the Admiralty Registrar in like manner as an order for the application of the security.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

14.—In every British Possession to which these Rules apply, the Governor in Council may, by Order, prescribe any matter directed by these Rules to be prescribed, or necessary for carrying them into effect.

15.—In the application of these Rules to British India, the following provisions shall have effect:—

(a.) The Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, the lower Provinces of Bengal, and the Province of Burmah shall be deemed to be separate British Possessions.

(b.) The expressions "Government of the Possession" and "Governor in Council" respectively shall mean the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal and the Chief Commissioner of Burmah, with respect to the territories administered by them respectively.

(c.) All Orders made in pursuance of Rule 14 with respect to any part of British India shall be made with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council.

16.—In the application of these Rules to any British Possession in which there is a Vice-Admiralty Court, and no Colonial Court of Admiralty, these Rules shall be read as if "Vice-Admiralty Court" were Colonial Court of Admiralty.

17.—In these Rules "judgment debt" means any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture found by any Court to be payable by the owner of a ship, and "execution creditor" means the person entitled to a judgment debt.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Act.

18.—This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1895."

An Ordinance to create the Office of Official Administrator.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint some fit and proper person to be called the Official Administrator of Estates.

2.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to and it shall be his duty to apply for Letters of Administration to the Estates of all persons who shall die intestate without leaving a widower, widow, brother, sister or any lineal ancestor or descendant, or leaving any such relation, if no such relation shall take out Letters of Administration within three months or within such longer or shorter term as the Judge of the Supreme Court to which application is made may direct; and also to the estates of all persons who shall die leaving a Will but leaving no Executor or no Executor who will act if no such relative as aforesaid of such deceased shall within the time aforesaid take out Letters of Administration to the Estate.

3.—The Official Administrator shall keep a full complete and accurate account of all transactions with respect to all estates administered by him and he shall keep all such books as may be necessary for that purpose.

4.—The Official Administrator shall once at least in each year furnish to the Governor a complete and accurate statement of the payments receipts and transactions of his office.

5.—The Official Administrator shall keep all money which shall come into his hands as such Administrator in the Government Savings' Bank, and interest shall be allowed on such money in the same way as interest is allowed on the deposits of private persons. The Official Administrator shall in all cases pay such money into the Savings' Bank as soon as possible after he receives it, and a separate account shall be kept in the Savings' Bank for each estate. The Official Administrator may draw in the same manner as any other depositor any money standing to the credit of any estate for the purposes of the due administration of such estate.

6.—Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator shall be granted on the payment of the same fees and duties and in the same way as Letters of Administration are usually granted.

7.—On the grant of Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator the personal property of the deceased shall vest in the Official Administrator and be assets in his hand for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the deceased in the same way and to the same extent in all respects as such property would have vested in and been assets in the hands of any other Administrator, and the Official Administrator shall discharge the debts and liabilities

of the deceased and shall distribute the surplus in the same way and in the same order of priority and to the same extent that any other Administrator would have been bound to discharge such debts and liabilities and to distribute such surplus if this Law had not been passed.

8.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to a commission of five pounds per centum on the value of all property administered by him: Such commission shall be the remuneration for the time and responsibility of the Official Administrator, but any expenses in respect of any other matters including travelling expenses may be charged by him in the same way that such expenses might be charged under similar circumstances by any other Administrator.

9.—All monies which at the time of the passing of this Ordinance may be deposited in the Government Savings' Bank and entered in the Books of the said Bank to the credit of Intestate Estates shall vest in the Official Administrator and shall be dealt with as it is directed by the fifth and seventh Sections of this Ordinance that monies received by him under this Ordinance shall be dealt with. No commission shall however be allowed to him upon the amount of this deposit. All books, papers and other documents relating to the said deposit and in the hands of the Police Magistrate shall be delivered to and taken charge of by the Official Administrator.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.
THE MAIL SHIPS (RULES) ORDER IN COUNCIL, 1895.
Windsor, 11th May, 1895.

AT the Court at Windsor, the 11th day of May, 1895.

PRESENT,
The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty,

WHEREAS section 8 (3) of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," provides that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make Rules for carrying into effect, as respects British Possessions, the provisions of that Act with respect to the security given by mail ships, and in particular with respect to the commencement of a legal proceeding by service of a writ or process in the Possession, and to the notices to be given to arresting authorities in the Possession, and the evidence to be receivable by such authorities of the security having been given or withdrawn, and the application of the security in discharge of any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture, where the same are or is recovered or payable either in the British Possession, or under proceedings pending concurrently in that British Possession, and in any other British Possession or the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Notices of Exemption.

1.—Any rules of the High Court of Justice in England, made under the provisions of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891" (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a Convention, and shall be published by such Government in the Gazette of the Possession, and also in such local official Gazettes published in the Possession as the Government of the Possession may prescribe.

2.—A copy of every notice and list published by the Board of Trade under the Act shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a particular Convention.

3.—A copy of every such Notice and list, signed by a Secretary to the Government of the Possession, or other prescribed officer, shall be published in the official Gazette of the Possession, and a copy of such Gazette Notification shall be kept publicly exhibited in the Court-room of every Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession, and a copy of the said Gazette containing any such Notification shall be receivable in evidence by every arresting authority in the Possession.

4.—If notwithstanding its exemption, an exempted mail ship is arrested in the Possession, the Government of the Possession, on being informed by the owner of such arrest and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that the ship is an exempted mail ship, shall forthwith send a special Notice to the arresting authority, informing him that the ship is an exempted mail ship, and as such entitled to release.

Actions Against Exempted Ships.

5.—An action may be commenced against the owners of an exempted mail ship in the like cases, in the same manner and subject to the same rules as an Admiralty action *in rem*, and in any Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession in which such an action might have been brought if the ship were not an exempted mail ship.

Orders, by Courts in British Possessions, for Application of the Security.

6.—Any order of a Court in a British Possession directing any security to be applied shall recite the name of the Court and of the action or proceeding, the cause of action, and the judgment debt, and shall comprise a certificate by the Judge of the Court that the ship in respect of which the Judgment is given is an exempted mail ship, and might but for such exemption have been arrested and sold in execution thereof, and that the judgment debt is still unsatisfied, and is payable out of the security lodged in respect of the ship in the High Court of Justice in England.

7.—The order may require payment to be made either in London to a named agent of the execution creditor, or in the Possession to some named officer of the Court from which the order issues.

8.—Every such order shall be sealed with the seal of the Court, and shall be drawn up in duplicate, addressed to the Admiralty Registrar, Royal Courts of Justice, London, and shall be transmitted under cover to the prescribed officer of the Government of the Possession.

9.—The said duplicate orders when received by the prescribed officer shall be countersigned by him, and shall be forthwith transmitted to a Secretary of State, who shall cause one of such orders to be delivered to the Admiralty Registrar, and the Admiralty Registrar shall, subject to any direction of the High Court, make an order upon the Paymaster-General for payment of the required sum out of the security in accordance with these Rules.

10.—Unless the High Court shall otherwise order, and subject to existing rights of priority of liens, orders for the application of any security shall be paid in the order in which they are received by the Admiralty Registrar; but where two or more orders are received at the same time, they shall be paid in the order of their respective dates.

11.—Where the order requires payment to a named agent of the execution creditor in London, the money shall be payable at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State.

12.—If the order requires payment to be made to a named officer of the Court from which the order issues, such an amount shall be paid out by the Paymaster-General, to a person nominated by the Secretary of State, as will at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State be necessary to purchase a draft for the amount of the order payable at sight in the Possession, and such draft shall be in favour of the said named officer of the said Court.

13.—Where any action or proceeding against the owners of an exempted mail ship is pending in a Court in a British Possession involving a claim against the security lodged in the High Court in England, the Court in the British Possession shall transmit to the Admiralty Registrar notice of the pendency of such action or proceeding stating the nature and amount of the claim and the proceedings taken in regard thereto; and in case of the subsequent discontinuance or other conclusion of such action or proceeding, whereby the security ceases to be affected the Court shall transmit notice of such discontinuance or conclusion. Every such notice shall be sealed, drawn up, addressed and transmitted to the Admiralty Registrar in like manner as an order for the application of the security.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

14.—In every British Possession to which these Rules apply, the Governor in Council may, by Order, prescribe any matter directed by these Rules to be prescribed, or necessary for carrying them into effect.

15.—In the application of these Rules to British India, the following provisions shall have effect:—

(a) The Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, the lower Provinces of Bengal, and the Province of Burmah shall be deemed to be separate British Possessions.

(b) The expressions "Government of the Possession" and "Governor in Council" respectively shall mean the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal and the Chief Commissioner of Burmah, with respect to the territories administered by them respectively.

(c) All Orders made in pursuance of Rule 14 with respect to any part of British India shall be made with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council.

16.—In the application of these Rules to any British Possession in which there is a Vice-Admiralty Court, and no Colonial Court of Admiralty, these Rules shall be read as if "Vice-Admiralty Court" were Colonial Court of Admiralty.

17.—In these Rules "judgment debt" means any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture found by any Court to be payable by the owner of a ship, and "execution creditor" means the person entitled to a judgment debt.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Act.

18.—This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1895."

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Ripon, K.G., the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., and the Right Honourable H. H. Fowler, three of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

An Ordinance to create the Office of Official Administrator.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint some fit and proper person to be called the Official Administrator of Estates.

2.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to and it shall be his duty to apply for Letters of Administration to the Estates of all persons who shall die intestate without leaving a widower, widow, brother, sister or any lineal ancestor or descendant, or leaving any such relation, if no such relation shall take out Letters of Administration within three months or within such longer or shorter term as the Judge of the Supreme Court to which application is made may direct; and also to the estates of all persons who shall die leaving a Will but leaving no Executor or no Executor who will act if no such relative as aforesaid of such deceased shall within the time aforesaid take out Letters of Administration to the Estate.

3.—The Official Administrator shall keep a full complete and accurate account of all transactions with respect to all estates administered by him and he shall keep all such books as may be necessary for that purpose.

4.—The Official Administrator shall once at least in each year furnish to the Governor a complete and accurate statement of the payments receipts and transactions of his office.

5.—The Official Administrator shall keep all money which shall come into his hands as such Administrator in the Government Savings' Bank, and interest shall be allowed on such money in the same way as interest is allowed on the deposits of private persons. The Official Administrator shall in all cases pay such money into the Savings' Bank as soon as possible after he receives it, and a separate account shall be kept in the Savings' Bank for each estate. The Official Administrator may draw in the same manner as any other depositor any money standing to the credit of any estate for the purposes of the due administration of such estate.

6.—Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator shall be granted on the payment of the same fees and duties and in the same way as Letters of Administration are usually granted.

7.—On the grant of Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator the personal property of the deceased shall vest in the Official Administrator and be assets in his hand for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the deceased in the same way and to the same extent in all respects as such property would have vested in and been assets in the hands of any other Administrator, and the Official Administrator shall discharge the debts and liabilities

of the deceased and shall distribute the surplus in the same way and in the same order of priority and to the same extent that any other Administrator would have been bound to discharge such debts and liabilities and to distribute such surplus if this Law had not been passed.

8.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to a commission of five pounds per centum on the value of all property administered by him: Such commission shall be the remuneration for the time and responsibility of the Official Administrator, but any expenses in respect of any other matters including travelling expenses may be charged by him in the same way that such expenses might be charged under similar circumstances by any other Administrator.

9.—All monies which at the time of the passing of this Ordinance may be deposited in the Government Savings' Bank and entered in the Books of the said Bank to the credit of Intestate Estates shall vest in the Official Administrator and shall be dealt with as it is directed by the fifth and seventh Sections of this Ordinance that monies received by him under this Ordinance shall be dealt with. No commission shall however be allowed to him upon the amount of this deposit. All books, papers and other documents relating to the said deposit and in the hands of the Police Magistrate shall be delivered to and taken charge of by the Official Administrator.

An Ordinance to create the Office of Official Administrator.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint some fit and proper person to be called the Official Administrator of Estates.

2.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to and it shall be his duty to apply for Letters of Administration to the Estates of all persons who shall die intestate without leaving a widower, widow, brother, sister or any lineal ancestor or descendant, or leaving any such relation, if no such relation shall take out Letters of Administration within three months or within such longer or shorter term as the Judge of the Supreme Court to which application is made may direct; and also to the estates of all persons who shall die leaving a Will but leaving no Executor or no Executor who will act if no such relative as aforesaid of such deceased shall within the time aforesaid take out Letters of Administration to the Estate.

3.—The Official Administrator shall keep a full complete and accurate account of all transactions with respect to all estates administered by him and he shall keep all such books as may be necessary for that purpose.

4.—The Official Administrator shall once at least in each year furnish to the Governor a complete and accurate statement of the payments receipts and transactions of his office.

5.—The Official Administrator shall keep all money which shall come into his hands as such Administrator in the Government Savings' Bank, and interest shall be allowed on such money in the same way as interest is allowed on the deposits of private persons. The Official Administrator shall in all cases pay such money into the Savings' Bank as soon as possible after he receives it, and a separate account shall be kept in the Savings' Bank for each estate. The Official Administrator may draw in the same manner as any other depositor any money standing to the credit of any estate for the purposes of the due administration of such estate.

6.—Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator shall be granted on the payment of the same fees and duties and in the same way as Letters of Administration are usually granted.

7.—On the grant of Letters of Administration to the Official Administrator the personal property of the deceased shall vest in the Official Administrator and be assets in his hand for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the deceased in the same way and to the same extent in all respects as such property would have vested in and been assets in the hands of any other Administrator, and the Official Administrator shall discharge the debts and liabilities

of the deceased and shall distribute the surplus in the same way and in the same order of priority and to the same extent that any other Administrator would have been bound to discharge such debts and liabilities and to distribute such surplus if this Law had not been passed.

8.—The Official Administrator shall be entitled to a commission of five pounds per centum on the value of all property administered by him: Such commission shall be the remuneration for the time and responsibility of the Official Administrator, but any expenses in respect of any other matters including travelling expenses may be charged by him in the same way that such expenses might be charged under similar circumstances by any other Administrator.

9.—All monies which at the time of the passing of this Ordinance may be deposited in the Government Savings' Bank and entered in the Books of the said Bank to the credit of Intestate Estates shall vest in the Official Administrator and shall be dealt with as it is directed by the fifth and seventh Sections of this Ordinance that monies received by him under this Ordinance shall be dealt with. No commission shall however be allowed to him upon the amount of this deposit. All books, papers and other documents relating to the said deposit and in the hands of the Police Magistrate shall be delivered to and taken charge of by the Official Administrator.

The Board appointed by His Excellency the Governor to enquire into the financial condition of the Colony beg leave to report for His Excellency's information, that they have examined the accounts extending as far back as 1886, and have also carefully scrutinized the yearly statements of "Assets and Liabilities" and of "Receipts and Expenditure" which have been issued since that date.

The Accounts with the Crown Agents shewing the Investments on account of "Land Sales" of the "Savings' Bank" and of the "Surplus Fund" were also examined.

These shew that on the 31st December, 1894, the cash balance in the hands of the Crown Agents was £3,189 14 9, and that the Investments on behalf of the Colony were as follows:—

These values represent the actual amount paid, and not the face value of the stock.

According to the Report of the Quarterly Survey of the Treasurer's Chest there was on the same date (31st December, 1894) a cash balance of £1,614 10 3 in the hands of the Treasurer.

Taking into consideration all liabilities, and excluding the amount invested on account of "Land Sales," a net surplus is shown on the 31st December, 1894, of £1,041 11 7. In this is not included either the interest accruing to the Revenue on Invested Funds, nor that accruing as payable to Depositors in the Savings' Bank for the Quarter ended 31st December.

The Books and Accounts of the Treasurer show that the Revenue for the past half year exceeded the expenditure by £104 4 4.

Since the 31st December of last year the amount invested on account of "Land Sales" has been further increased by £1,115 19 2, that on account of Savings' Bank by £799 12 0. and that on account of Surplus Funds by £4,000.

The Crown Agents were instructed by the Treasurer in June of the present year to transfer from invested Surplus Funds to the credit of the Savings' Bank Investments to the amount of about £3,500. These instructions, when carried out, will raise the amount invested on account of the Savings Bank to over £32,000.

We notice in the amounts invested on account of "Land Sales" and which consequently does not appear to the credit of the "Surplus Fund" a sum of £2,000 which accrued from the sale of the foreshore in Stanley to the Falkland Islands Company and Messrs. Dean and Sons in the year 1885. This sum was set apart for a specific purpose to be meanwhile invested in a distinct fund.

An impression has existed that this amount was included in Surplus Funds, but we are satisfied that it has always been included in "Land Sales," and that the surplus shown at the close of each year is actually Surplus revenue. The actual surplus in December, 1890, according to the accounts to that date was only £2,847 18 4, as against £1,041 11 7 on 31st December, 1894, showing that in the past four years only £1,806 6 9 of the original surplus Revenue have been expended,

In further evidence of the Colony's present satisfactory financial condition the Inventory and Valuation returned by the Storekeeper show that there are, in addition, stores to the value of about £1,200 in the Government Store for which no credit has been or will be taken in the Treasury Accounts.

Payment for these stores was made before the 30th June, last.

These stores do not include those such as coal and oil taken to account as advances and which are debited against the Departments as they make use of them.

The Government Storekeeper reports that the purchase of the whole of the present stock has been made since 1891, at which date the value of the entire stock in hand did not exceed £40.

10.—Every quarantine under this Ordinance and any notification relating thereto shall be binding on all persons whomsoever and if any person remove or cause to be removed or assist in removing any sheep from such quarantine, or if any person take any sheep into such quarantine without the authority of an Inspector he shall on conviction for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding (£100) One Hundred Pounds, and all sheep taken in or out of quarantine in contravention of this Ordinance or of any Regulations made hereunder may be seized by any person whomsoever and shall be dealt with as the Inspector shall direct.

11.—Previous to any station or sheep which have been placed in quarantine being released therefrom the proprietor or person in charge of such station or the owner of such sheep shall obtain from the Inspector a Certificate in the Form B that such station or sheep are not infected.

In Clause 9 Form A was amended by the addition of the words "and that the said is in quarantine."

In Clause 11 Form B was amended by the addition of the words "and that such station be released from quarantine."

Clause 12, line 1, the words "such infected" were struck out and the word "any" inserted after the word "sheep" the words "which shall develop scab" were inserted.

Clauses 10, 11 & 12 were re-numbered Clauses 13, 14 & 15.

The following Clause was inserted as Clause 16.

16.—Every owner intending to pack or remove any wool skins or other portion of any infected sheep shall give the Inspector three clear days notice of such intention; and if such owner shall fail to give such notice or shall remove or carry away otherwise than in bags or bales securely packed any such wool skin or other portion of such sheep he shall incur a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds; And any Inspector having just cause for suspecting that any such wool skin or other portion of such infected sheep has been removed or is intended to be removed or is being exposed contrary to the provisions of this section may detain and examine the same, and may also enter upon any premises and search for and examine any wool skin or other portion so suspected of belonging to infected sheep.

Clause 13 was re-numbered Clause 17, and in line 4 after the word "within" the following words were inserted "a period not less than six months, nor exceeding nine months from the date of such order as may be deemed advisable by the Inspector.

Line 5, after the word "period" the words "of six months" were struck out and in line 7 the words "said six months" were struck out and the words "period named by the Inspector in such order" was inserted.

The word "after" the word "sheep" in line 10 were struck out.

Clause 14 was re-numbered Clause 18. In lines 1 and 6 the word "six" was substituted for the word "three" and the words after the word "each" in the 6th line were struck out.

Clauses 15 & 16 were re-numbered clauses 19 & 20.

A new Clause 21 ran as follows:

21.—Every Inspector or other person who shall make or sign any return report or certificate respecting any sheep knowing such return report or certificate respectively to be false, or shall forge or alter or utter or put off any return report notice certificate or permit knowing the same to be forged or altered, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable to imprisonment for any term not exceeding three years.

Clause 17 was re-numbered Clause 22.

Clause 18 was re-numbered Clause 23 and the following words were added at the end of the Clause.

(a) And such permit shall on demand by any Inspector, Justice of the Peace, Constable or Sheep owner be produced.

The following were inserted as Clauses 24, 25, 26, 27 & 28.

24.—Any proprietor or person in charge of a station may seize and detain

Preamble.

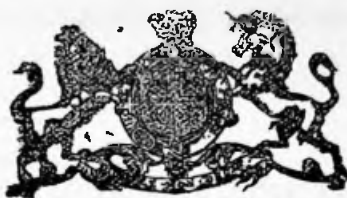

No. 12 of 1895.

An Ordinance to amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—Whenever the owner of any sheep shall become aware or shall have reasonable grounds to suspect that the same have become infected he shall within forty-eight hours thereafter give notice thereof in writing to the owners of adjoining stations and shall also within one week thereafter give notice thereof in writing to the Inspector. The owner of such sheep shall also pending the arrival of the Inspector conform to the Rules and Regulations that may be made for his guidance in such cases under the Scab Ordinance, 1895. Every owner who shall wilfully neglect or omit to give such notices as required by this section shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for every days default.

2.—It shall be lawful for the Inspector when it shall appear to him to be necessary for the purpose of enabling him to decide satisfactorily upon the condition of any sheep for which a clean certificate under Section 20 of the Scab Ordinance, 1895, may be applied for, to call upon the owner of such sheep to make a declaration in the Form in the Schedule to this Ordinance annexed, and if any such owner shall refuse or neglect to make such declaration when so called upon no such clean certificate shall be granted and if any owner shall make any such declaration knowing the same to be false he shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding six months or in the discretion of the Convicting Magistrate or Justices to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

3.—Every owner of sheep shall between the 31st day of March and 14th day of April in every year deliver or cause to be delivered to the Inspector a written return of the total number of sheep and lambs of each sex exceeding three months old owned by him on the 1st day of March preceding and shall specify in such return the ear-mark or brand of such owner. Every owner who shall wilfully neglect or omit to make such return shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Pound for every weeks' default. The ear-mark or brand shall be subject to the approval of the Inspector and when approved shall be registered and a description of the same published in the Government Gazette.

4.—Every owner of infected sheep shall within one month after his sheep are found to be infected have in readiness a proper dipping place with other appliances material and medicaments requisite for dipping such sheep to the satisfaction of the Inspector under a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

An Ordinance to amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Notice of infection of sheep to be given to adjoining owners.

1.—Whenever the owner of any sheep shall become aware or shall have reasonable grounds to suspect that the same have become infected he shall within forty-eight hours thereafter give notice thereof in writing to the owners of adjoining stations and shall also within one week thereafter give notice thereof in writing to the Inspector. The owner of such sheep shall also pending the arrival of the Inspector conform to the Rules and Regulations that may be made for his guidance in such cases under the Scab Ordinance, 1895. Every owner who shall wilfully neglect or omit to give such notices as required by this section shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for every days default.

24.—Any proprietor or person in charge of a station may seize and detain any infected sheep and may detain and examine any travelling sheep approaching or being upon any part of his station upon reasonable suspicion of their being infected and upon his giving the owner of such sheep written notice to that effect he may detain them until their owner shall call in the Inspector to examine such sheep and determine whether or not they are infected; and if the owner shall prevent such sheep from being detained or examined as aforesaid or impede or hinder the proprietor or person in charge in detaining or examining them, or shall not forthwith after their detention give the Inspector written notice thereof, then such owner shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

25.—Any person so detaining any travelling sheep shall until the arrival of the Inspector either keep such sheep on his own station or make such other arrangements as shall prevent the further spread of disease under a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds; and if such sheep shall be declared infected all necessary expenses incurred by such person in the detention and keep of such sheep shall be repaid to him by their owner; Provided however that if the sheep so detained shall be found on examination not to be infected and that the person detaining them had no reasonable grounds for suspecting them to be infected he shall pay to the owner of such sheep the loss and expense occasioned by such detention.

26.—The Inspector may issue an order to any owner intending to start any suspected sheep to travel, or to the owner of any doubtful sheep which may then be actually travelling, to drive such sheep to their destination by a certain route laid down in such order; and every owner shall drive such sheep in conformity with such order under a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

27.—If any person shall cast any infected sheep into any stream or water or leave the carcasses of any such sheep in any stream or water he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

28.—If with intent to cause it to appear that any sheep are not infected within the meaning of this Ordinance or to conceal the ownership of any sheep any person shall separate any of the sheep of a flock from any others of the same flock or conceal or destroy any sheep or remove any mark from any sheep he shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

Clause 19 was re-numbered Clause 29.

In line 5 the word "fifty" was struck out and the words "one hundred" substituted.

In line 8 the word "twenty" was substituted for the word "ten."

Clauses 20 and 21 were re-numbered Clauses 30 and 31.

Clauses 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26, were re-numbered Clauses 33, 34, 35, 36 & 37.

The following were inserted as Clauses 38, 39 and 40.

38.—All sheep above the age of six months shall be marked and kept legibly marked by the owner thereof with his registered mark.

39.—For the purposes of this Ordinance or any regulations hereunder proof that the registered mark of any owner is marked on any sheep and that it is the only registered mark thereon shall be *prima facie* evidence of the ownership of such sheep.

40.—Every person found guilty of any of the following acts relating to the marks and marking of any sheep shall on conviction for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds, viz:

(i.) Wilfully or negligently marking with his own registered mark any sheep of which he is not the owner or wilfully or negligently permitting any such sheep to be marked with his registered mark.

(ii.) Wilfully defacing destroying cropping or altering any ear or other mark on sheep of which he is not the owner or permitting or being privy to the destruction defacement or alteration thereof.

(iii.) Cutting off the tip or more than one-fourth of the ear of any sheep.

(iv.) Using on any sheep the registered mark of any other person without his authority.

(v.) Or in any other way offending against any of the provisions of this Ordinance or of any Regulations relating to the marking of sheep.

The numbers of the subsequent clauses were eliminated.

A Clause which ran as follows "Any statement certificate notice or order of an Inspector shall in every case for the purposes of this Act be *prima facie* evidence of the truth of the matter contained in such statement certificate notice or order and shall be considered conclusive unless the contrary be proved" was inserted after the Clause dealing with the mode of recovering penalties.

In the Clause empowering the Governor to make Rules. &c., Section 2, line 3, before the word "Medicaments" the word "proper" was inserted.

The Bill was left in Committee Stage.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the suspension of the Standing Orders with a view to proceeding with the consideration of the other Bills standing on the Orders of the Day which was duly seconded by His Honour the Judge and carried.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved the Second Reading and consideration in Committee of "An Ordinance for the Regulation of the Post Office," explaining that its object was to bring Article 31 of the International Postal Regulations into force in the Colony and vested powers in the Governor by Order in Council to effect changes whenever it was necessary to apply any other of the Regulations. His Honour the Judge seconded. The Bill went through Committee without amendment.

On the Council resuming the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Second Reading and consideration in Committee of "An Ordinance to amend the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894." His Honour the Judge seconded stating that the amendments were made in accordance with instructions conveyed by the Secretary of State.

The following amendments were made:

Clause 1, line 1, the words "and 15th" were inserted after "14th" and the words at the end of the Clause "and the following substituted therefor" were struck out.

Clause 2, line 8, after the word "disposal" the words "in the care of his friends or" were inserted.

The Council resumed its sitting. The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Second Reading and consideration in Committee of "An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and to make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination," explaining the provisions of the Bill.

The Honourable J. J. Felton seconded.

The following amendments were made:

Clause 1, line 4, the word "eight" was substituted for the word "six" and at the end of the Clause the following words were added "unless reasonable grounds be shown for such failure."

Line 2, the word "fail" was substituted for the word "neglect."

The Bill was left in Committee.

The Council adjourned until the 27th instant.

At an adjourned Meeting of the Legislative Council held on the 27th February, 1895.

The Council having resolved itself into Committee the following clauses (*vide Bill*) were added to the Ordinance and stood as Clauses 4, 5 and 6.

Clause 4 of the Bill was re-numbered clause 7.

The Council resumed its sitting.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon gave notice that at the next meeting of the Council he would move the Third Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Lunacy Ordinance, 1894."

The Council resumed its consideration in Committee of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1863, and to make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination," when the following words were added to clauses 4 and 7 respectively, the words at the end of clause 4 from the words "for this" in line 21 to "conviction" in line 24 being struck out.

When clause 4 was going through Committee, His Excellency called attention to the absence of awarding punishment to every subsequent disobedience of the order. The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon strongly urged the necessity of taking every precaution to prevent continued disobedience of such an order. It was unanimously considered that power should be given to the Magistrate to inflict a fine if a man showed himself recalcitrant.

His Excellency informed the Council that their wishes in this respect would be conveyed to the Secretary of State.

On the Council resuming its sitting the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon gave notice that at the next meeting he would move the Third Reading and passing of the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 1 of 1868, and to make further provision for Compulsory Vaccination."

The Council having resolved itself into Committee the enacting clause and title of the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance for the Regulation of the Post Office" were read. The Council resumed, and the Standing Orders having been suspended, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the Third Reading and passing of the Bill entitled "An Ordinance for the Regulation of the Post Office."

His Honour the Judge seconded and the Bill was read a third time and passed.

The Council then resumed its consideration in Committee of the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to make provision for the Eradication of Scab or other Infectious or Contagious diseases in Sheep."

The following Clauses (*vide Bill*) were carried and stood as Clauses 41, 42 & 43.

On Clause 41 His Excellency desired that his opinion might be recorded, in order not to appear inconsistent, that it would be unfair if the tax to defray the cost of carrying the Ordinance into effect were levied on the land according to the acreage as the recorded acreage of some Stations would prove to be much less than the actual acreage if surveyed.

The Council resumed its sitting.

The Secretary of State's Despatch No. 73 of 29th August, 1894 having been read, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the following resolution: "That a sum of £60 per annum, being at the rate of £1 4 per pupil be voted as a Grant in Aid towards the Baptist School.

The Resolution was unanimously carried.

The Council adjourned until the 28th February, 1895

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the 30th July, 1868, made by Her Majesty in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her by the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that the Merchant Ships of the United States of America the measurement whereof should after the 1st January, 1865, have been ascertained and denoted on the registers and other national papers of such ships, testified by the date thereof, should be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose, in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the Certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships, after making therefrom the same deductions, in respect of crew space and engine room, as would, if such ships were British, be made from their gross tonnage under the laws relating to British Ships.

And whereas by another Order in Council, dated the 19th March, 1883, made in exercise of the aforesaid powers Her Majesty was pleased to direct as follows:—

- 1.—As regards sailing ships, that Merchant Sailing Ships of the United States of America, the measurement whereof after the 5th August, 1882, has been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such sailing ships, testified by the date thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage noted in such registers and other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of Registry of British sailing ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships.
- 2.—As regards Steam Ships:—that Merchant Ships belonging to the United States of America, which are propelled by steam or any other power requiring engine room, the measurement whereof shall, after the said 5th day of August, 1882, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such steamships, testified by the dates thereof, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in such registers or other national papers in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purpose in, to, and for which the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of British ships is deemed to be the tonnage of such ships. Provided nevertheless that if the owner or master of any such American steamship desires the deduction for engine room measurement and deduction applicable to British ships instead of under the American Rule, the engine room shall be measured, and the deduction calculated according to the British rules.

And whereas by Section 84 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is enacted that, whenever it appears to Her Majesty the Queen in Council, that the tonnage regulations of that Act have been adopted by any Foreign Country, and are in force there, Her Majesty in Council may order that the ships of that Country shall, without being remeasured in Her Majesty's dominions, be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their Certificates of registry or other national papers, in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes as the tonnage denoted in the certificate of registry of a British ship is deemed to be the tonnage of that ship.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty in Council that the tonnage regulations of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, have been adopted by the United States of America and such regulations are now in force there, having come into operation on the 1st day of April, 1895.

And whereas there still are or may be ships belonging to the United States of America to which the hereinbefore recited Orders of the 30th July, 1868, and the 19th March, 1883, may respectively apply, and it is expedient not to revoke the same, but to let the said recited Orders remain in force so long as there are any ships to which the same may so respectively apply.

And whereas the provisions of Section One of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with.

NOW, THEREFORE, Her Majesty in pursuance and exercise of the powers hereinbefore mentioned, is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to direct that the Merchant ships of the United States of America the measurement whereof shall, after the 1st day of April, 1895, have been ascertained and denoted in the registers and other national papers of such ships, shall be deemed to be of the tonnage denoted in their certificates of registry or other national papers in the same manner, to the same extent, and for the same purposes as the tonnage denoted in the certificate of Registry of a British ship is deemed to be the tonnage of that ship.

The Council resumed.

His Honour the Judge then moved the following resolution :

That a sum of £500 be granted from general revenue for the purpose of defraying the cost of a house to be used as Officers quarters, and in reply to a question by the Honourable A. E. Baillon as to how the sum was to be met His Excellency stated that the financial condition of the Colony was better than in the previous year, there were £2569 balance according to the last Treasury State while there was a sum of £1700 in transit to England and the Surplus Fund stood at £1982.

An Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—When there shall in the opinion of the Inspector be no sufficient natural boundary between two stations and there is no sufficient dividing fence between such stations the Inspector may, if he considers it necessary for the eradication of Scab on the stations, issue an order in writing to the occupiers of the said stations to erect a sufficient fence between such stations within eighteen months from the date of the service of such order. Any occupier of a station who shall neglect to obey such order shall be liable to a penalty not less than pounds and not exceeding pounds for every week he shall remain in default.

2.—In this Ordinance the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them as under :—

“*Occupier.*”—Shall include and mean the owner, lessee or manager of a station.

“*Sufficient Fence.*”—Shall mean a fence not less than 3 feet 3 inches high, constructed of six wires, with droppers or standards not more than 10 feet apart, the bottom wire of which fence shall in no case be more than six inches from the ground, or a fence constructed of wire netting and touching the ground, and not less than 3 feet 3 inches high, with standards not more than 10 feet apart.

3.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of “The Scab Ordinance, 1895.”

The following list of Persons between the ages of Twenty-one and Sixty years, being the owners or occupiers of real property of the value of not less than Ten Pounds per annum, resident in the Colony, who are liable to serve as Jurors for the year 1896, is published in accordance with Section 3, of Ordinance 6 of 1889.

Any objections thereto if made in writing to me within fourteen days after publication will be heard and determined by me within one month after publication at the Police Magistrate's Court on a day of which notice will be given in the Official Gazette at least three days before the hearing of such objections.

An Ordinance to amend the Customs Duties Consolidation Ordinance, 1895.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, thereof, as follows:—

1.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time by Order in Council to name and appoint Ports of Entry in the Colony and declare the limits thereof: Provided however that Port Stanley on the Island of East Falkland and the Port of Fox Bay on the Island of West Falkland shall continue as heretofore to be Ports of Entry without further order or notice.

2.—If the master of any vessel arriving from ports beyond the seas brings such vessel to anchor at or has any communication with any part of the coast or shores of the Colony other than the Port of Stanley, the Port of Fox Bay or such other Port as may hereafter be declared by Order in Council a Port of Entry before making due report inwards of such vessel to the Collector or Deputy Collector of Customs the master shall on being convicted thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds: Provided that if any vessel is driven into any bay or place on the Coast of the Colony by stress of weather or by being disabled on proof thereof no such Penalty shall be imposed: Provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the Collector or Deputy Collector of Customs upon being applied to by the agent of the owner or master of a vessel expected to arrive within the Colony, from issuing a permit or authority for such vessel to enter any bay or place not being a port of entry upon the said agent agreeing to pay the expenses of a duly qualified Officer of Customs to be despatched to await the arrival of the vessel at such bay or place.

And upon application being so made to the Collector of Customs or Deputy Collector he is hereby authorized to grant such authority upon provision being made as aforesaid for the presence of an Officer of Customs at the bay or place, permit to enter at which has been applied for, and the master of any vessel entering such bay or place under such authority shall be exempt from any penalty under this Ordinance.

3.—The word "place" in the second line of the 34th Section of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 is hereby repealed, and the words "port of entry" substituted in lieu thereof, and the Section shall be read and construed as if the words "port of entry" had been originally inserted therein.

4.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of "The Customs Duties Consolidation Ordinance 1891," and shall come into effect from the passing thereof.

2.—If the master of any vessel arriving from ports beyond the seas brings such vessel to anchor at or has any communication with any part of the coast or shores of the Colony other than the Port of Stanley, the Port of Fox Bay or such other Port as may hereafter be declared by Order in Council a Port of Entry before making due report inwards of such vessel to the Collector of Customs or without authority as hereinafter provided for the master shall on being convicted thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and such vessel shall be liable to forfeiture: Provided that if any vessel is driven into any bay or place on the Coast of the Colony by stress of weather or by being disabled on proof thereof no such Penalty or Forfeiture shall be incurred: Provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the Collector of Customs upon being applied to by the agent of the owner or of the master of a vessel expected to arrive within the Colony, from issuing if he thinks advisable a permit or authority for such vessel to enter any bay or place not being a port of entry upon the said agent agreeing to pay the expenses of a duly qualified Officer or Officers of Customs to be despatched to await the arrival of the vessel at such bay or place.

3.—The word "place" in the second line of the 34th Section of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 is hereby repealed, and the words "port of entry" substituted in lieu thereof, and the Section shall be read and construed as if the words "port of entry" had been originally inserted therein.

by the Owners of Adjoining Lands.*

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—Where there shall be no sufficient natural boundary between two adjoining Stations and there shall be no dividing Fence between such Stations or the existing fence is from want of repair or other cause not a sufficient fence it may be lawful for the owner of either Station to call on the owner of the adjoining Station by notice in writing to come to an agreement as to the extent or nature of the fence to be erected or the repairs or work to be done to make the existing fence sufficient within the meaning of this Ordinance.

2.—If the parties shall fail within fourteen days after the giving of such notice to come to such agreement as aforesaid it shall be lawful for the party who shall have given the notice to apply to a Stock Inspector to view the Stations and to report upon the necessity for a fence or what repairs or additions to the existing fence are necessary.

3.—The Stock Inspector shall be entitled when so applied to to enter on such Stations for the purposes referred to in the immediately foregoing section and it shall be the duty of the said Inspector to carefully view and inspect the lands and to make a report in writing upon the extent of fence that it is necessary to erect or what repairs or improvements are necessary to make the existing fence sufficient within the meaning of this Ordinance, which report shall be delivered as soon as practicable to the party making the application.

4.—Upon such report being received it shall be lawful for the party who shall have made the application to at once proceed to erect the fence or to repair or improve the existing fence and on the completion of the work the said party shall be entitled to recover from the owner of the adjoining Station one half of the cost of the work so done by action or suit before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands upon a certificate being produced from a Stock Inspector that the fence has been erected or repaired or improved according to the terms of the Inspector's report.

5.—It shall be lawful for the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate before whom action is brought under the foregoing section, upon being satisfied that the defendant is unable from want of capital to immediately pay his proportion of the cost of the work to grant the defendant time for the payment thereof upon his entering into an agreement to pay the amount with interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum at such periods and by such instalments as shall be ordered by the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate. Provided however that it shall not be lawful for the Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate aforesaid to extend the time for payment in such cases beyond a period of ten years.

6.—If any defendant to whom time has been given for payment under the foregoing section shall fail to comply with any of the terms of the agreement entered into by him as aforesaid the plaintiff in the action shall be entitled to at once issue execution, under the judgment originally recovered, for the amount of principal and interest which may be still due and owing.

7.—When any damage shall be done to a dividing fence between two Stations, which is a sufficient fence within the meaning of this Ordinance, by any stock which is suffered to be on the Station bounded by such dividing fence by the owner thereof, such owner shall bear the entire cost of repairing such fence and if he refuses or neglects so to repair the said fence the adjoining owner may at once proceed to repair the same and shall be entitled upon completion of the work immediately to recover the cost thereof from the owner of the Station on which the stock was suffered to remain in an action or suit before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands. In such cases the preceding sections of this Ordinance shall not apply.

8.—Any person who shall wilfully break down, injure or leave open any gate of a Station or break down or injure any fence erected on a Station shall be liable on conviction before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding months,

9.—The preceding Sections of this Ordinance shall not apply to the erection or improvement of fences within the town of Stanley, or within any place which may hereafter be declared to be a township by the Governor of the Colony, but in all such cases when complaint is made to the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands by the owner of a lot of land in such town or township that there is no dividing fence between such lot and the adjoining lot of land, or that the existing fence is out of repair and that the adjoining owner has neglected or refused to assist in a fair and equitable proportion to make or repair such division fence, it shall be lawful for the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate to issue an order to any two indifferent freeholders of the town or township commanding them to view the premises and to make a report in writing to such Magistrate respecting what kind of fence will be most proper for the situation of the premises, or what repairs or improvements will be necessary to the existing fence; which report having been made it shall be lawful for the party who shall have made such complaint to proceed under the order of the Magistrate to make or repair such fence agreeably to the report of the said freeholders, and when the work shall be completed the same freeholders or any other two indifferent freeholders of the town or township shall in like manner be ordered to inspect the work, and upon their certificate that the work has been properly done according to the terms of the report the party who shall have made the complaint shall be entitled to recover one-half of the cost of the work from the owner of the adjoining lot in a summary way before the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate.

10.—If any freeholder so ordered to view premises and make report as aforesaid shall refuse or neglect to do so he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds, which penalty shall be recovered in a summary way before the Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate aforesaid, and all freeholders so ordered by a Magistrate shall be entitled to enter and inspect the land referred to in the order without the permission or leave of the owner or owners thereof.

11.—The fifth, sixth and seventh Sections of Ordinance No. 2 of 1857, are hereby repealed.

12.—In this Ordinance, except where inconsistent with the context, the following words shall have the meanings hereunder assigned them :—

1.—Where there shall be no sufficient natural boundary between two adjoining Stations and there shall be no dividing Fence between such Stations or the existing fence is from want of repair or other cause not a sufficient fence it may be lawful for the owner of either Station to call on the owner of the adjoining Station by notice in writing to come to an agreement as to the extent or nature of the fence to be erected or the repairs or work to be done to make the existing fence sufficient within the meaning of this Ordinance.

2.—If the parties shall fail within fourteen days after the giving of such notice to come to such agreement as aforesaid it shall be lawful for the party who shall have given the notice to apply to a Stock Inspector to view the Stations and to report upon the necessity for a fence or what repairs or additions to the existing fence are necessary.

3.—The Stock Inspector shall be entitled when so applied to to enter on such Stations for the purposes referred to in the immediately foregoing section and it shall be the duty of the said Inspector to carefully view and inspect the lands and to make a report in writing upon the extent of fence that it is necessary to erect or what repairs or improvements are necessary to make the existing fence sufficient within the meaning of this Ordinance, which report shall be delivered as soon as practicable to the party making the application.

4.—Upon such report being received it shall be lawful for the party who shall have made the application to at once proceed to erect the fence or to repair or improve the existing fence and on the completion of the work the said party shall be entitled to recover from the owner of the adjoining Station one half of the cost of the work so done by action or suit before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands upon a certificate being produced from a Stock Inspector that the fence has been erected or repaired or improved according to the terms of the Inspector's report.

5.—It shall be lawful for the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate before whom action is brought under the foregoing section, upon being satisfied that the defendant is unable from want of capital to immediately pay his proportion of the cost of the work to grant the defendant time for the payment thereof upon his entering into an agreement to pay the amount with interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum at such periods and by such instalments as shall be ordered by the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate. Provided however that it shall not be lawful for the Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate aforesaid to extend the time for payment in such cases beyond a period of ten years.

6.—If any defendant to whom time has been given for payment under the foregoing section shall fail to comply with any of the terms of the agreement entered into by him as aforesaid the plaintiff in the action shall be entitled to at once issue execution, under the judgment originally recovered, for the amount of principal and interest which may be still due and owing.

7.—When any damage shall be done to a dividing fence between two Stations, which is a sufficient fence within the meaning of this Ordinance, by any stock which is suffered to be on the Station bounded by such dividing fence by the owner thereof, such owner shall bear the entire cost of repairing such fence and if he refuses or neglects so to repair the said fence the adjoining owner may at once proceed to repair the same and shall be entitled upon completion of the work immediately to recover the cost thereof from the owner of the Station on which the stock was suffered to remain in an action or suit before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands. In such cases the preceding sections of this Ordinance shall not apply.

8.—Any person who shall wilfully break down, injure or leave open any gate of a Station or break down or injure any fence erected on a Station shall be liable on conviction before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding months,

9.—The preceding Sections of this Ordinance shall not apply to the erection or improvement of fences within the town of Stanley, or within any place which may hereafter be declared to be a township by the Governor of the Colony, but in all such cases when complaint is made to the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands by the owner of a lot of land in such town or township that there is no dividing fence between such lot and the adjoining lot of land, or that the existing fence is out of repair and that the adjoining owner has neglected or refused to assist in a fair and equitable proportion to make or repair such division fence, it shall be lawful for the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate to issue an order to any two indifferent freeholders of the town or township commanding them to view the premises and to make a report in writing to such Magistrate respecting what kind of fence will be most proper for the situation of the premises, or what repairs or improvements will be necessary to the existing fence; which report having been made it shall be lawful for the party who shall have made such complaint to proceed under the order of the Magistrate to make or repair such fence agreeably to the report of the said freeholders, and when the work shall be completed the same freeholders or any other two indifferent freeholders of the town or township shall in like manner be ordered to inspect the work, and upon their certificate that the work has been properly done according to the terms of the report the party who shall have made the complaint shall be entitled to recover one-half of the cost of the work from the owner of the adjoining lot in a summary way before the said Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate.

10.—If any freeholder so ordered to view premises and make report as aforesaid shall refuse or neglect to do so he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds, which penalty shall be recovered in a summary way before the Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate aforesaid, and all freeholders so ordered by a Magistrate shall be entitled to enter and inspect the land referred to in the order without the permission or leave of the owner or owners thereof.

11.—The fifth, sixth and seventh Sections of Ordinance No. 2 of 1857, are hereby repealed.

12.—In this Ordinance, except where inconsistent with the context, the following words shall have the meanings hereunder assigned them :—

“*Stock.*”—Shall mean any stallion, mare, gelding, foal, bull, cow, steer, calf, ram, ewe, wether or lamb.

“*Sufficient Fence.*”—Shall mean a fence not less than 3 feet 3 inches high constructed of six wires with droppers or standards not more than ten feet apart, the bottom wire of which fence shall not be more than six inches from the ground, or a fence constructed of wire netting touching the ground and not less than 3 feet 3 inches high, with standards not more than ten feet apart.

“*Owner.*”—Shall mean not only the owner in fee simple but also the lessee or manager or agent in charge of the land.

“*Stock Inspector*” and “*Inspector.*”—Shall mean any Inspector appointed under the provisions of “The Scab Ordinance, 1895.”

“*Station.*”—Shall mean land occupied or used for depasturing sheep by any person.

13.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the passing thereof and may be cited for all purposes as “The Fencing Ordinance, 1895.”

An Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1.—When there shall in the opinion of the Inspector be no sufficient natural boundary between two stations and there is no sufficient dividing fence between such stations the Inspector may, if he considers it necessary for the eradication of Scab on the stations, issue an order in writing to the occupiers of the said stations to erect a sufficient fence between such stations within eighteen months from the date of the service of such order. Any occupier of a station who shall neglect to obey such order shall be liable to a penalty not less than pounds and not exceeding pounds for every week he shall remain in default.

2.—In this Ordinance the following words shall have the meanings assigned to them as under :—

" *Occupier.*"—Shall include and mean the owner, lessee or manager of a station.

" *Sufficient Fence.*"—Shall mean a fence not less than 3 feet 8 inches high, constructed of six wires, with droppers or standards not more than 10 feet apart, the bottom wire of which fence shall in no case be more than six inches from the ground, or a fence constructed of wire netting and touching the ground, and not less than 3 feet 3 inches high, with standards not more than 10 feet apart.

1.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time by Order in Council to name and appoint Ports of Entry in the Colony and declare the limits thereof: Provided however that Port Stanley on the Island of East Falkland and the Port of Fox Bay on the Island of West Falkland shall continue as heretofore to be Ports of Entry without further order or notice.

No vessels to enter other places than Ports of Entry

2.—If the master of any vessel arriving from parts beyond the seas brings such vessel to anchor at or has any communication with any part of the coast or shores of the Colony other than the Port of Stanley, the Port of Fox Bay or such other Port as may hereafter be declared by Order in Council a Port of Entry before making due report inwards of such vessel to the Collector of Customs or without authority as hereinafter provided for, the master shall on being convicted thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and such vessel shall be liable to forfeiture: Provided that if any vessel is driven into any bay or place on the Coast of the Colony by stress of weather or by being disabled or by other unavoidable circumstances on proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council no such Penalty or Forfeiture shall be incurred: Provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the Collector of Customs upon being applied to by the agent of the owner or of the master of a vessel expected to arrive within the Colony, from issuing if he thinks advisable a permit or authority for such vessel to enter any bay or place, not being a port of entry, upon the said agent agreeing to pay the expenses of a duly qualified Officer or Officers of Customs to be despatched to await the arrival of the vessel at such bay or place.

Penalty.

Collector of Customs empowered to give permit for vessel to enter other places.

Amendment of Ordinance 5 of 1891.

3.—The word "place" in the second line of the 34th Section of Ordinance No. 5 of 1891 is hereby repealed, and the words "port of entry" substituted in lieu thereof, and the Section shall be read and construed as if the words "port of entry" had been originally inserted therein.

Title of Act

4.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of "The Customs Duties Consolidation Ordinance 1891," and shall come into effect from the date of passing thereof.

An Ordinance for regulating the Law relating to Conspiracy and and to the protection of property and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—An agreement or combination by two or more persons to do or procure to be done any Act in contemplation or furtherance of a trade dispute between employers and workmen shall not be indictable as a Conspiracy if such Acts committed by one person would not be punishable as a crime.

Nothing in this Section shall exempt from punishment any persons guilty of a conspiracy for which a punishment is awarded by any Ordinance of the Colony or Act of Parliament of Great Britain in force within the Colony.

Nothing in this Section shall effect the law relating to riot, unlawful assembly, breach of the peace or sedition, or any offence against the State or Sovereign.

A crime for the purposes of this Section means an offence punishable on indictment or an offence which is punishable on summary conviction and for the commission of which the offender is liable under the Ordinance or Statute making the offence punishable to be imprisoned either absolutely or at the discretion of the Court as an alternative for some other punishment.

When a person is convicted of any such Agreement or combination as aforesaid to do or procure to be done an act which is punishable only on summary conviction and is sentenced to imprisonment, the imprisonment shall not exceed three months or such longer time (if any) as may have been prescribed by the Ordinance or Statute for the punishment of the said Act when committed by one person.

2.—When any person wilfully and maliciously breaks a contract of service or of hiring knowing or having reasonable cause to believe that the probable consequences of his so doing either alone or in combination with others will be to endanger human life or cause serious bodily injury or to expose valuable property whether real or personal to destruction or serious injury he shall on conviction thereof by the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands be liable either to pay a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or to be imprisoned for a term not exceeding three months with or without hard labour.

3.—Where a master being liable to provide for his servant or apprentice necessary food, clothing, medical aid or lodging wilfully and without lawful excuse refuses or neglects to provide the same whereby the health of the servant or apprentice is or is likely to be seriously or permanently injured he shall on conviction before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands be liable either to pay a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or to be imprisoned for a term not exceeding three months with or without hard labour.

4.—Every person who with a view to compel any other person to abstain from doing or to do any Act which such other person has a legal right to do or abstain from doing wrongfully and without legal authority.

(i.) Uses violence to or intimidates such other person or his wife or children or injures his property, or

(ii.) Persistently follows such person about from place to place, or

(iii.) Hides any tools, clothes or other property owned or used by such other person or deprives him of or hinders him in the use thereof;

(iv.) Watches or besets the house or other place where such other person resides or works or carries on business or happens to be or the approach to such house or,

(v.) Follows such other person with two or more other persons in a disorderly manner in or through any street or road shall on conviction thereof before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands be liable either to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or to be imprisoned for a term not exceeding three months with or without hard labour;

Attending at or near the house or place where a person resides or works or carries on business or happens to be or the approach to such house or place in order merely to obtain or communicate information shall not be deemed a watching or besetting within the meaning of this Section.

5.—If any party feels aggrieved by any conviction before the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands under this Ordinance the party so aggrieved may appeal therefrom to the Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony upon the appellant entering into a recognizance with or without sureties conditioned personally to try such appeal and to abide the judgment of the Court thereon and to pay such costs as may be awarded by the Court.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the introduction and First reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Customs Duties Consolidation Ordinance, 1891."

The Standing Orders were suspended with a view to proceeding with the consideration of the Second Reading of the Bill.

A motion for the Second Reading being duly made by His Honour the Judge, who briefly explained the intention of the various clauses of the Bill, and seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary. The Council went into Committee on the Bill.

On clauses 1, 4, 5 and 6 the Honourable J. J. Felton referred to the provisions of the other draft Ordinance on the Orders of the Day entitled "An Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895," and, in connection therewith, the Honourable Member instanced the position of the original owner of an existing fence and asked if the original owner pulled down his fence because it was dilapidated he could call upon his neighbour to erect another at joint expense and whether he could call upon him to bear the proportion of the cost of repairing the existing fence.

He remarked on the length of time that the party who had applied for the erection of the fence might be out of pocket owing to the insolvency or impecunious condition of his neighbour and to the possibility of that party, if time for payment to him were extended for some years, not exceeding ten, as provided thereby, or for some other reason, becoming himself impecunious; if this were so the relative positions even of the parties might be reversed yet repayment by instalments only would continue to be required under the law. The Honourable Member also commented on the fact of no security being required for the

payment of instalments and asked if Government had the right to fix the rate of interest to be charged on the amount due by the defendant in clause 5.

It was explained to the Honourable Member with regard to existing fences put up at the expense of one individual, that the law could not be held to be retrospective, that there was nothing to prevent a man from pulling down his own fence, and, if re-erected or repaired at joint expense, the neighbours would naturally have an interest in it. It was suggested that Government might lend the necessary amount to the parties who were unable to meet their proportion of the cost of the erection of fences taking the leases as security for the ultimate re-payment of the money. With regard to the insertion of the rate of interest it was explained that exceptional measures were necessarily required to meet exceptional legislation.

The clauses 1, 4, 5 and 6 were left for further consideration in Committee.

There was no discussion on clauses 2, 3, 7 and 8.

In clause 8, last line, the word "six" was inserted before the word "months"

Clause 9. The Honourable J. J. Felton enquired if this clause referred to suburban lands. His Honour replied that these lands if used for depasturing, would be considered as "stations" under the interpretation clause 12, that a reference would be made to ascertain if any previous Ordinance had determined the "limits of Stanley" but that it was not intended that this clause should extend beyond the town.

On the Honourable J. J. Felton's suggestion it was generally agreed that some remuneration, to be defrayed by the party who failed to erect the fence, should be given to the freeholders ordered to view and report as provided by the clause.

No amendments were made in clauses 10, 11, 12 and 13.

The Bill was left in Committee.

The Council resumed.

His Honour the Judge then moved the introduction and first reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance 1895."

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary.

The Bill was read by title.

On the Standing Orders being duly suspended, His Honour moved the second reading and going into Committee on the Bill.

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary.

Clause 1. The Honourable J. J. Felton questioned the practicability of erecting fences within the period specified, 18 months; and was uncertain as to how far it would affect the agreement proposed in the Ordinance just previously under discussion; he, himself, thought it would over-ride it and render it abortive. Moreover, the financial condition of some farmers would not allow them to defray such an expense within such a short space of time.

After some discussion, His Excellency stated that, if the un-official members concurred, the Government might consider the advisability, with the approval of the Secretary of State, of lending money on the security of their leases in such instances where the action of the Government necessitated a person to fence for the purpose of the eradication of scab; but not in the other instance under the general fencing Ordinance.

The consideration of the draft Ordinance was consequently postponed with a view to the member in charge of the Bill, together with the Colonial Secretary, meeting the un-official members to devise some scheme under which, when a fence is so required to be erected, assistance might be given in the manner suggested above.

The Council then adjourned.

No. 8 of 1896.

An Ordinance to provide for the Administration of unrepresented Estates in the Falkland Islands.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Interpretation Clause.

1.—In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires, the following terms shall have the meaning hereinafter respectively assigned to them, that is to say:—

“The Judge” shall mean the Judge of the Supreme Court.

“The Court” shall mean the Supreme Court.

“Property” shall include goods, choses in action, land and every kind of property whether real or personal and every kind of Estate and interest present or future, vested or contingent.

“Unrepresented Estate” shall mean

(1). The Estate of every person who shall die intestate and whose widow, husband or next of kin shall be unknown, or shall have refused to take out Letters of Administration, or shall be absent from the Falkland Islands without having an agent therein.

(2). The Estate of every person who shall die having made a will, when owing to any cause it shall be necessary to appoint administrators *cum testamento annexo* or *de bonis non* of such Estate, and the person entitled to such Letters of Administration shall be unknown or shall refuse to take out such Letters of Administration or shall be absent from the Falkland Islands without having an agent therein.

(3). Every Estate whereof the Executors or Administrators shall be absent from the Falkland Islands without having an agent therein.

Letters of Administration not to be granted to creditor.

2.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance no Letters of Administration shall be granted to any person in the character of a creditor, but in every case where but for this Ordinance Letters of Administration of any Estate would be granted to a creditor thereof, such Estate shall be considered as unrepresented within the meaning of this Ordinance.

Appointment of Official Administrator.

3.—The Governor may appoint an Officer to be called the Official Administrator, who, previously to entering upon the duties hereinafter defined, shall enter into recognizance with two sureties in such sum as the Governor shall order and shall take and subscribe the following oath:

“ I do swear that I will faithfully, honestly and diligently perform the duties of Official Administrator without fear or favour, partiality or affection.—
So HELP ME GOD.”

and until such appointment is made and thereafter whenever there

shall be no Official Administrator so appointed the Colonial Secretary shall be ex-officio Official Administrator.

Official Administrator not
to act as Agent or Executor

4.—The Official Administrator shall not act as the agent of any person, nor as Executor or Administrator of any deceased person unless of any member of his own family not more remote than the fourth degree, and shall be personally responsible for the honesty and fidelity of every clerk and other person whom he may deem it necessary to employ in the execution of the duties of his Office.

Estates to devolve upon
successor on death, &c.

5.—Upon the death, resignation or removal from Office of any Official Administrator for the time being all property in his hands or under his control as such Official Administrator, and all rights, powers and duties vested in him under any order made under this Ordinance shall devolve upon and be vested in his successor, whether ex-officio or by appointment, and upon every appointment of an Official Administrator all property, rights, powers and duties (if any) then in the hands or under the control or vested in the Colonial Secretary of the Colony as ex-officio Official Administrator shall devolve upon and be vested in the person so appointed; and no legal process commenced by or against any Official Administrator in his Office as such shall abate or be prejudiced by the death, resignation or removal of such Official Administrator but the same may continue by or against his successor.

Official Administrator to
petition Court.

6.—The Official Administrator shall, whenever he shall become aware of any Estate which he shall consider unrepresented, present a petition to the Court in the Form in the Schedule hereto, stating the particulars of such Estate and praying for an order to collect and receive the same, and the Court shall, upon being satisfied that such Estate is unrepresented, grant such order accordingly, and thereupon the Official Administrator shall forthwith cause an inventory to be made of the Estate mentioned in such order and shall file the same in the Court.

Administrator may take
possession.

7.—The Official Administrator shall, if he think fit so to do, immediately on becoming aware of any unrepresented Estate, and before obtaining the order in the foregoing section mentioned, enter upon the Estate for the purpose of sealing up or making such other dispositions for the security of such Estate as he may deem necessary.

Court may revoke order.

8.—If upon the representation of any person claiming to be legally entitled to the Administration or management of any Estate in respect of which any such order shall have been made as aforesaid, the Court shall be satisfied that the applicant is so entitled, the Court may revoke such order and direct the Official Administrator to desist from interfering with such Estate or may make such other order as the Court shall seem meet: Provided always that all matters and things which shall have been *bona fide* done or performed by the Official Administrator previously to the determination of such order shall be valid and effectual to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Administrator to collect
debts.

9.—The Official Administrator shall as soon as possible after obtaining an order to collect any Estate got in and collect all debts due to the same and institute such legal process as may be requisite for compelling payment thereof. All such process shall be carried on in the name of the Official Administrator.

Interest to be paid on
money retained by any
person.

10.—If any person shall retain in his hands or employ for his own benefit or knowingly permit any person so to retain or employ any sum of money or other effects, part of any unrepresented Estate, after a demand therefor shall have been made by the Official Administrator, every such person shall be charged and pay interest on such money or on the value of such effects at the rate of 12 per centum per annum for the time during which he

shall have retained or employed the same, or permitted the same to be retained or employed as aforesaid, and the Official Administrator is hereby authorised and required to demand and sue for such interest either together with the principal money or effects, or separately, as he may think fit.

Notices to creditors.

11.—The Official Administrator shall, immediately after obtaining an order to collect any Estate, publish in the Falkland Islands Gazette and shall also affix on the Government notice board in Stanley, a notice calling upon the creditors of the Estate mentioned in such notice to come in and prove their claims on or before a certain day to be therein named, or in default thereof to be excluded from any benefit arising from such Estate, and if so ordered by the Court shall also publish such notice in one or more papers published out of the Colony to be selected by the Court, and shall repeat such notices so often as the Court shall order, and claimants or creditors residing within the Colony shall be bound to file their claims at the Office of the Official Administrator within three months after such notice as aforesaid; and claimants or others residing out of the Colony shall be bound to file their claims within six months after the publication of the last notice in such foreign paper as aforesaid, on pain, in default thereof, of being excluded from any benefit arising from such Estate.

Creditors to file claims.

Form of claims.

12.—All claims filed by creditors or claimants shall express the name and place of abode of the creditor or claimant, the origin of the debt or claim, the degree or class of such debt and the particulars and exact amount thereof, verified by affidavit, and there shall also be annexed to every such claim the documents purporting to be evidence thereof.

Disputes as to validity of claims to be settled by Court.

13.—In the event of any dispute arising as to the validity of any claim, the parties, or on their default or where the Official Administrator himself entertains doubts of the validity of any claim, the Official Administrator shall draw up and settle a statement in writing of the grounds of such dispute, and shall submit the same to the Court, and the Court shall thereupon make such order thereon as the circumstances of the case may require. But no action or suit shall be brought against the Official Administrator in respect of any debt due from an Estate under his administration.

Sale of perishable property

14.—The Court may at any time make an order for the immediate sale by the Official Administrator of such part of any Estate as shall be of a perishable nature or from any cause whatever deteriorating in value.

Administrator to sell personal property.

15.—The Official Administrator shall, within three months after entering into possession of any Estate, sell and dispose of all the personal property belonging to such Estate by public auction after such public notice thereof as is usual in the case of sales by order of the Court. Provided always that the Court may by any order in that behalf extend the time for such sale, or direct such personal property to be disposed of by private contract.

Court may order sale of realty.

16.—In case the Court shall be satisfied that the proceeds of the sale of the personal property belonging to any Estate are insufficient to discharge the debts and liabilities attaching to such Estate, the Court may by its order direct the Official Administrator to sell the whole or such part of the real property belonging to such Estate as the Court may deem necessary for the purpose aforesaid, and such sale shall be subject to all the incidents of a sale of real property by order of the Court: Provided always that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be taken or construed to give any purchaser any other or better title to such property than shall have been possessed by the last owner thereof.

17.—All monies received by the Official Administrator in the

Monies to be paid into Savings Bank.

Distribution of proceeds of Estate.

execution of his Office, whether of debts due to the Estate, the proceeds of sale, or from whatsoever source they may be derived, shall forthwith be paid into the Government Savings Bank to the account of the Official Administrator, and the Official Administrator shall submit monthly to the Judge a return showing all such sums with the date when paid into the Government Savings Bank and the Estate to whose credit they have been received.

18.—After the expiration of 12 months from the date of the order for taking possession of any Estate, the Official Administrator shall dispose of the moneys arising out of such Estate as follows, that is to say:—

- (1). He shall reimburse himself of all such costs and charges as he shall reasonably have incurred in collecting the Estate, such costs and charges having been previously authorized by the Court.
- (2). He shall pay into the Treasury $6\frac{1}{4}$ per centum upon the gross amount of the money arising out of the Estate, to be applied as hereinafter mentioned.
- (3). He shall pay the creditors of the Estate in the order prescribed by law if sufficient money shall remain for the payment thereof in full.
- (4). He shall pay the balance (if any) which shall remain after such payments into the Treasury in trust for the next of kin, heir-at-law, legatee or devisee of the deceased, as the case may be.

If sufficient money shall not remain after the satisfaction of Subsection (1) & (2) for the payment of all creditors in full, then the amount shall be divided rateably among the creditors.

Application of $6\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

19.—The $6\frac{1}{4}$ per centum to be paid by the Official Administrator into the Treasury under Subsection (2) of the last preceding section shall be applied in manner following, that is to say:—

- (1). 5 per centum shall be paid by the Treasurer to the Official Administrator on the production of the certificates required by section 24 of this Ordinance as a remuneration for the services he is required to perform.
- (2). $1\frac{1}{4}$ per centum shall be carried to a reserve fund for defraying the incidental expenses necessitated by this Ordinance. Provided always that the Governor may at any time order that the remuneration by this section provided to be paid to the Official Administrator shall be commuted for a fixed salary without reference to the amount at any time produced by such remuneration.

Disposal of real property.

20.—When after winding up an Estate any real property remains undisposed of, the Official Administrator shall forthwith, and before closing the accounts of such Estate, apply to the Court for directions as to the disposal of such real property, and the Court may order the same to be sold, or may appoint a receiver or make such other order as to the Court shall seem just.

Certain expenses to be paid from reserve fund.

21.—The expenses of every legal process and other matter which it shall be necessary for the Official Administrator to institute or perform on behalf of any Estate, the assets of which shall be insufficient to defray such expenses shall be paid out of the reserve fund.

Expenses paid by order from Governor.

22.—Upon the application of the Official Administrator the Governor may make orders by Warrant upon the Treasurer for the payment out of the said reserved fund to the Official Administrator of such monies as shall from time to time be payable therefrom under the provisions of this Ordinance.

Audit of accounts by Judge.

23.—The Official Administrator shall monthly exhibit a statement of his accounts to the Judge, who shall satisfy himself as to their correctness and also that the payments into the Government Savings Bank, prescribed by section 17 to be made, have been duly and punctually carried out. The moneys prescribed by section 18, to be paid into the Treasury, shall be so paid within 48 hours of the final winding up of the Estate.

Administrator to obtain Judge's Certificate.

24.—As a condition precedent to the payment by the Treasurer to the Official Administrator of the remuneration provided by section 10, or if the same shall have been commuted, of any salary arising from such commutation, the Official Administrator shall obtain from the Judge and deliver to the Treasurer a certificate in the following form:—

"I hereby certify that the Official Administrator has duly exhibited to me the monthly statement of accounts required by section 23 of the Unrepresented Estates Ordinance Falkland Islands, 1898, and that I have audited the same and found them correct, and that all payments required to be made into the Government Savings Bank have been so made."

A. B., Judge.

25.—The Official Administrator shall keep a separate account of and for each Estate that he shall administer under this Ordinance, and shall keep the following books:—

Books.

A book for entry of claims against every Estate. A book for entry of debts due to every Estate. Cash book. Journal. Ledger.

Inspection of books.

Any person may inspect the books and accounts of the Official Administrator during his Office hours and on payment of a fee of one shilling.

Estate of intestate illegitimate how dealt with.

26.—The balance of the Estate of an intestate who is illegitimate and leaves no widow or lineal descendant, when paid into the Treasury as provided by section 18, unless any claim or claims by the natural relations of the intestate be recognized by the Governor in Council, may be appropriated for such public purposes as shall be approved by the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Estate of intestate whose kindred are unknown how dealt with.

27.—The balance of the Estate of an Intestate whose kindred are unknown, when paid into the Treasury as provided by section 18 shall be invested under the head of "The Intestates Estates Fund" in securities to be approved by the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and shall be allowed to accumulate with interest for a period of ten years at the expiration of which period all claims thereto shall be barred and the principal and accumulated interest shall lapse to the Government of the Falkland Islands and may be appropriated for such public purposes as shall be approved by the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Balance of Estate of intestate illegitimate, &c., in hands of Police Magistrate how dealt with.

28.—All monies which at the time of the passing of this Ordinance shall be deposited in the Government Savings Bank and entered in the books of the said Bank to the credit of "Intestate Estates" shall vest in the Official Administrator and shall when they form part of the estate of an intestate illegitimate who left no widow or lineal descendant or of the estate of an intestate whose kindred are unknown, be immediately paid by him into the Treasury and be dealt with as provided by the 26th and 27th sections respectively of this Ordinance, and all books, papers and other documents relating to the said deposit and in the hands of the Police Magistrate of the Colony or any other Official, shall be delivered to and taken charge of by the Official Administrator.

29.—The Official Administrator shall in every case of intestacy in which the kindred of an intestate are unknown cause notice o

Notice of fact of kin of

Persons claiming balance

Short title.

the fact to be inserted as soon as practicable in at least one public newspaper in England and also in the case of a foreigner in a public newspaper of the country of which the intestate was a native for a period of one month. The notice of intestacy and of the fact that the kindred of the intestate are unknown shall also contain the name and nationality of the intestate, the date of his death and the value of the estate.

30.—Any person who shall claim in any other character than that of a creditor thereof, any Estate or balance which may be in the hands or under the control of the Official Administrator, or of the Treasurer, or which may be invested in the Intestate Estates Fund, may apply to the Court by petition to have the same delivered over to him; and the Court upon being satisfied of the validity of such claim shall make such order as may be just; and where two or more persons shall lay claim to any such Estate or balance, the Court may, with the consent of the parties, dispose of their claims by determining the same in a summary manner, and may make such order therein with regard to costs and all other matters as the circumstances may require; but where the parties do not consent, they shall proceed to obtain a decision of their claims according to the ordinary course of law; and the Official Administrator or Treasurer, as the case may be, shall, if necessary, take such steps as shall be requisite for compelling such parties to interplead.

31.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the passing thereof, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Unrepresented Estates Ordinance, 1896."

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Council resumed its consideration in Committee on the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the erection of dividing fences by the owners of adjoining lands."

His Honour the Judge stated that following on the suggestion made at the last meeting the Committee had met and had arrived at the conclusion that when time was given under Clause 5 the defendant should find security for the payment of instalments, and that under Clause 6 such security—either personal or that of sureties—should constitute a preferable lien against subsequent incumbrances on all property of the defendant or sureties. These amendments had accordingly been embodied in revised clauses which were now about to be laid before the Council.

His Excellency thought that under Clause 6, as amended, an adjoining leaseholder if unfriendly with a neighbour and knowing him to be heavily mortgaged and unable to find sureties might enforce him to fence, and that therefore the provisions of this Clause would put a powerful weapon in his hand.

After some discussion His Excellency said that there was no need for hasty legislation since the provisions of the existing Scab Ordinance, as already pointed out by His Honour the Judge, might in time bring about the fencing which was devised by the present proposed Ordinance.

The Council concurred in the Bill being left in Committee so that it might be referred to the Secretary of State with a view to the opinions of those more experienced in the matter being obtained.

It was however considered advisable that the proposed amendments should be discussed and—if carried—inserted, so that the Bill with the amended clauses might be laid before the Secretary of State.

Clause 1 passed without amendment.

Clause 5. The Un-Official Members recorded it as their opinion that the payment by instalments should commence with the commencement and not after the completion of the work, and that security should be demanded previous to commencing the work.

It was pointed out by His Honour the Judge that from a person enforcing the erection of a fence would appear that the work would be more beneficial to him than to his neighbour, and that no money should be recoverable until after the completion of the work.

His Excellency however stated that there would be no objection to the period for payment being extended to 10 years from the commencement of the work.

After some further discussion it was thought advisable that when the parties did not mutually agree to erect fences the report of the Stock Inspector consequent on the application of one of the parties should be delivered to the Magistrate and not to the party making the application: And that such Magistrate should after enquiry order the erection and decide as to the best means whereby the cost, by payment of instalments, should be defrayed.

This was unanimously agreed to, and the consideration of Clauses 3, 4, 5 and 6 were consequently held over for further amendment.

In Clause 9, line 26, the words "in a summary way" were struck out, and the words "by suit or action" inserted.

A new Clause, after Clause 9, making provision for the remuneration of freeholders inspecting lots was carried, and read as follows:—

10.—Each freeholder who may be ordered to view premises under the preceding Section shall be allowed by the Magistrate the sum of ten shillings per diem for the time necessarily employed in viewing the lot of land referred to in the order of the Magistrate which sum or sums of money shall be paid by the owner of the lot of land who shall have neglected or refused to assist in making or repairing a division fence, and upon non-payment of the amount allowed the Magistrate before whom the case shall have been heard shall issue his Warrant to recover the amount by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the party making default.

In Clause 13, line 4, the following words were inserted, "Magistrate," shall mean Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands, and the word "Magistrate" inserted in the clauses wherever the words Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands occurred.

The Bill was left in Committee.

The Council resumed.

On being duly moved into Committee the Council resumed its consideration of the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895."

The following amended Clauses which stood as Clauses 1 and 2 were carried.

1.—If it shall appear to the Chief Inspector on his own view that there is no sufficient natural boundary between two stations and no sufficient dividing fence between such stations the Inspector may, if he considers it necessary for the eradication of Scab on the stations, issue an order in writing to the occupiers of the said stations to erect a sufficient fence between such stations within eighteen months from the date of the service of such order: Provided however that the said Inspector shall be entitled and is hereby empowered when he shall become satisfied that because of the situation or natural conditions of any station it is impracticable to complete the erection of a dividing fence within such period of eighteen months to extend the time within which a dividing fence shall be erected on such station for such further period as to the said Chief Inspector shall seem fair and reasonable.

2.—Any occupier of a station who shall wilfully neglect to obey an order issued by the Chief Inspector under the preceding section within the period named in such order shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Ten Pounds and not exceeding Twenty Pounds for every month he shall remain in default. No occupier of a station shall however be considered guilty of such wilful neglect who shall within the time fixed by the Inspector have completed what is certified by the Inspector to be either occupier's proper proportion of the work of erecting such dividing fence.

In Clause 3, "Sufficient Fence" it was considered advisable that a combined wire netting and wire fence should be also deemed a sufficient fence and that this Sub-Clause should be accordingly revised.

Clause 3 was re-numbered Clause 4.

The Bill was left in Committee.

On the Council resuming His Honour the Judge moved the Introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance for regulating the law relating to Conspiracy and to the protection of property and for other purposes." Explaining that its provisions were based indeed almost similar to those of Vic. 38 & 89 Cap. 86.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded.

The Bill was read by title.

The Council adjourned until the 10th February.

The Council resumed in Committee the consideration of Clauses 3, 4, 5 & 6 of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the erection of dividing fences by the owners of adjoining lands."

His Honour the Judge laid before the Council certain revised Clauses drafted to meet the suggestions proposed at the last meeting. Before proceeding further he thought it right to state however that in introducing the Fencing Ordinances and the various amendments thereto it was not to be concluded that he cordially approved of them as a whole, but that he had yielded on many points in deference to the opinions of the Executive and Members of the Legislative Council but whilst expressing this opinion he would not vote against the amendments. A careful consideration, he added, of the whole question inclined him more strongly than ever to his original opinion that all that is required, after a Station has been viewed by a Scab Inspector and the necessity for a dividing fence reported, is for the owner desirous of fencing to complete the fence under order of a Magistrate, who upon its completion should be entitled to immediately recover half the cost from the adjoining owner. He did not think any great hardship would result from this either to the rich or poorer farmer.

His Honour further added that he certainly objected to an inquisitorial enquiry into the private means of an individual as soon as an owner wishes to fence. On the other hand, when the fence is completed the leaseholder erecting it should at once recover the share of the cost from the adjoining leaseholder.

His Excellency after some remarks from the Unofficial Members who appeared to be in favour of the proposed amendments said, that in face of what the Legal Adviser had stated he was not prepared to give effect to the Ordinance should the amendments be passed, and proposed that this Bill and the Bill to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895 should be left in Committee.

His Excellency addressing the Honourable J. J. Felton asked how he would have liked when entering on his farm to have been requested to do what was now proposed. The case is not similar with the adjoining owner, for instance, take those who have recently acquired land, they pay on the acreage ascertained by survey and a high rental, whereas farmers in many cases do not pay on one half the land leased, had not he and others stated that the farms could not pay on such a rental and yet he was asking that more should be demanded from the small farmers. His Excellency then asked the Unofficial Members to state their views on the matter in writing so that they, together with the original Draft Ordinance and these proposed amendments, might be forwarded to the Secretary of State for his instructions.

The Council then continued its consideration in Committee of an Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

Clause 2 was further amended by the words in lines 1 & 2 "obey an order issued by the Chief Inspector under the preceding section within the period named in such order" being struck out and the words "erect a dividing fence within the period fixed by the Chief Inspector under the preceding section" substituted therefor.

Clause 3. "A sufficient fence" was interpreted as follows: "shall mean a fence constructed of not less than 6 wires, or a fence constructed of wire or of wire and wire netting. The fence to have droppers or standards not less than 10 feet apart and to be not less than 3 feet 3 inches high and the bottom of the fence to be not less than six inches from the ground."

It was generally considered that the powers proposed by this Ordinance were too great to be vested in one authority. It was not thought expedient however for the Magistrate to intervene where the matter depended on the competency of an expert, such as a Scab Inspector, but there might be some appeal against his order say perhaps to the Governor-in-Council.

The Bill was left in Committee with a view to it being forwarded to the Secretary of State for his instructions thereon.

On the Council resuming, His Honour the Judge moved the Second Reading and going into Committee on an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance for regulating the Law relating to Conspiracy and to the protection of property and for other purposes."

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, the following amendments were made:—

Clause 1, lines 6 to 9, the words "nothing in this Section shall exempt from punishment any persons to.....the Colony" were deleted

Clause 3, line 1, the word "legally" was inserted after the word "being."

The following stood as Clauses 6 & 7.

6.—"Upon the hearing and determination of any case under Sections 2 and 3 of this Ordinance the respective parties to the contract of service their husbands or or wives shall be deemed and considered as competent witnesses."

7.—"In this Ordinance the word "Magistrate" shall include and mean the "Police Magistrate of the Colony or the Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands."

And the word "Magistrate" consequently inserted wherever the words "the Police Magistrate of the Colony or Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falklands" occurred.

The Council resumed when, the Standing Orders having been suspended, His Honour the Judge moved the Third Reading and passing of the Bill.

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

The Council adjourned.

An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs Duties and Trade.

Whereas it is expedient to consolidate and amend the several Ordinances now in force for the purpose of fixing the duties of Customs and levying and collecting the same.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance all Ordinances relating to Customs Duties and Trade are hereby repealed, and from henceforth there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid, unto Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, for the use of this Colony, the several duties of Customs in the "Tariff of Import duties" in the Schedule hereto.

2.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, to appoint proper persons to execute the duties of the several offices necessary to the collection of the customs and all matters connected therewith; Provided that the several persons now filling or discharging the duties of such offices shall continue to fill and discharge the same during Her Majesty's pleasure.

3.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to appoint Ports of Entry in the Colony, and declare the limits thereof. The Port of Stanley and the Port of Fox Bay shall continue however to be Ports of Entry without further notice or order.

4.—The Master of every vessel whether laden or in ballast shall, within twenty-four hours after arrival from parts beyond the seas at a Port of Entry in the Colony make due report (as in Form No. I of this Ordinance) of such vessel to the Collector of Customs; Provided always that if any suspicion arise as to the character of such vessel such report may be required forthwith, together with the production and lodging of the ship's papers with the Collector of Customs. Such reports shall be made before bulk be broken or any goods whatever, except personal luggage, passed by an Officer of Customs, shall be removed, landed, or waterborne from any such vessel. If the Master shall fail to make due report, or if the particulars or any of them contained in such report be false, he shall forfeit the sum of fifty pounds, and all goods not reported shall be forfeited; Provided that the Collector of Customs may forego the prosecution where no wilful error has been made, and subject the Master to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

5.—The Master of every vessel shall at the time of making report answer all such questions relating to the vessel, cargo, crew, and voyage, as shall be put to him by the Collector or Officer of Customs; and if such Master shall fail to make due report, or if the particulars or any of them contained in such report be false, or if he does not answer the questions demanded of him or does not answer truly, or if after the arrival within four leagues of the Port for which the vessel is bound, bulk shall be broken or any alteration made in the stowage of the cargo of such vessel, or if any part be staved, destroyed,

or thrown overboard or any package opened, unless cause be shown to the satisfaction of the Collector or in his absence the Officer of Customs, in every such case the Master shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, and in case the said Master shall fail to pay the amount of the penalties incurred under this section and all costs of recovering the same, the Collector or Officer of Customs as aforesaid shall have full power and authority to detain such vessel and not allow the same to leave the said Port until such amount has been duly paid and all expenses attendant thereon; and in case any goods be not reported, such goods shall be forfeited unless it appear that there was no fraudulent intention, in which case the Master shall be allowed to amend his report, and the goods may in the meantime be removed to the Government Warehouse,

6.—If the contents of any package in such vessel shall be reported by the Master as being unknown to him any duly authorized Officer of Customs shall open and examine such package on board such vessel, or cause the same to be brought to the Government Warehouse for that purpose at the expense of the owner of such package.

7.—On the arrival of any vessel in any Port of Entry in the Colony it shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to send one or more Officers of Customs on board of such vessel who shall remain on board at the discretion of the Collector of Customs till all goods are landed from such vessel, and the duties, if any, shall have been paid or otherwise accounted for to the satisfaction of the Collector, and there shall be paid for the services of every Officer so proceeding or remaining on board, as aforesaid, by the Master or Consignee of such vessel to the Treasurer for the purposes of general revenue, the sum of ten shillings for every day or part of a day during which such Officer shall be so employed; and further it shall be lawful for the Collector or other Officer of Customs to go on board any vessel at any time and rummage and search all parts of such vessel in order to ascertain the quantity of articles liable to duty which the vessel may contain.

8.—The Master of any vessel on board of which any Officer or Officers of Customs may be placed by the Collector of Customs under the powers given by the preceding section, shall provide food for and sufficient room and accommodation under the deck for the bed or hammock of every such Officer, for which a sum of three shillings per diem for each Officer shall be allowed to the Master.

9.—The Master of every vessel on board of which an Officer or Officers of Customs may have been placed shall, at the discretion of the Collector of Customs, either give an undertaking for payment or make a deposit with such Collector of Customs of such sum as, in the opinion of the Collector of Customs, shall be sufficient, on the termination of the duties of such Officer or Officers of Customs, to pay his or their return passage from the Port at which the cargo of such vessel may have been discharged.

10.—If the Master of any vessel arriving from parts beyond the seas brings such vessel to anchor at, or has any communication with, any part of the coast or shores of the Colony, other than the Port of Stanley, the Port of Fox Bay, or such other Port as may hereafter be declared by Order in Council a Port of Entry, before making due report inwards of such vessel to the Collector of Customs, or without authority as hereinafter provided for, the Master shall on being convicted thereof be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and such vessel shall be liable to forfeiture: Provided that if any vessel is driven into any Bay or place on the Coast of the Colony by stress of weather, or by being disabled, on proof thereof no such Penalty or Forfeiture shall be incurred: Provided also that nothing herein contained shall prevent the Collector of Customs upon being

applied to by the Agent of the Owner or of the Master of a vessel expected to arrive within the Colony, from issuing if he thinks advisable a permit or authority for such vessel to enter any Bay or place, not being a port of entry, upon the said Agent agreeing to pay the expenses of a duly qualified Officer or Officers of Customs to be despatched to await the arrival of the vessel at such Bay or place.

11.—The Master of every vessel arriving from any Port out of the Colony, at any port of entry within the limits of the Colony other than Port Stanley, for the purpose of landing or receiving cargo, shall, upon being admitted to entry inwards, pay to the Officer of Customs appointed by the Governor as aforesaid, a duty of one shilling per ton on the registered tonnage of such vessel. Provided always that no vessel whose registered tonnage exceeds two hundred tons shall be liable to a payment of a larger amount than ten pounds in respect of the aforesaid duty on each entry, and no such vessel shall be suffered to clear out by the said Officer of Customs until the said duty has been fully paid, and the amount of such duties shall be paid and applied in like manner as the several duties of Customs are directed to be paid and applied by the first Section of this Ordinance, and the same, and other duties collected by such Officer of Customs, shall be transmitted with all convenient speed by such Officer to the Treasurer at Stanley. All vessels liable to the payment of tonnage duties shall only be liable to the same for the first two voyages after the first day of January in any one year, and after payment of tonnage duties on such two voyages, shall be exempt from any further duties during the remainder of such year.

12.—Goods shall not be unladen from any vessel until due entry shall be made of such goods and warrant granted for unloading of the same and goods shall not be so unladen except at some place for which a sufferance has been granted by the Collector or Officer of Customs for the unloading of such goods nor otherwise than in the presence or with the permission in writing of the proper Officer of Customs.

13.—The Importer of any goods liable to duties of Customs and intended to be delivered for home use shall, before the unshipment thereof, make perfect entry of such goods by delivering to the Collector of Customs a Bill of Entry thereof in duplicate (as in Form No. 2 to this Ordinance annexed) and shall produce to the Collector of Customs, if required by him, the Invoice, Bills of Lading and other documents relating to the goods. The particulars in such entry shall correspond with the particulars given of the same goods and packages in the report or manifest of the ship.

14.—The Importer or his Agent shall, immediately upon the entry of any dutiable goods entered by him to be delivered for home use, pay all duties which may be payable upon such goods, to the Collector of Customs, and such Bill of Entry, when signed by the Collector of Customs, shall be transmitted to the proper Officer of Customs, and be his warrant for the landing and delivery of such goods.

15.—The Importer of any goods to be warehoused without payment of duty on the first entry thereof, or his Agent, shall deliver to the Collector of Customs a Bill of Entry in duplicate of such goods (as in Form No. 3) in the same manner and form and containing the same particulars as are hereinbefore required in the entry of goods to be delivered for home use as far as the same may be applicable, and such Bill of Entry, when signed by the Collector of Customs, shall be the Warrant for the due warehousing of such goods.

16.—If the importer of any goods, or his agent, shall make and subscribe a declaration in writing before the Collector or Officer of

Customs that he cannot for want of full information, or contents being unknown, make perfect entry thereof, the Collector or Officer of Customs shall receive an entry by bill of sight (as in Form No. 4) for the packages or parcels of such goods by the best description which can be given, and grant a Warrant thereupon in order that the same may be landed and secured to the satisfaction of the Collector or Officer of Customs, at the expense of the importer, and such goods shall be seen and inspected by the importer in presence of an Officer of Customs and within three days after the goods shall have been so landed the importer or his agent shall make a perfect entry thereof and pay all duties due thereon and in default of such entry or payment of duty such goods shall be conveyed by the proper Officer of Customs to the Government Warehouse for custody, and if the duties due upon the same be not paid within three months after such three days shall have expired, together with all charges for removal, warehouse rent, or charges for guarding the same, if such shall not be bonded, the Collector or Officer of Customs shall cause such goods to be publicly sold to the best bidder, after giving not less than seven days public notice in the Official Gazette or otherwise, of the time and place appointed for the sale; and the money arising from the sale thereof shall be applied in the first place as payment of said duties, charges, warehouse rent, or other charges, together with the expenses occasioned by the sale and the surplus (if any) shall be paid to the owner of the goods or other person authorized to receive the same.

17.—The Importer of any goods not liable to duties of Customs, or his Agent, shall deliver to the Collector or Officer of Customs an entry in duplicate of such goods in the Form No. 5 to this Ordinance and shall produce to the Collector or Officer of Customs, if required by him, the invoice, bills of lading and other documents relating to the goods. Should such entry be incorrect in any particular the Importer or his Agent shall within fourteen days after the landing of the goods deliver to the Collector or Officer of Customs a full and accurate account thereof. The Bill of Entry when signed by the Collector of Customs, shall be transmitted to the proper Officer of Customs and be his Warrant for the delivery of goods mentioned therein.

18.—When the Importer of any goods fails to make entry thereof or having made entry thereof to land or take delivery of the same the Consignee or Master of the ship may make entry of and land or unship and warehouse the said goods at the times and in the place and manner directed by the Collector of Customs.

19.—If the Importer of any goods or the Consignee or Master of the Ship shall not within fourteen days after the arrival of the importing vessel make perfect entry or entry by Bill of Sight or if having made such entry he shall not land such goods within fourteen days it shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to order such goods to be warehoused.

20.—It shall be lawful for the Importer of goods liable to duty to warehouse the same in the warehouse appointed for that purpose without payment of duty on the first entry thereof subject nevertheless to the rules, regulations and restrictions hereinbefore and hereinafter contained, and to such arrangements as the Governor in Council may consider it advisable to make for the convenience of the Mercantile community and the trade of the Port. Provided that immediately thereafter any such arrangement shall be published in the Official Gazette.

21.—Upon the entry of any goods to be warehoused the Import-

ter instead of paying down the duties thereon shall give a general bond with two good and sufficient sureties to be approved by the Collector in a sum to be approved by the Governor with the condition for the safe depositing of such goods in the warehouse mentioned in such entry and for the payment of all duties due on such goods according to the first account taken of such goods upon the landing of the same and with the further condition that no part thereof shall be taken out of such warehouse until cleared from thence upon due entry and payment of duty, or upon due entry for exportation and with the further condition that the whole of such goods shall be so cleared from such warehouse and the duties upon any deficiency of the quantity according to such first account paid within two years from the date of the first entry thereof and such general bond shall cover all imports and exports for twelve months and shall not be discharged until the goods shall have been accounted for to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs nor until the full duties due upon any deficiency of such goods not so accounted for shall have been paid: Provided always: and it is hereby declared that no greater sum shall be recovered than double the amount of the duties payable on the goods in respect of which a breach of the said bond shall be made.

22.—Before any warehoused goods liable to duty shall be permitted to be exported the Exporter shall give such security by bond in double the amount of duty payable on such goods with one or more sufficient sureties that such goods shall be duly shipped and exported to some port out of the Colony and shall be landed at the port for which they are entered outwards within such time as the Collector may deem reasonable or be otherwise accounted for to his satisfaction provided that any person desirous of exporting any such goods may subject to the approval of the Collector give a general bond with such security in such amount and under such conditions as the Collector may require in lieu of a separate bond for each exportation.

23.—If any goods entered to be warehoused shall not be duly carried into and deposited in the warehouse or shall afterwards be taken out of the warehouse for home consumption without due entry and payment of duty or having been entered and cleared for exportation from the warehouse shall not be duly carried and shipped or shall afterwards be reloaded except with the permission of the Collector or Officer of Customs such goods shall be forfeited.

24.—Upon the entry and landing of any goods to be warehoused the Officer of the Customs shall take a particular account of the same and shall mark each package or lot with distinguishing marks or numbers and shall enter the same in a book to be kept for that purpose and no goods which have been so warehoused shall be taken or delivered from the warehouse for exportation except upon due entry and under the care of an Officer of Customs, or upon due entry and clearance for home use: and whenever the whole of the goods warehoused under any entry shall be cleared from the warehouse or whenever further time shall be granted for any such goods to remain warehoused an account shall be made out of the quantity upon which the duties have been paid and of the quantity exported and of the quantity (to be then ascertained) of the packages of goods still remaining in the warehouse as the case may be deducting from the whole the quantity contained in any whole packages (if any) which may have been abandoned for duties: and if upon such account there shall in either case appear to be a deficiency of the original quantity the duty payable upon the amount of such deficiency shall then be paid.

25.—No goods shall be warehoused unless the duties thereon amount to twenty shillings nor shall any such goods be taken out of bond unless the duties thereon amount to ten shillings nor for exportation unless the duties thereon would if entered for home consumption have amounted to ten shillings. Provided always that the foregoing restrictions shall not apply to remainders of warehoused goods: and it shall be lawful for the Collector under such regulations as he shall see fit to permit moderate samples to be taken of any goods so warehoused without entry and without payment of duty except as the same shall eventually become payable as on a deficiency of the original quantity.

26.—It shall be lawful for the Collector under such regulations as he shall see fit to permit the proprietor or other person having control over the goods so warehoused to sort, separate, pack and repack any such goods and to make such lawful alterations thereto or arrangements, or assortments thereof, as may be necessary for the preservation of such goods or in order to further the sale, shipment or legal disposal of the same and also to permit any parts of such goods so separated to be destroyed but without prejudice to claim for duty upon the original quantity of such goods. It shall be lawful however for any person to abandon any whole packages to the Officers of the Customs for the duties without being liable for any duty upon the same: Provided that the warehouse charges be first paid.

27.—All goods warehoused under this Ordinance shall be duly cleared either for exportation or for home consumption within two years from the date of first entry for the warehousing thereof; and if any goods be not so cleared it shall be lawful for the Collector to cause the same to be sold and the produce shall be applied first to the payment of the duties, next of warehouse rent and other charges, and the surplus (if any) shall be paid to the proprietor or other person authorized to receive the same: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Collector to grant further time for any such goods to remain warehoused if he shall see fit to do so.

28.—The Government Store shall be the proper warehouse for the warehousing of goods, and should the Government Store at any time prove insufficient for that purpose the Collector of Customs shall procure such other warehouse as may be necessary and he shall cause a scale of charges for such purpose to be prepared and laid before the Governor in Council for approval and when approved the same shall be published in the Official Gazette, and such charges may from time to time be altered with the consent of the Governor in Council and such alterations shall be published in the Official Gazette in a similar manner.

29.—It shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to allow all goods brought into any Port of entry of this Colony and reported for exportation to be transhipped under the care and superintendence of an Officer of the Customs, on due entry inward and outward specification being previously passed for such goods and further in the case of dutiable goods upon bond being also entered into for the due exportation of the same in like manner as if they had been landed and if there are any goods on board not contained in such ship's content such goods shall be forfeited and if any goods contained in such content are not on board the Master shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for every package of goods contained in such content and not on board.

30.—In all cases where it may be necessary or expedient to tranship dutiable goods from any vessel to a hulk—such hulk shall be fitted with a secure store room, of sufficient capacity to contain all such dutiable goods, and the key of such store room shall be in the custody of an Officer of Customs, who shall keep a correct account of all goods removed from the importing vessel and placed therein, but no goods shall be kept on board any such hulk for a longer period than seven days, unless by special permission in writing of the Collector of Customs, and any such goods received on board any hulk without being placed in such secure store room as aforesaid, shall be liable to forfeiture, and the owner of such hulk shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for each offence. The removal of any such goods however, to and from such hulk, shall be carried out in the presence of an Officer of Customs, and there shall be paid by the Master of the vessel the sum of ten shillings per day for the services of such Officer.

31.—In all cases in which it may happen that a vessel is wrecked on any part of this Colony and goods are in any wise saved therefrom, if any articles liable to specific duties forming part of the salvage, are brought or washed on shore intact or free from damage, or in cases of wreck occurring elsewhere and the goods are brought into this Colony, the Collector or Officer of Customs shall require the full duties leviable thereon as if regularly imported, to be paid by the Consignee or Master of the said vessel, or by the Auctioneer charged with the sale thereof, and any such goods may be placed in the Government Warehouse in charge of the proper Customs' Officers, at the expense of the parties interested, in order to the separation of damaged from sound articles. Goods liable to duty landed from vessels in distress and partially or considerably damaged may also be removed to the Government Warehouse for the purpose of being rendered merchantable, either for home consumption or exportation, under such regulations as shall be made by the Collector and approved by the Governor in Council.

32.—The Master of every vessel which shall arrive at any port or place within the Colony with goods on board stranded, wrecked, derelict or unladed from any other vessel whether such goods were got within or without the limits of the Colony shall report and enter the quantity and particulars of the said goods in like manner and as nearly as can be ascertained as goods regularly imported and no such goods shall on any pretence whatsoever be landed at any port or place within the Colony from any such vessel until such report and entry shall have been made and a permit for that purpose granted by the Collector of Customs. The Master of any vessel who shall violate this Section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds and such vessel shall be liable to forfeiture.

33.—The Exporter of any goods shall within six days of the final clearance outwards of the exporting vessel, or within such other period as the Collector may direct, either by himself or his agent, deliver to the Collector or Officer of Customs a specification duly declared in the form No. 6 or No. 7 in the schedule to this Ordinance, according to the nature of the goods, and on the demand of the Collector or Officer of Customs, if required by him, shall produce the bills of lading or other documents relating to the goods: and on failure to comply with any of the foregoing requirements the exporter or agent shall be liable to a penalty not ex-

ceeding five pounds for each day's default.

34.—No goods (except passengers luggage which may be landed after examination by an Officer of Customs and prior to report and entry) shall be waterborne or landed except in the daytime and within the usual working hours according to the season of the year unless special permission be given in writing by the Collector of Customs and any goods so waterborne or landed contrary to this section shall be liable to forfeiture.

35.—The unshipping, carrying and landing of all goods and bringing them to the proper place for examination shall be performed by the importer and the expenses attending the weighing, putting them into the scales, opening, unpacking, repacking, bulking, sorting, lotting, marking and numbering, where such operations respectively are considered necessary by the Collector or Officer of Customs, removing to and placing them in the proper place of deposit until duly delivered shall be defrayed by the importer.

36.—Any duly authorised Officer of Customs may on the entry of any goods, or at any time afterwards, take samples of such goods for examination, or for ascertaining the duties payable on such goods, or for such other purposes as the Collector or Officer of Customs may deem necessary, and such samples shall be returned after due examination unless the Collector shall direct such samples to be otherwise disposed of.

37.—It shall be lawful for the Collector or Officer of Customs, within twenty-four hours from their removal from off the vessel to search, weigh, gauge, or measure all and any Spirits, Wines, Tobacco, Beer, and other articles subject to duty, in order to arrive at the exact amount of duty payable on such articles, even if a permit for landing them has been duly given.

38.—When any vessel has been entered, on board of which there shall be any goods on which any duty has been paid, or which are liable to duty, and the said goods shall have been injured during the voyage or shall thereafter be lost or destroyed before the same shall be landed from such vessel or from any vessel, craft or boat, employed to land the same, then, on proof being made to the satisfaction of the Collector that such goods or any part thereof have been so lost or destroyed before landing of the same, the duties on the whole or the part thereof so proved to be lost or destroyed, shall be remitted, or if the same shall have been paid be returned to the owner by the Treasurer on certificate to that effect from the Collector or Officer of Customs. If a rebate of duty shall have been granted for any goods supposed to be lost, and such goods are afterwards found, the owner of such goods shall be bound to refund any rebate of duty which may have been allowed to him on account of the supposed loss.

39.—Goods exempt from duty under this Ordinance as being imported for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for any purpose for which such goods may be imported free of duty, and any other goods the property of the Crown, shall in case of the sale thereof, after importation, become liable to and be charged with the same duties payable on the like goods on their importation for other purposes; and if such duties be not paid such goods shall be forfeited, and may be seized and dealt with accordingly.

40.—For the better computation of the duties on any bottled ale, beer, porter, wines, spirits, liqueurs and other beverages liable to duty six reputed quart bottles or twelve reputed pint bottles shall be taken and considered to be one gallon of such ale, beer,

porter, wines, spirits, liquours and other beverages.

41.—Before any vessel, whether laden or in ballast, calling at any Port in the Colony, and about to sail thence for any Port out of the Colony, shall be cleared outwards, the master shall attend before the Collector or Officer of Customs, and shall answer all such questions as shall be required of him concerning the vessel, the cargo and the voyage, and shall deliver to the said Collector or Officer of Customs a content of such vessel in the form No. 8 in the Schedule to this Ordinance, and for any contravention of this section the master shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

42.—In the case of vessels sailing from any Port of entry in the Colony for any other Port in the Colony and not bound for any Port out of the Colony, an account, with a duplicate thereof in the Form No. 9, shall be delivered by the Master to the Collector or Officer of Customs, who shall retain the duplicate and return the original, dated and signed by him : and such account shall be the clearance of the vessel for the voyage, and the transire or pass for the goods expressed therein ; and if the Master fail to deliver a correct account he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

43.—In the case of vessels returning to any Port of entry in the Colony from any other Port therein, without having left the Colony within twenty-four hours after their arrival and before any goods be unladen, a report in Form No. 10 shall be delivered by the Master to the Collector or Officer of Customs, who shall note thereon the date of delivery ; and if any of the goods on board such vessel be subject to any Customs' duty, the same shall not be unladen without the authority and permission of the Collector or Officer of Customs ; and if any goods shall be unladen contrary hereto, the Master shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

44.—Any duly authorized Officer of Customs may on the entry of any goods or at any time afterwards open or caused to be opened any package of such goods in the presence of one or more witnesses.

45.—If any goods liable to duty shall be found concealed in any way or packed in any package or parcel, such package or parcel and all the contents thereof shall be forfeited ; and if any goods be taken or delivered out of any vessel not having been duly entered the same shall be forfeited ; Provided always that no entry shall be required in respect of the luggage of passengers, which may be examined, landed, and delivered under such regulations as the Governor may direct ; but if any goods liable to duty shall be found concealed therein, either before or after landing, the same shall be liable to forfeiture, together with everything packed therewith.

46.—If any person shall import, or cause to be imported, goods of one denomination concealed in packages of goods of any other denomination, or any package containing goods not corresponding with the entry thereof, or shall directly or indirectly import or cause to be imported or entered, any package of goods as one denomination which shall afterwards be discovered, either before or after delivery thereof, to contain other goods subject to a higher rate or other amount of duty than those of the denomination by which such package or the goods in such package were entered, such package and the goods therein shall be forfeited, and such person shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, or treble the value of the goods contained in such package at the discretion of the Convicting Magistrate.

47.—It shall be lawful for the Collector or Officer of Customs to search any person on landing, and to examine and open all and any goods, wares or packages which he may suspect to contain Tobacco, Spirits or other articles liable to duty, of which no proper entry has been made, upon the same being landed on the beach or jetty, and it shall be lawful for such Officer to seize any articles liable to duty which he may find upon any person or amongst such goods or packages. And the Collector of Customs and the several other Officers of the Customs of the Colony shall be and they are hereby further respectively invested with full power and authority to detain all persons committing any violation of this ordinance and to make seizures of all vessels or goods liable to forfeiture hereunder and otherwise to carry into full force and effect the law of the Colony relating to Customs Duties and Trade.

48.—The Police Magistrate of the Colony may and is hereby empowered upon information upon oath of an officer of Customs to issue search warrants under his hand and seal for the discovery and seizure of any goods illegally imported into the Colony.

49.—Under the authority of warrant granted by the Police Magistrate on information sworn before him, it shall be lawful for any Officer of Customs, accompanied by a Police Constable, to enter any building or other place at any time, and search for and seize and secure any Spirits, Wine, Beer, Tobacco, Cigars, Cigarettes, or other articles liable to forfeiture under this Ordinance.

50.—If any vessel shall be found within the limits of the Falkland Islands with cargo on board and such vessel shall afterwards be found light or in ballast and the Master is unable to give a due account of the port or place where such vessel shall have legally discharged her cargo, such vessel shall be liable to forfeiture.

51.—Any Officer of the Customs producing his commission, warrant or deputation from the Collector of Customs may go on board any vessel which shall be within the limits of any port of the Colony and rummage and search the cabin and all other parts of such ship for prohibited or uncustomed goods and remain on board such ship so long as she shall continue within the limits of such port.

52.—All vessels, boats, carts, waggons and other means of conveyance together with all horses and other animals made use of in the removal, carriage or conveyance of any goods liable to forfeiture under this ordinance shall be forfeited.

53.—All vessels, boats, carts, waggons, horses or other animals, and all goods and articles whatsoever seized under the authority of this Ordinance shall as soon as possible be delivered into the care of the Collector or the proper Officer of the Customs at the port next to the place where the same were seized who shall secure the same by such means and in such manner as shall be provided and directed by the Governor in Council and if condemned the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs as aforesaid shall cause the same to be sold by public auction to the highest bidder in accordance with such order as shall be made by the Court before which such articles shall be condemned or in case of appeal to the Governor in Council as shall be made by such Governor in Council.

54.—Every person who shall knowingly harbour, keep, or conceal, or knowingly permit or suffer, or cause or procure to be harboured, kept or concealed, any goods liable to Customs' duties which shall have been illegally imported contrary to this Ordinance, or shall knowingly acquire possession of any such goods, or shall be in any way knowingly concerned in carrying, removing, depositing,

concealing, or in any manner dealing with any such goods with intent to defraud Her Majesty of any duties due thereon, or shall be in any way knowingly concerned in any fraudulent evasion or attempt at evasion of any duties of Customs, or of the laws and restrictions of the Customs, contrary to this Ordinance, such person shall for each such offence be liable to forfeit either treble the value of the goods including the duty payable thereon, or a sum not exceeding one hundred pounds at the discretion of the convicting Magistrate.

55.—Every person who shall rescue or endeavour to rescue, any goods seized by any Officer of Customs or other person authorized to receive the same, or before or after seizure shall stave, break or destroy or attempt to stave, break or destroy any goods to prevent the seizure or the securing thereof, by such officer or other person, or shall rescue or attempt to rescue any person apprehended for any offence punishable by fine or imprisonment under this Ordinance, or prevent or attempt to prevent his apprehension or shall assault or obstruct any Officer of Customs or other person duly employed for the prevention of smuggling, in the execution of his duty, or in seizing of any goods liable to forfeiture under this Ordinance or any Regulations framed hereunder, or shall aid, abet, or assist in committing any of the foregoing offences, shall for each such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, or such person may at the discretion of the Court or Magistrate, be imprisoned and kept to hard labour for any term not exceeding twelve months without the option of a penalty.

56.—All goods, vessels, boats, carts, waggons and horses or other animals liable to forfeiture under this Ordinance shall when the value thereof shall exceed fifty pounds be proceeded against and condemned in the Supreme Court of the Colony, and when the value aforesaid shall not exceed the sum of fifty pounds such condemnation shall take place before the Police Magistrate in the Police Court of the Colony.

57.—The value of articles seized as aforesaid shall for the purpose of the preceding section be ascertained by two appraisers to be appointed for that purpose by the Collector of Customs of the Port of Stanley.

58.—In all cases of seizure the mode of proceeding shall be regulated by rules to be framed for that purpose by the Judge of the Supreme Court, which rules shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council.

59.—An appeal shall lie to the Governor in Council from the decision of the Judge of the Supreme Court or of the Police Magistrate in any case of seizure prosecuted under this Ordinance: provided that notice of such appeal shall be given within two days after sentence is pronounced, exclusive of the day of pronouncing such sentence. The mode of proceeding on such appeal cases shall be regulated by rules framed by the Governor in Council for that purpose.

60.—No claim to anything seized under this Ordinance shall be admitted unless such claim be made on behalf and entered in the name of the owner of the same.

61.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council if he shall deem it advisable so to do to direct any vessel, boat or goods whatever seized under this Ordinance to be delivered to the owner or owners thereof, whether condemnation shall have taken place or not, and also to mitigate or remit any penalty or fine or any part of any penalty or fine incurred under this law or to release from confinement any person or persons committed under this Ordinance on

such terms and conditions as to the Governor in Council shall appear to be proper : provided that no person shall be entitled to the benefit of any order for such delivery, mitigation, remission or release unless such terms and conditions are fully and effectually complied with and if the owner or owners of the same shall accept the terms and conditions prescribed by the Governor in Council he shall not have or maintain any action for recompense or damage on account of such seizure or detention and the person making such seizure shall not proceed in any manner for condemnation.

62.—(i.) No action or other proceeding shall be brought against any officer or person acting under the authority of this Ordinance for anything done in the execution or by reason of his office, unless such action or other proceeding is commenced within six months after the cause of action has arisen : and no such action or proceeding shall be commenced until one month has elapsed after notice in writing has been delivered to such officer or person, or left at his usual place of abode by agent of the plaintiff.

(ii.) In such notice there shall be clearly stated the cause of action and the name and place of abode of the plaintiff, and no evidence of the cause of such action shall be produced except of such as is contained in such notice.

(iii.) Proof of the service of such notice shall be produced on the trial, and in case the plaintiff fails to prove the service of such notice he shall be non-suited with costs.

63.—It shall be lawful for any officer or other person to whom such notice is given at any time before the commencement of the action to tender amends to the plaintiff, and in case such tender is not accepted to plead the same and if the jury shall find the tender sufficient it shall give judgment for the defendant : Provided that it shall be lawful for such defendant by leave of the Court where such action is brought at any time before issue joined to pay money into Court by way of amends : Provided also that in any such action if the Judge or Court before whom or which such action is tried is of opinion that the defendant acted upon reasonable and probable cause the plaintiff shall not be entitled to more than one shilling damages nor to any costs of action.

64.—If any prosecution instituted in respect of any goods seized for the non-payment of duties or any other cause of forfeiture or for the recovery of any fine or penalty under this Ordinance any question arises as to whether the import duties have been paid in respect of such goods or whether such goods have been lawfully imported or lawfully laden unladen or exported, then and in every such case the proof thereof shall be on the defendant in such prosecution.

65.—For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance the Collector of Customs shall have power to make regulations for carrying the same into effect (subject to the approval of the Governor in Council) and from time to time to alter and revoke the same and to make such others as may be necessary subject as aforesaid.

66.—The Collector of Customs may under special circumstances permit the entry and landing of goods and the loading and clearance of ships at such place in such form and manner and under such conditions as he may direct to meet the exigencies of any case to which this Ordinance or the regulations made thereunder may not be applicable.

67.—Any person who shall neglect to comply with—or who shall offend against any of the provisions of this Ordinance or any Regulations made hereunder, for the breach of which no penalty is

hereinbefore provided; may on the complaint of the Collector or Officer of Customs, Chief Constable or Police Constable, be summoned before the Police Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace, and on conviction shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

68.—Any penalty imposed by virtue of this Ordinance shall be sued for and recovered under the "Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance" No. 11 of 1853.

69.—All penalties and forfeitures incurred under or by virtue of this Ordinance shall be paid to the Treasurer, and shall be apportioned by him as follows, that is to say—after deducting the charges of prosecution from the proceeds thereof, one third to the person who shall seize, inform, and prosecute for the same, and the other two thirds to Her Majesty for the use of the Colony.

70.—All Officers of Customs are hereby constituted Excise Officers, and also shall have and exercise all the powers of Officers appointed under section 3 of the "Quarantine Ordinance" 1875.

71.—In this Ordinance the following words shall have the meanings hereunder assigned to them:

"Collector of Customs" means not only that Officer or any one acting in that behalf in Stanley, but any duly appointed Deputy Collector, either in Stanley or elsewhere, or persons acting for him.

"Officer of Customs" shall mean any Officer duly appointed as such either temporarily or otherwise by the Governor or Collector of Customs.

"Vessel" shall mean every description of ship or vessel used in navigation not ordinarily propelled by oars.

"Master" shall mean every person having command or charge of any vessel.

"Warehouse" shall mean any place, covered or otherwise, where goods may be placed while in the custody of the Government.

72.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the passing thereof, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Customs Ordinance, 1896."

EXEMPTIONS.

The following articles shall be exempted from the payment of duty:—

Perfumed Spirits and Cologne Water, Lemonade, Ginger Ale, Ginger Beer, Soda Water, Potash, and all other Mineral Waters.

Naphtha or Methylic Alcohol in its crude state and not fit for use as a potable spirit or for admixture with a potable spirit.

Tobacco forming an ingredient in sheep wash, or hop powder manufactured in bond in the United Kingdom.

All articles imported or taken out of bond for the use of the Governor of the Colony and for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy.

The Governor, Military and Naval Departments, and Messes purchasing any article whatsoever, duty paid, shall be entitled, when the duty thereon shall in the whole amount to not less than ten shillings, to have the same refunded out of the Public Treasury, on the Warrant of the Governor in Council, on the certificate of the Governor or the Officer in command of any Military or Naval Department, or of any of Her Majesty's Ships of War.

The Consulates in this Colony of any Foreign Countries in which is accorded or in which hereafter may be accorded to British Consular Officers the privilege of exemption from Customs duties in respect of official goods imported into such Foreign Countries by Her Majesty's Government for the use of Her Majesty's Consulates shall have a like privilege granted to them of exemption from any duties that may be levied in this Colony on goods which may be imported by their respective Governments as bona fide official supplies for the use of such Consulates.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

After a few preliminary remarks His Excellency brought before the Council the draft of an address of condolence on behalf of the Colony on the occasion of the death of Colonel His Royal Highness Prince Henry Maurice of Battenberg, K.G.

The address having been read, on the motion by His Excellency, seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton, the Resolution was unanimously carried.

The following correspondence was laid on the table as directed by the Right Honourable the Secretary of State in his despatch No. 9, 18th January, 1896.

An abstract from Mr. Creegan's letter of 23th November, 1895, with enclosure regarding the survey already undertaken and required in the Colony.

His Honour the Judge then moved the reconsideration of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to create the office of Official Administrator" which was passed by the Council on 30th October, 1895, but not being assented to was referred to the Secretary of State and now brought up for amendment in accordance with instructions received from Mr. Secretary Chamberlain. To save undue complications the Ordinance, on the suggestion of the Legal Adviser concurred in by His Excellency, was withdrawn and a draft Ordinance framed on the lines indicated by the Secretary of State substituted therefor.

On the Council resuming His Honour the Judge moved the Introduction and First Reading of the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the Administration of Unrepresented Estates in the Falkland Islands." Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon.

On the suspension of the Standing Orders the Council went into Committee on the Bill, when the following amendments were made :—

Clause 2, line 3. The words "in a conspicuous situation at the Government Offices" were struck out and the words "on the Government Notice Board in" inserted in lieu thereof.

Clause 11, line 15. The word "six" was substituted for the word "nine."

Clause 11, (Sub-Section 2) line 1, "6½" was inserted in lieu of "ton."

Clause 19, line 1. The word "ten" was struck out "6½" substituted therefor.

Clause 19 (Sub-Section 2) line 1. "One and a quarter" was substituted for "five."

Clause 28, line 9. The word "respectively" was inserted after the word "sections."

In the Schedule to the Ordinance, line 1. The words "His Honour" were substituted for the words "the Honourable."

The Council resumed.

His Honour the Judge then moved the Third Reading and passing of the Bill.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

The Council adjourned.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the Introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to make further provision for the Service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1895."

Seconded by His Honour the Judge,

The Bill was read by title.

The Standing Orders being suspended, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by His Honour the Judge, moved the Second Reading of the Bill, when the Colonial Treasurer explained the causes for the excess of expenditure under the several heads of service.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon asked that before the Council resolved itself into a Committee for the consideration of the Bill, he might be permitted to scrutinize the items in detail.

The consideration of the Bill in Committee was consequently held over for an adjourned Meeting to enable the Honourable Member's request to be acceded to.

His Honour the Judge moved the Introduction and First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs Duties and Trade."

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary.

The Bill was read by title.

The Standing Orders being suspended His Honour the Judge, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, moved the Second Reading and going into Committee on the Bill, which was carried unanimously. His Honour explained that the necessity for the introduction of this Bill arose from the fact that the Law No. 5 of 1891 was found to be defective owing to the clauses being so distributed and arranged as not to facilitate its working, the opportunity had also been taken of embodying the two Ordinances which had been enacted subsequent to the passing of the Law of 1891.

The following amendments were made in Committee.

Clause 2 was deleted.

Clause 4, line 13. The words "and all goods not reported shall be forfeited" were struck out.

Clause 5, line 1. The word "such" was inserted before the word "vessel."

Clause 6, line 1. The word "any" before "vessel" was substituted for the word "such."

Clause 9, lines 7 and 8. The words "from the Port at which the cargo of such vessel may have been discharged" were struck out and the words "expenses if any" substituted.

Clause 12 read as follows :—

"Cargo shall not be unshipped from any vessel without the special permission in writing of the Collector of Customs, and such cargo shall not be landed except at some place for which a sufferance has been granted by the Collector or Officer of Customs for the landing of such goods nor otherwise than in the presence of the proper Officer of Customs."

Clause 13, line 7. From the words "the particulars" to the end of the clause were struck out.

Clause 16, lines 11 and 17. The word "seven" was substituted for the word

"three."

Clause 19, line 5. The word "may" was substituted for the word "shall."

Clause 23. The following words were added at the end of the clause "and the party offending shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds or treble the value of the goods at the option of the Collector of Customs."

Clause 27, line 9. The word "may" was substituted for the word "shall."

Clause 29, line 8. The words after "and if there are" to the end of the clause were struck out.

Clause 31, line 3. The word "dutyable" was inserted before "articles" and the words "liable to specific duties" struck out.

Clause 32, line 10. The word "warrant" was substituted for the word "permit."

Clause 34, line 1. The word "delivered" was substituted for the word "landed" and the word "due" was inserted in the second line before the word "examination."

Clause 36, line 2. After the word "afterwards" the words "open and if he desires" were inserted.

Clause 37, line 2. The words "twenty-four" were struck out and the words "a reasonable time not exceeding seventy-two."

Line 6. The word "warrant" was substituted for the word "permit."

Clause 39, line 2. The words "the Governor of the Colony or" were inserted before the words "of Her Majesty."

Clause 44 was deleted.

Clause 50, line 2. The words "or their dependencies" were inserted after the word "Islands."

Clause 52, line 3. The word "unlawful" was inserted before the word "removal."

Clause 53. The words "or in case, &c." to the end of the clause were struck out.

Clause 55, line 16. The words "at the discretion of the Court or Magistrate" were deleted.

Clause 57. The words "of the Port of Stanley" were deleted.

Clause 62, section 3. Was deleted.

Clause 63, line 10. The words "is of opinion" were struck out, and the words "shall certify upon the record" inserted in lieu thereof.

In the last line the word "suit" was substituted for the word "action."

Clause 67, line 5. The words "Chief Constable or Police Constable" were struck out.

Clause 71. Under the Sub-Heading "Officer of Customs" the words "and also all Police Constables" were added under the sub-heading "warehouse" after the word "otherwise" the words "now or hereafter to be constituted as such by the Collector of Customs, with the authority of the Governor" were added.

Under the head of "exemptions" in the Schedule, paragraph 6, lines 4 & 5, the words "on the warrant of the Governor in Council" were deleted.

The Bill was left in Committee that the clauses might be re-grouped and the legal procedure in serious cases be further considered.

At an adjourned Meeting held on the 12th Mar. 1896.

Absent:—

The Honourable J. J. Felton.

The Council resumed in Committee its consideration of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to make further provision for the service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1895."

The items of expenditure were read and discussed.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon referred to the excess of £518 on the Miscella-

neous vote, of which he understood that £500 was in respect of the purchase of a house formerly in the possession of Mr. Lasar, but which expenditure he thought would have been met by the ordinary Public Works vote. The Resolution unanimously carried on the 28th February granting this sum from General Revenue was read to the Honourable Member.

The Honourable Member thought that the amount of £1043 under the head of Public Works appeared excessive, and added, that if he had time he would like to thoroughly analyse the items in detail, more especially the expenditure on roads. It was explained that this amount included some £500 as the cost of labour on and material for the erection of the Magistrate's house, &c., on the West Falklands and for which a sum of £800 had been voted during the year; that the purchase and erection of standard street lamps was also defrayed out of this sum, and that the balance was represented by stock on hand in the Government Store.

The Honourable Member did not wish to oppose the vote.

With regard to the sum of £141 under Port and Marine, the Honourable Member was informed that this was due to the Pilot Schooner "Victoria" having been refitted, which also had to undergo repairs after going ashore. With the execution of these repairs the purchase of another Schooner was not contemplated so long as she was able to perform the pilot service as of late.

On clause 1 being put was unanimously carried.

Clause 2 passed without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Standing Orders being suspended the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, moved the Third reading and passing of the Bill, which being duly carried, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

The Council adjourned.

SPECIAL WARNING TO MARINERS:—

FALKLAND ISLANDS.—*Currents.*—Mariners are warned that during and after long continued South Easterly gales, when a heavy sea is rolling in on the South and South-East coasts of the Falkland Islands, there is stated to be a strong set to the North-Westward, to which set has been attributed the loss of several vessels in the neighbourhood of Bull point. Vessels from Cape Horn, therefore, intending to sight Beauchêne island, should make due allowance against a possible set of 20 to 30 miles a day to the North-Westward.

ICE.—With reference to Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 206 of 1894, and to previous Notices, respecting the large number of ice islands and bergs reported in the South Atlantic to the North-Eastward of the Falkland Islands:—Further notice is now given that the extraordinary accumulation of icebergs in this area appears to have been dispersed. It appears therefore unnecessary to continue to issue a special Notice warning Mariners of the abnormal condition of ice in this region, as the ordinary cautions in the Passage Book; page 57 in South America Pilot, part I, pages 36 and 37 and foot notes; and at page 33 of South America Pilot, part II, 1895, are amply sufficient to warn the seaman to avoid the area at all times, if practicable. Icebergs are still being reported off Cape Horn. *Note.*—This Notice has no reference to ice in Southern Indian Ocean, where bergs have been recently reported as far North as 42° South, and where consequently a Northern route is advisable. *April.*

On 4th January, 1896, the "*Zuleika*" reports having passed a large berg in 56° 17' S., 65° 42' W.; on 5th January another berg, in 54° 58' South, 62° 19' West; and on 6th January, another, in 53° 36' South, 58° 39' West. *May.*

On 4th January, 1896, the "*Lord Templemore*" reports having passed an iceberg and several small flocs in 55° 37' South, 62° 3' West. *April.*

On 9th January, 1896, the "*Loch Garry*" reports having passed a large berg in 53° 27' South, 61° 48' West, about 80 miles South, 73° East, from Cape St. John, East, end of Staten island; also several detached pieces were seen to leeward. *April.*

On 12th January, 1896, the barque "*Seastern*" reports having passed 2 large bergs in 55° 49' North, 58° 13' West. *April.*

MAGELLAN STRAIT, &c.

EVANGELISTAS (ISLS. OF DIRECTION).—A Light-House is in course of construction in 52° 24' South, 75° 6' West, on these islands, Western entrance to Magellan strait, and the Light may be exhibited before the end of 1896. *April.*

SMYTH CHANNEL.—A small beacon is established in 52° 15' 25" South, 73° 41' West, on Low island, Fortune bay, East coast of Baverstock island, and there is no beacon on Francis islet, *see* South America Pilot, part II, 1895, page 208. *March.*

HAVANNAH PORT.—A Light-House is to be constructed in 53° 10' South, 73° 15 $\frac{1}{4}$ ' West, on the point, Western end of Cordova peninsula, and the Light may be exhibited before the end of 1896. *April.*

ABRA CHANNEL.—A rock, carrying 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ fms., and well marked by kelp, lies in approximately 53° 24' 55" South, 73° 12' West, in the fairway of Abra channel, with centre of Maycock island. North, 76° West, $\frac{3}{4}$ mile, and summit of Francis island, North 11° E. *March.*

ENGLISH NARROWS.—As in passing through English narrows it is advisable to wait for slack tide, and as, consequently vessels bound in opposite directions (being unable to see each other) might meet in the critical part of the Channel; it has been arranged between certain Companies, whose vessels constantly use the inner Patagonian route, that when nearing the English Narrows ships should either fire a gun or sound their steam whistles; and that should vessels bound North meet vessels bound in the opposite direction, the ships bound North shall wait until the Southward-bound vessels have cleared the Narrows. As this appears to be a prudent course to adopt in view of the difficult navigation and limited time of slack water, all Mariners should regulate their movements in accordance with it. A note to the above effect has been placed on the Admiralty Charts. *May.*

DAWSON ISLAND.—A rock carrying 5 fathoms and marked by kelp, lies in approximately 53° 51 $\frac{1}{2}$ ' South, 70° 26 $\frac{1}{4}$ ' West, in the middle of Harriss bay, East side of the island, with Treo bluff, about South-East $\frac{1}{2}$ South, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and Offing island, North-East by North. A depth of 14 fathoms was found in the Northern part of the bay. *April.*

CAPE ORANGE.—A pyramid white beacon, 36 feet high, surmounted by 2 red baskets, is established in 52° 28' 40" South, 69° 22' 40" West, on the summit of the Cape. *May.*

CAPE POSSESSION.—The pyramid beacon in 52° 18' South, 68° 56' 35" West, on the cape, is now red and white horizon. *May.*

DUNCENESS.—A Light-House is in course of construction in 52° 24' South, 69° 25 $\frac{3}{4}$ ' West, on Dunceness, Eastern entrance to Magellan strait, and the Light may be exhibited before the end of 1896. *April.*

SPECIAL WARNING TO MARINERS:—

FALKLAND ISLANDS.—Currents.—Mariners are warned that during and after long continued South Easterly gales, when a heavy sea is rolling in on the South and South-East coasts of the Falkland Islands, there is stated to be a strong set to the North-Westward, to which set has been attributed the loss of several vessels in the neighbourhood of Bull point. Vessels from Cape Horn, therefore, intending to sight Beauchêne island, should make due allowance against a possible set of 20 to 30 miles a day to the North-Westward.

ICE.—With reference to Admiralty Notice to Mariners, No. 206 of 1894, and to previous Notices, respecting the large number of ice islands and bergs reported in the South Atlantic to the North-Eastward of the Falkland Islands:—Further notice is now given that the extraordinary accumulation of icebergs in this area appears to have been dispersed. It appears therefore unnecessary to continue to issue a special Notice warning Mariners of the abnormal condition of ice in this region, as the ordinary cautions in the Passage Book: page 57 in South America Pilot, part I, pages 36 and 37 and foot notes; and at page 33 of South America Pilot, part II, 1895, are amply sufficient to warn the seaman to avoid the area at all times if practicable. Icebergs are still being reported off Cape Horn. *Note.*—This Notice has no reference to ice in Southern Indian Ocean, where bergs have been recently reported as far North as 42° South, and where consequently a Northern route is advisable. *April.*

On 4th January, 1896, the "*Zuleika*" reports having passed a large berg, in 56° 17' S., 65° 42' W.; on 5th January another berg, in 54° 58' South, 62° 19' West; and on 6th January, another, in 53° 36' South, 58° 89' West. *May.*

ENGLISH NARROWS.—As in passing through English narrows it is advisable to wait for slack tide, and as, consequently vessels bound in opposite directions (being unable to see each other) might meet in the critical part of the Channel; it has been arranged between certain Companies, whose vessels constantly use the inner Patagonian route, that when nearing the English Narrows ships should either fire a gun or sound their steam whistles; and that should vessels bound North meet vessels bound in the opposite direction, the ships bound North shall wait until the Southward-bound vessels have cleared the Narrows. As this appears to be a prudent course to adopt in view of the difficult navigation and limited time of slack water, all Mariners should regulate their movements in accordance with it. A note to the above effect has been placed on the Admiralty Charts. *May.*

DAWSON ISLAND.—A rock carrying 5 fathoms and marked by kelp, lies in approximo 53° 51 $\frac{1}{4}$ ' South, 70° 26 $\frac{3}{4}$ ' West, in the middle of Harriss bay, East side of the island, with Tree bluff, about South-East $\frac{1}{2}$ South, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and Offing island, North-East by North. A depth of 14 fathoms was found in the Northern part of the bay. *April.*

An Ordinance to amend the Licensing Ordinance 1882.

Whereas it is expedient to amend Ordinance No. 11 of 1882, and make further provisions thereto—

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

“ *Owner*,” shall mean the owner, lessee, manager, or agent in charge of any Station.

1.—Any owner of a station may without a license sell liquor to shepherds and other employés, boná fide, in his own employment, provided such station be at a distance of not less than six miles from Stanley, or from any other Township which may be herein-after proclaimed, and, provided that such liquor shall have been procured from some person duly licensed to sell liquor within the Colony. The said owner shall keep a book in form Schedule 1, hereto, and shall enter therein a true account of all liquor sold by him; which book shall be produced for inspection by him to the Magistrate or Officer deputed by him, when called for. Any owner selling liquor to other than his own employés, or who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence.

2.—Every person duly licensed to sell liquors in Stanley, or in any Town which may hereafter be proclaimed, shall keep a book, in form, Schedule 2 hereto, and enter therein a true account of all liquors sold by him to Owners of Stations for the purpose specified in the preceding Clause; and such book shall be open to inspection at any time by any Inspector. For any neglect of—or refusal to comply with—any of these provisions, the Licensee will be liable to the forfeiture of his License and to a penalty not exceeding £20.

3.—Any person licensed to sell liquor by retail in Stanley, or in any Township which may be hereafter proclaimed, who shall directly or indirectly keep a Store, or sell, or barter goods on the premises for which a Retail License has issued under Ordinance No. 11 of 1882, shall on conviction be liable to forfeiture of his license and to incur a penalty not exceeding £50.

4.—The foregoing Section shall not apply to any meals supplied by the Licensee, nor to provisions consumed on the licensed premises, nor to the sale of Tobacco where a License for sale has been taken out under the provisions of Ordinance No. 10 of 1889.

Section 68 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1882 is hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall be read and construed with Ordinance No. 11 of 1882, and shall be cited as “The Licensing Ordinance Amendment Ordinance.”

An Ordinance to amend the Licensing Ordinance 1882.

Whereas it is expedient to amend Ordinance No. 11 of 1882, and make further provisions thereto—

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

“*Owner*,” shall mean the owner, lessee, manager, or agent in charge of any Station.

1.—Any owner of a station may without a license sell liquor to shepherds and other employés, *bonâ fide*, in his own employment, provided such station be at a distance of not less than six miles from Stanley, or from any other Township which may be hereinafter proclaimed, and, provided that such liquor shall have been procured from some person duly licensed to sell liquor within the Colony. The said owner shall keep a book in form Schedule 1, hereto, and shall enter therein a true account of all liquor sold by him; which book shall be produced for inspection by him to the Magistrate or Officer deputed by him, when called for. Any owner selling liquor to other than his own employés, or who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence.

2.—Every person duly licensed to sell liquors in Stanley, or in any Town which may hereafter be proclaimed, shall keep a book, in form, Schedule 2 hereto, and enter therein a true account of all liquors sold by him to Owners of Stations for the purpose specified in the preceding Clause; and such book shall be open to inspection at any time by any Inspector. For any neglect of—or refusal to comply with—any of these provisions, the Licensee will be liable to the forfeiture of his License and to a penalty not exceeding £20.

3.—Any person licensed to sell liquor by retail in Stanley, or in any Township which may be hereafter proclaimed, who shall directly or indirectly keep a Store, or sell, or barter goods on the premises for which a Retail License has issued under Ordinance No. 11 of 1882, shall on conviction be liable to forfeiture of his license and to incur a penalty not exceeding £50.

4.—The foregoing Section shall not apply to any meals supplied by the Licensee, nor to provisions consumed on the licensed premises, nor to the sale of Tobacco where a License for sale has been taken out under the provisions of Ordinance No. 10 of 1882.

Section 63 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1882 is hereby repealed.

This Ordinance shall be read and construed with Ordinance No. 11 of 1882, and shall be cited as “The Licensing Ordinance Amendment Ordinance.”

SPECIAL WARNING TO MARINERS :—

FALKLAND ISLANDS.—*Currents.*—Mariners are warned that during and after long continued South Easterly gales, when a heavy sea is rolling in on the South and South-East coasts of the Falkland Islands, there is stated to be a strong set to the North-Westward, to which set has been attributed the loss of several vessels in the neighbourhood of Bull point. Vessels from Cape Horn, therefore, intending to sight Beauchêne island, should make due allowance against a possible set of 20 to 30 miles a day to the North-Westward.

ICE.—With reference to Admiralty Notice to Mariners, No. 206 of 1894, and to previous Notices, respecting the large number of ice islands and bergs reported in the South Atlantic to the North-Eastward of the Falkland Islands :—Further notice is now given that the extraordinary accumulation of icebergs in this area appears to have been dispersed. It appears therefore unnecessary to continue to issue a special Notice warning Mariners of the abnormal condition of ice in this region, as the ordinary cautions in the Passage Book; page 57 in South America Pilot, part I, pages 36 and 37 and foot notes; and at page 33 of South America Pilot, part II, 1895, are amply sufficient to warn the seaman to avoid the area at all times if practicable. Icebergs are still being reported off Cape Horn. *Note.*—This Notice has no reference to ice in Southern Indian Ocean, where bergs have been recently reported as far North as 42° South, and where consequently a Northern route is advisable. *April.*

On 4th January, 1896, the "*Zuleika*" reports having passed a large berg in 56° 17' S., 65° 42' W.; on 5th January another berg, in 54° 58' South, 62° 19' West; and on 6th January, another, in 53° 36' South, 58° 39' West. *May.*

On 4th January, 1896, the "*Lord Templemore*" reports having passed an iceberg and several small flocs in 55° 37' South, 62° 8' West. *April.*

As this appears to be a prudent course to adopt in view of the difficult navigation and limited time of slack water, all Mariners should regulate their movements in accordance with it. The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

A paper containing a statement by certain Masters, Officers and Seamen of the Mercantile Marine belonging to ships now at Port Stanley relating to the advantages of a Steam Tug to replace the present Pilot Service in the Falkland Islands was laid before the Council.

The Council resumed its consideration in Committee of the Bill entitled "An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Customs duties and trade."

The following amendments were made :—

Clause 10, line 3. The words "the master shall" were inserted before the word "within."

Line 4. The word "deliver" was inserted before the words "a report" and the words "shall be delivered by the master" were deleted.

Clause 11, line 4. The words "or Officer of Customs" were struck out.

Clause 12, line 2. The words "after * * * entry" were deleted and the words "as hereinafter provided for by clause 56" inserted.

Line 3. After the word "daytime" the words "at the Stone Jetty" were inserted.

Clause 17, line 2. The following words were substituted for the words "duly authorized Officer of Customs" namely "any Officer of Customs duly authorized in that behalf by the Collector."

Clause 22, line 5. The words "arrangements" to the end of the clause were struck out and the following inserted in lieu thereof :—"rules as may be made under clause 45 of this Ordinance and published in the Official Gazette."

Clause 25, line 2. After the word "or" the words "having been deposited" were added.

Clause 28, line 10. After the word "person" the words "having first paid warehouse rent and other charges" were added.

Line 11. "Collector of Customs" was substituted for the words "Officer of Customs."

Line 12. The words "provided that" to the end of the clause were deleted.

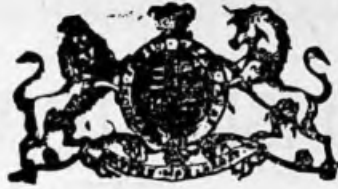

Though the amendments proposed are those generally concurred in by the Official and Unofficial Members, His Excellency added that he did not desire to press the Bill forward without allowing the Unofficial Member to communicate the proposed alterations to any of the farmers, from some of whom the introduction of the Bill had emanated.

The Honourable Unofficial Member present asked that if time would not admit of his corresponding with the West Island farmers on the matter, the committal of the Bill might be postponed until he had gone through its provisions with those whom it might affect on the East.

The consideration of the Bill in Committee was consequently adjourned until Tuesday, the 28th instant.

The Ordinance to further amend the "Scab Ordinance, 1895" was withdrawn in accordance with the instructions received from the Secretary of State.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency took charge, for the Colonial Secretary, of the Bill entitled "Customs Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1896."

On the motion for the Introduction and First reading of the Bill, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the same was read by title.

The Standing Orders being suspended, His Excellency moved the Second reading and going into Committee on the Bill, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon.

His Excellency explained to the Council that Clause 1 of the proposed Bill was introduced to render the provisions of the Customs Law fully complete. It was not to be supposed that any bribe had been offered or taken, but it was merely intended to provide against any such contingency.

Clause 2 had been inserted owing to a case of breaking seals on board of a Coasting vessel with a cargo of seal-skins having come before the Court, and it was thought better to deal with such an offence more specifically than was provided in the principal Ordinance.

The following amendment was made in Committee, at the end of Clause 2, the words "one hundred pounds" were added.

The Council resumed.

On the Third reading being duly proposed by His Excellency, and seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the Introduction and First reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1897," seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the Bill was read a First time and passed.

The Standing Orders were suspended with a view to proceeding with the other stages of the Bill.

The Council being moved into Committee, the draft Estimates for the year 1897 were laid on the table for consideration.

In going through the various items the Honourable the Colonial Secretary explained the sums to be appropriated, and pointed out where they differed from those voted for the present year.

Under Vote 10 "Medical" The Honourable Unofficial Member desired his dissent recorded to the extra tax £50 under the sub-head Inspector of Nuisances, which was proposed to be granted to the Assistant Colonial Surgeon for purposes of sanitary supervision on the West Island, unless the salary of the Stipendiary Magistrate on the West under Vote 7 "Legal" was reduced by the same amount, as he considered the holder of this latter appointment a useless and expensive Official.

Vote 12, Ecclesiastical. The sum of £8 for fuel for Church of England was struck out, it being unanimously considered better, and to be consistent, to withdraw the amount from the Church of England than to insert a similar item for the Churches of each of the other denominations.

Under Vote 17, Public Works. On referring to this vote His Excellency called attention to the amounts voted annually under this head and to the still general unsatisfactory condition of Government buildings and roads, and added that it was his intention to recommend a scheme to the Secretary of State for the future outlay on Public works, under which a loan, say of £12,000 should be obtained from Government funds for the erection of new buildings and for the entire re-construction of public roads. The re-payment of the same would be extended over a period of years and be less expensive than the annual cost now incurred on the maintenance of existing buildings and on the repairs to roads by small sections.

The Honourable Unofficial Member compared the actual expenditure on these works in 1895 with that estimated, and feared from a reference to even the expenditure for March quarter, that the amount voted for the present year would be again largely exceeded. It was explained that the cost of labour would not allow of the expenditure being kept down and was the primary cause of these excesses, and that there was work which would be badly required to be done after this winter, but the want of means would not allow of it this year.

The Honourable Unofficial Member agreed as to the price of labour being very expensive, but would ask, before recording his vote, to be allowed to see the items of the expenditure on this service up to the latest date.

The Bill was then left in Committee.

On the Council resuming, the Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882," passed at the last Meeting of the Council, was referred back to Committee, when the following addenda being adopted were inserted in the original Bill as Clauses 5, 6 & 7.

5.—It shall not be lawful for any licensed dealer to sell by wholesale or retail any spirits of less strength than 27 under proof under a penalty upon conviction for each offence not exceeding £20.

6.—It shall be lawful for any constable to enter upon any premises where liquor is kept or stored for the purposes of sale and take samples of any such liquor to be tested, and any person refusing so to furnish liquor required with this object, or who may interfere with, impede, resist or obstruct the officer in the discharge of this duty shall be liable to a penalty for each offence not exceeding £50.

7.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, annul and revoke Rules and Regulations as may seem requisite for the more effective carrying into effect the provisions of the principal Ordinance 11 of 1882.

Clauses 5, 6 & 7 of the original Bill were re-numbered 8, 9 & 10.

The Council adjourned.

Draft of an Ordinance to further amend "the Scab Ordinance, 1895" and to amend Ordinance No. 12 of 1895.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Term of infection reduced to three months.

1.—The word "six" in the Fiftieth Section of "the Scab Ordinance, 1895" in the interpretation of what shall be considered as "infected sheep" is hereby repealed, and the word "three" substituted in lieu thereof, and the Ordinance shall be read and construed as if the word "three" hereby introduced had been originally inserted in the said Section.

Inspector may allow sheep to be dipped within three months of application for certificate.

2.—The Inspector upon being satisfied of the non-existence of Scab on a Station may grant permission in writing, for the dipping and dressing of the sheep thereon, and such dipping or dressing shall not be considered a dipping or dressing within the meaning of "the Scab Ordinance, 1895," so as to prevent the owner of the Station from making the declaration contained in the Schedule annexed to Ordinance No. 12 of 1895.

Amendment of Schedule to Ordinance No. 12 of 1895.

3.—The word "six" in the Schedule annexed to Ordinance No. 12 of 1895, is hereby repealed, and the word "three" substituted therefor, and the Ordinance shall be read and construed as if the word "three" so introduced had been originally inserted in the Schedule.

An Ordinance to amend "The Unrepresented Estates Ordinance 3 of 1893."

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—The Official Administrator shall in every case of intestacy in which the kindred of an intestate are unknown, cause notice of the fact to be inserted as soon as practicable in the "London Gazette" and in the "London Times" newspaper once a quarter, for a period of one year. Papers connected with the construction of a pier in reply to a request by the Honourable Unofficial Members for information as to the proposed project were laid before the Council.

An Ordinance to amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

Enacting clause.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, thereof, as follows:—

Preamble.

1.—The words “two pence” in the last line of the 17th Section of the Scab Ordinance, 1895 are hereby repealed, and the following words “not less than one half-penny and not more than two pence” substituted in lieu thereof.

2.—The word “six” in the 20th Section of the Scab Ordinance, 1895 is hereby repealed, and the word “three” substituted therefor.

3.—The words “any two Justices of the Peace” in the 45th Section of the Scab Ordinance, 1895, are hereby repealed, and the words “Stipendiary Magistrate of the West Falkland Island” substituted in lieu thereof.

4.—The owner of a flock of sheep in which Scab shall be discovered shall, as soon as practicable, cause every sheep in such flock to be branded or marked on the rump or back with the letter “S,” such letter not being less than six inches in length, and such brand or mark shall from time to time be renewed as occasion may require, so that the brand or mark shall always be distinct and legible, and every such owner shall be liable to a fine of not more than three pence for every such sheep not being so branded or marked as aforesaid.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Excellency informed the Members that he had summoned the Council to ask for a vote from General Revenue, to be ultimately recovered from Crown Land Funds, to meet expenses on the survey of the proposed pier and also to lay on the table a Memorial to the Secretary of State from the unofficial Members, protesting against the construction of such a pier, certain statements in which, His Excellency stated, were not altogether correct and would, with the gross exaggerations which it also contained, be pointed out to the Secretary of State.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon here informed the Council that a copy of the Memorial had already been forwarded direct to the Under Secretary of State by the last Mail on the 12th instant.

To this action His Excellency expressed his strong disapproval and deprecated the course adopted by the unofficial Members of the Council in addressing such a document direct without his knowledge, or even a reference made thereto when the Memorial was forwarded to the Government for transmission to the Secretary of State on the 20th instant, 17 days after the Memorial had been despatched.

In order to remove the wrong impressions from the minds of the unofficial Members His Excellency reviewed the statements contained in the Memorial.

With regard to the employment of local labour, that would be a matter to be decided by the contractors in England, who would also devise such a construction as would withstand the strain of vessels moored alongside.

The facility to be afforded by the landing of goods direct, on to the jetty, was in itself so apparent as to sufficiently controvert the statement that such a method would not be so expeditious as the discharge first of all into a lighter.

The assertion that the original cost would not be less than £25,000, with annual expenses of £2000 was far wide of that estimated, namely £10,000, while the interest and sinking fund together with the expense of maintenance would be covered by the dues to be received by Government at rates lower than 15/- and 16/- a ton as at present charged for lighterage, but which figures could not be reconciled with 2/6 or 3/6 a ton as quoted in the Memorial. The men thrown out of employment by the disuse of lighters could find employment in the landing and transit of goods across the pier without fear of families being reduced almost to destitution.

Mr. Stanley's despatch of 12th October, 1885, No. 12, which was read, shows that the application of the purchase money of the foreshore in Stanley would be a matter for consideration at a future date and not as stated in the Memorial.

The proposed pier of 800 feet is intended to extend into 22 feet of water, but it is more probable that after the Surveyor's reports are completed it will be found that a length of 630 feet, with a depth of 20 feet 9 inches where the bottom is soft mud, would meet all present requirements.

This length would not bring the pier a quarter of the way across the harbour and would not impede navigation as feared by the Memorialists from it being carried $\frac{2}{3}$ the distance.

His Excellency in conclusion could not but consider that the Memorial was directed personally against himself and the action taken by him with regard to the public works during his tenure of office. The disgraceful condition in which he found the buildings, roads, &c., on his arrival, necessitated heavy expenditure of money. This money had not however been "squandered" but defrayed to meet the high price of labour. It was, His Excellency added, his wish to see the Colony in a fair state of advancement.

The Honourable J. J. Felton questioned the interpretation put by His Excellency on the Memorial stating that it was sent home by the first opportunity because it was uncertain when the information promised would be laid before them. He could not see the advantage or actual necessity of the work as the landing of cargo in small quantities would be more expensive than at present. He was in favour of the jetty being extended into 10 feet of water as much delay must ensue if steamers come alongside where they can discharge only on one side, while the expense to the importer cannot be lessened if landing, warehouse and

shipping dues are levied. At present the bulk of imports being for re-exportation to the out-stations are discharged into lighters where they remain until the schooner runs alongside for transshipping the goods. If this course were to be changed, station-holders would import goods direct to their stations by sailing vessels. If the rates to be levied were on a basis which would compare favourably with the present charges of the Falkland Islands Company there would be no objection, but until such were shown to be the case the Honourable Member adhered to the statements contained in the Memorial.

His Excellency stated that he would be very happy to obtain the views of the community as to the charges to be levied, but as the extension of the jetty into 10 feet of water would not do away with the cost of lighterage, dues could not be charged and the work would not be a reproductive one. For the protection of the revenue Customs Officers would have to be posted at outstations if goods were imported direct, the maintenance of whom would bear very heavily on the community.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon indignantly but respectfully repudiated His Excellency's assertions. It was due to the absence of any estimate of the cost of the proposed work or of any scheme for its maintenance that the Memorial was sent home direct. The Honourable Member did not think any advantage was to be derived to the general community by the project, and always understood that no money was to be expended without a vote. In any case he considered that the opinions of experts carrying on mercantile business locally should have been taken and should have more weight than the opinions which he knew had been received from Captains of H. M.'s ships who visited this port.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved the following resolution :

Resolved that a sum of £500 be appropriated to cover advances required to meet expenditure involved in operations undertaken by the sanction of the Secretary of State in connection with a new proposed pier in Stanley Harbour, until such advances are repaid as approved by the Secretary of State from funds arising from the sale of Crown lands in the Colony.

In seconding the Resolution His Honour the Judge remarked that though he had not seen the papers on the subject he was in favour of a pier alongside of which vessels could go in preference to a shorter one. Wrong impressions had been formed by the Memorialists, but His Honour thought it very desirable that the cost of a pier should be ascertained on the basis of soundings. A vote for the expenses of which was all that was now asked, and this expenditure was to be defrayed from Crown funds over which the Secretary of State had complete control.

As this work had been authorized by the Right Honourable the Secretary of State, His Excellency asked the unofficial Members to pay that deference due to the Secretary of State, the present vote being for an advance only from general revenue to be refunded from Crown Land Funds.

The Council divided.

FOR:—His Honour the Judge. The Honourables Colonial Secretary. Colonial Surgeon.

AGAINST:—The Honourables J. J. Felton. A. E. Baillon.

His Excellency said he had been hopeful of obtaining the unofficial Members' vote in favour of the Resolution looking to the information now before them which contained the Secretary of State's views and also to that furnished at the last Meeting of the Council. As the Memorial had been framed before the receipt of this information though not forwarded to the Government until after it was placed in their hands. His Excellency asked if the Memorialists wished to add any rider to it; the unofficial Members were understood to answer in the negative.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

His Honour the Judge moved the Introduction and First reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to further amend the Scab Ordinance, 1895." Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon.

The Bill was read by title.

The Standing Orders were suspended with a view to the Bill being proceeded with.

On His Honour moving the Second reading of the Bill and explaining the principles of the Bill, the Honourable Colonial Surgeon seconded and the Council resolved itself into Committee on the Bill.

In Clause 1 the Honourable J. J. Felton moved that the words "not exceeding two-pence" should be substituted for the word "not less than one half-penny and not more than two-pence," so that the amount of the penalty might be left to the Magistrate, which he thought was the intention of Clause 17 of the original Ordinance by the reading of the word "liable."

The proposed amendments he added, made it imperative on the Magistrate to inflict a heavy penalty, even though it might be proved that scab was carried maliciously amongst a man's flocks.

His Excellency said that if such happened it would be competent for the Magistrate to forward the case for the consideration of the Executive.

His Honour was of the opinion that whilst a certain amount of discretion should be left to the Magistrate there should be a fixed minimum penalty.

On the motion for the amendment being put :—

FOR:—The Honourables J. J. Felton. A. E. Baillon.

AGAINST:—His Honour the Judge. The Honourables Colonial Secretary, Colonial Surgeon.

The Clause stood as drafted.

Clause 2 and 3 passed without amendment.

Clause 4, the Honourable J. J. Felton contended would compel every sheep on the station to be branded, as the Inspector had ruled that a fence was no barrier and consequently if one flock were infected the flocks on the whole station would have to be branded.

It was explained that the clause referred only to a flock in which scab was discovered and could not be applied to all the sheep on the station. The clause was a step towards bringing about the separation of flocks and so to lessen the severity of the act.

In line 3 after the word "back" the words "or on such other part of the sheep as may be ordered by the Inspector" were inserted.

Reference was made to the substance to be used in branding and it was suggested that as this would diminish the value of wool, some other word than "S" should be made which could be placed upon, for instance, the face. It was decided to refer the matter to the Inspector.

The Honourable J. J. Felton was also in favour of a maximum say of £100 fine being fixed both in this clause and in clause 1, and added that no Inspector could make oath of the actual number of sheep on which the fine should be levied.

It was pointed out to the Honourable Member that in such a case the man creating scab would be no more heavily penalized than the farmer who had done his best to eradicate it, and in so far as the declaration was concerned the number of sheep was declared to by the farmer himself, though it as much depended on the Inspector to obtain as accurate returns as possible of the number of sheep in the flock.

The clause stood as amended in line 3.

The word "further" was inserted in the title page.

On the Council resuming, His Honour moved the Third reading and passing of the Bill, which being duly seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

3.—The Board of Health for the West Falkland Island shall possess and exercise in and throughout the West Falkland Island similar authority as regards the West Falklands as that vested in the Board of Health constituted under the Public Health Ordinance of 1894, with similar powers to make Bye-Laws for the proper enforcement of that Ordinance as far as applicable throughout the West Falkland Island.

4.—The Health Officer for the West Falkland Island shall discharge all the duties, and is hereby vested with all the powers and authority as far as applicable to the West Falkland Island of an Inspector of Nuisances appointed under the Public Health Ordinance of 1894.

5.—The Board of Health for the West Falkland Island shall consist of the Stipendiary Magistrate for the West Falkland Island, who shall be Chairman of the Board, the Health Officer of the West Falklands, and of such other Members not exceeding two, as shall be appointed annually by the Governor, and it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time to fill up any vacancy or vacancies which may occur on the said Board.

6.—At all meetings of the Board of Health for the West Falklands two Members shall constitute a quorum, and in the absence of the Chairman the senior Member present shall preside.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read, amended and confirmed.

With reference to the minutes of the last Meeting, the opinion of the Acting Stock Inspector that tar was not used in the Colony for the branding of sheep, and that "raddle and oil" which were in use was not injurious to wool, was read.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the Introduction and First reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to make further provision for the Service of the Colony of the Falkland Islands for the year 1896," seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon.

The Standing Orders having been suspended, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, moved the Second reading and going into Committee on the Bill. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary explained the causes for the excesses on the several votes.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said that, though it was useless to record his vote as the Unofficial Members were bound to vote together, and formed a majority, and also that as it was a matter of indifference to His Excellency, who had stated that he could always pass any measure by the majority of the official vote, he wished to protest against the amount inserted against the Public Works vote.

His Excellency informed the Unofficial Member that he had never made mention of such a fact as that stated. He had drawn attention that in a Crown Colony the Government holds the majority of the votes in its hands, and administers for the good of the Colony which is not ripe for a representative Assembly. His Excellency took strong exception to the Honourable Member's manner which was and had been a persistent personal opposition to himself rather than one directed toward the welfare of the Colony.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary stated that the Honourable Member was mistaken in what he had said.

The Honourable Member said he would take the liberty given him of protesting against the vote, and asked that what he had said might be recorded on the minutes, adding, though the word indifference may not have been used by His Excellency, an expression to that effect had been.

The Honourable Member objected to the expenditure of that portion now inserted under the head "Public Works" which had not been voted by the Council, and referred to the Secretary of State's despatch on that subject.

On the question being put Clause 1 was passed without amendment.

There was no discussion on Clause 2.

On the Council resuming, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, moved the Third reading and passing of the Bill, when the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

7.—All Members of the Board of Health for the Falkland Islands appointed before the commencement of this Ordinance shall, immediately upon the coming into operation hereof, become Members of the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island without further notice or appointment, and the powers authority and duties of the said Board shall, from the passing hereof, be limited and confined to the East Falkland Island.

8.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of "The Public Health Ordinance 1894."

As the Orders of the Day only contained the consideration of a Bill which had been left in Committee on the 23rd December, and had been approved by the Secretary of State with some slight amendments, the Members, being a quorum, were unanimous in considering that it would be unnecessary to adjourn the Meeting.

Cause 63 was deleted and re-enacted as follows :

63.—Any Officer of Customs who shall take or accept any fee, gratuity, reward or perquisite, directly or indirectly, for the neglect or non-performance of his duty, and any person who shall promise, give, or offer, or procure to be given, to an Officer of Customs any such fee, gratuity, reward or perquisite, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £100.

Clause 71. The sub-heading "Uncustomed goods" was struck out.

The Council having resumed, and the Standing Orders suspended, His Honour moved the Third reading and passing of the Bill, Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon.

The Bill was read a Third time and passed.

Whereas it is expedient to amend Ordinance 6 of 1896, and to make further provisions thereto.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—Fences dividing one Station from another shall in all cases be treated as improvements, whether erected voluntarily, by arrangement or by compulsion, and upon whatsoever land not being actual town land within the limits of a town whether leased under the provisions of the Land Ordinance of 1871 or otherwise, and whether situated within six miles of Stanley or of any other township that may be proclaimed, anything in the Land Ordinance 4 of 1871, Ordinance No. 9 of 1882, or in any other Ordinance excluding fencing on such land from being treated as an improvement notwithstanding.

2.—It shall be lawful for neighbouring lessees to arrange with each other for the erection of a dividing fence upon the basis of a claim for the improvements proportionate to the outlay incurred, and the lessee who pays the whole or more than half the cost shall stand in the place of the other as regards compensation on the determination of the lease of the other in proportion to so much of the amount so paid by him in excess of his own share as shall not then have been repaid to him.

3.—When it may be necessary that a fence should not exactly follow the actual boundary of the land comprised in a lease, the lessee who pays for its erection shall have the same claim for compensation at the expiration of the leases of himself and his neighbour respectively as if it had followed the actual boundary.

4.—Nothing in this Ordinance shall interfere with the provisions for the treatment of improvements already laid down in Ordinances No. 9 of 1882, No. 2 and No. 9 of 1894.

5.—This Ordinance shall be read and construed with and shall form part of Ordinance No. 6 of 1886.

An Ordinance to amend the Fencing Ordinance No. 6 of 1896.

Whereas it is expedient to amend Ordinance 6 of 1896, hereinafter styled the principal Ordinance, and to make further provisions thereto.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance fences on land leased from the Crown, not being actual town land within the limits of a town, shall in all cases be treated as improvements within the meaning of the 3rd clause of Ordinance No. 9 of 1882, and the value thereof shall be determinable as prescribed by the 1st clause of Ordinance No. 9 of 1894, anything in the 4th clause of Ordinance No. 9 of 1882 notwithstanding; which clause in so far as it affects fencing on suburban land being treated as an improvement is hereby repealed.

2.—It shall be lawful for neighbouring lessees without resorting to proceedings, as defined in the principal Ordinance to arrange with each other for the erection of a dividing fence upon the basis of a claim for the improvements proportionate to the outlay incurred, and the lessee who pays the whole or more than half the cost shall stand in the place of the other as regards compensation on the determination of the lease of the other in proportion to so much of the amount so paid by him in excess of his own share as shall not then have been repaid to him.

3.—When it may be necessary that a fence should not exactly follow the actual boundary of the land comprised in a lease, the lessee who pays for its erection shall have the same claim for compensation at the expiration of the leases of himself and his neighbour respectively as if it had followed the actual boundary.

4.—Nothing in this Ordinance shall interfere with the provisions for the treatment of improvements already laid down in Ordinances No. 9 of 1882, No. 2 and No. 9 of 1894.

BY THE QUEEN. A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS We are happily at Peace with all Sovereigns, Powers, and States :

And whereas, notwithstanding Our utmost exertions to preserve Peace between the two Sovereign Powers, a State of War unhappily exists between His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey and His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, and between their respective Subjects and others inhabiting within their Countries, Territories, or Dominions :

And whereas We are on Terms of Friendship and amicable intercourse with each of these Sovereigns, and with their several Subjects and others inhabiting within their Countries, Territories, or Dominions :

And whereas great numbers of Our loyal Subjects reside and carry on Commerce, and possess Property and Establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within the Dominions of each of the aforesaid Sovereigns, protected by the faith of Treaties between Us and each of the aforesaid Sovereigns :

And whereas We, being desirous of preserving to our Subjects the Blessings of Peace, which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to maintain a strict and impartial Neutrality in the said State of War unhappily existing between the aforesaid Sovereigns :

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation :

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects to govern themselves accordingly, and to observe a strict Neutrality in and during the aforesaid War, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the Laws and Statutes of the Realm in this behalf, or the Law of Nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril ;

And whereas in and by a certain Statute made and passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the 33rd and 34th year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the conduct of Her Majesty's Subjects during the existence of hostilities between foreign States with which Her Majesty is at Peace," it is amongst other things, declared and enacted as follows. This Act shall extend to all the Dominions of Her Majesty, including the adjacent territorial Waters :—

"Illegal Enlistment."

"If any person, without the licence of Her Majesty, being a British Subject, within or without Her Majesty's Dominions, accepts or agrees to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Foreign State at Peace with Her Majesty, and in this Act referred to as a friendly State, or, whether a British Subject or not, within Her Majesty's Dominions, induces any other person to accept or agree to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any such Foreign State as aforesaid—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person, without the Licence of Her Majesty, being a British Subject, quits or goes on board any Ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's Dominions, with intent to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State, or, whether a British Subject or not, within Her Majesty's Dominions, induces any other person to quit or to go on board any Ship with a view of quitting Her Majesty's Dominions with the like intent—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If any person induces any other person to quit Her Majesty's Dominions or to embark on any Ship within Her Majesty's Dominions under Misrepresentation or false Representation of the Service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State,—

"He shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"If the Master or Owner of any ship, without the licence of Her Majesty, knowingly either takes on board, or engages to take on board, or has on board any such ship within Her Majesty's Dominion any of the following Persons, in this Act referred to as illegally enlisted persons; that is to say,—

"(1.) Any person who, being a British subject within or without the Dominions of Her Majesty, has, without the licence of Her Majesty, accepted or agreed to accept any

Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any friendly State :

“(2.) Any person, being a British Subject, who, without the licence of Her Majesty, is about to quit Her Majesty's Dominions with intent to accept any Commission or Engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State :

“(3.) Any person who has been induced to embark under a Misrepresentation or false representation of the Service in which such person is to be engaged, with the intent or in order that such person may accept or agree to accept any commission or engagement in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with a friendly State :

“Such Master or Owner shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue ; that is to say, —

“(1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted ; and imprisonment if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour : and

“(2.) Such Ship shall be detained until the trial and Conviction or Acquittal of the Master or Owner, and until all Penalties inflicted on the Master or Owner have been paid, or the Master or Owner has given security for the payment of such penalties to the satisfaction of two Justices of the Peace, or other Magistrate or Magistrates having the authority of two Justices of the Peace ; and

“(3.) All illegally enlisted persons shall, immediately on the discovery of the offence, be taken on shore, and shall not be allowed to return to the Ship.

“Illegal Shipbuilding and Illegal Expelitions.

“If any person within Her Majesty's Dominions, without the Licence of Her Majesty, does any of the following Acts ; that is to say :—

“(1.) Builds or agrees to build, or causes to be built, any ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State : or

“(2.) Issues or delivers any Commission for any Ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State : or

“(3.) Equips any Ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State : or

“(4.) Dispatches, or causes or allows to be dispatched, any Ship with intent or knowledge, or having reasonable cause to believe that the same shall or will be employed in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State :

“Such person shall be deemed to have committed an offence against this Act, and the following consequences shall ensue :—

“(1.) The offender shall be punishable by fine or imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

“(2.) The Ship in respect of which any such offence is committed, and her equipment, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

“Provided that a person building, causing to be built, or equipping a Ship in any of the cases aforesaid, in pursuance of a contract made before the commencement of such War as aforesaid, shall not be liable to any of the penalties imposed by this Section in respect of such building or equipping if he satisfies the Conditions following: (that is to say),—

“(1.) If forthwith upon a Proclamation of Neutrality being issued by Her Majesty he gives notice to the Secretary of State that he is so building, causing to be built, or equipping such Ship, and furnishes such particulars of the contract and of any matters relating to, or done, or to be done under the contract as may be required by the Secretary of State:

“(2.) If he gives such security, and takes and permits to be taken such other measures, if any, as the Secretary of State may prescribe for ensuring that such ship shall not be dispatched, delivered, or removed without the Licence of Her Majesty until the termination of such War as aforesaid.

“Where any ship is built by order of or on behalf of any Foreign State when at War with a Friendly State, or is delivered to or to the order of such Foreign State, or any person who to the knowledge of the person building is an agent of such Foreign State, or is paid for by such Foreign State or such Agent, and is employed in the Military or Naval Service of such Foreign State, such ship shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been built with a view to being so employed, and the burden shall lie on the builder of such ship of proving that he did not know that the ship was intended to be so employed in the Military or Naval Service of such Foreign State.

“If any person within the Dominions of Her Majesty, and without the Licence of Her Majesty.—

“By adding to the number of the guns, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any Equipment for War, increases or augments, or procures to be increased or augmented, or is knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting the warlike force of any ship which at the time of her being within the Dominions of Her Majesty was a ship in the Military or Naval Service of any Foreign State at War with any Friendly State,—

“Such person shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

“If any person within the limits of Her Majesty's Dominions, and without the licence of Her Majesty :—

"Prepares or fits out any Naval or Military Expedition to proceed against the Dominions of any Friendly State, the following consequences shall ensue:

"(1.) Every person engaged in such preparation or fitting out or assisting therein, or employed in any capacity in such expedition, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be punishable by fine and imprisonment, or either of such punishments, at the discretion of the Court before which the offender is convicted; and imprisonment, if awarded, may be either with or without hard labour.

"(2.) All Ships and their equipments, and all Arms and Munitions of War, used in or forming part of such expedition, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty.

"Any person who aids, abets, counsels, or procures the Commission of any offence against this Act shall be liable to be tried and punished as a principle offender."

And whereas by the said Act it is further provided that ships built, commissioned, equipped, or despatched in contravention of the said Act, may be condemned and forfeited by Judgment of the Court of Admiralty; and that if the Secretary of State or Chief Executive Authority is satisfied that there is a reasonable and probable cause for believing that a Ship within Our Dominions has been or is being built, commissioned, or equipped, contrary to the said Act, and is about to be taken beyond the limits of such Dominions, or that a Ship is about to be despatched contrary to the Act, such Secretary of State, or Chief Executive Authority, shall have power to issue a Warrant authorizing the seizure and search of such Ship and her detention until she has been either condemned or released by process of law. And whereas certain powers of seizure and detention are conferred by the said Act on certain Local Authorities;

Now, in order that none of Our Subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said Statute, We do hereby strictly command that no person or persons whatsoever do commit any act, matter, or thing whatsoever contrary to the provisions of the said Statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said Statute imposed, and of Our high displeasure.

And We do hereby further warn and admonish all Our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to Our protection, to observe towards each of the aforesaid Sovereigns, their subjects and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever with whom we are at Peace, the duties of neutrality: and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those Belligerent Rights which We and Our Royal Predecessors have always claimed to exercise.

And We hereby further warn all Our loving Subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to our protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this Our Royal Proclamation, and of Our high displeasure, to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a Neutral Sovereign in a War between other Sovereigns, or in violation or contravention of the Law of Nations in that behalf, as more especially by breaking, or endeavouring to break, any Blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of either of the said Sovereigns, or by carrying Officers, Soldiers, Despatches, Arms, Ammunition, Military Stores or Materials, or any Article or Articles considered and deemed to be Contraband of War according to the Law or modern Usages of Nations, for the use or service of either of the said Sovereigns,

that all persons so offending, together with their ships and goods, will rightfully incur and be justly liable to hostile capture, and to the penalties denounced by the Law of Nations in that behalf.

And We do hereby give notice that all Our Subjects and Persons entitled to Our protection who may misconduct themselves in the premises will do so at their peril, and of their own wrong; and that they will in nowise obtain any protection from Us against such capture or such penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary, incur Our high displeasure by such misconduct.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor*, this third day of *May*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, in the sixtieth year of Our reign.

THE Marquess of Salisbury to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty:—

Foreign Office,
May 3, 1897.

MY LORDS,

HER Majesty being fully determined to observe the duties of neutrality during the existing state of war existing between His Imperial Majesty the Sultan of Turkey and His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, and being moreover resolved to prevent, as far as possible, the use of Her Majesty's harbours, ports, and coasts, and the waters within Her Majesty's territorial jurisdiction, in aid of the warlike purposes of either belligerent, has commanded me to communicate to your Lordships, for your guidance, the following rules, which are to be treated and enforced as Her Majesty's orders and directions:—

Her Majesty is pleased further to command that these rules shall be put in force in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands, on and after the 8th instant, and in Her Majesty's territories, and possessions beyond the seas, six days after the day when the Governor, or other chief authority of each of such territories or possessions, respectively shall have notified and published the same; stating in such notification that the said rules are to be obeyed by all persons within the same territories and possessions.

1. During the continuance of the present state of war, all ships of war of either belligerent are prohibited from making use of any port or roadstead in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, or of any waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of the British Crown, as a station, or place of resort for any warlike purpose, or for the purpose of obtaining any facilities for warlike equipment; and no ship of war of either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted to sail out of or leave any port, roadstead, or waters subject to British jurisdiction, from which any vessel of the other belligerent (whether the same shall be a ship of war or a merchant ship) shall have previously departed, until after the expiration of at least twenty-four hours from the departure of such last-mentioned vessel beyond the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty.

2. If any ship of war of either belligerent shall, after the time when this Order shall be first notified and put in force in

the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, and the Channel Islands, and in the several colonies and foreign possessions or dependencies of Her Majesty, respectively, enter any port, roadstead, or waters belonging to Her Majesty, either in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, or in any of Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions or dependencies, such vessel shall be required to depart and to put to sea within twenty-four hours after her entrance into such port, roadstead, or waters, except in case of stress of weather, or of her requiring provisions or things necessary for the subsistence of her crew, or repairs; in either of which cases the authorities of the port, or of the nearest port (as the case may be), shall require her to put to sea as soon as possible after the expiration of such period of twenty-four hours, without permitting her to take in supplies beyond what may be necessary for her immediate use; and no such vessel which may have been allowed to remain within British waters for the purpose of repair shall continue in any such port, roadstead, or waters, for a longer period than twenty-four hours after her necessary repairs shall have been completed. Provided, nevertheless, that in all cases in which there shall be any vessel (whether ships of war or merchant ships) of the said belligerent parties in the same port, roadstead, or waters within the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, there shall be an interval of not less than twenty-four hours between the departure thereof of any such vessel (whether a ship of war or merchant ship) of the one belligerent, and the subsequent departure therefrom of any ship of war of the other belligerent; and the time hereby limited for the departure of such ships of war respectively shall always, in case of necessity, be extended so far as may be requisite for giving effect to this proviso, but no further or otherwise.

3. No ship of war or either belligerent shall hereafter be permitted, while in any port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, to take in any supplies, except provisions and such other things as may be requisite for the subsistence of her crew, and except so much coal only as may be sufficient to carry such vessel to the nearest port of her own country, or to some nearer destination, and no coal shall be again supplied to any such ship of war in the same or any other port, roadstead, or waters subject to the territorial jurisdiction of Her Majesty, without special permission, until after the expiration of three months from the time when such coal may have been last supplied to her within British waters as aforesaid.

4. Armed ships of either party are interdicted from carrying prizes made by them into the ports, harbours, roadsteads, or waters of the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, or any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions abroad.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Introduction and First reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Public Health Ordinance of 1894, and to make provision for a Board of Health for the West Falkland Islands," seconded by the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary.

The Bill was read by title.

The Standing Orders were suspended with a view to the Bill being proceeded with.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Second reading, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Secretary.

The Council resolved itself into Committee on the Bill.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said he thought the measure was unnecessary and would hamper the work on the West and was quite premature, and that he should not vote in favour of it.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon said, before proceeding further he should like to ask His Excellency for any reasons for the Ordinance, as he thought that when the Council voted £50 a year for the Assistant Colonial Surgeon for Inspector of Nuisances, he thought that covered all purposes.

The Acting Colonial Secretary explained that there would be no extra expense in bringing in the Ordinance, that it would only be changing the title of Inspector of Nuisances to Health Officer, and that it was not contemplated to ask for more than the £50 already inserted in the Estimates.

The consideration of the Bill was continued, when the following amendments were made.

Clause 5, line 2. The words "Stipendiary Magistrate" were struck out and the words "Health Officer" inserted, and in line 3 the words "Health Officer" were struck out and the words "Stipendiary Magistrate" inserted.

The Honourable the Unofficial Members here laid great stress upon the objection of the Stipendiary Magistrate being Chairman of the Board while they had no objection to the Assistant Colonial Surgeon acting in that behalf.

On the question being put on each clause, that the clause be passed, the Unofficial Members desired their dissent to be recorded.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved that the Council do resume and also moved the Third Reading, which being duly seconded, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

His Excellency said, that in view of the objection raised by the Honourable the Unofficial Members, he would hold the Ordinance back for further reference to the Secretary of State.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary then moved the following Resolution :—

"That a sum not exceeding £350 be appropriated as a special vote toward the repairs to and rebuilding of the Sea wall running parallel to the Northern fence of Government paddock.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary explained that the Vote for Public Works on the Estimates for the year had been small, that no special vote for Sea Walls had been granted, and that the sums voted for Public Works were needed for other works of necessity.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon asked if the Unofficial Members could see the tenders granting that it was a work of great necessity, and hoped that if they voted the sums they would not see the work given to incompetent persons, thereby needing it to be executed over again.

The action taken by the Executive was explained, and after some discussion as to the line the wall was to take the resolution was unanimously carried. At the same time the proposal that the wall be continued straight and land thereby reclaimed, with a view to the same being carried out at as small an increase as possible was also considered.

His Excellency then informed the Council that the necessity for better protection against fire had been brought prominently to his notice. It was considered very desirable that this need should be met by the purchase of a suitable Fire Engine, the details of costs, &c., were fully explained by His Excellency. After the different projects such as a Steam Fire Engine, Reservoirs, or a long trench on the hill with outlets at each street had been considered, the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the following Resolution:

"That a sum not exceeding £1000 be, subject to approval of Secretary of State, appropriated as an advance from Land Sales Fund, to be repaid from a rate to be raised for the purpose of purchasing a suitable Fire Engine and outfit." The Resolution was unanimously carried.

An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of the town of Stanley against Fire, and for the establishment of a Volunteer Fire Brigade.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the protection of Stanley against Fire, and for the establishment of a Volunteer Fire Brigade.

Be it enacted by the Governor of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

FORMATION OF BRIGADE.

1.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to accept the services of any persons desiring to be formed into a Volunteer Fire Brigade under this Ordinance, and upon such acceptance being published in the *Gazette*, the proposed Brigade shall be deemed lawfully formed under this Ordinance and shall be designated, "The Stanley Volunteer Fire Brigade."

2.—The Officers shall consist of a Captain Superintendent, an Inspector, and an Assistant Inspector, and a Secretary, and shall be appointed by election by the Members of the Brigade, subject to confirmation by the Governor.

3.—Every Member of the Brigade shall before being enrolled as a Member take and subscribe to the oath set forth in the Schedule to this Ordinance, such oath to be administered by a Justice or an Officer of the Brigade.

4.—The Volunteer Fire Brigade shall upon its due formation assume and have charge of all Fire Engines and appliances in Stanley, subject to the same being kept always in a clean serviceable condition, always ready for instant use, and to the same being promptly and efficiently handled when called into action at a fire.

5.—The Captain Superintendent shall cause a complete inventory to be made and kept of all engines and apparatus in charge of and pertaining to the Brigade, and shall post one copy in the Fire Engine Shed and send another to the Colonial Secretary. These inventories must be checked by him on the 1st of January and July or within one week thereafter in each year, and all additions or losses noted and explained.

DISCIPLINE.

6.—The Captain Superintendent shall make rules and regulations from time to time for attendance at practice and fire drill; for the proper and secure maintenance of all Fire Engines and apparatus in charge of the Brigade, for ensuring method and discipline, and for encouraging smartness and *esprit de corps* among the Members and providing penalties for any breach of rules, and such rules upon being approved by the Governor shall have the force and effect of law and be binding on every Member of the Brigade.

7.—Any Member of the Brigade shall be at liberty to resign, provided that :—

I.—He has given to the Captain Superintendent 14 days notice of his intention.

II.—He has delivered up to the Captain Superintendent or other Member deputed by him, in good order, any uniform or equipment the property of Government or of the Brigade, which may have been issued to him or be in his charge.

III.—He has paid any money due or becoming due by him to the Brigade under any rule thereof.

8.—Any Member of the Brigade who fails to deliver up in good order upon demand by the Captain Superintendent any clothing or fire appurtenances in his charge or use shall be liable to pay to the Captain Superintendent for the benefit of the Brigade the full cost landed in the Colony of any such articles, such payment and cost to be recovered in a summary way before a Magistrate.

9.—Any person, or any Member of the Brigade, who shall by negligence or otherwise wilfully damage any one of the Fire Engines or appliances, or any part thereof, shall be liable upon summary conviction before a Magistrate to a penalty not exceeding £50, or imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding 12 months, and to pay the cost of the damage.

10.—Any Member of the Brigade may be called upon to resign, or, failing to do so may be dismissed from the Brigade upon the votes of not less than two-thirds of the members.

11.—A Member convicted before any Court in its criminal jurisdiction, or who is guilty of conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline, or to the damage of any of the fire appliances, may be dismissed by the Captain Superintendent, subject to appeal to the Governor.

FISCAL.

12.—All monies subscribed by, or to, or for the use of the Brigade, and all appliances belonging to or lawfully used by the Brigade, being its own or public property, and the power to sue for and recover monies due to the Brigade shall vest in the Captain Superintendent for the time being and his successors in office; and any proceedings—Civil or Criminal—shall not be abated or discontinued by his ceasing to hold office, but may be carried on by and in the name of his successor.

13.—If any Member or person who has been a Member of the Brigade shall neglect or refuse to pay anything subscribed or undertaken to be paid by him to the Brigade, or payable by him under the rules, or to pay any fine incurred by him under the rules, such money shall be recoverable from him with costs any time within 12 months after the same has become due, in a summary way in the Police Magistrate's Court, even though the amount may exceed £20.

14.—All monies payable or received under this Ordinance or by virtue of any of its provisions, or of any of the Rules or Regulations made thereunder shall be paid to the Secretary and credited by him to a fund styled the "Fire Brigade Fund;" and no disbursements therefrom shall be made save and except for purposes of *bona fide* protection against fire, or in the purchase of equipment for the Brigade, or the payment of wages, and no payment whatever shall be made except by approval of the Governor.

15.—There shall be levied, charged, and made for the use of the Fire Engines for services rendered to shipping a sum of for each day or part of a day during which the Engine is afloat, and all Fire Insurance Companies now or which may hereafter carry on business in Stanley, shall contribute to the maintenance of the Steam Fire Engine an annual payment equal to $\frac{1}{8}$ -th per cent of the capital assured.

PREVENTIVE.

16.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall not be lawful to build or erect any house, tenement, shed or warehouse, having a roof of wood, or of any material other than iron or slate, under a penalty on summary conviction before a Magistrate of a fine not exceeding £50, and imprisonment with or without hard labour not exceeding six months; and any roof erected in contravention of this Ordinance may be forthwith removed by order of the Court, at the defendant's risk and expense.

17.—It shall be lawful for the Police Magistrate upon information being laid before him that any chimney, flue, stove pipe, or other outlet of a fire is from faulty construction, or otherwise, a source of danger, to direct any constable or other person forthwith to enter on such premises and inspect and report thereon; and may thereupon summon before him the occupant or owner of the premises to show cause why the danger should not be abated, and may make such order in Court thereafter as may seem to him expedient in the public interest.

FIRES.

18.—Any person who assaults, resists, impedes, or obstructs a Member of the Brigade in the discharge of his duty, or who when called upon by any Member of the Brigade or by any Constable to assist either in conveying any engine or fire appliances to a fire, or in extinguishing any outbreak of fire, although present hesitates or declines so to assist shall be liable upon conviction in a summary way to a fine not exceeding £20, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding six months.

19.—It shall be lawful for any Constable or any Member of the Fire Brigade working at a fire to break and enter, pull down, cut away, and destroy any building curtilage which appears calculated to assist the conflagration, and he may take for use in extinguishing a fire any tanks, water, buckets, ladders, or other article whatsoever that may be at hand and required for service on the flames.

20.—Provided always that the owner of any property so damaged taken or affected shall be entitled upon clear proof thereof to compensation upon the proper assessment of such loss made by the assessors to be appointed for the purpose by the Governor. And provided further that no Constable or Member or Members of the Fire Brigade shall be personally liable for damage the result of action *bona fide* taken in the effort to extinguish or to prevent the spreading of a fire, nor unless such action can be proved to have been malicious and wanton and unwarranted by any of the surrounding circumstances.

GENERAL.

21.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to depute an Officer of the Government from time to time to view and inspect the Fire Engines and appliances, and to muster the Brigade for the purpose of testing and satisfying himself that proper efficiency is maintained; and in the event of receiving an unfavourable report the Govern-

ment may withdraw either permanently or for a time the Engines and appliances from the charge of the Brigade, and may make such other arrangements as may seem best likely to serve the public interests in the protection of life and property from fire.

22.—It shall be lawful for the Governor by Warrant under his hand to authorize the expenditure of such monies as may from time to time be required in maintaining the Fire Engines, in replenishing damaged Fire Stock, and in keeping in proper repair and order each and all of the requisite fire apparatus, as well as in the purchase of new articles that may be found necessary; and for carrying into effect measures for increased protection against fire.

23.—Nothing in this Ordinance shall be held to relieve or lessen the duties of the Police Force as to supervision over the fire appliances, assisting at fires, and maintaining order and protecting property thereat.

INTERPRETATION.

For the purposes of this Ordinance—

Captain Superintendent shall mean and include the Senior Officer for the time being of the Fire Brigade.

Officer shall mean any Member duly elected as Captain Superintendent, Inspector, and Assistant Inspector, and Secretary of the Fire Brigade.

Appliances shall mean and include not only all Engines, Hose, Carts, Reels, Axes, Ladders, Lamps, Branch Pipes, Buckets, and every article which can be used at a fire, as well as any article which may be purchased for use at fires, but all reservoirs, wells, tanks, or ditches, which may be built or constructed with the object of being available in case of fire.

Stanley shall mean and include the town comprised within a line running due S. from the harbour at the E. extremity of the F. I. Co's. slaughter-house on the East, and a similar line from the W. extremity of Mr. V. Packe's slaughter-house on the West, and of a line intersecting these and drawn due E. and W. to the S. of the most Southerly house. Provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to alter, amend, and extend these limits from time to time by publication in the Government Gazette.

SCHEDULE.

OATH OF MEMBER OF THE V. F. BRIGADE.

I, _____, do hereby make oath and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to H. M. Queen Victoria, and that I will well and faithfully serve and carry out to the best of my skill and ability, and for the best interests of my fellow citizens all and every the duties pertaining to or which may be required of me as a Member of the Fire Brigade.

So help me God.

An Ordinance to amend the Scab Ordinance of 1895, and Ordinances 12 of 1895, 10 of 1896, and 1 of 1897.

1.—In Clause 9 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895, lines 8 and 9 are hereby repealed.

2.—In Clause 18 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 the word “six” in the first line is hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the word “nine.” All the words after the word “penalty” in the 4th line are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the words “not exceeding £100.”

3.—In Clause 19 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895, the words “or within a period of three months thereafter” in the 3rd and 4th lines are hereby repealed and there shall be substituted for the word “such” in the 4th line the word “a.” After the word “months” and before the word “any” in the 5th line there shall be inserted the word “thereafter.” The words “any two Justices” in the 5th line are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the words “Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate of West Falklands.”

4.—Clause 31 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 is hereby repealed and the following shall be inserted and read as Clause 31.

“Every owner intending to import sheep from beyond the Colony shall give notice thereof to the Inspector, with as full information as possible of their number, description and place where ordered, and probable date of arrival in the Colony.

“Such sheep shall be landed only under proper supervision of the owner or his lawful agent, and shall at once be driven to and confined in a paddock securely fenced according to the requirements of the Fencing Ordinance No. 6 of 1893, and shall there remain in quarantine till examined and passed by an Inspector, who shall give such orders as may seem to him necessary for their continued quarantine, dipping, removal, release or destruction. The Inspector, if in Stanley, may, upon her arrival, at once board any vessel by which sheep are imported, and may inspect them on board and there give such permit in Form D in the Schedule hereto or make such order as he may deem necessary.

“Any owner, who by himself or his agent or servants, neglects to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or to carry out the directions received from the Inspector, and any person whomever who shall remove or attempt to remove, or permit to escape any sheep so imported and quarantined without the permission of the Inspector, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding One hundred pounds.

5.—The first five lines and the first two words of the 6th line of Clause 32 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 are hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof the following words shall be inserted and form part of the Clause. “If any sheep imported into the Colony shall be found to be infected.” The words “a person appointed” in the 9th line and the words “a person appointed as aforesaid” in the last line shall be, and the same are hereby repealed.

6.—Clause 33 of the Scab Ordinance 1895 is hereby repealed and the following shall be inserted and read as Clause 33.

"Any owner or person who shall import sheep otherwise than is provided by Section 31 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One hundred pounds."

7.—All the words in the 9th and 10th lines of the 50th Clause of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 after the word "disease" in the 9th line are hereby repealed, and the following shall be substituted therefor and become part of the Clause—"or which have within three months been liable to contact with diseased sheep or with places where diseased sheep have been depastured within a period of three months."

8.—The words in the 1st and 2nd lines of the 4th Clause of Ordinance 12 of 1895 "of infected sheep shall within one month after the sheep are found to be infected" shall be and the same are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof and read as part of the Clause the words "shall at all times at each Station."

After the word "sheep" and before the word "to" in the 4th line of the same Clause there shall be inserted the words "as may be on the Station."

9.—After the word "Inspector" and before the word "upon" in the 1st line of the 2nd Clause of Ordinance 10 of 1896, the words "may at any time order that clean sheep be dipped and dressed and" shall be inserted and form part of the Clause.

10.—The words in the 3rd and 4th lines of the 1st Clause of Ordinance 1 of 1897 "not less than $\frac{1}{2}$ d., and not more than 2d.," are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the words "not exceeding One hundred pounds."

11.—The first 2 lines of the 4th Clause of Ordinance 1 of 1897 as far as the word "practicable" in the 2nd line of the said Clause are hereby repealed and there shall be inserted instead the words "The owner of an infected flock who desires them to travel shall, before starting."

12.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

8.—Any Member of the Brigade who fails to deliver up in good order upon demand by the Captain Superintendent any clothing or fire appurtenances in his charge or use shall be liable to pay to the Captain Superintendent for the benefit of the Brigade the full cost landed in the Colony of any such articles, such payment and cost to be recovered in a summary way before a Magistrate.

9.—Any person, or any Member of the Brigade, who shall by negligence or otherwise wilfully damage any one of the Fire Engines or appliances, or any part thereof, shall be liable upon summary conviction before a Magistrate to a penalty not exceeding £50, or imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding 12 months, and to pay the cost of the damage.

10.—Any Member of the Brigade may be called upon to resign, or, failing to do so may be dismissed from the Brigade upon the votes of not less than two-thirds of the members.

11.—A Member convicted before any Court in its criminal jurisdiction, or who is guilty of conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline, or to the damage of any of the fire appliances, may be dismissed by the Captain Superintendent, subject to appeal to the Governor.

FISCAL.

12.—All monies subscribed by, or to, or for the use of the Brigade, and all appliances belonging to or lawfully used by the Brigade, being its own or public property, and the power to sue for and recover monies due to the Brigade shall vest in the Captain Superintendent for the time being and his successors in office; and any proceedings—Civil or Criminal—shall not be abated or discontinued by his ceasing to hold office, but may be carried on by and in the name of his successor.

13.—If any Member or person who has been a Member of the Brigade shall neglect or refuse to pay anything subscribed or undertaken to be paid by him to the Brigade, or payable by him under the rules, or to pay any fine incurred by him under the rules, such money shall be recoverable from him with costs any time within 12 months after the same has become due, in a summary way in the Police Magistrate's Court, even though the amount may exceed £20.

14.—All monies payable or received under this Ordinance or by virtue of any of its provisions, or of any of the Rules or Regulations made thereunder shall be paid to the Secretary and credited by him to a fund styled the "Fire Brigade Fund;" and no disbursements therefrom shall be made save and except for purposes of *bona fide* protection against Fire, or in the purchase of equipment for the Brigade, or the payment of wages, and no payment whatever shall be made except by approval of the Governor.

15.—There shall be levied, charged, and made for the use of the Fire Engines for services rendered to shipping a sum of for each day or part of a day during which the Engine is afloat, and all Fire Insurance Companies now or which may hereafter carry on business in Stanley, shall contribute to the maintenance of the Steam Fire Engine an annual payment equal to $\frac{1}{8}$ -th per cent of the capital assured.

PREVENTIVE.

16.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall not be lawful to build or erect any house, tenement, shed or warehouse, having a roof of wood, or of any material other than iron or slate, under a penalty on summary conviction before a Magistrate of a fine not exceeding £50, and imprisonment with or without hard labour not exceeding six months; and any roof erected in contravention of this Ordinance may be forthwith removed by order of the Court, at the defendant's risk and expense.

17.—It shall be lawful for the Police Magistrate upon information being laid before him that any chimney, flue, stove pipe, or other outlet of a fire is from faulty construction, or otherwise, a source of danger, to direct any constable or other person forthwith to enter on such premises and inspect and report thereon; and may thereupon summon before him the occupant or owner of the premises to show cause why the danger should not be abated, and may make such order in Court thereafter as may seem to him expedient in the public interest.

FIRES.

18.—Any person who assaults, resists, impedes, or obstructs a Member of the Brigade in the discharge of his duty, or who when called upon by any Member of the Brigade or by any Constable to assist either in conveying any engine or fire appliances to a fire, or in extinguishing any outbreak of fire, although present hesitates or declines so to assist shall be liable upon conviction in a summary way to a fine not exceeding £20, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding six months.

19.—It shall be lawful for any Constable or any Member of the Fire Brigade working at a fire to break and enter, pull down, cut away, and destroy any building curtilage which appears calculated to assist the conflagration, and he may take for use in extinguishing a fire any tanks, water, buckets, ladders, or other article whatsoever that may be at hand and required for service on the flames.

20.—Provided always that the owner of any property so damaged taken or affected shall be entitled upon clear proof thereof to compensation upon the proper assessment of such loss made by the assessors to be appointed for the purpose by the Governor. And provided further that no Constable or Member or Members of the Fire Brigade shall be personally liable for damage the result of action *bona fide* taken in the effort to extinguish or to prevent the spreading of a fire, nor unless such action can be proved to have been malicious and wanton and unwarranted by any of the surrounding circumstances.

GENERAL.

21.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to depute an Officer of the Government from time to time to view and inspect the Fire Engines and appliances, and to muster the Brigade for the purpose of testing and satisfying himself that proper efficiency is maintained; and in the event of receiving an unfavourable report the Govern-

ment may withdraw either permanently or for a time the Engines and appliances from the charge of the Brigade, and may make such other arrangements as may seem best likely to serve the public interests in the protection of life and property from fire.

22.—It shall be lawful for the Governor by Warrant under his hand to authorize the expenditure of such monies as may from time to time be required in maintaining the Fire Engines, in replenishing damaged Fire Stock, and in keeping in proper repair and order each and all of the requisite fire apparatus, as well as in the purchase of new articles that may be found necessary; and for carrying into effect measures for increased protection against fire.

23.—Nothing in this Ordinance shall be held to relieve or lessen the duties of the Police Force as to supervision over the fire appliances, assisting at fires, and maintaining order and protecting property thereat.

INTERPRETATION.

For the purposes of this Ordinance—

Captain Superintendent shall mean and include the Senior Officer for the time being of the Fire Brigade.

Officer shall mean any Member duly elected as Captain Superintendent, Inspector, and Assistant Inspector, and Secretary of the Fire Brigade.

Appliances shall mean and include not only all Engines, Hose, Carts, Reels, Axes, Ladders, Lamps, Branch Pipes, Buckets, and every article which can be used at a fire, as well as any article which may be purchased for use at fires, but all reservoirs, wells, tanks, or ditches, which may be built or constructed with the object of being available in case of fire.

Stanley shall mean and include the town comprised within a line running due S. from the harbour at the E. extremity of the F. I. Co's. slaughter-house on the East, and a similar line from the W. extremity of Mr. V. Packe's slaughter-house on the West, and of a line intersecting these and drawn due E. and W. to the S. of the most Southerly house. Provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to alter, amend, and extend these limits from time to time by publication in the *Government Gazette*.

SCHEDULE.

OATH OF MEMBER OF THE V. F. BRIGADE.

I, _____, do hereby make oath and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to H. M. Queen Victoria, and that I will well and faithfully serve and carry out to the best of my skill and ability, and for the best interests of my fellow citizens all and every the duties pertaining to or which may be required of me as a Member of the Fire Brigade.

So help me God.

An Ordinance to amend the Scab Ordinance of 1895, and Ordinances 12 of 1895, 10 of 1896, and 1 of 1897.

1.—In Clause 9 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895, lines 8 and 9 are hereby repealed.

2.—In Clause 18 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 the word “six” in the first line is hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the word “nine.” All the words after the word “penalty” in the 4th line are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the words “not exceeding £100.”

3.—In Clause 19 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895, the words “or within a period of three months thereafter” in the 3rd and 4th lines are hereby repealed and there shall be substituted for the word “such” in the 4th line the word “a.” After the word “months” and before the word “any” in the 5th line there shall be inserted the word “thereafter.” The words “any two Justices” in the 5th line are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the words “Police Magistrate or Stipendiary Magistrate of West Falklands.”

4.—Clause 31 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 is hereby repealed and the following shall be inserted and read as Clause 31.

“Every owner intending to import sheep from beyond the Colony shall give notice thereof to the Inspector, with as full information as possible of their number, description and place where ordered, and probable date of arrival in the Colony.

“Such sheep shall be landed only under proper supervision of the owner or his lawful agent, and shall at once be driven to and confined in a paddock securely fenced according to the requirements of the Fencing Ordinance No. 6 of 1893, and shall there remain in quarantine till examined and passed by an Inspector, who shall give such orders as may seem to him necessary for their continued quarantine, dipping, removal, release or destruction. The Inspector, if in Stanley, may, upon her arrival, at once board any vessel by which sheep are imported, and may inspect them on board and there give such permit in Form D in the Schedule hereto or make such order as he may deem necessary.

“Any owner, who by himself or his agent or servants, neglects to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or to carry out the directions received from the Inspector, and any person whomever who shall remove or attempt to remove, or permit to escape any sheep so imported and quarantined without the permission of the Inspector, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding One hundred pounds.

5.—The first five lines and the first two words of the 6th line of Clause 32 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 are hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof the following words shall be inserted and form part of the Clause. “If any sheep imported into the Colony shall be found to be infected.” The words “a person appointed” in the 9th line and the words “a person appointed as aforesaid” in the last line shall be, and the same are hereby repealed.

6.—Clause 33 of the Scab Ordinance 1895 is hereby repealed and the following shall be inserted and read as Clause 33.

"Any owner or person who shall import sheep otherwise than is provided by Section 31 of the Scab Ordinance of 1895, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One hundred pounds."

7.—All the words in the 9th and 10th lines of the 50th Clause of the Scab Ordinance of 1895 after the word "disease" in the 9th line are hereby repealed, and the following shall be substituted therefor and become part of the Clause—"or which have within three months been liable to contact with diseased sheep or with places where diseased sheep have been depastured within a period of three months."

8.—The words in the 1st and 2nd lines of the 4th Clause of Ordinance 12 of 1895 "of infected sheep shall within one month after the sheep are found to be infected" shall be and the same are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof and read as part of the Clause the words "shall at all times at each Station."

After the word "sheep" and before the word "to" in the 4th line of the same Clause there shall be inserted the words "as may be on the Station."

9.—After the word "Inspector" and before the word "upon" in the 1st line of the 2nd Clause of Ordinance 10 of 1896, the words "may at any time order that clean sheep be dipped and dressed and" shall be inserted and form part of the Clause.

10.—The words in the 3rd and 4th lines of the 1st Clause of Ordinance 1 of 1897 "not less than $\frac{1}{2}$ d., and not more than 2d.," are hereby repealed, and there shall be inserted in lieu thereof the words "not exceeding One hundred pounds."

11.—The first 2 lines of the 4th Clause of Ordinance 1 of 1897 as far as the word "practicable" in the 2nd line of the said Clause are hereby repealed and there shall be inserted instead the words "The owner of an infected flock who desires them to travel shall, before starting."

12.—This Ordinance shall be construed with and form part of the Scab Ordinance, 1895.

2. The words "within the town of Stanley" in the 2nd line of the 2nd Clause of the principal Ordinance are hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof and between the words "grazing" and "the" in the 2nd line of the said Clause there shall be inserted and read as part of the Clause the following words; "on any public street, road or path, or on any Crown land save by authority from the Governor within the limits of Stanley."

An Ordinance to amend the Pound Ordinance, 1893.

1. In the 8th and 9th lines of Clause 1 of Ordinance 7 of 1893, hereinafter styled the Principal Ordinance, the figure £2, and words "two pounds" is hereby repealed, and in their place the figure £10 and words "ten pounds" shall be inserted and read as part of the Clause.

The word "informer" in the last line of Clause 1 is hereby repealed, and the words "Principal Pound Keeper" shall be inserted in lieu thereof, and shall form part of the said Clause.

2. The words "within the town of Stanley" in the 2nd line of the 2nd Clause of the principal Ordinance are hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof and between the words "grazing" and "the" in the 2nd line of the said Clause there shall be inserted and read as part of the Clause the following words; "on any public street, road or path, or on any Crown land save by authority from the Governor within the limits of Stanley."

3. Clause 5 of the principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following shall be inserted in lieu thereof and shall be Clause 5.—
"It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to establish and declare an enclosure to be a public pound by publication thereof in the *Government Gazette*."

4. After the word "shall" and before the word "for" in the 4th line of Clause 6 of the principal Ordinance there shall be inserted and read as "part of the Clause the following words, "receive such annual salary as the Governor in Council may determine, and who shall."

5. This Ordinance shall be cited as the Pound Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, and shall come into operation on its passing.

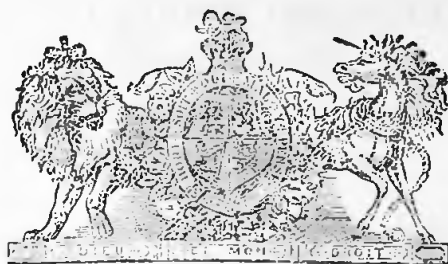

Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India: To Our Trusty and Well-beloved William Grey-Wilson, Esquire, Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Greeting.

WE do by this Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet appoint you, the said William Grey-Wilson, to be during Our pleasure Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, with all the powers, rights, privileges, and advantages to the said office belonging or appertaining.

II. And We do hereby authorize, empower, and command you to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in Our Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-fifth day of February, 1892, constituting the office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our said Colony, or in any other Our Letters Patent adding to, amending, or substituted for the same, according to such Orders and Instructions as Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief hath already received from Us, and to such further Orders and Instructions as you may hereafter receive from Us.

III. And further We do hereby appoint that, so soon as you shall have taken the prescribed Oaths and have entered upon the duties of your office, this Our present Commission shall supersede Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date the Twenty-sixth day of February, 1892, appointing Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir R. T. Goldsworthy, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George to be Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

IV. And we do hereby command all and singular Our Officers, Ministers, and loving subjects in Our said Islands, and all others whom it may concern, to take due notice hereof, and to give their ready obedience accordingly.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, this Twenty-seventh day of February, 1897, in the Sixtieth Year of Our Reign.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the re-committal of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Fencing Ordinance No. 6 of 1896."

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon.

The following amendments were made:

Clause 1, line 6, after the words "prescribed by" the words "that Clause as amended by Ordinance No. 9 of 1894," were inserted.

In line 8, after the word "it," the words "effects" to the end of the Clause were struck out, and the words "excludes improvements on suburban land is hereby repealed" were inserted.

Clause 4 being provided for by Clause 1 was struck out.

Clause 5 was re-numbered 4, and at the end the words "and shall come into operation upon such day as may be notified by publication in the *Official Gazette*," were added to the Clause.

On the Council resuming, the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the Third Reading and passing of the Bill.

Seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Second Reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of the Town of Stanley against Fire, and for the establishment of a Volunteer Fire Brigade."

Seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton. The Council went into Committee.

It was proposed by His Excellency and seconded by the Hon. A. E. Baillon that in Clause 2, line 1, the word "Captain" be struck out wherever it appears in this Ordinance.

Clause 3, lines 3 and 4, the words "or Officer" were struck out, and the words "or Superintendent" were inserted.

Clause 5, line 1, after the word "shall" and before the word "cause" the words "within seven days after assuming charge of Fire Engines" were inserted.

Clause 10, line 1, after the word "upon" the words "by the Superintendent" were inserted.

Clause 15. The first three lines of this Clause were struck out and the following inserted in lieu thereof.

"It shall be lawful for the Superintendent to charge for services of the Manual Engine rendered to shipping a sum not exceeding Five Pounds for each day or part of a day during which the Engine may be utilized." The remainder of the Clause remained unaltered.

The Hon. A. E. Baillon abstained from giving his vote on this Clause as he was unaware whether the Fire Insurance Companies in England, of which he was Agent, would acquiesce in the proposed provisions.

Clause 18, line 6, after the word "declines" and before the word "so" the words "without reasonable cause" were inserted.

Clause 19, line 3, after the word "building" and before the word "curtilage" the word "or" was inserted.

Clause 22, line 1, after the word "Governor" and before the word "by" the words "to appoint an Auditor or Auditors for the purpose of this Ordinance" were inserted.

The following new Clause was inserted and numbered 24.

"24.—This Ordinance shall be cited as 'The Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance,' and shall come into operation upon such day as may be notified by publication in 'the Government Gazette.'"

In the Interpretation Clause, "Stanley," in line 6, after the word "house," and before the word "Provided" the words "and the Harbour of Stanley as defined by 'Pilot Ordinance No. 5 of 1871.'"

In the 3rd line of the Schedule, after the word "Victoria," the words "Her Heirs and Successors" were inserted.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Council do resume, seconded by the Honourable A. E. Baillon

The Bill remained in Committee.

The Minutes of the previous Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon moved the Third Reading of a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of the Town of Stanley against Fire, and for the establishment of a Volunteer Fire Brigade."

Seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the First Reading of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Pound Ordinance of 1893."

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the suspension of the Standing Orders for the day to proceed to the despatch of business, which was carried after being seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton.

The Bill was read a First time.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the Second Reading and that the Council go into Committee on the Bill.

In Clause 2, lines 3 and 4, after the word "thereof" and before the word "there," in line 4 the words, and between the words "grazing" and "the" in the second line of the said Clause, were struck out.

The remainder of the Ordinance passed without further amendment.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary having moved the Council do resume, moved the Third Reading of the Bill.

Clauses 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 were re-numbered 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

Clause 11, last line, the words "Two Hundred Pounds" were substituted for the words "One Hundred Pounds."

Clause 13, at the end, the words "and shall come into operation upon the publication thereof in the Official Gazette," were inserted.

"Legal." The Un-Official Members asked if the Vote £50 for horse allowance could be expended by the Officer, and opposed the Vote of £10 increment to salary of the Stipendiary Magistrate.

"Police and Prisons." On each of these heads, after some discussion, the votes for Chief Constable and Gaoler were carried.

"Post Office." This Vote was passed *pro tem* to be guided by circumstances, but the Un-Official Members hoped for the sake of their clients in the West Falklands that the Government would do its utmost to improve the West Falklands Mail Service.

"Public Works." Upon a discussion on the services of a Superintendent of Works and the value of said services, the Honourables the Un-Official Members concluded that the Vote was too small for the services required, but were not desirous of opposing the Vote.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the Council do resume.

Seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton.

The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary moved the Third Reading; seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton, the Bill was read a Third time and passed.

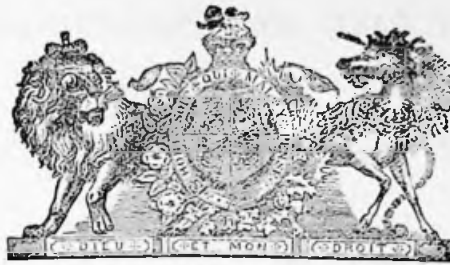

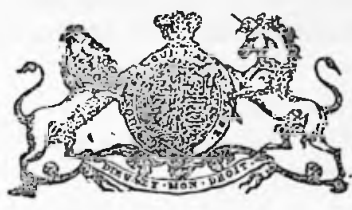

GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Promulgation and Construction of Ordinances; the Law in force in The Falkland Islands, and certain General Rules of Law and Procedure.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—The printing at the Government Printing Office, or by a duly authorized Printer of any duly enacted Ordinance of the Falkland Islands, or of any official document countersigned by the Colonial Secretary, or by any person duly authorized thereunto by the Governor shall be in Law a sufficient publication and promulgation of the same.

Legal Publication.

2.—Every Ordinance shall take effect on the day on which such Ordinance is sealed unless a contrary intention be expressed therein.

When Ordinance takes effect.

3.—Copies of existing Ordinances and of any Ordinances hereafter enacted printed at the Government Printing Office, or by any Printer duly authorized to print the same, shall be received as evidence of the passing and promulgation thereof in any Court of Civil or Criminal jurisdiction within this Colony: provided always that they are not at variance with the Record copies passed under the Seal of the Colony.

What copies are legal.

4.—The draft of every Ordinance shall be published in the Gazette and a copy thereof shall be affixed to the Notice Board in Stanley for the inspection of the Public for One Week before its introduction; and copies of every such Draft shall be purchasable from the Government Printer, or other person duly authorized to sell the same for such sum as the Governor may from time to time direct, not exceeding Three Pence for each page, and the purchaser of any such draft may, without further payment, demand from the seller so authorized, at any time within Six Months of such purchase and so soon as copies of the Ordinance are printed, a true copy of the Ordinance as passed: provided always that in any case in which the Governor in Council thinks it urgently necessary to dispense with such publication and public notification, and with the sale of such Draft he may do so.

Drafts to be published, posted, and may be bought.

Disallowance.	5.—An intimation of the disallowance by Her Majesty of any Ordinance shall be published in the Gazette, or in some local Newspaper.
All Ordinances may be inspected.	6.—A copy of every Ordinance shall be available for Public inspection during Office hours in the Court House or other place appointed by the Governor.
Rules, etc., to be recorded.	7.—Two copies of all Rules and General Orders made by the Governor or Governor in Council, shall be signed by the Governor, and one filed in the Supreme Court, and one in the Colonial Secretary's Office, and copies of all such Rules and Orders printed by order of the Government shall be received in evidence.
Repeals do not revive.	8.—Whenever any Ordinance repealing in whole or in part any former enactment is itself repealed, such last repeal shall not revive the enactment or part before repealed, unless words be added reviving such enactment or part.
Rules made may be revoked.	9.—When any person is empowered to make any Bye-Laws, Rules, Orders, or Regulations, or to fix any scale of Charges, Fees, or Fines, it shall be implied that such person may revoke, alter or vary the same from time to time as occasion may require, unless it shall appear from the terms used, that such power is intended to be exercised finally in the first instance.
When rules survive the repeal of an Ordinance.	10.—All Rules and Scales of Fees, Charges, or Fines, made or prescribed under any Act or Ordinance prior to its repeal, shall if the Repealing Ordinance provides for making Rules or prescribing scales of fees or charges, remain in force after such repeal until they are revoked or superseded by Rules or Scales of Fees or Charges made or prescribed under and by virtue of the Repealing Ordinance, and they may be read with such verbal alterations as may be required to make them applicable to the requirements of the Repealing Ordinance.
Rules, etc., as valid as Ordinances.	11.—All Rules, Regulations, Bye-Laws, General Orders made, and all scales of Fees, and Charges, prescribed under or by virtue of any Ordinance shall be binding in the same manner and to the same extent as if they formed part of such Ordinance, and shall be subject to disallowance by Her Majesty.
Who may arrest.	12.—Whenever it is provided by any Law that any person committing any offence may be taken into custody, and no person is specially empowered to make such arrest, it shall be lawful for any Constable, or for any other person duly authorized by the Governor in writing, to make such arrest.
Want of form does not invalidate.	13.—No Order, Judgment, Warrant, or other proceeding made or purporting to be made under or concerning the conviction or commitment of any offender shall be quashed or vacated for want of form only.
Errors do not invalidate.	14.—No process or proceeding shall be set aside on account of any verbal or technical error or mistake only, and it shall be competent for the Court to decide what is a verbal or technical error or mistake in any action or proceeding, and all errors or mistakes which are not calculated to misinform or mislead the opposite party shall in every instance be deemed merely verbal or technical.
Appointments.	15.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint such persons as may be required to carry out the duties connected with any Ordinance save where any appointment is specially vested in some other person, and all appointments so made by the Governor shall be during pleasure only.

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- 16.—The powers and duties conferred and imposed by any Ordinance upon the holder of any Office, which has been abolished or may hereafter cease to exist or which has been or may be in any way amalgamated with some other office or the duties of which have devolved upon some other person, may be lawfully exercised and performed by any person duly authorized from time to time by the Governor in writing to perform the same, and any person appointed to act in any office may lawfully exercise all the powers attached to such office.
- 17.—The powers and duties conferred and imposed by any Act upon the holder of any office which does not exist in this Colony may be lawfully exercised and performed by any person duly authorized from time to time, by the Governor in that behalf.
- 18.—When reference to any public Officer is made, such reference shall include the person for the time being, lawfully exercising the duties and functions of such Officer.
- 19.—Whenever under any Ordinance duties and powers are imposed or conferred upon any persons to be elected or appointed and such elections or appointments have not been made as required or the persons elected or appointed have declined to act and whenever any vacancy is caused by death, it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint some person to discharge such duties and exercise such powers until there shall be some person duly elected or appointed and willing to act.
- 20.—Whenever it may be found convenient for the more efficient carrying out of any Ordinance or other purpose that the Colony should be divided into districts it shall be lawful for the Governor by Order in Council to divide the Colony into as many districts as may be deemed advisable, and from time to time to re-divide, sub-divide, or alter the boundaries of any such districts.
- 21.—The precedence of the members of any Commission of Enquiry or Board shall be determined by the dates of their appointment or when all are appointed on the same day by the order in which their names appear in the Gazette or instrument appointing them and unless otherwise specially provided the senior member shall be the chairman.
- 22.—Any person who shall be guilty of any violation of an Order made by the Governor, or the Governor in Council under any Ordinance for which no penalty is prescribed by such Ordinance shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Five Pounds.
- 23.—Any person wilfully obstructing the carrying out of the provisions of any Ordinance, or of any Order made thereunder shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.
- 24.—Any person who shall neglect to comply with, or who shall offend against any of the provisions of any Ordinance for the breach of which no penalty is therein provided, may be summoned before any Justice and on conviction shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two Pounds, and in default of the payment of such penalty the Justice may issue a warrant for the levying thereof by distress and sale, or may commit the offender to prison with or without hard labour, for any period not exceeding six months unless such penalty be sooner paid.
- 25.—If any person shall attempt to commit, or procure, or attempt to procure to be committed, or aid, or abet, in the committing of, any offence and it shall appear that he did so know-

ingly and wilfully, he shall be liable on conviction to the same punishment as if he had committed the offence, but the Court may mitigate the punishment according to the circumstances of the case.

Appeal.

26. Any person Summarily convicted may appeal to the Supreme Court, provided he give to the Justice notice in writing of such appeal, and of the ground thereof, within seven days of such conviction and enter into a recognizance with one sufficient surety to prosecute such appeal at the next sitting of the Supreme Court, and such person may thereupon be admitted to bail.

Construction.

Interpretation.

Meaning of words.

27.—In the construction of Ordinances the following Rules shall be observed, unless otherwise expressly provided for, or unless such construction would be inconsistent with the intention of the Ordinance or repugnant to the context, that is to say :—

(a) The words "Queen" or "Her Majesty" shall include Her Majesty, her heirs, or successors.

"The Secretary of State" shall mean Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

"A Secretary of State" shall mean one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

"Governor" shall include the person for the time being lawfully administering the Government of the Colony.

"Governor in Council" shall mean the Governor acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council.

"Order in Council" shall mean an Order made by the Queen in Council.

"Warrant" shall mean warrant under the hand of the person issuing the same.

"Month" shall mean a Calendar month, and "Year" a Calendar Year.

"Oath" or "Affidavit" shall include affirmation or declaration in cases where by Law an affirmation or declaration may be substituted for an Oath or Affidavit, and "Sworn" shall in like cases include "Affirmed."

"Lands" shall include Messuages, Tenements, Hereditaments, Houses and Buildings.

"Estate" shall include any Estate or Interest, Charge, Right, Title, Claim, Demand, Lien or incumbrance at law or in equity.

"Person" shall include any body of persons corporate or unincorporate.

"Property" shall include Goods, Chattels, Money, valuable securities, Documents, and every other matter or thing, whether real or personal, upon or with respect to which any offence may be committed.

"Owner" shall include the Agent, Manager or beneficiary occupier.

"Act" shall mean any Act of Parliament in force in this Colony.

"Law" shall include Act, Ordinance, Order in Council, or Proclamation, in force for the time being.

"Dues" shall include Duties, Taxes, and Rates.

"Summary Conviction" shall mean any conviction obtained,

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under and by virtue of any Law for the time being, conferring on a Magistrate, or Justice, the power of summary judication.

"Police Officer" or "Constable" shall include any one appointed to act as such, or as a special Constable, and any one acting in aid or under the direction of any such person.

"Waters" shall mean the sea adjacent to this Colony over which Her Majesty has, or may have jurisdiction.

"Justice" shall mean Justice of the Peace.

"Stanley" shall mean the land within a circle of ten miles from Christ Church.

"Colony" shall mean The Colony of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies.

"Registrar" shall mean Registrar of the Supreme Court.

"Folio" shall mean 72 words.

"Master" in relation to a Ship, shall include any person having charge, control or command of a Ship.

"Vessel" shall include every description of Ship, Boat, Lighter or Water Tank.

"The Gazette" shall mean the Government Gazette of the Colony.

"Rules" shall include Regulations, Bye-Laws, and General Orders.

(b) The imposition of a penalty shall not relieve any person from liability to answer for special damages to a person injured.

(c) When forms are prescribed slight deviations therefrom, not affecting the substance or calculated to mislead, shall not vitiate them.

Forms.

(d) When no forms are given in any Ordinance, and forms are required, such forms shall be used as the Governor may direct.

(e) Whenever any Court or person shall be authorized by Law to hear, or determine any matter or thing, a power and authority to take evidence and to administer an oath, shall be implied, and any person giving false evidence, may be prosecuted for perjury in like manner, as if such false evidence had been given in any trial, before the Supreme Court.

Perjury.

(f) Whenever any Court or person is authorized by Law to hear, or determine any matter or thing, a power and authority to call for the production of any paper or document shall be implied, and the Court may commit to prison for any term not exceeding One Month any person who shall refuse to give evidence or to produce any paper or document.

(g) When the number to constitute a quorum of any Board under any Law shall not be prescribed, a majority of the Board shall be a quorum, and the Chairman shall only have an equal vote with other members, except where his casting vote between an equality of votes is requisite.

Quorum.

(h) When a power is conferred on any person by the word "may," or by the words "it shall be lawful," or by the words "shall or may be lawful," such power may be exercised or not at discretion.

(i) Words in the singular shall include the plural, words in the

Singular includes Plural.	plural shall include the singular, and words importing the masculine gender shall include Females.
	(j) Words purporting to give authority to three or more persons shall be construed as giving authority to a majority of such persons.
	(k) When authority to make appointments is conferred, it shall include the power to fill up vacancies caused by death, resignation, removal or refusal to act.
All Fines and Fees paid into Treasury.	(l) All Dues, Fees, Fines, Penalties, or Forfeitures, or the proceeds thereof upon sale or so much thereof respectively, as shall not be otherwise expressly applied and appropriated, shall be paid into the Treasury for the public uses of this Colony, and the support of the Government thereof, provided that the Secretary of State may authorize the refund of any fee to any Officer.
	28.—Unless otherwise expressly provided :—
Summary Jurisdiction.	(a.) Any contravention of an Ordinance may be heard and dealt with in a Summary way by any Justice, and if any forfeitures, dues, penalties, sums of money, or expenses imposed or made payable under any Ordinance, be not immediately paid, the Justice may issue a Warrant for the levying thereof by distress and sale, or in the case of a penalty, may commit the offender to prison, with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding Six Months, unless such penalty be sooner paid.
Informations must be within 12 months.	(b.) All informations and proceedings in respect of offences against any Ordinance shall be commenced within Twelve calendar months after the offences thereby respectively shall have been committed.
Fresh contravention after 7 days.	(c.) Any Person may be convicted of a fresh contravention of any Ordinance, who does not carry out the order of any Justice, within seven days of such order; and any Person who within Twelve Months is again convicted under that Ordinance shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twice the limit fixed in that Ordinance for a first conviction, and for a third or subsequent conviction three times that amount.
Informers.	(d.) Any person giving such information as shall lead to the conviction of any person under any Ordinance may be awarded any sum not exceeding one half of any fine imposed in such case, as the Governor may approve.
Law of England in force.	29. Subject to all local Ordinances and Orders in Council in force for the time being; so much of the Law of England, for the time being, as is applicable to local circumstances, is and shall be in force in this Colony, so far as it is suitable and appropriate, and subject to such qualifications as local circumstances render necessary.
Procedure.	30. Unless otherwise provided by Local Ordinance or Orders in Council the procedure of the High Court of Justice in England shall as far as possible be adopted in the Supreme Court; the procedure of a Police Magistrate's Court in England shall as far as possible be adopted in a Magistrate's Court; and the procedure in a County Court in England shall as far as possible be adopted in any Court for the recovery of small debts.
Repeal.	31. The Ordinances mentioned in the Schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent specified in the third column of that Schedule.
Short Title.	32. This Ordinance may for all purposes be cited as "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance 1898."

GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Administration of Justice.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

1.—In this Ordinance :

“The Court” shall mean the Court or the Chief Justice, or a Judge sitting in the Court Room or in Chambers.

“A Court” shall mean a sitting of the Supreme Court for the trial of any civil or criminal cause.

“Judgment” shall include decree, order, or sentence.

2.—The Supreme Court shall consist of the Chief Justice, and if any assessors be summoned then of the Chief Justice and such assessors, and if any other Judge or Judges be appointed hereafter then of the Chief Justice and such other Judge or Judges.

3.—The Chief Justice shall be a member of the Bar of England, Scotland or Ireland or some British possession, and of not less than seven years standing, or shall have filled the office of Judge of some court in the British Dominions and be nominated by the Secretary of State and appointed by the Governor under the Public Seal of the Colony and shall hold office during good behaviour. Provided that whenever the office of Chief Justice is vacant or if the Chief Justice become incapable or be suspended or be absent from the Colony then the Governor may do and execute or may appoint some officer to do and execute all things that belong to the office of Chief Justice.

4.—The same person may be appointed to the offices of Chief Justice and Police Magistrate and any person so appointed shall cease to be styled the Chief Justice and shall be styled the Judge.

5.—Whenever the same person shall hold the offices of Judge and Police Magistrate the Supreme Court shall for the purpose of hearing appeals from the Police Court, but for no other purpose, be

held before the Judge and three Justices and on such appeals all questions shall be determined by the majority of the Court and in case the votes shall be equal the Judge shall have a casting vote.

6.—The Judge shall from time to time fix the days for the sitting of the Supreme Court for the purpose of hearing appeals from the Police Court and he shall summon by notice three Justices residing in or near Stanley to attend every sitting of the Court for that purpose. The Justices shall be so summoned in rotation according to the order in which their names stand on the commission, so that as far as circumstances will permit each may serve in his turn.

7.—Any Justice who being duly summoned neglects or fails without reasonable cause to attend the sitting of the Court shall be liable to be fined by the judge a sum not exceeding £10.

8.—It shall be lawful for the Governor if he shall think proper from time to time to appoint a Sheriff either to act in any particular case or for any period and such Sheriff may duly authorise, under his hand and seal any person to be his deputy and such Sheriff and his deputy are hereby empowered to execute all writs, summonses, rules, warrants, orders, commands and processes of either the Supreme or Police Court and if a Sheriff shall not have been duly appointed by the Governor then the Chief of the Police may do and execute all thing that belong to the office of Sheriff.

9.—The Supreme Court shall have within the Colony all the jurisdiction, powers and authorities whatsoever possessed and vested in the following Courts and Judges in England :

- (1)—The Court of Queen's Bench, Common Pleas and Exchequer.
- (2)—The High Court of Chancery, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and the Vice-Chancellor.
- (3)—The Courts and Justices of Oyer and Terminer and general gaol delivery.
- (4)—The Court of Probate.

10.—The Court shall also have and exercise jurisdiction :

- (1)—Over all matters of insolvency and bankruptcy.
- (2)—Under any Ordinance or Order in Council that may be made respecting matrimonial and divorce cases.

11.—The Court shall have appellate jurisdiction over all cases determined in all inferior Courts and in respect of any misdirections or misrulings of the Judges thereof and may set aside or correct the same.

12.—The Court shall also have and exercise all other jurisdiction, powers and authorities whatsoever, which now are or may be hereafter expressly or impliedly vested in it by any Law.

13.—The Court shall have jurisdiction in all causes and questions of escheat and may entertain, decide and finally adjudicate in and on all such causes and questions.

14.—The Court shall have power to appoint guardians and committees of the persons and estates of infants and of idiots and

lunatics and other persons unable to govern themselves or their estates, and for that purpose to inquire into, hear and determine, by inspection of the person, or by examination on oath or otherwise of the party in whose custody or charge such person may be, or of any other person, or by such other ways and means by which the truth may be best discovered, and to act in all cases as fully and amply to all intents and purposes as the Lord High Chancellor or the grantee from the Crown of the persons and estates of such persons may do in England.

15.—In every civil cause law and equity shall be administered concurrently and the Court shall have power to grant either absolutely or on such terms and conditions as shall seem just, all such remedies as either party may appear to be entitled to in respect of either claim or defence; so that as far as possible all matters between the parties may be completely and finally determined and all multiplicity of legal proceedings avoided; and where there is any conflict between the rules of equity and the rules of common law, the rules of equity shall prevail.

16.—The Chief Justice may cause any Member of Council or Justice to be summoned to sit with him as an assessor on the trial of any cause or the hearing of any proceeding civil or criminal, and any assessor who without reasonable cause shall fail to attend the Court or refuse to act as an assessor shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £10 which may be imposed summarily.

17.—The assessors shall have no voice in the decision of any case but every assessor may note and shall sign such note if he dissent from the judgment of the Court and the Chief Justice shall enter the grounds of such dissent on the proceedings of the Court.

18.—The Supreme Court shall hold sittings in Stanley for the trial of criminal causes upon the first Wednesday of the months of February, May, August and November.

19.—The Supreme Court shall hold sittings in Stanley for the dispatch of business on its civil side immediately on the termination of the criminal business and at such other times as the Chief Justice may direct.

20.—The Governor may direct the holding by the Chief Justice at any time and at any place of a special Court for the trial of any criminal or civil cause.

21.—The Court may make such orders as may be necessary to procure the attendance of special or common juries at any special Court and any juror who shall without lawful excuse fail to attend and serve when summoned shall be liable to the same penalties as may be imposed upon jurors for non-attendance under any law for the time being in force relating to jurors.

22.—The Chief Justice may by summary order remove into the Supreme Court any suit instituted in a lower Court and may also remove from the Supreme Court into a lower Court any suit which shall involve directly or indirectly any claim, demand or question to or respecting property or any civil right amounting to or of the value of not more than £50 and which can in his opinion be properly tried in such lower Court and thereupon the Police Magistrate or Judge of the Summary Court, as the case may be, may summarily try the same.

23.—Every prosecution in the Supreme Court shall be by information in the name of such officer as the Governor may appoint and the officer prosecuting an information shall not at the same time preside upon the bench.

24.—Every case in which the prisoner shall be arraigned on a capital charge shall be tried by a jury of twelve men and no verdict shall be recorded unless such verdict be unanimous. Every other case whether civil or criminal shall be tried by a jury of seven men and whenever the jury shall consist of seven men it shall be competent for any five of such jurors after having been in deliberation for not less than two hours to find a verdict and such verdict when delivered shall have the same force and effect as if the whole jury had concurred therein if the foreman shall declare to the Court that not less than five of their number have agreed thereto.

25.—Any person may appeal to Her Majesty in Council from any judgment of the Supreme Court in respect of any sum above the value of £500 if within fourteen days next after such judgment he give notice to the Registrar of the Supreme Court of his intention to appeal and within three months enter into good and sufficient security for the prosecution of the appeal and for the payment of all such costs as may be awarded by Her Majesty, and the Chief Justice may direct that the judgment appealed from shall be carried into execution or be suspended pending the appeal upon such terms and subject to such security to be given by either party as may appear to be most consistent with real and substantial justice. Reserving to Her Majesty in Council full power and authority upon the humble petition at any time of any person aggrieved to refuse or admit an appeal from any judgment of the Supreme Court upon such terms as to Her Majesty in Council shall seem meet.

26.—Any person dissatisfied with any judgment of any inferior Court may, except as hereinafter provided, appeal to the Supreme Court by petition within fourteen days after the day on which judgment was given or within such further time as the Chief Justice shall allow and the Supreme Court may determine the case upon the evidence taken in the Police Court or may rehear the case and call any person as a witness, whether previously examined or not and determine the case in a summary way or remit the case to be tried by a jury and allow such costs to either party as justice may seem to require.

27.—The right of appeal shall not extend to the following cases :—

- (a.) Where the truth of the accusations or correctness of the claim has been admitted.
- (b.) Where imprisonment is adjudged for failure to comply with an order for the payment of money for the finding of sureties, for the entering into any recognizance, or for the giving of any security.
- (c.) Where in a civil case before judgment both parties agree in writing that the judgment of the inferior Court shall be final.
- (d.) Where the accused has consented to an adjudication of his case by the inferior Court.

28.—It shall be lawful for the Court in civil proceedings to order and allow to all persons examined or detained as witnesses such sum of money as shall appear reasonable for defraying their expenses or affording compensation for their trouble and loss of time and also to order any witness present to give evidence notwithstanding that no payment to which he may be entitled shall have been paid or tendered to him.

29.—All sums of money so allowed shall be paid by the party on whose behalf the witness is called and shall be recoverable as ordinary costs of suit, if the Court shall so direct.

30.—Where the plaintiff in any action shall prove to the satisfaction of the Chief Justice that the plaintiff has good cause of action against the defendant and that there is probable cause for believing that the defendant is about to quit the Colony and that the absence of the defendant will materially prejudice the plaintiff in the prosecution of his action the Chief Justice may order such defendant to be arrested and imprisoned for a period not exceeding six months, unless and until he give security, not exceeding the amount claimed in the action, that he will not leave the Colony without the leave of the Court.

31.—Where the action is for a penalty, or sum in the nature of a penalty for any contract, it shall not be necessary to prove that the absence of the defendant from the Colony will materially prejudice the plaintiff in the prosecution of his action, and the security given shall be to the effect that any sum recovered against the defendant in the action shall be paid, or that the defendant shall be rendered to prison.

32.—The expenses incurred for the subsistence in prison of any person arrested under Sections 30 and 31 shall be paid by the plaintiff at the rate of two shillings a day or such other sum as the Court may from time to time direct, and shall be made by monthly payments in advance; and the money so disbursed may be added to the costs of a decree and be recovered by the plaintiff, unless the Court shall otherwise order. The Court may release the person so imprisoned on failure by the plaintiff to pay the subsistence.

33.—The Governor may from time to time appoint any person to be a notary public provided that if any notary public duly appointed by the law of England shall be available any appointment under this Ordinance shall determine and whenever the Governor shall not have appointed any notary under this Ordinance the Chief Justice shall have and may exercise within the Colony all the powers and authorities of a notary public appointed by the Law of England and shall use a Seal with the inscription "Supreme Court of the Falkland Islands, Notarial Seal."

34.—The Governor in Council may make rules for regulating the process, practice and mode of pleading in the Supreme Court and the conduct of all civil and criminal business coming within its cognisance, and with reference to fees of court, costs of persons admitted to practice, the duties of Officers of the Court and the powers of Commissioners and all other matters in connection with the business of the Court not otherwise specially provided for.

35.—The Ordinances mentioned in the Schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent specified in the third column of that Schedule.

This Ordinance may for all purposes be cited as "The Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1858."

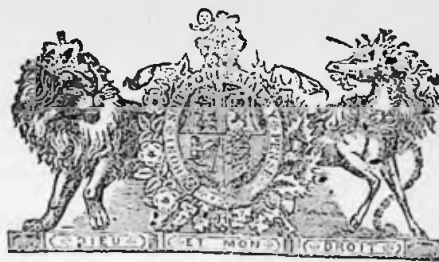

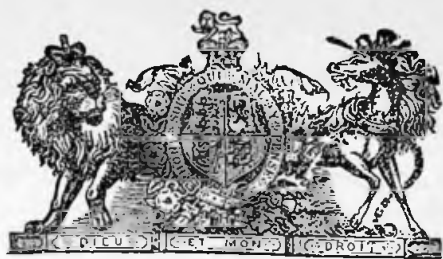

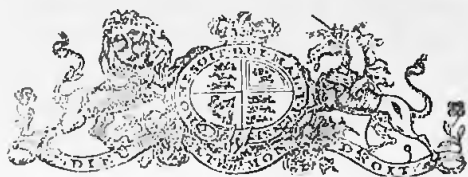

An Ordinance to provide for the better protection of the town of Stanley against Fire, and for the establishment of a Volunteer Fire Brigade.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the protection of Stanley against Fire, and for the establishment of a Volunteer Fire Brigade.

Preamble.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

FORMATION OF BRIGADE.

1.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to accept the services of any persons desiring to be formed into a Volunteer Fire Brigade and upon such acceptance being published in the *Gazette*, the proposed Brigade shall be deemed lawfully formed under this Ordinance and shall be designated, "The Stanley Volunteer Fire Brigade."

Formation of
Brigade.

2.—The Officers shall consist of a Superintendent, appointed by the Governor, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary, who shall be elected by the Members, subject to confirmation by the Governor.

Appointment of
Officers.

3.—Every Member shall before being enrolled take and subscribe to the Oath set forth in the Schedule to this Ordinance, such oath to be administered by a Justice or the Superintendent.

Enrolling of
Members.

4.—The Brigade shall upon its due formation assume and have charge of all Fire appliances in Stanley, subject to the same being kept always in a clean serviceable condition, always ready for instant use, and to the same being promptly and efficiently handled when called into action at a fire.

Brigade to have
charge of all
appliances.

5.—The Superintendent shall within 7 days after assuming charge of the Fire Engines cause a complete inventory to be made and kept of all engines and apparatus in charge of and pertaining to the Brigade, and shall post one copy in the Fire Engine Station and send another to the Colonial Secretary. These inventories must be checked by him on the 1st of January and July or within one week thereafter in each year, and all additions or losses noted and explained.

Inventories.

DISCIPLINE.

Power to make
rules.

6.—The Superintendent may make rules relating to attendance at practice and fire drill ; the proper and secure maintenance of all appliances in charge of the Brigade, for ensuring method and discipline, and for encouraging smartness and *esprit de corps* among the Members, for providing penalties for any breach of the rules, and for any other purpose in connection with this Ordinance; and such rules upon being approved by the Governor shall come into force.

Resignation of
Members.

7.—Any Member may resign, provided that :—

I.—He has given to the Superintendent 14 days notice of his intention.

II.—He has delivered up to the Superintendent or other Officer deputed by him, in good order, any uniform or equipment the property of Government or of the Brigade, which may have been issued to him or be in his charge.

III.—He has paid any money due or becoming due by him to the Brigade under any rule thereof.

Delivering up
Brigade property.

8.—Any Member who fails to deliver up in good order upon demand by the Superintendent any clothing or fire appliances in his charge or use shall be liable to pay to the Superintendent for the benefit of the Brigade the full cost landed in the Colony of any such articles, such payment and cost to be recovered in a summary way before a Magistrate.

Wilful damage of
appliances.

9.—Any person, or any Member who shall by negligence or otherwise wilfully damage any one of the Fire appliances, or any part thereof, shall be liable upon summary conviction before a Magistrate to a penalty not exceeding £20, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding six months, and to pay the cost of the damage.

Dismissal by Vote.

10.—Any Member may be called upon by the Superintendent to resign, or, failing to do so may be dismissed from the Brigade upon the votes of not less than two-thirds of the members.

Dismissal by
Superintendent.

11.—A Member convicted before any Court in its criminal jurisdiction, or who is guilty of conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline, or to the damage of any of the fire appliances, may be dismissed by the Superintendent, subject to appeal to the Governor.

FISCAL.

Monies and appli-
ances vest in
superintendent.

12.—All monies subscribed by, or to, or for the use of the Brigade, and all appliances belonging to or lawfully used by the Brigade, being its own or public property, and the power to sue for and recover monies due to the Brigade shall vest in the Superintendent for the time being and his successors in office; and any proceedings—Civil or Criminal—shall not be abated or discontinued by his ceasing to hold office, but may be carried on by and in the name of his successor.

Mode of recovery
of monies.

13.—If any Member or person who has been a Member of the Brigade shall neglect or refuse to pay anything subscribed or under-

taken to be paid by him to the Brigade, or payable by him under the rules, or to pay any fine incurred by him under the rules, such money shall be recoverable from him with costs any time within twelve months after the same has become due, in a summary way in the Police Magistrate's Court, even though the amount may exceed £20.

14.—All monies payable or received under this Ordinance or by virtue of any of its provisions, or of any of the Rules made thereunder shall be paid to the Secretary and credited by him to a fund styled the "Fire Brigade Fund;" and no disbursements therefrom shall be made save and except for purposes of *bona fide* protection against fire, or in the purchase of equipment for the Brigade, or the payment of wages, and no payment whatever shall be made except by approval of the Governor.

All monies to be paid to Secretary.

15.—It shall be lawful for the Superintendent to charge for the services of the Manual Engine rendered to shipping a sum not exceeding £5, for each day or part of a day during which the Engine may be utilised, and all Fire Insurance Companies now or which may hereafter carry on business in Stanley, shall contribute to the maintenance of the Steam Fire Engine an annual payment equal to $\frac{1}{8}$ -th per cent. of the capital assured.

Charge to shipping for use of Manual Engine.

Insurance Companies to contribute.

PREVENTIVE.

16.—From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall not be lawful to build or erect any house, tenement, shed or warehouse, having a roof of wood, or of any material other than iron or slate, under a penalty on summary conviction before a Magistrate of a fine not exceeding £20, and imprisonment with or without hard labour not exceeding six months; and any roof erected in contravention of this Ordinance may be forthwith removed by order of the Court, at the defendant's risk and expense.

No wood roof.

17.—It shall be lawful for the Police Magistrate upon information being laid before him that any chimney, flue, stove pipe, or other outlet of a fire is from faulty construction, or otherwise, a source of danger, to direct any constable or other person forthwith to enter on such premises and inspect and report thereon; and to summon before him the occupant or owner of the premises to show cause why the danger should not be abated, and to make such order in Court thereafter as may seem to him expedient in the public interest.

Dangerous flues.

FIRES.

18.—Any person who assaults, resists, impedes, or obstructs a Member in the discharge of his duty, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding six months. Any person present who when called upon by any Member or by any Constable to assist either in conveying any engine or fire appliances to a fire, or in extinguishing any outbreak of fire, declines, without reasonable cause, so to assist shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding £5, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding fourteen days.

Penalty for obstructing at a fire.

19.—It shall be lawful for any Constable or any Member working at a fire to break and enter, pull down, cut away, and destroy any building or curtilage which appears calculated to assist the conflagration, doing as little damage as possible, and he may take for use in extinguishing a fire any tanks, water, buckets,

ladders, or other article whatsoever that may be at hand and required for service at such fire. Provided that the owner of any property so damaged taken or affected shall be entitled upon clear proof thereof to compensation upon the proper assessment of such loss made by two assessors to be appointed for the purpose by the Governor. And provided further that no Constable or Member shall be personally liable for damage the result of action *bona fide* taken in the effort to extinguish or to prevent the spreading of a fire, nor unless such action can be proved to have been malicious and wanton and unwarranted by any of the surrounding circumstances.

Value of injury to
premises may be re-
covered from In-
surance Co.

20.—The damage to any building resulting from the carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be damage by fire within the meaning of any Policy of Insurance against Fire now or hereafter in force in this Colony, and shall be recoverable in any Court of Law in this Colony as if the said building so insured had been destroyed by fire.

GENERAL.

Inspection of Fire
Brigade appliances.

21.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to depute an Officer of the Government from time to time to view and inspect the Fire appliances, and to muster the Brigade for the purpose of testing and satisfying himself that proper efficiency is maintained; and in the event of receiving an unfavourable report the Government may withdraw either permanently or for a time the Engines and appliances from the charge of the Brigade, and may make such other arrangements as may seem best likely to serve the public interests in the protection of life and property from fire.

Auditors.

22.—It shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint an Auditor or Auditors for the purposes of this Ordinance, and by Warrant under his hand to authorize the expenditure of such monies as may from time to time be required in maintaining the Fire Engines, in replenishing damaged Fire Stock, and in keeping in proper repair and order all the appliances as well as in the purchase of new articles that may be found necessary; and for carrying into effect measures for increased protection against fire.

Police duties.

23.—Nothing in this Ordinance shall be held to relieve or lessen the duties of the Police Force as to supervision over the fire appliances, assisting at fires, and maintaining order and protecting property thereat.

Inquiry into cause
of fire.

24.—The Governor may direct and empower the Coroner or other person to hold, with, or without the aid of a Jury, an inquiry with or without closed doors into the origin or cause of any fire and in conducting such inquiry such person shall possess and exercise all the powers appertaining to the Office of Coroner in the holding of inquests of death; and any expenses attendant upon such inquiry shall be borne by the person applying for the same, or by the Colonial Government as the Governor shall direct.

Cost of inquiry.

25.—Whenever any inquiry in terms of the preceding clause is authorized by the Governor on the motion of any private person, such person shall enter into a bond with two sufficient sureties for the payment of all expenses attendant upon such inquiry as the Governor may approve.

Injured premises
may be examined.

26.—The person duly authorized and the Jury may for the holding of any inquiry as aforesaid, enter upon and examine any

premises, damaged or destroyed by any fire or by any act resulting from the carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance.

27.—The Governor in Council may at any time prohibit the importation of any inflammatory combustible, or explosive article, and may make regulations as to the building, manner and situation in which any such article shall be kept, and as to the quantity that may be kept in any building or place.

Importation, location and quantity of combustibles.

28.—Any person convicted of a contravention of a prohibition or of a regulation made by the Governor under the preceding Clause shall for a first offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Penalty.

29.—In this Ordinance :

“Superintendent” shall mean and include the Senior Officer for the time being of the Fire Brigade.

Interpretation.

“Officer” shall mean any Member duly appointed as Superintendent, or elected and confirmed as provided for in Clause 2.

“Appliances” shall mean and include all Engines, Hose, Carts, Reels, Axes, Ladders, Lamps, Branch Pipes, Buckets, and every article which can be used at a fire, and any article which may be purchased for use at fires, and all reservoirs, wells, tanks, or ditches, which may be constructed with the object of being available in case of fire.

“Member” shall mean a member of the Fire Brigade who has been duly enrolled.

30.—This Ordinance may be cited as the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, 1898.

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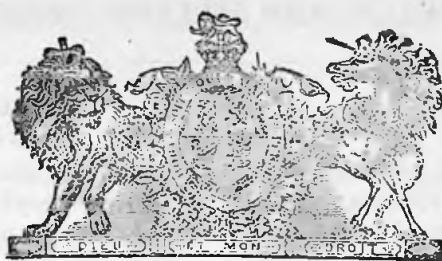

AN ORDINANCE relating to Jurors and Trials by Jury,

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—Every man, not being an alien, and except as hereinafter excepted, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, residing in this Colony, and being the owner or occupier of any real estate of the value of not less than ten pounds per annum or being in receipt of an annual salary of sixty pounds and upwards shall be qualified and liable to serve on juries in all civil and criminal proceedings in this Colony. Provided that no person whose usual place of residence is beyond a radius of six miles of Stanley, shall, without the sanction of the Chief Justice be summoned to serve, save on a coroner's inquest or at a special court ordered under section 20 of The Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1898.

Who must serve.

2.—The following persons shall be exempted from serving on juries: Members and Clerk of Council, persons holding office under the Imperial Government, Officers of the Court and Gaol, Barristers Solicitors and Attorneys, Consular agents not being British subjects, ministers of religion, duly qualified medical practitioners in actual practice, pilots and customs officers when on actual duty, and justices.

Exemptions.

3.—No man who hath been convicted of any treason, felony or perjury, or of any crime that is infamous, unless he shall have obtained a free pardon, shall serve on any jury.

Not fit.

4.—The Police Magistrate or other proper officer shall, on or before the first day of January in each year, prepare a list in alphabetical order of all men liable to serve on juries and shall cause the same to be published in the *Gazette* and a copy thereof to be affixed to the Court House or other conspicuous place and shall subjoin a notice that all objections to the said list will be heard on the third Monday in January at the Police Court.

Lists annual.

5.—The Police Magistrate may strike out of the said list any person who shall not be liable to serve, or who from any infirmity is incapable of serving as a juror, or who shall be unable to read and write, and shall correct all errors in the said list.

Correcting lists

Corrected list.

6.—A corrected copy of the jury list in which each name shall be numbered consecutively shall be signed by the Police Magistrate and shall thereupon come into force and shall be kept posted in some conspicuous place at or near the Court House and such jury list shall be in force until superseded by the list of the year next following.

Chief Justice may add or remove names.

7.—Any person whose name shall be upon any jury list, duly allowed and signed, may apply in open court to the Chief Justice for the removal of his own or any other person's name and any person duly qualified whose name has been expunged from any list may likewise apply to have his name restored, and the Chief Justice may summarily hear and decide upon any such application.

General.

8.—The Chief Justice may direct the summoning of jurors and give directions as to the time and place for which such jurors shall be summoned and as to all such other matters as shall seem requisite.

Number summoned.

9.—Unless otherwise ordered by the Chief Justice twenty-four persons shall be summoned when a jury of twelve is required and fourteen for a jury of seven and every summons, except in the case of a coroner's inquest shall be personally served upon or left at the usual place of abode of the juror three clear days before the day appointed for the sitting of the Court: provided that upon a coroner's inquest the summons may be made returnable immediately or at such time and place as the coroner shall specially order.

How.

10.—Jurors shall be summoned in the order in which their names are placed in the jury list and at the commencement of every year the names shall be taken from the new list, beginning with the person whose name stands next after the juror last summoned in the preceding list.

If absent.

11.—Whenever a summons cannot be served by reason of a juror being absent and whenever any juror has failed to attend, in either case the juror who has not served in his turn shall be resummoned until he shall have served in his turn.

to attend.

12.—If any person, duly summoned, shall fail to attend as a juror when his name is called, or after appearance shall withdraw himself without the permission of the court, the court may in a summary way, either on the same or at any future day impose a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

a jury.

13.—Juries for the trial of all issues which are not capital shall consist of seven persons; and it shall be competent for any five of such jurors after having been in deliberation for two hours at the least to find a verdict, and such verdict shall have the same force and effect as if the whole jury had concurred therein. Provided that in delivering such verdict the foreman shall declare to the court in the presence of the jury that not less than five of their number have agreed thereto.

Verdict of five.

Aliens to be tried as subjects.

14.—No alien in any case shall be entitled to a jury *de medietate lingue*, but every alien shall be triable in the same manner as if he were a natural born subject.

15.—The jury to be empanelled for the trial of any cause shall be balloted for in the following manner: Numbered counters corresponding with the numbers opposite the names on the jury list of such persons as have been summoned shall be put into a box in open court and drawn out until a sufficient number of jurors shall be secured, and in case of a sufficient number of jurors not being in attendance the Chief Justice may complete the number from among the bystanders, provided no objection to such person be made and allowed, and any such bystander refusing to act may be fined ten pounds or committed for contempt for any term not exceeding thirty days.

Ballot.

Bystanders.

16.—In any case where the jury consists of seven, each party shall be allowed three peremptory challenges and no more, and when the jury consists of twelve each party shall be allowed six peremptory challenges and no more; any further objections made to any juror shall be decided by the court.

Challenges.

17.—When a view shall be considered necessary by the court the jury sworn to try the case shall make the view under the charge of some proper person to be appointed and, if necessary, of a shewer, and the trial may be postponed to any other day.

View.

18.—If during the trial of any case, not being a capital offence, one juror shall die or become incapable of acting or be absent, it shall not be necessary to discharge the jury or to add another juror, but the trial shall be proceeded with.

Illness.

19.—Whenever it shall appear that any trial cannot reasonably be concluded in one day it shall be lawful for the court to adjourn the trial and to permit any juror to depart who shall in open court take the following oath:

Release on adjournment.

“I swear that during any adjournment of the trial of
“ I will not until the conclusion of the case or the jury shall be discharged speak with,
“ listen to or receive or hold any communication with any
“ person whatsoever other than my fellows impanelled with
“ me touching or relating to this trial and that upon the
“ termination of every adjournment thereof I will again come
“ into and remain in this court.”

So help me God.

20.—Jurors after retiring to consider their verdict may, in the discretion of the court, be allowed reasonable refreshment and such refreshment shall in criminal cases only be provided at the expense of Government.

Refreshments.

21.—Every juror summoned in any civil case shall receive from the Registrar the sum of three shillings for attending the court and if he shall serve as a juror he shall receive a further sum of five shillings for every day he shall serve as a juror and the party requiring the jury shall deposit with the Registrar a sum sufficient for the remuneration to such jurors for one day in advance.

Pay.

22.—Any person corruptly attempting to influence any juror and any juror consenting thereto shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanour and may on proof thereof before the Supreme Court be punished by fine not exceeding £100, or imprisoned with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding one year, or both.

Tampering with.

Repeal.

23.—The Ordinances mentioned in the Schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent specified in the third column of that Schedule.

Short Title.

24.—This Ordinance may be cited as "The Jury Ordinance, 1898."

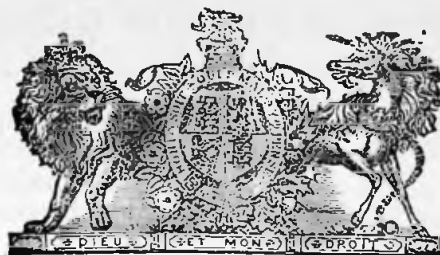

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and confirmed.

The President after explaining in full the advantages of the Bill introduced "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance" and moved the suspension of the Standing Orders, seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton, and agreed to.

The Bill went through all its stages and was passed with the following amendments.

Inserted Clause 17, "time."

Clause 26. "Subject to the provisions of Clauses 26 and 27 of the Administration of Justice Ordinance 1893."

Clause 27. Under "law" "rule" was inserted.

"Stanley" shall mean any land, house or premises situated on the South side of Stanley harbour and within two miles of the Cathedral.

"Suburban land or Suburbs" shall mean any land outside Stanley that can be reached without going more than six miles from the Cathedral or any land outside of the limits of any town hereafter declared which can be reached without going more than six miles from the centre of the Town."

In (b) "and all other casual revenues of the Crown (other than droits of the Crown and droits of the Admiralty)"

Under (b) "charged"

Under (d) "Law for Ordinance."

Clause 27. "The Governor in Council may from time to time declare any place within the Colony to be a Town and define the extent, limits, and boundaries of such Town, and from time to time vary or alter the boundaries so defined."

Clause 28. "Any person wilfully and corruptly making any solemn declaration or affirmation, knowing the same to be false, shall be deemed guilty of perjury."

In the Schedule "No. 1 of 1871" struck out "Ordinance No. 1 of 1869 Clause 1" inserted.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary introduced and explained a Bill entitled "An Ordinance relating to the Administration of Justice" and moved the suspension of the Standing Orders, seconded by the Honourable J. J. Felton and agreed to.

The Bill went through all its stages and passed with the following amendments.

Clause 1. "or rule" inserted.

Clause 18. "When there are cases to be tried" inserted.

Clause 24. All after "seven men" struck out "and when a sentence of penal servitude is passed the person so sentenced may be imprisoned with hard labour for any term not exceeding the term of such sentence of penal servitude" inserted.

Clause 32. "Two" made "three shillings."

Schedule No. 3 of 1876 (the whole.) No. 4 of 1876 (the whole) inserted.

RESOLUTION.

President read the following Resolution :

"That it is desirable to build new Government Offices, and that a sum not exceeding £10,000 should for that purpose be appropriated from the Land Sales Fund, and further, that a sum not exceeding £2000 should be appropriated from the same fund for additions to Government House."

In reading the resolution His Excellency pointed out the state of Government Offices which, compared with other Colonies, was a disgrace, and the desirability of a secure building for the custody of deeds, registers, &c., as well as for comfort of Public Officers, and still greater comfort and convenience for the public, who at present have to wait exposed to the weather for their mails, &c. This Colony was in its infancy, and if real progress were desired he felt sure the Honourable Members would give their support. He only desired at present that Members be with him in expressing the desirability of the principle of the present vote. He did not ask them to vote any more of which might be required for a year, or perhaps two years, but in any case when an estimate had been obtained he would submit the matter to the Council again before anything was expended.

His Excellency then laid plans of the proposed buildings before the Members and explained that the cost would probably be much under the estimate.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said he regretted that he could not support the resolution as he had all along been dead against incurring debt, and proceeded to mention his disputes with the last Governor, when he was called to order, as no personal references could be permitted in Council.

Mr. Felton considered if anything was done it should be in the direction of building bridges and signposts in the camp upon which nothing was ever expended, Stanley getting all the benefit.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon said it was with profound regret that he felt it his duty to oppose this the first measure at the first Legislative Council held by His Excellency, but he had read the Orders of the Day with amazement and dismay. He regarded the proposal as an indication of policy on the part of His Excellency which he felt bound to deplore. He went on to state that within the last seven or eight years the expenditure had gone up by leaps and bounds.

In 1891 Council had voted £2,500 for repairs of Government buildings, and £2000 had been spent on Government Offices alone. Moreover money would probably be required to build new Barracks and Store (which he believed were both the property of the Admiralty) in case of the place being made a Naval Depot.

He considered the present Government Offices met all requirements, and relied upon a statement read by Governor Kerr in 1890 to the effect that only the interest on the land sales should be expended.

His Excellency expressed surprise and regret that a proposal which he conceived was in the best interests of the Colony should have met with such opposition and pointed out how the expenditure proposed at the present would be a future economy.

The valuable records of Survey, Registration, &c., were daily fading, and in a few years would vanish, and then what would be the cost to replace them. His Excellency read a return by the Treasurer wholly refuting Mr. Baillon's assertion of the expenditure having gone up by leaps since 1891.

His Excellency said his special care would be to see that the money was not wasted. He said this with the more confidence as extravagance at which one Honourable Member hinted had never been laid to his charge in regard to public money at St. Helena which he had raised from debt to solvency, and asked the Honourable Members if the room in which they now sat 15 x 12 was a suitable Council Chamber for a Colony like this, when they remembered that the Falkland Island Company thought proper to expend a sum of £8000 on a residence for their Manager.

He would however in view of all that had been urged allow the matter to rest for the present, and would not go on with the second part of the Resolution.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary said His Excellency had left but little for him to say beyond that the offices were tumbledown, and the deeds and records, plans and registers, were most insecure, and in case of fire would be destroyed in a few minutes. The proposed buildings were not to be a temporary but a lasting permanent building by which the recurrent outlay in repairing and timbering up the present offices would be saved.

The Colonial Secretary asked leave at least to go on and propose the second Resolution as the Honourable Members were all personally conversant with the condition of Government House and the need for additional accommodation.

The Honourable J. J. Felton said he would support the vote if it came from General Revenue and not from the Land Fund.

Mr. Baillon said it gave him great pleasure to second this, and the Resolution thus amended was carried *nem con.*

The Governor urged the Council not to allow any differences of opinion to become at any time personal questions, and stated that he would always give Honourable Members credit for being actuated solely in the interests and for the advancement of the Colony, and hoped that the Government would be able to meet in every possible way any suggestions brought forward by them, but if he felt the view taken by the Government was for the good of the Colony he would never relax his endeavours to convince Members of what might appear to him to be the error of their views.

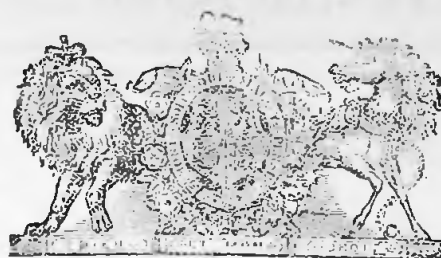

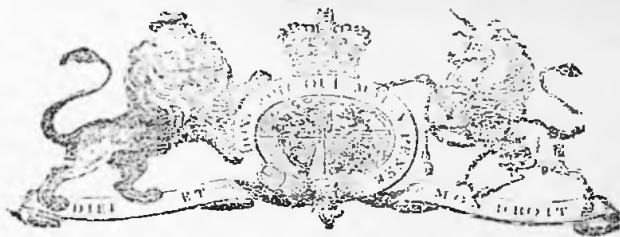

GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

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AN ORDINANCE relating to Coroners.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—Every Stipendiary Magistrate of this Colony shall be *ex officio* a Coroner and shall have and may exercise all the powers and shall perform all the duties of a Coroner, as known to and recognised by the English law and practice, subject to the provisions hereof. Coroner.

2.—In every case of an apparently not natural death information shall forthwith be given to the Coroner or to the nearest Justice by any person who shall have knowledge thereof; and every person wilfully failing to give such information shall on summary conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds. Information of death.

3.—Whenever a Coroner shall receive credible information of any such death he shall, if the circumstances seem so to require, proceed to the spot where the body shall be lying and there hold an inquest. Inquest by Coroner.

4.—Whenever a Justice shall receive credible information of any such death he may, if he cannot inform the Coroner in time or if in his opinion the Coroner would be unable to act by reason of his being at too great a distance from where the body is lying, or if the Coroner shall so request, hold such inquest in the stead of such Coroner and every such Justice is hereby authorized to exercise all the powers and perform all the duties of a Coroner in respect of such inquest. Inquest by Justice of the Peace.

5.—All evidence shall be taken in the form of depositions signed by the witnesses, as in the case of an indictable offence, and such depositions with the verdict of the jury or in the case of an enquiry with a statement by the Coroner of the supposed cause of Procedure.

[]

death shall forthwith be transmitted to the Registrar of the Supreme Court.

Inquest may be held on Sunday.

6.—Whenever it shall appear necessary an inquest may be held on a Sunday.

Inquisition.

7.—Every person empowered to hold an inquest under any law may instead thereof hold an inquisition without the aid or intervention of a jury and the procedure with regard thereto, and as to the summoning of witnesses, the taking of evidence, the commitment to prison and the bailing of those charged shall as nearly as may be accord with the law of England relating to inquests.

No burial without order.

8.—The body of a person who has apparently not died a natural death shall not be buried without an order in writing from a Coroner or Justice, and any person burying or assisting to bury any such body without an order as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Medical fees.

9.—When any qualified medical practitioner not holding any appointment under the Government gives evidence at any inquest by direction of a Coroner he shall receive a fee of One Pound and when he holds a *post mortem* examination by direction of a Coroner he shall receive a fee of Two Pounds.

Exhumation.

10.—It shall be lawful for the Governor by warrant under his hand and the Public Seal of the Colony to order the disinterment of any body.

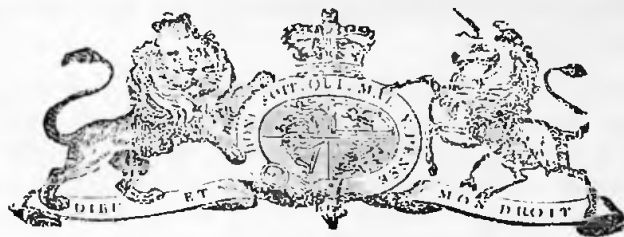

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—Every Stipendiary Magistrate of this Colony shall be *ex officio* a Coroner and shall have and may exercise all the powers and shall perform all the duties of a Coroner, as known to and recognised by the English law and practice, subject to the provisions hereof.

Coroners.

2.—In every case of an apparently not natural death information shall forthwith be given to the Coroner or to the nearest Justice by any person who shall have knowledge thereof; and every person wilfully failing to give such information shall on summary conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

Information of death.

3.—Whenever a Coroner shall receive credible information of any such death he shall, if the circumstances seem so to require, proceed to the spot where the body shall be lying and there hold an inquest.

Inquest by Coroner.

4.—Whenever a Justice shall receive credible information of any such death he may, if he cannot inform the Coroner in time or if in his opinion the Coroner would be unable to act by reason of his being at too great a distance from where the body is lying, or if the Coroner shall so request, hold such inquest in the stead of such Coroner and every such Justice is hereby authorized to exercise all the powers and perform all the duties of a Coroner in respect of such inquest.

Inquest by Justice of the Peace.

5.—All evidence shall be taken in the form of depositions signed by the witnesses, as in the case of an indictable offence, and such depositions with the verdict of the jury or in the case of an enquiry with a statement by the Coroner of the supposed cause of

8.—The body of a person who has apparently not died a natural death shall not be buried without an order in writing from a Coroner or Justice, and any person burying or assisting to bury any such body without an order as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Medical fees.

9.—When any qualified medical practitioner not holding any appointment under the Government gives evidence at any inquest by direction of a Coroner he shall receive a fee of One Pound and when he holds a *post mortem* examination by direction of a Coroner he shall receive a fee of Two Pounds.

Exhumation.

10.—It shall be lawful for the Governor by warrant under his hand and the Public Seal of the Colony to order the disinterment of any body.

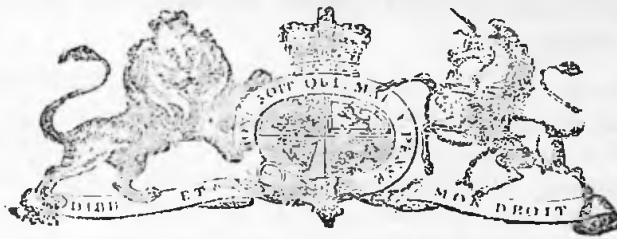

AN ORDINANCE relating to Harbours.

Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

1.—In this Ordinance—

“Harbour Master” shall mean any person lawfully performing the duties or acting under the orders of the Harbour Master.

Interpretation.

“Ship” shall include every description of vessel not propelled by oars only.

“Harbour” shall mean the water lying to the west of a line drawn from Cape Pembroke to William Point, and any Port hereafter defined and declared a harbour by the Governor in Council.

“Boat” shall include lighter, barge, hulk, or other open or partly decked vessel.

2.—The Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter or revoke Regulations :—

Regulations.

(a). For the preservation of any port, harbour, roadstead, wharf, landing place, or beach; for the safe and commodious navigation of any harbour and for the maintenance of good order therein;

(b). Respecting the anchoring mooring, and removing of ships, hulks, boats and buoys; the packing, landing, deposit or removal of gunpowder and other dangerous goods; the watering, coaling, ballasting, deballasting, loading and discharging of ships, the order and management of ships and boats within the waters of the Colony, and the loading, landing and disposition of cargo.

- (c). Respecting the numbering and marking and traffic of boats ;
- (d). Respecting the rates to be charged by boats, and the fees to be paid under this Ordinance ;
- (e). Fixing the penalties for the breach of any regulation made under this Ordinance ;
- (f). Requiring the deposit of a ships papers with the Collector of Customs ;

And such regulations shall come into force on publication of the same ; Provided that all such regulations shall be forthwith transmitted to the Secretary of State and shall be subject to correction or disallowance by Her Majesty.

Harbour Master may be appointed.

3.—The Governor may from time to time appoint a Harbour Master and a Deputy Harbour Master for any Port, and make regulations respecting their duties,

Orders of Harbour Master to be carried out.

4.—The Harbour Master may order the Master of any ship, boat or hulk ;

- (a). To shift the berth of such ship, boat or hulk, to any place other than where such ship, boat or hulk may be lying at the time of making such order ;
- (b). To make in writing or otherwise any declaration upon any subject in connection with his ship or the cargo and crew thereof.

Any person receiving such order who shall refuse or neglect to comply with such order with all convenient speed shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds,

Penalty for signing wilfully false statement.

5.—Any person signing a declaration required by this Ordinance or by any regulation made under this Ordinance, containing any wilfully, false, misleading or inaccurate statement, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds.

If ship is going to anchor no person to board before Harbour Master.

6.—Any person receiving anything from any ship, and any person other than the Pilot boarding or leaving, or making fast to any ship before she has received pratique and hoisted a white flag at the main top-gallant mast head, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

Penalty for interfering with Harbour Master.

7.—Any person interfering with the Harbour Master in the due execution of his duty so as to resist or impede him in the proper performance thereof shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Penalty for unlawfully damaging moorings, &c.

8.—Any person who shall wilfully and unlawfully cut, break, destroy, damage or remove, except for the purposes of this Ordinance, the mooring or fastening of any ship, boat or hulk, or any sea mark, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds, and such penalty shall not be a bar to, or prejudice any action at law which may be brought by any person who has suffered injury or loss.

Penalty for impeding execution of Warrant on board ship.

9.—Any person who shall oppose or impede the execution on board any ship of any Warrant or other legal process, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

10.—If the Master of any ship shall land or suffer to be landed in this Colony any stowaway, without the permission of the Governor in writing, he shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

Stowaways.

11.—Any person who takes or removes any sand, stone, or gravel from a harbour or the beach without the permission in writing of the Harbour Master, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

No person to remove sand, & „, without permission.

12.—Any person who throws into a harbour, or on the beach thereof any dead animal, ballast, damaged goods, rubbish, night soil or other material, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds; Provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the deposit of rubbish at any spot where an Official notice shall be posted sanctioning such deposit, and subject to the conditions laid down in such notice.

13.—Any person offending against any regulation made under this Ordinance shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum fixed in such regulations, and not more than Fifty Pounds.

Penalty for offending against regulations.

14.—This Ordinance may be cited as “The Harbour Ordinance, 1898.”

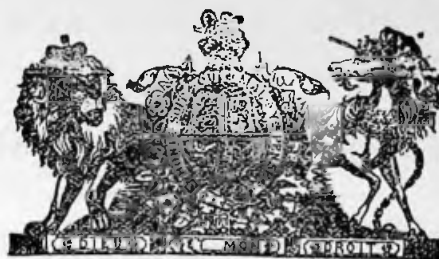

GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Post Office.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—In this Ordinance:

“Postal Packet” shall mean a letter, post card, reply post card, newspaper, book packet, pattern or sample packet, and every packet or article transmissible by post, and not for the time being prohibited from being sent by post.

“Port” shall mean a port as defined in the Customs Ordinance.

2.—Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and to any rules made hereunder, all laws and regulations for the time being in force relating to the Post Office of the United Kingdom shall, so far as the same are applicable, be in force in this Colony, and the Governor may, by Order in Council, from time to time provide for all matters relating to the practice, procedure and jurisdiction in this Colony, under the said laws and regulations in cases where the provisions thereof in respect of such matters are deemed by him inapplicable to this Colony.

3.—The Governor in Council may also from time to time by order

- (a) Fix the rates of postage to be charged on Postal packets sent from any place within the Colony to any other place within or without the Colony.
- (b) Fix the fees to be paid for registration, insurance and money orders, and in every other case where fees may be deemed necessary.
- (c) Make rules as to insurance and compensation, and any other matters connected with the Post Office and the Officers and servants thereof.

4.—The Master of any vessel about to depart from any port in the Colony shall, not less than 12 hours before leaving such port give notice personally or in writing to the Postmaster of his intended departure, and of the names of the places at which he intends to call, and he shall answer all such questions as shall be demanded of him relating to his ship and her intended voyage.

5.—A Master shall carry every mail tendered to him on behalf of or addressd to any Postmaster, and such Master shall keep all mails as he shall have in charge in some dry and secure place, and the same shall be entered upon the Custom House manifest whenever practicable.

6.—Every Master who shall refuse or wilfully delay to receive any mail or postal packet tendered to him by or on behalf of the Postmaster, or to give a receipt therefor, or who shall refuse or neglect to deliver without delay at the port of destination to the Postmaster or other addressee every mail or postal packet which he has brought, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One hundred Pounds.

7.—The Postmaster shall, on demand, pay to the Master of any ship, (not under contract with the Government) 1d. for every letter and $\frac{1}{4}$ for every other postal packet contained in any mail safely carried and delivered.

8.—Where, according to the rules of the Universal Postal Union, or other agreement, an indemnity in respect of loss is payable, the Governor shall cause the amount thereof to be paid to the sender, or at his request to the addressee, out of the public Revenues of this Colony, on account of the Country liable to pay such amount or any part thereof.

9.—Every postal packet shall, for the purposes of laying any information, be deemed to be the property of the Governor.

10.—The Ordinances mentioned in the Schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent specified in the third column of that Schedule.

11.—This Ordinance may for all purposes be cited as "The Post Office Ordinance, 1898."

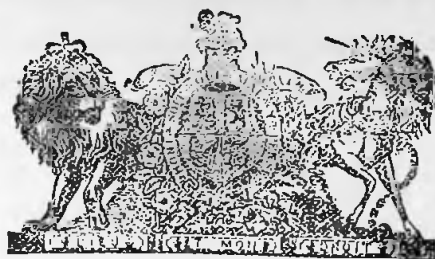

Report on Government Savings Bank in 1898.

During the year 1897-8, the number of deposits made in the Savings Bank amounted to 414, and their value to £10961 18 7½. On the other hand 144 withdrawals to the amount of £7713 14 1 were effected, so that the capital of the Bank increased by £3248 4 6½; this amount, together with £957 13 11½ interest earned during the year, brought the total balance to £12,476 9 10.

Statement A showing the Capital and Profit and Loss Account, and subsidiary tables B, C, D & E giving details of the transactions of the Bank since its formation are herewith attached.

The balance of £12,476 9 10 is distributed amongst 349 depositors, being an average of £121 14 2 per depositor, or £20 14 6 per head of the population, an average which takes the lead of the United Kingdom and other Colonies as shown by the annexed diagram. *

so that at the close of the Tenth complete year of its existence abundant proof is given that the want of opportunity, which at one time prevented the people employing their savings as capital, has been successfully supplied, and that the Savings Bank has fully answered the purpose for which it was instituted.

As in former years, Tables C & E show that the best months for the Bank were October to January and September when the deposits by far exceeds the withdrawals, while three out of a period of four (February and May) are the usual months in the Bank's year for the withdrawals to exceed the deposits, a circumstance due to the fact that after the busy season an exodus of shepherds and others takes place to the Mother Country or to Patagonia; the majority of whom however return after the winter only again to have recourse to the services of the Bank.

Without this Institute it is not easy to imagine what would have become of the capital now administered by it. Rapidly as the productive capability of the Islands has been increased, though there is not the slightest reason to doubt that the disposition of the community to consume wealth would have run ahead of its power of production, the people would have expended, unproductively, upon their immediate subsistence a larger part of all they earned, while the less favourable condition of the emigrant would not have so generally tended to promote the development of the neighbouring countries which help to supply England with cheap produce.

It is roughly estimated that since the formation of the bank some 54 per cent of its payments have been taken to the United Kingdom or to the Colonies, 26 per cent employed in Patagonia and 20 per cent utilised locally.

£158 5 6 of New Zealand stock were sold during the year. This sale was occasioned by the Bank funds being overinvested by £2099 at the time the amount sold was required.

The capital of the Bank, which earned £1186 2 3 during the year, £957 13 11½ of which were credited to the depositors and the sum of £45 defrayed for the management, leaving a profit of £183 8 3½, was invested in Consols and Inscribed Securities as follows:

GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

()

An Ordinance relating to the Seal fishery of the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Whereas it is desirable to make further provision for the Seal fishery of these Islands.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—In this Ordinance “Seal” means the “Fur Seal,” the “Hair Seal,” the “Sea Otter,” the “Sea Elephant,” the “Sea Leopard,” the “Sea Bear,” the “Sea Lion,” the “Sea Dog,” and any animal of the seal kind.

“Skin” means the skin of any seal.

“Sealing Season” means the period from the first day of April to the 30th day of September both inclusive.

“Close Season” means the whole of the year except the “Sealing Season.”

“Seal Reserve” means any portion of land or water set apart by the Governor in Council within the limits of the Colony for the breeding of Seals.

2.—The Colonial Secretary or such other Officer as the Governor may appoint, shall issue Sealing Licences to such persons as may apply for them on payment into the Colonial Treasury of the sum of Ten Pounds; provided that each person so applying shall enter into a bond with the Colonial Government.

(a) To pay into the Colonial Treasury the royalties specified in the schedule hereto.

(b) To render an accurate account of the number of seals taken by him during each sealing season.

3.—A Sealing Licence shall entitle the holder thereof to kill

or capture seals during the Sealing Season of the Calendar year in which the Licence is issued in such manner and subject to such conditions and restrictions as may be therein prescribed or as are laid down in this Ordinance and the Rules and Regulations made under Section 7 thereof.

4.—Any person who at the date of the passing of this Ordinance has, by lease from the Crown or otherwise an existing right to kill or capture seals, shall receive annually while such right continues, a Sealing Licence under this Ordinance without payment of the sum of Ten Pounds as aforesaid, and without being required to enter into the bond specified in the proviso to Section 2 hereof.

5.—Any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance and shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds for each such offence, and to forfeiture of any seals or skins found in his possession.

(a) Kills or captures, or attempts to kill or capture any seal, or carries or has in his possession any club, firearm or other lethal weapon, or any engine, net, trap, or other device, with intent to kill or capture any seal without a licence, or contrary to the terms of his licence, or beyond the limits specified in such licence.

(b) Is in or upon any seal reserve with intent to kill or capture any seal therein.

(c) Has in his possession, or in any ship under his command, any seal or skin of which he cannot give a satisfactory account.

(d) Kills or captures, or attempts to kill or capture, any seal during the close season, or on a Sunday, or between sunset and sunrise.

(e) Neglects or refuses to bring to, when lawfully required, any ship or vessel of which he may be in charge.

6.—The Governor in Council may, by proclamation

(a) Suspend the issue of all Licences except such as shall have been granted under Section 4 hereof.

(b) Prohibit the taking in any year of one or more kinds of seals or of the males or females or young of any kind.

(c) Vary in any year the limits of the sealing season for any kind of seal or for the males or females or young of any kind.

(d) Declare any territorial waters or any Crown land, or with the consent of the owner any private land, to be a seal reserve.

7.—The Governor in Council may also from time to time make rules.

(a) For fixing the terms and conditions under and upon which sealing licences shall be granted.

(b) For regulating the number of sealing licences to be issued in any year.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary introduced a Bill entitled "An Ordinance relating to Harbours" and moved the suspension of the Standing Orders, seconded by the Honourable A. E. Baillon.

The Bill was passed through all its stages with the following amendments in Committee.

The word "vessel" was substituted for the word "ship" wherever it occurs.

In clause 1 "Harbour" shall mean the land-locked water lying to the West and South West of a line drawn from Cape Pembroke to William Point.

Clause 6, line 1. After the word "vessel" insert "arriving from any port beyond the seas." In line 3 "the Commercial Code letter N" was substituted for "a white flag." Clause 11. After "beach" insert "thereof."

The Colonial Treasurer introduced "An Ordinance relating to the Post Office" and moved the suspension of the Standing Orders, seconded by the Colonial Secretary. The Bill passed through all its stages with the following amendment in Committee. Clause 1. "Port" shall mean the Port of Stanley or Fox Bay, and include any place where a Collector shall be stationed and any place hereafter declared a Port by the Governor in Council.

Read and Confirmed this 6th day of September, 1898.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon repeated his objection to horse allowance to Stipendiary Magistrate, West Falklands, of £50 (which he submitted last year on the Estimates being considered) as he understands that Mr. Hurst does not and cannot, ride.

8.—Police.

The Honourable A. E. Baillon fails to see the necessity for both Inspector and Superintendent, and moves a reduction in the vote by £100.

His Excellency said he would submit for the consideration of the Secretary of State the Honourable Member's motion.

His Excellency explained the origin of the Vote and pressed the necessity for a Fire Engine Station and a Police Station, and the desirability of having all buildings together, and under one roof. 16.—Colonial Engineer Mr. Baillon cordially approved of Mr. Messervy's appointment, and gives his opinion that the first things needing attention are the roads and drains. Mr. Baillon does not see the need for a foreman as well as a Colonial Engineer.

Mr. Baillon called attention to the Surveyor's services being retained further, as he only came out to survey the compulsory purchases.

His Excellency pointed out the chaotic state of the land deeds on which the Colonial Secretary had expended very much time for months past, and had made splendid progress, and assumed entire responsibility for diverting the Surveyor to making a proper plan of the town.

His Excellency proposed the building of a reservoir, as fresh water was essential for the Steam Fire Engine.

Mr. Baillon moved reduction of vote by £150 Foreman of Works.

- 17.—Public Works. Reserved for consideration at the adjourned Meeting of Council, when Mr. Baillon believes Mr. J. J. Felton will be able to attend.

- 18.—Savings' Bank. Passed without amendment.

- 19.—Drawbacks and Refunds. Passed without amendment.

- (c) For defining or restricting the limits within which any holder of a sealing licence shall be allowed to take seals.
- (d) For regulating the number of seals to be taken in any year by any holder of a sealing licence.
- (e) For disposing of any skins forfeited under the provisions of this Ordinance by sale or otherwise.

8.—Any owner or master, or other person in charge of any vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, who shall permit such vessel to be employed in killing or capturing seals, or who shall permit or negligently suffer any person belonging to such vessel to be employed in killing or capturing seals within the limits of this Colony without a licence, or contrary to the terms of his licence, or beyond the limits specified in such licence, or during the close season, or in any seal reserve, shall forfeit any seals so killed or captured and any skins found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Three Hundred Pounds for each offence.

9.—The Governor and any person duly authorised in writing by him, may kill or capture for scientific or other special purpose any seal, and in so doing shall be exempt from any penalties and forfeitures provided by this Ordinance.

10.—Every offence under this Ordinance may be prosecuted, and every penalty and forfeiture under this Ordinance may be recovered before the Police Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner, or by action in the Supreme Court of this Colony, together with full costs of suit. Provided that the penalty imposed by the Police Magistrate or two Justices shall not exceed One Hundred Pounds exclusive of costs.

11.—A moiety of any penalty and of the value of any forfeiture recovered under this Ordinance shall be paid to the person who shall prosecute any offender against it, or sue for such penalty, or upon whose information such penalty is imposed. Provided that no one in the employment of the Government shall receive any remuneration under this Section.

12.—For all purposes of and incidental to the trial and punishment of any person accused of any offence under this Ordinance, and the proceedings and matters preliminary and incidental to and consequential on his trial and punishment, and for all purposes of and incidental to the jurisdiction of any Court, or of any Constable or Officer with reference to such offence, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was actually committed or in any place in which the offender may for the time being be found.

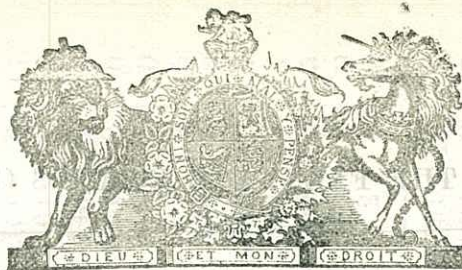
13.—Where the owner or master, or other person in charge of a vessel, is adjudged to pay a penalty for an offence under this Ordinance, the Court may, in addition to any other power they may have for the purpose of compelling payment of such penalty, direct the same to be levied by distress or arrestment and sale of the said vessel and the tackle thereof.

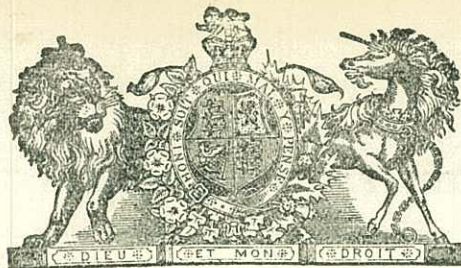

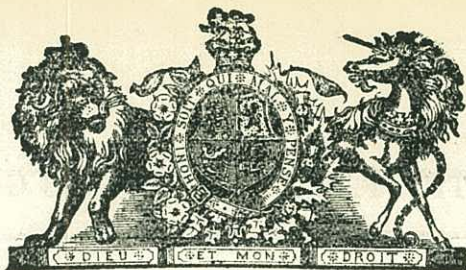

An Ordinance relating to duties of Customs on certain exports.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid, unto Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, for the use of this Colony, upon the several kinds of produce mentioned in the Schedule hereto which shall have been raised in this Colony, and which shall be shipped for parts or places beyond the limits of this Colony the several duties of Customs as the same are respectively inserted, described, and set forth in the said Schedule.

2.—It shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to require and demand from the shipper an account of such produce in such form, and containing such particulars as the Governor may from time to time direct.

3.—The weight or quantity of every shipment of such produce exported shall be declared by the shipper, and any person wilfully making any false or inaccurate declaration shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

4.—Such duties shall be payable by the shipper of such produce to the Collector of Customs at the time of shipment, and no vessel containing any such produce shall receive a clearance until such duties have been paid.

5.—All duties and penalties payable or recoverable under this Ordinance may be sued for and recovered on information in the name of the Collector of Customs before a Magistrate.

6.—When any person is adjudged by such Magistrate or Justices to pay any duty or penalty payable and recoverable under this Ordinance, such Magistrate or Justices shall state in the order or conviction, and also in the commitment of such person, if committed in default of payment, the amount of costs awarded to be paid by such person, as well as the duty or penalty so adjudged,

and shall commit such person until payment of such duty or penalty and costs.

7.—In this Ordinance “Collector of Customs” shall mean not only that Officer or anyone acting in that behalf in Stanley, but any duly appointed Deputy Collector, either in Stanley or elsewhere, or any person acting for him.

8.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the passing thereof, and may be cited for all purposes as “The Export Tariff Ordinance, 1899.”

*An Ordinance relating to duties of Customs
on certain exports.*

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid, unto Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, for the use of this Colony, upon the several kinds of produce mentioned in the Schedule hereto which shall have been raised in this Colony, and which shall be shipped for parts or places beyond the limits of this Colony the several duties of Customs as the same are respectively inserted, described, and set forth in the said Schedule.

2.—It shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to require and demand from the shipper an account of such produce in such form, and containing such particulars as the Governor may from time to time direct.

3.—The weight or quantity of every shipment of such produce exported shall be declared by the shipper, and any person wilfully making any false or inaccurate declaration shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

4.—Such duties shall be payable by the shipper of such produce to the Collector of Customs at the time of shipment, and no vessel containing any such produce shall receive a clearance until such duties have been paid.

5.—All duties and penalties payable or recoverable under this Ordinance may be sued for and recovered on information in the name of the Collector of Customs before a Magistrate.

6.—When any person is adjudged by such Magistrate or Justices to pay any duty or penalty payable and recoverable under this Ordinance, such Magistrate or Justices shall state in the order or conviction, and also in the commitment of such person, if committed in default of payment, the amount of costs awarded to be paid by such person, as well as the duty or penalty so adjudged.

and shall commit such person until payment of such duty or penalty and costs.

7.—In this Ordinance “Collector of Customs” shall mean not only that Officer or anyone acting in that behalf in Stanley, but any duly appointed Deputy Collector, either in Stanley or elsewhere, or any person acting for him.

8.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the passing thereof, and may be cited for all purposes as “The Export Tariff Ordinance, 1899.”

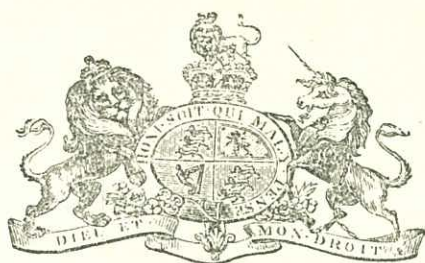
