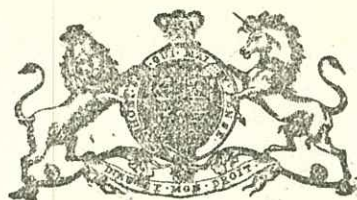

An Ordinance relating to duties of Customs.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance there shall be raised, levied and collected, and paid unto Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, for the use of this Colony, upon goods imported into this Colony, except as hereinafter exempted, the several duties of Customs as the same are respectively inserted, described and set forth in the first Schedule hereto.

Import duties.

2.—The goods enumerated in the second Schedule hereto shall and may be imported free of duty.

Exemptions.

3.—From and after the coming into operation of this Ordinance there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid, unto Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, for the use of this Colony, upon the several kinds of produce mentioned in the third Schedule hereto which shall have been raised in this Colony, and which shall be shipped for places beyond the limits of this Colony the several duties of Customs as the same are respectively inserted, described, and set forth in the said Schedule.

Export duties.

4.—It shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs to require and demand from the shipper an account of such produce exported in such form, and containing such particulars as the Governor may from time to time direct.

Shipper to make Return.

5.—The weight or quantity of every shipment of such produce exported shall be declared by the shipper, and any person wilfully making any false or inaccurate declaration shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds.

Contents of Return.

6.—Export duties shall be payable by the shipper of such produce to the Collector of Customs at the time of shipment, and no vessel containing any such produce shall receive a clearance until such duties have been paid, or adequate security has been given for their payment.

Duties to be paid before ship is cleared.

7.—All duties and penalties payable or recoverable under this Ordinance may be sued for and recovered on information in the name of the Collector of Customs before a Magistrate or two Justices.

Duties unpaid how recoverable.

As to costs and duties
in default.

8.—When any person is adjudged by such Magistrate or Justices to pay any duty or penalty payable and recoverable under this Ordinance, such Magistrate or Justices shall state in the order or conviction, and also in the commitment of such person, if committed in default of payment, the amount of costs awarded to be paid by such person, as well as the duty or penalty so adjudged, and shall commit such person until payment of such duty or penalty and costs.

Collector of Customs
defined.

9.—In this Ordinance "Collector of Customs" shall mean not only that Officer or anyone acting in that behalf in Stanley, but any duly appointed Deputy Collector, either in Stanley or elsewhere, or any person acting for him.

Short title.

10.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on the passing thereof, and may be cited for all purposes as "The Tariff Ordinance, 1900."

SECOND SCHEDULE.

EXEMPTIONS.

The following articles shall be exempted from the payment of duty:—

Perfumed Spirits and Cologne Water, Lemonade, Ginger Ale, Ginger Beer, Soda Water, Potash, and all other Mineral Waters.

Naphtha or Methylic Alcohol in its crude state and not fit for use as a potable spirit or for admixture with a potable spirit.

Tobacco forming an ingredient in sheep wash, or hop powder manufactured in bond in the United Kingdom.

All articles imported or taken out of bond for the use of the Governor of the Colony and for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy.

The Governor, Military and Naval Departments, and Messes purchasing any article whatsoever, duty paid, shall be entitled to have the same refunded out of the Public Treasury on the certificate of the Governor or the Officer in command of any Military or Naval Department, or of any of Her Majesty's Ships of War.

The Consulates in this Colony of any Foreign Countries in which is accorded or in which hereafter may be accorded to British Consular Officers the privilege of exemption from Customs duties in respect of official goods imported into such Foreign Countries by Her Majesty's Government for the use of Her Majesty's Consulates shall have a like privilege granted to them of exemption from any duties that may be levied in this Colony on goods which may be imported by their respective Governments as bonâ fide official supplies for the use of such Consulates.

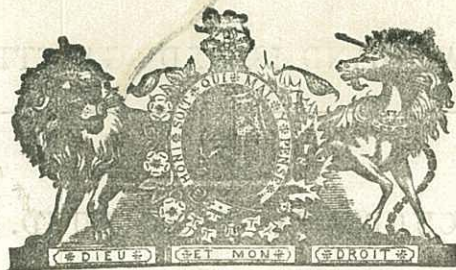

An Ordinance to amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1.—(i) For Sections 5 and 8 of the Licensing Ordinance 1882, shall be substituted the following Sections, namely:—

“A Billiard Table Licence shall authorize the licensee to keep and maintain billiard or bagatelle tables for hire on the premises thereon specified, and to allow such tables to be used between 10 in the morning and 10 at night.”

“The fees which shall be paid for licences shall be as follows:—

For a Publican's Retail Licence for six months,	£10 0 0.
For a Billiard Table Licence for six months,	£2 10 0.
For a Packet Licence	£5 0 0.
For a Wholesale Licence	£20 0 0.”

(ii) In the last line of Section 36 the word “when” shall be substituted for the word “where.”

2.—Any person who shall permit or allow a Billiard or Bagatelle table to be used for hire on any premises for which a Billiard Table Licence has not been obtained, shall be liable to a penalty not Exceeding Twenty Pounds.

3.—This Ordinance may be cited as “The Licensing Ordinance, 1900,” and shall be construed as one with the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

By the QUEEN.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N .

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS a state of war exists between Us and the South African Republic, and also between Us and the Orange Free State :

And whereas it is therefore expedient and necessary to warn all Our subjects of their duties and obligations towards Us, Our Crown and Government :

Now, therefore, We do hereby warn all Our subjects not to enlist or engage themselves in the military service of the Government of either of the said Republics, or in any way to aid, abet, or assist either of the said Republics in the prosecution of hostilities, and not to carry on any trade with, or supply any goods, wares, or merchandise to either of the said Republics, or to any person resident therein, or to supply any goods, wares, or merchandise to any person for transmission to either of the said Republics, or to any person resident therein, and not to carry any goods, wares, or merchandise destined for either of the said Republics, or for any person resident therein.

And We do hereby further warn all persons that whoever, in contravention of the law, shall commit any of the aforesaid acts, will be liable to such penalty as the law provides.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor*, this twenty-seventh day of *December*, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, in the sixty-third year of Our reign.

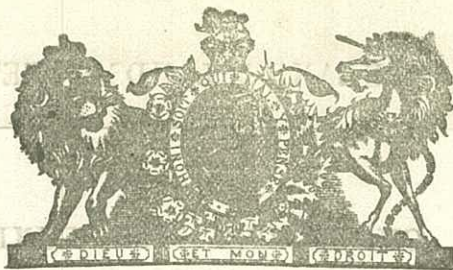

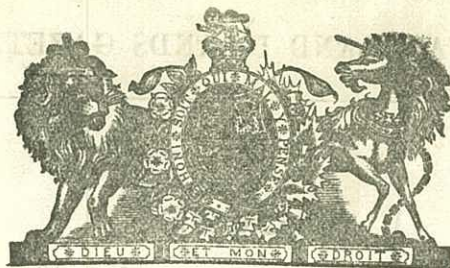

NOW, THEREFORE, I do hereby proclaim, declare and make known in terms of the said Order in Council, that the Supreme Court of the Falkland Islands has and may exercise jurisdiction and power to pronounce and enforce decrees of Judicial Separation, Dissolution of Marriage, and nullity of Marriage, and such other subsidiary jurisdiction as therein provided.

RULES and REGULATIONS

In Divorce and Matrimonial Causes,

THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Made on the 18th day of April, 1900, under Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 28th of November, 1899, instituting a Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes in the Falkland Islands.

1.—“Respondent” shall, in these Rules, include all co-respondents in so far as the term is applicable to them.

2.—Proceedings shall be commenced by depositing with the Registrar a Petition (Form 1) verified before the Chief Justice in Chambers by affidavit deposing to the truth of the facts of which the Petitioner has personal cognizance, and deposing to belief in the truth of the other facts alleged therein. The Registrar will, on obtaining the Chief Justice's approval, enter the facts alleged in such Petition in the Action book, and issue the necessary citations (Form 2).

3.—A citation, together with a copy, certified by the Registrar of every such Petition, shall be served, at the expense of the Petitioner in such manner as the Chief Justice may, in each case, direct, *i. e.*, either personally, or by Registered Letter, or by Advertisement in a Newspaper, upon the respondent and upon every person whom the Petitioner is required by Law to make a co-respondent. Should the name of any alleged adulterer be unknown to the Petitioner at the time of depositing the Petition, and afterwards become known to him, he must amend the Petition by inserting the name, and a copy of the amended Petition must be served as aforesaid.

4.—A Respondent may appear, by an Advocate, or Attorney, or in person, before the Registrar and enter an answer in the Action book or if not resident in the Falkland Islands may file an affidavit replying to a Petition and a copy of every such answer or affidavit shall be served by such respondent on the Petitioner.

5.—Application for leave to intervene in any cause must be made to the Chief Justice by Petition supported by affidavit.

6.—The Chief Justice shall fix a day for the hearing of any cause on being satisfied that the service has been made as directed and that the respondents have had sufficient time to prepare answers, and the day so fixed shall be notified by the Registrar to each of the Resident parties concerned by personal service and to non-Resident parties in such manner as the Chief Justice may order.

7.—Affidavits, in answer to the facts alleged in any Petition, may, with the consent of the Chief Justice, on his being satisfied that the alleged facts are set forth in such a manner as to assist the Jury in arriving at a just conclusion, be accepted at the trial from witnesses absent from the Colony, but the Chief Justice may direct that any such witness be examined by Commission.

8.—Any application for a new trial of issues of fact tried by a Jury, or for a re-hearing of a cause may be made by Petition within 14 days from the day of hearing if the Petitioner be resident, or 120 days if the Petitioner be non-Resident.

9.—Any person wishing to show cause against making absolute a decree nisi for dissolution of a Marriage shall state to the Registrar the facts upon which he relies, or file an affidavit setting forth such facts, and the Registrar shall enter such facts in the Action book, and the Chief Justice may, if he thinks fit, direct any controverted questions of fact so raised to be tried by a special Jury at the time of hearing the application to make absolute any such decree nisi.

10.—All applications, to make absolute a decree nisi for dissolution of a Marriage, must be made to the Court by motion.

NOTE.—A decree nisi can only be made absolute after six months.

11.—All Rules and Regulations of the Supreme Court, which are in force, shall so far as the same are not repugnant to these Rules be applicable to Matrimonial and Divorce causes; and in any matters not provided for, the procedure of the Probate Divorce and Admiralty division of the High Court of Justice in England shall as far as possible be adopted.

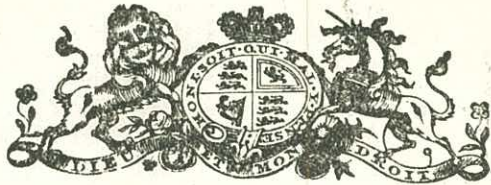

An Ordinance relating to Aliens and to the Naturalization of Foreign Subjects.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—An Alien who has resided in this Colony or who has been in the service of the Crown for a term in either case of not less than three years and who when naturalized intends to reside in this Colony or to serve under the Crown may apply to the Governor in Council for a certificate of naturalization.

Qualifications for naturalization.

2.—The applicant shall support his application (as in the first schedule hereto) by such evidence as the Governor in Council may require, and the Governor in Council, if satisfied with the evidence adduced, shall take the case of the applicant into consideration, and may grant or withhold a certificate of naturalization as he may think most conducive to the public good. The said certificate shall be in the form set forth in the second schedule to this Ordinance, and shall not be issued until it has been registered.

Form of application, evidence as to.

Certificate.

3.—Before a certificate of naturalization is granted the applicant shall take the oath of allegiance before the Governor and subscribe his name thereto in the oath book, and when such certificate is granted to him he shall to all intents and purposes whatsoever be entitled, within the limits of this Colony, to all the privileges and shall be subject to all the obligations of a British-born subject of Her Majesty.

Oath of allegiance to be taken.

4.—There shall be paid into the Treasury in respect of a certificate of naturalization the sum of Three Pounds, and for every certified copy of the same the sum of One Pound.

Fees.

5.—

(a) Whenever any person arrives in this Colony under an engagement to serve any person, firm, company, association, or body of persons, in any capacity, and

(b) Whenever any seaman is discharged from his ship in

Liability imposed in certain cases to repay costs incurred by the Government.

this Colony without the sanction of the and without
 reasonable provision having been made as to his subsistence, or
 (not being a deserter) is wrongfully left behind in this Colony,
 and, within a period of six months from the date of such arrival or
 discharge, or being left behind, such person or seaman, becomes
 chargeable to the Colony, then, in cases within clause (a), the
 person, firm, company, association, or body of persons, with whom
 such engagement was made, and, in cases within clause (b) the
 master of the ship from which such seaman has been so discharged,
 or by whom he has been so left behind, shall, respectively, be liable
 to repay to the Government all costs and charges incurred by the
 Colony on his behalf, including hospital costs and charges and the
 cost of his removal from the Colony.

Shipmasters bring-
 ing destitutes into
 the Colony liable to
 repay costs and
 charges:

6.—The master of any ship, British or Foreign, which brings into the Colony any person (not having been shipwrecked) who, at the time of his landing, is destitute of means of subsistence shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred by the Colony on behalf of such person, unless such master shall satisfy a magistrate that he made due enquiry and that he had reason to believe that such person was possessed of means of subsistence when he arrived in the Colony: Provided that where the person so brought into the Colony came as a stowaway the master shall incur no liability to repay the said cost and charges in case such stowaway is promptly handed over to the Police on the arrival of the ship and no money or compensation in respect of such person's passage is paid or received.

Owner, &c., liable in
 the absence of
 shipmaster.

7.—In the absence of the master of a vessel, or if such master shall depart from the Colony before repaying such costs and charges as are mentioned in the two preceding sections, the owner, agent, and consignee of such vessel at the time the person landed, or in the case of a seaman discharged or left behind, at the time of such discharge, or of his so being left behind, shall be liable to repay such costs and charges to the Government.

Recovery of costs.

8.—Such costs and charges shall be recoverable by suit as if an express agreement to repay them had been entered into with the Colonial Secretary, by the person, firm, company, association, body, master, owner, agent or consignee chargeable.

Aliens must register
 names.

9.—Every alien shall within a week after his landing in this Colony register his name, occupation, country and last residence at the office of the Stipendiary Magistrate.

Rights of Aliens.

10.—Real and personal property of every description may be taken, acquired, held and disposed of by an alien in the same manner in all respects as by a natural-born British subject, and a title to real and personal property of every description may be derived through, from, or in succession to an alien in the same manner in all respects as through, from, or in succession to a natural-born British subject: Provided, that

- (1) This section shall not qualify an alien for any office or for any franchise.
- (2) This section shall not entitle an alien to any right or privilege as a British subject, except such rights and privileges in respect of property as are hereby expressly given him.
- (3) This section shall not affect any estate or interest in real or personal property to which any person has or may

(3)

become entitled either immediately or immediately in possession or expectancy, in pursuance of any disposition made before the 25th day of April, 1870, or in pursuance of any devolution of law on the death of any person dying before the 25th day of April, 1870.

11.—Each of the persons named in the third schedule to this Ordinance shall be, to all intents and purposes whatsoever within the limits of this Colony, deemed and taken to be and to have been from the date specified in the third column to that schedule a natural-born subject of Her Majesty.

At present naturalized.

12.—All Ordinances relating to aliens in force at the time of the coming into operation of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Repeal.

13.—This Ordinance may be cited as the "Alien Ordinance," 1900.

Report of Commodore on Volunteer Force, April, 1900.

Sir,

In accordance with the instructions contained in Article XIII of my Confidential Standing Orders, I have the honour to inform you that I inspected the Falkland Islands Volunteers on March 30th last, and beg to report as follows:—

2.—The force consists of 4 Officers (including the Chaplain and Surgeon) and 82 Non-Commissioned Officers and men, of which latter some 14 are old soldiers. At my inspection however only 23 men were present, the remainder being variously employed in the town and surrounding sheep farms.

3.—The drills I witnessed were fairly well carried out, but with so small a detachment very little could be done.

4.—I was informed by the Commanding Officer (Lieutenant C. W. Hill) that during last season, viz., 1898—99, 41 men passed in Musketry, and this year 36 men have already completed their course.

5.—I inspected the two 9 pounder M.L. guns belonging to the force, and was informed that they had not been used for practice since April, 1899. Although mounted on horse carriages no harness is supplied, and when in use they have been dragged by the men themselves. They are apparently only taken out of the shed once a year, and no regular crews are told off for them.

6.—I do not consider that at present the Falkland Islands Volunteers can be considered an efficient defensive force. The movement generally does not seem to have met with much encouragement from employers of labour, otherwise the numbers might be largely increased, as I understand that in Stanley alone there are some 200 men fit to join.

7.—In any case its utility would be purely local, and I would therefore recommend that instead of Infantry pure and simple, the Corps should take the form of Mounted Infantry (the men are all good riders) and should be armed with the Lee-Metford instead of the Martini-Henry as at present.

8.—Further it would seem desirable that employers of labour and Managers of Stations in the Camp (that is Country) should be induced to take an interest in the scheme. By this means local detachments officered by persons having direct control over the men could be formed on all the principal Stations, where such drills as were necessary could be performed without interrupting the daily work, and in case of emergency they could be quickly concentrated at any given point.

Report by Commodore on Volunteer Force, April 1900.

Memorandum by the Colonial Defence Committee.

THE Colonial Office, at the request of the Admiralty, have referred to the Colonial Defence Committee a Report, dated the 11th April, 1900, from the Commodore, South-East Coast of America, on an inspection of the Falkland Islands Volunteers held on the 30th March, 1900.

2. The Report is not satisfactory. The desire to contribute seriously to the defence of the Empire which has been so strongly manifested in the United Kingdom and in nearly all the Colonies during the last six months has apparently not reached the Falkland Islands, where the Volunteer movement appears hitherto to have met with little success and to receive no encouragement from employers of labour. This may possibly be due to a want of realization by the people in the Falkland Islands of the part that can be played by local troops in the Crown Colonies in the general scheme of Imperial Defence. Though the special conditions of these Colonies will not, as a rule, permit of their sending forces away from them to co-operate with Imperial troops in offensive operations in distant parts of the world, they may render very material service to the Empire by strengthening or establishing the local defence of its outlying parts. In some of these Colonies are Imperial fortresses and coaling-stations, on which the efficiency of Her Majesty's Navy in the surrounding seas must depend. At these, Imperial garrisons are maintained; but the many calls on the British Army compel these garrisons to be kept up at a minimum strength, and it is of great importance that they should be supplemented by trained local troops. While the strategic importance of other Colonies does not justify a dispersion of Imperial troops for their defence, it is necessary both to protect themselves and to assist in the maintenance of the Empire's prestige, that they should be in a position to offer resistance to the hostile demands of an enemy's raiding cruiser; the effectiveness of such resistance must depend on the organization and training in peace of a sufficient local force.

3. The Falkland Islands, where there is at present no Imperial garrison, come into the latter category. Though the population is small, it is, being nearly entirely British, sufficient to provide an effective defence for the East Island against the very limited form of attack to which it is liable. A couple of hundred good shots trained as mounted infantry, or partly as mounted infantry and partly as infantry, should have little difficulty in capturing any party that might be landed from a hostile cruiser, and would thus effectively maintain British prestige, and preserve for the use of the British Navy and mercantile marine an important coaling-station.

4. The Committee have departed from their usual practice in this instance by not marking this memorandum "Secret," and they recommend that the Governor be instructed to give to it such publicity as he thinks fit.

SIR,

We have the honour to transmit for your consideration the enclosed copy of a report of a meeting held in Stanley to consider the recommendations of the Colonial Defence Committee and the report of the Commodore as to the Falkland Islands Volunteers with a view to increasing both the numbers and utility of the force.

As to the importance of maintaining the Force in an efficient condition, it is self-evident and any doubts which may have existed on the subject at one time will have been dispelled by the recent operations in the Transvaal and Orange Free State, where, side by side with the permanent Forces of Her Majesty, have fought Colonial contingents and Volunteers. Loyalty to Queen and country is as strong in these Islands as in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, and that the desire to render efficient assistance in an hour of need is bound up with our loyalty cannot be doubted.

It therefore behoves us to do all in our power to further the Volunteer movement, to demonstrate to the world that we are not behind the other Colonies in our organisation and efficiency, and you will see from the Report of the meeting that the utmost importance is attached to carrying the "Camp" with us in the matter.

The steps proposed to be taken in furtherance of the movement are as follows:—

To afford more facilities for practice in shooting and cheap ammunition, with a liberal free issue,

encourage Volunteers in the camp to practice at their Stations,

hold an Annual Rifle Meeting once a year in Stanley, and offer substantial prizes for which all Camp Volunteers shall be eligible,

encourage Volunteers in the camp to form small detachments of Mounted Infantry,

Any other suggestions calculated to increase the popularity of the Corps will be welcomed and receive most careful consideration, but in the first instance we shall be glad if you will carefully consider the papers now sent and state to what extent the Station can co-operate, giving information as to

How many men will join the force?

How many men would undertake systematic rifle practice if provided with rifles without necessarily joining the force?

How many men would join a Corps of Mounted Infantry?

So much depends in the matter upon the hearty co-operation of the heads of Stations that we trust you will enter into the spirit of the movement and do all in your power to ensure the co-operation of those under you.

Minutes of Committee Meeting, OCTOBER 19th, 1900.

THIS meeting, held in the Court House, was attended by a full Committee, elected at a general meeting held on the 8th inst., to discuss the best means to further the Volunteer movement in the Falkland Islands. The following were present:—

HON. C. W. APPLEYARD, HON. VERE PACKE, HON. W. A. HARDING, HON. DR. S. HAMILTON, The Very Rev. DEAN BRANDON, G. P. HAYES, Esq., W. C. GIRLING, Esq., Lieut. F. DUROSE, 2nd-Lieut. M. CRAIGIE-HALKETT, Sergt.-Instr. DAVIES, Messrs. F. W. STREET, E. HOLT, and H. H. SEDGWICK.

On the proposal of Lt. F. Durose, seconded by Mr. F. W. Street, Mr. Hayes was unanimously voted to the Chair, Mr. Sedgwick acting as Secretary. The Chairman in the course of his remarks explained that the object of the meeting was to come to some decision as to the best course to be adopted to improve in numbers and efficiency the Islands' forces for the purposes of defence. At the general meeting the opinion expressed went to prove that the idea of a mounted infantry detachment in Stanley was impractic-

able, but he thought that that opinion did not apply to the different camps where the scheme was both practicable and of utility and he invited the opinions of the members present.

Sergt.-Instr. Davies said that if the formation of the mounted detachments in the camps proved successful they would be of great value, mounted men with a knowledge of the camps being able to concentrate at a given place at short notice.

Lieut. Durose suggested that the first step that should be taken was to collect information as to what inducement would be held out to men joining in the camp and to what extent the Imperial Government would help to further the scheme. He also touched upon the subject of cost of ammunition for rifle practice and suggested that this be ascertained by the Committee.

The Hon. C. W. Appleyard promised to ask His Excellency the Governor about this and thought that if the ammunition was not free it should be at a low cost.

The Hon. W. A. Harding said he thought that the men in the camp should know first what was required of them, and in his opinion that if rifles were distributed the shooting should come first and the drill be a secondary item. He explained that the Falkland Islands Company camps were the largest and most available for help of this sort and promised his hearty support to the movement in the camps under his control.

The Chairman next asked the Sergt.-Instr. for details as to ammunition expended by the Volunteers and for his opinion as to the quantity now granted being sufficient to enable a Volunteer to become a marksman. The Sergeant explained that 60 rounds were furnished each member to enable him to become efficient, but on being further questioned admitted that members of the Stanley Rifle Club generally used 21 rounds for about 26 consecutive Saturdays, which enabled them in most cases to become good shots.

The Hon. C. W. Appleyard said he was certain that His Excellency would do everything in his power to obtain a sufficient supply of ammunition to enable the members to become marksmen. It was generally agreed after some discussion that the present regulation 60 rounds supplemented by 120 rounds for practice would go further toward the object in view, members of the old Stanley Rifle Club using often over some 500 rounds at their own expense to obtain the same ends.

The Chairman proposed that to improve the shooting an Annual Rifle Meeting should be held in May when members residing in the camp could compete as well as Stanley, and that substantial prizes should be given. Seconded by the Hon. C. W. Appleyard; carried unanimously.

The question of the most serviceable rifle was next entered upon and the Hon. Dr. S. Hamilton gave his opinion on the effective stopping power of the Martini-Henry and the Lee-Metford bullet. It was generally agreed that the choice of the rifle could safely be left in the hands of experts at home. On remarks being made as to encouragement given by employers of labour, Messrs. W. A. Harding, Vere Packe, and G. P. Hayes, the Chairman, all promised the fullest support that lay in their power.

The question of uniforms for camp members was also entered upon and some ideas were given as to a uniform corresponding with other of our Colonies as suitable to the climate here. Suggestions were also made as to an improvement in the present Volunteer uniform and to the necessity for overcoats, gloves and leggings.

The Chairman said he thought that some encouragement might be given to the movement by holding Athletic Sports annually and was informed by the Sergt.-Instr. that they had previously been held by the Colonists, but from lack of interest had been allowed to drop out since 1895.

The Hon. W. A. Harding said there was still about £10 in the Savings Bank belonging to a Sports Committee which might come in later on when sports were started again.

Mr. F. W. Street said he thought that Smoking Concerts and entertainments of that sort, on the lines they were carried out at home, would be beneficial in bringing the members together and uniting them and maintaining their interest in the corps.

The question of the Gymnasium for Volunteers and Drill Hall also was entered upon but necessarily from lack of time was but slightly discussed.

Mr. W. C. Girling asked whether steps were not now being taken to increase the numbers of Volunteers in Stanley and the Hon. C. W. Appleyard suggested that more facilities should be given to those desirous of joining and a notice issued stating the hours at which such persons could be sworn in.

It was unanimously agreed that a circular be sent embodying these minutes to the several camp managers asking their assistance to further the movement generally so that the Falkland Islands shall not rank as the only Colony that has not responded to the Imperial scheme of defence.

The Hon. C. W. Appleyard, G. P. Hayes, Esq., and H. H. Sedgwick were elected to forward an appeal to the camps generally to effect this purpose, another meeting being necessary after answers were received from camps.

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the Colony under your Government, a copy of a Convention between the United Kingdom and the United States of America relative to the disposal of Real and Personal Property, signed at Washington on the 2nd March, 1899, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Washington on the 28th July, 1900.

It will be observed from Article IV. of the Convention that, if it is desired that the stipulations of the Convention should be made applicable to any of the Colonies or Foreign possessions of Her Majesty, notice to that effect must be given on behalf of any such Colony or Foreign Possession by Her Majesty's Representative at Washington to the United States Secretary of State within one year from the date of the exchange of the ratifications.

I shall therefore be glad to be informed, as soon as possible, whether the Colony under your Government wishes to adhere to the Convention.

CONVENTION BETWEEN THE UNITED KINGDOM AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA RELATIVE TO THE DISPOSAL OF REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY.

Signed at Washington, March 2nd, 1899.

[Ratifications exchanged at Washington, July 28th, 1900.]

HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the United States of America, desiring to improve the condition of the subjects and citizens of each of the respective countries in relation to the tenure and disposition of real and personal property situated, or being within, the territories of the other, as well as to authorise the representation of deceased persons by the Consuls of their respective nations in the settlement of estates, have resolved to conclude a Convention for those purposes, and have named as their Plenipotentiaries:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Sir Julian Pauncefoot, Knight Grand Cross of the Orders of the Bath and of St. Michael and St. George, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Great Britain;

And the President of the United States of America, the Honourable John Hay, Secretary of State of the United States of America;

Who, having exchanged their said full powers, found in due and proper form, have agreed to and signed the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

Where, on the death of any person holding real property (or property not personal),

within the territories of one of the Contracting Parties, such real property would, by the laws of the land, pass to a subject or citizen of the other, were he not disqualified by the laws of the country where such real property is situated, such subject or citizen shall be allowed a term of three years in which to sell the same, this term to be reasonably prolonged if circumstances render it necessary, and to withdraw the proceeds thereof without restraint or interference, and exempt from any succession, probate, or administrative duties or charges other than those which may be imposed in like cases upon the subject or citizens of the country from which such proceeds may be drawn.

ARTICLE II.

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall have full power to dispose of their personal property within the territories of the other by testament, donation or otherwise; and their heirs, legatees, and donees, being subjects or citizens of the other Contracting Party, whether resident or non-resident, shall succeed to their said personal property, and may take possession thereof either by themselves, or by others acting for them, and dispose of the same at their pleasure, paying such duties only as the citizens or subjects of the country where the property lies shall be liable to pay in like cases.

ARTICLE III.

In case of the death of any subject of Her Britannic Majesty in the United States, or of any citizen of the United States of America in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, without having, in the country of his decease, any known heirs or testamentary executors by him appointed, the competent local authorities shall at once inform the nearest Consular officer of the nation to which the deceased person belonged of the circumstance, in order that the necessary information may be immediately forwarded to persons interested.

The said Consular Officer shall have the right to appear personally or by delegate, in all proceedings on behalf of the absent heirs or creditors until they are otherwise represented.

ARTICLE IV.

The stipulations of the present Convention shall not be applicable to any of the Colonies or foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty unless notice to that effect shall have been given, on behalf of any such Colony or foreign possession, by Her Britannic Majesty's Representative at Washington to the United States' Secretary of State within one year from the date of the exchange of the ratifications of the present Convention.

It is understood that, under the provisions of this Article, Her Majesty can in the same manner give notice of adhesion on behalf of any British Protectorate or sphere of influence, or on behalf of the Island of Cyprus, in virtue of the Convention of the 4th June, 1878, between Great Britain and Turkey.

The provisions of this Convention shall extend and apply to any territory or territories pertaining to or occupied and governed by the United States beyond the seas only upon notice to that effect being given by the Representative of the United States at London, by direction of the Treaty-making power of the United States.

ARTICLE V.

In all that concerns the right of disposing of every kind of property, real or personal, subjects or citizens of each of the High Contracting Parties shall, in the dominions of the other, enjoy the rights which are or may be accorded to the subjects or citizens of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE VI.

The present Convention shall come into effect ten days after the day upon which the ratifications are exchanged, and shall remain in force for ten years after such exchange. In case neither of the High Contracting Parties shall have given notice to the other twelve months before the expiration of the said period of ten years of the intention to terminate the present Convention, it shall remain in force until the expiration of one year from the day on which either of the High Contracting Parties shall have given such notice.

Her Britannic Majesty or the United States shall also have the right separately to terminate the present Convention at any time, on giving twelve months' notice to that effect in regard to any British Colony, foreign possession, or dependency, as specified in Article IV, which may have acceded thereto.

ARTICLE VII.

The present Convention shall be duly ratified by Her Britannic Majesty and by the President of the United States, by and with the approval of the Senate thereof, and the ratifications shall be exchanged in London or in Washington.

In faith whereof we, the respective Plenipotentiaries, have signed this Treaty, and have hereunto affixed our seals.



*An Ordinance to amend the Tariff Ordinance,
1900.*

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1.—The Tariff Ordinance, 1900, shall be amended:

Increase of duties
on Beer, Spirits, &c.

(a) by striking out from the first Schedule thereto the words and figures "Malt liquor, Mum, Spruce, Cider and "Perry, in casks, per gallon, four pence," and substituting therefor the words and figures "Malt liquor, Mum, Spruce, Cider and Perry, in casks, per gallon, six pence."

(b) by striking out from the first Schedule thereto the words and figures "per gallon, ten shillings," and substituting therefor the words and figures "per "gallon, twelve shillings."

Exemptions.

2.—Goods exempt from duty under "The Tariff Ordinance, 1900," as being imported for the use of the Governor of the Colony or Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for any purpose for which such goods may be imported free of duty, and any other goods the property of the Crown, shall, in case of sale thereof, after importation, become liable to and be charged with the same duties payable on the like goods on their importation for other purposes; and if such duties be not paid such goods shall be forfeited, and may be seized and dealt with accordingly.

Computation of
duties.

4.—For the better computation of the duties on any bottled spirits and other beverages liable to duty, six reputed quart bottles, or twelve reputed pint bottles, shall be taken and considered to be one gallon.

Short title.

5.—This Ordinance may be cited as "The Tariff Amendment Ordinance, 1900."

An Ordinance relating to the taking from time to time of a census of the Inhabitants of the Falkland Islands.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Date of taking
Census.

1.—The Governor may at any time appoint a night for the taking of a census of the inhabitants of this Colony, and such night shall be styled the Census night, and not less than 30 days notice shall be given in the Gazette of the night so appointed for the taking of a Census.

Governor to appoint
Supervisor.

2.—The Governor may from time to time appoint any person to supervise the taking of a Census and any Enumerator to assist such Supervisor, provided that every Manager of a Station shall perform all the duties of an Enumerator within the limits of every Station controlled by him.

Schedule.

3.—The Governor in Council may from time to time vary or alter the Schedule hereto attached to be used in the taking of such Census.

Schedules to be
supplied to house-
holders, &c.

4.—Not less than twelve hours before the Census night the Supervisor shall cause to be supplied to every occupier of a house or tenement in Stanley and its vicinity, or any town hereafter declared, and to the Master of any ship then in Stanley Harbour, and to the Manager of every Station one or more of the Schedules, and the Manager of every Station shall cause to be supplied to every occupier of a house or tenement on such Station and to the Master of any ship then lying in any part of the coast of such Station one or more of the Schedules.

Occupiers to fill up
Schedules.

5.—The occupier of every house or tenement and the Master of any ship within the limits of the Colony shall fill up (or cause to be filled up) and sign a return in terms of the Schedule, giving the full particulars as therein required to the best of his knowledge and belief.

6.—An Enumerator shall visit, on the day following the Census night, every house or tenement in a Town, and shall collect

all Schedules left to be filled up, and shall complete or cause to be completed all Schedules which appear to be defective, and correct all Schedules which appear to be erroneous.

Enumerators to collect and correct Schedule.

7.—A Manager shall visit on any day (not more than 15 days after the Census night) every house or tenement on his Station, and every vessel lying off his Station from which a defective Schedule has been received, and shall complete, or cause to be completed, all Schedules which appear to be defective.

Managers of Stations to correct Schedules.

8.—Every Enumerator shall make a solemn declaration that to the best of his knowledge and belief the Schedules sent in by him represent every occupier of a house or tenement within his District or Station as the case may be, and that he does not know of any person within his District or Station whose name is not entered in one of the Schedules sent in by him.

Declaration by Enumerators.

9.—Every Enumerator shall declare to and send in a return showing every house then building, and therefore uninhabited, and also every uninhabited house within his District.

Return of houses uninhabited, &c.

10.—Any occupier of a house, or Master of a ship, who shall wilfully refuse or without lawful excuse neglect to fill up the Schedule to the best of his knowledge and belief, or to sign and deliver the same when required, or who shall wilfully make any false return of any matter specified in the Schedule, or who shall refuse to give any information in reference thereto asked by the Supervisor or an Enumerator, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds.

Penalties.

11.—The Supervisor shall obtain, by such means as shall appear best adapted for the purpose, returns of all houseless persons and of all persons who during the Census night were travelling, or on the sea, or who for any other cause were not abiding in any house on the Census night.

Returns of persons houseless, &c.

12.—This Ordinance may be cited as "The Census Ordinance, 1901."

Short title.
