An Ordinance to provide for the establishment of Municipal Councils.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

I. Creation and Constitution of Council.

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, on a petition of a majority of three-fifths of the householders of any town, by Proclamation, to declare that a Municipal Council, hereinafter called "the Council," constituted in the manner herein laid down and possessed of the powers, rights and duties prescribed by this Ordinance, shall be established in such town.

Creation of Council.

2. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to define by notice in the Gazette the limits within which the Council shall exercise jurisdiction, and from time to time to alter, extend or diminish such limits; and the said limits shall be called the "Municipal limits."

Limit of
Municipality.

3. Whenever a majority of the Electors of any Town present a petition to the Governor praying that the Council of such Town may be abolished, and setting forth in such petition a scheme for securing the discharge of all liabilities incurred by such Council, and for satisfying all vested interests which may have accrued in consequence of the creation of such Council, and the Governor in Council shall be satisfied that such scheme provides ample security for the protection and satisfaction of all equitable claims, rights, titles and interests, it shall be lawful for the Governor by Proclamation to abolish such Council as on and from a date to be therein named, and the affairs of such Town shall thereupon be managed as though a Municipal Council had never existed therein, and all real and personal estate belonging to such Council shall thereupon vest in the Colonial Secretary for the time being, and shall be dealt with by him as directed by the Governor in Council.

Abolition of
Council.

4. The Council shall consist of a Chairman and six Councillors or such greater number of Members as shall from time to time be determined by the Governor in Council and notified in the Gazette and one half of such Members shall be elected as hereinafter provided and the other half of such Members and the Chairman shall be nominated by the Governor and appointed under his hand and the seal of the Colony and such nominated Members shall hold office during the Governor's pleasure.

Constitution of
Council.

Re-election.

5. Upon the 14th day of April, in the second year following an election under this Ordinance every Councillor shall vacate his seat but shall be eligible for re-election or re-nomination if duly qualified.

II. Electors.

Definition of Elector.

6. In this Ordinance, "elector" shall mean any person over twenty-one years of age, not being an undischarged bankrupt, or against whom an order of prohibition is in force under the Licensing Ordinance, or an alien, and not having been convicted of treason, felony or perjury or of any crime that is infamous (unless he shall have obtained a free pardon), who can read and write and who shall for the whole of the preceding twelve months have occupied any real estate within the Municipal limits of the annual value of not less than £10 in respect of which all rates for which he is liable shall have been paid at the time he records his vote.

Preparation of list of Electors.

7. For the purpose of the first election of any Council under this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Colonial Secretary or such other Officer as may be appointed by the Governor to prepare, on or before the 1st day of February in the year next following the creation of a Council as laid down in section 1 hereof, a list of all electors duly qualified under this Ordinance.

Objections to list.

Such list shall be affixed to the Court House and other conspicuous places in the Town and shall be accompanied by a notice that all objections to the said list will be heard at a date to be therein named at the Police Court.

Objections how heard.

8. On the date named in the aforesaid notice the Magistrate, or some other person appointed by the Governor, shall hear all objections that may be made in respect of the said list, and all applications for the insertion of names therein or removal of names therefrom, and shall sign a corrected copy of the list, in which the names shall appear in alphabetical order and with a numeral against each name.

Corrected list.

How posted and published.

9. The corrected list shall thereupon come into force, and shall be posted in conspicuous places within the Municipal limits and be published in the Gazette.

New list.

10. The aforesaid list shall remain in force until a new list shall have been made as hereinafter provided.

Council to prepare list of qualified electors.

11. For the purpose of every election subsequent to the first, it shall be the duty of the Council to prepare a list of all qualified electors. Such list shall be prepared in every year by the last day of February and the procedure with regard to the revision and coming into force of the list shall be the same as that prescribed by this Ordinance with regard to the first or original list.

III. Elections and Councillors.

Election to Council.

12. No person shall be elected or nominated to the Council unless he is an "elector" as defined in section 6

Disqualifications.

13. A person shall be disqualified for being a Member of the Council, if and while he :—

(a) holds any office or place of profit in the gift or disposal of the Council.

(b) has directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with, by or on behalf of the Council.

- (c) Is an Officer in the service of the Government, and has not obtained the consent of the Governor in writing.

14. If any Member of the Council :—

- (a) Becomes bankrupt ; or
- (b) Is absent from any three consecutive meetings, unless upon sick certificate ; or is absent from the Colony for more than 90 days at any one time, without leave of the Council,

When Councillor bankrupt or absent without leave.

he shall *ipso facto* cease to be a Councillor and a notification of any vacancy so caused shall be made to the Colonial Secretary and by him published in the Gazette, but any Councillor thus removed may be re-elected or re-nominated subject to the provisions of section 12.

15. If any Member of the Council refuses to obey the ruling of the chair or to comply with the rules of the Council, the Council may, after affording him full opportunity of defending himself, by resolution expel such Member and declare his seat vacant, and his seat shall thereupon become vacant accordingly

When Member refuses to obey rules.

16. Any ten electors may nominate any elector a candidate for the Council by signing and forwarding not later than the 14th day of April to the Colonial Secretary or Returning Officer a paper in the following words :—

Nomination of Elector.

“ We, the undersigned, hereby request you to enter the name of _____ on the ballot paper for the next Municipal election,”

“ I accept this nomination _____
(*Signature of candidate.*)

17. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the election of Councillors shall take place in such manner and at such time and subject to such regulations as to the recording and counting of votes and otherwise as may be prescribed by the Governor in Council.

Manner of election.

18. Every election shall take place under the presidency of a Returning Officer, to be named by the Governor, and the votes shall be given by ballot.

Vote by ballot.

19. The ballot of every elector shall consist of a paper called a “ ballot paper ” on which shall be entered the names of all candidates duly nominated.

Ballot paper.

At the time of voting, a ballot paper bearing a number corresponding with the number opposite his name on the list of electors shall be handed to the elector who, having placed against the names of the candidates the number of votes he desires to record in favour of each, shall place it in a ballot box in the presence of the Returning Officer.

Manner of ballot.

20. Every elector may give one vote and no more in respect of each vacant seat on the Council, but he may give all his votes to one candidate or some to one and some to another.

Manner of voting.

21. At the close of the election the Returning Officer shall count the votes recorded and declare the result, and give to each Councillor a certificate of election, setting forth the number of votes he has received.

Result of election how declared.

When equality of candidates exists.

22. When an equality is found to exist between any candidates at any election, and the addition of one vote would entitle any of such candidates to be declared elected, the Returning Officer may give such additional vote.

Completion of Election.

23. The election shall be completed by the 30th day of April.

May show cause why Councillor should not be elected.

24. Within seven days after any election, any person may by petition to the Supreme Court show cause why any Councillor should be declared not duly elected and any other person declared duly elected, and the Chief Justice, having heard the complaint, may make such order as justice requires, and direct the Returning Officer to issue his certificate to the person duly elected.

Casual vacancy.

25. Any casual vacancy in the office of Councillor may be filled, in the case of a nominated Member, by a person nominated by the Governor in Council and appointed under the hand of the Governor and seal of the Colony, and, in the case of an elected Member, by a person selected by the elected Members of the Council who shall give to the person so selected a certificate of appointment, which certificate shall be dealt with as prescribed in the case of a certificate given under section 21: provided that any person so nominated or selected shall vacate his seat on the 14th day of April next following the date of his appointment.

Certificate of Election to be produced.

26. After each election every Councillor whether nominated by the Governor or elected or declared elected on petition as hereinbefore provided shall attend in the Supreme Court at such time or times (not less than seven days after the election) as may be appointed for the purpose by the Chief Justice and the elected Councillors shall then produce for the information of the Chief Justice the certificates of election furnished to them under section 21 or section 24 of this Ordinance, and the Chief Justice shall administer to each Councillor an oath in the following terms:—

Oath of Councillor,

I _____ do sincerely promise and swear that I will faithfully and diligently execute to the utmost of my abilities the duties of a Municipal Councillor within the Municipality of _____.

Chief Justice to countersign certificates.

And after the elected Councillors have taken the oath the Chief Justice shall countersign their certificates, and the certificates so countersigned shall be their warrants of admission to the Council.

Colonial Secretary to fix day for first Council.

27. The Colonial Secretary shall fix a day and hour for the first meeting of the Council after each election; and such day shall be not less than seven days nor more than sixteen days after the election; and the Colonial Secretary shall publish a notice of the day and hour so fixed in the Gazette not less than three days before the day fixed for the meeting, and shall cause due notice to be given to each elected Councillor of the appointed time and the place of the meeting, and such notice shall set forth the terms of section 28 of this Ordinance, and shall specify any other business to be dealt with at the meeting.

IV. Councils and Officers.

Councillors' names to be entered on Minute Book.

28. At the first meeting of the Council after each election, the names of the Councillors duly elected shall be entered in the Minute Book, and opposite each name shall be noted the number of votes received by each as shown in the Returning Officer's Certificates issued, as prescribed in sections 21 and 24.

Appointment of Vice-Chairman.

The Council shall then appoint one of their number to be Vice-Chairman.

Chairman to preside.

29. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Council and shall have such other functions and powers as may be from time to time assigned to him by the Council.

He shall have an original vote and, in case of an equality of votes, a second vote. Chairman's votes.

30. (1) The Council shall meet once in every month and at at such other times as may be fixed by the rules, or when convened by the Chairman. Meetings of Council.

(2) If three Councillors present to the Chairman a written request to convene a meeting for considering some particular matter, the Chairman shall convene a meeting without delay, and if he refuses or neglects to convene a meeting within seven days any three Councillors may convene a meeting. Special Meeting.

31. (1) Any three Councillors shall be a quorum for the transaction of business. Procedure in Council.

(2) Every question shall be decided by a majority of the Members present.

(3) No act or proceeding of the Council shall be questioned on account of any seat being vacant.

(4) A Councillor shall not discuss or vote in respect of any matter in which he has directly or indirectly any pecuniary interest.

32. The Vice-Chairman shall preside whenever the Chairman is unable to attend, and in case of the absence, through illness or other cause, of both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman the Councillors may appoint one of their number to fill the office temporarily. Procedure in absence of Chairman.

33. The Chairman shall, during the term and by virtue of his office, be a Justice, but, before acting as such, he shall, if he has not already done so, take the oaths required to be taken by a Justice, and such Chairman, in his capacity as Justice, shall be subject to the same restrictions, disqualifications and powers of removal as any other Justice. Chairman to be Justice of the Peace ex-officio.

34. The Council may appoint a Secretary and Treasurer—not being one of their own number—who shall act as Clerk of the Council, and such other Officers as they may think necessary for the performance of the duties of the Council, and every Officer so appointed shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council and shall be paid such remuneration as the Council may assign to him and the Governor approve: and the Council shall take from any Officer who receives or pays any money on behalf of the Council such security as may be fixed by the Council and approved by the Governor. Appointment of Secretary and Treasurer.

35. The Council shall record in a book to be kept for that purpose minutes of their proceedings, and no business shall be entered upon until the minutes of the last preceding meeting shall be read over and confirmed or amended, as the case may require. Record of proceedings.

36. (1) A copy of any minute of the Council or of one of its Committee signed and certified by the Chairman thereof may be received in evidence, without further proof, for any purpose whatsoever. Minutes of Council how certified.

(2) Until the contrary is proved, every Meeting of the Council or of one of its Committee in respect of which a minute has been duly confirmed shall be deemed to have been legally convened and held, and the Members thereat to have been duly qualified and to have had power to deal with the matter referred to in such minute. When Meeting of Council deemed legally convened.

V. Vesting and disposal of Property.

Municipal Fund.

37. The annual revenues arising within the town of Stanley from the Dog Tax, the Publicans' Licenses, the Tobacco and Billiard Table Licenses under the several Ordinances relating thereto, and from the charge for depasturing on the Common and from an annual sanitary grant from general revenue of not less than One Hundred Pounds, as may be approved by the Governor in Council, shall be vested in the Municipal Council of Stanley whenever duly constituted, and shall be known as the "Municipal Fund" and shall be applied to discharge any lawful expenditure incurred by the Council under this Ordinance; provided that the Government shall retain for its own use five per cent of such revenues in consideration of the expense and labour of collecting them and shall deduct from such revenues the sum of Fifty Pounds annually in liquidation of the balance due on account of the sum advanced in 1897 from the Land Sales Fund for the purchase of a Steam Fire Engine or in liquidation of any loan hereafter made to the Council and in paying interest at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ per annum on so much of any such loans as shall remain due on the first day of January in each year, and provided that the sum to be paid by the Government on account of the revenues hereby allocated to the Municipal Council of Stanley in respect of the year in which the Council comes into existence as also the sanitary grant shall be assessed and determined by the Governor in Council, and paid from the Treasury by Warrant under the hand of the Governor.

Disposal of income.

38. The income of all Municipal property and all fines, fees and other revenues received shall be carried to the account of the Municipal Fund, and the debts of the Municipality, the salary of officers and expenses of the Council shall be paid out of the Municipal Fund.

VI. Rates.

Imposition of Rate.

39. In the event of the aforesaid Municipal Fund being insufficient to meet the authorized lawful expenditure, the Council may, with the consent of the Governor in Council, impose a rate upon all real estate within the Town limits in the manner following:-

Assessment Book.

40. On or before the first Monday in July in every year the Council may cause to be prepared (in an assessment book to be kept for that purpose) a list in alphabetical order of all persons liable to be rated and the amount at which each is assessed.

How rate is estimated.

41. Every rate so made shall be made upon an estimate of the net annual value of the real estate in respect of which the rate is levied, and shall not exceed the sum of Two Shillings and Sixpence in the pound.

Council to publish notice of assessment list.

42. The Council, when the assessment list has been prepared, shall publish a notice that such list has been made and may be inspected at the office of the Council on any day between such hours as are notified, and that all objections to the said list will be heard by the Council at their office on the third Monday in July.

Objections thereto.

On the said date the Council shall hear any objections that may be made, and insert in the said list any person liable to be rated and strike out of the said list any person who shall not be liable to be rated, and correct all errors in the said list and sign the same.

Supreme Court how petitioned for amendment of list.

43. Any person whose name shall be upon any such list duly allowed and signed by the Council may, between the third Monday in July and the end of September, apply by petition to the Supreme Court for the removal or insertion of his own or any other person's name, or for the increase or the reduction of the amount at which he or any other person is assessed, and the Chief Justice may require the attendance of an officer of the Council with the assessment book and summarily hear and deal with any such petition and if he sees fit amend the assessment book, and award costs to be paid in such manner and by and to such parties or persons as he may think just.

44. At any time after the last day of September, the Council may submit the assessment book to the Chief Justice for his signature, and the list when so signed by the Chief Justice shall be the assessment roll upon which the rates shall be levied until a new list shall be signed by the Chief Justice.

Chief Justice to sign Assessment Book.

45. If any person assessed to any rate under this Ordinance fails to pay the same within fourteen days after payment has been lawfully demanded in writing, the Council shall take proceedings in a Court of Summary Jurisdiction to compel the defaulting party to pay the rate.

Failure to pay rate.

46. The Council may remit wholly or in part any rate or tax on the ground of the poverty of the person liable to pay the same, or that the property in respect of which the rate or tax is payable has become deteriorated and that the rate is oppressive.

Remission of rate.

VII. Borrowing Powers.

47. It shall not be lawful for a Municipal Council to borrow any money for any purpose whatsoever except under the authority of an order of the Governor in Council and subject to such terms and conditions as may be prescribed by such order.

Borrowing powers.

VIII. Audit.

48. Within seven days after the 30th day of June and the 31st day of December in every year the accounts of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Council shall be closed and, after being signed by the Chairman, Treasurer and one Councillor, shall be examined and audited by a person to be appointed by the Governor and may at any time be inspected by any householder on payment of a fee of one shilling.

Audit.

49. The Auditor may disallow any item of account contrary to law and surcharge the same on the person making or authorizing the making of the illegal payment.

Auditor may disallow item.

50. Any person aggrieved by such disallowance may appeal to the Supreme Court and, thereupon, the Chief Justice may decide summarily upon the question at issue.

Appeal to Supreme Court.

51. The accounts within fourteen days after the completion of the audit shall be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary and a summary thereof shall be by him published in the Government Gazette.

Accounts to be Gazetted.

IX. Powers and Duties of Council.

52. The Municipal Council may :

- (a) Purchase, or hire, or, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, sell or exchange any land or right thereto and may erect and furnish such buildings as they require.
- (b) Purchase or hire any stone breaker, roller or other machine.
- (c) Purchase any stone, sand, shingle or other material necessary for repairing any road or drain.
- (d) Support or contribute to the support of any recreation ground.
- (e) Support or contribute to the support of a band.

Powers of Council.

(f) Maintain or contribute to the maintenance of a cemetery.

(g) Expend any money upon and perform any lawful act in connection with any work incidental to or required by or in connection with the powers and duties conferred upon them by this Ordinance.

(h) Do such other acts or incur such other expenditure as may be allowed by an order of the Governor in Council published in the Gazette.

Duties of Council.

53. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Council :—

(a) To keep all public roads within the Municipal limits clean and in good repair, and sufficiently drained, lighted and clear of obstructions.

(b) To provide for the removal or satisfactory disposal of all night soil and refuse from every house within the Municipal limits, provided that, in cases where the Council is unable to perform this duty itself, the Council shall remain responsible that it is effectively carried out by the owners of property concerned.

(c) To provide, if so directed by the Governor in Council, a good and sufficient supply of water for the use of persons living within the Municipal limits, and to keep cleansed and in good repair all public fountains, drains and aqueducts and to preserve the same from contamination.

(d) To provide for the protection of the Town against fire.

(e) To provide for the maintenance and protection of paupers.

(f) Generally to do such other acts as may be necessary for the conservancy of the Town and the preservation of the public health therein.

Section 1 of Ordinance 5 of 1894 to remain in abeyance.

54. Section 1 of Ordinance 5 of 1894, entitled "An Ordinance for the preservation of Public Health" shall remain in abeyance whenever and for so long as there shall be a Municipal Council lawfully established and constituted in the Town of Stanley, and the Council shall, within the Municipal limits, have the rights and powers of and perform the duties imposed upon the Board of Health for the East Falklands, provided that, whenever the Council discusses or decides upon any matter relating to the preservation of the public health which comes within the purview of the Ordinances and Bye Laws relating to health, the Colonial Surgeon shall be *ex-officio* Chairman to the Council and that no matters relating to health shall be determined in his absence.

Occasions when Colonial Surgeon is Chairman to Council.

X. Rules and Bye Laws.

Council may make and alter rules.

55. (1) The Council may at any Meeting make, alter, revoke and vary rules relating to all or any of the following matters, namely :—

(a) The times of their Meetings.

(b) The mode of convening their Meetings.

- (c) The attendance of Members.
- (d) The form and order of debates.
- (e) The powers and duties of their Officers and servants:
- (f) The general regulation of their own and of their Committees proceedings.

(2) No regulations shall be made, altered or revoked under this section unless special notice was given at the preceding meeting of the intended making, alteration or revocation and a copy of such notice was sent to every Councillor at least three days before the Meeting at which such making, alteration or revocation is to be considered and such rules shall not come into force until approved by the Governor in Council and published.

56. The Council subject to the same conditions as to making, altering, revoking and coming into force as are prescribed in the preceding section may make, alter, revoke or vary Bye Laws in respect of the following matters and may enforce same by pecuniary penalties for any neglect or breach thereof—

Council may make and alter Bye Laws.

- (1) Making, cleaning, or repairing roads, paths or drains.
- (2) Lighting.
- (3) The supply of water for sanitary or domestic purposes, and the rates to be charged therefor.
- (4) The removal of sewage and house refuse.
- (5) The structure and materials to be used in new buildings and in the repair of old buildings for the purpose of securing sanitation, stability, uniformity and protection against fire.
- (6) The closing, pulling down, or prohibiting the use of buildings or parts thereof unfit for human habitation.
- (7) The mode, manner, and place of keeping swine.
- (8) The recovery of costs incurred by the Council in the abatement or removal of nuisances.
- (9) The management and disposal of any real estate acquired by the Council.
- (10) The protection of the Town against fire.
- (11) Such other matters and things as they may be empowered to deal with by an order made by the Governor in Council.

57. The Supreme Court shall have power to make and enforce such orders and grant such remedies as shall seem just in respect of any matter which may arise under this Ordinance and which cannot otherwise be determined hereunder.

Powers of Supreme Court.

58. Any person who shall offend against or neglect to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance or lawful order made thereunder shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds, and every proceeding instituted shall be taken in the name of some duly authorized Officer of the Council.

Penalty clause.

59. Any person who votes in respect of any matter before the Council knowing that he is not a duly elected Councillor or after he has ceased to be lawfully a member of such Council, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds in respect of each time he votes.

Person voting when not a duly elected Councillor.

Improper use of
Municipal Fund.

60. Any person who authorises, sanctions or approves whether by himself or in conjunction with any other person the payment of any sum of money from the Municipal Fund, knowing that he is not lawfully a Councillor shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and shall be liable to imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding three years.

Ordinance 5 of 1897
to remain in abey-
ance.

61. Ordinance No. 5 of 1897, entitled "The Local Rates Ordinance," shall remain in abeyance and no rate shall be assessed thereunder whenever and for so long as a Municipal Council is lawfully established in the Town of Stanley, provided that nothing herein shall operate to prevent the collection and enforcement of the payment of any rate duly assessed thereunder before the constitution of a Municipal Council in Stanley.

Short Title.

62. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Municipal Ordinance, 1904."

Passed the Legislative Council this 28th day of December, 1904.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward to you herewith my report for 1904.

Sheep.—The number of Sheep in the Islands returned in May 1904 amounts to 702,444, consisting of 349,680 males, and 352,764 females, showing an increase of 121,235 as compared with 1903.

The increase is due to the good lambing during the preceding year and the exceptionally good weather throughout the year. There is a marked improvement in many of the flocks.

Wool.—The wool clip in most flocks was about half a pound better than last year, and the prices realized in England were much better than had been experienced for some years.

Lambing.—The lambing in the year has been most satisfactory, the average being about 73%. A higher percentage would have been obtained, but the severe weather in the spring produced a heavy death rate.

The only live stock imported during the year were 10 horses from Patagonia.

No amendments have been made in the Scab Ordinance.

There were still a few cases of lice existing last winter among some of the smaller flocks on the East. I have not seen any this shearing.

The results from the grass seed experiment are fairly satisfactory in places where it has been sown to any extent.

Education Report, 1904.

In Stanley. The Government Senior and Infant Schools, the Roman Catholic and one Private School carried on the work of Education uninterruptedly during the year.

The Annual Examination of the Government and Roman Catholic Schools was held by ALEXANDER MOIR, M.A., in December. The report is in the hands of the Government.

In the Camps. Two Teachers in addition to the three already at work were appointed by the Government, thus making three teaching on West Falkland and five adjacent Islands, and two on the north of East Falkland.

The two additional Teachers were much needed: the Camps are well supplied with Teachers and as far as can be judged, the work has proceeded most satisfactorily.

The Falkland Islands Company have one Schoolmaster—a Master of Arts in Darwin and two Teachers for their Camp—the south of East Falkland. They are also doing good work and fully meet the educational needs in their Camps.

Below is appended the number of children being educated in the Colony. In Stanley several children drift between the Government and Roman Catholic Schools, hence the number returned for Stanley should be reduced by some twelve or fifteen children.

Order of His Excellency the Governor in Council relating to Postal Orders.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by "The Post Office Ordinance, 1898," His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to direct as follows:—

1. On and after the 1st day of March, 1905, British Postal Orders for fixed sums from One Shilling up to Twenty-one Shillings shall be on issue at the Post Office at Stanley for payment in the United Kingdom and similar Orders for amounts from Sixpence to Twenty-one Shillings issued in the United Kingdom shall be cashed on presentation at the Post Office at Stanley.

2. The amounts for which British Postal Orders shall be issued in the Colony and the rates of poundage payable in respect of each Order shall be as follows:—

RULES.

The following Rules approved by the Governor in Council are applicable to the issue and payment of Postal Orders:—

1. British Postal Orders are sold and paid during the hours that the Post Office is open for the transaction of Money Order business.

2. The Postmaster must, before handing a Postal Order to an applicant, insert the name of the person to whom the amount is to be paid, and the person to whom the Order is issued may fill in the name of the Money Order Office at which the amount is to be paid.

Every person to whom a Postal Order is issued should keep a record of the particulars thereof on the counterfoil to facilitate enquiry if the Order should be lost.

The Postmaster General in London cannot undertake to trace any Order with a view to accounting for its loss or miscarriage unless proof can be given that the name of the payee was inserted in the Order before the holder parted with it and unless the number can be furnished.

3. Before payment of a Postal Order can be made the payee named therein must sign the receipt at the foot of the Order and must also fill in the name of the Money Order Office, if that has not already been done.

If the Order has been receipted before presentation, the person presenting it may be required to sign his name on the back of the Order, whether such person be the payee or not.

4. If a Postal Order be crossed, payment will only be made through a Banker, and if the name of the Banker be added, payment will only be made through that Banker.

No Postal Order will be paid, even though presented for payment by a Banker, unless the name of the payee be inserted in the body of the Order.

5. After a Postal Order has once been paid, to whomsoever it is paid, the Postmaster General will not be liable for any further claim.

6. If any erasure or alteration be made, or if the Order be cut, defaced or mutilated, payment may be refused.

7. Payment of a Postal Order may be refused or delayed by the Postmaster.

8. If an Order be not paid within three months from the last day of the month of issue, a commission equal to the amount printed on the Order will be charged to the payee in respect of each further period of three months, or any fraction of three months, which has elapsed.

Postal Orders presented for payment more than six months after the month of issue will not be paid until reference has been made to the Chief Office in London.

to give a preferable lien on wool from season to season, and to make
mortgages of sheep, cattle and horses valid without delivery to the
Mortgagee,” shall, in cases where such agreement or mortgage
shall have been executed out of the Colony, be extended to three
months.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1904.

2. During the year 51 accounts were opened and 70 closed; leaving a total of 356 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £49634 5s. 11d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £139 8s. 5d. standing to the credit of each account, or £24 16s. 2d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,000.

3. Interest amounting to £1,119 14s. 4d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £113 14s. 7d. less than that credited in 1902-3 and the amount of deposits for the year exceeds the withdrawals for the same period by £2,222 19s. 10d. as shown in the Monthly Summary of Savings Bank Transactions transmitted herewith. (Enclosure D.)

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £1633 0s. 5d. and the expenses incurred £1,119 14s. 4d. leaving a profit of £513 6s. 1d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1904.

5. As stated in the 4th paragraph of the last Report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1903, a Summary of the Profit and Loss Account since the establishment of the Savings Bank in April 1888, is enclosed. (Enclosure E.) I have entered the earnings of the Bank separately under different heads, as by the "Financial Records," of the Colony. Dividends have been received on account of a "Surplus Fund," prior to the establishment of the Savings Bank, and as far back as October 1886, when £3000 was invested on account of "Land Sales Account" and £1000 on account of "Surplus Fund." After the establishment of the Savings Bank and during the years from 1891 to 1898, the Investments then standing to the account of a "Surplus Fund" were transferred to the Savings Bank Account, and on the transfer of the following Stock, a profit of £79 4s. 6d. was made and given to General Revenue.

6. The following is an extract from the Treasurer's Report for the year 1891-2:—"Should the business of the Bank increase at the present ratio, it will be necessary before long to appoint a Special Manager for it." A glance at enclosure A will show the increase of the Bank, as will also be seen upon comparing the following figures with enclosures F and C. Face value of Investments held on 30th September, 1892 £20661 13s. 1d. Interests on Investments received 1891-92, £583 6s. 1d. The Bank is still carried on without any expense for management.

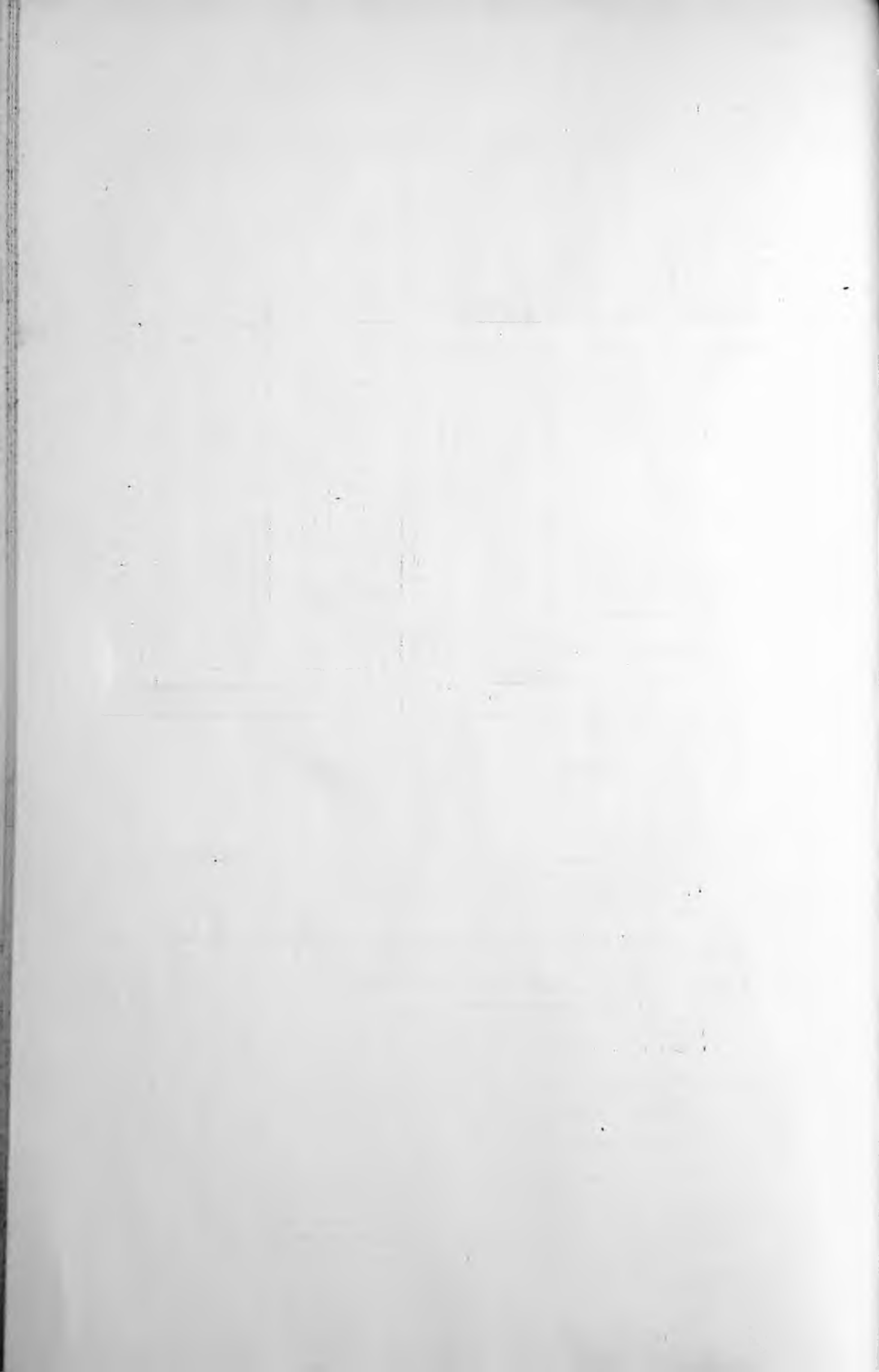

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES, 1904.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 25th March, 1905.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

Although it has not been usual in this Colony for the Officer Administering the Government to prepare a Message to accompany the Estimates the practice is quite common elsewhere and appears to me to carry with it so many advantages, not the least being that it affords the opportunity to lay the financial position of the Colony in as simple a manner as possible before the Public and at the same time assists the Colonists to take a practical interest in matters which directly concern them, that I propose to adopt it in future.

2. I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1904.

3. The revenue for the year exclusive of Land Sales and amounts received under the Stock Ordinance produced £15,689 6s. 1d. being £603 6s. 1d. in excess of the estimate. The expenditure amounted to £14,249 5s. 2d. (£14,334 6s. less £85 0s. 10d. overpayments recovered) being £467 under the estimate. The actual excess of Revenue over expenditure on the year's operations was therefore £1,440 0s. 11d.

4. Although the revenue for 1904 was £1,705 less than the actual revenue for 1903 (£17,393 exclusive of Land Sales and Scab rate) and Customs fell short of the estimate by £1,223, or nearly 23%, the result would have been still less satisfactory had it not been for a somewhat fortunate windfall of £1,000 obtained from the sale of the lease of Bluff Cove. Attached is a comparative statement (A.) of the estimated and actual revenue under the various heads.

5. There was a considerable saving of expenditure as shewn in the comparative statement (B.) attached amounting in the aggregate to £1,418 2s. 1d., but part of this *i.e.* the Mail subsidy for the last quarter of 1904 (£625) will have to be made good to the Pacific Steam Navigation Company in 1905. If this amount be deducted the saving is reduced to £793 2s. 1d.

6. The expenditure in excess of the amount already sanctioned by Council under the Appropriation Ordinance, No. 8 of 1903, and for which you will be asked to pass a Supplementary Appropriation Bill, is £971 1s 7d. The details are as follows:—

Division I.—**Pensions £54 9s. 4d.** A compassionate allowance of £50 was granted to MRS. WILMER the wife of the late CAPTAIN WILMER, Government Pilot; and a small increase was sanctioned to the pension of MR. H. P. MILLETT, late Gaoler.

Division III.—**Colonial Secretary £104 17s. 8d.** A sum of £69 13s. 4d. was due to the COLONIAL SECRETARY for salary undrawn in 1903; and there was a further expenditure on account of the overlapping of the salaries of the late printer MR. GILBERT and the present printer MR. McCONOMY.

Division V.—**Audit £1 16s. 6d.** The audit and other incidental expenses of the accounts of the Commissioners of Currency occasioned this excess

Division VII.—**Legal £21 15s. 3d.** MR. HURST late Stipendary Magistrate, West Falkland, on being transferred to headquarters became entitled to quarters or a house allowance in lieu thereof. Government had no suitable quarters to offer him. A sum of £12 11s. 8d. is the first instalment of certain expenses in connection with the extradition of a British subject in Chile. The total cost to the Colony is likely to exceed £100.

Division VIII.—**Police. £29 15s. 3d.** This sum includes not only the clothing of the Police but that of the Gaoler, Pilot, and Prisoners. A share should have been charged to the Prison and Pilot clothing votes respectively.

Division X.—**Medical £134 15s. 2d.** The exigencies of the service demanded that DR. HAMILTON should draw full pay while acting as Colonial Surgeon after DR. KEAY's retirement and departure in March, 1904, and until DR. BORN's arrival in October last to take up his new appointment. It was impossible to leave Stanley during this period without a Medical Officer. There was an overlapping of the salary of the post of Assistant Colonial Surgeon from 1st September, the date of the arrival of DR. BOLUS in the Colony, until 28th October, when DR. BORN reached Stanley.

Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous £280 5s. 7d.** The principal items of excess were Stationery £116 13s. 3d., Ammunition £104 17s. 5d., and Fire Brigade £69 9s. 3d. Stationery:—Material imported for the Schools was inadvertently charged to this vote. There was an unforeseen expenditure of £17 on account of a Typewriter which in conjunction with certain land forms, Saving Bank stationery, Intestate and other account books as also printing paper are responsible for this excess. Ammunition:—The cost was considerably under-estimated, and there was a charge of £23 12s. 5d. which properly belongs to 1903. A sum of £22 10s was expended locally on the purchase of powder as it was being sold cheap at the Naval Works. Ammunition has hitherto been brought to the Colony without charge in H.M.'s Ships, but there is an item of £9 11s. 6d. for freight in 1904, and this item is likely to be recurrent in the future. Fire Brigade:—Now that the loan is wiped out and a Sinking Fund established the general question will receive further consideration. As the Division Miscellaneous was incorrectly totalled in the 1904 Estimates as £881 instead of £901 provision has now to be made for £20 on this account.

Division XVII.—**Public Works £239 15s. 9d.**

(A.) Roads, bridges, drains, and jetties £116 18s. 4d. It was found necessary somewhat late in the year to place certain of the roads in Stanley in a somewhat better state of repair prior to the peat carting season.

(B.) Repair of buildings and furniture.—This item also includes ‘stores’ *i.e.* all building material for repairs, alterations and small additions, galvanized iron for roofing, cement, lime, paint, stoves, nails, nuts, bolts, screws, &c. &c. The indents for stores imported in 1904 do not appear to have been sufficiently carefully scrutinized beforehand in conjunction with the amount voted by Council.

Division XIX.—**Drawbacks & Refunds £103 11s. 1d.** This excess was mainly owing to the surrender of certain old leases and the issue of fresh leases under the 1903 Ordinance. Refunds became necessary in respect of rents paid in advance under the old leases.

7. The excess of assets over liabilities, or the accumulated surplus to the credit of the Colony, stood on the 31st December, 1904 at £1,486 5s. 5d. This is exclusive of a sum of £27,289 5s. on account of Land Sales which in accordance with the Secretary of State’s instructions has now been omitted from the liability side of the statement and raises the total excess of assets to £28,775 10s. 5d. As you are aware a considerable sum accrues annually to General Revenue in the shape of interest from Land Sales investments.

8. Although the Colony is perfectly sound financially, and we are fortunate in having no Public Debt, the prospects for the future cannot be regarded as altogether encouraging. The closing down of the Naval Works, the discontinuance of Stanley as the headquarters of the Canadian Sealing fleet, and the fact that under the new Admiralty policy the summer visit of several of H.M.’s Ships to this Colony is almost certain to be discontinued, all seem to point to a probable decrease in the European population at an early date—unless some new industry is started—and a proportionate shrinkage of revenue. Under these circumstances I feel bound to emphasize the necessity that exists for the very greatest care and economy.

Swedish Marriage Regulations.

His Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct the publication of the following letter from the Swedish Legation.

Sir,

Certain authorities require a subject of a foreign country who may wish to contract a marriage within their jurisdiction to produce a certificate declaring that he or she is free to contract marriage with the party in question in accordance with the law of his or her native land.

In order therefore to enable Swedish subjects residing abroad to prove their capacity to contract a marriage in accordance with the law of their own country and thereby to ensure its validity in Sweden, a new Swedish law provides that certain diplomatic and consular officers shall be empowered by the King to issue certificates to the effect that the holder is unimpeded by Swedish law to contract marriage with the other person mentioned in the certificate.

His Majesty the King having by decree of November 11th ultimo empowered the chief of this Legation to issue such certificates for Swedish subjects domiciled within certain enumerated parts of the British Empire comprising your consular district, I have the honour to inform you that should a Swedish subject residing within the said district and wishing to contract marriage before any other than a Swedish authority apply to you for a certificate of the said nature, his or her request should be referred to this Legation and should be accompanied by the documents necessary for issuing the certificate, *viz*:— statements of the full names, ages, places of birth, occupations, actual residence and places of residence of both parties within the last year before the date of the application, and also whether there be relationship or connection by a marriage between the parties interested, and if so, in what degree.

In places where an official register is kept an extract of the said register should be furnished; where no such register is kept by the local authorities an attestation made by two trustworthy persons and certified by the Consulate will be accepted as proof of the required statements.

On receipt of the application with the necessary information, the Legation will cause an advertisement to be inserted in a London newspaper and in a local newspaper of the places of residence of the interested parties, and if no legal objection be proven, will deliver the certificate, which will be issued in the Swedish language, and accompanied, if so desired, by a certified translation in English.

It is desirable that the person applying for the certificate should deposit at the Consulate a sum of One Pound (£1) to cover the expenses of the Legation, which will mainly consist in the advertising. Any part of the sum not expended will be refunded.

*Draft of an Ordinance
to amend "The Live Stock Ordinance, 1901."*

WHEREAS it is advisable to amend "The Live Stock Ordinance, 1901," and to make provision for the diminishing of geese, be it enacted by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance the words following shall have or include the meanings hereafter respectively assigned to them (that is to say):—

"Owner" includes a lessee from the Crown, and the Agent or Manager of any absentee owner or lessee.

"Geese" shall mean the variety known as the Upland Goose (*Bernicla or Clæphaga magellanica*).

"Beaks" shall mean the upper beak of the Upland Goose.

"Receiver" shall mean a person appointed by the Governor for the purpose of receiving and destroying the beaks of geese.

2. The Governor may appoint competent persons to act as Receivers for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be thought proper by the Governor in Council. All Inspectors of Stock shall be Receivers ex-officio.

3. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer when so instructed to withdraw such sums from the Seab Fund as may be approved by the Governor in Council for the purpose of paying for beaks at the rate of Ten Shillings for every hundred.

4. Every Receiver shall make out a receipt in duplicate by means of a carbon copy in Form A for the number of beaks received by him and shall after destroying the beaks by fire forward the original to the Colonial Secretary and hand the carbon copy to the person from whom he received them.

5. It shall be the duty of the Colonial Secretary on presentation of the carbon receipt to compare it with the original and when satisfied of its correctness to pass a voucher for the beaks at the rate specified in section 3. Should any receipt presented for payment be tampered with the value of the beaks on such receipt shall be forfeited.

6. The Governor in Council shall determine annually how many goose beaks may be purchased on the East and West Falkland respectively during the then current year and the same shall be notified in the Government Gazette and posted at the office of all Receivers.

7. This Ordinance and the Principal Ordinance shall be read and construed together and may be cited for all purposes as "The Live Stock Ordinance 1901-1905."

8. This Ordinance shall remain in force until the 31st day of December, 1907, unless extended for a further period by Proclamation

Attestation of Documents.

Attention is drawn to the following Colonial Regulations relating to the attestation of documents :—

The attestation of Signatures to Documents can only take place upon a full knowledge or intimate belief in the genuineness of those Signatures, and, as a general rule, the Secretary of State can only undertake to attest those of Governors or Officers administering Government.

Persons, therefore, who may have occasion to instruct their friends or agents in any Colony to send to them certificates, or powers of attorney, or judicial acts, for legal use in this Country should take care to have these documents authenticated in the Colony by the Officer administering the Government.

The same rule must particularly be observed by the Governor in sending home documents which, after being verified in England, are intended to be used in foreign Countries. The last signature attached by way of attestation to any such document must invariably be one which is known and can therefore be certified to in this Department. If possible it should always be that of the Officer administering the Government.

and it is notified that intimation has been received that, save under exceptional circumstances, the Secretary of State will not feel justified in authorising the certification for legalisation of any signatures except those of the Governor or Officer Administering the Government.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch Nos. 34 and 42 of the 10th April and 18th May respectively as to the possibility of growing Sand Binding Grasses with advantage in the Falkland Islands and in reply to transmit to you for your information, copies of letters from the Director of Kew Gardens and the Board of Agriculture on the subject.

2. Both authorities recommend Marram Grass and the Board of Agriculture suggest that a trial should also be given to Sea Lyme Grass. The Board have also been kind enough to furnish particulars as to the price &c. of the seeds of these grasses. I note what you say in paragraph 7 of your despatch No. 42 of the 18th May as to the arrangements you have made for obtaining roots of Marram Grass, but in view of the infrequent communication with Lively Island I thought you might prefer to receive seeds of this grass at once, as well as seeds of Sea Lyme Grass. I am therefore requesting the Crown Agents for the Colonies to purchase and send to you as soon as possible the quantities of both seeds suggested by the Board.

I have the honour to report for the information of His Excellency the Governor that :—

During my last visit to the West Falkland Islands (10) in or about 87 children were examined.

On the whole the answering and work done were quite as good as could be expected. Every child is getting a good grasp of reading, spelling, writing and arithmetic.

I would specially mention the children in Mr. J. Innis Wilson's "beat," they show throughout great progress and interest in their work.

In the camps visited the children seem almost without exception to take much interest in their work, and to be carrying out, under their parents guidance, the various "home lessons" left for them to do, while the Teacher is absent on the rest of his "beat." In one case a girl was bravely working through 150 sums and entering them in her exercise books.

*An Ordinance
to amend "The Live Stock Ordinance, 1901."*

WHEREAS it is advisable to amend "The Live Stock Ordinance, 1901," and to make provision for the diminishing of geese, be it enacted by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance the words following shall have or include the meanings hereafter respectively assigned to them (that is to say):—

"Owner" includes a lessee from the Crown, and the Agent or Manager of any absentee owner or lessee.

"Geese" shall mean the variety known as the Upland Goose (*Bernicla or Cŕephaga magellanica*).

"Beaks" shall mean the upper beak of the Upland Goose.

"Receiver" shall mean a person appointed by the Governor for the purpose of receiving and destroying the beaks of geese.

2. The Governor may appoint competent persons to act as Receivers for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be thought proper by the Governor in Council. All Inspectors of Stock shall be Receivers ex-officio.

3. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer when so instructed to withdraw such sums from the Scab Fund as may be approved by the Governor in Council for the purpose of paying for beaks at the rate of Ten Shillings for every hundred.

4. Every Receiver shall make out a receipt in duplicate by means of a carbon copy in Form A for the number of beaks received by him and shall after destroying the beaks by fire forward the original to the Colonial Secretary and hand the carbon copy to the person from whom he received them.

5. It shall be the duty of the Colonial Secretary on presentation of the carbon receipt to compare it with the original and when satisfied of its correctness to pass a voucher for the beaks at the rate specified in section 3. Should any receipt presented for payment be tampered with the value of the beaks on such receipt shall be forfeited.

6. The Governor in Council shall determine annually how many geese beaks may be purchased on the East and West Falkland respectively during the then current year and the same shall be notified in the Government Gazette and posted at the office of all Receivers.

7. This Ordinance and the Principal Ordinance shall be read and construed together and may be cited for all purposes as "The Live Stock Ordinance 1901-1905."

8. This Ordinance shall remain in force until the 31st day of December, 1907, unless extended for a further period by Proclamation

*Draft of an Ordinance
to provide for the rating of Stanley.*

WHEREAS it is advisable to repeal Ordinance No. 5 of 1897, and to make other provision in lieu thereof, be it enacted by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance the word 'house' shall mean and include every erection of whatever nature capable of being utilised for habitation, shelter, trade, work, storage, or for housing horses, cattle, stock, poultry, or any live bird or animal.

2. For all house property in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect thereof for every twenty shillings of its annual value the sum of nine pence or such further sum not exceeding in the aggregate one shilling and three pence as may be sanctioned annually by the Legislative Council; such value to be assessed in open court in the first fortnight in January in every year by the Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley whose decision shall be final. All rates shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer before the 31st day of March in each year.

3. The owners of all house property shall be responsible for the due payment of the rates and should such rates remain unpaid for a period of four weeks after they become due they shall be recoverable by civil process in the Magistrate's Court.

4. No rate whatever shall be levied upon any of the following descriptions of property:—

Property belonging to the Government unless the same be let or hired to a private individual.

Any Church or place of Public Worship.

Any hospital, asylum, or building used exclusively for charitable purposes, or any public school, public library, museum or mechanic's institute.

5. Ordinance No. 5 of 1897, entitled "An Ordinance to raise a sum of money by a rate on house and other property in Stanley, and to provide for the application thereof and of other local rates" shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

6. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905."

Trade Marks.

The Attention of traders in this Colony is called to the importance of registration in the Argentine Republic of marks well known and therefore valuable. According to the Argentine law it appears to be permissible for anyone to register in the Republic a trade mark for one class or for any number of different classes of goods, provided that that mark has not already been registered in that country. The cost of registration including Agents' fees is about £10, and the time necessary to obtain registration about six weeks, and that registration gives protection for ten years.

Particular attention is called to the serious disadvantage which may result from non-registration. A person not necessarily being the real owner of a particular trade mark, but having registered that mark in the Argentine, can lay an embargo on any goods he may find bearing that mark, although such goods may have been made by the original owner of the mark and have been legitimately introduced into the country.

Registration can be affected by an Agent under a Power of Attorney (form can be seen at the office of the Colonial Secretary) which should be certified to by an Argentine Consul.

Report of Annual Examination.

Sir,

I have the honour to report on the examination of the Schools in Stanley, held by me 25th, 26th and 27th September,—the Merit List having already been forwarded.

I would preface my remarks by calling your attention to some important factors, bearing on the school work of last session.

(1.) The session was curtailed to one of nine months, and, as I fully expected, the Arithmetical results suffered somewhat in consequence. In this subject it is impossible to shorten the period of study and produce the same satisfactory results.

(2.) In the Government School there was a re-arrangement of the staff, consequent on the Headmaster's being on furlough; and all the teachers had at least some new work thrown on their hands. This re-arrangement if retained, will in my opinion work very satisfactorily. From experience, I would advocate that an occasional change of work is beneficial to the teacher, who otherwise is apt to fall into a groove.

Beyond this however, as I pointed out in my last Report, more time will be at the disposal of the Headmaster, which will permit of his broadening out in the higher Standards, especially after VI, where a fresh subject would help to retain the interest of the few pupils, who continue at school after passing this Standard.

(3.) The Roman Catholic School laboured, probably under greater disadvantage, the teacher taking charge in the middle of the session.

I was quite satisfied however, that each and all of the teaching staff had worked strenuously to bring their pupils up to a higher degree of efficiency; and the examination reflected great credit on them; handicapped, as they were.

Arithmetic.—The short session told most upon Standard IV, and upwards. It is generally conceded that in this subject Standard IV is a difficult Standard, entering as it were, from the Simple to the Compound Rules,—still, longer practice, and a little more freedom in using the Tables will set this right.

In the higher Standards especially the want of time for revision was obvious, affecting as it did speed, accuracy, and knowledge of method.

I would instance the Vulgar Fraction, which was really very simple, when worked as a whole, as of course it ought to have been. When broken into parts, as one and all did, it assumed such a complicated form, that while some, after considerable labour arrived at a correct solution, the majority got lost in the mazes which they had created.

Many were also uncertain about the Decimal Point

Composition.—The papers were very creditable indeed.

Geography.—In all the Standards this subject had apparently received great attention, and most of the pupils had a good grasp of the work professed.

Grammar.—The Text book was quite “at their finger ends”—the subordinate clauses in the analysis being most puzzling to the majority.

History.—If knowledge of this subject were to be judged, by what the pupils knew of the Ancient Britons, King Alfred, William the Conqueror, and the Battle of Hastings, the pronouncement could not be too favourable, but one is apt to question its value, when an almost complete ignorance is found of the “Dogger Bank incident” and the “Invasion of England.” Only one pupil No.3 showed knowledge of topics, which have been on everyone’s lips.

The Syllabus is in my opinion at fault. In a former report I expressed the opinion, that up to the reign of Queen Elizabeth, a few introductory lectures by the teacher, would almost suffice to put the pupils in possession of all they want to know, “Of old, unhappy, far-off things and battles long ago.”

We are more immediately concerned with the knowledge of the new, and deeds, that have built up our great Empire; of the questions and the problems, which to-day our statesmen, and soldiers, and sailors are trying to answer and solve.

I would specially remark on the usual excellence of the Infant Department.

This report, I consider would be incomplete, without reference to the ability displayed by the pupils, forming VII & ex VII.

No teacher could desire finer educational material. Each had individual merits, and a series of examinations might very easily alter the order of merit.

In conclusion I think these yearly examinations have had great educational value, providing a certain objective to both pupil and teacher.

To the former the necessary practice, from an early stage, in setting down their thoughts in writing has given a certain amount of facility in expression, which might not otherwise have been obtained.

*An Ordinance
to provide for the rating of Stanley.*

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is advisable to repeal Ordinance No. 5 of 1897, and to make other provision in lieu thereof, be it enacted by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Enacting clause.

Interpretation of rateable property.

1. In this Ordinance the word 'house' shall mean and include every erection or structure of whatever nature capable of being utilised for habitation, shelter, trade, work, storage, or for housing horses, cattle, stock, poultry, or any live bird or animal.

Rate on property.

2. For all house property in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect thereof for every twenty shillings of its annual value the sum of nine pence or such further sum not exceeding in the aggregate one shilling and three pence as may be sanctioned annually by the Legislative Council; such value to be assessed in open court in the first fortnight in January in every year by the Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley whose decision shall be final. All rates shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer before the 31st day of March in each year.

Owners responsible for rate.

3. The owners of all house property shall be responsible for the due payment of the rates and should such rates remain unpaid for a period of four weeks after they become due they shall be recoverable by civil process in the Magistrate's Court.

Exemptions.

4. No rate whatever shall be levied upon any of the following descriptions of property:—

Property belonging to the Government unless the same be let or hired to a private individual.

Any Church or place of Public Worship.

Any hospital, asylum, or building used exclusively for charitable purposes, or any public school, public library, museum or mechanic's institute.

Previous Ordinance repealed.

5. Ordinance No. 5 of 1897, entitled "An Ordinance to raise a sum of money by a rate on house and other property in Stanley, and to provide for the application thereof and of other local rates" shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

Short Title.

6. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905."

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 8th September, 1905.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year 1906. They are in a slightly altered form to that in which they have hitherto been presented to you, the items have been numbered, and on the expenditure side an additional column has been inserted showing the actual expenditure for 1904.

REVENUE.

2. The Revenue for 1904 exclusive of Land Sales and Scab Rate amounted to £15,689. The Revenue for the current year has been estimated at £15,170, but it is not now expected to realize quite as much. The Revenue for 1906 has been estimated at £14,728. The decrease in Crown Rents is balanced by the additional interest obtained from Land Sales, and has been occasioned by the purchase of his leases by the Hon. J. J. Felton.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Expenditure for 1904 exclusive of Scab eradication amounted to £14,249, leaving a credit balance of £1,440. The expenditure for the year 1906 is estimated at £14,524, which leaves an estimated surplus of Revenue over Expenditure of £204.

4. *Personal Emoluments.*—The total provision under 'personal' including pensions in the Estimates for 1906 amounts to £6,075 or £168 less than the estimate for the current year. A reference to Appendix 2 will shew the several additions as also the reductions which have been effected.

Division III, item 1.—The salary of the Colonial Secretary has been fixed at £500 without quarters and allowances.

Item 3.—A small addition of £6 has been made to the salary of the Government Printer as his present emolument of £7 per mensem without allowances makes him an underpaid officer.

Item 4.—Provision has likewise been made for an apprentice in the Printing Office. Should anything happen to the Printer there is no one to take his place.

Division VI, item 5.—A small sum of £20 has been inserted on account of buoys and beacons. A very much larger sum than this could be advantageously expended in this direction for the benefit of the mercantile community in this tempestuous region were funds available.

Division VII.—The post of Magistrate for the West Falkland from which source Mr Hurst has been drawing his salary for several years past although resident in Stanley has been done away with, and he has been given the conjoint appointments of Postmaster, Manager of Savings Bank, and Registrar General and draws his salary from division XV. This redistribution of work will I trust bring about a higher standard of efficiency.

Division IX, item 3.—The Matron at the Goal has hitherto been paid £24 from vote for Gaoler. This now appears as a separate item. The provision for Warder has been reduced from £84 to £24 as such extra assistance is seldom required.

Division X, item 7.—Provision has been made for a Sanitary Inspector at £24. The late outbreak of epidemic diseases in the adjacent Republics points to the necessity for greater sanitary precautions than exist at present.

Item 8.—A sum of £50 has been provided for a Trained Nurse and Midwife. This I understand to be a somewhat delicate subject more especially as the two nurses obtained in the past were, from causes which it is unnecessary to allude to here, failures. The only terms upon which I could consent to allow the sum placed upon the Estimates to be appropriated to this purpose would be that the nurse was to be entirely under the control of the Colonial Surgeon, and that the Public guaranteed a not less amount for three years, which I understand they are willing to do. Certain small fees would require to be paid by non-guarantors. I am more than satisfied that the services of a properly qualified nurse and midwife are urgently needed.

Division XIV.—A considerable saving has been effected under the item Fire Brigade as the loan has now been paid off.

Division XVI, item 3.—There is an increase under this item of £84, which raises it from £120 to £204. The previous vote of £120 was little more than sufficient to provide for the services of one carpenter who in conjunction with the Foreman of Works comprised the carpenter staff. The services of two men are altogether inadequate to cope with the very extensive repairs to Government property which are necessary and a third carpenter has been employed for some time past. Although a good deal has been effected much still remains to be done. The preparation of the timber for the new school has already been commenced by the Government carpenters and they will continue to be so employed in conjunction with certain extra hands till its completion, possibly in March next, and other work must meanwhile stand over.

Division XVII.—*Public Works Extraordinary*.—Provision has been made for a Government contribution of £500 towards the cost of a telephone to be jointly owned and erected by the Government and the Falkland Island Company Ltd between Stanley and Darwin. The Public will have the use of the wire at certain hours daily, and at certain rates which will be arranged later. I am sure that this effort to break down the isolation which exists between Stanley and different parts of the Colony will receive from all Colonists the support which it deserves, and I trust that it will merely be the commencement of a more extensive telegraphic system.

An Ordinance to provide for the service of the Year 1906.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st December, 1906, a sum not exceeding Fourteen Thousand, Five Hundred and Twenty-three Pounds, Nineteen Shillings and Eight Pence, which sum is granted, and shall be appropriated for the purposes, and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto, which will come in course of payment during the year 1906.
