## An Ordinance

To amend "The Interpretation and General  
"Law Ordinance, 1900."

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The "Interpretation and General Law Ordinance, 1906," and shall be read as one with "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance, 1900," hereafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

Short title.

2. Section 26 of the Principal Ordinance is repealed, and the following section substituted therefor:—

Amendment of section 26.

"The Governor in Council may, with the approval of the "Secretary of State, from time to time declare any place "within the Colony to be a town and define the extent, "limits, and boundaries of such town, and of its suburbs, "and may, with the like approval, vary or alter the "extent, limits, and boundaries so defined, provided that "in no case shall any portion of the boundary of the "town be more than two miles, or of the suburbs more "than six miles from the centre of the town."

Amendment of section 28.

3. Section 28 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by

- (a) inserting after the word "Cathedral" in the definition of Stanley the words "and the land reserved for naval purposes commonly known as Navy Point, being all that lot or parcel of land situate on the North side of Stanley Harbour, bounded on the North by Port William, on the South by Stanley Harbour, on the East by the Narrows, and extending Westward for a distance of about eighty-one chains, containing one hundred and forty-five acres"
- (b) striking out the words "suburban land" or "suburbs" 'shall mean any land or districts outside Stanley which can be reached without going more than six miles from the Cathedral, or any land or districts outside the limits of any Town hereafter declared, which can be reached without going more than six miles from the centre of such Town, as defined by the Governor by notice published in the Gazette' and by inserting in the place of the words so struck out the words "suburban land" or "suburbs" shall mean (1) the land or districts outside Stanley bounded on the South and East by Port Harriet and the sea, on the West by a line drawn from a point on the Murrel River commonly known as "Furze Bush" to the summit of Mount Harriet and thence along the Eastern boundary of No. 1 section to the head of Port Harriet, and on the North by the Murrel River and Port William, and (2) any land or districts outside the limits of any place hereafter declared to be a Town, and within the limits of its suburbs as defined by the Governor under section 26 of this Ordinance.'
- (c) "Town" shall mean Stanley as defined in this Ordinance, or land within the limits of any place hereafter declared to be a town under section 26 of this Ordinance.

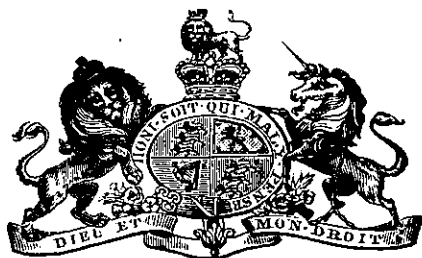

## An Ordinance

To amend "The Land Ordinance, 1903."

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance the term "Principal Ordinance" means "The Land Ordinance, 1903."

2. Section 1 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by

Amendment of section 1.

(a) striking out the words "suburban" means land 'more than two miles and less than six miles from the Cathedral or from the centre of any town' and by inserting in the place of the words so struck out the words "surburban" shall mean "surburban land" or "suburbs" as defined in section 28 of "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance, 1900," as amended "by "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance, 1906""

(b) striking out the words "Town" means land within 'two miles of the Cathedral or the centre of a town' and by inserting in the place of the words so struck out the words "Town" shall mean Stanley or Town as defined in section 28 of "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance, 1900," as amended by "The Interpretation and General Law Ordinance, 1906."

Amendment of section 6.

3. Section 6 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by

- (a) striking out the word "as" in the fourth line
- (b) inserting after the word "purpose" in the sixth line the words "and the Governor in Council is hereby empowered to refuse a lessee of any Crown Lands the right of purchasing the freehold of any land which there is reason to believe may be required for the extension of Stanley or for the establishment of another town."

Amendment of section 7.

4. Section 7 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by striking out the sixth line, and by inserting in the place thereof the words "Port Sussex (situate to the South of Port Sussex) 2224 acres."

Amendment of section 14.

5. Section 14 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by inserting after the word "Crown" in the last line the words "Provided always that, with the approval of the Governor in Council, a lessee may pay the whole of the moneys to be paid in respect of an application to purchase under this section as soon as he has received notice that his application has been registered, or, after the payment of ten per cent of the moneys to be paid in respect of such application, may pay the balance in such annual instalments, less than thirty, as may be approved by the Governor in Council, on terms and conditions corresponding with those provided in this section for the payment of such balance in thirty annual instalments."

Amendment of section 15.

6. Section 15 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by striking out the words "upset price" in the seventh line and by inserting in the place of the words so struck out the word "rent."

Short title.

7. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Land Ordinance, 1906."

Passed the Legislative Council this 28th day of December, 1906.

### FALKLAND ISLANDS.

#### CURRENTS.

Mariners are warned that during and after long continued South-Easterly gales, when a heavy sea is rolling in on the South and South East coasts of the Falkland Islands, there is stated to be a strong set to the North-Westward, to which set has been attributed the loss of several vessels in the neighbourhood of Bull Point. Vessels from Cape Horn, therefore, intending to sight Beauchêne Island, should make due allowance against a possible set of 20 to 30 miles a day to the North-Westward.

#### BURDWOOD BANK.

On the 21st December, 1905, when about 150 miles Eastward of Cape St. John, Staten Island, the German vessel "Preussen" passed several large icebergs on the Burdwood bank in approximately 54° 25' S., 59° 25' W., to the Southward of the Falkland Islands. It would appear not improbable that the periodic collection of icebergs East, and North East, of the Falkland Islands is in progress; and Mariners are warned to keep a good look-out when navigating in this area. They are also requested to send notice of any bergs they may encounter direct to the Hydrographic department, Admiralty. (April.)

#### ICEBERGS.

Mariners are warned that several reports have recently been received of the existence during February, 1906, of a large number of icebergs in the vicinity of the line marked by square symbols on the diagram attached to this Notice.\* The plain line on the diagram indicates the Northern limit of the area within which many ice islands and icebergs were reported during the years 1892-1894. The periodical collection of icebergs in this vicinity is evidently in progress. (June.)

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1906.

2. During the year 46 accounts were opened and 53 closed ; leaving a total of 351 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £52661 4s. 5d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £150 standing to the credit of each account, or £26 6s. 7d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,000.

3. Interest amounting to £1,139 8s. 5d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £41 14s. 2d. less than that credited in 1904-5 and the amount of deposits for the year exceeds the withdrawals for the same period by £2,427 19s. 5d. as shown in the Monthly Summary of Savings Bank Transactions transmitted herewith. (Enclosure D.)

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £1,650 16s. 8d. and the expenses incurred £1,139 8s. 5d. leaving a profit of £511 8s. 3d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1906. (Enclosure C.)

5. The investments on account of the Bank on the 30th September, 1906, amounts to £49,968 12s. 10d. leaving an uninvested balance of £2,742 11s. 7d.

## An Ordinance to make provision for preventing the spread of lice in sheep.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Interpretation.

Ordinance No. 6 of 1901.

## 1. In this Ordinance—

“Principal Ordinance” means the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901.

“Owner,” with reference to the ownership of sheep, includes the manager, overseer or person in charge of such sheep.

“To dip” or “dipped,” with reference to lice in sheep, means to immerse or immersed in some lice-destroying preparation.

“Notice” means a notice in writing, or in print, or partly in writing and partly in print, delivered to the person to be affected thereby, or left at or affixed to the usual or last-known place of abode of such person.

Construction.

## 2. This Ordinance shall be construed as one with the Principal Ordinance.

Annual dipping compulsory

3. Every owner shall, between the first day of March and the thirtieth day of June in every year, dip or cause to be dipped all sheep running on land whereof he is the occupier: Provided that, on the application of any owner, an inspector may grant an extension of the time in which such owner shall dip his sheep, but so that such extension shall not exceed sixty days prior to the thirty-first day of December. For every sheep not so dipped, such owner shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two shillings.

4. (1.) If any Inspector is satisfied that any sheep are affected with lice, he may give the owner thereof notice requiring him to dip such sheep to the satisfaction of the said Inspector or any other Inspector, within a period to be specified in such notice.

Notice to dip sheep affected with lice.

(2.) Every such owner who refuses, neglects, or fails to comply with such notice shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds: Provided that if, in the opinion of any Inspector, the said sheep are fit for slaughter, either for consumption as the food of man or for boiling down, and shall be slaughtered before the expiration of the period specified in the said notice within which the said owner was required to dip such sheep, no penalty shall be incurred under this section.

Penalty for neglect to dip after notice.

(3.) If after the expiration of one month from the date of a conviction under this section, the sheep in respect of which such conviction has been obtained shall not have been dipped to the satisfaction of an Inspector, the owner of such sheep shall, upon conviction, be liable to a further penalty of fifty pounds, and so on for every succeeding period of one week: Provided that if, in the opinion of any Inspector, the said sheep are fit for slaughter, either for consumption as the food of man or for boiling down, and shall be slaughtered within the period of one month from the date of a conviction under this section, no further penalty shall be incurred under this subsection.

5. Every person who by himself, his agent or servant, drives, without the permission of an Inspector, or depastures or suffers to stray, any sheep affected with lice, shall be liable, on conviction, for every day during which such sheep shall be so driven, depastured or suffered to stray, to a penalty not exceeding five pounds and not less than one pound.

Penalty for driving sheep affected with lice.

6. (1.) If any sheep affected with lice shall be found in any pound, or in any yard, or on any land or other place at which sheep are offered for sale, the owner of such sheep shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Penalty on owner of sheep affected with lice found in any pound, &c.

(2.) Any Inspector may order the withdrawal from sale of any sheep affected with lice until such sheep have been dipped to the satisfaction of the said Inspector or any other Inspector, and every owner of such sheep who refuses, neglects, or fails to comply with such order shall be liable to a further penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

7. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Ordinance, or any notice given thereunder, it shall not be necessary to dip any ewe affected with lice during such time previous to or after her lambing as an Inspector may appoint; and for such purpose any Inspector may, in respect of ewes, extend any notice to dip for such time as he shall think fit.

Ewes not to be dipped during lambing time.

8. This Ordinance may be cited as the Live Stock Ordinance, 1907, and may be cited with the Live Stock Ordinance 1901-1905 as the Live Stock Ordinances, 1901 to 1907.

I have the honour to transmit to you a summary, prepared by the General Post Office, London, of the principal results of the deliberations of the Congress of the Universal Postal Union held at Rome in April last.\*

It will be seen that, while the initial postage rate for letters remains 25 centimes or 2½d., the rate for each successive unit or fraction thereof is to be 15 centimes or 1½d., and that the unit of weight itself has been raised from 15 to 20 grammes, one ounce being regarded as the avoirdupois equivalent of 20 grammes. His Majesty's Government are prepared to raise the unit of weight for out-going letters from ½ ounce to 1 ounce on the 1st of October, 1907, when the new Postal Union Convention and the changes introduced by it are to come into operation.

I have agreed to the adoption of this increased minimum weight both for Foreign and Imperial letter postage on behalf of the following Colonies:—

## Annual Report of the Chief Inspector of Stock for the Year 1906.

THE CHIEF INSPECTOR OF STOCK to the COLONIAL SECRETARY.

STANLEY,

9th March, 1907.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith my Annual Report for the year ended the 31st December, 1906.

The season, though variable, has, on the whole, been very favourable for stock and grass.

**Sheep.**—The total number of sheep in the Colony at the end of May, 1906, was 702,696. This shows an increase of 1,802, as compared with the number for the year ended on the 31st May, 1905.

**Wool.**—The clip was good, and realized advanced prices.

**Lambing.**—The results were satisfactory, averaging about 75%.

**Dipping.**—A fair amount of attention was bestowed on the flocks in this respect, and sheep, generally, are very free from parasites. If Farmers only took the trouble to consider the financial gain to be derived by keeping their sheep clean, they would probably be more careful in their mode of dipping. In some cases, mustering is evidently not so close as is necessary to secure the best results.

The Live Stock imported during the year were as follows:—

- 22 Romney Marsh Rams, from England.
- 10   "           "           "           "   New Zealand.
- 2 Devon Bulls, from England.
- 2 Devon Heifers, from England.
- 154 Horses from Patagonia.

Unfortunately, the best Romney Marsh Ram died while being driven to its destination.

Live Stock exported:—

- 250 Rams to Patagonia.

**Geese.**—A decrease is noticeable in some parts, while in others very little diminution is apparent. The number of geese to be purchased for the year for the East and West Falklands, respectively, were:—

East Falklands, 50,000.

West Falklands, 50,000.

The number purchased on the East Falklands was 23,260, West Falklands 21,700.



**Grass Seed.**—During 1906 several Farmers experimented with various grass seeds, but not to any great extent. I am convinced, from personal observation, that cocksfoot grass seed, if sown in the early spring in sheltered places, such as valleys, and in soil other than peat, would grow well, and my experience is that it is one of the best artificial grasses to suit all purposes. If Farmers followed up this sowing systematically, the carrying capacity of their land would be greatly increased and they would be amply repaid.

Owing to a dry summer and high winds, sand has been breaking out in several places, especially in the dry camp, and where there is a tendency to overstock—also in localities where there has been burning at the wrong time of the year. His Excellency the Governor has kindly distributed sand binding grass seeds to check this breaking away.

I am pleased to report that a few of the Farmers on the West Falklands are draining all their swamps and cutting out all their ditches. This will certainly improve the land, and result in a large saving in the death rate among the sheep.

## Medical and Sanitary Report on the Falkland Islands for the Year 1906.

The returns deal with Port Stanley and the West Falkland Islands only, no returns being this year available for Darwin and the North Camp of the East Falklands.

### VITAL STATISTICS.

#### 1. Population.

The estimated population of the Colony for 1906 was 2,065.

There were 56 births.

The birth-rate was 27·11 per 1,000 as against 29·30 per 1,000 in 1905.

The total number of deaths from all causes amounted to 17, as against 11 in 1905, or at the rate of 8·23 per 1,000, being 6 in excess of the number in the preceding year and included 4 of persons aged 60 years and upwards, 2 deaths due to accidental drowning and 2 deaths occurring on board ship. The death rate continues low.

#### 2. Public Health.

There was a slight improvement in the health of the general population during the year 1906. The chief causes of sickness were, as usual, affections of the respiratory system. They were the cause of over 25 per cent of the total sickness during the year. Bronchitis was very prevalent. The outbreak of Measles which occurred during the latter end of the year 1905 terminated in February of the year under review. With the above exception, the Colony remained free from cases of infectious disease. Measles accounted for one death.

The total number of cases treated during the year was as follows:—

An increase of 86 as compared with the previous year.

3,221 Medicines were dispensed, and 1,627 visits paid in the town of Stanley alone, a decrease of 666 and 611 respectively.

The attendances at the Surgery (Port Stanley) numbered 2,040, an increase of 738.

The District Nurse, Miss Ellen Barnes, rendered most valuable services, attending 57 cases and paying 1,159 visits. Miss Barnes's services were also frequently requisitioned at the Surgery. The need of a properly trained Nurse and Midwife for the town has been amply demonstrated.

### Vaccination.

Vaccination is steadily being advanced.

The number of successful cases may be gathered from the following table :—

59 vessels were boarded during the year under review. Of this number, it was necessary to quarantine 3 vessels, owing to cases of infectious disease having occurred on ship board. It demonstrates the necessity of quarantine supervision.

I alluded in my last year's Annual Report to the absence of hospital accommodation for cases of dangerous infectious disease. The district is now equipped with proper provision for dealing with contagious diseases and is provided with a Quarantine Depot and Isolation Ward; most important steps in the direction of safe-guarding the health of the community.

Meteorology.

The total rainfall registered at Port Stanley during the year was 25·660 inches. The number of rainy days was 217. The mean temperature was 42° F. with a maximum of 69° F. and a minimum of 19° F.

Stanley is situated, Latitude 51° 41" South, Longitude 57° 15" West.

### Sanitation.

With regard to Sanitation, owing to lack of funds, no important work was undertaken for the improvement of the sanitation of the Town, but there can be no doubt that the efforts put forward during the year under review in the way of the sanitary inspection of premises and the cleansing of the open drains have been far more general and more complete than heretofore, as evinced by the greatly improved surface cleanliness.

In view of the neglect shown by a section of the population in regard to all matters connected with the dry system of sewage disposal, the Sanitary Inspector was supplied with a printed leaflet setting forth the dangers that insanitary closets may bring in their train and recommending the use of peat coom as a deodorant and absorbent.

The sewerage of the Town is a matter of grave urgency. The system as at present constituted, is a potential centre of disease.

The sooner drainage works are undertaken the better it will be from every point of view, sanitary or financial. The Town of Stanley requires a system of public scavenging and an improved pail system, and, in general, needs strict Sanitary administration.

## SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES, 1906.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

*Read in Council, 22nd March, 1907.*

### MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1906.

2. The revenue for the year, exclusive of Land Sales and amounts received under the Live Stock Ordinance, produced £15,821 15s. 11d., being £1,093 15s. 11d. in excess of the estimate. The increase was derived principally from probate duty, and an unforeseen amount under the head of interest caused by the purchase by lessees of their leaseholds.

3. The Expenditure amounted to £15,692 0s. 9d., being £1,168 1s. 1d. over the estimate. The actual excess of revenue over expenditure on the year's operations was therefore £129 15s. 2d.

4. There were only two items on which the revenue fell short of the estimate *i.e.* Division 1, Customs Duties, (£217), and Division VII, Rents (£30). In the former the falling off was under the sub-heads of wine, malt, and spirits, while in the case of the latter the application by certain lessees to purchase their leases under the Land Ordinance, 1903, led to the anomaly which I explained in my Message of August last.

5. The comparative statements (A) and (B) attached shew the estimated and actual revenue and expenditure under the various heads.

6. The expenditure in excess of the amount already sanctioned by Council under the Appropriation Ordinance No. V of 1905, and for which you will be asked to pass a Supplementary Appropriation Bill, is £1,675 0s. 5d. The details of the principal items are as follows:—

Division IV.—**Treasury and Customs £107 6s.** Of this amount £76 is on account of the new appointment of Customs Officer, while the balance, which is for temporary Customs Officers, is recoverable.

Division VII.—**Legal £17 3s. 6d.** The case of—

REX v SAUREZ and others

occasioned this expenditure.

Division IX.—**Prisons £52 7s. 4d.** The presence of two long sentence prisoners in the gaol was responsible for this over-expenditure.

Division XI.—**Education £114 4s. 1d.** The visit of Mr. H. M. Richards, one of His Majesty's Inspectors of Schools, caused the Education vote to be exceeded by this amount.

Division XIII.—**Transport £118 2s. 7d.** Passages from England had to be provided for Major and Mrs Campbell and family in accordance with agreement.

Division XVII.—**Public Works Recurrent £146 19s. 9d.** The vote for repairs of buildings and furniture was reluctantly reduced by Council from £500 to £400 when the 1906 Estimates were prepared owing to the somewhat discouraging revenue outlook. The overexpenditure includes the purchase of material for a much needed addition to the Public Offices of two commodious rooms one of which will be occupied by the Colonial Secretary and the other by his Clerks; also a hot water boiler and several hundred feet of piping for the old portion of Government House.

**Public Works Extraordinary £717 9s. 8d.** The Cottage in the Government House paddock was purchased, with the approval of the Secretary of State, from the Lords of the Admiralty at a cost of £325, and the balance, plus an unexpended amount under item 2 (Telephone, Stanley to Darwin) went to complete the new Government School.

Division XIX.—**Currency Note Fund £29 0s. 8d.** The fact appears to have been overlooked in the past that under the Order in Council providing for the issue of Government paper currency the income derived from the securities shall be applied, inter alia, in the payment of a sum equal to one per cent of the cost price of the securities to a Depreciation Fund.

Division XX.—**Drawbacks and Refunds £338 8s. 7d.** In certain cases before negotiations were concluded with lessees for the purchase of their leases rents fell due and were paid, and these were subsequently refunded.

7. As it is possible that Members of the Council and Colonists generally would be glad to have some additional details supplied to them with regard to one or two other matters in which they are directly interested, I avail myself of this opportunity to submit the following for their information.

#### PUBLIC WORKS.

8. The *pièce de resistance* was the new school. The carpenters, including our own small staff, worked at it till the end of August, and the fencing and laying out of the grounds engaged the out-door staff in one way or another for several months. The new building offers many educational facilities which were lacking in the old one. A cottage in the Dockyard has been added to, and put in thoroughly good order and is now occupied by the Chief Constable. The cottage in the Government paddock which was purchased from the Admiralty was overhauled, repainted, and placed in a proper state of repair, as also the surrounding fences. The bare damp stone passages at Government House were lined and papered, and several rooms done up. I have referred elsewhere to the new office of the Colonial Secretary. A number of the Government buildings were painted, and small defects attended to. Several peat sheds were erected. As a whole Government property is in better order at present than has been the case for some years past. Small sections of the seawall were repaired and rebuilt but much remains to be done. New fencing was put up for about three quarters of a mile on the west side of the Common, while on the east side new wires were supplied to the fence stretching from the south coast to Stanley Harbour. The metalling of Hebe Street was completed, and the drains throughout the town were regularly cleaned and attended to.

#### EDUCATION.

9. The visit of Mr. H. M. Richards, one of H.M. Inspectors of Schools, in order to inspect the schools in Stanley was an event of more than ordinary importance. In accordance with his recommendations the curriculum in the Government schools has been somewhat modernized and brought more into line with Board School methods.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

10. I regret to say that there was no improvement in interinsular communication during the year, and the unfortunate loss of the 'Fortuna' for a time left only one schooner available to do the whole of the interinsular work. The Manager of the



Falkland Islands Company did his best to relieve the strain and more than once sent out the Company's steam tug 'Samson' with the mails to Fox Bay, but notwithstanding this the fact remains that three times the monthly mail from the West Falkland and adjacent Islands missed the homeward mail, and on several occasions the schooner which took out the inward English mail to Fox Bay did not return direct to headquarters, thus preventing part of the mail and would-be passengers from making the homeward connection without incurring a month's delay in Stanley. An auxiliary schooner is shortly expected from England by the Falkland Islands Company for the interinsular trade, and negotiations are already proceeding between the Government and the Company for the regular carriage of mails and passengers between Stanley and Fox Bay.

#### TELEPHONES.

11. The erection of the Stanley-Darwin telephone has been proceeded with rapidly and two thirds of the total distance has been completed. The principal difficulty met with has been the frequent breaking of the wire by upland geese. These birds fly against it with great force and so far no satisfactory means have been devised to successfully combat this nuisance. In September a small telephone exchange was established in Stanley, and the following stations connected with one another; *i.e.* Government House, the Colonial Secretary's office, the Gaol, the office of the Falkland Islands Company, and the Lighthouse at Cape Pembroke.

#### WHALING AND SEALING.

12. The steam whaler "Admiralen" with her two tenders the 'Hauken' and the 'Ornen' had a successful season's catch around the Colony, and managed to obtain some 125 whales, mostly of the Sei variety. Under the Whaling Ordinance of 1906 whaling licenses are granted on terms and conditions approved by the Governor. As the result of the reduction of the duty from 10/s. to 1/s. on each seal skin imported for transshipment or exportation a certain number of the Nova Scotian sealers have revisited Stanley.

#### PASTORAL.

13. The prices realized during the year by pastoralists for wool, sheep-skins, and tallow have been very high. Patagonia appears to be one of the few countries where the number of sheep is increasing, though Australia is rapidly recovering from the great drought. Statistics seem to indicate that with few exceptions sheep throughout the world are becoming less in number, while the production of wool as a necessary consequence is likewise decreasing. On the other hand with an ever increasing population the demand for wool is likely to be maintained, and the prospects of sheep farmers, as far as I am in a position to judge, are therefore distinctly hopeful.

#### FISCAL.

14. On the eve of my return to England on short leave in order to consult a specialist about my eyes, it may not perhaps be amiss for me to review the Colony's financial position since I assumed the administration of the Government rather more than two and a half years ago. The assets and liabilities during the years 1904-05-06 were as follows:—

During the same period although the revenue has remained more or less stationery with a yearly average of £15,576 the expenditure has been kept under the revenue, and the aggregate savings in this respect have been £1964. The Colony carries no debt, and its financial position may be regarded as a sound and satisfactory one, while a possible extension of the whaling and sealing industries, and the establishment of a peat briquetting factory, to work the Government peat reserves, may be expected to bring in a slightly increased revenue in the course of a few years. Ways and means should however in my opinion be found with as little further delay as possible for the betterment of the sanitation of Stanley, the improvement of the inter-colonial mail and passenger service, and the repair and extension of the public stone jetty which is in a dangerous condition.

### Address.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Owing to the departure from the Colony of His Excellency the Governor, on leave of absence, the temporary administration of the Government devolves on me.

His Excellency, as you have already learnt from his Message to the Legislative Council, on the subject of the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance, goes to Europe for the purpose of consulting an oculist. While regretting the cause which necessitates his taking this extended journey, we can only hope that he will be amply compensated by the benefits to be derived from his visit. Both to His Excellency and Mrs. Allardyce, I am sure, we wish a prosperous voyage and a safe return to us in the best of health and strength.

The public affairs of this Colony have been under the guiding hand of His Excellency for just a little more than two and a half years. I question whether it is going beyond the mark to say that at no previous era in the history of the Falklands has there been greater administrative activity than during that time. ## Convention between the United Kingdom and the United States of America relating to Extradition.

## A BILL

## ENTITLED

## An Ordinance

## To amend the law relating to Quarantine.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. Whenever in this Ordinance or in any Regulation made thereunder any term is used having reference to communication with the shore, such term shall be held to mean not only direct communication with the shore, but also indirect communication therewith through or by means of communication with any ship or in any other way whatever.

Communication with  
the shore.

2. The Colonial Surgeon shall have full power to superintend and enforce the carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance, and the Regulations for the time being in force relating to Quarantine.

Powers of Colonial Surgeon

3. The Colonial Surgeon may, with the approval of the Governor, delegate in writing to some other person or persons all or any such powers as may be vested in him under this Ordinance and the Regulations made thereunder.

Delegation of powers by  
Colonial Surgeon.

4. The Governor may appoint such officers as may be necessary to enforce and carry out the provisions of this Ordinance, and the Regulations made thereunder; and all such officers shall be subject to the direction and control of the Colonial Surgeon.

Appointment of Officers

5. The Governor may, whenever it appears necessary or expedient, provide one or more ships or buildings and cause such ships or buildings to be fitted up as Observation Stations and Isolation Hospitals for the purpose of observation and isolation of the sick.

Observation Stations and  
Isolation Hospitals.

## Quarantine Grounds.

6. The Governor may appoint suitable places for Quarantine Grounds and shall have power from time to time to change such places. Notice of every such appointment shall be published in the Gazette.

## Regulations.

7. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time make Regulations:—

- (a) For preventing the introduction of infectious or contagious diseases into the Colony;
- (b) For the control and management of Observation and Isolation stations;
- (c) For the prevention of illegal communication with or escapes from such stations and from ships not admitted to pratique;
- (d) For the prevention or mitigation of diseases at such stations;
- (e) For supplies to persons placed there at the rates payable for such supplies;
- (f) For the inspection of ships and persons leaving the ports of the Colony for places beyond or within the Colony, and for the prevention of the embarkation of any person suffering from any infectious or contagious disease;
- (g) For the disinfection of any such ships, the crews and all persons, effects and clothes on board or to be embarked on board such ships;
- (h) For the detention of any person found suffering or suspected to be suffering from any infectious or contagious disease and the prohibition of embarkation of any article likely to convey infectious or contagious disease which cannot be disinfected;
- (i) For preventing the spread of infectious or contagious diseases within the Colony;
- (j) And generally such other Regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance.

Such Regulations may further provide for the infliction of a fine not exceeding fifty pounds and imprisonment not exceeding three months for any breach or contravention thereof, and also for the seizure or destruction of any articles shipped or conveyed or attempted to be shipped or conveyed on board such ships in contravention of the said Regulations.

(2) Until the Governor in Council makes Regulations under this section, the Regulations in the First Schedule to this Ordinance shall be in force and shall be deemed for all purposes to be Regulations made by the Governor in Council under this section.

Disease may be declared infectious or contagious, and notification thereof cancelled.

8. Whenever it shall appear to the Governor in Council to be expedient to declare any disease to be an infectious or contagious disease, in addition to the diseases defined as infectious or contagious in any Regulations under this Ordinance, it shall be lawful for him to declare by public notification such disease to be an infectious or contagious disease, and to fix by the same notification the number of days required to be fixed in respect of such disease for the

purpose of any Regulation under this Ordinance, and thereupon for the purposes of this Ordinance and any Regulations made thereunder such disease shall be deemed to be an infectious or contagious disease; and it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by public notification to withdraw and to declare to be no longer in force any such public notification as aforesaid.

9. On the arrival of any ship at any port of the Colony from a place beyond, or from an infected place within, the Colony, no person whatever except the Pilot, Health Officer, Harbour Master or other person authorised by the Health Officer shall leave or go on board or come into actual contact with the ship until she has been admitted to pratique. Any person transgressing this provision shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

Prohibition as to boarding vessels on arrival.

10. If any person without lawful authority or excuse (proof whereof shall lie on him) does or omits to do anything which under the provisions of this Ordinance or of any Regulations made thereunder he ought not to do or omit, or if he obstructs or impedes or assists in obstructing or impeding any Inspector or other Officer appointed under this Ordinance, or any Police Officer in the execution of this Ordinance or of any Regulations made thereunder, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Offences

11. Every offence against this Ordinance or against any Regulations made thereunder may be prosecuted before a Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner.

Offences may be prosecuted in a summary manner.

12. (1) If any person is guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against any Regulations made thereunder for which no penalty is prescribed, he shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

Penalty for offences.

(2) A person convicted of any offence against this Ordinance or against any Regulations made thereunder who is within a period of twelve calendar months convicted for a second or subsequent offence against this Ordinance or any such Regulations, shall be liable at the discretion of the Magistrate to imprisonment for any term not exceeding two calendar months either in addition to or in lieu of a fine.

(3) Nothing in this section contained shall affect the liability of any person to any punishment or penalty to which he is liable at common law or under any enactment other than this Ordinance, but so that a person shall not be punished twice for the same offence.

13. (1) When a person is seen or found committing or is reasonably suspected of being engaged in committing an offence against this Ordinance or against any Regulations made thereunder, any Inspector or other Officer appointed under this Ordinance, or any Police Officer may, without warrant, stop and detain him, and if his name and address are not known may without warrant apprehend him.

Apprehension of offender.

(2) If any person obstructs or impedes an Inspector or other Officer appointed under this Ordinance, or any Police Officer in the execution of this Ordinance or of any Regulations made thereunder, or assists in any such obstructing or impeding, he may be apprehended by such Inspector or other Officer or Police Officer without warrant.

(3) A person apprehended under this section shall be taken with all practicable speed before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

(4) Nothing in this section shall take away or abridge any power or authority that a Police Officer would have had if this section had not been enacted.

No indemnification.

14. No person shall be entitled to claim from the Government or from any of its officers any damages or indemnity on account of any acts lawfully done in accordance with any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or any Regulations made thereunder.

Misconduct of Quarantine Officers.

15. Any officer or person appointed to enforce the performance of Quarantine under this Ordinance who shall desert from duty or who shall infringe or knowingly suffer or permit any person to infringe any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or any Regulations made thereunder, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty of not less than five pounds and not exceeding twenty-five pounds, and to immediate dismissal.

Ship may put to sea instead of going into Quarantine.

16. Notwithstanding anything in this Ordinance contained it shall be lawful for any ship ordered to a Quarantine Ground under the provisions of this Ordinance or any Regulations made thereunder to put to sea again and enter the same port of the Colony instead of going into Quarantine.

Payment of expenses.

17. It shall be lawful for the Governor to direct the payment from the public revenues of the Colony of all expenses incidental to the execution of this Ordinance, and of any Regulations made thereunder.

Ordinance to apply to Men-of-war.

18. His Majesty's ships, and ships of war belonging to other nations are subject to this Ordinance and the Regulations made thereunder in the same way as merchant ships.

Repeal.  
Second Schedule.

19. The Ordinances mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Short title.

20. This Ordinance may be cited as the Quarantine Ordinance, 1907.



## FIRST SCHEDULE.

### The Quarantine Regulations, 1907.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Quarantine Regulations, 1907.
2. In these Regulations—
  - “Health Officer” means the Colonial Surgeon, or the Assistant Colonial Surgeon, and includes any person appointed by the Governor to act or assist in the execution of these Regulations.
  - “Ship” includes vessel, lighter, boat, or other floating craft.
  - “Master” means the master, officer, or other person for the time being in charge of any ship.
  - “Infectious or contagious disease” means cholera, plague, yellow fever, small-pox, and any other disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease.
  - “Place” includes any part of a territory such as an island, a port, a district, a sheep-farming station, a town, a settlement.
  - “Infected place” subject to the provision of Regulation 3 means a place where any infectious or contagious disease exists.
  - “Infected ship” means a ship on board of which a case or cases of infectious or contagious disease is or are present or has or have occurred within a period of seven days previous to the date of the arrival of the ship, except in the case of small-pox, when such period shall be twelve days, and in the case of any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease, when such period shall be the number of days fixed by the Governor in Council.
  - “Suspected ship” means a ship on board of which a case or cases of infectious or contagious disease has or have occurred during the voyage, or during the stay of such ship in the port of departure, but on board of which no fresh case has occurred within a period of seven days previous to the date of arrival of the ship, except in the case of small-pox, when such period shall be twelve days, and in the case of any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease, when such period shall be the number of days fixed by the Governor in Council.
  - “Healthy ship” means a ship which although having come from an infected place has had on board no death nor any case of infectious or contagious disease, either before leaving the port of departure or during the voyage or on arrival.
  - “Observation” means isolation of passengers either in a proper station provided for that purpose or on board ship prior to their obtaining free pratique.

3. A place shall not be regarded as infected because of the existence thereof of imported cases of any infectious or contagious disease or because of the occurrence of a single non-imported case.

4. A place shall cease to be regarded as infected if the Health Officer is satisfied that:

(a) There has been no fresh case of plague or cholera within five days, of yellow fever within six days, of small-pox within twelve days, or of any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease within such number of days as may be fixed by the Governor in Council, of the isolation or of the death or recovery of the last case;

(b) Infected things have been disinfected or destroyed, and that in the case of plague measures have been taken with a view to the destruction of rats in the infected locality, and in the case of yellow fever of mosquitos on and near the infected premises.

5. The provisions contained in these regulations shall be applied in respect not of a whole country but only of the infected place; but this limitation shall apply only if the Health Officer is satisfied that the country in which the infected place is situated takes the measures necessary to prevent the export of rags, clothing and bedding referred to in Regulation 26 from that place unless they shall have been previously disinfected and also takes measures necessary to check the spread of the disease.

6. The Health Officer may board any ship arriving in the waters of this Colony, or arriving at any port of, from any infected place within, the Colony, and inspect every person in the ship.

7. Every infected, suspected or healthy ship shall be inspected as soon as possible after arrival by the Health Officer.

8. The Health Officer may if he think proper call for inspection of the ship's books and papers and he shall use every lawful means which may seem to him expedient for ascertaining the health of the persons on board and the sanitary condition of the ship.

9. The Master of any ship, or any other person, shall answer truly and if required in writing all such questions put to him by and give all such information to the Health Officer or Harbour Master as may be necessary for any purpose of these Regulations. Any Master or other person who refuses or neglects to answer or answers evasively or falsely any such questions or who conceals from the Harbour Master or Health Officer the true state of the health of the crew or passengers or other persons on board of any ship or who refuses or fails to produce such books and papers as the Health Officer may demand shall be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.

10. Every "Infected," "Suspected," and "Healthy" ship arriving in the waters of this Colony, or arriving at any port of, from any place within, the Colony, shall fly the usual Quarantine or yellow Flag.

11. If he be ordered to do so by the Harbour Master or Health Officer, it shall be the duty of the Master or person in charge of any infected or suspected ship to cause such ship to be taken at once to such place as may be pointed out to him as the Quarantine Ground, there to remain until released under the provisions of these Regulations.

12. All ships in Quarantine shall fly by day the usual Quarantine or yellow Flag at the foremast head; by night at the foremast a red light over a green light.

13. All guard boats shall by day fly a similar yellow Flag; by night they shall fly a red light at bow and stern.

14. No person except those authorised by the Health Officer shall communicate with any ship in quarantine, and the persons on board shall not communicate with the shore except with the permission of the Health Officer.

15. Any person found on board any ship which has not been granted pratique without the permission of the Health Officer shall be detained in such manner and for such time as the Health Officer may direct, and shall be liable to a penalty for a breach of these Regulations.

16. Infected ships shall be dealt with as follows:—

- (a) Every person who is suffering from an infectious or contagious disease shall, as soon as possible, if the condition of such person admit of it, be removed from the ship and isolated in some hospital or other suitable building or place appointed by the Governor in Council for the isolation of persons so suffering; and no person so removed shall leave such hospital, building, or place, until the Health Officer shall have certified that such person is free from an infectious or contagious disease.
- (b) If the condition of any person who is suffering from an infectious or contagious disease does not admit of such person being removed from the ship, the ship shall not be admitted to free pratique, and such person shall not be removed from or leave the ship except with the consent in writing of the Health Officer.
- (c) All persons on board other than those suffering from an infectious or contagious disease shall be permitted to land and be kept under observation for periods not to exceed the following:—
  - (i.) Plague, five days.
  - (ii.) Cholera, five days.
  - (iii.) Yellow fever, six days.
  - (iv.) Small-pox, twelve days.
  - (v.) Any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease, such number of days as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

In applying these measures the date of the last case and the condition of the ship shall be taken into account.

- (d) Clothing and articles belonging to the passengers or crew which in the opinion of the Health Officer are infected shall be disinfected or destroyed.
- (e) Those parts of the ship that have been occupied by any person suffering from an infectious or contagious disease shall be disinfected, and also such other parts of the ship which, subject to the necessities of the case of a sick person who cannot be removed from the ship, the Health Officer may regard as infected.

- (f) In the case of plague measures shall be taken either before or after discharge of cargo to secure the destruction of rats on board. This operation shall be commenced as soon as possible and its duration shall not in any case exceed forty-eight hours.
- (g) In the case of yellow fever measures shall be taken to secure the destruction of mosquitos and their larvæ on board.
- (h) In the case of cholera the bilge water after preliminary disinfection shall be pumped out and the drinking water on board may be replaced by a fresh supply of wholesome water.

When such measures as the Health Officer may have deemed necessary in accordance with the provisions of this Regulation have been carried out, the Health Officer may, at his discretion, if not prevented by the provisions of paragraph (b) of this Regulation, admit such ships to free pratique.

17. Passengers arriving by an infected ship shall be entitled to a certificate from the Health Officer indicating the date of their arrival and the measures to which they and their baggage have been subjected.

18. Suspected ships shall be dealt with as follows:—

- (a) The passengers and crew may be subjected to observation on board for periods not to exceed the following:—
  - (i.) Plague, five days.
  - (ii.) Cholera, five days.
  - (iii.) Yellow fever, six days.
  - (iv.) Small-pox, twelve days.
  - (v.) Any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease such number of days as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

The period of observation shall date from the arrival of the ship.

- (b) Paragraphs (d), (e) and (h) of Regulation 16 shall apply to suspected ships, and paragraphs (f) and (g) thereof may be applied. When such measures as the Health Officer may have deemed necessary in accordance with the provisions of this Regulation have been carried out the Health Officer may at his discretion admit such ships to free pratique.

19. Healthy ships may be admitted to free pratique immediately on arrival irrespective of the nature of their bill of health. They may, however, at the discretion of the Health Officer be subjected to the measures specified in paragraphs (d), (f), (g) and (h) of Regulation 16 and the passengers and crew may be subjected to observation which shall not exceed the following periods:—

- (i.) Plague, five days.
- (ii.) Cholera, five days.
- (iii.) Yellow fever, six days.
- (iv.) Small-pox, twelve days.
- (v.) Any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease such number of days as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

The period of observation shall date from the departure of the ship from the infected place. The application of the measures specified in paragraph (d) or (f) of Regulation 16 shall only be resorted to when, in the opinion of the Health Officer, special reasons exist which require them. Where the provisions of paragraph (f) are applied the operation shall not in any case exceed twenty-four hours and shall not interfere with the free circulation of passengers and crew between ship and shore.

20. (1) If in a healthy ship the rats on board are found to be suffering from plague the Health Officer shall visit the ship and measures shall be taken as in paragraphs (d) and (f) of Regulation 16. The parts of the ship that the Health Officer may consider infected shall be disinfected and the passengers and crew may be subjected to observation which shall not exceed a period of five days after arrival unless in exceptional cases when such period may be extended to ten days. If unusual mortality has been observed among the rats on a healthy ship the Health Officer shall visit the ship and a bacteriological examination of the rats shall, when practicable, be made as quickly as possible. If it is thought necessary to resort to measures of rat destruction these shall be carried out as specified in paragraph (f) of Regulation 16.

(2) Until all suspicion of plague is removed the passengers and crew may be subjected to observation during the time specified in this Regulation in respect of ships on board of which rats are found to be suffering from plague.

21. Whenever means for the destruction of rats have been taken and the Master, the Shipowner, or the Shipowner's Agents shall so demand, the Health Officer of the Port shall furnish him with a certificate that such measures have been applied and specifying the reasons why.

22. If in the opinion of the Health Officer of the Port of arrival ships from an infected place have been disinfected effectively they shall not again be subjected to sanitary measures unless a fresh case of infectious or contagious disease has occurred on board since disinfection or unless they have again called at an infected place.

23. A ship shall not be regarded as having called at a place if it has merely disembarked passengers and their baggage or mails without having been in communication with the shore.

24. Where a ship has passengers on board who are in a filthy or otherwise unwholesome condition or is overcrowded with passengers, emigrants, or otherwise, the Health Officer may if in his opinion it is desirable with a view of preventing the introduction of any infectious or contagious disease subject persons on board to observation for such period as he may direct not exceeding the following:—

- (a) Plague, five days; if the person is under observation the period may be extended to ten days.
- (b) Cholera, five days.
- (c) Yellow fever, six days.
- (d) Small-pox, twelve days.
- (e) Any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease, such number of days as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

Where measures of observation are prescribed the Health Officer may exempt from their application any person who, in his opinion, is immune from the infectious or contagious disease on account of which these measures are applied.

25. The Health Officer may, at his discretion, permit any person in a suspected or healthy ship to proceed to any place, and such permission if granted shall be upon the following conditions:—

Before such person is granted such permission—

- (a) He shall satisfy the Health Officer as to his name and intended place of residence.
- (b) He shall agree to present himself for medical supervision during periods not to exceed the following:—
  - (i.) Plague, five days.
  - (ii.) Cholera, five days.
  - (iii.) Yellow fever, six days.
  - (iv.) Small-pox, twelve days.
  - (v.) Any disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease, such number of days as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.
- (c) He shall, if required by the Health Officer, deposit a sum not exceeding two pounds which may be forfeited if he fail to present himself for medical supervision.

The Agreement shall be in accordance with Form I of these Regulations.

- (d) The place of residence must, in the opinion of the Health Officer, be conveniently situated for the medical supervision.

If the Health Officer is not satisfied as herein required or if the person fails to comply with paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) hereof, the Health Officer may detain him under observation or direct him to proceed to a specified place and there remain under medical supervision during the prescribed period. In the latter case the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) hereof may, at the discretion of the Health Officer, be applied to such person.

- (e) In the case of small-pox a person may be required to produce to the Health Officer satisfactory evidence of having been successfully vaccinated or re-vaccinated within ten years immediately preceding or of his being otherwise immune from the disease and that such person may in the absence of such evidence be detained under observation for the prescribed period. But when the ship is a healthy ship this measure shall not apply to passengers who have not embarked or gone ashore at the infected place and it shall not be applied to those passengers who embarked or went ashore at the infected place if the circumstances of their stay there afford reasonable evidence of non-infection.

Any person acting in contravention of any of the provisions of this Regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

26. (1) Merchandise shall be disinfected only when in the opinion of the Health Officer it is infected, except in the case of yellow fever when it shall under no circumstances be liable to disinfection or prohibition. In the case of plague, cholera, and small-pox and any other disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease, clothing and bedding which have been used, rags when imported from an infected place as merchandise may be subjected to disinfection even in the absence of evidence that they are infected or their introduction into the Colony may be prohibited except that in the case of cholera, rags compressed in bales if in the opinion of the Health Officer they are free from infection shall not be subjected to the provisions of this Regulation.

(2) The measures specified in this Regulation are the only measures that shall be applied in respect of merchandise.

27. The entry of live stock into the Colony shall not be prohibited because of the existence of an infectious or contagious disease in the place from whence they have come or on board the ship in which they were conveyed.

28. When merchandise has been subjected to disinfection in pursuance of provisions in these Regulations, the owner or his agent shall be entitled to a certificate from the Health Officer indicating the measures that have been taken.

29. Nothing in these Regulations shall render liable to detention, disinfection or destruction, any article forming part of any mail (other than a parcel mail) conveyed under the authority of the postal administration of any Government, or shall prejudicially affect the delivery in due course of any such mail (other than a parcel mail) to the Post Office.

30. The only measures which parcel mails may be subjected to shall be disinfection or destruction of articles which are, in the opinion of the Health Officer, infected.

31. When any place within the Colony is an infected place:—

(1) No person suffering from an infectious or contagious disease shall leave such place, except with the permission of, and under such arrangements as may be sanctioned by the Health Officer. The Health Officer may permit any person to leave such place if he is satisfied that such person is not suffering from an infectious or contagious disease, and may or may not impose conditions on such permission, at his discretion.

(2) Measures shall be taken:—

(a) To prevent the exportation or carriage overland or coast-wise of merchandise or articles which the Health Officer may consider infected, unless such merchandise or articles shall in the first instance have been disinfected under his supervision on shore.

(b) In the case of plague to destroy rats and prevent them from gaining access to ships.

- (c) In the case of yellow fever to destroy mosquitos and prevent them from gaining access to ships, but when it is impossible to prevent mosquitos from gaining access to ships then to destroy those on board immediately before the departure of the ship.
- (d) In the case of cholera, the Health Officer to see that the drinking water on shore is wholesome, and that the drinking water taken on board ships is wholesome.
- (3) The Health Officer shall give to the Master of any ship coming under this Regulation a certificate stating in detail the measures taken.

**32.** When in the case of a healthy ship from a Port which is an infected place, the Health Officer of the Port of arrival is satisfied that the measures specified in Regulation 22 have been efficiently carried out at such infected place, such ship shall be exempted from the measures specified in Regulation 19: Provided always that if the period specified in that Regulation and dating from the departure of the ship from the infected place shall not have been completed, the passengers and crew may be subjected to observation for such duration as may be necessary to complete the period.

**33.** (1) No measures shall be taken against any ship arriving in the waters of this Colony, or arriving at any port of, from any place within, the Colony, because it has come from or called at any place where any of the following diseases exists, except in the case of any such disease declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease:—

Typhus fever;  
Enteric fever;  
Cerebro-spinal fever;  
Scarlet fever;  
Diphtheria;  
Measles;  
Whooping Cough;  
Chicken-Pox;  
Dengue.

(2) If a case or cases of any of the above diseases not declared by the Governor in Council to be an infectious or contagious disease has or have occurred on board either before leaving the Port of departure, during the voyage, or on arrival, the following measures may be applied at the discretion of the Health Officer:—

- (a) Isolation of the sick.
- (b) Disinfection of the infected clothing, bedding, and effects, and of the compartment of the ship occupied by the sick.
- (c) Observation of those who have been in contact with the sick.

**34.** If any ship in the waters of this Colony is known to have any case of infectious or contagious disease on board the Health Officer may order such ship to be placed in quarantine until she has been dealt with as an infected ship.



35. In the case of a death from any infectious or contagious disease on board any ship the body shall be disposed of in such a manner as the Health Officer may direct and at the expense of the ship.

36. If any person conveys or attempts to convey any article to or from any ship in contravention of these Regulations such article shall be forfeited.

37. (1) The Master or Surgeon when there is one of any ship shall if the facts warrant his so doing on arriving in the waters of this Colony sign and deliver to the Harbour Master the certificate in accordance with Form II appended to these Regulations.

(2) In the event of any Master or Surgeon not signing and delivering the certificates marked (a) and (b) the Harbour Master shall place such ship in quarantine pending the visit of the Health Officer who shall decide whether such ship shall be granted pratique or treated as an infected, suspected or healthy ship.

(3) In the event of any Master or Surgeon not signing and delivering the certificates marked (c) and (d), the Harbour Master shall grant pratique but the passengers and crew shall not be permitted to land until they have been seen and dealt with in accordance with these Regulations by the Health Officer.

(4) The Surgeon or Master of any ship who shall sign any such certificate as aforesaid containing any false statement shall be deemed guilty of a breach of these Regulations and may be proceeded against and punished accordingly.

38. The Owner, Master or Agents of the ship shall pay the Government on demand any costs and expenses incurred in the removal of any person from the ship to any observation station or connected with the cleansing and disinfection of any ship or of the cargo or merchandise of any ship or any part of such ship, cargo or merchandise, or of the destruction of rats or mosquitos on board including the hire of any necessary labour, ships, premises on shore and disinfecting appliances or of removing from any ship any article or thing and disinfecting the same.

39. (1) All costs and expenses charged or incurred by the Government for the maintenance of any person under observation or isolation and for the disinfection and cleansing of passengers' baggage shall be paid on demand to the Government by the person concerned, except in the case of the Master, Officers, or crew of any ship when such expenses shall be paid by the Owner, Master or Agent of the ship.

(2) The Government shall have a lien on all baggage and other property belonging to a person placed in an Observation or Isolation station to secure payment of any sums due to the Government for the maintenance of such person or that of other persons for whom he may be or may have rendered himself liable.

(3) Such property may be kept and detained at the Custom House, and, in default of payment, within eight days from the termination of the Quarantine, of any sums due to the Government by the owner of such property, in respect of maintenance, the Collector of Customs may cause such property to be sold by auction.

(4) Provided that after deduction from the sale price of such property of the claim of the Government and costs, the balance, if any, shall be paid to the owner of the property.

40. No ship shall be permitted to clear outwards from any port of this Colony until all fees and expenses payable by the Owner, Master, or Agents thereof in respect of such ship under the Quarantine Ordinance, 1907, or of these Regulations may have been first duly paid.

41. No person under observation shall be required to pay a fee to any Health Officer for the services of medical supervision: Provided always that this provision shall not apply to any such person who receives at his or her request medical attendance.

42. Where any breach of the above Regulations is committed, all persons assisting in any way in the commission of such breach, and the Master or other person having the control of any ship on board of which such breach has been committed or who has been in any way concerned in the commission of such breach, shall be severally answerable for such breach and shall be deemed guilty of the same.

The sods must be cut of a size not exceeding 8 by 8 by 8 inches in thickness, and only at places indicated. The peat must be cut and rickled to the satisfaction of the Chief Constable, or person deputed by him.

The top sod, to a depth of three inches, is not to be reckoned, and the walls of existing peat cuttings must be cut away to a horizontal depth of two inches before measurement can be reckoned.

Tenders should state the number of yards tendered for and the price per yard.

Half the quantity tendered for must be ready for removal by the 9th December, 1907, and the remainder by the 13th January, 1908, weather permitting.

## ENTITLED

## An Ordinance

To provide for the preservation of Hares  
and certain Wild Birds.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the first day of September one thousand nine hundred and eight, which day is in this Ordinance referred to as the commencement of this Ordinance.

Commencement of Ordinance.

2. From and after the commencement of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully kill, wound, or take, or attempt to kill, wound, or take any hare or leveret, or use any gun, net, snare, or dog for the purpose of killing, wounding, or taking any hare or leveret, or to have in his possession any hare or leveret killed, wounded or taken, between the first day of October in any year and the following thirty-first day of January, both days inclusive, and any person guilty of any such offence shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds in respect of every such hare or leveret killed, wounded or taken, or attempted to be killed, wounded, or taken, or in his possession.

Close time for hares.

3. From and after the commencement of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully shoot or take, or attempt to shoot or take, or use any lime, trap, net, snare, or other instrument for the purpose of taking, or to have in his control or possession killed or taken—

Close time for snipe, duck, teal, widgeon, and swan.

(a) between the first day of September in any year and the following fourteenth day of January, both days inclusive, any wild bird commonly known as snipe, or

(b) between the first day of October in any year and the following thirty-first day of January, both days inclusive, any wild bird commonly known as duck, teal, widgeon, or swan,

and any person guilty of any such offence shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound in respect of every such wild bird killed or taken, or in his control or possession.

4. Notwithstanding anything herein contained, a person shall not be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance if he satisfies the Court that the hare, leveret, snipe, duck, teal, widgeon, or swan, in respect of which he is charged with an offence under this Ordinance, was imported into the Colony, and that he is the owner thereof or acted with his permission.

Exemptions.

5. Every offence under this Ordinance may be prosecuted before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner.

Prosecution of offences.

6. This Ordinance may be cited as the Hares and Wild Birds Preservation Ordinance, 1907.

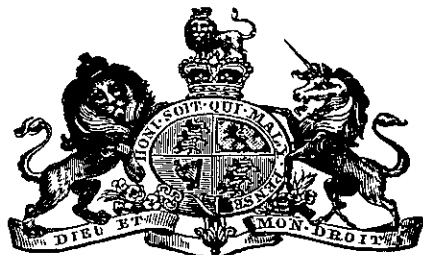

## ESTIMATES, 1908.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

*Read in Council, 29th October, 1907.*

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year 1908. It will be observed that a new departure has been made in the form in which the Estimates of Expenditure have been framed, the Division Public Works Extraordinary appearing below the line (its proper place) and not, as hitherto, above the line.

### REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for 1908 has been estimated at £14,994, or £827 less than that received in 1906.

It is expected that the increases and decreases under the several Divisions will be as follow :—

The increase of £188 under Division III. is to be attributed mainly to the development of the whaling industry, especially in the waters of our Dependency of South Shetlands.

The decrease under Division VII. Rents, Item 1, Crown Lands, £1,108, arises from the operation of the Land Ordinance, 1903, under which lessees who have arranged for the purchase of their leaseholds cease to pay an annual rent. This decrease is partially adjusted by the increase of £693 under Division V. Interest, Item 1, Land Sales Investment Fund.

#### EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1906 (i.e. exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary, £1,417, and payments under the Live Stock Ordinance, £566) amounted to £14,275, or £1,547 less than the Ordinary Revenue. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1908 is estimated at £14,265. A schedule of additions and reductions is given in Appendix 2.

4. Division I.—**Pensions.**—Item 8.—After a long and honourable career of service in the Colony, extending over a period of thirty years, the Very Rev. Lowthier E. Brandon, M.A., Dean and Colonial Chaplain, retired on pension on the 25th August, 1907. The annual expenditure under this Division therefore will be increased by £159 2s. 6d., i.e. £184 19s. 2d., the amount of the pension granted to Dean Brandon less £25 16s. 8d., the amount of that drawn by the late Mr. R. M. Routledge in respect of his services in this Colony as Magistrate. This sum, however, is more than met by the saving of £200 a year which has been effected under Division XII., Ecclesiastical, owing to the abolition of the office of Colonial Chaplain.

5. Division II.—**The Governor.**—Item 4.—Owing to the difficulty of obtaining the services of a person suitable for the post of Assistant Gardener and Labourer at the present rate of pay, this item has been increased by £6.

6. Division III.—**Colonial Secretary.**—Item 4.—Mr. J. B. McConomy's agreement as Printer expired on the 11th May last, but was extended for a period of six months at an increased rate of salary of 10/- a month, which has been voted by the Council. The Crown Agents have been instructed to engage the services of a Printer to succeed Mr. McConomy on practically the same terms on which he was originally engaged. Hence the reduction in the amount of this Item.

7. Division X.—**Medical.**—Item 8.—Honourable Members were informed in the Message laying the Estimates for 1907 that efforts would be made to obtain the use of the stone building on the north side of the Naval Depot for the purpose of a Quarantine Station and Isolation Ward. It is satisfactory to be able to state that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have consented to the proposal and have granted the building to the Colonial Government, for so long as it is required for quarantine purposes, at a rental of £30 per annum. It is permitted to fence in the area round the building (about 1 acre) and to erect on such area the mortuary, laundry, and lavatories for which provision has been made in the Estimates for the current year. The premises are to be kept in repair by this Government. The rent for 1908 is included in Item 8, Quarantine, &c., £80.

Item 9.—The work of converting the building formerly used as the Senior School into a Cottage Home for the relief of the indigent poor, referred to in the Message of 1907, is approaching completion, and the Home will probably be ready for the reception of inmates about the beginning of 1908. The sum of £150 appearing in the Estimates as Cottage Home Expenses includes Charitable Allowances. No vote under the latter head therefore is invited, as was done in the Estimates for 1907 (Division XIV., Miscellaneous, Item 15).

8. Division XI.—**Education.**—Item 8.—The annual grant of £110 in aid of the Roman Catholic Schools has been relinquished.

9. Division XII.—**Ecclesiastical.**—Items 1 and 3.—Effect has been given to an intimation conveyed by the Marquess of Ripon in March 1894, and the office of

Colonial Chaplain has been abolished. It is recognised, however, that it will be difficult for the Trustees of Christ Church immediately to secure adequate support for two clergymen if the whole of the Government grant of £400 a year were suddenly withdrawn. An annual grant of £200 therefore has been approved by the Secretary of State, on the distinct understanding that the amount of the grant may be revised hereafter. The grant is to be paid over to the Trustees of the Church for the purpose of augmenting the salary of one or two clergymen as they may decide at their discretion to appoint, subject to the condition that the Incumbent or his Assistant will, without additional remuneration from the Government, continue to perform such educational work as the Government may desire, and as they may be able to undertake without interfering with their clerical duties.

**10. Division XVI.—Colonial Engineer.**—Item 6.—Blacksmith's Apprentice.—This is a new office in respect of which a vote has already been passed by the Council and submitted for the approval of the Secretary of State.

Item 7.—Owing to the difficulty of always being able to secure the services of a local mason when required, the Crown Agents were instructed to engage a mason under an agreement for five years, on the understanding that he would also perform the duties of a labourer, and Mr. L. Raynor was selected for the post. He arrived in the Colony on the 8th May. His salary, particulars of which are given in Note 10, will be a charge against this item.

**11. Division XX.—Charges on account of the Public Debt.**—This is a new Division, the necessity for which is explained later in this Message,

**12. Division XXII.—Public Works Extraordinary.**—Items 10 and 11.—In the Message which accompanied the Supplementary Estimates 1906, I stated, *inter alia*, that ways and means should in my opinion be found with as little further delay as possible for (a) the betterment of the Sanitation of Stanley, (b) the repair and extension of the Public Stone Jetty.

Sanitation as existent in Stanley at present is, to say the least, extremely primitive. The soil has been reported by the Colonial Surgeon to be sewage sick, and premonitory signs are not wanting to indicate that this is so, and that the town is on the verge of serious trouble owing to a disregard of modern hygienic requirements.

The Colonial Surgeon in his Medical Report for 1904, wrote as follows:— "It is no exaggeration to say that, under the existing sanitary conditions, we are but paving the way for outbreaks of such essentially filth diseases as diphtheria, typhoid, smallpox, &c.," while again in his admirable Report for 1905 he remarked, "the town of Stanley requires proper scavenging and an improved pail system \* \* ." I may add that these views are likewise held by the local administration, and that the Secretary of State for the Colonies is of opinion, "that some improvement of the sanitation of the town is urgently called for." Indeed so much importance is attached to this question by His Majesty's Government that during my late visit to England I was asked to discuss this matter with Mr. Tyndale, Sanitary Engineer to the War Office. I explained the local conditions to him in their various bearings, and the following is an extract from his report to the Colonial Office:—

"The present condition of affairs seems to be as follows: Every house is provided with a pail closet the contents of which are dug into the soil of the garden with which practically all the houses are provided. This system hitherto has served fairly well as the soil is absorptive. The slops also are thrown out over the garden. But the time has come when the gardens can no longer deal healthily with the sewage required to be disposed of and a considerable risk to health is being run of rendering the Township unhealthy and of causing any disease which might break out to become epidemic.

"In view of these conditions it seems not only reasonable that they should be ameliorated, but that it is imperative that something should be done quickly to avert disaster."

As to what that something should be I have no hesitation in saying that the night soil should be removed and should be taken out to sea. To carry such a scheme into

operation a jetty with tipping funnel, two punts, two sanitary carts and horses, &c., would be required, as also a steam launch to tow the punts to Port William, the cost of which has been estimated at £2,000, exclusive of maintenance. The services of a launch are likewise urgently required for Quarantine, in fact without one the necessary regulations and restrictions cannot be properly enforced, while the work in the Harbour, Police and Customs Departments, &c., would thereby be very much facilitated and expedited. While I avail myself of this opportunity to acknowledge the courtesy of the Falkland Islands Company in so frequently granting to Government the use of their steamers 'Samson' and 'Plym,' often I fear at considerable inconvenience to themselves, I am satisfied that this Government should have a launch of their own and be independent in this respect as in other Colonies.

The annual cost of efficiently carrying out the above scheme for the removal of the night soil, and at the same time providing for the general maintenance of launch and punts, is estimated to be somewhat as follows:—

On the other hand it is anticipated that the launch by charter and otherwise would earn £140 per annum, and that the additional revenue obtained from pilotage would make good the salary of the Master, i.e. £120. To the above has to be added a further sum of about £50, being a saving under Port and Marine, items 1 and 2.

This then would leave a sum of £350 per annum to be provided from some other source. In view of the great benefit to be derived by the residents of Stanley from the introduction of a regular and systematic removal of the night soil, the present property rate of 9d. in the £, imposed under Ordinance IV of 1905, should be increased to one shilling and three pence, the maximum permitted under the Ordinance. This would bring in an additional £120.

The balance amounting to a little over £200 I propose to obtain by the following imposts:—

- (a) a tax on patent medicines of 20% ad valorem.
- (b) a gun license—including pistol—of 10/- per annum.

The former is much needed in the best interests of the community, while the latter would put a restraint on the use of firearms which is very badly wanted.

The Colony will, in my opinion, be extremely fortunate, if it can procure for its capital a much needed and efficient scheme for the removal of the night soil, thereby materially improving its existing sanitary conditions, and at the same time provide itself with a capable launch, thus obtaining increased administrative efficiency, at a total cost of £350 per annum.

With regard to the repair and extension of the Public Stone Jetty, this is a question which has engaged the attention of successive Administrations for many years past, and as far as I am aware the need for such a jetty, with a depth of about 12 feet of water at low tide, has been generally recognized. At a Meeting of the Executive Council in 1900 the Council unanimously decided "that a stone pier with 14 feet of water at low water should be constructed."

The causes which have prevented the needful wharf accommodation from being undertaken have been two, i.e. (1) certain more urgent considerations, some of which were alluded to under the Head of Public Works in the Message to Council already referred to (2) lack of funds. At present there are but three jetties in Stanley, i.e. the

East and West Jetties which are owned respectively by a private firm possessing certain sole and exclusive rights thereto, and the Dockyard Jetty. The latter, situated as it is at the extreme west of the township, is not convenient for business purposes.

If the trade of this Colony and its Dependencies is to be developed, and facilities offered for individual enterprise, many of which are lacking at present, the extension of the present Public Jetty some 200 feet by means of a wooden addition seems to me to be a Public Work which must strongly commend itself to those who have the best interests of the Colony at heart.

In order to permit of these two schemes being carried through, it is proposed to borrow a sum of £4,000 @ 3% from our accumulated assets, which now amount to over £50,000, and to establish a Sinking Fund for the repayment of the principal in ten years time.\*

Item 12.—There is a pressing necessity for extending the enclosed area of Stanley Cemetery, and the Cemetery generally needs putting into good order. The funds at the disposal of the Burial Board are quite inadequate for these purposes, and provision therefore has been made for carrying out the work.

Item 13.—The present Printing Office is practically beyond satisfactory repair, and a new office is imperatively necessary. It is proposed to erect the new building conveniently near the Government Offices, on the southern side.

Item 14.—The purchase of a Kitson Street Lamp (Oil, 1,000 candle-power) is in the nature of an experiment. If this style of lamp should prove to be suitable to local conditions, it is hoped that, by gradually substituting it for the street lamp at present in use, the lighting of Stanley will be greatly improved, and at an annual cost not in excess of that now incurred.

\* In deference to the wishes of the Unofficial Members of the Council, the Government have decided to let the question of the extension of the Public Stone Jetty stand over for the present, and to put in order and improve the existing structure as far as the sum of £250 voted for the purpose will allow.
