GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF.

(16th December, 1909.)

An Ordinance

To provide for Public Education.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. The parents or guardians of all children residing in Stanley of not less than five and not more than fourteen years of age are hereby required to cause such children to attend school unless there be some reasonable excuse as hereinafter mentioned shown to the satisfaction of the Stipendiary Magistrate; provided always that at any time before the first day of July, 1910, it shall be lawful for the parents or guardians of any child to withdraw such child from school on attaining the age of thirteen years.

Parents and Guardians to send children to school.

Any of the following reasons shall be a reasonable excuse:—

- (a) That the child is under efficient instruction in some other manner;
- (b) That the child has been prevented from attending school by illness or any other unavoidable cause.

Excuse for not doing so.

Any parent or guardian acting in contravention of this section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings; provided always that a complaint for continued non-attendance shall not be repeated at any less interval than two weeks.

Penalty.

Chief Constable to prosecute complaints.

2. It shall be the duty of the Chief Constable to prepare, keep and from time to time revise, add to and correct, a list in the form A in the Schedule hereto annexed, of all children between the ages of five and fourteen years residing in Stanley, and it shall be the further duty of the said Chief Constable, as hereinafter provided, to lodge a complaint before the Stipendiary Magistrate against the parent or guardian of any of such children who shall fail and omit to send them regularly to school.

Teachers to warn parents and guardians of non-attendance of children.

3. It shall be the duty of the Headmaster of the Government School and the Teachers of all schools receiving a grant from the Government in aid of their Schools in Stanley—

(a) To send once a fortnight to the parents or guardians of all children who do not make eight attendances out of ten in one week or sixteen attendances out of twenty in two consecutive weeks, due warning of such non-attendance in the form B in the Schedule hereto annexed ;

(b) To furnish the Chief Constable once in every two weeks with a list in the form C in the Schedule hereto annexed, of the children on the register of such schools, who have without reasonable excuse, and after due warning being given to the parents or guardians in the form B, failed to make the requisite number of attendances in any two weeks under this section. The production of the counterfoil of any such list shall be evidence before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the absence from school of the child or children named therein on the dates mentioned.

Power of Governor in Council to make Regulations.

4. The Governor in Council may from time to time make Regulations for the inspection and control :—

(a) Of all Government Schools ;

(b) Of all Schools receiving a Government Grant ;

(c) Of all Schools established in any other township of the Colony than Stanley ;

and may impose penalties not exceeding five shillings for any breach of same.

Such Regulations shall upon publication in the Government Gazette have the same effect as if inserted in this Ordinance.

Mode of recovery of penalties.

5. All penalties under this Ordinance, or under the Regulations framed hereunder, shall be recoverable in a summary manner in Stanley before a Stipendiary Magistrate on the complaint of the Chief Constable and in any other place than Stanley before a Justice of the Peace on the prosecution of any person named or appointed by the Governor.

Remission of fees in case of poverty.

6. The Governor of the Colony may remit the whole or any part of the school fees of any child attending a Government school upon being satisfied that the parent or guardian of such child is unable because of indigent circumstances to pay the same.

Instruction of children residing outside Stanley.

7. The parents or guardians of all children residing outside Stanley, shall have such children being not less than five and not more than fourteen years of age, taught by the various Government Itinerant or Resident Schoolmasters, unless there be some reasonable excuse to the contrary, as mentioned in Section 1 (a) and (b).

Appointment of Pupil Teachers.

8. It shall be competent for the Headmaster of the Government School, and for teachers of other schools receiving a Government grant, to appoint such number of pupil Teachers as may be approved

and sanctioned by the Governor, to assist the teachers in the aforementioned schools, to the extent of one Pupil Teacher for every fifty scholars in average attendance up to one hundred, and one Pupil Teacher for every twenty scholars in average attendance over one hundred. Such Pupil-teachers must, before being appointed, be certified as having passed the sixth Standard, or class equivalent to this, and must also be certified by the Government Medical Officer to be of sound constitution and physically fit to undertake the work of teaching.

9. The person appointed to be a Pupil Teacher as above shall be not less than fourteen years of age and will be on probation during the first year of his or her engagement, after which the Pupil Teacher must enter into an Agreement to serve for a further period of three years.

Terms of engagement of Pupil Teachers.

10. Each Pupil Teacher appointed to a Government School shall receive a salary at the rate of £24 per annum, to be increased by £3 per annum for each subsequent year, on passing the prescribed annual examination.

Salary of Pupil Teacher.

11. During his or her term of engagement the Pupil Teacher shall be allowed two afternoons in every school week for the purpose of study in the school under supervision, and while the School is not being held, shall receive special instruction from a certificated teacher of the school in which the Pupil Teacher is engaged during at least five hours per week (except during school holidays) of which not more than two shall be part of the same day. Such special instruction given to the Pupil Teacher shall be in the subjects specified for each year as shown in the form D in the Schedule hereto annexed, and the Pupil Teacher will be examined in each year of his or her engagement in those subjects.

Pupil Teacher to receive special instruction and be examined.

12. A Pupil Teacher who has successfully passed the final examination in the prescribed subjects at the termination of the fourth year of his or her agreement, may be employed as an Assistant Teacher in the Colony or as an Itinerant Schoolmaster, and shall receive a Certificate stating the educational acquirements attained and his or her ability as a Teacher.

Pupil Teacher may be employed as Assistant Teacher & receive Certificate.

13. Once a year at least, and on such other occasion as the Governor may direct, the Government Medical Officer shall make an examination of the children attending the Government Schools, or other schools receiving a Government grant and shall make a report to the Government of any children suffering from malnutrition, defective eye-sight, defective teeth, want of cleanliness of person, or from any skin disease.

Inspection of School children by Government Medical Officer.

14. The Government Medical Officer shall keep a list of the names of the scholars suffering from one or more of the defects mentioned in Section 13 and notice shall be sent to the parents or guardians of such children intimating that the children are so suffering, and advising the parents or guardians to adopt remedial measures.

Government Medical Officer to keep list of school children suffering from any defect, & Parents to be advised to remedy such.

15. The Headmaster of the Government School or Teacher of other Schools receiving a Government Grant shall, when possible, receive at least two day's notice of any visit from a Government Medical Officer, under section 13, in order that preparation may be made for such visit with as little disturbance to School routine as possible.

Government Medical Officer to give 2 days notice of visit to School.

16. Ordinance No. 6 of 1895 entitled "The School Attendance Ordinance, 1895", and the Regulations made thereunder shall be

Repeal.

and the same are hereby repealed.

Short Title.

17. This Ordinance shall be cited as the Public Education Ordinance, 1909, and shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and ten.

Passed the Legislative Council this 8th day of December, 1909.

Regulations for Government Schools.

ATTENDANCE.

1. The hours of attendance shall be defined in the Time Table of the School, which must be prepared by the Schoolmaster and submitted for the approval and sanction of the Governor in Council. Any alterations which may from time to time be suggested by the Schoolmaster must be submitted in like manner.

2. The regular school holidays shall be as follows:—

Good Friday and Easter week. The week following the next Friday after the 21st of September. Four weeks commencing with the week in which Christmas Day falls.

In addition to the above, the schools will be closed on every Saturday and on every day kept as a Public Holiday, or on which the Public Offices shall be closed by order of the Governor, and no other holidays shall be given without the sanction of the Governor.

3. The attendance of the scholars shall be registered every morning and every afternoon, at not later than 10. o.c. in the forenoon and not later than 2. 10 o.c. in the afternoon.

4. The Schools may at any time be temporarily closed by order of the Governor on account of epidemic disease or other sufficient cause.

WORK OF THE SCHOOLS.

5. (a) Time Tables and Schemes of Work must be prepared annually by the Schoolmaster and thereafter submitted to the Governor in Council for his approval and sanction.

(b) Evening continuation classes on advanced subjects may be instituted with the approval of the Governor.

DUTIES OF THE SCHOOLMASTER, SCHOOLMISTRESS AND ASSISTANT TEACHERS.

6. During school hours, the Schoolmaster, Schoolmistresses, Assistant Teachers and Pupil Teachers shall confine themselves strictly to the tuition of the scholars and shall not during such time be engaged in any other work, or in the preparation of Reports, or Accounts, all of which shall be done out of School hours.

7. It is the duty of the Schoolmaster in the month of November in each year to prepare requisitions for all necessary books, stationery, etc., required for the ensuing year, and forward them to the Colonial Secretary.

8. All books and other requisites necessary for the scholars shall be supplied to them by the Schoolmaster at prices which will be only the actual cost of the articles, to be paid for on or before delivery to the scholars.

9. A duplicate list of all school furniture, maps, and other articles being the property of the Government used in the school, must be made out annually by the Schoolmaster, one copy to be sent to the Colonial Secretary and the other to be kept in the School.

10. The Schoolmaster shall make an entry in the School Log Book each day specifying progress and other facts connected with the School and the Teachers.

11. No entry once made in the Log Book may be removed or altered otherwise than by a subsequent entry.

12. The Teachers must be at School at least five minutes before the time of opening.

13. The School shall be opened punctually at the times fixed by the Time Tables.

14. The Teachers must not be absent from their duties during school hours. If any absence is unavoidable it must be entered in the Log Book with the cause and duration of absence.

15. The School shall be opened by the children repeating the Lord's Prayer and by the singing of songs or by some simple physical exercises.

16. The School Accounts shall be kept in the manner and form appointed by the Governor in Council, and in books or forms supplied for that purpose.

17. The Governor in Council may from time to time appoint a Government Inspector of Schools, who, under such terms and conditions as may be approved, will periodically inspect:—

- (a) All Government Schools,
- (b) All Schools receiving Government grants,
- (c) All Camp Schools in charge of a Government Schoolmaster,

and perform such other educational work as the Government may desire. All reports made by the Government Inspector of Schools shall be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary.

18. The Parent or Guardian of any child attending a Government School shall pay to the Government Schoolmaster the undermentioned fees:—

- (a) In the case of children in Standards II and upwards, a fee of 6d. each weekly.
- (b) In the case of children in the Infant Class and Standard I, a fee of 3d. each weekly.

All fees received by the Government Schoolmaster shall be paid monthly to the Colonial Treasurer.

An Ordinance

To extend to the Colony certain provisions
of the Merchant Shipping Acts of the
Imperial Parliament.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the
Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative

1. From and after the passing of this Ordinance, the provisions
of Part II. of the Act of the Imperial Parliament 57 & 58 Victoria
Chapter 60 (the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894) as amended by the
Act of the Imperial Parliament 6 Edward 7 Chapter 48 (the
Merchant Shipping Act, 1906) relating to British Ships registered in
the United Kingdom, and to the owners, masters, and crews of
those ships, shall apply to British ships registered in the Colony and
to the owners, masters and crews of those ships when within the
jurisdiction of the Colony.

Part II. of the
Merchant Shipping
Act, 1894, applied to
the Colony.

2. This Ordinance may be cited as the Merchant Shipping
Ordinance, 1909.



2. During the year 99 accounts were opened and 29 closed; leaving a total of 456 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £65112 0s. 1d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £142 15s. 9d. standing to the credit of each account, or £31 10s. 6d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,065.

3. Interest amounting to £1,455 5s. 2d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £108 7s. 3d. more than that credited in 1907-8 and the amount of deposits for the year exceeds the withdrawals for the same period by £3,005 18s. 5d. as shown in the Monthly Summary of Savings Bank Transactions transmitted herewith. (Enclosure D.)

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £1,905 8s. 8d. and the expenses incurred £1,459 5s. 2d. leaving a profit of £446 3s. 6d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1909. (Enclosure C.)

5. The investments on account of the Bank on the 30th September, 1909. amounts to £59,930 1s. 6d. leaving an uninvested balance of £5,181 18s. 7d.



Education Report for 1909.

During the past year satisfactory progress has been made in all subjects in the Government School.

The infants are being well and happily taught, and everything is done to make the lessons bright and attractive.

The work in the various standards shows improvement. Changes in the Teaching Staff have proved some drawback, but with the appointment of an additional fully Certified Teacher progress in the future should become even more marked.

The written work is done with greater accuracy and neatness.

The sewing is distinctly good.

The new Educational Ordinance which comes in force this year makes provision for the employment of Pupil Teachers, and raises the school age to 14 years of age, and both of these innovations will be of value.

In the "Camps" the Itinerant Schoolmasters continue to carry on their difficult work. Where Parents co-operate with the Schoolmaster the results are satisfactory.

In Lafonia, the Falkland Islands Company continue to employ a resident Schoolmaster at Darwin and two Itinerant Schoolmasters in their "Camp".

Medical and Sanitary Report on the Falkland Islands for the year 1909.

The Colonial Surgeon to the Colonial Secretary.

I regret the report is only a short one, but I did not enter upon the duties of my office before the end of October, and unfortunately I have no record of cases treated in Stanley and the West Falkland before that date.

VITAL STATISTICS.

1. Population.

The estimated population of the Colony on December 31st, 1909 was 2,323. There were 54 births and 20 deaths registered during the year. The birth rate was 23.08 per 1,000 against 25.33 in 1908. The death rate was 8.60 per 1,000 against 5.24 in 1908. The deaths include 3 among children under one year of age. There was one suicide. The death rate compared with an English County is a low one, but it is necessary to remember that the Colony has comparatively few inhabitants over 60 years of age. Many persons return to England as they prefer to spend the declining years of life in that Country.

2. Public Health.

The health of the Colony has been fair throughout the year. Pharyngitis was prevalent. Two cases of diphtheria occurred in Stanley and several cases of Scarlet Fever on the West Falkland. No deaths occurred from those diseases. The District Nurse during the year attended 15 maternity cases, and 25 Medical and Surgical cases, paying 727 visits. I find patients she attends appreciate her services.

Vaccination.

51 children were vaccinated during the year.

All vessels arriving in the Colony were boarded on arrival and inquiries made regarding the health of crew and passengers but in no case was it found necessary to place any vessel in quarantine.

Sanitation.

Stanley is built on the side of a hill; drainage into the sea is very easy, but a few houses are in bad repair without any drainage arrangements. Building unfortunately is so expensive that many houses are somewhat overcrowded, containing more than one family. The public health of Stanley would be improved if a pure water supply could be provided. At present everyone is dependent on the water caught from the roofs of the houses, which from the prevailing high winds, must contain much dust and other objectionable matter.

Annual Report of the Chief Inspector of Stock for the year 1909.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit to you my first Annual Report for the year, 1909.

Owing to to my having been in the Colony but a few weeks, I am unfortunately not able to give as detailed a report as I should have liked to do.

Sheep—The number of sheep as shown by the Annual Return is 715,651, showing an increase on last years number 688,705, of 26,946. The total is made up as follows, and for comparison it will be as well to show the 1908 figures also.

Wool.—Prices were about a fair average and the clip was quite up to the usual standard, averaging about $8\frac{3}{4}$ lbs.

Imports & Exports.—The importation of horses and sheep is below that of 1908.

From Punta Arenas 70 horses were landed compared with 109 from the same port in 1908. Twenty-two Rams were imported in all, 19 Romney Marsh from England and 3 Merinos from France. Corresponding returns for 1908 are 33. Four hundred and seventy-nine Romney Marsh Rams were exported, being 179 above last years figures. The general health of imported stock was good.

Beaks.—The total number received during the year was 89,480 which is 37,500 above the 1908 return. The increase is from the West Falkland, which returned 51,955 beaks, while last year the number was 14,455.

Cultivation.—The sowing of grass seed is evidently becoming more popular and doubtless those who have gone to this trouble and expense will be well repaid by the results.

General Health.—The health of the sheep is on the whole very good.

The disease thought to be Malignant Oedema is still existant in the Colony, but I hope to be able to thoroughly investigate it during the coming spring.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES, 1909.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 18th April, 1910.

MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1909.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for the year was £17,608 19s. 4d. being £1223 in excess of the Ordinary Expenditure. This is £166 less than the Revenue collected last year but it is in advance of the Receipts for any other year in this Colony. That the development of Industry continues is shown by the increases in Internal Revenue and Rents which were respectively £526 and £929 above the estimate. Fees and Fines were more productive than in 1908 but were £229 below the estimate for 1909.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure amounted to £16,385 17s. 8d. or £767 3s. 11d. over the estimate.

4. The comparative statements (A) and (B) attached shew the estimated and actual Revenue and Expenditure under the various heads.

5. You will be asked to pass a Supplementary Bill for £2,074 17s. 6d., being Expenditure in excess of the amount already sanctioned by the Appropriation Ordinance, 1909. The details of the principal items are as follows:—

6. Division IV.—**Treasury, £70 17s. 1d.**—Of this £22 has been recovered under Fees. £34 is the salary of the Deputy Collector, New Island, a new appointment approved when that place was declared a Port of Entry. £29 is for House Allowance paid to the Acting Customs Officer.

7. Division VIII.—**Police, £15 19s. 0d.**—A special Constable was needed to guard lunatics and an unusual number of prisoners.

8. Division X.—**Medical, £79 12s. 0d.**—Unestimated expenditure incurred for lunatics and additional drugs taken over from the late Acting Colonial Surgeon.

9. Division XI.—**Education, £54 2s. 11d.**—The Assistant Mistress for the Government School could not be obtained for the salary estimated. Incidental expenses occasioned by changes in the staff amounted to £30.

10. Division XIII.—**Transport, £539 8s. 3d.**—Of this £65 was for landing additional stores expended on Public Works. The remainder was for passages to and from England paid under agreements.

11. Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous, £154 17s. 11d.**—£25 was allotted for the rent of a stall at the Liverpool Exhibition ; £64 was expended on ammunition, owing to supplies accumulating in England while waiting for the departure of a Man-of-War to save freight ; unexpected excesses on telegrams, stationery, seeds and the renewal of glass frames at Government House account for the remainder.

12. Division XVI.—**Colonial Engineer, £94 19s. 8d.**—It was not found possible to obtain a competent Master and Engineer for the Government Launch at the salaries originally proposed. The estimate for insurance of the Launch was also exceeded.

13. Division XVII.—**Savings Bank, £73 5s. 2d.**—This was interest paid on increased deposits.

14. Division XIX.—**Drawbacks and Refunds, £158 3s. 9d.**—Rents refunded to purchasers of Leasehold Lands.

15. Division XXI.—**Public Works Recurrent, £164 14s. 4d.**—Of this £52 was for roads, for which we have some shingle still in stock ; £69 for additional repairs, which is more than covered by the sale of surplus stores ; £43 was for additional furniture for Government House and Offices.

16. Division XXII.—**Public Works Extraordinary, £668 17s. 5d.**—It was found necessary to make a small extension of the Sanitary Jetty so as to reach deeper water. This cost £182. The Public Jetty cost £500 more than was estimated. In order to expedite the lighting of Stanley three more Kitson lamps were purchased and certain stores taken over from the Admiralty cost £35.

17. The Extraordinary Revenue was estimated at £7270, made up as follows:—

Land Sales	£6470

Land Sales realised £2523 and Stock Fund £7 more than was estimated.

18. The Extraordinary Expenditure was estimated at £2909 and amounted to £3527. We are left therefore with a surplus of Extraordinary Revenue over Extraordinary Expenditure of £6273. That is to say that up to the end of 1909 the surplus of Ordinary Revenue over Ordinary Expenditure, quite apart from Land Sales or other reserve Funds, has paid for all Extraordinary Expenditure and left us a Balance of £127. We have as you know, no debt, and a Reserve of over £70,000, so that the Colony may be congratulated on possessing the only satisfactory basis of prosperity, a thoroughly sound financial position.

PUBLIC WORKS.

19. The work done in 1909 was mainly a continuation of that begun in 1908. The stone portion of the Public Jetty was decked and the timber extension carried out to its termination in 13 ft. of water at low tide. The Sanitary Jetty was also broadened and extended six feet. The new Printing Office was finished and new roofs placed on the large

Store in the Dockyard and on the wooden portions of Government House. The Government Offices were improved by the addition of a waiting room and room for the archives as well as a porch. The Quarantine Station was overhauled and given cement floors, new boilers and stoves. A Fire-engine shed and oil store were built at the dockyard. During the winter a considerable amount of work was done on roads in Stanley. Ross road was picked and metalled; a new road was made along Pensioners' Cottages; and Drury St., Villiers St. and parts of John St. and Philomel St. were also gone over and repaired. The lighting of Stanley was greatly improved by the addition of five Kitson Lamps. Innumerable smaller alterations and repairs were carried out but I should especially mention the Reclamations at the dockyard and at the East End of the Town, which besides providing for the disposal of the rubbish of Stanley, extend the foreshore and protect it from erosion by water.

WHALING.

20. Both in South Georgia, where seven Companies continued their operations and in the South Shetlands where two additional Companies, making six in all, were at work, the season was satisfactory. I have every reason to expect that this industry will shortly be extended to the South Orkney and Sandwich groups. The policy of this Government will continue to be that of endeavouring to establish a permanent industry rather than the rapid collection of a large revenue.

21. In conclusion, Gentlemen, we may confidently expect that the development of our resources which has been so satisfactorily begun will continue during the present year. Now that the problems connected with the commercial use of peat fuel have been solved, the vast deposits on these Islands cannot remain long unexploited. When that moment comes, it is encouraging to know that in all probability our present Governor will still be with us, to devote to the service of the Colony those gifts to which the Falkland Islands already owes so much.

Notes on the Medical Aspect of the West Falkland.

The most notable feature during the past year has been an epidemic of Scarlet Fever. There were two separate and distinct outbreaks, one in the north and one in the south. In each instance the disease appeared within a week of the receipt of parcels of clothing from Port Stanley. Fortunately all the cases were of a comparatively mild type and were unaccompanied by complications or sequelæ. Both these epidemics have been stamped out.

The prevailing high winds and the bacteriological purity of the atmosphere acting as diluents of the infecting agents, are valuable factors in the prevention of infectious disease.

As in previous years, Diseases of the Respiratory and Digestive Systems have been responsible for the greatest number of cases.

Adenoids and diseases of the nasal cavities are common, resulting as they so frequently do, from neglected and repeated Catarrhal attacks. For this reason Asthma is very prevalent. The ordinary Bronchial or Spasmodic Asthma is very common in families with a neurotic tendency and it has long been recognised by Rhinologists as resulting from abnormalities in the nasal cavities. Nearly all the patients I have seen have been the subjects of well marked intranasal deformity, which if seen and treated during childhood, would in the great majority of cases have resulted in immunity from Asthma.

2. FOOD and WATER—On the whole the water used for drinking purposes is of exceptional purity and softness. For this reason it is admirably adapted to the dietetic requirements of the people, who eat meat to a degree far in excess of their bodily requirements. Being in most cases analogous in composition to distilled water, its great solvent power assists in the elimination of those bye-products of imperfect digestion which would otherwise result in wide-spread attacks of Gout. At the same time, its deficiency in lime salts is responsible for a great deal of infantile Rickets, causing delayed and imperfect development of teeth and their early decay. The resulting deficiencies of the dental apparatus greatly handicap the lower parts of the alimentary canal and severe degrees of dyspepsia are prone to follow very slight exciting causes. A large quantity of "stewed" tea is taken, and it cannot be denied that tobacco-chewing is responsible for many gastric troubles.

Constipation being a concomitant of dyspepsia, is very common, and is the cause of nearly all the cases of Hæmorrhoids. Attacks of the latter complaint are almost invariably relieved by small repeated doses of saline aperient such as Epsom Salts. The abuse of aloetic purgatives is also a common cause of Hæmorrhoids, and it should be understood that aloes or its active principle "Aloin" is the usual basis of Patent Pills and "Curative Syrups".

Many people suffer from the omission of an adequate quantity of vegetables from their dietary. Where these cannot be procured, it should be remembered that Lime-juice is an excellent substitute, and, in fact, a necessity.

Much infantile suffering could be avoided if mothers would bear the following facts in mind:

(a) The mother's milk if good in quality, is *all* that a child requires.

(b) If the mother's milk is unobtainable, the unskimmed milk of a healthy cow, strained, and enriched with a small quantity of cream, is

(c) A child *before* twelve months old, it cannot digest starchy food because the Pancreas does not secrete the digestive juices which are necessary for its digestion. Therefore nothing prepared from flour, oatmeal, cornflour or sweet potatoes should be given, *under any circumstances*.

- (d) Regularity in the feeding of infants is of the greatest importance. It is productive alike of thriving children and unworried mothers.
- (e) Never give a child anything in between meals.

- (f) In case of Diarrhœa in children, stop *all milk*, give a small dose of Castor Oil and feed on raw meat juice prepared from freshly killed beef, diluted with boiled (not boiling) water. Milk may be resumed 12 hours after cessation of the diarrhœa.
- (g) All feeding bottles &c. should be kept *immersed* in a solution of Borax when not in use.

3. SANITATION & HYGIENE—In one case a large cookhouse was unprovided with a closet.

No proper provision is made in any Cookhouse for systematic bathing. A suitable bathroom with a reasonable supply of hot water, regularly used, and frequent washing of the underclothing, would entirely prevent outbreaks of boils.

Where roofs are painted, rainwater should not be used for drinking purposes, or lead poisoning is liable to follow.

With a few exceptions, all houses are well built and kept scrupulously clean. In the future, however, much more care will have to be bestowed on the proper maintenance of closets.

4. As in former years minor ailments are common, and serious illness much less frequent than might reasonably be expected.

Considering the amount of riding necessary and the character of many of the horses, freedom from accidents is remarkable and speaks volumes for the skill of the riders.

The top sod, to a depth of three inches, is not to be reckoned, and the walls of existing peat cuttings must be cut away to a horizontal depth of two inches before measurement can be reckoned.

Tenders should state the number of yards tendered for, and the price per yard.

Half the quantity tendered for must be ready for removal by the 8th December, 1910, and the remainder by the 12th January, 1911, weather permitting.

PARDON TO DESERTERS, &c.

His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased as an act of clemency, on the occasion of his accession to the Throne, to approve of pardons being granted to soldiers in a state of desertion, or who, since deserting, have enlisted in other corps.

2. The following instructions are issued as regards the pardon to deserters, &c. :—
3. The pardon to deserters is extended to men who have—

- (a.) deserted ;
- (b.) fraudulently enlisted, as defined in Section 13, Army Act ;
- (c.) absented themselves without leave from the Regular, Auxiliary, or Reserve Forces ;
- (d.) improperly enlisted into the Regular Forces, Special Reserve, or Territorial Force, while serving in the Army Reserve,

provided that they committed the offence before the date of this Army Order, and surrender themselves within 2 months after that date if at home, or within 4 months if abroad.

4. Deserters and absentees are required to report themselves in writing, giving full particulars, to one of the undermentioned officers, from whom they will receive instructions. If they are suffering from any physical disability which renders them unable to rejoin the Service, they should state so in their letter.

5. Men who enlisted before the 24th May, 1900, or who have been in state of desertion or absence for a period of 5 years, or who are physically unfit for service, will not be called upon to rejoin for service, but will be given protecting certificates on their reporting themselves in writing, as directed in paragraph 4.

6. The officer mentioned in paragraph 4, on receiving a report from a deserter or absentee, will verify the statements made therein by reference to his documents. If the man is exempt from further service under paragraph 5 he will at once send him a protecting certificate on Army Form B 129.

7. Applications received from persons residing beyond the limits of the United Kingdom, and who are not exempt from further service, will, after verification in accordance with paragraph 6, be forwarded to the War Office, from which instructions will be issued in each case.

8. Deserters and men who have fraudulently enlisted will forfeit all previous service, but will not be subject to stoppages on account of articles lost or made away with at the time of desertion.

9. The fact of a soldier having claimed the benefit of the pardon will be entered on his record of service as follows :—

MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you the Estimates for the year 1911.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for 1911 has been estimated at £17,184, or £425 less than that received in 1909. The following are the increases and decreases anticipated :

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure in 1909 amounted to £16,386 or £1,223 less than the Ordinary Revenue. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1911 is estimated at £16,594, or £590 less than the Ordinary Revenue.

4. A schedule of additions and reductions is given in Appendix No. 1. The following is an explanation of the principal additions:

5. Division I.—**Pensions.**—Mr. Newing's pension was approved and sanctioned in 1909 but now first appears in the Estimates.

6. Division II.—**The Governor.**—Item 6.—Garden Seeds, transferred from Division XIV. Item 8 provides for certain legal works required for reference.

7. Division XI.—**Education.**—Item 3.—No Assistant Mistress for the Government School could be obtained for the salary voted in the 1910 Estimates. Item 7. These are the salaries fixed by "The Public Education Ordinance, 1909".

8. Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous.**—Item 2.—Provision has been made for a small increase in the amount of fuel required. Items 7 and 8. The additions are due to the increase in the numbers of Volunteers. Item 13 provides for expenditure on the extended Telephone service in Stanley.

9. Division XVI.—**Colonial Engineer.**—Item 5.—The incorporation of the post of Blacksmith with that of Engineer has been found to be inconvenient; it is therefore proposed to revive the post of Blacksmith as it was in 1908.

10. Item 9 now includes £18 formerly voted under item 14. Item 16 provides for the upkeep of the new Kitson lamps.

11. Division XX.—**Public Works Recurrent.**—Item 3.—The provision made for furniture in 1909 was found to be insufficient and the 1908 figure has been restored. Item 4 allows for the purchase of a horse if this is found to be necessary.

12. Division XXI.—**Public Works Extraordinary.**—Item 17.—The question of affording additional help to vessels approaching the Falklands has been under consideration for some time. After consulting local opinion and officers of the Royal Navy and the Pacific Steam Navigation Company, it was decided that the Sea Lion Rocks would be the most generally useful position for a light. Under the peculiar conditions, which necessitate leaving the light unattended for months and add greatly to the difficulties of construction, a beacon lighted by Acetylene Gas has been chosen as the most suitable and inexpensive.

Items 18 and 19 allow for much needed improvement of the two buildings mentioned. Item 20.—The boat now in use at Fox Bay is quite unsuited to the work required there. Item 21.—The Postmaster requires some means of keeping Postal Orders and other Government Property in safety. Item 22.—It is proposed to collect the rain water which at present runs to waste from the Customs Shed and make it available for launches and boats calling at the New Jetty.

Item 23.—The need for Headquarters and Drill Hall for the Volunteer Corps has been recognised for many years. A scheme for providing them was mooted in July 1893 and since that date the question has been discussed on several occasions and postponed to more urgent requirements. The time has now come when it is evident that the want of proper accommodation is preventing the further development of the corps and its provision has been repeatedly and strongly recommended by the Inspecting Officers and by the military authorities in England. It is now proposed to advance the cost of the building, as required, to the Volunteers who will repay the money with interest at 3% by annual instalments.

Report on "Bitumen" from the Falkland Islands.

The sample of "bitumen" which is the subject of this report was forwarded to the Imperial Institute, through the Colonial Office, by His Excellency the Governor of the Falkland Islands with letter No. 68 dated 4th September, 1909.

DESCRIPTION OF SAMPLE.

The sample weighed about 7lb, and consisted of dull black, compact "bitumen" having a specific gravity of 1.01. It was stated that there appear to be several outcrops of this material in different parts of the Falkland Islands.

RESULTS OF EXAMINATION.

The material ignited very easily and held fire well, burning with a long luminous smoky flame and leaving a reddish ash which contained a large proportion of silica. A proximate analysis of the sample gave the following results:—

The material was only very slightly soluble in chloroform or turpentine oil, solvents which usually dissolve bitumen readily.

When destructively distilled the material yielded a large quantity of gas, which burnt with a long, luminous, very smoky flame. A small quantity of caked coke was left.

When distilled at a lower temperature (about 500° C) the "bitumen" furnished a large quantity of oil, the yield of crude oil amounting to 75 per cent by weight. The oil was dark greenish-brown and had a specific gravity of 0.892 at 15.5° C. Its flash point was below 40° F and it would therefore be unsuitable for use as a liquid fuel without further treatment.

The crude oil was submitted to fractional distillation in order to remove the con-

stituents having a boiling point below 150°C . This fraction, known as "light petroleum", began to distill at 48°C and amounted to 15.3 per cent by weight of the crude oil, or 11.5 per cent by weight of the "bitumen". It had practically no smell, only a slight colour, and a specific gravity at 15.5°C of 0.740. The bromine absorption was 90 per cent.

The residue remaining after the removal of this light petroleum may be termed "fuel oil"; it had the following characters:—

Specific gravity at 15.5°C (60°F)	0.918
Flash point (Abel closed test)	74°C (165°F)
Solidifying point	1°C (34°F)
Calorific value	10,551 calories
Sulphur contained in the oil	0.14 per cent

The yield of this "fuel oil" amounted to 63.5 per cent by weight of the "bitumen" distilled.

The above figures indicate that the "fuel oil" would be quite suitable for use as a liquid fuel for ordinary purposes, although it does not quite satisfy the requirements of the British Admiralty, which are that the oil should have a flash point of 200°F and remain liquid at 32°F , and that it should be fairly free from sulphur.

The alternative to marketing the "fuel oil" would be to separate it into "kerosene" and "heavy oils" by fractional distillation, and to purify these by means of acid and alkali. This process is however likely to prove somewhat expensive, owing to the large amount of tarry matter produced and the consequent waste of acid. An experiment on a small scale gave a yield of kerosene (of boiling point 150° to 300°C) amounting to 25 per cent by weight of the "Bitumen" or 39.3 per cent by weight of the "fuel oil". The kerosene, which possessed a slightly greenish colour and a rather pronounced smell, had the following characters:—

Specific gravity at 15.5°C (60°F)	0.855
Flash point (by Abel closed test)	70°C (158°F)
Bromine absorption	42 per cent

The "Heavy oils" which distilled above 300°C under reduced pressure amounted to 27.7 per cent by weight of the "bitumen", or 43.6 per cent by weight of the "fuel oil". The product was a dark green, fluorescent, semi-solid mass with a specific gravity of 0.819. It solidified at 10°C .

The loss on redistilling the "fuel oil" in this way amounted to 17.1 per cent by weight, but probably on a large scale the loss would be smaller.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

This mineral is not a bitumen in the ordinary sense, since it is practically insoluble in the usual solvents. It resembles to some extent a number of natural products, such as albertite, which are related to the true bitumens or asphalts. Owing to its insolubility it could not be used for the preparation of varnishes, and since it is infusible it could not be employed like true asphalt as an insulating medium. The only uses that can be suggested for it are (1) as a fuel and (2) as a source of mineral oil. Its employment as a general fuel would however present considerable difficulty, as it burns very vigorously and with very long flames. In order to utilise it for steam raising purposes special grates and appliances would probably be necessary.

With reference to its utilisation as a source of mineral oil it may be mentioned that at one time albertite was mined in Canada on a considerable scale for the distillation of burning oil, but this industry ceased to be remunerative with the discovery in Canada of petroleum. For use as a source of oil the mineral would have to be obtainable in large quantities, as otherwise it would not be worth while to install distillation plant in the Falkland Islands or to export the material for treatment elsewhere. It would therefore appear necessary to have the deposits examined by a specialist, with a view to ascertaining the quantity likely to be available, before further action is taken.



This gives an average of over £149 3s. 8d. standing to the credit of each account, or £34 0s. 6d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,065.

3. Interest amounting to £1,558 2s. 7d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £102 17s. 5d. more than that credited in 1908-9 and the amount of deposits for the year exceeds the withdrawals for the same period by £5,153 8s. 3d. as shown in the Monthly Summary of Savings Bank Transactions transmitted herewith. (Enclosure D.)

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £2,000 11s. 11d. and the expenses incurred £1,562 2s. 7d. leaving a profit of £438 9s. 4d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1910. (Enclosure C.)

5. The investments on account of the Bank on the 30th September, 1910. amounts to £60,516 4s. 2d. leaving an uninvested balance of £9,749 4s. 2d.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

Respecting the use of Government Wharfs.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance—

“Government Wharf” shall mean any wharf the property of the Crown which shall be declared to be such by the Governor in Council and published in the Gazette.

“Vessel” shall mean every description of ship, lighter, or floating water tank.

“Boat” shall mean any small open or partly decked vessel, ordinarily propelled by oars.

“Harbour Master” shall mean any person lawfully performing the duties or acting under the orders of the Harbour Master.

“Officer of Customs” shall mean any person duly appointed in writing as such, and shall include the Collector of Customs, and any Deputy Collector of Customs, and all Police Constables.

2. No vessel shall be taken alongside of or made fast to any Government Wharf except with the permission of the Harbour Master. Any vessel alongside of or made fast to any such wharf must at any time at the request of the Harbour Master be removed therefrom or shifted from alongside of such wharf. The Master or person in charge of any vessel who shall offend against any of the provisions of this section shall on conviction be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

3. When any vessel of a measurement of not less than two tons shall be placed alongside a Government wharf for the purpose of discharging or taking in cargo or landing or embarking passengers thereat or for any other purpose there shall be paid in respect of such vessel the wharfage charges specified in the Schedule to this Ordinance. Such wharfage shall be paid or secured to the satisfaction of the Harbour Master before such vessel is removed from alongside of such Government wharf. Any person or persons removing any vessel from alongside of any Government wharf without such wharfage being paid or secured as aforesaid shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

4. The measurement of any vessel shall be deemed to be that specified in the register, and in the case of unregistered vessels the Harbour Master shall be the person to determine the tonnage of same.

5. The Governor in Council in the case of any vessel or vessels registered within the Colony, and owned by the same firm or person within the Colony, may, on application being made in writing, permit the wharfage charges payable in respect of such vessel or vessels for any period not exceeding one year to be commuted by the payment in advance of such sum as he may determine subject to such conditions as he may deem expedient.

6. Any vessel employed trading to or within the Colony that has paid the wharfage charge aforesaid at one Government wharf for any one day may for any portion of such day be placed alongside any other Government wharf free of wharfage.

7. Whenever it shall appear necessary to the Harbour Master or any Officer of Customs it shall be lawful for them to prevent any person from coming upon any Government wharf and also to order any person already there to leave the same and any person neglecting or refusing to leave such wharf when requested to do so may be taken into custody without a warrant and shall upon conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

8. The owner or master of any vessel or boat shall be liable for any damage done to any Government wharf, or penalty incurred by such vessel or boat, and such vessel or boat may be detained by order of the Governor until such penalty or damage has been paid.

9. The Master or owner of any vessel or boat from which any ashes, ballast, damaged goods, or dead animals are landed on any Government wharf without permission shall be liable to any penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

10. Any person who leaves or causes to be left on any Government wharf any dead animal, ballast, damaged goods, rubbish, nightsoil, or any other material without the permission of the Harbour Master or an Officer of Customs shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

11. (1.) The Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, or revoke Regulations appertaining to and for the general good management and control of any Government wharf, and such Regulations may provide that any infraction thereof may be punished by fine not exceeding ten pounds.
- (2.) Until the Governor in Council makes Regulations under this section, the Regulations in the Schedule to this Ordinance shall be in force and shall be deemed for all purposes to be Regulations made by the Governor in Council under this section.
12. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Wharfage Ordinance, 1911".

SCHEDULE.

The Wharfage Regulations, 1911.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Wharfage Regulations, 1911.
2. The Master or Owner of every vessel of a registered measurement of two tons and over shall pay wharfage to the Harbour Master in accordance with the subjoined scale of charges—

3. The Government wharf at the north end of Philomel Street in the town of Stanley shall after the hour of sunset and before the hour of sunrise be the only calling place for all boats plying to or from vessels in the harbour, and it shall not be lawful for any boat to call at any other wharf or place, or to proceed from any other wharf or place on the shore of the harbour after the hour of sunset or before the hour of sunrise without the permission of the Harbour Master or an Officer of Customs.

4. Any person failing to comply with or offending against these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of two pounds for each offence.

Report on "Waters" from the Falkland Islands.

By PROFESSOR WYNDHAM R. DUNSTAN, M.A., L.L.D., F.R.S., Director.

The samples of water which are the subject of this report were brought to the Imperial Institute by His Excellency the Governor of the Falkland Islands on the 6th April, 1910.

DESCRIPTION OF SAMPLES.

(1) "Spring water from Cygnet Harbour, Lafonia". The sample consisted of about half a pint of greenish-yellow water containing a quantity of bright greenish, slimy suspended matter. The spring from which the water was taken is reputed to possess medicinal properties, and it was desired to ascertain whether this view would be supported by an analysis of the sample.

(2) "Water from a peat bog". This sample was thought to contain traces of oil. It consisted of about half a pint of water containing a quantity of reddish flocculent matter.

RESULTS OF EXAMINATION.

(1). The Spring water was analysed with the following results:

The quantity of water was too small to permit of its examination for bromides, iodides, borates, or nitrates.

(2). No trace of oil could be detected in the water from a peat bog. The reddish flocculent matter present consisted chiefly of hydrated oxide of iron.

CONCLUSIONS.

Sample No. 1 may for all practical purposes be regarded as diluted sea-water. The absence of calcium carbonate, together with the presence of calcium and magnesium sulphates, indicates that the salts present are of marine origin and are not due to organic contamination. The total solid matter in solution is below the maximum recognised in the United Kingdom for ordinary drinking water, and this spring water cannot therefore be regarded as having any special medicinal value.

Sample No. 2 contained no oil, and the supposition that oil was present is probably to be explained by the fact that iridescent scums of hydrated iron oxide on the surface of stagnant water are frequently mistaken for oil.

Results of the examination of "Corrosive Powder" from the Falkland Islands.

NUMBER AND QUANTITY.

"Corrosive powder found amongst the wood of the buried forest on West Point Island".

RESULTS OF EXAMINATION.

(1) *Mineralogical*:— The specimen consisted of a grey powder possessing a slightly astringent taste. It consisted chiefly of sulphate of iron and contained a certain amount of insoluble matter, partly pyrite (ferric sulphide) and partly quartz.

The sulphates of iron were readily soluble in water, and could be obtained in a fairly pure state by solution of the crude material in water and recrystallisation.

COMMERCIAL VALUATION AND REMARKS.

This material has probably resulted from the alteration of pyrite. It differs from ordinary "copperas" (sulphate of iron) in containing much less than the normal amount of combined water. It is however soluble in water, and if it occurs in sufficient quantity it might be used in the same way as ordinary copperas, viz. as a disinfectant, and also for the preparation of ink and in the manufacture of mordants for dyeing. The material would only be of commercial value if large quantities are available.

A specimen of decomposing marcasite from the Falkland Islands previously examined at the Imperial Institute (see report dated 11th February, 1908) was found to consist almost wholly of ferric sulphide, which if allowed to decompose completely under moist conditions, would furnish material similar to the present sample.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.**Whaling Regulations.**

Under the power and authority in him vested by section 3 of the "Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908", His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. The period for which Whaling Licenses shall be issued shall commence on the 1st October of each year and terminate on the 30th September of the succeeding year.

2. On and after this date separate Whaling Licenses shall be issued for:—

- (a) The South Shetlands and Graham's Land,
- (b) The South Orkneys,
- (c) The Falkland Islands.

3. Each Whaling License shall be applicable to one floating factory and two steam whalers, and should permission be granted to any applicant by the Governor in Council to employ a third steam whaler a special fee of £100 will require to be paid on this account.

4. No greater number than ten Whaling Licenses shall be issued in any one year for the South Shetlands and Graham's Land.

5. Any applicant for a Whaling License for

- (a) The South Shetlands and Graham's Land, or
- (b) The South Orkneys,

must send in his application so as to reach the Colonial Secretary, Falkland Islands, not later than the 1st June, 1911, and not later than the 1st April in succeeding years.

6. Each application for a Whaling License shall be registered when received in a register to be termed the Whaling License Register.

7. These Regulations shall have no application to South Georgia.

Annual Report by the Chief Inspector of Stock.

Stanley,

14th February, 1911.

Sir,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year, 1910.

Seasons.—The Autumn and Winter were very wet and hard on stock, but the Spring and early Summer were the driest known for years.

Sheep.—The number of sheep in the Colony on May 1st was 724,736, an increase of 9,085 on 1909 and 36,031 more than in 1908.

Lambing.—With the exception of a few very bad nights in the early part of the season, the weather was extremely mild and favourable for the lambs. The return although good did not equal that of last year. The young stock are of a good quality and the lambs from the various stud flocks are of quite a high standard.

Wool.—The reports on exported wool were good. There was a fair demand for Falkland Island wool throughout the year, some of the best quality fetching 1/1d. per lb. The care in sorting and classing which farmers are paying much attention to, is evidently appreciated by home buyers. The new clip promises to be superior in every way to that of recent years, and it is hoped that prices will remain firm.

Dipping.—This has been carried on in a satisfactory manner. Several farmers are endeavouring to rid their flocks of keds (ticks) by dipping twice, and this practice might be followed by others with distinct advantage to their flocks.

Imported Stock.—Thirty-eight Romney Marsh rams were imported from England. These rams were mostly two toothed. Annual importations of sheep of this quality are very materially raising the standard of the stock. Many of the rams on arrival were suffering from bronchial trouble, and a few were affected with "Foot Rot". Two rams developed Malignant Catarrhal Fever, an extremely severe and contagious malady. All however recovered under treatment and were released from Quarantine in 28 days.

I am of opinion that if all imported sheep were dipped while in quarantine, the period of detention might with safety be shortened.

General health of Sheep.—On the whole very good. Intestinal parasites are common and also, but to a lesser extent, lung worms. The camp being badly infested with them, and being also the main source of infection, renders treatment practically impossible. Samples of blood and flesh were received from a district where heavy loss had been experienced in lambs after marking. These, on microscopic examination proved to be Malignant Oedema. The causal organism probably entered the body through a wound, which had become contaminated with infected dirt or earth. Similar examinations have proved the presence of Black Quarter in the Colony. This disease is even more fatal than Anthrax, but usually it is confined to certain districts and even paddocks. It is not however infectious.

Horses.—Although 128 horses were imported, being 58 more than last year, there is still a scarcity of horses in the Colony. Several Stations are breeding horses and some very good foals and colts are to be seen on these farms. Defective teeth are very common and many animals suffer in condition accordingly. Between 70 to 80 horses' mouths were attended to during one of my visits to the camp. A little use of a tooth rasp in the majority of cases is all that is required and will make a great difference to the health of the horses. The idea that Glanders is prevalent amongst the horses is erroneous. The disease may be existent, but although I have looked for its symptoms among hundreds of horses, I have yet to find a suspicious case.

Ditching & Draining.—Much good work is being done in this direction throughout the Colony and especially on the West Falkland.

Wild Birds.—Turkey Buzzards, Corranchos, Johnny Rooks and Geese are all being more or less diminished, more especially the latter. There seems to be no practical method of dealing with the common large Gull, which is thought by many to be a great pest. Nearly £400 was spent during the year on the purchase of Geese, Turkey, Corrancho and Rook Beaks.

An Ordinance

Respecting the use of Government Wharfs.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance—

“Government wharf” shall mean any wharf the property of the Crown which shall be declared to be such by the Governor in Council and published in the Gazette.

“Vessel” shall mean every description of ship, lighter, or floating water tank.

“Boat” shall mean any small open or partly decked vessel, ordinarily propelled by oars.

“Harbour Master” shall mean any person lawfully performing the duties or acting under the orders of the Harbour Master.

“Officer of Customs” shall mean any person duly appointed in writing as such, and shall include the Collector of Customs, and any Deputy Collector of Customs, and all Police Constables.

2. No vessel shall be taken alongside of or made fast to any Government wharf except with the permission of the Harbour Master. Any vessel alongside of or made fast to any such wharf must at any time at the request of the Harbour Master be removed therefrom or shifted from alongside of such wharf. The Master or person in charge of any vessel who shall offend against any of the provisions of this section shall on conviction be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

3. When any vessel of a measurement of not less than two tons shall be placed alongside a Government wharf for the purpose of discharging or taking in cargo or landing or embarking passengers thereat or for any other purpose there shall be paid in respect of such vessel the wharfage charges specified in the Schedule to this Ordinance. Such wharfage shall be paid or secured to the satisfaction of the Harbour Master before such vessel is removed from alongside of such Government wharf. Any person or persons removing any vessel from alongside of any Government wharf without such wharfage being paid or secured as aforesaid shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

4. The measurement of any vessel shall be deemed to be that specified in the register, and in the case of unregistered vessels the Harbour Master shall be the person to determine the tonnage of same.

5. The Governor in Council in the case of any vessel or vessels owned by the same firm or person within the Colony, may, on application being made in writing, permit the wharfage charges payable in respect of such vessel or vessels for any period not exceeding one year to be commuted by the payment in advance of such sum as he may determine subject to such conditions as he may deem expedient.

6. Any vessel employed trading to or within the Colony that has paid the wharfage charge aforesaid at one Government wharf for any one day may for any portion of such day be placed alongside any other Government wharf free of wharfage.

7. Whenever it shall appear necessary to the Harbour Master or any Officer of Customs it shall be lawful for them to prevent any person from coming upon any Government wharf and also to order any person already there to leave the same and any person neglecting or refusing to leave such wharf when requested to do so may be taken into custody without a warrant and shall upon conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

8. The owner or master of any vessel or boat shall be liable for any damage done to any Government wharf, or penalty incurred by such vessel or boat, and such vessel or boat may be detained by order of the Governor until such penalty or damage has been paid.

9. The Master or owner of any vessel or boat from which any ashes, ballast, damaged goods, or dead animals are landed on any Government wharf without permission shall be liable to any penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

10. Any person who leaves or causes to be left on any Government wharf any dead animal, ballast, damaged goods, rubbish, nightsoil, or any other material without the permission of the Harbour Master or an Officer of Customs shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

11. (1.) The Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, or revoke Regulations appertaining to and for the general good management and control of any Government wharf, and such Regulations may provide that any infraction thereof may be punished by fine not exceeding ten pounds.

(2.) Until the Governor in Council makes Regulations under this section, the Regulations in the Schedule to this Ordinance shall be in force and shall be deemed for all purposes to be Regulations made by the Governor in Council under this section.

12. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Wharfage Ordinance, 1911."

SCHEDULE.

The Wharfage Regulations, 1911.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Wharfage Regulations, 1911.

2. The Master or Owner of every vessel of a registered measurement of two tons and over shall pay wharfage to the Harbour Master in accordance with the subjoined scale of charges—

Wharfage duty for one day or any part thereof.

do. 50 do. 60	11/-.
do. 60 do. 70	12/-.

do. 150 tons and upwards	20/-.

3. The Government wharf at the north end of Philomel Street in the town of Stanley shall after the hour of sunset and before the hour of sunrise be the only calling place for all boats plying to or from vessels in the harbour, and it shall not be lawful for any boat to call at any other wharf or place, or to proceed from any other wharf or place on the shore of the harbour after the hour of sunset or before the hour of sunrise without the permission of the Harbour Master or an Officer of Customs.

4. No vessel is to be anchored or moored within twenty yards of the two mooring buoys situated to the North West and North East respectively of the Government wharf at the North end of Philomel Street without the permission of the Harbour Master, or within twenty yards of a straight line drawn between the two mooring buoys.

5. Any vessel while under mail contract with the Government will be exempt from wharfage charges.

6. Any person failing to comply with or offending against these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of two pounds for each offence.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 16th March, 1911.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1910.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for the year was £18,534 11s. 2d. being £2,500 8s. 2d. in excess of the Ordinary Expenditure. This is the highest Revenue so far obtained in this Colony, exceeding that of the previous year by £925 11s. 10d. The receipts exceeded the estimate under every Head except two, i.e. Division IV. (Fines, Fees, &c.) and Division VII. (Rents). The former is always difficult to estimate, while in the case of the latter there was a decrease of £690. This decrease was due to two of the Whaling Companies in South Georgia paying their 1910 rent in 1909, and to the fluctuation in rent explained in my Message to Council when introducing the 1910 Estimates.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1910 (exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary, £1,371, and payments under Live Stock Ordinance, £795) amounted to £16,034 or £2,500 less than the Ordinary Revenue. The comparative statements (A) and (B) attached shew the estimated and actual Revenue and Expenditure under the various Heads.

4. Division II.—**The Governor, £19 os. 3d.**—Items 1, 3 and 7. A portion of the Governor's salary for 1909, amounting to £3 15s. 2d. was paid in 1910. Fees for Marriage Licenses (recoverable) were exceeded by £6; and there was a small over-expenditure under Books for Library.

5. Division III.—**Colonial Secretary, £9 5s. 7d.**—Item 5. The increments due to the Printer's Apprentice, amounting to £9 4s. 5d., were inadvertently omitted when preparing the Estimates.

6. Division IV.—**Treasury and Customs, £145 1s. 7d.**—Items 3, 5, 6 and 9. Deputy Collector, New Island. The salary for this Officer for December, 1909, was paid in 1910. There was an excess of £99 17s. under temporary Customs Officers (recoverable), and of £13 5s. under Shipping Fees. The Acting Customs Officer at Stanley was granted a house and fuel allowance which amounted to £23 6s. 8d.

7. Division VII.—**Legal, £28 8s. 11d.**—Item 1. Part of the salary for 1909 of the Stipendiary Magistrate at South Georgia was paid in 1910.

8. Division VIII.—**Police, £20 17s. 5d.**—Item 5. This over-expenditure was caused by procuring some of the uniform for the Constabulary locally.

9. Division IX.—**Prisons, £114 16s. 2d.**—Items 1 and 6.—The posts of Gaoler and Warder were combined, thus causing an excess of £72 on the Vote, but as against this there was a saving of £84 under item 2, Warder. The clothing vote was exceeded by £42 16s. 2d.: some uniform was purchased locally and cost somewhat more than if imported. There is a supply of boots, warm clothing, etc., in stock.

10. Division X.—**Medical, £151 10s. 7d.**—Items 3 and 9. Certain salary due to the Assistant Colonial Surgeon, West Falkland, in 1909, and amounting to £138 3s. 3d., was not drawn till 1910. There was a small over-expenditure under Medicines.

11. Division XI.—**Education, £76 3s. 7d.**—Items 5, 6 and 8. No suitable Assistant Mistress was procurable at the salary of £70 provided in the Estimates, and it had to be increased to £100. The salary of the second Assistant Mistress was likewise increased by £5. Under the Education Ordinance of 1909 provision was made for Pupil Teachers, and a sum of £40 was disbursed on this account.

12. Division XIII.—**Transport, £22 1s. 5d.**—Item 2. Vote was exceeded by this amount.

13. Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous, £284 2s. 2d.**—Items 4, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12 and 13. There was a small over-expenditure of £4 19s. 6d. under salutes and flags, and of £4 under Capitation Grant to Volunteers. The excess of £187 13s. 3d. under Ammunition was due to the purchase of certain rifles and equipment which were supplied to the Volunteers on the West Falkland with the sanction of the Secretary of State. Seeds and plants for the Government House garden and hothouses, and the renewal of the scrim in the conservatories caused the vote to be exceeded by £13. The over-expenditure (£12 10s.) under Stall, Imperial Institute, was due to the payment of the Colony's contribution to the end of the calendar year instead of to 30th September as formally. The Stationery vote was exceeded by £24 15s. 9d. owing to a considerable number of necessary forms having to be printed at home. The re-organisation of the Stanley Telephone system required the purchase of a 25 switch-board and attachments at a cost of £39.

14. Division XV.—**Post Office, £9 19s. 2d.**—Item 1. A portion of the Postmaster's salary for 1909, amounting to £7 18s. 4d., was paid in 1910.

15. Division XVI.—**Colonial Engineer, £112 10s. 3d.**—Items 3, 15 and 16.—Two Carpenters (£23 12s. 8d.): these men are paid by the hour, and the estimate of £204 was somewhat low. The new Kitson incandescent lamps light the town very much better than the old oil lamps which only made darkness visible, but the extension and improvement of the system demands a somewhat larger consumption of oil than formerly. The over-expenditure on this account including freight on oil was £27; some of the oil is still in stock. The coal and oil estimate for the launch was somewhat exceeded, and the above in conjunction with the purchase of new firebars and zinc plates caused an over-expenditure of £60.

16. Division XXII.—**Public Works Extraordinary, £528 4s. 5d.**—Items 9, 12, 14, 15 and 22. Certain additional piles, copper, decking, &c., also some tram line and trucks, were responsible for an over-expenditure of £329; while the Kitson lamps with freight caused the estimate under this item to be exceeded by £50. The excess of £30 under Cottage, Government Workmen, is accounted for by the substantial paling fence which surrounds the buildings, and the erection of certain necessary outhouses. During the last few years several peat sheds have been built annually with the result that all the Offices and dwelling houses owned by Government have now, with one exception, been supplied with a substantial peat shed. The additional comfort thereby obtained in this damp climate is very marked. The over-expenditure under this item was £28. A new boiler had to be procured for the fire engine at a cost of £262 8s. 10d. Of this sum £174 17s. 2d. was paid from the Fire Brigade Fund, and the balance, £87 11s. 8d., was charged to Public Revenue.

17. Division XXIII.—**Stock Ordinance, £104 8s. 3d.**—Items 4, 6 and 8. A microscope was purchased at a cost of £29, the travelling grant was exceeded by £24, and the diminution of turkey Buzzards increased this particular item by £28. A sum of £21 16s. 9d. due to certain Receivers of Geese Beaks in 1909 was not drawn till 1910.

18. In my Message to Council already referred to I drew attention to the improvement in the Colony's Ordinary Revenue at the end of 1908 as compared with what it was in 1905, being an increase of over 16%. That increase, I am glad to inform you, has now risen to over 21%, and that too without additional taxation. A reference to the Statement of Assets and Liabilities, which will be laid on the Table, will shew that the Colony has Surplus Assets amounting to £76,579 (Land Sales Fund £75,323, Surplus Revenue £1,256) and I have therefore no hesitation in congratulating you upon the Colony's financial condition. As you are aware, there is no Public Debt.

19. Since my return from leave in December last you have appropriated a sum of £3,000 for the purpose of procuring a wireless installation to connect with the International Station which is to be erected at Punta del Este, Uruguay. Experience has already shewn that the intervening 960 miles between Stanley and Punta del Este can be covered at night by a less powerful kilowatt set than the one which it is proposed to erect. I am hopeful therefore that at a non-distant date the isolation which has hitherto handicapped the Colony's development will be broken down, that it will be possible to be in nightly communication with the rest of the British Empire, and that, when that comes about, the 21% increase of Revenue to which I have already alluded will be very substantially increased.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To amend The Probate and Unrepresented Estates Ordinance, 1901.

Whereas it is expedient to amend The Probate and Unrepresented Estates Ordinance, 1901, and make further provision thereto:

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. (1). When any company incorporated according to the laws of some country, possession or place other than this Colony carries on business in this Colony, such company shall make application to the Registrar-General that an office of the company in this Colony, situated as stated in the application, be registered as the registered office of the company for the purposes of this Ordinance.

Companies registered
abroad.

The Application may be made by the company by the hand of an agent or attorney or any person conducting the business of the company in this Colony.

(2). When the company is carrying on business at the date of the commencement of this Ordinance, the application shall be made before the expiration of a period of three months thereafter; and when the company begins to carry on business after the said date, the application shall be made before the expiration of a period of three months after the company begins to carry on business.

(3). If the company fails to make such application before the expiration of the period appointed in this section, it shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds nor less than twenty pounds, and to a further penalty not exceeding two pounds for every day during which the company has carried on business after the expiration of such period.

(4). On the receipt of any such application the Registrar-General shall register the said office of the company in a book to be kept for the purpose, and issue a certificate of registration to the company by posting the same addressed to the company at such registered office.

A copy of each certificate so issued shall be published in the Gazette.

(5). When the situation of the registered office of any such company is changed, notice in writing of such change shall forthwith be given by the company to the Registrar-General, who shall enter the same on the register, and when the certificate of registration is presented to him for that purpose, upon such certificate, and shall publish a copy of such notice in the Gazette.

If any such company fails to give such notice, it shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

(6). Such company within six months after the death of any member thereof (wheresoever such member may have been domiciled), (or such further time as the Registrar-General may allow), shall cause to be delivered to the Registrar-General a return giving the name and address of such member, the date of his death and the number description and value of the shares or other interest in the said company held by such member at the time of his death so far as relates to the business of the said company carried on in this Colony, and shall pay estate duty thereon at the rate prescribed in section 22 of the Principal Ordinance.

If any such return is not delivered in accordance with this subsection, the company making default shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

Moreover, such duty shall be deemed to be a debt due by the company to His Majesty, and shall be recoverable accordingly in any Court of competent jurisdiction.

(7). Any writ or other process issued in pursuance of this Ordinance against any such company may be served by being left at the registered office of the company with some person there, or if there is no registered office or no person is found at the registered office, by being affixed at the office of the Registrar.

(8). Production of the Gazette purporting to contain the copy of a certificate of registration issued under this section shall for the purposes of proceedings in any court of Justice or for any other purpose be evidence that the office of such company has been duly registered under this Ordinance and is situated as mentioned in the certificate.

Production of the Gazette purporting to contain the copy of a notice of the change of the situation of a registered office shall for the purposes aforesaid be evidence that the registered office of the company mentioned therein has been so changed.

2. When a member of a company registered under this Ordinance or "The Companies Ordinance, 1898," or any Ordinance amending or repealing the same, dies after the commencement of this Ordinance, wheresoever such member may have been domiciled, estate duty shall be chargeable on the value of the shares or other interest held by such member at the time of his death.

Companies registered in this Colony.

The Secretary or Attorney in this Colony of such company shall within six months of the death of such member notify the Registrar-General of the name and address of such member, the date of his death and the number, description and value of the shares or other interest in the said company held by such member at the time of his death, and the company shall through such Secretary or Attorney pay the estate duty thereon at the rate prescribed in section 22 of the Principal Ordinance.

Any such Secretary or Attorney who refuses or neglects so to notify the Registrar-General shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of fifty pounds.

3. Any payment by a company of estate duty imposed in respect of shares or other interest in that company held by such deceased member shall be deemed to be a payment on behalf of the personal estate of such member, and may by the company be deducted from any moneys payable by the company to the representative of such deceased member in respect of such shares or interest, or be recovered by action from such representative, and the company shall have a first and paramount lien upon such shares or interest for the amount of such payment.

Use of peat on Swedish Railways.

(Board of Trade Journal, 2nd March, 1911).

With reference to the notice on p. 433 of the "Board of Trade Journal" of 4th March, 1909, relative to the use of peat on the Swedish State Railways, H.M. Consul at Stockholm (Mr. H. M. Villiers, M.V.O.) reports that the Board of Railway Directors on a previous occasion showed that a mixture of coal and peat containing up to 50 per cent of peat, could be used in certain cases without the power of traction of the engine being reduced to any great extent. The Board have now had plans prepared for goods train engines of two types to burn peat only. The larger engine, for which two firemen will be necessary, will weigh with the tender about 101 metric tons when in use, and will possess a material weight of $73\frac{1}{2}$ tons; it will have about the same power of traction as an engine burning coal and weighing about 83 and 59 tons. The smaller engine to take peat will weigh 75 and $56\frac{1}{2}$ tons and will have about the same drawing power as a coal-burning engine weighing about 60 and 44 tons.

Medical and Sanitary Report on the Falkland Islands for the year 1910.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Population.

The estimated population of the Falkland Islands was 2,356 on December 31st, 1910. There were 47 births and 14 deaths during the year. The birth rate was 20·23 per 1000 as compared with 23·08 in 1909. The death rate was 6·02 per 1000 as against 8·06 in 1909.

The birth rate is a lower one than that of any European country with the exception of France, which is 20·00 per 1000; the United Kingdom having a birth rate of over 26·00 per 1000. The average death rate in England is about 14 per 1000, the healthiest county there having a rate of slightly over 12 per 1000. These figures are misleading unless one remembers that the population of these islands is an exceptional one owing to the immigration of young men who frequently leave the Colony when past middle age. Males are greatly in excess of females, the proportion being as much as 3 : 2.

It is very satisfactory to note that no death occurred of persons between the ages of 8 months and 40 years. I find the rate of infant mortality compares very favourably with that of England and bears witness to the care which mothers here devote to their off-spring. The three deaths of infants were due to Premature Birth, Congenital Deformity, and Convulsions.

Public Health.

1. The Health of the Colony has, with the exception of an epidemic of Scarlet Fever and Influenza, been satisfactory throughout the year.

Scarlet Fever appears to have been imported from the West Falkland early in the year. The first case in Stanley occurred in January and at irregular intervals was followed by 8 other cases. No deaths occurred and the majority of cases were not of a very severe type. I fear other mild cases were not brought to my notice.

2. In July Influenza attacked at least 50 per cent of the inhabitants of Stanley. The disease was apparently imported from Buenos Aires where it was prevalent. The earlier cases were liable to lung complications: convalescence as usual in this complaint was very protracted. Towards the end of the year there was a marked recrudescence of the disease when in most cases the digestive organs were affected with severe vomiting, and diarrhoea. It is much to be regretted that the epidemics of Influenza which have been common to most of the world since 1889 cannot be prevented, as they indirectly greatly increase the death rate and by the great depression of spirits and nervous exhaustion caused add materially to human suffering. The Falkland Islands with their damp, cold climate will be very liable to this disease.

3. In spite of the force of the strong prevailing wind which usually arouses into fatal activity the hitherto dormant tubercule bacillus, it is interesting to note that although diseases of the Respiratory system especially Bronchitis are prevalent here, Phthisis and other forms of Human Tuberculosis are fortunately almost absent from these Islands. I have only seen two cases during the 18 months I have been here, and in one of these cases the disease was contracted in Patagonia. This fact is the more striking as the disease is found in the sheep here, and contrary to the belief prevalent a few years ago Human and Animal Tuberculosis are now admitted by all authorities to be identical diseases.

4. Pharyngitis was as usual prevalent and some cases of Acute Tonsillitis were seen; this disease is associated with insanitary conditions, overcrowding, lack of ventilation, exposure to cold and wet. Many houses in Stanley are overcrowded, containing more than one family: more houses are urgently required in the town. A philanthropic person would benefit the health and comfort of the community by erecting some. The rate of wages is high, and as unfortunately all material has to be imported from abroad, housebuilding is not here as in most places a profitable investment.

5. There can be no doubt that the health of the people in Stanley would benefit if the consumption of alcohol was diminished. In spite of the high duty far too much is used. Strong beer is largely drunk by the working classes. In the absence of statistics one does not wish to insist too strongly on personal impressions, but I should be surprised if

the amount of alcohol consumed per head by the population here is not found to be largely in excess of the average quantity used per head in an English sea-port town. Except in the cases of children or habitual drunkards it is probably not wise, and certainly not practical to attempt to regulate the amount of alcohol consumed by direct legislation. A late Archbishop had the moral courage to tell us "It is better for England to be free than sober" but I am sure he would have agreed that it was still better for a people to be both free and sober. The position in the Falklands is an exceptional one. A man on some stations in the camp is unable to obtain any alcohol, at other stations he has a small reasonable amount doled out to him at regular intervals. He comes into Stanley perhaps once a year for a little relaxation. While his money lasts he has no difficulty in finding companions to help him spend it, and too frequently, before leaving again for the camp with an empty pocket, requires medical treatment.

Perhaps I may be allowed to suggest that it would be wise to consider whether it would be possible and expedient at some future date to adopt in Stanley what is known as the "Gothenburg System". Under this system alcohol would be sold either by a Municipal Board or Government alone, the salesman having no interest in the quantity sold. In this town there would only be one large Inn where a man could obtain very comfortable lodgings and good board at reasonable prices. Alcohol would be obtainable but kept rather in the background. If some such scheme was adopted I am of opinion that the evil would be checked at its origin, and that it would not be necessary for a town like Stanley with only 1,000 inhabitants to have no less than 15 men placed on the Black List in a single year.

6. Dyspepsia is prevalent. It would be diminished if people remembered that they ought not to take tea and meat at the same time, also that the tea should be poured away from the leaves and never allowed to infuse for more than ten minutes.

It is however partly due to the exceptionally bad teeth from which nearly all Falkland Islanders suffer. A good dentist would probably find an annual visit to this place greatly to his financial advantage.

Water Supply.

Owing to the drought in the Spring and Summer many of the inhabitants of Stanley suffered serious inconvenience from lack of water. Fortunately on the break up of the drought only a few cases of dysenteric diarrhœa occurred in Stanley. The water supply which mainly consists of rain water collected from the roofs of the houses is a very unsatisfactory one and should not be used unless previously boiled, as besides the slight risk of lead poisoning from the use of ordinary lead paints a great deal of filth is deposited as dust on the roofs which is washed by the rain into the water cisterns. The sanitary arrangement by which the night-soil is collected by sanitary carts and discharged into the sea has diminished the danger, but until the inhabitants have a pure water supply one does not feel secure from such an outbreak of Dysentery as occurred in 1907 when 18% of the population of Stanley were treated for this disease. I hope it will be found possible to supply the town with pure water at no distant date. Ten gallons per day per head would probably be required.

Quarantine.

All vessels on arrival in the Colony were boarded by the Medical Officer of Health and enquiries made regarding the health of crew and passengers, but in no case was it found necessary to place any vessel in Quarantine. The Regulations limit "Infectious or contagious diseases" to "Cholera", "Yellow Fever", "Small-pox" and "The Plague". At present there is no danger of the introduction of Cholera: Yellow Fever could not exist in the Falkland Islands: A well vaccinated community need not dread Small-pox. Plague has however become a disease with which the world has to reckon. This disease in the 14th century when known as the Black Death had an enormous mortality, 25% of the population of Europe was carried off by this epidemic. England losing $\frac{2}{3}$ or $\frac{3}{4}$ of her population. The visitation called "The Great Plague" in 1665 is better known but was not so serious. From this date there was a gradual retrocession of the disease from Europe until it became for the whole world, with the exception of the extreme south-east of Europe, the adjoining part of Asia and Egypt, merely a subject of historical interest and of no practical importance. The sudden reversal of this long process is a very striking occurrence and since 1880 plague has once more gradually taken its place among the diseases with which the whole world has to reckon, and has now to be fought with all the resources of modern science. Plague for the first time in history made its appearance on the American continent in 1898. Since that date there has been several outbreaks on this side of the Atlantic. A few cases occurred in Brazil during the past year. The domestic rat plays a most important part in the dissemination of this

disease. I think the Falkland Islands would be wise to join the crusade which is at present being so widely waged against this animal. Rat virus is frequently found very effective and if boys were paid 1d. per head, this pest might for a time be almost exterminated in these islands.

Vaccination.

The lymph received from Buenos Aires monthly is of good quality and has given every satisfaction. The number of successful cases was 44.

Victoria Cottage Home.

During the past year Nurse Davies attended 28 Medical or Surgical cases, and 24 Maternity cases, an increase of 3 and 9 respectively. The total number of visits paid by her being 1,123 an increase of 396 on the previous year. She has always performed her duties in a thorough and conscientious manner. I regret she is shortly leaving the Colony on the termination of her contract.

The Victoria Cottage Home has one permanent resident and during the year three other Falkland Island patients were admitted, one of whom died, the remaining two after a few weeks were discharged cured. Last December illustrated the usefulness of the Institution when for several weeks there were no less than six other inmates, including three cases of fractured limbs from a ship in distress and one amputation case from a Whaler.

Medical Report, West Falklands.

Epitome of Dr. Turner's Report on the West Falkland for 1910-11.

Certain diseases recur regularly every year in the West Falkland.

1. Diseases of the Alimentary System	50%.
2. Diseases of the Respiratory System	24%.

Other diseases depending principally on occupation—

Diseases of the Skin	6%.
Diseases of Bursae	2·21%.

Diseases of the Digestive System.

- Causes—
- I. Defective and decayed teeth.
 - II. Improper food.
 - III. Tobacco chewing, etc.

Scrupulous care should be taken of the teeth; they should be cleaned twice a day with antiseptic tooth paste. All food should be thoroughly chewed before it is swallowed, and improper articles of food such as stewed tea, highly seasoned dishes and tobacco chewing should be avoided. The consumption of spirits, especially when taken on an empty stomach, has a most damaging effect on the delicate lining membrane.

Diseases of the Respiratory System.

Many diseases originate in a common cold in the head. To avoid colds all living rooms should be well ventilated and wet clothing should be changed at the earliest opportunity.

Diseases of the Skin.

Boils are common. They are caused by a microbe when the bodily resistance is lowered by any cause, such as a too exclusive meat diet, bad ventilation, &c. To prevent boils the patient should stop all riding until every boil has been healed for one week. He should eat very little meat and take plenty of vegetables.

II. Social conditions.

The conditions under which the working classes live are usually excellent. Wages are good, houses and mutton are provided. Free fuel and vegetables, and in many cases fresh milk and butter, can be obtained by personal labour.

There is no unemployment. The universal prosperity, health and comfort enjoyed by the families of the industrial population of the West Falklands must be quite unique. Mutton is the principal food of the people.

III. Water.

This is of a high degree of purity everywhere. It is however deficient in lime salts and phosphates, and to correct this deficiency plenty of vegetables should be taken and some form of chemical food or compressed tablets of hypophosphate of lime.

IV. Domestic Hygiene.

Ventilation is neglected. In many houses the windows are nailed up. As people become more enlightened and educated they will realise the importance of this subject and understand that ventilation does not mean "draught".

Clothing. The clothing worn seems well suited to the climate.

Cookhouses. From the hygienic point of view there is still much to be desired with regard to cookhouses nearly all of which need painting on the inside, and I regret

Trespass Ordinance, 1904.

Rules relating to the depasturing of animals upon the Common, or upon Crown Waste Land, framed under section 14 of Ordinance V., of 1904.

1. All grazing Licenses will be issued by the Chief Constable, and all applications for same must be made either personally or in writing to this Officer.

2. Annual Grazing Licenses to depasture animals on the Common for any one year will only be issued in the month of January, and not later than the 15th, unless the animal for which a License is applied is imported or purchased after this date.

3. Grazing Licenses to depasture animals on the Common for any period not exceeding one month may be issued at any time, and such License shall take effect from the date on which the License fee is paid to the Chief Constable, and terminate in the following month on the day preceding the date of payment.

4. "Season" Grazing Licenses to depasture animals on the Common for the period from 1st October to 31st March inclusive may be issued on or after 1st October in any one year on payment of half the yearly fee provided in the First Schedule of the Ordinance.

5. Information must be given as soon as possible to the Chief Constable by the owner of any Calf or Foal not exceeding one year, which may be on the Common, in order that a Free Pass, in the form "A" attached may be issued for such animal or animals.

6. Licenses to graze tethered animals on certain Crown Waste Lands, in the town of Stanley for a period of eight consecutive months commencing from the 1st day of September, to be put up to public auction at 2 p.m. on the second Saturday in the month of August in each year, or as soon thereafter as possible. A fortnight's notice of such auction to be posted on the Gazette Board stating the place where such auction will be held, and the conditions and upset prices of such licenses.

7. A list of Licenses and Passes, to be published quarterly in the Government Gazette, and placed on the Gazette Board.

8. All animals found on the Common to be rounded up at least once in every twelve months, and a list and description of all animals found thereon, without a license, to be placed on the Gazette Board.

9. All previous Rules are hereby revoked.

The Infants are well taught.

Teachers are to be congratulated on their work, which is throughout characterized by right methods of instruction.

The strength of the Staff has been added to, by the appointment of Pupil Teachers, who will, as years pass by, become more and more useful.

In the "Camps" the Itinerant Schoolmasters are doing good work. Efforts are being made to bring about the use of similar text books to those in the Government Schools. This will be of special benefit to those children who remove from time to time from the camp to Stanley.

In Lafonia the Falkland Islands Company employ a resident Schoolmaster at Darwin, and two Itinerant Schoolmasters in their "Camp".

2. Although regular mails were received and despatched and other Postal business transacted since the year 1880, this is the first report on the Post Office that has been made.

POST OFFICE RECEIPTS.

The receipts for the year amounted to £1458 12s. 6d. or £482 16s. 0d. more than the amount received in 1909 (vide appendix A.)

The increase in the receipts for the year is accounted for partly by the large sale of postage stamps after the death of His Most Gracious Majesty King Edward the VII ; to the sales of stamps at the Post Offices at Fox Bay, New Island and South Georgia, and to the increased parcel mails received from the United Kingdom.

EXPENDITURE.

The Expenditure for the year, including the subsidy of £2,500 paid to the Pacific Steam Navigation Co., amounted to £3359 2s. 0d. (vide appendix B).

POST OFFICES.

During the latter part of the year 1909 it was found necessary, owing to the growth of the Whaling Industry in the Colony and its Dependencies, to afford increased Postal facilities and better control over Postal matters, and Post Offices were accordingly established at New Island, West Falkland, and at South Georgia, a Deputy Postmaster being appointed in charge of each Office.

In addition to ordinary Postal business, the Post Offices at New Island and Fox Bay issue Money Orders, Register letters, Insure parcels, &c., these being despatched to England through the Head Office at Stanley.

The Money Order and Parcel systems have not up to the present been extended to South Georgia, ordinary postal business only being transacted at that Office. Mails to and from Europe for South Georgia are received and sent through the Post Office at Buenos Aires Mails between the Colony and South Georgia being dealt with in a similar manner except when an opportunity offers to communicate direct.

POSTAL.

The total number of postal packets of every description received and despatched (including figures received from South Georgia) was 142,337 or 14,951 in excess of the number handled last year. This increase is in a large measure accounted for by the considerable amount of correspondence received for, and sent by, persons engaged in the Whale Fishing Industry in the Colony and its Dependencies, and also to the advantage

taken by the Public of low rates of postage on letters and parcels. For comparative statement see appendix C.

PARCEL POST.

The number and value of parcels received from and despatched to the United Kingdom during the year was 5,352 value £8222 15s. 1d., or an increase in number of 611, value £1128 2s. 2d. over the number received from and despatched to the United Kingdom during the year 1909. In order to cope with the large number of parcels received it was found necessary to enlarge the parcel room. This has recently been done and the sorting and delivery of parcels are thereby very much facilitated.

MONEY ORDERS.

Issued. 2222 Money Orders of the value of £9,131 5s. 4d. were issued on the United Kingdom and other countries during the year, an increase in value over the previous year of £429 1s. 5d.

Paid. 74 Money Orders to the value of £259 2s. 7d. were paid during the year, an increase in number over the previous year of 22, but a decrease in value of £89 7s 6d.

POSTAL ORDERS.

During the year 1,587 Postal Orders value £654 11s. 6d. were sold giving a slight increase over the previous year of 18 postal orders value £3 4s. 6d. These figures would show that as a means of remitting small amounts Postal Orders are largely used.

174 Postal Orders value £79 14s. 0d. were paid in the Colony as against 152 paid last year value £57 17s. 7d.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Details of the sales of ordinary postage stamps, post cards and embossed envelopes will be found in Appendix D. The total value of postage stamps, post cards and envelopes sold during the year was £1115 17s. 3½d. or an increase over last years figures of £444 16s. 4d.

The 1d. postage stamp commanded the highest sale, the total number sold being 54,104. The ½d stamp had the next largest sale the total number sold being 28,507. Next in order comes the 2½d. stamp with a sale of 13,082. There was a considerable increase in the sale of 1/- 3/- and 5/- stamps. The sale of post cards was small, only 185 being sold, this is probably due to the large use of picture post cards.

MAIL SERVICES.

The mail packet service was performed throughout the year by the Pacific Steam Navigation Co., Ltd., 13 calls outward and 13 calls homeward being made. The Time Table was kept with great regularity.

INTER-INSULAR SERVICE.

At the beginning of the year mails for the West Falkland were carried by schooner. This service was found unsatisfactory and towards the middle of the year was succeeded by a steam mail service with vessels owned by Messrs. C. Salvesen & Co., of Leith under contract with the Colonial Government. The mails were carried between Stanley, Fox Bay and New Island with calls at intermediate stations. This service, as regards carriage of mails, was found to work extremely well and residents on the West Falklands had the advantage, hitherto unknown, of receiving their mails two days after they were received from Europe. In no single instance was the homeward mail steamer missed. The S.S. "Columbus" a vessel better adapted to the carriage of mails and passengers than the steam whalers, recently arrived and has commenced her duties in accordance with the terms of the Contract entered into with Messrs. Salvesen & Co.

PERSONAL.

During the year under report Mr. George Hurst, Postmaster, who returned from leave in April, retired in November after a long service in the Colony. In the same month Mr. Craigie-Halkett was appointed to act as Postmaster. Miss Willis (now Mrs. W. Wade) an efficient Post Office Assistant tendered her resignation after 10 years service, and has been succeeded by the recent appointment of Mr. A. Newing to be Post Office Clerk.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copies of two International Maritime Conventions, which were signed at a Conference held in Brussels in September last, (a) for the unification of certain rules of law with respect to collisions and (b) for the unification of certain rules of law with respect to assistance and salvage at sea.

2. It is very desirable that these conventions should be adhered to by all portions of the Empire, unless in any particular instance there should be strong reasons to the contrary; and I therefore propose to notify the adherence of the Colony under your Government on the 1st of June next unless I receive from you in the meantime any representations against the adoption of such a course.

**Convention for the Unification of certain rules of law
with respect to Collisions.**

ARTICLE 1.

Where a collision occurs between sea-going vessels or between sea-going vessels and vessels of inland navigation, the compensation due for damages caused to the vessels, or to any things or persons on board thereof, shall be settled in accordance with the following provisions, in whatever waters the collision takes place.

ARTICLE 2.

If the collision is accidental, if it is caused by *force majeure*, or if the cause of the collision is left in doubt, the damages are borne by those who have suffered them.

This provision is applicable notwithstanding the fact that the vessels, or any one of them, may be at anchor (or otherwise made fast) at the time of the casualty.

ARTICLE 3.

If the collision is caused by the fault of one of the vessels, liability to make good the damage attaches to the one which has committed the fault.

ARTICLE 4.

If two or more vessels are in fault the liability of each vessel is in proportion to the degree of the faults respectively committed. Provided that if, having regard to the circumstances, it is not possible to establish the degree of the respective faults, or if it appears that the faults are equal, the liability is apportioned equally.

The damages caused, either to the vessels or to their cargoes or to the effects or other property of the crews, passengers, or other persons on board, are borne by the vessels in fault in the above proportions, and even to third parties, a vessel is not liable for more than such proportion of such damages.

In respect of damages caused by death or personal injuries the vessels in fault are jointly as well as severally liable to third parties, without prejudice however to the right of the vessel which has paid a larger part than that which, in accordance with the provisions of the first paragraph of this article, she ought ultimately to bear, to obtain a contribution from the other vessel or vessels in fault.

It is left to the law of each country to determine, as regards such right to obtain contribution, the meaning and effect of any contract or provision of law which limits the liability of the owners of a vessel towards persons on board.

ARTICLE 5.

The liability imposed by the preceding Articles attaches in cases where the collision is caused by the fault of a pilot, even when the pilot is carried by compulsion of law.

ARTICLE 6.

The right of action for the recovery of damages resulting from a collision is not conditional upon the entering of a protest or the fulfilment of any other special formality.

All legal presumptions of fault in regard to liability for collision are abolished.

ARTICLE 7.

Actions for the recovery of damages are barred after an interval of two years from the date of the casualty.

The period within which an action must be instituted for enforcing the right to obtain contribution permitted by paragraph 3 of Article 4, is one year from the date of payment.

The grounds upon which the said periods of limitation may be suspended or interrupted are determined by the law of the Court where the case is tried.

The High Contracting Parties reserve to themselves the right to provide, by legislation in their respective countries, that the said periods shall be extended in cases where it has not been possible to arrest the defendant vessel in the territorial waters of the State in which the plaintiff has his domicile or principal place of business.

ARTICLE 8.

After a collision, the master of each of the vessels in collision is bound, so far as he can do so without serious danger to his vessel, her crew and her passengers, to render

assistance to the other vessel, her crew and passengers.

He is likewise bound so far as possible to make known the name of his vessel and the port to which she belongs, and also the names of the ports from which she comes and to which she is bound.

A breach of the above provisions does not of itself impose any liability on the owner of a vessel.

ARTICLE 9.

The High Contracting Parties whose legislation does not forbid infringements of the preceding Article bind themselves to take or to propose to their respective legislatures the measures necessary for the prevention of such infringements.

The High Contracting Parties will communicate to one another as soon as possible the laws or regulations which have already been or may be hereafter promulgated in their States for giving effect to the above undertaking.

ARTICLE 10.

Without prejudice to any conventions which may hereafter be made, the provisions of this Convention do not affect in any way the law in force in each country with regard to the limitation of shipowners' liability, nor do they affect the legal obligations arising from contracts of carriage or from any other contracts.

ARTICLE 11.

This Convention does not apply to ships of war or to Government ships appropriated exclusively to a public service.

ARTICLE 12.

The provisions of this Convention shall be applied as regards all persons interested when all the vessels concerned in any action belong to contracting States, and in any other cases for which the national laws provide.

Provided always that—

- (1) As regards persons interested who belong to a non-contracting State the application of the above provisions may be made conditional upon reciprocity.
- (2) Where all the persons interested belong to the same State as the Court trying the case, the provisions of the national law and not of the Convention are applicable.

ARTICLE 13.

This Convention extends to the making good of damages which a vessel has caused to another vessel, or to goods or persons on board either vessel, either by the execution or non-execution of a manœuvre or by the non-observance of the regulations, even if no collision has actually taken place.

ARTICLE 14.

Any one of the High Contracting Parties shall have the right, three years after this Convention comes into force, to call for a fresh conference with view to possible amendments, and particularly with a view to extending, if possible, the sphere of its application.

Any Power exercising this right must notify its intention to the other Powers, through the Belgian Government, which will make arrangements for convening the Conference within six months.

ARTICLE 15.

States which have not signed this Convention are allowed to adhere to it on request. Such adhesion shall be notified through the diplomatic channel to the Belgian Government, and by the latter to each of the other Governments; it shall become effective one month after the sending of the notification by the Belgian Government.

ARTICLE 16.

This Convention shall be ratified. After an interval of at most one year from the day when the Convention is signed, the Belgian Government shall place itself in communication with the Governments of the High Contracting Parties which have declared themselves prepared to ratify the Convention, with a view to deciding whether it should be put into force.

The ratifications shall, if so decided, be deposited forthwith at Brussels, and the Convention shall come into force a month afterwards.

The protocol shall remain open another year in favour of the States represented at the Brussels Conference. After this interval they can only adhere to it on conforming with the provisions of Article 15.

ARTICLE 17.

In the case of one or other of the High Contracting Parties denouncing this Convention, such denunciation shall not take effect until a year after the day on which it has been notified to the Belgian Government, and the Convention shall remain in force as between the other Contracting Parties.

ADDITIONAL ARTICLE.

Notwithstanding anything in the provisions of Article 16, it is agreed that it shall not be obligatory to give effect to the provisions of Article 5, establishing liability in cases where a collision is caused by the fault of a pilot carried by compulsion of law, until the High Contracting Parties shall have arrived at an agreement on the subject of the limitation of liability of shipowners.

In witness whereof, the Plenipotentiaries of the several High Contracting Parties have signed this Convention and have affixed their seals hereto.

Drawn up at Brussels, one copy, September 23rd, 1910.

Convention for the Unification of certain rules of law with respect to Assistance and Salvage at Sea.

ARTICLE 1.

Assistance and salvage of sea-going vessels in danger, of any things on board, of freight and passage money, and also services of the same nature rendered by sea-going vessels to vessels of inland navigation or *vice versa*, are subject to the following provisions, without any distinction being drawn between the two kinds of service, viz., assistance and salvage, and in whatever waters the services have been rendered.

ARTICLE 2.

Every act of assistance or salvage which has had a useful result gives a right to equitable remuneration.

No remuneration is due if the services rendered have no beneficial result.

In no case shall the sum to be paid exceed the value of the property salvaged.

ARTICLE 3.

Persons who have taken part in salvage operations notwithstanding the express and reasonable prohibition on the part of the vessel to which the services were rendered have no right to any remuneration.

ARTICLE 4.

A tug has no right to remuneration for assistance or to salvage of the vessel she is towing or of the vessel's cargo, except where she has rendered exceptional services which cannot be considered as rendered in fulfilment of the contract of towage.

ARTICLE 5.

Remuneration is due notwithstanding that the salvage services have been rendered by or to vessels belonging to the same owner.

ARTICLE 6.

The amount of remuneration is fixed by agreement between the parties and, failing agreement, by the Court.

The proportion in which the remuneration is to be distributed amongst the salvors is fixed in the same manner.

The apportionment of the remuneration amongst the owner, master and other persons in the service of each salving vessel shall be determined by the law of the vessels flag.

ARTICLE 7.

Every agreement as to assistance or salvage entered into at the moment and under the influence of danger may, at the request of either party, be annulled or modified by the Court if it considers that the conditions agreed upon are not equitable.

In all cases, when it is proved that the consent of one of the parties is vitiated by fraud or concealment or when the remuneration is, in proportion to the services rendered, in an excessive degree too large or too small, the agreement may be annulled or modified by the Court at the request of the party affected.

ARTICLE 8.

The remuneration is fixed by the Court according to the circumstances of each case on the basis of the following considerations:—(a) firstly, the measure of success obtained, the efforts and deserts of the salvors, the danger run by the salvaged vessel, by her passengers, crew and cargo, by the salvors, and by the salvaging vessel; the time expended, the expenses incurred and losses suffered, and the risks of liability and other risks run by the salvors, and also the value of the property exposed to such risks, due regard being had to the special appropriation (if any) of the salvors' vessel for salvage purposes; (b) secondly, the value of the property salvaged.

The same considerations apply for the purpose of fixing the apportionment provided for by the second paragraph of Article 6.

The Court may deprive the salvors of all remuneration, or may award a reduced remuneration, if it appears that the salvors have by their fault rendered the salvage or assistance necessary, or have been guilty of theft, fraudulent concealment, or other acts of fraud.

ARTICLE 9.

No remuneration is due from persons whose lives are saved, but nothing in this Article shall affect the provisions of the national laws on this subject.

Salvors of human life, who have taken part in the services rendered on the occasion of the accident giving rise to salvage or assistance, are entitled to a fair share of the remuneration awarded to the salvors of the vessel, her cargo, and accessories.

ARTICLE 10.

A salvage action is barred after an interval of two years from the day on which the operations of assistance or salvage terminate.

The grounds upon which the said period of limitation may be suspended or interrupted are determined by the law of the Court where the case is tried.

The High Contracting Parties reserve to themselves the right to provide, by legislation in their respective countries, that the said period shall be extended in cases where it has not been possible to arrest the vessel assisted or salvaged in the territorial waters of the State in which the plaintiff has his domicile or principal place of business.

ARTICLE 11.

Every master is bound, so far as he can do so without serious danger to his vessel, her crew and her passengers, to render assistance to everybody, even though an enemy, found at sea in danger of being lost.

The owner of a vessel incurs no liability by reason of contravention of the above provision.

ARTICLE 12.

The High Contracting Parties whose legislation does not forbid infringements of the preceding Article bind themselves to take or to propose to their respective legislatures the measures necessary for the prevention of such infringements.

The High Contracting Parties will communicate to one another as soon as possible the laws or regulations which have already been or may be hereafter promulgated in their States for giving effect to the above undertaking.

ARTICLE 13.

This Convention does not affect the provisions of national laws or international treaties as regards the organisation of services of assistance and salvage by or under the control of public authorities, nor, in particular, does it affect such laws or treaties on the subject of the salvage of fishing gear.

ARTICLE 14.

This Convention does not apply to ships of war or to Government ships appropriated exclusively to a public service.

ARTICLE 15.

The provisions of this Convention shall be applied as regards all persons interested when either the assisting or salving vessel or the vessel assisted or salvaged belongs to one of the Contracting States, and in any other cases for which the national laws provide.

Provided always that—

- (1) As regards persons interested who belong to a non-contracting State the application of the above provisions may be made conditional upon reciprocity.
- (2) Where all the persons interested belong to the same State as the Court trying the case, the provisions of the national law and not of the Convention are applicable.
- (3) Without prejudice to any wider provisions of any national laws, Article 11 only applies as between vessels belonging to the States of the High Contracting Parties.

ARTICLE 16.

Any one of the High Contracting Parties shall have the right, three years after this Convention comes into force, to call for a fresh Conference with a view to possible amendments, and particularly with a view to extending, if possible, the sphere of its application.

Any Power exercising this right must notify its intention to the other Powers, through the Belgian Government, which will make arrangements for convening the Conference within six months.

ARTICLE 17.

States which have not signed this Convention are allowed to adhere to it on request. Such adhesion shall be notified through the diplomatic channel to the Belgian Government, and by the latter to each of the other Governments; it shall become effective one month after the sending of the notification by the Belgian Government.

ARTICLE 18.

This Convention shall be ratified. After an interval of at most one year from the day on which the Convention is signed, the Belgian Government shall place itself in communication with the Governments of the High Contracting Parties which have declared themselves prepared to ratify the Convention, with a view to deciding whether it should be put into force.

The ratifications shall, if so decided, be deposited forthwith at Brussels, and the Convention shall come into force a month afterwards.

The protocol shall remain open another year in favour of the States represented at the Brussels Conference. After this interval they can only adhere to it on conforming with the provisions of Article 17.

ARTICLE 19.

In the case of one or other of the High Contracting Parties denouncing this Convention, such denunciation shall not take effect until a year after the day on which it has been notified to the Belgian Government, and the Convention shall remain in force as between the other Contracting Parties.

In witness whereof, the Plenipotentiaries of the respective States have signed this Convention and have affixed their seals thereto.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To validate certain proceedings of the Legislative Council.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. All Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Legislative Council during the period from 10th February to 30th May, 1911, inclusive, shall be as valid as if the Legislative Council had been legally constituted.

Report on Minerals from the South Shetland Islands

by PROFESSOR WYNDHAM R. DUNSTAN, M.A., F.R.S., Director.

The two mineral specimens which are the subject of this report were forwarded to the Imperial Institute by the Colonial Office with letter No. 12247/11 dated 22nd April, 1911.

The specimens consisted of (1) Copper ore and (2) quartz. The results of their examination are given below.

COPPER ORE.

This specimen weighed 28 grams, and consisted of a mixture of chrysocolla (hydrated copper silicate) and hydrated copper carbonate. It was analysed with the following results:—

Ore represented by this sample would be worth about 9s. a ton per unit per cent of metallic copper present, provided the quantity of copper does not fall below 10 per cent.

If ore of similar quality to the present sample is available in large quantities it will be valuable as a source of copper. Such material usually occurs as a surface alteration product, and may be taken as an indication that sulphide of copper occurs beneath the surface. The locality is worth examination for copper ore.

QUARTZ.

This was a piece of massive white quartz, weighing 55 grams. It was not of promising character as an ore of gold, and was too small for assay.

Sealing in the Dependencies.

Attention is drawn to Sections 7 and 8 of the Seal Fishery (Dependencies) Ordinance, 1909, which are as follows:—

7. Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel, who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in killing or taking seals, or who shall permit or negligently suffer any person belonging to such vessel to be employed in killing or taking seals, in the Dependencies or the Colonial Waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance, shall forfeit any seals so killed or taken, and any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding three hundred pounds for each offence.

8. Any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds for each such offence, and to forfeit any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession:—

- (a) Kills, takes, or hunts, or attempts to kill or take, any seal in the Dependencies or the Colonial Waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance.
- (b) Has in his possession, or in any vessel under his command, any seal, seal-oil, or skins, for the lawful possession of which he cannot account satisfactorily.

RULES.

1. The Nurse is a Government Servant and immediately under the control of the Colonial Surgeon.
2. All applications for the Nurse's Services must be made to the Colonial Surgeon or the Assistant Colonial Surgeon; in midwifery cases alone application may be made direct to the nurse.
3. Persons paying an annual subscription of 5/- will be entitled to the free services of the Nurse for their families in all cases except midwifery when the fee shall be 21/-.
4. The services of the Nurse can also be obtained by non-subscribers when the fee to be paid shall be determined by the Colonial Surgeon.
5. Subscribers are not to exercise any control or supervision over the Nurse.
6. It will be the duty of the Nurse to attend rich or poor, as directed by the Colonial Surgeon.
7. A report of all midwifery cases attended by the Nurse alone must be made to the Colonial Surgeon.
8. Professional visits, other than midwifery cases, prescribing and the recommendation of drugs or appliances are strictly prohibited.
9. The Nurse will attend at the Surgery when requested.
10. The Nurse will keep a record of all cases attended by her and at the end of each month a list of the same shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Nurse Fund.
11. All accounts shall be published annually in the Gazette and shall be open to inspection on application to the Colonial Surgeon.
12. Complaints shall be investigated and dealt with by the Colonial Surgeon. In serious cases a full report to be submitted to the Governor for his decision.
13. The Rules of 12th May, 1906, are hereby repealed.

In all cases where traces of blood are found in the milk, or the udders of a cow seem unhealthy, samples of the milk should be sent for examination.

The samples (about $\frac{1}{4}$ pint) must be milked straight from the cow into perfectly clean bottles, each sample being kept separate and securely corked. The milker's hands and the teats of the cow should be carefully washed before milking. The samples should be addressed to the Chief Inspector of Stock, Stanley, and bear the name and address of the person to whom the report is to be sent.

IMPORTANT.—It is now clearly proved that tuberculosis or "consumption" of cattle can be transmitted to human beings especially children who drink the milk of an affected cow. It is therefore of the utmost importance (1) to find out if your cows are affected and (2) if so, not to allow the milk to be used by human beings or for rearing calves. Butter made from the milk is equally dangerous.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, October, 20th, 1911.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you the Estimates for the year 1912.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue has been estimated at £20,069, or £1534 in excess of that received in 1910, or £389 more than the Revised Estimate for 1911. The principal anticipated increases and decreases under the several Divisions are shewn below:—

3. The Whaling Industry is responsible for the increase under Division III. The continuous heavy decrease which has taken place during several years past under Rent (Crown Lands, Falklands) owing to the operation of the Land Ordinance, 1903, as explained in previous Messages to Council, has now reached a point (estimated revenue for 1912, £604 only) below which it cannot sink without disappearing entirely. As against the decrease of £476 referred to above there is an estimated increase of £250 under Interest on Land Sales Investment. We may therefore be said to have practically reached low water mark on this vexed question of Rent versus Interest, which, had it not been for the development of the whaling industry would have brought the Colony to the verge of a financial crisis.

EXPENDITURE.

4. The estimated Ordinary Expenditure (exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary, £6570, and payments under the Live Stock Ordinance, £941) is £18,276 as against an actual Expenditure of £16,034 in 1910, and a revised Expenditure for 1911 of £17,564. A Schedule of additions and reductions is given in Appendix 1.

5. Division II.—**The Governor.**—Item 9. A new typewriter is badly required for the Governor's Office.

6. Division III.—**Colonial Secretary.**—Item 7. Provision has been made for a much needed Office Messenger who will likewise assist to clean the Offices.

7. Division IV.—**Treasury and Customs.**—Items 4 & 5. With the increased shipping owing to the development of the whaling industry these increases for temporary Customs Officers and Overtime services are necessary. Both are recoverable.

8. Division X.—**Medical.**—Items 4, 13, & 14. A sum of £150 has been provided for an Assistant Colonial Surgeon for the East Falkland. A similar sum is guaranteed by certain Farmers and their employees who benefit by his services. £60 is provided for the maintenance of a pauper lunatic in England. The purchase of a sterilizer, probable cost £25, is imperatively necessary.

9. Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous.**—Item 5. The cutting, rickling, and carting of peat is annually becoming a more serious matter. The requirements of the Public Service are very much greater than heretofore, and the bogs are further off and more difficult of access.

Item 12. The increased work and correspondence in the different departments demands an increase to the stationery vote which is annually overdrawn.

Item 13. With the introduction of the new telephone system, and the establishment of a central exchange, an attendant at £30 per annum will be required. This expenditure will be more than recovered by subscribers' fees and telephone messages.

Item 15. Caretaker Cemetery, £30. It is hoped that the Chairman of the Cemetery Board will see his way to recommend the reduction of this amount before the 1913 Estimates are prepared.

10. Division XVI.—**Colonial Engineer.**—Item 1. It has been decided, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to revive this appointment which lapsed with Mr. Messervy's departure from the Colony in May, 1901. Since I assumed the Administration of the Government in September, 1904, I have gladly performed, gratuitously, and to the best of my ability, the duties which in a small Colony usually devolve upon the Officer in Charge of the Public Works Department. That it has been a period of unusual activity in the annals of this outpost, and that the Colony has in the Public Wharf, the Public Schools, the Public Museum and Library, the Victoria Cottage Home, and in many other directions substantial assets on which it may reasonably congratulate itself will, I think, be generally admitted.

The time has however arrived when the Colony can not only afford to provide the necessary salary for the post, but, in view, of the larger works about to be undertaken, requires the services of a thoroughly competent Engineer. The Officer selected for this appointment is Mr. R. B. Baseley, whose character and qualifications are well known locally, and we are fortunate in finding a suitable person on the spot.

But before taking leave of the old regime, which will terminate at the close of the current year, I am glad to have the opportunity afforded me to gratefully acknowledge the loyal assistance I have at all times received from the Foreman Carpenter (Mr. G. T. King), and the Outdoor Foreman (Mr. W. Atkins), to whose helpful co-operation and knowledge of local conditions the many Public Works completed during the last seven years are largely due.

Item 2.—£256. This provides for the salaries of the two Wireless Operators in connection with the Marconi installation which was approved by Council in August last.

11. Division XX.—Public Works Recurrent.—Item 5. It is considered that the sum of £110 will cover the cost of fuel, oil, repairs, &c., required for the wireless plant.

Item 6.—£90. The Light at the Sea Lion Rocks will require to be visited at least once every eight or nine months in order to change the acetylene gas cylinders.

12. Division XXI.—Public Works Extraordinary.—Item 1.—£30. Considerable sections of the Common Fence require to be renewed.

Item 2.—£15. Certain additional furniture is needed for the Government School.

Item 3.—£100. The sea has encroached considerably at the west end of the town, and the present sea-wall will have to be extended.

Item 5.—£30. It is thought desirable to procure one more Kitson lamp.

Item 7.—£60. Peat deteriorates heavily unless under cover. Experience has shewn that the principle of having a reserve to meet unforeseen contingencies is imperatively necessary.

Item 11.—£100. Although much material and labour has been expended on the Murray Heights, and the system of drainage adopted has worked satisfactorily during an abnormally wet winter, it has been impossible to complete the work.

Item 12.—£100. The erection of the Light on the Sea Lion Rocks will be undertaken in the early part of the year.

Item 18.—£300. This expenditure is rendered necessary by the appointment of a Colonial Engineer.

Item 21.—£450. The Magistrate at South Georgia, owing to the courtesy of the Compañia Argentina de Pesca, has hitherto been provided with house accommodation, but considering the revenue which is now obtained from the Dependency it is only right that he and the other officials stationed there should be furnished by Government with suitable quarters and offices.

Item 22.—£1200. Provision has been made on the 1911 Estimates for a payment of £1960 towards the purchase of the wireless plant, the balance of the cost of the installation f.o.b. Liverpool (£840), as also the erection of buildings, &c., (£360), is provided as above.

Item 19.—£4000. I have left to the last the important question of a Town Hall. The disastrous fire which destroyed the Assembly Rooms on the 30th March necessitated a reconsideration of the question of a Volunteer Drill Hall, and at the same time brought into prominence the need for a Town Hall. During the late winter that section of the public on amusement bent, and they form a considerable section of the residents of Stanley, had forcibly brought home to them the inconvenience which resulted owing to the loss of the Assembly Rooms, as there was no building capable of providing adequate accommodation for dances, bazaars, concerts, &c. The Very Rev. Dean Seymour kindly lent the Parish Room again and again, but it was invariably overcrowded and was altogether too small for local requirements.

Prior to the fire already alluded to, and when the Government was negotiating with the Assembly Rooms Company for the purchase of the Assembly Rooms, it was clearly understood that the Rooms when purchased would be available, subject to a fixed charge, for public entertainments. This pledge the Government has no wish to avoid under the altered circumstances, and some few months ago plans were prepared locally giving a general idea of what was required. Members have lately had the opportunity

of perusing alternative designs and specifications which have been received from the Consulting Engineer to the Crown Agents. These show commodious buildings of considerable artistic merit adequate for the dual purposes referred to above and with accommodation for both the Public Library and the Museum.

The cost of the materials of Design No. 1 would be for the superstructure complete £3,650, and to this amount would have to be added possibly £1,100 for freight, £504 for the services of seven extra carpenters for six months, £250 for the purchase of cement for the foundations, £400 for the hot water system, and £600 for additional labour and unforeseen expenses, making a total cost of £6,504. This however is on the supposition that the excavations and foundations are done by the Public Works permanent staff.

An alternative would be to borrow a sum of £6,500 @ 3% from our accumulated assets, which now amount to over £80,000, and to establish a Sinking Fund for the repayment of the principal in ten years time. The general feeling however seems to be opposed to a loan. Personally I am satisfied that if strict economy is exercised during the next two years, and ordinary revenue is supplemented by a small export duty on whale oil, a proposal which I have recommended to the Secretary of State, the necessary funds for the erection of the Town Hall will be forthcoming out of current revenue without any diminishing of our accumulated assets.

Although as an investment it seems doubtful whether 1% would be returned on the capital expenditure, yet on the other hand it is recognised that there is a pressing need for such a building, and as my advisers, and the Colonists whom I have consulted, are in favour of the above expenditure, and the continued prosperity of the Colony may be considered as assured so long as the whaling industry remains profitable, I have placed on account a sum of £4000 on the 1912 Estimates for the above purpose, and propose that the balance of the cost of the Town Hall should be appropriated in 1913. As it is highly improbable that the erection of the building will be commenced much before October next, the proposal to distribute the cost over two years offers distinct advantages.

REGULATIONS.

Importation of Live Stock into the Falkland Islands.

1. Any person intending to import any animal enumerated in Schedule A shall give a month's notice in writing to an Inspector stating the number, description, from whence expected, where purchased and probable date of arrival in the Colony.

2. Every such animal imported into the Colony from a British or Colonial port must be accompanied by a health certificate signed by a qualified Veterinary Surgeon of the district locality in which the animal was purchased, and if imported into the Colony from a foreign port, it must be accompanied by a written declaration from the exporter, made before a British Consular Officer, to the effect that the animal is free on embarkation from any infectious or contagious disease and has not, within thirty days of shipment, been in direct or indirect contact with infected Stock.

3. Any person who shall import any animal without due notice as provided in the first of these Regulations, or without a health certificate as provided in the second of these Regulations, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

4. Every imported animal enumerated in Schedule A shall be examined by an Inspector, and the Inspector shall have the power

- (1) to prohibit the landing of any such animal which would be a source of danger to other animals in the Colony.
- (2) to order any such animal to be destroyed, either on board ship or after being landed, but such order must in all cases be sanctioned by the Governor before being carried into effect.
- (3) to order any such animal to be conveyed or driven to, and confined in any area set apart as a quarantine paddock, and such animal shall be retained in quarantine until a written order for its release has been given by him.

5. Any person who fails to take due precautions as to the landing of any animal enumerated in Schedule A, or permits any such animal to escape from quarantine, shall be liable to the penalties provided in section 42 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901.

6. All expenses incurred in the destruction or keeping in quarantine, by order of an Inspector, of any imported animal enumerated in Schedule A shall be payable by its owner, and in no case will the Government compensate an owner for any such animal destroyed under these Regulations.

govern themselves accordingly and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid war and to abstain from violating or contravening either "an act to regulate the conduct of Her Majesty's subjects during the existence of hostilities between Foreign States with which Her Majesty is at Peace," or the Laws and Statutes of the Realm in this behalf, or the Law of Nations, or any Treaty made by His Majesty in relation thereto, or the Rules which His Majesty has directed to be observed during the continuance of the present state of war, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril.

An Ordinance

To Regulate the Sale of Intoxicating
Liquors in South Georgia.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1. No person shall sell or expose for sale in the Dependency of South Georgia any intoxicating liquor without being licensed to sell the same, and any person who shall sell or expose any liquor for sale without holding a licence shall for the first offence be liable to a penalty of not less than thirty pounds, and for any subsequent offence such person shall forfeit the sum of fifty pounds. Upon any conviction under this section the offender shall forfeit all liquors in his possession with the vessels containing the same to the use of His Majesty, and the same may be sold by order of the Stipendiary Magistrate and the proceeds of the sale shall be paid into general revenue.

Sale of Liquor prohibited without a Licence.

2. In order to enable any person lawfully to sell intoxicating liquor he must obtain a licence from the Stipendiary Magistrate.

Licence, how obtained.

3. The Stipendiary Magistrate may issue licences for the sale of intoxicating liquor on the premises specified in the licence and on payment of the fees specified in section 5 of this Ordinance, but no licence may be issued without the approval of the Governor in Council who shall likewise decide the place where and the hours during which such liquor may be sold.

Power of Magistrate to issue licence when approved by Governor in Council.

Duration of Licence.

4. Licences issued under this Ordinance shall be in force for six months from the date of issue, or for such period less than six months as may be specified in the licence.

Fees.

5. The fees payable for licences issued under this Ordinance shall be as follows:—

For 3 months or less £10.

For over 3 months £20.

Supply of liquor to intoxicated persons.

6. If the holder of any licence or his servant supplies intoxicating liquor to any person who is at the time in a state of intoxication such holder shall be liable to a penalty of not less than two pounds or more than five pounds and for any subsequent offence to a penalty of not less than five pounds or more than ten pounds.

Revocation of Licence.

7. Any licence issued under this Ordinance may be revoked at any time by the Stipendiary Magistrate, but the reasons for such revocation shall be reported in writing to the Governor.

Short title.

8. This Ordinance may be cited as the Licensing Ordinance (South Georgia), 1911.

RULES.

1. The Chief Justice may from time to time by Commission signed by him appoint persons being practising Solicitors or other fit and proper persons to be Commissioners for Oaths and may revoke any such appointment.
2. A Commissioner for Oaths, may by virtue of his commission in the Colony or elsewhere administer any oath or take any affidavit for the purposes of the Supreme Court.
3. Provided that a Commissioner for Oaths shall not exercise any of the powers given by these Rules in any proceeding in which he is solicitor to any of the parties to the proceeding or clerk to any such solicitor, or in which he is interested.
4. Every Commissioner for Oaths shall express the time when and the place where he shall take any affidavit or the acknowledgment of any deed or recognizance; otherwise the same shall not be held authentic, nor be admitted to be filed or enrolled without the leave of the Supreme Court, and every such Commissioner shall express the time when and the place where he shall do any other act incident to his office.

A BILL
ENTITLED
An Ordinance

To make provision for the preparation and publication of a new and revised edition of the Ordinances of this Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance 'The New Edition' means the new and revised edition of the Ordinances of the Colony to be prepared under the authority of this Ordinance.

Interpretation.

2. The Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies shall appoint a Commissioner for the purpose of preparing a new and revised edition of the Ordinances of this Colony. Should the Commissioner selected be unable from any cause to fully discharge his commission under this Ordinance the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies may appoint some other fit and proper person to be a Commissioner in his stead.

Appointment of Commissioner for the new edition.

3. In the preparation of the new edition the Commissioner shall have the following powers (that is to say):—

Powers of revision as to form vested in the Commissioner.

(1) To omit—

- (a) All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances which have been expressly or specifically repealed or which have expired or have become spent or have had their effect;
- (b) All repealing enactments contained in Ordinances and also all tables or lists of repealed enactments whether contained in Schedules or otherwise;
- (c) All preambles to Ordinances where such omission can in the opinion of the Commissioner be conveniently made;
- (d) All introductory words of enactment;
- (e) All enactments prescribing the date when an Ordinance or part of an Ordinance is to come into force where such omission can in the opinion of the Commissioner be conveniently made; and
- (f) All amending Ordinances or parts of Ordinances where the amendments affected by such Ordinances or parts of Ordinances have been embodied by the Commissioner in the Ordinances to which they relate;

(2) To consolidate into one Ordinance any two or more Ordinances in *pari materia* making the alterations thereby rendered necessary in the consolidated Ordinance and affixing such date thereto as may seem most convenient;

- (3) To alter the order of sections in any Ordinance and in all cases where it is necessary to do so to renumber the sections of any Ordinance ;
- (4) To alter the form or arrangement of any section of an Ordinance either by combining it in whole or in part with another section or other sections or by dividing it into two or more sub-sections ;
- (5) To divide any Ordinance whether consolidated or not into parts or other divisions ;
- (6) To add a short title to any Ordinance which may require it and if necessary to alter the short title of any Ordinance ; and
- (7) To do all other things relating to form and method which may be necessary for the perfecting of the new edition.

Numbering of Ordinances.

4. There shall be attached to each Ordinance contained in the new edition a number shewing its place among the Ordinances of the year to which it belongs.

Mode of dealing with alterations of substance.

5. (1) The powers conferred upon the Commissioner in section 3 shall not be taken to imply any power in him to make any alteration or amendment in the matter or substance of any Ordinance or part of an Ordinance.
- (2) Subject to the provision of sub-section 4 of this section in every case where any such alteration or amendment is in the opinion of the Commissioner desirable the Commissioner shall draft a Bill setting forth such alterations and amendments and authorising them to be made in the said new and revised edition and every such Bill shall subject to the sanction of the Governor be submitted to the Legislative Council and be dealt with in the ordinary way.
- (3) Any such Bill may have reference to more Ordinances than one although such Ordinances may not be in *pari materia*.
- (4) In any case where an Ordinance whether consolidated or not requires such considerable alterations and amendments as to involve its entire recasting the Commissioner shall draft a Bill accordingly and such Bill shall be submitted to the Legislative Council and be dealt with in the Ordinary way.

Bringing into force of the new edition.

6. (1) On the copies of the new edition being printed the Governor shall cause each of the said copies to be impressed on the title-page thereof with the Public Seal.
- (2) On some convenient day thereafter the Governor shall by a proclamation to be published in the Gazette notify that the copies of the new edition have been duly impressed as aforesaid and are ready for issue at the Colonial Secretary's Office in Stanley.

Approval of the Legislative Council and validity

At the expiration of three months after the publication of the said proclamation the new edition shall be laid before the Legislative Council for approval and after such approval shall be deemed to be and shall be without any question whatsoever in all Courts of Justice and for all other purposes whatsoever the sole and only proper Ordinance Book of the Colony up to the date of the latest of the Ordinances contained therein. Provided that nothing

in this section shall affect the operation of any Ordinance which may be passed before such approval by the Legislative Council for the repeal alteration or amendment of any earlier Ordinance after such Ordinance has been already printed in the new edition.

Reference to repealed enactment, how construed.

Enactment.

8. Where in any enactment or in any document of whatsoever kind reference is made to any enactment repealed or otherwise affected by or under the operation of this Ordinance such reference shall where necessary and practicable be deemed to extend and apply to the corresponding enactment in the new edition.

Short title.

9. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The New Edition of the Ordinances Ordinance, 1912".

Rules relating to Nurse Probationers.

1. The Nurse Probationer must adhere to the rules laid down for the Government Nurses.

2. A lecture will be delivered by the Colonial Surgeon every week, from which she must not absent herself except in case of illness.

3. At the end of the first three months probationership, she will be examined on the subjects taught and if she shows a good knowledge of these subjects, may be recommended for retention for training.

4. She may however be relieved of her post at any time by the Colonial Surgeon, should she fail to follow the instructions of those in charge of her.

5. The period of training shall be for three years and at the end of each year, she will be examined by the Colonial Surgeons and Matron in her first, second and third professional examinations respectively. Should she fail in any one of these examinations, she will be referred, for a period of not less than three months; these three months not counting in the period of training.

6. If, at the end of the first three months, she is recommended for further training, she will be provided each year with the following uniform:—

One outdoor cloak, two pairs of boots, two print dresses, three pairs of cuffs, six collars, three caps, two pairs of ward shoes.

As these things will be the property of the hospital she may be required to hand them over to the Matron when leaving.

7. When on day duty she will be expected to rise at 6 a.m. in summer (November 1st to March 31st) and 7 a.m. in winter (April 1st to October 31st) and at 10 a.m. to be properly uniformed for the rest of the day.

8. She will be allowed two hours off duty each day, during which she must take outdoor exercise, and two half-days each week.

9. She must on no account speak to any one not connected with the Hospital about her cases, otherwise she may be liable to instant dismissal. Any inquiries by relatives of patients must be answered by the Matron, and she should take care to direct such inquiries to the Matron.

10. Part of her training will be with the District Nurse in her external duties, when she will do exactly as this nurse directs her.

11. Any complaints she may have must be lodged in writing with the Colonial Surgeon, who will at his earliest convenience settle the matter.

12. She must be sympathetic and considerate with her patients, and abstain from the use of any improper language.

These rules may be added to should occasion arise.

The owner or occupier of any dwelling house in Stanley in which a case of a disease which appears to be infectious occurs, or the parent or guardian of any child suffering from a disease which appears to be infectious shall, within twenty-four hours of the appearance of such disease, notify the Colonial Surgeon or other Medical Practitioner in Stanley of the appearance of such disease.

An Ordinance

To amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. When any person against whom a prohibition order has been made or renewed under sections 25 or 26 of the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, shall :

Offences punishable.

- (a) send, or in any way influence, any person to procure him liquor ; or
- (b) be found in possession of any liquor ; or
- (c) be found drunk in Stanley

he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £5 or to imprisonment not exceeding one month.

2. Any person convicted under section 1 of this Ordinance or convicted under section 1, subsection (c) of the Licensing Ordinance, 1904, of selling, supplying or distributing liquor to a prohibited person, shall be liable on a second or subsequent conviction to imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Penalty on second conviction.

Power of Magistrate
to grant relief to
family of convicted
person.

3. In the case of a married person sentenced under either of the two preceding sections, the Magistrate may, at his discretion, and on being satisfied that the family is indigent, order that a sum not exceeding 3/- per diem be paid by the Government towards the support of the family of the convicted person during the whole or any portion of the time during which such person is imprisoned in accordance with the following scale:—

Allowance to wife : not exceeding 1/6 per diem ;

Allowance to husband (when incapacitated from work owing to illness or accident and on production of satisfactory medical certificate) : not exceeding 1/6 per diem ;

Allowance to each child (not exceeding six) under 14 years of age : 3d. per diem.

Title.

4. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the Licensing Ordinance, 1911, and shall be construed as one with the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, and the Licensing Ordinance, 1904.

An Ordinance

To make provision for the preparation and publication of a new and revised edition of the Ordinances of this Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance 'The New Edition' means the new and revised edition of the Ordinances of the Colony to be prepared under the authority of this Ordinance.

Interpretation.

2. The Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies shall appoint a Commissioner for the purpose of preparing a new and revised edition of the Ordinances of this Colony. Should the Commissioner selected be unable from any cause to fully discharge his commission under this Ordinance the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies may appoint some other fit and proper person to be a Commissioner in his stead.

Appointment of Commissioner for the new edition.

Powers of revision as to form vested in the Commissioner.

3. In the preparation of the new edition the Commissioner shall have the following powers (that is to say):—

- (1) To omit—
 - (a) All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances which have been expressly or specifically repealed or which have expired or have become spent or have had their effect;
 - (b) All repealing enactments contained in Ordinances and also all tables or lists of repealed enactments whether contained in Schedules or otherwise;
 - (c) All preambles to Ordinances where such omission can in the opinion of the Commissioner be conveniently made;
 - (d) All introductory words of enactment;
 - (e) All enactments prescribing the date when an Ordinance or part of an Ordinance is to come into force where such omission can in the opinion of the Commissioner be conveniently made; and
 - (f) All amending Ordinances or parts of Ordinances where the amendments affected by such Ordinances or parts of Ordinances have been embodied by the Commissioner in the Ordinances to which they relate;
- (2) To consolidate into one Ordinance any two or more Ordinances in *pari materia* making the alterations thereby rendered necessary in the consolidated Ordinance and affixing such date thereto as may seem most convenient;
- (3) To alter the order of sections in any Ordinance and in all cases where it is necessary to do so to renumber the sections of any Ordinance;
- (4) To alter the form or arrangement of any section of an Ordinance either by combining it in whole or in part with another section or other sections or by dividing it into two or more sub-sections;
- (5) To divide any Ordinance whether consolidated or not into parts or other divisions;
- (6) To add a short title to any Ordinance which may require it and if necessary to alter the short title of any Ordinance; and
- (7) To do all other things relating to form and method which may be necessary for the perfecting of the new edition.

Numbering of Ordinances.

4. There shall be attached to each Ordinance contained in the new edition a number shewing its place among the Ordinances of the year to which it belongs.

Mode of dealing with alterations of substance.

5. (1) The powers conferred upon the Commissioner in section 3 shall not be taken to imply any power in him to make any alteration or amendment in the matter or substance of any Ordinance or part of an Ordinance.
- (2) Subject to the provision of sub-section 4 of this section in every case where any such alteration or amendment is in the opinion of the Commissioner desirable the Commissioner shall draft a Bill setting forth such

alterations and amendments and authorising them to be made in the said new and revised edition and every such Bill shall subject to the sanction of the Governor be submitted to the Legislative Council and be dealt with in the ordinary way.

- (3) Any such Bill may have reference to more Ordinances than one although such Ordinances may not be in *pari materia*.
- (4) In any case where an Ordinance whether consolidated or not requires such considerable alterations and amendments as to involve its entire recasting the Commissioner shall draft a Bill accordingly and such Bill shall be submitted to the Legislative Council and be dealt with in the ordinary way.

6. (1) On the copies of the new edition being printed the Governor shall cause each of the said copies to be impressed on the title-page thereof with the Public Seal.

Bringing into force of the new edition.



Whaling Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 3 of the "Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908", His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. The period for which Whaling Licences may be issued shall commence on the 1st October of each year and terminate on the 30th September of the succeeding year.
2. Licences will be issued in the name of the Company applying for them and are not transferable.
3. The fee payable for each Licence is £100: this fee will not be refunded if for any cause the Licence is not used.
4. Each Whaling Licence shall be applicable to one floating factory and two steam whalers, and should permission be granted to any applicant by the Governor in Council to employ a third steam whaler a special fee of £100 will be payable on this account.
5. On and after this date separate Whaling Licences shall be issued for:—
 - (a) The South Shetlands and Graham's Land,
 - (b) The South Orkneys,
 - (c) The Falkland Islands,
 - (d) The South Sandwich Islands.
6. The number of Whaling Licences issued in any one year for the South Shetlands and Graham's Land shall not exceed ten; and in the case of the Falkland Islands, the South Orkneys or the Sandwich Islands the number shall not exceed seven.
7. Any applicant for a Whaling Licence must send in his application so as to reach the Colonial Secretary, Falkland Islands, not later than the 1st April, giving the name of the Company and the names of the vessels to be employed.
8. Each application for a Whaling Licence shall be registered when received in a register to be termed the Whaling Licence Register.
9. Every licensed vessel shall, at the end of the season's whaling operations, proceed direct to a Port of Entry in the Colony or its Dependencies and report the result of the catch to the Collector of Customs.
10. Licences will be issued on the condition that the licensees and their employees will not kill or capture seals (including all animals of the seal kind), penguins or birds in the Dependencies of the Colony or the waters thereof except when in actual need of them for food.
11. Any breach of these Regulations by the licensee or his employees will render the licensee liable to the immediate forfeiture of his Licence, as well as any claim to a Whaling Licence in the future.
12. These Regulations shall have no application to South Georgia, and shall come into force on the 1st April, 1912, and shall then supersede the Regulations of the Governor in Council of the 6th February, 1911.

SIR.

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1911.

2. During the year 63 accounts were opened and 63 closed; leaving a total of 471 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £69971 9s. 7d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £148 11s. 2d. standing to the credit of each account, or £30 15s. 11d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,272.

3. Interest amounting to £1,529 17s. 0d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £28 5s. 7d. more than that credited in 1909-10 and the amount of withdrawals for the year exceeds the deposits for the same period by £293 18s. 9d. Had £500 received by the Crown Agents in September been included, the Deposits would have shown an excess over the withdrawals of £206. Vide Monthly Summary of Savings Bank Transactions transmitted herewith. (Enclosure D.)

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £2,129 1s. 3d. and the expenses incurred £1,533 17s. 0d. leaving a profit of £595 4s. 3d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1911. (Enclosure C.)

5. The investments on account of the Bank on the 30th September, 1911. amount to £66,516 4s. 2d. leaving an uninvested balance of £3,455 5s. 5d.

An Ordinance

To amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The Third Schedule to the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff Amendment Ordinance, 1900, is hereby amended by adding the following to the list of Export Duties:

Addition to 3rd section of "Tariff Ordinance, 1900".

2. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the first day of October, 1912; and may be cited as "the Tariff Amendment Ordinance, 1912", and shall be read and construed as one with the Tariff Ordinance, 1900; and any copy of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, printed after the commencement of this Ordinance may be printed with the amendment made by this Ordinance.

Chief Stock Inspector's Annual Report for 1911.

STOCK DEPARTMENT,

STANLEY, 16th February, 1912.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith my Annual Report for the year ended on the 31st December, 1911.

It is gratifying to be able again to report a prosperous season for stock owners. Wool made a good price although not so good as in 1910. Hides, tallow and skins had also a fair market and at the present time everything points to a continuance of equally good returns. During the Winter and Spring more rain fell than had been known for many years, grass was very backward and consequently stock suffered considerably. However towards the close of the year grass was abundant, stock quickly picked up and looked as well as they had done for several seasons past.

Two canning factories were opened in the Autumn, at which over 30,000 sheep were canned. There is every hope that these new enterprises will prove a success. Owing to the recent series of outbreaks of Foot and Mouth Disease in England, a case of Distemper occurring in a dog in Stanley, and complaints from farmers respecting imported horses, it was thought advisable in the interest of stock owners to draw up new importation Regulations, which came into force on the first day of 1912. Copies of these Regulations have been sent to all Stations, and have been published in the Gazette; they can also be had on application to this office.

The prohibition against sheep, cattle and alfalfa from South American ports is still maintained.

The Ordinance providing for the purchase of Goose Beaks expires at the end of 1912.

Sheep.—There is a marked decrease in the number of sheep in the Colony, the return being 706,170, which is 18,566 less than in 1910. The health of the sheep is very satisfactory. A few cases of Lice were found on the East Falklands. Ticks were much less numerous, especially on Stations where it is the practice to dip twice. Dipping has been carried out in a conscientious manner in all districts. Investigations are being made with regard to so-called Scrofula and will be published as soon as they are completed. There is no evidence that the disease is in any way infectious, but all affected sheep should be killed as the tendency towards it is probably inherited.

Lambing.—Although the weather at this season was bad, lambs were more plentiful than they were last year, with a very small mortality afterwards. The quality of the young stock improves yearly, some of the Hoggets to be seen at certain farms being a credit to the Colony. The good increase should enable farmers to cull more heavily and thus rid their farms of unprofitable old sheep.

Wool.—The clip was in every way satisfactory, being heavier and of better quality than that of the previous year. The new clip threatens to be somewhat light but in other respects will compare favourably with that of other seasons.

Importations.—During the year twenty-seven Romney Marsh Rams were imported from England. These sheep were all shearlings and were of a better type than many of the sheep brought into the Colony. All sheep imported are now dipped before they are released from quarantine, which is an additional safeguard against introducing parasitic diseases.

Horses.—The number in the Colony is 3,554. These are classified as follows:—

Some good sires are needed in the Colony.

Many colts are ruined through neglect of the feet. Two hundred and thirteen horses were imported, including four stallions. This was 85 more than in 1910, and they were of a much better class than in former years.

Cattle.—Statistics show that there are 7,859 cattle in the Falklands. It is a regrettable fact that some of the milking cows have been found to be Tuberculous. A notice was issued by the Government in October drawing attention to the danger of using Tuberculous milk for human consumption, and offering to test samples of milk free of charge. This offer should be taken advantage of by any person milking cows which are in any way suspected of the disease. The percentage of affected animals is not high, so that it is entirely in the hands of Stock owners whether the disease shall be stamped out or allowed to spread gradually.

Cultivation.—Some very good hay has been cut in some districts, the growers declaring that they have been well repaid for their trouble and expense. Other farmers should give this a trial, for it must be a very great advantage to have a few tons of good hay on hand in the winter.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance
To regulate Cinematograph and similar
Exhibitions.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. (1) It shall not be lawful for any person to advertise, present or carry on any Cinematograph or other similar Exhibition, unless a description of every scene intended to be presented or produced at such Exhibition has been first furnished to the Colonial Secretary, nor without the written permission of the Governor granted under his hand or under the hand of the Colonial Secretary.

Cinematograph Exhibitions subject to conditions.

(2) The Governor may refuse to grant such permission or grant it subject to such special conditions and restrictions, to be specified in the permission as to him may seem fit; and any such permission may be revoked by the Governor at any time.

2. Where the Governor grants any such permission as aforesaid upon condition that the Exhibition be conducted under the superintendence of some person designated in the permission, then it shall be lawful, at any time, for the person so designated to order such Exhibition to cease or to give any other direction he may think necessary for ensuring the safety from fire of the premises at which the Exhibition takes place and of the people attending the Exhibition.

Supervision to ensure safety from fire.

3. Any person who conducts or in any way assists in conducting any such Exhibition as aforesaid in contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance, or the Rules made thereunder, or of any condition or restriction specified in a permission granted under this Ordinance, shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Penalty.

4. (1) It shall be the duty of the occupier or the person who manages or receives the rent of any premises at which it may be proposed to conduct any such Exhibition as aforesaid, to ascertain whether the requisite permission shall have been obtained and, if so, the terms of such permission; and it shall also be the duty of such occupier or person to give notice to the Chief Constable, or to the Officer in charge of the Police Station, if and so soon as he has reason to believe that there is an intention to proceed with the Exhibition either without the Governor's permission, or with such permission but without having everything done, which may be required by such permission to be done previous to the Exhibition taking place.

Duty of occupier, etc. of premises.

(2) Any occupier or person referred to in this section who fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Penalty.

5. A constable or any other officer appointed for the purpose by the Governor may at all reasonable times enter any premises in which he has reason to believe that such an Exhibition as aforesaid is being or about to be given, with a view to seeing whether the provisions of this Ordinance or any Rules made thereunder, and the conditions of any permission granted under this Ordinance, have

Power of entry.

been complied with ; and if any person prevents or obstructs the entry of any constable or officer appointed as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

6. The Governor in Council may make and thereafter may, from time to time, vary, amend or rescind, such Rules as he may deem expedient for regulating and controlling cinematograph and other similar exhibitions.

Rules.

7. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, or against any provision of the Rules made thereunder, shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.

General penal clause.

8. In any prosecution under this Ordinance, the onus of proving that he had complied with the law shall lie on the Defendant.

Burden of proof.

9. This Ordinance shall not apply to an exhibition given in private premises to which the public are not admitted, whether on payment or otherwise.

Ordinance not applicable to private exhibitions.

10. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Cinematograph Ordinance, 1912".

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

relating to Wireless Telegraphy.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. No person shall establish any wireless telegraph station or install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place or on board any British ship registered in the Colony except under and in accordance with a licence granted in that behalf by the Governor in Council.

Licences for Wireless Telegraphy.

2. No person shall work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed on any merchant ship (whether British or Foreign) whilst that ship is in the territorial waters of the Colony, otherwise than in accordance with regulations made in that behalf by the Governor in Council, and the Governor in Council may, by any such regulations impose penalties, recoverable before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner, for the breach of any such regulations, not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence, and may provide for the forfeiture on any such breach of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or worked on such ship.

Regulations made by Governor in Council.

3. If any person establishes a wireless telegraph station without a licence in that behalf or installs or works any apparatus for wireless telegraphy without a licence in that behalf he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and be liable on summary conviction thereof to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or to imprisonment not exceeding three months and, on conviction in the Supreme Court, to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months and in either case be liable to forfeit any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or

Penalties.

worked without a licence.

4. If a Justice of the Peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for supposing that a wireless telegraph station has been established without a licence in that behalf, or that any apparatus for wireless telegraphy has been installed or worked in any place or on board any merchant ship within his jurisdiction without a licence in that behalf or contrary to the provisions of the regulations made under this Ordinance, he may grant a search warrant to any constable or to any officer appointed in that behalf by the Governor and named in the warrant, and a warrant so granted shall authorise the officer named therein to enter and inspect the station, place or ship and to seize any apparatus which appears to him to be used or intended to be used for wireless telegraphy therein.

Power to issue
Search Warrant.

5. The expression "wireless telegraphy" means any communication by telegraph without the aid of any wire connecting the points from and at which the messages or other communications are sent and received: Provided that nothing in this Ordinance shall prevent any person from making or using electrical apparatus for actuating machinery or for any purpose other than the transmission of messages.

Definition.

Proviso.

6. The Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1903, is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

7. This Ordinance may be cited as the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1912.

REPORT ON CENSUS, 1911.

STANLEY, FALKLAND ISLANDS,
16th September, 1911.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the following Report and Summary of the Census of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

2. The Report includes the population of South Georgia. In 1901, the year the previous Census was taken, South Georgia was uninhabited.

3. The Census of the Falkland Islands was taken on the night of the 2nd of April last, and that of South Georgia on the 19th of March. The Stipendiary Magistrate at South Georgia took advantage of the discretionary power allowed him and reported that he had altered the date of the "Census Night" from the 2nd of April to the 19th of March, in order that various floating factories which were preparing to leave at the end of March could be included. The Census Schedules were received from South Georgia at the end of June.

1.—AREA.

The area of the Colony, including West Falklands and adjacent Islands, is 6,500 square miles, and that of South Georgia 1,000 square miles, making a total area of 7,500 square miles. The whole of this district was successfully enumerated.

2.—POPULATION.

The population of the Islands, including South Georgia, was found to total 3,275 persons. In the year 1881 the population was 1,553; in 1891 it had risen

to 1,789; in 1901 to 2,043, and in the present year, owing largely to the recent development of the Whaling Industry, it has risen to 3,275.

The distribution of the population is described below:—

The increase of population during the last ten years was 1,232, or an increase in the Falkland Islands of 229 and 1,003 in South Georgia. The total increase per cent. of the population since 1901 was 60·33. In the previous ten years, 1891-1901, the population increased by 254 or 7·78 per cent. (*See* Footnote B in Comparative Table 1.)

PORT STANLEY.—The population of the Town of Stanley, including crews of ships in harbour (20 persons), was 905 or a slight decrease of 11 as compared with the 1901 Census. Probably there is no real decrease, as when the previous Census was taken a Man-of-War was in harbour, and there can be little doubt that a considerable number of her crew on leave during the "Census Night" were enumerated.

The number of uninhabited houses in Stanley was 5.

The number inhabited was 181 as against 168 in 1901, an increase of 7·74 per cent. and an average of five persons to each house.

Table 2 shows the distribution of the population of the Town of Stanley according to the number of rooms in each house and persons in household.

DENSITY OF POPULATION.

The average density of the population, *i.e.*, the average number of persons living on each square mile was as follows:—

SEXES.

The total number of males and females in the Islands and South Georgia was 2,370 and 905 respectively, or an average of only 38·2 females to every 100 males. The average in the previous Census was 69·8 females to every 100 males.

The small proportion of females to males is due to the large number of males engaged in the Whaling Industry—excluding the number of males so engaged (1,149), the average number of females to every 100 males would be 74·11.

The following comparative statement shows the number of males and females in every 100 of the population in the age periods mentioned, and the number of females to every 100 males.

It will be seen from the foregoing that up to the age of 15 years there is little difference in the proportion of females to males, but from 20 years there is a marked difference which is accounted for by the large male population.

AGES.

The Return of Ages was completely given on all schedules. Probably in some cases persons were not sure of their exact age and gave some multiple of 10 as 20, 30, 40, and possibly in some cases the ages has been mis-stated. The largest proportion of the population are those between the ages of 20 and 30, next in order come those between the ages of 40 and 50.

The following table shows the percentage under certain age groups as compared with the previous Census.

CIVIL CONDITION OF THE POPULATION.

The Civil condition of the population is set forth in table 4.

In 1901, 30.2 of the population were married; in 1911 the percentage was 31.60. In the case of males the percentage for 1901 was 26.8 and for 1911, 30.84, and in the case of females the percentages were 35.1 and 33.59 respectively.

The large number of persons unmarried, is to a certain extent due to the large number of children, as for instance 36·67 of the population were under 20 years of age.

Out of 1,647 males over 20 years, 726 were shown as married, and out of 427 females over 20 years, 293 were shown as married, or 44·0 per cent in the case of males and 68·62 per cent in the case of females.

The large number of married males as compared to married females is due to the large number of married men employed whose wives are not residing in the Colony.

persons engaged in various branches of the Whaling Industry on the West Falklands and at South Georgia. Out of 2,370 males, 42 are shown as unemployed or 1·77 per cent. and out of 905 females, 405 or 44·7 per cent. are shown as unemployed or not having any special employment.

But the foregoing by no means represents the whole of the persons engaged in the Whaling Industry, as for instance a large number so engaged are placed in the classification as Mariners, Firemen, Master Mariners, Blacksmiths, Mechanics, Engineers, etc., all of whom were either directly or indirectly engaged in the above-mentioned Industry. (See also footnote at Table 1 concerning shipping population at South Georgia.) Shepherds and Farm hands total 440 or 18·6 per cent. of the total male population.

Scholars are returned at 503, or an increase of 127 over the number so classed at the previous Census, the number of children between the ages of 5 and 15 not employed nor at school was only 12 as against 56 in 1901. The number of children under 5 is given at 247—the majority of these would not be under tuition.

BIRTHPLACES.

Out of the population of 3,275, 1,421 were British subjects born in the Colony and 673 were British subjects born in Great Britain and Colonies. There were 13 Naturalized British subjects. The number of Foreigners was 1,093 out of which number no less than 980 were natives of Sweden and Norway—the majority of these were engaged in the Whaling Industry.

The average number of Births during the last 5 years was 52, and deaths 18, leaving an average increase of 34.

Birthplaces are classified in Table 6.

RELIGIONS.

No difficulty was experienced in obtaining information as to the Religious beliefs of the people, the column provided in the schedules for this purpose being in nearly every case properly filled in.

1,821 are returned as belonging to the Church of England and 769 as Lutherians, for detailed classification see Table 7.

INFIRMITIES.

A careful examination of the returns has only shown 3 persons with serious infirmities, viz:—

Deaf and Dumb	2

Probably there are many other persons with slight infirmities, such as impairment of sight, hearing or mental capacity, who have been unwilling to admit them in themselves or their families; notwithstanding this, however, it may be taken for granted that there were not more than a dozen persons with serious infirmities in the whole population.

CONCLUSION.

The population was enumerated on the lines of the English and other Colonial Censuses, that is to say, the population of the Colony and its Dependencies comprised all those persons present within the Colony on the Census night whether permanent or temporary residents.

In order to ascertain the numbers of those persons either able, or unable, to read and write it would perhaps be as well in future to place a column in the Census Schedules for this purpose.

The population, as will be seen from the foregoing Report, has increased more during the last 10 years than in the previous 30 years, and this owing to the development of the Industries already mentioned.

I cannot conclude this Report without mentioning the very satisfactory manner in which the Magistrate and Managers of Whaling Stations at South Georgia, the Deputy Collector at New Islands, Managers of Stations on the East and West Falklands and adjacent Islands and others, appointed Enumerators, performed the work assigned to them and thus contributed very largely to the proper enumeration of the Inhabitants. I must also mention in this connection the enumerator for Stanley, Mr. D. R. Watson.

The East Falkland Medical Report for 1911.

VITAL STATISTICS.

The population of the East Falklands was shewn to be 1608 by the Census taken in April, 1911.

There were 46 births and 13 deaths during the year.

The annual mortality was 13·05 per 1,000.

The birth rate was 28·6 per 1,000.

As I did not take over the duties of Colonial Surgeon until the beginning of November I cannot speak of what occurred before that date, so therefore quote from a report left me by Dr. Earl. I also give a short report of the condition of the Colony from the date on which I assumed the responsibilities of the Colonial Surgeon to the end of the year.

PREVALENCE OF SICKNESS.

"The winter was a very wet one with very little sunshine or frost. During this period numerous cases of Diarrhœa were seen in Stanley. The temperature in these cases was raised to about 101°. The stools contained blood-stained mucus. All the patients recovered.

"The inhabitants of Stanley will be liable to Dysentery and other water-borne diseases until they have a satisfactory water supply. Water collected from the roofs of buildings is always unsatisfactory and in Stanley with the prevailing high winds and numerous sea-birds, there is more danger than in most places from using such water.

"Four cases of slight Scarlet Fever were seen in Stanley and also a few cases of Chicken-pox.

"During the year an epidemic of German Measles broke out in Stanley. The infection was probably introduced from the Coast of South America. I estimate that 50 per cent of the houses in Stanley were attacked; the majority of the cases did not require medical treatment.

"An epidemic on remote islands frequently has some exceptional characteristics, and in the recent epidemic the number of middle-aged and even old people who contracted the disease was surprising.

"Five cases of Beri-Beri were treated in the Cottage Home. The patients were received from a Canadian Sealer, and a Whaler. All the cases recovered, but a case terminated fatally on a Sealer as it was entering the Harbour.

"Four cases of insanity were attended, three of which were sent to England. This is a very large number from a population of a little under 2,000 people. One of the cases was caused by Alcohol".

From October 27th I became responsible for the health condition of the Colony. I have called two meetings of the Board of Health at which many suggestions were made, and in almost all cases the proposed improvements were carried out. With regard to the health of the Colony, valuable assistance might be rendered if the people would not try to conceal diseases of an infectious nature. During my period of office there have been 3 cases of infectious disease: One of Diphtheria, one of Measles and one of Scarlatina.

When the one case of Diphtheria occurred in Stanley, all the necessary precautions were taken, and amongst them I examined the children at all the schools. The throats of many of the children were found to be in an unhealthy condition. Parents are advised to have this remedied as soon as possible as in the event of a Diphtheria epidemic such children would suffer severely.

Attention should also be given to the eyesight of school children as many cases of constant headache and other troubles are caused by defective eyesight and could be cured if the eyes were properly treated. Many adults in Stanley have been fitted with glasses and the failure of their eyesight consequently arrested.

Since June, 1911, I have extracted 78 teeth and stopped many others; if teeth were brushed more regularly they would not decay so rapidly. A properly qualified Dentist is shortly to be appointed for the Colony and his presence will undoubtedly be of great value.

VICTORIA COTTAGE HOME.

The Cottage Home has been of valuable service, and people are appreciating its advantages more and more every day.

I have performed 10 operations in it, all turning out satisfactorily. Eight patients have been admitted for treatment since November, 1911, many of them coming from ships in harbour. At this stage I might say a word for the highly efficient manner in which the nurses have discharged their duties. The District Nurse has attended 44 cases and paid in all 842 visits.

KING EDWARD MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

The New Hospital, to be erected as a Memorial by the Colonists to his late Majesty King Edward VII, was begun towards the end of the year. This will provide a Maternity Ward which is most urgently needed, and all women in the "Camp" may be strongly advised to make use of the Ward instead of depending for their lives and future health on such help as can be given to them in their own homes.

The number of ships arriving at Stanley from foreign and home ports was 59. All these were boarded and every care was taken that nothing infectious was likely to be introduced into the Colony.

The number of attendances at the Surgery during November and December is as follows:—

During the two months of office I have performed 25 minor operations.

The number of Vaccinations in the East Falkland for 1911 was 62.

If the frequency with which Medical Assistance has been called in may be taken as an index to the state of the Public Health, the past twelve months must be regarded as a favourable period. Not only was the total number of calls low, but many of them were in respect of illnesses of so trivial a nature as to have scarcely required skilled attention.

Such a marked improvement is interesting from the sanitary point of view because of the problem it presents for consideration. To what circumstances is the decrease in the incidence of Sickness due?

It has been pointed out in previous Reports that serious illnesses and accidents are not of common occurrence in West Falkland. By far the greater number of cases for which medical aid is sought are better described by the word "ailments". Nevertheless, statistics have shown that each year certain complaints occur in such relatively large numbers, that, compared with others, they constitute outstanding features.

The most noticeable of these have usually been Affections of the Digestive and Respiratory systems but it is gratifying to be able to record that of 26 cases of the former, 16 were purely and simply those requiring Dental Treatment, whilst of the latter, but 3 have been seen.

The Incidence of Sickness also bears a definite relationship to Meteorological conditions, and I attribute the low percentage of Respiratory affections to the latter being favourable.

This relationship between illness and weather is more intimate than at first sight appears. Health is not only affected by actual exposure to cold, heat, snow and rain. According to prevalent conditions, various articles of food may undergo changes which render them prejudicial to health. Thus, the composition of many drinking waters, by reason of their source, varies within wide limits, bearing at each moment of variation, a fairly constant ratio to the amount of rainfall. Animal food and milk undergo changes intimately related to varying atmospheric conditions, which readily provoke indisposition or illness.

It is expected that the necessary apparatus for taking Meteorological observations will shortly be installed at Fox Bay. The utilization of such readings in the Annual Medical Report will provide comparative statistics of great value. I am of opinion that had such been available for the purposes of the present report, a series of comparative curves would have shown the improvement in the Public Health to be associated with a higher mean winter temperature, and a lower mean winter rainfall.

The cases of Epidemic Diarrhœa, usually so frequent in early spring, have this year been conspicuous by their absence.

EPIDEMICS.

There have been three separate outbreaks of Rôtheln or German Measles.

The first one took place on Pebble Island in September, 1911. During this outbreak I was myself incapacitated by an attack of Scarlet Fever, and so was unable to see any of the cases. From descriptions of the symptoms, and accounts of the course of the disease which have been furnished to me, there can be no doubt of the diagnosis.

The second outbreak was at Port Howard in December, 1911, and it occurred within a week of the arrival of the new Itinerant Schoolmaster in the house in which he was staying. He reported having been in contact with the disease during his stay in Stanley.

The third outbreak occurred at Port Stephens, within a few days of the visit of a crew sent from Pebble Island via Stanley in January, 1912. It first occurred in a house where one of the Members of the crew had stayed.

In all 12 cases of German Measles have been reported to me.

Shortly following the outbreak at Port Howard, one of the families affected, again called me in on account of the appearance of sore throats of a very severe type. In two of the children, the condition was suggestive of Diphtheria, and I accordingly took swabs from the throats of all four of them which were subjected to Bacteriological examination. The Klebs-Lœffler Bacillus which is the cause of Diphtheria, was present in each instance.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

In connection with these outbreaks of infectious disease, I convened a meeting of the Board of Health, and proposed co-operation with the Board of Health in East Falkland with a view to framing some simple Sanitary measures to minimise the risk of conveying

infection from one island to the other. I am of opinion that it is desirable to adopt some such protective measures because many of the native-born Falkland Islanders are susceptible to infection, (even by such simple conditions as Measles, R otheln, Whooping Cough, &c.), not having acquired the immunity conferred by a previous attack.

Thus exists the risk that industry might be seriously impeded by the outbreak of one of these conditions during the season.

It may be mentioned that since the spring, the winds have not been nearly as violent and tempestuous as is usual. Many days have been perfectly calm with great heat and bright sunshine. Such weather, notwithstanding the germicidal effect of sunshine would favour the spread of infectious disease. The diluent effect of high winds is a valuable factor in preventing infection.

FOOD.

To secure variety in food is not an easy matter in West Falkland. Nevertheless, I am of opinion from personal observation, that vegetables are more extensively taken than they were two years ago. Most houses possess good gardens which do the owners much credit.

Fresh milk, butter, cream and eggs, are to be had for the trouble involved in obtaining them.

I do not think I have ever seen fish so frequently used in the Colony as I have during the past year, greatly, I am convinced, to the benefit of the consumers. Fish is best eaten fresh, however, i.e., within twenty-four hours of being caught. When preserved in brine or other media, it is never as beneficial or digestible. There is a peculiar belief prevalent, even among folk who ought to know better, to the effect that fish is rendered poisonous if the moon is allowed to shine upon it. In order to convince adherents to this belief of its fallacy, I have caught fish and hung them out all night under a full moon, eating them for breakfast with no ill results. It is suspected that fish which are said to have exhibited poisonous properties through exposure to the rays of the moon, have probably been subjected to considerably more than one night of such treatment.

I would again emphasize the need for care in the killing of animals intended for human consumption. They should never be slaughtered after being hard-driven for any distance. Not only is the flesh rendered coarse and tough, but it may cause gastric disturbance or diarrh ea.

This is because Sarc olactic and Carbonic Acids are formed in large quantities as waste products in the muscles of hunted or driven animals, for the elimination of which a period of rest is required. In such animals, rigor mortis may be observed almost immediately after death, and the tissues are liable to undergo correspondingly early putrefactive change.

Sarc olactic Acid is isomeric with a laevorotatory body produced by the action of certain bacilli and vibrios.

A period of rest amounting to not less than forty-eight hours per ten miles driven is necessary for the complete elimination of these bodies. Otherwise not only will the flesh resist and disturb digestion, but it is of lower potential energy and calorific value.

During the summer many stations are invaded by "Blue-bottle" flies in large numbers, and meat becomes fly-blown within a few hours of being killed.

The common fly is recognized as being a most serious factor in the spread of disease. This he effects by settling on putrefying garbage or excreta and then transferring his attentions to articles of food. Therefore fly-blown meat should never be used for human consumption. Practically nothing is being done to check the number of these flies, which appear to increase year by year. Fortunately there is at present in the Colony no serious disease of which these flies could act as carriers, but they must be regarded as a source of potential danger, and steps should be taken as far as possible, to limit or reduce their numbers.

Persons responsible for the management of Ttry-works, &c., are advised to use every endeavour to prevent scraps of meat or offal upon which the grubs come to maturity from lying about, and every meat-house should be fly-tight and contain one or other of the many fly-catching devices.

Blue-bottles are said to have first made their appearance on West Falkland at the time the S.S. "Salembria" used to export frozen mutton.

DRINKING WATER.

A systematic Analysis of every water used for domestic purposes in West Falkland has been commenced, and such results as have been completed up to date are appended to this Report.*

In conducting these analyses, I have had before me the question of their suitability or otherwise for drinking purposes rather than the determination of their ultimate constituents. It is necessary, however, to dispel the erroneous impression that the chemist is able to pronounce definitely as to the purity or impurity and the safety or danger of a water by conducting certain routine examinations. He can speak authoritatively with regard to danger but not with regard to purity. Unless a water is highly polluted, the true significance of the results of analysis cannot be arrived at without actual knowledge of the source of the water.

Of all substances found in drinking waters, it is now generally admitted that only those of organic origin are seriously dangerous, and by far the greatest risk lies in the use of water which is liable to contain such living organisms as when introduced into the body are capable of producing specific diseases.

Chemical Analysis can give no information whatever concerning the presence of Pathogenic or Disease-causing Organisms. Certainly it can demonstrate the presence of organic material, but there are no chemical tests by which the harmlessness or danger of such organic material can be placed beyond doubt. It is comparatively easy to estimate the quantity and quality of the *inorganic* constituents, and to say whether safe or dangerous. But these are only of importance so far as their presence helps to a better understanding of the source of those of organic origin. It has frequently happened that chemical analysis has failed to reveal any trace of pollution in waters which have caused epidemics of disease. *No standard of purity can be enunciated.* Chemical and Bacteriological examination can prove danger but not safety.

With the advent of what I may term the "Bacteriological Era" and the ability to identify individual organisms in a mixed group, it was thought that Bacteriology rather than Chemistry would become the arbiter. The fallacy of this belief was soon proved. I have at hand a report of the great Typhoid Epidemic at Worthing, during the whole of which epidemic the Typhoid bacillus was never once found in the drinking water, though that was the cause of the outbreak. The Cholera bacillus was never found in the water of Hamburg during the epidemic.

Ab initio, it may be taken that most of the drinking waters are safe. But I have come across two waters which conclusively show how a pure spring may become contaminated by an adjacent settlement, if sufficient thought is not given to the relative positions of the house and the well when choosing the site of the former. There are considerations which far outweigh those of mere convenience. The discovery of these two waters alone fully justifies the laborious task imposed.

In connection with No. 6/1912 it will be observed that a minute trace of Copper was detected. It is very rare indeed for copper to be found in a drinking water, and I repeated the reaction several times in order to satisfy myself of its existence.

I visited the station in question with a view to stopping the water supply, and before making a more minute investigation of the well, asked whether copper was used in any way in the course of its construction, either as bolts or nails. The reply was in the negative. With the recent discovery of copper in South Shetlands in my mind, I began to wonder whether we were on the eve of a similar discovery. Investigation of the bottom of the well resulted in the discovery of some old copper cartridge cases; and a review of the water with its 00.0041 grains per gallon of free ammonia supplies what is scientifically a most interesting and unique explanation.

For the most part, it will be observed that the waters all exhibit a high rate of Oxygen absorption. In No. 5/1912 copious pollution was discovered and the absorbed oxygen reached the remarkable figure of 0.90 grains per gallon in 15 minutes at 212° Fahrenheit. This, in the absence of metallic impurity, denotes a most serious amount of pollution, though it has to be borne in mind that such contamination is superadded to a peaty water, which probably accounts for the extraordinary total.

On the other hand No. 3/1912 is stored rain-water containing low total solids, but 0.04 grains per gallon of Zinc as a metallic impurity. This was probably responsible for part of the absorbed oxygen.

Peaty waters always exhibit a high rate of Oxygen absorption; and having regard to the conditions of the country, a water springing from other than a peaty formation, yet showing a high oxygen absorption, must be treated with suspicion. No. 2/1912 is a case in point.

PERSONAL HYGIENE.

It is gratifying to find that much greater attention is paid to matters of personal hygiene.

Teeth in particular, are being attended to much more carefully, and the tooth-brush is becoming a comparatively common object. I would again point out the necessity for impressing the need for its regular use on the rising generation, and much good could be done if the Itinerant Schoolmasters would institute "Tooth-brush Drill" as is done in many schools in Britain. In this connection I would recommend to the consideration of the Government the supply of tooth-brushes to children of school age at cost price, upon the written order of a Government Schoolmaster.

I understand that better facilities for bathing now exist in certain cookhouses.

NEW BUILDING.

I have been consulted respecting a proposed addition to a cookhouse. It was intended to extend an existing building with a view to giving more and better accommodation, and after a survey and consultation, I prepared plans for an addition designed so that it might subsequently form the nucleus of a larger building when the time comes for the demolition of the older wing. I understand that the erection of this building is shortly to be commenced.

As a general principle, it is a mistake to add promiscuously and indefinitely to existing old buildings. Whenever possible, additions should be designed on a scale to suit possible future requirements.

I am convinced that the many advantages of flat Galvanized Iron as opposed to the corrugated have only to be realized for it to come into general use. Given houses of equal size, it offers a smaller superficial area, and consequently it is more economical in upkeep as regards paint.

Corrugated Iron offers from 30% to 40% greater radiating surface with a correspondingly greater loss of heat. Hence houses covered with flat Iron are warmer. Corrugated Iron was originally designed and intended only for roofs, and it is best employed in that situation.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-law made under section 19 of Ordinance No. V of 1894.

Bye-law No. 1 of 1912.

From the date on which this Bye-law comes into force no person shall sell milk, or keep cows for the purpose of selling milk in Stanley, without being duly registered in the Register kept by the Board of Health.

2. Any person desirous of selling milk in Stanley after the abovementioned date must first make application in writing to the Clerk of the Board who will then, without charge, insert the applicant's name in the Register.

3. The particulars to be given in the application and entered in the Register shall be in accordance with the Form annexed to this Bye-law.

4. Any person infringing the provisions of this Bye-law will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £2.

5. This Bye-law shall come into force on the 1st April, 1912.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES, 1911.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 14th March, 1912.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1911.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for the year was £24,206 18s. 1d. being £7,022 in excess of the original estimate, and £1,917 in excess of the revised estimate. This is the highest Revenue so far obtained in this Colony, and exceeded that of 1910, which was previously the largest, by 30%. The receipts exceeded the estimate under every Head except Division VII (Rents), where there was a deficit of £165. In my Message to Council of 20th October last I alluded to this question. The excesses included £978 under Customs; £2,707 under Licences and Internal Revenue (mostly Whaling Licences); £1,793 under Fees of Court and Offices (mostly Death Duties); and £913 under Interest.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1911 (exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary, £4,810, and payments under Live Stock Ordinance, £947) amounted to £17,650, or £6,556 less than the Ordinary Revenue. After deducting an Expenditure of £4,810 on Public Works Extraordinary, there was a surplus of Revenue over Expenditure on the year's operations of £1,746. The comparative statements (A) and (B) attached shew the estimated and actual Revenue and Expenditure under the various Heads.

4. The Council has already approved the items of over-expenditure referred to in Minutes, Nos. 1, 2 and 3 of 1911, and my Minute, No. 1 of 1912 of this date, and I have now to invite Members to pass the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance, 1912, and thereby give their sanction to the several sums, amounting in the aggregate to £4,022 6s. 4d., payable for the year 1911. I propose, however, to refer briefly to the principal items of over-expenditure.

5. Division II.—**The Governor, £53 5s 10d.**—Items 3, 7, 8, 9. Fees for Marriage Licences (recoverable) were exceeded by £6. Owing to an unusually prolonged winter the coal vote was exceeded by £16 18s. 6d. The cost of the books procured for the Library exceeded the estimate. A new typewriter (£18 8s. 0d.) was purchased at the end of 1911.

6.—Division X.—**Medical, £174 5s. 6d.** There was an expenditure of £81 17s. 6d. on account of salary to the Assistant Colonial Surgeon, East Falkland, (a new appointment), and an over-expenditure of £26 10s. 2d. under Quarantine. A sum of £46 8s. 0d. had to be expended on account of Lunatics.

7. Division XI.—**Education, £34 13s. 11d.** £30 was disbursed in fees for special instruction to Pupil Teachers.

8. Division XIII.—**Transport, £175 5s. 11d.** The vote for passages was exceeded by £115 18s. 10d., and that for Local Stores by £59 7s. 1d.

9. Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous, £347 11s. 10d.**—Items 1, 2, 9, 13 and 19. The Crown Agents' Expenses, £26 13s. 4d., and the cost of Telegrams, £31 15s. 5d., were under-estimated. The Fire Brigade was re-organised, and new hose, etc., procured at a cost of £79 18s. 9d. It was intended to improve the local telephone system, and £129 14s. 3d. was spent in labour and material. The new system will probably be completed in April next. The Coronation expenses amounted to £50 3s. 1d.

10. Division XV.—**Post Office, £146 17s. 3d.**—Items 1 and 9. There was an excess of £28 15s. 0d. on the first item owing to arrears of salary paid to the Postmaster. The subsidy granted on account of the West Falkland Mail was exceeded by £93 16s. 2d. in consequence of certain additional services performed by the Contractors.

11. Division XX.—**Public Works Recurrent, £223 17s. 7d.**—Items 1, 2, 3, and 4. There was an over-expenditure of £26 3s. 10d. on Roads and Drains; of the metal broken and ballast purchased, there are still a good many tons in hand. The excess of £86 5s. 7d. under Repairs is accounted for by the following: the Colonial Surgeon's quarters had to be repainted throughout after his departure; certain structural alterations and repairs were effected in the offices of the Treasurer and Postmaster, and a number of private letter boxes were erected in the Post Office. The furniture vote was exceeded by £24 4s. 8d. A new stock of linen and crockery was obtained for Government House; and cork carpet was laid in the hall and passages. A sum of £66 had to be spent in procuring two new horses.

12. Division XXI.—**Public Works Extraordinary, £2,630 0s. 7d.** The principal excesses were: £121 19s. 11d. on the draining of the Murray Heights, a very much needed and useful improvement which, though not yet completed, has worked satisfactorily so far; £152 8s. 7d. on account of the Sea Lion Light, caused, principally, by the strengthening of the structure on the recommendation of the Board of Trade; £83 7s. 8d. the addition to Rock Cottage; £98 6s. 11d. furniture for the new school-room; £77 14s. 5d., structural alterations and additions to the Bonded Store and Customs Shed; £326 5s. 7d., new schoolroom, Public School; £450 on account of the purchase of a stone cottage urgently required as quarters for officials; £84 6s. 6d. for the purchase of the Assembly Rooms site and adjacent land, after the fire, owing to its proximity to the Government Offices; and £1,659 8s. 1d. being an instalment of 70% approximately, of the value of the plant for the wireless installation. There was, however, a considerable saving made on the vote of £3,000 for this last item.

13. Division XXII.—**Live Stock, £63 3s. 9d.** An office was provided for the Stock Inspector at a cost of £104 6s. 8d., but there was a saving on certain other subheads.

14. I have already referred to the satisfactory financial results obtained last year, and incidentally, as evidence of the progress made, I may mention that ordinary revenue shews an increase of 59% on that obtained in 1905. While on the subject of the Colony's finances, I would particularly desire to draw attention to the surplus of assets, which amounted on 31st December to £91,181, including £86,455 on account of Land Sales,

and to recall the fact that the Colony has no public debt. It is estimated that the Land Sales Fund will exceed £94,000 at the end of 1912. I have every reason to believe that our present strong financial position will be still further strengthened during the next few years.

15. The opening of wireless communication with the mainland of South America will undoubtedly assist in attracting trade and shipping to this Colony. It is with satisfaction, therefore, that I am able to state that the site for the Falklands station has been selected by the erecting engineer, and the preparation of the foundations commenced. It is the intention of the Government to erect, on the completion of the Stanley station, an equally powerful installation at South Georgia. Should one of the floating factories at South Shetlands be fitted with a wireless plant capable of communicating with Headquarters, those engaged in the whaling industry at the Dependencies will then be linked up with Stanley and the outer world, and owners and employees will be able to keep in constant touch with one another. The question of connecting the East and West Falkland by wireless is receiving consideration.

16. All leaseholders at South Georgia and whaling licensees in the other Dependencies have been notified that the Government intends to amend the Whale Fishery Ordinance and to impose certain restrictions on the use of floating factories and vessels for towing whale carcasses.

17. Grytviken Harbour, South Georgia, is to be made a Port of Entry from the 1st October next, and at the same time the provisions of the Tariff and Customs Ordinances of this Colony will be extended to that Dependency. As you are aware, the necessary legislation for the imposition of an export duty of 3d a barrel (i.e. 1/6 a ton) on all whale oil has already been enacted.

18. From the revenue thus obtained it is proposed to erect the wireless station at South Georgia; place an Acetylene Light on a site to be selected hereafter—probably in the neighbourhood of Cape Buller—to facilitate the approach of vessels making the Dependency from the North West; build suitable quarters for the Stipendiary Magistrate and his Staff, as well as a Customs Shed and other necessary buildings; and to grant a subsidy for the regular carriage of Mails between South Georgia and Buenos Aires.

19. I think Members have reason to be satisfied with the manner in which the latent resources of the Colony and its Dependencies are being developed, and in thanking the Council for their cordial co-operation and support, I likewise congratulate them on the results so far achieved, and the favourable prospect of further development in the immediate future.

An Ordinance relating to Wireless Telegraphy.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Licences for Wireless
Telegraphy.

1. No person shall establish any wireless telegraph station or install or work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place or on board any British ship registered in the Colony except under and in accordance with a licence granted in that behalf by the Governor in Council.

Regulations made by
Governor in Council.

2. No person shall work any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed on any merchant ship (whether British or Foreign) whilst that ship is in the territorial waters of the Colony, otherwise than in accordance with regulations made in that behalf by the Governor in Council, and the Governor in Council may, by any such regulations impose penalties, recoverable before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner, for the breach of any such regulations, not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence, and may provide for the forfeiture on any such breach of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or worked on such ship.

Penalties.

3. If any person establishes a wireless telegraph station without a licence in that behalf or installs or works any apparatus for wireless telegraphy without a licence in that behalf he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and be liable on summary conviction thereof to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or to imprisonment not exceeding three months and, on conviction in the Supreme Court, to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months and in either case be liable to forfeit any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or worked without a licence.

Power to issue
Search Warrant.

4. If a Justice of the Peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for supposing that a wireless telegraph station has been established without a licence in that behalf, or that any apparatus for wireless telegraphy has been installed or worked in any place or on board any merchant ship within his jurisdiction without a licence in that behalf or contrary to the provisions of the regulations made under this Ordinance, he may grant a search warrant to any constable or to any officer appointed in that behalf by the Governor and named in the warrant, and a warrant so granted shall authorise the officer named therein to enter and inspect the station, place or ship and to seize any apparatus which appears to him to be used or intended to be used for wireless telegraphy therein.

Definition.

5. The expression "wireless telegraphy" means any communication by telegraph without the aid of any wire connecting the points from and at which the messages or other communications are sent and received: Provided that nothing in this Ordinance shall prevent any person from making or using electrical apparatus for actuating machinery or for any purpose other than the transmission of messages.

Proviso.

Repeal.

6. The Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1903, is hereby repealed.

Short title.

7. This Ordinance may be cited as the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1912.

POST OFFICE RECEIPTS.

The receipts for the year amounted to £1,491 18s. 2d., or £66 14s. 4d, more than the amount received in 1910. (Vide appendix A). There was an increase of receipts in respect of the following sub-heads, namely:—

1. Sale of Stamps
4. Parcel Post, and
5. Poundage, P. O's,

while a decrease is shewn under:—

2. Insufficient postage and Void M. O's.

The decrease in receipts under this head is accounted for by greater care being exercised in the prepayment of correspondence. Formerly it has not been the practice for Books, Newspapers, etc., insufficiently prepaid to be charged on delivery with double the deficiency. I am of opinion, however, that deficient postage on this class of correspondence should be collected in future.

EXPENDITURE.

The expenditure for the year, including the subsidy of £2,500 paid to the Pacific Steam Navigation Co., amounted to £3,775 17s. 3d. (Vide Appendix B).

POST OFFICES.

The Offices opened at New Island, W. F. and South Georgia have amply justified their establishment. Proper supervision is now exercised over the large quantity of mail matter received and despatched at both places. The objectionable practice that hitherto existed of private persons handling the mails has thus been eliminated.

Additional facilities are given for the delivery of letters by the installation of Private Letter Boxes, the charge for a Box being £1 1s. 0d. per annum. The holder has the privilege of getting letters at any time during office hours.

A much needed and generally appreciated improvement was made by the erection of a waiting room with paying window to the Postmaster's Office—this addition, while giving greater efficiency has also facilitated the sale of Postal Orders and the transaction of other business connected with the Department.

POSTAL.

The total number of postal packets of every description received and despatched (including estimated number handled at South Georgia) was 147,764 or 5,427 more than the number handled last year (Appendix C). Low rates of postage combined with other

facilities are no doubt accountable for the increase.

The total number of Mails received and sent during the year amounted to 1080 Bags and Parcel receptacles. Owing to the large amount of correspondence from Norway for South Georgia the Norwegian Postal authorities, with the concurrence of the Postmaster General, instituted on the 1st January, 1912, a direct Mail Service with South Georgia via Buenos Aires. Formerly the mails were sent through the G. P. O., London. The inauguration of this service is a great advantage to residents at South Georgia. I am of opinion that a similar service to this Colony would be advantageous to the numerous Whaling vessels that call here.

INTER-INSULAR SERVICE.

The R. M. S. "Columbus" to which reference was made in my previous report commenced the carriage of West Falkland mails in April. Unfortunately, however, owing to an accident to her machinery, the proper carrying out of the itinerary was temporarily suspended. The service has since run smoothly, and has given general satisfaction. On almost every occasion the return mails were received in time for departure by the homeward European Mail. The itinerary of the Mail Steamer includes San Carlos, N. on the East Falkland (where mails for San Carlos S., Teal Inlet and Douglas Station are left) Port Howard, Fox Bay, Port Stephens and New Island. As occasion requires the call at San Carlos is omitted on the outward trip, a call being made at Darwin. In addition to the above a quarterly call is made at Hill Cove and West Point Island.

MAIL SERVICE.

The Mail Packet Service was performed throughout year by the P. S. N. Co., Ltd., 13 calls outward and 13 calls homeward being made.

In several instances the mail steamer arrived under the contract time of 27 days. With one exception, the Time Table was kept with great regularity.

PARCEL POST.

The number and value of Parcels received from and despatched to the United Kingdom during the year was 5,672 value £8,929 14s. 3d., or an increase in number of 320 value £706 14s. 2d. over the number received last year. It is satisfactory to note that, notwithstanding the large number of parcels handled, and the several places in the Colony to which they were despatched, no complaints were made as to miscarriage.

MONEY ORDERS.

Issued. 2060 Money Orders of the value of £9,528 18s 2d. were issued on the United Kingdom and other countries, an increase in value over the previous year of £397 12s. 0d. A list of the Countries Money Orders were issued on is given in Appendix D.

Paid. 89 Money Orders to the value of £330 6s. 4d. were paid, an increase in number over the previous year of 15 value £71 3s. 9d. See Appendix D. for the Countries in which they were issued.

POSTAL ORDERS.

Issued. The sales of Postal Orders show a considerable increase over the preceding year. 2173 were sold value £1,012 10s. 6d. giving an increase over the previous year of 586 Postal Orders value £357 19s. 0d.

The £1 value shows the largest sale, no less than 475 being sold. The 10/- value had the next largest sale with 286. Next in order comes the 5/- value with 214.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Details of the sales of postage stamps and other stamped postal matter will be found in Appendix E.

The total value of stamps, post cards, etc., sold was £1,133 12s. 4d., or a slight increase over last year's figures of £17 15s. 0½d.

The 1d. stamp commanded the largest sale, the total number sold being 59,738. The next largest sales in their respective orders were ½d. 40,009, 2½d. 13,205, 2d. 8,149.

The sales of the larger values of 3/- and 5/- compare favourably with the number sold last year. The sale of Postcards increased considerably, 1212 being sold as against

185 last year. This abnormal increase is due to the large purchases made by the Japanese Training Ship "Taisei Maru".

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

The hitherto isolated state of the Colony will shortly be terminated by the erection of a Wireless Telegraph Station—the tender of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co. has been accepted for a 5 kilowatt Station capable of communicating at night with Buenos Aires or Monte Video. The necessary plant has already arrived in the Colony and a suitable site has been selected for its erection.

The provision of Wireless facilities, in addition to its many other advantages, will be of great benefit to the Postal Service of the Colony.

TELEPHONES.

In Stanley good progress has been made with the erection of Poles, Telephone wires, etc., in connection with the Telephone Exchange. Besides the linking up of Government buildings with those of business houses, provision is being made to install telephones in private houses at a fixed annual rate.

The inauguration of the new Telephone system in Stanley will be a general benefit to the community.

There is a long distance telephone between Stanley and Darwin, (60 miles), on which messages may be exchanged at a reasonable charge.

Two private Telephones have been recently erected by the Honble. Vere Packe, one to Port Louis, S. and one to Fitzroy, S.

PERSONAL.

During the year under report Mr. Craigie-Halkett, who was appointed to act as Colonial Postmaster in November, 1910, was confirmed in the appointment. Mr. J. W. Brown was appointed Deputy Postmaster at Fox Bay, vice Dr. Turner, resigned. Mr. E. Binnie proceeded to South Georgia to act as Deputy Postmaster during Mr. Wilson's absence on leave, and Mr. A. Newing succeeded Mr. Binnie as Deputy Postmaster at New Island.

Rules relating to the Stanley Telephone Exchange.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by "The Post Office Ordinance, 1898", His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Rules:—

1. The Stanley Telephone System will be under the management of the Post Office. All complaints by subscribers with regard to the working of the system should be made, and all irregularities reported direct to the Postmaster.

TOWN LINES.

2. The subscription to the Stanley Telephone Exchange by annual subscribers shall be £8 per annum for each instrument, payable to the Postmaster in advance.

3. Any person who wishes to become a subscriber for a period of three years, will, on giving the necessary guarantee to the Postmaster, be charged an annual subscription of £5 : 5 : 0 for each instrument.

4. The subscription or rental shall include the fixing and maintenance of the necessary wire and instrument, and will allow the subscriber to communicate at all times with other subscribers in the town of Stanley. No call, unless of an urgent nature, shall be made after 9 p.m.

5. The Government will maintain the service in good condition as far as possible, but do not guarantee continued service.

6. The telephone instrument is the property of the Government and will be removed on the lapsing of the subscription.

7. The subscriber will be responsible for the proper care of the instrument while in his possession, and will be personally liable for any damage thereto arising from wilful neglect or carelessness.

8. NON-SUBSCRIBERS, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF BONA FIDE BOARDERS AT HOTELS, ARE NOT PERMITTED TO MAKE USE OF A SUBSCRIBER'S TELEPHONE.

9. Non-subscribers desirous of using the town telephone can do so at the Call Room at the Exchange on payment of a fee of 2d. a call to the operator in attendance.

10. No call is to exceed three minutes duration. Should a longer call be required, there will be a further charge of 2d. for every three minutes or portion of three minutes.

LONG DISTANCE LINES.

(Darwin, Goose Green, Fitzroy, Port Louis, and intermediate stations, also Cape Pembroke Lighthouse).

11. Subscribers (who are non-owners of Long Distance Lines) and non-subscribers in Stanley desirous of using Long Distance Lines shall pay the following charges:—

6d. a call not exceeding five minutes duration, or,

6d. for a message not exceeding 30 words.

In the case of non-subscribers there will be an additional charge of 2d. for the use of the Exchange as provided above for a call in the town.

12. Non-subscribers in the Camps who wish to communicate with anyone in Stanley (whether subscriber or non-subscriber) shall pay a similar scale of fees to that mentioned in the preceding Rule, to the operator in charge of the station where the message is despatched. In the case of a message to a non-subscriber in Stanley a further fee of 2d. will be charged to the sender for delivery.

13. Camp operators must send in on an approved form to the Postmaster a half yearly return of all fees collected.

14. All messages transmitted over Long Distance Lines by or on behalf of, or on account of

- (a) the owner of a Long Distance Line, or
- (b) the Government,

shall be free of cost.

15. Regulation No. 3 of the Regulations of the Governor in Council of the 30th March, 1908, is hereby repealed.

16. Any person infringing any of these Rules shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty shillings.

An Ordinance
To regulate Cinematograph and similar
Exhibitions.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. (1) It shall not be lawful for any person to advertise, present or carry on any Cinematograph or other similar Exhibition, unless a description of every scene intended to be presented or produced at such Exhibition has been first furnished to the Colonial Secretary, nor without the written permission of the Governor granted under his hand or under the hand of the Colonial Secretary.

Cinematograph Exhibitions subject to conditions.

(2) The Governor may refuse to grant such permission or grant it subject to such special conditions and restrictions, to be specified in the permission as to him may seem fit; and any such permission may be revoked by the Governor at any time.

2. Where the Governor grants any such permission as aforesaid upon condition that the Exhibition be conducted under the superintendence of some person designated in the permission, then it shall be lawful, at any time, for the person so designated to order such Exhibition to cease or to give any other direction he may think necessary for ensuring the safety from fire of the premises at which the Exhibition takes place and of the people attending the Exhibition.

Supervision to ensure safety from fire.

Penalty.

3. Any person who conducts or in any way assists in conducting any such Exhibition as aforesaid in contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance, or the Rules made thereunder, or of any condition or restriction specified in a permission granted under this Ordinance, shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Duty of occupier, etc. of premises.

4. (1) It shall be the duty of the occupier or the person who manages or receives the rent of any premises at which it may be proposed to conduct any such Exhibition as aforesaid, to ascertain whether the requisite permission shall have been obtained and, if so, the terms of such permission; and it shall also be the duty of such occupier or person to give notice to the Chief Constable, or to the Officer in charge of the Police Station, if and so soon as he has reason to believe that there is an intention to proceed with the Exhibition either without the Governor's permission, or with such permission but without having everything done, which may be required by such permission to be done previous to the Exhibition taking place.

Penalty.

(2) Any occupier or person referred to in this section who fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Power of entry.

5. A constable or any other officer appointed for the purpose by the Governor may at all reasonable times enter any premises in which he has reason to believe that such an Exhibition as aforesaid is being or about to be given, with a view to seeing whether the provisions of this Ordinance or any Rules made thereunder, and the conditions of any permission granted under this Ordinance, have been complied with; and if any person prevents or obstructs the entry of any constable or officer appointed as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Rules.

6. The Governor in Council may make and thereafter may, from time to time, vary, amend or rescind, such Rules as he may deem expedient for regulating and controlling cinematograph and other similar exhibitions.

General penal clause.

7. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, or against any provision of the Rules made thereunder, shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds.

Burden of proof.

8. In any prosecution under this Ordinance, the onus of proving that he had complied with the law shall lie on the Defendant.

Ordinance not applicable to private exhibitions.

9. This Ordinance shall not apply to an exhibition given in private premises to which the public are not admitted, whether on payment or otherwise.

Short title.

10. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Cinematograph Ordinance, 1912".

Passed the Legislative Council this 2nd day of April, 1912.

Education Report for 1911 by the Government Inspector of Schools.

The results of the Educational year in the Government School may be classed as highly satisfactory.

There is a further advance in the numbers of the children on the roll, and a very considerable improvement in the average attendances. In both these cases statistics point to the fact that the methods and tuition are duly appreciated alike by parents and children.

The Quarterly examinations held by the Government Schoolmaster further point to the steady work carried on and prove that steady progress is being made in all subjects taught.

There has been a marked improvement both this year and last in the neatness and penmanship of the written work.

The plain sewing is quite one of the most satisfactory features in the School.

Drawing shows a satisfactory advance.

The Infants are well and happily taught.

The appointment of Pupil Teachers has worked quite satisfactorily.

During the year an important addition was made to the School Buildings: the new Class Room has proved a great advantage and with growing numbers this further accommodation was quite necessary.

In the "Camps" good work is being done by the Itinerant Schoolmasters. Generally the parents give their best assistance to the Teachers, by proper and regular supervision of home lessons, and when this is done progress is quite satisfactory. That the work and visits of the Schoolmasters are really appreciated, is proved by the wishes often expressed that the visits could be more frequent.

Whaling Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 3 of the "Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908", His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. The period for which Whaling Licences may be issued shall commence on the 1st October of each year and terminate on the 30th September of the succeeding year.

2. Licences will be issued in the name of the Company applying for them and are not transferable. A licensed vessel is prohibited from catching whales for a Company other than that mentioned in the Licence. Should the owner or master of a licensed vessel desire from any cause whatsoever to catch whales for a Company other than that indicated in the Licence, the permission of the Governor in Council must be first obtained.

3. The fee payable for each Licence is £100 : this fee will not be refunded if for any cause the Licence is not used.

4. Each Whaling Licence shall be applicable to one floating factory and two steam whalers, and should permission be granted to any applicant by the Governor in Council to employ a third steam whaler a special fee of £100 will be payable on this account.

5. On and after the 1st April, 1912, separate Whaling Licences shall be issued for:—

- (a) The South Shetlands and Graham's Land,
- (b) The South Orkneys,
- (c) The Falkland Islands,
- (d) The Sandwich Islands,

but no further Licence or Lease for whaling purposes shall be issued, with the exception of renewals of existing annual Licences for one floating factory and two steam whalers, without the permission of the Governor in Council.

6. Any applicant for a Whaling Licence must send in his application so as to reach the Colonial Secretary, Falkland Islands, not later than the 1st April in each year, giving the name of the Company and the names of the vessels to be employed.

7. Each application for a Whaling Licence shall be registered when received in a register to be termed the Whaling Licence Register.

8. Every licensed vessel shall, at the end of the season's whaling operations, proceed direct to a Port of Entry in the Colony or its Dependencies and report to the Collector of Customs or Customs Officer, full particulars of the catch including the number of barrels of oil obtained.

9. Licences will be issued on the condition that the licensee, or person employed by him, will not take penguin or birds' eggs without a written order from a Magistrate or a Customs Officer, and will not kill or capture seals (including all animals of the seal kind), penguins or birds in the Dependencies of the Colony or the waters thereof except when in actual need of them for food.

10. No licensee, or person employed by him, shall kill or shoot any whale calf, or any female whale which is accompanied by a calf.

11. In these Regulations "carcass" shall mean any dead whale. Any carcass abandoned in the territorial waters of the Dependencies or thrown up on the sea shore is the property of the Crown.

12. No moorings shall be laid down in the harbours of Deception Island, South Shetlands, without special permission; and the owner of any moorings already laid down shall at once remove them or alter their position on being requested to do so by the Government.

13. No whale carcass shall be moored either to a mooring, or to a vessel, in the Harbours of Deception Island, so as to interfere unduly, in the opinion of a Magistrate or a Customs Officer, with the traffic or operations of another whaling Company. No whale carcass shall at the end of the whaling season and on the departure of the floating factory be left attached to any mooring except with the permission of a Magistrate or a Customs Officer.

14. Any licensee, or person employed by him, committing a breach of these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for each offence, and the licensee will at the same time become liable to the immediate forfeiture of his Licence, and of any claim to a Whaling Licence in the future.

15. These Regulations shall have no application to South Georgia, and shall supersede the Regulations of the Governor in Council of the 22nd January, 1912.

An Ordinance

To amend "The Whale Fishery
Ordinance, 1908".

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. Section 2 of the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908, hereinafter called the principal Ordinance, is hereby amended by inserting therein the following subsection after subsection (2):

New subsections.

(3) The Colonial Secretary or such other officer as the Governor may appoint for the purpose, may grant Floating Factory Licences, that is to say, licences to flench, render, boil down, treat or manufacture whale carcasses or any part thereof by means of a floating factory, on such terms and conditions and on payment of a fee of not less than £100 and not more than £200, as the Governor in Council may approve.

Power to grant
Floating Factory
Licences.

2. Section 6 of the principal Ordinance is hereby amended by inserting therein the following subsections:

(c) Employs any vessel or floating factory for the purpose of flenching, rendering, boiling down, treating or manufacturing the blubber or any part of the carcase of any whale in Colonial Waters unless he shall have been expressly authorised to do so by a licence under this Ordinance or by the lease of a site on land for whaling purposes.

Offences.

(d) Employs any vessel for the purpose of towing the body of any whale in Colonial Waters unless he shall have been expressly authorised by licence or otherwise to do so.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the Whale Fishery Amendment Ordinance, 1912, and shall be read and construed as one with the principal Ordinance and any copy of the principal Ordinance printed after the commencement of this Ordinance may be printed with the amendments made by this Ordinance.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws relating to Ash-pits framed under section 19 of Ordinance No. V of 1894.

Clause 4 of the Bye-laws relating to Ash-pits published in the *Gazette* of 1st June, 1909, is hereby repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—

4. Every such ash-pit shall be constructed of metal, stones or bricks, bound together by mortar or cement, and shall be provided with a removable cover to be constructed of a framework of wood covered with iron, one portion of which must be hinged so as to be easily opened. It shall be of such cubic capacity as will suffice to hold one month's accumulation of rubbish. No ash-pit shall be of less than 6 cubic feet capacity.

Wireless Telegraphy Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 2 of the "Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1912", His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. All apparatus for wireless telegraphy on board a Merchant Ship in the territorial waters of this Colony shall be worked in such a way as not to interfere with (a) Naval Signalling, or (b) the working of any wireless telegraph station lawfully established, installed or worked in the Colony or the territorial waters thereof, and in particular the said apparatus shall be so worked as not to interrupt or interfere with the transmission of any messages between wireless telegraph stations established as aforesaid on land and wireless telegraph stations established on ships at sea.

2. No apparatus for wireless telegraphy on board a Merchant Ship shall be worked or used whilst such ship is in any of the harbours of the Colony, except with the special or general permission in writing of the Governor.

3. These Regulations shall not apply to the use of wireless telegraphy for the purpose of making or answering signals of distress.

4. If at any time in the opinion of the Governor an emergency has arisen in which it is expedient for the public service that His Majesty's Government should have control over the transmission of messages by wireless telegraphy the use of wireless telegraphy on board Merchant Ships whilst in the territorial waters shall be subject to such further regulations as may be made by the Governor from time to time, and such regulations may prohibit or regulate such use in all cases or in such cases as may be deemed desirable.

5. The Master of any Merchant Ship on board of which apparatus for wireless telegraphy shall be worked or used contrary to these Regulations shall on summary conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence and to the forfeiture of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed on such ship, and in default of payment to be imprisoned with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding three months.

6. These Regulations shall come into force on the first day of September, 1912.

An Ordinance

To amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. When any person against whom a prohibition order has been made or renewed under sections 25 or 26 of the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, shall :

Offences punishable.

- (a) send, or in any way influence, any person to procure him liquor ; or
- (b) be found in possession of any liquor ; or
- (c) be found drunk in Stanley ;

he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £5 or to imprisonment not exceeding one month.

2. Any person convicted under section 1 of this Ordinance or convicted under section 1, subsection (c) of the Licensing Ordinance, 1904, of selling, supplying or distributing liquor to a prohibited person, shall be liable on a second or subsequent conviction to imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Penalty on second conviction.

3. The Licensing Ordinance, 1911, No. VI of 1911 is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

4. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the Licensing Ordinance, 1912, and shall be construed as one with the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, and the Licensing Ordinance, 1904.

An Ordinance

**To amend the Registration Ordinance
No. XII of 1853.**

Whereas it is advisable to amend the Registration Ordinance No. XII of 1853, (hereinafter called the principal Ordinance) BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Certificates of cause of death.

1. (1) The Registrar General shall from time to time furnish printed forms of certificates of cause of death gratis to any Medical Practitioner residing or practising in the Colony.

(2) In case of the death of any person who has been attended by a medical practitioner, that practitioner shall sign and give to some person required by the principal Ordinance to give information concerning the death a certificate stating to the best of his knowledge and belief the cause of death, and such person shall upon giving information concerning the death or giving notice of the death, deliver that certificate to the registrar and the cause of death stated in that certificate shall be entered in the register, together with the name of the certifying medical practitioner.

(3) Where an inquest is held on the body of any deceased person a medical certificate of the cause of death need not be given to the registrar, but the certificate of the finding of the Jury given by the Coroner, or the written statement of the Coroner, shall be sufficient.

2. The Governor in Council may, from time to time by order published in the Gazette, alter any of the forms contained in the Schedules to the principal Ordinance, or prescribe new forms for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the principal Ordinance, or this Ordinance, and may from time to time make Regulations for carrying into effect the said provisions and revoke and alter such Regulations and the Governor in Council may impose penalties not exceeding _____ pounds for the breach of such Regulations.

Power of Governor in Council to alter forms and make regulations.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the Registration Amendment Ordinance, 1912, and shall be read and construed as one with the principal Ordinance, and any copy of the principal Ordinance printed after the commencement of this Ordinance may be printed with the Amendments made by this Ordinance.

Short title.

Objects and Reasons.

The Object of this Bill is to put in force in the Colony the law of England in regard to Certificates of cause of death and to give the Governor in Council the power of prescribing improved forms for registration and certificates. The provisions of the Bill are modelled on sections 20 and 44 of 37 & 38 Vict. Ch. 88.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, September, 25th, 1912.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you the Estimates for the year 1913. They have been prepared somewhat differently from what you have hitherto been accustomed to, and are now more in accordance with the form adopted in other Colonies.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue has been estimated at £23,649 or £558 less than the actual receipts in 1911. This revenue, as will be shewn later, should be sufficient to cover both the Ordinary and Extraordinary Expenditure, and leave a balance in hand of £318. The principal anticipated increases and decreases under the several Divisions are shewn below:—

3. The export tax of 3d. a barrel on whale oil is responsible for the increase under Division I, and the new issue of stamps for that under Division VI. The increase under Interest and the decrease under Rents are the outcome of the operation of the Land Ordinance, 1903, as has been explained in previous Messages.

EXPENDITURE.

4. The Estimated Ordinary Expenditure (exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary, £2,170, and payments under Live Stock Ordinance, £581) is £20,580, as against an expenditure of £17,650 in 1911, and a revised expenditure for 1912 of £20,034. A schedule of additions and reductions shewing the difference between the proposed expenditure, and the approved estimate for 1912, is given in the Appendix.

5. Division II.—**The Governor.**—Items 1 & 2. An increase of £50 to the Governor's salary, as also an entertainment allowance of £250, was recommended by the Secretary of State last year and approved by the Council. The salary of the office will be reconsidered hereafter when the time arrives to appoint my successor.

Item 4. The salary of the Private Secretary has been raised from £50 to £100.

6. Division III.—**Colonial Secretary.**—Item 1. The salary of the post was increased last year from £500 to £600 on the recommendation of the Unofficial Members and with the approval of the Secretary of State.

Item 4. The Clerk to Councils has not hitherto received any direct remuneration for his services. The increase of work justifies the salary of £24 which has been provided for.

7. Division IV.—**Treasury & Customs.**—Items 6 & 7. The establishment of a Port of Entry at South Georgia with effect from 1st October next has necessitated the appointment of a Customs Officer at £150. The decrease in the revenue from import duties on wine, malt, spirits, and tobacco during the last five years, notwithstanding the growth of shipping and population, demands the strengthening of the Customs Staff by an Assistant Officer in Stanley, £84, and, as occasion requires, a second Officer at New Island.

8. Division VI.—**Port & Marine.**—Certain items have been transferred from Colonial Engineer and placed under this Division. Overtime, Launch, has been increased from £10 to £25.

9. Division VII.—**Legal.**—£50 has been added to the salary of the Magistrate at South Georgia owing to increased work and responsibility. Provision has also been made for a Magistrate, who will likewise act as Customs Officer, at Deception Island, South Shetlands, where a Port of Entry is to be established from 1st October next. This Officer will remain in the Dependency during the whaling season.

10. Division IX.—**Medical.**—Item 5. This is a new item and provides for the services of a Dental Surgeon at a salary of £300. This official will be under a three years agreement, and will attend Government servants and their families free of cost, but will be entitled to charge fees for extraordinary operations. In addition to being required to undertake private practice for Colonists, in accordance with a scale of charges approved by the Government, he will attend all schoolchildren between the ages of 6 and 14—other than those mentioned above—at a fee of 10/- a head per annum. I am hopeful that his services will prove a great boon to the Colony. I may explain that he will be required to visit out-lying stations from time to time as directed by the Colonial Surgeon.

Items 9, 10, 11 and 16. The King Edward Memorial Hospital will be taken over by the Government from the Committee on completion. At the east end of the Hospital, and forming part of the building, will be the Victoria Cottage Home. The proposal to amalgamate these two Institutions has received the approval of my advisers, and indeed it is the only way in which to provide the necessary medical and nursing staff for the former. Without such an arrangement, and considerable assistance from Government, no adequate Hospital could possibly have been erected with the funds available. I attach great importance to the fact that the new institution will include a maternity ward.

The second indoor servant will only be engaged when the number of patients renders her services necessary. The outdoor servant, in addition to being employed as a gardener and general labourer, will attend to the heating and hot water systems, etc.

It is estimated that the additional cost to Government by the above amalgamation will not exceed £150 per annum, and the advantage to the Colony in having an up-to-date Hospital with properly equipped operating theatre can hardly be overestimated.

11. Division X.—Education.—Item 8. Two additional Pupil Teachers have been appointed, but it is not intended to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of one of the Assistant Teachers. Under the Education Ordinance of 1909, the present average attendance of scholars at the Government school permits the employment of five Pupil Teachers. The increase of £6 under Cleaning is rendered necessary by the new schoolroom.

12. Division XIII.—Miscellaneous.—Item 3. A contribution of £30 has again been made towards the salary of the Caretaker at the Cemetery. It will I fear be many years before the interest from the Endowment Fund, which now amounts to about £300, will be sufficient to replace the above grant.

Item 6. The expansion of Government property renders an addition under Fire Insurance unavoidable.

13. Division XIV.—Post Office.—Item 7. The new and efficient Telephone Exchange has a Staff of two day operators and one night operator whose salaries should be covered by the fees received from public calls and subscriptions.

Item 11. A subsidy of £480 has been provided for the conveyance of mails to and fro once in every four weeks between Buenos Aires and King Edward Cove, South Georgia.

14. Division XV.—Colonial Engineer.—Item 2. The increased demand for wireless operators consequent upon the "Titanic" disaster and the erection of a large number of new wireless stations in other countries has necessitated the addition of £144 to this item.

Item 5. It has not been found possible to retain two carpenters throughout the year at the figure hitherto provided (£204) which has therefore been raised to £240.

Item 6. The improved lighting of the town with extra Kitson lamps has resulted in the lamplighter being seldom available for other work except during the period when the lamps are not lighted (November to February). In these circumstances it is more equitable to allow the lamplighter to draw the larger portion of his salary from this vote.

15. Division XIX.—Public Works Recurrent.—Items 7 and 8. The repairs to the Sea Wall and the Common Fence, which are of a recurrent nature, come more appropriately under this Division than under Public Works Extraordinary where they have hitherto appeared.

16. Division XX.—Public Works Extraordinary.—Item 1. Kitson lamp £40. It is proposed to purchase another lamp.

Item 2. Peat Sheds, £60. Two more peat Sheds are required.

Item 3. Sea Lion Light, £400. This is for the conveyance of the material to Sea Lion Island and its erection, and includes the cost of labour and maintenance of the men while there, and the remuneration of the expert engineer for visiting the island and adjusting the sun-valve. I fear it will not be possible to complete this important work until towards the end of 1913 owing to the erection of the Town Hall.

Item 4. Town Hall, £1,050. The bulk of the material for the Town Hall is expected shortly in the barquentine "Ragnhild", and will therefore require to be paid for in 1912. By chartering a sailing vessel the heavy item of "landing charges" will be avoided. Of the above sum, £750 is to be expended in erecting the building, and £300 is on account of an Air Gas installation including piping and generating plant.

Item 5. Wireless Installation, £420. This is the balance of the purchase money of the plant, i.e., 15% of the contract price (£2,800) which has to be paid hereafter to the Contractors who guarantee the efficiency of the works for a period of twelve months from the date of the establishment of communication with South America. The station is now complete, and two operators arrived on the 18th instant to take charge. On the night of the 23rd instant certain tests were made and messages exchanged with H.M.S. "Active" at Monte Video.

The question of wireless communication with the West Falkland, South Georgia and the South Shetlands is still under consideration, as also a proposal to survey certain of the uncharted waters of the Dependencies.

Item 6. Fencing Wireless Station, £200. It is thought advisable to enclose the operators' quarters and the power house with a wooden paling, and to fence off the land between the station and the south coast.

17. Division XXI.—**Live Stock Ordinance.**—Items 8 and 9. The operation of Ordinance No. 3 of 1905, which provides for the diminishing of geese, ceases at the end of the year, and it is not proposed to renew it at present. This explains why no provision is made for the purchase of geese beaks. Owing, however, to the damage done to sheep by turkey buzzards, carranchos, and johnny rooks, it is intended to continue the diminution of these birds, and the Receivers of Beaks will, as heretofore, issue the necessary certificates.

An Ordinance

to provide for the preservation of certain
Wild Animals and Birds in South Georgia.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the
Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 1st day of
December one thousand nine hundred and twelve, which day is in
this Ordinance referred to as the Commencement of this Ordinance.

Commencement of
Ordinance.

2. From and after the commencement of this Ordinance it
shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully kill or take or attempt
to kill or take or use any lime, trap, net, snare or other instrument
for the purpose of taking or to have in his control or possession
for the purpose of taking or to have in his control or possession
killed or taken any wild animal or bird which is included in the
first Schedule to this Ordinance annexed and any person who com-
mits any such offence shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not
exceeding ten pounds for every such animal and to a penalty not
exceeding two pounds for every such bird in respect of which an
offence has been committed.

Prohibition.

Penalty.

Close Season.

3. From and after the commencement of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully kill or take or attempt to kill or take or use any lime, trap, net, snare or other instrument for the purpose of taking or to have in his control or possession killed or taken between the 1st day of October in any year and the following last day of February, both days inclusive, any wild bird which is included in the second Schedule to this Ordinance annexed, and any person who commits any such offence shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of one pound for every bird in respect of which an offence has been committed.

Penalty.

Power of Governor in Council.

4. The Governor in Council may, from time to time, by order published in the Gazette, add any wild animal or bird to the lists in the Schedules to this Ordinance annexed and a copy of the Gazette containing any order made under this Ordinance shall be evidence of such order having been made.

Exemptions.

5. The Governor and any person duly authorised in writing by him or by the Stipendiary Magistrate, South Georgia, may kill or capture for scientific or other purpose any wild animal or wild bird, and in so doing shall be exempt from any penalties provided by this Ordinance.

Prosecution of offences.

6. Every offence under this Ordinance, may be prosecuted before a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner.

Short title.

7. This Ordinance may be cited as the Wild Animals and Birds (South Georgia) Ordinance, 1912.

An Ordinance

To amend the Registration Ordinance

No. XII of 1853.

Whereas it is advisable to amend the Registration Ordinance No. XII of 1853, (hereinafter called the principal Ordinance) BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. (1) The Registrar General shall from time to time furnish printed forms of certificates of cause of death gratis to any medical practitioner residing or practising in the Colony.

Certificates of cause of death.

(2) In case of the death of any person who has been attended by a medical practitioner, that practitioner shall sign and give to some person required by the principal Ordinance to give information concerning the death a certificate stating to the best of his knowledge and belief the cause of death, and such person shall upon giving information concerning the death or giving notice of the death, deliver that certificate to the registrar and the cause of death stated in that certificate shall be entered in the register, together with the name of the certifying medical practitioner.

(3) Where an inquest is held on the body of any deceased person a medical certificate of the cause of death need not be given to the registrar, but the certificate of the finding of the Jury given by the Coroner, or the written statement of the Coroner, shall be sufficient.

Power of Governor in Council to alter forms and make regulations.

2. The Governor in Council may, from time to time by order published in the Gazette, alter any of the forms contained in the Schedules to the principal Ordinance, or prescribe new forms for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the principal Ordinance, or this Ordinance, and may from time to time make Regulations for carrying into effect the said provisions and revoke and alter such Regulations and the Governor in Council may impose penalties not exceeding twenty pounds for the breach of such Regulations.

Short title.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the Registration Amendment Ordinance, 1912, and shall be read and construed as one with the principal Ordinance, and any copy of the principal Ordinance printed after the commencement of this Ordinance may be printed with the Amendments made by this Ordinance.

An Ordinance

To prohibit the passing of sentence of death on a child or young person.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. In this Ordinance—

Definitions.

The expression "child" means a person who in the opinion of the Court is under the age of fourteen years;

The expression "young person" means a person who in the opinion of the Court is fourteen years of age or upwards and under the age of sixteen years.

Sentence of death on child or young person not to be passed.

2. Sentence of death shall not be pronounced on or recorded against a child or young person, but in lieu thereof the Court shall sentence the child or young person to be detained during His Majesty's pleasure, and, if so sentenced, he shall be liable to be detained in such place and under such conditions as the Governor in Council may direct, and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody.

Repeal.

3. The Children Ordinance, 1909, No. IV of 1909, is hereby repealed.

Short title.

4. This Ordinance may be cited as the Children Ordinance, 1912.

We would like to thank all the officials for their kind courtesy and Mr. Harding, the Manager of the Falkland Islands Company, we thank especially for the way he provided bedding for the crew now housed in the Naval Station.

Licensing Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by the Licensing Ordinance 1882-1896, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

1. Any owner of a station procuring liquor for the purpose of disposing of it under the provisions of section 1 of "The Licensing Ordinance Amendment Ordinance", No. VII of 1896, shall keep a book in accordance with Forms A and B attached hereto and enter therein a true account of all liquor procured for this purpose as well as of all liquor sold by him at his station.
2. Every person duly licensed to sell liquor in Stanley shall keep a book in accordance with Forms C and D attached hereto, and enter therein a true account of all liquor purchased or imported as well as of all liquor sold by him for consumption off the premises.
3. Every owner of a station and every person duly licensed to sell liquor in Stanley shall at the end of each quarter at once send to the Colonial Secretary a true copy of the books required to be kept under the preceding Regulations completed to 31st March, 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December, respectively.
4. The Forms previously issued and now in use are hereby repealed.
5. These Regulations shall come into force on the first day of January, 1913.

Wireless Telegraphy Regulations, No. 2.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 2 of the "Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1912, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following interim Regulations:

1. The Wireless telegraph service of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies will conform as far as possible to the Regulations laid down by the Radiotelegraphic Convention.
2. The Government will expedite and facilitate as far as possible the receipt and transmission of messages, but is not responsible for their incorrect receipt, transmission or non-transmission.
3. All messages for transmission must be made out on an approved form obtainable at the Post Office, or at the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, or at any licensed wireless station in the Dependencies, and handed in during office hours.
4. The charge for a wireless telegram must in every case be prepaid in full by the sender.
5. Reimbursements may be claimed under the following conditions:—
 - (a) When a wireless telegram written in plain language has been rendered useless by inaccurate transmission the whole amount will be refunded. Under no circumstances is the charge for a code or cypher wireless telegram returned on account of an error in transmission unless such error leads to non-delivery or delay due to negligence on the part of operators.
 - (b) When a wireless telegram has failed to reach its destination through an error on the part of the wireless telegraph service the whole of the amount will be refunded.
 - (c) When one or more words have been omitted in transmission the cost of such word or words will be refunded provided that it is not less than 2/-.
6. Service messages are transmitted free of charge.
7. Certified copies of wireless telegrams may be procured on application at the Post Office, Stanley, and on the production of satisfactory evidence of the identity of the applicant and a payment of 1/-.

CHARGES.

SCHEDULE 1.

Falkland Islands.

1. The charges for wireless telegrams will be as follows:—
 - (a) "Transmission charge" of 1/- a word (address and signature included) which belongs to the local Government.
 - (b) "Landing Charge" of 1/- a word (address and signature included) which belongs to the local Government.

- (c) "Landing Charge" which belongs to the land station in South America (tariff not yet decided).
- (d) "Ship charge" of 4d. a word (address and signature included) which belongs to the ship station. When messages are sent through a ship there will be an additional "ship charge".

SCHEDULE 2.

South Shetlands, South Orkneys, and Graham's Land.

1. The charges for wireless telegrams exchanged between the Stanley station and any wireless station licensed to operate in the territorial waters of the South Shetlands and Graham's Land will be as follows:—

- (a) "Transmission charge" of 1/- a word (address and signature included).
- (b) "Landing charge" or "receiving charge" of 1/- a word (address and signature included).

2. In the case of wireless telegrams exchanged between ships licensed to operate a wireless telegraph apparatus in the territorial waters of the South Shetlands, South Orkneys, and Graham's Land, it shall be optional for the licensees to make a charge not exceeding 6d. a word for receiving and transmitting such messages.





By His Excellency WILLIAM LAMOND ALLARDYCE,
Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint

inhabiting within their Countries, Territories, or
Dominions, and being desirous of preserving to His
subjects the Blessings of Peace, is firmly purposed

Now, Therefore, I, WILLIAM LAMOND ALLARDYCE, do hereby publish, promulgate, and proclaim, that His Most Excellent Majesty the King hath strictly charged and commanded all His loving subjects to govern themselves accordingly and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid war and to abstain from violating or contravening either "an act to regulate the conduct of Her Majesty's subjects during the existence of hostilities between Foreign States with which her Majesty is at Peace," or the Laws and Statutes of the Ream in this behalf, or the Law of Nations or any Treaty made by His Majesty in relation thereto, or the Rules which His Majesty has directed to be observed during the continuance of the present state of war, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril.

Report by Assistant Colonial Surgeon on Potato Poisoning.

Three cases of potato poisoning have recently come under notice.

The Potato or *Solanum Tuberosum* belongs to the same family (*The Solanaceæ*) as Tobacco, Deadly Nightshade and Bitter-Sweet.

In the flowers, leaves, roots and tubers of this family is found a poisonous body known as *Solanin*, which is allied to and probably isomeric with Atropine, the active principle of Belladonna.

Normally this body is present in potatoes in such small quantities that it produces no ill effect, even though many of them are eaten.

When the potato develops "eyes" and begins to "shoot", considerable quantities of it form around the eyes and immediately under the "peel". It is also present in harmful quantities in shrivelled or discoloured potatoes.

If such are eaten they may give rise to shivering fits or "rigors", hot skin, rapid pulse, abdominal pain with or without vomiting and diarrhœa. Later, a rose coloured rash appears in patches which may vanish very quickly; and in a still later stage the muscles of the neck shoulders and arms become swollen and extremely painful. There is great swelling of the eyelids so that they are nearly closed, and one or more joints may be swollen. There are pains in all the bones. The symptoms of the disease, which may prove fatal, are often mistaken for "Ptomaine poisoning" such as follows the eating of tinned or stale fish.

Potatoes such as are old, shrivelled, shooting, or have many eyes are best avoided. It has been found, however, that the removal of a good thick "peel" and all the eyes enable the potatoes to be eaten without ill result. Discoloured potatoes should always be avoided entirely.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To give effect to the measures decided upon in the International Opium Convention signed at The Hague on the 23rd day of January, 1912, and to regulate the importation into and the storage and disposal of Opium, Morphine, Cocaine and similar drugs in the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Whereas the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands hath agreed to be bound by the International Opium Convention signed at The Hague on the 23rd of January, 1912:

And whereas it is expedient to regulate the Importation and the Storage and Disposal of Opium, Morphine, Cocaine and similar drugs;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Opium Ordinance, 1913". Short title.

Signification of terms.

2. In this Ordinance the term—

“Raw opium” means the spontaneously coagulated juice obtained from the capsules of the “*papaver somniferum*” which has only been submitted to the necessary manipulations for packing and transport.

“Prepared opium” means the product of raw opium, obtained by a series of special operations, especially by dissolving, boiling, roasting, and fermentation, designed to transform it into an extract suitable for consumption; and includes dross and all other residues remaining when opium has been smoked.

“Medicinal opium” means raw opium which has been heated to 60° centigrade and contains not less than 10% of morphine, whether or not it be powdered or granulated or mixed with indifferent materials.

“Morphine” means the principal alkaloid of opium, having the chemical formula $C_{17}H_{19}NO_3$.

“Heroin” means the diacetyl morphine, having the formula $C_{21}H_{23}NO_5$.

“Cocaine” means the principal alkaloid of the leaves of *Erythroxylon Coca*, having the formula $C_{17}H_{21}NO_4$.

“Similar drugs” include—

(a) all preparations whether officinal or non-officinal as well as the so-called anti-opium remedies, which contain more than 0.2% of morphine, or more than 0.1% of cocaine.

(b) heroine, its salts and preparations containing more than 0.1% of heroine.

(c) all new derivatives of morphine, of cocaine, or of their respective salts, and every other alkaloid of opium which has been demonstrated by scientific research to be liable to similar abuse and in its abuse productive of like ill-effects.

“Opium” when used without any qualifying epithet, shall be taken to include “Raw opium” “Medicinal opium” “Morphine,” “Heroin,” “Cocaine,” and “Similar drugs.”

“Store” means any place appointed by the Governor for the storage of opium on its arrival at any port in the Colony.

Importation of prepared opium unlawful.

3. It shall not be lawful to import into the Colony any prepared opium.

Opium to be deposited in store.

4. All opium imported into the Colony shall be deposited, at the cost, risk, and peril of the person or persons importing the same, in such store as shall be appointed by the Governor for that purpose.

Opium withdrawn on Colonial Surgeon's authority.

5. No opium shall be delivered or withdrawn from a store except on the written authority of the Colonial Surgeon or Medical Officer authorised by him as hereinafter provided.

Colonial Surgeon may delegate authority.

6. The Colonial Surgeon may authorise in writing any Medical Officer at any port in the Colony to sign the authority required by this Ordinance for the withdrawal of opium.

Withdrawals only by Registered Medical Practitioners, etc.

7 It shall not be lawful to authorise any withdrawal of opium from a store except to registered Medical Practitioners and Dentists and to licensed Druggists

Opium not to be kept in a place other than a store without authority

8. Where any opium imported into the Colony is, without the proper authority, found in the possession of any person or kept in a place other than a store such person or the occupier of such place, unless he can prove that the same was deposited there without his knowledge or consent, and also the owner of, or other person guilty of keeping the opium, shall be guilty of an offence.

9. Any person contravening the provisions of any of the preceding sections shall, on summary conviction before a Magistrate be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any period not exceeding twelve months, and the Magistrate may order any prepared opium, or opium unlawfully imported or withdrawn from the store, to be forfeited to His Majesty.

Penalty for
contravention.

10. It shall be lawful for a Magistrate, if satisfied by information on oath that any opium, or prepared opium is being unlawfully kept, conveyed, landed or sold in contravention of this Ordinance at any place, whether a building or not, or in any ship, not being or having the status of a ship of war, or vehicle, to grant a warrant to enter at any time, and if needs be by force, on Sundays as well as on any other days, the place, ship, or vehicle named in such warrant, and every part thereof, and to examine the same, and to search for any opium or prepared opium unlawfully kept therein, and to demand from the owner or occupier thereof the production of the authority for being in possession of the same.

Search warrant.

When the officer or other person executing such warrant has reasonable cause to believe that any prepared opium or opium found by him in any such place, ship or vehicle, is being kept, conveyed, landed or sold in contravention of this Ordinance, he may seize and detain the same until the Magistrate has decided whether the same is liable to be forfeited or not.

Seizure of prepared
opium or opium.

Proceedings in a Magistrate's Court shall be commenced as soon as possible after the seizure.

Procedure.

11. Any person acting under the aforementioned warrant shall not be liable to any suit for seizing or detaining any prepared opium or opium.

Protection of officers
from actions.

12. Whoever attempts to commit or aids or abets in the commission of any offence against this Ordinance may be dealt with in the same way, and shall be liable in the same penalty, as if he were charged with the actual offence.

Accomplices.

13. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to make such rules as he may consider expedient for the regulation of the importation, landing, storage, withdrawal or conveyance of any opium imported into this Colony and any person contravening the same shall, on summary conviction before a Magistrate, be liable for every offence to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a period not exceeding one month.

Governor in Council
may make rules.

14. All penalties incurred under this Ordinance may be recovered before a Magistrate, for which purpose every Magistrate shall have jurisdiction to the extent of the said penalties.

GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK,
STANLEY, 4th February, 1913.

SIR.

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1912.

2. During the year 67 accounts were opened and 44 closed; leaving a total of 494 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £70574 0s. 5d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £142 17s. 3d. standing to the credit of each account, or £31 1s. 3d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,272.

3. Interest amounting to £1,587 2s. 9d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £57 5s. 9d. more than that credited in 1910-11 and the amount of deposits for the year exceeds the withdrawals for the same period by £602 10s. 10d. It is satisfactory to note that notwithstanding heavy withdrawals, the balance at the end of the Bank year was the largest since the establishment of the Bank in 1888.

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £2,341 12s. 5d. and the expenses incurred £1,591 2s. 9d. leaving a profit of £750 9s. 8d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1912. (Enclosure C.)

5. The investments on account of the Bank on the 30th September, 1912. amounted to £69,016 4s. 2d. leaving an uninvested balance of £1,557 19s. 3d.

Report on Minerals from the Falkland Islands.

by PROFESSOR WYNDHAM R. DUNSTAN, M.A., F.R.S., Director.

The three mineral specimens which are the subject of this report were forwarded to the Imperial Institute by the Colonial Office with letter No. 40825/1912 dated 4th January, 1913. It was stated that the specimens were collected in the course of investigations as to the alleged existence of gold bearing quartz on the West Falkland.

The specimens, which were labelled "Exhibit" No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3, respectively, were examined with the following results:

“**Exhibit No. 1.**” This consists of a few lumps of dark brown earthy material containing organic matter.

“**Exhibit No. 2.**” This is a grey clay containing rootlets, and fragments of sandstone. The sandy portion consists chiefly of quartz, but various heavy minerals are also present, including a small amount of monazite.

“**Exhibit No. 3.**” This is a concentrate consisting chiefly of a mixture of zircon and rutile, together with some garnet and quartz. A small amount of monazite is present.

None of the three samples represents material of any commercial value.

The following is a summary of the results of the magnetic observations made by the Yacht “Carnegie” at the monument on Navy Point, February 3rd, 1913. Secondary stations were occupied west of Government House which are not permanently marked since they were used only for the control of the ship instruments. The elements are practically the same as for Navy Point and show no local magnetic disturbance. This is rather unusual and indicates remoteness if not absence of iron, at least, of the magnetic ores.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 31st March, 1913.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1912.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for the year was £22,154 14s. 10d. being £2,085 14s. 10d. in excess of the original estimate, and £2,339 14s. 10d. in excess of the revised estimate. The receipts exceeded the estimate under every Head except Division I (Customs) and Division VII (Rents). In the former there was a deficit of £1,434, and in the latter a deficit of £380. As far as the rent roll of the Falklands proper is concerned, it would appear as if low water mark had been passed.

The decrease in receipts from Customs is due to a falling off under wine, malt, spirits and tobacco. The revenue obtained from wine was nearly 50% less than in 1911, while the duty realized from malt was the smallest received since 1898. In the matter of spirits only £1,510 was received, being 21% short of the estimate. It is noteworthy that this is likewise the smallest duty returned under this Head since 1896. Tobacco dues amounted to only £706, or less than 53% of the estimate of £1,500. This is the lowest revenue derived from this source since 1891. Notwithstanding the growth of trade, shipping and population which has taken place of late years, there has been a continued decrease in the import duties on wine, malt, spirits and tobacco; it seems, therefore, doubtful whether the present Customs Staff is sufficient to adequately safeguard the revenue. This question is receiving the careful consideration of the Administration and the Collector of Customs.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1912 amounted to £20,872, or £1,283 less than the Ordinary Revenue. The Extraordinary Expenditure was £12,637, as against an Extraordinary Revenue of £11,882. The Annual Account which has been laid on the Table shews the estimated and actual Revenue and Expenditure under the various Heads.

4. The Council has already approved the items of over-expenditure referred to in my Minutes, Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5 of 1912, and No. 1 of 1913 and I have now to invite Members to pass the 1912 Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance, 1913, and thereby give their sanction to the several sums, amounting in the aggregate to £7,832 15s. 8d., payable for the year 1912.

5. Before submitting the explanation which I usually make on this occasion with regard to the more important items of over-expenditure, I desire to call the attention of the Council to the fact that, during the past year, an extensive programme of public works was carried through, including the erection of a 5 kilowatt wireless installation, and, adjacent to the power house, commodious quarters for the operators. This installation has broken down the isolation of the Colony, materially benefited the Colonists, and been the means of rendering succour at a crisis, which, without its timely assistance, might have resulted in great loss of life. I refer to the wreck of the mail steamer "Oravia". The bulk of the material for the new Town Hall, a large two-storied building, was likewise purchased, stones for the foundations quarried and carted, the necessary excavations made, and the masonry finished. In addition to the above, the King Edward Memorial Hospital and the annex. to be termed the Victoria Cottage Home, were completed, and a substantial slip for the Government launch and sanitary punts constructed. An entirely new metallic circuit telephone system was installed in Stanley, and quarters adequate for the accommodation of the Stipendiary Magistrate at South Georgia and his staff were erected at King Edward Cove.

As you will readily admit, such a programme is unprecedented in the history of the Colony, and great credit is due to the Colonial Engineer, Mr. R. B. Baseley, for the results obtained.

Members will doubtless recollect that, when the question of wireless communication was first considered, this Council was unanimously of opinion that the cost of the installation should be defrayed from the Colony's accumulated assets which, as shown in the Annual Account, now amount to nearly £100,000. The Secretary of State has been pleased to approve of this procedure.

With regard to the cost of the Town Hall, the same principle holds good, and it is unreasonable to expect the Ordinary Revenue of any single year to meet such a heavy outlay. For the time being, the Secretary of State has given instructions for the Account of the Colony with the Crown Agents to be kept in funds by them, at bank rate varying, on the security of the Land Sales investments. At the end of the current year the financial position can be reconsidered.

I now propose to briefly explain the principal items of over-expenditure, all of which have already been approved by Council. A reference to the detailed statement of expenditure laid on the Table will supply full particulars in each case, and will shew the savings effected under subheads.

6. Division I.—**Pensions, £52 16s. 8d.**—Items 9, 10, 11 and 12. Of this amount £33 4s. 6d. was not drawn by Mr. Hurst in 1911, and the names of Messrs. Fraser and Earl were added to the retired list.

7. Division II.—**The Governor, £291 17s. 10d.**—Items 1, 3, 8, and 10. The Governor's salary was increased by £50 per annum, and an entertainment allowance of £250 per annum was granted.

8. Division III.—**Colonial Secretary, £67 5s. 10d.**—Items 1 and 3. The Colonial Secretary's salary was raised by £100 a year. Additional clerical assistance involved an expenditure of £31.

9. Division IV.—**Treasury and Customs, £228 14s. 10d.**—Items 2, 7, and 12. Part of the salary of the Treasury Clerk was not drawn in 1911; shipping fees (recoverable) exceeded £136; and a Customs Officer had to be appointed for South Georgia at a salary of £150 per annum.

10. Division VI.—**Port & Marine.—£40 2s. 6d.**—Item 4. £35 was spent in the purchase of the "Criccieth Castle" lifeboat which is to be repaired and stationed in Stanley.

11. Division VII.—**Legal, £215 5s. 6d.**—Items 1, 2, 4, and 5. Part of the salary of the Magistrate at South Georgia for 1911 was not drawn till 1912; this officer likewise received from 1st October an increase of salary at the rate of £50 per annum. The balance includes a sum of £86 in connection with the prosecution of seal poachers; the cost of sending a Magistrate to South Georgia to relieve Mr. Wilson when ill; the salary of the Magistrate at the South Shetlands and Graham's Land for three months; and the expenses of the enquiry into the wreck of the R. M. S. "Oravia".

12. Division X.—**Medical, £303 12s. 3d.**—Items 10, 12, 13, and 16. The excess of £25 under "Medicines" was occasioned by the importation of serum as a precautionary measure owing to an outbreak of diphtheria and of tetanus. The vote for the maintenance of the Victoria Cottage Home was exceeded by £81, but this sum was recovered from the patients. Two pauper lunatics had to be sent to and maintained in England. The services of a Government Dental Surgeon, Mr. G. W. Royle, were procured for a period of three years, the payment of his salary commencing on 22nd August.

13. Division XIII.—**Transport, £432 3s. 3d.**—Item 1. Provision had to be made for the passages of an unusually large number of officials and employees.

14. Division XIV.—**Miscellaneous, £322 15s. 2d.**—Items 1, 2, and 18. The activity in public works materially increased the Crown Agents' expenses. There was likewise a large addition to the usual number of telegrams. £62 was expended under "Interest on Overdrafts", and the transfer of certain Intestate Estates to General Revenue involved a loss of £68.

15. Division XV.—**Post Office, £476 12s. 7d.**—Items 8 and 10. The new issue of postage stamps necessitated a considerable extra expenditure. £250, part of the mail subsidy due in 1911, was paid in 1912.

16. Division XVI.—**Colonial Engineer, £56 4s. 7d.**—Items 17, 18, and 21. There was an over-expenditure of £46 and £104 respectively on account of overtime and coal for the launch. This was caused by the erection of the wireless station and the activity in shipping. The forage vote was exceeded by £67 due to the increase in the number of horses, and the rise in price of both hay and oats. Much carting of stone had to be done for the foundations of the Town Hall, and the annual peat requirements of Government are now 100% greater than they were in 1905 apart from the fact that the bogs are much more distant than formerly. There was a considerable saving under the head of Wireless Operators.

17. Division XVII.—**Savings Bank, £128 17s. 2d.**—Item 2. This was due to the increase in the number of depositors.

18. Division XX.—**Public Works Recurrent, £81 3s. 6d.**—Items 2 and 3. The cost of the repairs to buildings was under-estimated. The excess on the furniture vote for Government House and Offices of £46 was caused by renovating two rooms at Government House, and procuring some much needed chairs and sofas. The freight to this Colony on such bulky articles as furniture is very high.

19. Division XXI.—**Public Works Extraordinary, £5,085 6s. 0d.**—Items 23, 26, 27 to 35.

Item 23. Town Hall. The original estimate was £6,500, but since then freights have gone up considerably, as also the price of local labour. A large part of the material came out in the sailing vessel "Ragnhild", and has been placed in proximity to the site. The total expenditure to 31st December was £5,454, or £1,454 in excess of the amount appropriated when the 1912 Estimates were passed. As already stated ordinary revenue can hardly be expected to at once meet such a heavy charge as this, and it would appear to be preferable, as suggested in my Message to Council of 20th October, 1911, to borrow the needful sum from our financial reserve and establish a sinking fund for the repayment of the principal in ten years time @ 3%. An alternative would be to pay at the end of the present financial year, or when the total cost of the building is definitely ascertained, a moiety of the cost from the Colony's accumulated assets.

It is essential to the development of a Colony which has hitherto been lacking in Public Works that the present progressive policy should be maintained, and if ordinary

revenue is to be debited with a heavy charge of this sort it is impossible to make headway ; it can hardly be regarded as modern finance. The generation of to-day should not be saddled with the entire burden of important and much needed improvements. There are many directions in which expenditure could advantageously be incurred for the benefit of the Colonists. I have merely to mention greater facilities for communicating with the outer world, including a subsidiary wireless station on the West Falkland ; additional coastal lights ; modern lighting ; a fresh water supply to every householder in Stanley instead of the present unsatisfactory method of storing rain water in tank and barrel ; not to speak of the surveying of the little known harbours and shores of our Dependencies where the whaling industry stands in urgent need of reliable charts.

Item 26. Wireless Installation, £1,150 16s. 3d. This has already been referred to in my Message, and the advantages which are derived from the installation call for no further comment on my part. It is hoped that it will be possible hereafter to maintain communication with the station at Punta Arenas, when completed, in daylight as well as at night.

Item 27. Telephone Exchange, £409 10s. 2d. Stanley's new metallic circuit telephone system has come up to expectations, and the facilities afforded for communicating with many of the settlements on the East Falkland are being daily appreciated by the public.

Item 28. King Edward Memorial Hospital, £296 7s. 1d., and Item 29, Victoria Cottage Home, £306 11s. 2d. After King Edward's death, the Colonists decided to shew their attachment to the Throne and person of His late Majesty, and at the same time demonstrate their practical sympathy with his often expressed wish to relieve human suffering, by building a hospital to be termed the King Edward Memorial Hospital. It was apparent, however, that without the Government's assistance no adequate and properly equipped institution of this kind could be erected. Nor would it have been possible without the amalgamation of the Victoria Cottage Home and the King Edward Memorial Hospital to provide a nursing and medical staff for the latter. The Committee approached the Government in the matter, and the Governor in Council expressed his readiness to transfer the Home to a position in such proximity to the Hospital that both institutions might be connected, and worked by the same staff. The Committee offered to hand over the Hospital, on completion, to the Government, provided that it was maintained from public funds. This was agreed to. A contribution of £300 was made by Government towards the erection of the Hospital, and a similar amount voted for the transfer and erection of the Home. In addition, over £2,400 has been raised by public subscription. The building is now complete, and a considerable sum available for installing the heating system, furnishing the wards, and equipping the operating room.

Item 30. Colonial Engineer's Quarters, £81 12s. 1d. Two stone cottages have been converted into a suitable dwelling house for this Officer.

Item 31. Lighthouse Telephone, £370 14s. 4d. The telephone line from Stanley to Cape Pembroke Lighthouse requires renewing throughout. The erecting engineer of the wireless station, which is halfway between Stanley and the Lighthouse, was of opinion that a metallic circuit system would be necessary to connect the station with headquarters. The above sum has been expended in material for such a system between the Telephone Exchange, the Wireless station, and Cape Pembroke Lighthouse.

Item 32. Operators' Quarters, £462 7s. 11d., and Item 33, Furniture, £87 1s. 2d. Quarters have been built and furnished at the wireless station for the operators.

Item 34. Naval Lighter, £100. A large iron lighter was purchased from the Admiralty.

Item 35. Customs Shed, South Georgia, £375 15s. 9d. After the establishment of a Port of Entry at King Edward Cove, it was necessary to provide a Customs Shed, the material for which cost, in London, £375 15s. 9d.

Public Health Bye-law No. 4 of 1912.

Bye-law relating to Buildings framed under section 18 of Ordinance No. V of 1894.

Clause No. 2 of the Bye-law framed under Ordinance No. 5 of 1894, published in the "Gazette" of 20th September, 1894, is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

2. Before the erection of any new building shall be commenced plans of the same shall be submitted to the Board of Health with particulars as to water-closets, earth-closets, ash-pits and cesspools, together with a statement of the proposed drainage, including the drainage of the site on which the building is to be built or rebuilt. Before any alteration contemplated to be made with regard to any of the subjects of which the particulars are as above required shall be commenced, the alteration so proposed must have the sanction of the Board of Health.

Public Health Bye-law No. 1 of 1913.

Every new stone or brick building to be used as a dwelling house shall be constructed with a damp proof course of durable material, impervious to moisture.

An Ordinance

To amend the law with regard to the preservation of wild animals and birds.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as The Wild Animals and Birds Protection (Amendment) Ordinance 1913, and shall apply throughout the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its dependencies, and shall come into force on such date as the Governor shall appoint by Proclamation in the Government Gazette.

Short title and commencement of Ordinance.

2. The Wild Birds Preservation Ordinance 1908 and the Wild Animals and Birds (South Georgia) Ordinance 1912 are hereby repealed.

Repeal.

3. Any person who, after the commencement of this Ordinance, within the limits of the Colony of the Falkland Islands or its dependencies,

Offences with regard to wild animals and birds mentioned in Schedule I.

(a) knowingly kills or attempts to kill, or wounds or takes any wild animal or bird specified in the first schedule to this Ordinance : or

(b) uses any lime, trap, net, snare or other instrument for the purpose of killing or taking any such wild animal or bird : or

(c) has in his control or possession or exposes or offers for sale or exports or attempts to export from the Colony or its dependencies any such wild animal or bird, killed or taken after the commencement of this Ordinance, or any part of any such wild animal or bird, so killed or taken,

shall be guilty of an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every such wild animal or part of an animal and to a penalty not exceeding two pounds for any bird, or part of a bird in respect of which an offence has been committed.

Offences with regard to wild animals or birds mentioned in Schedule II.

4. Any person who, during the period between the first day of October in any year and the last day of February in the following year, both days included (which period is hereinafter called the close season),

(a) knowingly kills or attempts to kill or wounds or takes any wild animal or bird specified in the second schedule to this Ordinance : or

(b) uses any lime, trap, net, snare, or other instrument for the purpose of killing or taking any such wild animal or bird : or

(c) has in his control or possession or exposes or offers for sale or exports or attempts to export any such wild animal or bird or any part of any such wild animal or bird, killed or taken during the close season ;

shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding one pound for every wild animal or bird or part of a wild animal or bird in respect of which an offence has been committed.

Burden of proof in certain cases.

5. Whenever in any proceedings under sections 3 or 4 of this Ordinance it is alleged that the wild animal or bird in respect to which or to any part of which the charge is laid was killed or taken without the limits of the Colony and its dependencies or before the commencement of this Ordinance or at a time when such bird might lawfully be killed or taken, the proof of such circumstance shall lie on the person alleging the same.

Power of Governor to grant licences.

6. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Ordinance the Governor by writing under his hand may, for such time and subject to such conditions as he thinks fit, authorize any person to kill or take any wild animal or bird, specified in the schedules, and to export such animal or bird.

Power of Stipendiary Magistrate to grant licence.

7. The Stipendiary Magistrate in any dependency may authorize the killing or taking in that dependency of any wild animal or bird specified in the schedules, and the export from that dependency of any such animal or bird.

Power of Governor in Council to alter Schedules.

8. (a) The Governor in Council may from time to time by order published in the Government Gazette declare that the name or names of any wild animal or bird shall be added to or expunged from the list of animals and birds contained in Schedules I and II to this Ordinance and thereupon and while such order remains in force this Ordinance shall be read and shall have effect as if the name of the animal or bird so added had been inserted or as if the

name of the animal or bird so expunged had not been specified in the schedule mentioned in such order.

(b) Such order may apply either to the whole of the Colony and its dependencies or to any part of such whole.

9. (a) The Governor in Council may by Proclamation published in the Government Gazette, vary the close season established by section 4 of this Ordinance or by any such Proclamation with regard to any or all of the wild animals or birds named in the second schedule to this Ordinance, and while any such Proclamation remains in force this Ordinance shall be read subject to the variation made by such Proclamation.

Power of Governor in Council to vary the close season.

(b) Such Proclamation may apply either to the whole of the Colony and its dependencies or to any part of such whole.

10. Every offence under this Ordinance may be prosecuted before a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner.

Prosecution of offences.

11. Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect any penalty incurred in respect of any offence committed against either of the Ordinances hereby repealed or any investigation or legal proceeding in respect of any such offence, but any such investigation or legal proceeding may be instituted, continued or enforced and any such penalty may be imposed as if this Ordinance had not been passed.

Penalties incurred or proceedings taken under the repealed Ordinances not affected.

Passed the Legislative Council this 14th day of March, 1913.

A Summary of the Annual Medical Report for the District of West Falkland, 1912.

I. VITAL STATISTICS.

According to the Official Report of the Census of 1911, West Falkland including New Island has 664 inhabitants, and West Falkland alone 553. The proportion of the sexes is:—

1. Including New Island 475 Males and 189 Females.
2. Excluding „ „ 369 „ and 184 „

Respecting the Colony as a whole, the report states that there is an increase of 60·33%, as compared with 7·8% for the previous Decenium. This large increase has been brought about by the Whale Fishing industry. The Birth and Death Rates of West Falkland with New Island are 13·55 and 7·55 per 1000 respectively. The same Rates for West Falkland alone (there were no births on New Island) were 16·27 and 9·41 per 1000 respectively. The Birth Rate for West Falkland will always appear low in comparison with other communities as long as the present industrial conditions obtain, for the majority of employees are single men living in Cook Houses and the married population is disproportionately small.

II. METEOROLOGICAL CONDITIONS.

It would be unwise at present to make an *ex cathedra* statement respecting the precise nature of the influence exerted by the Meteorological Conditions.

Systematic observations were only commenced in 1912, and several years accumulated data are required before the influences drawn therefrom can be of value. The following factors are however readily observed:—

- i. Marked fall of the barometer appears to be closely followed by a rise in illness.
- ii. The barometer maintained the highest mean level during the second and third quarters of the year, and during these quarters the sickness incidence was practically nil.
- iii. Baromic oscillation was followed by a greater rise in sickness in the two Summer than in the two Winter Quarters.

III. REMARKS ON THE NOSOLOGICAL RETURNS.

Certain features are worthy of notice. viz:—

- i. Entire absence of all forms of Tuberculosis.
- ii. „ „ „ Malignant disease (cancer).
- iii. „ „ „ Rheumatic Fever and its sequelæ.
- iv. „ „ „ Infectious disease.
- v. The prevalence of disorders of the Digestive apparatus.

The freedom from serious disease has been frequently mentioned in previous reports, and though the same is true of the year 1912, there has been a larger number of cases under treatment among which accidents have occupied a prominent place.

Affections of the Digestive system, always well to the fore, reach a total of 67, of which number the Dental Apparatus is responsible for no fewer than 50. These figures by no means represent the total number of sufferers, and I venture the suggestion unsupported by statistics, that few communities probably exhibit more wide-spread oral sepsis.

In West Falkland joint changes are seen with considerable frequency in comparatively young subjects nearly every case being associated with oral sepsis. The joints principally affected are those of the fingers.

Boils (Furunculosis) still exist in West Falkland though on the whole they are less prevalent. Many of these cases recover without calling in Medical help.

IV. GENERAL SANITARY CONDITION OF THE DISTRICT.

DWELLINGS. In the majority of cases inhabited houses are well built, give adequate accommodation and are maintained in repair. A few notable exceptions however are badly kept or so small as to readily give rise to over-crowding, especially at certain times of the year.

A list has been compiled of houses where "Nuisances" exist within the meaning of the Public Health Ordinance, and notices will be served to secure their abatement.

It is recommended that a fit and proper person be appointed as Inspector of inhabited Dwellings, and that he make a periodic round and report to the Board of Health.

Such duties could be performed by an existing official.

WATER. Close attention has been paid to the water used for drinking purposes, and a number of specimens have been subjected to chemical and bacteriological examination. The results show that more of these waters are polluted than might be supposed.

FOOD. Little can be added to what has been said in previous reports on this subject, but attention must once more be called to the fact that animals intended for consumption as food must not be slaughtered after having been driven from a distance, without a period of rest being allowed to intervene. Meat-houses should be fly-tight, and it may be pointed out that if a carcass be "quartered" directly it is cold, all kidney fat removed, and then hung up in a stream of air, there is far less likelihood of it becoming "fly-blown". Fly-blown meat should never be eaten under any circumstances, and a carcass so affected ought to be destroyed. It is a filthy and dangerous practice to cut off the affected part, and then eat the part adjoining.

V. VACCINATIONS.

During the year five vaccinations have been performed. The condition of the population, as far as the protection from small-pox afforded by vaccination is concerned, is in my opinion doubtful. There are at present not more than five unvaccinated infants, but it is not possible to say with accuracy whether there are any unvaccinated adults or if so how many. The immunity of native born inhabitants with regard to small-pox, as to other infectious diseases is in many respects an unknown quantity on account of the personal equation.

Re-vaccination is rarely sought voluntarily and as a matter of opinion, I should say that the immunity, at any rate among adults, is low in degree.

Chief Stock Inspector's Annual Report for 1912.

STOCK DEPARTMENT,

STANLEY, 5th April, 1913.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith my Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1912.

SHEEP.

The year from the stock-owner's point of view has been most satisfactory and prosperous, and the health and condition of stock generally was good. More wool was produced than during 1911, and the price of all exports from the farms continued high. On most stations the lambing was not so good as last year. The lambing percentage for all stations of the Colony was 67%, while in 1911 it was slightly over 72%. In each case the percentage has been made on the dipping tally, 7% being allowed for loss between lamb marking and that period. The lambs were of a very even type in most localities and it is evident that the quality and stamina are improving each year.

2. Careful attention is being paid to the selection of rams and culling is deeper, with the result that on a great many stations the flocks present a very good appearance; the sheep are young, well framed and healthy, truer to their breed and clip well over eight pounds per fleece. There are some farms, however, content to breed year after year from old sheep carrying neither flesh nor wool, with the result that their increase is low, clip light, and death rate high.

3. Scrofula is much less in evidence than heretofore; this is due to the fact that all affected sheep are slaughtered, which is undoubtedly the most satisfactory manner of stamping out the disease. There are a few stations on the East Falkland still troubled with lice and some discontent exists among the farmers with regard to their boundary fences, which in many places are certainly not sheep-proof. Farmers to whom this might apply should refer to the Live Stock Ordinance, No. 1 of 1907, section 5, which provides a heavy penalty for persons allowing infected sheep to stray. If some farmers considered to what extent the health of their flocks was improved by keeping them free from external parasites they would be more careful over their dipping, gathering, and fences. Farms troubled with lice would be well-advised to dip with one of the many well-known arsenical dips, in preference to the non-poisonous preparations, which, for this parasite, are often not to be depended upon. It is satisfactory to see the trouble which some farmers are taking to rid their young stock of ticks by dipping their lambs twice. This practice is becoming more common yearly and cannot be too strongly recommended.

4. There was an abundance of grass in the early autumn, with more seed than had been seen for years. At this period the stock looked particularly well.

5. The death rate was slightly less than in the previous year, being 10.42% as compared with 10.86% in 1911. It is gratifying to note that at one station, where the mortality from Malignant Œdema after lamb marking used to be excessive, the death rate was reduced about 40%. The rate of mortality throughout the Colony varies considerably; on some stations it is as low as 5%, while on others it is three times as high. I am satisfied that by judicious ditching, draining, and shepherding, the rate of mortality, which is at present about one sixth of the total increase, could be considerably diminished.

6. The demand for sheep of good weight is steadily increasing, both for the canneries in the Colony and for export. I venture to predict that, in a year or two, sheep will be almost double their present value.

7. Owing to numerous outbreaks of foot and mouth disease in Great Britain and Ireland it was found necessary, in order to safeguard the Colony against infection, to

prohibit the importation of stock from those Countries. The embargo on cattle, sheep and hay from South American ports is still maintained. During 1912 one farmer imported three rams contrary to the Regulations. A fine was imposed and the stock were slaughtered.

8. As will be seen from the Comparative Table attached, the import of rams decreased slightly in 1912, owing to the prohibition already mentioned, but the number of sheep exported exceeded that of the previous year by 3,000. More stud stock would certainly have been introduced had the Colonial ports been open to shipment from England. Sixteen Romney Marsh Rams were saved from the wreck of the "Oravia", but of eleven consigned to this Colony seven were unfortunately drowned. A number of those saved were in a very low state of health when landed.

HORSES.

9. Horses have been very free from illness of a serious nature. The disease associated with a swelling of the head between the eyes, which is caused by a minute organism found in swamps and stagnant ditches, is becoming less in evidence every year. Many of these cases in which the swelling appears low on the forehead recover naturally if the animal is rested and put on good pasture; on the other hand, when the head is affected above the level of the eyes, which is less often the case, death frequently results from inflammation of the brain.

10. There is a good demand for useful horses, especially for animals suitable for cart work. The foaling percentage was 66%, or 10% higher than in the previous year. The quality of some of the stallions imported during the last few years leaves much to be desired, and the Falklands breed will not thereby be materially benefited. The number of horses in the Colony shews an increase of 111 over that of 1911.

CATTLE.

11. The number of cattle has been reduced by 323. Several samples of milk taken from cows suffering from mastitis were examined microscopically, but in only a small percentage of cases was there any trace of the tubercle bacillus to be found. Arrangements have been made to apply the tuberculin test to 40 or 50 cows on the East Falkland, the result of which will be published hereafter.

CULTIVATION.

12. Last year, probably for the first time, hay grown in the Falklands was sold in Stanley and there is every prospect that in the near future enough will be grown to supply the needs of the Colony. This is in many ways very desirable. The price to the buyer will probably be less, while the quality will be equal to that imported, and the risk of introducing disease in hay from infected countries will thereby be considerably reduced. Many farmers are now growing hay on a small scale, but in a few cases the cutting of it has been left too long so that much of the nutriment is lost.

CANNING.

13. This new enterprise has proved to be quite a success. The prices obtained for canned goods were higher than in 1911, and the meat found a ready and satisfactory market in Great Britain. The report from the buyers was very favourable and it is hoped that this new industry, which should be welcomed by stock owners, will be supported by them and continue to advance in the right direction.

GEESE.

14. The Ordinance providing for the diminution of Geese terminated at the close of the year. During the five years that this Ordinance has been in force approximately 500,000 geese beaks have been paid for at the rate of ten shillings per hundred.

The purchase of the beaks of turkey buzzards, carranchos and rooks is still being continued.

An Ordinance

To give effect to the measures decided upon in the International Opium Convention signed at The Hague on the 23rd day of January, 1912, and to regulate the importation into and the storage and disposal of Opium, Morphine, Cocaine and similar drugs in the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Whereas the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands hath agreed to be bound by the International Opium Convention signed at The Hague on the 23rd of January, 1912:

And whereas it is expedient to regulate the Importation and the Storage and Disposal of Opium, Morphine, Cocaine and similar drugs;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Opium Ordinance, 1913".

2. In this Ordinance the term—
- “Raw opium” means the spontaneously coagulated juice obtained from the capsules of the “*papaver somniferum*” which has only been submitted to the necessary manipulations for packing and transport.
- “Prepared opium” means the product of raw opium, obtained by a series of special operations, especially by dissolving, boiling, roasting, and fermentation, designed to transform it into an extract suitable for consumption; and includes dross and all other residues remaining when opium has been smoked.
- “Medicinal opium” means raw opium which has been heated to 60° centigrade and contains not less than 10% of morphine, whether or not it be powdered or granulated or mixed with indifferent materials.
- “Morphine” means the principal alkaloid of opium, having the chemical formula $C_{17}H_{19}NO_3$.
- “Heroin” means the diacetyl morphine, having the formula $C_{21}H_{23}NO_5$.
- “Cocaine” means the principal alkaloid of the leaves of *Erythroxylon Coca*, having the formula $C_{17}H_{21}NO_4$.
- “Similar drugs” include—
- all preparations whether officinal or non-officinal as well as the so-called anti-opium remedies, which contain more than 0·2% of morphine, or more than 0·1% of cocaine.
 - heroin, its salts and preparations containing more than 0·1% of heroin.
 - all new derivatives of morphine, of cocaine, or of their respective salts, and every other alkaloid of opium which has been demonstrated by scientific research to be liable to similar abuse and in its abuse productive of like ill-effects.
- “Opium” when used without any qualifying epithet, shall be taken to include “Raw opium” “Medicinal opium” “Morphine,” “Heroin,” “Cocaine,” and “Similar drugs.”
- “Store” means any place appointed by the Governor for the storage of opium on its arrival at any port in the Colony.
3. It shall not be lawful to cultivate in this Colony the Opium Poppy (*papaver somniferum*). Cultivation of Opium Poppy prohibited.
4. It shall not be lawful to import into the Colony any prepared opium. Importation of prepared opium unlawful.
5. All opium imported into the Colony shall be deposited, at the cost, risk, and peril of the person or persons importing the same, in such store as shall be appointed by the Governor for that purpose. Opium to be deposited in store.
6. No opium shall be delivered or withdrawn from a store except on the written authority of the Colonial Surgeon or Medical Officer authorised by him as hereinafter provided. Opium withdrawn on Colonial Surgeon's authority.
7. The Colonial Surgeon may authorise in writing any Medical Officer at any port in the Colony to sign the authority required by this Ordinance for the withdrawal of opium. Colonial Surgeon may delegate authority.
8. It shall not be lawful to authorise any withdrawal of opium from a store except to registered Medical Practitioners and Dentists and to licensed Druggists. Withdrawals only by Registered Medical Practitioners, etc.
9. Where any opium imported into the Colony is, without the proper authority, found in the possession of any person or kept in a place other than a store such person or the occupier of such place, Opium not to be kept in a place other than a store without authority.

Signification of terms

unless he can prove that the same was deposited there without his knowledge or consent, and also the owner of, or other person guilty of keeping the opium, shall be guilty of an offence

Penalty for
contravention.

10. Any person contravening the provisions of any of the preceding sections shall, on summary conviction before a Magistrate be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any period not exceeding twelve months, and the Magistrate may order any prepared opium, or opium unlawfully imported or withdrawn from the store, to be forfeited to His Majesty.

Search warrant.

11. It shall be lawful for a Magistrate, if satisfied by information on oath that any opium, or prepared opium is being unlawfully kept, conveyed, landed or sold in contravention of this Ordinance at any place, whether a building or not, or in any ship, not being or having the status of a ship of war, or vehicle, to grant a warrant to enter at any time, and if needs be by force, on Sundays as well as on any other days, the place, ship, or vehicle named in such warrant, and every part thereof, and to examine the same, and to search for any opium or prepared opium unlawfully kept therein, and to demand from the owner or occupier thereof the production of the authority for being in possession of the same.

When the officer or other person executing such warrant has reasonable cause to believe that any prepared opium or opium found by him in any such place, ship or vehicle, is being kept, conveyed, landed or sold in contravention of this Ordinance, he may seize and detain the same until the Magistrate has decided whether the same is liable to be forfeited or not.

Procedure.

Proceedings in a Magistrate's Court shall be commenced as soon as possible after the seizure.

Protection of officers
from actions.

12. Any person acting under the aforementioned warrant shall not be liable to any suit for seizing or detaining any prepared opium or opium.

Accomplices.

13. Whoever attempts to commit or aids or abets in the commission of any offence against this Ordinance may be dealt with in the same way, and shall be liable in the same penalty, as if he were charged with the actual offence.

Governor in Council
may make rules.

14. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to make such rules as he may consider expedient for the regulation of the importation, landing, storage, withdrawal or conveyance of any opium imported into this Colony and any person contravening the same shall, on summary conviction before a Magistrate, be liable for every offence to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a period not exceeding one month.

Recovery of penalties.

15. All penalties incurred under this Ordinance may be recovered before a Magistrate, for which purpose every Magistrate shall have jurisdiction to the extent of the said penalties.

Date of commencement
of Ordinance.

16. This Ordinance shall not come into force until such date as the Governor may fix by Proclamation after His Majesty's non-disallowance thereof has been communicated to him.

Passed the Legislative Council this 31st day of March, 1913.

7. During the year under review a further sum of £43 : 8 : 1 has been invested on behalf of the Depreciation Fund which now amounts to £388 : 6 : 10.

8. The Order in Council of Her Late Majesty, dated 7th March, 1899, provided that until the Depreciation Fund amounted to not less than 10% of the Investment portion of the Note Guarantee Fund there should be an annual appropriation thereto of an amount equal to 1% of the cost price of the Investments. Seeing that the sum of £3,750 only

is invested, and the Depreciation Fund now amounts to £388 : 6 : 10 or £13 : 6 : 10 over the required amount, this annual appropriation ceased during the year under review. Until further investments are made, therefore, the sum of £37 : 10 : 0 together with interest on amount of the Depreciation Fund will not shew as a debit in the Profit and Loss Account, and will correspondingly increase the amount transferred to the General Revenue of the Colony.

Wart Disease (Black Scab) of Potatoes.

The disease known as Wart Disease, Cauliflower Disease, Canker, "Fungus" or Black Scab, attacks the tubers and haulms of Potatoes, giving rise to large and irregular outgrowths which resemble pieces of cauliflower covered with mud.

Warts or wrinkles appear at first near the eyes of the young tuber, and later several warts by growing together form a brown spongy scab, which finally becomes black.

Black scab has no connection with ordinary potato scab and does not resemble it in appearance, but as both are frequently found on the same plant they are sometimes confused.

Although the disease has been known to potato growers in the Liverpool district for some 15 years it was not reported to the Board until 1901. Since then a number of cases have occurred in Lancashire, Cheshire, Shropshire, Staffordshire and Warwickshire, while outbreaks have also been recorded in other English Counties, in Wales and in Scotland.

The disease has caused much damage in gardens or allotments where potatoes are grown every year, but in a few cases there has also been serious loss in potatoes grown in a four-course rotation. Land may be unfit for potato growing for as long as six years after infection.

The occurrence of the wart disease in the affected districts is similar to that of the Finger-and-toe disease (Leaflet No. 77) which, on certain soils and in some seasons, has caused serious damage to turnips. Although in the first instance only a few plants may show the wart disease, it is almost sure to spread more or less rapidly and the disease must be treated as a dangerous enemy, which, if neglected, may entirely prevent the growth of potatoes where it occurs.

CAUSE OF INFECTION.

The diseased tubers or haulms contain numberless "spores" (the "seeds" of the disease) which are not only capable of infecting healthy potatoes the following season, but may also lie dormant in the soil for more than four years.

The diseased tuber is the usual source of infection and the spread of the disease from one holding to another is mainly to be attributed to the planting of infected sets.

When disease appears it may, if neglected, spread over a farm and render the soil useless for potato growing in the course of a few years. It is spread by manure, by the decay of affected haulms, tubers and runners in the soil, and it may even be carried from one field to another on implements and boots.

Diseased potatoes must always be well boiled before being given to cattle or pigs, for infection is readily spread by manure if raw diseased tubers are fed to stock. For the same reason diseased haulms must never be thrown on the manure heap. Dung which

has been contaminated in any way should not be used for potato growing. If practicable it should be applied to permanent grass.

PREVENTIVE AND REMEDIAL MEASURES.

1. "Seed" potatoes from a diseased crop or from a field in which disease is known to have occurred within six years should be avoided. If "seed" potatoes are purchased in a district in which the disease is common, they should be bought as soon after harvest as possible; the sets should be freely sprinkled with sulphur (4-5 lbs will dress a ton) and should then be stored in boxes or pits until required.

Tubers only slightly diseased may easily be overlooked, and may cause widespread infection when planted.

2. In the case of a disease like wart disease, which infects the land gradually, it is necessary to detect and stamp out the fungus as soon after infection as possible. When discovered the entire plant affected should be carefully removed, the useless portions burned, the tubers boiled without delay, and the soil dressed with gaslime. Further, when the field is next planted with potatoes the piece of ground where the disease appeared should be fallowed and dressed with gas-lime at the rate of 4-5 tons per acre.

If the attack has occurred in a garden required for frequent potato growing, the occupier should dig out and burn, not only the affected plant, but a considerable quantity of the surrounding soil so as to ensure that every fragment of the diseased plant is destroyed. Gas-lime should then be applied to the soil.

3. If fields worked on a four-course rotation have become generally infected, farmers should replace the potato by some other crop, so as to let eight years intervene before the next potato crop is planted. The sets should be dusted with sulphur before planting, as recommended above.

4. In gardens and allotments in which the disease has been bad, potatoes should on no account be planted on the same piece of land next season and one of the 3 following methods of treatment may be adopted:—

- (a) The ground towards the end of April, should be covered with gas-lime (2lb to the square yard) which may be forked into the surface soil to a depth of 3 inches. After lying fallow until the end of June it should be dug and prepared for cabbages.
- (b) If the soil is deep, 2lb of gas-lime per square yard may be applied at the end of March, and a month later the soil should be inverted by deep trenching. Any crop except potatoes may be grown.
- (c) The affected land should be sprinkled with sulphur (4 ozs. per square yard) early in May, and, after having been lightly forked in, any crop except potatoes may be sown or planted.

Whichever of these methods may be adopted it is necessary, when potatoes are next planted in the garden, that the sets should be dusted over with sulphur, and as they lie in the drills should be freely sprinkled with sulphur before they are covered in. Before the potatoes are earthed up the surface of the soil round the haulms should be sprinkled with sulphur.

Some varieties of potatoes suffer much less from wart disease than others. The variety known as "Snowdrop" generally escapes infection, and the varieties "Maincrop" and "Conquest" have also been known to escape when other sorts planted in the same garden have been attacked. These varieties are, therefore, worthy of the attention of those whose land has become infected; but the preventive measures indicated above should still be carefully followed.

In gardens in which a single diseased potato has been found the course recommended in the foregoing paragraphs should be adopted; but if no other land for growing potatoes is procurable, and occupiers of gardens and allotments are obliged to grow potatoes on land on which disease has been seen, they should apply freshly burnt lime two or three days before planting, at the rates of 4 lbs. to the square yard. After the sets have been placed in the drills they should be freely sprinkled with sulphur. Before the plants are "earthed up" the ground should again be sprinkled with sulphur. If an early potato is required "Snowdrop" should be planted; if a late variety, preference should be given to those of the "Maincrop" type, such as "Langworthy" and "What's Wanted".

Sulphur suitable for the purposes indicated should be procurable at from 9s. to 11s. per cwt. or 1/3 to 1/6 per stone.

CIRCULAR.

DOWNING STREET,

SIR,

My attention and that of my predecessors in office has from time to time been called to cases in which gentlemen who have been Colonial Governors or have held other high appointments in the Colonial Service have, immediately upon their retirement, been offered and accepted directorships of companies operating in territories in which they recently held office.

2. The acceptance of such directorships has afforded occasion for adverse criticism, and, after much consideration, I have arrived at the conclusion that the practice is open to serious objection, as tending to impair that reputation for a disinterested sense of public duty which the Colonial Service rightly enjoys.

3. I have, therefore, decided to lay down for the future the following rule viz:— that no officer who has retired from the Colonial Service shall accept the directorship of any company operating in the Colony or Protectorate in which he has served without first obtaining the written consent of the Governor for the time being of the Colony or Protectorate in question, which consent during the first three years after an officer's retirement will only be given in very exceptional circumstances and after reference to the Secretary of State. And no retiring Colonial Governor shall accept such a directorship or similar position until he has obtained the necessary permission from the Secretary of State, who will in each case consult the Governor of the Colony or Protectorate affected before deciding upon the application.

4. It is doubtless desirable to support such a rule by some adequate sanction, and you should at once consider the enactment of a provision in the Pensions Law of your Government for enforcing the new rule by taking power to suspend the pension of an officer who disregards the rule or the Secretary of State's instructions. In the meantime I have to request that you will take the necessary steps to bring the ruling to the notice of all whom it may concern.

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To amend the Pensions Ordinance, 1906.

Whereas it is advisable to amend the Pensions Ordinance, No. 5 of 1906, (hereinafter called the principal Ordinance) BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. No officer who has retired from the public service of the Colony shall accept the directorship of any company operating in the Colony without first obtaining the written consent of the Governor of the Colony for the time being, which consent during the first three years of an officer's retirement will only be given in very exceptional circumstances and after reference to the Secretary of State.

Conditions under which a retired officer may accept the directorship of a company operating in the Colony.

2. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under the principal Ordinance or any amendment thereof, or under any regulations made thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence against the preceding section, or shall fail to comply with the Secretary of State's instructions in connection with any application made under the preceding section, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, to suspend such pension for such period as he may think fit.

Education Report for 1912

by the Government Inspector of Schools.

The year's work in the Government School may be reported on as being highly satisfactory.

The number of scholars on the roll is the same as last year, while the average attendances, allowing for the climatic conditions, are good. The subjects on the syllabus are in accordance with those taught in the Public Elementary Schools in Great Britain, and it is found when children leave this Colony for home, they can take their places without difficulty in their own standards. Quarterly examinations are regularly held by the Government Schoolmaster, and the general progress noted testifies to the careful and conscientious work of the teachers. The same care is taken as in former years with the sewing, and the work turned out by the girls would bear comparison with any other school.

The Infant Classes are very good, and the children are given varied occupations.

During the year a covered play-shed was built for the children affording protection and a place for amusement during the times for recreation. This is an important and welcome addition to the premises. The children in the "Camps" are still being taught by Itinerant Schoolmasters. In most cases I am happy to report that the Schoolmasters receive the hearty co-operation of the parents, and the children make therefore good progress; it has, however, been necessary more than once to remind parents of the need to properly supervise the home lessons during the periods between the Teacher's visits.

The "Camps" will suffer a loss through the resignations of two of these Schoolmasters, both of whom have completed their periods of engagement. Mr. Moyes and Mr. Barlas were both excellent and popular Teachers.

The Falkland Islands Company employ a resident Schoolmaster at Darwin, and two Itinerant Schoolmasters in their "Camp".



Regulations as to issue, surrender, forfeiture, and restoration of the "Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration" and the "Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal", under Royal Warrants of the 18th May, 1899, as amended by Royal Warrant of the 3rd August, 1902.

Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers Decoration.

PERSONS ELIGIBLE.

1. (a) Officers having 20 years commissioned service which need not be continuous;
- (b) Honorary Colonels and Acting Chaplains who have the qualifying service of 20 years.
- (c) Officers who have retired and have the necessary qualifying service of 20 years.

QUALIFYING SERVICE.

2. The following service will be considered to be qualifying service:—

(a) Service rendered wholly in the Local Forces of one or more Self-governing Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates, or partly in the Local Forces of one or more Self-governing Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates and partly in the Territorial or Volunteer Forces of Great Britain or in the Indian Volunteers, service on the West Coast of Africa counting double.

(b) Half the time served in the ranks of the Auxiliary Forces of any Self-governing Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, Indian Volunteers or the Territorial or Volunteer Forces of Great Britain. As regards the United Kingdom, half of any period of service in the ranks of a Cadet Corps or Cadet Battalion which belonged to the organization existing before the 21st May, 1910, and half of any period of service as a Cadet in the Senior Division of the Officers' Training Corps after attaining the age of 17 years.

SERVICE ON PERMANENT STAFF.

3. Service on the Permanent Staff shall not reckon as qualifying service for the Decoration.

APPLICATION.

4. Application for the Decoration will be made in writing by the Commanding Officer of each corps, and will in each case be supported by a statement of the applicant's service on Form "A".

Commanding Officers will forward their recommendations through the usual channels of correspondence to the Governor together with the certificate marked "B".

5. The Decoration being granted as a reward for good and long service, Commanding Officers should in each case state in general terms the reason which in their opinion gives the applicant a claim to receive the Decoration.

PUBLICATION.

6. The grant of the Decoration will be published in the Government "Gazette".
7. The letters V.D. will be inserted in the Army List, against the name of the Officer to whom the Decoration is given.

FORFEITURE.

8. When the conduct of an Officer, after he has been awarded the Colonial Auxiliary

Forces Officers' Decoration, has been such as to disqualify him from wearing it, he may be deprived of it by the Governor.

RESTORATION.

9. A Decoration forfeited by an Officer under the provisions of paragraph 8 may be restored to him by the Governor.

Loss.

10. When a Decoration has been lost, and it is desired to replace it, a declaration must be made before a Magistrate stating the circumstances under which the loss occurred, and the rank, name and corps of the Officer to whom the Decoration belonged.

This declaration will be forwarded to the Governor through the usual channel of correspondence in the case of an Officer who is still serving and direct to the Governor in the case of one who has retired. The Decoration will be replaced, on payment, if the explanation as to the loss is considered satisfactory.

Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal.

PERSONS ELIGIBLE AND QUALIFYING SERVICE.

1. Members of the Auxiliary Forces of all ranks may be granted a medal designated "The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal", after twenty years' service (which need not be continuous) in such Forces.

The following shall be reckoned as qualifying service, service on the West Coast of Africa counting double:— Service rendered wholly in the Auxiliary Forces of one or more Self-governing Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates, or partly in the Auxiliary Forces of one or more Self-governing Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates, and partly in the Territorial or Volunteer Forces of Great Britain, in the Indian Volunteers, or service, after the age of 15 in a Cadet Corps in the United Kingdom which has received the recognition of the Army Council, provided that the Cadet enlists in the Territorial Force or into any other Corps, service in which counts for the reward of the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal, within 6 months of leaving his Cadet Unit. The Medal may also be granted to Volunteers who may have retired after completing twenty years' service, and to Officers who have served in the ranks but have not qualified for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration.

SERVICE ON PERMANENT STAFF.

2. Service on the Permanent Staff shall not reckon as qualifying Service for the Medal.

APPLICATIONS.

3. Applications for the Medal will be made on Form "D", through the usual channel of correspondence to the Governor, whose decision upon the validity or otherwise of any claim to the Medal will be final. Retired Members will apply through the Officer Commanding the Regiment (or Corps) in which they last served.

NOMINAL ROLL.

4. Commanding Officers will forward with Form "D", a nominal roll, arranged alphabetically, on Form "E". This roll will be prepared in duplicate, one copy being retained by the Officer Commanding and the other forwarded with his recommendation to the Governor.

PUBLICATION.

5. Names of recipients will be promulgated in the Government "Gazette", after the publication of which the original applications (Form "D") will be returned by the Governor to the Commandant for record and retention.

DISTRIBUTION.

6. The distribution of the Medals will be made by the Senior Officer of the Corps, or as the Governor shall decide, at the earliest time that a good muster of the Corps can be reckoned upon.

SURRENDER.

7. Any Officer who is subsequently awarded the "Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration" will not be required to surrender the Medal, but he will not be permitted to wear both.

FORFEITURE.

8. When the conduct of any Member of the Auxiliary Forces, after he has been awarded the "Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal", has been such as to disqualify him from wearing it, he may be deprived of it by the Governor.

RESTORATION.

9. A Medal forfeited by a Member of the Auxiliary Forces under paragraph 8 may be restored to him by the Governor.

Loss.

10. When a Long Service Medal has been lost and it is desired to replace it, a declaration must be made before a Magistrate stating the circumstances under which the loss occurred, and the rank, name and corps of the individual to whom the Medal belonged.

The declaration will be forwarded to the Governor through the usual channel of correspondence in the case of an individual who is still serving and direct to the Governor in the case of one who has retired. The Medal will be replaced, on payment, if the explanation as to its loss is considered satisfactory.

Whaling Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 3 of the "Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908," His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

1. The period for which Whaling Licences may be issued shall commence on the 1st October of each year and terminate on the 30th September of the succeeding year.

2. Licences shall be issued in the name of the Company applying for them and shall not be transferable. A licensed vessel shall be prohibited from catching whales for a Company other than that mentioned in the Licence. Should the owner or master of a licensed vessel desire from any cause whatsoever to catch whales for a Company other than that indicated in the Licence, the permission of the Governor in Council must be first obtained.

3. Every licensed vessel shall be either owned or *bonâ fide* chartered by the licensee.

4. A Licence shall authorize the use of either

- (a) two floating factories in conjunction with two whale catchers; or
- (b) a third whale catcher.

5. Every application for a Licence should be made in writing to the Colonial Secretary so as to reach the Colonial Secretary's Office, Falkland Islands, not later than the 1st April in each year; and should state the name of the Company to whom the Licence is to be issued and the names of the vessels to be used.

6. No Licence authorizing the use of a third whale catcher shall be issued without the sanction of the Governor in Council.

7. The fee payable for a Licence authorizing the use of two floating factories and two whale catchers shall be £200, and for a Licence authorizing the use of a third whale catcher, £100.

8. If permission to use not more than two whale catchers, whether in conjunction with a second floating factory or not, is applied for, the vessel or vessels of the applicant shall be required to carry in all not less than nine (9) pressure boilers, each 10 feet long by 7 feet diameter, or of equivalent cubic capacity, for dealing with the residue of the carcass after the blubber has been removed.

9. If application is made for permission to use a third whale catcher, the plant of the applicant shall have to include not less than twelve (12) pressure boilers of the capacity defined in the preceding Regulation.

10. Every Licence authorizing the use of two floating factories in the territorial waters of the South Shetlands and Graham's Land shall be issued subject to the special condition that permission to use the territorial waters of Deception Island will be withdrawn if, at any time during the life of the Hektor Whaling Company's lease of land in Deception Island, it is shown to the satisfaction of the Governor that the operation of the second floating factory seriously impedes the Hektor Whaling Company in fulfilling the conditions of their lease.

11. On and after the 1st October, 1914, separate Licences shall be issued for:—

- (a) The South Shetlands and Graham's Land.
- (b) The South Orkneys.
- (c) The Falkland Islands.
- (d) The Sandwich Islands.

But no further Licence or Lease for whaling purposes shall be issued, with the exception of renewals of existing annual Licences for two floating factories and two whale catchers, or for a third whale catcher, without the permission of the Governor in Council.

12. Each application for a Licence shall be registered when received in a Register to be termed the Whaling Licence Register.

13. Every licensed vessel shall, at the end of the season's whaling operations, proceed direct to a Port of Entry in the Colony or its Dependencies and report to the Collector of Customs or Customs Officer, full particulars of the catch, including the number of barrels of oil and the quantity of baleen and guano obtained.

14. No licensee shall kill or shoot any whale calf, or any female whale which is accompanied by a calf.

15. Any dead whale abandoned in the territorial waters of the Colony or its Dependencies or thrown up on the sea shore is the property of the Crown.

16. No moorings shall be laid down in the harbours of the Colony, or of any Dependency, without the special permission of the Government; and the owner of any moorings already laid down shall at once remove them or alter their position on being requested to do so by the Government.

17. No whale carcass shall be moored either to a mooring, or to a vessel, in the harbours of Deception Island, so as to interfere unduly, in the opinion of a Magistrate or a Customs Officer, with the traffic or operations of another whaling Company. No whale carcass shall, at the end of the whaling season and on the departure of the floating factory, be left attached to any mooring except with the permission of a Magistrate or a Customs Officer.

18. Any licensee who commits, or allows or negligently suffers a person employed by him to commit a breach of these Regulations, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for each offence, and the licensee shall at the same time become liable to the immediate forfeiture of his Licence and of any claim to a Licence in the future. And if any person employed by a licensee commits a breach of these Regulations, he shall be liable to the same penalty.

19. No Licences shall be issued after the 1st October, 1914, except on the terms and conditions contained in the foregoing Regulations.

20. These Regulations shall have no application to South Georgia, and shall supersede the Whaling Regulations of the Governor in Council of the 6th May, 1912, and shall come into force on the 1st October, 1914.

Whaling Regulations, South Georgia.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 3 of the "Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908", His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. No leaseholder shall kill or shoot any whale calf, or any female whale which is accompanied by a calf.
2. Any dead whale abandoned in the territorial waters of South Georgia or thrown up on the sea shore is the property of the Crown.
3. Any leaseholder who commits, or allows or negligently suffers a person employed by him to commit a breach of these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for each offence, recoverable in a summary manner before a Magistrate. And if any person employed by a leaseholder commits a breach of these Regulations, he shall be liable to the same penalty.
4. These Regulations shall supersede the Whaling Regulations of the Governor in Council dated the twenty-third day of September, 1912, and shall come into force on the first day of October, 1913.

Whereas by Section 3 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, all persons were prohibited from using any port within the United Kingdom for the purposes of pelagic sealing contrary to an Order in Council made under the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Acts, 1895 and 1912:

And whereas by Section 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, the importation of the skins of seals captured in contravention of any such Order as last aforesaid was prohibited:

And whereas by Section 5 (1) of the said Act it was enacted that His Majesty might by Order in Council extend the provisions of the two hereinbefore recited sections to any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom, to any British Protectorate, and to Cyprus, subject to such modifications and adaptations as might appear to him to be necessary:

And whereas by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in and over Cyprus and within the Dominions of His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar:

And whereas it is desirable that the provisions of the sections 3 and 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, should be extended to the Colonies and Protectorates enumerated in the Schedule to this Order and to Cyprus and to the dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar subject to the modifications and adaptations hereinafter contained:

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fisheries (Crown Colonies and Protectorates) Order in Council, 1913.

2. The word "Zanzibar" in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the Zanzibar Order in Council, 1906.

3. From and after the commencement of this Order Sections 3 and 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, shall apply to the Colonies and Protectorates enumerated in the Schedule to this Order and to Cyprus and to Zanzibar (all of which Colonies and Protectorates and Cyprus and Zanzibar are hereinafter referred to as "Territories affected") subject to the following modifications and adaptations, that is to say:—

- (i) For the words "The United Kingdom" in Section 3 (1) of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted in the case of each Territory affected the name of such Territory.
- (ii) In Section 3 (2) of the said Act for the words "Secretary of State" wherever such words occur in the case of all Territories affected other than Zanzibar there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "Officer administering the Government," and in the case of Zanzibar the words "His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General for Zanzibar," and for the words "The Board of Trade or any officer of the Board" the words "any customs officer."
- (iii) In Section 4 of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted for the words "section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876," a reference to the enactment in force in the Territory affected whereby the importation of goods is prohibited or restricted and such enactment shall apply accordingly.

4. This Order shall be published in the Government Gazette of each of the Territories affected other than Zanzibar and shall thereupon come into operation in such Territory. In the case of Zanzibar, this Order shall be published at Zanzibar in such manner as the Secretary of State shall direct by His Majesty Agent and Consul-General and shall thereupon come into operation.

Prohibition of using ports for purposes of pelagic sealing contrary to Order.
57 & 58 Vict. c. 60.

3.—(1) If any person uses any port within the United Kingdom for the purpose of equipping any ship intended to be used or employed in killing, taking, or hunting seals in contravention of any such Order as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to be dealt with as if such offence were an offence declared to be a misdemeanour by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and the ship and her equipment and everything on board thereof shall be subject to forfeiture to His Majesty.

(2) If the Secretary of State is satisfied that there is reasonable cause for believing that a ship has been or is being equipped contrary to this section, the Secretary of State may authorise the Board of Trade, or any officer of the Board, to seize and detain the ship. Where such an authority is given, the ship may be seized and detained in like manner as if it were liable to seizure and detention under the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1907.

(3) For the purposes of this section, "equipping" in relation to a ship shall include the furnishing of a ship with any tackle, apparel, furniture, provisions, munitions, fuel or stores, or any other thing which is used in or about a ship for the purpose of fitting or adapting her for the sea or for killing, taking, or hunting seals.

Prohibition of importation of skins of seals captured in contravention of Order.

4. Skins of seals taken in contravention of any such Order as aforesaid, and skins of seals identified as being of the species known as *Callorhinus alascanus*, *Callorhinus ursinus*, and *Callorhinus kurilensis*, and belonging to the American, Russian, or Japanese herds, except such as are taken under the authority of the respective Powers to which the breeding grounds of such herds belong and have been officially marked and certified as having been so taken, shall, subject to the provisions of this section, be deemed to be included in the table of prohibitions and restrictions contained in section forty-two of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, and that section shall apply accordingly.

SUPPLEMENTARY MEMORANDUM

for the information and guidance of persons engaged in

THE WHALE FISHERY INDUSTRY

In the territorial waters of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

The attention of all persons engaged in the Whaling Industry is drawn to the following:—

In Ordinance No. 6 of 1909, it is laid down as follows:—

Seals.

Section 1.

It shall not be lawful for any person to kill, take, or hunt, or attempt to kill or take any seal in the Dependencies or the Colonial Waters thereof unless he shall first have been duly licensed.

Section 2.

In this Ordinance—

“Seal” means the “Fur Seal”, the “Hair Seal”, the “Sea Otter”, the “Sea Elephant”, the “Sea Leopard”, the “Sea Bear”, the “Sea Lion”, the “Sea Dog”, and any animal of the seal kind.

“Skin” means the the skin of any seal.

“Seal Reserve” means any portion of land or water set apart by the Governor in Council within the limits of the Dependencies for the breeding of Seals.

Section 7.

Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel, who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in killing or taking seals, or who shall permit or negligently suffer any person belonging to such vessel to be employed in killing or taking seals, in the Dependencies or the Colonial Waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance, shall forfeit any seals so killed or taken, and any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding three hundred pounds for each offence.

Penalty.

Section 8.

Any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds for each such offence, and to forfeit any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession:—

- (a) Kills, takes, or hunts, or attempts to kill or take, any seal in the Dependencies or the Colonial Waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance.
- (b) Has in his possession, or in any vessel under his command, any seal, seal-oil, or skins, for the lawful possession of which he cannot account satisfactorily.

Penguins. In Ordinance No. 7 of 1909, it is laid down as follows:—

Section 1.

It shall not be lawful for any person to kill or take Penguins in the Dependencies unless he shall first have been duly licensed.

Section 5.

Penalty. Any person who shall, after the coming into operation of this Ordinance, without a licence or contrary to the terms and conditions of any licence which may have been granted to him under this Ordinance kill or take, or caused to be killed or taken any penguin in the Dependencies shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding thirty pounds.

Section 6.

Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel, who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in killing or taking penguins, or who shall permit or negligently suffer any person belonging to such vessel to be employed in killing or taking penguins, contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, shall forfeit any penguins so killed or taken, and any penguins or penguin-oil found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds for each offence.

Customs. All fishing vessels arriving from ports or places beyond the seas, must comply with Section 2 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1903 which reads as follows:—

The master of every vessel whether laden or in ballast, shall within twenty-four hours after arrival from parts beyond the seas at any port make due report (form I) of such vessel to the collector; provided that if any suspicion arise as to the character of such vessel, such report and the lodging of the ship's papers may be required forthwith. Such reports shall be made before bulk be broken or any goods whatever, except personal luggage passed by an officer, shall be removed, landed, or waterborne from any such vessel. If the master shall fail to make due report, or if the particulars, or any of them, contained in such report be false, he shall forfeit the sum of fifty pounds; provided that the collector may forego the prosecution where no wilful error has in his opinion been made, and subject the master to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

Penalty.

Fishing vessels may carry the following articles from one place to another, without any clearance, vide Sections 35 and 9, viz:—

Fish, and appliances for carrying on the business of fishermen. They are always liable to be rummaged. All fishing vessels clearing outwards from the Colony for ports or places beyond the seas, must first comply with section 34, which reads as follows:—

Before any vessel, whether laden or in ballast, lying at any port or place and about to sail thence for any port out of the Colony, shall be cleared outwards, the master shall attend before the collector or officer, and shall answer all such questions as shall be required of him concerning the vessel, the cargo and the destination, and shall deliver to the said collector or officer a content of such vessel (form 7), and for any contravention of this section the master shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

Flocks infected with Lice.

His Excellency the Administrator, directs it to be notified, for general information, that on and after the 1st October, 1913, the various provisions of the Live Stock Ordinances 1901 to 1907 will be rigidly enforced.

The attention of Farmers whose flocks are in any way infected with lice is particularly called to Section 16 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1901 which reads as follows:—

16. If an Inspector is satisfied that any sheep are infected he shall give the owner of such sheep an order in writing to clean such sheep within twelve months from the date of such order, and if at any time during such period such owner shall not in the opinion of an Inspector have made or be making reasonable exertions to clean such sheep or if at the expiration of the twelve months such sheep shall in the opinion of an Inspector still be infected sheep the owner thereof shall upon conviction be liable to a penalty not less than one halfpenny and not more than twopence for every such sheep.

Report on Minerals from the Falkland Islands.

by PROFESSOR WYNDHAM R. DUNSTAN, M.A., F.R.S., Director.

The Minerals have been examined at the Imperial Institute with the following results:—

Specimen (a) is a basic igneous rock, probably of dyke origin. On microscopic examination it was found to be an ophitic dolerite. Such rocks are used extensively in England as road-metal, but they are otherwise of no value.

Specimen (b) is a portion of the root-tuft of a siliceous sponge; it has the appearance of glass wool, but microscopic examination showed it to be spicular in character. A number of species of hexactinellid sponges have root-tufts similar to this specimen.

Notes on Customs, Pilot, Harbour and Quarantine Ordinances.

1. Stanley Harbour is the landlocked water lying to the West and South-West of a line drawn from William Point to Cape Pembroke. (Ordinance 2/02, Section 1).

2. Every master shall within 24 hours of his ship's arrival report and deposit the ship's papers at the Customs and deliver a manifest and cockets of all goods for the Colony before bulk is broken. Penalty £50. (Ordinance 6/03, Section 2).

Goods transferred without permission may be forfeited. (Ordinance 6/03, Section 52).

NOTE. The papers of a Foreign ship if transferred by the Collector to the Consul shall be produced at the Custom House when a clearance is applied for.

3. A master must make in writing any declarations required by the Harbour Master in connection with his ship, cargo or crew. Penalty £20. Making false declaration, Penalty £50. (Ordinance 2/02, Sections 4 and 5).

4. Seven shillings per diem must be paid for each Customs Officer on board and he must be provided free with board and sleeping accommodation. (Ordinance 6/03, Sections 6 and 7).

5. Vessels entering at ports other than Stanley must pay tonnage dues of 1/- per registered tonnage. Maximum £10. (Ordinance 6/03).

6. All vessels (except War Ships, Yachts and Coasters) entering the harbour must pay pilotage. Rates:— Inward, 6/- a foot minimum £3; Outward, half rates. (Ordinance 6/02, Section 18).

7. A pilot necessarily detained on board any ship shall be paid 12/- for every day or part of a day after he has been on board 24 hours, and if a pilot be recalled to any ship the cost of bringing him off and landing him and a fee of £1 for every day or part of a day that he shall be on board shall be paid to him. (Ordinance 6/02, Section 14).

8. No dead animal, ballast, damaged goods, rubbish, night soil or other material shall be thrown into the harbour. Penalty £5. Master liable as to rubbish &c. thrown into harbour. Penalty £50. (Ordinance 2/02, Sections 21 and 22).

9. No vessel, except a War Ship, having more than 50 tons of explosives, or having more than one ton of explosive *and* an inflammable cargo (such as coal and oil), may enter the Inner Harbour until explosives are deposited in Magazine. If laden with an inflammable cargo and not more than one ton of explosives, or with a general cargo and not more than 50 tons of explosives, she may anchor in Inner Harbour to east of the Narrows. Penalty £100 with or without imprisonment. (Ordinance 2/02, Section 16 and 17).

10. No cannon or gun shall be fired or kept loaded with any projectile in the Harbour on board any vessel save a War Ship. Penalty £50. (Ordinance 2/02, Section 19).

11. No person, except the pilot, may board and no person may leave an incoming vessel until she has received pratique and hoisted the code letter N. Penalty £5. (Ordinance 2/02, Section 6).

12. The Master of any vessel about to depart from any Port in the Colony shall not less than 12 hours before leaving such Port give notice personally or in writing to the Postmaster of his intended departure and of the names of the places at which he intends to call, and he shall answer all questions as shall be demanded of him relating to his ship and her intended voyage. (Ordinance 10/1898, Section 4).

13. Every "Infected", "Suspected" and "Healthy" ship arriving in the waters of this Colony shall fly the usual Quarantine or yellow Flag. Section 10 Quarantine Regulations, 1908. Penalty £50. (Ordinance 7/08, Section 11).

14. All previous Notes on this subject are hereby superseded.

MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you the Estimates for the year 1914. They have been prepared so that the respective revenue and expenditure for the Falklands, for South Georgia, and for the other Dependencies, can be shown separately.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue has been estimated at £27,725 or £5,571 greater than the actual ordinary receipts in 1912. This revenue, should be sufficient to cover both Ordinary and Extraordinary Expenditure, and leave a balance in hand of £770. The principal anticipated increases and decreases under the several Divisions are shewn below:—

3. The export tax of 3d. a barrel on whale oil, the additional duty of 25% on spirits, and the large consumption of tobacco in South Georgia are mainly responsible for the increased revenue.

4. The decrease under Internal Revenue as compared with 1912 is mainly caused by the policy of restricting the issue of whaling licences to those Companies already holding same. The decrease of Revenue under Post Office as compared with 1912 is caused by the abnormal receipts in that year due to a new issue of stamps.

EXPENDITURE.

5. The estimated Ordinary Expenditure (exclusive of £3,854 for Public Works Extraordinary and an expenditure of £577 under Live Stock Ordinance) is £23,201, as against an expenditure of £20,871 in 1912 and a revised expenditure for 1913 of £20,271. A schedule of additions and reductions shewing the differences between the proposed expenditure and the approved estimate for 1913 is given in the Appendix.

6. Division III.—**Colonial Secretary.** Opportunity has occurred for the reorganisation of the Colonial Secretary's clerical staff owing to the retirement through ill-health of Capt. I. Watt. As it is not proposed to grant the Senior Clerk a free house and fuel, and as the Junior Clerk's salary is estimated at £36 per annum as against £120 actually drawn under this Head during 1913, the probable saving in this direction on the expenditure for 1913 will be over £100.

7. Division VIII.—**Police & Prisons.** Item 4. The increased duties required of the police constables both in Stanley and the West Falkland have rendered it necessary to increase the force from four to five men.

8. Division IX.—**Medical.** Item 1. The salary of the Colonial Surgeon has been increased from £300 to £350. Item 16. Owing to the rapid increase in the number of rats in Stanley, and the presence of bubonic plague in Paraguay and Argentina, it has been considered necessary to allot £25 towards their destruction.

9. Division X.—**Education.** Item 3. The salary of the Schoolmistress has been raised from £75 per annum to £100 with annual increments of £5 to £120.

10. Division XII.—**Transport.** Item 1. As the vote for passages of Government Employees has for several years been found inadequate the sum of £300 has been allotted in place of the £175 allotted in 1913.

11. Division XIII.—**Miscellaneous.** Item 6. Fire Insurance is increased by £25 on the amount expended in this direction in 1913 to partially cover the Town Hall Buildings during erection.

12. Division XIV.—**Post Office.** Item 11. It is hoped to be able, with the offer of a subsidy of £1,500, to induce a shipping firm to open up regular communication between the Falklands and South Georgia. Such a service would be of material benefit to those engaged in the whaling industry.

13. Division XV.—**Colonial Engineer.** Item 9. With the increased public works it has been found necessary to employ permanently three labourers instead of two. Item 14. Constant employment is now found for a mason on buildings, drains, etc.

14. Division XIX.—**Public Works Recurrent.** Item 1. The improvement of the roads, especially those to the peat banks, is a matter of vital necessity to the inhabitants of Stanley and it is proposed to spend the whole of the sum of £500 in 1914 on their repair, improvement, etc. Item 10. This is a new item, repairs of Jetties being previously included in Item 1, Roads

15. Division XX.—**Public Works Extraordinary.** Item 1. It is proposed to purchase another Kitson Lamp. Item 2. Another Peat Shed is required. Item 4. A sum of £968 is required for the Town Hall. It is hoped that the building will be completed before the end of 1914. Item 5. This sum represents the balance due to the

Marconi Company when the terms of the Agreement for erecting the Station, etc., are fully complied with. Item 12. This building has not been occupied for some months owing to its disrepair. Through the scarcity of house accommodation in Stanley the Customs Officer, who is entitled to free quarters, is at present not provided with suitable ones. Item 13. Amount required for renewals to the pipe system of the Government Jetty. Item 14. For the purchase of a new sanitary cart. Item 15. For a Kitson lamp to be used on Point William when steamers are expected. Item 16. For a wireless installation to be erected at Fox Bay. Item 17. For a telephone system at Fox Bay in connection with the wireless installation. Item 18. The building occupied by the Government Official in residence at Fox Bay is badly in need of repair.

16. Division XXI.—Items 3 and 4. The operation of Ordinance No. 3 of 1905, which provides for the diminution of geese, ceased at the end of 1912 and a renewal of its enactment is not proposed at present. The Offices of Receiver of Beaks West Falkland and New Island are abolished.

DORMANT COMMISSION passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, appointing the Colonial Secretary of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, or Alexander Hugh Blaxell Pearce, Esq., to administer the Government of that Colony and its Dependencies in the event of the death, incapacity, removal, or absence of the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, and of there being no Lieutenant-Governor therein.

George the Fifth by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To the person for the time being holding the substantive appointment of Colonial Secretary of Our Colony of the Falkland Islands, or to Our Trusty and Well-beloved Alexander Hugh Blaxell Pearce, Esquire, Greeting.

Appointment of the Colonial Secretary to administer the Government in certain events.

WE do, by this Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet, appoint you, the said holder for the time being of the substantive appointment of Colonial Secretary to administer the Government of Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, during Our pleasure, with all the powers, rights, privileges, and advantages to the same belonging or appertaining,

whenever and so long as the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief is vacant or the Governor and Commander-in-Chief is incapable of discharging the duties of administration or is absent from the Colony and its Dependencies and there is no Lieutenant-Governor therein.

II. And if at any time when this Our Commission takes effect or while this Our Commission is effective the substantive Office of Colonial Secretary is vacant or the holder of that office is incapable of discharging the duties of administration or is absent from Our said Colony and its Dependencies, We do appoint you, the said Alexander Hugh Blaxell Pearce, to administer the government of Our said Colony and its Dependencies during Our pleasure, with all the powers, rights, privileges, and advantages aforesaid.

Appointment of A. H. B. Pearce,

ment in certain events.

III. And We do in any such event hereby authorise, empower, and command you, the person for the time being holding the substantive appointment of Colonial Secretary, or you, the said Alexander Hugh Blaxell Pearce, to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in any Letters Patent for the time being in force relating to Our said Colony and its Dependencies, according to such Orders and Instructions as Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the time being of Our said Colony and its Dependencies hath already received, or as you may hereafter receive from Us.

Powers and authorities.

IV. And further, We do hereby revoke the Commission under the Sign Manual and Signet of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, bearing date the Ninth day of March, 1894, appointing Our Trusty and Well-beloved Thomas Augustus Thompson, Esquire, to administer the Government of Our said Colony in the events therein mentioned.

4. The Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer moved the introduction of Minute No. 3 of 1913 from His Excellency the Administrator. The Hon. W. A. Harding seconded. Question put and agreed to.

On the motion of the Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, the Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole Council, with His Excellency the President in the Chair to consider the Minute. (Copy of Minute appended).

Council in Committee.

Estimates, 1913. Division XIX. Item 1.—Roads, Drains, Bridges. The Hon. W. A. Harding remarked that both this sum (£150 for improvement of the roads to the peat banks) and the amount of £450 invited to be voted under Item 2 for repairs to the Police Cottages were urgently needed. He was very glad to see that these two works were being taken in hand.

The several sums in the Schedule to the Minute were voted in respect of the services noted therein.

On the motion of the Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, the Council resumed.

5. His Excellency the President communicated the following Message from the Administrator to the Council introducing the 1914 Estimates.

(Vide copy of Message published in Gazette of 1st October, 1913).

The Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer thanked the Administrator for the Message which His Excellency had been pleased to communicate to the Council.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, who added that he considered the addition of the 'Actual Expenditure' column in the tabulation of the Estimates a great convenience.

On the motion of the Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, the Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole Council, with His Excellency the President in the Chair, to consider the Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for 1914.

Council in Committee.

Revenue. Division I. Customs Duties. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked why the estimate under 'Tobacco' was so low. The Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer replied that in 1912 only £706 was received under this head and that, although in 1913 probably £2,600 would be received, he considered £2,200 a safe estimate for the revenue for 1914.

Division VI. Post Office. Item 7. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if no method

of payment for wireless telegrams, other than that of affixing postage and revenue stamps, could be adopted.

His Excellency replied that he hoped to bring another mode of payment into force on 1st January, 1914.

Division X. Live Stock Ordinance. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if the Stock Tax of $\frac{1}{2}$ of a penny per acre was still necessary. He suggested a reduction on the grounds that the Offices of Receivers of Beaks were now abolished and that there was a balance of £1,500 in the hands of the Stock Fund.

His Excellency said that it was his wish that this money should be expended for the benefit of the farmers.

Upon this assurance the Hon. W. A. Harding would not oppose the continuity of the Tax.

The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if it was true that a grant had been made from the Land Sales Fund for the use of the Wireless Station.

The Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer agreed that this had been done.

The Hon. W. A. Harding remarked that this was the first that he had heard of the grant officially. He considered that it was dangerous to draw upon the capital of the Fund.

Expenditure. Division I. Pensions. Total of £763 agreed to.

Division II. The Governor. Item 9. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if it had not been the rule to supply Government House with oil.

His Excellency replied in the negative but said that the Secretary of State had been pleased to approve of oil being provided for use in rooms of public entertainment as from 1st January, 1914.

Total of £1,973 agreed to.

Division III. Colonial Secretary. Item 3. The Hon. W. A. Harding said that, as he understood that Captain Watt's ill-health was due to a large extent to overwork, he would beg to recommend that his pension should be as liberal as possible. In view of the fact that he had taken no leave during his service it would seem that he was entitled to two years' salary before retiring on pension.

His Excellency replied that the Honourable Member's recommendation would be conveyed to the Secretary of State, who would, he trusted, find it possible to grant Captain Watt some pension.

Total of £1,796 agreed to.

Division IV. Treasury and Customs. Total of £1,540 agreed to.

Division V. Audit. Total of £32 agreed to.

Division VI. Port and Marine. Item 1. The Hon. W. A. Harding commented on the low salary paid to the Harbour Master and asked if he received any overtime fees.

The Hon. the Acting Colonial Treasurer reported that the Harbour Master did receive overtime fees but that they were very small.

The Hon. W. A. Harding was of opinion that this Officer's salary was disproportionately low when compared with the salaries of Officials holding less responsible positions.

His Excellency stated that he hoped to go into the question of the salaries of all public Officers at an early date.

Total of £680 agreed to.

Division VII. Legal. Total of £410 agreed to.

Division VIII. Police and Prisons. Item 4. The Hon. W. A. Harding stated that he was very pleased that an additional constable was being engaged.

Total of £794 agreed to.

Division X. Education. The Hon. W. A. Harding spoke as follows on the subject of introducing religious instruction into the Government School:

"Seeing that considerable interest has lately been shown on the question of religious education in the Government School I should like to be allowed to record my opinion, which was formed before the Meetings which have been held to ventilate the question.

"I do not regard this as a question for a majority or a minority; it is a question primarily for the individual parents who have children actually attending school. In other places parents mostly have some choice—they can select a school where religion is taught, or one where religion is not taught. Here there are two schools only, the Roman Catholic School and the Government School. Protestants have only the latter, and if even a small number of parents desire that their children should have religious

education, I regard it as the duty of the Government to meet their wishes as far as possible. There should be no question of compulsion at all, either for or against. I may sum up by quoting the opinion of Mr. Arthur Balfour:—

“The State ought to provide the parents with that kind of religious training, if any, which they desire in the schools to which they are compelled to send their children”.

Division XI. Ecclesiastical. Total of £220 agreed to.

Division XII. Transport. Total of £450 agreed to.

Division XIII. Miscellaneous. Item 13. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if the President would be prepared to reconsider the deletion of the vote of £12 for the Volunteer Band if occasion should arise.

His Excellency replied that he would be pleased to do so.

Total of £847 agreed to.

Division XIV. Post Office. Item 11. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if any information had been received with regard to the establishment of a Mail Service with South Georgia.

His Excellency replied in the negative, adding that he hoped to hear from the Secretary of State on this subject by the mail due on the 15th October.

Total of £5,280 agreed to.

Division XV. Colonial Engineer. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if the carpenters voted under this head were to be employed on repair work.

His Excellency stated that this was so.

Total of £2,323 agreed to.

Division XVI. Savings Bank. Total of £1,624 agreed to.

Division XVII. Currency Note Fund. Total of £15 agreed to.

Division XVIII. Drawbacks and Refunds. Total of £100 agreed to.

Division XIX. Public Works Recurrent. His Excellency informed the Council that he desired that the whole of the £500, which he invited the Council to vote under Item 1, to be expended on the roads.

The Hon. W. A. Harding was of opinion that the sum of £450 would prove insufficient for the repair of buildings and furniture for the year.

His Excellency replied that he proposed almost immediately to appoint a Board of Survey to report on the condition of Government property. Upon receipt of this report he would present it to the Council.

Total of £1,595 agreed to.

Division XX. Public Works Extraordinary. Item 4. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if the total amount voted was intended to cover the cost of furnishing the Town Hall.

His Excellency replied in the negative.

The Hon. W. A. Harding, while quite recognizing that the work must now be carried through, remarked that the Town Hall was becoming an enormous expense to the Colony.

Item 15. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked for information as to the description of light which it was proposed to place on Point William.

The President replied that he was unable to give this information at present but that, before any expenditure was incurred, the matter would be brought before the Council for discussion.

Item 16. The Hon. W. A. Harding asked if the sum of £1,700 estimated for the Fox Bay Wireless Station was intended to cover both material and labour.

His Excellency replied in the affirmative.

Total of £3,754 agreed to.

Division XXI. Live Stock Ordinance. Total of £577 agreed to.

On the motion of the Acting Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, the Council resumed.

The Council adjourned *sine die* at 1 p.m.

Wireless Telegraphy Regulations, No. 2 (a).

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 2 of the "Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1912," His Excellency the Administrator, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. The Wireless Telegraph Service of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies will conform as far as possible to the Regulations laid down by the International Radiotelegraphic Convention.

2. The Government will expedite and facilitate as far as possible the receipt and transmission of messages, but is not responsible for their incorrect receipt, or non-transmission.

3. All messages for transmission must be made out on an approved form obtainable at the Post Office, or at the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, or at any Wireless Telegraph Station in the Dependencies, and handed in during Office hours.

4. The charge for a wireless telegram must in every case be prepaid in full by the sender.

5. Reimbursements may be claimed under the following conditions:—

(a) When a wireless telegram written in plain language has been rendered useless by inaccurate transmission the whole amount may be refunded. Under no circumstances is the charge for a code or cypher wireless telegram returned on account of an error in transmission unless such error leads to non-delivery or delay due to negligence on the part of the operators.

(b) When a wireless telegram has failed to reach its destination through an error on the part of the Wireless Telegraph Service the whole of the amount may be refunded.

(c) When one or more words have been omitted in transmission the cost of such word or words may be refunded, provided that the amount to be refunded is not less than 2/-.

6. Service messages are transmitted free of charge.

7. Certified copies of wireless telegrams may be procured on application at the Post Office, Stanley, and on production of satisfactory evidence of the identity of the applicant, and payment of 1/-.

Charges.

The charges for wireless telegrams will be as follows:—

- (a) "Transmission charge" of 6d. a word (address and signature included) which belongs to the local Government.
- (b) "Landing charge" of 6d. a word (address and signature included) which belongs to the local Government.
- (c) "Landing charge" of 4s. 2d. for the first ten words, with a minimum of ten words, and 5d. for every subsequent word, which belongs to the station in South America.
- (d) "Ship charge" of 4d. a word (address and signature included) which belongs to the "Ship Station". When messages are sent via a ship there will be a double charge for receiving and transmitting (The "Ship charge" given above may vary according to the Tariff set forth in the International Radiotelegraphic Convention).

8. These Regulations supersede the "Wireless Telegraphy Regulations, No. 2" dated 1st November, 1912, and published in the Gazette of 1st December, 1912.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To make provision for a Cemetery in the Town of Stanley, and for the appointment of a Burial Board.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Repeal.

1. The Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1888, and The Stanley Cemetery Amendment Ordinance, 1892, and The Stanley Cemetery Amendment Ordinance, 1907, are hereby repealed.

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance the term—

"Cemetery" means the Stanley Cemetery.

"Burial Board" means the Stanley Cemetery Burial Board.

Boundaries of Cemetery.

3. The boundaries of the Cemetery shall be as follows:—

From East to West the space between the line dividing lots Nos. 41 and 42, and the Western wall of the Cemetery; from North to South the space between the northern wall of the Cemetery and the Fitzroy

Road, being six chains and eighty links from East to West, and six chains and fifty links from North to South, enclosing an area of four acres, one rood and twenty seven perches, and including lots Nos. 40, 41, and 96; and the whole shall be enclosed by a substantial fence or wall.

4. The Cemetery shall be vested in the Governor of the Falkland Islands for the purposes of a Cemetery for the use of the Colony and may be transferred hereafter to the Burial Board should it be incorporated as a Body Corporate.

Investiture.

5. The Cemetery shall be surrounded on all sides by an open space or road, not less than one chain in width, and no dwelling house, except the Caretaker's Cottage and appurtenances, shall be erected in the Cemetery or within one hundred feet of the outer wall or fence.

Space to be left round Cemetery.

No dwelling house to be erected within 100 feet of Cemetery.

6. There shall be a Burial Board composed of the following Members:—

Burial Board.

The Colonial Secretary for the time being; the Incumbent of Christ Church Cathedral for the time being; the Priest, if any, for the time being in charge of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Stanley; and the Minister, if any, for the time being attached to the Baptist Chapel in Stanley; two Unofficial Members of the Legislative Council; and two persons residing in the Town of Stanley, or within one mile thereof, to be appointed by the Governor. Provided always that the two persons appointed by the Governor shall not continue in Office longer than two years without being reappointed.

7. The Colonial Secretary shall be chairman of the Board and shall preside at its Meetings. In his absence the Members present will elect a chairman.

Chairman of Board.

8. The Board shall meet at least once in every three months and at such other time as at any previous Meeting shall have been determined upon; and it shall be at all times competent for any two Members of the Board by writing under their hands to summon, with at least forty-eight hours notice, the Board for any special purpose mentioned in such writing, and to meet at such time as shall be appointed therein.

Meetings of Board.

9. At all Meetings of the Board any number not less than three Members of such Board shall be sufficient number for transacting business and for exercising all the powers of the Board.

Quorum.

10. Entries of all proceedings of the Board, with the names of the Members who attend each Meeting, shall be made in books to be provided and kept for that purpose, under the direction of the Board, and shall be signed by the Presiding Member. The Board shall likewise provide and keep books in which shall be entered true and regular accounts of all sums of money received and paid for or on account of the purposes of this Ordinance, and of all liabilities incurred by them for such purposes, and of the several purposes for which such sums of money are paid and such liabilities incurred.

Minutes of proceedings.

Accounts of Board.

11. The accounts of the Board shall be made up and balanced to the thirtieth day of September in each year; and some time in the month of December in every year, not later than the fifteenth day thereof, the Board shall cause to be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary, for the information of the Governor in Council, an account of all sums of money received and expended by the Board under the provisions of this Ordinance, and a statement of the purposes of all expenditure and of the balance of money, if any, remaining in hand; and all or any of the books which shall be kept by the Board

Accounts to be balanced annually on 30th September.

Accounts to be forwarded annually to Colonial Secretary.

Books to be produced whenever desired to Governor in Council.

as hereinbefore provided, shall at all times be placed before the Governor in Council for inspection, when so required, on due notice to the Board from the Colonial Secretary.

Board to have control of Cemetery.

12. The Board shall have the management and control of all matters connected with the Cemetery, and may permit the building of a Chapel or Chapels for the performance of the Burial Service, either in the consecrated or unconsecrated parts thereof, and may lay out and embellish the grounds of the Cemetery as they think fit.

Board to attend to upkeep of Cemetery.

13. The Board shall keep the Cemetery, the Caretaker's Cottage, and the Chapel or Chapels, if any, and the walls or fences enclosing the Cemetery in good order and condition out of such monies as shall be received by them by virtue of this Ordinance, or by public or private contributions, or from any other funds made applicable to such purpose.

Board to allow portions of Cemetery to be consecrated subject to approval of Governor in Council.

14. The Board shall, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, allow certain portions of the Cemetery to be consecrated in addition to those portions already consecrated, provided that a sufficient area in the opinion of the Governor in Council remains unconsecrated, and that an adequate portion of the Cemetery is reserved exclusively for the burial of Roman Catholics. The Board shall define by suitable marks the consecrated portions of the Cemetery and the portion set apart for the burial of Roman Catholics.

Board to appoint grave diggers.

15. The Board shall appoint such persons as they may think fit, to be grave diggers, and shall fix the rate of charges for digging graves.

Parts of Cemetery may be set apart for exclusive burial.

16. The Board may set apart such parts of the Cemetery as they may think fit for the purpose of granting exclusive rights of burial therein, and may sell, either in perpetuity or for a limited time, and subject to such conditions as shall be hereafter determined, the exclusive right of burial in any parts of the Cemetery so set apart, or the right of one or more burials therein, and they may sell the right of placing any monument or gravestone in the Cemetery, or of any railing or other enclosure, or any tablet or monumental inscription on the walls of any Chapel or other building within the Cemetery.

Plan and book of reference to be kept.

17. The Board shall cause a plan of the Cemetery to be made on a scale sufficiently large to show the situation of every burial place in all parts of the Cemetery so set apart, and in which an exclusive right of burial has been granted, and all such burial places shall be numbered, and such numbers shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and such book shall contain the names and descriptions of the several persons to whom the exclusive right of burial in any such place of burial has been granted by the Board, and no place of burial, with exclusive right of burial therein, shall be made in the Cemetery without the same being marked out in such plan, and a corresponding entry made in the said book, and the said plan and book shall be kept by the Board.

Form of grant of exclusive right of burial.

18. The Board may grant, in the form in the schedule to this Ordinance annexed, or to the like effect, the exclusive right of burial in any part of the Cemetery, either in perpetuity or for a limited time, and of the right of one or more burials therein, or of placing therein any monument, tablet or gravestone, or any railings or other enclosures round the same.

Register of grants to be kept.

19. A register of all such grants shall be kept by the Board, and within fourteen days after the date of any such grant, an entry or memorial of the date thereof, and of the parties thereto, and also the consideration for such grant, and also a proper description of the

ground described in such grant, so as the situation thereof may be ascertained, shall be made by the Board in such register; and the Board shall be entitled to demand any sum not exceeding two shillings and sixpence, for every such entry or memorial, and the said register may be perused at all reasonable times by any grantee or assignee of such right on payment of one shilling.

20. The exclusive right of burial in any such place of burial shall, whether granted in perpetuity or for a limited time, be considered as the personal estate of the grantee, and may be assigned in his lifetime or bequeathed in his Will.

Exclusive right of burial place to be personal estate of Grantee, to be assignable, or may be bequeathed by Will.

21. Every such assignment made in the lifetime of the assignor shall be by deed, in which the consideration shall be duly set forth and may be in the form in the schedule to this Ordinance annexed, or to the like effect.

Form of assignment.

22. Every such assignment shall, within six months after the execution thereof, if executed in the Falkland Islands, or within six months after the arrival thereof in the Falkland Islands, if executed elsewhere, be produced to the Board, and an entry or memorial of such assignment shall be made in the register by the Board in the same manner as that of the original grant, and until such entry or memorial, no right of burial shall be acquired under any assignment, and for every such entry or memorial the Board shall be entitled to demand any sum not exceeding two shillings and sixpence.

Assignment to be registered.

23. An entry or memorial of the Probate of every Will by which the exclusive right of burial within the Cemetery is bequeathed, and in case there be any specific disposition of such exclusive right of burial in the said Will, an entry of such disposition shall, within six months after the Probate of such Will, be made in the said register in the same manner as that of the original grant, and until such entry, no right of exclusive burial shall be acquired under such Will; and for every such entry or memorial the Board shall be entitled to demand any sum not exceeding two shillings and six pence.

Probates of Wills by which the exclusive right of burial is bequeathed to be registered.

24. No body shall be buried in any place wherein the exclusive right of burial shall have been granted by the Board, except with the consent of the owner, for the time being, of such exclusive right of burial.

Burial place to be kept exclusively for purchaser of exclusive right.

25. No such grant as aforesaid shall give the right to bury within the consecrated part of the Cemetery the body of any person not entitled to be buried in consecrated ground according to the rights and usage of the Church of Eng'and, or to place any monument, gravestone, tablet, or monumental inscription respecting any such body within the consecrated part of the Cemetery.

No such grant to give the right of burial in consecrated ground to certain persons.

26. The Board may take down and remove any gravestone, monument, tablet, or monumental inscription, and any railings or other enclosures which shall have been placed within the Cemetery without their authority.

Power to remove monuments, &c., improperly erected.

27. With respect to interments made in the Cemetery previous to the operation of this Ordinance, the Board shall have the same power and authority to grant exclusive rights to such burial places, and to the right of any monuments, tablets, gravestones, railings, or other enclosures which shall have already been placed thereon, in like manner as hereinbefore provided for the purchase of such rights, and all such burial places shall be measured and defined by boundary marks, and by numbers in regular order, and shall be duly marked upon the plan of the Cemetery, and entered in the register book,

Board may grant exclusive rights to burial places already occupied, and to monuments, &c., already placed therein.

and the rate of payment for the same shall be at the rate fixed for all such exclusive burial places, according to the space of ground occupied.

Power of Board to make Bye-laws.

28. The Board may make Rules and Bye-laws for the maintenance and control of the Cemetery and particularly with respect to the following matters ; that is to say :—

(1) With respect to the minimum and maximum size of all graves, and of all spaces in which exclusive rights of burial are granted, as hereinbefore provided.

(2) The conditions on which exclusive rights of burial may be granted, and the price to be paid for the minimum size of such spaces, and the price per superficial foot at a largely increased rate of any additional space between the minimum and maximum size of spaces so granted.

(3) The price and conditions of the sale of a right to place monuments, gravestones, or any railing or other enclosure in the Cemetery, or of placing any tablet or monumental inscription on the walls of any Chapel or other building within the Cemetery.

(4) The rate and amount of all fees to be paid to any Officer of the Board for attending at funerals, allotting graves, or any other duties for which he ought properly to receive fees.

Bye-laws to be approved by the Governor in Council.

29. All Rules and Bye-laws shall be approved by the Governor in Council before they shall have the force of law.

Ordinance not to affect powers of Board of Health.

30. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall be held to affect the powers of the Board of Health with respect to burial grounds, and the burial of the dead under the provisions of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Penalty for damaging the Cemetery.

31. Every person who shall wilfully destroy or injure any building, wall or fence, belonging to the Cemetery, or destroy or injure any plant therein, or who shall daub or disfigure any wall thereof, or put up any bill therein, or on any wall thereof, or wilfully destroy, injure, or deface any monument, tablet, inscription, or gravestone, or other enclosure within the Cemetery, or do any wilful damage therein, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay to the Board over and above the amount of injury done, a sum not exceeding five pounds.

Penalty for committing a nuisance in the Cemetery.

32. Every person who shall play at any game or sport, or discharge fire-arms, save at a Military funeral, in the Cemetery, or shall wilfully and unlawfully disturb any persons assembled in the Cemetery for the purpose of burying any body therein, or who shall commit any nuisance within the Cemetery, shall forfeit and pay to the Board a sum not exceeding five pounds.

Recovery of Penalties.

33. All penalties and forfeitures incurred under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary manner before the Police Magistrate, with costs, on the complaint of any Member or Officer of the Board.

Short title.

34. This Ordinance may be cited as the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1913.

On standing, the water deposited a small quantity of brownish sediment, but it was otherwise clear and of good colour, and devoid of odour and taste.

The foregoing results show that this water is soft and free from pollution. The amounts of albuminoid ammonia and absorbed oxygen are however rather high, and indicate the presence of organic matter which is probably derived from the peaty topsoil of the locality.

The results of the chemical analysis show that the water is suitable for drinking purposes.



ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To amend the Patents Ordinance, 1903.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Preamble.

1. The sixth sub-section of the third section of Ordinance No. 2 of 1903, entitled an Ordinance relating to Patents for Inventions, Registration of Designs and of Trade Marks", is hereby amended as follows:—

Addition to 3rd section, 6th sub-section of "Patents Ordinance, 1903".

(6) A fee of five pounds. In the event of a renewal of the registration being desired at the termination of fourteen years from the date of the first registration a further fee of five pounds will then become payable, and thereafter at the termination of every further period of fourteen years.

2. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Patents Amendment Ordinance, 1914"; and shall be read and construed as one with the Patents Ordinance, 1903: and any copy of the Patents Ordinance, 1903, printed hereafter may be printed with the amendment made by this Ordinance.

WHEREAS it is advisable to repeal the "Pensions Amendment Ordinance, 1913".

Repeal.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Preamble.

1. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under Ordinance No. 5 of 1906, entitled "An Ordinance to declare the law regulating pensions, gratuities, and other allowances to be granted in respect of offices held in the Public Service of the Falkland Islands", (hereinafter called the principal Ordinance) becomes, on his final retirement from the service of the Colony, either a Director of any Company the principal part of whose business is in any way directly concerned with the Colony, or an officer or a servant employed in the Colony by any such Company, without in every such case the permission of the Governor in writing first had and obtained, then in every such case it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the

Conditions under which a retired Officer may accept the Directorship, etc., of a Company operating in the Colony

Penalty	approval of the Secretary of State, to direct that such pension shall forthwith cease : provided always that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, on being satisfied that the person in respect of whose pension any such direction shall have been given has ceased
Conditions under which pension may be restored	to be a Director of such Company or to be employed as an officer or servant of such Company in the Colony, as the case may be, to give directions for the restoration of such pension, with retrospective effect, if he shall see fit, to such a date as he shall specify.
Short title	2. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Pensions Amendment Ordinance, 1914", and shall be read and construed as one with the principal Ordinance, and any copy of the principal Ordinance printed after the commencement of this Ordinance may be printed with the amendments made by this Ordinance.



The following sections of the Wild Animals and Birds Protection (Amendment) Ordinance, 1913, are published for general information :

3. Any person who, after the commencement of this Ordinance, within the limits of the Colony of the Falkland Islands or its Dependencies,

(a) knowingly kills or attempts to kill or wound or take any wild animal specified in the First Schedule to this Ordinance : or

(b) uses any lime, trap, net, snare or other instrument for the purpose of killing or taking any such wild animal or bird : or

(c) has in his control or possession or exposes or offers for sale or exports or attempts to export from the Colony or its Dependencies any such wild animal or bird killed or taken after the commencement of this Ordinance, or any part of any such wild animal or bird, so killed or taken,

shall be guilty of an offence and shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding TEN POUNDS for every such wild animal, or part of an animal, and to a penalty not exceeding TWO POUNDS for any bird, or part of a bird, in respect of which an offence has been committed.

Schedule 1.

Reindeer.

Kelp Goose (*Bernicla antarctica*).Thrush (*Turdus falklandicus*).Wren (*Troglodytes Cobbi*)Scoresby's Gull (*Larus Scoresbyi*).Kelp Pigeon (*Chionis alba*).Red-breasted Starling
(*Trupialis falklandicus*).Cinclodes (*Cinclodes antarcticus*).

4. Any person who, during the period between the first day of October in any year and the last day of February in the following year, both days included (which period is hereinafter called the close season),

(a) knowingly kills or attempts to kill or wound or take any wild animal or bird specified in the Second Schedule to this Ordinance : or

(b) uses any lime, trap, snare, or other instrument for the purpose of killing or taking any such wild animal or bird : or

(c) has in his control or possession or exposes or offers for sale or exports or attempts to export any such wild animal or bird or any part of any such wild animal or bird, killed or taken during the close season ;

shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding ONE POUND for every wild animal or bird or part of a wild animal or bird in respect of which an offence has been committed.

Gun License Ordinance, 1908.

The following section of the Gun License Ordinance, 1908, is published for general information :

6. Every person who shall use or carry a gun elsewhere than in a dwelling-house or the curtilage thereof without having in force a license duly granted to him under this Ordinance shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding the sum of FIVE POUNDS: Provided always that the said penalty shall not be incurred by the following, namely:—

- (1) By any person in the naval, military, or volunteer service of His Majesty or in the service of the Colonial Government, using or carrying any gun in the performance of his duty, or when engaged in target practice.
- (2) By any person carrying a gun belonging to a person having in force a license under this Ordinance, and by order and for the use of such licensed person only, if the person carrying the gun shall, upon the request of any Officer of Customs, or any Constable, owner or occupier of the land on which such gun shall be used or carried, give his true name and address and also the true name and address of his employer.
- (3) By any person carrying a gun in the ordinary course of his trade or business as a common carrier.

To amend The Pensions Ordinance, 1906.

WHEREAS it is advisable to repeal the "Pensions Amendment Ordinance, 1913". Repeal.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:— Preamble.

1. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under Ordinance No. 5 of 1906, entitled "An Ordinance to declare the law regulating pensions, gratuities, and other allowances to be granted in respect of offices held in the Public Service of the Falkland Islands", (hereinafter called the principal Ordinance) becomes, on his final retirement from the service of the Colony, either a Director of any Company the principal part of whose business is in any way directly concerned with the Colony, or an officer or a servant employed in the Colony by any such Company, without in every such case the permission of the Governor in writing first had and obtained, then in every such case it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to direct that such pension shall forthwith cease: provided always that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, on being satisfied that the person in respect of whose pension any such direction shall have been given has ceased to be a Director of such Company or to be employed as an officer or servant of such Company in the Colony, as the case may be, to give directions for the restoration of such pension, with retrospective effect, if he shall see fit, to such a date as he shall specify. Conditions under which a retired Officer may accept the Directorship, etc., of a Company operating in the Colony

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

Relating to Prospecting for and Mining Metals and Other Minerals.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:— Enacting Clause.

1. In this Ordinance and in any Rules, Regulations, or Proclamations made thereunder unless the context otherwise requires:— Interpretation.

“BOARD” means the Falkland Islands Mining Board as constituted in Section 28 hereof.

“PRIVATE LAND” means land which is held by the owner under a Crown grant;

“COAL” includes shale and mineral oils;

“PRECIOUS METALS” means gold, silver, and precious stones;

“MINERALS” means all metals or minerals other than coal and precious metals.

Issue of miners' rights and prospecting licenses.

2. From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall be lawful for the Board to issue miners' rights and prospecting licences in the manner and subject to the conditions hereinafter prescribed.

Miner's right.

3. A miner's right shall confer upon the holder a non-exclusive right to prospect for precious metals, coal, and minerals on any land in the Colony or Dependencies subject to the following exceptions:—

- (a) It shall not confer a right to prospect upon any lands comprised in a prospecting license.
- (b) It shall not confer a right to prospect on private lands except for precious metals.

Prospecting license.

4. A prospecting license or license to prospect shall entitle the holder thereof to the exclusive right of prospecting for precious metals, coal, and minerals on the land to which it refers.

Miner's right or prospecting license necessary.

5. (1) From and after the commencement of this Ordinance no person shall prospect for precious metals, coal, or minerals on any lands in the Colony or Dependencies unless he is the holder of a miner's right or of a prospecting license.

(2) Any person prospecting in contravention of this section shall be liable upon summary proceedings before a stipendiary magistrate to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

Lands excepted from prospecting.

6. Nothing contained in this Ordinance and no miner's right or prospecting license shall authorise any person to enter and prospect upon:—

- (a) Any land in the town of Stanley
- (b) Any land actually and lawfully occupied by buildings or being used as a garden, planting ground, plantation, ornamental pleasure ground, or set apart as a cemetery.
- (c) Any land while actually under crop;
- (d) Any land situated within one hundred yards of any spring in use as a source of water supply or any artificial reservoir, dam, waterworks, or buildings.

Fee for miner's right.

7. The Board may grant a miner's right to any person applying for the same and the applicant shall pay a fee of five pounds for the miner's right granted to him.

Conditions to which prospecting licenses are to be subject.

8. Every prospecting license shall be deemed to be subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) That the holder will vigorously and continuously prosecute prospecting operations to the satisfaction of the Board and will promptly and at the latest within thirty days report to the Board all mineral discoveries: and a holder shall not be deemed to be vigorously and continuously prosecuting prospecting operations unless there be engaged in the prospecting operations qualified and competent persons to prospect in the proportion of at least one to every five hundred acres of the land referred to in his prospecting license;

- (b) That the holder will fill up all holes made and repair or pay compensation for any other damage done to the surface of the land whilst prospecting;

- (c) That the holder in the case of occupied land will lodge to the satisfaction of the Board sufficient security for the fulfilment of the last-mentioned condition.

On breach of any of the above-mentioned conditions by the holder of a prospecting license the Board may cancel the license.

9. (1) Every application for a prospecting license shall be in writing addressed to the Board and shall state the position and approximate area and boundaries in respect of which the application is made.

Application for prospecting licenses.

(2) It shall be accompanied by a fee calculated at the rate of one pound for every one hundred acres of the area of the land to which the license refers and the said fee shall be paid by the Board into the Treasury forthwith upon the granting of any license or returned to the applicant should the application for a license be refused.

10. The Board shall keep a register showing the name in full, the place of residence and occupation of every person to whom a miner's right is granted.

Register of miner's right.

11. The particulars of every application for a prospecting license shall be entered by the Board in a register to be kept by the Board for that purpose and all applications shall be dealt with according to the order in which the same are received.

Register of prospecting licenses.

12. (1) If all conditions prescribed have been complied with by the applicant and there is not in force a license previously issued in respect of the area for which application is made, the Board shall issue to the applicant the prospecting license applied for.

Issue of licenses.

(2) A prospecting license shall be subject to the conditions that may be made thereunder and shall be in such form as may be approved by the Governor-in-Council.

13. (1) A prospecting license shall continue in force for one year from the date of issue and shall not be issued in respect of an area exceeding ten thousand acres.

Area and duration of prospecting licenses.

(2) A prospecting license shall not be renewable but on its termination application for a new license may be made by the holder thereof.

14. The applicant for a prospecting license shall mark out the area in respect of which it is to apply in a manner prescribed by the Board but no survey shall be necessary. Provided that in case of two or more applications for adjoining land or of any question or dispute as to the actual land comprised in the application the Board may direct such survey as it deems necessary to be made either by the applicants or at their cost.

Marking out of area for prospecting license.

15. If any license holder reports the discovery of any precious metal, coal, or other mineral, in such quantity as the Board considers payable, the Governor may cause the locality in which the discovery was made to be surveyed and shall proclaim such part thereof as the Board may deem expedient to be open for mining leases. The lands comprised in any such proclamation are hereinafter referred to as a mining area.

Declaration of mining area.

16. (1) Before proclaiming a mining area the Governor shall, except in the case of unoccupied Crown lands, acquire

Resumption of land for mining area.

such area in accordance with the methods provided by law for the acquisition of land for public purposes.

(2) In assessing any compensation on any land acquired under this section there shall be taken into account the market value of the land (exclusive of any increase in the value of such land by reason of the existence thereon of any precious metal, coal, or other mineral) and the improvements thereon, reasonable allowance being made for any damage that may be caused by severance, and if there be a tenant thereon he shall receive a reasonable compensation for disturbance.

No person to mine without a lease.

17. (1) From and after the commencement of this Ordinance no person shall mine for precious metals on any lands in the Colony unless he has first obtained from the board a mining lease entitling him so to do nor shall any person mine for coal or other minerals except on private lands unless he has first obtained a lease entitling him so to do.

Penalty.

(2) Any person mining in contravention of this section shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding twelve months.

Condition in lease for diligence.

(3) Every mining lease granted in pursuance of this Ordinance shall contain a condition authorising the Board to declare the lease void and to re-enter upon the land leased if the lessee shall not vigorously and continuously prosecute mining operations on the land to the satisfaction of the Board.

Privilege of discoverer.

18. (1) Upon the proclamation of a mining area the license holder who reported the discovery leading thereto shall have the right in priority to any other person of obtaining a lease for mining of such area in such manner and subject to such conditions as may be prescribed.

(2) No lease of any part of a mining area shall be granted to any person who is or has been the agent or servant of any license holder in respect of such area or part thereof except with the consent in writing of such license holder or his representatives.

Area of land leased.

19. The area of the lands leased for the purpose of mining in pursuance of this Ordinance, other than alluvial working, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres and the shape or conformation of the area shall be such that the ratio of the length to the breadth shall never be greater than two to one.

Rents.

20. (1) There shall be paid by the holder of a lease to mine precious metals or other minerals an annual rent of five shillings per acre and the holder of a lease to mine coal one shilling per acre.

(2) Such rent shall be payable in advance at the times and in the manner that may be prescribed.

(3) Such rents shall form part of the general revenue of the Colony.

Royalties.

21. There shall be payable to the Board by the holders of mining leases the following royalties viz:—

(a) On every ounce of gold raised one shilling;

(b) On every ton of coal threepence;

(c) On all other metals and minerals raised on Crown Land such amount as may be prescribed by the Governor-in-Council and reserved in the lease.

22. The royalties paid in respect of precious metals shall form part of the general revenue of the Colony.

Distribution of royalties.

23. The Governor-in-Council may from time to time make regulations with respect to:—

Power of Governor in Council to make regulations.

- (a) The application for and form of miners' rights;
- (b) The form of prospecting licenses and, so far as is consistent with this Ordinance, the conditions to be observed by holders of prospecting licenses;
- (c) The duration and area of leases in any mining area;
- (d) The conditions of application for grant, form, issue, and registration of mining leases and the fees payable thereon;
- (e) The renewal, transfer, assignment, surrender, and determination of mining leases and the registration thereof and the fees payable thereon;
- (f) The ascertainment and payment of royalties;
- (g) The payment of rents;
- (h) The amount of royalty payable in respect of metals or minerals in cases in which no provision is made in this Ordinance;
- (i) The keeping of records of precious metals, coal, and other minerals found;
- (j) The keeping, inspection, and verification of accounts and plans and sections of mines.

24. The Governor may with the consent signified by resolution of the Legislative Council make regulations for all and any of the following matters;

Regulations with consent of Legislative Council.

- (a) The mode of working mining leases and deposit of waste and tailings;
- (b) Definition of boundaries and maintenance of boundary-marks;
- (c) Surveys;
- (d) The regulation of the use of the surface of the land and of the cutting of peat for fuel;
- (e) Water rights and the use of water;
- (f) Permits to use land for purposes connected with mining;
- (g) Trespass;
- (h) Employment and registration of labourers, the payment of wages and duties of employers;
- (i) Duties of traders in precious metals;
- (j) The sanitary regulation of lands comprised in mining leases and adjacent thereto;
- (k) The regulation of mines;
- (l) The determination of disputes;
- (m) Disposal of forfeited precious metals;
- (n) The regulation of the erection of buildings and the carrying on of businesses in a mining area;

- (o) The regulation of alluvial working and among other things the areas and modes of working and otherwise conducting alluvial working.

Penalty for breach of regulations.

25. Any regulation made under the last preceding two sections may for any breach thereof or for any disobedience of a lawful order of an authorised officer impose a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds or imprisonment for any period not exceeding six months and may authorise the cancellation of a prospecting license or lease.

Forfeiture of minerals illicitly mined.

26. Any precious metal, coal, or other mineral raised in contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder, shall be forfeited.

Penalty on obstruction of a license holder or lessee.

27. Any person who shall interfere with or obstruct the holder of a prospecting license or of a mining lease or his agent or agents in the exercise of his rights conferred by this Ordinance or any regulations made hereunder shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding twenty-five pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months.

Appointment of Board.

28. The Board to be constituted under this Ordinance shall be appointed by the Governor-in-Council and shall consist of three members one of whom shall be the Colonial Secretary for the time being and the Colonial Secretary shall be the chairman of the Board. In the event of there being any difference of opinion between the members of the Board as to any matter before them the opinion of the majority shall be binding and any decision or action in pursuance thereof shall be deemed to be the decision or action of the Board provided always that there shall be a right of appeal from any decision or action of the Board to the Governor-in-Council whose decision on the matter at issue shall be final.

Decisions.

Appeals.

Applications to Board.

29. All applications, notices, communications or reports required to be made to the Board under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be addressed to the Colonial Secretary who shall place the same before the Board without delay.

Special concessions.

30. Where any person satisfies the Governor-in-Council that he has prior to the passing of this Ordinance expended money in investigating the mining resources of the Colony or Dependencies or in developing the same with a view to obtaining concessions of lands for mining or prospecting purposes it shall be lawful for the Governor-in-Council to make special concessions, to the person aforesaid in respect of any prospecting licences, areas of land leased or to be leased, royalties or other matters coming within the purview of this Ordinance as the Governor-in-Council may consider reasonable and proper.

Validation of existing leases.

31. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to invalidate any mining lease that may have been validly granted before the commencement thereof.

Suspending clause.

32. This Ordinance shall not come into force until such date as the Governor may fix by proclamation after His Majesty's non-disallowance thereof has been communicated to him.

33. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Mining Ordinance, 1914."

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To provide for the Registration of Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the Registration of Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists. Preamble.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows: Enacting clause.

1. In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires: Interpretation.

“MEDICAL PRACTITIONER” means any person professing to practice medicine or surgery or holding himself out as ready and willing to treat patients for gain.

2. Separate registers of Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists shall be kept in the form of the Schedule hereto, and a fee of one pound shall be charged for each registration under Section 4 hereof. Provided that Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists qualified to be registered under this Ordinance and in actual practice of their profession in the Colony or Dependences, shall be entitled to registration free of charge within three months after the coming into operation of this Ordinance. Register to be kept. Proviso.

3. The Colonial Surgeon shall be the Registrar of Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists, and shall once in every year, as soon as conveniently may be after the first day of January, make and publish in the Gazette a list containing the names and qualifications of all registered Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists. Colonial Surgeon to be Registrar.

4. (1) The publication of such lists shall be *prima facie* evidence that the persons named therein are registered under this Ordinance, and the absence of the name of any person from such list shall be *prima facie* evidence that such person is not registered.

Publication *prima facie* evidence of Registration.

(2) All register books and all copies thereof or extracts therefrom certified under the hand of the Registrar shall be receivable in evidence in all courts of justice in the Colony.

(3) The Registrar shall produce or cause to be produced any register book in his office on subpoena or order of any court without payment for so doing, unless the court or tribunal shall otherwise direct.

5. (1) The following persons shall be entitled to registration under this Ordinance as Medical Practitioners:—

Persons entitled to be registered Medical Practitioners.

(a) The holder of any licence, degree, or diploma which would entitle him to registration as a medical practitioner by the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom;

(b) The holder of any licence, degree, or diploma in medicine or surgery which by order of the Governor-in-Council shall be declared a qualification for registration as a Medical Practitioner under this Ordinance.

(2) The following persons shall be entitled to registration under this Ordinance as Midwives.

Persons entitled to be registered as Midwives.

Any person who holds a diploma or certificate in midwifery granted by a recognised institution or who in the opinion of the Colonial Surgeon possesses the requisite skill, knowledge, and experience may be registered as a midwife.

(3) The following persons shall be entitled to registration under this Ordinance as Dentists:—

Persons entitled to be registered as Dentists.

(a) Possesses a licence or degree in dental surgery or dentistry of any of the Bodies and Universities who elect members of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom: or

(b) Is at the passing of this Ordinance *bona fide* engaged in the practice of dentistry or dental surgery either separately or in conjunction with the practice of medicine, surgery or pharmacy.

(4) Provided that no person shall be entitled to Registration whose name has been struck off the Register of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom.

6. Every person registered under this Ordinance who may have obtained any higher degree or qualification, other than the qualification in respect of which he may have been registered, shall be entitled to have such higher degree or additional qualification inserted in the register in substitution for, or in addition to, the qualifications previously registered, without payment of any further fee.

Persons registered may have additional qualification inserted in register free of charge.

7. Every medical practitioner registered under this Ordinance shall be entitled to practice medicine, surgery, and midwifery, and every dentist registered under this Ordinance shall be entitled to practice dentistry, and every person registered under this Ordinance as a midwife shall be entitled to practice midwifery and every medical practitioner, dentist, and midwife so registered shall be

If registered entitled to practice and sue for fees.

entitled to demand, sue for, and recover in any court of law, with full cost of suit, reasonable charges for professional aid, advice, and visits, and the value of any medicine or any medical or surgical appliances rendered or supplied by him to his patients.

8. No person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any court of law for any medical or surgical advice, or attendance or for the performance of any operation as a medical practitioner, or dentist, or for any medicine which he shall have prescribed and supplied or for any services performed as a midwife within the Colony after the coming into force of this Ordinance, unless he was at the time registered under this Ordinance; but all registration effected within three months after the coming into force of this Ordinance, shall be deemed to relate back to the time of such coming into force.

No fees recoverable unless persons registered.

9. No certificate, or other document, required by law to be signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner, given after the commencement of this Ordinance, shall be valid unless signed by a person registered as a medical practitioner under this Ordinance.

Certificates cannot be signed unless person signing is registered.

10. From and after the coming into force of this Ordinance the words "legally qualified medical practitioner," or "duly qualified medical officer," or any words importing a person recognized by law as a medical practitioner, or member of the medical profession when used in any Ordinance, or order of the Governor-in-Council, or in any Proclamation, or in any Order or Rules made thereunder, with reference to such persons, shall be construed to mean a person registered as a medical practitioner under this Ordinance.

Construction of terms.

11. All medical officers in the Public Service of the Colony, and all medical officers of His Majesty's Army and Navy respectively residing in the Colony while on full pay, and all duly qualified ships surgeons while in discharge of their duties shall be entitled to the privileges of persons registered under this Ordinance and may be registered free of charge.

Persons entitled to free registration.

12. (1) If any medical practitioner, midwife or dentist registered under this Ordinance, shall:—

If convicted may be struck off from the Register.

(a) Be convicted of any felony or misdemeanour; or

(b) After due enquiry by a Board of Enquiry be deemed by the Governor-in-Council to have been guilty of infamous conduct in any professional respect,

the Governor-in-Council may order the Registrar to strike out the name of such person from the Register.

(2) Such order may prescribe a period on the expiration of which a person ordered to be struck off as aforesaid shall be entitled to be re-registered.

(3) The Board of Enquiry shall consist of the Colonial Surgeon and two other persons to be appointed by the Governor; upon any such enquiry the person against whom such offence or conduct is alleged shall be entitled to appear and be heard.

(4) Any person whose name may have been ordered to be struck out from the Register may appeal to the Supreme Court which shall have power to annul or vary the order in respect of which such person appeals

(5) Every appeal under this section shall be made within eight days from the date of such Order and the Registrar shall not strike out any name as aforesaid before such period has expired and he has ascertained that no such appeal has been lodged.

13. Any person who, after the coming into force of this Ordinance, wilfully and falsely takes, or uses, any name, title, or addition, evidently implying a qualification to practice medicine, surgery, dentistry, or registration as a midwife, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for each offence and to a further penalty of five pounds a day during the continuance of such offence or, in default of payment, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months. Penalty.

14. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists Ordinance, 1914." Short Title.

A BILL
ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To Regulate the Sale and Use of Poisons.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. The several substances mentioned in the first schedule hereto shall be deemed poisons within the meaning of this Ordinance.

Definition of poisons.

2. (1) Nothing in this Ordinance shall apply to the sale of:—

Application of Ordinance.

(a) Any poison when made up or compounded as a medicine according to the prescription of a duly qualified medical practitioner, provided the medicine is labelled with the name and address of the vendor and the ingredients thereof are entered, with the name of the person to whom it is sold or delivered, in a book to be kept for that purpose;

(b) Patent medicines;

(c) Photographic materials for the purpose of photography;

(d) Medicines dispensed by veterinary surgeons for animals under their treatment; or

(e) Fly poison papers or packets of poisonous mixtures for the destruction of vermin when duly marked as such;

(2) Nothing in this Ordinance shall apply to sales of poisons by wholesale dealers in the ordinary course of wholesale dealing, if an order in writing signed by the purchaser is given for the supply of the same, provided that the sales shall be entered in a book, and the packages of poison shall be labelled as directed by section 8 hereof.

Persons qualified to deal in poisons.

3. (1) It shall not be lawful for any person who has not been duly registered under the provisions of the Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists, Ordinance, 1914, to sell or deal in poisons.

(2) Whosoever, not being qualified as aforesaid, sells or deals in any poisons shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

Sale of poisons to be entered in a book.

4. (1) Every person who sells any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto, shall, before delivery thereof to the purchaser, inquire his name, place of abode, and occupation, and the purpose for which the poison is required or stated to be required.

(2) The vendor shall thereupon make a faithful entry of the sale, specifying the poison and the quantity thereof, and all the particulars so given by the purchaser, together with the day of the month and year of the sale, in a book to be kept by the vendor for that purpose in the form in the second schedule hereto.

(3) The entry shall be signed by the person making the same and also by the purchaser, unless he declares himself unable to write, in which case the person making the entry shall add thereto the words "purchaser cannot write."

(4) Whenever a witness to the sale is required by this Ordinance the entry shall be signed by that witness, who shall also state his place of abode.

5. (1) In cases where sales and purchases of poisons are made by correspondence, the letter ordering the same shall be preserved by the vendor and a memorandum of the date of the said letter, by whom it was written, and the quantity and particulars of the poison therein ordered, shall be entered in the said book.

(2) No person shall sell any poison so ordered to any person with whose signature he is not acquainted, unless the signature has been witnessed by a justice of the peace, clergyman, or public officer, or is authenticated by some person known to the vendor.

Restrictions as to sale of any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto.

6. (1) No person shall sell any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto to any person who is under eighteen years of age, or who is unknown to the vendor, unless the sale is made in the presence of some witness who is known to the vendor and knows the purchaser.

(2) The witness shall sign his name and add his place of abode to the required entry before the delivery of the poison to the purchaser.

7. Whosoever—

(a) Sells any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto and delivers the same without having made and signed the entries required by this Ordinance; or

- (b) Sells that poison without having obtained the signature to such entry as is required by this Ordinance; or
- (c) Purchases the poison and gives false information in answer to inquiries to the person selling the same in relation to the particulars which the vendor is by this Ordinance authorised to inquire of such purchaser; or
- (d) Signs his name as a witness to the sale of the poison to a person unknown to him; shall for every offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

8. No person shall sell any poison specified in the second part of the first schedule hereto or any substance or preparation which has been or is hereafter declared to be a poison as herein provided either by wholesale or retail, unless the bottle, or other vessel, wrapper or cover, box, or case immediately containing the same bears thereon the word "Poison" printed conspicuously, together with the name of the article and the name and address of the seller thereof.

Rules to be observed in the sale of poisons.

9. (1) Whosoever sells any poison otherwise than as herein provided shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Penalties.

(2) For the purpose of this section the person on whose behalf a sale is made by any apprentice or servant shall be deemed to be the seller.

Provided that the apprentice or servant shall also be liable to a like penalty.

10. The books required to be kept under this Ordinance shall at any time be open to inspection by a Government medical officer, or, on the order of a stipendary magistrate, by a constable or officer of the police. Any person refusing to allow or hindering an inspection of the books by a Government medical officer or by a duly authorised officer or constable shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

Inspection of books.

11. (1) The Governor may make further regulations as to the colouring of any poison, or the sale or custody of the same, or for otherwise carrying into effect the objects of this Ordinance.

Regulations.

(2) The Regulations shall be published in the Gazette and shall thereupon have the same force and validity as if they formed part of this Ordinance.

(3) A copy of the regulations shall be laid before the Legislative Council without unnecessary delay.

12. Whosoever, being the owner or other person in charge or possession of any poison, leaves it in any place (whether the same is ordinarily accessible to others or not) unless the bottle or package of whatever kind in which the poison is contained is marked "Poison" and is otherwise duly labelled in the manner provided by section 8, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Poisons to be labelled.

13. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Poisons Ordinance 1914."

REGULATIONS.

Importation and Exportation of Live Stock.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by Section 38 of the "Live Stock Ordinance, 1901," His Excellency the Administrator, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulation:

1. Any person intending to import any animal enumerated in Schedule A hereto shall give a month's notice in writing to the Chief Inspector of Stock stating the number, description, from whence imported, where purchased, and probable date of arrival in the Colony.

2. Ships carrying animals shall enter at Port Stanley for the purpose of examination, except in cases where the Master has previously obtained special permission from the Chief Inspector of Stock to enter at Fox Bay or New Island. This special permission will only be granted when a definite date of arrival is stated.

3. The proposed Port of Entry and the first port at which it is intended to land any animal should be stated in the form of Schedule B hereto. Seven days of grace will be allowed after which the permission so granted shall be cancelled and a fresh application made.

4. Every animal so imported into the Colony from a British or Colonial port shall be accompanied by a health certificate signed by a qualified veterinary surgeon of the district in which the animal was purchased, and if imported into the Colony from a foreign port shall be accompanied by a written declaration from the exporter made before a British Consular Officer to the effect that the animal is free on embarkation from any infectious or contagious disease and has not, within thirty days of shipment, been in direct or indirect contact with infected stock.

5. Any person who shall import any animal without due notice as provided in the first of these Regulations, or without a health certificate as provided in the fourth of these Regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

6. Every animal imported enumerated in Schedule A hereto shall be examined by an Inspector and the Inspector shall have power:

(a) to prohibit the landing of any animal which, in his opinion, would be a source of danger to other animals in the Colony;

(b) to order any such animal to be destroyed, either on board ship or after being landed, but such order must in all cases be sanctioned by the Governor before being carried into effect;

(c) to order any animal to be conveyed or driven to and confined in any area set apart as a quarantine paddock, and such animal shall be retained in quarantine until a written order for its release has been given by him.

7. Any person who fails to take due precautions as to the landing of any animal enumerated in Schedule A hereto or permits any such animal to escape from quarantine shall be liable to the penalties provided in Section 42 of the Live Stock Ordinance 1901.

8. All expenses incurred in the destruction or keeping in quarantine, by order of an Inspector, of any imported animal enumerated in Schedule A hereto shall be payable by its owner, and in no case will the Government compensate an owner for any such animal destroyed under these Regulations.

9. An Inspector shall inspect any stock-carrying vessel and shall have the power:

- (a) To order that all or any parts of the vessel be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected to his satisfaction;
- (b) To prohibit the landing of fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils or other articles which have been used for or about any animal;
- (c) To prohibit the landing of any other article which, in his opinion, may carry disease.

10. These Regulations supercede the Regulations for the "Importation of Live Stock into the Falkland Islands" published in the Gazette of 1st November 1911.

Church and School Building at Darwin Harbour.

His Excellency the Administrator directs the publication, for general information, of the following letter from the Honourable W. A. Harding.

SIR,—

I should be much obliged if you would publish in the Gazette the following statement with reference to the Church and School Building at Darwin Harbour, with a view to eliciting the views of any of the original subscribers as to the demolition of the old building and the proposed erection of a new one on the site.

The circumstances under which the existing Church and School at Darwin Harbour was originally put up are shortly as follows:—Some 40 years ago it was decided to invite a Presbyterian Minister from Scotland to take up religious work at Darwin Harbour, and the Falkland Islands Company at the same time arranged to have a School there: the Minister arrived in 1872 and the school master towards the end of the same year. For some time the services were held in the cook house, but when the School was finally decided upon it was arranged that if the Company guaranteed the Minister's stipend and provided a school master, a building more suitable than the cook house should be provided by subscription.

A fair amount was raised, and the building was sent out freight free by the Company who likewise advanced the cost of erection. The cost of material (without freight) and the expense of erection amounted together to £245. Subscriptions to the fund ceased after some years and as the total was only £165, there remained a debt of £80 which the Directors of the Company eventually wrote off.

In the course of time the place was found to be too large and a division was put up at the cost of the Company, later when the roof became leaky, the Company re-roofed the building and have always kept it painted. In fact after the subscriptions were exhausted, the maintenance and repair was undertaken by the Company who are therefore the largest contributors to the building.

It is now however past repair, and the Directors propose to replace it entirely at their own expense. The original site is by far the most convenient and from every point of view it is preferable that the new building should be erected on that site. It is probable that but very few of the original subscribers are now living but before demolishing this the Directors of the Company would be glad to receive an expression of the views of any surviving subscribers.

I may add that it is the Directors' wish that the new Building shall be used in precisely the same manner as the old one, that is to say that they would not assent to its exclusive use by any body or sect, but that it shall be set apart for the use of all religious denominations as a quiet place where any service may be held. The Directors do not desire that any moiety of collections made at any service held there shall be appropriated towards lighting or cleaning, which will be provided by the Company. The control of the Building will be in the hands of the Camp Manager to whom due notice should be given of a desire to hold a service there.

SIR.

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1913.

2. During the year 68 accounts were opened and 67 closed; leaving a total of 495 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £70401 15s. 11d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £142 4s. 6d. standing to the credit of each account, or £30 10s. 11d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,272.

3. Interest amounting to £1,725 10s. 7d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £138 7s. 10d. more than that credited in 1911-12. The amount of withdrawals for the year exceeded the deposits for the same period by £172 4s. 6d. The balance at the end of the Bank year shows a slight decrease as compared with the previous year, this being accounted for by the exceptionally heavy withdrawals made by depositors leaving the Colony.

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £2,326 12s. 6d. and the expenses incurred £1,733 10s. 7d. leaving a profit of £593 1s. 11d. as shown in the profit and loss account for the year ended 30th September, 1913. (Enclosure C.)

5. The investments held on account of the Bank on the 30th September, 1913, amounted to £69,016 4s. 2d. leaving an uninvested balance at the end of the Bank Year of £1,385 11s. 9d.

An Ordinance

To validate certain proceedings of the Legislative Council.

Whereas doubt has arisen as to whether Vere Packe was a legally appointed Member of the Legislative Council during the period from 12th November, 1911, to 7th June, 1912, and whereas doubt has also arisen as to whether George Isaac Turner was legally appointed temporarily and provisionally a Member of the Legislative Council during the absence from the Colony of Vere Packe for the period from 3rd July, 1912, to 31st March, 1913.

Preamble.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To amend the Alien Ordinance, 1900.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:— Enacting Clause.

1. The following is substituted for Section 5 of Ordinance No. V. of 1900, entitled "An Ordinance Relating to Aliens and to the Naturalization of Foreign Subjects." Amendment.

(a) Whenever any person arrives in this Colony under an engagement to serve any person, firm, company, association, or body of persons, in any capacity, and Liability imposed to repay costs incurred by the Government.

(b) Whenever any seaman is discharged from his ship in this Colony without the sanction of the Colonial Secretary and without reasonable provision having been made as to his subsistence, or (not being a deserter) is wrongfully left behind in this Colony, and

Within a period of twelve months from the date of such arrival or discharge, or, being left behind, such person or seaman becomes chargeable to the Colony, then, in cases within clause (a) the person, firm, company, association, or body of persons, with whom such engagement was made, and in cases within clause (b) the master of the ship from whom he has been so left behind, shall, respectively be liable to repay to the Government all costs and charges incurred by them during his residence in the Colony, and the costs of his removal from the Colony.

2. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Alien Amendment Ordinance 1914" and shall be read and construed as one with the Alien Ordinance 1900 and any copy of the Alien Ordinance 1900 printed hereafter may be printed with the amendment made by this Ordinance. Short title.

Report on the condition of the teeth in the Falkland Islands, 1913.

1. PREVALENCE OF CARIES.

(a) Caries is abundant both in the child and adult. Its progress is very rapid and it is seldom that one finds the pulp of the tooth reacting to the injury, viz:-Caries.

(b) Extensive decay is found in both the "Milk" and "Permanent" dentitions. In the former Caries shews itself very early, and in the latter decay progresses steadily from the time the first permanent molar erupts.

(c) All the teeth in the milk dentition are equally predisposed to the action of decay, but in the permanent dentition the teeth that are attacked first are the first permanent molars. With the exception of three cases examined out of 140 these particular teeth were all carious. The position of the Caries was in nearly all cases on the occlusal surfaces of the teeth. The incisor teeth came next in frequency, the Caries here being interstitial in nearly all cases.

2. STRUCTURE OF THE TEETH.

Ordinary macroscopical appearances show the teeth to be normal in shape. Eight cases of Rhacitic teeth were found. In consistency the teeth are undoubtedly soft, as is shewn when a cutting instrument is used; the enamel may be said to be "chalky."

The general formation of the teeth in the jaws en masse shews irregularity. There is crowding of the teeth in the Incisor regions both in the Maxilla and Mandible, the Arches shewing a distinct constriction in the pre-molar region.

3. PERIODONTAL DISEASE.

This condition is common, especially in adults. The nature of the disease is typical slow tissue necrosis ensuing with ultimate looseness of the teeth.

General symptoms were present on many occasions resulting from the absorption of the Toxins produced in the mouth.

4. CAUSES OF DECAY.

Caries is a chemico-parasitic action occurring in the mouth, bringing about liquefaction of the tooth substance and disintegration. In consequence, when the cause of this rapid and extensive decay is sought for, one must consider the growth of organisms in the mouth and what is likely to assist them in their liquefaction of the tooth substance.

For this purpose at least three important factors must be taken into account, viz:-

- (a) The cleansing of the mouth,
- (b) The types of food taken,
- (c) The feeding of the infant.

(a). THE CLEANSING OF THE TEETH.

This is all important. It is the collection of foodstuffs in the mouth that is responsible for more than half the decay. Tooth brushes are very little used in the Falklands and small effort is made to keep the mouth clean, with the inevitable result that the soft foodstuffs accumulate around the teeth and subject themselves to the action of enzymes resulting in the formation of acid, which acid liquefies the tooth substance (enamel) and allows the peptonizing action of micro-organisms to take place. A definite conclusion is therefore arrived at that lack of cleanliness is undoubtedly largely responsible for the excessive decay prevalent.

(b). THE TYPES OF FOOD TAKEN.

This is a question which has received much attention. Of all the foods taken those which abound in carbo hydrates of the mono saccharid group, most readily acted on in the mouth, their fermentation causing the formation of lactic acid and water. It is the formation of this acid that is the chief source of all the trouble.

It is therefore well to study the diet of the inhabitants to see if there is an excessive amount of readily fermentable carbo hydrates imbibed. The bread eaten is of a particularly soft nature and readily clings to the teeth. Another article eaten with too much frequency is the harmful sweetmeat which contains a very inferior type of sugar, or in other words a carbo hydrate, and a very readily fermentable one.

I think it may be safely said that an abnormally large amount of sweet-eating takes place here both by adults and children, especially the latter. The habit is a pernicious one and has a direct bearing on the existing condition. A tremendous amount of biscuit-eating also goes on amongst the children.

These factors have an important bearing on the decay of teeth.

(c). THE FEEDING OF THE INFANT.

This again is an all-important point to consider, as the feeding of the infant to a marked degree must determine the structure of the tooth. During the first three years of life the permanent teeth are in a state of development and if the infant is not obtaining the proper food in proper proportions the tooth follicle, in which is the developing tooth, does not derive the necessary nourishment; there is also a deficiency in lime salts, which last is manifested by a condition known as rhacitic teeth where the enamel is lacking.

The children here are fed in a variety of peculiar ways. They are nearly all artificially fed with the tube bottle, but this type of bottle is being ousted by the more rational variety the "boat" bottle.

The food taken is nearly always condensed milk or a mixture with cows milk, but it is quite a common occurrence to find a young child without teeth sucking a piece of mutton.

The irregular way in which the children are fed in early life has to a degree a bad influence on the ultimate constitution of the teeth.

From observations therefore I attribute the bad condition of the teeth to:—

- (1) Lack of cleanliness.
- (2) Abundant eating of sweet and "pappy" foods.
- (3) Mal-Development of teeth due to bad feeding in Infancy.

THE GOVERNMENT SCHOOL CLINIC, STANLEY.

A School Clinic has been started under my guidance. All the scholars were examined with probe and mirror and the parents were notified on printed slips of the exact treatment required. The children have received the stated treatment, where desired by the parents, every Saturday morning at the Dental Surgery.

Each child on being treated receives a card on which is placed the treatment and the date for the next appointment, so that the parent can see the progress made.

The examination shewed Caries to exist in every mouth with the exception of two cases.

The children also shewed no disposition to clean the teeth at all. Tonsils and Adenoids were constant in every case.

The school children will be examined every year and the progress of the treatment against Oral Sepsis noted.

A consignment of tooth brushes and powder has been obtained for the use of the children, which they are able to purchase from the Schoolmaster at a nominal cost.

An effort is being made to obtain lantern slides in order that popular lectures may be given to the parents and children by the dentist on the care of the teeth. As this Clinic is quite a new institution a better response to it is hoped for next year. At present progress is rather slow.

The Hon. G. J. Felton, after taking the prescribed oath, took his seat as a provisional Member of the Council.

3. Supplementary Appropriation, 1914.

His Excellency the President communicated the following Message to the Council introducing the Supplementary Estimates for 1913.

(Vide copy of Message attached.)

4. Motion.

The Hon. W. A. Harding, in addressing the Council, remarked that the Colony was to be congratulated on the very high revenue of 1913. He commented particularly on the large increase under the head of Customs and said that the result for 1913 seemed to prove that the decline in revenue from this source noted in previous years was not due to insufficient means of safeguarding the revenue as had been suggested. With regard to the Item "Crown Agents Expenses" contained in Clause 16 of the Message he asked whether the sum of £44/3/4 would not be better charged to the Town Hall, in view of the fact that the over-expenditure was occasioned by the amount of orders placed for building materials for this erection. The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer explained that certain transactions were made by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Colonial Government free of commission, but on chargeable items the commission was calculated on the total amount so expended and that it would add greatly to the work of accountancy if this commission was allocated to the various votes as suggested by the Honourable Member. The Hon. W. A. Harding expressed himself satisfied with the explanation given and moved that a hearty vote of thanks be accorded to His Excellency for his Message to the Council introducing the Supplementary Estimates for the past year.

Seconded by the Hon. G. J. Felton and agreed to.

5. Bills.

1. The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved, that a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to appropriate certain further sums of money for the use of the Public Service of the Colony for the year ended on the 31st day of December, 1913," be introduced and read a first time.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

The Standing Orders were suspended accordingly.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved the second reading of the Bill.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a second time.

On the motion of the Hon. the Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, the Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole Council, with His Excellency the President in the Chair, to consider the Bill, clause by clause.

Council in Committee.

Clause 1 agreed to.

Clause 2 agreed to.

The Schedule agreed to.

The Enacting Clause agreed to.

The Title agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved that the Bill be read a third time and passed.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a third time accordingly and passed.

2. The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved, that a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Alien Ordinance, 1900," be introduced and read a first time.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a first time.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved, that so much of the Standing Orders as might be necessary be suspended in order to allow the Bill to pass through all its stages at that Meeting.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

The Standing Orders were suspended accordingly.

The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved the second reading of the Bill.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a second time.

On the motion of the Hon. the Colonial Treasurer, seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding, the Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole Council, with His Excellency the President in the Chair, to consider the Bill, clause by clause.

Council in Committee.

Clause 1. The Hon. W. A. Harding expressed himself of the opinion that cases of lunacy should be excluded from the operation of the Ordinance. The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer read to the Meeting Clause 4 of the Lunacy Ordinance, No. 2 of 1895,

which provided for the payment by the Government of any expenses incurred in this direction. The Hon. W. A. Harding desired that legal opinion might be obtained as to whether the Clause under discussion would supersede Clause 4 of the Lunacy Ordinance, and thus have the effect of throwing the liability for the cost of the removal of a lunatic from the Colony upon the employer. He did not know whether it was the intention of the Government to transfer this responsibility, but was of opinion that expenses in cases of lunacy should be met from public funds. His Excellency the President stated that he was strongly of opinion that the cost should fall upon the employer who had brought the case to the Colony. The Hon. W. A. Harding remarked that lunacy was a matter against which no precaution could be taken. The Falkland Islands Company had imported many men into the Colony and had always had them medically examined, but it was impossible for a doctor to certify that any particular person would not become a lunatic and lunacy was therefore a matter which employers could not foresee. His opinion was that such cases should not be included in the operation of the Ordinance, or that the liability of the employer for expenses should be limited to, say, £20 or £25. The cost of sending a lunatic to England would not be less than £100, which sum, he considered, was too large to make anyone liable for in a case not to be guarded against by foresight. The Hon. G. J. Felton stated that, in view of the fact that employees were constantly changing masters, he considered a period of twelve months too long a time for which to make the original employer, or importer, liable. His Excellency the President expressed his willingness that the Committee should adjourn until such time as the legal opinion desired by the Hon. W. A. Harding could be obtained.

Committee adjourned accordingly. Council resumed.

(3). The Hon. the Colonial Treasurer moved, that a Bill entitled "An Ordinance Relating to Prospecting for and Mining Metals and Other Minerals," be introduced and read a first time.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a first time accordingly.

(4). The Hon. the Colonial Surgeon moved, that a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the Registration of Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists," be introduced and read a first time.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a first time accordingly.

(5). The Hon. the Colonial Surgeon moved, that a Bill entitled "An Ordinance to Regulate the Sale and Use of Poisons," be introduced and read a first time.

Seconded by the Hon. W. A. Harding and agreed to.

Bill read a first time accordingly.

Council adjourned *sine die* at 3.40 p.m.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES, 1913.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 23rd March, 1914.

MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you herewith the Supplementary Estimates for the year 1913.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for the year was £32,284 12s. 4d. which is the largest in the history of the Colony, being £8,635 12s. 4d. in excess of the original estimate, and £3,940 12s. 4d. in excess of the revised estimate. The receipts exceeded the estimate under every head.

The increase in the receipts from Customs is due principally to the growth of the population and to the increase in shipping owing to the whaling industry in the Colony and Dependencies. Of the amount of £13,050 4s. 5d. received under this head £5,989 2s. 4d. was received from the Falklands, £4,109 14s. 4d. from South Georgia and £2,951 7s. 9d. from the other Dependencies. The increased revenue under this head was £9,469 11s. 10d. in excess of the revenue derived in 1912.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure for 1913 amounted to £20,648 2s. 10d. or £11,636 9s. 6d. less than the Ordinary Revenue. The Extraordinary Expenditure was £4,591 17s. 10d. (Public Works Extraordinary £3,965 7s. 5d. and Stock Fund £626 10s. 5d.) as against an Extraordinary Revenue of £10,644 18s. 3d. including the amount loaned from Land Sales Fund. The Annual Account which has been laid on the table shews the estimated and actual Revenue and Expenditure under the various heads.

4. The Council has already approved of the items of over-expenditure referred to in the Governor's Minutes Nos. 1 and 2 of 1913 and my Minute No. 3 of 1913, and I have now to invite the Members to pass the 1913 Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance 1914 and thereby give their sanction to the several sums, amounting in the aggregate to £3,339 16s. 0d. payable for the year 1913.

5. Before submitting any explanation with regard to the items of over-expenditure I desire to draw the attention of the Council to the unprecedented prosperity of the Colony. At the same time it is well to bear in mind that this prosperity is derived from two sources only, the whaling and sheep-farming industries. The former industry is likely to last for only a limited number of years, and I have strong reason to believe that it is only the very high price of wool at the present time that accounts for the prosperity of the latter, and that on some at least of the sheep runs in the Colony the pasture is deteriorating.

Item 11, Type, etc., £8 : 4 : 2; additional type for the Printing Office was required.
8. Division IV.—**Treasury & Customs, £202 : 16 : 2.**—Item 5, House Allowance, 14s. 8d; excess through absence of Senior Officer, who still draws an allowance, from Stanley on special duty in the South Shetlands. Item 6, Officers, South Georgia, £6 : 5 : 0; caused through change in holders of appointment owing to retirement of former Officer. Item 7, Temporary Officers, £61 : 19 : 3; employed in the Colony and Dependencies. Item 8, Refund of Fees, £126 : 18 : 0; the total amount of £226 : 18 : 0 voted was recovered from Shipping. Item 10, Uniforms, etc., £2 : 4 : 11 and Item 11, Stationery, £4 : 13 : 11; both underestimated.
9. Division VI.—**Port and Marine, £45 : 1 : 0.**—Item 4, Overtime, £8 : 3 : 4; caused through services of "Penguin" being required before or after working hours. Item 14, Lunacy, £77 : 11 : 4; for support of Colonial patients in English asylums. Item 17, African Committee, £10 : 16 : 9; Colony's share of expenditure to be borne by all Colonies.
13. Division X.—**Education £15 : 2 : 0.**—Item 3, Schoolmistress, £6 : 14 : 5; Mrs. A. M. Souter's salary has been increased. Item, 10, Stationery £6 : 18 : 7; underestimated. Item 11, Itinerant Schoolmasters' Expenses £1 : 9 : 0; cost of horse-gear required.
14. Division XI.—**Ecclesiastical £50 : 0 : 0.**—Item 2, Allowance for Clergymen, £50; not drawn in 1912.
15. Division XII.—**Transport £335 : 0 : 3.**—Item 1, Passages of Government Employees, etc., £335 : 0 : 3; occasioned through number of Officers whose passages had to be paid to and from Europe, etc.
16. Division XIII.—**Miscellaneous, £275 : 11 : 1.**—Item 5, Crown Agents Expenses, £44 : 3 : 4; owing to amount of building material for Town Hall. Item 9, Capitation Grant, Volunteers, £15. Item 10, Ammunition, £16 : 10 : 9. Item 16, Contingencies, £33 : 10 : 4; each of these last three Items were underestimated. Item 17, Interest on Loans, £166 : 6 : 8; caused through loans required owing to deficit of revenue in 1912.
17. Division XIV.—**Post Office £33 : 6 : 7.**—Item 3, Deputy Postmaster, New Island £1 : 6 : 2, and Item 4, Clerk, £5 : 5 : 11; through change in holders of offices. Item 5, Lady Assistant £5; and Item 8, Stamps, etc., £5 : 11 : 1; were underestimated. Item 13, Telephones, £16 : 3 : 3; owing to additional subscribers to telephone service.

18. Division XV.—**Colonial Engineer £14:16:3.**—Item 21, Forage, £9:12:9; caused through increased price in horse fodder. Item 23, Lathe for shop, £4:10:0; a lathe was required. Item, Launch, 13s. 6d.; oil used during 1912.

19. Division XVI.—**Savings Bank £76:5:0.**—Item 1, Audit, £4; Auditor's fees for the years 1912 and 1913 were paid in 1913. Item 2, Interest, £72:5:0; owing to the closing of some large accounts.

20. Division XVIII.—**Refunds £209:12:10.**—This was occasioned by the adjustments of the payments for wireless telegrams, originally paid by postage stamps, and also a refund of a whaling license of £100.

21. Division XIX.—**Public Works Recurrent, £661:4:10.** Item 1, Roads, £138:13:4; this expenditure was caused by the very necessary construction of roads to the peat banks. Item 2, Repairs, £476:16:2; the excess was principally owing to the condition of the Police Cottages, which warranted immediate attention. A further large sum will be required to place several of the Government buildings in Stanley in a habitable condition and to replace those past repair, but it is not possible to consider any large measure of repairs or renewals of buildings at present as all available mechanics are required for the Town Hall. Item 5, Wireless Installation, £45:15:4; the upkeep of the station was underestimated and an apprentice has been engaged to enable the Station to be kept open for longer hours, and hence be in more constant touch with stations and vessels, especially those in the South Shetlands when atmospheric conditions render it possible to effect communication with the whaling factories there.

22. Division XX.—**Public Works Extraordinary, £2662:6:3.**—Item 4, Town Hall, £2,090:4:0; the excess under this vote has been caused through the original estimate of £6,500 being so much exceeded. The expenditure for the year has been £3,140:4:0, and the total expenditure to 31st December, 1913, £8,788:8:3. Item 7, Magistrates House, South Georgia, £391; being the amount expended to complete building, the total cost of which was £796:12:3. Item 8, Naval pump, etc., £20; pump etc., purchased from Admiralty. Item 9, Dentist's Surgery, £161:9:0; a surgery was required to enable the Colonial Dentist to carry out his duties in a satisfactory manner.

23. Division XXI.—**Live Stock Ordinance £91:2:9.**—Item 1, Chief Inspector of Stock £1:4:8; underestimated. Item 6, Repairs, £20:16:2; a new dipping tank at the Quarantine Station was required. Item 10, Geese beaks, £69:1:11; vouchers not received in Stanley until 1913.

POPULATION.

The estimated population for the East Falklands for 1913 was 1643, an increase of 35 over 1912 when the population was 1608.

BIRTHS.

The Birth Rate for the year was 38, or 23·10 per 1,000, against 50 or 31·09 per 1,000, showing a decrease of 12 or 7·99 per 1000.

I understand that in the camp the birth rate is rapidly decreasing. This is due to the employment of single men only on the different stations, and the migration to Stanley of the married people for the purpose of educating their children.

DEATHS.

The Death Rate for the year was 12 or 7·30 per 1,000, a very satisfactory decrease over 1912, when the Death Rate was 22 or 13·68 per 1,000.

Of the twelve deaths recorded for 1913, two were accidental and two still births, which reduces the mortality from disease to 8, or 4·80 per 1,000.

The eight deaths are accounted for as follows:—

Three from Tuberculosis.

One from Chronic Suppuration Otitis Media in an infant.

Two deaths in elderly men from Carcinoma. In one case the liver and rectum were affected; in the other the cacum and colon were the seat of the disease.

One death from Septicaemia and Pelvic Cellulitis, and lastly one infantile death from General Debility.

NOSOLOGICAL RETURNS.

I have been struck during my sojourn in the Falklands with the readiness in which Falkland Islanders call upon medical help for even minor complaints.

It is a conclusive proof of the good financial status of the people. From the 7th February 1913, to the 31st December 1913, 1891 visits were paid, and 1931 prescriptions prescribed.

There was a very severe epidemic of Influenza in Stanley in the month of June. Intense frontal headache with backache and a high temperature characterised this epidemic. In the spring months there was also an epidemic of Acute Tonsilitis among the children.

There were no deaths from either of these epidemics.

Chronic Gastritis is very prevalent among the native born Falkland Islander, due in most cases to Oral Sepsis and the monotonous diet of mutton, bread and tea. I have been astonished when witnessing the different meals in the cook-house at the rapidity with which the men consume their food. This rapid eating alone will account for a considerable number of the cases of Gastritis.

Tonsils and Adenoids are very prevalent among the children, but not to the same extent as is found in children in the same station of life at home. The physique of the children is decidedly below the average, this however I think can be explained by the inbreeding which must take place in a small isolated community, and by the lack of outdoor games and sports indulged in by the Falkland Island children.

QUARANTINE AND SANITATION.

Fifty vessels were given free pratique during the year. The Colony was fortunate in not being visited during the year by any serious outbreak of quarantinable disease. There were a few isolated cases of Scarletina at North Arm during the Autumn months, which however were not followed by any general outbreak of this disease.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

Nine meetings were held during the year, and several useful Bye-Laws were discussed by the Board and passed by the Governor-in-Council.

The sanitary condition of Stanley leaves at present much to be desired. The open drainage system which is at present in vogue is not only very unsatisfactory from want of efficiency, but is also very unhealthy. In my opinion the periodic epidemics of sore throat which attack the settlement are due to the present drainage system. I feel sure that if it were not for the strong winds which prevail practically all the year round some virulent epidemic would result.

THE VICTORIA COTTAGE HOME.

This small Institution, although by no means all that can be desired as a Hospital, has been exceedingly useful during the year.

Twenty-three patients were admitted and received treatment.

WATER SUPPLY.

Water supply is in Stanley an uncertain factor, both in quantity and quality. This question will continue to be unsatisfactory until the present unreliable and unhealthy system of storing, for domestic use, rain water collected from the roofs in tanks is abolished, and a pipe borne water system introduced. Samples taken from a spring situated about two miles to the west of Stanley were sent home during the year, for examination at the Imperial Institute. The satisfactory result of the analysis was published in the Gazette of 1st January, 1914.

DEPARTMENTAL NOTES.

The Colonial Surgeon arrived in the Colony on the 6th February, 1913, and immediately took over the duties of his office.

On the 16th April the Assistant Colonial Surgeon left Stanley and the nursing staff resigned and left by the same mail.

From the mail of the 16th April until the arrival of Miss M. E. Brookfield as District Nurse on 20th August, I was without nursing or medical help.

Miss L. Blaber arrived by the mail of 10th September and took up her duties as Nurse-Matron, Victoria Cottage Home.

I wish to draw attention here to "The School Dental Clinic" and to the inestimable benefit it will be to the community, not only now, but in the future. In taking care of the teeth of the child we aid and assist nature in building up a sturdy stock. Every child's mouth should be examined and treated at the beginning of school life and subsequently at least once a year or oftener. At present there are 36 children undergoing treatment, and 142 children have been examined.

In the Report for 1912 it was calculated that the Decennial Increase Rate of the population for the previous intercensal period was 6·41 per cent. This was arrived at by deducting from the Census returns the number of the "tidal population," *i.e.* those persons not domiciled in the Colony who arrive and depart with the whaling season, and whose numbers were included in the Census. Utilising this co-efficient, it is calculated that the population of West Falkland is 668.

BIRTHS.

During the year, there were 8 births as compared with 9 for 1912 and 10 for 1911, the Relative Birth Rates being 11·97 (1913), 13·55 (1912), and 15·05, (1911). These figures shew a progressive decrease of a Birth Rate which is always disproportionately low on account of the large proportion of unmarried males employed on the various stations. I attribute it to the fact that there certainly is a growing tendency for stations to employ single men rather than married ones. Four houses at least which were occupied within the last two years by families of the child-bearing age are now occupied by single men. One firm with about 26,000 sheep now employs no married men at all. This is against the best social and industrial interests of the Colony, which is so situated that no working man can become his own master, except in the rarest instances, unless he emigrates.

DEATHS.

During the year there were 7 deaths as compared with 5 for 1912, and 1 in 1911 giving Death Rates of 10·48 (1913), 7·5 (1912), and 1·5 (1911) respectively. This increase in the Death Rate is explained by two deaths by accident in connection with the whaling industry, two deaths of old people in the ninth decennium, and three infantile deaths at or shortly after childbirth.

Of the infantile deaths, two occurred in camp houses whilst the mothers were confined alone and without help or attention. The third was a case of induction of labour for puerperal eclampsia, with interlocking of twins and instrumental delivery, one of the twins dying within two days of birth.

By contributing two deaths, the whaling industry is responsible for a death rate of 2·99 per 1,000.

The Infantile Death Rate is equivalent to 4·64 per 1,000 of the population.

Since the last report was issued a number of persons from the West Falkland have emigrated to Australia and other Colonies, the majority of whom were native born Falkland Islanders. Signs are not wanting that such emigration is likely to increase.

The question of inter-marriage has a direct bearing on the Vital Statistics, and a further reference is made to the subject in Section 2.

II. REMARKS UPON THE NOSOLOGICAL RETURNS.

Hitherto the outstanding features of the Nosological Returns have been:—

- i. Entire absence of all forms of Tuberculosis.
- ii. Entire absence of Malignant Disease.
- iii. Entire absence of Rheumatic Fever and its sequelae.
- iv. Freedom from Infectious Disease.
- v. Prevalence of Disorders of the Digestive Apparatus.

Although the same satisfactory conditions still obtain, as regards Tuberculosis, etc., two cases of Malignant Disease have been chronicled during the year. The Alimentary Tract site was concerned in each instance, and both growths were Epithelial in origin. In the first case the growth originated in the gum around a diseased tooth; whilst in the second the growth involved the Caecum, and the ascending and transverse Colon. One patient was a native of the Falklands and the other came from England (Surrey), the former being in the fifth decade and the latter in the ninth. No conclusions with respect to the relative liability or immunity of native Falkland Islanders and those of British Falkland Islander I have seen affected with the Disease as against three (2 English and 1 Norwegian) Europeans.

Concerning Disorders of The Digestive System, of which the mouth constitutes a part, there is a marked decrease. Only five cases of Chronic Dyspepsia have been under treatment during the year.

There have only been two cases of Asthma under treatment, but the condition still continues to be fairly prevalent. Most of the sufferers have become so accustomed to the disease that they rarely seek advice, but use one or other of the patent asthma cures made from powdered Stramonium and Lobelia with a little saltpetre in varying proportions. Quite a number of young children suffer from asthma, and it is important that their parents should bring them early for treatment. Its prevalence is a very disquieting sign, for Asthma is a Neurosis, and the Colony has only a small community. The relation between Asthma, Epilepsy and Diabetes is well known, and these three conditions occur more frequently in the children of neurotic parents than in the children of the neurologically robust. In all small communities marriages between persons of varying degrees of cousinship are unavoidable and inbreeding takes place progressively. Given time, the persons of such a community are bound to undergo both physical and mental degeneration. The Colony is only a comparatively young one, the native-born fathers and mothers representing perhaps not more than the third or fourth generation of colonists, if that. There are innumerable examples of marriages between first cousins, and in one of the instances known to me both the contracting parties come of neurotic stock and are themselves highly neurotic. All the possibilities of the mentally degenerate lie before the descendants of such persons. I am of opinion that sooner or later the question of intermarriage will have to receive serious consideration and that first cousins should be placed within the proscribed degrees of consanguinity.

III. GENERAL SANITARY CONDITION OF THE DISTRICT.

The sanitary organization of the district leaves much to be desired. The Medical Officer of Health is and always must be the expert in Sanitary matters, and, as such, act as adviser to the Board of Health. Publicity and Public Opinion are the two great factors which determine disinterested action on the part of the members of public bodies. When there is no publicity, and therefore no chance for the public to form its own opinion on matters in which its welfare is concerned, there is no deterrent to persons entrusted with the discharge of public duties from acting in a self interested manner; particularly when such a body is limited to two or three members, and is non-elective. That personal considerations should be allowed to interfere with the discharge of duty is intolerable.

DWELLINGS.

As in previous years, most inhabited houses are in good order, and are maintained in repair. Certain dwellings, however, are dilapidated, so much so that in winter time they are not fit for occupation. Cookhouses remain in the same unsatisfactory condition on the whole, and no improvement may be looked for until such time as it may be necessary to rebuild the faulty ones. During the past year even more persons than usual have complained of catching cold. It is pointed out that with adequate ventilation in living and bedrooms there is far less susceptibility to this annoying malady, to which nothing predisposes so much as the overheated and vitiated air of a badly ventilated room. It is possible to effect efficient ventilation without the production of a draught.

WATER.

In a country where domestic water has to be procured from an adjacent well, spring or stream, or collected from roofs and stored, it is always necessary to keep close observation on the source of supply. Whether in consequence of the water analyses made last year and the reports and recommendations furnished thereon or not, no cases of illness attributable to water supply have come under notice during the year. Some of the galvanized tanks used for storing rain water have lost, to a greater or less extent, their protecting coating of zinc because the contained water has been acid in reaction. Water obtained from such a tank deposits a reddish sediment of iron oxide, and destructively attacks the interior of kettles etc., in which it is boiled. Once the protective coating of zinc has been eaten through, helped no doubt by electrical currents generated by the acid water and the two dissimilar metals, the iron is attacked with comparative rapidity. Iron dissolved

in water may be beneficial, but zinc, especially in any quantity, is harmful. I have found as much as '04 grs. per gallon of zinc in water from a galvanized tank. It is easy to protect the outside of a tank by painting, but paint must not be used on the inside. For all tanks, old or new, no matter of what material, I recommend that they be painted over on the inside with cement. Pure cement is mixed with water until it is of the same consistency as paint, and then applied with a new paint-brush over the interior of the tank. When it is dry, a second coat should be put on and allowed to dry for a day or two. It may then be well rinsed out with two or three changes of water, when it is ready for use. Tanks treated in this way will last longer than when the bare metal is left in contact with the water. The cement may be renewed from time to time if necessary. There is much less risk of tank water becoming contaminated by sediment if the service tap be fitted internally with a pipe running half way across the tank, the end of which is turned up at right angles, for six or eight inches. All tanks should be cleaned regularly and frequently. The analyses made last year show that tank water is more frequently contaminated than well or spring water. Water for drinking purposes should never be collected from roofs much frequented by sea-birds, or near try-works. In such situations contamination is almost certain to occur.

FOOD.

Food is plentiful and of good quality, and its lack of variety is probably not noticed by the public. It has the great advantage of (for the most part) not passing through the hands of the "food-faker." It is a pity that means are not adopted for preserving some of the very excellent fish which abound round the coast, not only for personal consumption, but also as a commercial commodity.

With a scattered population occupying isolated dwellings, sanitary arrangements depend upon individual commonsense rather than upon prescribed method. Any transgression of the elementary laws of sanitation leads to an offence which constitutes its own punishment, and it is rare. High winds and wild birds, perhaps the two best scavengers in the world, are most valuable allies. With certain exceptions the sanitary condition of the district may be regarded as good.

MARINE SANITATION.

No reports upon the sanitary condition of the district would be complete without some remarks upon marine sanitation. Attention was drawn in the report for 1912 to the increasing tonnage entering at New Island, and to the risk of infectious diseases gaining entrance there. The whaling factories carry large crews, and upon arrival there are nearly always a large number of men upon the sick list. Many of these ships call at Monte Video which is only three to five days distant, and it is worth bearing in mind that the incubation period of various diseases varies from twenty-four hours to three weeks.

It would be possible for a man to contract Enteric Fever at Monte Video, and to sow the organisms broadcast at New and Weddell Islands. With our hap-hazard system of water supply, (safe enough, doubtless, for the ordinary requirements of the district) one case of Enteric might be the means of overwhelming the whole colony with such an epidemic as would be beyond our medical resources.

VACCINATION.

During 1913, eight vaccinations have been performed. The remarks made in the report for 1912 as to the degree of immunity prevailing among the population of West Falkland still hold good. Re-vaccination is never sought by adults. All persons coming to the West Falkland from Great Britain, have, as far as can be ascertained, been vaccinated, and at least two of them re-vaccinated. The occurrence of small-pox from time to time on board mail steamers coming to the Falklands shews how near the brink of an infectious volcano we stand. There is a distinct doubt as to the extent to which the adult population is protected by vaccination, and they are the ones who would be first brought in contact with infection should it occur.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance

To provide for the appointment of a Marine Board and to define its Powers and Functions.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows : Enacting Clause.

I. In the construction and for all the purposes of this Ordinance, and in all instruments purporting to be issued thereunder, the terms : Interpretation.

“Board” shall mean the Falkland Islands Marine Board ;

“Inter-insular vessel” shall mean any vessel engaged in trade or passenger traffic between any two ports or places in the Colony ;

“Sea going service” shall mean service beyond the protection of land or reefs ;

“Short coasting service” shall mean service generally within protection of land or reefs or as may be specially endorsed on the certificate or license ;

“Harbour service” shall mean service strictly within a harbour or waters entirely protected and smooth ;

“Ton” shall mean ton registered, or in unregistered vessels licensed ton ;

“Passenger” shall mean any person carried in any vessel other than the master and crew ;

Appointment of Marine Board.

2. The Governor in Council may appoint any number of persons not exceeding four, exclusive of the Colonial Secretary who shall be President, of the Board, to be called "The Falkland Islands Marine Board", and three members of such Board shall be a quorum with equal powers as a full Board to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance, and the Governor in Council may remove any member of such Board and appoint others in their place and may fix the amount of remuneration to be paid to the members of such Board and may appoint such clerks and servants as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance. In the absence of the President at any Meeting of the Board the members present shall elect a Chairman.

Seal of Marine Board.

3. The Board shall have and make use of a corporate seal bearing such device as the Governor in Council shall approve.

Jurisdiction of Board.

4. The powers, authorities, and jurisdiction, of the Board shall extend and may be exercised by them in and over any tidal waters of the Colony from high-water mark.

Power of Board to settle and issue forms.

5. The Board may settle and issue all forms which are required by this Ordinance.

Board may appoint Inspectors or Surveyors.

6. The Board may appoint any person to act as an inspector or surveyor to report to them upon any of the following matters, that is to say, upon the nature and causes of any accident or damage which any vessel has sustained or caused, and generally upon any matter in relation to which jurisdiction, authority, or power, is by this Ordinance conferred upon the Board.

Powers of Inspectors and Surveyors.

7. Every such inspector or surveyor as aforesaid shall have the following powers in addition to any other powers conferred by this Ordinance ;—

- (a). He may at all reasonable hours go on board any vessel for the purpose of examining the hull, machinery, boats, equipments, or any materials belonging to or on board of such vessel to which the provisions of this Ordinance extend, in order to ascertain whether the provisions of this Ordinance or of any regulations made thereunder have (or has) been complied with, also for enquiring into or ascertaining the nature or causes of any accident or damage which such vessel has sustained or caused, or is alleged to have sustained or caused, or for making any report required by the Board ;
- (b). He may enter upon and inspect any premises the entering upon or inspection of which appears to him to be requisite for the purpose of the report which he is directed to make ; and
- (c). He may require the attendance of all such persons as he may consider necessary to call before him for a like purpose and may require answers to any questions he may think necessary to put, and may require the production of any books, papers, logs, or other documents that he may consider necessary.

Board may summon witnesses, etc.

8. The Board may, by summons under the hand of the President or Chairman of the Board, require the attendance of all such persons as they think fit upon any enquiry instituted by the Board, and may examine such persons and enforce the production of all books, papers, logs, accounts, or other documents relating

to any such enquiry, and may administer oaths or require statutory declarations as to the truth of any statement made on examination.

9. Every person summoned as a witness may be allowed such reasonable expenses as may be fixed by the Board. Expenses allowed to witnesses.

10. If any person without reasonable excuse (proof whereof shall lie on him) does any of the following things, namely:— Penalties on witnesses. etc.

(a). Having been summoned fails to attend as a witness before the Board, or any inspector or surveyor, or to make any answer, or to produce any document, or to make or sign any declaration, or to refuse to allow any copies to be taken of any document: or

(b). Prevents or impedes any inspector or surveyor in the execution of his duty on board ship or elsewhere, or knowingly misleads or deceives the Board or any inspector or surveyor;

he shall for every such offence be liable, on conviction in a summary manner, to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or in default to imprisonment for any term not exceeding one month.

11. Examinations shall be instituted for persons who wish to procure certificates of competency for either of the following grades, namely:— Examinations to be instituted for masters and mates.

Master of an interinsular vessel.

Mate of an interinsular vessel.

And the Board may with the approval of the Governor appoint examiners to conduct such examinations and any members of the Board may be present and assist at any such examination.

12. The Board may from time to time lay down rules as to the qualifications of applicants. Qualifications of applicants for certificates.

13. Subject to the proviso in this section contained the Board shall deliver to every applicant who has passed the examination satisfactorily and has given satisfactory evidence of his sobriety, ability, and general good conduct, a certificate of competency to the effect that he is competent to act in the capacity therein described. Provided that in every case in which the said Board has reason to believe that there has been any irregularity a further enquiry into his testimonials and character may be made before granting him a certificate. Certificates of competency to be granted to those who pass.

14. Certificates of service differing in form from certificates of competency shall be granted as follows (that is to say)— Certificates of service.

(a). Every person who before the first day of January one thousand nine hundred and fourteen has served more than a year as master of an interinsular vessel shall be entitled to a certificate of service as such for interinsular vessels;

(b). Every person who before the first day of January one thousand nine hundred and fourteen has served more than one year as mate of an interinsular vessel shall be entitled to a certificate of service as such for interinsular vessels.

Each of these certificates of service shall contain particulars of the name, place of birth, age, and of the length and nature of the previous service of the person to whom the certificate is delivered and the Board shall deliver such certificates of service to the persons entitled respectively thereto upon their proving

themselves to have attained such rank, or to have served as aforesaid, and upon their giving a full and satisfactory account of the particulars aforesaid.

Examination of applicants for certificates.

15. All applicants for certificate of service or competency or for any license under this Ordinance shall pass an examination for form vision, colour blindness, and in the rule of the road at sea.

Vessels to be provided with certificated Officers.

16. Every steam or sailing vessel of five tons and upwards navigating from any port or place in the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies excepting as provided in section 33 hereof must be provided with officers holding valid certificates of competency or service, or a license as the case may be, under this Ordinance or holding similar or equivalent unexpired certificates from the Board of Trade or other competent authority according to the scale required by the laws of the country in which she is registered or else according to the following scale:—

- (a) Of five to fifty tons with a master holding an appropriate interinsular certificate or a license in form of Schedule D hereto ;
- (b) Of fifty to one hundred tons and upwards with a master and a mate both holding an appropriate interinsular certificate.

Penalty for engaging to serve without proper certificate.

17. Every person who having been engaged to serve in any capacity for which a certificate or a license is required under this Ordinance goes to sea or serves in any vessel without being at the time possessed of the necessary certificate or license and every person who employs any such person in any such capacity in such vessel who at the time is not possessed of such certificate or license and every person who shall navigate or cause to be navigated any such vessel without the proper complement of officers required by section 16 shall for each such offence be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds or in default of payment to imprisonment for any term not exceeding three months.

Fees to be paid by applicants for examination, etc.

18. All applicants for certificates of service and for examination for certificates of competency shall pay the fees specified in Schedule A to the Board for the use of the Colonial Treasury.

Board of Trade and other certificates to be of equal validity with Falkland certificates

19. Every certificate of competency issued by the Board of Trade or any other competent British authority shall be deemed to be equivalent to and shall confer the same rights and privileges as a certificate of a like kind and grade issued under this Ordinance.

President to sign all certificates in duplicate.

20. All certificates and licenses shall be signed by the President of the Board and shall be made in duplicate and be paid for in accordance with the Schedule of Fees as above mentioned and one copy of such certificate or license shall be delivered to the person entitled to the certificate or license and the other shall be kept and recorded by the Board. And all cancellations, suspensions, alterations or other proceedings in any way affecting any certificate or license made or taken by such Board in pursuance of the powers herein contained shall be entered in the record of certificates and licenses and a copy purporting to be certified under the seal of the Board of any certificate or license or of any entry made as aforesaid in respect of any certificate or license shall be prima facie evidence of such certificate or license or of the truth of the matters stated in such entry.

Cancellations etc. to be entered in record of certificates.

Certified copy of certificate to be taken as evidence.

21. On the Board being satisfied of any certificate or license having been lost or destroyed without fault on the part of the holder thereof the Board may direct a certified copy of the recorded certificate or license to be delivered to such person upon payment of a fee of ten shillings and such copy shall be as valid and effectual as the original certificate.

Where certificate has been lost.

22. Every person who makes, or who procures to be made, or assists in making, any false representation for the purpose of obtaining for himself or for any other person a certificate either of competency or of service, or a license, or who forges, assists in forging, or procures to be forged, or fraudulently alters, assists in fraudulently altering, or procures to be fraudulently altered, any such certificate or license, or any official copy of such certificate or license, or who fraudulently makes use of any such certificate or license or any copy of such certificate or license which is forged, altered, cancelled, suspended, or to which he is not justly entitled, or who fraudulently lends his certificate or license to, or allows the same to be used by, any other person shall be guilty of a misdemeanour and on conviction in a summary manner shall be liable to be imprisoned for any period not exceeding six months with or without hard labour or may be indicated for a misdemeanour.

As to false representations, forging etc., of certificates.

23. No vessel the master of which is required by this Ordinance to hold a certificate of competency or service or a license shall be cleared from the Customs-house at any port in the Colony unless the master and officers of the vessel (as the case may be) hold certificates of competency or service or licenses as required by this Ordinance and any officer of Customs or Inspector may detain the vessel until such certificate is produced,

Production of certificate at Customs-house. No vessel to be cleared unless master and officers hold certificate.

24. The Board may grant licenses in the form of Schedule D hereto which shall take the place of and be equally valid as certificates of competency or service for vessels of from five to fifty tons register in the interinsular trade. Any such license at the discretion of the Board may give the holder thereof the right to act as master or mate of a vessel aforesaid whilst engaged in any service within the limits of the Colony or may restrict his right to act as master or mate aforesaid to such a vessel whilst engaged in short coasting service or harbour service or both. Such license to be granted to applicants who shall shew to the satisfaction of the Board that they are competent to take charge of such vessel as they apply for and who shall produce satisfactory testimonials.

Sailing licenses may be granted for inter-insular trade.

25. Every such license shall contain particulars as to name, nationality, age, place of birth, together with the length and nature of all previous services.

Particulars to be entered on license.

26. The Board may cancel or suspend the certificate whether of competency or service of any master or mate in any of the following cases :—

Certificate may be cancelled or suspended.

- (a) If the Board find that the loss or abandonment of or serious damage to any ship or loss of life has been caused by his wrongful act or default.
- (b) If the Board find that he is incompetent or has been guilty of any gross act of misconduct, drunkenness or tyranny or that in a case of collision he has failed to render such assistance or give such information as is required by section four-hundred and twenty-two of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894."

- (c) If in case of a certificate having been granted by the Board he is shown to have been convicted of an indictable offence.

Upon order of cancellation or suspension, certificate to be handed up.

27. Every master or mate whose certificate has been cancelled or suspended by the Board shall on demand to be notified to him in writing deliver up his certificate to the President of the Board. Every master or mate who neglects to comply with any such demand shall on conviction thereof before a stipendiary magistrate be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, and in default of payment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three months.

Governor may direct issue of new certificate.

28. Where any certificate cancelled or suspended by such Board shall be a certificate originally issued by an authority in this Colony the Governor-in-Council may at any time after the cancelling or suspending thereof in the instance of a cancelled certificate direct the Board to issue to the person who held such certificate a new certificate of the same or any lower grade and in the instance of a suspended certificate shorten the time for which such certificate has been suspended or direct the Board to issue to the person who held such certificate a new certificate of a lower grade.

Certificate of short-coasting or harbour service may be cancelled.

29. It shall be lawful for the Board if after due enquiry it be found that the holder of any short-coasting, or harbour service license or sailing license is unfit to have charge of any vessel he may then be in charge of either to cancel, suspend or limit such license to such lesser tonnage as the Board may think fit.

Issue of certificates.

30. The Board may grant to vessels engaged in trade passenger traffic or otherwise certificates in form of Schedule B hereto or as near thereto as circumstances will permit and such certificate shall be liable to be revoked at any time on good cause by the Board. Such certificate shall state whether the vessel to which any certificate is given is to be employed in the inter-insular trade or for harbour or for short-coasting service the name of the master, the number of passengers which the vessel may carry under different circumstances, the period during which the vessel may ply, and the date at which the certificate will expire.

Penalty on ship proceeding to sea without certificate.

31. It shall not be lawful for any vessel of two tons and upwards to proceed upon any voyage or excursion with any passengers or cargo on board unless such vessel has a certificate valid and unexpired and which must be produced at the Customs house before any clearance can be obtained, or on demand by any lawfully appointed officer and any master or owner of such vessel shall for any such offence against the provisions of this section be liable on conviction in a summary manner to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months.

Limit of passengers to be carried.

32. Any master or person in charge of any vessel who shall carry a greater number of passengers than is specified in such vessel's certificate shall be liable on conviction in a summary manner to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds or in default of payment to imprisonment for any term not exceeding one month.

Persons in charge of coasting vessels to hold license.

33. No person shall have the principal charge of any sailing-vessel of five tons or upwards whether employed in harbour or short-coasting service unless he shall have obtained a license in form of Schedule E hereto from the Board or hold a certificate

or license for a higher grade on which license shall be written his name and place of abode and the number of the license and the tonnage of the vessel of which he is authorised to take charge and for such license he shall pay the fee of ten shillings. And if any person shall ply with any such vessel without being so licensed by the Board to take charge of such vessel such person shall be liable on conviction in a summary manner to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds and in default of payment to imprisonment for any period not exceeding two months. And the Board shall keep a duplicate of every such license which shall be evidence in all cases without producing the original license.

Master of unlicensed vessel subject to penalty.

34. The owner of any sailing-vessel requiring a certificate under this Ordinance shall pay on application for every certificate the sum mentioned in Schedule C.

Fees to be paid for certificates.

35. The Board may from time to time make or alter any regulations;—

Board may make and alter regulations as to inter-insular trade.

(a) For the better working of the inter-insular trade as regards building, naming, marking and registering of vessels and the number of passengers allowed to be carried by such vessel;

(b) As to the requirements of sea-going vessels as regards boats, life-buoys, anchors, chains, sails, warps, and other gear, and any vessel may be detained in port, after due warning has been given, until the said Board are satisfied that such vessel is complete in her equipments and has complied with the regulations concerning the marking and registering of such vessel;

As to requirements of vessels.

(c) Concerning the lights to be shown, the signals to be used, and the sailing rules to be observed by vessels navigating the harbours or protected waters of the Colony;

As to lights and signals in protected waters.

(d) Generally for the carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance.

And generally.

And by such regulations the Board may impose a penalty for any breach of any such regulations not exceeding ten pounds and in default of payment imprisonment for any period not exceeding one month. All such regulations passed under the provisions of this Ordinance when approved by the Legislative Council and published in the Gazette shall have the force and effect of law and all such regulations shall be subject to disallowance of His Majesty.

36. Whenever any vessel has been lost or has sustained any damage either in her hull or in any other part, the owner or master of such vessel shall at the earliest opportunity transmit to the Board a report of such accident or damage stating the name of such vessel, the port to which she belongs and the place where she is and if such master shall neglect to do so he shall on conviction in a summary manner forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds or in default suffer imprisonment not exceeding two months.

Master or owner to report loss or damage.

37. Any Inspector appointed by the Board, or in his absence any Justice of the Peace, shall as soon as conveniently may be, examine upon oath any person belonging to any ship which may be or may have been in distress within the limits of this Colony or its Dependencies, or any other person who may be able to give an account of the casualty, or of the cargo or stores thereof, as to the following matters, that is to say.

Witness may be examined when found.

1. The name and description of the ship.
2. The name of the Master and the Owners.
3. The names of the owners of the cargo.
4. The places from and to which the ship was bound.
5. The occasion of the distress or casualty to the ship.
6. The services rendered.
7. All such other matters relating to the ship and her cargo as may be deemed necessary.

Every such examination shall be taken down in writing, and for the purposes of such examination every such inspector or Justice of the Peace as aforesaid shall have the same powers as if such examination was held by the Board.

If vessel reported unseaworthy, survey to be made.

38. When the Board receive a complaint or have reason to believe that any British vessel is by reason of the defective condition of her hull or equipment, or by reason of overloading or improper loading unfit to proceed to sea without danger to human life having regard to the service for which the vessel is intended, any such ship may be provisionally detained by the Board for the purpose of being surveyed, and the Board may appoint some person or persons to survey such vessel and equipment and the cargo thereof, and may either finally detain or release the vessel, as follows :—

- (a) When a ship has been provisionally detained there shall be forthwith served on the Master of the ship a written statement of the grounds of her detention, and the Board may, if they think fit, appoint some competent person or persons to survey the ship and report thereon to the Board.
- (b) The Board on receiving the report may either order the ship to be released or, if in their opinion the ship is unsafe, may order her to be finally detained, either absolutely, or until the performance of such conditions with respect to the execution of repairs or alterations, or the unloading or reloading of cargo, as the Board think necessary for the protection of human life and may from time to time vary or add to any such order, and a copy of such order and of any alteration thereof shall be served as soon as possible on the Owner or Master of the vessel. When any vessel has been detained under this section she shall not be released by reason of her British register being closed.
- (c) Every complaint as to the condition of a ship shall be in writing and shall state the name and address of the complainant and a copy of the complaint shall before or during such survey be given by the Board to the Master or Owners of the ship.
- (d) Before the order for final detention is made a copy of the Surveyors report shall be served upon the Master or the Owner of the ship, and within 30 days after such service the Owner or Master of the ship may appeal to the Board or to the Harbour Master of the port of entry where the ship is detained. Provided always that the Harbour Master of any port of entry other than Port Stanley may exercise the same powers as are conferred on the Board by this Section.

39. The Board shall have authority to direct the costs of the survey to be borne by the owner of the vessel if such vessel is reported unfit to proceed to sea without serious danger to human life and such costs shall be recoverable from the owner of such vessel in the same manner as costs awarded by a stipendiary magistrate under "The Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902."

Cost of such survey.

40. All matters for which provision has not been made in this Ordinance shall be dealt with under those sections of the Imperial Merchant Shipping Acts in force in the Colony in so far as the same are applicable to the particular case.

Imperial Act to apply to penalties not dealt with under this Ordinance.

41. Any person committing any offence against any of the provisions of this Ordinance for which specific penalty is not provided shall be liable upon summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds and in default of payment to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term, not exceeding three months.

Penalty in cases not specially provided for.

42. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Marine Board Ordinance, 1914."

Report on Penguin Guano from the Falkland Islands.

The five samples of penguin guano from the Falkland Islands which are the subject of this report were forwarded to the Crown Agents for the Colonies by the Colonial Secretary at Stanley with letter No. 379/380/13 dated the 30th August, 1913, and were transferred to the Imperial Institute for examination.

It was stated that the samples had been obtained from Cochon and Kidney Islands, and it was desired to ascertain their commercial value and the best method of preparing the guano for export.

DESCRIPTION OF SAMPLES.

The Samples were as follows:—

Nos. 1, 2 and 3 from Cochon Island. Weight about 2 lb each.

These three samples consisted of black, wet, slimy masses, containing much organic matter together with some fibrous material. A few small bones of birds and a small quantity of sand were also present.

Nos. 4 and 5 from Kidney Island. Weight about 1½ lb each.

These two samples were similar to those from Cochon Island, but No. 4 contained, in addition to the constituents mentioned above, about 7 per cent. of fine gravel.

RESULTS OF EXAMINATION.

The samples were submitted to preliminary examination at the Imperial Institute with the following results:—

Commercial Value.

The commercial value of these samples in the United Kingdom, based on the average current values per unit, per cent, for the constituents, nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash, would be approximately as follows (March 1914):—

Remarks.

It is evident that at the prices, quoted above, it would not be remunerative to export guanos of the composition of the present samples to any considerable distance. The results of the analyses show however, that the samples contained an excessive quantity of water, varying from 64 to 80 per cent. and if this could be reduced to say 20 per cent, these materials from Cochon and Kidney Islands would be comparable with certain commercial guanos.

The following table shows the results of re-calculating the amounts of the valuable constituents of these guanos, assuming the amount of moisture present to have been reduced to 20 per cent. Analyses recorded by Fritsch for another sample from the Falkland Islands and for three samples of Peruvian Guano are added for comparison.

It will be seen from these figures that as compared with good Peruvian guano the present samples from the Falkland Islands contained much less nitrogen and potash, and the phosphoric acid is also much lower in the case of samples 3 and 4. Samples 1, 2 and 5 are better as regards nitrogen and phosphoric acid than the guano from the Falkland Islands previously examined (No 6 in table).

It is possible that the present samples are from the top layers of the deposits and may have been exposed to rain; in that case the guano situated at a short distance below the surface will probably prove to be richer in manurial constituents than these samples.

The Peruvian guanos of commerce, being obtained from a very dry region, are not specially dried before export, but if it is desired to prepare material similar to the present samples from the Falkland Islands for export the percentage of water should be reduced, in order to minimise freight charges and to render the guano easier to handle. On exposure to the air for six days it was found that sample No. 5. lost 70 per cent of moisture, thus showing that under suitable conditions simple air-drying would suffice for the purpose.

The "Spanish Swindle."

With reference to Gazette Notice No. 78 of 8th May, 1908, His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, for general information, that a despatch has been received from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies intimating that the perpetrators of the fraud commonly known as the "Spanish Swindle" are still endeavouring to victimise residents in British Colonies.

This fraud, which is practised upon the unwary by a gang of ingenious swindlers established in Madrid and other Spanish towns, is almost invariably carried out on the lines previously published, which are as follows:—

"A Spanish prisoner who is dying in a military prison desires to provide for his only daughter. He possesses a large fortune secreted somewhere, and offers to transfer it to his correspondent if the latter will maintain and educate the child. Certain obligations, however, must first be discharged, and for this purpose about £100 is to be forwarded in bank-notes to a given address where the prison chaplain will receive the sum and escort the girl to England. The fortune will then be handed over. The story is usually supported by forged documents and newspaper cuttings."

3. The total face value of notes received by the Commissioners is £21,750, and and is accounted for as follows:—

4. Notes of the "A" issue are being withdrawn from circulation as fast as possible, but there are still a considerable number for which the Commissioners are liable, viz:—

but it is probable that not all of these will be presented for payment.

5. The Profit and Loss account for the year 1913 shews a net profit of £122 : 6 : 4; as compared with £85 : 19 : 3 in 1912. This amount has been carried to the credit of the general revenue of the Colony. The expenses for management and audit amounted to £9 : 7 : 8.

6. No investments were made on behalf of the Commissioners during the year under review.

7. The Depreciation Fund remains at £388 : 6 : 10, and is in excess of the 10% of the investment portion of the Note Guarantee Fund provided for by Order in Council dated March 7th, 1899.

8. The sum of £3,750 in gold is deposited in the Government Vault, and an equal amount is invested in various stocks, these together covering the face value of Notes in circulation.

9. The total amount invested by the Commissioners, consisting of the above-mentioned £3,750 and the Depreciation Fund Balance, £388 : 6 : 10, amounts to £4,138 : 6 : 10. But the value of the Stocks so held, like that of all other Trustee Stock, has of recent years fallen so much that at the end of 1913 the market value of the Securities held by the Commissioners was estimated to be not more than £3,650, or £100 less than the £3,750 for which they are responsible. It appears, therefore, desirable that the Commissioners should deal with this question with a view to bringing up their investments to at least the £3,750 required by the Order in Council.

10. I have this day examined a statement of Assets and Liabilities, and finding the same correct have signed my name to it. This statement will, I understand, be forwarded to you by the Colonial Treasurer.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance to Incorporate the Stanley Cemetery Burial Board as a Body Corporate.

Whereas Orissa Catherine Anne Dean of Stanley is desirous of making provision for the maintenance of the post of Caretaker of the Stanley Cemetery, and of the Caretaker's Cottage erected at her expense, in order to enable special attention to be given to the graves of her late husband George Markham Dean and certain other deceased persons, and whereas Orissa Catherine Anne Dean is prepared to contribute the sum of one thousand pounds towards the above purposes when the Burial Board created under the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance shall have been incorporated as a Body Corporate, and whereas William Alfred Harding, has collected certain sums of money exceeding in the aggregate four hundred pounds for the purpose of establishing a Stanley Cemetery Endowment Fund for the maintenance of the Stanley Cemetery, and is desirous of handing over these sums and such other sums as he may collect to the Burial Board of the Stanley Cemetery when they are incorporated as a Body Corporate:—

Preamble.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

1. The Burial Board of the Stanley Cemetery are hereby declared and adjudged to be one body politic and corporate by the name of "The Trustees of the Stanley Cemetery" and by that name shall and may have perpetual succession, and shall and may sue and be sued in all Courts and before all Magistrates, Justices and others in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever, and shall and may have a common seal, and the same may vary and alter at their pleasure, and by the name aforesaid shall be in law capable of holding all such estate real or personal as hath already been acquired by them, or of taking for ever hereafter other estate real or personal either by purchase, gift, devise or legacy, for the use of the said Stanley Cemetery.

Stanley Cemetery Burial Board Incorporated a Body Corporate.

2. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Stanley Cemetery Incorporation Ordinance, 1914,"



An Ordinance

To provide for the Registration of Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the Registration of Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists. Preamble.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

1. In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires. Interpretation.

“MEDICAL PRACTITIONER” means any person professing to practice medicine or surgery or holding himself out as ready and willing to treat patients for gain.

2. Separate registers of Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists shall be kept in the form of the Schedule hereto, and a fee of one pound shall be charged for each registration under Section 4 hereof. Register to be kept.
Provided that Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists qualified to be registered under this Ordinance and in actual practice of their profession in the Colony or Dependencies, shall be entitled to registration free of charge within three months after the coming into operation of this Ordinance. Proviso.

3. The Colonial Surgeon shall be the Registrar of Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists, and shall once in every year, as soon as conveniently may be after the first day of January, make and publish in the Gazette a list containing the names and qualifications of all registered Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists. Colonial Surgeon to be Registrar.

Publication *prima facie*
evidence of
Registration.

4. (1) The publication of such lists shall be *prima facie* evidence that the persons named therein are registered under this Ordinance, and the absence of the name of any person from such list shall be *prima facie* evidence that such person is not registered.

(2) All register books and all copies thereof or extracts therefrom certified under the hand of the Registrar shall be receivable in evidence in all courts of justice in the Colony.

(3) The Registrar shall produce or cause to be produced any register book in his office on subpoena or order of any court without payment for so doing, unless the court or tribunal shall otherwise direct.

Persons entitled to be
registered Medical
Practitioners.

5. (1) The following persons shall be entitled to registration under this Ordinance as Medical Practitioners:—

(a) The holder of any licence, degree, or diploma which would entitle him to registration as a medical practitioner by the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom;

(b) The holder of any licence, degree, or diploma in medicine or surgery which by order of the Governor-in-Council shall be declared a qualification for registration as a Medical Practitioner under this Ordinance.

Persons entitled to be
registered as Midwives.

(2) The following persons shall be entitled to registration under this Ordinance as Midwives.

Any person who holds a diploma or certificate in midwifery granted by a recognised institution or who in the opinion of the Colonial Surgeon possesses the requisite skill, knowledge, and experience may be registered as a midwife.

Persons entitled to be
registered as Dentists.

(3) The following persons shall be entitled to registration under this Ordinance as Dentists:—

(a) Possesses a licence or degree in dental surgery or dentistry of any of the Bodies and Universities who elect members of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom: or

(b) Is at the passing of this Ordinance *bona fide* engaged in the practice of dentistry or dental surgery either separately or in conjunction with the practice of medicine, surgery or pharmacy.

(4) Provided that no person shall be entitled to Registration whose name has been struck off the Register of the General Council of Medical Education and Registration in the United Kingdom.

Persons registered may
have additional
qualification inserted in
register free of charge.

6. Every person registered under this Ordinance who may have obtained any higher degree or qualification, other than the qualification in respect of which he may have been registered, shall be entitled to have such higher degree or additional qualification inserted in the register in substitution for, or in addition to, the qualifications previously registered, without payment of any further fee.

If registered entitled
to practice and sue for
fees.

7. Every medical practitioner registered under this Ordinance shall be entitled to practice medicine, surgery, and midwifery, and every dentist registered under this Ordinance shall be entitled to practice dentistry, and every person registered under this Ordinance as a midwife shall be entitled to practice midwifery and every medical practitioner, dentist, and midwife so registered shall be

entitled to demand, sue for, and recover in any court of law, with full cost of suit, reasonable charges for professional aid, advice, and visits, and the value of any medicine or any medical or surgical appliances rendered or supplied by him to his patients.

8. No person shall be entitled to recover any charge in any court of law for any medical or surgical advice, or attendance or for the performance of any operation as a medical practitioner, or dentist, or for any medicine which he shall have prescribed and supplied or for any services performed as a midwife within the Colony after the coming into force of this Ordinance, unless he was at the time registered under this Ordinance; but all registration effected within three months after the coming into force of this Ordinance, shall be deemed to relate back to the time of such coming into force.

No fees recoverable unless persons registered.

9. No certificate, or other document, required by law to be signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner, given after the commencement of this Ordinance, shall be valid unless signed by a person registered as a medical practitioner under this Ordinance.

Certificates cannot be signed unless person signing is registered.

10. From and after the coming into force of this Ordinance the words "legally qualified medical practitioner," or "duly qualified medical officer," or any words importing a person recognized by law as a medical practitioner, or member of the medical profession when used in any Ordinance, or order of the Governor-in-Council, or in any Proclamation, or in any Order or Rules made thereunder, with reference to such persons, shall be construed to mean a person registered as a medical practitioner under this Ordinance.

Construction of terms.

11. All medical officers in the Public Service of the Colony, and all medical officers of His Majesty's Army and Navy respectively residing in the Colony while on full pay, and all duly qualified ship's surgeons while in discharge of their duties shall be entitled to the privileges of persons registered under this Ordinance and may be registered free of charge.

Persons entitled to free registration.

12. (1) If any medical practitioner, midwife or dentist registered under this Ordinance, shall:—

If convicted may be struck off from the Register.

(a) Be convicted of any felony or misdemeanour; or

(b) After due enquiry by a Board of Enquiry be deemed by the Governor-in-Council to have been guilty of infamous conduct in any professional respect,

the Governor-in-Council may order the Registrar to strike out the name of such person from the Register.

(2) Such order may prescribe a period on the expiration of which a person ordered to be struck off as aforesaid shall be entitled to be re-registered.

(3) The Board of Enquiry shall consist of the Colonial Surgeon and two other persons to be appointed by the Governor; upon any such enquiry the person against whom such offence or conduct is alleged shall be entitled to appear and be heard.

(4) Any person whose name may have been ordered to be struck out from the Register may appeal to the Supreme Court which shall have power to annul or vary the order in respect of which such person appeals

(5) Every appeal under this section shall be made within eight days from the date of such Order and the Registrar shall not strike out any name as aforesaid before such period has expired and he has ascertained that no such appeal has been lodged.

An Ordinance

To make provision for a Cemetery in the Town of Stanley, and for the appointment of a Burial Board.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The Stanley Cemetery Ordinance, 1888, and The Stanley Cemetery Amendment Ordinance, 1892, and The Stanley Cemetery Amendment Ordinance, 1907, are hereby repealed.

Repeal.

2. In this Ordinance the term—

Definitions.

“Cemetery” means the Stanley Cemetery.

“Burial Board” means the Stanley Cemetery Burial Board.

3. The boundaries of the Cemetery shall be as follows:—

Boundaries of Cemetery.

From East to West the space between the line dividing lots Nos. 41 and 42, and the Western wall of the Cemetery; from North to South the space between the northern wall of the Cemetery and the Fitzroy

Road, being six chains and eighty links from East to West, and six chains and fifty links from North to South, enclosing an area of four acres, one rood and twenty seven perches, and including lots Nos. 40, 41, and 96; and the whole shall be enclosed by a substantial fence or wall.

Investiture.

4. The Cemetery shall be vested in the Governor of the Falkland Islands for the purposes of a Cemetery for the use of the Colony and may be transferred hereafter to the Burial Board should it be incorporated as a Body Corporate.

Space to be left round Cemetery.

No dwelling house to be erected within 100 feet of Cemetery.

5. The Cemetery shall be surrounded on all sides by an open space or road, not less than one chain in width, and no dwelling house, except the Caretaker's Cottage and appurtenances, shall be erected in the Cemetery or within one hundred feet of the outer wall or fence.

Burial Board.

6. There shall be a Burial Board composed of the following Members:—

The Colonial Secretary for the time being; the Incumbent of Christ Church Cathedral for the time being; the Priest, if any, for the time being in charge of the Roman Catholic Chapel in Stanley; and the Minister, if any, for the time being attached to the Baptist Chapel in Stanley; two Unofficial Members of the Legislative Council; and two persons residing in the Town of Stanley, or within one mile thereof, to be appointed by the Governor. Provided always that the two persons appointed by the Governor shall not continue in Office longer than two years without being reappointed.

Chairman of Board.

7. The Colonial Secretary shall be chairman of the Board and shall preside at its Meetings. In his absence the Members present will elect a chairman. The Sexton of Christ Church Cathedral shall act as Clerk to the Board when required, and perform such other duties as the Board may consider necessary.

Sexton to be Clerk.

Meetings of Board.

8. The Board shall meet at least once in every three months and at such other time as at any previous Meeting shall have been determined upon; and it shall be at all times competent for any two Members of the Board by writing under their hands to summon, with at least forty-eight hours notice, the Board for any special purpose mentioned in such writing, and to meet at such time as shall be appointed therein.

Quorum.

9. At all Meetings of the Board any number not less than three Members of such Board shall be sufficient number for transacting business and for exercising all the powers of the Board.

Minutes of proceedings.

10. Entries of all proceedings of the Board, with the names of the Members who attend each Meeting, shall be made in books to be provided and kept for that purpose, under the direction of the Board, and shall be signed by the Presiding Member. The Board shall likewise provide and keep books in which shall be entered true and regular accounts of all sums of money received and paid for or on account of the purposes of this Ordinance, and of all liabilities incurred by them for such purposes, and of the several purposes for which such sums of money are paid and such liabilities incurred.

Accounts of Board.

Accounts to be balanced annually on 30th September.

Accounts to be forwarded annually to Colonial Secretary.

11. The accounts of the Board shall be made up and balanced to the thirtieth day of September in each year; and some time in the month of December in every year, not later than the fifteenth day thereof, the Board shall cause to be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary, for the information of the Governor-in-Council, an account of all sums of money received and expended by the Board under the provisions of this Ordinance, and a statement of the purposes of all expenditure and of the balance of money, if any, remaining in hand; and all or any of the books which shall be kept by the Board

as hereinbefore provided, shall at all times be placed before the Governor in Council for inspection, when so required, on due notice to the Board from the Colonial Secretary.

Books to be produced whenever desired to Governor in Council.

12. The Board shall have the management and control of all matters connected with the Cemetery, and may permit the building of a Chapel or Chapels for the performance of the Burial Service, either in the consecrated or unconsecrated parts thereof, and may lay out and embellish the grounds of the Cemetery as they think fit.

Board to have control of Cemetery.

13. The Board shall keep the Cemetery, the Caretaker's Cottage, and the Chapel or Chapels, if any, and the walls or fences enclosing the Cemetery in good order and condition out of such monies as shall be received by them by virtue of this Ordinance, or by public or private contributions, or from any other funds made applicable to such purpose.

Board to attend to upkeep of Cemetery.

14. The Board shall, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, allow certain portions of the Cemetery to be consecrated in addition to those portions already consecrated, provided that a sufficient area in the opinion of the Governor in Council remains unconsecrated, and that an adequate portion of the Cemetery is reserved exclusively for the burial of Roman Catholics. The Board shall define by suitable marks the consecrated portions of the Cemetery and the portion set apart for the burial of Roman Catholics.

Board to allow portions of Cemetery to be consecrated subject to approval of Governor in Council.

15. The Board shall appoint such persons as they may think fit, to be grave diggers, and shall fix the rate of charges for digging graves.

Board to appoint grave diggers.

16. The Board may set apart such parts of the Cemetery as they may think fit for the purpose of granting exclusive rights of burial therein, and may sell, either in perpetuity or for a limited time, and subject to such conditions as shall be hereafter determined, the exclusive right of burial in any parts of the Cemetery so set apart, or the right of one or more burials therein, and they may grant the right by sale or otherwise of placing any monument or gravestone in the Cemetery, or of any railing or other enclosure, or any tablet or monumental inscription on the walls of any Chapel or other building within the Cemetery.

Parts of Cemetery may be set apart for exclusive burial.

17. The Board shall cause a plan of the Cemetery to be made on a scale sufficiently large to show the situation of every burial place in all parts of the Cemetery so set apart, and in which an exclusive right of burial has been granted, and all such burial places shall be numbered, and such numbers shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and such book shall contain the names and descriptions of the several persons to whom the exclusive right of burial in any such place of burial has been granted by the Board, and no place of burial, with exclusive right of burial therein, shall be made in the Cemetery without the same being marked out in such plan, and a corresponding entry made in the said book, and the said plan and book shall be kept by the Board.

Plan and book of reference to be kept.

18. The Board may grant, in the form in the schedule to this Ordinance annexed, or to the like effect, the exclusive right of burial in any part of the Cemetery, either in perpetuity or for a limited time, and of the right of one or more burials therein, or of placing therein any monument, tablet or gravestone, or any railings or other enclosures round the same.

Form of grant of exclusive right of burial.

19. A register of all such grants shall be kept by the Board, and within fourteen days after the date of any such grant, an entry or memorial of the date thereof, and of the parties thereto, and also the consideration for such grant, and also a proper description of the

Register of grants to be kept.

ground described in such grant, so as the situation thereof may be ascertained, shall be made by the Board in such register; and the Board shall be entitled to demand any sum not exceeding two shillings and sixpence, for every such entry or memorial, and the said register may be perused at all reasonable times by any grantee or assignee of such right on payment of one shilling.

Exclusive right of burial place to be personal estate of Grantee, to be assignable, or may be bequeathed by Will.

20. The exclusive right of burial in any such place of burial shall, whether granted in perpetuity or for a limited time, be considered as the personal estate of the grantee, and may be assigned in his lifetime or bequeathed in his Will.

Form of assignment.

21. Every such assignment made in the lifetime of the assignor shall be by deed, in which the consideration shall be duly set forth and may be in the form in the schedule to this Ordinance annexed, or to the like effect.

Assignment to be registered.

22. Every such assignment shall, within six months after the execution thereof, if executed in the Falkland Islands, or within six months after the arrival thereof in the Falkland Islands, if executed elsewhere, be produced to the Board, and an entry or memorial of such assignment shall be made in the register by the Board in the same manner as that of the original grant, and until such entry or memorial, no right of burial shall be acquired under any assignment, and for every such entry or memorial the Board shall be entitled to demand any sum not exceeding two shillings and sixpence.

Probates of Wills by which the exclusive right of burial is bequeathed to be registered.

23. An entry or memorial of the Probate of every Will by which the exclusive right of burial within the Cemetery is bequeathed, and in case there be any specific disposition of such exclusive right of burial in the said Will, an entry of such disposition shall, within six months after the Probate of such Will, be made in the said register in the same manner as that of the original grant, and until such entry, no right of exclusive burial shall be acquired under such Will; and for every such entry or memorial the Board shall be entitled to demand any sum not exceeding two shillings and six pence.

Burial place to be kept exclusively for purchaser of exclusive right.

24. No body shall be buried in any place wherein the exclusive right of burial shall have been granted by the Board, except with the consent of the owner, for the time being, of such exclusive right of burial.

No such grant to give the right of burial in consecrated ground to certain persons.

25. No such grant as aforesaid shall give the right to bury within the consecrated part of the Cemetery the body of any person not entitled to be buried in consecrated ground according to the rights and usage of the Church of England, or to place any monument, gravestone, tablet, or monumental inscription respecting any such body within the consecrated part of the Cemetery.

Power to remove monuments, &c., improperly erected.

26. The Board may take down and remove any gravestone, monument, tablet, or monumental inscription, and any railings or other enclosures which shall have been placed within the Cemetery without their authority.

Board may grant exclusive rights to burial places already occupied, and to monuments, &c., already placed therein.

27. With respect to interments made in the Cemetery previous to the operation of this Ordinance, the Board shall have the same power and authority to grant exclusive rights to such burial places, and to the right of any monuments, tablets, gravestones, railings, or other enclosures which shall have already been placed thereon, in like manner as hereinbefore provided for the purchase of such rights, and all such burial places shall be measured and defined by boundary marks, and by numbers in regular order, and shall be duly marked upon the plan of the Cemetery, and entered in the register book,

and the rate of payment for the same shall be at the rate fixed for all such exclusive burial places, according to the space of ground occupied.

28. The Board may make Rules and Bye-laws for the maintenance and control of the Cemetery and particularly with respect to the following matters; that is to say:—

Power of Board to make Bye-laws.

(1) With respect to the minimum and maximum size and depth of all graves, and of all spaces in which exclusive rights of burial are granted, as hereinbefore provided.

(2) The conditions on which exclusive rights of burial may be granted, and the price to be paid for the minimum size of such spaces, and the price per superficial foot at a largely increased rate of any additional space between the minimum and maximum size of spaces so granted.

(3) The price and conditions of the sale of a right to place monuments, gravestones, or any railing or other enclosure in the Cemetery, or of placing any tablet or monumental inscription on the walls of any Chapel or other building within the Cemetery.

(4) The rate and amount of all fees to be paid to any Officer of the Board for attending at funerals, allotting graves, or any other duties for which he ought properly to receive fees.

29. All Rules and Bye-laws shall be approved by the Governor-in-Council before they shall have the force of law.

Bye-laws to be approved by the Governor in Council.

30. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall be held to affect the powers of the Board of Health with respect to burial grounds, and the burial of the dead under the provisions of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Ordinance not to affect powers of Board of Health.

31. Every person who shall wilfully destroy or injure any building, wall or fence, belonging to the Cemetery, or destroy or injure any plant therein, or who shall daub or disfigure any wall thereof, or put up any bill therein, or on any wall thereof, or wilfully destroy, injure, or deface any monument, tablet, inscription, or gravestone, or other enclosure within the Cemetery, or do any wilful damage therein, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay to the Board over and above the amount of injury done, a sum not exceeding five pounds.

Penalty for damaging the Cemetery.

32. Every person who shall play at any game or sport, or discharge fire-arms, save at a Military funeral, in the Cemetery, or shall wilfully and unlawfully disturb any persons assembled in the Cemetery for the purpose of burying any body therein, or who shall commit any nuisance within the Cemetery, shall forfeit and pay to the Board a sum not exceeding five pounds.

Penalty for committing a nuisance in the Cemetery.

33. All penalties and forfeitures incurred under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary manner before the Police Magistrate, with costs, on the complaint of any Member or Officer of the Board.

Recovery of Penalties.

Preamble.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. All Ordinances and Resolutions passed, and all Votes granted, by the Legislative Council during the period from 12th November, 1911, to 31st March, 1913, inclusive, shall be as valid as if the Legislative Council had been legally constituted.

Validation of Proceedings

2. Vere Packe and George Isaac Turner shall be relieved of all penalties to which they may have rendered themselves liable for having sat and voted during the above mentioned period in the Legislative Council.

Wart disease (Black Scab) in Potatoes.

With reference to the Notice appearing in the Gazette of 2nd June, 1913, on the subject of the Wart or Cauliflower Disease in the Stanley potato crop during that season, the Governor directs it to be notified for general information that the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries have given this disease their very careful consideration and it has been declared unlawful for potatoes to be planted in infected areas in the United Kingdom.

An Ordinance To Regulate the Sale and Use of Poisons.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The several substances mentioned in the first schedule thereto shall be deemed poisons within the meaning of this Ordinance.

Definition of poisons.

2. (1) Nothing in this Ordinance shall apply to the sale of:—

Application of Ordinance.

(a) Any poison when made up or compounded as a medicine according to the prescription of a duly qualified medical practitioner or dentist, provided the medicine is labelled with the name and address of the vendor and the ingredients thereof are entered, with the name of the person to whom it is sold or delivered, in a book to be kept for that purpose;

(b) Patent medicines;

(c) Photographic materials for the purpose of photography;

(d) Medicines dispensed by veterinary surgeons for animals under their treatment;

(e) Fly poison papers or packets of poisonous mixtures for the destruction of vermin when duly marked as such; or

(f) Sheep dips.

(2) Nothing in this Ordinance shall apply to sales of poisons by wholesale dealers in the ordinary course of wholesale dealing, if an order in writing signed by the purchaser is given for the supply of the same, provided that the sales shall be entered in a book, and the packages of poison shall be labelled as directed by section 8 hereof.

Persons qualified to deal in poisons.

3. (1) It shall not be lawful for any person to sell or deal in poisons who is not either:—

(a) a Medical Practitioner or Dentist registered under the provisions of the Medical Practitioners, Midwives, and Dentists Ordinance, 1914, or

(b) a duly qualified and licensed apothecary or chemist.

(2) Whosoever, not being qualified as aforesaid, sells or deals in any poisons shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

Sale of poisons to be entered in a book.

4. (1) Every person who sells any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto, shall, before delivery thereof to the purchaser, inquire his name, place of abode, and occupation, and the purpose for which the poison is required or stated to be required.

(2) The vendor shall thereupon make a faithful entry of the sale, specifying the poison and the quantity thereof, and all the particulars so given by the purchaser, together with the day of the month and year of the sale, in a book to be kept by the vendor for that purpose in the form in the second schedule hereto.

(3) The entry shall be signed by the person making the same and also by the purchaser, unless he declares himself unable to write, in which case the person making the entry shall add thereto the words "purchaser cannot write."

(4) Whenever a witness to the sale is required by this Ordinance the entry shall be signed by that witness, who shall also state his place of abode.

5. (1) In cases where sales and purchases of poisons are made by correspondence, the letter ordering the same shall be preserved by the vendor and a memorandum of the date of the said letter, by whom it was written, and the quantity and particulars of the poison therein ordered, shall be entered in the said book.

(2) No person shall sell any poison so ordered to any person with whose signature he is not acquainted, unless the signature has been witnessed by a justice of the peace, clergyman, or public officer, or is authenticated by some person known to the vendor.

Restrictions as to sale of any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto.

6. (1) No person shall sell any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto to any person who is under eighteen years of age, or who is unknown to the vendor, unless the sale is made in the presence of some witness who is known to the vendor and knows the purchaser.

(2) The witness shall sign his name and add his place of abode to the required entry before the delivery of the poison to the purchaser.

7. Whosoever—

(a) Sells any poison specified in the first part of the first schedule hereto and delivers the same without having made and signed the entries required by this Ordinance; or

- (b) Sells that poison without having obtained the signature to such entry as is required by this Ordinance; or
- (c) Purchases the poison and gives false information in answer to inquiries to the person selling the same in relation to the particulars which the vendor is by this Ordinance authorised to inquire of such purchaser; or
- (d) Signs his name as a witness to the sale of the poison to a person unknown to him; shall for every offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

8. No person shall sell any poison specified in the second part of the first schedule hereto or any substance or preparation which has been or is hereafter declared to be a poison as herein provided either by wholesale or retail, unless the bottle, or other vessel, wrapper or cover, box, or case immediately containing the same bears thereon the word "Poison" printed conspicuously, together with the name of the article and the name and address of the seller thereof.

Rules to be observed
in the sale of poisons.

9. Whosoever sells any poison otherwise than as herein provided shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds. For the purpose of this section the person on whose behalf a sale is made by any apprentice or servant shall be deemed to be the seller. Provided that the apprentice or servant shall also be liable to a like penalty.

Penalties.

10. The books required to be kept under this Ordinance shall at any time be open to inspection by a Government medical officer, the chief constable or, on the order of a stipendary magistrate, by a constable or officer of the police. Any person refusing to allow or hindering an inspection of the books by a Government medical officer, the chief constable, or by a duly authorised officer or constable shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one pound.

Inspection of books.

11. (1) The Governor-in-Council may make further regulations as to the colouring of any poison, or the sale or custody of the same, or for otherwise carrying into effect the objects of this Ordinance.

Regulations.

(2) The regulations shall be published in the Gazette and shall thereupon have the same force and validity as if they formed part of this Ordinance.

12. Whosoever, being the owner or other person in charge or possession of any poison, leaves it in any place (whether the same is ordinarily accessible to others or not) unless the bottle or package of whatever kind in which the poison is contained is marked "Poison" and is otherwise duly labelled in the manner provided by section 8, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Poisons to be labelled.

13. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Poisons Ordinance, 1914."

to Incorporate the Stanley Cemetery Burial
Board as a Body Corporate.

Whereas Orissa Catherine Anne Dean of Stanley is desirous of making provision for the maintenance of the post of Caretaker of the Stanley Cemetery, and of the Caretaker's Cottage erected at her expense, in order to enable special attention to be given to the graves of her late husband George Markham Dean and certain other deceased persons, and whereas Orissa Catherine Anne Dean is prepared to contribute the sum of one thousand pounds towards the above purposes when the Burial Board created under the Stanley Cemetery Ordinance shall have been incorporated as a Body Corporate, and whereas William Alfred Harding, has collected certain sums of money exceeding in the aggregate four hundred pounds for the purpose of establishing a Stanley Cemetery Endowment Fund for the maintenance of the Stanley Cemetery, and is desirous of handing over these sums and such other sums as he may collect to the Burial Board of the Stanley Cemetery when they are incorporated as a Body Corporate:—

Preamble.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Stanley Cemetery Burial
Board Incorporated a
Body Corporate.

1. The Burial Board of the Stanley Cemetery are hereby declared and adjudged to be one body politic and corporate by the name of "The Trustees of the Stanley Cemetery" and by that name shall and may have perpetual succession, and shall and may sue and be sued in all Courts and before all Magistrates, Justices and others in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever, and shall and may have a common seal, and the same may vary and alter at their pleasure, and by the name aforesaid shall be in law capable of holding all such estate real or personal as hath already been acquired by them, or of taking for ever hereafter other estate real or personal either by purchase, gift, devise or legacy, for the use of the said Stanley Cemetery.

Short Title.

2. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Stanley Cemetery Incorporation Ordinance, 1914."

An Ordinance to Amend the Pensions
Ordinance, 1906.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is advisable to amend the "Pensions Ordinance, 1906," and to repeal the "Pensions Amendment Ordinances, 1913."

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under Ordinance No. 5 of 1906, entitled "An Ordinance to declare the law regulating pensions, gratuities, and other allowances to be granted in respect of offices held in the Public Service of the Falkland Islands", (hereinafter called the principal Ordinance) becomes, on his final retirement from the service of the Colony, either a Director of any Company the principal part of whose business is in any way directly concerned with the Colony, or an officer or a servant employed in the Colony by any such Company, without in every such case the permission of the Governor in writing first had and obtained, then in every such case it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to direct that such Pension shall forthwith cease: provided always that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, on being satisfied that the person in respect of whose pension any such direction shall have been given has ceased to be a Director of such Company or to be employed as an officer or servant of such Company in the Colony, as the case may be, to give directions for the restoration of such pension, with retrospective effect, if he shall see fit, to such date as he shall specify

Conditions under which a retired Officer may accept the Directorship, etc., of a Company operating in the Colony.

Penalty.

Conditions under which pension may be restored.

2. Ordinance No. 4 of 1913, entitled "An Ordinance to Amend the Pensions Ordinance, 1906," and Ordinance No. 6 of 1913, entitled "An Ordinance to Amend the Pensions Ordinance, 1906," are hereby repealed.

Repeal.

3. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Pensions Amendment Ordinance, 1914," and shall be read and construed as one with the principal Ordinance, and any copy of the principal Ordinance printed after the commencement of this Ordinance may be printed with the amendments made by this Ordinance.

Short Title.

Reprint.

An Ordinance

For the preservation of Penguins.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Repeal.

1. Ordinance No. 1 of 1867, entitled "An Ordinance to amend and consolidate the Ordinances relating to the destruction of Penguins," and Ordinance No. 7 of 1909, entitled "An Ordinance to provide for the preservation of Penguins in the Dependencies"; are hereby repealed.

Unlawful to take penguins' eggs without a license.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to take or destroy penguins' eggs on the East Falkland Island and islands adjacent thereto, lying North of Choiseul Sound and Brenton Loch, or the West Falkland Island and Islands adjacent thereto, or in any Dependency of the Colony, unless he shall first have been duly licensed.

Granting of licenses.

3. The Colonial Secretary, a Stipendiary Magistrate, a Justice of the Peace, a Deputy Collector of Customs, or such other officer or officers as the Governor may appoint for the purpose, may grant licenses to take penguins' eggs within the territorial limits defined in the preceding section, to such persons as may apply for them for such periods, and on such terms and conditions in respect of the number and description of eggs to be taken, the territorial limits within which they may be taken, under such licenses, and the payment to be made in respect thereof, as may be approved by the Governor.

4. The Governor in Council may, from time to time, make regulations for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance, and the intent and object thereof, and may impose penalties not exceeding ten pounds for the breach of such regulations,

Governor in Council may make regulations.

5. All regulations made in pursuance of this Ordinance shall be published in the Government "Gazette" and shall come into force on such day as the Governor may direct by notice in that behalf published in the Government "Gazette."

Regulations to be published in the Government "Gazette".

6. Any person who, after the coming into operation of this Ordinance, shall, without a license or contrary to the terms and conditions of any license which may have been granted to him under this Ordinance, take or destroy, or incite any other person to take or destroy any penguins' eggs within the territorial limits defined in section 2 of this Ordinance, shall on conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate, or any two Justices of the Peace, forfeit and pay for every egg so taken or destroyed a sum not exceeding five shillings,

Penalty for taking penguins' eggs without a license.

7. Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel, who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in taking or destroying penguins' eggs, or who shall permit or negligently suffer any person belonging to such vessel to be employed in taking or destroying penguins' eggs, contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, shall forfeit any eggs so taken and any eggs found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for each offence.

Liability of an owner or master of a vessel,

8. Offences under this Ordinance or under any regulations made thereunder, may be prosecuted, and any penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance, or any regulations thereunder, may be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner.

Prosecution of offences.

9. For all purposes of and incidental to the trial and punishment of any person accused of any offence under this Ordinance, and the proceedings and matters preliminary and incidental to and consequential on his trial and punishment, and for all purposes of and incidental to the jurisdiction of any Court, or of any Constable or Officer with reference to such offence, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was actually committed or in any place in which the offender may for the time being be found.

Venue.

10. Any penalty adjudged under this Ordinance to be paid by the owner or master, or other person in charge of a vessel, may be recovered in the ordinary way, or, if the Court think fit so to order, by distress or arrest and sale of the vessel to which the offender belongs, and her tackle, apparel, and furniture, and any property on board thereof or belonging thereto, or any part thereof.

Recovery of penalties

11. Service of any summons or other matter in any legal proceedings under this Ordinance shall be good service if made personally on the person to be served, or at his last place of abode, or if made by leaving such summons or other matter for him on board any vessel to which he may belong, with the person being or appearing to be in command or charge of such vessel.

Service of summons

12. The Governor, and any person duly authorised by him in writing, may take or destroy for a scientific or any other special purpose, any penguins' eggs, and in so doing shall be exempt from any penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance. Special exemption.

13. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Penguins Preservation Ordinance, 1914," and shall be in force in the Dependencies. Short title.

WHEREAS a state of war exists between Us and the German Emperor,

And whereas it is contrary to law for any person resident, carrying on business, or being in Our dominions, to trade or have any commercial intercourse with any person resident, carrying on business, or being in the German Empire without Our permission:

And whereas it is therefore expedient and necessary to warn all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in Our dominions of their duties and obligations towards Us, Our Crown and Government:

Now, therefore, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and we do hereby warn all persons resident, carrying on business or being in Our dominions:

Not to supply to or obtain from the said German Empire any goods, wares, or merchandise, or to supply to or obtain the same from any person resident, carrying on business, or being therein, nor to supply to or obtain from any person any goods, wares or merchandise for or by way of transmission to or from the said Empire, or to or from any person resident, carrying on business, or being therein, nor to trade in or carry any goods, wares or merchandise destined for or coming from the said Empire, or for or from any person resident, carrying on business or being therein:

Nor to permit any British ship to leave for, enter, or communicate with any port or place in the said Empire:

Nor to make or enter into any new marine, life, fire or other policy or contract to insurance, with or for the benefit of any person resident, carrying on business, or being in the said Empire, nor under any existing policy or contract of insurance to make any payment to or for the benefit of any such person in respect of any loss due to the belligerent action of His Majesty's forces or of those of any ally of His Majesty:

Nor to enter into any new commercial, financial, or other contract or obligation with or for the benefit of any person resident, carrying on business, or being in the said Empire:

And We do hereby further warn all persons that whoever in contravention of the law shall commit, aid or abet any of the aforesaid acts, will be liable to such penalties as the law provides:

And We hereby declare that any transactions to, with or for the benefit of any resident, carrying on business, or being in the said Empire, which are not treasonable and are not for the time being expressly prohibited by Us either by virtue of this Proclamation or otherwise, and which but for the existence of the state of war aforesaid would be lawful, are hereby permitted:

And We hereby declare that the expression "person" in this Proclamation shall include any body of persons corporate or un-incorporate and that where any person has or had an interest in houses or branches of business in some other country as well as in Our dominions, or in the said Empire (as the case may be), this Proclamation shall not apply to the trading or commercial intercourse carried on by such person solely from or by such houses or branches of business in such other country.

Order of His Majesty the King in Council.

His Excellency the Governor, under instructions from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, directs the publication of the following Order in Council.

Order of His Majesty in Council for the Granting of “Days of Grace.”

His Majesty being mindful, now that a state of war exists between this Country and Germany, of the recognition accorded to the practice of granting “days of grace” to enemy merchant ships by the Convention relative to the Status of Enemy Merchant Ships at the outbreak of hostilities, signed at the Hague, on the 18th October, 1907, and being desirous of lessening, so far as may be practicable, the injury caused by war to peaceful and unsuspecting commerce, is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. From and after the publication of this Order, no enemy merchant ship shall be allowed to depart, except in accordance with the provisions of this Order, from any British port or from any ports in any Native State in India, or in any of His Majesty's Protectorates, or in any State under His Majesty's protection or in Cyprus.

2. In the event of information reaching one of our Principal Secretaries of State not later than midnight on Friday the seventh day of August that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which at the date of the outbreak of hostilities were in the ports of the enemy or which subsequently entered them is, in his opinion, not less favourable than the treatment accorded to enemy merchant ships by Articles 3 to 7 of this Order, he shall notify the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty accordingly, and the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury shall forthwith give public notice thereof in the “Gazette,” and Articles 3 to 8 of this Order shall thereupon come into full force and effect.

3. Subject to the provisions of this Order, enemy merchant ships which

- (i) at the date of the outbreak of hostilities were in any port in which this Order applies; or
- (ii) cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and, after the outbreak of hostilities, enter a port to which this Order applies, with no knowledge of the war:

shall be allowed up till midnight (Greenwich mean time), on Friday the 14th of August for loading or unloading their cargoes, and for departing from such port:

Provided that such vessels shall not be allowed to ship any contraband of war, and any contraband of war already shipped on such vessels must be discharged.

4. Enemy merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and which with no knowledge of the war arrive at a port to which this Order applies after the expiry of the time allowed by Article 3 for loading or unloading cargo and for departing, and are permitted to enter, may be required to depart either immediately, or within such time as may be considered necessary by the Customs Officer of the port for the unloading of such cargo as they may be required or specially permitted to discharge.

Provided that such vessels may, as a condition of being allowed to discharge cargo, be required to proceed to any other specified British port, and shall there be allowed such time for discharge as the Customs Officer of that port may consider to be necessary.

Provided also that, if any cargo on board such vessel is contraband of war or is requisitioned under Article 5 of this Order, she may be required before departure to discharge such cargo within such time as the Customs Officer of the port may consider to be necessary; or she may be required to proceed, if necessary under escort to any other of the ports specified in Article 1 of this Order, and shall there discharge the contraband under the like conditions.

5. His Majesty reserves the right recognised by the said Convention to requisition at any time on payment of compensation enemy cargo on board any vessel to which Articles 3 and 4 of this Order apply.

6. The privileges accorded by Articles 3 and 4 are not to extend to cable ships or to sea-going ships designed to carry oil fuel, or to ships whose tonnage exceeds 5,000 tons gross, or whose speed is 14 knots or over, regarding which the entries in Lloyd's Register shall be conclusive for the purposes of this Article. Such vessels will remain liable on adjudication by the Prize Court to detention during the period of war, or to requisition, in accordance, in either case, with the Convention aforesaid. The said privileges will also not extend to merchant ships which show by their build that they are intended for conversion into warships, as such vessels are outside the scope of the said Convention, and are liable to adjudication by the Prize Court to condemnation as prize.

7. Enemy merchant ships allowed to depart under Articles 3 and 4 will be provided with a pass indicating the port to which they are to proceed, and the route they are to follow.

8. A merchant ship which, after receipt of such a pass, does not follow the course indicated therein will be liable to capture.

9. If no information reaches one of our Principal Secretaries of State by the day and hour aforementioned to the effect that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which were in the ports of the enemy at the date of the outbreak of hostilities, or which subsequently entered them, is, in his opinion, not less favourable than that accorded to enemy merchant ships by Articles 3 to 8 of this Order, every enemy merchant ship which, on the outbreak of hostilities, was in any port to which this Order applies, and also every enemy merchant ship which cleared from its last port before the declaration of war, but which, with no knowledge of the war, enters a port to which this Order applies, shall, together with the cargo on board thereof, be liable to capture, and shall be brought before the Prize Court forthwith for adjudication.

10. In the event of information reaching one of our Principal Secretaries of State that British Merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, but are met with by the enemy at sea after the outbreak of hostilities, are allowed to continue their voyage without interference with either the ship or the cargo, or after capture are released with or without proceedings for adjudication in the Prize Court or are to be detained during the war or requisitioned in lieu of condemnation as prize he shall notify the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty accordingly, and shall publish a notification thereof in the "Gazette" and in that event, but not otherwise, enemy merchant ships which cleared from their last port before the declaration of war, and are captured after the outbreak of hostilities and brought before our Prize Courts for adjudication, shall be released or detained or requisitioned in such cases and upon such terms as may be directed in the said notification in the "Gazette."

11. Neutral cargo, other than contraband of war, on board an enemy merchant ship which is not allowed to depart from a port to which this Order applies, shall be released.

12. In accordance with the provisions of Chapter III of the Convention relative to certain Restrictions on the Exercise of the right of Capture in Maritime War, signed at the Hague on the 18th October, 1907, an undertaking must, whether the merchant ship is allowed to depart or not, be given in writing by each of the Officers and

members of the crew of such vessel, who is of enemy nationality, that he will not, after the conclusion of the voyage for which the pass is issued, engage while hostilities last in any service connected with the operation of the war. If any such officer is of neutral nationality, an undertaking must be given in writing that he will not serve, after the conclusion of the voyage for which the pass is issued, on any enemy ship while hostilities last. No undertaking is to be required from members of the crew who are of neutral nationality.

Officers or members of the crew declining to give the undertakings required by this Article will be detained as prisoners of war.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and each of our Principal Secretaries of State, and all Governors, Officers, and authorities whom it may concern are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Ammunition and explosive of all kinds, the ingredients used in their manufacture, and the machinery for manufacturing them.

Military stores of all kinds including—

clothing, equipments, accoutrements, harness, saddlery, implements and tools, wire, chemicals used in the manufacturing of explosives, signalling and search-light equipment, telegraphic and electric-light plant suitable for field use, limelight apparatus, heliographs, optical instruments used in military operations.

Naval Stores of all kinds, including—

materials used in ship construction, such as rivet-iron, angle-iron, round bars, rivets, sheet-plate iron, forgings and armour-plates; machinery used in constructing ships and torpedo boats: marine engines and the component parts thereof, including screw propellers, cylinders, cranks, shafts, boilers, tubes for boilers, boiler-plates, fire-bars.

Every article whatsoever which is, can, or may become applicable for the manufacture of marine machinery, including anchors, chain cables, wire hawsers, capsans, windlasses, steam-winchs, masts, derricks, davits.

Torpedoes and their component parts, and machinery for manufacturing them.

All apparatus for projecting inflammable materials or firing torpedoes.

Steam and other boats suitable for use for warlike purposes.

Submarine cables.

Submarine mines, and apparatus appertaining to them.

Marconi apparatus.

Electrical fittings used on board ship.

WHEREAS by the Seal Fisheries (Crown Colonies and Protectorates) Order in Council, 1913, hereinafter called the Principal Order, provision was made for applying Sections 3 and 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, to certain Colonies and Protectorates, including the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Protectorate, the Solomon Islands Protectorate, and the Somaliland Protectorate, and to Cyprus and to Zanzibar (all of which Colonies and Protectorates and Cyprus and Zanzibar were thereafter referred to as "Territories affected"):

And whereas by Article 4 of the Principal Order it was directed that the said Order should be published in the Government Gazette of each of the Territories affected other than Zanzibar, and should thereupon come into operation in such Territory:

And whereas there is no Government Gazette in the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Protectorate, or in the Solomon Islands Protectorate, or in the Somaliland Protectorate:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the Principal Order so as to make proper provision for bringing the said Order into operation in the said Protectorates:

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Seal Fisheries (Crown Colonies and Protectorates) Order in Council, 1914."

2. The Principal Order shall come into operation in the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Protectorate, the Solomon Islands Protectorate, and the Somaliland Protectorate forthwith.

3. The Schedule to the Principal Order is hereby revoked, and the Schedule to this Order substituted therefor.

Prince of Wales National Relief Fund.

His Excellency the Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following particulars in connection with the Prince of Wales National Relief Fund:

(i) On the 7th September a wireless telegram was received from the Secretary of State as follows;

“4th September. I have received enquiries from certain Colonial Governments as to the scope and object of the Prince of Wales National Relief Fund. This Fund will be applied to the relief of persons in the British Isles who are dependents of men at the front and those men who suffer from unemployment caused by interruption and dislocation of trade and industry or are otherwise plunged into poverty and distress in consequence of the war.”

(ii) The following Public Circular was issued on the 9th September:

“His Excellency the Governor has received a telegram from the Secretary of State intimating that the Prince of Wales has inaugurated a National Relief Fund for the purpose of helping the relatives and dependents of men now at the front and also those who are thrown out of employment as a consequence of the war.

The Governor and Members of the Executive and Legislative Councils feel that an opportunity is hereby afforded to all Colonists and Residents in the Falkland Islands to show their patriotism and sympathy by helping this Fund. They cannot emphasize too strongly the fact that the whole of the British Empire is passing through a crisis of unparalleled gravity in which our national existence is threatened, and that this is an occasion when all loyal Britishers, and those who are living under the British Flag, should come forward and help.

The Governor and the Members of the Legislative Council feel so strongly that the present crisis calls for contributions on a liberal scale that they have unanimously voted to this object from Public Funds the sum of £2,250, representing an amount equal to £1 a head of the estimated population of the Islands.

Briefly the occasion is one which demands a personal sacrifice, and the measure of that sacrifice should be in proportion to the gravity of the situation and not limited to just whatever one can conveniently afford.

(iii) Wireless telegrams were then despatched and received as under:

Governor to Secretary of State :

"9th September. With reference to your telegraphic despatch, Prince of Wales National Relief Fund, vote of £2,250 unanimously carried by Legislative Council equivalent to £1 per head of the population of the Falkland Islands; in addition £750 has been collected privately, giving a total of £3,000, which should be paid to the Fund by Crown Agents chargeable to Falkland Islands. Further instalment will follow shortly."

Secretary of State to Governor :

"10th September. With reference to your telegram of the 9th September, His Majesty's Government appreciate highly very generous and patriotic gifts offered to Prince of Wales Fund both by Legislative Council on behalf of the Colony and by private contributors."

Penguin Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by Section 4 of the Penguins Preservation Ordinance, 1914, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

1. The period for which Licenses to take Penguins' eggs may be issued shall be from the 1st day of October to the 31st day of December.

2. All Licenses shall be available only for those rookeries specified thereon.

3. All applications for Licenses shall be made either personally or in writing and shall reach the Colonial Secretary, or other Officer, authorised by the Ordinance to issue Licenses, not later than the 1st day of October.

4. The Fee payable in respect of Licenses to take Penguins' eggs shall be as follows:—

For a License to take not more than 1,000 eggs 5/=

For a License to take more than 1,000 eggs, 5/= for the first thousand, and 5/= for every additional thousand or part thereof.

5. Every Licensee shall, at a date not earlier than the 1st January or later than the 1st February, make in writing to the Colonial Secretary, or other person authorised by the Ordinance to issue Licenses, a declaration of the number of eggs taken during the past season and of the localities from which the eggs were taken.

6. All Licensees bringing eggs into the township of Stanley shall notify the Chief Constable, and it shall be lawful for the Chief Constable or other person duly authorised by the Colonial Secretary to inspect any eggs so imported.

7. Any Licensee who commits or allows or negligently suffers a person employed by him to commit a breach of these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence, and the Licensee shall at the same time become liable to the immediate forfeiture of his License and of any claim to a License in the future. And if any person employed by the Licensee commits a breach of these Regulations he shall be liable to the same penalty.

8. No Licenses shall be issued after the 1st October, 1914, except on the terms and conditions contained in the foregoing Regulations.

Stock Inspector's Report.

STOCK DEPARTMENT,

STANLEY,

August 29th, 1914.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith the Report of this Department for the Season 1913-14.

Previous Reports have been drawn up to the end of December in each year but for many reasons this system was unsatisfactory, for parts of two separate seasons were thereby included, instead of one entire season.

Sheep.

2. The general health of the flocks is extremely satisfactory. To some extent this is due to the enforcement of stringent Importation Regulations. Lice are at present our worst enemy among sheep, but I have great hopes of seeing the Colony free from this pest within the next few years. Many of the farmers apparently did not realise the extent to which their stock and wool were damaged by this parasite, dipping and gathering being carried on in a more or less careless manner, and it is suspected that in some cases attempts were made to conceal infection. The result is that it has become necessary to enforce Section 16 of the Stock Ordinance, which gives the owner of infected sheep twelve months to clean his flock under a penalty of a fine. Once again I should like to remind stock owners that they will find a poisonous powder dip far more effectual and reliable than the non-poisonous preparations and also that two dippings at least are absolutely necessary if good and lasting results are to be expected. On some stations this important work has been carried on in a desultory manner, sheep being hurried through the trough, many without total immersion, apparently the one object in view being speed. Thoroughness being quite a secondary consideration.

It appears that some of the stock owners do not realize that the majority of the dips at present on the market are sold specifying to kill parasites within a stated time of immersion and when the dip is at a certain strength. Few professing to be effectual with a thirty seconds swim which leaves parts of the sheep quite untouched by the fluid, yet it is a fact that quite a number of the sheep are hurried through the trough in a few seconds, whilst the strength of the preparation is the same as, or more often less than, is recommended for a thorough dipping with an immersion of three times as long as that actually given. The result is obvious.

Specific Ophthalmia.

3. A disease known as Specific Ophthalmia, one of the chief symptoms of which was temporary blindness, showed itself on the East Falklands during the late summer and autumn, but with no serious results, the mortality being practically nil, and the disease disappearing with the advent of the wet weather. Specific Ophthalmia is not contagious, and is always liable to be seen after a spell of dry weather, but the results are not in any way serious.

Lambing.

4. The lambing percentage was slightly lower than that of last year, being 67·34% as compare with 68·82% for the year 1912.

The lambs on the whole improve yearly and on some farms are of a very good type. In some stud flocks there are ram lambs which would compare very favourably with many young rams I have seen imported into the Colony.

Statistics.

5. It is gratifying to note that the death rate has been reduced from 12% in 1912 to 11% this season. Many stations have reduced their death rate considerably by judicious ditching, culling and stocking. On the East Falklands there was some mortality among the ewes at lambing and shearing times. The clip during the season was somewhat lighter than in the previous year, probably to some extent due to the exceptionally dry spring and summer. The price of all exports from the farm remained high, wool making as much as 1/2 per pound. As predicted in my last report the price of sheep has risen considerably and there is every prospect of a further good demand for sheep of good weight and quality during the coming season.

The Annual returns for 1914 show the number of sheep in the Colony to be 698,072 or 4,789 less than in the previous year. The number is now less than it has been for the last five years. This reduction may be accounted for by the large number of sheep exported.

Cattle.

6. A number of cattle were subjected to the tuberculin test, but in no single case was there a reaction. Examination of the mammary glands or udders of a large number of milk cows revealed less than 2% of suspected cases of tuberculosis, whilst no cases of this disease were seen after death in animals slaughtered either for food or other purposes. Tuberculosis in the sheep may be said to be practically non-existent. The conclusions which may be drawn from the above remarks are highly satisfactory to the Colony. About 1,000 head of cattle were canned during the season at the Goose Green Works. This is the first time that cattle have been utilised for this purpose in the Colony, and every encouragement should be given to the industry.

Horses.

7. The total number in the Colony is 3,528, a slight increase on previous returns. The general health of the horses has been extremely good during the season. The percentage of foals is considerably above that of last year, being 61.89% compared with 48.52%.

Cultivation.

8. Much progress has been made in this respect during the last few years, the weather last season being especially favourable for good crops. Hay crops were particularly heavy and well saved, and sufficient hay is now probably grown in the Colony to supply its own needs. Lucerne or alfalfa was tried on a small scale as an experiment, but beyond establishing itself fairly well in the ground, did not give good results. Good crops of oat hay were raised on the East and West Falklands, some attaining a height of four feet. Green oat hay is a highly nutritious food for either horses or cattle, but should be given chopped. New hay is known to be unsuitable for feeding purposes, being liable to set up severe abdominal and skin troubles. Farmers would therefore be well advised not to cut their stack for at least six months if they can possibly avoid doing so.

Imports.

9. The number of live stock imported was slightly in excess of that of the previous season. The rams on the whole were of a much better quality and type than many of the shipments of foregoing seasons. I am informed by the P. S. N. Co's Agent, that arrangements have been made for a cargo boat to leave England in October in each year. This being after the Ashford sales will be a great convenience to importers of Stock. The inconvenience and expense of transshipping at Monte Video will be avoided and the risk of introducing disease into the Colony considerably reduced. During the season the Department received notices of intending importations of nearly 500 horses, which were to arrive at various Ports of Entry. Out of this number only 116 duly arrived, the majority of these reaching the Colony months after the date specified on the notices received. Since it was very inconvenient and almost impossible to arrange to meet these shipments for the purpose of examination, it was found necessary to enforce

new Importation Regulations whereby all live stock must come through Port Stanley, except when special permission to do otherwise is granted. Since the introduction of the above Regulations, it has been deemed advisable, owing to the risk of introducing contagious disease into the Colony, to issue a Proclamation prohibiting the importation of all live stock from South America. Probably there are some stock owners who may think this order unnecessarily severe, but I can assure them that what has been done is entirely in their own interest, for should the disease, from which the Government is doing its utmost to keep the Colony free, once get established here, many farms would be badly crippled in consequence, if not absolutely ruined.

Quarantine Station.

10. All imported sheep are dipped and quarantined for thirty days as usual. A new dip was found to be necessary and has been erected, and at an early date it is hoped to put the station in thorough repair, and in a more hygienic condition.

Exports.

11. Over 38,000 live sheep were exported to South America during the season. This is the largest number yet exported from the Falklands but in all probability will be exceeded next year, for it is possible that in the near future negotiations will be entered into, with certain Companies in South America, for exporting sheep of a suitable weight in a frozen condition.

All the stock exported was free from disease and of good quality. Some discontent arose among the farmers about the prices offered; it appears that in some cases as much as 12/- per head was offered for 60 lb. wethers, while other farmers were offered three or four shillings less per head for sheep of the same weight. In a Colony of this size it seems a pity that a standard price cannot be arranged for sheep of a uniform weight. Until something in this way is done I feel sure there will always be a certain amount of discontent which will not be beneficial to either buyer or seller. The general opinion amongst farmers is that next year a sheep of 60 lbs. will not be sold for less than 10/-

Geese.

12. Certain farmers on the West Falklands petitioned the Government asking that the payment for geese beaks be continued. The request was considered by the Governor-in-Council, the communication in reply being in the negative. Some of the farmers on the West Island now pay 10/- per 100 for beaks obtained on their own stations. The purchase of turkey, carrancho and rook beaks is still continued.

Post Office Receipts.

The receipts for the year 1913, amounted to £2691/17/3, or a decrease of £676/18/10 as compared with the receipts in the preceding year. The decrease of receipts in the year, 1913, is accounted for by the unusually large sales of postage stamps in 1912, consequent on a new issue of postage stamps being put on sale. The amount received for Stamp Sales in 1912 was £2927/4/2 as compared with £2144/0/3 in 1913.

An increase of receipts is shown in respect of the following sub-heads, namely—

Expenditure.

The expenditure for the year amounted to £3776/4/2 or a decrease of £363/8/5, as compared with the expenditure in 1912.

The principal increase in expenditure in 1912, is shown under the following sub-heads, namely—

The large expenditure under item 8 was due to the cost of the new King George V. series of postage stamps.

The amount of £850 shown under item 12., as against £600 in 1913, is accounted for by the payment in 1912 for mail services performed in 1911, and not paid during that year.

Post Offices.

The post offices at New Island and South Georgia have proved a boon to persons engaged in the Whaling Industry. This is shown by the quantity of mail matter handled.

South Georgia. In 1912 the quantity received and despatched was 36,622 and in the year, 1913, 42,209.

The total number of registered articles handled in 1912 was 742 and in 1913, 829.

Postal.

The total number of postal packets of every description received and despatched in 1913 was 168939 or a slight decrease of 339 as compared with the figures for 1912 (vide Appendix C).

Inter-Insular Mail Service.

The inter-insular mail service was performed for part of the year 1913, by the R. M. S. Columbus. This vessel however was unable to continue the service and was succeeded, as a temporary measure, by one of Messrs. Salvesen's steam whalers. The change did not interfere with the regular carriage of mails, inward mails were at all times received in time to despatch to Europe by the homeward mail steamer. The S. S. "Falkland", belonging to the Falkland Islands Transport Company, arrived in the Colony early this year and is now performing the Inter-insular mail service.

The present system of distribution of mails to outlying districts gives general satisfaction to Colonists. The average number of bags despatched each mail was 31.

That the service works in a smooth and satisfactory manner is evidenced by the fact that notwithstanding the large amount of postal matter handled no loss has been reported.

The creation of a mail service between the Colony and the Dependency of South Georgia would be an immense advantage both from an administrative and a postal point of view. At present mails to and from South Georgia have to be transmitted via Buenos Aires.

Ocean Mail Service.

The Mail Packet Service was performed throughout the year by the P.S.N.Co., Ltd., 13 calls outward and 13 calls homeward being made. In some instances mail steamers arrived under the contract time of 27 days. Intermediate mails were despatched by cargo steamers whenever opportunity offered.

South Georgia. Mails to and from Europe and South Georgia are sent via Buenos Aires. Closed mails are received and sent to Norway in this manner. Mails to Buenos Aires are carried by vessels of the Cia Argentina de Pesca. As opportunity offers mails are despatched by various transports trading to and from the Dependency. The total number of bags of mail handled in 1913, was 139.

Wireless Telegraphy.

The hitherto isolated state of the Colony was terminated by the completion of a 5 K.W. Wireless Station at the latter part of 1912. The Station immediately proved its usefulness on the occasion of the wreck of the P.S.N.Co's S: S. "Oravia" in November, 1912, and it was undoubtedly through its medium that all lives were saved.

During the period October, 1912, to 31st December, 1913, a total of 836 messages were dealt with consisting of 10,085 words (Vide Appendix D). During the month of November, 1912, an unusual press of telegrams had to be dealt with resulting on the wreck of the "Oravia". The Argentine Government kindly assisted by allowing their Warship "SAN MARTIN" to receive messages from the Stanley Station and re-transmit them to country of destination. Later, telegrams were received and sent via the Rio Grande do Sul Station (Junccao) belonging to the Brazilian Govt., this Station though some 1300 miles distant maintained good communication with the Stanley Station. From October, 1913, almost all telegrams received and sent have been transmitted through the Cerrito Station, Monte Video, owned by the Uruguayan Government. Vessels approaching via Cape Horn usually communicate with the Stanley Station.

During the hours of night some remarkable results have been obtained. In many instances signals have been heard over 2,000 miles away. Cape St. Thome Station in Brazil is often heard quite distinctly, as also the high power station at Lima, Peru.

Vessels are constantly heard on the West Coast of S. America. H. M. Battle Cruiser "NEW ZEALAND" while on her passage home was heard some distance west of Cape Horn.

Wireless communication was held periodically with Whaling Factories at the South Shetlands during the whaling season. Communication was not continuously maintained owing in part to the geographical configuration of Deception Harbour in relation to the Falklands. In many instances where the S.S. "HECTORIA" could not get in touch with the Falkland Station, she was able to get in touch with steamers on the West Coast of S. America or vessels approaching Cape Horn; this would seem to show that the high land surrounding the harbour to the north and east affects communication with Stanley.

The Wireless Station erected at Punta Arenas, Chile, was communicated with during the latter part of the year but no satisfactory service has so far been arranged. A regular daylight service with Punta Arenas would be of immense advantage to the Colony as it would overcome the difficulty frequently experienced at night from severe atmospherics. Daylight tests have been made with Punta Arenas and found to be satisfactory.

In the near future the Government propose to erect a small Station at Fox Bay, West Falkland. This Station while breaking down the isolation of the West Falklands will be found of great advantage to Colonists and should result in a fair amount of traffic.

Telephones.

The Stanley Telephone Exchange was completed and opened for public service in May, 1912, during that year the number of paid calls amounted to 870. During the year 1913, the number of paid calls was 1182.

The inauguration of the Telephone System has been found to be a general benefit to the community in Stanley and to those persons residing in Camp districts connected by telephone.

The Revenue received for telephones services in 1912 was £58/2/11 and in 1913, £95/15/4.

The number of private instruments rented in Stanley at the end of 1913 totalled 15 (including extensions).

There is every indication that other Stations on the East Falkland will shortly become connected by telephone.

The completion of the Telephone Exchange and the Wireless Station in 1912, mark two of the most important events in the history of the Colony.

Postage Stamps.

Details of the sales of postage stamps and other stamped postal matter during the years 1912 and 1913 will be found in Appendix E.

The total value of stamps, post cards, etc., sold was £2155/5/8½ or a decrease of £753/11/7 as compared with the figures for 1912. The large sales in 1912 are accounted for by the new issue of stamps bearing the effigy of H. M. King George V.

The 1d. stamp commanded the largest sale followed successively by the ½d, 2½d, 2d, 1s/- and 6d denominations. Sales of higher value stamps such as 5s/- and 3s/- hold well. The sale of post cards in 1913, shows a considerable increase over the number sold during the previous year.

Money Orders.

Issued. The total value of money orders issued during 1913, was £10350/17/2 as against £10159/10/11, in 1912, showing a very slight difference in this particular class of business.

Paid. The total value of money orders paid during 1913, was £570/6/7 as against £1037/5/6 paid during the preceding year.

Postal Orders.

The sales of postal orders during the years under review have increased considerably. The number sold in 1912 was 2687 and the number in 1913, 2744. Although there is a difference in the numbers of Orders sold the values for each year are only slightly different. The value sold in 1912, was £1320/15/6, and that in 1913, £1321/9/0.

The denomination commanding largest sale was the £1 postal order followed successively by the 10/-, 5/- and 2s/6d.

The number of postal orders issued and repaid in the Colony only amounted to 11:

The value of postal orders issued on the Colony averages about £18 a month.

Parcel Post.

The total number of parcels received from and despatched to the United Kingdom during the year, 1912, was 5786, value £8650/16/3, and the number dealt with during the year, 1913, was 5517 parcels value £9526/9/1.

The revenue received from this source in 1912, was £274/9/0, and the amount received in 1913, £289/6/11, showing a slight increase of £14/17/11.

A few parcels were lost in the wreck of the R. M. S. "ORAVIA" in November, 1912: senders filed their claims for compensation at the office of origin in England.

It is satisfactory to note that, notwithstanding the large number of parcels handled locally, and the many places in the Colony to which they were despatched, no claims for loss were received.

Personal.

On completion of the Telephone Exchange in May, 1912, Miss N. Aldridge was appointed operator. During the year Mr Albert Newing, Postal Clerk, was transferred to South Georgia as Customs Officer. Mr. N. C. Watt at present Acting Deputy Collector, New Island, was appointed Postal Clerk vice Mr. Newing. Miss I. Atkins, Lady Assistant, was appointed temporarily and provisionally to act as Postal Clerk. Miss E. M. Pearce was appointed temporarily and provisionally to act as Lady Assistant. Bertram Sedgwick was appointed Post Boy and Messenger in place of Henry Aldridge resigned.

From May to October Mr. E. Binnie was appointed to act as Postmaster during the time I was acting as Colonial Treasurer. At the end of October I again resumed my postal duties in addition to those of acting Treasurer and continued to control both Departments until I handed over the Treasury on the 9th December.

Miscellaneous.

A Post Office and Savings Bank Guide, which it is hoped will be of use to Colonists, has been completed and is now being printed in England.

Imperial Institute.

Reports for Private Individuals on Technical Subjects.

His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified for general information that he has been informed by the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies that yearly increasing demands are being made on the Imperial Institute by private individuals and firms for reports on technical subjects.

In the past it has generally been impossible to accede to such requests owing to the pressure of other work, but at the same time the Secretary of State is of opinion that the conduct of such investigations may be regarded as a legitimate function of the Institute. Authority has accordingly been given for researches, investigations, analyses, etc., required by private individuals and firms in His Majesty's overseas dominions to be undertaken in consideration of an appropriate fee.

It is, however, undesirable that the Imperial Institute should compete with the professional expert and it will be left to the authorities of the Institute to decide in the case of each application whether or no the request for researches, etc., is one that can properly be complied with.

The following are some of the more important matters with which the Imperial Institute is in a special position to deal:

- (a) Investigations as to the value of new or little known raw materials for commercial purposes.
- (b) Chemical analyses, assays and valuations of raw materials such as food-stuffs, essential and fixed oils, drugs, soils, minerals, ores, waters, fuels, etc., etc.
- (c) The technical testing of timbers fibres cements and other materials.
- (d) Identifications of vegetable and mineral substances.

Any reports which may be supplied under this arrangement will become the property of those who pay for them and will not be communicated either by the Imperial Institute or by any Government to other persons, or published without the consent of those concerned.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

LETTERS PATENT passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom providing for the appointment of a Deputy to the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Dated 19th September, 1914.

George the Fifth by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To all whom these presents shall come, Greeting.

Recites Letters Patent of 25th February, 1892.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent passed under the Great Seal of our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-fifth day of February 1892, Her Majesty Queen Victoria did declare that there should be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief (therein and hereinafter called "the Governor") in and over our Colony of the Falkland Islands (therein and hereinafter called "the Colony"):

And whereas by the Fourteenth Clause of the aforesaid Letters Patent certain provision was made for the administration of the Government of the Colony during the absence therefrom of the Governor:

And whereas we are minded to make further provision for the administration of the Government during the temporary absence of the Governor from the seat of Government or from the Colony:

Now therefore We do hereby ordain and declare
Our will and pleasure as follows:—

I. In the event of the Governor having occasion at any time to be temporarily absent for a short period from the seat of Government, or to leave the Colony for the purpose of visiting any Dependency thereof, he may by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Colony appoint any person resident in the Colony to be his Deputy during such temporary absence, and in that capacity to exercise, perform, and execute for and on behalf of the Governor during such absence, but no longer, all such powers and authorities vested in the Governor as shall in and by such instrument be specified and limited, but no others. Every such Deputy shall conform to and observe all such instructions as the Governor shall from time to time address to him for his guidance. Provided nevertheless that by the appointment of a Deputy as aforesaid the power and authority of the Governor shall not be abridged, altered or in any way affected otherwise than We may at any time hereafter think proper to direct.

Appointment of Deputy to Governor.

The Governor, during his passage by sea to or from any Dependency of the Colony, shall not, if he shall have appointed a Deputy, be considered absent from the Colony within the meaning of the Fourteenth Clause of the above-recited Letters Patent of the Twenty-fifth day of February 1892.

II. And We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, full power and authority from time to time to revoke, alter or amend these Our Letters Patent as to Us or them shall seem fit.

Power reserved to His Majesty to revoke, alter, or amend the present Letters Patent.

III. And We do further direct and enjoin that these Our Letters Patent shall be proclaimed at such place or places within the Colony as the Governor may think fit.

Port Regulations.

Owing to the existence of a state of war Stanley Harbour and its approaches are being placed in a condition of Naval and Military defence. Under the power and authority in him vested by Section 2 of The Harbour Ordinance 1902, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

3. No vessel is to be permitted to enter Stanley Harbour (i.e. the land-locked water to the west and south-west of a line drawn from Cape Pembroke to William Point) until she has received permission by signal from the Lighthouse or from the Examination Steamer.

Port Regulations. (No. 1.)

Owing to the existence of a state of war Stanley Harbour and its approaches have been placed in a condition of Naval and Military defence. Wherefore under the power and authority in him vested by Section 2 of The Harbour Ordinance 1902, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

1. No vessel is to anchor in the inner harbour to the eastward of a line joining Magnetic Observation Spot and the Slaughter house at the East end of Stanley, or, in Port William, to the eastward of a line drawn N. 10 W. true from Navy Point.
2. No vessel is to enter Stanley Harbour (i.e. the landlocked water lying to the west and south-west of a line joining Cape Pembroke and William Point) until she has received permission by signal from the Lighthouse or from the Examination Steamer.
3. No vessel is to leave the Harbour unless
 - (a) four hours notice has first been given to the Naval authorities, or in their absence to the Port authorities,
 - (b) permission to leave has been obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, or, in the absence of Naval authorities, from the Port authorities,
 - (c) the Government Pilot is on board. In the event of the Government Pilot being absent in the outer harbour, arrangements may be made whereby the vessel will proceed to Ordnance Point where the Government Pilot will be taken on board.
4. A copy of these Regulations will be delivered by the Government Pilot to all Masters of vessels arriving at the Port.
5. The Regulations dated 18th November, 1914, are hereby rescinded.

Education Report for 1913 by the Deputy Government Inspector of Schools.

Progress in the "Camp" Districts has been well maintained during the past year: the advent of new school-masters has been very much welcomed, and they have already created very favourable impressions both with parents and children.

This is a very difficult work, and I am glad to say there has been a greater co-operation by the parents.

The children I have examined in the "Camp" Districts, both private pupils and ordinary school children, have shewn up distinctly good work, which is the outcome of systematic teaching. A re-arrangement of "beats" on the West Falklands has taken place, and this move will no doubt prove beneficial to the children.

Appended is the Report from the Head Master of the Government School, Stanley, on the years work at the School:—

"During the past year there has been steady progress in the Government School, attested by the three periodical examinations. The number on the roll is 158, and the attendance through the year has been quite satisfactory.

New features in the year's work include a Dental Clinic, and quite a number of scholars have had their teeth attended to by the Government Dentist. An extension of the Inter-School Correspondence—by which quite a number of the children are now writing to others in England, Tasmania, New Zealand, and different parts of Canada—has also taken place.

Hygiene is also taught to the children as a part of the curriculum in as practical a way as possible."

I may add that I have seen some of the needlework done by the elder girls. This reflects the very highest credit upon Mrs. Souter and those who teach it. Three new Pupil Teachers have joined the staff this past year, and are, I believe, doing very well.

ESTIMATES, 1915.

(MESSAGE INTRODUCING.)

Read in Council, 10th November, 1914.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,—

I have the honour to lay before you the Estimates for the year 1915. Owing to the existence of a state of war between His Majesty the King and the Emperors of Germany and Austria-Hungary it has been found impossible to prepare them at an earlier date. The same cause materially interferes with the reliability that usually attaches to estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the succeeding year.

REVENUE.

2. The Ordinary Revenue has been estimated at £21,073, representing a decrease of £6,652 on the corresponding estimate for the year 1914. The above is based on the supposition that hostilities will continue throughout 1915. A falling off is anticipated under all Divisions except those of Rent and Interest which are likely to remain stationary.

EXPENDITURE.

3. The Ordinary Expenditure (exclusive of Public Works Extraordinary—which will be dealt with later—and payments under Live Stock Ordinance, £685) is £43,704, as compared with an approved expenditure for 1914 of £23,181, and a revised expenditure of £29,773.

4. Division I. **Pensions.** The Appendix shews that pensions amounting to £763 12s. 8d. have already been sanctioned, and that a further sum of £165 14s. 5d. has been provided on account of pensions which are likely to become due during 1915.

5. Division II. **Governor.** Item 9. A sum of £20 has been inserted on account of oil for use in the public rooms at Government House.

6. Division III. **Colonial Secretary.** Item 12. The telegram vote has been increased by £20.

7. Division IV. **Treasury and Customs.** Items 6 and 7. It has been found necessary to station a second Customs Officer, temporarily and provisionally, at South Georgia, and provision has been made for a Customs Officer to accompany the whaling expeditions to the South Orkneys and for additional assistance at New Island.

8. Division VII. **Legal.** Items 2, 5 and 6. For the purpose of more efficient administration it has been decided to revive the appointment of Stipendiary Magistrate, West Falkland. The officer appointed will require to accompany the annual whaling expeditions to the South Shetlands, and will have his headquarters at Deception Island for a period of approximately four months during the whaling season. The coal and oil for the Stipendiary Magistrate's office at South Georgia has not hitherto been shewn on the annual Estimates. It is essential that the Magistrate should be provided with a typewriter.

9. Division XIII. **Miscellaneous.** Item 4. The duties of Storekeeper have hitherto been performed by the Chief Constable who was likewise Outdoor Foreman, but the arrangement was not entirely satisfactory. As the new Drill Instructor is also to be Chief Constable it has been considered advisable to put the Government Store in charge of the Harbour Master and to allow the latter a small salary of £18 per annum on this account. For the past twelve months he has been performing these additional duties gratis. Item 6. The increase of Government buildings, including the new Town Hall, has necessitated an advance of £35 under Fire Insurance. Item 9. A sum of £25 has been added to the Imperial Institute vote for the purpose of assisting the new organization of the Technical Information Bureau. Item 10. It has been thought advisable to make an annual contribution of £100 to the Anglo-Swedish Scientific Station in Graham's Land, in return for which the Colony will be supplied with all information obtained by the expedition regarding whales.

10. Division XIV. **Military.** Items 2 and 8. Provision has been made at a cost of £15,600, for keeping the Volunteers on active service during the whole year. Item 4. In order to maintain and increase the efficiency of the Volunteer Corps arrangements have been made to meet the expense of additional arms and ammunition. Item 7. Some new uniforms are badly needed. The details of this Division shew that there is an increased estimated expenditure for the year of £17,755 caused by the outbreak of hostilities in Europe.

11. Division XVI. **Post Office.** Item 11. The growing importance and the extreme isolation of our Dependency of South Georgia renders a direct Mail Service highly desirable. A sum of £3,600 has been provided on this account, and Tenders for a monthly service between King Edward Cove and Stanley have been invited in the English and Norwegian papers. Item 12. A small addition has been made to the local Interinsular subsidy.

12. Division XVII. **Colonial Engineer.** Item 1. The Secretary of State has been pleased to confirm the appointment of Mr. R. B. Baseley as Colonial Engineer. The increasing importance of the Works Department necessitated the appointment of a permanent official, and the Colony is to be congratulated on securing an officer who has already shewn his capabilities and qualifications for the post by the results obtained during the last three years. Item 2. Provision has been made for an apprentice at the Wireless Station at a salary of £50. Items 10 and 13. The Carters and the Scavenger at present receive a wage rather less than that paid to the ordinary labourer. The salary of the former (of whom there are two) is now raised by £6, while the Scavenger will receive an additional £7. Item 11. A difficulty has been experienced in obtaining a boy for the sanitary carter at the wage of £18, and the remuneration has therefore been raised to £24. Item 18. The forage vote has been found to be inadequate and has therefore been increased by £50.

13. Division XVIII. **Savings Bank.** The satisfactory condition of this institution, and the marked increase of business in late years, in conjunction with the profits earned, warrant the payment to the Manager of a small salary. This officer has hitherto received no remuneration. A sum of £50 has therefore been inserted on this account.

14. Division XX. **Public Works Recurrent.** Item 2. The vote for Repair of Buildings has been raised to £500, the figure at which it stood for many years before 1914.

15. In approaching the question of **Public Works Extraordinary** it is desirable again to call attention to the fact that the estimated ordinary Revenue for 1915 is £21,073 and that the estimated ordinary Expenditure, exclusive of the special Military Expenditure of £17,755 already referred to, is £25,949, shewing a debit balance as against Revenue, of £4,876. Should hostilities cease next year, or should the naval situation permit of the Volunteer Corps being no longer needed for active service, local finances would thereby be at once very sensibly relieved. Indeed in the case of the former, the estimate of Revenue would undoubtedly be exceeded and a modified Public Works Programme could be undertaken.

16. In these circumstances I have thought it expedient to insert a number of items involving a total expenditure of £4,850 which I would invite the Council to approve subject to the following condition, *i.e.*, should the Governor-in-Council consider it feasible to undertake the works in question with due regard to the revenue and to local conditions, they will be undertaken; but not otherwise. The matter is one which, with your concurrence, might very well be left to the discretion of the Executive.

17. Notwithstanding a heavy expenditure £5,298 under "Military," and a donation of £2,250 to the Prince of Wales National Relief Fund, the total Expenditure for 1914 should not exceed the ordinary Revenue, but unfortunately there will be no available balance to carry forward to meet the very heavy Expenditure for next year. It follows therefore that either our accumulated assets, *i.e.*, the Land Sales Fund, which is our Capital, must be drawn upon and consequently reduced, or some new method must be found for making good the deficit of Revenue for 1915.

18. After careful consideration of the subject I consider that the most equitable manner of meeting that deficit, when the amount is definitely ascertained, would be the introduction hereafter of a graduated land war tax, extending over one or more years. Meanwhile such monies as may be required in 1915 should be borrowed from Land Sales Fund and paid back later with interest.

19. Before closing this message I desire to avail myself of the opportunity of placing on record my appreciation, first, of the way in which so many of the Colonists at once came forward and enlisted as Volunteers on the outbreak of hostilities, and second, of the loyalty and patriotism of those who have supported and assisted me in this national crisis. The generous contributions which have been made to the Prince of Wales National Relief Fund, which now total over £4,000, alone indicate, were further proof wanted, the intense loyalty and sympathy, coupled with the keenest desire to help the Motherland.

Proclamation.

In the name of His Majesty, George V., of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, &c., &c., &c.,

By His Excellency WILLIAM LAMOND ALLARDYCE, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS by my Proclamation of the 6th August, 1914, I did specify certain articles which would be regarded as contraband of war; and WHEREAS this list of articles has been subsequently added to; and WHEREAS it is expedient to consolidate the said lists and to make certain additions thereto;

NOW THEREFORE, I, William Lamond Allardyce, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, as aforesaid, do hereby proclaim that the lists of articles of contraband given in Gazette Notices Nos. 165 and 201 of 1914, and No. 17 of 1915 are hereby withdrawn, and that in lieu thereof, and during the continuance of the present war or until further public notice, the articles enumerated in Schedule I hereto will be treated as absolute contraband, and the articles enumerated in Schedule II hereto will be treated as conditional contraband.

SCHEDULE I.

1. ARMS of all kinds, including arms for sporting purposes, and their distinctive component parts.
2. PROJECTILES, CHARGES and CARTRIDGES of all kinds, and their distinctive component parts.
3. POWDER and explosives specially prepared for use in war.
4. SULPHURIC ACID.
5. GUN MOUNTINGS, limber boxes, limbers, military wagons, field forges and their distinctive component parts.
6. RANGE FINDERS and their distinctive component parts.
7. CLOTHING and equipment of a distinctly military character.
8. SADDLE, DRAUGHT and PACK animals suitable for use in war.
9. All kinds of HARNESS of a distinctively military character.
10. Articles of camp equipment and their distinctive component parts.
11. ARMOUR PLATES.
12. HEMATITE IRON ORE and haematite pig iron.
13. IRON PYRITES.
14. NICKEL ORE and nickel.
15. FERROCHROME and chrome ore.

GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK,

STANLEY, 18th December, 1914

SIR,

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1914.

2. During the year 85 accounts were opened and 37 closed; leaving a total of 541 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £79,434 9s. 3d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £146 16s. 7d. standing to the credit of each account, or £34 19s. 3d. per head of the population of the Falklands, computing the population at 2,272.

3. Interest amounting to £1,644 14s. 1d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £80 16s. 6d. less than that paid in 1912-13. The amount of Deposits for the year was the largest since the foundation of the Bank and exceeded the withdrawals for the same period by £9,032 13s. 4d. The amount of withdrawals for the year showed a decrease of £6,688 as compared with the withdrawals in the previous year, and is the lowest recorded in the last 5 years.

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £2,317 9s. 1d. and the expenses incurred £1,648 14s. 1d. leaving a profit of £668 15s. 0d., or £75 13s. 1d. more than the profit derived in the previous year.

5. The investments held on account of the Bank on the 30th September, last, amounted to £69,016 4s. 2d. Owing to the unusually heavy deposits and small withdrawals the uninvested balance on that date amounted to £10,418 5s. 1d. If the present situation permits of investments being made to advantage I recommend that a further sum of £5,000 be invested on account of Savings Bank Funds.

6. In view of the present uncertainty of the money market and the fact that no Stock Exchange Official list for 30th September last has been received, the market value of Savings Bank Investments on that date has not been inserted.

An Ordinance to Amend the Whale Fishery
Ordinance, 1908, with Regard to the Export
of Whale Oil.

Preamble.

WHEREAS a state of war exists between His Majesty the King and the Emperors of Germany and Austria-Hungary, and whereas it is necessary to take such measures as may effectively control the export of whale oil and prevent its importation into an enemy country.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Bond to be given for delivery of Oil in United Kingdom.

1. Any person or company licensed under the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908, or any lessee of land granted for the purpose of carrying on whaling operations, shall, on making the customary declaration of the amount of whale oil about to be exported and the country of destination, give a bond to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy for the delivery in the United Kingdom of such consignment of oil.

Penalty.

2. Any person or company contravening or attempting to contravene Section 1 of this Ordinance shall not only forfeit his bond but shall be likewise liable to the summary cancellation of his lease or license by the Governor-in-Council.

Exception by Proclamation.

3. Notwithstanding the above it shall be lawful for the Governor-in-Council in his discretion by Proclamation from time to time to permit the export of whale oil to specified countries other than the United Kingdom, and from time to time to alter, amend, modify, or repeal such Proclamations.

Short Title.

4. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Whale Oil (War) Ordinance, 1915," and shall be read as one with the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908.

Passed by the Legislative Council the 22nd day of January, 1915.

4. Telegram from the Viceroy of India giving details of the attitude of the Indian Empire to the war, and speeches made by the members of the Legislative Council of India. 9th September, 1914.
5. List of offers from Chiefs and others resident in or on visits to the United Kingdom.
6. Resolution moved by the Secretary of State for India in the House of Lords with reference to the maintenance of the Indian Forces. 16th September, 1914.
7. Similar Resolution moved in the House of Commons by the Prime Minister (Mr. Asquith). 16th September, 1914.
8. Further telegram from Viceroy of India with reference to further acceptances on the part of the Government of further tokens of India's very striking exhibition of patriotism.



Whereas a state of war exists between His Majesty the King and the Sultan of Turkey, owing to the hostile acts committed by Turkish forces under German officers, and whereas a state of war exists between His Majesty the King and the Emperors of Germany and Austria-Hungary, and whereas a Proclamation has been issued in London extending certain Proclamations and Orders-in-Council connected with the state of war between His Majesty the King and the Emperors of Germany and Austria-Hungary to cover the state of war now existing between His Majesty and the Sultan of Turkey.

Now, therefore, I, William Lamond Allardyce, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, do hereby publish, promulgate and proclaim, that all Commands, Conditions, Prohibitions and Penalties imposed upon all loyal subjects of His Majesty the King in all Proclamations and Orders-in-Council contained in the Falkland Islands Gazettes Extraordinary published by my authority on the eighth day of August, 1914, and on the twenty-second day of August, 1914, having relation to the conduct and bearing of His Majesty's subjects towards the German and Austro-Hungarian Emperors their Empires and subjects, shall be deemed to have equal and similar effect with regard to the bearing and conduct of His Majesty's subjects towards the Sultan of Turkey, his Empire and subjects.

Cinematograph Regulations, 1915.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by the Cinematograph Ordinance, 1912, His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:

1. No child under the age of 14 shall be permitted to enter any Cinematograph Entertainment or Exhibition held after the hour of 7.30 p.m.
 2. In any case of infringement of Regulation 1 proceedings may be taken under Section 7 of the Ordinance against the parent or guardian of the child causing the infringement.
 3. If it appears to the Chief Constable or other officer appointed under Section 5 of the Ordinance to enter any premises in which an Entertainment or Exhibition is being or about to be held, that an infringement of Regulation 1 is being brought about or connived at by the person or persons holding or about to hold such Entertainment or Exhibition, proceedings may also be taken against such person or persons holding or about to hold such Entertainment or Exhibition.
 4. These Regulations may be cited as "The Cinematograph Regulations, 1915."

An Ordinance to Amend the Volunteer Ordinance, 1893.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. Every Volunteer when called out on active service by Proclamation under the hand of the Governor shall receive from the Government such pay and allowances, quartering and billeting, as the Governor-in-Council shall from time to time direct, and while in receipt of such will not be entitled to claim pay from his employer, except at such times and under such conditions as are hereinafter specified.

Pay and Allowances.

2. When on the written request of an employer a Volunteer is permitted or instructed by the Commanding Officer temporarily to resume his civil employment no payment shall be made by the Government in respect of the period during which such Volunteer shall be released from military duty, and the employer shall pay full wages to the Volunteer in respect of such time as he shall work for his employer during the period of such release.

Pay on release from military duties.

3. Should any employer apply for the temporary services of Volunteers other than his own employees, he shall be responsible for the full payment, at the current rate of wage, of such men as may be selected by the Commanding Officer with the approval of the Governor to perform such work in respect of such time as they are thus employed.

Prevention of employees from becoming Volunteers.

4. If it is brought to the knowledge of the Commanding Officer that any employer, by threats or otherwise, wilfully prevented or endeavoured to prevent an employee from becoming a Volunteer at any time during which the Volunteer Force or any part thereof is on active service, the Commanding Officer may institute proceedings against such employer, and any employer convicted under this section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence.

Regulations.

5. The Governor-in-Council may from time to time make, amend, and revoke Regulations appertaining to the general management, discipline, and control of the Volunteer Force, and such Regulations may provide for the punishment of any infraction thereof.

Courts-Martial.

6. At such times as the need arises and it appears to the Governor, having regard to the officers at his disposal, that the provisions of the Army (Annual) Act with regard to Courts-Martial cannot be given effect to, it shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint such Officers as he may consider desirable to sit on Courts-Martial which shall have all the powers and responsibilities attaching under the Army (Annual) Act above mentioned to Regimental, District, General, and Field General Courts-Martial as the case may be.

Repeal.

7. Sections 11 and 13 of the Volunteer Ordinance, 1893, are hereby repealed.

Short Title

8. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Volunteer Active Service Ordinance, 1915" and shall be read and construed as one with the "Volunteer Ordinance, 1893."



Education Report for 1914 by the Government Inspector of Schools.

The past year has not been very satisfactory from an Educational point of view. On the return of the headmaster and headmistress from leave, it was proved that the standard of work in the Government Schools had fallen off very considerably. Discipline had become slack, largely owing to lack of co-operation among the Teachers. Before these defects could be remedied, war broke out, and the departure of women and children from Port Stanley to safer places of abode in various parts of the camp, necessitated the closing of the Schools for a period of time. Mr. and Mrs. Souter, the headmaster and headmistress in question had received by the end of the year, preferment to another Colony. It is to be hoped that their successors will show the same amount of conscientiousness, and thoroughness as they have done. In the camps steady and satisfactory work was done by the Teachers. Here again the exigences of the war made tuition in the latter part of the year, impossible in some parts of the camp. Several of the Teachers were members of the Colony's Defence Force, and were withdrawn to take up military services.



Report of the Colonial Treasurer for the year 1914.

TREASURY,

Stanley, Falkland Islands,

24th April, 1915.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit herewith returns (numbered 1 to 12) called for under Article 396 of the Financial Regulations, together with a draft of the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance in respect of the year ended 31st December 1914.

2. The total Revenue collected amounted to £42,932 8s. 6d. as against £36,765 estimated. It includes £8,365 10s. 3d. instalments of land purchase, and £807 3s. 6d. collected for Land Tax, under the Live Stock Ordinance, leaving a total Ordinary Revenue of £33,759 14s. 9d, being £6,034 14s. 9d. over that estimated. Compared with the previous year, it shows an increase of £1,475 2s. 5d.

3. The following shows the heads of Revenue with the amounts in excess of the estimates:—

4. The only head of Revenue which failed to realize the amount estimated was "Miscellaneous", which was under by £37 0s. 4d.

5. Head 1. **Customs Duties £11,960 : 10 : 10.** Both the Import and Export Duties exceeded the estimate; the former by £457 8s. 11d. and the latter by £733 1s. 11d. but fell short of the receipts for the previous year by £1,089 13s. 7d. This was no doubt due to the unsettled state of affairs in Europe and elsewhere, in consequence of the war. The most noticeable decrease was under "Imports on Tobacco, South Georgia" (£819 17s. 4d. less than in 1913) and "Exports on Whale Oil, South Georgia" (£480 5s. 8d. less than in 1912.)

6. Head 2. **Port Dues £640 : 14 : 0.** All the Items under this head with the exception of "Wharfage" exceeded the estimate, but fell short of the receipts for the previous year, with the exception of "Pilotage." The increase in the latter was due to the whaling fleet calling at Stanley instead of at New Island as formerly.

7. Head 3. **Internal Revenue £5,311 : 4 : 1.** The total receipts under "Licences" exceeded the estimate by £1,604 5s. 2d. and was £706 17s. 8d. more than the previous year. This increase was mainly due to the extra "Floating Factory Licences" issued during the 1914-15 whaling season. The receipts in respect of Sealing Licences were £110 under the estimate, and £130 less than in the previous year. No Auctioneer's Licence appears to have been issued in 1914. The receipts in respect of Stanley Rates under "Taxes" exceeded the estimate by £37 17s. 11d. and were £20 5s. 6d. more than the previous year.

8. Head 4. **Fees, Fines, £2,466 : 7 : 3.** The increase under this head was due to the very large probate duty collected under "Supreme Court" (£1,469 6s. 1d.) which exceeded the estimate by £1,169 6s. 1d. and was £975 7s. 6d. more than the previous year. It was the largest collected since 1911, and exceeded the average for the five previous years by £838 3s. 1. The fees collected for services of Customs Officers exceeded the estimate by £232 0s. 4d. and were £60 2s. more than in 1913. Reimbursements amounting to £734 3s. 10d. were made during the year, leaving a true revenue under this head of £1,732 3s. 5d.

9. Head 5. **Interest £6,836 : 15 : 3.** All the items under this head exceeded the estimate with the exception of interest on Land Sales investments, which was under by £114 5s. 0d, but exceeded the receipts for the previous year by £221 16s. 4d; this was due to over estimating, no account being taken of the £4,400, transferred to General Revenue from the Land Sales Fund in 1913. There has been a very satisfactory increase during the last four years, in the interest collected on Land Sales investments, as the following shows:—

The interest on Currency Funds invested amounted to £131 : 12 : 6, of which £40 : 3 : 3, was expended in the purchase of new notes, and expenses of management, leaving a balance of £91 : 9 : 3, transferred to revenue.

10. Head 6. **Post Office £3,498 : 17 : 1.** The total receipts under this head were the largest on record, being £130 : 1 : 0 over that collected in 1912, the next best year. There was a slight falling off in the receipts for Commission on money orders, which were £18 : 14 : 7 less than in 1913. The increase under Post Office was due to the sums collected in respect of Wireless Messages, (£274 : 11 : 8) and for the sale of Stamps, (£2,799 : 10 : 10).

11. Head 7. **Rents £2,952 : 6 : 7.** This head shows an amount of £352 : 6 : 7 in excess of the estimate, but there was really no appreciable increase, as no account was taken in the estimates of the rental due in respect of the lease to the Hektor Whaling Co., of land at Port Foster, Deception Island, (£250). There was a small increase of about £63, in respect of the rental of Government houses in Stanley.

12. Head 8. **Miscellaneous. £92 : 19 : 8.** The largest decrease under this head was under the item "Sale of Stores", which was £39 : 2 : 0 under the estimate, and £44 : 10 : 4, less than in the previous year, being the smallest amount collected since 1891. With the exception of "Sale of Ballast", and "Unforseen", all the other items under this head exceeded the estimate.

13. Notwithstanding the set back to trade caused by the war, the Revenue compares most favourably with that of other years. Had there been no war, there is every reason to believe that the year would have been a very prosperous one and the Revenue the largest on record.

14. The Expenditure during the year amounted to £36,046 19s. 4d. as against £27,512 estimated. It includes £547 0s. 1d. disbursed in carrying into effect the provisions of the Live Stock Ordinance. The total Expenditure for the year, excluding Live Stock, but including Public Works Extraordinary, amounted to £35,499 19s. 3d. as against £26,935 estimated, making an excess of £8,564 19s. 3d. over the amount originally estimated.

The total Expenditure for the year, exclusive of Live Stock, exceeded the total Ordinary Revenue by £1,740 4s. 6d. which if deducted from the accumulated Surplus Revenue at the beginning of the year, (£4,701 9s. 10d.) leaves a Surplus Ordinary Revenue on the 31st December, of £2,961 5s. 4d. as against £5,491 estimated.

20. There is no Public Debt; on the other hand the Colony has a Surplus Fund, (the Land Sales Fund), and a Live Stock Fund, which amounted to £109,118 : 1 : 5 and £2,004 : 6 : 9 respectively, on the 31st December. The former fund was over invested on the 31st December, by £7 : 7 : 4.

21. The Savings Bank transactions during the year shows an increase of £8,775 : 11 : 11, the balance due to depositors on the 31st December, being £82,013 : 10 : 3, as against £73,237 : 18 : 4, on the 31st December 1913. Of the total deposits £69,016 : 4 : 2 is invested as shown by Return 7, leaving a balance of £12,997 : 6 : 1, uninvested. The interest on investments amounted to £2,326 : 2 : 6, and the interest credited to depositors, with expenses of management, amounted to £1821 : 6 : 1, the difference £504 : 16 : 5, going to the credit of revenue.

22. The financial transactions during the year, may be said on the whole to be satisfactory. The Revenue, exclusive of the receipts in respect of Land Purchase, and the Live Stock land tax, exceeded the Ordinary Expenditure by £2,216 : 13 : 10. The expenditure on Public Works Extraordinary, which amounted to £3,956 : 18 : 4, was met out of the excess revenue for the year, together with £1740 : 4 : 6, of the accumulated excess revenue of previous years.



An Ordinance to Empower the Summary Cancellation by the Governor of Leases and Licenses granted for the purpose of enabling the Lessees and Licensees to carry on Whaling Operations in the waters of the Falkland Islands and Dependencies.

WHEREAS a state of war exists between His Majesty and the Emperor of Germany, and whereas the Governor is informed by His Majesty's Government that with a view to preventing whale oil exported from this Colony and its Dependencies to neutral countries from being exported thence to Germany it is necessary in the national interests that licenses to take whales in Colonial waters and leases granted for the purpose of enabling the lessees to carry on whale fishing in Colonial Waters shall be liable to cancellation by the Governor,

Preamble.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Whale Fishery Regulation Ordinance, 1915."

Short Title.

2. If instructed by the Secretary of State so to do, the Governor may by writing under his hand declare any lease or license empowering any person to take whales in Colonial Waters to be cancelled and such lease or license shall thereupon become void and of no effect.

Power of Governor to cancel leases and licenses.

3. Any declaration made by the Governor under the last preceding section shall be published in the Gazette as soon as may be and such publication shall be sufficient notice to all concerned.

Cancellation to be published in Gazette, and to be sufficient notice.

No action to be taken against Governor.

4. No action shall be brought against the Governor or any person duly authorized by him in respect of any acts done or omitted to be done in pursuance of this Ordinance.

Remittance of portion of fees or rent paid.

5. The Governor may direct a proportionate part of any fee or rent which has been paid in advance in respect of the year during which a license or lease has been cancelled to be returned to the person by whom it was paid.

Dependencies.

6. This Ordinance shall apply to the Dependencies.

Passed the Legislative Council this 1st day of May, 1915.



Report of the Colonial Dental Surgeon for the year 1914.*

In reviewing the year's work the months extending from August to December must not be taken into consideration, owing to the fact that I was engaged in military duties in Stanley and Government service on the West Falkland. The progress in all branches of dental work has improved in comparison with that of 1913; I will deal with each branch separately.

THE GOVERNMENT SCHOOL DENTAL CLINIC.

It will be seen by the above figures the number of visits, fillings and extractions has doubled on the previous year. The children have displayed a keener interest in the care of their teeth, evidenced by the fact that there is a more liberal use of the tooth-brush and that there has been a more even attendance on their part.

I procured a special set of lantern slides illustrating the types of teeth, decay, and the results of neglect. These were explained in simple language to the children at the School, who paid marked attention. Two lectures of this nature were given at the School and would have been followed by more had not the war intervened.

DENTAL WORK IN THE CAMPS.

The work done in the Camps in 1913 was small owing to the fact that only about two months were spent there; in 1914 nearly five and a half months were occupied in Camp work. The Camps include East and West Falklands. In all twelve stations were visited; every facility was offered by the various Managers of the Stations in enabling me to get from one Station to another.

Auditor's Report on the transactions of the Commissioners of Currency for the year, 1914.

STANLEY,

7th May, 1915.

Sir,

I have the honour to report that I have this day examined the books of the Commissioners of Currency for the year ending December 31st 1914, and find that the transactions have been duly and properly entered therein and accounted for.

2. In view of the extraordinary conditions prevailing in the Colony in consequence of the war the gold reserve of £3750 was transferred from the Government vault to London and placed on deposit with the London and Westminster Bank Limited.

3. The investment portion of the Note Guarantee Fund remains at the purchase value of £3750, the face value securities being £3989, but it is not possible to estimate its present market value. In all probability it would not be immediately realizable except at a considerable loss, and in this connection I would call attention to my last report (March 30th 1914).

4. In consequence of warlike operations during a portion of the period under review it was decided to destroy a considerable number of Notes; a subsequent issue of other Notes partially balanced this, but in place of Notes to the value of £7500 which were in circulation at the end of 1913, there were only Notes to the value of £6456 10s. 0d. in circulation at the close of 1914, these being made up as follows;—

809 Notes of £5 face value	£4045
2352 Notes of £1 face value	£2352
238 Notes of 5/- face value	£59 10s.

5. Whereas the gold reserve and the investment portion of the Note Fund together amount to £7500, whilst the value of the Notes in circulation, as shewn in the previous paragraph, is only £6456 10s. the Commissioners are liable for the balance of £1043 10s. This will doubtless be met by a corresponding further issue of Notes during the present year.

6. The Depreciation Fund remains at the same figure as for the last two years, namely, £388 6s. 10d. which is more than sufficient to fulfill the requirements of the Order-in-Council of 1899. This amount is invested in Transvaal 3% Stock.

7. The Profit and Loss Account for the year 1914 shows a net profit of £112 14s. 3d., which amount has been carried to the General Revenue of the Colony.

8. I have this day examined a statement of the Commissioners' Assets and Liabilities prepared by the Colonial Treasurer and finding the same to be correct have signed my name thereto.

ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT FOR EAST FALKLAND, 1914.

VITAL STATISTICS.

POPULATION.

The estimated population for the East Falkland for the year is 1708, an increase of 65 over 1913 when the population was 1643.

BIRTHS.

The birth rate for 1914 was 45 or 26.30 per 1000, against 38 or 23.10 per 1000 in 1913, showing a slight increase for this year.

DEATHS.

The death rate for 1914 of 26 or 15.2 per 1000 appears to be a great increase on 12 or 7.30 per 1000 for 1913. Sixteen deaths on active service as a result of the war however must be deducted from this, leaving ten deaths from disease, which are accounted for as follows:—

1 Pulmonary Tuberculosis,	2 Pneumonia,
1 Nephritis, (chronic)	1 Cerebral Haemorrhage,
1 Senile Decay,	1 Delirium Tremens,
1 Acute Gastritis,	1 Acute Gastro-Enteritis,
1 Septic Cerebral Embolism.	

Two of these ten deaths were in infants in the first year of life, Acute Gastritis and Gastro-enteritis. The one death from Tuberculosis, a disease which happily I have found to be extremely rare in this Colony, occurred in a young girl of about sixteen years of age. The whole of one lung was affected being practically riddled with miliary tubercles. The remaining seven deaths occurred in elderly people, some of whom were in advanced years of life. The death rate therefore, for 1914, apart from the accidental deaths has been on the whole satisfactory.

NOSOLOGICAL RETURNS.

On glancing through the nosological returns for 1914 there is no particular disease which stands out by itself, either from the frequency of its occurrence or its virulence. Stanley was visited, as in 1913, in the month of May and June, by an epidemic of Influenza. Practically every house in the settlement was affected. High temperature and in many cases, especially among children, delirium with mental disturbance which lasted some days was noticeable. There was also an epidemic of chicken pox in the East Camp and a few isolated cases of measles in Stanley, which fortunately did not spread. No deaths resulted from either of these epidemics. The Falkland Island Volunteers were called out for active service on the outbreak of war. The health of the corps, in spite of the difficulty of obtaining suitable accommodation for the men, and the severe weather to which they were exposed in the performance of their duty, was excellent. Colds with one or two minor epidemics of diarrhoea and vomiting among the men stationed on outpost duty, were the only cases of sickness. There were no deaths among the men from disease. During the year in the Government Surgery 2,224 prescriptions were made up, 2,000 consultations held and 1,353 visits were paid in Stanley.

QUARANTINE AND SANITATION.

660 Vessels were given free pratique during the year. The Colony was fortunate as in previous years in not being visited by any severe epidemic of Quarantinable disease. There was an epidemic of what was first diagnosed to be Small Pox on the West Falklands, but which eventually turned out to be chicken pox. The source of this disease was traced to the S.S. "NEUQUEN" which was employed in conveying sheep from this Colony to Bahia, where at this time an epidemic of chicken pox was raging. There were a few isolated cases of chicken pox in the East Falklands due no doubt to infection from the West Falklands. In Stanley in the early winter months a few isolated cases of measles occurred, which however did not develop into a serious epidemic; Sandy Point in this case appeared to have been the source of infection. Board of Health meetings were held every month until the outbreak of war. The reports of the Sanitary Inspector were laid before the Board and discussed. It was found necessary to enforce several of the Bye laws of the Board of Health.

THE VICTORIA COTTAGE HOME.

There were no deaths in this institution during the year. Eleven patients availed themselves of the advantages of the Home and received treatment.

MEDICAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE CARE OF THE SICK AND WOUNDED.

On the declaration of war it was necessary to make arrangements for wounded, especially with the enemy so close to the Colony. Six ladies volunteered as Nurses and received instruction in bandaging, and nursing. As a result of the Naval Action off the Falklands their assistance was found to be most useful. Fourteen men were enrolled as stretcher bearers and received drill and lectures in ambulance and first aid. The King Edward Memorial Hospital was kindly lent to the Government during the war by the Committee and His Excellency placed it at the disposal of the Admiralty. During the Naval action off the Falklands it was thought with such a large number of ships in action, there was bound to be a correspondingly large number of wounded. As the Hospital was not considered at the time to have sufficient accommodation, the Government School was converted into a temporary Hospital and the Cottage Home was also prepared, so that over 100 beds in all were ready when the fleet returned to Stanley. Fortunately our number of wounded was exceedingly small and the King Edward Memorial Hospital had ample room. I think all will agree the service the Hospital has rendered has demonstrated its great utility.



The following despatch has been received from Vice-Admiral Sir F. C. Doveton Sturdee, K.C.B., C.V.O., C.M.G., reporting the action off the Falkland Islands on Tuesday, the 8th of December, 1914:—

*Invincible at Sea,
December 19th, 1914.*

SIR,

I have the honour to forward a report on the action which took place on 8th December, 1914, against a German Squadron off the Falkland Islands.

- (A.)—Preliminary Movements.
- (B.)—Action with the Armoured Cruisers.
- (C.)—Action with the Light Cruisers.
- (D.)—Action with the Enemy's Transports.

(A.)—PRELIMINARY MOVEMENTS.

The squadron consisting of H.M. ships "Invincible," flying my flag, Flag Captain Percy T. H.

Beamish; "Inflexible," Captain Richard F. Phillimore, "Carnarvon," flying the flag of Rear-Admiral Archibald P. Stoddart, Flag Captain Harry L. d'E. Skipwith; "Cornwall," Captain Walter M. Ellerton; "Kent," Captain John D. Allen; "Glasgow" Captain John Luce; "Bristol," Captain Basil H. Fanshawe; and "Macedonia," Captain Bertram S. Evans; arrived at Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, at 10.30 a.m. on Monday, the 7th December, 1914. Coaling was commenced at once, in order that the ships should be ready to resume the search for the enemy's squadron the next evening, the 8th December.

At 8 a.m. on Tuesday, the 8th December, a signal was received from the signal station on shore:—

"A four-funnel and two-funnel man-of-war in sight from Sapper Hill, steering northwards."

At this time, the positions of the various ships of the squadron were as follows:—

"Macedonia": At anchor as look-out ship.

"Kent" (guard ship): At anchor in Port William.

"Invincible" and "Inflexible": In Port William.

"Carnarvon": In Port William.

"Cornwall": In Port William.

"Glasgow": In Port Stanley.

"Bristol": In Port Stanley.

The "Kent" was at once ordered to weigh, and a general signal was made to raise steam for full speed.

At 8.20 a.m. the signal station reported another column of smoke in sight to the southward, and at 8.45 a.m. the "Kent" passed down the harbour and took up a station at the entrance.

The "Canopus," Captain Heathcoat S. Grant, reported at 8.47 a.m. that the first two ships were 8 miles off, and that the smoke reported at 8.20 a.m. appeared to be the smoke of two ships about 20 miles off.

At 8.50 a.m. the signal station reported a further column of smoke in sight to the southward.

The "Macedonia" was ordered to weigh anchor on the inner side of the other ships, and await orders.

At 9.20 a.m. the two leading ships of the enemy ("Gneisenau" and "Nurnberg"), with guns trained on the wireless station, came within range of the "Canopus," who opened fire at them across the low land at a range of 11,000 yards. The enemy at once hoisted colours and turned away. At this time the masts and smoke of the enemy were visible from the upper bridge of the "Invincible" at a range of approximately 17,000 yards across the low land to the south of Port William.

A few minutes later the two cruisers altered course to port, as though to close the "Kent" at the entrance to the harbour, but about this time it seems that the "Invincible" and "Inflexible" were seen over the land, as the enemy at once altered course and increased speed to join their consorts.

The "Glasgow" weighed and proceeded at 9.40 a.m. with orders to join the "Kent" and observe the enemy's movements.

At 9.45 a.m. the squadron—less the "Bristol"—weighed, and proceeded out of harbour in the following order:—"Carnarvon," "Inflexible," "Invincible," and "Cornwall." On passing Cape Pembroke Light, the five ships of the enemy appeared clearly in sight to the south-east, hull down. The visibility was at its maximum, the sea was calm with a bright sun, a clear sky, and a light breeze from the north-west.

At 10.20 a.m. the signal for a general chase was made. The battle cruisers quickly passed ahead of the "Carnarvon" and overtook the "Kent." The "Glasgow" was ordered to keep two miles from the "Invincible," and the "Inflexible" was stationed on the starboard quarter of the flagship. Speed was eased to 20 knots at 11.15 a.m. to enable the other cruisers to get into station.

At this time the enemy's funnels and bridges showed just above the horizon.

Information was received from the "Bristol" at 11.27 a.m. that three enemy ships had appeared off Port Pleasant, probably colliers or transports. The "Bristol" was therefore directed to take the "Macedonia" under his orders and destroy transports.

The enemy were still maintaining their distance, and I decided, at 12.20 p.m., to attack with the two battle cruisers and the "Glasgow."

At 12.47 p.m. the signal to "Open fire and engage the enemy" was made.

The "Inflexible" opened fire at 12.55 p.m. from her fore turret at the right-hand ship of the enemy, a light cruiser; a few minutes later the "Invincible" opened fire at the same ship.

The deliberate fire from a range of 16,500 to 15,000 yards at the right-hand light cruiser, who was dropping astern, became too threatening, and when a shell fell close alongside her at 1.20 p.m. she (the "Leipzig") turned away, with the "Nurnberg" and "Dresden" to the south-west. These light cruisers were at once followed by the "Kent," "Glasgow," and "Cornwall," in accordance with my instructions.

The action finally developed into three separate encounters, besides the subsidiary one dealing with the threatened landing.

(B).—ACTION WITH THE ARMOURED CRUISERS.

The fire of the battle cruisers was directed on the "Scharnhorst" and "Gneisenau." The effect of this was quickly seen, when at 1.25 p.m., with the "Scharnhorst" leading, they turned about 7 points to port in succession into line ahead and opened fire at 1.30 p.m. Shortly afterwards speed was eased to 24 knots, and the battle cruisers were ordered to turn together, bringing them into line ahead, with the "Invincible" leading.

The range was about 13,500 yards at the final turn, and increased, until, at 2 p.m., it had reached 16,450 yards.

The enemy then (2.10 p.m.) turned away about 10 points to starboard and a second chase ensued, until, at 2.45 p.m., the battle cruisers again opened fire; this caused the enemy, at 2.53 p.m., to turn into line ahead to port and open fire at 2.55 p.m.

The "Scharnhorst" caught fire forward, but not seriously, and her fire slackened perceptibly; the "Gneisenau" was badly hit by the "Inflexible."

At 3.30 p.m. the "Scharnhorst" led round about 10 points to starboard; just previously her fire had slackened perceptibly, and one shell had shot away her third funnel; some guns were not firing, and it would appear that the turn was dictated by a desire to bring her starboard guns into action. The effect of the fire on the "Scharnhorst" became more and more apparent in consequence of smoke from fires, and also escaping steam; at times a shell would cause a large hole to appear in her side, through which could be seen a dull red glow of flame. At 4.4 p.m. the "Scharnhorst," whose flag remained flying to the last, suddenly listed heavily to port, and within a minute it became clear that she was a doomed ship; for the list increased very rapidly until she lay on her beam ends, and at 4.17 p.m. she disappeared.

The "Gneisenau" passed on the far side of her late flagship, and continued a determined but ineffectual effort to fight the two battle cruisers.

At 5.8 p.m. the forward funnel was knocked over and remained resting against the second funnel. She was evidently in serious straits, and her fire slackened very much.

5.15 p.m. one of the "Gneisenau's" shells struck the "Invincible" this was her last effective effort.

At 5.30 p.m. she turned towards the flagship with a heavy list to starboard, and appeared stopped, with steam pouring from her escape-pipe, and smoke from shell and fires rising everywhere. About this time I ordered the signal "Cease fire," but before it was hoisted the "Gneisenau" opened fire again, and continued to fire from time to time with a single gun.

At 5.40 p.m. the three ships closed in on the "Gneisenau", and, at this time, the flag flying at her fore truck was apparently hauled down, but the flag at the peak continued flying.

At 5.50 p.m. "Cease fire" was made.

At 6 p.m. the "Gneisenau" heeled over very suddenly, showing the men gathered on her decks and then walking on her side as she lay for a minute on her beam ends before sinking.

The prisoners of war from the "Gneisenau" report that, by the time the ammunition was expended, some 600 men had been killed and wounded. The surviving officers and men were all ordered on deck and told to provide themselves with hammocks and any articles that could support them in the water.

When the ship capsized and sank there were probably some 200 unwounded survivors in the water, but, owing to the shock of the cold water, many were drowned within sight of the boats and ship.

Every effort was made to save life as quickly as possible, both by boats and from the ships; life-buoys were thrown and ropes lowered, but only a proportion could be rescued. The "Invincible" alone rescued 108 men, fourteen of whom were found to be dead after being brought on board; these men were buried at sea the following day with full military honours.

(C.)—ACTION WITH THE LIGHT CRUISERS.

At about 1 p.m., when the "Scharnhorst" and "Gneisenau" turned to port to engage the "Invincible" and "Inflexible," the enemy's light cruisers turned to starboard to escape; the "Dresden" was leading and the "Nurnberg" and "Leipzig" followed on each quarter.

In accordance with my instructions, the "Glasgow" "Kent," and "Cornwall" at once went in chase of these ships; the "Carnarvon," whose speed was insufficient to overtake them, closed the battle cruisers.

The "Glasgow" drew well ahead of the "Cornwall" and "Kent," and at 3 p.m., shots were exchanged with the "Leipzig" at 12,000 yards. The "Glasgow's" object was to endeavour to outrange the "Leipzig" with her 6-inch guns and thus cause her to alter course and give the "Cornwall" and "Kent" a chance of coming into action.

At 4.17 p.m. the "Cornwall" opened fire, also on the "Leipzig."

At 7.17 p.m. the "Leipzig" was on fire fore and aft, and the "Cornwall" and "Glasgow" ceased fire.

The "Leipzig" turned over on her port side and disappeared at 9 p.m. Seven officers and eleven men were saved.

At 3.36 p.m. the "Cornwall" ordered the "Kent" to engage the "Nurnberg," the nearest cruiser to her.

Owing to the excellent and strenuous efforts of the engine room department, the "Kent" was able to get within range of the "Nurnberg" at 5 p.m. At 6.35 p.m. the "Nurnberg" was on fire forward and ceased firing. The "Kent" also ceased firing and closed to 3,200 yards; as the colours were still observed to be flying in the "Nurnberg" the "Kent" opened fire again. Fire was finally stopped five minutes later on the colours being hauled down, and every preparation was made to save life. The "Nurnberg" sank at 7.27 p.m. and, as she sank, a group of men were waving a German ensign attached to a staff. Twelve men were rescued, but only seven survived.

The "Kent" had four killed and twelve wounded, mostly caused by one shell.

During the time the three cruisers were engaged with the "Nurnberg" and "Leipzig," the "Dresden" who was beyond her consorts, effected her escape owing to her superior speed. The "Glasgow" was the only cruiser with sufficient speed to have had any chance of success. However, she was fully employed in engaging the "Leipzig" for over an hour before either the "Cornwall" or "Kent" could come up and get within range. During this time the "Dresden" was able to increase her distance and get out of sight.

The weather changed after 4 p.m. and the visibility was much reduced; the sky was overcast and cloudy, thus assisting the "Dresden" to get away unobserved.

(D.)—ACTION WITH ENEMY'S TRANSPORTS.

A report was received at 11.27 a.m. from H. M. S. "Bristol" that three ships of the enemy, probably transports or colliers had appeared off Port Pleasant. The "Bristol" was ordered to take the "Macedonia" under his charge and destroy the transports.

H. M. S. "Macedonia" reports that only two ships, steamships, "Baden" and "Santa Isabel" were present; both ships were sunk after the removal of the crew.

I have pleasure in reporting that the officers and men under my orders carried out their duties with admirable efficiency and coolness, and great credit is due to the Engineer Officers of all the ships, several of which exceeded their normal full speed.

Sheep.

2. It is satisfactory to be able to report that the general health of the flocks continues to be good. I am glad to state that those farmers who were served with notices to clean their flock of lice within a certain time, have conscientiously striven to do so. This is all the more gratifying as they were obviously aware of my inability to inspect the infected flocks at the expiration of the time stated on the notices served. I have therefore every reason to hope that on my next visit of inspection I shall find the number of sheep infected considerably reduced.

Ophthalmia.

3. This malady is steadily on the decline. Farms which were troubled with the disease last season have been practically free during the present one.

Statistics.

4. The returns show the number of sheep to be 701,268, an increase of 3,196 on the 1914 returns.

I am glad to be able to report that the death rate is still on the decrease, being 11.05% compared with 11.31 last year and 12.63 in 1913.

The price of wool during the season has been excellent and still continues to be very high, some making a record price for the Colony of 1/5d. per pound.

Very little Tallow has been shipped, the price averaging about 34/- per cwt.

The total number of sheep disposed of during the season was 60,356, being 23,709 less than last year and over 17,000 less than any year since 1910.

The Chief reductions are to be found in the number canned and exported.

There is every prospect of there being a good demand for prime sheep during the coming season as several opposition buyers are expected to negotiate.

Lambing.

5. The lambing season was a disappointment to most farmers. To a great extent the low percentage of 59.70% was due to the extremely bad weather experienced in the Spring, and also it is possible to a lesser extent due to the fact that many farms were very short of shepherds, these men being called up on active service at the commencement of the war. It will be seen from the appended table that there is a big decrease in the number of lambs, there being over 18,000 less than in the former season. This decrease accounts to some extent for the big reduction in the number of surplus sheep disposed of.

Canning.

6. Only one factory was working during the season and owing to the uncertainty of the export trade and the abnormally large demand for mutton in Stanley, considerably fewer sheep were canned than usually. 15,787 sheep, from the East Falklands only, were utilised in this way. The sheep were purchased outright, the prices for suitable stock being:—

No Cattle were killed at the works this season. The produce from the factory found a ready sale in England, the prices obtained being higher than formerly.

Cattle.

7. The health of the Cattle is excellent. Tuberculosis is present, but to a very small extent only. Quite rightly many people are nervous about using blood-tinged milk, which in the majority of cases is due to an injury of the Udder, and not to the Tubercle Bacillus as often supposed, so perhaps a few hints about the appearance of tubercular milk might not be out of place here.

In the first stages nothing much is noticeable either in the quantity or in the appearance of the milk, but soon if the milk be closely observed in a bottle, small white particles will be seen adhering to the glass.

As time goes on this deposit will become more noticeable, especially if the milk be allowed to stand for some time, when white particles will readily be seen on the bottom of the bottle. Still later, as the disease progresses the milk will have a brownish appearance, less will be given and that of a somewhat watery nature.

Tubercular milk rarely becomes curdled. Suspected samples sent to this office for microscopical examination, should be in clean sealed bottles, the strippings of the suspected quarter being preferred for the purpose.

Horses.

8. The returns show a small decrease in the number of horses in the Colony. The foaling percentage was also somewhat less than in the former season, being 61.44% compared with 61.89%. General health very satisfactory.

Imports.

9. Owing to a prohibition on horses from South America being in force, only two horses were imported (by special permission of the Governor in Council).

The prohibition has now however been withdrawn, but the embargo on other Live Stock and on Hay is still maintained. Nineteen Romney Rams of very good quality were imported from New Zealand.

Exports.

10. Considerably fewer sheep were exported from the Colony than formerly. Several thousands more would have been sold for export, had the buyers visited the stations at an earlier date, but owing to the uncertainty of things, farmers naturally enough would not take the risk of holding their stock until the month of May.

It certainly seems a pity to allow a new paying trade in surplus sheep to fall through, for the want of definite arrangements being made well in advance between the parties, for the dates of buying and shipping.

7337 live sheep were exported, compared with 38124 in 1914.

Cultivation.

11. Progress in this direction is being made every season. The quantity of hay saved has increased considerably, and the quality compares very favourably with shipments recently arrived from Europe.

Falkland Islands.**Minute by the Governor.***To the Legislative Council at a Meeting held on the 3rd August, 1915.***HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.**

This being the first occasion on which I have the honour to meet you in Council assembled, I desire to assure you of my readiness at all times to co-operate with you for the advancement of the Colony and the welfare of its people.

I have called you together to-day to consider the customary Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance in respect of the year 1914, and to ask you to authorize expenditure not already provided for on the estimates for the current year.

Before proceeding, it may be convenient that I should refer briefly to the financial condition of the Colony, details respecting which will be found in the Report of the Colonial Treasurer for the year 1914, to be laid before you.

The revenue for the year 1914, exclusive of Land Sales and receipts under the Stock Ordinance, amounted to £33,759 and the expenditure to £35,499, leaving a deficit on the year's transactions of £1,740. This deficit has for the present been met out of the surplus funds of the Colony.

Compared with the annual average of the previous five years, the revenue and expenditure of 1914, shew increases of £1,149, and £12,257, respectively. Of the expenditure, £9,766 is consequent on the outbreak of war:—

Under Public Works Extraordinary, £1,329 was spent during the year on the Stanley Town Hall, in course of erection, and £1,044 on a plant for the proposed Wireless Station at Fox Bay

The 1914 Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance, 1915, is necessary to legalize the expenditure during the year 1914, of £11,286, not already sanctioned by law. This sum includes under Miscellaneous, the £9,766 for the Volunteers and donation to the National Relief Fund, and an excess of £1,520 only, on the provision made by Ordinance No. 8 of 1913 for the several services for the year.

On the 31st December, 1914, the assets of the Colony amounted to £114,083, made up as follows:—

Since the estimates for the current year were passed by this Council in November last, it has become necessary to incur further expenditure, and you will be asked to vote an additional sum of £4,800 : 15 : 2 to carry on to the end of the year.

Under the head of Military £1,760 is required, the two principal items being, £400 for uniforms for the Volunteers, and £1,310 for contingencies, hay, etc., for which no provision was made on the estimates. Up to the 30th June last £5,921 has been spent on the Volunteers. Under altered circumstances it is hoped by savings on other votes provided on the estimates, that at the end of the year there will be little or no excess on the total vote of £10,000 already voted under this head.

Under the Public Works Recurrent, a sum of £428 is required, made up of £190 for the extensive repairs found necessary to the Colonial Secretary's Quarters, £75 for furniture for Government House, the vote on the estimates being insufficient, and £163 for renewals for the Wireless Station.

Under Public Works Extraordinary, £1,066 is required. This sum includes £60 for new telephone switchboard, £600 for the Town Hall, £128 (revote) for repairs to Gardener's cottage, Government House, and £250 for Buoy for South Georgia.

To complete the Town Hall, I regret to say that an additional sum of £1,457 is required.

This sum however does not include the cost of lighting. It is estimated that a separate plant for electric lighting will cost £783.

Of the additional £1,457 required, you will be asked to vote £400 as an instalment to carry on the work to the end of the year, the remaining £1,057, to be included in the estimates of next year.

The Council is aware that the original intention of the "Town Hall" was to provide, on the upper floor, a large hall with stage, dining and other adjacent rooms, and on the ground floor to accommodate the Museum, and Library, and the Volunteers with Armoury, Storeroom, Canteen, Billiard Room, etc., etc.

Further consideration has however been given to the matter, and while it is proposed to leave the upper floor of the building as originally planned, it has been suggested as the building now occupied by the Government Offices is no longer considered suited for present day requirements, advantage should be taken of the accommodation afforded on the ground floor of the new building, to house the Supreme and Magistrate's Courts and the Legislative Council Chamber in one room, the Colonial Secretary's Office, the Treasury, the Post Office, the Museum and the Library. The Head Quarters of the Volunteers to be provided for in some other Government Building.

To give effect to this suggestion a sum of £500 will be required to enable minor re-arrangements of the ground floor to be made, and to build a strong vault for the Treasury and Commissioners of Currency.

By the allocation of the ground floor in this manner I am of opinion it will be occupied to best advantage, and that the convenience of the Officers concerned, and the Public, will be better served.

I therefore commend the suggestion for your consideration. Subject to your approval and to the sanction of the Secretary of State, £200, of the additional £500 required, has been placed on the Schedule of supplementary votes to be submitted to you, as a first instalment for work to be undertaken this year.

The revenue for the current year, exclusive of Land Sales, and receipts under the Live Stock Ordinance, was estimated at the time of passing the annual estimates in November last, at £21,073, and the expenditure at £36,024, leaving an estimated deficit of £14,951.

To meet the deficit on the year's transactions, due to the consequences of the war, my predecessor, Governor Allardyce, C.M.G., informed the Council that either the Land Sales Fund must be drawn upon and consequently reduced, or some new method must be found for making good the shortage of revenue for 1915. Governor Allardyce considered the most equitable manner of meeting the deficit, when the amount be definitely ascertained, would be by a graduated land war tax extending over one or more years.

At the time the estimates for 1915 were passed it was not possible to forecast with any degree of reliability, the probable revenue for the year, and the receipts under the three principal heads of Customs, Port Dues, and Internal Revenue, were estimated at the conservative estimate of £8,107, compared with £18,447, the actual receipts for the year 1913. I am glad to be in a position to inform you that the amount estimated for the twelve months has been more than realized during the first half of this year. The receipts to the 30th of June last amounted to £9,641. I am afraid however that owing to extraordinary expenditure incurred, the ordinary revenue may not be sufficient to cover the total expenditure of the year, and that it will be necessary to resort to the Land Sales Fund, though possibly to a less extent than at first estimated, to meet the deficit.

It is clear that if the sum of the deficit on the year's transactions be charged to the Land Sales Fund, the assets of the Colony will be correspondingly reduced. The Secretary of State desires me therefore to invite an expression of your views as to whether the amount of any deficit taken from the Land Sales Fund should be treated as an advance to general revenue, or as a final payment.

My predecessor was of opinion that no permanent reductions in the Land Sales Fund of the Colony should be effected, an opinion with which I am in accord. The interest derived from the moneys of the Fund invested, provides an annual contribution of no small amount to the general revenue of the Colony, and the Fund affords a safeguard for temporary public accommodation on easy terms in times of need.

I suggest for the consideration of the Council that any advance authorised and made from the Land Sales Fund for public purposes, should be treated as a loan, repayable from general revenue, and that repayments of the same should be made within such period as the Council may in each case fix, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State. Provision to be made on the annual estimates for payment of the instalments as they become due, together with interest on the amount of the loan outstanding.

When the draft estimates for the year 1916 are under consideration, should it be found that the revenue is not sufficient to meet the expenditure of the year, I feel confident that you will be prepared to provide the necessary ways and means, either by way of a land tax or by such other equitable measures as may be decided upon.



SIR

I have the honour to inform you that it has been brought to my notice that since the outbreak of war officers holding appointments in the Colonial Service have, in several instances, tendered their resignation of their appointments without previous enquiry as to whether they could be permitted to do so, and have even refused to return to their duties after it had been made clear to them that the exigencies of the public service made it impossible that their resignations should be accepted.

2. I have reasons to believe that some members of the Colonial Service hold the view that it is open to servants of the Crown to tender their resignations and relinquish their appointments whenever it may suit their convenience to do so. Such views are entirely erroneous. No servant of the Crown is at liberty to resign his appointment except by permission of the Crown, and this should be clearly understood by every member of the Colonial Service.

3. I recognise that such resignations as have been tendered since the outbreak of hostilities by officers without first obtaining permission to do so have been usually prompted by a patriotic wish to serve the Empire in some capacity directly connected with the war. It is not, however, for the individual officer to decide in what capacity he can best serve His Majesty the King. As, moreover, such conduct, far from assisting, may cause most serious detriment to the public service, especially at such a time as the present, I am compelled to regard it as a grave dereliction of duty which cannot be excused.

4. In his circular despatch of 31st August, 1914, my predecessor informed you of the liberal conditions as to pay which were to be granted here to Civil Servants joining the colours, and I am well aware of the readiness which you have shown to allow every officer who could possibly be spared to join His Majesty's Forces. I am confident that you will maintain the same attitude; but the administration cannot be allowed to fall into confusion through lack of officers to carry on the work that is absolutely necessary in the public interest.

5. It must, therefore, be understood that, should any member of the Colonial Service hereafter resign his post without permission, he will be treated as absent from duty without leave, and will be gazetted as dismissed from the service, with the result that he will be debarred from further employment under the Crown in any capacity, civil or military.

6. I request that you will cause this despatch to be published in the Colony under your government.

LATHES, and other machines or machine-tools capable of being employed in the manufacture of munitions of war;

MAPS and plans of any place within the territory of any belligerent, or within the area of military operations, on a scale of four miles to one inch or on any larger scale, and reproductions on any scale by photography or otherwise of such maps or plans;

LUBRICANTS, soft soap;

RAW COTTON, cotton lintens, cotton waste, and cotton yarns.

And I do further Proclaim that in the Proclamation of the 19th day of March, 1915, aforesaid, the words "other than linseed oil" shall be deleted and that the following article will be treated as conditional contraband:—

Regulations for the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force.

Notwithstanding anything contained in the Army Acts and the King's Regulations dealing with offences against Military Order and Discipline, the Officer Commanding the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force may for each or any of the following offences inflict a fine not exceeding one pound (£1) on any member of the Force who without reasonable cause shewn to the Officer Commanding:—

- (a) Neglects to obey any general or other order,
- (b) Fails to appear on parade, or rendezvous appointed by the Commanding Officer or goes from thence without leave, or without urgent necessity quits the ranks, or
- (c) Absents himself from any drill or class of instruction when ordered to attend, or
- (d) Commits any act to the prejudice of good order or military discipline.

An Ordinance to extend and amend section sixty-four of The Customs Ordinance, 1903.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Ordinance, 1915."

Extension of Section 64 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1903.

2. Section sixty-four of the Customs Ordinance, 1903, (which enables the exportation of certain articles to be prohibited) shall have effect, whilst a state of war in which His Majesty is engaged exists, as if, in addition to the articles therein mentioned, there were included all other articles of every description.

Power to vary Proclamation.

3. Any proclamation made by the Governor under the said section as so amended may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to from time to time by proclamation by the Governor.

ENTITLED

An Ordinance
To regulate the export of whale oil.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Whale Oil Export (War) Ordinance, 1915" and shall be read as one with The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908.

Governor in Council may make Regulations.


2. The Governor in Council may make, and from time to time vary, regulations prohibiting the export of whale oil from the Colony or its Dependencies to any destination other than a Port in the United Kingdom without a written export licence first obtained from the Collector of Customs or his Deputy.

Bond to be given for delivery in United Kingdom or authorised destination.

3. Any Person or Company licensed under The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908, or any Lessee of land granted for the purpose of carrying on whaling operations, shall, at the time of making the customary declaration of the amount of whale oil about to be exported and the country of destination, give a bond to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy for the delivery of such consignment of oil in the United Kingdom, or at the Port or Country for which he has obtained an export licence from the Collector of Customs or his deputy as the case may be; and such bond shall remain in force until it shall within six calendar months of the date of the bond be shewn to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs that the full quantity of oil mentioned therein has been duly delivered at the authorized Port or Country of destination.

Penalty.

4. Any person or company contravening or attempting to contravene the provisions of this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder shall forfeit the bond required and furnished by him under section 3 of this Ordinance, and shall furthermore be liable to the summary cancellation by the Governor of his licence or lease.

By the King a Proclamation relating to trading with persons of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in Liberia or Portuguese East Africa.

GEORGE R. I.

WHEREAS it is expedient that transactions between British subjects and persons of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in Liberia or Portuguese East Africa should be restricted in manner provided by this Proclamation,

NOW THEREFORE We have thought fit by and with the advice of our Privy Council to issue this our Royal Proclamation declaring and it is hereby declared as follows:—

1. The proclamations for the time being in force relating to trading with the enemy shall as from the tenth day of December one thousand nine hundred and fifteen apply to any person or body of persons of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in Liberia or Portuguese East Africa in the same manner as they apply to persons or bodies of persons resident or carrying on business in an enemy country. Provided that where an enemy has a branch locally situated in Liberia or Portuguese East Africa nothing in Article six of The Trading with the Enemy Proclamation No. 2 shall be construed so as to prevent transactions of by or with that branch being treated as transactions of by or with an enemy.
2. Nothing in this proclamation shall be taken to prohibit anything which might be specially permitted by our licence or by a licence given on our behalf by a Secretary of State or the Board of Trade or the Lords Commissioners of our Treasury.
3. This Proclamation shall be called The Trading with the Enemy (Liberia and Portuguese East Africa) Proclamation 1915.

Given at our Court at Buckingham Palace this tenth day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen in the sixth year of Our Reign.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Whale Fishery Amendment Ordinance, 1915", and shall be read and construed as one with The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908.

Amendment of Sec. 6 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1908.

2. Section 6 of "The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908" is hereby amended as follows:—

In the 2nd line of subsection (d) after the word "towing" the words "or buoying" shall be inserted.

After subsection (d) the following shall be added as subsection (e)

- (e) Employs any licensed vessel, or any vessel the use of which is authorized by lease, to tow, buoy or manufacture within the territorial waters of the Colony carcasses of whales taken, towed or buoyed outside the territorial waters of the Colony by any vessel unlicensed or not authorized as aforesaid.

An Ordinance to prohibit by Regulations the export of whale oil, except to the United Kingdom.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Whale Oil (Export Regulation) Ordinance, 1915" and shall be read as one with The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908.

Short Title,

2. The Governor in Council may make, and from time to time vary, regulations prohibiting the export of whale oil from the Colony or its Dependencies to any destination other than a Port in the United Kingdom without a written export licence first obtained from the Collector of Customs or his Deputy.

Governor in Council may make Regulations.

3. Any Person or Company licensed under The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908, or any Lessee of land granted for the purpose of carrying on whaling operations, shall, at the time of making the customary declaration of the amount of whale oil about to be exported and the country of destination, give a bond to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy for the delivery of such consignment of oil in the United Kingdom, or at the Port or Country for which he has obtained an export licence from the Collector of Customs or his deputy as the case may be; and such bond shall remain in force until it shall within six calendar months of the date of the bond be shewn to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs that the full quantity of oil mentioned therein has been duly delivered in the United Kingdom or at the authorized Port or Country of destination.

Bond to be given for delivery in United Kingdom or authorised destination.

Penalty.

4. Any person or company contravening or attempting to contravene the provisions of this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder shall forfeit the bond required and furnished by him under section 3 of this Ordinance, and shall furthermore be liable to the summary cancellation by the Governor of his licence or lease.

Repeal Ord. No. 1 of 1915.

5. The Whale Oil (War) Ordinance, 1915, (No 1 of 1915), is hereby repealed.

An Ordinance to extend and amend section sixty-four of The Customs Ordinance, 1903.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Ordinance, 1915."

Extension of Section 64 of
Ordinance No. 6 of 1903.

2. Section sixty-four of the Customs Ordinance, 1903, (which enables the exportation of certain articles to be prohibited) shall have effect, whilst a state of war in which His Majesty is engaged exists, as if, in addition to the articles therein mentioned, there were included all other articles of every description.

3. Any proclamation made by the Governor under the said section as so amended may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to from time to time by proclamation by the Governor.

Power to vary Proclamation.



By His Excellency WILLIAM DOUGLAS YOUNG, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

Whereas by my Proclamation dated the twentieth day of September, 1915, I did prohibit the exportation, other than to the United Kingdom, British Possessions and Protectorates, of all goods specified in Schedule A; And, other than to Ports of France, Russia (except Baltic Ports) Belgium, Spain and Portugal, of all goods specified in Schedule B; And to all Ports in Denmark, the Netherlands and Sweden, of all goods specified in Schedule C,

And Whereas it is necessary to prohibit the exportation from this Colony and its Dependencies of goods other than those specified,

Now therefore I have thought fit to issue this my Proclamation, and in virtue and in the exercise of the powers in me vested to declare and it is hereby declared, that except to the United Kingdom, British Possessions and Protectorates, the exportation from this Colony and its Dependencies to any Country or place of all goods (including horses, cattle or sheep) of every description, is hereby prohibited, without the sanction of the Governor and a written export licence first applied for and obtained from the Collector of Customs or his Deputy,

And I do further declare that the Proclamation given under my hand, and the Public Seal of the Colony, on the twentieth day of September, 1915, above referred to, is hereby repealed and cancelled.

Given under my hand and the Public Seal of the Colony at Government House, Stanley, this twenty-first day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

I have the honour to inform you that by section 7 (2) of the National Registration Act, 1915, every person between the ages of 15 and 65 arriving in the United Kingdom, after the passing of the Act, is required within twenty-eight days after his arrival, if he has not been previously registered, to send or deliver to a local registration authority, by post or otherwise, notice of his arrival, together with the particulars concerning himself required by the Act to be registered, and, if so required, to attend at such place and time as the authority may appoint, and answer such questions as may be addressed to him for the purpose of enabling the necessary particulars to be registered.

2. I shall be glad if you will take steps to communicate this provision generally to the officers serving under your administration and to cause the special attention of every officer coming on leave to be called to the requirements of the Act.

Minute by the Governor

To the Legislative Council at a Meeting held on the 29th November, 1915.

At the Meeting of the Legislative Council held on the 3rd August last, I had the honour to inform the Council that as far as could be ascertained it was expected that at the end of the current year the financial position of the Colony would be in a better state than had been originally estimated.

I am in a position to-day to inform the Council that, after paying back to the Land Sales Fund the sum of £1,642, borrowed to meet the deficiencies in the earlier months of the year, it is expected that the deficit on the year's transactions will be about £600 in place of the £15,000 originally estimated. This is due, on the one hand, to a larger revenue than was anticipated, and, on the other, in a measure, to its being found impossible to carry out certain of the works provided for under Public Works Extraordinary.

I annex a statement prepared by the Treasurer shewing the Estimated Assets and Liabilities of the Colony on the 31st December, 1915.

The draft Estimates for the Current year, which are submitted for your consideration, shew an expenditure of £32,529 and a revenue, on the basis of present taxation, of £29,834, leaving a deficit of £2,547.

Provision must therefore be made to meet this deficit. To this end an Ordinance will be submitted to you to provide for an increase in the export duties on wool, sheep, sheep skins and hides, and an export duty on canned and preserved meats, and guano. The additional revenue to be raised from these sources is estimated at about £3,100, and will leave the small credit margin of a little over £400 to meet unforeseen expenditure during the year.

In preparing the draft estimates for the year 1916, provision for increases on annually recurrent expenditure has been found to be necessary in some cases, owing to present conditions, at the same time due care has been given to economy. I trust the estimates as framed will commend themselves to the Council. The form in which the estimates have been printed is an improvement to that of the previous years, the credit of which is due to the Honourable C. F. Condell, the Colonial Secretary, who has bestowed much time and attention thereto.

To refer briefly to the principal changes under the several Heads of the estimates.

Governor. Provision is made for the appointment of a Clerk and Private Secretary with salary at the rate of £200 to £250 per annum, in place of a Private Secretary at £100 per annum, in order to retain the services of a permanent officer in the office of the Governor.

Colonial Secretary. The salary of the Office of Second Clerk, at £100 for the current year, has been increased to £150. An additional Assistant Printer, with salary at rate of £96, has been provided for, making a staff of three printers. A staff of two printers is too small for the work required.

Treasury & Customs. It is proposed to transfer the Savings Bank from the Post Office to the Treasury, to be worked as provided by Ordinance No. 1 of 1888, and provision has been made for the appointment of a Second Clerk to this Department at a salary of £150 a year. The salaries of the Customs Officer and the Assistant Customs Officers have been increased from £100 to £120 each. It is proposed to amend the Customs Regulations and to require the services of these Officers at an early hour in the morning without the payment of fees for extra hours. The increased salary to include remuneration for these services.

Port and Marine. Provision has been made for an increase of salary to the Harbour Master etc, to £180 a year. The duties of Storekeeper at present performed by the Harbour Master, at the remuneration at the rate of £18 a year, to be transferred to the post of Clerk and Storekeeper under the Colonial Engineer's Department. There is also an increase of £12 a year, making the salary one of £96, for a deck hand, to secure the services of a suitable person.

Police and Prisons. An addition of £8 has been made to the salary of the Chief Constable, and of £12 each to the Gaoler and the five constables. The scale of salaries will then be: the Chief Constable at £9 a month, the Gaoler and Sergt. of Police at £8, and the five constables at £7 each, monthly, with free quarters in each case. It is also proposed when a constable is detached for duty and serving at South Georgia, acting also as Assistant Customs Officer, to give him a duty allowance at the rate of £50 per annum.

Education. The item Expenses and Allowances to Travelling Teachers, omitted in 1915 estimates, has been inserted at £50. This vote covers travelling gear and expenses, and an allowance to Travelling Teachers at the rate of 3/6 a day when out of their district on authorized leave in the Colony.

Post Office. Personal allowance to Mr. M. Craigie-Halkett at the rate of £50 a year has been inserted in the estimates, in lieu of the £50 paid to him as Manager of the Savings Bank. It is proposed to assign to Mr. Halkett other duties on the transfer of the Savings Bank to the Treasury, in respect of which this personal allowance will be granted. Provision is also made under this Department for the subsidy of £960 a year for the Coastal Service of the Islands under contract for five years from the 1st January, 1915.

Colonial Engineer. Provision is made for the appointment of a Clerk and Storekeeper at the salary of £150 a year. This provision is made to enable the Colonial Engineer to be more frequently out of his Office personally supervising and directing public works under his charge. Provision is also made for the Wireless Station Operator at Fox Bay. Pending the erection of the installation at Fox Bay, the extra assistance required at the present time for the continuous service at the Stanley Wireless Station will be paid from this vote. The telephone operators have been transferred from under the Post Office Department to this Department. In framing the estimates for this Department for the year 1916, only posts of the workmen of a more or less permanent character have been retained and shewn separately. The pay of all other workmen and labourers in future will be paid for by the day, and charged to the vote upon which they are employed. This will afford a means of ascertaining readily the cost of the work undertaken. An item of £50 only has been retained for casual labour under the Department.

Public Works Recurrent. The vote for Roads, Bridges, and Drains has been increased from £500 to £1,000. It is hoped that more work will be undertaken on the roads of Stanley next year than has been possible this year. The vote for repairs of buildings and furniture has been increased from £500 to £700, and includes the cost of labour on the same. The provision of telephone maintenance, has been transferred from the Post Office Department, and the £120 on the estimates includes cost of instruments, materials, and labour. The item for peat cutting has also been transferred, from the Head Miscellaneous, as this work is under the direction of the Colonial Engineer.

Public Works Extraordinary. Provision of £465 is made for the erection of a light at Point William. It is proposed to utilize the light imported some three years ago for Sea Lion Island. It has not yet been possible to erect the light on this Island, the desirability for which on further consideration appears doubtful and will engage further attention. Of the two lights it is considered that William Point is the more desirable. Stanley Town Hall: A sum of £1,540 has been inserted in the estimates to carry on the work of completion on this building. Should the allocation of the ground floor for the Public Offices, as approved by the resolution of this Council on the 3rd August last, meet with the final sanction of the Secretary of State, a further sum of £500 will be required, as I informed the Council by my Minute of the 3rd August, 1915. An additional sum of £783 will also be required should it be decided to install an electric lighting plant. Provision is also inserted for the erection of a house for the Wireless Operator at Fox Bay at a cost of £560; renewing of heating system at Government House, £390; continuation of construction of Moody Street, £340; extension of sea wall, Stanley, £120; extension of

Stanley Cemetery, £200; and completion of King Edward VII Memorial Hospital, £500. This latter item is to extend the heating system to the rooms on the south side of the building, to provide for a reservoir, and a peat shed, cutting and facing the bank and concreting on the south side of the building for its protection against surface drainage from the rising ground on that side. In taking the vote of £560 for the quarters for the Wireless Operator at Fox Bay, I ask the Legislative Council to leave it to the discretion of the Governor in Council to apply this vote with the approval of the Secretary of State to the proposed quarters for the Government Officer on New Island, (for which provision was made this year but it has not been possible to proceed with the work) should it be found possible by other means to provide quarters for the Operator at Fox Bay on the erection of the Wireless Station there.

At a meeting of the Council held on the 3rd August, I informed the Council that further consideration had been given to the original proposal to house the Falkland Islands Volunteers on the ground floor of the building in course of erection and called the Town Hall, and that instead of carrying out that proposal, it had been suggested that the ground floor of the building should be allocated for the accommodation and use of the Supreme Court and the Public Offices etc., the Headquarters of the Volunteers to be provided for in some other Government Building.

The Council subsequently passed a Resolution approving the suggestion made to allocate the ground floor for the Public Offices.

I have since had the pleasure of presiding at a special meeting of the members of the Volunteers at which I recounted to them the original proposals, and explained to them the changes suggested on those proposals. I informed the Volunteers that instead of charging them a rental of £60 a year for accommodation in the Town Hall, it was now proposed to give them, rent free, accommodation for Headquarters, Club purposes, in part of the buildings at present occupied by the Public Offices, as soon as the Town Hall building is completed and the Offices can be moved thereto.

The proposal met with the concurrence of the meeting of Volunteers, at which the following resolution was subsequently passed:—

“That this meeting of the members of the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force, having heard the proposals made by His Excellency the Governor, to carry out the previous intention to use the upper floor of the Town Hall for a Drill Hall for the Volunteers utilizing the ground floor of the Hall for Public Offices and allowing the use by the Volunteers of a part of the present Government Offices for the purpose of Headquarters and a Volunteer Club, concurs in these proposals and will be glad if His Excellency will further consider the matter with a view to effect being given to the same”.

The Council will see that the proposed changes are concurred in by the Volunteers, and I may add, as far as I have been able to ascertain, by the Community generally.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward the following report on the Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1915.

2. During the year 206 accounts were opened and 43 closed; leaving a total of 696 depositors, amongst whom the balance in hand amounting to £91,162 8s. 6d. is distributed. This gives an average of over £130 19s. 7d. standing to the credit of the account, or £40 2s. 6d. per head of the population computing the population at 2,272.

3. Interest amounting to £1,799 14s. 3d. has been paid and credited to depositors during the year, being £155 0s. 2d. more than that paid and credited in 1913-14. The amount of Deposits for the year, £23,172 2s. 6d. was the largest since the foundation of the Bank and exceeded the withdrawals for the same period (£11,444 3s. 3d.) by £11,727 19s. 3d, and the Deposits, as compared with the amount received in any previous year, by £4072 7s. 11d.

4. The income earned by the Bank during the year has been £2,309 5s. 1d. and the expenses incurred £1,804 14s. 3d. leaving a profit on the transactions of the year of £505 10s. 10d.

5. The investments held on account of the Bank on the 30th September last. amounted to £74,016 4s. 2d. Owing to continued large deposits the uninvested balance on that date amounted to £17,146 4s. 4d, of which the greater portion is on deposit in England bearing current rate of Bank Interest.

A BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance to provide for the management and maintenance of King Edward VII Hospital.

Preamble.

Whereas subscriptions have been collected by a Committee known as the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital Committee, and a Building has been erected in the Town of Stanley for a Public Hospital as a Memorial in the Colony to His Late Majesty King Edward VII,

And Whereas the site for the Hospital together with the Buildings erected thereon has, with the approval of the said Committee, been given conveyed and granted by Messrs George Bonner and Company Limited to the Governor of the Falkland Islands in terms and on the conditions set forth in a Deed of conveyance made the First day of October, 1915, between the said Company, the Chairman of the said Committee, and the Governor of the Falkland Islands,

And Whereas it is necessary to provide for the management and maintenance of the said Buildings for the purposes of a Public Hospital,

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The King Edward Hospital Ordinance, 1916".

2. In this Ordinance:—

Interpretation.

“HOSPITAL” means the Public Hospital in the Town of Stanley known as “The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital”.

“COMPANY” means Messrs George Bonner and Company Limited their successors and assigns.

3. (1) The several lots or parcels of land in the Town of Stanley comprising the site for the Hospital and described in the Indenture contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance, are together with the Buildings thereon, conveyed to and held by the Governor and his Successors on behalf of the Crown in terms and on the conditions set forth in the said Schedule.

Hospital lands and buildings.

(2) In the event of the Government ceasing at any time to maintain and use the said Buildings for the purpose of a Public Hospital, then at the expiration of one year thereafter or at such earlier date as may be mutually agreed the hereditaments assured by the Indenture contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance shall revert and be reconveyed by the Governor to the Company.

4. The Hospital shall be called and known as “The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital”.

Name of Hospital.

5. The Colonial Surgeon shall be the Medical Officer and Surgeon to the Hospital, and the Hospital shall be under his care and management subject to the regulations for the Hospital and the directions of the Governor.

Medical Officer.

6. The Governor may appoint a Nurse Matron, and such other Nurses and Servants for the Hospital as he may think fit, who shall receive such salaries and allowances as the Legislative Council may provide with the sanction of the Secretary of State.

Appointment of Nurses and Servants.

7. (1) There shall be a Visiting Committee for the Hospital to be appointed by the Governor from time to time for such period or periods as the Governor may think fit, consisting of not more than three persons not holding any appointment or employment under the Colonial Government. The Committee shall meet as often as they shall think fit and shall at all times have access to the Hospital and shall enter any suggestions they may have to make for the consideration of the Governor in a book to be kept at the Hospital for the purpose.

Visiting Committee.

(2) The Governor shall appoint the Chairman of the Committee.

Chairman of Committee.

8. The Governor in Council may make, and from time to time vary, regulations for the admission, maintenance, treatment and discharge of patients, and for the general management and working of the Hospital, and such regulations shall be published in the Gazette.

THIS INDENTURE made the First day of October One thousand nine hundred and fifteen BETWEEN GEORGE BONNER AND COMPANY LIMITED whose registered office is situated at 41 Castle Street in the City of Liverpool (hereinafter called "the Company") of the first part THE HONOURABLE WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING of the Falkland Islands of the second part and HIS EXCELLENCY WILLIAM DOUGLAS YOUNG, C.M.G. Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies (hereinafter called "the Governor") of the third part WHEREAS the Company is by its Memorandum of Association empowered to aid in the establishment and support of Schools Associations or Institutions calculated to benefit persons employed by the Company or having dealings with the Company AND WHEREAS some time since it was resolved to erect and equip a Hospital at Stanley in the Falkland Islands to be known as The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital and funds were raised and subscribed for the purpose AND WHEREAS the Company being seized in unincumbered fee simple of the hereditaments hereby assured resolved to give the same as and for the site of the said Hospital it being the opinion of the Directors that such Hospital was calculated to benefit persons employed by the Company AND WHEREAS with the privity of the Company a Hospital has since been erected on the said site under the supervision of a Committee known as The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital Committee whereof the said WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING is Chairman AND WHEREAS it has been arranged that such Hospital should be handed over to the Governor to be held by him and his successors on behalf of the Crown subject nevertheless to the provisions hereinafter mentioned AND WHEREAS the Company with a view of furthering such purpose as aforesaid has consented to convey the hereditaments hereby assured in manner hereinafter appearing AND WHEREAS it has been arranged that the said WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING should join in these presents for the purpose of testifying the approval hereof of the said Hospital Committee NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises the Company with the privity of the said WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING HEREBY GRANTS unto the Governor ALL THAT piece or parcel of land containing three fourths of an acre or thereabouts situate in Stanley in the Falkland Islands and formerly consisting of three plots which were heretofore severally granted or conveyed (by the respective instruments in the Schedule hereto mentioned) by the descriptions set out in the said Schedule TOGETHER with the Hospital and other Buildings thereon erected TO HOLD the same UNTO AND TO THE USE of the said Governor and his Successors upon the terms and subject to the conditions following that is to say :—

1. THE said hereditaments and the buildings erected or from time to time to be erected thereon shall be used as a Public Hospital to be known as The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.
2. THE said Hospital shall henceforth be maintained and the Medical and Nursing Staff provided out of Public Funds of the Falkland Islands.
3. THERE shall be a visiting Committee to be appointed by the Governor for the time being which Committee shall consist of three members of the Public not being in the service of the Colonial Government. The members of the said Committee shall at all times have access to the said Hospital and the suggestions of the Committee shall be from time to time entered by them in a Book to be kept at the said Hospital for that purpose.
4. IF at any time the said lands and buildings shall cease to be used for the Purposes of a Hospital the hereditaments hereby assured shall be reconveyed to the Company its successors and assigns.

IN WITNESS whereof the Company has hereunto affixed its seal the party of the second part and the Governor have set their respective hands and seals the day and year first before written.

Falkland Islands Defence Force Club.

RULES.

1. The Club shall be called the Falkland Islands Defence Force Club and shall consist of:—

- (a) Enrolled Members of the Force,
- (b) Honorary Members,
- (c) Temporary Members.

2. The management of the property, finances and civil affairs of the Club shall be under a Committee composed of the Officer Commanding the Volunteer Force and six members, consisting of one Officer, at least two N.C.O.s and the remainder privates to be elected at the Annual General Meeting. The elected members of the Committee shall hold office in the following manner. Two members shall retire each year in rotation, the order for retirement during the first three years to be decided by ballot at the first Committee meeting. Retiring members shall be eligible for re-election. Casual vacancies during the course of a year may be filled by the Committee until the next Annual General Meeting. The Committee shall appoint one of their number to act as Honorary Secretary and Treasurer and any four of the Committee shall form a quorum. If any member of the Committee shall be absent from six consecutive meetings without leave he shall be deemed to have vacated his seat and the vacancy may be filled by the Committee. The Commanding Officer shall be President and Chairman *ex officio* of all Committees.

3. A Club Steward shall be appointed by the Committee, subject to the approval of the Commanding Officer, and acting under the orders of the Committee the Steward shall be responsible for the due orderly conduct of the Club.

4. Candidates for Honorary Membership shall be proposed and seconded by at least two enrolled members of the Club and their names shall then be submitted to the Committee for election by ballot, provided that no one shall be eligible for Honorary Membership unless he is incapacitated by age or physical unfitness from enrolling in the Force. On the ballot two adverse votes shall exclude.

5. Warrant and Petty Officers of His Majesty's Navy and N.C.O.s of the Army and Royal Marines, whilst in Stanley, may be admitted to the Club premises as temporary Members.

6. The Club room and property shall be for the use of the Club members only, but any member who is in full privileges may bring in one guest, who however shall not be permitted to purchase any article of refreshment. Such member shall be responsible for the good behaviour of the guest introduced. Notwithstanding, no one shall be introduced as a guest more frequently than twice within a period of thirty days, nor shall any member be entitled to introduce more than two guests within a like period. The "Guests' Book" shall be kept by the Steward and all names duly entered therein.

7. Honorary Members shall pay a minimum subscription of ten shillings per annum to the Club.

8. Any member who is a defaulter, or who misconducts himself shall be deprived of the privileges of the Club if and for so long as the Commanding Officer directs.

9. While the force is on active service any member who is attending hospital or doing light duty as a convalescent shall be excluded from the Club unless the written permission of the Medical Officer has been given.

10. The Club shall be open from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. on week days and from noon to 6 p.m. on Sundays, subject to any extension made by the Committee with the approval of the Commanding Officer and subject to any restriction that may be made by order of the Governor.

11. No liquor shall be taken away from the Club premises and no liquor supplied to anyone not being a member except as already provided in these rules.

12. All money matters shall be managed by the Committee and all orders for goods placed under their direction.

13. Should the financial position of the Club hereafter render such a course necessary the Committee may call on the enrolled members resident in Stanley to pay a subscription not exceeding one shilling per month.

Made at a General Meeting held at Headquarters on the twenty-ninth day of January, 1916, under the provisions of The Volunteer Ordinance, 1893.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit to you the Annual Report on the Education Department for the year 1915. Owing to the meagreness of previous Annual Reports and of the Special Report for the Imperial Conference Series I have thought it advisable to give more detailed information than will in future be necessary.

1. General.

2. The provisions for education in the Falkland Islands consist of:

- A. By Government
 - (a) A Government School in Stanley
 - (b) Five Government Travelling Teachers
- B. Receiving a Grant from Government
 - Nil
- C. Independent of Government
 - (a) A Roman Catholic School in Stanley
 - (b) A School supported by the Falkland Islands Company in Darwin
 - (c) Falkland Islands Company Travelling Teachers.

3. The Education Department in this Colony is in a somewhat chaotic state. Previous Education Reports have been submitted by the Inspector of Schools; there is now no Inspector of Schools, and even before the departure of the last Inspector this official, in as far as he was an official, can in no wise be considered to have been, in any ordinary sense, the Head of the Education Department. The late Inspector of Schools, who was the Dean of the Anglican Cathedral here, used to visit, when on his rounds through the country or "camp" districts, the various Government Travelling Teachers and the families they taught, and used to be referred to in certain matters connected with them. He was not allowed to visit the Government School in Stanley officially, he could not visit the little school in Darwin officially, and naturally did not visit the Roman Catholic School at all. He was, therefore, in the somewhat anomalous position of being an "Inspector of Schools" with no schools to inspect. Even in the case of the Travelling Teachers he had no authority. The Teachers' salaries were paid through the Government Schoolmaster in Stanley, who signed and submitted the Vouchers, drew the money, paid it into the Savings Bank to the Teachers' accounts, and even received a percentage as commission for so doing. At the same time it may be noted that the Government Schoolmaster knew nothing about these Teachers; whether they were at work or on leave. The Travelling Teachers did not correspond through either the Inspector of Schools or the Government Schoolmaster in Stanley, but wrote direct to the Colonial Secretary.

4. The paper for the series of Imperial Education Conference papers of 1912, clearly a work for the Head of the Department, was not written by the Inspector of Schools but by the Government Schoolmaster in Stanley. The Education Ordinance

(No. 8 of 1909), though it enters on all sorts of minor details regarding Pupil Teachers, matters which might well be relegated to a Code, does not so much as mention an Inspector of Schools, who only appears as a kind of after-thought and possibility, in the second last of the Regulations framed under that Ordinance.

5. In the Government School itself the position of the Government Schoolmaster has been a peculiar one. He was, to begin with, absolutely independent of the so called Inspector of Schools; he prepared his own syllabus of work, taught it, set his own examination papers, alone supervised the examination, corrected the papers and reported on the results of the examination, so that there was in reality no check whatsoever.

6. The Roman Catholic School, receiving no grant, was, and is, of course under no obligation to furnish Government with any information, nor is the little school at Darwin.

7. Neither from the above-cited paper for the Imperial Conference Series by the Government Schoolmaster nor from the Reports for previous years of the Government Inspector of Schools is it possible to obtain the figures or information which would enable me to make any comparison with the past, whether statistical, educational, or financial. I have, however, got certain figures from the Blue Books, others by enquiry or by consulting some of the Minute Papers in the Colonial Secretary's Office. Even with such assistance it is not, however, easy to prepare an altogether satisfactory Report.

8. There were various changes in the Government Education Staff during 1915.

- (1) The Inspector of Schools, Dean Seymour, left the Colony on the 28th June, 1915, and was not replaced. The Inspector of Schools received no salary as such.
- (2) Mr. and Mrs. Soutar, who had been Government Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress since 1908, left the Colony on the 2nd January, 1915. Mr. and Mrs. Soutar were receiving, when they were transferred, salaries at the rate of £240 and £108 per annum respectively.
- (3) Mr. G. L. Brown, who arrived in the Colony in December, 1914, as a Travelling Teacher, acted as Government Schoolmaster from 2nd January, 1915 to 7th August, 1915.
- (4) Mr. and Mrs. Hoare arrived in the Colony on the 7th August, 1915, and were appointed Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress from that date.
- (5) Mr. Conway, one of the Travelling Teachers, acted as Assistant Master from 1st January to 21st February, 1916.
- (6) Mr. Hubbard arrived in the Colony on the 21st February, 1915, and was appointed Assistant Master from that date.

2. Government School, Stanley.

12. There is no exact record of the number of pupils examined in 1913, 1914 and 1915. The number examined in September, 1915, was apparently about 137, Boys 78, Girls 59.

13. The number of openings of the school, each morning and each evening counting as one opening, was:

14. The School is held in large and commodious buildings, a main school-house containing a central hall, 4 class-rooms, 2 vestibules for hanging hats, great coats, &c.; a smaller school-house containing one large Infant class-room and an office for the Head Teacher. There is a fair-sized yard or play-ground, with proper sanitary out-buildings, tanks, a shed, and a giant stride. The school is situated in the centre of the town. The buildings were erected in 1905-6 at a cost of about £3,000, inclusive of the price of the site. The Government Schoolmaster and his wife, who is the Schoolmistress, are provided with a free house of an annual rental of £30 and 54 free loads of peat per annum, (value about £10).

15. The expenditure on the Stanley School during 1915 amounted to about £1026, divided as follows:

(a) Salaries	£572
(b) Other charges, including fuel and light, landing charges, &c.,	75
(c) Rental value of buildings (estimated)	200
(d) Teachers' passages	73
(e) Freight of Teachers' furniture	56
(f) Stationery £50	50

The total amount received in fees during 1915 was £128 : 12 : 6. The pupils paid £23 for stationery supplied. The actual cost to Government of the upkeep of the school for 1915 may therefore be estimated at £874, or, with 130 children in average Attendance, at £6 : 7 : 0 per head.

3. Government Travelling Teachers.

16. The Colony of the Falkland Islands outside Stanley is, educationally, as far as Government is concerned, divided into five "beats", each one of which is in charge of a Travelling Teacher (or Itinerant Schoolmaster). There are two beats on the East Falkland and three on the West Falkland. The salary of a Travelling Teacher commences at £60 per annum and rises, by increments of £5 each year, to £80. Travelling Teachers come out from the United Kingdom on a five years agreement and receive a free 2nd Cabin passage to the Falkland Islands and back. In addition to his salary each Teacher is entitled to free board and lodging and free transportation from point to point while on duty. The titular Travelling Teachers during 1915 were:

- East Falkland (a) Mr. G. L. Brown, never took up appointment
- (b) Mr. W. U. Currie, appointed 18th September, 1913.
- West Falkland (c) Mr. F. P. Thomson, appointed 16th November, 1911.
- (d) Mr. A. G. Simon, appointed 12th August 1913
- (e) Mr. W. E. Conway, appointed 10th December, 1913.

(1) The School was closed from the middle of October until the end of the year owing to the War.

17. On account of the War and the consequent dislocation of local services, Mr Brown and Mr Conway were employed in Stanley during the whole of 1915 and Mr Currie from January to June 1915, the two latter being Volunteers. It is consequently impossible to give any details concerning "Beats" (a) and (e) for this year. Mr Thomson on Beat (c) had under instruction during the year 15 children, 8 boys and 7 girls; Mr Simon, on beat (d) taught 10 children, 5 boys and 5 girls; Mr Currie, on beat (b) taught, during a part of the year, 13 children, 5 boys and 8 girls. There were thus in all 38 children, 18 boys and 20 girls, receiving instruction from the Government Travelling Teachers. The Government expenditure in 1915 on the Travelling Teachers amounted to £244, (including amounts paid to those otherwise employed.)

4. Roman Catholic School, Stanley.

18. The Roman Catholic School in Stanley, St. Mary's School, is in charge of Sisters of the Congregation of Mary, Help of Christians, a Congregation founded in Turin, Italy, by the Venerable Dom Bosco in 1872. This Congregation first arrived in the Colony in January, 1907, to replace the Salesian Congregation which had been in charge of the school previously. The present staff consists of three Sisters. The Manager is the Reverend Father Migone, the Roman Catholic clergyman. The school does not receive any Grant in aid from Government.

22. In connection with his educational work, Father Migone runs an excellent Cinematograph entertainment. Before the War there were monthly "free shows" open to all the children of Stanley and the Government Schoolmaster used to be present to explain the meaning, &c., of the pictures to the children. The whole expense of the installation has been borne by Father Migone himself, and since the beginning of the War the proceeds of many of the paying shows have been devoted to the Red Cross, the Belgian Relief and other funds.

5. The Falkland Islands Company's School and Teachers.

23. The Falkland Islands Company maintain a school with one Teacher at their little town of Darwin and further employ two Camp Teachers to visit the shepherds' houses in Lafonia, the south-west portion of East Falkland, the whole of which district belongs to the Company.

(2) There was no examination in 1914 on account of war conditions.

24. The number of children receiving instruction in the Darwin School in 1915 was 15; boys 8, girls 7. In cases where children shew any special aptitude they receive as a supplement to the ordinary elementary instruction teaching in secondary school subjects, inclusive of latin, geometry, algebra, statics, dynamics.

25. The Camp Teachers usually assign six weeks to each house; occasionally when two houses are near one another, two families are instructed together, the children walking or riding to the house where the Teacher has his temporary quarters. The number of children receiving instruction from these Camp Teachers in 1915 was 37, boys 20, girls 17.

6. Examinations.

26. The children of the Roman Catholic School, Stanley, and of the Falkland Islands Company's School Darwin, are examined under arrangements made by their own Managers. Government has nothing to do with these examinations. At the former school there was a Prize Day, in December, 1915, on which several Recitations and Songs were rendered by the pupils in a very satisfactory manner. The prizes were distributed by the Governor. On the following day there was an exhibition of work. The children taught by the Government Travelling Teachers and the Falkland Islands Company's Camp Teachers are, if examined at all, examined by their Teachers.

27. There has been, in the past, no Annual Examination of the Government School, Stanley, at the end of the school year in December. The usual examinations in March, June and September, conducted entirely by the Head Teacher (Government Schoolmaster), were held in 1915. There was a distribution of prizes for the year 1914 on 2nd June, 1915; the prizes were distributed by the Colonial Secretary, the Governor being unavoidably absent.

28. The Examination of the Pupil Teachers of the Government School, Stanley, is generally held in February each year. No examination for 1914 was held in February 1915, on account of the War. The examination for 1915, held in February 1916, was conducted by the Colonial Secretary by request of the Governor. The results are given in Appendix V.

7. Conclusion.

29. In concluding I must express my hearty thanks to the Reverend Father Migone for kindly sending me the information I asked for about the Roman Catholic School in Stanley, and to Mr. W. A. Harding, the local Manager of the Falkland Islands Company, and Mr. Alexander Moir, of Darwin, for the details with which they furnished me about the Company's School and Teachers.

Medical and Nursing Staff.

On 12th May Dr. Craddock arrived to take up the post of Assistant Colonial Surgeon, East Falkland.

On 28th June Dr. Pearce went home on leave, Dr. Craddock being appointed acting Colonial Surgeon.

Dr. Turner from the West also left by the same boat as Dr. Pearce.

The West were without a doctor until October when Dr. Henry arrived as "Camp" Doctor.

Miss Brookfield who came out as trained Nurse and Midwife was acting Nurse Matron until November when she resigned, leaving Stanley to be married.

Since then there has been no nurse in Stanley owing to the shortage of Nurses at present in England in England.

King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

In May the new King Edward VII Memorial Hospital was opened and the old Victoria Cottage Home closed and converted into Headquarters for the Falkland Islands Volunteers. Twenty one cases were admitted to the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital during the year.

Epidemics.

The only epidemic that occurred was during July, August and September. The cause of this was difficult to trace as it occurred more or less simultaneously over the East and West Islands, chiefly in the larger settlements. No cases occurred in Stanley. There were five deaths. The symptoms simulated very closely those of Beri Beri and in some stations nearly all the inhabitants complained of some symptom or other, although I think that many of the milder cases, the symptoms of which were mainly gastric, were due to indiscretions of diet, etc., and would never have come under notice, had it not been for the nervousness due to the fatal cases.

Quarantine, Shipping, Etc.,

No infectious cases have been reported from the ships although two cases of Mucous Colitis were admitted to the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital from one of the whaling boats.

General Health of Stanley.

Since May I have only seen one case of the ordinary exanthems, a case of Chicken Pox in a child. There has been one case of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, a man who was seen soon after his arrival to the Colony and who left after three or four weeks.

The health of the workmen erecting the Naval Wireless Station has not been so good as that of the ordinary population of Stanley. The chief illnesses among the men have been Bronchitis, Rheumatism, and Enteritis. Many cases of the latter being, I think, due to excessive meat eating to which the men were unaccustomed, and in many other cases to the abuse of alcohol. The lack of accommodation and subsequent crowding also helped to lower the general condition of the men.

Regulations for the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force.

1. Every member of the Force called out on Active Service, and whilst actually and wholly employed on such service, may, subject to the following proviso, be paid, from such funds as may be provided by the Legislative Council with the sanction of the Secretary of State, Military pay according to his rank in the Force, at the following rates:—

Company Sergeant Major	6/-	per day, plus 6d. proficiency pay.

Provided that where the member of the Force is in Civil employment, and his employer is willing to continue the payment in full to him of his ordinary daily civil pay whilst actually and wholly employed on active service, the member shall not in addition thereto receive military pay.

Should the employer of the member of the Force be unable at any time to continue the payment in full to him of his ordinary daily civil pay, or any portion thereof, whilst the member is actually and wholly employed on active service, such member in addition to so much of his civil pay as he may receive from his employer, may, with the sanction of the Governor, and from such funds as may be provided by the Legislative Council with the sanction of the Secretary of State, be paid such allowance as will bring the amount of his daily remuneration up to the standard daily rate of pay, for normal working hours, enjoyed by him at the time of his being called out for service.

2. Every member of the Force on Active Service on Outpost or Field Duty and absent from his ordinary place of residence shall, in addition to his military pay receive free rations, or an allowance at a rate not exceeding £3 a month in lieu thereof, at the option of the Commanding Officer of the Force.

3. In the event of a Volunteer being actually employed on Active Service for a portion only of a day he shall be entitled to receive pay proportionate to his daily military pay calculated at three times the number of hours during which he is so employed, provided that the total number of hours by such calculation does not exceed twenty-four.

4. Every member of the Force shall be eligible for proficiency pay who has passed the “qualification standard” in the Musketry course during, or if such has not been held, immediately preceding the term of Active Service, and has attended the number of drills required by the Regulations for efficiency, or who has qualified in any particular branch.

5. Every member of the Force shall be liable, after inquiry held by the Officer Commanding the Force, to forfeit his proficiency pay for offences of neglect of duty, neglect of care for arms or equipment, or for misconduct.

Regulations for the Government Savings Bank.

1. In these Regulations "Savings Bank" means the Government Savings Bank established by The Savings Bank Ordinance, 1888.

2. The Savings Bank shall be at the Public Treasury, Stanley, and shall be open daily each week (Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Public Holidays excepted) for the transaction of business from 10 a.m., to 3 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

3. Every Depositor, on making a first deposit in the Savings Bank, shall be supplied, free of charge, with a Pass Book, and shall be required to state his christian name and surname, occupation and residence, (to the officer appointed to receive the deposit), and to sign his name in the place provided for the Depositor's signature in the Pass Book. If the Depositor cannot write, his mark shall be taken, and witnessed by the Treasurer or an Officer of his Department.

If the Depositor is unable to attend personally at the Savings Bank, his signature or mark may be witnessed by a Justice of the Peace or a Minister of Religion recognised by the Government, or by a landed proprietor, or lessee of Crown Lands or his Manager in the district in which the Depositor resides. The particulars of the deposit together with the money to be deposited shall then be forwarded to the Treasurer to be dealt with according to the Savings Bank Regulations.

4. Deposits may be made by a Trustee in behalf of another person or persons, in the joint names of such Trustee and the person or persons on whose account such money shall be so deposited, but repayment of the same or any part thereof shall not be made without the receipt and receipts of both or all of the said parties, or the survivor or survivors, or the executors or administrators of such survivor, whose receipt and receipts, either personally, or by agent appointed by Power of Attorney, which Power of Attorney may be executed by an infant of or exceeding the age of 14 years, shall alone be a valid discharge, except in cases of insanity or imbecility of the party on whose behalf the deposits were made, when the Treasurer may, on proof of the fact to his satisfaction, allow repayment to be made to the Trustee alone.

5. Deposits may be made by or for the benefit of any person under 21 years of age, and repayment shall be made to such minor after the age of 7 years in the same manner as if he were of full age.

6. Deposits may be made by married women, and deposits so made, or made by women who shall afterwards marry, will be repaid to any such woman.

7. Deposits may be made by The Trustees of any Friendly Society, or of any Charitable or Provident Society, or Penny Savings Bank, within the Colony of the Falkland Islands, provided always that such deposits shall not be of less amount than One Shilling, or of any sum not a multiple thereof, and that a copy of the rules of such Society or Penny Savings Bank be deposited with the Treasurer, with the names and addresses of the Trustees thereof.

8. No deposit shall be for any sum less than One Shilling, and no withdrawal shall be for less amounts than One Shilling unless to close the account.

9. Every Depositor shall once in each year, on or before the 30th of September, forward his Pass Book to the office of the Treasurer, in order that the entries in such book may be compared with the entries in the books of the Treasurer, and that the interest due to the Depositor may be inserted in his book.

10. Any Depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or any part of the sum standing to his credit in the Savings Bank, shall make application to the Treasurer, on the form hereby prescribed as follows:—

11. Every withdrawal from the Savings Bank shall be paid to the Depositor in person, or to the person duly authorized by him to receive the same, and receipts shall be given by the Depositor, or by the person authorized, as the case may be, for every payment made to him.

An authorization to receive payment from the Savings Bank shall be signed in the presence of a Justice of the Peace, a Minister of Religion recognized by the Government, or a landed proprietor or Lessee of Crown Lands or his Manager in the District in which the Depositor resides. If the Depositor be out of the Colony, his signature shall be verified by some constituted authority of the place in which he resides.

12. Applications to withdraw money deposited by any Friendly, Charitable or Provident Society, or Penny Savings Bank, shall be signed by two of the Trustees of any such Society, or Penny Savings Bank, or, when there is no Trustee, then by the Treasurer, and the names of the Trustee or Treasurer or other Officer of the Society authorised to receive the amount to be withdrawn, shall be stated in the notice of withdrawal, and the Warrant for payment of the amount shall be made out in the name of such Trustee, Treasurer, or Officer, and the receipt of such person apparently authorised shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

13. In case any Depositor shall die leaving any sum of money in the Savings Bank, the same shall only be paid to the Executor or Administrator on the production of the Probate of the Will, or Letters of Administration of the Estate or Effects of the deceased Depositor, to the Treasurer. Provided always that if the sum of money, with interest, due to such Depositor at the time of his death shall not exceed Fifty Pounds, and if Probate of his Will or Letters of Administration be not produced to the Treasurer, or if notice in writing of the existence of a Will, and intention to prove the same, or to take out Letters of Administration, be not given to the Treasurer at his office within the period of one month after the death of the Depositor; or if such notice be given, but such Will be not proved, or Letters of Administration be not taken out, and the Probate or Letters of Administration (as the case may be) be not produced to the Treasurer within the period of two months from the death of the Depositor, it shall be lawful for the Treasurer after such period of *one* or *two* months (as the case may be) to pay and divide such funds at his discretion, to or amongst the widow or relatives of the deceased Depositor, or any, or more of them; or, if he shall think proper, according to the Statute of Distributions.

14. If any Depositor, being illegitimate, shall die intestate, leaving any person or persons who but for the illegitimacy of such Depositor, and of such person or persons, would be entitled to the money due to such deceased Depositor, it shall be lawful for the Treasurer, with the authority in writing of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, to pay the money of such deceased Depositor to any one or more of the persons, who, in his opinion, would have been entitled to the same according to the Statute of Distributions if such Depositor and such person or persons had been legitimate.

15. If any Depositor shall become insane or otherwise incapacitated to act and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Treasurer, and if the Treasurer shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, he may pay from time to time out of the funds of such Depositor to any person whom he shall judge proper, and the receipt of such person shall be a good discharge for the same.

16. If any dispute shall arise between the Treasurer and any individual Depositor or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor, or assignee of a Depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Savings Bank, then and in every such case, the matter in dispute shall be referred to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and whatever award, order, or determination, shall be made by the said Chief Justice, shall be binding and conclusive on all parties, and shall be final to all intents and purposes without any appeal.

17. No money shall be paid from the Savings Bank without the production of the Depositor's pass book and application for withdrawal made on the prescribed form. Payments may be made, when convenient to the Treasurer, at the time of application, provided nevertheless the Treasurer may in the exercise of his discretion require on the receipt of the application for withdrawal the following periods of delay:—

For any sum of money not exceeding ten pounds (£10.) Two days.

For any sum of money exceeding ten pounds (£10.) Four days.

Provided always that in case of the withdrawal of any sum exceeding Fifty Pounds, (£50) payment may be made by a Bill of Exchange at par, drawn by the Governor on the Crown Agents for the Colonies in London payable thirty days after sight, or in cash from the Treasury Chest, at the discretion of the Governor. In case of payment by Bill of Exchange the withdrawal will be complete on the day of the date of such Bill.

18. The Regulations made by the Governor in Council on the 8th day of May, 1888, are hereby cancelled.

I have the honour to submit herewith returns (numbered 1 to 12), called for under Colonial Regulation 396, together with a Draft of the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance in respect of the year ended 31st December 1915.

REVENUE.

2. The total revenue collected amounted to £63,626 : 11 : 11 as against £30,342, estimated. It includes £8472 : 12 : 7 instalment of Land Purchase, and £806 : 15 : 0 collected under the Live Stock Ordinance, leaving a total Ordinary revenue of £34,347 : 4 : 4, being £13,274 : 4 : 4, over that estimated. Compared with the revenue for the previous year, it shows an increase of £587 : 9 : 7.

The most noticeable increase was under "Imports on spirits, Falklands", (£896 : 8 : 7 more than in 1914), and "Exports on Whale oil, South Georgia" (£1065 : 0 : 3 more than in 1914).

6. Head 2. **Port Dues** £681 : 19 : 0. All the Items under this head, with the exception of "Wharfage", exceeded the estimate and were £41 : 5 : 0 more than the previous year.

An Ordinance to provide for the management and maintenance of The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

Whereas subscriptions have been collected by a Committee known as the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital Committee, and a Building has been erected in the Town of Stanley for a Public Hospital as a Memorial in the Colony to His Late Majesty King Edward VII,

Preamble.

And Whereas the site for the Hospital together with the Buildings erected thereon has, with the approval of the said Committee, been given conveyed and granted by Messrs George Bonner and Company Limited to the Governor of the Falkland Islands in terms and on the conditions set forth in a Deed of conveyance made the First day of October, 1915, between the said Company, the Chairman of the said Committee, and the Governor of the Falkland Islands,

And Whereas it is necessary to provide for the management and maintenance of the said Buildings for the purposes of a Public Hospital,

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the King Edward Hospital Ordinance, 1916.

Short Title.

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance:—

“HOSPITAL” means the Public Hospital in the Town of Stanley known as “The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital”.

“COMPANY” means Messrs George Bonner and Company Limited their successors and assigns.

Hospital lands and buildings.

3. (1) The several lots or parcels of land in the Town of Stanley comprising the site for the Hospital and described in the Indenture contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance, are together with the Buildings thereon, conveyed to and held by the Governor and his Successors on behalf of the Crown in terms and on the conditions set forth in the said Schedule.

(2) In the event of the Government ceasing at any time to maintain and use the said Buildings for the purpose of a Public Hospital, then at the expiration of one year thereafter or at such earlier date as may be mutually agreed the hereditaments assured by the Indenture contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance shall revert and be reconveyed by the Governor to the Company.

Name of Hospital.

4. The Hospital shall be called and known as “The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital”.

Medical Officer.

5. The Colonial Surgeon shall be the Medical Officer and Surgeon to the Hospital, and the Hospital shall be under his care and management subject to the regulations for the Hospital and the directions of the Governor.

Appointment of Nurses and Servants.

6. The Governor may appoint a Nurse Matron, and such other Nurses and Servants for the Hospital as he may think fit, who shall receive such salaries and allowances as the Legislative Council may provide with the sanction of the Secretary of State.

Visiting Committee.

7. (1) There shall be a Visiting Committee for the Hospital to be appointed by the Governor from time to time for such period or periods as the Governor may think fit, consisting of not more than three persons not holding any appointment or employment under the Colonial Government. The Committee shall meet as often as they shall think fit and shall at all times have access to the Hospital and shall enter any suggestions they may have to make for the consideration of the Governor in a book to be kept at the Hospital for the purpose.

Chairman of Committee.

(2) The Governor shall appoint the Chairman of the Committee.

Making of Regulations.

8. The Governor in Council may make, and from time to time vary, regulations for the admission, maintenance, treatment and discharge of patients, and for the general management and working of the Hospital, and such regulations shall be published in the Gazette.

DEED OF CONVEYANCE.

THIS INDENTURE made the First day of October One thousand nine hundred and fifteen BETWEEN GEORGE BONNER AND COMPANY LIMITED whose registered office is situated at 41 Castle Street in the City of Liverpool (hereinafter called "the Company") of the first part THE HONOURABLE WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING of the Falkland Islands of the second part and HIS EXCELLENCY WILLIAM DOUGLAS YOUNG, C.M.G. Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies (hereinafter called "the Governor") of the third part WHEREAS the Company is by its Memorandum of Association empowered to aid in the establishment and support of Schools Associations or Institutions calculated to benefit persons employed by the Company or having dealings with the Company AND WHEREAS some time since it was resolved to erect and equip a Hospital at Stanley in the Falkland Islands to be known as The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital and funds were raised and subscribed for the purpose AND WHEREAS the Company being seized in unincumbered fee simple of the hereditaments hereby assured resolved to give the same as and for the site of the said Hospital it being the opinion of the Directors that such Hospital was calculated to benefit persons employed by the Company AND WHEREAS with the privity of the Company a Hospital has since been erected on the said site under the supervision of a Committee known as The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital Committee whereof the said WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING is Chairman AND WHEREAS it has been arranged that such Hospital should be handed over to the Governor to be held by him and his successors on behalf of the Crown subject nevertheless to the provisions hereinafter mentioned AND WHEREAS the Company with a view of furthering such purpose as aforesaid has consented to convey the hereditaments hereby assured in manner hereinafter appearing AND WHEREAS it has been arranged that the said WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING should join in these presents for the purpose of testifying the approval hereof of the said Hospital Committee NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises the Company with the privity of the said WILLIAM ALFRED HARDING HEREBY GRANTS unto the Governor ALL THAT piece or parcel of land containing three fourths of an acre or thereabouts situate in Stanley in the Falkland Islands and formerly consisting of three plots which were heretofore severally granted or conveyed (by the respective instruments in the Schedule hereto mentioned) by the descriptions set out in the said Schedule TOGETHER with the Hospital and other Buildings thereon erected TO HOLD the same UNTO AND TO THE USE of the said Governor and his Successors upon the terms and subject to the conditions following that is to say :—

1. THE said hereditaments and the buildings erected or from time to time to be erected thereon shall be used as a Public Hospital to be known as The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.
2. THE said Hospital shall henceforth be maintained and the Medical and Nursing Staff provided out of Public Funds of the Falkland Islands.
3. THERE shall be a visiting Committee to be appointed by the Governor for the time being which Committee shall consist of three members of the Public not being in the service of the Colonial Government. The members of the said Committee shall at all times have access to the said Hospital and the suggestions of the Committee shall be from time to time entered by them in a Book to be kept at the said Hospital for that purpose.
4. IF at any time the said lands and buildings shall cease to be used for the Purposes of a Hospital the hereditaments hereby assured shall be reconveyed to the Company its successors and assigns.

IN WITNESS whereof the Company has hereunto affixed its seal the party of the second part and the Governor have set their respective hands and seals the day and year first before written.

An Ordinance to Prohibit Trading with
Persons of Enemy Nationality.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Trading with the Enemy Prohibition Ordinance, 1916.

Short Title.

2. Any act of the Imperial Parliament in force for the time being and any Proclamation or Order-in-Council by His Majesty the King prohibiting any persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, from trading with any persons or bodies of persons whether resident or not resident, or carrying on business in enemy territory or in territory in the occupation of the enemy, shall have full force and effect in respect of any person or persons or bodies of persons, resident in or carrying on business in this Colony, in respect of any acts committed by them which, if committed by persons in the United Kingdom, would constitute an offence under any such act of the Imperial Parliament or under any Proclamation or Order-in-Council by His Majesty the King.

Trading with persons of Enemy Nationality prohibited.

“MANAGER” and “AGENT” respectively means any person duly approved as such in accordance with the provisions of Section 70 of the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

“SERVANT” means any person employed by the holder of a publican's retail license, or his Manager or Agent.

2. No intoxicating liquor shall be sold by any servant under the age of twenty-one years, unless the holder of a publican's retail license, his Manager or Agent be present.

3. No child under the age of sixteen shall be employed for the sale of or be allowed to sell intoxicating liquor.

4. Any person acting in contravention of any provision of these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty of ten pounds for every breach thereof.

After two years of the War we see most clearly emerging a struggle of Economic Endurance, to be waged by the non-combatants; and that side whose non-combatants can finance it longest will win. Upon the issue depends the liberty of our Empire.

Customs Rules.

Appointing the hours of routine duty for Officers of the Customs Department and fixing the charges to be paid for the overtime services of the Officers.

—00—

1. For the purpose of these Rules the appointed hours for routine duty of the Officers of the Customs Department shall be as follows:—

For Indoor Officers of Customs.

Weekdays. 10.0 a.m. to 4.0 p.m., the hour 1.0 to 2.0 p.m. being allowed for meals.
Saturdays. 10.0 a.m. to 1.0 p.m.

For Outdoor Officers of Customs.

1st April to 30th September	Weekdays	7.30 a.m. to 4.0 p.m.
” ” ” ”	Saturdays	7.30 a.m. to 1.0 p.m.
1st October to 31st March	Weekdays	6.0 a.m. to 5.0 p.m.
” ” ” ”	Saturdays	6.0 a.m. to 1.0 p.m.

Subject to intervals for meals according to circumstances of service, as may be approved by the Collector or Deputy Collector of Customs.

Should the services of the Outdoor Officers of Customs not be required on outdoor duty, the hours of routine duty of these Officers shall, subject to the direction of the Collector or Deputy Collector of Customs, be the same as those for the Indoor Officers of Customs.

Fees to be paid by Shipping and Importers.

2. Any Merchant, Agent, or Master of a vessel asking for or requiring the services of an Officer of Customs at any time other than the above appointed hours, and the Collector of Customs having authorized the same, shall be charged and shall pay into the Government Treasury fees at the following rates in respect of each officer employed:—

- (a) ON WEEKDAYS (not being Office Holidays)
- (i) Between the hour of 6.0 a.m. and the hour appointed for the commencement of duty, and after the appointed hours of duty to 8.0 p.m., one shilling and sixpence for every hour or part of an hour.
 - (ii) Between the hours of 8.0 p.m. and 6.0 a.m. two shillings and three pence for every hour or part of an hour
Provided that unless the service be continuous with the end or beginning of the hours of routine duty in no case shall the minimum charge be less than for two hours.
- ON SUNDAYS, CHRISTMAS DAY, AND OFFICE HOLIDAYS
- (iii) Between 6.0 a.m. and 8.0 p.m. five shillings for the first two hours or part of two hours, and one shilling and sixpence for every hour or part of an hour thereafter.

- (iv) Between 8.0 p.m. and 6.0 a.m. seven shillings and sixpence for the first two hours or part of two hours, and two shillings and three-pence for every hour or part of an hour thereafter.

When the services of an officer extend from one period of time into the other the longer time served in either shall govern the amount of the fee to be paid in respect of the Officer's overtime for the first two hours or part of two hours.

When the personal services of the Collector of Customs are necessarily required by any Merchant, Agent, or Master of a Vessel, out of the hours appointed for Indoor Officers of Customs, double the above rates will be charged.

- (b) For single act of entering or clearing or of entering and at the same time clearing a vessel provided that the Officer's services be not otherwise required and charged for under section (a) above.

On Weekdays	7/6
On Sundays, Christmas Day, and Office Holidays	10/-

In the case of a Whale Catcher or Whale Catchers being entered or cleared together with, and at the same time as, a Whale Factory or Steamer, and belonging to the same Company, the inclusive fee for each Factory or Steamer and Catchers shall be a full rate and a half.

Fees to be paid to Customs Officers.

3. The amount of the fees paid into the Government Treasury under these rules may, on the warrant of the Governor, be paid to the Officer in respect of whose services the fees were originally paid into the Treasury.

4. The Rules made by the Governor in Council on the 3rd day of July, 1906, and published in the Gazette of the 1st August, 1906, are hereby rescinded.



Sir,

I have the honour to forward herewith the Annual Report of this department for the season 1915-1916.

Seasons.

2. The late Spring and Summer were very dry, hard camp suffering a good deal in consequence. The Winter has been open, not too severe, and with less rain than usual.

Sheep.

3. The general health of the flocks is excellent; in fact, speaking from personal knowledge, I am able to say that the sheep are freer from external parasites at the present time than they have been during the last seven years and the Colony can also congratulate itself on the fact that the flocks are free from practically every contagious and infectious disease so common among Sheep in other parts.

(a) The clip has been well up to the average and in every way satisfactory, the highest price for Wool being $1/8\frac{1}{2}d$, which is the record for over 40 years.

(b) The total number of Sheep in the Islands is now 689,904; this is over 11,000 less than the returns of last year, and less than has been returned in the Colony since 1909. The decrease is mainly due to the fact that over 77,000 Sheep were disposed of during the season or more than 17,000 more than last year.

(c) It is very satisfactory to report that the death rate for the season of 10.30% is less than it has been for six years and is over 2% lower than in 1913. The mortality is due mainly to climatic conditions, bad ditches, swamps etc., nevertheless the death rate could be reduced in some parts if there was less rush and rough handling of stock, which are especially noticeable at the dippings.

(d) Everything was in favour of there being a good increase of lambs, yet the returns, more especially on the West, were disappointing. The percentage was 68.80 which although, 4% better than last season, still leaves much to be desired.

(e) Owing to complaints on both East and West Islands about driving stock through farms without due notice being given, it was found necessary to circulate to all farms on the mainland copies of Sections 18 & 19 of the Live Stock Ordinance No. 8 of 1901.

Canning.

4. Although only the Goose Green factory was working over 37,000 sheep were canned, which is over 8,000 more than ever canned in the Colony previously. For the first time sheep were purchased from the West Falklands for the works, 13,120 being shipped per S.S. "Falkland" from Port Howard to Egg Harbour.

Cattle.

5. Number in the Colony 7,561. Health very good. New blood is very badly needed on both East & West Falklands.

Horses.

6. Number in the Colony 3,929. General health good. Mortality 3.5%. Foaling 53.73%. On some stations, owing doubtlessly to a shortage of horses, it has been the custom to send worn-out old Mares to the Manadas, for breeding purposes. Such a procedure is naturally unprofitable, for it is not reasonable to expect an old mare to rear a foal well, when it often is a difficult matter for her to support herself. Happily there is now every possibility of this method being changed, for quite a number of good young mares have been imported, many of which will be used for breeding purposes. Some really good class Stallions of a suitable stamp are very badly needed indeed.

Exports.

7. No live animals were exported during the season, as the law does not permit the exportation of stock to any Country except the United Kingdom.

Imports.

8. Five Romney Rams of first quality were imported from England. This is the least number of Rams imported for some years. From South America 313 Horses and Mares were imported. Some of these animals were heavier and better class than usually shipped to the Colony.

Cultivation.

9. Owing to the exceptionally dry Summer, hay crops were lighter than usually. There is now more land under cultivation than there has ever been previously, and there is every likelihood that that this will increase yearly. The advantage of being able to buy good hay locally grown must now be apparent, for the imported material is poorer in quality and considerably higher in price. In addition there is always a risk of introducing disease into the Colony with imported hay.

Ensilage.

10. This has been tried as an experiment for the first time in the Colony, a crop of oaten hay having successfully been turned into Ensilage. The advantages which are claimed for the process should appeal to the Falkland Island farmer, the principal one being that in the raising of crops a farmer is independent of weather conditions, which in this Colony is a decided gain, for few seasons occur in which difficulty is not experienced in reducing green fodder to a sufficiently dry condition for stacking in the ordinary way. Ensilage is a valuable food for stock, and can be made out of the great majority of green crops and grasses. An experiment made with Tussac would prove interesting and valuable.

Diminution of certain wild birds.

11. Although a sum of £50 is estimated to be spent on the destruction of Rooks, Carranchos, & Turkey Buzzards, yet during the last twelve months less than £8 has been paid out for this purpose.

Quarantine Station.

12. The fences have now been put in thorough repair, the shed painted outside and limewashed inside. The dip has also been repaired and a concrete floor has been laid beneath the gratings, so that now the shed can be thoroughly disinfected, which formerly, with a soft earthen floor, was impossible. The work was carried out by the Public Works Department at a total cost of £99 : 4 : 9.

SUGGESTIONS BY THE ACTING COLONIAL SURGEON FOR AN
IMPROVED DIET IN THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

1. More might be made of the natural resources of the Island.
 - (a) Beef can generally be obtained either alternate weeks or at least every third week.
 - (b) Fish can be obtained during a considerable portion of the year if trouble is taken to catch them.
 - (c) Geese are always plentiful (other game such as teal, hares and snipe can be obtained in season).
 - (d) Fowls and eggs are fairly plentiful.

If proper advantage is taken of the above foods helped out with tinned and potted provisions it would do a great deal to relieve the monotony of the mutton diet which at present seems to be the only flesh that many exist on week after week.

2. More might be made of the vegetables that can be grown.

All the houses have a garden, many of them of considerable size. In many of these, (in fact in most of them,) the major portion is laid out in potatoes which are practically the only vegetable imported and which can always be obtained.

If the householders laid their gardens out chiefly in other vegetables and only planted a small portion with potatoes, they could always buy sufficient potatoes to prevent any actual shortage.

Cabbages (two or three kinds) carrots, parsnips, swede turnips, leeks and cauliflour will all grow with a little care, Beet and lettuces do well in some gardens.

Young carrot tops make an excellent substitute for spinach when properly cooked. In fact much of the green food that is habitually wasted could be used for vegetable soups.

A FEW SHORT HINTS ON VEGETABLE GROWING.
FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Preparation of heavy soil.

Heavy soil should be prepared by bastard trenching, *i.e.* by digging a trench 14 inches deep 3 feet 6 inches wide the full width of plot and removing soil; the bottom of the trench should then be broken up to a depth of about 12 inches. Trench No. 2 should be 3 feet wide and treated in exactly the same way as No. 1. By trenching the whole plot in this fashion the ground will be dug to a depth of 26 inches. Trenching should be done in Autumn, or throughout the winter months.

Preparation of light soil.

Light soil should be turned up rough in the Autumn and lime should be applied in Spring in preference to Animal Manure. 14 lbs. of lime per rod.

POTATOES.

Early second early are the best to grow. Varieties with shallow eyes such as Rosebery, Advancer, Royalty, Duke of York, Suttons Snowball, Suttons Supreme and Dobbie's Favourite are recommended. Sets weighing from 2 to 3 oz. are the best to plant, and they should be laid out in shallow boxes until growth has begun, then plant between 20th September and 10th October. There should be 2 feet between the rows and 1 foot between the tubers, and sets should be planted 4 inches below the surface. During growth the ground should be kept free from weeds and a sprinkling of lime will be found beneficial. Earth up to the plants when they are six inches high.

PARSNIPS, CARROTS and BEETROOT.

Sow parsnips and carrots on 15th September or as soon thereafter as weather permits. Drills should be 14 inch to 15 inch apart and 1 inch deep. Sow parsnip seed thick, and carrot seed thin. Parsnips should be thinned about 14 inches apart, and carrots 6 inches apart and remaining plants removed for use not later than January. The ground should be kept free from weeds and porous. Should the ground be of tenacious clay and not permit trenching, holes about 3 feet deep should be dug and filled with fine soil. The following varieties are recommended, *Carrots*, James Scarlet Intermediate, Carter's Short Horn, Improved Horn, Early Market; *Parsnips*, The "Studant" and Hollow Crown.

Beetroot should be sown in the latter part of October. There should be 14 inches between the rows and 1 foot between the plants. Holes should be made with a small dibber and 3 or 4 seeds placed in each hole 1 inch deep. Plants should be thinned out 12 inches apart. The following varieties are recommended; Egyptian Turnip Rooting varieties, Carter's round, Carter's Dainty and Dell's Dark-Leaved.

TURNIPS.

The ground should be lightly manured and turned over deeply with spade. Seed should be planted not earlier than the first week in October, and should then be sown every month or six weeks to keep up a good supply of young roots. The young plants should be thinned out to 6 inches apart. Good varieties are the Little Marvel, Snowball, Golden Rose, Golden Ball and Jersey Lily. The Suede Turnip should be treated in the same way except that they should be thinned out 14 inches apart. The Crimson Top Suede is recommended.

ONIONS.

The ground should be bastard trenched and a heavy dressing of manure should be worked in. Drills should be 14 inches apart. The seed should be sown thickly about 1 inch deep not later than the 16th September. The plants should be thinned to 1 foot apart and the ground kept open by the use of the hoe. The plants should be manured as they are gross feeders.

CABBAGE and WINTERGREENS.

Ground should be well manured and dug deeply. Three sowings are required, the first in September, the second in November, and third at the beginning of February. Cabbage should be sown in drills about 6 inches apart and $\frac{1}{2}$ in. deep. The seed should be sown thin and kept moist. When the second leaves appear the plants should be planted out in a bed 6 inches apart. When they have become good strong plants they should be transplanted to the final quarters having 18 inches between the rows and 15 inches between the plants. The following are recommended; Sutton's April, Enfield Market, Wheeler's Imperial, Carter's Beefheart and Carter's Marrow. The Savoy Cabbage is the winter green which is sown at the beginning of October, receiving the same treatment as Cabbages. They should be planted 2 feet apart or between Potatoes in

December and will give useful produce in June, July, August and September. Other good winter greens are Scotch Kale and Russian Kale. Purple sprouting Broccoli will be found to be one of the most useful vegetables in the garden. It is at its best in October when vegetables are scarce and is a favourite in the Old Country. Sow Broccoli seed at the end of October in drills 6 inches apart and $\frac{1}{2}$ an inch deep. When the plants are large enough plant in a firm and rather poor soil. Planting of all kinds of cabbages should be done with the garden trowel or hand fork. The following varieties are recommended; Broccoli Late Queen, Universal Protecting, Carter's autumn and Snows Winter White.

LETTUCE.

Plants require rich soil and half-sheltered position. Sow seed thinly in drills $\frac{1}{2}$ in. deep and thin plants out to 1 foot apart and 14 inches between the rows, the following are good varieties: Early White Cos, Dunnett's Giant White Cos. Cabbage Lettuce Longstander, Holborn Standard Carter's Perpetual.

2. These Regulations may be cited as the Whaling (Emergency) Regulations, 1916.

REGULATIONS.

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

The Medical Officer.

1. The Colonial Surgeon, who is the Medical Officer and Surgeon to the Hospital, shall, in the exercise of the general care and management of the Hospital, exact from the officers, nurses and servants of the Institution prompt obedience to his lawful orders.

2. He shall visit and inspect the Hospital at least once a week, and when there are any patients in hospital he shall visit at least once a day and shall give such further daily attendance at the Hospital as may be necessary.

3. He shall be responsible for the general economy and expenditure of the Hospital, and shall certify the correctness of every account before payment is made. He shall also be responsible for the due collection, and payment into the Treasury at the end of each month, of all Hospital fees and moneys due to the Treasury.

The Nurse Matron.

4. The Nurse Matron of the Hospital shall reside at the Hospital and occupy the quarters provided for her and for the joint use of herself and the Government Nurse. She shall not absent herself from the Hospital premises without handing over the temporary charge, to the senior nurse present, or in the absence of any nurse, to the senior maid, and without notifying the place where she may be found in case of emergency. Such notification shall be by writing on a slate, to be exhibited in the front porch of the Hospital.

5. She shall be responsible to the Medical Officer for the domestic order and cleanliness of the Hospital and for the general observance of the rules thereof by every nurse, servant, patient, and visitor, and she shall report to the Medical Officer all cases of misbehaviour or neglect.

6. She shall take charge of and be responsible for all household goods, linen and furniture and shall keep an inventory thereof, and when any such articles are worn out or destroyed shall specify in writing to the Medical Officer what is required to replace them. She shall also similarly specify any further articles she considers necessary for the service of the Hospital.

7. She shall be responsible to the Medical Officer for the proper nursing, care, and comfort of the inmates in every particular, and shall strictly conform to the directions of the Medical Officer in respect thereto.

8. She shall, under the direction of the Medical Officer, order all supplies and provisions required for the Hospital, and she shall be responsible for the ordering and proper issue of all diets for patients, and for the catering required at the Hospital.

9. She shall keep a counterfoil order book of all supplies and provisions ordered for the Hospital, and shall from time to time submit the same to the Medical Officer for his inspection and approval. She shall also keep a diet book and an issue book shewing the daily consumption of provisions, etc., served out to the patients and to the household.

10. She shall keep a Register of all patients admitted to the Hospital, giving date of admission, name of patient, disease as certified by the Medical Officer, date of discharge, fees payable, and such other information as the Governor may require.

11. She shall, on or before the discharge from Hospital of any patient, and at the end of every week, make out in Form I hereto, an account of the fees etc., to be paid by the patient. Such accounts shall be forwarded to the Medical Officer for the collection of the amount as shall be certified by him. In similar manner she shall make out and forward all accounts for private attendance or nursing at the residences of patients.

12. She shall immediately report to the Medical Officer any occurrence of an unusual or urgent nature.

13. She shall, in the absence from Stanley of the Government Nurse and at such other times as may be required, attend at the residences of patients and perform such nursing duties within the Town of Stanley, or elsewhere, as the Medical Officer may direct.

The Government Nurse.

14. The Government Nurse shall reside at the Hospital and occupy the quarters provided for her and for the joint use of the Nurse Matron and herself. She shall attend and perform such nursing duties at the residences of patients as the Medical Officer shall direct. When not engaged on duty beyond the limits of the Town of Stanley and her services are otherwise available, the Government Nurse shall assist the Nurse Matron in the care and nursing of any patients in the Hospital, and shall carry out all such orders as may be given to her in this respect by the Nurse Matron, subject to the instructions of the Medical Officer.

15. She shall when present at the Hospital take temporary charge of the Hospital in the absence therefrom of the Nurse Matron.

16. When the services of the Government Nurse are required for private attendance or nursing at the residence of the patient and application is made by the patient's medical attendant, the Nurse Matron, subject to the direction of the Medical Officer, shall arrange accordingly, should the services of the of the Nurse be available.

17. The following shall be the fees to be charged for private attendance or nursing at the residence of the patient:

Within the limits of the Town of Stanley:

For visits of attendance as shall be directed by the Medical officer,

By the day, according to number of visits 1 - to 2/-

By annual subscription payable half yearly in January and July,

For not more than 2 members of
same family, per annum 10/-

For whole family, ,, £1 : 1 : 0

For Nursing,

During the day ... 3/-

During the night ... 5/-

Beyond the limits of the Town of Stanley:

For Nursing,

For first week, or part thereof, £1 : 1 : 0

After first week, per day 3/-

in addition to which the Nurse shall be provided free of charge, with suitable board and lodging, and means of conveyance both from and to Stanley.

The above fees do not include charges in midwifery cases, for which a further fee of £1 : 1 : 0 shall be charged for services and attendance in each case.

For Government Officials and employes and their families and servants the fees to be charged shall in each case be one half of the above rates.

Assistant Nurses, Maids and Servants.

18. Every Assistant Nurse, maid and servant, shall be under the immediate direction of the Nurse Matron, and in her absence under that of the Government Nurse in temporary charge. They shall use the utmost diligence in complying with the orders of the Medical Officer and the Nurse Matron, or Nurse in charge.

19. They shall never absent themselves from the Hospital premises without the permission of the Medical Officer or the Nurse Matron or Nurse in Charge.

Hospital Patients.

20. Every patient shall be admitted to, and discharged from, the Hospital by the Medical Officer. The Medical Officer may refuse to admit any applicant for admission should he consider the case to be not of sufficient gravity for treatment in the wards of the Hospital.

21. Every patient admitted to the Hospital shall be liable for the payment of the Hospital fees set forth in these Regulations.

22. No male patient shall go into the women's ward, and no female patient shall go into the men's ward.

23. No patient shall quit the Hospital without leave from the Medical Officer, or, in case of emergency, from the Nurse Matron.

24. Any patient breaking any of the Regulations of the Hospital, or refusing the medical treatment ordered, shall be liable to be discharged from the Hospital by the Medical Officer.

25. With the permission of the Medical Officer, or of the Nurse Matron, and at such times as may be fixed by either of them, friends of patients may be allowed to visit them in Hospital, but not otherwise.

26. Every application for admission to the Maternity Ward, shall be made as far as possible at least one week before the date of desired admission.

27. Any patient desirous of being admitted to the Hospital as a Private Patient occupying a private ward may, in the discretion of the Medical Officer, be so admitted whenever any such ward is available. Private Patients shall make arrangements at their own expense for attendance by their own medical attendant.

28. The following shall be the Hospital fees to be charged Hospital patients:—

In the General Wards, including medical attendance, care, and treatment.

For residents in the Colony, subject nevertheless to a remission, either in whole or in part, by the Governor in indigent cases 4/- a day or £1 : 1s. a week

For non-residents, subject to any special considerations and recommendations for a less charge as may be approved by the Governor 7/- a day or £2 a week

For every midwifery case, including stay in the Hospital not exceeding 15 days, an inclusive fee of:—

For residents in the Colony ... ~~£3~~⁵ : 0 : 0

For non-residents £5 : 0 : 0

For stay beyond 15 days the charge shall be at the per week rate. 7

In Private Ward.

For Private Patient, resident in the Colony 6/- a day or £2 a week

For Private Patient, non resident ... 8/- a day or £2 : 10s. a week

In midwifery cases an additional Hospital fee of £1 and £2 respectively, shall be charged.

For Government Officials and employes and their families and servants the Hospital fees to be charged shall in each case be one half of the above rates.

In any case, including that of a Government Official and employe, etc., in which any wine, spirit or extras be permitted by the Medical Officer, but not ordered by him as forming part of the medical treatment, the cost of the same shall, in addition to the Hospital fees, be paid for by the patient.

The Infirmary.

29. Admission to the Infirmary, known as the "Victoria Cottage Home", section of the Hospital and consisting of three single rooms, shall, when accommodation is available, be allowed and made only on the order of the Governor, and shall be subject to such conditions as the Governor may think fit to attach thereto. The Governor may at any time order the discharge therefrom of any inmate.

30. British subjects only, of long residence in the Colony, in most indigent circumstances and without means of subsistence, shall be admitted to this section of the Hospital.

31. Inmates shall, unless sufficient cause be shewn the Nurse Matron, rise not later than 7.30 a.m. in the winter, and 7 a.m. in the summer. They shall be in bed, and lights out, by 9 p.m. each night.

32. The hours for meals shall be as follows:—

Breakfast	8 a.m.	Tea	5 p.m.
Dinner	1 p.m.	Cup of Cocoa	8 p.m.

33. Every inmate shall perform such household and other duties about the Hospital and premises as the Nurse Matron may require, subject to the approval of the Medical Officer.

34. Inmates shall, when not prevented by illness or other sufficient cause, bathe on Saturday evenings between the hours of 7.30 and 9 p.m. and on such other days and at such times as the Nurse Matron may direct. Linen, underclothing and towels issued to inmates shall be changed on Saturday, each week, and at such other times as the Nurse Matron may consider necessary.

35. Inmates may, subject to good conduct, be allowed out on Sunday morning to attend Church Services, and on three afternoons in the week, viz, on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday from 1.30 p.m., to 5 p.m., and at such other times as the Medical Officer or Nurse Matron may allow.

36. Any inmate who misconducts himself or fails in the due observance of these regulations, or of any direction thereunder given by the Medical Officer, or by the Nurse Matron, shall be liable to be instantly discharged by order of the Governor, or to such other punishment as the Governor may see fit to impose.

General.

37. No patient or inmate shall be allowed to carry into the Hospital or to receive any alcoholic liquor without the permission of the Medical Officer, and any article, the introduction of which is forbidden by the Medical Officer, is strictly prohibited under these Regulations.

38. These Regulations may be cited as the King Edward Hospital Regulations 1916.

By His Excellency WILLIAM DOUGLAS YOUNG, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS a Proclamation was issued on the 13th day of July, 1915, prohibiting the introduction, amongst other things, of hay into this Colony from the Republic of Chile,

AND WHEREAS by my Proclamation of the 19th October, 1916, I did, for the time being and until further notice, modify the aforesaid Proclamation of the 13th day of July, 1915, so far as to permit the introduction of hay from Punta Arenas, Chile,

NOW THEREFORE know ye that with the advice of the Executive Council I do hereby revoke and rescind my Proclamation of the 19th October, 1916, aforesaid, and that the Proclamation of the 13th day of July, 1915, remains in full force and effect.

Given under my hand and the Public Seal of the Colony at Government House, Stanley, this eighth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen.

Meeting of the Legislative Council held on the
4th November, 1916.

Minute by the Governor.

I have the honour to submit for the consideration and approval of the Legislative Council the Estimates for the service of the Colony for the year 1917.

The Revised Estimates for the current year, 1916, shew,

Added to the surplus balance (£4,300) brought forward on 1st January, 1916, the surplus balances of the Colony on the 1st January, 1917, will, it is estimated, amount to over £14,000. Statement by the Treasurer annexed.

The surplus balance on the current year's working has been largely due to the necessary postponement of certain public works provided for but not carried out during the year.

The valuable asset of the Colony in the Land Sales Fund will, it is estimated, with the sum of £8,503 to be paid in during the present year, be increased to £126,173 on the 31st December next. The bulk of these moneys are invested in approved securities.

The Ordinary Revenue for the year 1917 is estimated at £31,681
and the Expenditure (including Public Works Extraordinary) at £29,530

leaving an available balance of - - - - - £ 2,151 for other services.

It is estimated that in consequence of a smaller number of whaling factories operating in South Shetlands during the season 1916-17, the revenue from the Whaling Industry will be about £4,000 less than that of the current year; otherwise the several items of revenue follow closely the Estimates for the current year.

The expenditure on the fixed establishment with a few minor changes also follows closely that of the current year. Explanatory notes throughout the estimates have been printed opposite most of the items appearing on the Estimates, rendering unnecessary further information in detail being given.

Under head XIII "Miscellaneous" provision at the rate of £100 a year has been made for the Library and Museum about to be established in the new Government Buildings, Stanley. It is proposed that the Library should be open daily and be free to the public, with a newspaper and periodical section available to annual subscribers. A short Ordinance will be introduced for the consideration of the Council at a future meeting.

Under head XX "Public Works Recurrent" provision is again made for £1,000 for maintenance and repairs of Roads, Drains and Bridges. It is to be regretted that it has not been found possible during the current year to effect the repairs to the roads in Stanley that had been anticipated, and for which provision has been made on the current year's estimates, but it is hoped that some improvement may be looked for in this respect in the course of next year.

Under head XXI "Public Works Extraordinary" provision of £1,200 has been inserted to proceed with the erection of the Wireless Telegraph plant at Fox Bay, imported in the early part of 1914. The work of erection has been delayed this year to consider an alternative proposal to connect the East and West Falklands by telephone. The matter has received attention, but in consequence of increased cost it has not been found possible to proceed with the proposal. Provision has therefore been made to proceed with the original scheme for a wireless telegraph installation.

Subject to the approval of the Secretary of State it is proposed to provide a limited supply of articles of heavy furniture for the Government quarters set aside for certain officials such as the Colonial Secretary and the Colonial Surgeon, the officers to pay five per cent. on the value of the furniture supplied to their quarters. An instalment of £250 has been placed on the Estimates for next year as a commencement towards this service.

The Members of the Council are aware that while several young men from the Colony—all honour and credit to each of them— have individually proceeded home at their own expense to join the Colours and take their active share in the present war against the enemies of Our King and Country, the population of the Falkland Islands is too small to permit the Colony the privilege of associating with other of His Majesty's Possessions beyond the seas in sending and maintaining a contingent at the Front. There can however be no doubt that though small, the community of the Falkland Islands in their loyal and dutiful attachment to their King and Country are none the less ready to do their part and to bear their share of the burdens cast upon the Empire by the war.

In the circumstances and in this respect the contribution from this Colony as a whole to the Mother Country must take the form of a share of the Colony's income. Though the amount must necessarily be infinitesimally small, as a first step the offer might be made to the Imperial Government of an annual payment for ten years from the 1st January, 1917, of a sum equal to ten per cent. of the annual revenue of the Colony derived from Customs duties, such payment to be a contribution towards the Interest and Sinking Fund of the Imperial Loans raised for the purposes of the war.

In the hope that this course will commend itself to the Members acting on behalf of the people of the Colony, and be accepted by the Imperial Government, a resolution will be moved in Council to give effect to the same.

The increasing demand for the invaluable services rendered by the Royal Flying Corps affords a suitable opportunity for the Colony to do at the present time yet a little more, and to offer to the Imperial Government a gift of an armed airplane for the Corps. A resolution on the subject will also be submitted for the consideration of the Council.

The people of the Colony by private subscriptions contribute liberally to funds raised for causes arising out of the war, and I desire to avail myself of this opportunity to thank them in that behalf, especially so for the generous contributions, exceeding £600 for "Our Day", appointed throughout the Empire for the 19th October this year, for collections to be made for the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

An Ordinance to provide further for the maintenance of discipline on board Admiralty Transports.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Admiralty Transport Discipline Ordinance, 1916. Short Title.

2. (1) If whilst within the jurisdiction a seaman lawfully engaged in accordance with the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1914, to serve on board any British Ship belonging to or chartered or requisitioned by the Admiralty:— Seamen neglecting to join ship, deserting or joining in state of drunkenness.

(a) Neglects or refuses without reasonable cause to join his ship or to proceed to sea in his ship, or is absent without leave from his ship or from his duty at any time; or

(b) Joins his ship or is whilst on board his ship in a state of drunkenness so that the performance of his duties or the navigation of his ship is thereby impeded,

he shall be guilty of an offence; and the Master Mate or Owner of the ship or his Agent or any Commissioned Naval Officer may with or without the assistance of the local Police Officers or Constables convey on board his ship any seaman whom he has reason to believe to be guilty of an offence under this section, and may also arrest him without first procuring a warrant, and Police Officers or Constables are hereby directed to give assistance if required. Provided always that no commissioned Naval Officer acting in pursuance of the powers aforesaid shall be liable to any penalty nor to any action for damages for false imprisonment.

(2) If such seaman is brought before a Court on charge of having committed an offence under this section, he shall, if the offence comes within the provisions of paragraph (a) be liable to the penalties prescribed for such offences in Section 221 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and if the offence comes within the provisions of paragraph (b) he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds (£5).

In accordance with instructions received from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, I hereby declare that His Majesty the King will not be advised to exercise his powers of disallowance in respect of Ordinance No. 9 of 1915, entitled "An Ordinance to Amend the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908".

By His Excellency WILLIAM DOUGLAS YOUNG, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

Whereas it is of great importance that full information should be obtained with regard to property in enemy territory belonging to British subjects, and also with regard to the claims of British subjects against enemy persons and enemy Governments,

And Whereas for the purpose of obtaining such information it is necessary that returns of such property should be made by British subjects to the Officer appointed to receive the same,

And Whereas His Majesty the King has by His Proclamation bearing date at Windsor Castle the 7th day of September, 1916, strictly commanded and enjoined His subjects forthwith to make returns accordingly,

Now Therefore know ye that I do by this my Proclamation make known the same, and call upon all British subjects residing in this Colony, who are entitled to property of any description whatsoever in enemy territory or to any interest in such property or have claims against enemy Governments, forthwith to make returns of their said property or claims to the Officer appointed to receive the same,

Provided that it shall not be necessary to make such returns respecting property or claims, whereof returns have before the date of this Proclamation been voluntarily made to such Officer as aforesaid in the form prescribed.

The Officer appointed to receive such returns shall be:—

- (a) In the case of property in enemy territory and claims against enemy persons, the Registrar, Stanley,
- (b) In the case of claims against enemy Governments, the Registrar, Stanley, for transmission to the Directors of the Foreign Claims Office, Foreign Office, London.

The said returns shall be made in such form and with such particulars as the Registrar may require.

For the purposes of this Proclamation,

“Property” includes documents of title to property;

“Enemy Territory” means the territory of any State at war with Great Britain (including the Colonies and Dependencies thereof);

“Enemy Persons” includes all persons, firms, companies and corporations residing or carrying on business in enemy territory;

“Enemy Government” means the Government of any State at war with Great Britain.

The Governor directs it to be notified, for general information, that under the Defence of the Realm Acts and Regulations no person is allowed to land or to embark at any port in the United Kingdom without the special permission of a Secretary of State, or unless he has in his possession a valid passport issued to him not more than two years previously, by or on behalf of the Government of the Country of which he is a subject or a citizen, or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality and identity. To every such passport and document as aforesaid there must be attached a photograph of the person to whom it relates.

Applied *mutatis mutandis*, no person shall land or embark at any port in this Colony unless he have in his possession a valid passport or some other document as aforesaid, and without the permission of the Detaining Officer, (the Treasurer and Collector of Customs or his Deputy) provided that in the case of an alien the grant of such permission by the Detaining Officer shall not exempt such alien from any of the requirements of the Alien Ordinance, 1900. No enemy alien whose Sovereign or State is at war with His Majesty the King shall be allowed to land at any port in the Colony without the special permission of the Governor.

An Ordinance

To provide for the payment for ten years of an annual contribution to His Majesty's Government towards the expenses of the War.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as The War expenses contribution Ordinance, 1917. Short Title.

2. For a period of ten years commencing from the first day of January, 1917, there shall be paid annually, out of the public revenue and other funds of the Colony, to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, a sum equal to one-tenth part of the Customs revenue of the year, such payment to be a contribution to His Majesty's Government from the Colony of the Falkland Islands towards the expenses of the war. Every such contribution shall be paid on the warrant of the Governor, and shall form a charge on the Public Funds of the Colony.



The Governor directs the publication, for the general information and guidance of the inhabitants of the Colony, of the following extracts from the Defence of the Realm Regulations, as applied to the Falkland Islands.

M.P. 181/17.

Reg. 14c. 1. A person coming from or intending to proceed to any place out of the Falkland Islands as a passenger shall not, without the special permission of the Governor, land or embark at any port in the Falkland Islands unless he has in his possession a valid passport issued to him not more than two years previously by or on behalf of the Government of the country of which he is a subject or a citizen, or, in the case of a person coming from a place outside the Falkland Islands, either such a passport or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality and identity.

To every such passport and document as aforesaid there must be attached a photograph of the person to whom it relates.

If any person lands or embarks in contravention of this regulation, or if, where any such special permission to land has been granted by the Governor subject to any conditions, the person to whom it was granted fails to comply with any such condition, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

Reg. 14d. 2. A British subject shall not embark at any port of the Falkland Islands, or attempt to leave the Falkland Islands, as a member of the crew of an outward bound neutral ship, unless he came to the Falkland Islands as a member of the crew of that ship, or unless he has in his possession a valid passport or has obtained the written permission of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy or some person duly authorized by him, and if he does so, or if, where any such written permission has been granted subject to any conditions, he fails to comply with any such condition, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

Reg. 18. 3. No person shall without lawful authority collect, record, publish or communicate or attempt to elicit, any information with respect to the movement, numbers, description, condition, or disposition of any of the forces, ships, or aircraft of His Majesty or any of His Majesty's Allies, or with respect to the plans or conduct, or supposed plans or conduct, of any naval or military operations by any such forces, ships, or aircraft, or with respect to the supply, description, condition, transport, or manufacture or storage or place or intended place of manufacture or storage, of war material, or with respect to any works or measures undertaken for or connected with, or intended for the fortification or defence of any place, or any information of such a nature as is calculated to be or might be directly or indirectly useful to the enemy, and if any person contravenes the provisions of this regulation, or without lawful authority or excuse has in his possession any document containing any such information as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Reg. 19. 4. No person shall, without the permission of the senior naval or military officer present in the Colony make any photograph, sketch, plan, model, or other representation of :—

- (a) any place or thing within any area for the time being specified in an order made by the senior naval or military officer, with the approval of the Governor-in-Council, as being an area within which the making of such representations is prohibited;
- (b) any naval or military work, or any dock or harbour work, wherever situate;
- (c) any other place or thing of such a nature that such representations thereof are calculated to be, or might be, directly or indirectly, useful to the enemy;

and no person in any such area or in the vicinity of any such work shall without lawful authority or excuse have in his possession any photographic or other apparatus or other material or thing suitable for use in making any such representation.

If any person contravenes the provisions of this regulation, or without lawful authority or excuse has in his possession any representation of any such work, place, or thing of such a nature that it is calculated to be or might be directly or indirectly useful to the enemy, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

5. No person shall, without the written permission of the Governor make, buy, sell or have in his possession or under his control any apparatus for the sending or receiving of messages by wireless telegraphy, or any apparatus intended to be used as a component part of such apparatus; and no person shall sell any such apparatus to any person who has not obtained such permission as aforesaid, and any person having in his possession or under his control any such apparatus, whether with or without the permission of the Governor, shall on demand deliver the apparatus to the Governor, or as he may direct; and if any person contravenes the provisions of this regulation he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations. Reg. 22.

6. No person shall without lawful authority transmit (otherwise than through the post) or convey to or from the Falkland Islands, or receive or have in his possession for such transmission or conveyance, any letter or any written message for any other person, and if any person contravenes this provision he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations. Reg. 24.

This Regulation shall not apply to "shipowners' letters" as defined by section thirty of the Post Office Act, 1908, nor to any other class of letters or written messages that may be for the time being exempted by order of the Governor.

7. No person shall by word of mouth or in writing or in any newspaper, periodical, book, circular or other printed publication:— Reg. 27.

- (a) spread false reports or make false statements; or
- (b) spread reports or make statements intended or likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to interfere with the success of His Majesty's forces or of the forces of any of His Majesty's Allies by land or sea or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with foreign powers;

and if any person contravenes any of the above provisions he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

8. The senior naval or military officer may, with the approval of the Governor, by order prohibit any person from approaching within such distance as may be specified in the order of any camp, work of defence or other defended military work, or any work to which it is deemed necessary in the interest of the public safety or of the defence of the Realm, to afford military protection, and if any person contravenes any such order he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations. Reg. 29.

9. If any person gives, sells, procures, or supplies, or offers to give, sell, procure, or supply, any intoxicant— Reg. 40.

- (a) to or for a member of any of His Majesty's forces with the intent of eliciting information for the purpose of communicating it to the enemy, or for any purpose calculated to assist the enemy; or
- (b) to or for a member of any of His Majesty's forces when not on duty with the intent to make him drunk or less capable of the efficient discharge of his duties; or
- (c) to or for a member of any of His Majesty's forces when on duty either with or without any such intent as aforesaid;

he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations:

Reg. 54.

10. Any person landing or embarking at any place in the Falkland Islands, and any person who by reason of his occupation or habits has special opportunities of communicating with the crews and passengers of vessels, shall, on being required to do so by the senior naval or military officer present or by an officer of the Customs or by a police constable, make a declaration as to whether or not he is carrying or conveying any letters or other written messages intended to be transmitted by post or otherwise delivered, and, if so required, shall produce to the person making the requisition any such letters or messages; and any of the aforesaid officers or constables may search any such person and any baggage with a view to ascertaining whether such person or the person to whom the baggage belongs is carrying or conveying any such letters or messages.

Any of the aforesaid officers or constables acting as above shall transmit any letters or other messages so produced to him or found on such search to the officer appointed to censor postal correspondence.

Any person who knowingly makes any false declaration under this regulation, or on being required to produce any such letters or messages as aforesaid refuses or neglects to do so, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

Reg. 58.

11. A person convicted of an offence against these regulations by a court of summary jurisdiction shall be liable to be sentenced to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine, and the court may, in addition to any other sentence which may be imposed, order that any goods in respect of which the offence has been committed shall be forfeited.

Sir,

With reference to Mr. Bonar Law's Circular despatch of the 30th August, on the subject of the Imperial Institute, I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy of three Resolutions adopted by an Inter-Departmental Committee which was appointed to define the spheres of work of the Imperial Institute and the Commercial Intelligence Branch of the Board of Trade.

2. I have to explain that, in view of the increased attention which has been paid, especially since the outbreak of war, to the importance of obtaining the fullest possible information as to the resources of the Empire in raw materials, with the object of the utilisation of those resources for purposes of commercial development, it was felt that some danger existed lest the work in this direction which was being carried on by the Department and the Institute might lead to an overlapping of their functions and to consequent waste of energy.

3. It was accordingly decided to appoint an Inter-Departmental Committee over which the Right Honourable Lewis Harcourt, M.P., then First Commissioner of Works, was good enough to preside, and it is hoped that the decision embodied in the enclosed Resolutions, which have been unanimously agreed to by the Committee, will ensure a satisfactory delimitation of the spheres of work of the two departments as well as close and cordial co-operation between them.

4. I shall be glad if you will take steps, by publishing this despatch in the official Gazette or in such other manner as you may deem suitable, to give publicity to the new arrangement.

Resolutions of Inter-Departmental Committee on Co-operation between the Board of Trade and the Imperial Institute.

(1) The Imperial Institute should deal with enquiries as to the sources of supply of raw materials produced within the Empire in connexion with their industrial and commercial utilisation. Either the Board of Trade or the Imperial Institute may deal with enquiries as to supplies immediately available, but the Board of Trade should as a rule deal with enquiries for ordinary supplies of well-recognised raw material through the usual trade channels.

(2) The Imperial Institute should undertake all necessary investigations of the value and uses of raw materials produced within the Empire.

(3) The Imperial Institute and the Board of Trade should co-operate in cases in which the questions concerned involve special statistical and trade information as well as technical treatment.

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the Education Department for the year 1916.

Government School.

2. The only change in the Staff of the Government School during the year was the resignation of Miss E. Pearce, 4th year Pupil Teacher, who was not replaced.

There was no external examination in 1914 or 1915 nor is there any exact record of the numbers of those examined by the then Schoolmaster.

7. The expenditure on the School during 1916, inclusive of the estimated rental value of the school buildings, amounted to approximately £870, being a good deal less than in 1915, owing to the fact that there were no payments of Teachers' passages and freight of furniture. The total amount received in fees was £128. The pupils paid £11 for stationery supplied.

II. Government Travelling Teachers.

8. It was pointed out in last year's Report that on account of the War only three of the five posts were filled at the end of 1915. During 1916 another Travelling Teacher was transferred to other work and it has been found impossible to fill any of the vacancies owing to present conditions, as the type of man required as a Travelling Teacher is the very type required for military service. Consequently at the end of 1916 there were only two Travelling Teachers at work, one on East Falkland and one on West Falkland.

V. Examinations.

14. The Government School was examined in December, 1916 by Mr. T. N. Goddard, B.A. Oxon, and the Pupil Teachers in January, 1917, by the Colonial Secretary. Government has no connexion with the examination of the Roman Catholic School, Stanley or the Falkland Islands Company's School, Darwin. The children taught by the Travelling and Camp Teachers are not examined.

VI. Conclusion.

15. In conclusion I would like to thank the Reverend Father Migone and Mr. Moir of Darwin for the information kindly sent me about their schools. Further, I would also wish to express my satisfaction with the extremely painstaking and thorough way in which Mr. Goddard conducted the examination of the Government School. It is very necessary that Government, which spends so large a sum relatively on the School, should have a definite means of appreciating what is being done at the School, and a carefully conducted examination by someone unconnected with the School is the best way of obtaining such knowledge. The School was examined on a programme of work drawn up by the Government Schoolmaster and approved by the Governor in Council.

KING EDWARD VII. MEMORIAL HOSPITAL.

2. Miss Niven arrived in the Colony to take up her duties of Nurse-Matron on 1st July, 1916.

3. The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital is now in complete working order. Rules have been drawn up and the Hospital is divided into General Wards, Maternity and Lying-in Wards, and at the east end of the building three wards are used as an Infirmary.

4. Twenty-six patients have been admitted to the Hospital 11 female and 15 male. Nine of the female patients were maternity cases and although this is a step in the right direction more might be made of the facilities offered by the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital to expectant mothers, especially those not resident in Stanley and at places where the necessary attendance in emergencies is problematical.

Four of the male patients were accidents admitted from ships calling at Stanley.

5. There are now three inmates in the Infirmary portion of the Hospital (Victoria Cottage Home) 2 male 1 female.

THE SCHOOLS.

6. I examined the children at the Government Schools on 5 occasions. The general nutrition and cleanliness of the children are good. At present the chief defects are those of mouth, throat, and nose.

7. Very many of the children are mouth-breathers owing to enlarged tonsils and adenoids. It is impossible to treat these at present owing to the fact that there is at present no second surgeon in Stanley.

8. The teeth of the children are uniformly bad. I think I only saw ten or twelve children who did not require treatment from a dentist. This is altogether the fault of the Parents as the Colonial Dentist reserves Saturday mornings entirely for the treatment of school children, and systematic attendance at the Dentist's would not only improve the general health of the child but also, in later years, prevent the stomachic and intestinal troubles so prevalent among the adults of Stanley.

9. For two or three months during the early part of the year "Nits" were very common in the children's heads and I have endeavoured to make parents realize that immediate treatment is very necessary as direct contact while the children are playing is unavoidable and Nits spread from child to child with extreme rapidity.

A few cases of Ringworm occurred but owing to the unsightliness of the disease in most cases the parents noticed it at once and brought their children for treatment early.

GENERAL HEALTH OF THE COLONY.

10. This has been considerably better than in 1915. In the early months of the year there was a moderately severe epidemic of influenza in Stanley. This was possibly imported from Punta Arenas as the first cases were patients who had opportunity of direct contact with those on board a ship carrying a cargo of horses imported from Patagonia where influenza was at that time very prevalent. Fortunately no deaths occurred. The symptoms were the same in nearly all cases, severe headache, epistaxis, a dry cough and a high temperature. Practically all the severe cases were adults: the children I examined chiefly were suffering from what appeared to be slight colds.

11. The majority of other patients I have seen during the year have been intestinal cases and in nearly every case I have had to refer the patient to the Colonial Dentist for treatment before any improvement from drugs or dieting could be hoped for. If patients realized that 90% of the ailments of the stomach and bowels are directly due to decaying teeth and that it is a waste of time and material to treat them medicinally until the mouth is reasonably clean they would save themselves a considerable amount of pain and expense.

An Ordinance

To provide for the payment for ten years of an annual contribution to His Majesty's Government towards the expenses of the War.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as The War expenses contribution Ordinance, 1917.

Short Title.

2. For a period of ten years commencing from the first day of January, 1917, there shall be paid annually, out of the public revenue and other funds of the Colony, to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, a sum equal to one-tenth part of the Customs revenue of the year, such payment to be a contribution to His Majesty's Government from the Colony of the Falkland Islands towards the expenses of the war. Every such contribution shall be paid on the warrant of the Governor, and shall form a charge on the Public Funds of the Colony.

Annual contribution for ten years from January, 1917.





The Governor desires to draw the attention of the inhabitants of the Falkland Islands to the conditions of life brought about by the War, to the measures taken some months ago by the Home Government to control the consumption of food and luxuries and to prohibit, except under special circumstances, the exportation from the United Kingdom of all foodstuffs to all destinations, and also to the necessity experienced in this Colony to obtain food supplies from sources other than the United Kingdom.

His Excellency desires to add that from recent reports received it is evident that the food supplies in the United Kingdom are heavily taxed to meet home requirements, that the people of the United Kingdom are faced with certain restrictions and privations in the matter of food, and that self-denial in the matter of food on the part of the civil population both in the United Kingdom and overseas has become necessary for the maintenance of essential supplies for His Majesty's Forces on active service at the front.

The Governor considers that it behoves the inhabitants of the Colony fully to realize the position and to bring themselves into line with their fellow-subjects in the United Kingdom and in other British Possessions. His Excellency urges that restrictions should be made in all unnecessary expenditure on what may be termed luxuries in food, dress, and drink, and on anything which merely gratifies the appetite or taste for the moment, in order that better provision may be made to meet the increased cost of living in the purchase of indispensable commodities.

The Governor believes that it is common knowledge that prices have risen throughout the British Empire and elsewhere, and considers that it is possible that they will rise still further before any reduction may be expected. His Excellency is aware that this increase in prices affects the people of the Falkland Islands and considers that it should be met cheerfully by them in the manner indicated in this Notice, namely by the practice of thrift and self-denial.

In conclusion the Governor advises those who are in a position to do so, when the time comes to prepare the ground for planting, to cultivate their gardens to the full extent in potatoes and other vegetables and thereby make the Colony less dependent on imported foodstuffs in this respect.

I have the honour to submit the following report of the transactions of the Falkland Islands Currency Note Accounts for the year ended 31st December 1916.

THE NOTE GUARANTEE FUND.

2. In accordance with the provisions of section 7, of the Currency Note Order, 1899, the coin received in exchange for the currency notes, formed "The Note Guarantee Fund", and on the 1st January 1916, this fund amounted to £10,000, being the face value of the notes in circulation on that date.

3. During the year there was no increase in the Note Issue, and consequently, under the provisions of section 7, the Note Guarantee Fund remained the same.

4. Under the provisions of the same section, the Note Guarantee Fund has to be divided into two Parts, i.e.—(a) "The Coin Portion", and (b) "The Investment Portion".

(a) THE COIN PORTION. On the 1st January, the coin portion amounted to £5,000, and was equally divided between the Commissioners and the Crown Agents, i.e.—£2,500 in the Commissioners' safe in the Colony, and £2,500 with the Crown Agents, in London.	
(b) THE INVESTMENT PORTION. On the 1st January, the investment portion amounted to £5,000, of which £1,250 was held in cash, (by the Crown Agents), and the balance was held in securities in the hands of the Crown Agents costing.	£3,750 : 0 : 0

As the funds in the hands of the Commissioners forming the Investment Portion of the fund only amounted to £5,000, the balance (£248 : 13 : 5), was advanced from the General Revenue of the Colony.

THE NOTE DEPRECIATION FUND.

5. Under the provisions of section 8, the Commissioners have to set aside annually a sum equal to One per. cent. of the cost price of the securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, to form a "Depreciation Fund", and in accordance with section 9, a separate account has to be kept of this fund, to form part of the investment portion of the Guarantee Fund.

6. The annual appropriation of the said One per. cent., commenced January 1901, and in accordance with the provisions of the Order, it was discontinued in 1912, when the Depreciation Fund amounted to £388 : 6 : 10, or a little over ten per. cent. of the cost of the securities then forming the "Investment Portion".

I have the honour to submit herewith returns* (numbered 1 to 12), called for under Colonial Regulation 396, together with a draft* of the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance in respect of the year ended 31st December, 1916.

2. The Ordinary Revenue for the year was £39,105 : 11 : 5, being £16,785 6 : 0, more than the Ordinary Expenditure, and £14,161 : 3 : 11, more than the total expenditure for the year, exclusive of disbursements under the Live Stock Ordinance. The excess of £14,161 : 3 : 11, added to the surplus balance of assets on the 1st January, makes a surplus of £18,468 : 13 : 9, on the 31st December 1916.

REVENUE.

3. The total revenue for the year was £48,553 : 12 : 8, being £6,291 : 12 : 8 over the original estimate. It includes £8,841 : 18 : 3 instalments of Land purchases, and £606 : 3 : 0 collected under the Live Stock Ordinance, leaving a total Ordinary Revenue of £39,105 : 11 : 5 being £6,231 : 11 : 5 over the original estimate, and £4,758 : 7 : 1 more than in the previous year.

The increase under Post Office, is due to the receipts for "Wireless messages", collected in 1915, being paid into Treasury in 1916.

The decrease, under Internal Revenue, is due to fewer whaling floating factories, (vessels) operating in the South Shetlands during the 1916-17 whaling season.

The decrease, under Fees Fines, is mainly due to smaller receipts in 1916, under Sec. 22 of Ordinance No. 9 of 1901.

EXPENDITURE.

5. The expenditure for the year, exclusive of Live Stock, was £24,944 : 7 : 6 as against £32,529 estimated, making a saving of £7,584 : 12 : 6 on the original estimate.

6. The total expenditure for the year was £25,460 : 6 : 3 as against £33,179 estimated. It includes £515 : 18 : 9 disbursed under the Live Stock Ordinance, and £2,624 : 2 : 1 expended on Public Works Extraordinary, leaving an Ordinary Expenditure of £22,320 : 5 : 5, being £8,814 : 4 : 8 less than the previous year, and £4,560 14 : 7 on the original estimate.

7. On account of present conditions and local circumstances, it was found necessary to postpone certain public works, for which provision had been made.

10. There is no Public Debt. On the other hand the Colony has a Funded amount (The Land Sales Fund) of £126,432 : 12 : 3, and a Live Stock Fund, amounting to £2,302 : 14 : 5, which together with the surplus of accumulated Ordinary Revenue of £18,468 : 13 : 9, makes a total of £147,204 : 0 : 5.

11. The Savings Bank transactions during the year shew an increase of £19,184 : 7 : 2, the balance due to depositors on the 31st December being £108,614 : 0 : 1, as against £89,429 : 12 : 11 on the 31st December 1915. Of the total deposits, a sum of £86,016 : 4 : 2 was invested in approved securities, leaving an uninvested balance of £22,597 : 15 : 11. The dividends received during the year, from the securities, amounted to £2,558 : 4 : 6, and the expenses of management, including interest credited and paid to depositors, amounted to £2,264 : 16 : 1, leaving a balance of £293 : 8 : 5, which was transferred, as in former years, to the Ordinary revenue of the Colony.

12. During the year the amount received as instalments of land Purchases, was £8,841 : 18 : 3, which added to the balance standing to the credit of the Land Sales Fund, at the beginning of the year, (£117,590 : 14 : 0) makes a total of £126,432 : 12 : 3, of which £126,154 : 12 : 10, was invested in approved securities, leaving an uninvested balance on the 31st December 1916 of £277 : 19 : 5.

1. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Sealing Regulations of the 29th June, 1914, the Sealing Season, or period during which Sea Elephants may be taken in the waters of South Georgia, is for the present year hereby extended from the 1st to the 30th September, 1917.

2. No female Sea Elephant shall be taken by any holder of a Sealing Licence during the month of September.

3. These Regulations may be cited as the Sealing (Emergency) Regulations, 1917.

An Ordinance to provide further for the maintenance of discipline on board Transports.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as The Transport Discipline Ordinance, 1917.

Seamen neglecting to join ship, deserting, or joining in state of drunkenness.

2. (1) If whilst within the jurisdiction a seaman lawfully engaged to serve on board any ship or vessel belonging to or chartered, hired, or requisitioned by the Admiralty or Army Council:—

(a) Neglects or refuses without reasonable cause to join his ship or vessel, or to proceed to sea in his ship or vessel, or deserts or is absent without leave from his ship or vessel or from his duty at any time; or

(b) Joins his ship or vessel or is whilst on board his ship or vessel in a state of drunkenness so that the performance of his duties or the navigation of his ship or vessel is thereby impeded,

he shall be guilty of an offence; and the master mate or owner of the ship or vessel or his agent or any Naval or Military Officer may with or without the assistance of the local police officers or constables convey on board his ship or vessel any seaman whom he has reason to believe to be guilty of an offence under this section, and may also arrest him without first procuring a warrant, and police officers or constables are hereby directed to give assistance if required. Provided always that no Naval or Military Officer acting in pursuance of the powers aforesaid shall be liable to any penalty nor to any action for damages for false imprisonment.

"WHALE OIL" means the oil of the whale and shall include whale guano, whale bone, and any other products of the whale and whaling industry.

"SEAL OIL" means the oil of the seal as herein defined and shall include any other products of the seal and sealing industry.

Oil to be exported to and sold in United Kingdom.

3. All whale oil and all seal oil, shall be exported to and delivered in and sold in the United Kingdom only, except in cases where special permission is given by a Secretary of State or by the Governor by means of a licence to export or to dispose of the same otherwise.

Exception.

Bond to be given for delivery and sale in United Kingdom or country authorized.

4. Any person or company licensed under The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908, or under The Seal Fishery (Dependencies) Ordinance, 1909, or any lessee of land granted for the purpose of carrying on whaling or sealing operations, shall, at the time of making the customary declaration of the amount of whale oil or seal oil about to be exported and the port and country of destination, give a bond to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy for the delivery and sale of such consignment of whale oil and seal oil in the United Kingdom, or for the delivery and sale in the country for which he has obtained a licence from a Secretary of State or from the Governor as herein provided; and such bond shall remain in force until it shall, within six calendar months of the date of the bond, or such further period as may be sanctioned by a Secretary of State or by the Governor, be shewn to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy that the conditions of the bond have been fully complied with.

Governor in Council may make Regulations.

5. The Governor in Council may make, and from time to time vary, regulations for carrying out generally the provisions of this Ordinance.

Penalties.

6. Any person or company contravening or attempting to contravene the provisions of this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder shall forfeit the bond required and furnished by him under section 4 of this Ordinance, and shall furthermore be liable to the summary cancellation by the Governor of his licence or lease.

Ordinance in force in Dependencies.

7. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Duration of Ordinance.

8. This Ordinance shall continue in force during the continuance of the present war and for a period of six months thereafter and no longer, but the expiration of this Ordinance shall not render null and void any proceedings begun or any penalty incurred under this Ordinance before the date of the expiration of the same.

Repeal of Ordinance No. 10 of 1915.

9. The Whale Oil (Export Regulation) Ordinance, 1915, is hereby repealed.

LETTERS PATENT, passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, providing for the further Definition and Administration of certain Islands and Territories as Dependencies of the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

Dated 28th March, 1917.

George the Fifth by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting.

WHEREAS doubts have arisen as to the limits of the groups of islands known as South Georgia, the South Orkneys, the South Shetlands, and the Sandwich Islands, and the territory of Graham Land otherwise known as Graham's Land; and whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for the government, not only of these islands and territory but also of certain other Our islands and territories adjacent thereto as Dependencies of Our Colony of the Falkland Islands:

I. Now We do hereby declare that from and after the publication of these Our Letters Patent in the Government Gazette of Our Colony of the

Falkland Islands, the Dependencies of Our said Colony shall be deemed to include and to have included all islands and territories whatsoever between the the 20th degree of West longitude and the 50th degree of West longitude which are situated south of the 50th parallel of South latitude; and all islands and territories whatsoever between the 50th degree of West longitude and the 80th degree of West longitude which are situated south of the 58th parallel of South latitude.

II. And we do hereby vest in the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our Colony of the Falkland Islands all such powers and authorities in and over the lands hereby included in the Dependencies of Our said Colony as are exercised by him over the Dependencies in virtue of certain Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-first day of July 1908.

III. We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, full power and authority from time to time to revoke, alter or amend these Our Letters Patent as to Us or them shall seem meet.

IV. The Governor shall cause these Our Letters Patent to be published in the Government Gazette of Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and the same shall thereupon come into force.

REGULATIONS

to prohibit the use of Wireless Telegraphy on board Vessels whilst in Harbour.

1. The radiotelegraph station or apparatus on board any vessel, other than His Majesty's Ships of War, shall not be worked whilst such vessels is within any Port, or Harbour, or territorial waters of the Colony.

2. Every vessel of British Register shall immediately on arrival in a Port or Harbour of the Colony completely disconnect the aerial wires from its radiotelegraph apparatus, the ends of such wires being suspended entirely clear of the radiotelegraph room or office, preferably from the main rigging, in such a manner as to shew that they are properly disconnected, and they shall remain so disconnected whilst the vessel is in Port or Harbour.

3. Every vessel of Foreign Register shall, immediately on arrival in any Port or Harbour of the Colony, take down its aerial wires completely, and disconnect the same from its radiotelegraph apparatus, and they shall remain so disconnected whilst the vessel is in Port or Harbour.

Provided nevertheless that any vessel of Foreign Register remaining in a Port or Harbour for less than twelve hours may, at the discretion of of the Collector of Customs or his Deputy, be permitted to leave its aerials up, provided the same be first disconnected and remain disconnected in strict accordance with these Regulations.

4. The Collector of Customs or his Deputy may, in addition to the foregoing, require the radiotelegraph room or office of any vessel to be sealed and remain sealed whilst the vessel is in Port or Harbour, or he may require any other steps to be taken as he may think fit.

5. For any breach of these Regulations, the Master or Owner of the vessel shall on summary conviction be liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20) for each offence and to the forfeiture of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or worked on such vessel.

6. During the continuance in force of these Regulations, so much of the Wireless Telegraphy Regulations, made on the 21st day of June, 1912, as may be inconsistent herewith is hereby suspended.

7. These Regulations may be cited as the Vessels Wireless Prohibition (Emergency) Regulations, 1917.

An Ordinance to provide further for the maintenance of discipline on board Transports.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as The Transport Discipline Ordinance, 1917.

Seamen neglecting to join ship, deserting, or joining in state of drunkenness.

2. (1) If whilst within the jurisdiction a seaman lawfully engaged to serve on board any ship or vessel belonging to or chartered, hired, or requisitioned by the Admiralty or Army Council:—

(a) Neglects or refuses without reasonable cause to join his ship or vessel, or to proceed to sea in his ship or vessel, or deserts or is absent without leave from his ship or vessel or from his duty at any time; or

(b) Joins his ship or vessel or is whilst on board his ship or vessel in a state of drunkenness so that the performance of his duties or the navigation of his ship or vessel is thereby impeded,

he shall be guilty of an offence; and the master mate or owner of the ship or vessel or his agent or any Naval or Military Officer may with or without the assistance of the local police officers or constables convey on board his ship or vessel any seaman whom he has reason to believe to be guilty of an offence under this section, and may also arrest him without first procuring a warrant, and police officers or constables are hereby directed to give assistance if required. Provided always that no Naval or Military Officer acting in pursuance of the powers aforesaid shall be liable to any penalty nor to any action for damages for false imprisonment.

(2) If such seaman is brought before a Court on charge of having committed an offence under this section, he shall, if the offence comes within the provisions of paragraph (a) be liable to the penalties prescribed for such offences in Section 221 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and if the offence comes within the provisions of paragraph (b) he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds (£5).

Penalties.

(3) For the purposes of this Ordinance a copy of any entry made in an official log book in manner provided by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall, if it purports to be signed and certified as a true copy or extract by the officer in whose custody the original log book is entrusted, be admissible in evidence.

Extracts from log admissible evidence.

3. The Admiralty Transport Discipline Ordinance, 1916, is hereby repealed.

Sir,

I have the honour to forward the Annual Report of this Department for the season 1916-17.

Seasons.

During the late Spring and early Summer we had more rain than at this period of the previous year. The Winter has been exceptionally open and mild, with very little snow.

Sheep.

The health of the flocks that I have seen is excellent, with the exception of two flocks which were infected with lice. The total number of sheep in the Islands is now 696,975, shewing an increase of slightly over 7000 on last year's returns.

Wool.

The clip of the season was very satisfactory, the highest price obtained for wool being 2s. 7½d. per lb. This is the highest price on record for Falkland Islands wool.

Canning.

The only factory working during the season was that of the Falkland Islands Company Limited at Goose Green, where 42,711 sheep were canned, or an increase of over 5000 on last year's canning. I visited the factory at Goose Green on several occasions; its cleanliness and the methods employed there leave nothing to be desired.

Cattle.

The number of cattle in the Colony is 6,844; their health is very good.

Horses.

There are 2,653 horses in the Colony; their general health is good.

Exports.

The only export from the Colony during last year was a consignment of 600 sheep which were sent from Beaver Island to South Georgia.

Imports.

September, 1916, 49 horses from Punta Arenas, Chile. October, 1916, 3 Welsh stallions from the United Kingdom. November, 1916, 10 Romney Marsh rams from United Kingdom. January, 1917, 21 Romney Marsh and 21 Cheviot rams from United Kingdom.

Cultivation.

Progress is being made yearly in the cultivation of crops and the quantity of hay obtained is increasing; its quality is good.

 Prospecting and Mining.

WHEREAS all grants or leases of Crown lands now in force in the Colony with certain exceptions contain provisions the effect of which is (a) to limit the use of the land by the grantee or lessee to use for pastoral purposes only and (b) to reserve to the Crown in some cases all mines of silver, gold, and other precious metals and all mines of coal and in other cases all diamonds and all mines of gold, silver and other metals and all mines of coal, in or under the said land and in either case with full liberty at all times to search and dig for and carry away the same and for that purpose to enter upon the said land or any part thereof:

Preamble.

AND WHEREAS doubts have arisen as to the extent of the rights reserved to the Crown in respect of lands the subject of such grants or leases:

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to put an end to such doubts and to make provision for authorising and regulating the prospecting for and working of minerals in or under such lands in manner hereinafter appearing:

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Mining Ordinance, 1917."

Short Title.

2. In this Ordinance and any Regulations made thereunder the word "mineral" means and includes precious stones, precious metals, metals and all minerals of any kind whatsoever including coal, bituminous shale and mineral oil.

Definition of Mineral.

3. This Ordinance shall apply only to unalienated Crown Lands and to lands the subject of an existing Crown grant or Crown lease the effect of which is to confine the user of such land by the grantee or lessee to pastoral purposes only and to reserve to the Crown all mines of silver, gold and other precious metals and all mines of coal; or all diamonds and all mines of gold, silver, and other metals and all mines of coal, as the case may be.

Lands to which this Ordinance applies.

No person to prospect or mine without authority.

4. No person shall prospect for or mine or take away any mineral found upon or under any land to which this Ordinance applies, unless he be first granted by the Governor a prospecting licence or a mining lease, as the case may be, entitling him to do so. Provided that no licence shall be required by the holder of a Crown grant or Crown lease to quarry or take Stone, Flint, Chalk, Gravel, Sand, Peat and such other substances as the Governor may permit, on application in writing, to be quarried or taken, whether under or upon the land the subject of such grant or lease. Any Stone, Flint, Chalk, Gravel, Sand, Peat or other substance so quarried or taken shall be used exclusively upon such land and no part thereof shall, except by permission of the Governor expressed in writing, be sold, given away, dealt with or disposed of in any other manner whatsoever. Any person acting in contravention of this section shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

Governor may grant licences and leases to prospect and mine.

5. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor to grant licences to prospect for and leases to mine, take, win, and carry away any mineral upon or under any land to which this Ordinance applies, on such terms and for such periods of time as the Secretary of State for the Colonies may approve, and subject to any Regulations which, from time to time, may be in force.

Licences and leases not to be transferred.

(2) No licence or lease granted under this Ordinance shall be disposed of or transferred without the written sanction of the Governor being first applied for and obtained.

Payment by holder of licence or lease of compensation for damage.

(3) Every prospecting licence and every mining lease granted under this Ordinance shall provide that the holder thereof in the exercise of the right conferred shall do as little damage as possible, and shall be subject to the payment by the licensee or lessee, as the case may be, of reasonable compensation to the grantee or lessee of the land in respect of which the licence or lease is granted, for any actual damage done by him, in the exercise of such right, to any buildings, roads, or pastoral rights on or over the land.

Claim for compensation to be brought within four months.

6. (1) Any claim for compensation for actual damage done by the holder of a prospecting licence or mining lease or by his agent or servants to any buildings, roads or pastoral rights, shall be made by the grantee or lessee of the land and lodged with the Colonial Secretary within four months from the date of the alleged damage sustained.

Claim to be assessed by Board of Arbitrators.

(2) Every such claim shall within six months from the date of its being lodged with the Colonial Secretary be inquired into and the damage if any assessed by a Board of three Arbitrators composed of the Magistrate of the District in which the alleged damage occurred, or such other officer as the Governor may appoint, and two persons resident in the Colony, one of whom shall be nominated by the grantee or lessee of the land lodging the claim and the other by the person to whom the licence or lease is granted.

Appeal to Judge against finding of Arbitrators.

(3) An appeal from the finding of the majority of the Board of Arbitrators shall lie to the Chief Justice whose decision shall be final.

Form of licence and lease and rights conferred by same.

7. A licence to prospect and a lease to mine shall be in such form as may be approved by the Governor, and shall whilst in force, and for the purposes for which it is granted, entitle the holder thereof as well as his authorized agents and servants, together with his or their animals, carts, vehicles, and all things and appliances necessary for the working of the undertaking, to freely enter and to pass at all times on to and over the land named therein, and, subject to the conditions specified therein, to prospect for or to mine, take, win and carry away any mineral found upon or under the land to which the licence or lease shall apply.

8. Every application for a prospecting licence or for a mining lease shall be made in writing to the Colonial Secretary and shall state the position and approximate area and boundaries of the land in respect of which the application is made, and such further particulars as may be required by the Governor.

Applications for licences and leases to be sent to Colonial Secretary.

9. Any person who interferes with or obstructs the holder of a prospecting licence, or of a mining lease, or his agents or servants in the exercise of the rights and privileges conferred on him in pursuance of this Ordinance or of any Regulation made thereunder shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

Protection of holder of licence or lease against interference.

10. In every prospecting licence there shall be implied and deemed to be inserted therein a condition that the person to whom the same is granted shall actively carry on the work of prospecting to the satisfaction of the Governor, in default of which, the licence may, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, be cancelled by the Governor, when it shall become null and void and all works and property of the licensee on the land shall be forfeited to the Government of the Falkland Islands or otherwise dealt with as the Governor may order.

Work to be actively carried on.

11. Any mineral raised, taken, won or carried away in contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance, or any Regulation made thereunder, shall be forfeited to the Government of the Falkland Islands, and any person so acting in contravention of this section shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

Forfeiture of minerals taken in contravention of Ordinance or Regulations.

12. (1) The Governor in Council may make and from time to time vary Regulations for carrying out the provisions and intent of this Ordinance, and for protecting owners and occupiers of land against undue interference with their rights by operations of mining enterprises.

Making of Regulations.

(2) The Regulations may provide for the payment of such Royalties and fees as the Governor in Council may see fit to impose.

Regulations may provide payment of royalties and fees.

(3) Every Regulation shall have full force and effect on publication in the Gazette.

Regulations in force on publication.

13. Any person found guilty of an offence under this Ordinance, or failing to comply with any Regulation made thereunder shall on summary conviction be liable for every such offence and non-compliance to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds (£50) or to imprisonment for any period not exceeding six months, and in addition, at the discretion of the Governor, if the holder of a prospecting licence or a mining lease, to the cancellation of the same.

Penalties.

14. This Ordinance shall be in force also in the Dependencies.

GEORGE, *R.I.*

WHEREAS WE, having taken into consideration the Name and Title of Our Royal House and Family have determined that henceforth Our Royal House and Family shall be styled and known as the House and Family of Windsor:

AND WHEREAS We have further determined for Ourselves and for and on behalf of Our descendants and all other the descendants of Our Grandmother Queen Victoria of blessed and glorious memory to relinquish and discontinue the use of all German Titles and Dignities:

AND WHEREAS We have declared these Our determinations in Our Privy Council:

NOW, THEREFORE, We, out of Our Royal Will and Authority, do hereby declare and announce that as from the date of this Our Royal Proclamation Our House and Family shall be styled and known as the House and Family of Windsor, and that all the descendants in the male line of Our said Grandmother Queen Victoria who are subjects of these Realms, other than female descendants who may marry or may have married, shall bear the said name of Windsor:

AND WE do hereby further declare and announce that We for Ourselves and for and on behalf of Our descendants and all other the descendants of Our said Grandmother Queen Victoria who are subjects of these Realms, relinquish and enjoin the discontinuance of the use of the Degrees, Styles, Dignities, Titles and Honours of Dukes and Duchesses of Saxony and Princes and Princesses of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, and all other German Degrees, Styles, Dignities, Titles, Honours and Appellations to Us or to them heretofore belonging or appertaining.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Seventeenth day of *July*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and seventeen, and in the Eighth year of Our Reign.



Meeting of the Legislative Council held on the 5th November, 1917.

Minute by the Governor.

I have the honour to submit, for the consideration of the Legislative Council, the draft Estimates for the service of the Colony for the year 1918.

The ordinary revenue of the Colony is estimated at	£30,247
and the expenditure, including public works extraordinary at		£32,730
leaving, I regret to say, an estimated deficit of	£ 2,483

The revenue is estimated at about £4,000 less than the annual average for the previous five years. The falling off is for the most part due to the temporary suspension of certain of the whaling operations in the Dependencies of the Colony. It is hoped the date is not far distant when it may be possible for those operations to be resumed. No whaling operations are being carried on in the Falkland Islands at the present time.

The expenditure for the current services of next year has been framed on the lines of the present year. Under existing conditions it has been considered desirable to postpone any new works under the head of Public Works Extraordinary. The provision made under this head, amounting to £1,720 only, is in the nature of a revote and includes £1,000 for the erection of the Wireless Telegraph Installation at Fox Bay, £300 for furniture for the Town Hall, and £420 for other minor services.

Of the estimated expenditure for the year 1918, a sum of about £4,000 is consequent on the war. It is a matter for consideration whether this expenditure should not be met by increased taxation on the sheep and whaling industries. It is well known that arising out of war conditions both these industries benefit very greatly by the high market prices ruling for their commodities, and it appears to me that it would be equitable for those industries to be required to contribute directly to the revenue an additional sum at least sufficient to cover the local extra expenditure on account of the war. It may however be found possible to meet this expenditure of next year without the immediate necessity for taking steps in this direction.

On turning to the draft Estimates it will be seen that the revised estimate of ordinary revenue for the current year, 1917, amounts to £32,600, and the expenditure, including public works extraordinary, to about £30,000, leaving an available balance of £2,600 on the year's transactions. This balance is sufficient to cover the estimated deficit on the expenditure of next year, and it is not at present proposed to resort to extra taxation in the direction indicated, but to make use of the available balance of the year 1917, to meet the estimated deficit of the year 1918. Should, however, the Secretary of State be unable to give his sanction to the adoption of this course, or should it be found necessary or expedient to provide additional funds to meet the expenditure of next year, the Council will be called together again for the purpose of making the necessary provision.

I am glad to say the general financial condition of the Colony is sound.

A condition upon which the Colony is to be congratulated, and one, it may be, unique amongst His Majesty's many Colonial possessions.

Message from HIS MAJESTY THE KING.

To my People

The world-wide struggle for the triumph of right and liberty is entering upon its last and most difficult phase. The enemy is striving by desperate assault and subtle intrigue to perpetuate the wrongs already committed and stem the tide of a free civilization. We have yet to complete the great task to

which more than three years ago we dedicated ourselves. At such a time I would call upon you to devote a special day to prayer that we may have the clearheadedness and strength necessary to the victory of our cause. This victory will be gained only if we steadfastly remember the responsibility which rests upon us and in a spirit of reverent obedience ask the blessing of Almighty God upon our endeavours. With hearts grateful for the divine guidance which has led us so far towards our goal let us seek to be enlightened in our understanding and fortified in our courage in facing the sacrifices we may yet have to make before our work is done. FALKLAND ISLANDS. Specimens collected by the Rev. C. McD. Hobley, and transmitted by the Colonial Office to the Geological Survey for identification.

The specimens consist of:—

- (1) A hard black bedded material "A" of Hobley's Report.
- (2) Friable black material "B" " "
- (3) Yellowish white substance associated with "B"
- (4) Hard rock composed of yellow and brown fragments in a ferruginous matrix "D" of Hobley's Report.
- (5) Two samples of Water "C" of Hobley's Report.

(1) The hard black material soils the fingers. It is well bedded in layers up to $1\frac{1}{4}$ ins. in thickness, but shows signs of slickensiding by the development of black lustrous surfaces that give to the rock the appearance of coal. A section F.2384 cut from this material shows abundant but minute grains of quartz and other crystalline matter embedded in an opaque matrix. Also, a small amount of finely divided iron-pyrites may be detected in reflected light. (H.H.T.)

On heating to redness in air, it changes rapidly in colour the residue becoming practically white.

This residue was examined microscopically and was found to consist of quartz, finely divided micaceous matter and impalpable siliceous material stained slightly by ferric oxide. (H.H.T.)

During the ignition it was noticed that water, carbon dioxide, sulphur-dioxide, and, after a while, ammonia were evolved. No oil or tarry matter were seen but a faint tarry odour was perceptible.

The formation of carbon dioxide and the change in colour when the substance was heated indicated carbonaceous matter; sulphur dioxide, some mineral such as iron-pyrites; while the ammonia could only be present in the form of a nitrogenous-carbonaceous compound.

As, probably, the nitrogenous compound would be decomposed on heating by the action of sulphur dioxide in the presence of water, the nitrogen would be liberated as ammonia, and estimated as such would be 0.47% of the material.

The following is an analysis of the hard black material:—

only a trace of manganese was found in this specimen.

(2). The friable black material is very similar in composition to the harder variety (1), the same compounds being evolved when the substance is heated, but the greater amount of water present possibly accounts for the friability.

Compared with (1) this material contains more iron-pyrites, but the nitrogen content is less. Apparently the nitrogenous compound has been leached out by water. The amount of manganese is not perceptibly greater than in the hard material.

The percentage of carbon in the samples is far too great to be all in combination with such a small quantity of nitrogen as 0.39%; the greater part of the carbon found must, therefore, be in a free state either as amorphous carbon or more probably as graphite.

In order to prove the presence or absence of graphite, experiments were made on the electrical conductivity of the solid material, and from the comparative ease with which a film of copper was electrolytically deposited it would appear that the carbon exists mainly in the form of graphite, although possibly not to the exclusion of amorphous carbon.

Such a condition of the carbon is not uncommon in carbonaceous shales all the world over.

(3). The yellowish white substance exuded from (2) consists of a basic sulphate of iron produced by the oxidation of iron-pyrites; the presence of this basic sulphate was also detected in the sample (1) of hard black material. (E.G.R.)

(4). This compact mass is what is usually described as "iron pan" and consists of fragments of green shale, shale stained yellow or brown by ochre, and angular pieces of dark brown iron-stone cemented together by a dull brown ferruginous cement. Such a rock arises when any fragmental material is steeped for lengthy periods in ferruginous waters under the oxidizing influence of the air. (H.H.T.)

(5). The two samples of water W.A. and W.B. were subjected to a qualitative chemical analysis only as it was thought that the samples did not merit a detailed quantitative investigation.

W.A. contains too much sea-water to be worth examination.

W.B. is fairly pure water containing a little iron in the ferrous state, a little carbondioxide, and a very little sodium chloride. It is practically free from dissolved sulphates. No oil was found and the oily scum mentioned in the report is in all probability due, as suggested, to the oxidation of the ferrous iron. (E.G.R.)

We consider that the materials submitted have no commercial value, the hard black coaly substance being only carbonaceous shale and of no use as a fuel. Further the contained graphite is so intimately mixed with impurity that it could not be mechanically separated; it is possible however that natural segregations of graphite might occur within the district, and if so probably in the neighbourhood of faults or shearplanes.

Presentation of Union Jacks and Commemorative Shields to The British West Indies Regiment, The West African Frontier Force, The King's African Rifles, The Somaliland Camel Corps, The Falkland Islands Volunteer Corps and the Saint Helena Volunteers, from the Women and Children of the British Isles, made on their behalf by Her Royal Highness Princess Alexander of Teck, and received by the Right Hon. Walter Long, Secretary of State for the Colonies, on behalf of the soldiers.

SPEECH BY MISS CHAMBERLAIN.

Your Royal Highness,

It is a matter of deep gratification to the Ladies' Committee, of which Your Royal Highness is Patroness, that the last of the presentations on our long list should be graciously made by yourself in person. This Committee was formed under the auspices of the League of the Empire to find expression for the admiration and gratitude of the Women and Children of the British Isles towards the men of the Overseas Contingents fighting for the Empire in the Great War. In Europe, in Asia, in Africa, our fellow subjects and partners in the Empire uphold the cause of freedom and justice, side by side with the men of this country, and we know not whom most to praise, where each one we consider seems to have attained the utmost height of heroism.

The soldiers and sailors of the United Kingdom hear the voice of our pride and thankfulness; their deeds shall be remembered among us while the land they serve and save retains her liberty. Nor yet shall we forget the tide of loyalty and patriotism which flowed deep and full from every part of the Empire overseas towards the points of danger, seeking the grim conflict for righteousness' sake. Lest they should remain ignorant of our deep sense of the new bond uniting all subjects of the British Crown in mutual help and common sacrifice for the noblest ends, lest any of the men who offer their lives for us should not know how we honour them in our heart of hearts, the women and young people here at home have found a symbol in the Flag of the Empire and have provided the accompanying record in these shields.

Many such emblematic gifts have already passed to the overseas soldiers through Royal and gracious hands. To-day those Colonial Regiments who are serving in lands distant from these shores receive our tribute through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, their natural representative in this Country. They fight afar, but their valour and devotion are known and are dear to us, and you, Madam, have graciously consented in presenting the gifts, which will be brought to you by a deputation of the givers, to be our intermediary and to enhance the value of our commemoration.

We send the message of our admiration to the BRITISH WEST INDIES REGIMENT whose units fight in France, in East Africa, in Mesopotamia and in Egypt, where they take their part in protecting that now prosperous land from a return of Turkish misrule.

THE WEST AFRICAN FRONTIER FORCE bear already upon their shield the legend Togoland and Cameroons. They will add another name before the end, for they fight now in German East Africa.

Here they find themselves close comrades of the KING'S AFRICAN RIFLES, whose first work was to expel the invader from a portion of their own territory and who go on to the final deliverance from the German yoke of the last stretch of African soil, a consummation which now seems close at hand.

There has been fighting in every corner of the African continent; the remotest contingents have struck their blow for the weak against the cruel. Thus the SOMALILAND CAMEL CORPS, in operations culminating with the victory of Shimer Barris, have repelled the Mad Mullah's adherents and justified the faith reposed in us.

Finally there are two Corps of Volunteers, who have not been called upon to fight, but who have done all they could in making ready for the call. One of these saw dire peril very near to them. Theirs was no idle boast when they offered life and limb if the need should arise. These are the FALKLAND ISLANDS VOLUNTEERS and the SAINT HELENA VOLUNTEERS.

To all we offer the symbol of Loyalty to our King and love of our country, the sign of our common partnership in a great Empire, maintaining everywhere the ideals of humanity and justice, the flag that brings freedom in its folds, the Union Jack.

H. R. H. PRINCESS ALEXANDER OF TECK.

In handing the flags to the Right Hon. the Secretary of State, Princess Alexander expressed her gratitude at being associated with those who were paying that tribute to the loyal devotion which had brought the sons of the Empire from every corner of the world to fight beside the Motherland.

SPEECH BY MR. WALTER LONG.

Mr. Walter Long in accepting the flags on behalf of the regiments said that although all of them had not been in active fighting, it might be frequently driven home that whether a man found himself in the fighting line or doing his duty in any part of the British Dominions, he was equally deserving of the gratitude and appreciation of his fellow countrymen. "We are apt," he said, "to give insufficient recognition to men fighting in all parts of the world under climatic and more arduous difficulties perhaps than on some of the fronts. To all alike our thanksgiving is extended, and I thank the League of the Empire for its efforts in consolidating the goodwill of the peoples of the vast British Empire in the determination to serve King and country in the interests of freedom and justice, which is the spirit of the whole civilized world. In our Overseas possessions men are, as I know from letters which reach me daily, eating their hearts out because they are not allowed to take part in the fighting line. They cannot be allowed to go because they are needed for the Government of the Colony in which they live, although they have begged and implored to be allowed to go. But necessity imposed upon us the duty of keeping them where they are.

Of all who faithfully serve in whatever national work they might be called upon to perform it might be said that they were doing their duty equally with those who fought the common foe. There was hardly a home in the Kingdom which was not darkened by the black shadow of sacrifice and sorrow. But the sacrifices were not made in vain. We were fighting not for the possession of this or that territory, but for the great ideals which had appealed to us from childhood upward, for those liberties and rights and so-called privileges, and which made the world a place worth living in.

The regiments and contingents honoured that day would appreciate their emblems the more because they had received them from the hands of a member of the illustrious family which was always ready to lend its aid to every good cause. This characteristic of the King and of members of his Royal House was familiar, and happily his personality and that of other members of his family were familiar also in many distant parts of the Empire."

SPEECH BY SIR PHILIP HUTCHINS, K.C.S.I.

Your Royal Highness,

As Chairman of the League of the Empire I have to express the League's gratitude to your Royal Highness.

As you have heard from Miss Chamberlain this afternoon's ceremony has brought one of our latest undertakings to a conclusion. On former occasions thanks to assistance most graciously given by other members of the Royal Family we have been privileged to present flags and shields to the contingents which have rushed to the aid of the Mother Country from the four great Overseas Dominions, from India and from Newfoundland; and also to the Rhodesians who are fighting for the Empire in East Africa and elsewhere. Now, thanks to your Royal Highness, we have the pleasure of handing over to the official custody of the Secretary of State similar gifts for the soldiers who have come from Crown Colonies. Thus we can congratulate ourselves that this scheme of ours has now been successfully accomplished.

I offer you, Madam, our most grateful thanks for your kind interest and support in this matter.

And I may also thank Mr. Long for his cordial participation in this ceremony, and for having consented to take these Emblems into his keeping until they can be forwarded to their proper destination.

Port Regulations (No. 2)

1. No local cutter or sailing craft shall enter, leave, or be under weigh in Port William between the hours of sunset and sunrise.
2. Every Master or Owner of a local cutter or sailing craft desiring to leave Port Stanley shall first apply to the Harbour Master for a permit, and shall state to the Harbour Master the nature of the intended sailing and of the probable date of the return of the vessel to the Port. He shall also apply to the Collector of Customs for a Customs Clearance when necessary.
3. The Harbour Master shall give such steering or other directions as he may consider necessary.
4. Any person offending against these Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.
5. These Regulations may be cited as the Harbour Sailing Craft (War) Regulations, 1918, and shall be read with the Port Regulations (No. 1) of the 26th November, 1914, as modified hereby.
6. These Regulations and the Port Regulations (No. 1) of the 26th November, 1914, shall remain in force during the continuance of the war.

Telephone and Telegraph Rules.

1. Every Telephone and Telegraph Line or Wire established or erected in this Colony shall be subject to the control of the Colonial Postmaster, and no Telephone or Telegraph or electrical line or wire shall be established or erected in the Colony by any person or Company without the sanction of the Governor obtained through the Postmaster.

Telephone Exchange and Circuit, Stanley.

2. Every application to subscribe to or rent a telephone on the Exchange Circuit, Stanley, shall be made to the Colonial Postmaster, and on the application being approved by the Governor an agreement for the term of one or three years rental, as the case may be, shall be entered into between the person renting the Telephone and the Colonial Postmaster.

3. The Telephone Exchange and Circuit, Stanley, shall be under the care and management of the Colonial Engineer. Any complaints by subscribers with regard to the working of the circuit should be made, and all irregularities reported, to the Colonial Engineer.

4. The subscriptions or rentals to the Telephone Circuit, Stanley, shall be paid in advance to the Postmaster, and shall be as follows:—

For one year or less ... £8 : 0 : 0 per annum for each instrument.

For a period of three years

or over ... £5 : 5 : 0 per annum for each instrument.

For each extension by switch, for connection with Exchange Circuit:—

(a) For not more than 110 yards in length connecting with the subscriber's original instrument in the same premises ... £1 : 10s. per annum.

(b) For not more than a quarter of a mile in length connecting with the subscriber's original instrument in separate premises, either belonging to or rented by the same person ... £2 : 10s. per annum.

5. (1) The subscription or rental shall include (except in the case of the Stanley-Darwin Line and Private Lines) fixing and maintaining the necessary wire and instrument, and shall allow the subscriber the use, free of further charge, of the Exchange Circuit at all times during the day.

(2) No call, unless of an urgent nature, shall be made before 7 a.m. or after 9 p.m.

6. The Telephone Circuit, Stanley, shall be maintained in good condition as far as possible by the Colonial Engineer, but a continuous service is not guaranteed.

7. (1) Any person who is not a subscriber shall not be allowed the use, free of charge, of the Telephone Circuit or of a subscriber's telephone. Non-subscribers may originate and receive calls at the Public Call Office at the Exchange, Stanley, on pre-payment to the Operator in charge of a fee of three pence (3d.) for each service not exceeding five minutes, and at the same rate for each five minutes thereafter.

(2) Any subscriber allowing his line connected through the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, to be used by a non-subscriber or on behalf of a non-subscriber shall be held responsible for the collection and payment of the fee of three-pence (3d.) for each call for five minutes and for every five minutes thereafter.

Payment shall be made by the subscriber to the Postmaster at the end of each month.

8. (1) The Operator at the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, shall when in doubt ascertain the name of the person making use of the Telephone system, and if the person be ascertained to be a non-subscriber making use of a subscriber's instrument, the Operator shall, without delay, inform the subscriber in order that the fees due may be collected and paid by him to the Postmaster.

(2) Should the Operator be unable to ascertain whether the person calling the Exchange is a subscriber or not, no through connection shall be made until the necessary information has been given.

9. Telephone messages for delivery by messenger in Stanley shall be received by the Operator at the Telephone Exchange, written down and delivered on pre-payment of a fee of three-pence (3d.) for each thirty words or less, not including the address. Messages shall likewise be received and transmitted over the telephone by the Operator on pre-payment of a fee of three-pence (3d.) for each thirty words or less.

10. All fees collected by the Operator at the Exchange, Stanley, shall be paid into the Treasury at the end of the month.

11. Every subscriber shall be held responsible for the proper care of the Government Telephone Instrument installed on his premises, and shall be personally liable for any damage arising from wilful neglect or careless use of the instrument.

Stanley Darwin Telephone Line.

(Joint property of the Government and the Falkland Islands Company Limited.)

12. The Stanley-Darwin Telephone Line shall be available to the public as follows:—

(a) All calls by or on behalf of the Government or the Falkland Islands Company, Limited shall be free of charge.

(b) All other calls or messages shall be paid for at the following rates:—

For a call not exceeding five minutes duration, and for every subsequent period of five minutes 6d.

For a message not exceeding thirty words 6d.

For every thirty words or less beyond the first thirty 3d.

An additional charge of three-pence (3d.) shall be made for the delivery of a message in Stanley.

Provided that any subscriber to the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, may compound by the prepayment of £1 : 10s. per annum for all calls by him during the year, over the Stanley-Darwin Telephone Line.

Private Telephone Lines.

13. (1) Any private long distance line on East Falkland, may, with the permission of the Governor and at the expense of the owner, be connected with the Telephone Exchange, Stanley.

(2) The subscription for such connection shall be £5 : 5s. per annum for each separate Camp Station, whether connected to the Exchange, Stanley, by direct private line, or by an extended line, The subscription shall be paid in advance, and will include any farm cottage belonging to the Camp Station, connected with the private line.

(3) Every telephone instrument on a private long distance line connected with the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, shall be fitted with an inter-through switch, and the nearest instrument in actual circuit along the line from the Exchange shall be the instrument for the call.

(4) The Government, and, subject to any objection on the part of the owner, any subscriber to the Telephone Exchange, Stanley, may use free of charge, any private long distance line connected with the Telephone Exchange.

(5) Any person who is not a subscriber may, with the written sanction of the owner, be allowed to use any private long distance line, free of charge, from the Telephone Exchange Call Office, Stanley, but when used by him from a subscriber's house through the Exchange, the Subscriber shall be responsible for the payment of the fees incurred as provided in paragraph 7 (2).

14. All instruments, wire and accessories on any private line or any private long distance line shall be supplied at the cost of the owner of the line, and the line instruments, etc., shall be erected and maintained by the owner at his entire cost.

General.

15. No alteration or connection shall be made to any Government wire or instrument either permanently or temporarily by any person without the permission of the Colonial Engineer.

16. Anything connected with the Telephone or Telegraph not provided for by these Rules, may, with the approval of the Governor, be arranged and dealt with by the Colonial Postmaster or the Colonial Engineer as the case may be.

17. In these Rules

“SUBSCRIBER” shall mean a person who has paid the annual subscription or rental under these rules, and shall include the members of his household, and private guests while staying in his house, and *bona fide* resident boarders at an hotel in which a telephone is installed.

“PRIVATE LONG DISTANCE LINE” shall mean a telephone line extending beyond the limits of Stanley, erected and maintained by the owner at his entire cost.

18. Any person guilty of a breach of Rule 1 of these Rules shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty-five pounds (£25). For non-payment of any subscription or fees due or other breach of these Rules, the Telephone Instruments, wire, etc., being the property of the Government, shall be liable to be removed by the Colonial Engineer or the line to the Exchange, Stanley, disconnected until further orders, or to a penalty not exceeding twenty shillings (20/-).

19. The Rules relating to the Stanley Telephone Exchange dated 1st April, 1912, are hereby repealed.

A Committee has been formed in England for the purpose and, after consultation with different authorities, has decided that the best object to which this Fund can be devoted, will be to assist in the higher education of the daughters of any Commissioned Officers of Ward Room Rank, who lost their lives in H. M. S. "Invincible" and, subsequently, similarly to assist daughters of Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines of the above-mentioned Rank who have lost their lives on Active Service.

The Fund will be known as the "Invincible Memorial Fund".

The residents of the Falkland Islands have every reason to cherish a deep and grateful remembrance of the action of the British Squadron under the command of Admiral Sturdee on the Flagship "Invincible" on the 8th December, 1914, when the German squadron was destroyed in these waters and the Falkland Islands saved from bombardment and possibly occupation by the enemy.

The Governor feels sure that the residents and owners of property in the Falkland Islands will be glad of this opportunity to shew what in any case must amount to but a small measure of their heartfelt thankfulness for this deliverance from the enemy, and will contribute accordingly to the "Invincible Memorial Fund".

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

An Ordinance to provide for the care and management of a Public Library and Museum in the Town of Stanley.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Library and Museum Ordinance, 1918.

Short Title.

2. The Library and Museum established in the rooms set apart for the purpose in the Government Building known as the "Town Hall", in the Town of Stanley, shall be called the Public Library and Museum, and shall be maintained out of such moneys as may be provided by the Legislative Council and approved by the Secretary of State, and such other moneys as may be subscribed or received for the purpose.

Maintenance of Museum and Library.

3. (1) The Library and Museum shall be under the care and management of a Committee of five persons, to be appointed by the Governor, who shall hold office for a period of three years.

Appointment of Committee.

(2) On the occurrence of a vacancy by the death, absence from the Colony, or resignation of any member, the Governor may make a fresh appointment to the Committee.

Vacancies.

(3) The Governor shall appoint a member of the Committee to be Chairman.

Chairman.

4. (1) The Committee may make and from time to time vary or annul rules for the general care and management of the Library and Museum and the conditions under which books, papers, magazines, etc. may be borrowed and taken out of the Library. All rules made by the Committee shall be submitted to the Governor, and shall come into force and take effect as and when approved by the Governor in Council and published in the Gazette.

Committee may make Rules.

Penalties.

(2) The rules may provide for a penalty not exceeding twenty shillings for any breach thereof, and for the payment of the amount of any damage done to the Library or to the Museum or anything contained therein.

Appointment of Librarian.

5. (1) The Governor may appoint a Librarian and Museum attendant who shall receive such salary as the Legislative Council may provide and as may be approved by the Secretary of State.

Duties of Librarian.

(2) The Librarian shall act under the directions of the Committee and in accordance with the Rules, and shall be responsible for and have immediate charge of the Library and Museum and everything contained therein.

Admission to Library and Museum &c.

6. (1) Admission to the Library and Museum shall be free of charge.

(2) Subject to such limitations and conditions as may be imposed by the rules, every one of the community may enjoy the use of the Library during such time as the Library is open, and being a subscriber to the Library may borrow and take books, papers, magazines, etc., out of the Library in accordance with the Rules.

Subscribers to Library.

7. There shall be one or more classes of subscribers to the Library, and the qualifications, subscriptions and privileges of each class of subscriber shall be defined by Rules made under this Ordinance.

Legal proceedings may be taken on behalf of the Committee.

8. All actions prosecutions or legal proceedings whatsoever relating to any matter or thing in any wise concerning the Library and Museum may be brought in the names of any two of the Committee or in the name of any person nominated in writing for such purpose by any two of the Committee; and all penalties imposed by any of the Rules made under this Ordinance and the amount of any damage done as aforesaid shall be recoverable under the provisions of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

Fines to be paid into Treasury and credited to Library and Museum Funds.

9. All sums paid as fines under the Rules and all sums received and paid into the Treasury by reason of any proceedings taken under this Ordinance before a Magistrate shall be credited to the funds of the Library and Museum and shall be applied for the purposes of the Library and Museum.

By His Excellency WILLIAM DOUGLAS YOUNG, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

Whereas by the Geneva Convention Act, 1911, of the Imperial Parliament, it is enacted that it shall not be lawful for any person to use, for the purpose of his trade or business, or for any other purpose whatsoever, without the authority of the Army Council, the heraldic emblem of the Red Cross on a white ground formed by reversing the Federal colours of Switzerland, or the words "Red Cross" or "Geneva Cross",

And whereas it is also enacted that the said Act shall extend to His Majesty's Possessions outside the United Kingdom subject to such necessary adaptations as may be made by Order in Council,

And whereas an Order in Council dated at the Court at Buckingham Palace the 23rd day of October, 1917, cited for all purposes as "The Geneva Convention Act, 1911, (Colonies) Order in Council, 1917," has been made and it is therein ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that The Geneva Convention Act, 1911, in its application to the Colonies affected by the Order, shall be adapted as follows:—

- (1) The powers by the said Act vested in the Army Council shall be vested in the Governor in Council, or, if there shall be no Executive Council in the Colony, in the Governor.
- (2) Proceedings under the said Act shall not be instituted without the consent of the Principal Law Officer of the Colony, or, if there be no such Law Officer, of the Colonial Secretary.

And whereas it is further provided that "The Geneva Convention Act, 1911, (Colonies) Order in Council, 1917" shall come into force in each Colony affected by the said Order on a date to be fixed by the Governor,

Now therefore know ye that I do hereby proclaim that "The Geneva Convention Act, 1911, (Colonies) Order in Council, 1917," shall come into force and have effect in this Colony as from the first day of March, 1918.

K. E. M. Hospital.

Miss K. Yule arrived in the Colony on 22nd September as Government Nurse and was appointed Nurse Matron on 1st December in the place of Miss M. Niven resigned.

Twenty-one (12 males and 9 females) patients were admitted to the Hospital during the year. There was one death in the Hospital.

31 patients were treated by the Nurse Matron in their own homes, 21 being gynecological.

Government School.

The children were medically examined at intervals during the year. Over 20% of the children in Stanley suffer from enlarged tonsils or adenoids. Urgent isolated cases may be treated, but it is difficult to operate on large numbers without adequate assistance and in consequence little can be done until the arrival of a second Medical Officer. A few cases of Nits were treated and two cases of Ringworm. On the occasion of the last Medical inspection only 4 cases of Nits were seen and 1 suspected case of Ringworm. The condition of the teeth of most of the school children is still very unsatisfactory and parents should avail themselves more of the opportunity of sending their children regularly to the Colonial Dentist's Surgery; Saturday mornings are reserved exclusively for school children.

Shipping & Quarantine.

25 vessels were given Pratique during the year as against 51 the preceding year. 3 cases were admitted to the K. E. M. Hospital, 2 from whaling vessels (surgical) 1 from a sailing vessel (medical).

Public Health.

Exanthems, 2 cases of chicken pox. Phthisis, 3 cases, 1 Death.

With regard to the latter, none of the Patients were inhabitants of Stanley. Owing to there being no suitable accommodation in Stanley for the proper isolation treatment of such cases, patients suffering from this disease are advised to remain in camp, as open air treatment is easier to carry out there and there is less risk of the disease spreading than if they live in the crowded houses in Stanley; a suitable diet is also easier to obtain. The Board of Health made an exhaustive survey of the Roads, Drains, etc. in Stanley with a view to the possibility of improving the present conditions. The matter is still under consideration. During the later months of the year, November and December, a large percentage of the population of Stanley suffered from Gastritis and Enteritis. This was probably due to the very dry weather, followed by two or three days heavy rain. Residents in Stanley, relying as they do on rain water collected from the roofs, should realize that their tanks of drinking water should be thoroughly cleaned periodically, as the sediment that collects at the bottom of the tank almost invariably cause intestinal trouble when stirred up by a heavy fall of rain following a prolonged drought. The only cases (3) coming under my notice from Camp were from a station on which the water used was partly roof water and partly spring water.

General Remarks.

The general health of the Colony was better than during the two previous years.

STANLEY.

There was less sickness than in 1916; possibly this was owing to the fact that about 150 workmen had left Stanley and there was consequently less crowding in the houses.


There was less sickness than usual; several stations were not visited at all during the year except in passing through and the cases at the rest were chiefly accidents.

1. The Sealing Season, or period during which seals may be taken in the Dependencies of the Colony under licence granted under the provisions of the Seal Fishery (Dependencies) Ordinance, 1909, shall be from the 1st March to the 31st August in each year.
2. The Close Season, or period during which seals shall not be taken, shall be from the 1st September in each year to the last day of February of the succeeding year.
3. These Regulations may be cited as the Sealing Period (Dependencies) Regulations, 1918.
4. These Regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of June, 1918.
5. The Sealing Regulations made on the 29th June, 1914, are hereby repealed.

In any order for such goods the priority of the goods should be given shewing those which are most urgently required should preference be given. It is at present impossible to sanction the exportation from the United Kingdom for general purposes, civilian or otherwise, of clothing other than boots.

I have the honour to submit herewith returns (numbered 1 to 13), called for under Colonial Regulation 396, together with a draft of the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance in respect of the year ended 31st December, 1917.

2. The Ordinary Revenue and Expenditure for the year amounted to £36490 : 18 : 8, and £28479 : 14 : 4, respectively. The total expenditure, exclusive of disbursements under "Live Stock" amounted to £29386 : 5 : 8, and was under the Ordinary Revenue by £7104 : 13 : 0. This last named sum of £7104 : 13 : 0, added to the £18468 : 13 : 9, at the beginning of the year, makes a surplus of available assets on the 31st December 1917, of £25573 : 6 : 9.

Revenue.

3. The General Revenue for the year amounted to £45588 : 9 : 11, and exceeded the original estimate by £4725 : 9 : 11. It included a sum of £8492 : 4 : 3 (instalments of Land Purchase) as well as a sum of £605 : 7 : 0 (collected under the Live Stock Ordinance) leaving an ordinary revenue of £36490 : 18 : 3, which exceeded the original estimate by £4809 : 18 : 8, but was less than that collected in the previous year by £2614 : 12 : 9. In the revenue for 1917 is included, a sum of £1835, collected at South Georgia during the previous year.

Expenditure.

5. The expenditure for the year, exclusive of disbursements under "Live Stock", amounted to £29386 : 5 : 8 as against £30813 estimated, making a saving on the original estimate of £1426 : 14 : 4.

6. The total expenditure amounted to £29686 : 16 : 2 as against £31393 estimated. It included a sum of £300 : 10 : 6 disbursed under "Live Stock", as well as a sum of £906 : 11 : 4 expended under "Public Works Extraordinary", leaving an Ordinary Expenditure of £28479 : 14 : 4, which was £363 : 5 : 8 under the original estimate, but exceeded that for the previous year by £6159 : 8 : 11. Certain disbursements made during the year under "Military", can hardly be regarded as recurrent expenditure.

7. Owing to prevailing conditions and local circumstances, it was found necessary to postpone certain public works, for which provision had been made on the estimates.

10. There is no public debt. On the other hand the Colony has a funded amount, (The Land Sales Fund) of £134924 : 16 : 6, as well as a Live Stock Fund, amounting to £2607 : 10 : 11. These funds together with the surplus of accumulated ordinary revenue of £25573 : 6 : 9, make up the total of £163105 : 14 : 2.

11. The Savings Bank transactions during the year shew an increase of £2634 : 13 : 1. The balance due to depositors on the 31st December being £111245 : 13 : 2, as against £108614 : 0 : 1 on the 1st January. Of the total deposits, a sum of £86016 : 4 : 2 was expended in the purchase of approved securities, leaving an uninvested balance on the 31st December, of £25229 : 9 : 0. The dividends received from the securities during the year, amounted to £3308 : 14 : 7, and the expenses of management, including interest paid to depositors, amounted to £2608 : 5 : 7 leaving a balance, (profit) of £700 : 9 : 0, which was transferred, as in former years, to ordinary revenue.

I have the honour to submit the following report of the transactions of the Falkland Islands Currency Note Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1917.

The Note Guarantee Fund.

2. Under the provisions of the Currency Note Order, 1899, the coin received in exchange for currency notes issued for circulation, forms "The Note Guarantee Fund." On the 1st January the Note Guarantee Fund amounted to £10,248 : 13 : 5 being £248 : 13 : 5 in excess of the face value of the currency notes issued for circulation, up to that date.

3. During the year the "Note Issue" was increased from £10,000 to £12,000, and the £2,000 in coin received by the Commissioners was allocated as follows:—

Placed to the credit of the Investment Portion of the Fund	751 : 6 : 7

4. Under the provisions of The Order, the Note Guarantee Fund has to be divided into two parts, i.e.—(a) "The Coin Portion" and (b) "The Investment Portion".

(a) THE COIN PORTION. During the year the coin portion was increased from £5000 to £6000, and is at present divided between the Commissioners and the Crown Agents, i.e.—£2,500 in the Commissioner's safe in the Colony and £3,500 with the Crown Agents in London.

(b) THE INVESTMENT PORTION. During the year the investment portion was increased by a sum of £751 : 6 : 7, which was expended in the purchase of approved securities and thereby the total amount so expended was brought up from £5,248 : 13 : 5 to £6,000.

The Note Depreciation Fund.

5. Under the provisions of the Order, the Commissioners have to set aside annually a sum equal to one per cent. of the cost price of the securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund to form a "Depreciation Fund," and in accordance therewith, a separate account has to be kept of this Fund, to form part of the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.

6. During the year there was no change in the amount expended in the purchase of securities forming the Note Depreciation Fund which amounted to £890 : 15 : 7.

Summary of Year's Transactions.

7. On the 1st January, the face value of the notes in circulation, (The Note Issue), amounted to £10,000, During the year the face value of the notes issued for circulation amounted to £2,855, and of those withdrawn and cancelled, to £855, thereby leaving in circulation, at the end of the year, notes amounting in face value to £12,000 i.e.—

An Ordinance

To facilitate the application in the Colony of
Section 14 of the (Imperial) Copyright Act,
1911.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the (Imperial) Copyright Act, 1911, came into operation in this Colony on the Proclamation of the Governor dated the 24th day of April, 1912.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to facilitate the application in the Colony of Section 14 of the Act.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Copyright Act, 1911, Ordinance, 1918.

Application of Section 14 of Copyright Act, 1911.

2. For the purpose of the application of Section 14 of the (Imperial) Copyright Act, 1911, to the importation into this Colony of works made out of the Colony:

Treasurer & Collector of Customs shall perform duties under Act.

(1) The Treasurer and Collector of Customs shall perform the duties and may exercise the powers thereby imposed on or given to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise of the United Kingdom.

Regulations.

(2) Regulations made by the Treasurer and Collector of Customs under that Section shall require the approval of the Governor in Council.

(3) Regulations made under that Section may provide that notices given to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise of the United Kingdom, if communicated by them to the Treasurer and Collector of Customs, shall be deemed to have been given by the owner of the Copyright to the Treasurer and Collector of Customs.

Notices to Treasurer and Collector of Customs.

(4) That section shall have effect as if it formed part of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Section 14 of Copyright Act, 1911, to form part of Ordinance No. 6 of 1903.

(11th July, 1918)

An Ordinance to Authorise and Regulate Prospecting and Mining.

Preamble.

WHEREAS all grants or leases of Crown lands now in force in the Colony with certain exceptions contain provisions the effect of which is (a) to limit the use of the land by the grantee or lessee to use for pastoral purposes only and (b) to reserve to the Crown in some cases all mines of silver, gold, and other precious metals and all mines of coal and in other cases all diamonds and all mines of gold, silver and other metals and all mines of coal, in or under the said land and in either case with full liberty at all times to search and dig for and carry away the same and for that purpose to enter upon the said land or any part thereof:

AND WHEREAS doubts have arisen as to the extent of the rights reserved to the Crown in respect of lands the subject of such grants or leases:

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to put an end to such doubts and to make provision for authorising and regulating the prospecting for and working of minerals in or under such lands in manner hereinafter appearing:

Short Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Definition of Mineral.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Mining Ordinance, 1918."

Lands to which this Ordinance applies.

2. In this Ordinance and any Regulations made thereunder the word "mineral" means and includes precious stones, precious metals, metals and all minerals of any kind whatsoever including coal, bituminous shale and mineral oil.

3. This Ordinance shall apply only to unalienated Crown Lands and to lands the subject of an existing Crown grant or Crown lease the effect of which is to confine the user of such land by the grantee or lessee to pastoral purposes only and to reserve to the Crown all mines of silver, gold and other precious metals and all mines of coal; or all diamonds and all mines of gold, silver, and other metals and all mines of coal, as the case may be.

4. No person shall prospect for or mine or take away any mineral found upon or under any land to which this Ordinance applies, unless he be first granted by the Governor a prospecting licence or a mining lease, as the case may be, entitling him to do so. Provided that no licence shall be required by the holder of a Crown grant or Crown lease to quarry or take Stone, Flint, Chalk, Gravel, Sand, Peat and such other substances as the Governor may permit, on application in writing, to be quarried or taken, whether under or upon the land the subject of such grant or lease. Any Stone, Flint, Chalk, Gravel, Sand, Peat or other substance so quarried or taken shall be used exclusively upon such land and no part thereof shall, except by permission of the Governor expressed in writing, be sold, given away, dealt with or disposed of in any other manner whatsoever. Any person acting in contravention of this section shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

No person to prospect or mine without authority.

5. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor to grant licences to prospect for and leases to mine, take, win, and carry away any mineral upon or under any land to which this Ordinance applies, on such terms and for such periods of time as the Secretary of State for the Colonies may approve, and subject to any Regulations which, from time to time, may be in force.

Governor may grant licences and leases to prospect and mine.

(2) No licence or lease granted under this Ordinance shall be disposed of or transferred without the written sanction of the Governor being first applied for and obtained.

Licences and leases not to be transferred.

(3) Every prospecting licence and every mining lease granted under this Ordinance shall provide that the holder thereof in the exercise of the right conferred shall do as little damage as possible, and shall be subject to the payment by the licensee or lessee, as the case may be, of reasonable compensation to the grantee or lessee of the land in respect of which the licence or lease is granted, for any actual damage done by him, in the exercise of such right, to any buildings, roads, or pastoral rights on or over the land.

Payment by holder of licence or lease of compensation for damage.

6. (1) Any claim for compensation for actual damage done by the holder of a prospecting licence or mining lease or by his agent or servants to any buildings, roads or pastoral rights, shall be made by the grantee or lessee of the land and lodged with the Colonial Secretary within four months from the date of the alleged damage sustained.

Claim for compensation to be brought within four months.

(2) Every such claim shall within six months from the date of its being lodged with the Colonial Secretary be inquired into and the damage if any assessed by a Board of three Arbitrators composed of the Magistrate of the District in which the alleged damage occurred, or such other officer as the Governor may appoint, and two persons resident in the Colony, one of whom shall be nominated by the grantee or lessee of the land lodging the claim and the other by the person to whom the licence or lease is granted.

Claim to be assessed by Board of Arbitrators.

(3) An appeal from the finding of the majority of the Board of Arbitrators shall lie to the Chief Justice whose decision shall be final.

Appeal to Judge against finding of Arbitrators.

7. A licence to prospect and a lease to mine shall be in such form as may be approved by the Governor, and shall whilst in force, and for the purposes for which it is granted, entitle the holder thereof as well as his authorized agents and servants, together with his or their animals, carts, vehicles, and all things and appliances necessary for the working of the undertaking, to freely enter and to pass at all times on to and over the land named therein, and, subject to the conditions specified therein, to prospect for or to mine, take, win and carry away any mineral found upon or under the land to which the licence or lease shall apply.

Form of licence and lease and rights conferred by same.

Applications for licences and leases to be sent to Colonial Secretary.

8. Every application for a prospecting licence or for a mining lease shall be made in writing to the Colonial Secretary and shall state the position and approximate area and boundaries of the land in respect of which the application is made, and such further particulars as may be required by the Governor.

Protection of holder of licence or lease against interference.

9. Any person who interferes with or obstructs the holder of a prospecting licence, or of a mining lease, or his agents or servants in the exercise of the rights and privileges conferred on him in pursuance of this Ordinance or of any Regulation made thereunder shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

Work to be actively carried on.

10. In every prospecting licence there shall be implied and deemed to be inserted therein a condition that the person to whom the same is granted shall actively carry on the work of prospecting to the satisfaction of the Governor, in default of which, the licence may, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, be cancelled by the Governor, when it shall become null and void and all works and property of the licensee on the land shall be forfeited to the Government of the Falkland Islands or otherwise dealt with as the Governor may order.

Forfeiture of minerals taken in contravention of Ordinance or Regulations.

11. Any mineral raised, taken, won or carried away in contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance, or any Regulation made thereunder, shall be forfeited to the Government of the Falkland Islands, and any person so acting in contravention of this section shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance.

Making of Regulations.

12. (1) The Governor in Council may make and from time to time vary Regulations for carrying out the provisions and intent of this Ordinance, and for protecting owners and occupiers of land against undue interference with their rights by operations of mining enterprises.

Regulations may provide payment of royalties and fees.

(2) The Regulations may provide for the payment of such Royalties and fees as the Governor in Council may see fit to impose.

Regulations in force on publication.

(3) Every Regulation shall have full force and effect on publication in the Gazette.

Penalties.

13. Any person found guilty of an offence under this Ordinance, or failing to comply with any Regulation made thereunder shall on summary conviction be liable for every such offence and non-compliance to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds (£50) or to imprisonment for any period not exceeding six months, and in addition, at the discretion of the Governor, if the holder of a prospecting licence or a mining lease, to the cancellation of the same.

Ordinance to apply also to the Dependencies.

14. This Ordinance shall be in force also in the Dependencies.

Expenditure of £3,124 1s. 10d. authorized in addition to that authorized by Ordinance No. 4 of 1916.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the (Imperial) Copyright Act, 1911, came into operation in this Colony on the Proclamation of the Governor dated the 24th day of April, 1912.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to facilitate the application in the Colony of Section 14 of the Act.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Copyright Act, 1911, Ordinance, 1918.

Application of Section
14 of Copyright Act,
1911.

2. For the purpose of the application of Section 14 of the (Imperial) Copyright Act, 1911, to the importation into this Colony of works made out of the Colony:

Treasurer & Collector
of Customs shall per-
form duties under Act.

(1) The Treasurer and Collector of Customs shall perform the duties and may exercise the powers thereby imposed on or given to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise of the United Kingdom.

Regulations.

(2) Regulations made by the Treasurer and Collector of Customs under that Section shall require the approval of the Governor in Council.

Notices to Treasurer
and Collector of
Customs.

(3) Regulations made under that Section may provide that notices given to the Commissioners of Customs and Excise of the United Kingdom, if communicated by them to the Treasurer and Collector of Customs, shall be deemed to have been given by the owner of the Copyright to the Treasurer and Collector of Customs.

- (4) That section shall have effect as if it formed part of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Section 14 of Copyright Act, 1911, to form part of Ord. No. 6 of 1903.

An Ordinance to provide for the care and management of a Public Library and Museum in the Town of Stanley.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Library and Museum Ordinance, 1918.

Short Title.

2. The Library and Museum established in the rooms set apart for the purpose in the Government Building known as the "Town Hall", in the Town of Stanley, shall be called the Public Library and Museum, and shall be maintained out of such moneys as may be provided by the Legislative Council and approved by the Secretary of State, and such other moneys as may be subscribed or received for the purpose.

Maintenance of
Museum and Library.

Appointment of Committee.

3. (1) The Library and Museum shall be under the care and management of a Committee of five persons, to be appointed by the Governor, who shall hold office for a period of three years.

Vacancies.

(2) On the occurrence of a vacancy by the death, absence from the Colony, or resignation of any member, the Governor may make a fresh appointment to the Committee.

Chairman.

(3) The Governor shall appoint a member of the Committee to be Chairman.

Committee may make Rules.

4. (1) The Committee may make and from time to time vary or annul rules for the general care and management of the Library and Museum and the conditions under which books, papers, magazines, etc. may be borrowed and taken out of the Library. All rules made by the Committee shall be submitted to the Governor, and shall come into force and take effect as and when approved by the Governor in Council and published in the Gazette.

Penalties.

(2) The rules may provide for a penalty not exceeding twenty shillings for any breach thereof, and for the payment of the amount of any damage done to the Library or to the Museum or anything contained therein.

Appointment of Librarian.

5. (1) The Governor may appoint a Librarian and Museum attendant who shall receive such salary as the Legislative Council may provide and as may be approved by the Secretary of State.

Duties of Librarian.

(2) The Librarian shall act under the directions of the Committee and in accordance with the Rules, and shall be responsible for and have immediate charge of the Library and Museum and everything contained therein.

Admission to Library and Museum &c.

6. (1) Admission to the Library and Museum shall be free of charge.

(2) Subject to such limitations and conditions as may be imposed by the rules, every one of the community may enjoy the use of the Library during such time as the Library is open, and being a subscriber to the Library may borrow and take books, papers, magazines, etc., out of the Library in accordance with the Rules.

Subscribers to Library.

7. There shall be one or more classes of subscribers to the Library, and the qualifications, subscriptions and privileges of each class of subscriber shall be defined by Rules made under this Ordinance.

Legal proceedings may be taken on behalf of the Committee.

8. All actions prosecutions or legal proceedings whatsoever relating to any matter or thing in any wise concerning the Library and Museum may be brought in the names of any two of the Committee or in the name of any person nominated in writing for such purpose by any two of the Committee; and all penalties imposed by any of the Rules made under this Ordinance and the amount of any damage done as aforesaid shall be recoverable under the provisions of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

9. All sums paid as fines under the Rules and all sums received and paid into the Treasury by reason of any proceedings taken under this Ordinance before a Magistrate shall be credited to the funds of the Library and Museum and shall be applied for the purposes of the Library and Museum.

Fines to be paid into Treasury and credited to Library and Museum Funds.

The message which I send to the people of the British Empire on the 4th anniversary of their entry into the war is "HOLDFAST".

We are in this war for no selfish ends. We are in it to recover freedom for the nations which have been brutally attacked and despoiled and to prove that no people however powerful can surrender itself to the lawless ambitions of militarism without meeting retribution swift certain and disastrous at the hands of the free nations of the world. To stop short of victory for this cause would be to compromise the future of mankind.

I say HOLDFAST because our prospects of victory have never been so bright as they are to day. Six months ago the rulers of Germany deliberately rejected the just and reasonable settlement proposed by the Allies. Throwing aside the last mask of moderation they partitioned Russia enslaved Roumania and attempted to seize supreme power by overwhelming the Allies in a final and desperate attack. Thanks to the invincible bravery of all the Allied armies it is now evident to all that the dream of universal conquest for the which they wantonly prolonged the war can never be fulfilled but the battle is not yet won. The great autocracy of Prussia will still endeavour by violence or guile to avoid defeat and so give militarism a new lease of life. We cannot seek to escape the horrors of war for ourselves by laying them up for our children. Having set our hands to the task we must see it through till a just and lasting settlement is achieved.

In no other way can we ensure a world set free from War.

Whereas by the Falkland Islands Currency Note Order, 1899, (hereinafter referred to as "The Principal Order"), provision was made with respect to the issue of currency notes in the Colony of the Falkland Islands:

And whereas by Section 7 of the Principal Order it was provided that the coin received in exchange for currency notes should form the Note Guarantee Fund, and that a portion thereof, referred to as the coin portion of the Fund, and being not less than the fixed proportion of the notes for the time being in circulation, should be in coin and should be held in the Colony in the custody of the Commissioners:

And whereas it is expedient that during the War, and for twelve months after the termination thereof, part of the coin portion of the Fund shall be kept in the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Falkland Islands Currency Note (Temporary Amendment) Order, 1918, and shall be read and construed with the Principal Order.

2. There may be kept in the United Kingdom, either in coin or invested in such manner as a Secretary of State shall approve, for the period of the War, and for twelve months after the termination thereof, such part of the coin portion of the Note Guarantee Fund as a Secretary of State may from time to time direct, notwithstanding that by reason hereof the coin portion of the Fund in the custody of the Commissioners in the Colony may become and be less than the fixed proportion of the notes for the time being in circulation.

3. The Governor of the Colony may, at any time during the War, or during a period of twelve months after the termination thereof, declare by Proclamation that the currency notes issued in the Colony are inconvertible and thereupon, notwithstanding anything in the Principal Order to the contrary, the holder of a currency note shall not be entitled to demand from the Commissioners, and the Commissioners shall not be liable to make, payment in current coin of the amount expressed in the note until the

said Proclamation shall be revoked, or until the period of twelve months after the termination of the War shall have expired, whichever shall first occur.

4. Any such Proclamation may at any time be revoked by the Governor without prejudice to the issue of a new Proclamation in pursuance of Article 3 of this Order.

5. This Order shall come into operation from and after a day to be fixed by Proclamation by the Governor.

6. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order.

Sheep.

2. It is satisfactory to be able to report that the general health of the flocks continues to be good, with the exception of certain flocks which have been infected with Lice and are under notice to clean.

Every effort is being made to clean these sheep, but owing to the fog and continual rain in the Autumn, the gathering and dipping of these sheep has not been able to be carried out as satisfactorily as it would have been had the weather been favourable.

Ophthalmia.

3. This disease is still prevalent among some of the flocks, but I am glad to state that it is becoming less frequent each season.

Statistics.

4. The Returns for 1918 shew the number of the sheep in the Colony to be 699,284 an increase of 2,309 on the 1917 returns.

The price of wool still continues good, and I am glad to say that the clip of the present season has been a record one as regards the weight of wool.

The chief increase is to be found in the number of sheep canned for exportation, and no doubt this will continue under present conditions.

Lambing.

5. The Lambing this season was exceptionally good; no doubt this was due to the fine weather in the Spring. It will be seen from the Comparative Table appended that there is a big increase on the number returned last season.

Canning.

6. Only one factory was working during the season (The Falkland Islands Company's factory at Goose Green). Owing to the need of canned meat for export a considerably increased number of sheep were canned this season, viz:— 61,181, shewing an increase of 18,470 on the previous season.

The sheep were purchased outright from the various stations, the average price paid being 10/3½d. per sheep.

Cattle.

7. The number of cattle at present in the Colony is 7,263 shewing an increase of 419 on last year's returns. The health of the cattle is very good.

Horses.

8. The returns of the present season shew a small decrease on the numbers of last season. The number of foals returned also shew a slight decrease. The general health of the horses is satisfactory.

Imports.

9. During the season the Imports have been :—
6 Bulls, 1 Stallion (Highland Pony), 16 Romney Marsh Rams, from the United Kingdom, and 23 horses from Punta Arenas, Chile.

The Farmers are to be congratulated on their efforts to improve the stock in general of this Colony, as will be seen from the importations made from time to time, not only in the way of improving the sheep, but also the cattle and horses, and I consider the recently imported Highland Pony Stallion an excellent type of horse, and well adapted for this Colony.

Exports.

10. No stock has been exported from the Colony this season. A considerable quantity of Canned Meat, Wool, Hides and Tallow has been exported.

Cultivation.

11. The progress made in this direction increases year by year. The quantity and quality of the hay grown and stored this season is much greater than those of the previous season.

At two of the stations another valuable foodstuff is prepared, namely Ensilage.

“YORK COTTAGE, SANDRINGHAM, NORFOLK.

On the occasion of “Our Day”, 1918, I have much pleasure in congratulating the Red Cross Society and the Order of Saint John on the magnificent work which they in conjunction have achieved during more than 4 years of warfare, and in expressing the confident hope that their efforts may continue to receive from my people the financial support which they require. By personal observation in the United Kingdom and on the Western Front I am convinced that the appeal by the Joint Committee for funds is more than justified in the manner in which they carry on their widespread and responsible labours in co-operation with the Medical Services of the Forces. In Flanders, France, Italy, and Malta, in Palestine, Macedonia and Egypt, in Mesopotamia and East Africa, and in Russia, Roumania and Siberia, the Joint Societies have relieved the suffering, healed the sick and saved valuable lives for the service of the Empire in War and Peace. They have also been able to give welcome assistance to our Allies, and in making provision for the sick and wounded have not forgotten the Prisoners of War whose privations they have done much to alleviate. But it must be remembered that Peace even when declared will not bring a cessation of the work of the Hospitals, and indeed the demands on the resources of the Red Cross must inevitably continue for some time after hostilities have ended. Impressed as I am by the vast obligations which must still fall on the Joint Societies I have much pleasure in contributing the sum of Ten Thousand Pounds.

An Ordinance to provide for a graduated
Land Tax.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Land Tax Ordinance, 1918.

Graduated Land Tax.

2. There shall from and after the first day of January, 1919, and annually thereafter, be charged levied and paid yearly, into the Colonial Treasury, Stanley, on behalf of His Majesty the King His Heirs and Successors for the use of the Government of the Colony, on all lands, save and except as hereinafter provided, a graduated land tax at the rate per acre specified in Schedule A to this Ordinance, and the said land tax shall be calculated and assessed in accordance therewith on the total and aggregate acreages of all lands held by the owner grantee or lessee thereof.

Schedule A.

Tax due in January
each year.

3. (1) The said land tax shall become due on the first day of January in each year in respect of the year and the owner grantee or lessee of the land shall pay the same as herein provided at and after the rate specified in Schedule A hereto in respect of the total and aggregate acreage of all lands held by him.

(2) The payment annually of the land tax shall be made in two equal instalments on or before the thirty-first day of January and the thirty-first day of July in each year.

Payment of Tax annually in two equal instalments.

(3) If any owner grantee or lessee shall fail to pay the amount of the land tax or any instalment thereof within sixty days from the date on which the same shall become due and payable he shall be liable to the further payment of a surcharge on the amount of the same equal to one fourth part thereof by way of a penalty and such surcharge shall be recoverable as herein provided.

Penalty for failure to pay tax.

4. (1) The acreage of all lands upon which the land tax shall be paid shall be the total acreage ascertained by survey made by a qualified land surveyor.

Acreage of land for purpose of Ordinance.

(2) Where no survey of the land has been made before the date of the passing of this Ordinance, and until such time as a survey shall have been made and the acreage of the land ascertained—

(a) the acreage upon which the land tax shall be paid shall be the acreage stated in the Crown grant or lease respecting the land, or

(b) where the acreage of the land is not stated in the Crown grant or lease respecting the land, the acreage upon which the land tax shall be paid shall be the acreage as declared under the provisions of this Ordinance by the Governor in Council.

5. In every case in which the acreage of any lands has not been ascertained by survey made, or the acreage is not stated in the Crown grant or lease under which the lands are held or occupied, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by order to declare the acreage of such lands, and the acreage so declared shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be deemed to be the acreage of such lands, and every such order shall have full force and effect and shall remain in force until varied or amended in like manner by the Governor in Council, or until such time as a survey of the land shall have been made and the acreage of the land ascertained.

Governor in Council to declare acreage in certain cases.

6. (1) The owner grantee or lessee of all lands which have been surveyed since the date and issue of the Crown grant or lease respecting the same shall within six months from the date of the passing of this Ordinance, and hereafter within six months from the making of any survey of the same, make and furnish to the Colonial Treasurer a true and correct return of the description and total acreage of all lands held or occupied by him as ascertained by the survey.

Return of lands surveyed to be furnished to Treasurer.

(2) Any owner grantee or lessee failing to make and furnish the return required by this section of the Ordinance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds and to a further penalty not exceeding twenty pounds a month for every month during which the failure continues after conviction therefor.

Penalty for failure to make return of lands surveyed.

7. All lands within the limits of any Town, and all unleased Crown and Government reserved lands, and all lands held by His Majesty's Naval and Military Authorities for the service of His Majesty and by the Colonial Government shall be exempt from payment of land tax.

Lands exempt from payment of land tax.

Land Tax charge on lands under Crown Grants and condition under Leases.

8. The land tax under this Ordinance shall constitute a first charge or lien on all lands held under Crown Grant, in respect of which the same is due, and the payment of the tax shall form a condition of the occupation and enjoyment of any and all lands held under Crown or Government Lease.

Recovery of land tax and penalties.

9. The amount of the land tax and any penalty incurred under this Ordinance shall be recoverable by the Colonial Treasurer, or any person duly authorised by him, upon summary conviction.

Minute by the Governor introducing the Estimates
for the year 1919.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

I have the honour to submit for your consideration and approval the draft Estimates for the public service of the Colony for the year 1919.

The revenue, based on present taxation, is estimated at £30,337, and the expenditure at £34,517, leaving a deficit of £4,180 to be met from other sources.

The expenditure has been kept down with a due regard to economy. With the exception of £500 to enable trials to be made for the installation, after the War, of a Wireless Telegraph Station at South Georgia, no new works have been provided for under public works extraordinary.

At the time the Estimates for the current year were passed by your Council in November, 1917, and provision was made for an expenditure of £32,730, it was estimated that the revenue for the year would fall short of the expenditure by a sum of about £2,480. I am now able to inform you that it is considered that the revenue of this year will be sufficient to meet the expenditure, the revised estimates being, revenue £30,154, within £100 of the original estimate, and expenditure £28,510, a sum of £1,220 less than the original estimate. There may however be an increase in the expenditure on account of the cost for carriage of overseas mails if charged and paid within the year.

The Wireless Telegraph Installation at Fox Bay, for which provision is made on the current year's estimates, was completed by Mr. R. B. Baseley, A. M. I. Mech. E, Colonial Engineer, and communication with Stanley satisfactorily established on the 25th instant. Among the first messages received by me is one from the Farmers and residents of West Falkland, expressing for "the great benefit conferred" their appreciation and thanks, which I have the pleasure to convey to your Council.

On the 1st January, 1918, the surplus of assets over liabilities were, Crown Lands Fund £134,925, Stock Fund £2,608 and Surplus Balances £25,573. The revenues derived from the Dependencies have brought about the nest egg the Colony possesses in its surplus balances.

Of recent years the general revenue of the Colony has been largely added to by the revenue derived from the Dependencies, and by the interest received from the investments on account of the Crown Lands Fund, Crown moneys to which it may be considered the Colony can have no legal claim.

For the years 1915, 1916, and 1917, the average annual revenue of the Colony was,

From the Falkland Islands, including the interest

whilst the average annual expenditure

and the direct expenditure

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To the expenditure of the Dependencies, however, a fair proportion of the cost of the administration of the Colony should be added, and assuming that proportion to be one third, the adjusted figures for the average annual expenditure would be, for the Falkland Islands £26,100, and for the Dependencies £3,000.

The Government expenditure on the Dependencies has, for the past four years owing to the War, been confined for the most part to what may be called establishment charges.

The possibilities of the Dependencies have however been engaging attention. At the present time an Inter-Departmental Committee is at work in London, to enquire into and report what can be done to facilitate action, at the conclusion of the War, in regard to the preservation of the whaling industry and the development of other industries in the Dependencies. The Committee will consider not only economic questions and the scheme for the employment of a research vessel, but also what purely scientific investigations are most required to further the objects in view.

It can be foreseen that an increased expenditure on the Dependencies, more proportionate to the revenue derived from them, will in the near future be incurred, and that funds which have hitherto been available and applied for other services of the Colony will be considerably lessened. When the time arrives the Colony must be prepared to meet its obligations in this respect to the best of its resources.

The Estimates for next year shew that the revenue based on present taxation is estimated,

The situation reviewed, it is not only imperative that the estimated deficit of £4,180 on next year's transactions of the Colony should be met, but that a beginning should be made to produce more closely equilibrium between the revenue and expenditure of the Falkland Islands apart from the revenue derived from the Dependencies.

To make up the amount required to meet next year's expenditure, two alternatives have suggested themselves, to increase the export duties under the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, on the produce of the sheep industry, or to increase the tax on land under the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, as a contribution to general revenue.

After due consideration it is considered expedient, in lieu of these two sources of revenue, to introduce a land tax on the graduated scale of,

- One farthing per acre on lands under 5,000 acres,
- One half-penny per acre on lands of 5,000 acres and under 50,000 acres,
- Three farthings per acre on lands of 50,000 acres and under 100,000 acres and
- One penny per acre on lands of 100,000 acres and over.

The Stock Department heretofore charged to the tax on land under the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, to become a charge on general revenue.

It is estimated that by these changes an additional sum of £4,800 will be contributed annually to the general revenue of the Colony.

Draft Ordinances to give effect to the proposals put forward, and to place an export duty of 3½d per barrel on seal oil, will be submitted for your consideration.

Adjusted on the basis proposed, the revenue for the year 1919, is estimated,

From the Falkland Islands - - - -	£20,230

leaving an available balance of £689 to meet unforeseen charges.

Representations on behalf of the largest and oldest of the land owners in the Colony were made to me some time ago, to the effect that the land owners do not favour the present export duties on the sheep industry. They consequently would not welcome any increase in those duties. As I understand it, the land owners consider the export duties to be a tax on good farming and a premium on bad. To put it in other words, that the export duties operate in favour of the careless and slovenly farmer, and unduly hit the man who through application and energy makes the very best he can of his farm. The land owners represent, and in this I am in accord with them, that the land is the only permanent source of wealth, and that when it is necessary to raise more revenue unquestionably the money needed should be raised by a tax on land.

As the time has arrived when more revenue is required, I am ready so far to apply the principle advocated by the land owners as now submitted for your consideration. In so doing I have no reason to suppose that the graduated land tax based on the low rates stated will be otherwise than as acceptable to the thrifty holder of lands of comparatively moderate extent, as I hope it will be to the larger proprietor.

During the last ten years the total trade of the Colony has advanced from £320,054 in 1907, to a declared value of £3,127,909 in 1917.

Of the total imports last year, valued at £1,257,306, coal represented £505,252, timber and empty oil barrels £308,161, and hardware and machinery £139,970.

Of the total exports the produce of the sheep industry was declared at £303,184 and the whale and seal industries at £1,565,985. The values given would appear however to have been somewhat understated. With the average price of 1s. 2d. per lb. realized for wool f.o.b. Stanley Harbour (some wool fetched as much as 1s. 9d. per lb.) and £6 per barrel for whale oil, the value of the exports may be stated at £343,000 for the sheep industry, and £2,280,000 for the whale and seal industries.

Compared with the exports of the year 1907, these figures shew an increase of £154,300 and £2,264,300 on exports of the sheep and whale industries respectively. The exports of whale oil have increased from 14,400 barrels in 1907, to 380,489 barrels in 1917. The wool exported last year amounted to 4,711,271 lbs. and exceeds by 261,672 lbs. the wool exported in 1907.

I cannot however think that the sheep industry in the Falkland Islands has reached its limit of production. It has been stated that there are many lands in the Falkland Islands which are not being farmed as they should. In fact in some cases the lands are not being made use of at all, and that if the land were taxed it might possibly have a stimulating effect on farming to the immediate benefit of the farmer generally. I am led to believe it is possible that on some stations if more energy and care were paid to farming and improvements made to both land and stock the industry would respond by an increased yield.

I make these remarks not by way of criticism but in the light of friendly counsel, with the hope they will be accepted in the spirit in which they are made, having alone for their object the advancement of the interests of the farmer in particular and the Colony in general.

An Ordinance to provide for a graduated
Land Tax.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows: —

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the **Land Tax Ordinance, 1918.** **Short Title.**
2. There shall from and after the first day of January, 1919, and annually thereafter, be charged levied and paid yearly, into the Colonial Treasury, Stanley, on behalf of His Majesty the King His Heirs and Successors for the use of the Government of the Colony, on all lands, save and except as hereinafter provided, a graduated land tax at the rate per acre specified in Schedule A to this Ordinance, and the said land tax shall be calculated and assessed in accordance therewith on the total and aggregate acreages of all lands held by the owner grantee or lessee thereof. **Graduated Land Tax.**
Schedule A.
3. (1) The said land tax shall become due on the first day of January in each year in respect of the year and the owner grantee or lessee of the land shall pay the same as herein provided at and after the rate specified in Schedule A hereto in respect of the total and aggregate acreage of all lands held by him. **Tax due in January each year.**
- (2) The payment annually of the land tax shall be made in two equal instalments on or before the thirty-first day of January and the thirty-first day of July in each year. **Payment of Tax annually in two equal instalments.**

Penalty for failure to pay tax.

(3) If any owner grantee or lessee shall fail to pay the amount of the land tax or any instalment thereof within sixty days from the date on which the same shall become due and payable he shall be liable to the further payment of a surcharge on the amount of the same equal to one fourth part thereof by way of a penalty and such surcharge shall be recoverable as herein provided.

Acreege of land for purpose of Ordinance.

4. (1) The acreage of all lands upon which the land tax shall be paid shall be the total acreage ascertained by survey made by a qualified land surveyor.

(2) Where no survey of the land has been made before the date of the passing of this Ordinance, and until such time as a survey shall have been made and the acreage of the land ascertained—

(a) the acreage upon which the land tax shall be paid shall be the acreage stated in the Crown grant or lease respecting the land, or

(b) where the acreage of the land is not stated in the Crown grant or lease respecting the land, the acreage upon which the land tax shall be paid shall be the acreage as declared under the provisions of this Ordinance by the Governor in Council.

Governor in Council to declare acreage in certain cases.

5. In every case in which the acreage of any lands has not been ascertained by survey made, or the acreage is not stated in the Crown grant or lease under which the lands are held or occupied, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by order to declare the acreage of such lands, and the acreage so declared shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be deemed to be the acreage of such lands, and every such order shall have full force and effect and shall remain in force until varied or amended in like manner by the Governor in Council, or until such time as a survey of the land shall have been made and the acreage of the land ascertained.

Return of lands surveyed to be furnished to Treasurer.

6. (1) The owner grantee or lessee of all lands which have been surveyed since the date and issue of the Crown grant or lease respecting the same shall within six months from the date of the passing of this Ordinance, and hereafter within six months from the making of any survey of the same, make and furnish to the Colonial Treasurer a true and correct return of the description and total acreage of all lands held or occupied by him as ascertained by the survey.

Penalty for failure to make return of lands surveyed.

(2) Any owner grantee or lessee failing to make and furnish the return required by this section of the Ordinance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds and to a further penalty not exceeding twenty pounds a month for every month during which the failure continues after conviction therefor.

Lands exempt from payment of land tax.

7. All lands within the limits of any Town, and all unleased Crown and Government reserved lands, and all lands held by His Majesty's Naval and Military Authorities for the service of His Majesty and by the Colonial Government shall be exempt from payment of land tax.

Land Tax charge on lands under Crown Grants and condition under Leases.

8. The land tax under this Ordinance shall constitute a first charge or lien on all lands held under Crown Grant, in respect of which the same is due, and the payment of the tax shall form a condition of the occupation and enjoyment of any and all lands held under Crown or Government Lease.

9. The amount of the land tax and any penalty incurred under this Ordinance shall be recoverable by the Colonial Treasurer, or any person duly authorised by him, upon summary conviction.

Recovery of land tax and penalties.

An Ordinance to regulate the Sea Fisheries.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Sea Fisheries Ordinance, 1918.

Fishing for export purposes prohibited without a Licence.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to catch for the purposes of export any fish in the territorial or Colonial waters of the Colony unless he be duly licensed under this Ordinance.

Issue of Licences.

3. The Collector of Customs or his Deputy, may on the application of any person or persons approved by the Governor, grant licences to such person or persons to catch fish for the purposes of export from the Colony, for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be therein specified, and subject at all times to such regulations as may be in force, and to the payment of such licence fees and royalties as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

Payment of Fees and Royalties.

Governor in Council may make regulations.

4. (1) The Governor in Council may make and from time to time vary regulations—

Terms and conditions.

(a) For fixing the terms and conditions on which licences to catch fish for export may be granted;

Close season.

(b) For fixing the close season for any kind of fish, and for prohibiting the taking of fish during any such season;

- (c) For defining the limits within which any holder of a licence shall be allowed to fish; **Defining Limits.**
- (d) For curing and preparing the fish caught and for the utilization of any refuse or part of the fish; **Curing, &c.**
- (e) For disposing by sale or otherwise of any fish and any fishing gear forfeited under the provisions of this Ordinance; **Disposing of fish forfeited.**
- (f) To prohibit the use of specified kinds of fishing gear or the prosecution of a fishing method considered to be undesirable in the interests of the fishery; **Fishing gear, prohibition of undesirable.**
- (g) For fixing the amount of the fees to be paid for a licence to catch fish, and of the royalties payable on the fish caught, and, **Fees and Royalties.**
- (h) Generally for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and the intent and object thereof. **Regulations generally.**

(2) All regulations made in pursuance of this Ordinance shall be published in the Gazette. **Publication of Regulations.**

5. Any person who shall on summary conviction be found guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder, shall for each offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds (£100) and to the forfeiture of the fish caught together with the fishing gear, and on a repetition of an offence under this Ordinance to the immediate cancellation of the licence held by him. **Penalty.**

6. Any person who shall fish or catch fish beyond the Colonial Waters in a manner that would within the Colonial Waters be contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance or to any regulations made thereunder, shall on entering the Colonial Waters and having on board the vessel the fish so caught be deemed to have committed an offence against this Ordinance and may be dealt with accordingly. **Fishing in prohibited manner beyond Colonial Waters.**

7. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony. **Ordinance in force in Dependencies.**

The Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following Terms of the Armistice which was signed by the Plenipotentiaries of the Allies and the United States of America and by the German delegates at 5.0. a.m. on the 11th November, 1918.

Terms of German Armistice.

(a) Clauses relating to Western Front.

1. Cessation of operations by land and in the air 6 hours after the signature of the armistice.

2. Immediate evacuation of invaded countries Belgium, France, Alsace Lorraine, Luxembourg, so ordered as to be completed within 14 days from the signature of the armistice. German troops which have not left the above territories within the period will become prisoners of war. Occupation by the Allied and United States Forces jointly will keep pace with evacuation in their areas. All movements of evacuation and occupation will be regulated in accordance with a note (*annexure*).

3. Repatriation, beginning at once, to be completed within fourteen days of all inhabitants of the countries above enumerated, (including hostages, persons under trial or convicted).

4. Surrender in good condition by the German armies of the following equipment, 5,000 guns, (2,500 heavy, 2,500 field), 30,000 machine-guns, 3,000 minewerfer, 2,000 aeroplanes (fighters, bombers firstly and night bombing machines). The above to be delivered *in situ* to the Allied and United States troops in accordance with the detailed conditions laid down in the note (*annexure 1*).

5. Evacuation by the German armies of the countries on the left bank of the Rhine. These countries on the left bank of the Rhine shall be administered by the local authorities under the control of the Allied and United States armies of occupation. The occupation of these territories will be carried out by Allied and United States garrisons holding the principal crossings of the Rhine (Mayence, Coblenz, Cologne) together with bridgeheads at those points of a 30 kilometre radius on the right bank and by garrisons similarly holding the strategic points of the regions. A neutral zone shall be set up on the right bank of the Rhine between the

river and a line drawn 10 kilometres distant starting from the Dutch frontier to the Swiss frontier. In the case of inhabitants no person shall be prosecuted for having taken part in any military measures previous to the signing of the armistice. No measure of a general or official character shall be taken which would have as a consequence the depreciation of industrial establishments or a reduction of their personnel. Evacuation by the enemy of the Rhineland shall be so ordered as to be completed within a further period of 11 days, in all 25 days after the signature of the armistice. All movements of evacuation and occupation will be regulated according to the note (annexure 1).

6. In all territory evacuated by the enemy there shall be no evacuation of inhabitants; no damage or harm shall be done to the persons or property of the inhabitants. No destruction of any kind to be committed. Military establishments of all kinds shall be delivered intact as well as military stores of food. Munitions, equipment not removed during the periods fixed for evacuation, stores of food of all kinds for the civil population, cattle, etc., shall be left *in situ*. Industrial establishments shall not be impaired in any way and their personnel shall not be moved.

7. Roads and means of communication of every kind, railroads, waterways, main roads, bridges, telegraphs, telephones shall be in no manner impaired. All civil and military personnel at present employed on them shall remain. 5,000 locomotives, 150,000 waggons and 5,000 motor lorries in good working order with all necessary spare parts and fittings shall be delivered to the associated powers within the period fixed for the evacuation of Belgium and Luxemburg. The railways of Alsace Lorraine shall be handed over within the same period together with all prewar personnel and material. Further, material necessary for the working of railways in the country on the left bank of the Rhine shall be left *in situ*. All stores of coal and material for upkeep of permanent way, signals, and repair shops shall be left *in situ* and kept as far as means of communication are concerned in an efficient state by Germany during the whole period of the armistice. All barges taken from the Allies shall be restored to them, the note appended as annexure 2 regulates the detail of these measures.

8. The German command shall be responsible for revealing all mines or delay action fuzes disposed on territory evacuated by the German troops and shall assist in their discovery and destruction. The German command shall also reveal all destructive measures that may have been taken (such as poisoning, pollution of springs, wells, etcetera) under penalty of reprisals.

9. The right of requisition shall be exercised by the Allied and United States armies in all occupied territory, save for settlement of accounts with authorised persons; the upkeep of the troops of occupation in the Rhineland (excluding Alsace Lorraine) shall be charged to the German Government.

10. The immediate repatriation without reciprocity according to detailed conditions which shall be fixed, of all Allied and United States prisoners of war; the Allied powers and the United States of America shall be able to dispose of these prisoners as they wish. However, the return of German prisoners of war interned in Holland and Switzerland shall continue as heretofore. Return of German prisoners of war shall be settled at peace preliminaries.

11. Sick and wounded who cannot be removed from evacuated territory will be cared for by German personnel who will be left on the spot with the medical material required.

(b) Clauses relating to the Eastern Frontiers of Germany.

12. All German troops at present in any territory, which before the war belonged to Russia, Rumania, or Turkey shall withdraw within the frontiers of Germany, as they existed on August 1st, 1914. And all German troops at present in territories which before the war formed part of Russia must likewise return to within the frontiers of Germany as above defined as soon as the Allies shall think the movement suitable having regard to the internal situation of those territories.

13. Evacuation by German troops to begin at once; and all German instructors, prisoners, and civilian as well as military agents, now on the territory of Russia (as defined on August 1st, 1914) to be recalled.

14. German troops to cease at once all requisitions and seizures, and any other undertaking with a view to obtaining supplies for Germany in Rumania and Russia, as defined on August 1st, 1914.

15. Abandonment of the treaties of Bucharest and Brest Litovsk and of the supplementary treaties.

16. The Allies shall have free access to the territories evacuated by the Germans on their eastern frontier, either through Danzig, or by the Vistula, on order to convey supplies to the populations of those territories or for the purpose of maintaining order.

(c) Clause relating to East Africa.

17. Unconditional evacuation of all German forces operating in East Africa within one month.

(d) General Clauses.

18. Repatriation, without reciprocity, within a maximum period of one month, in accordance with detailed conditions hereafter to be fixed, of all civilians interned or deported who may be citizens of other allied or associated states than those mentioned in clause 3.

19. With the reservation that any future claims and demands of the Allied and United States of America remain unaffected the following financial conditions are required:

Reparation for damage done. While the armistice lasts no public securities shall be removed by the enemy which can serve as a pledge to the Allies for the recovery or reparation for war losses. Immediate restitution of the cash deposit in the national bank of Belgium, and in general, immediate return of all documents, specie, stock, shares, paper money together with plant for the issue thereof, touching public or private interests in the invaded countries. Restitution of the Russian and Roumanian gold yielded to Germany or taken by that power. This gold to be delivered in trust to the Allies until signature of peace.

(e) Naval Conditions

20. Immediate cessation of all hostilities at sea and definite information to be given as to the location and movements of all German ships. Notification to be given to neutrals that freedom of navigation in all territorial waters is given to the naval and mercantile marines of the Allied and associated powers, all questions of neutrality being waived.

21. All naval and mercantile marine prisoners of war of the Allied and associated powers in German hands to be returned, without reciprocity.

22. (5) In order to meet our wishes the text will be modified as follows: Handing over to the Allies and the United States of all submarines (including all submarine cruisers and minelayers) which are at present at the moment with full com-

plement in the ports specified by the Allies and the United States. Those that cannot put to sea to be deprived of crews and supplies and shall remain under the supervision of the Allies and United States. Submarines ready to put to sea shall be prepared to leave German ports immediately on receipt of wireless order to sail to the port of surrender, the remainder to follow as early as possible. The conditions of this article shall be carried out within fourteen days after the signing of the armistice.

23. The following German surface warships, which shall be designated by the Allies and the United States of America, shall forthwith be disarmed and thereafter interned in neutral ports or failing that allied ports, to be designated by the Allies and the United States of America, and placed under surveillance of the Allies and the United States of America, only caretakers being left on board, namely: 6 battle cruisers, 16 battle ships, 8 light cruisers, including 2 minelayers, 50 destroyers of the most modern type. All other surface warships [including river craft], are to be concentrated in German naval bases to be designated by the Allies and the United States of America, and are to be paid off and completely disarmed and placed under the supervision of the Allies and the United States of America. All vessels of the auxiliary fleet [trawlers, motor vessels, etcetera] are to be disarmed. All vessels specified for internment shall be ready to leave German ports seven days after the signing of the armistice. Directions for voyage will be given by wireless.

NOTE TO CLAUSE 23.

A declaration has been signed by the Allied delegates and handed to the German delegates to the effect that in the event of ships not being handed over owing to the mutinous state of the fleet the Allies reserve the right to occupy Heligoland as an advanced base of armistice. The German delegates have on their part signed a declaration that they will recommend the Chancellor to accept this.

24. The Allies and the United States of America shall have the right to sweep up all minefields and obstructions laid by Germany outside German territorial waters, and the positions of these are to be indicated.

25. Freedom of access to and from the Baltic to be given to the Naval and mercantile marines of the allied and associated powers. To secure this the allies and the United States of America shall be empowered to occupy all German forts, fortifications, batteries and defence works of all kinds in all the entrances from the Cattegat into the Baltic, and to sweep up all mines and obstructions within and without German territorial waters without any questions of neutrality being raised, and the positions of all such mines and obstructions are to be indicated.

26. The existing blockade conditions set up by the Allied and associated powers are to remain unchanged, and all German merchant ships found at sea are to remain liable to capture. The Allies and United States of America contemplate the provisioning of Germany during the armistice as shall be found necessary.

27. All Naval aircraft are to be concentrated and mobilised in German bases to be specified by the Allies and the United States of America.

28. In evacuating the Belgian coasts and ports, Germans shall abandon all merchant ships, tugs, lighters, cranes and all other harbour materials, all materials for inland navigation, all aircraft and air-materials and stores, all arms and armaments, and all stores, and apparatus of all kind.

29. All Black Sea ports are to be evacuated by Germany; all Russian warships of all descriptions seized by Germany in the Black Sea are to be handed over to the Allies and the United States of America; all neutral merchant ships seized are to be released; all warlike and other materials as specified in clause 28 are to be abandoned.

30. All Merchant ships in German hands belonging to the Allies and associated powers are to be restored in ports to be specified by the allies and United States of America without reciprocity.

31. No destruction of ships or of materials to be permitted before evacuation, surrender or restoration.

32. The German Government shall formally notify the neutral Governments of the world, and particularly the Governments of Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland, that all restrictions placed on the trading of their vessels with the allied and associated countries, whether by the German Government or by private German interests, and whether in return for specific concessions such as the export of shipbuilding materials or not are immediately cancelled.

33. No transfer of German merchant shipping of any description to any neutral flag are to take place after signature of the armistice.

(f) Duration of Armistice.

34. The duration of the armistice is to be 36 days, with option to extend. During this period, on failure of execution of any of the above clauses, the armistice may be denounced by one of the contracting parties, on 48 hours previous notice.

Time Limit for Reply.

35. This armistice to be accepted or refused by Germany within 72 hours of notification.

The Governor has received the following telegram from His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies which he has the honour to communicate to the People of the Falkland Islands.

Secretary of State to Governor. Dated and received 16th November, 1918.

Now that the war has been brought to a victorious conclusion I desire to express to the people of the Falkland Islands on behalf of His Majesty's Government our appreciation of their constant and loyal support of the common cause and to recall with pride and gratitude their deliverance from the peril which they so staunchly faced in the early days of the war.

Report on the Government Savings Bank for the year 1917-18.

TREASURY,

STANLEY, FALKLAND ISLANDS,

3rd March, 1917.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward the following report of the transactions of the Government Savings Bank, for the year ended 30th September, 1918, with Returns (numbered 1 to 6) called for under Section 13 of the Savings Bank Ordinance, 1888.

Summary of year's transactions.

2. During the year there were 88 new accounts opened and 30 accounts closed, leaving a total of 796 depositors amongst which the balance in hand (£125,682 3s. 5d.) was distributed. The average for each account was £157 17s. 10d, or £55 11s. 9d. per head of the population of the Falkland Islands.

3. On the 30th September there were 2 depositors with over £3,000 each, another with over £2,000., 13 with over £1,000., 42 with over £500., 120 with over £200., 122 with over £100., and 146 with over £40., leaving 350 with less than £40 each. It would therefore seem that other than savings are deposited with the Treasurer. This may be explained by the fact that there are no banking institutions in the Colony, and in consequence it may be said that many of the depositors would seem to do a certain amount of their business through the Government Savings Bank.

4. The Ordinance provides for the Treasurer receiving on deposit "savings" of no less amount than one shilling, and to repay the same, but there does not appear to be any limit to the amount which any person may deposit in one year, over that sum, nor is there a limit placed on the amount standing on deposit in the name of any one depositor, on which interest may be allowed, as in the United Kingdom.

7. The Ordinance provides for all monies deposited in the bank to be invested in approved securities, if convertible at short notice.

The dividends received for the half-year, from the £25,000., 5%, War Stock purchased in May 1918, was duly credited to the income of the bank.

9. The profit on the year's transactions was credited as in former years to Ordinary Revenue. Since the establishment of the Bank in 1888, the income derived from the securities has been credited to the Ordinary Revenue of the Colony and the interest paid to depositors with the expenses for management, have been charged as part of the Expenditure of the Colony.

10. Under the provisions of the Ordinance, the income derived from the securities shall form a Fund for defraying the interest due to depositors, and all expenses incurred in the execution of the Ordinance.

11. Return No. 5 shews that since the establishment of the bank in 1888, the Ordinary Revenue of the this Colony has benefited to the extent of £11,179 - 17 - 7., In future the profit on each year's transactions will be expended in the following year in the purchase of securities, to form a Savings Bank Depreciation Fund, in accordance with the instructions received from the Secretary of State.

12. The interest payable to depositors under the Ordinance is at the rate of $2\frac{1}{4}\%$ per annum, on every complete pound, that is to say, sixpence on every pound left on deposit for a complete year. It should be remembered that interest is paid only on the pound, (not the odd shillings): it is reckoned from the first day of JANUARY, APRIL, JULY, or OCTOBER following the day of deposit, and ceases as from the last day of MARCH, JUNE, SEPTEMBER, or DECEMBER preceding the day of withdrawal.

13. The Ordinance and the Regulations made thereunder provide for the payment of withdrawals of over £50, by Bill of Exchange. Minors over 7 years are authorized to sign as if of full age. Each depositor is provided with a Pass Book in which he is required to sign his name and state his address, in the place provided.

- (b) **THE INVESTMENT PORTION.** During the year the investment portion was increased by a sum of £1,500 which was expended in the purchase of approved securities, and the total sum so expended on behalf of this fund amounts to £7,500.

The Note Depreciation Fund.

6. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, a sum equal to one per cent. of the cost price of the securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund has to be set aside annually to form a Depreciation Fund, until such time as the latter is not less than ten per cent of the cost price of the securities forming the said investment portion. A separate account has to be kept of the Depreciation Fund, to form part of the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.

7. During the year there was no change in the securities forming the Note Depreciation Fund, which amounted to £890 : 15 : 7., on the 31st December, 1918.

Summary of Year's Transactions.

8. On the 1st January, the face value of the notes in circulation, amounted to £12,000. During the year the face value of the notes issued by the Commissioners amounted to £3,400., which less those withdrawn and cancelled, (£400) leaves in circulation at the end of the year, £15,000., viz:—

The decrease shown in the number of openings during the year 1918 is accounted for by the fact that a break of one week (1st to 5th July) was made in the long winter term, and by certain holidays which were granted to the School on the occasion of the signing of the Armistice with Germany.

6. The expenditure on the Government School during the year amounted approximately to £809. The total amount received in fees was £108, and £18 was taken by sale of stationery, &c., to the pupils.

7. Miss Lena Poppy, who in January, 1918, passed her fourth annual and final examination as a pupil teacher, was appointed to act temporarily as an additional Assistant Mistress at the Government School.

9. This very considerable decrease is accounted for by the fact that on the 14th November, 1917, Mr. F. P. Thomson completed his extended period of service as a Travelling Teacher, since when there has been only one Travelling Teacher employed by the Government instead of five for which the establishment makes provision. Owing to the war it has been found impossible to fill, as they occurred, the vacancies in the posts of Travelling Teacher. In 1912 the number of children under instruction by Government Travelling Teachers was 92, as compared with 19 as recorded in the above table for the year 1918.

An Ordinance to amend the Mining Ordinance, 1918.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Mining Ordinance, 1918, amendment Ordinance, 1919.

Amendment of Ordinance No. 1 of 1918

2. The Mining Ordinance, 1918, is hereby amended as follows:—

Clause 10.

(1) By the deletion, in clause 10 thereof, of the word "actively" before the words "carry on the work of", and by the insertion therein of the words "actively and with due diligence" before the words "to the satisfaction of the Governor,"

Clause 13.

(2) By the insertion, in clause 13 thereof, of the words, "and with the sanction of the Secretary of State" after the words, "at the discretion of the Governor".

I have the honour to submit herewith returns (numbered 1 to 14*), called for under Colonial Regulation 396, together with a draft of the Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance in respect of the year ended 31st December, 1918.

2. The Revenue and Expenditure for the year amounted to £46364 : 16 : 8, and £26269 : 10 : 4, respectively. Included therein are sums received under the Land Ordinance 1903, in respect of land purchases, as well as sums received and disbursed under the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901.

3. The revenue, exclusive of "Land Sales", exceeded the expenditure by £11204 : 1 : 0. The total revenue was £6946 : 16 : 8, over, and the total expenditure £7,030 : 9 : 8, under, the original estimate for the year 1918.

Revenue.

4. The ordinary Revenue amounted to £37471 : 19 : 5; representing £24,075† : 6 : 3, for "Falklands", and £13,396 : 13 : 2, for the "Dependencies", as shewn in detail on Return 2.

5. There was a deficiency of £271 : 13 : 10, under "Internal Revenue", on the estimated revenue for 1918. All the other Heads shew an increase on the original estimate, amounting to a total in ordinary revenue of £7496 : 13 : 3. As compared with the previous year there was a net increase in ordinary revenue of £981 : 0 : 9.

6. As compared with the last year prior to the War, the total ordinary revenue was £5187, more than in 1913. The receipts for "Customs Duties" and "Fees Fines" exceeded those for 1913, by £1964, and £1487, respectively; the receipts for "Port Dues" "Internal Revenue", and "Post Office", were less than in 1913, by £154., £1697., and £1163., respectively.

8. The receipts in respect of Import Duties on Wine, Malt, Spirits, and Tobacco amounted to £7175 : 17 : 4, for the year 1918, or £693 : 0 : 5, more than the previous year, and £914 : 14 : 7, over the average for the previous five years.

† Includes £5392 interest from Crown Lands Fund, and £4326 interest on Government Savings Bank moneys.

Expenditure.

9. The expenditure for the year 1918, exclusive of disbursements under The Live Stock Ordinance 1901, amounted to £25941 : 2 : 3, representing £24853 : 14 : 5, for the "Falklands" and £1087 : 7 : 10, for the "Dependencies" as shewn in detail on Return 3.

10. There was an excess of £2 : 10 : 0, under "Ecclesiastical", and £266 : 11 : 7, under "Miscellaneous", on the original estimated expenditure for 1918. All the other Heads shew a savings on the original estimate, amounting to a total of £7299 : 11 : 3. As compared with the previous year there was a net saving of £3417 : 5 : 10.

12. During the five years 1914-18, the total ordinary revenue has exceeded the total ordinary expenditure, during the same period by £42727 : 7 : 5, of which a sum of £10324 : 13 : 4, has been expended under "Public Works Extraordinary" since 1914, leaving a net saving on the five past years of £32402 : 14 : 1. This amount when added to the accumulated savings of £4701 : 9 : 10, at the beginning of the year 1914, makes a total net saving in ordinary revenue over expenditure up to the 31st December 1918, of £37104 : 3 : 11.

13. There is no public debt. On the other hand, on the 31st December 1918, the Colony had a Land Sales Fund amounting to £143816 : 1 : 10, and a Live Stock Fund amounting to £2280 : 14 : 9, which together with accumulated ordinary revenue of £37104 : 3 : 11, makes a total surplus of £183201 : 0 : 6.

14. The sums received during the year in respect of land purchases, (transferred to the Land Sales Fund), amounted to £8891 : 5 : 4. On the 31st December 1918, this Fund amounted to £143816 : 1 : 10, of which a sum of £143485 : 12 : 8, was invested in Stocks, leaving an uninvested balance at the end of the year of £333 : 8 : 2.

15. The monies standing to the credit of the Depositors in the Government Savings Bank at the end of the year amounted to £112440 : 18 : 8, making an increase during the year of £1195 : 5 : 6. All the money so deposited, with the exception of £12674 : 14 : 6 was invested in approved securities. The dividends received from these securities, during the year, amounted to £4467 : 17 : 7, of which a sum of £2748 : 17 : 1, was expended during the year in the payment of interest to depositors and expenses for management, leaving a profit on the year's transactions of £1719 : 0 : 6. of which a sum of £1600 is about to be invested on behalf of a Savings Bank Investment Depreciation Fund.

16. During the year the tax on land under the Live Stock Ordinance 1901, and the export duties on the sheep industry, under the Tariff Ordinance 1900, were repealed, (the latter as from the first of January 1919), and replaced by a graduated land tax, from one-farthing to one penny per acre, and an export tax on seal oil of three-pence half-penny per barrel of forty gallons, as from the first of January 1919.

17. No specie was imported by Government during the year. To meet local requirements the currency note issue was increased from £12,000, to £15000. The arrangement[†] made in 1901, is still in existence, whereby one thousand pounds is paid to the Crown Agents London at the end of each month, and a simultaneous repayment is made from the Colonial Treasury.

RULES

Public Library and Museum.

LIBRARY.

1. The Library shall be open, admission free, :—

On Sunday, Wednesday, and Saturday from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

On Monday from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

On Tuesday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

On Friday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

2. (1) Any resident may, on application, and on prepayment to the Librarian of a yearly subscription of five shillings (5/-), or half-yearly of three shillings (3/-), borrow and take out one book (two volumes) at a time,

(2) If sufficient numbers of copies are subscribed for, any resident paying a yearly subscription of two pounds (£2), or half-yearly of one pound five shillings (£1 : 5 : 0) may take out one monthly magazine, and one weekly or daily newspaper in addition to three books (two volumes each) at a time.

3. Any resident not being a subscriber as above may borrow and take out one book at a time on prepayment to the Librarian of two pence (2d.) per week.

4. No book shall be retained for a longer period than two weeks. If at the end of that period and on return of the book to the Library, the book has not been asked for by another subscriber, the book may be taken out again by the same subscriber for a further period of one week.

5. No monthly magazine taken out shall be retained for a longer period than one week.

6. Daily or weekly newspapers shall only be taken out at the last hour of closing of the Library for the day, and shall be returned at the first hour fixed for the next opening of the Library.

7. No book, monthly magazine or newspaper shall be lent or passed on by one person to another.

8. Any person who shall fail to return any book, monthly magazine or newspaper to the Librarian, as required by these Rules, shall pay a fine of 2d. a day for each day every book, monthly magazine or newspaper is not so returned.

9. No talking to the annoyance of any person shall be allowed in the Library. Any person on being cautioned by the Librarian and persisting in the same shall be guilty of an offence under these Rules.

Children's Section of Library.

10. Any child under the age of 15 years, on prepayment of an annual subscription of one shilling (1/-) and on application to the Librarian, may borrow and take out one book or one magazine at a time from the Children's Section. Any book so taken out shall be returned to the Librarian within one week.

MUSEUM.

11. The Museum shall be open, admission free, :—

On Tuesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

On Saturday and Sunday from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

When the Mail Steamer is in harbour the Museum shall also be open from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Any person desirous of visiting the Museum at any other time of the day may apply to the Librarian and Museum Attendant for special permission.

GENERAL.

12. The loss or damage of any book, monthly magazine, newspaper, or of any article either in the Library or the Museum, shall be reported and payment to the value thereof made to the Librarian and Museum Attendant.

13. No smoking shall be allowed either in the Library or Museum.

14. Any person infringing any of these rules shall be liable to a penalty of twenty shillings.







And whereas I consider it no longer necessary that the Falkland Islands Volunteer Corps and Force should continue called out for active service:

Now therefore I do hereby order that the active service of every Officer and Volunteer belonging to the Falkland Islands Volunteer Corps, required by the Governor by Proclamation of the 5th day of August, 1914, as well as by the subsequent Proclamation issued on the 10th day of August, 1914, shall end, and that the Force shall revert to normal peace conditions as from this date.



Minute by the Governor introducing the Estimates for
the Year, 1920.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

I have the honour to lay before you the draft Estimates of the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies for the service of the year 1920.

The revenue of the Colony is estimated at:—

For the Falkland Islands - - - -	£26,897	
(Including £5,800 interest from Crown Lands Fund, and £800 interest on Surplus Balances), and		
for the Dependencies - - - -	£32,576	
		£59,473

The expenditure is estimated at:—

For the Falkland Islands - - - -	£31,159	
For the Dependencies - - - -	£28,159	
		£59,318

leaving a surplus balance of £ 155

The Estimates have for the most part been framed on the lines of the Estimates for the present year. In a few instances the salaries of certain of the lower paid Government servants have been slightly increased.

Provision has been made:—

Under Head VII Legal, for the post of a Deputy Magistrate at South Georgia, the increased importance of the Dependency rendering the appointment of a second resident Magistrate desirable;

And under Head IX Medical, for the temporary services of an additional Medical Officer for East Falkland, to ensure, if possible, a medical practitioner being available at all times in the Town of Stanley. Under this head of service it may be found necessary to make further increases at a later date.

Under Public Works Extraordinary provision has been made for the installation of a Wireless Telegraph Station at South Georgia, at an estimated cost of £6,000. This provision is one that will no doubt commend itself to the Council, as it is considered wireless communication with this isolated and remote Dependency, will greatly facilitate matters connected with the Whaling Industry of the Dependency.

Now that the great War for justice and freedom is over, is won, and the great and general blessings of peace have been restored to our King and Country, and to our Allies, it may not be out of place to briefly consider how far this distant Colony has been affected by the War.

As Honourable Members are aware the capture of the Falkland Islands was, amongst others, a pronounced aim of the enemy, and the Colony was one of the first of His Majesty's vast possessions to be threatened by attack and occupation. But the enemy reckoned himself to be alone in these waters, when on the 8th December, 1914, his ships approached within close range of Port Stanley, prepared to attack.

In readiness stood the British Navy, the strength and shield of our Empire's Defence, and by glorious victory, the German Squadron destroyed, the "Good Hope" and "Monmouth" vindicated, the Colony and the people of the Falkland Islands were saved from harm and capture.

From that time to the termination of hostilities in November last, can it be said that the four years of war have materially changed the conditions of life in the Falkland Islands? - I think not. The people of the Falkland Islands have enjoyed immunity from privations due to the war. They have suffered naught in their everyday pursuits. Though prices have risen throughout the world as a sequel to the disturbed conditions of peace and trade, commodities of life, local and imported, have been plentiful with us and essential supplies, available in price to all, uncontrolled by any measure of rationing or otherwise.

At the time the Estimates for the year 1915 were passed by the Council in November, 1914, it was not possible to forecast conditions, and in providing the ways and means for the year, including the cost for a local measure of self defence, it was anticipated that the expenditure would exceed the revenue by a sum of £15,950. The decisive victory of the 8th December, 1914, and the measures taken by the Admiralty for the protection of the Colony, however, lightened the situation. The public revenue continued as in normal years and largely exceeded the estimate, and it became possible to curtail the special expenditure provided for. The result was that in place of a deficit, the year closed with a surplus credit balance of £1,346. A near margin but one on the right side.

In each of the three succeeding years, owing to the prosperous condition of the whaling industry, and to the suspension during the War of all new public works extraordinary, the surplus balances of the Colony were largely added to. In 1916 the year ended with a balance of £14,161; followed in 1917 by a sum of £7,104; and in the year 1918 by a sum of £11,530, thus increasing the surplus balances of the Colony from £2,961 at the end of 1914, to £37,104 at the end of 1918.

The revenue derived from the Falkland Islands has, I regret to say, not been a contributing factor. To the Dependencies must be given the full credit of the satisfactory state of the financial balances of the Colony.

The annual revenue derived from the Falkland Islands falls short of the annual expenditure of the Islands, as is well known to Honourable Members.

During the period of the War the prices obtained in the British Market have ruled high throughout for the staple produce of the Colony - the sheep industry of the Falkland Islands, and the whaling industry of the Dependencies -

The total declared value of the exports for the year 1918 of the sheep industry was £340,600 (4,809,500 lbs of wool valued at £294,310) and, of the whaling industry £1,711,600 (298,019 barrels of oil valued at £1,703,320).

At the meeting of the Legislative Council held on the 29th October, last year, I informed the Council that at the conclusion of the War the matter of the further development of the Dependencies, and the preservation of the whaling industry would be proceeded with. At the same time I stated that increased expenditure for this service would of necessity have to be incurred, and that when the time arrived the Dependencies would no doubt be called upon to meet it.

It has now been decided to create a Dependencies Research and Development Fund, out of which expenses incurred in the special work of research and development can be met. To finance this Fund it is proposed to increase, from the 1st October, 1919, the export duty on Whale Oil and Seal Oil from 3½d. a barrel to 1/6 a barrel, and to pay into the Fund the increased duty at the rate of 1/2½ on every barrel of oil exported. A draft Ordinance will be submitted for your consideration to give effect to this proposal. A new heading has been opened in the Estimates under Head XIV for the Fund, with an estimated payment into it of £20,500 for next year.

I regret I am not in a position to inform the Council to-day of any arrangement having been come to for the resumption of a regular steamer service with the Colony. So far as I am aware, no such arrangement has been made, but the matter is engaging attention. In the meantime provision has been made on the Estimates for next year for the payment of a mail subsidy at the former rate: out of this provision the cost at present being incurred for the sea carriage of our mails will be met.

Form of orders.

(2) Every order made by the Magistrate under this section shall as near as possible be in the form applicable, contained in the Schedule hereto.

Arrest and detention of Aliens pending deportation.

4. In any case where the Stipendiary Magistrate has made an order under this Ordinance for the deportation of an alien and no opportunity is available at the time of making the order to send the alien out of the Dependency, the Magistrate may if he deem it expedient cause such alien to be arrested and committed to prison until such time as an opportunity shall offer, when the alien in respect of whom such order is made shall be deported accordingly.

Master of vessel to receive Alien on board.

5. In any case where the Stipendiary Magistrate has made an order under this Ordinance for the deportation of an alien he may by order under his hand, and on payment of reasonable expenses as may be ordered by the Magistrate, require the Master of any vessel to receive the said alien on board his vessel and to convey him out of the Dependency.

Penalties.

6. If any person in respect of whom any order is made under this Ordinance fails to comply with any of the provisions of the order he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance and shall on summary conviction be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds (£50).

Sheep.

2. The general health of the sheep in these islands is very good, and it is satisfactory to be able to state that the number of Stations infected with Lice is considerably less.

Statistics.

3. The Returns for 1919 shew the number of sheep in this colony to be 669,996, a decrease of 29,372 on the returns of 1918. There is a marked decrease on the whole in the Returns as compared with the figures of last year, the greatest decrease being in the total number of sheep, this was due no doubt to the exceptionally bad winter followed by a bad spring. There is also a decrease shewn in the number of sheep canned this Season. The price of wool still continues good, comparing closely with prices obtained last season. Average price 1/4d. per lb. The clip this season was much lighter than last season.

Lambing.

4. The lambing this season was considerably below the average, as will be seen from the Comparative Table, which shews a big decrease, this was no doubt due to weather conditions.

Canning.

5. The Falkland Island Co's. factory at Goose Green, East Falkland, was the only one working during the season. The number of sheep canned for Export was 43,224 shewing a decrease of 18,957 on the numbers canned last season. The average price paid per sheep was 10/10³/₄ shewing a slight increase in the price paid last season. The number of sheep boiled down this season shews a big increase in the figures of last season. Whereas 1,000 only were dealt with in this manner last year, 9,413 were boiled down this year, 5,910 of these being boiled down at San Carlos North.

Cattle.

6. The number of cattle at present in the Colony is 6,794, shewing a decrease of 469 on last year's returns. The general health of the cattle is very good.

Horses.

7. The Returns of the present season shew the number of horses in the Colony to be 2,611 or an increase of 55 on the returns of the previous season. This slight increase was due no doubt to the imported animals. The health of the horses on the whole is satisfactory.

Imports.

8. During the season the imports have been
- 27 Romney Marsh Rams from the United Kingdom.
 - 2 Pigs from South Georgia.
 - 6 Pigs from Argentina (By special permission of His Excellency the Governor).
 - 75 Horses from Argentina.

Exports.

9. During the Season 965 sheep and 1 horse were exported to Argentina. In addition to the Live Stock exported there was the usual considerable quantity of Canned Meat, Wool, Hides, and Tallow to the United Kingdom.

Cultivation.

10. The progress made in the cultivation of Hay is shewn in the increase of quantity grown and stored this season.

Season.

13. The period of Season for Stock in the Falkland Islands extends from October to March.







Message from His Majesty the King.

TO ALL MY PEOPLE

Tuesday next November 11th is the first anniversary of the Armistice which stayed the world-wide carnage of the four preceding years and marked the victory of right and freedom. I believe that my people in every part of the Empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it.

To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feeling it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the Armistice came into force, the eleventh hour of the eleventh

day of the eleventh month, there may be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities. During that time except in the rare cases where this might be impracticable all work, all sound, and all locomotion should cease so that in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead.

No elaborate organization appears to be necessary. At a given signal which could be easily arranged to suit the circumstances of each locality I believe that we shall all gladly interrupt our business and pleasure whatever it may be and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

Two patients were admitted from ships. (Both Whaling vessels).

The K. E. M. Hospital is still not sufficiently used by Gynecological patients resident in Stanley. More general operations might have been done had it not been for the unavoidable inadequate Medical and Nursing staff in Stanley. While only one qualified Nurse and one Medical man are available it is quite impossible to perform serious operations other than emergency cases and as a result many patients were advised and actually went to South America for Surgical Treatment. Twenty four Patients (21 Gynecological) were treated by the Nurse Matron in their own homes.

Government School.

The children were Medically examined at intervals. The difficulty of the treatment of children requiring minor operations was similar to the previous year pending the arrival of a second Medical Officer. The condition of the children's teeth was still very unsatisfactory owing to the children not attending the Colonial Dentists Surgery regularly.

Quarantine.

49 vessels were given pratique. No infectious cases were seen; two cases were admitted to the K. E. M. Hospital, one a head injury from Monte Video, one a case from South Georgia.

Public Health.

Exanthems 6 cases of chicken pox. Phthisis 6 cases. Of the latter 5 cases were either from the camp or outlying Islands and consequently treatment was commenced too late to be of much service.

The Board of Health reported fully on the condition of the Roads and Drains in Stanley; unfortunately owing to the difficulty of materials and labour little could be done at the time to carry out its suggestions.

During the latter months of the year there was a mild epidemic of Influenza. (During this time "Spanish Influenza" was raging in Europe and South America). No deaths occurred from it on the East Falkland but two cases, I understand, died on the West Falkland from Broncho-pneumonia following Influenza.

In Stanley two forms appeared; one in which the intestines were affected; this was chiefly in younger patients, the second in older people in which the lungs and bronchial tubes were chiefly affected.

The Camp.

There was very little sickness in the Camp, the majority of cases being either accidents or Midwifery cases. Some of the stations were not visited at all and some only in passing.
