All derivations of coal tar generally known as intermediate products capable of being used or adapted for use as dyestuffs, or of being modified or further manufactured into dyestuffs,

All direct cotton colours, all union colours, all acid colours, all chrome and mordant colours, all alizarine colours, all basic colours, all sulphide colours, all vat colours (including synthetic indigo), all oil, spirit, and wax colours, all lake colours, and any other synthetic colours, dyes, stains, colour acids, colour lakes, leuco acids, leuco bases, whether in paste, powder, solution or any other form,

Such goods not being the produce or manufacture of any part of the British Empire.

Given under my hand and the Public Seal of the Colony at Government House, Stanley, this nineteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty.

Report on Examination of the Government School, Stanley, December, 1919,

Stanley,
Falkland Islands,
17th December, 1919.

Sir,

As in 1916, 1917 and 1918, I have again by the Administrator's instructions, conducted the Annual examination of the Government School, and now have the honour to submit my Report for His Excellency's information.

2. I attended at the Government School on Thursday, Friday and Monday, the 11th, 12th and 15th December, and conducted the examination on lines similar to those followed in the two previous years, that is to say, by oral questioning, inspection and examination of work done previously, rather than by written tests or set papers, the utility of which, after four years experience in examining the Government School I am convinced is practically non-existent.

3. As last year I have refrained from awarding any individual or competitive mark to each child and shall confine my report to remarks on the various subjects taught.

General Remarks on the various Subjects.

ARITHMETIC.

4. In 1916 I commented somewhat unfavourably on this subject but in the two succeeding years noted a general improvement. This year I have again to remark on the very notable improvement that has been made in this subject, the advance being very much more observable than those noted in 1917 and 1918. This improvement is not so much an advance in the capacity of the best two or three children in each class as a steady improvement in the average ability and reliability of the whole classes. The proportion of children in each class which approximated to 75% of marks in any series of tests set was considerably higher than in previous years, while the presence of errors due to mere carelessness was far less noticeable.

DICTATION AND SPELLING.

This subject is up to the standard of last year.

ENGLISH COMPOSITION.

There is no appreciable improvement or deterioration in English Composition, a subject that is perhaps the most difficult and certainly one of the most important in the curriculum. A good standard is maintained throughout the School, but several of the faults which were apparent last year are still to be found, *e.g.*, a lack of coherence and unity in the treatment of the subjects, very occasional lapses into gross errors such as "I seen" for "I saw," and an unnecessary predilection for the short disconnected sentence that involves a repudiation of the utility of the relative clause. For English Composition purposes the word "nice" should be wiped out of the School vocabulary.

HYGIENE.

The children have a good knowledge of the principles of health, sanitation, cleanliness and the more simple functions of the human body.

SINGING.

The reading from the blackboard of unseen exercises in staff and tonic solfa notations was particularly well done by the top division. This division also sang some songs of considerable difficulty with confidence and success. The children take an interest in their singing and it was seldom that I was able to detect any "passengers" while a song was in progress. The only noticeable fault of any importance is the somewhat natural tendency to sing too loud with its consequent unavoidable loss of tone. Breathing exercises are always done at the beginning of a singing lesson and it is difficult to overestimate their value.

HISTORY AND GEOGRAPHY.

These subjects were treated well and the children appeared to be interested in them. It was seldom that the majority of any class was not able and anxious to answer any question asked.

The "Piers Plowman" History Readers in use at the School are admirably suited for the teaching of the manners and customs of our forefathers and with their assistance History in the Government School is rendered a more living and interesting subject than it often appears to be among children of school age.

Similarly, in the lower forms particularly, Geography is taught not so much with the idea of filling the mind with a knowledge of boundaries, physical features, imports and exports &c., as with the intention of interesting the children in the appearance, mode of life and peculiarities of the races inhabiting different parts of the world, thus forming an interesting and attractive foundation on which the equally useful but less attractive superstructure of hard facts and figures can be erected later, and this intention meets with the success it deserves.

READING.

I was last year compelled to make a somewhat unfavourable report on the Reading of the School. This year I am glad to be able to say that I found a marked improvement in this subject. Far more care was taken by the children to give full (but not too full) effect to the values of punctuation marks, to lay stress where stress was due, and to read not only with understanding but also with appreciation. The attitude, or "stance," adopted for reading, on which I commented unfavourably last year, was very much improved throughout. I was particularly pleased with the reading of Standard II.

WRITING.

The writing throughout showed improvement.

DRAWING (*Boys only*).

Scale Drawing with graduated rulers was done with care, neatness and accuracy, the boys making their own measurements from objects in or about the School premises and reducing them to the required scale. Several good freehand drawings from objects or copies were shewn up.

NEEDLEWORK (*Girls only*).

I inspected the work on which the girls had been engaged during the year. The amount of work got through shewed much industry and all the work appeared to be done with skill and neatness. I have nothing to add to my previous reports on this subject. I believe the standard of plain sewing at the Government School to be a very high one.

POETRY.

I was less favourably impressed by the recitation of selected poems this year. There was a lack of vigour and life. The pieces had however been well studied and the children knew something of the subject matter of the poems.

PHYSICAL EXERCISES.

The physical exercises were done with more briskness and precision than were apparent in previous years and were a considerable improvement on last year's performance.

INFANTS.

The high standard of the Infants' divisions of the School, on which I had occasion to comment in previous reports, was in all directions well maintained.

General Remarks.

5. In making my first report on the Examination of the School in 1916 under the heading "General Remarks" I expressed the following opinions:—

"The results of the examination appear to me to be without question good and full of promise for the future. The children are with few exceptions interested in their lessons and submitted to examination with enjoyment I believe that the work the Headmaster and Mistress are doing at the school to be of the greatest benefit to the future generation of Falkland Islanders, though much time must elapse before such work can come to full fruition. The discipline and order maintained at the School are, as far as an examiner can judge, excellent."

Having conducted three annual examinations since writing the above, I see no reason for revising any of the opinions expressed at that time, and I have no hesitation in reporting that in my opinion the standard of knowledge, intelligence, keenness and order is appreciably higher at the present time than on any previous occasion when it has been my privilege to conduct the Annual Examination of the Government School.

6. I desire to express my appreciation of the cordial co-operation of the Headmaster and Staff which greatly facilitated my work as Examiner.

7. In concluding I would venture to suggest for the Administrator's consideration that this Report be printed as an Appendix to the Education Report for the year 1919, for the benefit of parents and others interested in the Government School.

Report on Currency Note Accounts for the year 1919.

The Note Guarantee Fund.

1. Under the provisions of the Principal Order 1899, the coin received by the Commissioners in exchange for the notes issued, (put into circulation) has to form the Note Guarantee Fund.

2. On the 1st January this fund amounted to £15,000. During the year the "Note Issue" was increased to £18,000, and the £3,000 received in coin by the Commissioners was allocated as follows:—

3. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, the Note Guarantee Fund has to be divided into two parts (a) The Coin Portion, and (b) The Investment Portion. Under the provisions of the Temporary Amendment Order, such part of the coin portion as the Secretary of State may direct, may be kept in the United Kingdom, either in coin or invested for twelve months after the termination of the War.

(a) **THE COIN PORTION.** During the year the coin portion was increased from £7,500 to £9,000, and is divided between the Commissioners and the Crown Agents, viz:— £3,500 in the Commissioners safe in the Colony, and £5,500 with the Crown Agents, deposited with the London County and Westminster and Parrs' Bank.

(b) **THE INVESTMENT PORTION.** During the year the Investment portion was increased by a sum of £1,500, which was expended in the purchase of approved Securities, and the total sum so expended on behalf of the Fund amounts to £9,000.

The Note Depreciation Fund.

4. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, a sum equal to one per cent of the cost price of the Securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund has to be set aside annually to form a Depreciation Fund, until such time as the latter is not less than ten per cent of the cost price of the Securities forming the said Investment Portion. A separate account has to be kept of the Depreciation Fund to form part of the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.

5. During the year there was no change in the Securities forming the Note Depreciation Fund, which amounted to £890 : 15 : 7, on the 31st December 1919.

Government School.

The physique of the children is poor, the number of thin and anæmic children being very noticeable. They have been examined, with a view to ascertaining, those among them who would benefit by tonsillotomy and to devote one morning weekly at the hospital for such work.

Public Health.

Hitherto outstanding features are:—

- (1) Rarity of malignant diseases.
- (2) Rarity of venereal disease.
- (3) Rarity of all forms of tuberculosis.
- (4) Freedom from infectious diseases.
- (5) Prevalence of alimentary disorders.

During the last quarter, the dentist was absent from the Colony and consequently 48 persons applied to me for extractions. Never before have I seen a community where caries and oral sepsis is so widespread. Oral sepsis and the usage of tank water are the principal causative factors of the numerous gastro-intestinal disorders. The native Falklanders are prone to periodical attacks of deafness and tinnitus aurium, due to recurrent inflammation of middle ear (otitis intermitteas). What appears to be an epidemic of such aural attacks, is accounted for by the season of the year, presence of defective drains and sewerage. A great number of children suffer from chronic tonsillitis and during the first year from laryngismus. I attribute the latter to a nervous erethism begotten by close confinement to ill-ventilated rooms. The question of intermarriage is becoming more serious every year and is slowly but surely imparting the stamp of degeneration on the race.

Camp.

On my calls at different stations, I was struck by the number of children, who very rarely visited Stanley and also how sadly their education had been neglected. The fatal effects of the disuse of the mental faculties, are strikingly observable in some of these children, who are more or less solitarily confined for long periods. Loss of power and health of mind, from imperfect or partial exercise of the faculties, is only natural. In general their education is giving them only a few accomplishments. Education, if properly conducted would go far to prevent these evils.

Sanitation and Water supply.

There is no such thing as systematic drainage. The only method of discharge is by open gutters, which on warm days are very offensive. There are hardly any underground channels or sewers. The earth closet system is adopted, throughout the colony. The excreta are received into an iron pail, underneath a seat, which pail can be removed from outside, and into which a small quantity of dried peat coom is placed, either daily or as often as the closet is used. Peat coom has a great power in retaining the nitrogenous constituents of urine and will quite fix the ammonia. The pail is removed weekly, but the sewage is not utilised in any way. No danger can possibly arise, from this system, if strictly followed. The deodorising effects of this coom, are quite remarkable, a slight covering effectually prevents effluvia. Yet if we contemplate the influence, of winds, in the economy of human life, the township of Stanley, will find them highly beneficial, as they contribute greatly to preserving the health of the people, by the dissipation of the noxious exhalations arising from sluggish drains and heaps of putrefying matter. Most of the houses are ill-ventilated and are not fitted up with accommodation for hot and cold bathing. I venture to suggest the erection of a public bathing establishment. The improvement in health and cheerfulness of the parties benefited would more than compensate for the necessary outlay.

Departmental Notes.

To meet the requirements of the people, the installation of an X ray apparatus in the hospital, is an immediate necessity. Miss Layton, the Government Nurse and myself arrived in the colony 15th September, 1919.

VOLUNTEER FORCE.

The Administrator directs the publication, for general information, of Army Order, No. 376 of 1918 regarding the retention of rank by officers on

the termination of their Commissions or on ceasing to be employed.

The terms of this Order will apply to officers of the Falkland Islands Volunteer Corps, which Corps was mobilised by a Proclamation dated the fifth day of August, 1914, under "The Volunteer Ordinance, 1892." and disbanded by Proclamation dated 1st August, 1919.

The grant of permission to retain honorary rank will not have effect outside of the Colony.

Army Order No. 376 of 1918.

Retention of Rank by Officers on the termination of their Commissions, or on ceasing to be employed.

1. An officer whose service has been satisfactory throughout, shall, on the termination of his commission or on relegation to unemployment, be granted "permission to retain the rank" he has held under the following conditions.

2. This retention of rank will take the place of the honorary rank granted hitherto and the decision is retrospective to the beginning of the present war.

(A) SUBSTANTIVE RANK HELD WHILE SERVING.

3. An officer will be given permission to retain rank equivalent to the substantive rank he held or holds at the time of the termination of his commission or on relegation to unemployment, irrespective of how long he may have held that substantive rank.

4. Temporary rank in the New Army for officers holding temporary commissions, is the equivalent of substantive rank for the purpose of granting retention of rank.

(B) ACTING RANK OR, IN CERTAIN CASES, TEMPORARY RANK HELD WHILE SERVING IN A SPECIAL CAPACITY.

5. An Officer with a permanent or temporary commission who holds acting rank or temporary rank while holding an appointment, and whose service on the active list is terminated, as the immediate result of sickness or wounds caused "in and by" the service, will be granted permission to retain the rank he held at the time of the termination of his commission or relegation to unemployment, or in the case of a Lieutenant-Colonel, reverted under paragraph 3 of A.C.I. 1251 of 1917, the rank he held at the date he incurred the disability which resulted in the termination of his commission or his relegation to unemployment, or he will be dealt with under the conditions of paragraph 6 below if more favourable.

6. In all other cases an officer will be given permission to retain, or be granted rank equivalent to the highest acting or temporary rank he may have held, provided that he has held that rank for an aggregate minimum period of six months.

Report on the Government Savings Bank for the year 1918-19.

Summary of year's transactions.

1. During the year there were 79 new accounts opened and 94 closed, leaving a total of 781 depositors amongst which the balance in hand (£116,673 - 2 - 4) was distributed. The average for each account was £149 - 7 - 9 or £51 - 16 - 2. per head of the population of the Falkland Islands.

2. The sums deposited during the year amounted to a total of £33,435 - 9 - 9, as against £31,419 - 19 - 8, in the year 1918-19.

3. Large sums were withdrawn by Depositors during the year for Investment in the Imperial War Loan, causing the Withdrawals during the year to amount to the large sum of £42,444 - 10 - 10. as against £18,633 - 15 - 11, in the previous year.

In 1919, a sum of £1,600 provided for on the Estimates for that year was contributed from General Revenue and invested to form a Savings Bank Depreciation Fund in connection with the Securities held by the Savings Bank. The dividends accruing from this investment have been added to this Depreciation Fund which now amounts to a total of £1625 - 8 - 4, and a further contribution from General Revenue has been provided on the Estimates for 1920. in respect of the profit on the transactions as shewn in the Profit and Loss Account.

9. Under the provisions of the Savings Bank Ordinance, the income derived from the Securities forms a Fund for defraying the Interest due to Depositors, and all expenses incurred in the execution of the Ordinance.

10. Formerly the Profit on the year's transactions was credited to the ordinary Revenue of the Colony, but commencing with the year under Report the income derived from Savings Bank Investments is required to be applied as follows:—

- (a) For defraying the Interest due to Depositors,
- (b) in paying the expenses of and incidental to the management of the Savings Bank, and the balance,
- (c) to be expended in the purchase of approved Securities for the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund which was formed during the year.

11. The interest payable to depositors under the Ordinance is at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ per annum, on every complete pound, that is to say, sixpence on every pound left on deposit for a complete year. It should be remembered that interest is paid only on the pound (not the odd shillings): it is reckoned from the first day of January, April, July or October following the day of deposit, and ceases as from the last day of March, June, September, or December, preceding the day of withdrawal.

12. The Ordinance and the Regulations made thereunder provide for the payment of withdrawals of over £50 by Bill of Exchange. Minors over 7 years of age are authorised to sign as if of full age. Each depositor is provided with a Pass Book in which he is required to sign his name and state his address, in the place provided. Pass Books have to be produced when a deposit is made or money withdrawn, and such books have to be forwarded to the Treasurer for audit purposes, on or before the 30th September in each year.

An Ordinance to appropriate certain further sums of money for the use of the Public Service of the Colony for the year ended on the 31st day of December, 1919.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the 1919 Supplementary Appropriation Ordinance, 1920.

An Ordinance to provide for an increase in the rate of Pensions granted to Public Officers,

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title?

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Pensions Increase Ordinance, 1919. and shall be read and construed with the Pensions Ordinance, 1906, as amended by the Pensions Amendment Ordinance, 1914.

2. The pay and emoluments on which public officers have been pensioned or granted retiring gratuities or on which they would be normally pensioned or granted retiring gratuities, may from such date as the Governor in Council shall determine be increased by 25 per cent. if such pay and emoluments do not exceed £300 per annum, and by 20 per cent, if such pay and emoluments exceed £300 per annum, subject to the following provisions:—

(a) That the minimum additional amount on which the supplementary pension or gratuity is calculated shall be £26 per annum.

(b) That no officer with salary and emoluments exceeding £300 per annum shall receive a smaller supplementary pension or gratuity than he would have received if his salary and emoluments had been exactly £300 per annum.

3. Nothing in this Ordinance shall entitle a person whose salary is increased subsequent to the date on which the Ordinance comes into force to a pension or a retiring gratuity in excess of that which he would have received if his salary had not been increased or if this Ordinance had not been brought into force whichever is greater.

Sea Fisheries.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Sea Fisheries Ordinance, 1920." Short Title.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person either

(a) to catch for the purpose of export any fish in the territorial waters of the Colony, or

Restrictions on catching and exporting fish.

(b) to export from the Colony any fish wherever the said fish may have been caught which has been landed, transhipped, cured preserved or manufactured within the Colony or its territorial waters, or to export any oil or other product manufactured from such fish unless he be duly licensed under this Ordinance.

3. The Collector of Customs or his Deputy, may on the application of any person or persons approved by the Governor, grant licences to such person or persons to catch fish for the purposes of export or to export fish or fish products from the Colony, for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be therein specified, and subject at all times to such regulations as may be in force, and to the payment of such licence fees and royalties as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

Granting of Licences.

4. (1) The Governor in Council may make and from time to time vary regulations:—

Powers of Governor-in-Council to make or vary Regulations.

(a) For fixing the terms and conditions on which licences to catch fish for the purposes of export or to export fish or fish products may be granted;

(b) For fixing the close season for any kind of fish, and for prohibiting the taking of fish during any such season;

(c) For defining the limits within which any holder of a licence shall be allowed to take fish;

- (d) For curing and preparing the fish caught and for the utilization of any refuse or part of the fish;
- (e) For disposing by sale or otherwise of any fish and any fishing gear forfeited under the provisions of this Ordinance;
- (f) To prohibit the use of specified kinds of fishing gear or the prosecution of a fishing method considered to be undesirable in the interests of the fishery;
- (g) For fixing the amount of the fees to be paid for a licence to catch fish, and of the royalties payable on the fish caught, and,
- (h) Generally for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and the intent and object thereof.

Regulations to be published in Gazette.

(2) All Regulations made in pursuance of this Ordinance shall be published in the Gazette.

Penalty.

5. Any person who shall on summary conviction be found guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder, shall for each offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds (£100) and to the forfeiture of the fish caught together with the fishing gear, and on a repetition of an offence under this Ordinance to the immediate cancellation of the licence held by him,

7. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

THE WHALE FISHERY ORDINANCE, 1908.

Regulations.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by "The Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908," His Excellency, the Administrator, by and with the advice of the Executive Council is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

1. These Regulations shall apply to the Colonial Waters of South Georgia, and shall take effect as and from the 1st day of June, 1920.
2. It shall not be lawful for any person to kill, take, or hunt, or attempt to kill or take any whale in the Colonial Waters of South Georgia between the 1st day of June and the 15th day of September, both days inclusive, in any year, which period is hereby declared to be a close season for the purpose of taking whales, and all licences issued for this purpose shall, in future, be issued subject to the provisions of this Regulation.
3. Any licensee who commits, or allows or negligently suffers a person employed by him to commit a breach of these Regulations shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds for each offence, and the licensee shall at the same time become liable to the immediate forfeiture of his licence. If any person employed by a licensee commits a breach of these Regulations, he shall be liable to the same penalty.
4. These Regulations shall not apply to the Colonial Waters of the South Shetlands and Graham's Land; the South Orkneys and the Sandwich Islands.

REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by the "Quarantine Ordinance No. 7 of 1908" His Excellency the Administrator, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following Regulations:—

1. Owing to the outbreak of plague in Liverpool, all importers of cargo are instructed to use the utmost precautions with a view to preventing the importation of the disease into the Colony.
2. Clothing, textile fabrics, skins and other similar articles, coming from a plague infected district shall be destroyed or thoroughly disinfected as may be ordered by the Colonial Surgeon.
3. Lighters and all floating craft, going alongside cargo ships must be rendered rat-proof as far as possible.
4. Persons engaged on the duties of unloading shall conform strictly to such instructions as may be issued by the Colonial Surgeon for the prevention of the introduction of plague into the Colony.
5. All live stock landed from ships coming from a plague infected district shall be placed in quarantine for the necessary period.

An Ordinance to provide for an increase in the rate of Pensions granted to Public Officers,

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Pensions Increase Ordinance, 1919, and shall be read and construed with the Pensions Ordinance, 1906, as amended by the Pensions Amendment Ordinance, 1914.

Short Title

2. The pay and emoluments on which public officers have been pensioned or granted retiring gratuities or on which they would be normally pensioned or granted retiring gratuities, may from such date as the Governor in Council shall determine be increased by 25 per cent. if such pay and emoluments do not exceed £300 per annum, and by 20 per cent. if such pay and emoluments exceed £300 per annum, subject to the following provisions:—

Increase of Pensions, date to be determined by Governor-in-Council.

(a) That the minimum additional amount on which the supplementary pension or gratuity is calculated shall be £26 per annum.

(b) That no officer with salary and emoluments exceeding £300 per annum shall receive a smaller supplementary pension or gratuity than he would have received if his salary and emoluments had been exactly £300 per annum.

3. Nothing in this Ordinance shall entitle a person whose salary is increased subsequent to the date on which the Ordinance comes into force to a pension or a retiring gratuity in excess of that which he would have received if his salary had not been increased or if this Ordinance had not been brought into force whichever is greater.

Pensions on Salaries increased after the coming into force of this Ordinance.

An Ordinance to regulate the Sea Fisheries.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Sea Fisheries Ordinance, 1920." Short Title.

2. It shall not be lawful for any person either

(a) to catch for the purpose of export any fish in the territorial waters of the Colony, or

Restrictions on catching and exporting fish.

(b) to export from the Colony any fish wherever the said fish may have been caught which has been landed, transhipped, cured preserved or manufactured within the Colony or its territorial waters, or to export any oil or other product manufactured from such fish unless he be duly licensed under this Ordinance.

3. The Collector of Customs or his Deputy, may on the application of any person or persons approved by the Governor, grant licences to such person or persons to catch fish for the purposes of export or to export fish or fish products from the Colony, for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be therein specified, and subject at all times to such regulations as may be in force, and to the payment of such licence fees and royalties as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

Granting of Licences.

4. (1) The Governor in Council may make and from time to time vary regulations:—

Powers of Governor-in-Council to make or vary Regulations.

(a) For fixing the terms and conditions on which licences to catch fish for the purposes of export or to export fish or fish products may be granted;

(b) For fixing the close season for any kind of fish, and for prohibiting the taking of fish during any such season;

(c) For defining the limits within which any holder of a licence shall be allowed to take fish;

- (d) For curing and preparing the fish caught and for the utilization of any refuse or part of the fish;
- (e) For disposing by sale or otherwise of any fish and any fishing gear forfeited under the provisions of this Ordinance;
- (f) To prohibit the use of specified kinds of fishing gear or the prosecution of a fishing method considered to be undesirable in the interests of the fishery;
- (g) For fixing the amount of the fees to be paid for a licence to catch fish, and of the royalties payable on the fish caught, and,
- (h) Generally for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and the intent and object thereof.

Regulations to be published in Gazette.

(2) All Regulations made in pursuance of this Ordinance shall be published in the Gazette.

Penalty.

5. Any person who shall on summary conviction be found guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder, shall for each offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds (£100) and to the forfeiture of the fish caught together with the fishing gear, and on a repetition of an offence under this Ordinance to the immediate cancellation of the licence held by him,

Repeal.

6. The Sea Fisheries Ordinance 1918, Ordinance No. 9 of 1918, is hereby repealed.

7. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

of a Defence Force.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the
Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council thereof, as follows:—

Preliminary.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Defence Force Ordinance, 1920. Short Title

2. In this Ordinance and in any Regulations or Rules
made thereunder unless the context otherwise requires:—

“Appointments” includes accoutrements and equipments of every kind other than clothing. Interpretation.

“Commanding Officer” or “Commandant” means the Officer in command of the Defence Force.

“Company” means company forming part of the Force.

“Defence Force” or the “Force” means the Defence Force established by this Ordinance.

“Efficiency” or “efficient” means the standard of efficiency fixed by the Governor in Council by Regulations under this Ordinance.

“Member” means a member of the Force.

“Officer” means a person holding the Governor’s commission as an Officer in the Force.

"Regulations" and "Standing Orders" and "Rules" mean respectively regulations and standing orders and rules made under the provisions of this Ordinance.

"The Army Act" means the Army Act, 1881 (Act of the Imperial Parliament 44 and 45 Vic. C 58) and includes all Acts amending or substituted for the same and also all Articles of War in force thereunder.

Organization of Defence Force.

Formation of Force.

3. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor on behalf of His Majesty to accept the services of any male British subject desiring to join the Defence Force and offering his services to His Majesty.

(2) Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to render it obligatory upon the Governor to accept the services of any person.

Composition of Force.

4. The Defence Force shall consist of such Companies of Garrison Artillery, Mounted Infantry and Infantry as the Governor may from time to time determine, and each such Company or Companies shall be designated by such style as the Governor shall direct.

Disband Company, etc.,

5. The Governor may disband or discontinue the services of any Company or part thereof whenever it seems to him expedient to do so.

Entry on Muster Roll.

6. (1) The name of every person whose services have been accepted by the Governor as a member of the Defence Force shall be entered by the Commanding Officer on the Muster Roll of the Force which shall be kept by him.

Oath.

Schedule A.

(2) Every person whose services have been accepted as above shall upon admission to the Defence Force take the oath or make the declaration set forth in Schedule A to this Ordinance, to be administered by a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace or by a Commissioned Officer of the Force.

Officers.

7. (1) The Governor shall appoint the Officers of the Defence Force, with such rank as he may from time to time think necessary; such Officers shall have such rank and authority in the Defence Force as are held by Officers of corresponding rank in His Majesty's Regular Forces, and their duties shall be the same as are from time to time prescribed for Officers of the Army in the "King's Regulations" so far as the same can be made applicable.

Commandant.

(2) The Governor may appoint a Commanding Officer or Commandant of the Force, who shall have such local rank as the Governor may confer on him, and he shall be responsible to the Governor for the instruction, training, discipline and conduct of the Force.

Rank of Officers.

(3) Officers of the Force shall rank with Officers of His Majesty's Regular Forces but as junior of their respective ranks.

Validity of appointment.

(4) No appointment made under this section shall be deemed to be vacated by the death or retirement from office of the Governor who made the same.

8. The Commanding Officer may appoint such non-commissioned Officers of the Defence Force as he may deem expedient.

Non-Commissioned Officers.

9. (1) The members of the Force, other than Commissioned Officers, shall wear such uniforms as the Governor shall direct, and such uniforms shall be supplied to them upon their enrolment, and renewed from time to time, at the public expense, as may be decided by the Commandant.

Uniform.

(2) The Officers of the Force shall provide themselves at their own expense with such uniform as the Governor shall direct.

Officers uniforms.

10. (1) For every member of the Force a rifle and such appointments as the Governor may direct shall be issued to the Commandant on loan for the use of such member, and the Commandant shall be responsible to the Governor for such arms and appointments.

Arms etc.

(2) There may be issued for every member annually two hundred rounds of rifle ammunition and such further supply on such terms as to payment and otherwise as the Governor may direct.

Ammunition supply per member.

(3) Every member shall pay to the Commandant the cost of repairing or replacing any rifle or appointments damaged destroyed or lost by such member, and shall also pay for any ammunition expended by him to the full issue of which he was not entitled.

Cost of repairs etc. and extra ammunition.

(4) All arms, ammunition, musical instruments, clothing, appointments and necessities issued on loan to any member of the Defence Force shall be and remain the property of the Government and shall be produced, exhibited and delivered to the Officer commanding or to any person authorized by him to inspect or receive the same.

Arms and equipment etc. remain property of Government.

11. Subject as hereinafter mentioned any member may, except when on active service, and except when the sections relating to compulsory service under this Ordinance are in force, quit the Force on complying with the following conditions:—

Right of member to quit Force.

- i. giving the Commanding Officer three months notice in writing of his intention to quit the Force;
- ii. delivering up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) all arms clothing and appointments being public property or property of the Force issued to him; and
- iii. paying all money due or becoming due by him under the rules of the Force either before or at the time or by reason of his quitting the Force,

and thereupon he shall be struck out of the muster roll of the Force by the Commanding Officer.

The Governor shall have full power at all times to permit any member of the Defence Force to quit the Force upon such member complying with the conditions laid down in Sub Section (ii) and (iii) hereof.

The Reserve.

12. (1) There shall be a Reserve Section to the Force and any Member who has served in the Force, or in any of His Majesty's Regular or Auxiliary Forces, with efficiency for at least two years, may on application to the Commanding Officer be transferred to the Reserve.

Reserve.

Liable to be called out.

(2) Every member so transferred to the Reserve shall be deemed to be on the strength of the Force and shall be liable to be called upon to serve with the Force at such times as the Force may be called out for active service under section 15 of this Ordinance, should the Governor deem it expedient by proclamation to require the services of the Reserve or any part thereof.

May attend drills, etc., wear uniform.

(3) Every member in the Reserve may with the permission of the Commanding Officer attend all drills and inspections or parades of the Force, and may wear the uniform of the Force at any military functions and on all occasions on which uniform is worn.

Badge.

(4) Every member in the Reserve shall wear the letter R below the badge of the Force worn on the shoulder straps.

Resignation.

(5) Any member in the Reserve may, except when the Force is on active service, resign from the Force on giving two weeks notice in writing to the Commanding Officer and complying with conditions as in paragraphs ii and iii in the preceding section.

The Retired List.

Retired Members.

13. (1) There shall be a retired list to which any member who has been returned with efficiency for at least five years, who by reason of physical disability, not being the result of his own misconduct, certified to by a medical officer, is debarred from further service with the Force, or who has attained the age of forty-one years, may be posted by the Commanding Officer on his being satisfied thereof, and the Commanding Officer shall strike the name of the member off the Muster Roll accordingly.

Age for posting to, from Reserve.

(2) Any member of the Reserve who has attained the age of forty-one years may on application to the Commanding Officer be struck off the Muster Roll and be posted to the Retired List.

Wear uniform.

(3) Every member whose name is placed on the Retired List as herein provided may, at any military function and on all occasions on which uniform is worn, be permitted by the Commanding Officer to wear the uniform last worn by him whilst a member of the Force. He shall wear the letters R. L. below the badge of the Force worn on the shoulder straps.

Enjoy privileges of Club.

(4) He may enjoy the privileges of any Club established by or for the use of the Force in like manner as though he were still an active member of the Force.

Transitional.

Transitional.

14. All members of the Volunteer Corps or Force established by the Volunteer Ordinance, 1892, as amended by the Volunteer Active Service Ordinance, 1915, at the time of coming into force of this Ordinance, shall be deemed as from the date of their joining the Volunteer Corps or Force to be members of the Defence Force established under this Ordinance and to have complied with the requirements of section 6 of this Ordinance, and all Officers and non-commissioned officers of the said Volunteer Corps or Force established by the Volunteer Ordinance, 1892, shall be deemed to have been appointed to be of corresponding rank, and to have had their appointments confirmed in the Defence Force established by this Ordinance.

Active Service.

15. (1) The Governor may by proclamation call out the Defence Force, or any Company or part thereof, for active service, whenever it appears to him advisable to do so by reason of invasion, or war, or danger, or any of them, or by reason of any internal emergency threatening the security of life or property, to quell which the available civil force is deemed by him inadequate.

Governor may call out Force.

(2) Every member so called out shall attend in obedience to the call and shall assemble at such place and perform such service as may be directed by the Governor.

Attend call.

(3) Every member so called out shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be deemed to be on active service. If any such member, not incapacitated by infirmity for service, refuses or neglects so to assemble, as required by the Governor, he shall be deemed to be a deserter.

Called out, deemed on Active Service.

(4) The period of such service shall continue so long as the Governor shall consider necessary, and shall end only by order of the Governor.

Period of Active Service.

(5) Nothing in this Ordinance shall render any member liable to serve or proceed on duty without his consent beyond the limits of the Colony.

Liable to serve in Colony only.

16. Whenever the Force or any part thereof is on active service, or is undergoing drill exercise or inspection, or is doing any duty together with His Majesty's Regular Forces, the Force shall, subject to any regulation under this Ordinance, be under the command of the Officers of His Majesty's Regular Forces so nevertheless that the Force or any part thereof shall when the circumstances of the service admit be led by its own Officers under such command.

Under command on active service.

17. The Commanding Officer of the Force or of any company, detachment or party thereof may, when the Force or any part thereof is called out for active service, impress men, horses, carts, riding and driving gear and boats and their accessories, or any article as the service may require.

Impressment of men, horses, etc.

Compulsory Service.

18. (1) Every male person resident in the Colony between the ages of eighteen and forty-one years, shall within four months of his becoming liable under this Ordinance furnish his full name the date of his birth and nationality to the Officer Commanding who shall enter the same in an alphabetical Register to be kept by him.

Persons liable to serve furnish name and age.

(2) Every person so registered and liable to serve in the Defence Force shall on each occasion of his leaving or returning to the Colony notify the Officer Commanding.

To report movements to or from Colony.

(3) Upon any person ceasing to be liable to serve under this Ordinance the Commanding Officer shall strike his name out of the Register.

19. Every male British subject over the age of eighteen and under the age of forty-one years resident in the Colony, not being exempt under section 22 of this Ordinance, shall be liable to serve in the Defence Force.

Persons liable to serve.

20. In the event of the Defence Force being called out for active service as herein before provided, and the Governor considering it expedient that the numerical strength of the Force

Application of compulsory service.

should be increased, the Governor may by proclamation call upon and require any or all such person or persons as are mentioned in the preceding section, not being members of the Force or exempt under the next succeeding section to join and serve with the Force so called out, and every such person shall be required to assemble at such place and perform such service as may be directed by the Governor and shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and shall serve as a member of the Force accordingly.

Ballot.

21. If the number of persons called up under the preceding sections is greater than the number required by the Governor, the Officer Commanding shall draw by ballot from all the names on the register until the names of a sufficient number of persons have been drawn, and the persons whose names are so drawn shall serve as members of the Force for such time as the Force may continue called out on active service.

**Exemption from service
Schedule B.**

22. (1) The persons specified in Schedule B to this Ordinance shall be exempt from service in the Defence Force:

Provided that they may so serve, if they desire to do so, and the Governor sanctions their doing so.

**Special exemption by
Governor.**

(2) Any person liable to serve in the Defence Force may, at the discretion of the Governor, be discharged annually from such liability upon paying into the Colonial Treasury the sum of twenty-five pounds for each and every year or portion of a year that he is liable to serve. All moneys paid under this subsection shall be applied to the purposes of the Force.

Immunities.

**Immunities of
Members.**

23. (1) No action shall lie against any member of the Defence Force, nor shall he be subject to any penalty or punishment, for any act or thing done by him, while paraded under arms:

Provided that the act or thing was done in pursuance of a lawful command given to him by the Governor or a Magistrate or his Commanding Officer, or in defence of his post or person or otherwise in the lawful performance of his duty.

(2) No action shall be brought against any person for anything done by him under this Ordinance, unless the same shall be commenced within three months after the act complained of was committed, nor unless notice in writing of such action shall have been given at least one month before such action was commenced.

(3) In every action brought against any person for anything done by him under this Ordinance, the plaintiff shall expressly allege in his statement of claim that such act was done either maliciously or without reasonable and probable cause or through gross negligence, and if at the trial of such action he fails to prove such allegation, he shall be nonsuited, or a verdict shall be given for the defendant.

(4) Any person who is sued for anything done by him in pursuance of this Ordinance may plead the general issue and give this Ordinance in evidence for his defence, and in case the plaintiff in such action shall be nonsuited or shall discontinue his suit or shall have judgment given against him, he shall pay to the defendant double costs.

(5) Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall exempt any person from being prosecuted, tried and convicted before the ordinary tribunals of the Colony for any felony, misdemeanour or offence against any law for the time being in force in this Colony.

Provided that no person shall be punished twice for the same offence.

(6) Every member of the Defence Force shall be allowed a reasonable time for going to and returning from any drill, parade or other service, and, if in uniform, he shall not be liable during such time, or when on duty at drill, parade or other service, to have his person, horse, harness or conveyance arrested or taken in execution by any civil process issued out of any Court whatever.

Discipline.

24. (1) Every member of the Defence Force who shall be guilty of any of the offences specified in the first column of Schedule C to this Ordinance shall be liable to pay a fine not exceeding the amount set opposite such offence in the second column of that Schedule. Offences Schedule C.

(2) Fines in respect of the said offences for which the limit of the fine is one pound and under may be imposed by the Commanding Officer. Fines of £1 and under

Offences in respect of which the limit of fine exceeds one pound shall only be imposed by the Commanding Officer after an investigation by a Court of Inquiry. Fines over £1.

(3) All fines inflicted for any of the said offences shall go to the funds of the Force, and, if not paid within ten days, shall be recoverable summarily as a civil debt, under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, or any Ordinance amending the same, by the Commanding Officer or any Officer of the Force authorized by him. Fines to go to funds Force.

25. (1) If any member of the Force, while on duty with the Force or any part thereof, or while wearing the uniform or accoutrements of such Force disobeys any lawful order of any Officer under whose command he then is, or is guilty of misconduct, the officer then in command of the Force or any superior officer under whose command the Force or part thereof then is may order the offender, if an Officer, into arrest and, if not an Officer, into the custody of any member of the Force. Arrest for breach of Discipline.

Provided that the offender shall not be kept in such arrest or custody longer than during the time the Force or such portion thereof as aforesaid then shall remain on duty. For the purposes of this provision any such member, while going or returning to or from any place of exercise, drill or assembly of the Force, or any part thereof, shall be deemed to be on duty so long as he continues to wear the clothing or accoutrements of the Force.

(2) Every such arrest as aforesaid shall be forthwith reported to the Commanding Officer or such other Officer as may be prescribed in that behalf by the regulations. Arrest to be forthwith reported.

Expulsion from Force.

26. (1) The Commanding Officer may, subject to such appeal to the Governor as is hereinafter mentioned, discharge from the Force any member thereof and strike him off the strength, either for disobedience of orders by him, while on duty with the Force, or for neglect of duty or misconduct by him as a member of the Force, or for other sufficient cause, the existence and sufficiency of the cause to be judged by the Commanding Officer or, in a case of appeal, by the Governor.

Liability after discharge.

(2) The member so discharged shall nevertheless be liable to deliver up in good order, fair wear and tear only excepted, all arms, ammunition, clothing and appointments, being public property or property of the Force, issued to him and to pay all moneys due or becoming due by him under this Ordinance under the rules or regulations, either before or at the time or by reason of his discharge.

Appeal to Governor.

(3) Any member who feels aggrieved by such discharge may appeal to the Governor at any time within fourteen days after such discharge, and the Governor may cancel or confirm such discharge or give such other directions with reference thereto as to him may seem just and proper, and his determination shall be binding on all persons.

Discipline on Active Service.

27. (1) The provisions of the Army Act shall as far as applicable apply to the discipline of the Force or any part thereof when on active service, or undergoing drill, exercise, training or inspection, together with His Majesty's Regular Forces or any part thereof, subject nevertheless to the following modifications:—

- (a) That no member of the Defence Force shall for any offence against the Army Act be subject to the penalty of death, or to any longer term of imprisonment than five years.
- (b) That no sentence of a Court Martial for the trial of a member of the Force shall be carried into execution unless confirmed by the Governor.

(2) Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to limit or derogate from the power given by section one hundred and seventy-seven of the Army Act to the General Officer Commanding His Majesty's Forces with which the Force is serving of making such exceptions or modifications as in the same section are referred to.

Financial.**When travelling expenses are payable to Members.**

28. Whenever any Member shall be called out under this Ordinance on active service away from his place of residence he shall be entitled to receive if willing to do so his travelling expenses from and to such residence, and it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix the rate and amount of such expenses.

Pay and Allowances on active service.

29. Every member called out under this Ordinance on active service shall receive from the Government such pay and allowances, quartering and billeting, as the Governor shall from time to time direct, and while in receipt of such will not be entitled to claim pay from his employer, except at such times and under such conditions as are hereinafter specified.

30. Every member who when called out under this Ordinance on active service shall leave a wife or a wife and family unable to support herself or themselves shall during the period of absence on such active service be entitled to relief for his wife and family and it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix the amount of such relief, consideration being given to the amount of the pay and allowances granted under the preceding section to the member himself.

Relief to families of Members called out on Active Service.

31. Every member of the Force who shall have received wounds or injuries when called out under this Ordinance on active service and the widows and families of all such members who may have been killed or have died within twelve months after having been wounded of wounds received during such active service or have died within twelve months from illness directly traceable to fatigue or exposure incident to such active service shall be entitled to such pensions or gratuities as shall be fixed by the Governor provided that no pension or gratuity under this section shall exceed the sum of two hundred pounds (£200).

Pensions to members disabled on service and to widows and families of those killed on service.

32. (1) When on the written request of an employer a member is permitted or instructed by the Commanding Officer temporarily to resume his civil employment no payment shall be made by the Government in respect of the period during which such Member shall be released from military duty, and the employer shall pay full wages to the Member in respect of such time as he shall work for his employer during the period of such release.

Payment of members by employer on release from military duties.

(2) Should any employer apply for the temporary services of any Member other than his own employee, he shall be responsible for the full payment, at the current rate of wages, of such members as may by the Commanding Officer with the approval of the Governor be selected to perform such work in respect of such time as they or any of them are thus employed.

33. It shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer subject to the Regulations and on the warrant of the Governor to pay annually out of the Revenue of the Colony to the Officer Commanding for the purposes of the Force, capitation grants, not exceeding the following rates:—

Capitation grant.

For every Member of the Force qualifying in any year as efficient:—

- (a) in drilling or musketry the sum of thirty shillings (30/-).
- (b) in both drilling and musketry the sum of two pounds (£2).

34. All moneys subscribed by or to or for the use of the Force or any company or Club of the Force and all effects and other property belonging to the Force or any company or Club of the Force and the exclusive right to sue for and recover current subscriptions, arrears of subscriptions and other moneys due to the Force or to any Company or Club of the Force shall vest in the Commanding Officer for the time being and his successors in office, with power for him and them to bring actions, to make

Force funds and property vested in Commanding Officer.

contracts and conveyances and to do all other lawful things in respect of or relating to the same; and any civil or criminal proceedings taken by virtue of this section by the Officer Commanding shall not be discontinued or abated by his death, resignation or removal from office, but may be carried on by and in the name of his successors.

Recovery.

35. Any money or fine recoverable under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary way in the Magistrate's Court notwithstanding the amount may be in excess of the ordinary jurisdiction of that Court.

Inspections.

Inspections by Officers, Regular Forces,

36. An inspection of the Force may from time to time be held by an Officer of His Majesty's Regular Forces, nominated by the Governor for the purpose, at such times as the Governor may direct, and such Inspecting Officer shall report in writing to the Governor as to the efficiency or otherwise of the Force.

Regulations.

Governor to make Regulations.

37. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time make, amend and revoke regulations consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance as he shall deem proper for:—

- (a) regulating muster, instruction and rifle practice;
- (b) fixing standards of efficiency and extra efficiency;
- (c) the storing and issuing of arms and ammunition;
- (d) targets, butts and shooting ranges;
- (e) the composition and proceedings of Courts of Inquiry;
- (f) the general government and good discipline of the Defence Force; and
- (g) giving further and better effect to the provisions of this Ordinance.

(2) Any such regulations may provide for the punishment or penalty of any infraction thereof.

(3) Every regulation made under this section shall be published in the Gazette.

Committee of Force.

Committee of Force.

38. There shall be a Committee of the Force composed of the Officer Commanding and six members to be elected at a General Meeting of the Members of the Force to be held annually. Two of the elected members shall retire in rotation each year, but shall be eligible for re-election. Any casual vacancy on the Committee during the course of a year may be filled by the Committee until the next annual General Meeting.

Committee may make Rules.

39. The Committee may from time to time make amend and revoke Rules for the management and maintenance by annual subscription or otherwise of the Social Club of the Force, to be called "The Defence Force Club", and for the property finances and civil affairs of the Force;

Provided that such rules shall not have effect unless and until the Commanding Officer thinks fit to transmit the same to the Governor for his approval and such approval has been notified by the Governor to the Commanding Officer to be by him forthwith communicated to the Force, whereupon the rules so approved shall be binding on all members and shall be published in the Gazette.

40. The Rules may provide for the payment by Members of fines not exceeding ten shillings for any infringement thereof as may be imposed by the Committee, and for the payment of the amount of any damage done to the property of the Club.

Fines under rules.

Courts of inquiry.

41. (1) The Governor may at any time convene a Court of Inquiry, composed of officers or other persons, or of both, to inquire into any matter relative to the Force or to any Company or any part thereof or to any Officer or other member of the Force and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained in such inquiry and, if required, to report upon the same for his information.

Governor may convene Court of Inquiry.

(2) The Commanding Officer of the Force may at any time convene a Court of Inquiry composed of Officers to inquire into any matter relative to any Company or to any non-commissioned officer or private thereof and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained on such inquiry and, if required, to report on the same for his information and assistance.

Commanding Officer may convene Court of Inquiry.

(3) Every Court of Inquiry shall have power to bring any member of the Force before it, either by summons or, if necessary, by warrant of apprehension directed to any Police officer or constable.

Power of Court.

(4) If any person summoned or ordered to attend as a witness before a Court of Inquiry, after payment or tender of reasonable expenses of his attendance:—

Non-attendance.

- (a) makes default in attending or in being in attendance; or
- (b) refuses to take an oath or affirmation which the Court of Inquiry requires him to take; or
- (c) refuses to produce any document in his power or control which the Court of Inquiry lawfully requires him to produce; or
- (d) refuses to answer any question which the Court of Inquiry lawfully requires him to answer; or
- (e) is guilty of any contempt of the Court of Inquiry by causing any interruption or disturbance in its proceedings or otherwise;

the President of the Court of Inquiry may certify the default, refusal or contempt under his hand to a Judge or Magistrate having power to deal with or punish persons guilty of like acts or omissions in his Court, and such Judge or Magistrate may thereupon inquire into the same, and if the person is found guilty, deal with or punish him in like manner as if such default, refusal or contempt had been made or committed before him or in relation to his Court.

Presidents powers.

Penalties.

42. If any person assaults or resists, or aids or abets any person in assaulting, or resisting, any member of the Defence Force in the discharge of his duty, he shall be punishable on summary conviction, with a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or with imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months.

Assaulting or resisting members.

Obstructing or molesting member.

43. If any person wilfully obstructs or molests any company or any Officer or member of any company while on duty, he shall, on the prosecution of the Officer Commanding be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, and may be arrested or given into custody by the Senior Officer present and conveyed and handed over to the custody of the Police.

Wilful injury to guns, butts, etc.

44. If any person wilfully commits any damage to any gun, cannon, butt or target, hut, shed, emplacement, magazine or other property lawfully used by His Majesty's Regular Forces or the Defence Force, or without the leave of the Officer Commanding searches for bullets in or otherwise disturbs the soil of or near any such gun, cannon, butt or target, hut, shed, emplacement or magazine, he shall on the prosecution of the Officer Commanding, be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every such offence.

Wrongful detention or disposal of arms etc.

45. (1) If any person designedly makes away with, sells, pawns, wrongfully destroys or damages or negligently loses anything issued to a member of the Force, or refuses or neglects, when lawfully required, to produce, exhibit or deliver, on demand anything which he is liable under this Ordinance or the Rules or Regulations made thereunder to produce exhibit or deliver the value thereof shall be recoverable from him summarily, under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, by the Commanding Officer or any Officer authorized by him, and he shall also for every such offence, be liable, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

(2) Whoever knowingly buys or takes in exchange or in pawn from any member of the Force or person acting on his behalf or solicits or entices any member of the Force to sell or pawn or knowingly assists or acts for any member of the Force in selling or pawning or has in his possession or keeping, without satisfactorily accounting for the same, any arms, ammunition, clothing, appointments, musical instruments or necessaries, being public property or the property of the Force, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a sum not exceeding five pounds for every such offence.

Failure to furnish name etc.

46. If any person fails to furnish his full name, the date of his birth and nationality to the Officer Commanding as required under the provisions of this Ordinance he shall on summary conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Prevention of persons from becoming members of Force.

47. If any employer or person, by threats or otherwise, wilfully prevents or endeavours to prevent any one from becoming a member of the Defence Force or at any time serving as a member of the Force, the Commanding Officer may institute proceedings against such employer or person, and such employer or person shall be liable on summary conviction, if the offence be committed in peace time, to a fine not exceeding twenty five pounds, and if committed at any time during which the Force or any part thereof is on active service, to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, for each such offence or repeated offence.

Appearance of Commanding Officer.

48. In all proceedings under this Ordinance before a Magistrate the Commanding Officer may appear by any Officer of the Force authorized by him in that behalf by writing under his hand.

Application of penalties

49. Every pecuniary penalty recovered summarily on the prosecution of the Commanding Officer shall be paid to the Commanding Officer and be applied as part of the Funds of the Force.

Repeal.

50. The Ordinances set out in Schedule D hereto are hereby repealed.

Provided that all Rules Regulations and Standing Orders made under the repealed Ordinances and existing and in force prior to the coming into operation of this Ordinance shall remain in force until altered amended or rescinded by any Rules, Regulations or Standing Orders made in pursuance of the powers given by this Ordinance.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

Order of His Excellency, the Administrator, in Council, declaring an alteration in Schedule 1 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1913, entitled "An Ordinance to amend the Law with regard to the Preservation of Wild Animals and Birds."

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by Section 7 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1913, entitled "An Ordinance to Amend the Law with regard to the Preservation of Wild Animals and Birds," His Excellency the Administrator, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to declare that the following alteration, referring only to the Red Breasted Starling (*Trupialis falklandicus*) is hereby made to Schedule 1 of the aforementioned Ordinance.

Any person on application to the Colonial Secretary or the Stipendiary Magistrate, West Falkland, may be authorised for a year specified in the authority, to kill or take the Red Breasted Starling (*Trupialis falklandicus*) during the months of April, May and June, but no person shall be permitted to kill or take more than twenty of this species in any one year, and the beaks of all birds killed under such authority must be sent to the authorising officer with a written certificate, in the form set forth in the schedule hereto that the beaks of all birds so killed have been sent in.

Granted by H.M. THE KING to the
MERCANTILE MARINE, LICENSED PILOTS, FISHERMEN
AND CREWS OF PILOTAGE AND LIGHTHOUSE
AUTHORITIES VESSELS.

1.—THE BRITISH WAR MEDAL will be granted to applicants who have served at sea for six months between the 4th August, 1914 and the 11th November, 1918, inclusive.

2.—THE MERCANTILE MARINE WAR MEDAL will also be granted to applicants who, during the period of six months referred to above, have served at sea on a voyage through the danger zone, i.e. on a ship which has entered or cleared a United Kingdom, French or Mediterranean port.

3.—Applications must be made on the forms which are provided in Mercantile Marine Offices and Offices of Pilotage and Lighthouse Authorities.

4.—At present only Medal Ribands will be distributed; the medals will not be ready for a considerable time.

5.—Board of Trade Officers have instructions not to pass more than a certain number of applications each day. These applications will be dealt with, and the riband distributed, as quickly as possible. Less delay will be caused by this method than by allowing numbers of applications to accumulate which cannot be dealt with immediately.

6.—It is an offence for any unauthorised person to wear the ribands and medals.

Crews of vessels which were engaged in purely coastal trade within the period mentioned are not entitled to either of these awards.

All applications should be made through the Shipping Master at an early date.

WHEREAS by the Falkland Islands Currency Note Order, 1899 (hereinafter referred to as the "Principal Order"), provision was made with respect to the issue of Currency Notes in the Colony of the Falkland Islands:

And whereas by Section 7 of the said Order it was provided that the coin received in exchange for currency notes should form the Note Guarantee Fund, and that a portion thereof, referred to as the coin portion of the Fund, and being not less than a fixed proportion of the notes for the time being in circulation, should be in coin, and should be held in the Colony, in the custody of the Commissioners, and that the portion so held should not be less in any case than one-half.

And whereas it is expedient to reduce the coin portion of the said Fund and to provide that part thereof may be kept in the United Kingdom.

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—This Order may be cited as the Falkland Islands Currency Note (Amendment) Order, 1920, and shall be read and construed with the "Principal Order."

2.—The words "one half" at the end of Section 7 (4) of the Principal Order are hereby revoked and in place thereof the words "one third" shall be inserted.

3.—There may be kept in the United Kingdom either in coin or invested in such manner as a Secretary of State shall approve, such part of the coin portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, not exceeding two-thirds thereof, as a Secretary of State from time to time may direct, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Principal Order.

4.—The Falkland Islands Currency Note (Temporary Amendment) Order, 1918, is hereby revoked.

5.—This Order shall come into operation from and after a day to be fixed by Proclamation by the Governor.

6.—His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order.

The following notice has been issued by the French Republic:

NOTICE TO TRAVELLERS.

PROHIBITION OF THE EXPORTATION OF GOLD, SILVER AND PAPER CURRENCY.

The exportation from France of French or foreign gold, silver and paper currency is forbidden under a penalty of imprisonment of from one month to two years, and a fine of from 100 to 5,000 francs. Either one or both these penalties may be imposed, and the currency found in possession of the traveller confiscated, together with his means of transport. (Law of the 17th August, 1915 and Decree of the 12th July, 1919).

Without special permission from the Minister of Finance (Exchange Commission) travellers from abroad are likewise forbidden to import a larger sum than 1000 francs each in French or foreign notes. (Law of the 23rd April, 1918, and Order of the 3rd July, 1918).

An allowance is made in silver currency to the amount of a maximum sum of 10 francs per person.

Travellers who do not conform to these instructions expose themselves to imprisonment and a heavy fine.

WAR OFFICE NOTICE.

Refunds of passage money for ex-officers and men of the British Army.

Army Council Order 275/18 which authorised refunds of passage money of those proceeding from abroad after the declaration of war and joined the British Army has been extended in respect of the date for the submission of claims, and claims will be allowed up to December 31st, 1920, inclusive, for the following special categories who were unable to submit their claims before September 1st, 1919.

No others will be considered.

1.—(a) Those who were actually engaged in military operations in distant parts of the world, e.g. places other than France, Belgium, or the area of the Rhine Army.

(b) Those who were incapacitated by wounds or disease contracted on active service.

(c) Those who were killed in action or died from the result of wounds or illness contracted during their service. In these cases applications should be made on behalf of the nearest relative.

2.—Each claim must be accompanied by a full statement of the reason which prevented its submission before the 1st September, 1919.

Claims will be considered on their own merits provided that they come within the above categories and are supported by the particulars regarding the date of sailing from abroad, the date of arrival in the United Kingdom, the date of enlistment, etc., required by the Army Council Order 275/18. Full regimental particulars (rank, regimental number and each regiment) of the applicant should be stated.

All claims must be submitted to the War Office or a recognised Military Authority on or before December 31st, 1920. No extension of this date will be allowed.

3.—Applications should if necessary be rendered without waiting till the steamship companies' certificates required by para 3 of Army Council Order 0/275/18 have been received, which certificates should be forwarded when obtained. A note that this will be done should be made on the claim.

The KING has approved of the recommendations made, with a view to economy, by a Committee appointed for the purpose of considering alterations in the regulations with regard to Civil Uniform.

The alterations which the King has approved, are as follows:—

1.—*First and Second Class Uniform.* The wearing of the Full Dress Coat to be optional. The Levee Coat to be substituted for it, at the option of the wearer, on all occasions when Full Dress is prescribed.

2.—*Third, Fourth and Fifth Class Uniform.* In future to be of one pattern for all three classes, but with distinctive embroidery on the collar to mark the three classes. (Patterns may be seen at St. James's Palace.)

3.—*The White Undress Tropical Uniform,* as approved for use by Colonial Officials in tropical countries, may be worn at Court in this country and on all ceremonial occasions overseas, at the option of those entitled to it.

4.—All persons in the possession of Civil Uniforms made in accordance with the existing regulations may continue to wear them as heretofore.

5.—Civil Uniforms as approved for use by Officers of the Government in India may be worn as heretofore.

6.—In lieu of either Civil Uniform or Court Dress the following alternative dress may be worn by gentlemen (other than Members of Their Majesties' Households and of the Diplomatic and Consular Services) on all occasions when Uniform and Court Dress is prescribed:—

An ordinary black evening dress coat.

Black or white evening dress waistcoat,

Breeches.—Plain black evening dress material or stockinet, with three small black cloth or silk buttons, and small jet or black buckles at the knee.

Hose. Black silk.

Shoes. Plain Court, with bows, no buckles.

Tie. White evening dress bow necktie.

Report of the Treasurer for the year 1919.

Revenue.

1. The Revenue and Expenditure for the year amounts to £56,682 : 10 : 4, and £26,910 : 11 : 11, respectively. Included therein are sums received under the Land Ordinance 1903, in respect of Land Purchases.

2. The Revenue, exclusive of "Land Sales," exceeded the Expenditure by £21,585 : 14 : 2. The total Revenue was £13,339 : 10 : 4 over, and the total Expenditure £8,176 : 8 : 1 under the original estimate for the year 1919.

3. The ordinary Revenue amounted to £48,496 : 6 : 1; representing £34,735 : 1 : 4, for "Falklands", and £13,761 : 4 : 9, for the "Dependencies."

4. All Heads of Revenue show an increase on the original estimate, amounting to a total in ordinary Revenue of £12,720 : 6 : 1. As compared with the previous year there was a net increase in ordinary Revenue of £5,223 : 12 : 10.

During the five years 1915-1919 the total ordinary Revenue has exceeded the total ordinary Expenditure, during the same period by £62,673 : 0 : 11, of which a sum of £6,944 : 8 : 2, has been expended under "Public Works Extraordinary" since 1915, leaving a net saving on the past five years of £55,728 : 12 : 9. This amount when added to the accumulated savings of £2,961 : 5 : 4, at the beginning of the year 1915, makes a total net saving in ordinary Revenue over Expenditure up to the 31st December 1919, of £58,689 : 18 : 1.

13. There is no Public Debt. On the other hand, on the 31st December 1919, the Colony had a Land Sales Fund amounting to £152,002 : 6 : 1, and a Live Stock Fund amounting to £2280 : 14 : 9, which together with accumulated ordinary Revenue of £58,689 : 18 : 1, makes a total surplus of £212,972 : 18 : 11.

14. The sums received during the year in respect of land purchases (transferred to the Land Sales Fund) amounted to £8,186 : 4 : 3. On the 31st December, 1919, the Fund amounted to £152,002 : 6 : 1. The Securities held by the Fund amounted to £152,023 6 4, shewing an over-invested amount at the end of the year of £21 : 0 : 3. Necessary action has been taken to adjust this over-investment.

15. The monies standing to the credit of the Depositors in the Government Savings Bank at the end of the year amounted to £118,270 : 7 : 11, making an increase during the year of £5,829 : 9 : 3. All the money so deposited, with the exception of £8,504 : 3 : 9, was invested in approved Securities. The dividends received from these Securities, during the year, amounted to £4,568 : 19 : 9; of this a sum of £2,668 : 19 : 11: was expended during the year in the payment of interest to Depositors, expenses of Management and Audit and a sum of £100 as contribution General Revenue on working account of Savings Bank, and a sum of £1,625 : 8 : 4, in the purchase of Securities for the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund, leaving a profit on the year's transactions of £174 : 11 : 6.

16. No Specie was imported by the Government during the year. To meet local requirements the Currency Note issue was increased from £15,000 to £18,000. The arrangement made in 1901, between the Falkland Islands Co., Ltd., and the Colonial Government is still in existence, whereby one thousand pounds is paid to the Crown Agents in London at the end of each month, and a simultaneous repayment is made from the Colonial Treasury.

STOCK DEPARTMENT.

Report for Season 1919-1920.

Sheep.

1. The general health of the sheep on the islands is very good and several stations that were affected with lice have now a clean bill of health regarding the same, although the East Island is not quite clear.

Statistics.

2. As will be seen from the comparative table of returns, there is a marked difference from last years return of sheep, owing to the extremely wet and cold lambing season. Horses have also decreased notwithstanding the importation of 315, apparently not enough horses are bred in the country, and therefore there is not a supply sufficient to counteract the wastage from old age sickness, etc. Also as the importation from the coast, of all livestock including horses is liable to be stopped owing to infectious or contagious disease, it would be well to pay more attention to horse breeding.

Lambing.

3. The lambing this season was below the average due to the extremely bad weather in the spring.

Canning.

4. The Falkland Islands Co.'s factory at Goose Green was the only one working this season. The number of sheep canned for export was 24832 showing a decrease of 18,392 from last year. The average price paid for sheep was 11/1. Only 4,640 sheep were boiled down this year.

Cattle.

5. The number of cattle in the Colony in this years return is 5,406 a decrease of 1388 from last year. The general health of the cattle is good.

Horses.

6. Last year's return of horses was 2611; this year the return shows 2486 giving a decrease of 235 from last year, although 315 were imported this year and only 75 the year before, showing that with much larger importation the stock is decreasing.

Pigs.

7. Several boars and sows have been received from South Georgia and no doubt there will be more pigs in the camp in the near future.

CASH ON DELIVERY SERVICE.

RULES GOVERNING THE EXCHANGE OF POSTAL PARCELS
SUBJECT TO TRADE CHARGES BETWEEN THE POST OFFICE
OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND AND THE POST OFFICE
OF THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

ARTICLE 1.

Parcels subject to the collection of Trade Charges can be exchanged between the United Kingdom and the Post Office Stanley, Falkland Islands.

ARTICLE 2.

1. The maximum amount of Trade Charges in the case of parcels for delivery in the United Kingdom is fixed at £40 per parcel, and, in the case of parcels for delivery in Stanley, Falkland Islands, at £40 per parcel.

2. In calculating the amount of Trade Charges, fractions of a penny are ignored.

ARTICLE 3.

1. Each Administration fixes the special fee to be levied from the sender of a parcel subject to a Trade Charge. This fee must not exceed:

(a) $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each £1 or fraction of £1 to be collected, in the case of parcels posted in the United Kingdom.

(b) $2\frac{1}{2}$ d for each £1 or fraction of £1 to be collected, in the case of parcels posted in Stanley, Falkland Islands.

2. Each Administration shall communicate to the other the special fee fixed in its service by virtue of the preceding paragraph, as well as any alteration subsequently made in it.

3. This fee is shared between the Administration of the country of origin and that of the country of destination in the manner prescribed in the Detailed Regulations.

ARTICLE 4.

1. In addition to the special fee fixed by the preceding Article the Post Office of the country in which a parcel subject to a Trade Charge is posted may collect a posting fee from the sender, and the Post Office of the country of destination of a parcel subject to a Trade Charge may collect a delivery fee from the addressee.

2. The posting fee must not exceed:—

(a) In the case of a parcel posted in the United Kingdom, 2d, per parcel.

(b) In the case of a parcel posted in Stanley, Falkland Islands, 2d. per parcel.

3. The delivery fee must not exceed:—

(a) In the case of a parcel delivered in the United Kingdom, 4d per parcel.

(b) In the case of a parcel delivered in Stanley, Falkland Islands, 4d. per parcel.

4. Each Administration shall communicate to the other the special fees fixed in its service by virtue of this Article, as well as any alterations subsequently made in them.

5. These fees shall be retained by the office which collects them.

ARTICLE 5.

The amounts of Trade Charges collected are liquidated by means of Trade Charge Money Orders, which are issued free of all charges. The amount of a Trade Charge Money Order which cannot be delivered remains at the disposal of the Administration of the country of origin of the parcel on which the Trade Charge is payable.

ARTICLE 6.

In principle the amounts of Trade Charges should be paid in by the addressee of the parcel and paid out to the sender in gold; but each Administration shall have power to receive and employ for this purpose any other money legally current in its country, provided that due allowance is made for any difference in the exchange value.

ARTICLE 7.

1. The loss of a parcel subject to a Trade Charge entails responsibility upon the Postal Service in the conditions fixed by the Regulations for the exchange of parcels by Parcel Post between the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Falkland Islands.

2. After the delivery of the parcel the Post Office of the country of destination is responsible for the amount of the Trade Charge, unless it can prove that the parcel and the relative Despatch Note (if one is used) did not, when transmitted to its service, bear the indications prescribed in the Detailed Regulations for parcels subject to Trade Charges. Nevertheless, an application as to the disposal of the amount of a Trade Charge is only entertained if made within a year of the posting of the parcel.

ARTICLE 8.

The sender of a parcel posted under this arrangement may not have the amount of the Trade Charge cancelled or reduced after posting.

ARTICLE 9.

The two Administrations undertake to admit parcels subject to Trade Charge in transit through their services. Nevertheless, the accounts relative to the Trade Charges collected will be drawn up and settled directly between the Post Offices of origin and destination of the parcels subject to Trade Charges.

ARTICLE 10.

The two Administrations are authorized to fix by common consent the measures of detail necessary for ensuring the performance of the present Rules and to modify them from time to time in accordance with the needs of the service.

ARTICLE II.

These rules shall come into force on the date to be agreed upon between the two Administrations. They will remain in force until the expiry of one year from the date on which either Administration shall give notice to the other of its intention to terminate them. The date agreed upon by the Administrations for the purposes of these instructions is the 1st January, 1920.

DETAILED REGULATIONS FOR CARRYING OUT THE RULES
GOVERNING THE EXCHANGE OF POSTAL PARCELS SUBJECT
TO TRADE CHARGES BETWEEN THE POST OFFICE OF
GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND AND THE POST OFFICE OF
STANLEY, FALKLAND ISLANDS

ARTICLE I.

1. On parcels subject to Trade Charges, and on the Despatch Notes, if any, relating to them, the word "Remboursement" must be written or printed boldly beside the address, and after it, the amount of the Trade Charge must be shown, in Latin characters, in the money of the country of origin, without erasure or correction, even if certified.

2. Each parcel subject to a Trade Charge must be accompanied by a separate Despatch Note, in services in which Despatch Notes are used.

3. Each parcel subject to a Trade Charge and the relative Despatch Note, if one is used, must bear a red label with the word "Remboursement" in Latin characters.

4. Each parcel subject to a Trade Charge posted under this arrangement must bear on the cover and on the back of the relative Despatch Note, if one is used, a request signed by the sender that if the parcel is undeliverable at the expiration of 15 days from its arrival at the place of destination, it is to be (a) abandoned or (b) returned to him at his expense.

ARTICLE II.

Each parcel subject to a Trade Charge is entered on the parcel bill with a note of the amount of the Trade Charge.

ARTICLE III.

1. Every parcel subject to a Trade Charge is accompanied by a Trade Charge Money Order in conformity with or analogous to the specimen B annexed to the present Rules. This Money Order, which is attached to the Despatch Note or to the parcel bill when no Despatch Note is used, should bear a statement of the amount of the Trade Charge in the currency of the country of origin, and should show, as a general rule, the sender of the parcel as payee of the Order. It is free to each Administration, however to have the Orders relating to the parcels originating in its service addressed to the offices of origin of the parcels or to other offices.

2. Entries in pencil will not be allowed on Trade Charge Money Orders.

ARTICLE. IV

Except by contrary agreement between the Administrations of origin and of destination, the amounts of the Trade Charge Orders are converted into the currency of the country of destination by the Post Office of that country, which uses for this purpose the same rate of conversion as it uses for the conversion of ordinary Money Orders drawn on the country of origin of the parcels.

ARTICLE. V

1. Immediately after collecting the Trade Charge, the Office of destination, or any other Office designated by the Administration of the country of destination fills in the part "Indications deservice" of the Trade Charge Money Order and, after impressing it with its date stamp, returns it free of Postage to the country of origin in the manner prescribed by Article XXIV, § 1, of the Detailed Regulations for the execution of the Principal Convention of the Postal Union, or any Article which may be substituted therefor.

2. Trade Charge Orders are paid under the conditions determined by each Administration with a view to ensure the payment of the amounts of the Trade Charges to the senders of the parcels.

ARTICLE VI.

1. Parcels subject to the collection of Trade Charges can be redirected if the new country of destination maintains with that of origin an exchange of Trade Charge parcels. The parcels are, in case of redirection, accompanied by the Trade Charge Orders made out by the service of origin. The new office of destination acts in the settlement of the Trade Charge as if the parcel had been directly consigned to it.

2. In the case of an application for redirection to a country which does not maintain with that of origin an exchange of Trade Charge parcels, the parcel is treated as one which cannot be delivered.

ARTICLE VII.

1. Trade Charge Orders relating to parcels which, for any reason whatever, are returned to origin should be cancelled by the Office which returns the parcels and should be annexed to the Despatch Notes, or, if no Despatch Notes are used, to the bill on which the parcels are advised.

2. Trade Charge Orders mislaid, lost, or destroyed before the collection of the Trade Charge, are replaced, without formalities, by new orders bearing the heading "Duplicate." The request for a duplicate is addressed directly to the Office of origin of the parcel.

3. Trade Charge Orders mislaid, lost, or destroyed after the collection of the Trade Charge are likewise replaced by duplicates, or by authorities to pay, after proof by the two Post Offices that the orders have not been paid or refunded.

ARTICLE VIII.

1. Trade Charge Orders which it has not been possible to deliver to the payees within the period of validity fixed by the agreement concluded between the two Administrations for the exchange of Money Orders are, at the expiration of the period of validity, receipted by the Office of the country of payment, and are claimed from the Office which issued them.

2. Trade Charge Orders which have been delivered to the payees and of which the payees have not claimed payment within the period of validity fixed by the Rules for the transaction of Money Order business between the two Administrations are replaced by authorities to pay. These authorities to pay are drawn up by the Office which issued the orders, as soon as it has been able to ascertain that the originals have not been paid within the period of validity. They are receipted by the Post Office of destination and claimed by it in the first account rendered after their receipt.

ARTICLE IX.

1. Trade Charge Money Orders of which payment cannot be effected for one of the following reasons:—

- i. Incorrect, insufficient or doubtful description of the name or residence of the payees;
- ii. Differences or omissions of names or amounts;
- iii. Erasures of, or additions to, the entries;
- iv. Omission of stamps, signatures or other service indications;
- v. Use of irregular forms;

shall be corrected by the Post Office which has issued them.

2. For this purpose, the Orders shall be returned as soon as possible, officially registered, to the Office of origin by the Office of destination.

ARTICLE X.

1. The settlement relative to Trade Charges paid by each Post Office on behalf of the other Post Office is effected by means of Trade Charge Accounts (specimen A annexed) the final totals of which are carried to the General Account between the United Kingdom and the Falkland Islands, under the heading "Trade Charge Money Orders."

2. In the Trade Charge accounts, which are accompanied by the paid and receipted Trade Charge Orders, the Orders are entered in alphabetical sequence of the Offices of issue and in numerical sequence of their issue at that Office. At the end of the account the Office which has drawn it up deducts from the total sum of its credit a half per cent., representing the share of the other Office in the Trade Charge fee.

3. The verification of the Trade Charge accounts is effected according to the rules for the transaction of Money Order business between the two Post Offices.

ARTICLE XI

The present Regulations shall be brought into operation on the day on which the Rules come into force. They shall have the same duration as the Rules.

Minute by the Acting Governor introducing the Estimates for the year 1921.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

I have the honour to lay before you the draft Estimates of the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies for the service of the year 1921.

The Revenue, (exclusive of Land Sales) is estimated at £115,511 of which £29,945 is in respect of the Falkland Islands and £85,566 of the Dependencies.

The Expenditure is estimated at £114,355 of which £39,661 is in respect of the Falkland Islands and £74,694 of the Dependencies leaving a Surplus of Revenue over Expenditure amounting to £1,156.

From these figures it will be seen that there is an estimated excess of Revenue over Expenditure for the Dependencies of £10,872 and an estimated deficit for the Colony of £9,716.

2. These Estimates have been framed on the same principle as those for the current year.

It was in 1914 that the Revenue and Expenditure of the Dependencies were first shown in detail, separately from those of the Colony proper, in the body of the Estimates. No summary of this Revenue and Expenditure was published, however.

The current year's Estimates were the first to contain such a summary, and to show at a glance the relative positions of the Colony and the Dependencies in respect of the excess of or deficit in Revenue as compared with Expenditure.

3. An examination of the Estimates for the year 1914 and subsequent years will show that in every year a deficit has been estimated for the Colony proper, and an excess for the Dependencies; while an examination of the Returns of Actual Revenue and Expenditure for the completed years 1914 to 1919 inclusive will show that in every year the Actual combined Revenue exceeded, and the Actual combined Expenditure fell short of the amounts estimated, with the exception of the year 1914, in which there was a nett deficit of £1,740.

The Actual excess of Revenue over Expenditure during the years 1915 to 1919 has been carried to the "Surplus Balance" of the Colony, which, on 31st December 1913 stood at £4,701 and on the 31st December 1919 at £58,690.

4. In the Estimates for the current year a sum of £20,500, (out of an estimated export duty on whale oil from the Dependencies amounting to £25,500) has been earmarked for the Dependencies' Research Fund; similarly in the Estimates for 1921 a sum of £72,500 has been earmarked for the same Fund out of an estimated export duty of £77,500; £5,000 being retained in each case to the credit of the Dependencies' accounts, and thus helping to make up the excess of Revenue over Expenditure.

This sum of £5,000 (representing approximately 3½d. per barrel of the export duty expected from oil in 1921) might with propriety be transferred to the Revenue of the Colony proper, as also might a sum representing a proportion of the cost of the Central Administration, say £3,000; thus reducing the Colony's deficit to £1,716 as against an excess of £2,872 in favour of the Dependencies.

5. The Secretary of State for the Colonies has pointed out the desirability of the Colony attaining such a position financially as to show an equilibrium between its own Revenue and Expenditure after charging the Dependencies with their share of the cost of the Central Administration; the nett excess of the Dependencies' Revenue over Expenditure being transferred to the "Dependencies' Research Fund, and only such excess of Revenue over Expenditure as the Colony proper can show in its own accounts, being transferred to its "Surplus Balance."

This is, of course, the object which we should endeavour to attain, but, in framing the estimates on the conservative principle of the past seven years, I have not been able to estimate an excess of Revenue over Expenditure in the case of the Colony proper: on the contrary a deficit of £9,716 is anticipated, less the £8,000 above referred to.

There would appear to be no reason, however, why the actual Revenue for 1921 should not exceed the estimate as in past years.

6. Though the estimated Revenue of the Colony proper is £3,084 greater than that estimated for the current year, the estimated Expenditure shows an increase of £8,797.

This latter amount is made up as follows:

These increases are necessary, having regard to efficiency of service and Departmental requirements, and on account of the general rise in the price of all commodities.

7. Should the result of the year's working show that the Colony's Revenue has exceeded its Expenditure there would be no need to draw on the excess obtained by the Dependencies, and only such excess of Revenue should be transferred to the "Surplus Balance" of the Colony, while the Dependencies' excess would be transferred to the Dependencies Research Fund. Should however the Colony's accounts show an actual deficit, and those of the Dependencies an actual excess, it would be equitable if the former were met from the latter, and only the balance remaining transferred to the Research Fund, this balance being in addition to the £72,500 already earmarked. In the event of no such balance being available it would be necessary to reduce the contribution to the Research Fund, in order to obtain an equilibrium between Revenue and Expenditure.

The only alternative would be to increase the existing rates of both direct and indirect taxation, which the Colony is not at present able to bear.

8. I need not enter into detail regarding the Revenue items, but would, in passing call the attention of Hon. Members to the large increase anticipated in Customs Export Duty on whale and seal oil, the duty on which was increased from 1/6 to 5/- per barrel by The Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance 1920. As has already been stated, a sum £72,500 out of this anticipated Duty has been earmarked for the Dependencies Research Fund.

9. Under the Expenditure side of the Estimates several items call for remark :

HEAD I.

Pensions.

The increase under this head has been authorised by the Pensions Increase Ordinance, 1919.

Salaries.

The general increase of salaries for all departments was passed by a Resolution of this Hon. Council on the 26th of May, 1920, with the exception of the Governor's salary which I now ask you to pass as suggested by the Secretary of State.

It will be seen that the substantive salary of the Governor has been increased by £50, the entertaining allowance of £250 cancelled, and a duty allowance of £500 per annum provided for.

HEAD VI.

Port and Marine.

Item 2. A new engineer for the Government Steam Launch has been appointed recently owing to the fact that the person who has held the post for the past eight years has left the Colony.

It was necessary that the post should be filled without delay, and this was done locally in order to save both time and expense. The engineer thus appointed is a married man with a family, and quarters have had to be provided for him which have not been allowed for in the Estimates now before you. A note will require to be made to this effect on page 13 of the Estimates.

HEAD XI.

Medical.

It will be noted that increased salaries have been provided for the new officers appointed to the posts of Colonial Surgeon, and Dentist. It is not now possible to obtain officers for these posts at lower salaries.

Provision has been inserted for a new post viz: that of a Dispenser for the King Edward Memorial Hospital who will also act as X Rays Operator.

The provision made for maintenance of the Hospital Staff and Patients is in accordance with the general rise in the price of foodstuffs.

An item of £200 has been inserted for furniture, as the existing furniture is inadequate for the needs of the Hospital.

HEAD XII.

Transport.

The increase of £640 is accounted for by the fact that the sum provided for in the current year was greatly under-estimated.

HEAD XV.

Scientific Dept.

This new Department is provided for after careful consideration of the needs of the Colony with a view to furthering its development.

The Secretary of State is taking steps to appoint a Forest Officer and a Geologist, and Mr. J. E. Hamilton, the Stipendiary Magistrate, West Falkland, has been selected for the post of Naturalist while carrying out the duties of his substantive post.

Time alone will prove the benefits that it is hoped will accrue to the Colony from the institution of this new Department; but there can be no doubt that the experiment is justifiable.

The Forest Officer will be engaged for a term of five years, the Geologist for a term of two years, and Mr. Hamilton's services as Government Naturalist will be available, in the first instance, till the completion of his present agreement which has still two years to run.

**HEAD XVI.
Military.**

Item 10 under this Head I propose with your approval to transfer to Head XIII, Miscellaneous, in the corrected Estimates, as being more appropriate.

**HEAD XVII.
Post Office.**

Provision has again been made under this Head for £2,500 in respect of the carriage of mails between the Colony and the United Kingdom, though no arrangement has yet been made for the resumption of a regular mail service, nor have any accounts yet been received from the Pacific Steam Navigation Company for carriage of mails during the current year.

**HEAD XXII.
Colonial Engineer.**

Provision will require to be made under this Head in respect of House Allowance for the new Blacksmith whom the Crown Agents for the Colonies have been asked to appoint, as there are no Government quarters available for him. The sum of £24 per annum should therefore be inserted as Item 24 "House Allowance to Blacksmith."

10. In conclusion I would remark, that, while the items under Head XXIV do not appear to call for comment, a number of Major works are urgently needed for the benefit of both the Capital in particular and the Colony in general, which it is not possible to provide for out of the Ordinary Revenue. These will form the subject of representations which I propose shortly to make to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and, if approved, will require to be paid for out of the Surplus Balances.

Government Notice.

The following telegrams from the Secretary of State for the Colonies are published for general information :—

“November 2nd: It has been decided that, on Thursday, 11th November, it being the second anniversary of the Armistice, the Cenotaph in Whitehall shall be unveiled by His Majesty the King, and that, as part of the Ceremony on that day there shall be buried in Westminster Abbey, an unknown British warrior whose body shall be taken from amongst those buried in France. Every precaution will be taken to prevent his identity being known. The coffin will be brought to the Cenotaph where it will be met by the King, attended by Representatives of the whole of the Empire. There will be a short service at the Cenotaph consisting of the singing of the hymn “O God our Help in Ages Past” and the “Lord’s Prayer.” This service will be so timed that the unveiling of the Cenotaph takes place at 11 a.m. exactly, after which there will be two minutes silence followed by the “Last Post.” Wreaths will then be laid by His Majesty, the Prime Minister, and Representatives of the Empire. The funeral procession will then proceed to the Abbey where the funeral service will take place on the body being buried in a grave in the nave of the Abbey. It is proposed, just as last year, there should be during the two minutes silence complete suspension of all normal business, work, and locomotion throughout the United Kingdom that the thoughts of all may be concentrated in reverent remembrance of the Glorious Dead.”

"November 6th : With reference to my telegram of the 2nd November, His Majesty the King has expressed the wish that on Armistice Day, 11th November, there should be a complete suspension of all normal business, work, and locomotion throughout the British Empire during the two minutes silence commencing at 11 a.m."

IT IS HOPED THAT ALL WILL UNITE IN GIVING EFFECT TO THE WISH EXPRESSED BY HIS MAJESTY THE KING AT THE APPOINTED HOUR, viz; 11 a.m. on THURSDAY, the 11th instant.

FOR THE TOWN OF STANLEY THE FOLLOWING ARRANGEMENTS WILL BE MADE TO MARK THE HOUR:—

THE CATHEDRAL BELL WILL BE RUNG FROM 10.55 a.m. to 11 a.m. PRECISELY; AFTER WHICH TWO GUNS WILL BE FIRED IN RAPID SUCCESSION FROM "VICTORY GREEN." ON THE FIRING OF THESE GUNS THERE WILL BE A CESSATION OF ALL WORK AND OTHER ACTIVITIES FOR A PERIOD OF TWO MINUTES, AT THE END OF WHICH TIME ONE GUN WILL BE FIRED.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

Notice of His Excellency, the Administrator, in Council making an alteration in the King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital Regulations of the 21st day of September, 1916.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by Section 8 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1916, His Excellency the Administrator, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to alter Clause 28 of the King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital Regulations, made by the Governor, in Council, on the 21st day of September, 1916, to read as follows:

Clause 28. The following shall be the Hospital fees to be charged to Hospital Patients:—

In the General Wards, including medical attendance, care and treatment.

For residents in the Colony, subject nevertheless to a remission, either in whole or in part by the Governor in indigent cases.....4s. a day or £1 1s. a week.

For non-residents, subject to any special considerations and recommendations for a less charge as may be approved by the Governor..... 7s. a day or £2 a week.

For every midwifery case, including stay in the Hospital not exceeding 15 days, an inclusive fee of:—

For residents in the Colony £5 0s. 0d.

For non-residents £7 0s. 0d.

For stay beyond 15 days the charge shall be at the per week rate.

In Private Ward.

For Private Patient, resident in the Colony6s. a day or £2 a week.

For Private Patient non-resident 8s. a day or £2 10s. a week.

In midwifery cases an additional fee of £2 shall be charged.

For Government Officials and employees and their families and servants the Hospital fees to be charged shall in each case be one half of the above rates.

In any case, including that of a Government Official and employee, etc., in which any wine, spirit, or extras be permitted by the Medical Officer, but not ordered by him as forming part of the medical treatment, the cost of the same shall, in addition to the Hospital fees, be paid for by the patient.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Appropriation (1921) Ordinance, 1920.

Appropriation
£114,254 for service of
Year 1921.

2. The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st December, 1921, a sum not exceeding One hundred and fourteen thousand two hundred and fifty four Pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1921.

(13th December, 1920.)

An Ordinance to provide for the establishment
of a Defence Force.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Preliminary.

Short Title

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Defence Force Ordinance, 1920.

2. In this Ordinance and in any Regulations or Rules made thereunder unless the context otherwise requires:—

Interpretation.

“Appointments” includes accoutrements and equipments of every kind other than clothing.

“Commanding Officer” or “Commandant” means the Officer in command of the Defence Force.

“Company” means company forming part of the Force.

“Defence Force” or the “Force” means the Defence Force established by this Ordinance.

“Efficiency” or “efficient” means the standard of efficiency fixed by the Governor in Council by Regulations under this Ordinance.

“Member” means a member of the Force.

“Officer” means a person holding the Governor’s commission as an Officer in the Force.

“Regulations” and “Standing Orders” and “Rules” mean respectively regulations and standing orders and rules made under the provisions of this Ordinance.

“The Army Act” means the Army Act, 1881 (Act of the Imperial Parliament 44 and 45 Vic. C 58) and includes all Acts amending or substituted for the same and also all Articles of War in force thereunder.

Organization of Defence Force.

3. (1) It shall be lawful for the Governor on behalf of His Majesty to accept the services of any male British subject desiring to join the Defence Force and offering his services to His Majesty. Formation of Force.
- (2) Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to render it obligatory upon the Governor to accept the services of any person.
4. The Defence Force shall consist of such Companies of Garrison Artillery, Mounted Infantry and Infantry as the Governor may from time to time determine, and each such Company or Companies shall be designated by such style as the Governor shall direct. Composition of Force.
5. The Governor may disband or discontinue the services of any Company or part thereof whenever it seems to him expedient to do so. Disband Company, etc.,
6. (1) The name of every person whose services have been accepted by the Governor as a member of the Defence Force shall be entered by the Commanding Officer on the Muster Roll of the Force which shall be kept by him. Entry on Muster Roll.
- (2) Every person whose services have been accepted as above shall upon admission to the Defence Force take the oath or make the declaration set forth in Schedule A to this Ordinance, to be administered by a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace or by a Commissioned Officer of the Force. Oath.
Schedule A.
7. (1) The Governor shall appoint the Officers of the Defence Force, with such rank as he may from time to time think necessary; such Officers shall have such rank and authority in the Defence Force as are held by Officers of corresponding rank in His Majesty's Regular Forces, and their duties shall be the same as are from time to time prescribed for Officers of the Army in the “King's Regulations” so far as the same can be made applicable. Officers.
- (2) The Governor may appoint a Commanding Officer or Commandant of the Force, who shall have such local rank as the Governor may confer on him, and he shall be responsible to the Governor for the instruction, training, discipline and conduct of the Force. Commandant.
- (3) Officers of the Force shall rank with Officers of His Majesty's Regular Forces but as junior of their respective ranks. Rank of Officers.
- (4) No appointment made under this section shall be deemed to be vacated by the death or retirement from office of the Governor who made the same. Validity of appointment.

Non-Commissioned
Officers.

8. The Commanding Officer may appoint such non-commissioned Officers of the Defence Force as he may deem expedient.

Uniform.

9. (1) The members of the Force, other than Commissioned Officers, shall wear such uniforms as the Governor shall direct, and such uniforms shall be supplied to them upon their enrolment, and renewed from time to time, at the public expense, as may be decided by the Commandant.

Officers uniforms.

(2) The Officers of the Force shall provide themselves at their own expense with such uniform as the Governor shall direct.

Arms etc.

10. (1) For every member of the Force a rifle and such appointments as the Governor may direct shall be issued to the Commandant on loan for the use of such member, and the Commandant shall be responsible to the Governor for such arms and appointments.

Ammunition supply
per member.

(2) There may be issued for every member annually two hundred rounds of rifle ammunition and such further supply on such terms as to payment and otherwise as the Governor may direct.

Cost of repairs etc. and
extra ammunition.

(3) Every member shall pay to the Commandant the cost of repairing or replacing any rifle or appointments damaged destroyed or lost by such member, and shall also pay for any ammunition expended by him to the full issue of which he was not entitled.

Arms and equipment
etc. remain property of
Government.

(4) All arms, ammunition, musical instruments, clothing, appointments and necessities issued on loan to any member of the Defence Force shall be and remain the property of the Government and shall be produced, exhibited and delivered to the Officer commanding or to any person authorized by him to inspect or receive the same.

Right of member to
quit Force.

11. Subject as hereinafter mentioned any member may, except when on active service, and except when the sections relating to compulsory service under this Ordinance are in force, quit the Force on complying with the following conditions:—

- i. giving the Commanding Officer three months notice in writing of his intention to quit the Force;
- ii. delivering up in good order (fair wear and tear only excepted) all arms clothing and appointments being public property or property of the Force issued to him; and
- iii. paying all money due or becoming due by him under the rules of the Force either before or at the time or by reason of his quitting the Force,

and thereupon he shall be struck out of the muster roll of the Force by the Commanding Officer.

The Governor shall have full power at all times to permit any member of the Defence Force to quit the Force upon such member complying with the conditions laid down in Sub Section (ii) and (iii) hereof.

The Reserve.

Reserve.

12. (1) There shall be a Reserve Section to the Force and any Member who has served in the Force, or in any of His Majesty's Regular or Auxiliary Forces, with efficiency for at least two years, may on application to the Commanding Officer be transferred to the Reserve.

(2) Every member so transferred to the Reserve shall be deemed to be on the strength of the Force and shall be liable to be called upon to serve with the Force at such times as the Force may be called out for active service under section 15 of this Ordinance, should the Governor deem it expedient by proclamation to require the services of the Reserve or any part thereof. Liable to be called out.

(3) Every member in the Reserve may with the permission of the Commanding Officer attend all drills and inspections or parades of the Force, and may wear the uniform of the Force at any military functions and on all occasions on which uniform is worn. May attend drills, etc., wear uniform.

(4) Every member in the Reserve shall wear the letter R below the badge of the Force worn on the shoulder straps. Badge.

(5) Any member in the Reserve may, except when the Force is on active service, resign from the Force on giving two weeks notice in writing to the Commanding Officer and complying with conditions as in paragraphs ii and iii in the preceding section. Resignation.

The Retired List.

13. (1) There shall be a retired list to which any member who has been returned with efficiency for at least five years, who by reason of physical disability, not being the result of his own misconduct, certified to by a medical officer, is debarred from further service with the Force, or who has attained the age of forty-one years, may be posted by the Commanding Officer on his being satisfied thereof, and the Commanding Officer shall strike the name of the member off the Muster Roll accordingly. Retired Members.

(2) Any member of the Reserve who has attained the age of forty-one years may on application to the Commanding Officer be struck off the Muster Roll and be posted to the Retired List. Age for posting to, from Reserve.

(3) Every member whose name is placed on the Retired List as herein provided may, at any military function and on all occasions on which uniform is worn, be permitted by the Commanding Officer to wear the uniform last worn by him whilst a member of the Force. He shall wear the letters R. L. below the badge of the Force worn on the shoulder straps. Wear uniform.

(4) He may enjoy the privileges of any Club established by or for the use of the Force in like manner as though he were still an active member of the Force. Enjoy privileges of Club.

Transitional.

14. All members of the Volunteer Corps or Force established by the Volunteer Ordinance, 1892, as amended by the Volunteer Active Service Ordinance, 1915, at the time of coming into force of this Ordinance, shall be deemed as from the date of their joining the Volunteer Corps or Force to be members of the Defence Force established under this Ordinance and to have complied with requirements of section 6 of this Ordinance, and all Officers and non-commissioned officers of the said Volunteer Corps or Force established by the Volunteer Ordinance, 1892, shall be deemed to have been appointed to be of corresponding rank, and to have had their appointments confirmed in the Defence Force established by this Ordinance. Transitional

Active Service.

Governor may call out Force.

15. (1) The Governor may by proclamation call out the Defence Force, or any Company or part thereof, for active service, whenever it appears to him advisable to do so by reason of invasion, or war, or danger, or any of them, or by reason of any internal emergency threatening the security of life or property, to quell which the available civil force is deemed by him inadequate.

Attend call.

(2) Every member so called out shall attend in obedience to the call and shall assemble at such place and perform such service as may be directed by the Governor.

Called out, deemed on Active Service.

(3) Every member so called out shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be deemed to be on active service. If any such member, not incapacitated by infirmity for service, refuses or neglects so to assemble, as required by the Governor, he shall be deemed to be a deserter.

Period of Active Service.

(4) The period of such service shall continue so long as the Governor shall consider necessary, and shall end only by order of the Governor.

Liable to serve in Colony only.

(5) Nothing in this Ordinance shall render any member liable to serve or proceed on duty without his consent beyond the limits of the Colony.

Under command on active service.

16. Whenever the Force or any part thereof is on active service, or is undergoing drill exercise or inspection, or is doing any duty together with His Majesty's Regular Forces, the Force shall, subject to any regulation under this Ordinance, be under the command of the Officers of His Majesty's Regular Forces so nevertheless that the Force or any part thereof shall when the circumstances of the service admit be led by its own Officers under such command.

Impressment of horses, etc.

17. The Commanding Officer of the Force or of any company, detachment or party thereof may, when the Force or any part thereof is called out for active service, impress horses, carts, riding and driving gear and boats and their accessories, or any article as the service may require.

Compulsory Service.

Persons liable to serve furnish name and age.

18. (1) Every male person resident in the Colony between the ages of eighteen and forty-one years, shall within four months of his becoming liable under this Ordinance furnish his full name the date of his birth and nationality to the Officer Commanding who shall enter the same in an alphabetical Register to be kept by him.

To report movements to or from Colony.

(2) Every person so registered and liable to serve in the Defence Force shall on each occasion of his leaving or returning to the Colony notify the Officer Commanding.

(3) Upon any person ceasing to be liable to serve under this Ordinance the Commanding Officer shall strike his name out of the Register.

Persons liable to serve.

19. Every male British subject over the age of eighteen and under the age of forty-one years resident in the Colony, not being exempt under section 22 of this Ordinance, shall be liable to serve in the Defence Force.

Application of compulsory service.

20. In the event of the Defence Force being called out for active service as herein before provided, and the Governor considering it expedient that the numerical strength of the Force

should be increased, the Governor may by proclamation call upon and require any or all such person or persons as are mentioned in the preceding section, not being members of the Force or exempt under the next succeeding section to join and serve with the Force so called out, and every such person shall be required to assemble at such place and perform such service as may be directed by the Governor and shall be subject to the provisions of this Ordinance and shall serve as a member of the Force accordingly.

21. If the number of persons called up under the preceding sections is greater than the number required by the Governor, the Officer Commanding shall draw by ballot from all the names on the register until the names of a sufficient number of persons have been drawn, and the persons whose names are so drawn shall serve as members of the Force for such time as the Force may continue called out on active service.

Ballot.

22. (1) The persons specified in Schedule B to this Ordinance shall be exempt from service in the Defence Force:

Exemption from service
Schedule B.

Provided that they may so serve, if they desire to do so, and the Governor sanctions their doing so.

(2) Any person liable to serve in the Defence Force may, at the discretion of the Governor, be discharged annually from such liability upon paying into the Colonial Treasury the sum of twenty-five pounds for each and every year or portion of a year that he is liable to serve. All moneys paid under this subsection shall be applied to the purposes of the Force.

Special exemption by
Governor.

Immunities.

23. (1) No action shall lie against any member of the Defence Force, nor shall he be subject to any penalty or punishment, for any act or thing done by him, while paraded under arms:

Immunities of
Members.

Provided that the act or thing was done in pursuance of a lawful command given to him by the Governor or a Magistrate or his Commanding Officer, or in defence of his post or person or otherwise in the lawful performance of his duty.

(2) No action shall be brought against any person for anything done by him under this Ordinance, unless the same shall be commenced within three months after the act complained of was committed, nor unless notice in writing of such action shall have been given at least one month before such action was commenced.

(3) In every action brought against any person for anything done by him under this Ordinance, the plaintiff shall expressly allege in his statement of claim that such act was done either maliciously or without reasonable and probable cause or through gross negligence, and if at the trial of such action he fails to prove such allegation, he shall be nonsuited, or a verdict shall be given for the defendant.

(4) Any person who is sued for anything done by him in pursuance of this Ordinance may plead the general issue and give this Ordinance in evidence for his defence, and in case the plaintiff in such action shall be nonsuited or shall discontinue his suit or shall have judgment given against him, he shall pay to the defendant double costs.

(5) Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall exempt any person from being prosecuted, tried and convicted before the ordinary tribunals of the Colony for any felony, misdemeanour or offence against any law for the time being in force in this Colony.

Provided that no person shall be punished twice for the same offence.

(6) Every member of the Defence Force shall be allowed a reasonable time for going to and returning from any drill, parade or other service, and, if in uniform, he shall not be liable during such time, or when on duty at drill, parade or other service, to have his person, horse, harness or conveyance arrested or taken in execution by any civil process issued out of any Court whatever.

Discipline.

Offences Schedule C.

24. (1) Every member of the Defence Force who shall be guilty of any of the offences specified in the first column of Schedule C to this Ordinance shall be liable to pay a fine not exceeding the amount set opposite such offence in the second column of that Schedule.

Fines of £1 and under

(2) Fines in respect of the said offences for which the limit of the fine is one pound and under may be imposed by the Commanding Officer.

Fines over £1.

Offences in respect of which the limit of fine exceeds one pound shall only be imposed by the Commanding Officer after an investigation by a Court of Inquiry.

Fines to go to funds Force.

(3) All fines inflicted for any of the said offences shall go to the funds of the Force, and, if not paid within ten days, shall be recoverable summarily as a civil debt, under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, or any Ordinance amending the same, by the Commanding Officer or any Officer of the Force authorized by him.

Arrest for breach of Discipline.

25. (1) If any member of the Force, while on duty with the Force or any part thereof, or while wearing the uniform or accoutrements of such Force disobeys any lawful order of any Officer under whose command he then is, or is guilty of misconduct, the officer then in command of the Force or any superior officer under whose command the Force or part thereof then is may order the offender, if an Officer, into arrest and, if not an Officer, into the custody of any member of the Force.

Provided that the offender shall not be kept in such arrest or custody longer than during the time the Force or such portion thereof as aforesaid then shall remain on duty. For the purposes of this provision any such member, while going or returning to or from any place of exercise, drill or assembly of the Force, or any part thereof, shall be deemed to be on duty so long as he continues to wear the clothing or accoutrements of the Force.

Arrest to be forthwith reported.

(2) Every such arrest as aforesaid shall be forthwith reported to the Commanding Officer or such other Officer as may be prescribed in that behalf by the regulations.

26. (1) The Commanding Officer may, subject to such appeal to the Governor as is hereinafter mentioned, discharge from the Force any member thereof and strike him off the strength, either for disobedience of orders by him, while on duty with the Force, or for neglect of duty or misconduct by him as a member of the Force, or for other sufficient cause, the existence and sufficiency of the cause to be judged by the Commanding Officer or, in a case of appeal, by the Governor.

Expulsion from Force.

(2) The member so discharged shall nevertheless be liable to deliver up in good order, fair wear and tear only excepted, all arms, ammunition, clothing and appointments, being public property or property of the Force, issued to him and to pay all moneys due or becoming due by him under this Ordinance under the rules or regulations, either before or at the time or by reason of his discharge.

Liability after discharge.

(3) Any member who feels aggrieved by such discharge may appeal to the Governor at any time within fourteen days after such discharge, and the Governor may cancel or confirm such discharge or give such other directions with reference thereto as to him may seem just and proper, and his determination shall be binding on all persons.

Appeal to Governor.

27. (1) The provisions of the Army Act shall as far as applicable apply to the discipline of the Force or any part thereof when on active service, or undergoing drill, exercise, training or inspection, together with His Majesty's Regular Forces or any part thereof, subject nevertheless to the following modifications:—

Discipline on Active Service.

(a) That no member of the Defence Force shall for any offence against the Army Act be subject to the penalty of death, or to any longer term of imprisonment than five years.

(b) That no sentence of a Court Martial for the trial of a member of the Force shall be carried into execution unless confirmed by the Governor.

(2) Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to limit or derogate from the power given by section one hundred and seventy-seven of the Army Act to the General Officer Commanding His Majesty's Forces with which the Force is serving of making such exceptions or modifications as in the same section are referred to.

Financial.

28. Whenever any Member shall be called out under this Ordinance on active service away from his place of residence he shall be entitled to receive if willing to do so his travelling expenses from and to such residence, and it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix the rate and amount of such expenses.

When travelling expenses are payable to Members.

29. Every member called out under this Ordinance on active service shall receive from the Government such pay and allowances, quartering and billeting, as the Governor shall from time to time direct, and while in receipt of such will not be entitled to claim pay from his employer, except at such times and under such conditions as are hereinafter specified.

Pay and Allowances on active service.

Relief to families of
Members called out on
Active Service.

30. Every member who when called out under this Ordinance on active service shall leave a wife or a wife and family unable to support herself or themselves shall during the period of absence on such active service be entitled to relief for his wife and family and it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix the amount of such relief, consideration being given to the amount of the pay and allowances granted under the preceding section to the member himself.

Pensions to members
disabled on service and
to widows and families
of those killed on serv-
ice.

31. Every member of the Force who shall have received wounds or injuries when called out under this Ordinance on active service and the widows and families of all such members who may have been killed or have died within twelve months after having been wounded of wounds received during such active service or have died within twelve months from illness directly traceable to fatigue or exposure incident to such active service shall be entitled to such pensions or gratuities as shall be fixed by the Governor provided that no pension or gratuity under this section shall exceed the sum of two hundred pounds (£200).

Payment of members
by employer on release
from military duties.

32. (1) When on the written request of an employer a member is permitted or instructed by the Commanding Officer temporarily to resume his civil employment no payment shall be made by the Government in respect of the period during which such Member shall be released from military duty, and the employer shall pay full wages to the Member in respect of such time as he shall work for his employer during the period of such release.

(2) Should any employer apply for the temporary services of any Member other than his own employee, he shall be responsible for the full payment, at the current rate of wages, of such members as may by the Commanding Officer with the approval of the Governor be selected to perform such work in respect of such time as they or any of them are thus employed.

33. It shall be lawful for the Colonial Treasurer subject to the Regulations and on the warrant of the Governor to pay annually out of the Revenue of the Colony to the Officer Commanding for the purposes of the Force, capitation grants, not exceeding the following rates:—

For every Member of the Force qualifying in any year as efficient:—

- (a) in drilling or musketry the sum of thirty shillings (30/-).
- (b) in both drilling and musketry the sum of two pounds (£2).

Force funds and prop-
erty vested in Com-
manding Officer.

34. All moneys subscribed by or to or for the use of the Force or any company or Club of the Force and all effects and other property belonging to the Force or any company or Club of the Force and the exclusive right to sue for and recover current subscriptions, arrears of subscriptions and other moneys due to the Force or to any Company or Club of the Force shall vest in the Commanding Officer for the time being and his successors in office, with power for him and them to bring actions, to make

contracts and conveyances and to do all other lawful things in respect of or relating to the same; and any civil or criminal proceedings taken by virtue of this section by the Officer Commanding shall not be discontinued or abated by his death, resignation or removal from office, but may be carried on by and in the name of his successors.

35. Any money or fine recoverable under this Ordinance may be recovered in a summary way in the Magistrate's Court notwithstanding the amount may be in excess of the ordinary jurisdiction of that Court. Recovery.

Inspections.

36. An inspection of the Force may from time to time be held by an Officer of His Majesty's Regular Forces, nominated by the Governor for the purpose, at such times as the Governor may direct, and such Inspecting Officer shall report in writing to the Governor as to the efficiency or otherwise of the Force. Inspections by Officers' Regular Forces,

Regulations.

37. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time make, amend and revoke regulations consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance as he shall deem proper for:— Governor to make Regulations.

- (a) regulating muster, instruction and rifle practice;
- (b) fixing standards of efficiency and extra efficiency;
- (c) the storing and issuing of arms and ammunition;
- (d) targets, butts and shooting ranges;
- (e) the composition and proceedings of Courts of Inquiry;
- (f) the general government and good discipline of the Defence Force; and
- (g) giving further and better effect to the provisions of this Ordinance.

(2) Any such regulations may provide for the punishment or penalty of any infraction thereof.

(3) Every regulation made under this section shall be published in the Gazette.

Committee of Force.

38. There shall be a Committee of the Force composed of the Officer Commanding and six members to be elected at a General Meeting of the Members of the Force to be held annually. Two of the elected members shall retire in rotation each year, but shall be eligible for re-election. Any casual vacancy on the Committee during the course of a year may be filled by the Committee until the next annual General Meeting. Committee of Force.

39. The Committee may from time to time make amend and revoke Rules for the management and maintenance by annual subscription or otherwise of the Social Club of the Force, to be called "The Defence Force Club", and for the property finances and civil affairs of the Force; Committee may make Rules.

Provided that such rules shall not have effect unless and until the Commanding Officer thinks fit to transmit the same to the Governor for his approval and such approval has been notified by the Governor to the Commanding Officer to be by him forthwith communicated to the Force, whereupon the rules so approved shall be binding on all members and shall be published in the Gazette.

Fines under rules.

40. The Rules may provide for the payment by Member of fines not exceeding ten shillings for any infringement thereof as may be imposed by the Committee, and for the payment of the amount of any damage done to the property of the Club.

Courts of Inquiry.**Governor may convene Court of Inquiry.**

41. (1) The Governor may at any time convene a Court of Inquiry, composed of officers or other persons, or of both, to inquire into any matter relative to the Force or to any Company or any part thereof or to any Officer or other member of the Force and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained in such inquiry and, if required, to report upon the same for his information.

Commanding Officer may convene Court of Inquiry.

(2) The Commanding Officer of the Force may at any time convene a Court of Inquiry composed of Officers to inquire into any matter relative to any Company or to any non-commissioned officer or private thereof and to record the facts and circumstances ascertained on such inquiry and, if required, to report on the same for his information and assistance.

Power of Court.

(3) Every Court of Inquiry shall have power to bring any member of the Force before it, either by summons or, if necessary, by warrant of apprehension directed to any Police officer or constable.

Non-attendance.

(4) If any person summoned or ordered to attend as a witness before a Court of Inquiry, after payment or tender of reasonable expenses of his attendance:—

- (a) makes default in attending or in being in attendance; or
- (b) refuses to take an oath or affirmation which the Court of Inquiry requires him to take; or
- (c) refuses to produce any document in his power or control which the Court of Inquiry lawfully requires him to produce; or
- (d) refuses to answer any question which the Court of Inquiry lawfully requires him to answer; or
- (e) is guilty of any contempt of the Court of Inquiry by causing any interruption or disturbance in its proceedings or otherwise;

Presidents powers.

the President of the Court of Inquiry may certify the default, refusal or contempt under his hand to a Judge or Magistrate having power to deal with or punish persons guilty of like acts or omissions in his Court, and such Judge or Magistrate may thereupon inquire into the same, and if the person is found guilty, deal with or punish him in like manner as if such default, refusal or contempt had been made or committed before him or in relation to his Court.

Penalties.**Assaulting or resisting members.**

42. If any person assaults or resists, or aids or abets any person in assaulting, or resisting, any member of the Defence Force in the discharge of his duty, he shall be punishable on summary conviction, with a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or with imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months.

43. If any person wilfully obstructs or molests any company or any Officer or member of any Company while on duty, he shall on the prosecution of the Officer Commanding be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding five pounds, and may be arrested or given into custody by the Senior Officer present and conveyed and handed over to the custody of the Police.

Obstructing or molesting member.

44. If any person wilfully commits any damage to any gun, cannon, butt or target, hut, shed, emplacement, magazine or other property lawfully used by His Majesty's Regular Forces or the Defence Force, or without the leave of the Officer Commanding searches for bullets in or otherwise disturbs the soil of or near any such gun, cannon, butt or target, hut, shed, emplacement or magazine, he shall on the prosecution of the Officer Commanding be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every such offence.

Wilful injury to guns, butts, etc.

45. (1) If any person designedly makes away with, sells, pawns, wrongfully destroys or damages or negligently loses anything issued to a member of the Force, or refuses or neglects, when lawfully required, to produce, exhibit or deliver, on demand anything which he is liable under this Ordinance or the Rules or Regulations made thereunder to produce exhibit or deliver the value thereof shall be recoverable from him summarily, under the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, by the Commanding Officer or any Officer authorized by him, and he shall also for every such offence, be liable, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

Wrongful detention or disposal of arms etc.

(2) Whoever knowingly buys or takes in exchange or in pawn from any member of the Force or person acting on his behalf or solicits or entices any member of the Force to sell or pawn or knowingly assists or acts for any member of the Force in selling or pawning or has in his possession or keeping, without satisfactorily accounting for the same, any arms, ammunition, clothing, appointments, musical instruments or necessaries, being public property or the property of the Force, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a sum not exceeding five pounds for every such offence.

46. If any person fails to furnish his full name the date of his birth and nationality to the Officer Commanding as required, under the provisions of this Ordinance he shall on summary conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds

Failure to furnish name etc.

47. If any employer or person, by threats or otherwise, wilfully prevents or endeavours to prevent any one from becoming a member of the Defence Force or at any time serving as a member of the Force, the Commanding Officer may institute proceedings against such employer or person, and such employer or person shall be liable on summary conviction, if the offence be committed in peace time, to a fine not exceeding twenty five pounds, and if committed at any time during which the Force or any part thereof is on active service, to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, for each such offence or repeated offence.

Prevention of persons from becoming members of Force.

48. In all proceedings under this Ordinance before a Magistrate the Commanding Officer may appear by any Officer of the Force authorized by him in that behalf by writing under his hand.

Appearance of Commanding Officer.

49. Every pecuniary penalty recovered summarily on the prosecution of the Commanding Officer shall be paid to the Commanding Officer and be applied as part of the Funds of the Force.

Application of penalties.

Repeal.

Repeal Schedule D.

50. The Ordinances set out in Schedule D hereto are hereby repealed.

Provided that all Rules Regulations and Standing Order made under the repealed Ordinances and existing and in force prior to the coming into operation of this Ordinance shall remain in force until altered amended or rescinded by any Rules Regulations or Standing Orders made in pursuance of the powers given by this Ordinance.

WE do, by this Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet, appoint you, the said JOHN MIDDLETON, to be, during Our pleasure, Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, with all the powers, rights, privileges, and advantages to the said Office belonging or appertaining.

II. And We do hereby authorise, empower, and command you to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in certain Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster, the Twenty-fifth day of February, 1892, constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our said Colony, together with certain other Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Nineteenth day of September, 1914, providing for the appointment in certain events of a Deputy to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our said Colony, and in certain Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-first day of July, 1908, declaring that the groups of Islands known as South Georgia, the South Orkneys, the South Shetlands and the Sandwich Islands, and the territory known as Graham Land, should become Dependencies of Our said Colony, together with certain further Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-eighth day of March, 1917, providing for the administration of the islands and territories therein defined as dependencies of Our said Colony, or in any other Letters Patent adding to, amending, or substituted for the same, according to such Orders and Instructions as Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief hath already received, and to such further Orders and Instructions as you may hereafter receive from Us.

III. IV. And We do hereby command all and singular Our Officers and loving subjects in Our said Colony and its Dependencies and all others whom it may concern, to take due notice hereof, and to give their ready obedience accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 5 of the Land Tax Ordinance, 1918, it was provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by order to declare, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, the acreage of any lands in every case in which the acreage of such lands has not been ascertained by survey made or the acreage is not stated in the Crown grant or lease under which the lands are held or occupied,

AND WHEREAS by an instrument, dated the 28th day of September, 1859, the lands forming the Peninsula or tract of land on East Falkland Island known as "Lafonia," and more particularly described in the said instrument, together with all the islands in Choiseul Sound, and all other Islands adjacent to the coast of the said Peninsula or tract, were granted to the Falkland Islands Company,

AND WHEREAS the acreage of the said lands has not been ascertained by survey made and is not stated in the said instrument bearing date the 28th day of September, 1859, under which the lands are held,

AND WHEREAS by an order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the fifth day of December, 1918, it was ordered and declared that the acreage of the lands forming the Peninsula or tract of land described in the grant of the same dated the 28th day of September, 1859, together with all the Islands in Choiseul Sound, and all other Islands adjacent to the coast of the said Peninsula or tract, shall for the purposes of the Land Tax Ordinance, 1918, be deemed to be seven hundred thousand acres,

AND WHEREAS by section 5 of the Land Tax Ordinance, 1918, it was provided that every such order shall have full force and effect and shall remain in force until varied or amended in like manner by the Governor in Council, or until such time as a survey of the land shall have been made and the acreage of the land ascertained,

1. The exporter of any Whale or Seal Oil shall, within six calendar months from the date of the clearance outwards of the exporting vessel, deliver to the collector a certificate, in the form annexed hereto, of the quantity of oil landed or discharged from such exporting vessel, and shall make and subscribe a declaration to the truth of the said certificate.

Provided that the said certificate may be delivered to the Collector by a duly authorised agent for and on behalf and at the risk of the exporter; and further, it shall be lawful for the Collector, when it shall not be reasonably possible, in the opinion of the Collector, for the exporter to deliver the said certificate within the period above prescribed, to grant an extension of the period within which the said certificate shall be delivered.

2. If any Whale or Seal Oil exported from the Colony is landed or discharged from the exporting vessel at more than one port outside the Colony, a separate certificate shall be delivered of the quantity landed or discharged at each port of landing or discharge.

3. If the exporter of any Whale or Seal Oil shall fail to comply with any of the foregoing requirements, he shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by article 31 of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Report on the Government Savings Bank for the year 1919-20.

Summary of year's transactions.

1. During the year ended 30th September, 1920, there were 102 new accounts opened and 80 closed, leaving a total of 806 depositors amongst whom the balance in hand (£128,385 - 7 - 10) was distributed. The average for each account was £159 - 17 - 8 or £56 - 18 - 8. per head of the population of the Falkland Islands.

2. The moneys deposited during the year amounted to £32,312 - 9 - 9d. as against £33,435 - 9 - 9, in the year ended 30th September, 1919.

3. The withdrawals amounted to £20,600 - 4 - 3., as against £42,444 - 10 - 10 in the previous year.

10. The interest payable to depositors under the Ordinance is at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ per annum, on every complete pound, that is to say, sixpence on every pound left on deposit for a complete year. It should be remembered that interest is paid only on the pound (not the odd shillings): it is reckoned from the first day of January, April, July or October following the day of deposit, and ceases as from the last day of March, June, September, or December, preceding the day of withdrawal.

11. The Ordinance and the Regulations made thereunder provide for the payment of withdrawals of over £50 by Bill of Exchange. Minors over 7 years of age are authorised to sign as if of full age. Each depositor is provided with a Pass Book in which he is required to sign his name and state his address, in the place provided. Pass Books have to be produced when a deposit is made or money withdrawn, and such books have to be forwarded to the Treasurer for audit purposes, on or before the 30th September in each year.

To prohibit the Importation of Animals, Fodder, and Litter from Chile or Argentina.

By His Excellency JOHN MIDDLETON, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by Section 44 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, power is given to the Governor in Executive Council by Proclamation to prohibit the importation or introduction into the Colony or into any particular port thereof, of any sheep, cattle, horses or other animals, or of any hay, straw, fodder or other article either generally or from any places that may be named in such Proclamation for such periods as he may deem necessary for the purpose of preventing the introduction of any infectious and contagious disorder among sheep, cattle, horses or other animals in this Colony,

AND WHEREAS it has been officially reported that an infectious and contagious disease is prevailing in Chile and Argentina and it is expedient to take measures to prevent the introduction of this disease into the Falkland Islands,

NOW THEREFORE, in virtue of the powers in me vested by the Ordinance aforesaid, I do hereby in Executive Council order and proclaim as follows:

The importation or introduction into the Falkland Islands from Chile or Argentina of any animals except horses and dogs, of hay, chaff or other similar substance commonly used for food of animals, of straw or other similar substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals is prohibited.

The Proclamation of the sixth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and Twenty is hereby repealed.

- (2) Under Section 5 of the Seal Fishery Ordinance, 1899, any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against the Ordinance and shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for each such offence and to forfeiture of any seals or skins found in his possession.
 - (a) Kills or captures or attempts to kill or capture any seal or carries or has in his possession any club, firearm, or other lethal weapon, or any engine, net trap or other device with intent to kill or capture any seal without a licence.
 - (b) Is in or upon any seal reserve with intent to kill or capture any seal therein.
 - (c) Has in his possession or in any ship under his command any seal or skin of which he cannot give a satisfactory account.
- (3) It is provided by Section 12 of the Ordinance aforesaid that one half of any penalty and of the value of any forfeiture recovered under the Ordinance shall be paid to the person who shall prosecute any offender against it or sue for such penalty or upon whose information such penalty is imposed.
- (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Ordinance aforesaid, special consideration, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, will be given to the payment of rewards, on a liberal scale to the person who shall prosecute any offender against the Ordinance, or sue for any penalty, or upon whose information any penalty is imposed.

A Bill to facilitate the enforcement in the Colony of Maintenance Orders made by courts in England and Ireland and vice versâ.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1920."

Definitions.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation, for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependants of the person against whom the order is made, and the expression "dependants" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain; the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy, and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Enforcement in the Colony of maintenance orders made in England and Ireland.

3.—(1) Where a maintenance order has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, been made against any person by any court in England or Ireland, and a certified copy of the order has been transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Governor, the Governor shall send a copy of the order to the prescribed officer of a court in the Colony for registration; and on receipt thereof the order shall be registered in the prescribed manner, and shall, from the date of such registration, be of the same force and effect, and, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, all proceedings may be taken on such order as if it had been an order originally obtained in the court in which it is so registered, and that court shall have power to enforce the order accordingly.

(2) The court in which an order is to be so registered as aforesaid shall, if the court by which the order was made was a court of superior jurisdiction, be the Supreme Court, and, if the court was not a court of superior jurisdiction, be a court of summary jurisdiction.

Transmission of maintenance orders made in the Colony.

4. Where a court in the Colony has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, made a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved to that court that the person against whom the order was made is resident in England or Ireland, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State a certified copy of the order.

5.—(1). Where an application is made to a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony for a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved that that person is resident in England or Ireland the court may, in the absence of that person, if after hearing the evidence it is satisfied of the justice of the application, make any such order as it might have made if a summons had been duly served on that person and he had failed to appear at the hearing, but in such case the order shall be provisional only, and shall have no effect unless and until confirmed by a competent court in England or Ireland.

Power to make provisional orders of maintenance against persons resident in England or Ireland.

(2) The evidence of any witness who is examined on any such application shall be put into writing, and such deposition shall be read over to and signed by him.

(3) Where such an order is made, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, the depositions so taken and a certified copy of the order, together with a statement of the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order is made had been duly served with a summons and had appeared at the hearing, and such information as the court possesses for facilitating the identification of that person, and ascertaining his whereabouts.

(4) Where any such provisional order has come before a court in England or Ireland for confirmation, and the order has by that court been remitted to the court of summary jurisdiction which made the order for the purpose of taking further evidence, that court or any other court of summary jurisdiction sitting and acting for the same place shall, after giving the prescribed notice, proceed to take the evidence in like manner and subject to the like conditions as the evidence in support of the original application.

If upon the hearing of such evidence it appears to the court that the order ought not to have been made, the court may rescind the order, but in any other case the depositions shall be sent to the Secretary of State and dealt with in like manner as the original depositions.

(5) The confirmation of an order made under this section shall not affect any power of a court of summary jurisdiction to vary or rescind that order: Provided that on the making of a varying or rescinding order the court shall send a certified copy thereof to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State; and that in the case of an order varying the original order the order shall not have any effect unless and until confirmed in like manner as the original order.

(6) The applicant shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against a refusal to make a provisional order as he would have had against a refusal to make the order had a summons been duly served on the person against whom the order is sought to be made.

6.—(1) Where a maintenance order has been made by a court in England or Ireland, and the order is provisional only and has no effect unless and until confirmed by a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony, and a certified copy of the order, together with the depositions of witnesses and a statement of the grounds on which the order might have been opposed has been transmitted to the Governor, and it appears to the Governor that the person against whom the order was made is resident in the Colony, the Governor may send the said documents to the prescribed officer of a court of summary jurisdiction, with a requisition that a summons be issued calling upon the person to show cause why that order should not be confirmed, and upon receipt of such documents and requisition the court shall issue such a summons and cause it to be served upon such person.

Power of court of summary jurisdiction to confirm maintenance order made by courts in England and Ireland.

(2) A summons so issued may be served in the Colony in the same manner as if it had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the person happens to be.

(3) At the hearing it shall be open to the person on whom the summons was served to raise any defence which he might have raised in the original proceedings had he been a party thereto, but no other defence, and the certificate from the court which made the provisional order stating the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order was made had been a party to the proceedings shall be conclusive evidence that those grounds are grounds on which objection may be taken.

(4) If at the hearing the person served with the summons does not appear or, on appearing, fails to satisfy the court that the order ought not to be confirmed, the court may confirm the order either without modification or with such modifications as to the court after hearing the evidence may seem just.

(5) If the person against whom the summons was issued appears at the hearing and satisfies the court that for the purpose of any defence it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the provisional order for the taking of any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.

(6) Where a provisional order has been confirmed under this section, it may be varied or rescinded in like manner as if it had originally been made by the confirming court, and where on an application for rescission or variation the court is satisfied that it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the order for the purpose of taking any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.

(7) Where an order has been so confirmed, the person bound thereby shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against the confirmation of the order as he would have had against the making of the order had the order been an order made by the court confirming the order.

Power of Secretary of State to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

7. The Secretary of State may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.

Mode of enforcing orders.

8.—(1) A court of summary jurisdiction in which an order has been registered under this Ordinance or by which an order has been confirmed under this Ordinance, and the officers of such court, shall take all such steps for enforcing the order as may be prescribed.

(2) Every such order shall be enforceable in like manner as if the order were for the payment of a civil debt recoverable summarily :

Provided that if the order is of such a nature that if made by the court in which it is so registered, or by which it is so confirmed, it would be enforceable in like manner as an order of affiliation, the order shall be so enforceable.

(3) A warrant of distress or commitment issued by a court of summary jurisdiction for the purpose of enforcing any order so registered or confirmed may be executed in any part of the Colony in the same manner as if the warrant had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the warrant is executed.

9. The Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902 shall apply to proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance in like manner as it applies to proceedings under that Ordinance, and the power of the Chief Justice to make rules under section seventy of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, shall include power to make rules regulating the procedure of courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Application of Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

10. Any document purporting to be signed by a judge or officer of a court in England or Ireland shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been so signed without proof of the signature or judicial or official character of the person appearing to have signed it, and the officer of a court by whom a document is signed shall until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been the proper officer of the court to sign the document.

Proof of documents signed by officers of court.

11. Depositions taken in a court in England or Ireland for the purpose of this Ordinance may be received in evidence in proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

A Bill to facilitate the enforcement in the Colony of Maintenance Orders made by courts in England and Ireland and vice versâ.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1920."

Definitions.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation, for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependants of the person against whom the order is made, and the expression "dependants" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain; the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy, and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Enforcement in the Colony of maintenance orders made in England and Ireland.

3.—(1) Where a maintenance order has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, been made against any person by any court in England or Ireland, and a certified copy of the order has been transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Governor, the Governor shall send a copy of the order to the prescribed officer of a court in the Colony for registration; and on receipt thereof the order shall be registered in the prescribed manner, and shall, from the date of such registration, be of the same force and effect, and, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, all proceedings may be taken on such order as if it had been an order originally obtained in the court in which it is so registered, and that court shall have power to enforce the order accordingly.

(2) The court in which an order is to be so registered as aforesaid shall, if the court by which the order was made was a court of superior jurisdiction, be the Supreme Court, and, if the court was not a court of superior jurisdiction, be a court of summary jurisdiction.

Transmission of maintenance orders made in the Colony.

4. Where a court in the Colony has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, made a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved to that court that the person against whom the order was made is resident in England or Ireland, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State a certified copy of the order.

5.—(1). Where an application is made to a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony for a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved that that person is resident in England or Ireland the court may, in the absence of that person, if after hearing the evidence it is satisfied of the justice of the application, make any such order as it might have made if a summons had been duly served on that person and he had failed to appear at the hearing, but in such case the order shall be provisional only, and shall have no effect unless and until confirmed by a competent court in England or Ireland.

Power to make provisional orders of maintenance against persons resident in England or Ireland.

(2) The evidence of any witness who is examined on any such application shall be put into writing, and such deposition shall be read over to and signed by him.

(3) Where such an order is made, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, the depositions so taken and a certified copy of the order, together with a statement of the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order is made had been duly served with a summons and had appeared at the hearing, and such information as the court possesses for facilitating the identification of that person, and ascertaining his whereabouts.

(4) Where any such provisional order has come before a court in England or Ireland for confirmation, and the order has by that court been remitted to the court of summary jurisdiction which made the order for the purpose of taking further evidence, that court or any other court of summary jurisdiction sitting and acting for the same place shall, after giving the prescribed notice, proceed to take the evidence in like manner and subject to the like conditions as the evidence in support of the original application.

If upon the hearing of such evidence it appears to the court that the order ought not to have been made, the court may rescind the order, but in any other case the depositions shall be sent to the Secretary of State and dealt with in like manner as the original depositions.

(5) The confirmation of an order made under this section shall not affect any power of a court of summary jurisdiction to vary or rescind that order: Provided that on the making of a varying or rescinding order the court shall send a certified copy thereof to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, and that in the case of an order varying the original order the order shall not have any effect unless and until confirmed in like manner as the original order.

(6) The applicant shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against a refusal to make a provisional order as he would have had against a refusal to make the order had a summons been duly served on the person against whom the order is sought to be made.

6.—(1) Where a maintenance order has been made by a court in England or Ireland, and the order is provisional only and has no effect unless and until confirmed by a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony, and a certified copy of the order, together with the depositions of witnesses and a statement of the grounds on which the order might have been opposed has been transmitted to the Governor, and it appears to the Governor that the person against whom the order was made is resident in the Colony, the Governor may send the said documents to the prescribed officer of a court of summary jurisdiction, with a requisition that a summons be issued calling upon the person to show cause why that order should not be confirmed, and upon receipt of such documents and requisition the court shall issue such a summons and cause it to be served upon such person.

Power of court of summary jurisdiction to confirm maintenance order made by courts in England and Ireland.

(2) A summons so issued may be served in the Colony in the same manner as if it had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the person happens to be.

(3) At the hearing it shall be open to the person on whom the summons was served to raise any defence which he might have raised in the original proceedings had he been a party thereto, but no other defence, and the certificate from the court which made the provisional order stating the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order was made had been a party to the proceedings shall be conclusive evidence that those grounds are grounds on which objection may be taken.

(4) If at the hearing the person served with the summons does not appear or, on appearing, fails to satisfy the court that the order ought not to be confirmed, the court may confirm the order either without modification or with such modifications as to the court after hearing the evidence may seem just.

(5) If the person against whom the summons was issued appears at the hearing and satisfies the court that for the purpose of any defence it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the provisional order for the taking of any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.

(6) Where a provisional order has been confirmed under this section, it may be varied or rescinded in like manner as if it had originally been made by the confirming court, and where on an application for rescission or variation the court is satisfied that it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the order for the purpose of taking any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.

(7) Where an order has been so confirmed, the person bound thereby shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against the confirmation of the order as he would have had against the making of the order had the order been an order made by the court confirming the order.

Power of Secretary of State to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

7. The Secretary of State may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.

Mode of enforcing orders.

8.—(1) A court of summary jurisdiction in which an order has been registered under this Ordinance or by which an order has been confirmed under this Ordinance, and the officers of such court, shall take all such steps for enforcing the order as may be prescribed.

(2) Every such order shall be enforceable in like manner as if the order were for the payment of a civil debt recoverable summarily :

The Imperial Bureau of Mycology is the outcome of a proposal unanimously adopted by the Imperial War Conference in 1918 that a central organisation should be established for the encouragement and co-ordination of work throughout the

Empire on the diseases of plants caused by fungi, in relation to agriculture. The Committee of Management consist of some of the foremost biologists in the Country with Viscount Harcourt as their Chairman, and includes the following members:- Professor I. Bayley Balfour, M.D., D.Sc., F.R.S., Mr. W. Bateson, F.R.S., Professor V. H. Blackman, F.R.S., Professor F. O. Bower, F.R.S., Mr. A. D. Cotton, F.R.S., Professor H. H. Dixon, F.R.S., Professor J. B. Farmer, F.R.S., Captain A. W. Hill, F.R.S., Professor W. H. Lang, F.R.S., Sir Daniel Morris, K.C.M.G., Mr. J. Murray, Mr. G. H. Pethybridge, B.Sc., Sir David Prain, C.M.G., C.I.E., F.R.S., Dr. A. B. Rendle, F.R.S., Mr. H. N. Ridley, C.M.G., F.R.S., Professor R. A. Robertson, F.R.S.E., Sir A. E. Shipley, F.R.S., Professor W. Somerville, F.R.S., and Dr. H. W. T. Wager, F.R.S.

Dr. E. J. Butler, late Imperial Mycologist, Director of the Research Institute, Pusa, and Agricultural Adviser to the Government of India, has been appointed Director and has started work at the headquarters of the Bureau, No. 17, Kew Green, Kew (Telephone Richmond 603). This site has the advantage of proximity to the fine library and collections of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, with the Director and staff of which the Bureau will work in co-operation.

The funds of the Bureau are entirely provided by contributions from the various self-governing Dominions, India, Egypt, and Soudan, and the non-self-governing Colonies and Protectorates. It will work broadly on the lines of the existing Imperial Bureau of Entomology at South Kensington, and will aim at doing for the other great class of destructive agencies in agriculture, namely the diseases and blights of plants caused by fungi, what the older Bureau has so successfully done in regard to injurious insects. It will be a central agency for the accumulation and distribution of information and for the identification of specimens sent in from all parts of the Empire. It is proposed to issue, as soon as funds permit, a periodical journal through which those interested in mycological work in regard to agriculture will be kept informed of progress

elsewhere. There are at present over fifty officials engaged in this work in the overseas parts of the Empire, while the number of agriculturists, planters and the like practically interested is legion.

The effect of fungus diseases in reducing crop production is great beyond calculation. A Canadian scientist has estimated the loss caused by rust in wheat in the prairie region of Canada in 1917 at at 100,000,000 bushels, representing a value of between £25,000,000 and £50,000,000. For the same year the loss in the five chief cereals in the United States exceeded 400,000,000 bushels. The effect of this on the provisioning of the world may be easily imagined.

It is hereby notified, for general information, that an Anglo-German Mixed Arbitral Tribunal has been established under Article 304 of the treaty of Versailles, and is about to begin work in London.

A great part of the work of the Tribunal is to decide as to debts under Article 296 of the Treaty where a difference has arisen between an enemy debtor and an enemy creditor or between the British and German clearing offices. Under Article 297 the Tribunal can determine compensation to be borne by Germany in respect of damage or injury inflicted on the property, rights or interests of British Nationals in German territory as they existed on August 1, 1914, by the exceptional war measures or measures of transfer mentioned in the Annex to that Article. The other matters within the jurisdiction of the Tribunal are set out in Articles 299, 300, 304, 305, and 310 of the Treaty.

The procedure before the Tribunal is to some extent regulated by Sections III to VII of part X of the Treaty, but the Tribunal has settled further and more detailed rules dealing with the manner in which claims must be submitted.

The following rules deal with the time for presentation of Claims:-

RULE 1. The time within which claims are to be submitted to the Tribunal shall be as follows:-

- (a) Appeals under Article 296, Annex, paragraph 20.

Within thirty days of the communication of the joint decision of the two clearing offices to the Appellant.

- (b) Claims under Article 297.

Within twelve months from the date of the publication of these rules in the place at which such claimant is residing, or within six months from the date on which the claimant learnt that damage or injury had been inflicted on his property, rights or interests, or within six months from the date on which the Claimant learnt that restitution under section (f) of the said Article had been made or refused, whichever period is the longer.

- (c) Claims under Article 305.

Within twelve months of the publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, or within twelve months of the date on which the decision was given, or within six months of the date on which such decision came to the knowledge of the Claimant, whichever period is the longer.

- (d) In all other cases.

Within twelve months from the date of the publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, with the exception of those cases provided for in Rule 22 where the lim-

itations of time imposed by these rules are stated not to apply.

After the expiration of the times prescribed by this rule, no claim will be accepted without the special leave of the Tribunal.

RULE 2. All claims, answers and other written proceedings must be delivered or sent by post to the Tribunal Secretariat at 21 St. James's Square, London, S.W. 1.

A complete copy of the Rules of Procedure of the Tribunal may be seen at the Colonial Secretary's Office.

Report on Currency Note Accounts for the year 1920.

The Note Guarantee Fund.

1. Under the provisions of the Principal Order 1899, the coin received by the Commissioners in exchange for the notes issued, (put into circulation) has to form the Note Guarantee Fund.

2. On the 1st January 1920 this fund amounted to £18,000. During the year the "Note Issue" was increased to £20,000, and the £2,000 received in coin by the Commissioners was allocated as follows:—

Placed to the credit of the "Coin Portion"	£1,000

3. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, the Note Guarantee Fund has to be divided into two parts (a) The Coin Portion, and (b) The Investment Portion. Under the provisions of the Currency Note (Amendment) Order 1920, there may be kept in the United Kingdom either in coin or invested in such manner as the Secretary of State shall approve, such part of the coin portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, not exceeding two-thirds thereof, as the Secretary of State from time to time may direct, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Principal Order.

(a) **THE COIN PORTION.** During the year the coin portion was increased from £9,000 to £10,000, and is divided between the Commissioners and the Crown Agents. viz:— £4,000 in the Commissioners safe in the Colony, and £6,000 with the Crown Agents, deposited with the London County Westminster and Parrs' Bank.

(b) **THE INVESTMENT PORTION.** During the year the Investment portion was increased by a sum of £1,000, which was expended in the purchase of approved Securities, and the total sum so expended on behalf of the Fund amounts to £10,000.

The Note Depreciation Fund.

4. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, a sum equal to one per cent of the cost price of the Securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund has to be set aside annually to form a Depreciation Fund, until such time as the latter is not less than ten per cent of the cost price of the Securities forming the said Investment Portion. A separate account has to be kept of the Depreciation Fund to form part of the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.

5. During the year the Note Depreciation Fund was increased by a sum of £109 : 4 : 5, which was expended in the purchase of approved Securities. The total of the Fund now amounts to the sum of £1,000, which represents a sum equalling 10% of the cost price of the Securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.

Summary of Year's Transactions.

6. On the 1st January 1920, the face value of the Notes in circulation amounted to £18,000. During the year a further issue of Notes was made by the Commissioners amounting to a face value of £2,000, leaving in circulation at the end of the year, £20,000, viz:—

Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 2 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902.

1. No hulk shall be moored to swing to the North of the middle of the Inner harbour nor to the West of a line drawn north from the flagstaff on Victory Green nor to the East of a line drawn north from the East slaughter house.

2. No ship or hulk shall be moved in the Harbour save under the direction or with the permission in writing of the Harbour Master, and a fee of £1 shall be paid for every such permission, unless such removal has been ordered by the Harbour Master. Any hulk having fixed moorings may return thereto without additional fee.

3. In every case where it may be necessary to change the position of a vessel or hulk for the purpose of receiving or discharging cargo or for any other purpose, such vessel or hulk must be moved under the direction of the Harbour Master.

4. Vessels at anchor outside the limits assigned to hulks shall exhibit, from sunset to sunrise, the following light or lights:-

A vessel under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall carry forward, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a WHITE LIGHT in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

A vessel of 150 feet or upwards in length, when at anchor, shall carry in the forward part of the vessel, at a height of not less than 20 feet and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, one such light, and at or near the stern of the vessel, and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light, another such light.

5. No person shall collect, remove or cause to be removed any timber or wood for any purpose whatsoever, from the foreshores of the Harbour without the written permission of the Harbour Master.

6. Permission in writing shall be obtained from the Harbour Master for the removal of any sand, stone or gravel from the foreshores of the Harbour.

7. The Masters of vessels who may require water shall apply to the Harbour Master. Water will be supplied on payment of 2/6 per ton of 220 gallons.

8. No ballast, dunnage, ashes or rubbish of any description whatever shall be thrown into the water of the Harbour.

9. Masters of vessels who may require a lighter for the disposal of ashes, dunnage, rubbish, &c. shall apply to the Harbour Master who will cause a lighter to be placed alongside the vessel for that purpose.

10. Masters of vessels who may wish to discharge ballast shall communicate with the Harbour Master who will direct the disposal of same.

11. Masters of vessels who may desire to haul up on the beaches of the Harbour any boat or craft shall apply to the Harbour Master who will direct where such boat or craft shall be placed.

12. No sand, shingle, gravel or tussac shall be allowed to remain upon any Government Jetty or landing place within Two YARDS from the edge of such jetty or landing place.

13. The Regulations made on the 23rd of December, 1902 are hereby repealed.

Regulation made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 4 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1906.

Regulation No. 18 of the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the Pensions Ordinance 1906 is repealed and replaced by the following:-

18. If any officer to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance or under any previous Law or Regulations is appointed to another office in the service of the Colony, or in any other public service, then during his tenure of such office so much only (if any) of his pension shall be paid to him as, together with any pension received by him in respect of other public service, and with the salary and fees of such office, makes up an amount not greater than the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer at any time in the course of his service in the Colony or other public service; provided that where the officer retired or was transferred from the service of the Colony prior to the 1st January, 1920, the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer in the course of his service in the Colony, shall for the purposes of this Regulation be deemed to be the highest pensionable emoluments actually so drawn by him plus fifty per cent thereof; and also provided that any bonus or temporary increase, whether on pension or on the salary of the new office, granted in view of cost of living, shall be added to such pension or salary, as the case may be, for the purposes of this Regulation.

BRITISH LEGATION,
Buenos Aires,
August 5th 1921.

My Lord,

Your Lordship is aware that owing to the claim of Argentina to the ownership of the Falkland Islands, or *Islas Malvinas* as they are invariably called here, foreign vessels have not been allowed to trade between the Argentine and the Islands on the ground that such trade would be a violation of the Argentine law which confines the coastal trade to vessels flying the national flag.

The Ministry of Finance was consulted recently by the Representative of certain Shipping Companies as to whether vessels flying foreign flags may trade between Argentine ports and ports in the Falkland Islands and a reply in the form of an opinion by the Solicitor to the Treasury has been issued to the following effect:-

"However legitimate may be the rights of the Argentine Republic to the Malvinas Islands so long as these islands remain in the possession of the British Government, even though unlawfully so held, the ports of the islands, for the purposes of Argentine customs and coastal laws, must be considered as foreign. In consequence there is no legal obstacle in the way of vessels under foreign flags trading between Argentine ports and Port Stanley or any other port in the Malvinas Islands".

It remains to be seen whether the Argentine Government will accept this opinion and give effect to it by means of a Decree.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting held on the 1st April, 1921.

1. The Minutes of the Meeting held on the 6th December, 1920, were read and confirmed.

2. The Hon. M. C. Craigie-Halkett took the prescribed oath as Acting Treasurer.

3. The Hon. the Acting Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following documents:-

- (1) A telegraphic despatch from the Secretary of State, dated the 12th March, 1921, relative to the decision of the Admiralty to close the Submarine Cable.
- (2) A telegraphic despatch from the Secretary of State, dated the 22nd of March, 1921, relative to the decision of the Admiralty to close down the Naval Wireless Station.
- (3) A Statement of the imports of milk, butter, and cheese for the years, 1918, 1919, and 1920.

4. The Governor invited the Council to consider, having regard to the decision of the Admiralty notified in the Secretary of State's telegrams of the 12th and 22nd of March, the means by which telegraphic communication should be maintained.

The following resolutions were moved by the Hon. the Acting Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Hon. G. I. Turner :-

- (1) That the cordial thanks of the Colony should be conveyed to His Majesty's Government for the generous proposal that the Naval Wireless Station should be transferred to the Colonial Government as a free gift.
- (2) That telegraphic communication should be maintained but at a less cost than would be incurred in working the Naval High Power Wireless Station.

The resolutions were adopted.

5. With reference to the Statement of the Imports of milk, butter and cheese, which had been laid on the table, the Governor invited the Council to consider the measures which should be adopted for the improvement of the milk supply of Stanley.

The following resolution was moved by the Hon. the Acting Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Hon. G. I. Turner:

The Council approves in principle of the following measures being adopted for the improvement of the milk supply of Stanley:-

- (1) The gradual improvement of the existing pasturage by the draining of marsh land and by the sowing of suitable grasses.
- (2) The provision of a larger area for grazing.
- (3) The importation of stock for crossing with local cattle.
- (4) The provision of winter food by planting of tussac grass on suitable areas on the coast.

The resolution was adopted.

6. The Governor invited the attention of the Council to the scale of fees payable, under the Regulations of the 6th of November, 1920, by patients in the King Edward Memorial Hospital. His Excellency stated that with the approval of the Council and pending reconsideration of the scale of fees, he proposed that the fee payable for midwifery cases should be fixed temporarily at £2 and that this fee should include care, treatment, and medical attendance, irrespective of the period for which the patient remained in hospital.

The Council concurred.

Rules made by the Superintendent of the Stanley Volunteer Fire Brigade under Section 6 of the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance No. 3 of 1898.

1. Each Member shall promptly obey all orders which he may receive from those in authority over him, and shall conform to all rules which may from time to time be made by the Superintendent.
2. The Brigade shall provide each Member with an armlet.
3. No member can be recognised at any drill or fire as a Member of the Fire Brigade unless wearing his armlet, and no Member shall appear in his armlet except he is on duty.
4. The Brigade shall meet for drill &c., not less than twelve times yearly, the time to be as directed by the Superintendent.
5. Members failing to attend such drills &c., shall pay the sum of TWO SHILLINGS & SIXPENCE into the funds of the Brigade, unless such Members produce satisfactory evidence of inability to attend.
6. Members leaving Stanley, for any period of time whatsoever, shall inform the Superintendent 12 hours prior to their departure. Failure to report departure from Stanley shall entail a fine of TWO SHILLINGS & SIXPENCE which shall be paid into the funds of the Brigade.
7. The Brigade when assembled for drill &c., shall be deemed to be on Active Duty and no Member shall leave such drill &c., without the permission of the Superintendent or Officer in Command. A Member leaving such drill &c. without permission shall be deemed to be in default and shall pay the sum of FIVE SHILLINGS into the funds of the Brigade.
8. Any matter of importance or general application, such as an alteration of the Rules &c., shall be decided at a Committee Meeting of the Brigade and then submitted to His Excellency the Governor for his consideration.
9. Nothing in these Rules contained shall affect the liability of any Member to any punishment or penalty to which he is liable at Common Law or under Ordinance No. 3 of 1898, Stanley Fire Brigade.

All previous Rules are hereby repealed.

An Ordinance

To facilitate the enforcement in the Colony of Maintenance Orders made by courts in England and Ireland and vice versa.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921."

Definitions.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation, for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependants of the person against whom the order is made, and the expression "dependants" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain; the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy, and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Enforcement in the Colony of maintenance orders made in England and Ireland.

3.—(1) Where a maintenance order has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, been made against any person by any court in England or Ireland, and a certified copy of the order has been transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Governor, the Governor shall send a copy of the order to the prescribed officer of a court in the Colony for registration; and on receipt thereof the order shall be registered in the prescribed manner, and shall, from the date of such registration, be of the same force and effect, and, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, all proceedings may be taken on such order as if it had been an order originally obtained in the court in which it is so registered, and that court shall have power to enforce the order accordingly.

(2) The court in which an order is to be so registered as aforesaid shall, if the court by which the order was made was a court of superior jurisdiction, be the Supreme Court, and, if the court was not a court of superior jurisdiction, be a court of summary jurisdiction.

4. Where a court in the Colony has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, made a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved to that court that the person against whom the order was made is resident in England or Ireland, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State a certified copy of the order.

Transmission of maintenance orders made in the Colony.

5.—(1). Where an application is made to a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony for a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved that that person is resident in England or Ireland the court may, in the absence of that person, if after hearing the evidence it is satisfied of the justice of the application, make any such order as it might have made if a summons had been duly served on that person and he had failed to appear at the hearing, but in such case the order shall be provisional only, and shall have no effect unless and until confirmed by a competent court in England or Ireland.

Power to make provisional orders of maintenance against persons resident in England or Ireland.

(2) The evidence of any witness who is examined on any such application shall be put into writing, and such deposition shall be read over to and signed by him.

(3) Where such an order is made, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, the depositions so taken and a certified copy of the order, together with a statement of the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order is made had been duly served with a summons and had appeared at the hearing, and such information as the court possesses for facilitating the identification of that person, and ascertaining his whereabouts.

(4) Where any such provisional order has come before a court in England or Ireland for confirmation, and the order has by that court been remitted to the court of summary jurisdiction which made the order for the purpose of taking further evidence, that court or any other court of summary jurisdiction sitting and acting for the same place shall, after giving the prescribed notice, proceed to take the evidence in like manner and subject to the like conditions as the evidence in support of the original application.

If upon the hearing of such evidence it appears to the court that the order ought not to have been made, the court may rescind the order, but in any other case the depositions shall be sent to the Secretary of State and dealt with in like manner as the original depositions.

(5) The confirmation of an order made under this section shall not affect any power of a court of summary jurisdiction to vary or rescind that order: Provided that on the making of a varying or rescinding order the court shall send a certified copy thereof to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, and that in the case of an order varying the original order the order shall not have any effect unless and until confirmed in like manner as the original order.

(6) The applicant shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against a refusal to make a provisional order as he would have had against a refusal to make the order had a summons been duly served on the person against whom the order is sought to be made.

6.—(1) Where a maintenance order has been made by a court in England or Ireland, and the order is provisional only and has no effect unless and until confirmed by a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony, and a certified copy of the order, together with the depositions of witnesses and a statement of the grounds on which the order might have been opposed has been transmitted to the Governor, and it appears to the Governor that

Power of court of summary jurisdiction to confirm maintenance order made by courts in England and Ireland.

the person against whom the order was made is resident in the Colony, the Governor may send the said documents to the prescribed officer of a court of summary jurisdiction, with a requisition that a summons be issued calling upon the person to show cause why that order should not be confirmed, and upon receipt of such documents and requisition the court shall issue such a summons and cause it to be served upon such person.

(2) A summons so issued may be served in the Colony in the same manner as if it had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the person happens to be.

(3) At the hearing it shall be open to the person on whom the summons was served to raise any defence which he might have raised in the original proceedings had he been a party thereto, but no other defence, and the certificate from the court which made the provisional order stating the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order was made had been a party to the proceedings shall be conclusive evidence that those grounds are grounds on which objection may be taken.

(4) If at the hearing the person served with the summons does not appear or, on appearing, fails to satisfy the court that the order ought not to be confirmed, the court may confirm the order either without modification or with such modifications as to the court after hearing the evidence may seem just.

(5) If the person against whom the summons was issued appears at the hearing and satisfies the court that for the purpose of any defence it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the provisional order for the taking of any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.

(6) Where a provisional order has been confirmed under this section, it may be varied or rescinded in like manner as if it had originally been made by the confirming court, and where on an application for rescission or variation the court is satisfied that it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the order for the purpose of taking any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.

(7) Where an order has been so confirmed, the person bound thereby shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against the confirmation of the order as he would have had against the making of the order had the order been an order made by the court confirming the order.

Power of Secretary of State to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

7. The Secretary of State may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.

Mode of enforcing orders.

8.—(1) A court of summary jurisdiction in which an order has been registered under this Ordinance or by which an order has been confirmed under this Ordinance, and the officers of such court, shall take all such steps for enforcing the order as may be prescribed.

(2) Every such order shall be enforceable in like manner as if the order were for the payment of a civil debt recoverable summarily :

Provided that if the order is of such a nature that if made by the court in which it is so registered, or by which it is so confirmed, it would be enforceable in like manner as an order of affiliation, the order shall be so enforceable.

(3) A warrant of distress or commitment issued by a court of summary jurisdiction for the purpose of enforcing any order so registered or confirmed may be executed in any part of the Colony in the same manner as if the warrant had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the warrant is executed.

9. The Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902 shall apply to proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance in like manner as it applies to proceedings under that Ordinance, and the power of the Chief Justice to make rules under section seventy of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, shall include power to make rules regulating the procedure of courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Application of Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

10. Any document purporting to be signed by a judge or officer of a court in England or Ireland shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been so signed without proof of the signature or judicial or official character of the person appearing to have signed it, and the officer of a court by whom a document is signed shall until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been the proper officer of the court to sign the document.

Proof of documents signed by officers of court.

11. Depositions taken in a court in England or Ireland for the purpose of this Ordinance may be received in evidence in proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Depositions to be evidence.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Seal Fishery (Dependencies) Regulations, 1921.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under Section 3 of the Whale Fishery Ordinance No. 5 of 1908.

1. These regulations may be cited as the Whaling Regulations, 1921.
2. The expression "Whaling Officer" as used in these regulations shall mean such officer as the Governor may appoint to enforce the provisions of the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908.

3. Whaling licences in the form annexed may be issued for and in respect of the following places:-

- (a) Falkland Islands.
- (b) South Georgia.
- (c) South Shetlands.
- (d) South Orkneys.
- (e) South Sandwich Islands.

and shall be valid for the period from 16th September to the 31st May next following.

4. Every person desiring to obtain a licence to kill, take, or hunt whales, shall apply in writing to the Colonial Secretary and shall give the following particulars:-

- (a) If an individual, his full name, nationality, description and address.
- (b) If a private company, the full name, nationality, description and address of each partner, and if a limited company, the same particulars regarding each director.
- (c) The names of all vessels to be employed.
- (d) The number and cubic capacity of all open and pressure boilers.
- (e) The carrying capacity of the Floating factory in tanks and barrels.

The applicant shall shew to the satisfaction of the Governor that he possesses or commands sufficient working capital to ensure the proper working of the licence applied for.

5. Applications for licences shall be delivered at the Colonial Secretary's Office on or before the first day of May preceding the season during which the applicant proposes to operate.

6. The Governor may in the exercise of his discretion refuse to grant a licence to an applicant without giving any reason for refusal.

7. A licence shall not be transferable unless the approval of the Governor has been first applied for and obtained.

8. A licence in Form A of the Schedule may authorize the use of either one or two Floating Factories in conjunction with not more than two whale catchers provided that in special circumstances the use of an additional whale catcher may be authorized by separate licence in Form B. of the schedule.

9. The following fees shall be payable for licences:-

- (a) either one or two Floating Factories and two whale catchers £200.
- (b) an additional whale catcher £100.

10. A whale catcher shall not be used, without the sanction of the whaling officer, to hunt or take whales, or attempt to hunt or take whales until such time as the floating factory or land station for which it operates is ready to utilize immediately any whales taken.

11. Floating Factories shall utilize the following parts of all whales taken under licence namely:-

- (a) Head.
- (b) Jawbones.
- (c) Tongue.
- (d) Tail (from the vent to the flukes)
- (e) Inside fat.

12. The number of flensed whale carcasses waiting to be dealt with at one time, either at a land station, or attached to any vessel or mooring shall not exceed twenty.

13. The whaling officer may prohibit the use of any licensed whale catcher for taking whales, when, in his opinion the further taking of whales would lead to an accumulation of whale matter that could not be utilized without undue waste.

14. Pressure boilers shall not be used for storing oil until whale catching has ceased for the season.

15. No person shall kill, hunt, or take, or attempt to kill, hunt, or take any whale calf or female whale accompanied by a calf.

16. Returns shall be rendered to the whaling officer on or before the 10th day of June in each year giving the following particulars:-

- (a) number and description of whales taken each month.
- (b) number of barrels of oil of various grades produced each month.
- (c) quantity of baleen obtained.
- (d) quantity of guano manufactured.

17. The holder of a lease of a land site for whaling purposes shall not have the right to use any bays or anchorages for the purpose of mooring whales without the sanction of the whaling officer first being applied for and obtained.

18. The holder of a licence, shall, at his own expense remove or alter the position of any moorings laid down in the waters of the Colony or any Dependency of the Colony, or on land, on being required to do so by the whaling officer.

19. The holder of a licence who commits or allows or negligently suffers a person employed by him to commit a breach of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for each offence and any person employed by him who commits a breach of these regulations shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £10 for each offence.

20. Any person who refuses to obey the lawful order of the whaling officer shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these regulations and shall be liable to the penalties set forth in the preceding regulation.

21. These regulations shall apply to the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

22. The following regulations made under the Whale Fishery Ordinance No. 5 of 1908, as amended by No. 5 of 1912, are hereby repealed:-

- (a) Whaling regulations made on the 28th day of July, 1913.
- (b) Whaling regulations made for South Georgia on the 28th day of July, 1913.
- (c) Whaling regulations made for South Georgia on the 24th day of June, 1920.

1. His Majesty the King has been pleased to approve of the privilege of wearing uniform, granted to ex-officers of Dominion Forces and Colonial Volunteers under local conditions, which is now effective only within local limits, being extended to cover the wearing of uniform on special occasions at home and elsewhere throughout His Majesty's Dominions.

2. His Majesty has also been pleased to approve that the privilege of retaining rank by such officers should be extended to be effective throughout His Majesty's Dominions.

3. These privileges will be limited to an officer who held a commission between the 5th August, 1914 and the date of the termination of the War, midnight of 31st August as notified to you in my telegram of 16th August.

4. Military officers in this country who have relinquished their commissions and who have been permitted to retain their rank, also officers who have been demobilised or disembodied, are permitted to wear uniform on special occasions when attending ceremonies and entertainments of a military nature, and on occasions when the wearing of uniform would appear appropriate, this limitation should be observed in respect of officers of the Colonial Volunteer Forces who have relinquished their commissions and have been permitted to retain their rank under due authority by notification in the local Gazette.

5. The uniform should be restricted to service dress and should be that of the unit or of the general list to which the officer belonged when he relinquished his commission or was demobilised. The badges of rank should be those of the rank he held when demobilised or that retained by him when he quitted the service.

REVENUE.

1. The Revenue for the Year 1920 amounted to the sum of £71,557 : 16 : 5. Included therein are sums received under the Land Ordinance 1903, in respect of Land Purchases.

2. The ordinary Revenue amounted to £64,165 : 16 : 7 ; representing £35,497 13 : 11 for "Falklands", and £28,688 : 2 : 8 for the "Dependencies".

3. The Revenue, exclusive of "Land Sales", exceeded the Expenditure by £10,590 17 : 0. The total Revenue was £4,444 : 16 : 5 over, and the total Expenditure £5,743 0 : 5, under the original Estimate for 1920.

4. The Falklands Revenue, exclusive of Land Sales, exceeded Falklands Expenditure by a sum of £2,177 : 9 : 4. The Dependencies Revenue exceeded Dependencies Expenditure by a sum of £8,433 : 7 : 8.

5. The following Table shows the actual amount of Revenue collected during the year from the Falklands and Dependencies, and the increase or decrease on the original Estimate for 1920 :-

8. The total receipts in respect of Export duties on Whale Oil and Seal Oil shew a decrease on the original Estimate, amounting to £6,662 : 19 : 4.

9. On the 1st October, 1920, the Export duty on Whale Oil and Seal Oil was increased from 1/6 to 5/- per barrel of 40 Gallons. The actual amount collected at the increased rate was £500, representing duty on 2,000 barrels of Oil exported from South Georgia in November 1920. Of the total amount of £19,038 : 0 : 8 received in respect of duty on Whale Oil during the year, a sum of £10,497 : 4 : 4 was transferred to the Dependencies Research and Development Fund, leaving a balance for transfer to that Fund of £8,540 : 16 : 4.

10. The sums received during the year under the "Land Tax Ordinance, 1918" amounted to £8,693 : 14 : 2, or £6 : 5 : 10 under the Estimate for 1920.

EXPENDITURE.

11. The Expenditure for the year amounted to the sum of £53,574 : 19 : 7, representing £33,320 : 4 : 7 for the "Falklands" and £20,254 : 15 : 0 for the "Dependencies". Expenditure under Dependencies includes a sum of £6,000 provided under Head XXII, Public Works Extraordinary (Item 10) Wireless Station for South Georgia. The amount was unexpended during the year on the service for which it was provided, and in accordance with instructions received, was transferred to the credit of the Dependencies Research and Development Fund.

This amount when added to the accumulated savings of £4,037 : 8 : 10 at the beginning of the year 1915, makes a total net saving in ordinary Revenue over Expenditure up to the 31st December 1920, of £69,280 : 15 : 1.

15. There is no public Debt. On the other hand the Colony has a Land Sales Fund amounting to £159,394 : 5 : 11, and a Stock Fund amounting £2,280 : 14 : 9, which together with accumulated ordinary Revenue of £69,280 : 15 : 1, makes a total surplus of £230,955 : 15 : 9.

*(includes a sum of £6,000 transferred to the Dependencies Research and Development Fund).

16. The sums received during the year in respect of Land purchases (transferred to the Land Sales Fund) amounted to £7,391 : 19 : 10. On the 31st December 1920, the Fund amounted to £159,394 : 5 : 11. The Securities held by the Fund amounted to £158,737 : 13 : 5, leaving an uninvested amount at the end of the year of £656 : 12 : 6. This amount has since been invested.

17. The monies standing to the credit of the Depositors in the Govt. Savings Bank at the end of the year amounted to £128,799 : 19 : 6, as against £118,270 : 7 : 11 on the 31st December, 1919, or an increase during the year of £10,529 : 11 : 7. All the money so deposited, with the exception of *£19,033 : 15 : 4, was invested in approved Securities. The dividends received from these Securities during the year, amounted to £4,485 : 7 : 1, of this amount a sum of £2,899 : 12 : 11 was expended during the year in payment of interest to Depositors, expenses of Management &c., also a sum of £100 as contribution General Revenue on working account of Savings Bank, and a sum of £1,240 in the purchase of Securities for Savings Bank Depreciation Fund, leaving a balance for investment on the years transactions of £245 : 14 : 2.

18. The Securities held on account of the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund at the beginning of the year amounted to £1,625 : 8 : 4. The dividends received during the year, including a sum of 13/4 remaining uninvested from the previous year, amounted to £121 : 16 : 3. The whole of this sum, together with the sum of £1,240 mentioned in para : 15 above, was expended in the purchase of Securities for the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund. The Securities held on account of the Fund on 31st December, 1920, amounted to £2,987 : 4 : 7.

19. Specie to the value of £7,010 (£7,000 in silver and £10 in copper) was imported by the Col. Govt., during the year. To meet local requirements the Currency Note issue was increased from £18,000 to £20,000. The arrangement made in 1901, between the Falkland Is. Co., Ltd., and the Col. Govt., is still in existence whereby One Thousand Pounds is paid to the Crown Agents in London at the end of each month, and a simultaneous repayment is made from the Colonial Treasury.

Seasons.

2. The late spring and summer were much better than the previous year for stock. The winter has been more severe, with less rain but more snow than usual.

Sheep.

2. I am pleased to be able to report that the general health of the sheep continues to be good.

(a) There has been no infectious or contagious diseases among the animals in the Islands, and the sheep on the East Island are freer from parasitic disease than last year, there being only a few isolated cases of Lice, and this pest bids fair to be shortly stamped out. The West Falklands and the Islands are free from lice.

(b) The total number of sheep in the Islands is now 667,677 showing an increase of 21,939 over last years total, this is partly due to the better lambing season, also to there being no export of sheep, and to the fact that there was no Canning this year, owing to the factory at Goose Green being closed down for the season.

(c) The lambing season was good, some of the stations showing a high rate of increase.

(d) 30 Rams were imported from England, the number would have been larger, but exportation was stopped owing to an outbreak of Foot and Mouth disease.

(e) There were no sheep canned this season, but a larger number were boiled down, the largest percentage being from the East Island.

Cattle.

4. The number of cattle in this years return is 7,674 showing an increase of 307 from last year. On some of the stations new blood is badly needed, and there does not seem sufficient care and thought taken in the production of milk and butter.

Horses.

5. This years return of horses shows the number to be 2,436, showing a decrease of 50 for the year. Last years return was 2,486, a decrease of 235 from the year previous, although 315 were imported in 1919-20. I consider it most important that the farmers should breed their own horses, and not trust too much to importations, as that is both unreliable and also the animals have to become acclimatised, which takes at least a year. If more stallions of useful breed were introduced, and larger and more productive manadas kept, it would certainly make the question of shortage of horses much easier than it is at present.

Exports.

6. No live stock were exported this season owing to there being no boats coming from the Coast.

Cultivation.

7. It is pleasing to note that some stations have been trying new methods of cultivation, and that the cultivation of hay has been persevered with, also that some stations are planting more Tussac, which if planted and protected will give a quantity of valuable feed for the stock.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1921.

A Bill

To Amend the Licensing Ordinance,
1882.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Licensing Ordinance, (Amendment), 1921".

Definition.

2. Still means any apparatus susceptible of being used for the manufacture or rectifying of spirits and includes any portion of such apparatus.

Importation of Still without permit forbidden.

3. It shall not be lawful for any person to import or to have in his possession a still without having first received a permit in writing under the hand of the Colonial Secretary.

Enforcement of provisions of Ordinance

4. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance, it shall be lawful for any Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Officer of Customs or Constable to enter into and search without warrant any buildings, premises, vessel or boat where there is reasonable cause to suspect that an illicit still may be found and to make such examination or enquiry as may be proper to ascertain whether any offence against this Ordinance has been committed.

Persons unlawfully importing a Still guilty of an offence.

5. Any person unlawfully importing a still into the Colony or Colonial Waters thereof shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Making, erecting, or concealing, or using a Still an offence.

6. Any person found unlawfully in possession of, making, erecting, concealing, or using a still shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Penalty for offences against this Ordinance.

7. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance and any person aiding or abetting in the commission of such offence shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds, or in default of payment to imprisonment with hard labour for a term not exceeding six months.

Application to Dependencies.

8. This Ordinance shall apply to the Dependencies as well as to the Colony.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1921.

A Bill

To Prohibit Persons not being in the Possession of Valid Passports from landing in the Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Passports Ordinance, Short Title. 1921".

2. A person coming from any place out of the Colony shall not, without the special permission of the Governor or of some person deputed in writing by him, land at any place in the Colony unless he has in his possession a valid passport issued to him, not more than two years previously, by or on behalf of the Government of which he is a subject or citizen, or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality or identity.

3. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and in addition to, or instead of such penalty to imprisonment not exceeding six months.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1921.

A Bill

To Consolidate and Amend the Laws
relating to Seal Fishery in the Colony and
its Dependencies.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the
Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as “The Seal Fishery
(Consolidation) Ordinance, 1921”.

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance:—

“Seal” means the fur seal, the hair seal, the sea otter,
the sea elephant, the sea leopard, the sea bear, the sea lion, the sea
dog and any animal of the seal kind.

“Skin” means the skin of any seal.

“Seal reserve” means any portion of land or water
within the limits of the Colony set apart by the Governor in Council
for the breeding of seals.

Appointment of Seal
Fishery Officers.

3. (1) The provisions of this Ordinance shall be enforced
by Seal Fishery Officers.

(2) The following persons shall be seal fishery officers
that is to say, every commissioned officer of any of His Majesty's
ships on full pay, and every officer in the employ of the Government
of the Colony authorised in that behalf by the Governor.

Unlawful to take seal
in the Colony with-
out a licence.

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to kill, take or hunt,
or attempt to kill or take any seal in the Colony or the Colonial
waters thereof, unless he shall first have been duly licenced.

Granting of Sealing
Licences.

5. (1) Such officer as the Governor may appoint for the pur-
pose may grant licences to take seals in the Colony and the Colonial
waters thereof, to such persons as may apply for them, for such periods
and on such terms and conditions as may be approved by the
Governor.

(2) In the case of the breach by the holder of a licence of any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or of the regulations made thereunder or of any of the conditions under which such licence may have been granted, the Governor may, by notice in writing, summarily revoke such licence, and thereupon all rights conferred thereby or enjoyed thereunder shall cease as from a date mentioned in such notice.

Power to revoke licences.

6. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and the intent and object thereof.

Regulations.

(2) Any person guilty of an offence against any provision of the regulations made under this section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty-five Pounds.

7. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to declare, by notification in the Gazette, any Crown land or Colonial waters, or with the consent of the owner or lessee, any private land, to be a seal reserve, and, by notification in the Gazette, to revoke and declare to be no longer in force any such notification as aforesaid.

Seal Reserve.

8. Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in killing or taking seals in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance or contrary to the terms of or beyond the limits specified in any licence granted to him under this Ordinance, shall forfeit any seals so killed or taken, and any seals, seal-oil or skins found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Three Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months for each offence.

Liability of an owner or master of a vessel.

9. Any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding six months for each such offence, and to forfeit any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession:-

Offences and penalties and forfeitures consequent thereon.

(a) Kills, takes or hunts, or attempts to kill or take, any seal in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance.

(b) Has in his possession, or in any vessel under his command, any seal, seal-oil, skins, for the lawful possession of which he cannot account satisfactorily.

10. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance and of any regulation made by the Governor in Council under this Ordinance a seal fishery officer may, with respect to any vessel found within the limits of the territorial waters of the Colony engaged or believed to be engaged or concerned in seal fishing, exercise the following powers:-

Powers of Seal Fishery Officers.

(1) He may go on board at any time.

(2) He may require the owner, master, or crew, or any of them to produce any certificates of registry, licences, official log books, official papers, articles of agreement, muster rolls, and other documents relating to the vessel, which are in their respective possession or control on board the vessel and may take copies thereof or of any part thereof.

(3) He may muster the crew of the vessel.

(4) He may require the master to appear and to give any explanation concerning his vessel and the said certificates of registry,

official log books, official papers, articles of agreement, muster rolls and other documents or any of them.

(5) He may make any examination or enquiry which he deems necessary to ascertain whether any contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance or of any regulation as aforesaid has been committed.

(6) In the case of any person who appears to him to have committed any such contravention he may, without summons, warrant or other process, both take the offender and the vessel to which he belongs and the crew thereof to the nearest port of entry in the Colony or its Dependencies, as defined by the Customs Ordinance, 1903, and bring him or them before a competent court and detain him, it and them in the port until the alleged contravention has been adjudicated upon, or until the master of the said vessel has given security to be approved by the Chief Justice or a Magistrate of the Colony to abide the event of any action, suit, or other legal proceeding that may be instituted in respect of such vessel or of any person belonging thereto, and to pay all penalties, costs and damages that may be awarded them. In any legal proceeding under this subsection the person giving security may be deemed to be the owner of the detained vessel.

Protection of Seal
Fishery Officers.

11. No seal fishery officer shall be liable for any costs or damages in respect of any vessel detained under this Ordinance unless the detention is proved to have been made without reasonable grounds.

Vessel not bringing
to when summoned
or throwing overboard
goods during chase to
be forfeited.

12. If any vessel found in the waters of the Colony and suspected by a seal fishery officer to be engaged or concerned in seal fishing, shall not bring to upon signal made by any ship or boat in His Majesty's service or in the service of the Colonial Government, by hoisting the proper pendant or ensign, whereupon chase shall be given, and any person on board such vessel shall, during chase or before such vessel shall bring to, throw overboard any part of her lading, such vessel shall be forfeited.

Vessel not bringing to
when required to,
penalty £50.

13. If any vessel liable to seizure or examination under this Ordinance shall not bring to when required to do so, the master of such vessel shall forfeit the sum of Fifty Pounds; and on such vessel being chased by any vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or duly employed for enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance, having a proper pendant or ensign hoisted, it shall be lawful for the captain, master or other person having the charge or command of such vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or employed as aforesaid (first causing a gun to be fired as a signal), to fire at or into such vessel, and such captain, master, or other person acting in his aid or by his direction shall be and is hereby indemnified and discharged from any indictment penalty, action, or other proceeding for so doing.

Arrest of persons com-
mitting an offence at a
Seal Reserve.

14. A seal fishery officer may arrest, detain and bring before a competent Court any person committing or appearing to be about to commit an offence on land at any Seal Reserve against the provisions of this Ordinance or any Regulations made thereunder.

Armed Guard may
be stationed at a Seal
Reserve.

15. (1) The Governor may cause an armed guard to be stationed at or in the vicinity of any Seal Reserve for the purpose of the further enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance and may prescribe by order under his hand the manner in which such guard shall perform its duties.

Power of guard to
arrest.

(2) The said guard shall have power to arrest, detain, and bring before a competent court any person committing, or appearing to be about to commit, an offence against the provisions of this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder.

(3) The said guard may use such force as may be necessary to effect an arrest, or to overcome obstruction or to prevent an offence from being committed, and are hereby indemnified and discharged from any indictment, penalty, action, or other proceeding for so doing.

16. If any person obstructs any seal fishery officer or an armed guard acting under the powers conferred by this Ordinance, or refuses or neglects to comply with any requisition or direction lawfully made or given by, or to answer any question lawfully asked by any seal fishery officer or guard, such person shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding six months.

Punishment for obstructing Seal Fishery Officers.

17. If any person shall maliciously shoot at any vessel or boat belonging to His Majesty's Navy, or in the service of the Colonial Government, or shall maliciously shoot at, maim, or wound any officer of the Navy or Colonial Government being duly employed in the prevention of offences against this Ordinance, or any person acting in his aid or assistance, in the execution of his office or duty, every person so offending, and every person aiding, abetting or assisting therein, shall, upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of felony and shall be liable to be imprisoned with hard labour for any period not exceeding three years.

Persons shooting at vessels or officers enforcing Ordinance, guilty of felony.

18. Offences under this Ordinance, or under any regulation made thereunder, may be prosecuted, and penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance, or any regulations thereunder, may be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner, or by action in the Supreme Court of the Colony, together with full costs of suit ;

Prosecution of Offences.

Provided that any penalty imposed by a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace shall not exceed One Hundred Pounds, exclusive of costs, and imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

19. For all purposes of and incidental to the trial and punishment of any person, accused of any offence under this Ordinance and the proceedings, and matters preliminary, and incidental to, and consequential on his trial and punishment, and for all purposes of and incidental to the jurisdiction of any Court, or any constable, or officer with reference to such offence, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was actually committed, or in any place in which the offender may for the time being be found.

Venue.

20. Any penalty adjudged under this Ordinance to be paid by the owner or master, or other person in charge of a vessel may be recovered in the ordinary way, or, if the Court think fit so to order, by distress or arrest and sale of the vessel to which the offender belongs, and her tackle, apparel, and furniture, and any property on board thereof or belonging thereto, or any part thereof.

Recovery of penalties.

21. Service of any summons or other matter in any legal proceedings under this Ordinance shall be good service if made personally on the person to be served, or at his last place of abode, or if made by leaving such summons, or other matter for him on board any vessel, to which he may belong, with the person being, or appearing to be, in command, or charge of such vessel.

Service of summons.

22. The Governor may authorize in writing any person to kill or take, for a scientific or any other special purpose, any seal in the Colony or Colonial waters thereof, and in so doing the person so authorized shall be exempt from any penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance.

THE RUSSIAN FAMINE.

His Excellency the Governor has received from the Lord Mayor of London a copy of the National Appeal, recently issued in view of the terrible calamity which has overwhelmed Russia :-

It is stated that "The Appeals from Russia are unparalleled in their urgency, and in the presence of such misery and want no humane man, whatever his opinion of recent events in Russia may be, will allow his instinct of sympathy to be silenced. Among these hungry and desperate peasants there are millions of children, and of the elders not one in a hundred belongs to any political party. The totally destitute population of the stricken districts, which will perish unless prompt help is rendered, numbers at the very lowest computation ten millions."

Members of the public are invited to contribute to the Fund to be raised locally. Subscriptions will be received by the Colonial Treasurer and forwarded to the Mansion House for the general fund, the administration of which will be under the control of the Joint Council of Red Cross.

The attention of intending importers is drawn to the "Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920" (Imperial) under which the importation and exportation of morphine, cocaine, ecgonine, and diamorphine (commonly known as heroin), and their respective salts, and medicinal opium, and any preparation, admixture, extract or other substance containing not less than one-fifth per cent of morphine or one-tenth per cent of cocaine, ecgonine or diamorphine, is prohibited except under certain conditions. It will therefore be necessary for the importer to furnish Government with a statement in quadruplicate of his requirements, guaranteeing that the consignment in question is required exclusively for legitimate scientific and medicinal purposes, and that re-export is not intended. The importer should also state the name of the firm who is to supply the drugs. These statements should reach the Colonial Surgeon, Stanley, before the 1st June and the 1st December, each year: at the time the importer sends his indent for transmission to the Board of Trade, he should send a copy of his indent to the supplying firm with his usual arrangements as to payments etc.; his firm will then in due course get from the Board of Trade a duplicate copy of the indent with a licence to export from England, the drugs mentioned therein.

That, moreover, putting aside the aforementioned circumstance, the Coastwise Trade Law cannot be strictly applicable as the navigation between these islands is not carried on by national shipping and therefore this cannot suffer the competition which the said law seeks to prevent,

It is resolved

To temporarily authorize vessels under foreign flags to effect operations between the ports of the Falkland Islands and the others of the Republic.

MINUTE No. 4 OF 1921, inviting the Council to approve a further payment to Major F. J. Newnham, in respect of War Gratuity.

Minutes No. 1 to No. 3 were adopted.

At the request of the Honourable H. C. Harding the Council agreed to postpone further consideration of Minute No. 4 pending the return to the Colony of the senior un-official member.

6. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To facilitate the enforcement in the Colony of Maintenance Orders made by Courts in England and Ireland and vice-versa" was read a first time.

On further motion made and seconded, the standing orders were suspended and the Bill was read a second time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 11 and the Title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

7. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To provide for the Imposition of Fees in respect of the grant of Certificates and other matters under the British Nationality and Status of Aliens Act, 1914" was read a first time.

On further motion made and seconded, the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a second time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2, the Schedule and the Title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To apply certain further sums of money to the Service of this Colony for the year ended on the 31st day of December, 1920" was a first time.

On further motion made and seconded, the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill read a second time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2, the Schedule, the Preamble and the Title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

9. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer the Bill "To provide for the refund of one half of the duties of Customs levied and collected under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, between the 1st of October, 1920 and the 30th of September, 1921, on Whale and Seal Oil" was read a first time.

On further motion made and seconded, the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a second time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

Clause 2 was amended to read as follow :

One half of the duties of Customs which were levied, collected and paid upon Whale and Seal Oil, between the first day of October in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty and the thirtieth day of September in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-one, under Section 7 of The Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by The Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920 shall be refunded.

The Preamble was amended to read as follows :

Whereas it is expedient that one half of the duties of Customs levied and collected upon Whale Oil and Seal Oil between the first day of October in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty and the thirtieth day of September in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-one shall be refunded.

The Title was amended to read as follows :

An Ordinance to provide for the refund of one half of the duties of Customs levied and collected, on Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1920 and the 30th of September, 1921, under Section 7 of The Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by The Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

10. With reference to Minute No. 4 of the meeting held on the 1st of April, His Excellency stated that the Consulting Engineers had estimated that the cost of the additional plant necessary to improve the 5 kilowatt set belonging to the Eastern Wireless Station would be £2,729. The Admiralty had subsequently been asked to consider proposals with a view to the reduction of this cost.

11. With reference to Minute No. 5 of the meeting held on the 1st of April, His Excellency stated that the live stock which it had been decided to import, were awaiting shipment to the Colony, and that the planting of Tussac had been commenced.

12. With reference to the Governor's Minute to the Council introducing the Estimates for the year 1916, His Excellency stated that endeavour would be made in the course of the year to complete the work of erecting at William Point the Beacon Light imported in 1912.

13. The Council then adjourned sine die.

An Ordinance

To provide for the service of the Year 1922.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Appropriation Ordinance, 1922". Short Title.

2. The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on 31st December, 1922, a sum not exceeding Forty-six Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-eight Pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1922. Appropriation
£46,838 for service
of year 1922.

An Ordinance

To Prohibit Persons not being in the Possession of Valid Passports from landing in the Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Passports Ordinance, 1921".

Short Title.

2. A person coming from any place out of the Colony shall not, without the special permission of the Governor or of some person deputed in writing by him, land at any place in the Colony unless he has in his possession a valid passport issued to him, not more than two years previously, by or on behalf of the Government of which he is a subject or citizen, or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality or identity.

Landing in Colony without passports forbidden.

3. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and in addition to, or instead of such penalty to imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Penalty for offences against this Ordinance.

An Ordinance
To Consolidate and Amend the Laws
relating to Seal Fishery in the Colony and
its Dependencies.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Seal Fishery (Consolidation) Ordinance, 1921".

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance:—

"Seal" means the fur seal, the hair seal, the sea otter, the sea elephant, the sea leopard, the sea bear, the sea lion, the sea dog and any animal of the seal kind.

"Skin" means the skin of any seal.

"Seal reserve" means any portion of land or water within the limits of the Colony set apart by the Governor in Council for the breeding of seals.

Appointment of Seal Fishery Officers.

3. (1) The provisions of this Ordinance shall be enforced by Seal Fishery Officers.

(2) The following persons shall be seal fishery officers that is to say, every commissioned officer of any of His Majesty's ships on full pay, and every officer in the employ of the Government of the Colony authorised in that behalf by the Governor.

Unlawful to take seal in the Colony without a licence.

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to kill, take or hunt, or attempt to kill or take any seal in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof, unless he shall first have been duly licenced.

Granting of Sealing Licences.

5. (1) Such officer as the Governor may appoint for the purpose may grant licences to take seals in the Colony and the Colonial waters thereof, to such persons as may apply for them, for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be approved by the Governor.

Power to revoke licences.

(2) In the case of the breach by the holder of a licence of any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or of the regulations made thereunder or of any of the conditions under which such licence may have been granted, the Governor may, by notice in writing, summarily revoke such licence, and thereupon all rights conferred thereby or enjoyed thereunder shall cease as from a date mentioned in such notice.

6. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and the intent and object thereof.

Regulations.

(2) Any person guilty of an offence against any provision of the regulations made under this section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty-five Pounds.

7. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to declare, by notification in the Gazette, any Crown land or Colonial waters, or with the consent of the owner or lessee, any private land, to be a seal reserve, and, by notification in the Gazette, to revoke and declare to be no longer in force any such notification as aforesaid.

Seal Reserve.

8. Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in killing or taking seals in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance or contrary to the terms of or beyond the limits specified in any licence granted to him under this Ordinance, shall forfeit any seals so killed or taken, and any seals, seal-oil or skins found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Three Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months for each offence.

Liability of an owner or master of a vessel.

9. Any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding six months for each such offence, and to forfeit any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession:-

Offences and penalties and forfeitures consequent thereon.

(a) Kills, takes or hunts, or attempts to kill or take, any seal in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance.

(b) Has in his possession, or in any vessel under his command, any seal, seal-oil, skins, for the lawful possession of which he cannot account satisfactorily.

10. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance and of any regulation made by the Governor in Council under this Ordinance a seal fishery officer may, with respect to any vessel found within the limits of the territorial waters of the Colony engaged or believed to be engaged or concerned in seal fishing, exercise the following powers:-

Powers of Seal Fishery Officers.

(1) He may go on board at any time.

(2) He may require the owner, master, or crew, or any of them to produce any certificates of registry, licences, official log books, official papers, articles of agreement, muster rolls, and other documents relating to the vessel, which are in their respective possession or control on board the vessel and may take copies thereof or of any part thereof.

(3) He may muster the crew of the vessel.

(4) He may require the master to appear and to give any explanation concerning his vessel and the said certificates of registry, official log books, official papers, articles of agreement, muster rolls and other documents or any of them.

(5) He may make any examination or enquiry which he deems necessary to ascertain whether any contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance or of any regulation as aforesaid has been committed.

(6) In the case of any person who appears to him to have committed any such contravention he may, without summons, warrant or other process, both take the offender and the vessel to which he belongs and the crew thereof to a port of entry in the

Colony or its Dependencies, as defined by the Customs Ordinance, 1903, and bring him or them before a competent court and detain him, it and them in the port until the alleged contravention has been adjudicated upon, or until the master of the said vessel has given security to be approved by the Chief Justice or a Magistrate of the Colony to abide the event of any action, suit, or other legal proceeding that may be instituted in respect of such vessel or of any person belonging thereto, and to pay all penalties, costs and damages that may be awarded them. In any legal proceeding under this subsection the person giving security may be deemed to be the owner of the detained vessel.

**Protection of Seal
Fishery Officers.**

11. No seal fishery officer shall be liable for any costs or damages in respect of any vessel detained under this Ordinance unless the detention is proved to have been made without reasonable grounds.

**Vessel not bringing
to when summoned
or throwing overboard
goods during chase to
be forfeited.**

12. If any vessel found in the waters of the Colony and suspected by a seal fishery officer to be engaged or concerned in seal fishing, shall not bring to upon signal made by any ship or boat in His Majesty's service or in the service of the Colonial Government, by hoisting the proper pendant or ensign, whereupon chase shall be given, and any person on board such vessel shall, during chase or before such vessel shall bring to, throw overboard any part of her lading, such vessel shall be forfeited.

**Vessel not bringing to
when required to,
penalty £50.**

13. If any vessel liable to seizure or examination under this Ordinance shall not bring to when required to do so, the master of such vessel shall forfeit the sum of Fifty Pounds; and on such vessel being chased by any vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or duly employed for enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance, having a proper pendant or ensign hoisted, it shall be lawful for the captain, master or other person having the charge or command of such vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or employed as aforesaid (first causing a gun to be fired as a signal), to fire at or into such vessel, and such captain, master, or other person acting in his aid or by his direction shall be and is hereby indemnified and discharged from any indictment penalty, action, or other proceeding for so doing.

**Armed Guard may
be stationed at a Seal
Reserve.**

14. The Governor may cause an armed guard to be stationed at or in the vicinity of any Seal Reserve for the purpose of the further enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance and may prescribe by order under his hand the manner in which such guard shall perform their duties.

**Penalty for not com-
plying with directions
of Seal Fishery Officer.**

15. If any person refuses or neglects to comply with any requisition or direction lawfully made or given by, or to answer any question lawfully asked by any seal fishery officer or armed guard such person shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding One hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding six months.

**Power to arrest for
breaches of Ordinance.**

16. (1) It shall be lawful for a seal fishery officer or an armed guard to arrest, detain, and bring before a competent court, any person committing or appearing to be about to commit, an offence against the provisions of this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder.

(2) A seal fishery officer or armed guard may use force for the prevention of any such offence, or for the purpose of effecting an arrest.

(3) If any person is killed maimed or hurt by reason of his resisting a seal fishery officer or an armed guard in the execution of the duties of this Ordinance committed to such seal fishery officer or armed guard, neither the seal fishery officer nor the armed guard shall be liable to any punishment or to pay any damages by reason of the person being so killed, maimed or hurt.

**Persons shooting at
vessels or officers
enforcing Ordinance,
guilty of felony.**

17. If any person shall maliciously shoot at any vessel or boat belonging to His Majesty's Navy, or in the service of the Colonial Government, or shall maliciously shoot at, maim, or wound any officer of the Navy or Colonial Government being duly employed

in the prevention of offences against this Ordinance, or any person acting in his aid or assistance, in the execution of his office or duty, every person so offending, and every person aiding, abetting or assisting therein, shall, upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of felony and shall be liable to be imprisoned with hard labour for any period not exceeding three years.

18. Offences under this Ordinance, or under any regulation made thereunder, may be prosecuted, and penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance, or any regulations thereunder, may be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner, or by action in the Supreme Court of the Colony, together with full costs of suit ;

Prosecution of Offences.

Provided that any penalty imposed by a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace shall not exceed One Hundred Pounds, exclusive of costs, and imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

19. For all purposes of and incidental to the trial and punishment of any person, accused of any offence under this Ordinance and the proceedings, and matters preliminary, and incidental to, and consequential on his trial and punishment, and for all purposes of and incidental to the jurisdiction of any Court, or any constable, or officer with reference to such offence, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was actually committed, or in any place in which the offender may for the time being be found.

Venue.

20. Any penalty adjudged under this Ordinance to be paid by the owner or master, or other person in charge of a vessel may be recovered in the ordinary way, or, if the Court think fit so to order, by distress or arrest and sale of the vessel to which the offender belongs, and her tackle, apparel, and furniture, and any property on board thereof or belonging thereto, or any part thereof.

Recovery of penalties.

21. Service of any summons or other matter in any legal proceedings under this Ordinance shall be good service if made personally on the person to be served, or at his last place of abode, or if made by leaving such summons, or other matter for him on board any vessel, to which he may belong, with the person being, or appearing to be, in command, or charge of such vessel.

Service of summons.

22. The Governor may authorize in writing any person to kill or take, for a scientific or any other special purpose, any seal in the Colony or Colonial waters thereof, and in so doing the person so authorized shall be exempt from any penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance.

Special exemption.

23. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Application of Ordinance to Dependencies.

24. The Seal Fishery Ordinance, 1899, and the Seal Fishery Dependencies Ordinance, 1909, are hereby repealed.

Ordinances 1 of 1899 and 6 of 1909 Repealed.

Report of the Government Savings Bank for the Year 1920-21.

The Colonial Secretary,

I beg to submit herewith, in accordance with section 13, of the Savings Bank Ordinance 1888, the following report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank for the period 1st October, 1920, to the 30th September, 1921.

2. During the above mentioned period, the sums credited to the various depositors with accrued interest, exceeded the amount of the withdrawals by a sum of £936 : 13 : 1, leaving a balance of £129,322 : 0 : 11, to the credit of the depositors on the 30th September, 1921, as compared with £128,385 : 7 : 10, on the 1st October, 1920.

3. During this period, 669 deposits were made, as against 374 withdrawals. There were 67 new accounts opened, as against 75 accounts closed, leaving 795 depositors amongst whom the balance of £129,322 : 0 : 11, was divided, which gives an average of about £162., for each account, or about £61 : 3 : 0, per head of the population of the Falkland Islands.

His Excellency the Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following Bye-laws made by the Board of Health, under Sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under Sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894, and approved by the Governor in Council.

1. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1921". Short Title.

2. In these Bye-laws—

Definitions.

"The Board" means the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island.

"Contagious or Infectious Disease" means cholera, plague, yellow fever, smallpox, typhus fever, enteric fever, cerebro spinal fever, scarlatina, scarlet fever, diphtheria, measles, whooping cough, chicken pox, dengue or influenza, and any other disease which may, from time to time, be included by bye-law.

"Occupier" means, in the case of any premises or part of any premises, the person in occupation or having the management or control thereof either on his own account or as agent for some other person.

"Pail" includes any receptacle in which night-soil is deposited.

"Ashpit" means any receptacle whether movable or fixed, for the deposit of house refuse, dust, ashes or rubbish.

"Milk" shall mean cows' milk, and shall not include condensed or tinned milk.

3. The following shall be the duties of the Inspector of Nuisances :- Duties of Inspector of Nuisances.

(1) He shall perform, under the general direction of the Board, all the duties imposed upon him by the Public Health Ordinance and by these Bye-laws.

(2) He shall keep a diary for the information of the Colonial Surgeon and of the Board of Health, containing full particulars of all inspections made by him.

(3) He shall furnish weekly reports to the Colonial Surgeon on the first day, not being a holiday, in each week, and shall render such information as he may be able to furnish with respect to any matter to which the duties of an Inspector of Nuisances relate.

(4) He shall attend meetings of the Board when so required.

(5) He shall, if directed by the Board to do so, superintend the due execution of all works which may be undertaken under the Board's direction for the suppression or removal of nuisances.

(6) He shall enter and inspect between sunrise and sunset, once in every three months, the yards and outbuildings of all premises in the town of Stanley, and he shall report any nuisance found by him without delay to the President of the Board, who shall at once summon a meeting of the Board if any action by the Board is necessary.

(7) He shall cause to be removed from all public drains, water-courses, gutters, ditches, streets, lanes or roads any noxious matter which may be found therein.

(8) He shall make frequent visits of inspection to all bakehouses, butchers' shops, dairies and slaughter houses.

(9) In all matters, not specifically provided for in these bye-laws, he shall observe and execute all the lawful orders and directions of the Board applicable to his office.

Building and night-soil bye-laws to apply to Stanley only.

4. The bye-laws relating to buildings and night-soil shall apply only to that part of the town of Stanley situate on the south side of the Harbour and within two miles of the Cathedral.

BUILDINGS.

New buildings not to be erected or used without sanction of the Board.

5. (1) Before the erection of any new building or extensive repairs, reconstruction or alteration of any existing building shall be commenced, plans of the same shall be submitted to the Board with particulars as to water closets, earth closets, ash pits and cesspools together with a statement of the proposed drainage including the drainage of the site on which the building is to be erected or rebuilt.

(2) There shall be no alteration in the plans as approved by the Board without the sanction of the Board.

(3) No new building shall be inhabited, used or occupied until it has been inspected and approved by the Board.

Requirements in respect of new buildings.

6. New buildings shall conform to the following requirements :-

(1) The site of the intended building shall be dug out to such depth as shall be necessary in the opinion of the Board.

(2) The space between the foundation and the joists shall be not less than twelve inches in height and shall be efficiently ventilated by the insertion of air bricks or gratings in the outer wall.

(3) Every new building shall have gutters or spouts along the eaves thereof with down spouts.

(4) The backyard of every new building shall be provided with a pathway extending along and adjacent to the back of the premises, and such pathway shall be constructed of flat brick laid in cement, of rubble and cement, or other approved material. The width of such pathway shall not be less than four feet and shall slope half an inch to the foot from the building.

(5) The house drain shall be constructed of cement, or other approved material, with sufficient fall, and provided with a grating where the drain leaves the premises or enters the ground.

(6) All barrels, cisterns and tanks for holding water for drinking or for domestic purposes must be furnished with a good and sufficient cover.

(7) Any stone or brick building to be used as a dwelling house shall be constructed with a damp proof course of durable material impervious to moisture. The damp proof course shall be not less than six inches above ground level. A damp proof course may consist of sheet lead, asphalt $\frac{3}{4}$ inch thick, a layer of canvas impregnated with asphalt, cement, slates embedded in cement, or glazed stoneware perforated longitudinally.

(8) Where a chimney is built against a wooden house, the back of such chimney shall be built of brick work of not less than 9 inches in thickness from the foundation to the height of four feet above the arch bar, the remainder of the back and the other sides of the chimney shall be built of brick work of not less than $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in thickness.

(9) Every habitable room shall have at least one window opening direct into the external air and half at least shall be made to open.

(10) Where there is no fireplace or chimney, suitable ventilating apertures having a total sectional area of 50 square inches, shall be provided in addition to the window.

(11) Every closet shall have a window opening direct into the external air not less than 1 foot by 1 foot exclusive of frame.

(12) The floor beneath the seat of the closet shall be paved with tiles or bricks laid in cement, with cement or other approved material, and shall slope backward half an inch to the foot.

7. An ashpit shall be provided, and it shall be constructed of metal, stones or bricks bound together by mortar or cement, and it shall be provided with a removable cover to be constructed of a framework of wood covered with iron, one portion of which shall be movable so as to be easily opened. It shall be of such cubic capacity, not less than 6 feet, as to hold one month's accumulation of rubbish.

Ashpit to be provided.

8. Every pail closet shall be not less than six feet distant from any dwelling house, or if included in the building shall (1) be separated from the rest of the building by at least two doors; (2) shall not overlook the kitchen; (3) shall afford facilities for the removal of night-soil without passing through the passages or rooms of the house; (4) be situated in all respects to the satisfaction of the Board.

Position of pail closets

9. Upon its being shewn to the satisfaction of the Board that a building is so ruinous as to be dangerous to the public safety, the Board may order the immediate removal or demolition of the building, and the owner or occupier shall at once proceed to obey the said order. In the event of the owner or occupier neglecting to obey such order, he shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws, and it shall be lawful for the Board to do whatever may be necessary for the execution of the order and to recover any expenses incurred in so doing from the person or persons on whom the order was made.

Demolition of ruinous buildings.

SANITATION.

10. All fowl-houses, fowl-coops, pig-stys, or any building in which animals are kept must be placed in such position as to the Board may seem best for the prevention of a nuisance and the protection of the health of the inhabitants of the neighbourhood.

Position of out-houses in which animals are kept.

11. Night-soil shall be removed from premises, weather permitting, not less often than once in each week in covered carts. The removal will be effected between the hours of 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. from September to April inclusive, and 10 p.m. and 8 a.m. from May to August inclusive.

Removal of night soil.

- Night-soil not to be put on ground. **12.** No person shall deposit in, upon, or dig into the ground, or place in any ashpit any night-soil.
- Ashpits to be emptied. **13.** The occupier of any premises shall, once at least in every month, remove from such premises the contents of any ashpit belonging thereto.
- Requirements in respect of earth closets. **14.** The occupier of any premises to which is attached any closet or closets not flushed with water, shall :
- (1) Provide every such closet with a movable metal pail for the deposit of night-soil of a capacity sufficient in the opinion of the Board to satisfy the requirements of the household.
 - (2) Cause the seat or sides of every such closet to be so constructed as to admit of the convenient removal of such pail.
 - (3) Cause every such closet to be provided with sufficient peat coom, dry earth, ashes, or other deodorant and with suitable means for the effectual application of such material to the contents of the pail used in such closet.
 - (4) Afford proper facilities to the servants of the Government engaged in removing night-soil for gaining access to the premises.
- Obstruction of persons removing night-soil an offence. **15.** All collected matter under the last preceding section shall be deemed to be the property of the Government, and any person wilfully obstructing any servant of the Government in removing night-soil shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

- Infectious diseases to be notified. **16.** The occupier of any dwelling house in which a case of a disease which appears to be infectious occurs, or the parents or guardian of any child suffering from a disease which appears to be infectious, and a Medical Practitioner attending a case of an infectious disease shall, within twenty-four hours of the appearance of such disease, notify the Colonial Surgeon of the appearance of such disease.
- Precautions deemed necessary by Board to be taken. **17.** Any person, on whose premises any case of a disease of a contagious or infectious nature occurs, shall be bound to take whatever precautions the Board may deem necessary to order such person to adopt for the purpose of preventing the spread of such contagious or infectious disease.
- Compensation to be paid for destruction of articles by order of the Board. **18.** If the Board considers it necessary to order the burning or destroying of any article, in order to prevent the spread of any disease, the owner of such article shall be entitled to receive compensation not exceeding Five Pounds, by order of the Board, with the sanction of the Governor in Council.
- Power to declare stations or premises to be infected. **19.** The Colonial Surgeon or any Medical Practitioner authorized by him may give notice in writing to the Manager of any Station or the occupier of any premises on the East Falkland Island, declaring such Station or premises or any portion thereof to be infected or free from infection, and a copy of such notice shall be affixed to the Gazette Board in Stanley.
- Persons leaving an infected station without permit, guilty of an offence. **20.** Any person leaving a Station or any premises declared to be infected, as in the last preceding section, without a written permit from a Medical Officer stating that, to the best of his knowledge and belief, such person is free from infection shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws.

FOOD PROTECTION.

21. Any person who shall offer, sell or expose for sale any unwholesome meat, poultry, fish or provisions of any kind shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws. Selling unwholesome provisions.

22. Any person who shall sell as pure and unadulterated, any article of food or drink which is adulterated and not pure shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws. Adulteration.

23. Any person selling any adulterated or impure article of food or drink shall be taken to have knowledge of such adulteration or impurity until the contrary shall be proved. Proof of knowledge.

24. Any person who shall sell : Requirements for sale of milk.

- (a) Fresh milk containing less than 3 per cent of milk fat or less than 8.5 of natural solids not fat.
- (b) Milk which is dirty, adulterated or diluted with water or other liquid.
- (c) Skimmed, separated, impoverished or boiled milk for fresh milk.
- (d) Milk from a cow suffering from any form of tuberculosis or from any contagious or infectious disease,

shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws.

25. No person affected with tuberculosis or with any contagious, infectious or cutaneous disease shall attend to or milk cows or carry or handle milk vessels or utensils, or in any way take part in the handling or preparation of milk for sale. Persons infected not to handle milk.

26. From and after the 1st day of May, 1922, no person shall sell milk or keep cows for the purpose of selling milk in Stanley without being duly registered in the Register kept by the board and without first having obtained a licence from the Board to sell milk. Milk sellers to be registered (and licensed).

27. Any person desirous of selling milk in Stanley must first make application in writing to the Clerk of the Board who will then without charge insert the applicant's name and such particulars as may be necessary in the Register. Application for registration by intending milk sellers.

28. The Board may grant a licence on such terms and conditions as may appear necessary in the interests of the public health and such licence shall be for the period of one year and shall be in Form "A" annexed to these bye-laws. No fee shall be charged for a licence granted under this section. Board may grant licences to sell milk.

29. Upon the conviction by a competent court of any person who is the holder of a licence to sell milk, for an offence against the bye-laws relating to the sale of milk, it shall be lawful for the Board summarily to revoke and cancel the licence of such person. Power to cancel licence.

30. It shall be lawful for the Board, when it shall consider it necessary, to order any person licensed to keep cows for the purpose of selling milk to produce a certificate from a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon to the effect that any cow or cows so kept have been examined by the said Veterinary Surgeon and found to be free from tuberculosis or any contagious or infectious disease. Certificate of freedom from infection may be required.

31. (1) Any cow found by a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon to be infected with tuberculosis may be destroyed by order of the Board. Infected cow may be destroyed.

(2) Provided that a compensation not exceeding £5 shall, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, be paid to the owner of such cow.

Approval of Board required before a slaughter house is built.

32. Before any building intended to be used as a slaughter-house can be erected or converted into such, the Board must have submitted to it by the owner for approval a statement detailing the position of such building with plans of the building and premises, and must be satisfied of the necessity for the same, and may withhold or grant its sanction under such terms or conditions as the Board may deem necessary.

GENERAL.

Board's control of markets.

33. No markets shall be held unless the Board has first approved of the same and has sanctioned some place for the holding of such markets, and such markets shall be conducted under terms and conditions to be issued by the Board at the time of giving its sanction.

Depositing rubbish etc. in a drain an offence.

34. Any person who shall discharge or deposit in or on any public road or street or in any water-course, drain or ditch, any stones, earth, weed, sweepings, filth, paper, rags or rubbish of any kind shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws.

Drains, water-courses and ditches to be kept clean.

35. The owner or occupier of any premises shall keep in a thorough state of cleanliness and repair all water-courses, open ditches, or gutters upon his premises and prevent the accumulation of noxious matter by the removal thereof to any place of deposit which the Board may order.

Unlawful to drive animals over open drains.

36. It shall be unlawful wilfully to drive or lead or take horses, cattle, or vehicles over open drains, or to tether horses or cattle in the vicinity of such drains.

Water supplies to be protected.

37. Every occupier of any premises shall be bound to protect the water supply attached to such premises in such a way as may be considered necessary by the Board to secure the utmost possible purity.

Control of new burial grounds.

38. If it shall become necessary to alter in any way the existing Burial Grounds or to lay out any new burial grounds, the alterations or laying out of the same, as the case may be, must be submitted by the Cemetery Trustees or Committee of Management to the Board for its approval, the same to be submitted to the Governor in Council for his approval.

Noxious or offensive trades subject to control of Board.

39. No person shall carry on any noxious or offensive trade namely that of soap-boiler, tallow-melter or tanner or other trade deemed by the Board to be noxious or offensive, without first having obtained the permission of the Board in writing, and such permission shall only be granted subject to such terms and conditions in respect of the situation of the premises in which such noxious or offensive trade may be carried on and otherwise as affecting the public health, as the Board may determine.

Control over vessels in insanitary condition in the Harbour.

40. If it shall be reported to the Inspector of Nuisances that any vessel in the Harbour of Stanley is in an insanitary condition, he shall at once board and inspect the said vessel and report in writing her condition to the Colonial Surgeon, and the Board shall thereupon make such order for cleaning and disinfecting the vessel as may be shewn to be necessary, and the Master or Owner shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws if he fails by negligence or otherwise to carry out the Order of the Board.

41. Any person failing to comply with or committing an offence against any of the provisions of these bye-laws shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for each offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty not exceeding the sum of Five Shillings for each day on which such offence continues after written notice of the said offence or Order from the Board has been served upon him.

Penalty for breach of the bye-laws.

42. The Inspector of Nuisances shall serve all notices or orders issued by the Board and shall prosecute offenders in the Police Court on behalf of the Board.

Inspector of Nuisances to prosecute offenders.

43. The bye-laws shewn in the Schedule hereto are hereby repealed.

A Bill to amend the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922," and shall be read and construed as one with the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921.

Definitions.

2. For the purpose of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependents of the person against whom the order is made; the expression "dependents" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain according to the law in force in that part of His Majesty's dominions in which the maintenance order was made; the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy; and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Power of Governor to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

3. The Governor may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.

Extension of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, to other British Possessions.

4. Where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any British possession or any territory under His Majesty's protection for the enforcement within such possession or territory of maintenance orders made by Courts in the Falkland Islands, the Governor may by Proclamation extend the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, to maintenance orders made by Courts within such possession or territory, and thereupon the said Ordinance shall apply to such maintenance orders as if they had been made in England or Ireland.

5. Sections 2 and 7 of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, are hereby repealed.

Regulations under the Pensions Ordinance, 1906.

—:o:—

Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as "The Pensions Regulations (Amendment), 1922."

Officers transferred to
or from Colony.

2. Every officer who is transferred to or from the service of the Colony from or to the service of any Colony mentioned in the schedule hereto, and whose aggregate service would have entitled him, had it been wholly in the Colony, to a pension under these regulations, shall on his ultimate retirement from service, if he has served for a period of at least twelve months in the Colony, be entitled to a pension which shall bear the same proportion to that to which he would have been entitled had the whole of his service been in the Colony, as the aggregate amount of the salary which he has drawn from the Colony bears to the total sum made up of such aggregate amount, and the aggregate amounts received from the Colonies mentioned in Schedule hereto.

Rights of officers
transferred from the
Falkland Islands.

3. Every public officer who, having held a pensionable office in the Colony for a period of at least twelve calendar months, leaves the service of the Colony for the service of any Colony other than in the last clause mentioned or for service under the Imperial Government and whose aggregate service would have entitled him, had it been wholly in the Colony, to a pension under these regulations, shall on his ultimate retirement from service, be entitled to a pension at the rate of one seven hundred and twentieth ($1/720$) of the amount of his annual salary at the date of his so leaving the service of the Colony as aforesaid, for each calendar month of his service in the Colony.

Provided that his total pension shall in no case be greater than the maximum of two-thirds of the highest salary drawn by him at any time in the course of his service.

Rights of officers
transferred to the
Falkland Islands.

4. Every public officer who, having been in the service of any other Colony not among those mentioned in the schedule hereto or in the service of the Imperial Government, is transferred to a pensionable office in the Colony, and whose aggregate service would have entitled him, had it been wholly in the Colony, to a pension under these regulations, shall, on his retirement from service, and if he has served for a period of at least twelve months in the Colony, be entitled to a pension at the rate of one seven hundred and twentieth ($1/720$) of the amount of his annual salary at the date of such retirement for each calendar month of his service in the Colony, and in every such case there may be added, at the discretion of the Governor, in computing the period of the retiring Officer's service in the Colony, a number of months not exceeding (*a*) one third of the aggregate of his service elsewhere than in the Colony, nor (*b*) two-thirds of his service in the Colony, nor (*c*) in any case sixty months.

5. Regulations No. 20 and No. 21 of the Schedule to the Pensions Ordinance, 1906 are hereby repealed.

His Excellency the Governor, having taken into consideration representations by the local owners of cutters on the subject of the royalty of 10% of each cargo of tussock required to be delivered to Government, has been pleased to order as follows :-

From and after the 1st of April next royalties will not be required.

Persons desirous of cutting tussock on Crown Lands may be granted a licence, which will expire on the 31st of December in each year.

A fee of £5 will be paid for each such licence with an additional fee of £1 per annum in respect of each person employed under the licence in cutting or transporting tussock grass. For the year 1922 the fee payable shall be £3 : 15/- and 15/- respectively.

The conditions of the licence are :

(1) That every bundle of tussock grass shall weigh not less than 20lbs and shall be sold at not more than 6d. a bundle.

(2) That the tussock shall be cut clean and areas shall be cut in rotation leaving no waste.

(3) That no birds or animals in the locality shall be molested, provided that special permission may be granted to kill animals if seriously damaging the tussock.

(4) That the licence shall be forfeited without compensation if any breach of the above named conditions is committed.

(5) If a breach of the second condition of the licence is committed and it is not found possible to fix responsibility, all the licences issued for the place where the breach occurs may be cancelled, on a proportionate amount of the licence fee for the balance of the year for which the licence has been granted being remitted to the licence holders.

Persons found on Tussock Islands or cutting tussock grass without a licence will be prosecuted according to law for trespass and damage.

Ordinance No. of 1922.

A Bill

To provide for the refund of a portion of the duties of Customs levied and collected on Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1921, and the 30th of September, 1922, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, if the market price of the Oil does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duty) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922."

Definition.

2. In this Ordinance term "average market price for the season" means the average market price in the United Kingdom for the period from the 1st day of October, 1921, to the 30th day of September, 1922.

3. A refund of a part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid upon whale and seal oil, between the first day of October, 1921, and the thirtieth day of September, 1922, shall be made in accordance with the following scale :—

4. In the event of any difference of opinion arising as to the average price for the season the decision of the Governor in Council shall be final.

The liquid (No. 6) from sampling site B was found to consist of water containing 0.66 per cent of total solids which consisted largely of soluble phosphates.

REMARKS.

These guanos are very similar in composition to the two previous samples from Kidney Island which were dealt with in Imperial Institute report of the 10th March, 1914. If the guanos were dried until only 20 per cent of moisture remained, they would contain the amounts of manurial constituents shown in the following table, to which corresponding figures for typical Peruvian guanos are added for purposes of comparison :-

From these figures it will be seen that the present samples from Kidney Island are very inferior to good Peruvian guanos in respect of the amounts of nitrogen and phosphoric acid which they contain. The water (sample No. 6) percolating through the guano deposit at site B was found to contain soluble phosphates and it seems likely that the inferior quality of the guano may be due to prolonged leaching by rain water.

The present materials, if shipped in the condition in which they were received at the Imperial Institute would in no case be worth as much as £1 per ton delivered in the United Kingdom. If however facilities could be arranged for drying the guano in the Falkland Islands it would be possible to prepare a partially dried material from guanos Nos. 1, 3, 4 and 5, which could be used as an organic filling material in the manufacture of compound manures, and would be of somewhat higher value. Guano No. 2 would not be suitable for use in this way as it contains little organic matter.

Report on "Sand" from the Falkland Islands.

The sand from Kidney Island which is the subject of this report was forwarded by the Government Geologist and was received at the Imperial Institute in November, 1921.

DESCRIPTION.

The sample weighed 1 lb. and consisted of rounded grains of quartz of uniform size, together with very small quantities of garnet, felspar and hornblende. Some of the quartz grains showed inclusions of rutile.

REMARKS.

This sand contains rather too much iron to be used for the manufacture of the best quality of glass. It could however be employed for the production of glass-ware of medium quality, for which purpose it would be quite satisfactory, in view of its general characters and the large proportion of grains of suitable size.

Annual Medical Report on the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies for the year, 1921.

A. FALKLAND ISLANDS.

(1) General.

Prevalence of Sickness. The place continues to maintain a very high position from a health point of view, there having been no epidemic of any infectious or contagious disease during the year ending 1921. The high winds that prevail are undoubtedly the purifying agent at work, which coupled with rapid atmospheric changes does not appear to be favourable to bacterial development, as virulent sepsis is practically never met with.

(2) Sanitation.

The sanitary state of Stanley is not good; repeated reports have been made on the absence of any proper drainage system, water supply, and the condition of roads, etc., etc. The primitive sanitary conditions that exist in the camp were reported on as being in a satisfactory state but the absence of up-to-date sanitation in these isolated places does not menace the general Public health. The Assistant Colonial Surgeon paid visits of inspection to the different stations in the East Falkland Camp during the year.

(3) Schoolchildren.

Only one of the schoolchildren attending the Government school has been operated upon for tonsils and adenoids; this boy's parents have remarked upon the great improvement which has followed the operation. Parents are not as a rule aware of the bad effect of tonsils and adenoids upon the general health, and intellectual development of their children; and this would be more apparent here if a higher standard of education was available.

P A S S P O R T R E G U L A T I O N S .

1. Applicants for passports, the renewal of passports or endorsements on passports may obtain the necessary forms of application from the Colonial Secretary's Office. Three clear day's notice should be given.

2. The application forms will be given to the applicant together with a Paying-in Form for the Treasury. The prescribed fees which are as follows:-

Passports	Fee 7/6.
Endorsements	2/-
Renewals	2/-

will be paid to the Treasury and the receipt obtained from the Treasury returned to the Colonial Secretary's Office together with the application form duly filled in.

3. Passports are granted by the Falkland Islands Government:-

- (1) To natural-born British subjects;
- (2) To the wives and widows of such persons; and
- (3) To persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Dominions or Colonies, or in India.

A married woman is deemed to be a subject of the State in which her husband is for the time being a subject.

4. Passports are granted:-

- (1) In the case of natural-born British subjects and persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, upon the production of a Declaration made by the applicant, in a Form (A), to be obtained upon application to the Colonial Secretary, verified by a Declaration made by a Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, Physician or Surgeon, resident in the Colony. The applicant's Certificate of Birth and other evidence may also be required.
- (2) In the case of children under the age of 16 years requiring a separate Passport, upon production of a Declaration made by the child's parent or guardian, in a Form (B), to be obtained upon application to the Colonial Secretary.

5. If the applicant for a passport be a naturalized British subject, the Certificate of Naturalization must be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary's Office with the Declaration or Letter of Recommendation.

Naturalized British subjects will be described as such in their Passports, which will be issued subject to the necessary qualifications.

6. Passports are not available beyond two years from the date of issue. They may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, after which fresh Passports must be obtained.

Ordinance No. of 1922.

A Bill

To amend the Maintenance Orders
(Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance,
1921.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the “Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922”, and shall be read and construed as one with the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921.

Short Title.

2. For the purpose of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, the expression “maintenance order” means an order, other than an order of affiliation for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependents of the person against whom the order is made; the expression “dependents” means such persons as that person is liable to maintain according to the law in force in that part of His Majesty’s dominions in which the maintenance order was made, the expression “certified copy” in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy; and the expression “prescribed” means prescribed by rules of court.

Definitions.

3. The Governor may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorized to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.

Power of Governor to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

4. Where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any British possession or any territory under His Majesty’s protection for the enforcement within such possession or territory of maintenance orders made by Courts in the Falkland Islands, the Governor may by Proclamation extend the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921 to maintenance orders made by Courts within such possessions or territory, and thereupon the said Ordinance shall apply to such maintenance orders as if they had been made in England or Ireland.

Extension of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, to other British Possessions.

Repeal of Sections 2
and 7 of the principal
Ordinance.

5. Sections 2 and 7 of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities
for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, are hereby repealed.

A Bill

To secure the Reciprocal Enforcement of judgments obtained in superior courts in this Colony, the United Kingdom and other parts of His Majesty's Dominions or territories under His Majesty's protection.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgements Ordinance, 1922."

Enforcement in Colony of Judgements obtained in the United Kingdom.

2. (1) Where a judgment has been obtained in a superior court in the United Kingdom, the judgment creditor may apply to the Supreme Court of the Colony at any time within twelve months after the date of the judgement, or such longer period as may be allowed by the court, to have the judgment registered in the court, and on any such application the court may, if in all the circumstances of the case they think it is just and convenient that the judgment should be enforced in the Colony, and subject to the provisions of this section, order the judgment to be registered accordingly.

(2) No judgment shall be ordered to be registered under this section if—

- (a) the original court acted without jurisdiction, or
- (b) the judgment debtor, being a person who was neither carrying on business nor ordinarily resident within the jurisdiction of the original court, did not voluntarily appear or otherwise submit or agree to submit to the jurisdiction of that court; or

- (c) the judgment debtor, being the defendant in the proceedings, was not duly served with the process of the original court and did not appear, notwithstanding that he was ordinarily resident or was carrying on business within the jurisdiction of that court or agreed to submit to the jurisdiction of that court; or
- (d) the judgment was obtained by fraud; or
- (e) the judgment debtor satisfies the registering court either that an appeal is pending, or that he is entitled and intends to appeal, against the judgment; or
- (f) the judgment was in respect of a cause of action which for reasons of public policy or for some other similar reason could not have been entertained by the registering court.

(3) Where a judgment is registered under this section:—

- (a) the judgment shall, as from the date of registration be of the same force and effect, and proceedings may be taken there on, as if it had been a judgment originally obtained or entered up on the date of registration in the registering court;
- (b) the registering court shall have the same control and jurisdiction over the judgment as it has over similar judgments given by itself, but in so far only as relates to execution under this section;
- (c) the reasonable costs of and incidental to the registration of the judgment (including the costs of obtaining a certified copy thereof from the original court and of the application for registration) shall be recoverable in like manner as if they were sums payable under the judgment.

(4) Rules of court shall provide:—

- (a) for service on the judgment debtor of notice of the registration of a judgment under this section; and
- (b) for enabling the registering court on an application by the judgment debtor to set aside the registration of a judgment under this section on such terms as the court thinks fit; and
- (c) for suspending the execution of a judgment registered under this section until the expiration of the period during which the judgment debtor may apply to have the registration set aside.

(5) In any action brought in any court in the Colony on any judgment which might be ordered to be registered under this section, the plaintiff shall not be entitled to recover any costs of the action unless an application to register the judgment under this section has previously been refused, or unless the court otherwise orders.

3. Where a judgment has been obtained in the Supreme Court of the Colony against any person, the court shall, on an application made by the judgment creditor and on proof that the judgment debtor is resident in the United Kingdom, issue to the judgment creditor a certified copy of the judgment.

Issue of certificates of judgments obtained in the Colony.

4. Provision may be made by rules of court for regulating the practice and procedure, (including scales of fees and evidence), in respect of proceedings of any kind under this Ordinance.

The revenue of the Falklands, shewn above as amounting to £39,398 : 1 : 10, does not include Dependencies share of the cost of the Central Administration of the Colony, but included therein is the interest derived from Savings Bank Investments which amounted to £4,814 : 5 : 7. In addition to the revenue which was derived from normal sources, the sum of £2,280 : 14 : 9, previously shewn in the published statements of the accounts of the Colony as standing to the credit of the "Stock Fund," was transferred therefrom and credited during the year in the accounts to current revenue under Head 8, "Miscellaneous".

5. On the other hand the expenditure of the "Falklands" which is shewn in paragraph 3, above, as amounting to £47,048 : 13 : 7, includes £2,978 : 11 : 2 expended under Head 24, "Public Works Extraordinary", as well as £5,276 : 17 : 11, under Head 18, "Savings Bank". Of this last named amount, a sum of £2,199 : 7 : 5 was transferred for investment on account of the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund. The total expenditure for the year exceeded the revenue derived from normal sources by a sum of £7,650 : 11 : 9, viz;

THE LAND SALES FUND.

6. On the 1st January, the Land Sales Fund amounted to £159,394 : 5 : 11. During the year a sum of £7,883 : 9 : 8 was received as instalments of land purchases, and credited direct to the fund, making a total of £167,277 : 15 : 7 of which, a sum of £166,375 : 8 : 2, had been expended in the purchase of approved securities, leaving an uninvested balance on the 31st December, of £902 : 7 : 5 in cash in the hands of the Crown Agents.

THE DEPENDENCIES.

7. The gross revenue of the Dependencies amounted to £99,832 : 8 : 1 and exceeded the actual expenditure incurred, (£2,496 : 1 : 2), by a sum of £97,336 : 6 : 11. During the year a total sum of £84,288 : 19 : 5 was made a charge against the revenue of the Dependencies when transferred and credited to the Fund for Research and Development in the Dependencies, leaving a balance of £13,047 : 7 : 6, viz :—

8. An adjustment of the accounts will have to be effected at a later date when the Dependencies share of the cost of the Central Administration of the Colony has been determined.

THE RESEARCH FUND.

9. During the year a sum of £84,288 : 19 : 5, in respect of export duties and remittance charges thereon, was transferred and credited to the Research Fund. From this amount, the Crown Agents refunded in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 4 of 1921, a sum £35,418 : 3 : 7 together with an additional amount of £709 : 15 : 1 in respect of remittance charges ; making a total of £36,127 : 18 : 8, and leaving a balance of £48,161 : 0 : 9. The fund was further augmented by the sum of £1,977 : 13 : 9 derived from Investments. £25,000, of the amount in the hands of the Crown Agents on the 31st December, (£50,138 : 14 : 6) was invested in Treasury Bills.

10. During the year a sum of £22,813 : 9 : 11 was transferred by "adjustment voucher" and credited to the fund, being £18,622 : 2 : 3 from "Deposits" and £4,191 : 7 : 8 from the surplus Balances of the Colony. On the 31st December the fund amounted to £72,952 : 4 : 5, against which there is a known liability of £7,507 : 4 : 7 to be refunded in respect of export duties and remittance charges collected previous to the 31st December.

SURPLUS AND DEFICIT ACCOUNT.

THE GOVERNMENT SAVINGS BANK.

(Ordinance No. 1 of 1888).

23. A copy of the annual report on the Government Savings Bank for the year of account ended 30th September, 1921, is furnished in the attached returns. On the 31st December, the amount standing to the credit of the various depositors in the bank amounted to £128,402 : 11 : 1, of which £115,766 : 4 : 2, was invested, leaving an uninvested balance at the end of the year of £12,636 : 6 : 11. The Savings Bank Depreciation Fund amounted to £5,551 : 8 : 9 on the 31st December, of which £2,399 : 7 : 5 was uninvested.

THE CURRENCY NOTE FUNDS.

(Note Order 1899).

24. A copy of the annual report on the transactions of the Commissioners of Currency for the year ended 31st December, 1921, is also included in the returns furnished herewith. At the end of the year the Face Value of the notes in circulation amounted to £20,000. The Investment Portion of the Fund amounted to £12,000, and was fully invested, as well as the Note Depreciation Fund which amounted to £1,000. At the end of the year the Coin Portion of the Fund held by the Commissioners amounted to £8,000.

THE FINANCIAL POSITION OF THE COLONY.

(Colonial Regulation 344).

25. Most of the moneys forming the capital funds of the Colony have from time to time been invested in stocks and other securities which have greatly depreciated in value since the War. In order to arrive more or less at the real value of such funds ample deduction should be made from their previous value, or the cost price of the securities held, on account of such depreciation ; the depreciation in the market value of such securities is more or less a direct charge against the revenue of the Colony.

26. In accordance with the provisions of Colonial Regulation 344, the Surplus Balances of the Colony amounted to £312,996 : 17 : 11, at the end of the year, viz :-

27. At the end of the year, the depreciation in the market value of the "Investment Portion" of the Savings Bank was £27,570, which less the estimated value of the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund of £5,643, leaves an estimated net depreciation in Savings Bank capital of £21,927.

28. The Land Sales has no Depreciation Fund, but the estimated depreciation in the market value of the Securities held on behalf of the Land Sales Fund at the end of the year was £34,821.

29. At the end of the year, the depreciation in the market value of the Currency Commissioners' "Investment Fund" was estimated at £1,719, which less the estimated value of the "Depreciation Fund" of £869, leaves an estimated net depreciation of £850.

30. As the only investments made on behalf of the Research Fund were in the purchase of Treasury Bills, no depreciation in value was incurred. The sum total of the above mentioned estimated depreciation in capital amounts to £57,598, viz :-

1. This Order may be cited as "The Air Navigation (Colonies and Protectorates) Order in Council, 1922."

2. In this Order and its schedules,

"Colony" means one of the British possessions or protectorates mentioned in the second schedule hereto ;

"Governor" means the officer for the time being administering the Government of the Colony ;

"The Act" means the Air Navigation Act, 1920.

3. The provisions of Sections 7, 8 (1), 9, 10, 11, 12 and 18 of the Act with the necessary modifications as set forth in the first schedule hereto shall be and hereby are extended to the Colonies mentioned in the second schedule hereto.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of April, 1922.

An Ordinance

To amend the Maintenance Orders
(Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance,
1921.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922", and shall be read and construed as one with the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921.

Short Title.

2. For the purpose of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependents of the person against whom the order is made; the expression "dependents" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain according to the law in force in that part of His Majesty's dominions in which the maintenance order was made, the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy; and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Definitions.

3. The Governor may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorized to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.

Power of Governor to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

4. Where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any British possession or any territory under His Majesty's protection for the enforcement within such possession or territory of maintenance orders made by Courts in the Falkland Islands, the Governor may by Proclamation extend the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921 to maintenance orders made by Courts within such possessions or territory, and thereupon the said Ordinance shall apply to such maintenance orders as if they had been made in England or Ireland.

Extension of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, to other British Possessions.

Repeal of Sections 2 and 7 of the principal Ordinance.

5. Sections 2 and 7 of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, are hereby repealed.

An Ordinance

To secure the Reciprocal Enforcement of judgments obtained in superior courts in this Colony, the United Kingdom and other parts of His Majesty's Dominions or territories under His Majesty's protection.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgments Ordinance, 1922."

Enforcement in Colony of Judgments obtained in the United Kingdom.

2. (1) Where a judgment has been obtained in a superior court in the United Kingdom, the judgment creditor may apply to the Supreme Court of the Colony at any time within twelve months after the date of the judgment, or such longer period as may be allowed by the court, to have the judgment registered in the court,

and on any such application the court may, if in all the circumstances of the case they think it is just and convenient that the judgment should be enforced in the Colony, and subject to the provisions of this section, order the judgment to be registered accordingly.

(2) No judgment shall be ordered to be registered under this section if—

- (a) the original court acted without jurisdiction, or
- (b) the judgment debtor, being a person who was neither carrying on business nor ordinarily resident within the jurisdiction of the original court, did not voluntarily appear or otherwise submit or agree to submit to the jurisdiction of that court; or
- (c) the judgment debtor, being the defendant in the proceedings, was not duly served with the process of the original court and did not appear, notwithstanding that he was ordinarily resident or was carrying on business within the jurisdiction of that court or agreed to submit to the jurisdiction of that court; or
- (d) the judgment was obtained by fraud; or
- (e) the judgment debtor satisfies the registering court either that an appeal is pending, or that he is entitled and intends to appeal, against the judgment; or
- (f) the judgment was in respect of a cause of action which for reasons of public policy or for some other similar reason could not have been entertained by the registering court.

(3) Where a judgment is registered under this section:—

- (a) the judgment shall, as from the date of registration be of the same force and effect, and proceedings may be taken thereon, as if it had been a judgment originally obtained or entered up on the date of registration in the registering court;
 - (b) the registering court shall have the same control and jurisdiction over the judgment as it has over similar judgments given by itself, but in so far only as relates to execution under this section;
 - (c) the reasonable costs of and incidental to the registration of the judgment (including the costs of obtaining a certified copy thereof from the original court and of the application for registration) shall be recoverable in like manner as if they were sums payable under the judgment.
- (4) Rules of court shall provide:—
- (a) for service on the judgment debtor of notice of the registration of a judgment under this section; and
 - (b) for enabling the registering court on an application by the judgment debtor to set aside the registration of a judgment under this section on such terms as the court thinks fit; and
 - (c) for suspending the execution of a judgment registered under this section until the expiration of the period during which the judgment debtor may apply to have the registration set aside.

(5) In any action brought in any court in the Colony on any judgment which might be ordered to be registered under this section, the plaintiff shall not be entitled to recover any costs of the action unless an application to register the judgment under this section has previously been refused, or unless the court otherwise orders.

Issue of certificates of judgments obtained in the Colony.

3. Where a judgment has been obtained in the Supreme Court of the Colony against any person, the court shall, on an application made by the judgment creditor and on proof that the judgment debtor is resident in the United Kingdom, issue to the judgment creditor a certified copy of the judgment.

Power to make rules.

4. Provision may be made by rules of court for regulating the practice and procedure, (including scales of fees and evidence), in respect of proceedings of any kind under this Ordinance.

Interpretation.

5. (1) In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires:—

The expression "judgment" means any judgment or order given or made by a court in any civil proceedings, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, whereby any sum of money is made payable, and includes an award in proceedings on an arbitration if the award has, in pursuance of the law in force in the place where it was made, become enforceable in the same manner as a judgment given by a court in that place.

The expression "original court" in relation to any judgment means the court by which the judgment was given.

The expression "registering court" in relation to any judgment means the court by which the judgment was registered.

The expression "judgment creditor" means the person by whom the judgment was obtained, and includes the successors and assigns of that person.

The expression "judgment debtor" means the person against whom the judgment was given, and includes any person against whom the judgment is enforceable in the place where it was given.

(2) Subject to rules of court, any of the powers conferred by this Ordinance on any court may be exercised by a judge of the court.

Extent of Ordinance.

6. (1) Where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of His dominions of judgments obtained in the Supreme Court of this Colony, the Governor may by Proclamation under his hand declare that this Ordinance shall extend to judgments obtained in a superior court in that part of His Majesty's dominions in like manner as it extends to judgments obtained in a superior court in the United Kingdom and on any such Proclamation being made this Ordinance shall extend accordingly.

(2) For the purposes of this section the expression "part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom" shall be deemed to include any territory which is under His Majesty's protection or in respect of which a mandate is being exercised by the Government of any part of His Majesty's dominions.

(3) A Proclamation made by the Governor under this section may be varied or revoked by a subsequent Proclamation.

To provide for the refund of a portion of the duties of Customs levied and collected on Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1921, and the 30th of September, 1922, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duty) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922." Short Title.

2. In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of whale and seal oil for the period from the 1st day of October, 1921, to the 30th day of September, 1922. Definition.

3. A refund of a part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid upon whale and seal oil, between the first day of October, 1921, and the thirtieth day of September, 1922, shall be made in accordance with the following scale :— Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

If the average market price for the season of first grade oil,

Exceeds £45 but does not exceed £50 per ton 6d.

" £40 " " " " £45 " " 1/-.

Does not exceed £40 " " 1/6.

Governor in Council
to decide.

4. In the event of any difference of opinion arising as to the average market price for the season the decision of the Governor in Council shall be final.

Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 2 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902.

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as "The Harbour Regulations, 1922".

Firing or throwing
stones at birds &c. in
the Harbour.

2. No person shall discharge any fire-arm at or throw any stone or other missile at any seabird or wild animal within the limits of the Harbour provided that nothing in this section shall serve to prohibit birds or animals from being killed for the protection of property or obtained by or with the authority of the Government Naturalist for Scientific purposes.

Penalty for any
breach of any Reg-
ulation.

3. Any person who is guilty of any breach of any Regulation made under the provisions of section 2 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902, shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding £2 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 14 days if no other penalty be provided for such an offence by any provision of the said Ordinance.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting held on the 17th December, 1921.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 23rd September, were read and confirmed.

2. The Council gave further consideration to the payment to Major F. J. Newnham of an additional sum in respect of War Gratuity. (Governor's Minute No. 4 of 1921.)

The vote was agreed to on the understanding that the calculation of the gratuity due had been based on the consolidated army pay of the temporary rank actually held by Major Newnham. His Excellency stated that the question of the rank on which the gratuity had been based would be referred to the Secretary of State.

3. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved and the Honourable the Treasurer seconded the adoption of the following minute from the Governor:-

MINUTE NO. 5 OF 1921, submitting Supplementary Estimate of Expenditure (No. 2 of 1921)

The minute was adopted.

4. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following papers:-

Copies of all regulations made since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.

5. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers:-

- (1) A Schedule of all charges of an unusual or special description, not covered by the appropriation law for the year 1921 incurred during the quarter ended the 30th September.
- (2) A Comparative Statement of Revenue and Expenditure for the quarter ended the 30th September.

6. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved and the Honourable the Treasurer seconded the adoption of revised Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Council, repealing and replacing all previous Standing Rules and Orders.

The Standing Rules and Orders were adopted.

7. The draft Estimates for the year 1922 were approved with the following alterations:-

- (1) Under Head VIB Patrol Boat, Item 2, the sum of £180 was increased to £240.
- (2) Under Head VIB Patrol Boat, Item 3, was reduced from £528 to £396 and a new item was inserted to provide for the services of a gunner at a salary of £150.
- (3) Under Head XIX, Public Works Extraordinary, a new item was inserted to provide for the further expenditure of £150 necessary to complete the work of erecting the beacon light at William Point.

In approving the Estimates as amended the unofficial members requested that the following reports might be furnished:-

- (1) A report showing the necessity for the amount provided under Head XVII Public Works Department, Item 3, Salary of Foreman of Works and Timekeeper.
- (2) A report showing the necessity for the amount provided under Head XIX Public Works Extraordinary, Item 7, re-coppering and repairs to Public Jetty. In this connection it was suggested that the construction of landing steps on the face of the jetty would be a useful improvement.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To provide for the service of the year 1922" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

Clause 2 was amended to read as follows:-

The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on 31st December, 1922, a sum not exceeding Forty-six thousand, Eight hundred and Thirty-eight Pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purpose and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto, which will come in course of payment during the year 1922.

Number VI of the Schedule was amended to read as follows:-

Port and Marine £5954.

Number XIX of the Schedule was amended to read as follows:-

Public Works Extraordinary (Falklands) £2850.

The Title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 8 and the Title was agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To prohibit persons not being in the possession of valid passports from landing in the Colony" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 3 and the title was agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

11. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Seal Fishery in the Colony and its Dependencies" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 to 13 were agreed to.

It was agreed to omit Clause 14 from the Bill. Subsection (1) of Clause 15 was agreed to and renumbered Clause 14.

It was agreed to omit Subsections (2) and (3) of Clause 15 from the Bill.

Clause 16 was renumbered Clause 15 and amended to read as follows:-

If any person refuses or neglects to comply with any requisition or direction lawfully given by, or to answer any question lawfully asked by any seal fishery officer or armed guard, such person shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding One hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding Six months.

Clauses 17 to 24 were agreed to without amendment.

The following new clause was embodied in the Bill as Clause 16:-

- (1) It shall be lawful for a seal fishery officer or armed guard to arrest, detain and bring before a competent court any person committing, or appearing to be about to commit, an offence against the provisions of this Ordinance or any regulation made thereunder.
- (2) A seal fishery officer or armed guard may use force for the prevention of any such offence or for the purpose of effecting an arrest.
- (3) If any person is killed, maimed or hurt by reason of his resisting a seal fishery officer or an armed guard in the execution of the duties of this Ordinance committed to such seal fishery officer or armed guard, neither the seal fishery officer nor armed guard shall be liable to any punishment or to pay any damages by reason of the person being so killed or hurt.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

12. The Honourable the Treasurer moved and the Honourable G. I. Turner seconded the following resolution:-

Be it resolved that under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, this Council hereby sanctions the following rate to be charged for for the year 1922 on house property in the Town of Stanley, namely One shilling and Threepence for every Twenty Shillings of the annual value of such house property.

The resolution was adopted.

9. Although owing to the appointment of four new teachers in December, 1919, the number of children taught increased, changes in the staff much affected the teaching that could be given. The period of tuition given by the teachers to each child varied from two to six weeks only.

10. Of the Travelling Teachers :-

Mr. C. F. Daer was on duty in the North Beat of the West Falkland to the 16th August, 1921, when he came into Stanley on health grounds. On the 10th October he was seconded for duty in the Government School.

Mr. W. U. Currie was continuously on duty in the West Falkland throughout 1920 and 1921.

Mr. J. S. Scott was brought into Stanley in March, 1920, to act as Private Secretary to the Administrator. He was invalided out of the Service in January, 1921.

Mr. J. Sturrock was on continuous duty in the West Falkland throughout 1920 and 1921.

Mr. G. L. Daillie was seconded for duty in Stanley in March, 1920. On the 10th October, 1921, he was appointed to act as Headmaster of the Government School.

Mr. J. J. Wilson arrived in August, 1921, and was assigned to the San Carlos Beat, in the East Falkland.

Miss Riches, pupil teacher in the Government School was, under special arrangement stationed at Teal Inlet for three months in 1921, for the purpose of giving instruction to the children there.

Sir,

I have the honour to furnish the attendance statistics of the children taught in the Falkland Islands Company's Camp for the years 1920, 1921.

The Company have maintained a small school at Darwin their chief station, for over fifty years, which has always had as teacher a certificated master.

For the year 1921 there is nothing outstanding to report, elementary subjects only having been taught, but it is hoped to form a Junior class in Algebra and Latin for the present session.

For the outlying shepherds' houses they provide two camp teachers, one of whom has been a pupil teacher in Scotland.

The camp teacher mentioned, Thomas Goodwin, takes the Darwin section, while the other, James H. Watson, takes the North Arm, while they divide Walker Creek between them giving instruction to some eighteen families.

With this staff, small as it is, much might be done if there were some goal to press forward to, some avenues opened by which there might come advancement.

Occasionally a boy has gone forth equipped with such a grounding in Mathematics and Latin, as has enabled him to take his place creditably alongside his compeers in the educational arenas of home, but for the majority there is only the occupation of the shepherd or the labourer to look forward to—and so Cui bono ?

Boys are withdrawn from school as soon as they reach a wage-earning age, and the teacher cannot detain them by holding before their vision better prospects in life.

Yet the material is similar to that in the north-eastern counties of Scotland, where the goal of the boy of parts is the University—a great lamp illuminating these far off hills and valleys. The village schoolmasters are all university graduates, and from their schools lies a straight road to college. Poverty is no barrier. Father, mother, brothers and sisters make heavy sacrifices to help forward the student of their family, and these sacrifices are made with the utmost cheerfulness.

In any sphere of life however, even an elementary education is a valuable asset, and if parents could be got to realise this, they would do their utmost to co-operate with each other, and their teachers, so that children might get as much time and attention devoted to them, as is possible under the present system. Where houses are within easy reach grown up children could ride or even walk to and fro. In Scotland children think nothing of walking three or four miles to school. The harder the path, the more difficult the attainment of knowledge, the more prized will it be in after life. "There is no royal road."

Ordinance No. of 1922.

A Bill

To provide for Trading Companies and other Associations.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Companies and Private Partnership Ordinance 1922".

I. COMPANIES.

Imperial Companies
Acts extended to the
Colony.

2. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance the following Acts of the Imperial Parliament are declared to be in force in the Colony, in so far as they are applicable:—

The Companies (Consolidation) Act, 1908 (8 Edw. VII, ch. 69), and

The Companies Act, 1913 (3 and 4, Geo. V., ch. 25).

Registrar.

3. The Registrar-General shall be the Registrar of Companies, and the memorandum of associations and the articles of association (if any) of any trading company formed in the Colony under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be registered in a deed book kept for that purpose.

Rules and Fees.

4. The Governor in Executive Council may make rules for the more effectual working of the said Imperial Acts in the Colony. Such rules shall be published in the Gazette and shall come into operation as from the date of publication. Fees shall be paid as laid down in the table of fees shewn in Schedule A to this Ordinance.

5. (1) A company incorporated outside the Colony may carry on business in the Colony or its Dependencies by filing with the Registrar General,

Requirements as to Companies established outside the Colony.

- (a) a certified copy of the charter, statutes, or memorandum and articles of the company, or other instrument constituting or defining the constitution of the Company and, if the instrument is not written in the English language a certified translation in the English language thereof;
- (b) list of the directors of the company;
- (c) the name of some one or more persons resident or stationed for the time being in the Colony or its Dependencies authorised to accept on behalf of the company service of process and any notices required to be served on the company;

and in the event of any alteration being made in any such instrument, or in the directors, or in the names of any such person as aforesaid, the company shall file with the Registrar General within six months a notice of the alteration.

(2) Any process or notice required to be served on the company shall be sufficiently served if addressed to any person whose name has been so filed as aforesaid and left at or sent to the address which has been so filed.

(3) If any company to which this section applies fails to comply with any of the requirements of this section the company, and every officer or agent of the company, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds, or in the case of a continuing offence five pounds for every day during which the failure continues.

(4) There shall be paid to the Registrar for registering any document required by this section to be filed with him a fee of five shillings.

Provided always that paragraphs (a) and (b) of sub-section (1) of this section shall not apply to any company incorporated outside the Colony which shall carry on business within the Colony solely through the medium of a *bona fide* agent.

6. A company incorporated outside the Colony and duly registered in accordance with the provisions of the last foregoing section may sue and be sued in its incorporated name and enjoy all the privileges of a company projected formed and incorporated in the Colony.

Power of Companies incorporated outside the Colony.

II. GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF PARTNERSHIP.

7. (1) Partnership is the relation which subsists between persons carrying on a business in common with a view of profit.

Nature of Partnership.

(2) But the relation between members of any company or association which is;

- (a) Registered as a Company under this Ordinance or any other Ordinance for the time being in force relating to the registration of joint stock companies; or
- (b) Formed or incorporated by or in pursuance of any other Ordinance of the Colony or letters patent, or Royal Charter;

is not a partnership within the meaning of this Ordinance.

- New partners. 8. A new partner cannot be introduced to the partnership without the consent of all the partners. The consent of the majority will not suffice.
- Sub-partners. 9. One partner may take a sub-partner to participate in his share of the partnership but such sub-partner is not a partner in the partnership.
- In case of fraud. 10. The contract is essentially one of good faith among the partners both in its beginning and its progress and it can be set aside at any time on fraud being established.
- Maximum number of partners. 11. The number of partners in a private partnership shall not exceed twenty.
- Infant may become partner 12. An infant may be a partner but under the law with regard to infants he is not responsible for the debts of the partnership if he repudiates his liability on coming of age.
- In case of lunacy. 13. (1) If a partner was a lunatic at the time of entering into the contract and the fact was concealed from any of the partners the fraud will be a sufficient ground for setting aside the contract.
- (2) If the lunacy was known to the other partners they cannot afterwards set aside the contract on that ground but it may at any time be set aside by those acting for the lunatic.
- (3) If the contract has been entered into by the lunatic in a lucid moment and is a transaction in good faith as regards the other partners any supervening lunacy will not invalidate the right of the lunatic to his share of the profits and his property will be subject to the debts of the partnership.
- (4) If a partner sane at the time of entering into the contract shall become insane during the partnership it shall be at the option of the remaining partners to continue the partnership according to the terms of the contract or to dissolve the partnership.
- Married woman may become partner. 14. A married woman may with the consent of her husband enter into a contract of partnership and when such consent has been given by the husband signing the articles of partnership the wife shall be entitled to act as a *feme sole* with regard to the partnership.
- Undertaking must be lawful but may be of a general nature. 15. The undertaking into which the partners enter must be a lawful one but need not be any particular business as a valid partnership may be constituted for purposes of a general nature to speculate in any way which may appear to offer profit.
- Partner to share in profits. 16. The partnership must be for the purpose of making profit in which each of the partners shall have a share.
- Participation in profits. 17. It is not necessary that each partner actually participate in the profits whatever amount of profit may be made because a partner may validly stipulate on account of the greater share of the fund which he advances that one or more of the partners shall not receive anything unless a certain amount of profit has been made. It is enough that each partner shall have a fair chance of making profit and that the conditions of the contract are not manifestly unjust.
- Losses to be borne mutually. 18. The partners in the contract of partnership bear the loss mutually if they fail to make profit and incur loss but it shall not be unlawful for a partner to stipulate as between himself and the other partners that he shall not be liable to contribute to the loss.

19. The shares in the profit and the proportion of responsibility for loss may be equal or unequal according to the agreement of the partners or *pro rata* according to the amount each has contributed to the common fund but where no stipulation has been made and there is no guide to the intention of parties the shares in the profit and loss shall be taken to be equal.

Shares in profit and loss.

20. While partners share in profit and are liable for loss a mere participation in profits does not necessarily make the participator a partner. A manager or servant of a partnership may have a share in the profits as his wages and yet not be a partner.

Share in profits without being a partner.

21. The mere fact that the participator in the profits is the manager or servant of the partnership does not necessarily exclude him from being a partner. The fact whether he is a partner or not depends upon the intention of parties when he was admitted to share profits and must be judged of according to the facts and circumstances of each case.

Proof of partnership.

22. The advance of money by way of loan upon a contract in writing to receive a rate of interest varying with the profits or even a share of the profits will not of itself make the lender a partner. A widow or child of a partner may receive a portion of profits by way of annuity without incurring liability for the debts of the partnership. The vendor of the goodwill of a business may receive a portion of the profits in consideration of the sale without being subject to the liabilities of a partner.

Persons may participate in profits without being liable as partners.

III.—PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP WHERE THE LIABILITY OF THE MEMBERS IS UNLIMITED.

(i) *The partnership property.*

23. The fund which the partners contribute or as it is commonly called the capital of the partnership need not necessarily consist of money. One may contribute his skill or his labour or goods or real estate or the goodwill of a business and generally it may be said that anything which the partners themselves consider to have value may be contributed to the common fund.

What may constitute capital.

24. Where the contribution of the partner is labour or skill or something which bears no ratable proportion to the money supplied by others it is the more necessary that the share of the profits to which each partner is entitled should be fixed at the time of making the contract. If no proportion is fixed the contributor of the skill or labour shall be entitled to receive profits in proportion to the smallest sum of money advanced by the other partners.

Where labour or skill is contributed.

25. No partnership in which the common fund or capital exceeds the value of one hundred pounds sterling and the duration of the contract exceeds or by the nature of the engagement must exceed twelve months can be pleaded or proved in actions between the partners themselves unless the contract has been embodied in articles of partnership. If a partner has been admitted subsequent to the articles his admission may be proved by letters writings or facts and circumstances.

Where capital exceeds one hundred pounds or duration of contract exceeds twelve months.

26. Existing partnerships shall until their termination be subject to the rules of the law anterior to this Ordinance as regards the necessity of articles but all future contracts of partnerships shall with the exception aforesaid be embodied in articles of partnership.

As to existing partnerships.

Limited partners may be responsible as Ordinary partners in certain cases.

27. If those who are not partners at all or who may be limited partners only hold themselves out to others as ordinary partners and in this manner cause them to enter into contracts or make advances or sell goods on credit or in any other way to become creditors the individuals who so represent themselves shall be held bound by their representations.

Liability of dormant partners.

28. A person who enters into a partnership without notification and continues in it for the purpose of sharing in the profit as a dormant partner shall be liable to creditors during the time he remained a partner in the same manner as an ordinary partner.

Partnership property.

29. The whole property real and personal original and acquired of the partners as a whole in connection with the partnership shall be held as belonging to the partnership under the firm name style title or designation and the partnership to that effect shall be regarded as a juridical person and it shall be capable of sustaining the relation of creditor and have the right to sue and of sustaining the relation of debtor and the liability to be sued each partner having a contingent right to his share of the property when the debts shall be paid and the property divided but having no right while the partnership lasts to dispose of the property except for partnership purposes and on the other hand each partner remaining liable for the debts of the partnership.

Partnership may be sued in name of firm.

30. The partnership itself may be lawfully sued by entering as the name of the defendant the firm name style title or designation under which the partnership conducts its ordinary business and a writ left at the ordinary place of business of such partnership or with a manager clerk shopman operative or servant therein or delivered personally to any one partner shall be a sufficient service upon the said partnership and upon the individual partners thereof and judgment may be given thereon which shall be a good judgment against the partnership as in the case of any ordinary defendant to an action.

Partnership may sue in name of firm.

31. The partnership may sue under the firm name style title or designation by which it conducts its ordinary business without requiring to insert as a plaintiff the name of any individual partner and a judgment obtained in any action in which the writ shall be so sued out shall be a good judgment and may be enforced by all the remedies competent to an ordinary plaintiff.

Real estate may form capital.

32. Real estate may form part of the capital of a partnership.

Liabilities thereof.

33. The real property may form part of the partnership property although the title may be in name of one or more of the partners and be liable for the debts of the company or be treated as personalty on the death of a partner.

Real property not necessarily partnership property.

34. On the other hand land may be contributed to the partnership fund not as a portion of the capital but simply for the purpose of cultivation or pasturage the property remaining in the individual partner and the use solely belonging to the partnership.

Titles to land may be taken and transferred in name of partnership.

35. Titles to land may be taken in the name of the partnership under its ordinary name style title or designation and a transfer of the same may be validly made under the firm name style title or designation when subscribed to the transfer by one of the partners. Mortgages and encumbrances may be granted and created in the same manner and the transfers mortgages or encumbrances shall when so subscribed be held to have been done with consent of all the partners.

36. The partnership property must first be applied to the payment of partnership debts and each partner has a right to have the same so applied before any individual partner or his creditors or representatives can claim any right therein.

Property to be applied to the payment of debts.

37. Each partner has a claim on the partnership property for all funds advanced by him and the partnership has also a claim for the repayment to the partnership of whatever has been taken by one partner beyond his share.

Where partners may claim individually &c.

38. No creditor of an individual partner can acquire any right title or interest in the partnership property even as the consequence of a judgment except for so much as belongs to the partner after all claims on the partnership as a whole are deducted and satisfied and the mode of putting any such judgment in force shall be by attachment of the partner's share of profit and property and not by seizure and sale.

Claims against individual partners.

(ii) *Powers and authorities of partners.*

39. Each partner is *præpositus negotiis societatis* and while the stipulations in the articles of partnership bind the partners *inter sese* in regard to the extent of their powers as regard the public each partner can bind the partnership by his acts in relation to the partnership business. This however is subject to the limitation that it must be in relation to the partnership business as ordinarily conducted because one partner has no authority to bind his co-partners to obligations which both he and the persons with whom he dealt must have known to be beyond the ordinary scope of the business and of the powers ordinarily exercised by partners.

Partner may bind partnership in relation to its ordinary business.

40. In ordinary trading partnerships the buying and selling of goods the drawing accepting and indorsing of bills the granting of cheques upon the partnership bank account the borrowing of money within ordinary limits for trade purposes the granting of receipts the ordering of insurances the payment of debts the granting of Custom House bonds and the pledging of partnership property for partnership purposes are all within the scope of the agency entrusted to each partner.

Ordinary trading transactions may be entered into by any partner.

41. In partnerships where it is part of the ordinary business to grant warranties or guarantees the guarantee of one partner shall bind the whole but where that is not the ordinary course of the business of the partnership the holder of the guarantee will require to prove that it was done with the consent of the firm.

With regard to the granting of warranties &c.

42. One partner has no authority to refer a matter in dispute to arbitration in name of the partnership without their consent.

Reference of dispute.

43. Contracts will not bind the partnership which have been made by one partner with a party who has knowledge or notice that the partner is acting beyond his powers or in fraud of the firm.

Contracts not binding in certain cases.

44. Where a partner gives a bill or acceptance or indorsement of the firm in payment of his private debt the firm will not be bound to the person accepting such a payment unless he can prove that the partner was authorised or otherwise establishes the *bona fides* of the transaction. If the bill is in the hands of third holders the partnership shall be liable unless the circumstances show that the holder was aware of the nature of the transaction.

Acceptance of the firm given for a private debt.

45. Where money has been raised by one partner upon the faith of the partnership signature and such partner applies the money to his own private debt the firm will be bound when the party advancing the money had no knowledge of the object to which it was to be applied.

Application of partnership money to private use.

- Application of partnership securities. 46. The same rules will apply to the application of the securities or property real or personal of the firm in payment of the private debt of a partner.
- Where money has been advanced to individual partner. 47. Where money has been advanced to a partner upon his individual credit and responsibility although the money be paid into the firm account and employed for partnership purposes the person making the advance must go against the individual partner who obtained it upon his own credit.
- Responsibilities of new partner. 48. A new partner by joining an old firm shall make himself liable like the other partners for the debts of the firm.
- Where a partner is accepted as debtor in place of firm. 49. Where a partnership has been originally liable for a debt and the creditor by arrangement accepts one of the partners as his debtor in place of the partnership such acceptance will extinguish the debt against the firm.
- Where retiring partner ceases to be responsible. 50. If a creditor in like manner continues to accept of the partnership as the debtor after the retirement of a partner has been duly notified to him the responsibility of the retiring partner ceases.
- Notice of discharge of partner from responsibility to be given to creditor. 51. But as the principal of the discharge which is here assumed is that the creditor had notice of the partnership in its altered condition and accepted it as his debtor there must be no doubt of the notice which ought to be both personal and public in the manner set forth in a subsequent section the latter form being sufficient intimation to those who have subsequent dealings with the firm that the partner has retired and the former being necessary in the case of the actual creditors of the firm at the date of retirement.
- Liability for torts. 52. (1) The partnership is liable for torts committed by the partners or the servants of the partnership in the course of carrying on partnership business.
- For frauds. (2) The partnership is liable if one of the partners fraudulently disposes of property consigned to the custody and care of the partnership.
- For injuries to persons or goods. (3) The partnership is liable for injuries to persons or goods caused by the want of care or want of skill of the partners or servants of the firm in the carrying on of the ordinary business of the firm.
- For slander. (4) A partnership of publishers shall be liable for the printing and publishing of a slander by the firm on the authority of one of the partners in the course of the business of the firm.
- For frauds on the revenue. (5) The partnership will be liable for frauds committed on the revenue by one of the partners in conducting the business of the firm.
- Liability in certain cases only. (6) The tort to render the firm liable must be committed in carrying out the business of the firm within the ordinary scope thereof or the act must be endorsed and accepted by the firm.
- (iii) *Rights and duties of partners.*
- Responsibility for loss. 53. If any loss be sustained to the partnership from the gross negligence unskilfulness fraud or misconduct of a partner the partner is responsible to the partnership.
- For breach of articles. 54. A partner is responsible to the partnership for intentional breaches of the articles of partnership.

55. If a partner makes any false representations to his partners or conceals from them facts in connection with the business and thereby makes profit to himself he must make good to the partnership the profit so obtained.

For false representations.

56. If a partner makes any private stipulations with third persons for bonuses or premiums for himself in connection with the business of the partnership he must account therefor to the partnership.

Rule as to bonuses etc.

57. (1) A partner cannot enter into any other business or engagement which will interfere with the proper performance of his partnership duties.

Inability of partner in certain cases.

(2) Nor can he make purchase or sales on his private account which would interfere with the bargains of the firm or lessen their profit.

(3) A partner cannot enter upon any other undertaking which would give him a direct interest contrary to that of the partnership but the position must be one not merely of temptation to act in such a manner but an obvious antagonistic interest.

58. As one of the chief duties of the partners is to account faithfully to the partnership for all transactions it is absolutely necessary to keep business books in which everything done by each shall appear and be accounted for.

Books must be kept.

59. The withholding of accounts by one partner from the firm shall be of itself a presumption that fraud has been perpetrated or was intended.

Withholding of accounts presumption of fraud.

60. All the partners are entitled to know the full extent of the partnership affairs and to have free access to the books on all occasions unless they have intentionally limited their powers by the articles.

Access to books.

61. The articles shall state what sum each partner will be entitled to draw for his private expenditure and there may also be a stipulation that one or more shall receive a sum by way of salary before profits are estimated but unless this stipulation be clearly set forth the presumption will be against any salary being payable.

Salaries and private expenditure of partners.

(iv) *Articles of partnership.*

62. In this Ordinance (section twenty-five) it has been made necessary for all partnerships where the capital exceeds one hundred pounds sterling and the duration exceeds twelve months to be constituted by articles of partnership.

Articles of partnership.

63. It is not necessary to insert in articles of partnership the general principles applicable to all contracts of partnership but only such stipulations as without being stipulated would not be implied by law.

Stipulations to be inserted.

64. Agreements may be entered into to form a partnership which are not the partnership articles and should any of the partners fail to carry out the agreement it is hereby enacted that such preliminary agreements cannot be enforced so as to compel persons who are unwilling to enter into partnership but an action will lie for damages for breach of agreement wherever any of the parties had proceeded in fulfilment of it to contract engagements to realise funds or do any other act which involved pecuniary obligations or loss in virtue of the agreement.

Agreements to form partnership.

- Construction of articles. 65. The articles of partnership are construed like other contracts according to the intention of parties and they shall always be construed so as to defeat fraud and the taking by any partner of an unfair advantage over his co-partners.
- Variation of articles. 66. If partners do not faithfully observe the articles of partnership among themselves and a practice spring up on any points at variance with the articles it will not be competent for one partner thereafter suddenly to attempt to enforce the articles but the practice will be taken as a virtual alteration or repeal of the articles by consent of all. The articles may be varied during the partnership with consent of all the partners.
- Where a specific business is carried on. 67. When the partnership is entered into for the carrying on of a specific business the Supreme Court in the event of dispute shall construe strictly the description of the business set forth in the articles so that the partnership be not turned from its legitimate ends.
- Date of commencement. 68. The time for commencement of the partnership shall be carefully set forth. If no date is specified it will be held to commence from the date of the articles.
- Name of firm to be defined. 69. The name or style by which the firm is to be known shall be defined by the articles as it is under the common name that the partnership will not only carry on its transactions but also that under which it will sue or be sued. The name need not include any of the existing partners.
- Duration of partnership. 70. The articles shall set forth the duration of the partnership but whatever time be stated the death of a partner brings the partnership to an end unless there are stipulations to the contrary.
- Death of partner need not terminate partnership. 71. If the articles stipulate that the death of a partner shall not necessarily put an end to the partnership a clause may empower the representative of the deceased partner to carry on the business with the survivors for the benefit of the widow and children of the deceased partner and for the admission of one or more of the children as partners on their arrival at majority.
- Where interest is given to the widow. 72. If the interest in the partnership be given to the widow during her life and to the children after her death it is only the children who survive the mother who are entitled to a share.
- Disposition of share by will or otherwise. 73. The articles may empower the partners to provide by will or otherwise for the disposal of their share in the event of death. If the will leaves the executors the freedom of declining should they not consider it wise or expedient to continue the partnership the death of the party then puts an end to the partnership.
- Share of deceased partner. 74. The articles shall contain provisions for the manner in which the share of a deceased partner shall be estimated and paid should there be no intention to admit the representatives into business.
- One or more partners may conduct business. 75. It may be stipulated that one or more of the partners shall have the direction of the business of the company and these provisions will be enforced by the Supreme Court.
- As to secret manufactures. 76. There may be special cases where a partnership is formed for working some manufacture which is a secret and in such cases it will be competent for the partner who is in possession of the secret to make such stipulations as shall protect him in the working thereof.

77. The clauses in connection with the contribution of the capital shall bring to a money valuation such items as lands buildings book debts and other property which may be contributed in order that the capital account may be clearly set forth.

Computation of capital.

78. Provision shall be made for balances and division of profits.

Profits.

79. It may be provided to prevent future disputes that the the accounts as agreed to at any particular time shall be conclusive but no such provision will bar an enquiry into fraud.

Accounts when agreed to be conclusive.

80. The mode of hiring and dismissing employees of the firm shall be provided for.

Employees.

81. The mode of permitting a partner to retire from the firm either with or without liberty to carry on the same trade and the purchase of his share by the firm or otherwise may be stipulated.

Retirement of partner.

82. The steps necessary to be taken upon dissolution the mode of winding-up and the settlement of controversies shall be provided for and it shall be competent for the partners to provide that any of their number may be expelled from the partnership should his conduct or pecuniary entanglements be such as to compromise the credit of the firm.

Dissolution and winding up.

(v) *Remedies against partners and third parties.*

83. (1) A partner may sue the partnership under the firm style name title or designation and the partnership may in like manner sue a partner for any matter or thing in relation to which a cause of action has arisen. Two firms may sue each other although some of the partners may be partners in both or any member of either firm may sue either or both.

Firms may sue and be sued.

(2) Third parties may sue the partnership and the partnership may sue third parties in the same way as ordinary plaintiffs may sue but when judgment has been given against the partnership the execution will not lie against the separate partners unless the firm has no effects. Where the judgment has to be enforced by imprisonment it will be competent to proceed against one or other of the partners at the choice of the holder of the judgment.

84. Where judgment has been given against a partner for a private debt the share of profit and share of partnership property belonging to such partner may be attached in the hands of the firm but it shall not be competent to proceed to seizure and sale of the property of the firm for the separate debt of a partner.

Private debts of partner.

85. The juridical person of the firm will be taken to be in existence after the active operations of the partnership have ceased or after the partners have entered into a new contract for all purposes connected with the receiving and paying the debts of the firm and generally for the purpose of winding up but for that only.

Existence of firm.

86. One partner may sue another for all matters or things unconnected with the partnership and even for matters arising out of the partnership if the interests of the firm are not necessarily involved.

One partner may sue another.

87. Any partner who has been denied access to the books or papers of the firm or who has reason to believe that one or more of the partners have made profit from the partnership without disclosing it may sue the firm for an account and this right extends to the

Denial of access to books.

executor administrators or representatives of a deceased partner. Such action may be sued without its being necessary to ask for a dissolution of the partnership but the Supreme Court may decree the dissolution should circumstances emerge during the enquiry which induce the belief that mutual concert and agreement between the parties is thenceforth impossible.

(vi) *Dissolution of partnership.*

Partnership may be dissolved.

88. A partnership may be dissolved by the act or consent of the partners or of some of them or by the judgment of a competent court or by the mere operation of law or by the extinction or completion of the thing in regard to which the partnership was formed or by the lapse of time for which it was originally contracted or by the death or bankruptcy of a partner.

Dissolution by consent.

89. All partnerships whether a period has been fixed for the termination of the contract or the duration is merely dependent on the will of the partners can be brought to an end by mutual consent the whole existence of the contract depending upon the consent of the parties who made it. A partnership which has no fixed term may be dissolved at the desire of either of the partners and even by acts which are inconsistent with the continuance of the partnership.

Must be publicly announced.

90. Although the original contract has been made by deed under seal it is not necessary that the dissolution be effected in the same way. The resolution to dissolve publicly announced as afterwards provided for will be sufficient.

Or decreed by the Court.

91. A partnership which is to endure for a stated period cannot be brought to an end by the mere will of one of the partners but any partner may apply to the Supreme Court for a dissolution on sufficient cause shown.

Partnerships at will.

92. When the term for which the partnership was originally formed has elapsed and no notice of dissolution has been given and no new articles of partnership entered into but the partners have continued the business without any change the association between them will be treated as a partnership at will under the same terms and conditions so far as applicable which are set forth in the original articles these for the purposes required by section twenty-six hereof being taken to be the articles of the continued partnership.

Court may end partnership on cause being shown.

93. (1) The causes for which a partnership may be brought to an end by the Court on the application of a partner although the fixed term has not elapsed are generally those which arise subsequently to the formation of the contract from the misconduct fraud or violation of duty of one or more of the partners.

(2) The misconduct or violation of duty must not be trivial or in regard to other relations of life unless they have a tendency to injure the credit or interfere with the business of the partnership.

(3) The Supreme Court may be applied to for a dissolution because of the impracticability of carrying out the partnership from a change of circumstances or a failure of expectations.

Insanity a cause.

94. It has already been provided in section thirteen sub-section four that supervening insanity of any partner may be a cause for dissolution at the choice of the partners. The insanity must be such as is likely to continue and not a merely temporary malady.

Also absence of partner.

95. The prolonged absence of a partner his residence out of the colony his change of domicile or engaging in pursuits incompatible with his duty to the partnership may all be good grounds for the dissolution of the partnership by a Court of law even where the term has not expired.

96. The partners may refer to arbitration the question of dissolution before the agreed on term and an award decreeing dissolution shall be a competent award and even where the question of dissolution has not been expressly referred if the differences between the partners have been referred and the arbitrators have awarded a dissolution that shall be a competent award. Question of dissolution may be referred.
97. The outlawry of a partner or his attainder for treason or felony operates as a dissolution of the partnership. Effect of outlawry &c.
98. A female partner marrying may continue as a partner but the husband shall have no right arising from his *jus mariti* or otherwise to interfere with the affairs of the firm but she shall act in the affairs of the partnership as a *feme sole* ; but the marriage of a female partner during the tenure of the partnership may be a good ground for applying to the Supreme Court to decree a dissolution under the particular circumstances of the case. Effect of female partner marrying.
99. The voluntary assignment by one or more of the partners of all their right title and interest in the partnership property dissolves the partnership. Voluntary assignment.
100. The attachment of the profit and share of the property in the firm of one partner by a creditor may be a ground for a dissolution of the partnership but only by appealing to the Supreme Court to decree the dissolution. Attachment of profit and share of partner by creditor.
101. The bankruptcy of one or more of the partners acts as a dissolution of the contract as the whole property of the partner passes to the trustee in the bankruptcy and the bankrupt ceases to have the power of free action necessary to the discharge of his duties as partner. Bankruptcy of partner.
102. The death of a partner dissolves the partnership among all the survivors from the date of the death unless the contrary has been provided in the articles of partnership. Death of partner.
103. In all such cases of dissolution as the affairs of the firm must be wound up the partnership subsists for that purpose and that alone and the debts may be collected and paid in the name of the firm by the whole or some or one of the partners nominated for that purpose and the accounts adjusted. Winding-up.
104. The dissolution of the partnership does not change the rights of third parties in regard to liabilities due by the firm and they are entitled to be paid out of the partnership assets and where these are insufficient by the partners or the estate of a deceased partner. Where the partnership assets are insufficient it is not necessary for the creditors to sue each partner but the action will continue to lie against the firm under its ordinary name style title or designation until the winding-up is finished and judgment having been obtained and the partnership having no assets the judgment may be put in force against the individual partners. Rights of third parties in regard to liabilities.
105. In order that there may be no confusion between a partnership which is subsisting solely for the purpose of winding-up and one which is in actual operation the words "in liquidation" shall be added to the name of the firm in course of winding-up on its ordinary place of business and as the heading of all bills and demands made upon debtors and in all documents relating to the winding-up and in any legal proceedings instituted by or against the firm the like words shall be added to the ordinary name style title or designation according as the firm are plaintiffs or defendants. Partnership in liquidation.

Notice in cases of liquidation,

106. On the dissolution of a partnership it is necessary to give public notice to prevent partners being held liable as such for the acts of their co-partners after dissolution and it is hereby enacted that in addition to the words "in liquidation" being added to the name of the firm an advertisement in the Gazette and a notice of the dissolution published in the newspapers of the Colony shall be sufficient public notice within the Colony but creditors of the partnership are entitled to separate private notice by writing.

(vii) *Special provisions relating to dissolution by bankruptcy.*

Bankruptcy.

107. The partnership as a trader may apply to the adjudicated bankrupt on the same grounds as a sole trader or the partnership may be made bankrupt compulsorily by creditors in the same manner as a sole trader.

Firm adjudicated bankrupt.

108. The firm may apply to be adjudicated bankrupt without an adjudication being asked for against the individual partners and the creditors may apply for adjudication against the firm alone without seeking an adjudication against the individual partners.

Effect as against individual partners.

109. Where the firm applies to be adjudicated bankrupt without an adjudication against the individual partners any creditors of the requisite amount may apply for adjudication against the individual partners.

Partners may apply for adjudication.

110. Where creditors have applied for adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm and not against the individual partners it will be competent for the partners to make an application to have themselves adjudicated bankrupt.

Special adjudication against partners.

111. The creditors applying for adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm may apply for adjudication against one or more of the individual partners without applying for adjudication against the whole and one or more of the partners may apply for adjudication against themselves when that is competent without the whole having so applied.

Power of trustee in certain cases.

112. When adjudication of bankruptcy has been granted against the firm only either on the voluntary application of the firm or compulsorily at the instance of creditors without the individual partners being adjudged bankrupt and the trustee shall find either in the course of his investigations or at the conclusion thereof that the contributions required from any of the individual partners to pay the debts of the firm are greater than they can pay or provide for or if he has reason to believe that any individual partner is disposing of his separate property without awaiting the result of the investigation or is preparing to leave the Colony or in any way acting so as to prejudice the right of the creditors under the bankruptcy it shall be competent for the trustee to apply for an adjudication of bankruptcy against such partner or partners.

Bankruptcy of partner,—effect of.

113. Creditors cannot apply for an adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm for debts due by an individual partner but they may apply for the bankruptcy of the separate partner and if granted his bankruptcy operates as a dissolution of the partnership which may then be wound up either by the firm in liquidation or by an adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm should that be applied for in a competent manner.

Court may appoint same trustee.

114. Where adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm is accompanied or followed by adjudication against the individual partners the Court may appoint the same trustee to wind up the different estates where such a course shall appear best for all concerned.

115. Where there is a concurrent winding-up of the estate of the partnership and the separate estates of the partners it is not necessary for the trustee to await the completion of the winding-up of the partnership estate before he declares any dividend on the estate of the individual partners or *vice versa* should he be satisfied that there are sufficient funds in either estate to pay the deficiency on the other or should he make sufficient allowance for the probable claims against either before striking the amount of the dividend. The share of the surplus of the individual partner from the partnership estate will become an asset of his individual estate and where there is no surplus but a deficiency the deficiency in whole or in part according to the solvency of the other partners will rank as a debt upon the separate estate.

Concurrent winding-up: duty of trustee.

116. Partners subject to their liability for any deficiency in the partnership assets may prove against the partnership estate for any debts due to themselves personally and especially where the claim of the partner proving is founded upon a fraudulent appropriation of his separate property to the purposes of the partnership.

Partners may prove against partnership.

117. If one or more of the partners should be members of another partnership or carrying on another trade such partnership or partner as trader may prove for such partnership or trade debts in the same manner as ordinary creditors against the partnership or the estates of individual partners.

Where partners are members of another firm.

118. The partnership may prove as a creditor against the estate of a bankrupt partner for any sums owing by him and especially the partnership may also prove for sums fraudulently abstracted by the individual partner to swell his own estate.

Partnership may prove against bankrupt partner.

IV.—PARTNERSHIP WITH LIMITED LIABILITY OF CERTAIN PARTNERS.

119. A partnership may consist of two classes of partners one class consisting of one or more partners being responsible for the debts of the partnership as ordinary partners and another class which may also consist of one or more partners who are contributors to the capital solely and not active members of the partnership and whose liability for the debts of the concern shall be limited to the amount of capital contributed by them.

New form of partnership.

120. The name of the partnership shall include one or more of the partners whose liability is unlimited together with the addition "and company" to cover the partners not named and it shall not be necessary to add anything to such a designation to show that any of the partners are mere contributors to the capital and not active members of the partnership but the insertion of the name of any contributory in the name style title or designation of the firm shall of itself make him an ordinary partner.

Designation.

121. The terms and conditions of such partnerships must be set forth in articles of partnership whatever the amount of the capital or period of duration of the partnership and these articles must disclose the partners whose liability is unlimited and the names and the amount of contribution to the capital of those partners who are not to interfere in the active management of the partnership and not to be responsible beyond the amount contributed and their respective rights and interests in the partnership.

Terms and conditions to be stated in articles.

122. It shall not be necessary to register such articles (except under any general provisions for the registration of deeds and documents now in force or to be hereafter enacted) but an abstract of the

Abstract of articles.

same shall be registered in the office of the Registrar-General in a book properly indexed to be kept by him for the purpose in which an abstract or vidimus prepared by the parties thereto and certified as correct by one of the partners whose liability is unlimited or by an attorney of the Supreme Court shall be recorded and preserved.

Abstract of articles must be registered.

123. Such abstract shall set forth as nearly as may be in the form contained in Schedule B hereto annexed the date when the articles of partnership were entered into the name of the company the nature of the business the date of the commencement of the partnership and its duration the names of the partners whose liability is unlimited the amount of capital of the company and the sums contributed by partners whose liability is limited. It shall not be necessary to disclose in such abstract the names of the partners who merely contribute to the capital.

Fees.

124. There shall be charged for the registration of such abstract and the inspection thereof or for a certified copy of the same the sums set forth in Schedule C hereto annexed.

Court may order exhibition of articles &c.

125. The exhibition of the articles of partnership and the disclosure of the names of the partners whose liability is unlimited can at any time be ordered by the Supreme Court in the course of proceedings against the partnership.

Certificate to false abstract: penalty.

126. Any partner or attorney of Supreme Court who certifies to the correctness of an abstract which shall not truly disclose the facts required to be disclosed as the same are contained in such articles of partnership or which shall falsely set forth any of such facts shall be deemed guilty of an offence which shall be punishable on conviction thereof according to law by imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years.

Liability of dormant partner.

127. If the partners who are set forth in the articles as contributing to the capital and not to be liable beyond the amounts of their contribution afterwards take an active part in the administration of the partnership they shall be liable as ordinary partners.

Proof of active partnership defined.

128. The visiting occasionally of the place of business for the purpose of inspecting the books and advising with the other partners upon business matters shall not be regarded as taking part in the administration in the sense of the preceding article but any buying and selling or dealing with the cash or presence in the place of business during business hours which would lead the public to believe that the partner so acting was an active partner in the concern shall make him subject to the liabilities of the firm as an ordinary partner and the consideration of the weight to be attached to any particular facts must be left to the appreciation of the legal tribunals.

129. The same consequences will follow although the partner contributing to the capital may allege that he acted in the business of the partnership per procuracion of the firm or as mandatory of the other partners.

As to true position of partner.

130. In the event of any question arising as to the true position of a partner the burden of proof will lie upon the partner who claims to be relieved from the ordinary obligations to show that he was only a contributor to the capital and not an ordinary partner.

Where partner shall be deemed an ordinary partner.

131. If any partner shall receive a portion of the profit of a partnership and is unable to prove that he has paid the sum stipulated in the articles of partnership to be payable by him as a partner contributing to the capital he will be taken to be an ordinary partner and liable for the debts of the partnership as such.

132. It shall not be lawful to divide or constitute the capital of a partnership of this description by shares.	Restriction as to capital.
---	----------------------------

133. The partners who do not take part in the administration of the business may at any time demand an inspection of the accounts of the partnership and it shall be the duty of the partners who administer to keep the books of the partnership with correctness and up to date.

All partners may inspect accounts.

134. If accounts should not be delivered or shown on demand the partner may apply to the Court for an account with or without praying for a dissolution of the partnership and under such application the Court may not only order an account but decree a dissolution.

135. If the partners who administer the affairs of the partnership or any of them knowingly give or exhibit to the partner or partners whose liability is limited a false account representing the administration as having resulted in profit whereas there had in reality been a loss he or they shall be held to have committed a fraud upon such partners which shall be an offence punishable on conviction according to law by imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years.

Penalty on partner exhibiting false accounts.

136. If any partner whose liability is limited shall knowingly accept of any sum purporting to be a dividend upon the amount of capital contributed by him or in name of profit made by the partnership when no such profit was made he shall be held liable for the debts of the partnership as an ordinary partner.

Liability of partner accepting dividend when no profit was made.

<p>137. B.A.W.R.A. WOOL.

The position of crossbred wool.

The Directors of the British-Australian Wool Realisation Association have once more reviewed very carefully the position of crossbred wool. The statistical memorandum given below shows that the stock of crossbred wool in the hands of B.A.W.R.A. has diminished in the last two years by about 239 million lb., while the stock of wool in Argentina and Uruguay has diminished in the same period by approximately 131 million lb. When all deductions have been made there remains the absolute certainty that the supply of crossbred wool in the world has diminished in two years by a minimum of 220 million lb., while there is a high degree of probability that the actual diminution is between 240 million and 260 million lb.

It will be seen that in the above figures allowance is made for an increase of the stock of crossbred wool in the hands of dealers and manufacturers since 30th June, 1920, of from 30 million to 50 million lb., on balance, the diminution in the United States compensating to some extent for the increase in Europe. The absence of authoritative statistics of dealers' and users' stocks prevents any closer approximation to the actual figures. The surplus of crossbred wool in the Southern Hemisphere has now been almost entirely wiped out. From the River Plate Republics shipments have been made in the last twelve months equal to 633,000 bales, which is considerably more than twice the estimated amount of the clip in those countries which will begin to be shorn in October. During the same period New Zealand wool equal to one clip and a half has been absorbed by dealers and users. Practically the whole of the purchases of Australasian and South American crossbreds have been made for Europe as the United States have taken less than one quarter of their usual share.

In view of the above facts, the Directors of B.A.W.R.A. have not been surprised to learn from many of the leading buyers that some time is required for digesting the very heavy purchases of crossbred wool lately made, especially the wool below 50's, of which the greater part of the New Zealand, Argentina and Uruguay clips is composed. A short breathing space is specially desirable at a time when the trade has to deal with the English clip.

In view of this situation and in conformity with the policy fully set forth in the Directors' report of 13th January, 1922, the Board have decided to withdraw as far as possible all the medium and coarse crossbred wool intended to be shown in the July to September sales. It may be necessary for warehouse reasons to include a few small parcels of these wools at the Hull and London sales in July and September, but limits will be placed on such parcels not lower than the full equivalent of the June auction values. Current prices are already far below the cost of production, and a further fall to be followed inevitably by a much greater rise later on, would be harmful and disturbing to all the interests concerned, especially in so far as such a fall would bring about a further reduction of the production, which has already fallen to such a point as to cause some anxiety as to future supplies. It is notorious that land once diverted from sheep farming very seldom returns to it.

The increase in holdings of Australasian and South American crossbred wool in the hands of dealers and manufacturers cannot be estimated so closely as the other figures, but on no possible calculation can it be put higher for the world as a whole than 70 million lb., there being a high degree of likelihood that the actual net increase is between 40 million and 50 million lb. In England and the Continent of Europe taken together there may be reckoned to be an increase of 80 million to 120 million lb., of which rather less than half is held in England. In the United States, on the other hand, there is a very considerable diminution, which cannot possibly be less than 40 million lb., and is probably 50 million to 60 million lb. The shipments from the River Plate to the United States from October, 1921, to May, 1922, were 64 million lb., less than a year before.

V.

The total diminution, therefore, of the baled stocks of crossbreds from Australasia and the River Plate is about 294 million lb. less a quantity which may be reckoned at between 40 million and 50 million lb. The net diminution, therefore, approximates to 250 million lb., which is equal to the whole exportable surplus of the Argentine Republic and Uruguay for next season.

Ordinance No. of 1922.

A Bill

To amend "The Live Stock Ordinance, 1901."

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Live Stock (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922," and shall be read and construed as one with "the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901," hereinafter referred to as the principal ordinance.

Short Title.
To form part of the principal ordinance.

2. The definition of "infected sheep" in Section 1 of the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

Interpretation of term
"infected sheep."

"Infected sheep" means any sheep infected with scab or other infectious or contagious disease or affected with any parasitic disease or which within six months have been exposed to disease as aforesaid.

3. Section 13 of the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

Annual Return.

Every farmer shall, on or before the 30th day of June in each year, make and transmit to the Chief Inspector a return in Form 5 of First Schedule hereto.

4. Section 30 of the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

Every person who by himself, his agent or servant, drives, without the permission of an Inspector, or depastures or suffers to stray, any sheep from a station declared by such Inspector to be affected with lice, shall be liable on conviction for every day during which such sheep shall be so driven, depastured or suffered to stray, to a penalty not exceeding five pounds and not less than one pound.

Sheep not to be driven from station affected with lice.

5. Form 5 of the First Schedule to the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the form shewn in the schedule hereto.

Clause 2 was amended to read as follows:-

In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of Whale and Seal Oil for the period from the 1st day of October, 1921, to the 30th day of September, 1922.

Clause 3 was amended to read as follows:-

A refund of a part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid upon whale and seal oil, between the first day of October, 1921, and the thirtieth day of September, 1922, shall be made in accordance with the following scale:-

If the average market price for the season per ton of first grade oil,				
Exceeds £45 but does not exceed £50 per ton	...			6d.
" £40 " " " " £45 " "	...			1/-
Does not exceed " " £40 " "	...			1/6.

Clause 4 was amended to read as follows:-

In the event of any difference of opinion arising as to the average market price for the season the decision of the Governor in Council shall be final.

The enacting clause was agreed to.

The title was amended to read as follows:-

To provide for the refund of a portion of the duties of Customs levied and collected on Whale and Seal oil, between the 1st of October, 1921, and the 30th of September, 1922, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. Supplementary Estimate No. 1 of 1922, was submitted for the approval of Council, and passed.

Regulations governing the importation of sheep from South America made by the Governor in Council under section 45 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901.

The regulations governing the importation and exportation of Live Stock made by the Governor in Council on the 7th of February, 1914, shall apply to the importation of sheep from South America subject to the following additional provisions :

1. The sheep shall be imported by a vessel to be approved by the Governor.
2. The importing vessel shall be provided with adequate supplies of fodder and water before leaving the Colony and shall not take on board at any foreign port any hay, fodder, straw, litter or water for consumption.
3. The sheep shall be inspected before shipment by a person to be appointed by the Governor for this purpose. The person so appointed shall make a declaration in the form annexed hereto with respect to the sheep which it is intended to import and the declaration shall be countersigned by the Chief Inspector of Stock.
4. The sheep shall be landed on an island to be approved by the Governor and shall remain there in quarantine for a period of 90 days.
5. The sheep shall be dipped a first time on being landed at the quarantine station and a second time after an interval of ten days.
6. Before the sheep are released from quarantine they shall be marked with yellow ruddle.
7. The owner of any sheep imported under these regulations shall not permit any such sheep, for a period of twelve months from the date of importation, to be depastured or to stray on any land which is not separated by at least two fences from any lands not in the occupation of the said owner.
8. Any sheep marked with yellow ruddle which shall be found straying on lands not in the occupation of the owner of the sheep, so marked, may be destroyed or may be ordered to be destroyed forthwith by the owner or occupier of such lands and no compensation whatsoever shall be payable to any person in respect of the destruction of such sheep.

This regulation (No. 8) shall remain in force until notice of its repeal shall have been published in Government Gazette.

An Ordinance

To amend "The Live Stock Ordinance, 1901."

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

Short Title.
To form part of the
principal ordinance.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Live Stock (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922," and shall be read and construed as one with "the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901," hereinafter referred to as the principal ordinance.

Interpretation of term
"infected sheep."

2. The definition of "infected sheep" in Section 1 of the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

"Infected sheep" means any sheep infected with scab or other infectious or contagious disease or affected with any parasitic disease or which within six months have been exposed to disease as aforesaid.

Annual Return.

3. Section 13 of the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

Every farmer shall, on or before the 30th day of June in each year, make and transmit to the Chief Inspector a return in Form 5 of First Schedule hereto.

4. Section 30 of the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

Sheep not to be driven
from station affected
with lice.

Every person who by himself, his agent or servant, drives, without the permission of an Inspector, or depastures or suffers to stray, any sheep from a station declared by such Inspector to be affected with lice, shall be liable on conviction for every day during which such sheep shall be so driven, depastured or suffered to stray, to a penalty not exceeding five pounds and not less than one pound.

5. Form 5 of the First Schedule to the principal ordinance is repealed and replaced by the form shewn in the schedule hereto. Form of Annual Return.

An Ordinance
To provide for Trading Companies and
other Associations.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Companies and Private Partnership Ordinance 1922". Short Title.

I. COMPANIES.

2. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance the following Acts of the Imperial Parliament are declared to be in force in the Colony in so far as they are applicable:— Imperial Companies Acts extended to the Colony.

The Companies (Consolidation) Act, 1908 (8 Edw. VII, ch. 69), and

The Companies Act, 1913 (3 and 4, Geo. V., ch. 25).

3. The Registrar-General shall be the Registrar of Companies and the memorandum of associations and the articles of association (if any) of any trading company formed in the Colony under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be registered in a deed book kept for that purpose. Registrar.

4. (1) The Governor in Executive Council may make rules for the more effectual working of the said Imperial Acts in the Colony. Such rules shall be published in the Gazette and shall come into operation as from the date of publication. Rules and Fees.

(2) There shall be paid to the Registrar in respect of the several matters mentioned in Schedule A to this Ordinance the several fees therein specified or such smaller fees as the Governor may from time to time direct.

(3) All fees paid to the Registrar in pursuance of this Ordinance shall be paid into the Treasury.

Requirements as to
Companies established
outside the Colony.

5. (1) A company incorporated outside the Colony may carry on business in the Colony or its Dependencies by filing with the Registrar General:—

- (a) a certified copy of the charter, statutes, or memorandum and articles of the company, or other instrument constituting or defining the constitution of the Company and, if the instrument is not written in the English language a certified translation in the English language thereof;
- (b) list of the directors of the company;
- (c) the name of some one or more persons resident or stationed for the time being in the Colony or its Dependencies authorised to accept on behalf of the company service of process and any notices required to be served on the company;

and in the event of any alteration being made in any such instrument, or in the directors, or in the names of any such person as aforesaid, the company shall file with the Registrar General within six months a notice of the alteration.

(2) Any process or notice required to be served on the company shall be sufficiently served if addressed to any person whose name has been so filed as aforesaid and left at or sent to the address which has been so filed.

(3) If any company to which this section applies fails to comply with any of the requirements of this section the company, and every officer or agent of the company, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds, or in the case of a continuing offence five pounds for every day during which the failure continues.

(4) There shall be paid to the Registrar for registering any document required by this section to be filed with him a fee of five shillings or such smaller fee as may be prescribed by the Governor.

Provided always that paragraphs (a) and (b) of sub-section (1) of this section shall not apply to any company incorporated outside the Colony which shall carry on business within the Colony solely through the medium of a *bona fide* agent.

Power of Companies
incorporated outside
the Colony.

6. A company incorporated outside the Colony and duly registered in accordance with the provisions of the last foregoing section may sue and be sued in its incorporated name and enjoy all the privileges of a company projected formed and incorporated in the Colony.

II. GENERAL PRINCIPLES OF PARTNERSHIP.

Nature of Partnership.

7. (1) Partnership is the relation which subsists between persons carrying on a business in common with a view of profit.

(2) But the relation between members of any company or association which is;

- (a) Registered as a Company under this Ordinance or any other Ordinance for the time being in force relating to the registration of joint stock companies; or
- (b) Formed or incorporated by or in pursuance of any other Ordinance of the Colony or letters patent, or Royal Charter;

is not a partnership within the meaning of this Ordinance.

8. A new partner cannot be introduced to the partnership without the consent of all the partners. The consent of the majority will not suffice. New partners.
9. One partner may take a sub-partner to participate in his share of the partnership but such sub-partner is not a partner in the partnership. Sub-partners.
10. The contract is essentially one of good faith among the partners both in its beginning and its progress and it can be set aside at any time on fraud being established. In case of fraud.
11. The number of partners in a private partnership shall not exceed twenty. Maximum number of partners.
12. An infant may be a partner but under the law with regard to infants he is not responsible for the debts of the partnership if he repudiates his liability on coming of age. Infant may become partner
13. (1) If a partner was a lunatic at the time of entering into the contract and the fact was concealed from any of the partners the fraud will be a sufficient ground for setting aside the contract. In case of lunacy.
- (2) If the lunacy was known to the other partners they cannot afterwards set aside the contract on that ground but it may at any time be set aside by those acting for the lunatic.
- (3) If the contract has been entered into by the lunatic in a lucid moment and is a transaction in good faith as regards the other partners any supervening lunacy will not invalidate the right of the lunatic to his share of the profits and his property will be subject to the debts of the partnership.
- (4) If a partner sane at the time of entering into the contract shall become insane during the partnership it shall be at the option of the remaining partners to continue the partnership according to the terms of the contract or to dissolve the partnership.
14. A married woman may with the consent of her husband enter into a contract of partnership and when such consent has been given by the husband signing the articles of partnership the wife shall be entitled to act as a *feme sole* with regard to the partnership. Married woman may become partner.
15. The undertaking into which the partners enter must be a lawful one but need not be any particular business as a valid partnership may be constituted for purposes of a general nature to speculate in any way which may appear to offer profit. Undertaking must be lawful but may be of a general nature.
16. The partnership must be for the purpose of making profit in which each of the partners shall have a share. Partner to share in profits.
17. It is not necessary that each partner actually participate in the profits whatever amount of profit may be made because a partner may validly stipulate on account of the greater share of the fund which he advances that one or more of the partners shall not receive anything unless a certain amount of profit has been made. It is enough that each partner shall have a fair chance of making profit and that the conditions of the contract are not manifestly unjust. Participation in profits.
18. The partners in the contract of partnership bear the loss mutually if they fail to make profit and incur loss but it shall not be unlawful for a partner to stipulate as between himself and the other partners that he shall not be liable to contribute to the loss. Losses to be borne mutually.

Shares in profit and loss.

19. The shares in the profit and the proportion of responsibility for loss may be equal or unequal according to the agreement of the partners or *pro rata* according to the amount each has contributed to the common fund but where no stipulation has been made and there is no guide to the intention of parties the shares in the profit and loss shall be taken to be equal.

Share in profits without being a partner.

20. While partners share in profit and are liable for loss a mere participation in profits does not necessarily make the participator a partner. A manager or servant of a partnership may have a share in the profits as his wages and yet not be a partner.

Proof of partnership.

21. The mere fact that the participator in the profits is the manager or servant of the partnership does not necessarily exclude him from being a partner. The fact whether he is a partner or not depends upon the intention of parties when he was admitted to share profits and must be judged of according to the facts and circumstances of each case.

Persons may participate in profits without being liable as partners.

22. The advance of money by way of loan upon a contract in writing to receive a rate of interest varying with the profits or even a share of the profits will not of itself make the lender a partner. A widow or child of a partner may receive a portion of profits by way of annuity without incurring liability for the debts of the partnership. The vendor of the goodwill of a business may receive a portion of the profits in consideration of the sale without being subject to the liabilities of a partner.

What may constitute capital.

23. The fund which the partners contribute or as it is commonly called the capital of the partnership need not necessarily consist of money. One may contribute his skill or his labour or goods or real estate or the goodwill of a business and generally it may be said that anything which the partners themselves consider to have value may be contributed to the common fund.

Where labour or skill is contributed.

24. Where the contribution of the partner is labour or skill or something which bears no ratable proportion to the money supplied by others it is the more necessary that the share of the profits to which each partner is entitled should be fixed at the time of making the contract. If no proportion is fixed the contributor of the skill or labour shall be entitled to receive profits in proportion to the smallest sum of money advanced by the other partners.

Where capital exceeds one hundred pounds or duration of contract exceeds twelve months.

25. No partnership in which the common fund or capital exceeds the value of one hundred pounds sterling and the duration of the contract exceeds or by the nature of the engagement must exceed twelve months can be pleaded or proved in actions between the partners themselves unless the contract has been embodied in articles of partnership. If a partner has been admitted subsequent to the articles his admission may be proved by letters writings or facts and circumstances.

As to existing partnerships.

26. Existing partnerships shall until their termination be subject to the rules of the law anterior to this Ordinance as regards the necessity of articles but all future contracts of partnerships shall with the exception aforesaid be embodied in articles of partnership.

Limited partners may be responsible as Ordinary partners in certain cases.

27. If those who are not partners at all or who may be limited partners only hold themselves out to others as ordinary partners and in this manner cause them to enter into contracts or make advances or sell goods on credit or in any other way to become creditors the individuals who so represent themselves shall be held bound by their representations.

28. A person who enters into a partnership without notification and continues in it for the purpose of sharing in the profit as a dormant partner shall be liable to creditors during the time he remained a partner in the same manner as an ordinary partner.

Liability of dormant partners.

III.—PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP WHERE THE LIABILITY OF

THE MEMBERS IS UNLIMITED.

(i) *The partnership property.*

29. The whole property real and personal original and acquired of the partners as a whole in connection with the partnership shall be held as belonging to the partnership under the firm name style title or designation and the partnership to that effect shall be regarded as a juridical person and it shall be capable of sustaining the relation of creditor and have the right to sue and of sustaining the relation of debtor and the liability to be sued each partner having a contingent right to his share of the property when the debts shall be paid and the property divided but having no right while the partnership lasts to dispose of the property except for partnership purposes and on the other hand each partner remaining liable for the debts of the partnership.

Partnership property.

30. The partnership itself may be lawfully sued by entering as the name of the defendant the firm name style title or designation under which the partnership conducts its ordinary business and a writ left at the ordinary place of business of such partnership or with a manager clerk shopman operative or servant therein or delivered personally to any one partner shall be a sufficient service upon the said partnership and upon the individual partners thereof and judgment may be given thereon which shall be a good judgment against the partnership as in the case of any ordinary defendant to an action.

Partnership may be sued in name of firm.

31. The partnership may sue under the firm name style title or designation by which it conducts its ordinary business without requiring to insert as a plaintiff the name of any individual partner and a judgment obtained in any action in which the writ shall be so sued out shall be a good judgment and may be enforced by all the remedies competent to an ordinary plaintiff.

Partnership may sue in name of firm.

32. Real estate may form part of the capital of a partnership.

Real estate may form capital.

33. The real property may form part of the partnership property although the title may be in name of one or more of the partners and be liable for the debts of the partnership or be treated as personalty on the death of a partner.

Liabilities thereof.

34. On the other hand land may be contributed to the partnership fund not as a portion of the capital but simply for the purpose of cultivation or pasturage the property remaining in the individual partner and the use solely belonging to the partnership.

Real property not necessarily partnership property.

35. Titles to land may be taken in the name of the partnership under its ordinary name style title or designation and a transfer of the same may be validly made under the firm name style title or designation when subscribed to the transfer by one of the partners. Mortgages and encumbrances may be granted and created in the same manner and the transfers mortgages or encumbrances shall when so subscribed be held to have been done with consent of all the partners.

Titles to land may be taken and transferred in name of partnership.

Property to be applied to the payment of debts.

36. The partnership property must first be applied to the payment of partnership debts and each partner has a right to have the same so applied before any individual partner or his creditors or representatives can claim any right therein.

Where partners may claim individually &c.

37. Each partner has a claim on the partnership property for all funds advanced by him and the partnership has also a claim for the repayment to the partnership of whatever has been taken by one partner beyond his share.

Claims against individual partners.

38. No creditor of an individual partner can acquire any right title or interest in the partnership property even as the consequence of a judgment except for so much as belongs to the partner after all claims on the partnership as a whole are deducted and satisfied and the mode of putting any such judgment in force shall be by attachment of the partner's share of profit and property and not by seizure and sale.

(ii) *Powers and authorities of partners.*

Partner may bind partnership in relation to its ordinary business.

39. Each partner is *præpositus negotiis societatis* and while the stipulations in the articles of partnership bind the partners *inter sese* in regard to the extent of their powers as regard the public each partner can bind the partnership by his acts in relation to the partnership business. This however is subject to the limitation that it must be in relation to the partnership business as ordinarily conducted because one partner has no authority to bind his co-partners to obligations which both he and the persons with whom he dealt must have known to be beyond the ordinary scope of the business and of the powers ordinarily exercised by partners.

Ordinary trading transactions may be entered into by any partner.

40. In ordinary trading partnerships the buying and selling of goods the drawing accepting and indorsing of bills the granting of cheques upon the partnership bank account the borrowing of money within ordinary limits for trade purposes the granting of receipts the ordering of insurances the payment of debts the granting of Custom House bonds and the pledging of partnership property for partnership purposes are all within the scope of the agency entrusted to each partner.

With regard to the granting of warranties &c.

41. In partnerships where it is part of the ordinary business to grant warranties or guarantees the guarantee of one partner shall bind the whole but where that is not the ordinary course of the business of the partnership the holder of the guarantee will require to prove that it was done with the consent of the firm.

Reference of dispute.

42. One partner has no authority to refer a matter in dispute to arbitration in name of the partnership without their consent.

Contracts not binding in certain cases.

43. Contracts will not bind the partnership which have been made by one partner with a party who has knowledge or notice that the partner is acting beyond his powers or in fraud of the firm.

Acceptance of the firm given for a private debt.

44. Where a partner gives a bill or acceptance or indorsement of the firm in payment of his private debt the firm will not be bound to the person accepting such a payment unless he can prove that the partner was authorised or otherwise establishes the *bona fides* of the transaction. If the bill is in the hands of third holders the partnership shall be liable unless the circumstances show that the holder was aware of the nature of the transaction.

Application of partnership money to private use.

45. Where money has been raised by one partner upon the faith of the partnership signature and such partner applies the money to his own private debt the firm will be bound when the party advancing the money had no knowledge of the object to which it was to be applied.

46. The same rules will apply to the application of the securities or property real or personal of the firm in payment of the private debt of a partner.

Application of partnership securities.

47. Where money has been advanced to a partner upon his individual credit and responsibility although the money be paid into the firm account and employed for partnership purposes the person making the advance must go against the individual partner who obtained it upon his own credit.

Where money has been advanced to individual partner.

48. A new partner by joining an old firm shall make himself liable like the other partners for the debts of the firm.

Responsibilities of new partner.

49. Where a partnership has been originally liable for a debt and the creditor by arrangement accepts one of the partners as his debtor in place of the partnership such acceptance will extinguish the debt against the firm.

Where a partner is accepted as debtor in place of firm.

50. If a creditor in like manner continues to accept of the partnership as the debtor after the retirement of a partner has been duly notified to him the responsibility of the retiring partner ceases.

Where retiring partner ceases to be responsible.

51. But as the principal of the discharge which is here assumed is that the creditor had notice of the partnership in its altered condition and accepted it as his debtor there must be no doubt of the notice which ought to be both personal and public in the manner set forth in a subsequent section the latter form being sufficient intimation to those who have subsequent dealings with the firm that the partner has retired and the former being necessary in the case of the actual creditors of the firm at the date of retirement.

Notice of discharge of partner from responsibility to be given to creditor.

52. (1) The partnership is liable for torts committed by the partners or the servants of the partnership in the course of carrying on partnership business,

Liability for torts.

(2) The partnership is liable if one of the partners fraudulently disposes of property consigned to the custody and care of the partnership.

For frauds.

(3) The partnership is liable for injuries to persons or goods caused by the want of care or want of skill of the partners or servants of the firm in the carrying on of the ordinary business of the firm.

For injuries to persons or goods.

(4) A partnership of publishers shall be liable for the printing and publishing of a slander by the firm on the authority of one of the partners in the course of the business of the firm.

For slander.

(5) The partnership will be liable for frauds committed on the revenue by one of the partners in conducting the business of the firm.

For frauds on the revenue.

(6) The tort to render the firm liable must be committed in carrying out the business of the firm within the ordinary scope thereof or the act must be endorsed and accepted by the firm.

Liability in certain cases only.

(iii) *Rights and duties of partners.*

53. If any loss be sustained to the partnership from the gross negligence unskillfulness fraud or misconduct of a partner the partner is responsible to the partnership.

Responsibility for loss.

54. A partner is responsible to the partnership for intentional breaches of the articles of partnership.

For breach of articles.

For false representations.

55. If a partner makes any false representations to his partners or conceals from them facts in connection with the business and thereby makes profit to himself he must make good to the partnership the profit so obtained.

Rule as to bonuses etc.

56. If a partner makes any private stipulations with third persons for bonuses or premiums for himself in connection with the business of the partnership he must account therefor to the partnership.

Inability of partner in certain cases.

57. (1) A partner cannot enter into any other business or engagement which will interfere with the proper performance of his partnership duties.

(2) Nor can he make purchase or sales on his private account which would interfere with the bargains of the firm or lessen their profit.

(3) A partner cannot enter upon any other undertaking which would give him a direct interest contrary to that of the partnership but the position must be one not merely of temptation to act in such a manner but an obvious antagonistic interest.

Books must be kept.

58. As one of the chief duties of the partners is to account faithfully to the partnership for all transactions it is absolutely necessary to keep business books in which everything done by each shall appear and be accounted for.

Withholding of accounts presumption of fraud.

59. The withholding of accounts by one partner from the firm shall be of itself a presumption that fraud has been perpetrated or was intended.

Access to books.

60. All the partners are entitled to know the full extent of the partnership affairs and to have free access to the books on all occasions unless they have intentionally limited their powers by the articles.

Salaries and private expenditure of partners.

61. The articles shall state what sum each partner will be entitled to draw for his private expenditure and there may also be a stipulation that one or more shall receive a sum by way of salary before profits are estimated but unless this stipulation be clearly set forth the presumption will be against any salary being payable.

(iv) *Articles of partnership.*

Articles of partnership.

62. In this Ordinance (section twenty-five) it has been made necessary for all partnerships where the capital exceeds one hundred pounds sterling and the duration exceeds twelve months to be constituted by articles of partnership.

Stipulations to be inserted.

63. It is not necessary to insert in articles of partnership the general principles applicable to all contracts of partnership but only such stipulations as without being stipulated would not be implied by law.

Agreements to form partnership.

64. Agreements may be entered into to form a partnership which are not the partnership articles and should any of the partners fail to carry out the agreement it is hereby enacted that such preliminary agreements cannot be enforced so as to compel persons who are unwilling to enter into partnership but an action will lie for damages for breach of agreement wherever any of the parties had proceeded in fulfilment of it to contract engagements to realise funds or do any other act which involved pecuniary obligations or loss in virtue of the agreement.

65. The articles of partnership are construed like other contracts according to the intention of parties and they shall always be construed so as to defeat fraud and the taking by any partner of an unfair advantage over his co-partners.

Construction of articles.

66. If partners do not faithfully observe the articles of partnership among themselves and a practice spring up on any points at variance with the articles it will not be competent for one partner thereafter suddenly to attempt to enforce the articles but the practice will be taken as a virtual alteration or repeal of the articles by consent of all. The articles may be varied during the partnership with consent of all the partners.

Variation of articles.

67. When the partnership is entered into for the carrying on of a specific business the Supreme Court in the event of dispute shall construe strictly the description of the business set forth in the articles so that the partnership be not turned from its legitimate ends.

Where a specific business is carried on.

68. The time for commencement of the partnership shall be carefully set forth. If no date is specified it will be held to commence from the date of the articles.

Date of commencement.

69. The name or style by which the firm is to be known shall be defined by the articles as it is under the common name that the partnership will not only carry on its transactions but also that under which it will sue or be sued. The name need not include any of the existing partners.

Name of firm to be defined.

70. The articles shall set forth the duration of the partnership but whatever time be stated the death of a partner brings the partnership to an end unless there are stipulations to the contrary.

Duration of partnership.

71. If the articles stipulate that the death of a partner shall not necessarily put an end to the partnership a clause may empower the representative of the deceased partner to carry on the business with the survivors for the benefit of the widow and children of the deceased partner and for the admission of one or more of the children as partners on their arrival at majority.

Death of partner need not terminate partnership.

72. If the interest in the partnership be given to the widow during her life and to the children after her death it is only the children who survive the mother who are entitled to a share.

Where interest is given to the widow.

73. The articles may empower the partners to provide by will or otherwise for the disposal of their share in the event of death. If the will leaves the executors the freedom of declining should they not consider it wise or expedient to continue the partnership the death of the party then puts an end to the partnership.

Disposition of share by will or otherwise.

74. The articles shall contain provisions for the manner in which the share of a deceased partner shall be estimated and paid should there be no intention to admit the representatives into business.

Share of deceased partner.

75. It may be stipulated that one or more of the partners shall have the direction of the business of the company and these provisions will be enforced by a competent Court.

One or more partners may conduct business.

76. There may be special cases where a partnership is formed for working some manufacture which is a secret and in such cases it will be competent for the partner who is in possession of the secret to make such stipulations as shall protect him in the working thereof.

As to secret manufactures.

- Computation of capital. 77. The clauses in connection with the contribution of the capital shall bring to a money valuation such items as lands buildings book debts and other property which may be contributed in order that the capital account may be clearly set forth.
- Profits. 78. Provision shall be made for balances and division of profits.
- Accounts when agreed to be conclusive. 79. It may be provided to prevent future disputes that the accounts as agreed to at any particular time shall be conclusive but no such provision will bar an enquiry into fraud.
- Employees. 80. The mode of hiring and dismissing employees of the firm shall be provided for.
- Retirement of partner. 81. The mode of permitting a partner to retire from the firm either with or without liberty to carry on the same trade and the purchase of his share by the firm or otherwise may be stipulated.
- Dissolution and winding up. 82. The steps necessary to be taken upon dissolution the mode of winding-up and the settlement of controversies shall be provided for and it shall be competent for the partners to provide that any of their number may be expelled from the partnership should his conduct or pecuniary entanglements be such as to compromise the credit of the firm.
- (v) *Remedies against partners and third parties.*
- Firms may sue and be sued. 83. (1) A partner may sue the partnership under the firm style name title or designation and the partnership may in like manner sue a partner for any matter or thing in relation to which a cause of action has arisen. Two firms may sue each other although some of the partners may be partners in both or any member of either firm may sue either or both.
- (2) Third parties may sue the partnership and the partnership may sue third parties in the same way as ordinary plaintiffs may sue but when judgment has been given against the partnership the execution will not lie against the separate partners unless the firm has no effects. Where the judgment has to be enforced by imprisonment it will be competent to proceed against one or other of the partners at the choice of the holder of the judgment.
- Private debts of partner. 84. Where judgment has been given against a partner for a private debt the share of profit and share of partnership property belonging to such partner may be attached in the hands of the firm but it shall not be competent to proceed to seizure and sale of the property of the firm for the separate debt of a partner.
- Existence of firm. 85. The juridical person of the firm will be taken to be in existence after the active operations of the partnership have ceased or after the partners have entered into a new contract for all purposes connected with the receiving and paying the debts of the firm and generally for the purpose of winding up but for that only.
- One partner may sue another. 86. One partner may sue another for all matters or things unconnected with the partnership and even for matters arising out of the partnership if the interests of the firm are not necessarily involved.
- Denial of access to books. 87. Any partner who has been denied access to the books or papers of the firm or who has reason to believe that one or more of the partners have made profit from the partnership without disclosing it may sue the firm for an account and this right extends to the

executor administrators or representatives of a deceased partner. Such action may be sued without its being necessary to ask for a dissolution of the partnership but the Supreme Court may decree the dissolution should circumstances emerge during the enquiry which induce the belief that mutual concert and agreement between the parties is thenceforth impossible.

(vi) *Dissolution of partnership.*

88. A partnership may be dissolved by the act or consent of the partners or of some of them or by the judgment of a competent court or by the mere operation of law or by the extinction or completion of the thing in regard to which the partnership was formed or by the lapse of time for which it was originally contracted or by the death or bankruptcy of a partner.

Partnership may be dissolved.

89. All partnerships whether a period has been fixed for the termination of the contract or the duration is merely dependent on the will of the partners can be brought to an end by mutual consent the whole existence of the contract depending upon the consent of the parties who made it. A partnership which has no fixed term may be dissolved at the desire of either of the partners and even by acts which are inconsistent with the continuance of the partnership.

Dissolution by consent.

90. Although the original contract has been made by deed under seal it is not necessary that the dissolution be effected in the same way. The resolution to dissolve publicly announced as afterwards provided for will be sufficient.

Must be publicly announced.

91. A partnership which is to endure for a stated period cannot be brought to an end by the mere will of one of the partners but any partner may apply to the Supreme Court for a dissolution on sufficient cause shown.

Or decreed by the Court.

92. When the term for which the partnership was originally formed has elapsed and no notice of dissolution has been given and no new articles of partnership entered into but the partners have continued the business without any change the association between them will be treated as a partnership at will under the same terms and conditions so far as applicable which are set forth in the original articles these for the purposes required by section twenty-five hereof being taken to be the articles of the continued partnership.

Partnerships at will.

93. (1) The causes for which a partnership may be brought to an end by the Court on the application of a partner although the fixed term has not elapsed are generally those which arise subsequently to the formation of the contract from the misconduct fraud or violation of duty of one or more of the partners.

Court may end partnership on cause being shown.

(2) The misconduct or violation of duty must not be trivial or in regard to other relations of life unless they have a tendency to injure the credit or interfere with the business of the partnership.

(3) The Supreme Court may be applied to for a dissolution because of the impracticability of carrying out the partnership from a change of circumstances or a failure of expectations.

94. It has already been provided in section thirteen sub-section four that supervening insanity of any partner may be a cause for dissolution at the choice of the partners. The insanity must be such as is likely to continue and not a merely temporary malady.

Insanity a cause.

95. The prolonged absence of a partner his residence out of the colony his change of domicile or engaging in pursuits incompatible with his duty to the partnership may all be good grounds for the dissolution of the partnership by a Court of law even where the term has not expired.

Also absence of partner.

- Question of dissolution may be referred. 96. The partners may refer to arbitration the question of dissolution before the agreed on term and an award decreeing dissolution shall be a competent award and even where the question of dissolution has not been expressly referred if the differences between the partners have been referred and the arbitrators have awarded a dissolution that shall be a competent award.
- Effect of outlawry &c. 97. The outlawry of a partner or his attainder for treason or felony operates as a dissolution of the partnership.
- Effect of female partner marrying. 98. A female partner marrying may continue as a partner but the husband shall have no right arising from his *jus mariti* or otherwise to interfere with the affairs of the firm but she shall act in the affairs of the partnership as a *feme sole* ; but the marriage of a female partner during the tenure of the partnership may be a good ground for applying to the Supreme Court to decree a dissolution under the particular circumstances of the case.
- Voluntary assignment. 99. The voluntary assignment by one or more of the partners of all their right title and interest in the partnership property dissolves the partnership.
- Attachment of profit and share of partner by creditor. 100. The attachment of the profit and share of the property in the firm of one partner by a creditor may be a ground for a dissolution of the partnership but only by appealing to the Supreme Court to decree the dissolution.
- Bankruptcy of partner. 101. The bankruptcy of one or more of the partners acts as a dissolution of the contract as the whole property of the partner passes to the trustee in the bankruptcy and the bankrupt ceases to have the power of free action necessary to the discharge of his duties as partner.
- Death of partner. 102. The death of a partner dissolves the partnership among all the survivors from the date of the death unless the contrary has been provided in the articles of partnership.
- Winding-up. 103. In all such cases of dissolution as the affairs of the firm must be wound up the partnership subsists for that purpose and that alone and the debts may be collected and paid in the name of the firm by the whole or some or one of the partners nominated for that purpose and the accounts adjusted.
- Rights of third parties in regard to liabilities. 104. The dissolution of the partnership does not change the rights of third parties in regard to liabilities due by the firm and they are entitled to be paid out of the partnership assets and where these are insufficient by the partners or the estate of a deceased partner. Where the partnership assets are insufficient it is not necessary for the creditors to sue each partner but the action will continue to lie against the firm under its ordinary name style title or designation until the winding-up is finished and judgment having been obtained and the partnership having no assets the judgment may be put in force against the individual partners.
- Partnership in liquidation. 105. In order that there may be no confusion between a partnership which is subsisting solely for the purpose of winding-up and one which is in actual operation the words "in liquidation" shall be added to the name of the firm in course of winding-up on its ordinary place of business and as the heading of all bills and demands made upon debtors and in all documents relating to the winding-up and in any legal proceedings instituted by or against the firm the like words shall be added to the ordinary name style title or designation according as the firm are plaintiffs or defendants.

106. On the dissolution of a partnership it is necessary to give public notice to prevent partners being held liable as such for the acts of their co-partners after dissolution and it is hereby enacted that in addition to the words "in liquidation" being added to the name of the firm an advertisement in the Gazette and a notice of the dissolution published in the newspapers of the Colony shall be sufficient public notice within the Colony but creditors of the partnership are entitled to separate private notice by writing.

Notice in cases of liquidation,

(vii) *Special provisions relating to dissolution by bankruptcy.*

107. The partnership as a trader may apply to be adjudicated bankrupt on the same grounds as a sole trader or the partnership may be made bankrupt compulsorily by creditors in the same manner as a sole trader.

Bankruptcy.

108. The firm may apply to be adjudicated bankrupt without an adjudication being asked for against the individual partners and the creditors may apply for adjudication against the firm alone without seeking an adjudication against the individual partners.

Firm adjudicated bankrupt.

109. Where the firm applies to be adjudicated bankrupt without an adjudication against the individual partners any creditors of the requisite amount may apply for adjudication against the individual partners.

Effect as against individual partners.

110. Where creditors have applied for adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm and not against the individual partners it will be competent for the partners to make an application to have themselves adjudicated bankrupt.

Partners may apply for adjudication.

111. The creditors applying for adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm may apply for adjudication against one or more of the individual partners without applying for adjudication against the whole and one or more of the partners may apply for adjudication against themselves when that is competent without the whole having so applied.

Special adjudication against partners.

112. When adjudication of bankruptcy has been granted against the firm only either on the voluntary application of the firm or compulsorily at the instance of creditors without the individual partners being adjudged bankrupt and the trustee shall find either in the course of his investigations or at the conclusion thereof that the contributions required from any of the individual partners to pay the debts of the firm are greater than they can pay or provide for or if he has reason to believe that any individual partner is disposing of his separate property without awaiting the result of the investigation or is preparing to leave the Colony or in any way acting so as to prejudice the right of the creditors under the bankruptcy it shall be competent for the trustee to apply for an adjudication of bankruptcy against such partner or partners.

Power of trustee in certain cases.

113. Creditors cannot apply for an adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm for debts due by an individual partner but they may apply for the bankruptcy of the separate partner and if granted his bankruptcy operates as a dissolution of the partnership which may then be wound up either by the firm in liquidation or by an adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm should that be applied for in a competent manner.

Bankruptcy of partner,—effect of.

114. Where adjudication of bankruptcy against the firm is accompanied or followed by adjudication against the individual partners the Court may appoint the same trustee to wind up the different estates where such a course shall appear best for all concerned.

Court may appoint same trustee.

Concurrent winding-up: duty of trustee.

115. Where there is a concurrent winding-up of the estate of the partnership and the separate estates of the partners it is not necessary for the trustee to await the completion of the winding-up of the partnership estate before he declares any dividend on the estate of the individual partners or *vice versa* should he be satisfied that there are sufficient funds in either estate to pay the deficiency on the other or should he make sufficient allowance for the probable claims against either before striking the amount of the dividend. The share of the surplus of the individual partner from the partnership estate will become an asset of his individual estate and where there is no surplus but a deficiency the deficiency in whole or in part according to the solvency of the other partners will rank as a debt upon the separate estate.

Partners may prove against partnership.

116. Partners subject to their liability for any deficiency in the partnership assets may prove against the partnership estate for any debts due to themselves personally and especially where the claim of the partner proving is founded upon a fraudulent appropriation of his separate property to the purposes of the partnership.

Where partners are members of another firm.

117. If one or more of the partners should be members of another partnership or carrying on another trade such partnership or partner as trader may prove for such partnership or trade debts in the same manner as ordinary creditors against the partnership or the estates of individual partners.

Partnership may prove against bankrupt partner.

118. The partnership may prove as a creditor against the estate of a bankrupt partner for any sums owing by him and especially the partnership may also prove for sums fraudulently abstracted by the individual partner to swell his own estate.

IV.—PARTNERSHIP WITH LIMITED LIABILITY OF CERTAIN PARTNERS.

Form of partnership with limited liability of certain partners.

119. A partnership may consist of two classes of partners one class consisting of one or more partners being responsible for the debts of the partnership as ordinary partners and another class which may also consist of one or more partners who are contributors to the capital solely and not active members of the partnership and whose liability for the debts of the concern shall be limited to the amount of capital contributed by them.

Designation.

120. The name of the partnership shall include one or more of the partners whose liability is unlimited together with the addition "and company" to cover the partners not named and it shall not be necessary to add anything to such a designation to show that any of the partners are mere contributors to the capital and not active members of the partnership but the insertion of the name of any contributory in the name style title or designation of the firm shall of itself make him an ordinary partner.

Terms and conditions to be stated in articles.

121. The terms and conditions of such partnerships must be set forth in articles of partnership whatever the amount of the capital or period of duration of the partnership and these articles must disclose the partners whose liability is unlimited and the names and the amount of contribution to the capital of those partners who are not to interfere in the active management of the partnership and not to be responsible beyond the amount contributed and their respective rights and interests in the partnership.

Abstract of articles.

122. It shall not be necessary to register such articles (except under any general provisions for the registration of deeds and documents now in force or to be hereafter enacted) but an abstract of the

same shall be registered in the office of the Registrar-General in a book properly indexed to be kept by him for the purpose in which an abstract or vidimus prepared by the parties thereto and certified as correct by one of the partners whose liability is unlimited or by an attorney of the Supreme Court shall be recorded and preserved.

123. Such abstract shall set forth as nearly as may be in the form contained in Schedule B hereto annexed the date when the articles of partnership were entered into the name of the company the nature of the business the date of the commencement of the partnership and its duration the names of the partners whose liability is unlimited the amount of capital of the company and the sums contributed by partners whose liability is limited. It shall not be necessary to disclose in such abstract the names of the partners who merely contribute to the capital.

Abstract of articles must be registered.

124. There shall be charged for the registration of such abstract and the inspection thereof or for a certified copy of the same the sums set forth in Schedule C hereto annexed.

Fees.

125. The exhibition of the articles of partnership and the disclosure of the names of the partners whose liability is unlimited can at any time be ordered by the Supreme Court in the course of proceedings against the partnership.

Court may order exhibition of articles &c.

126. Any partner or attorney who certifies to the correctness of an abstract which shall not truly disclose the facts required to be disclosed as the same are contained in such articles of partnership or which shall falsely set forth any of such facts shall be deemed guilty of an offence which shall be punishable on conviction thereof according to law by imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years.

Certificate to false abstract: penalty.

127. If the partners who are set forth in the articles as contributing to the capital and not to be liable beyond the amounts of their contribution afterwards take an active part in the administration of the partnership they shall be liable as ordinary partners.

Liability of dormant partner.

128. The visiting occasionally of the place of business for the purpose of inspecting the books and advising with the other partners upon business matters shall not be regarded as taking part in the administration in the sense of the preceding article but any buying and selling or dealing with the cash or presence in the place of business during business hours which would lead the public to believe that the partner so acting was an active partner in the concern shall make him subject to the liabilities of the firm as an ordinary partner and the consideration of the weight to be attached to any particular facts must be left to the appreciation of the legal tribunals.

Proof of active partnership defined.

129. The same consequences will follow although the partner contributing to the capital may allege that he acted in the business of the partnership per procuration of the firm or as mandatory of the other partners.

130. In the event of any question arising as to the true position of a partner the burden of proof will lie upon the partner who claims to be relieved from the ordinary obligations to show that he was only a contributor to the capital and not an ordinary partner.

As to true position of partner.

131. If any partner shall receive a portion of the profit of a partnership and is unable to prove that he has paid the sum stipulated in the articles of partnership to be payable by him as a partner contributing to the capital he will be taken to be an ordinary partner and liable for the debts of the partnership as such.

Where partner shall be deemed an ordinary partner.

Restriction as to capital.

132. It shall not be lawful to divide or constitute the capital of a partnership of this description by shares.

All partners may inspect accounts.

133. The partners who do not take part in the administration of the business may at any time demand an inspection of the accounts of the partnership and it shall be the duty of the partners who administer to keep the books of the partnership with correctness and up to date.

Effect of refusal.

134. If accounts should not be delivered or shown on demand the partner may apply to the Court for an account with or without praying for a dissolution of the partnership and under such an application the Court may not only order an account but decree a dissolution.

Penalty on partner exhibiting false accounts.

135. If the partners who administer the affairs of the partnership or any of them knowingly give or exhibit to the partner or partners whose liability is limited a false account representing the administration as having resulted in profit whereas there had in reality been a loss he or they shall be held to have committed a fraud upon such partners which shall be an offence punishable on conviction according to law by imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years.

Liability of partner accepting dividend when no profit was made.

136. If any partner whose liability is limited shall knowingly accept of any sum purporting to be a dividend upon the amount of capital contributed by him or in name of profit made by the partnership when no such profit was made he shall be held liable for the debts of the partnership as an ordinary partner.

What business may be conducted in partnership.

137. Any business which may be conducted under an ordinary partnership may be conducted under a partnership having partners whose liability is limited as hereinbefore defined including the holding of real property and the working of farms.

Where partner contributing capital is a creditor.

138. The partner contributing to the capital solely shall not rank as a creditor on the bankrupt estate of the partnership until all other creditors are satisfied and paid.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Benefit and Provident Societies.

139. The associations which are known by the names of benefit industrial or provident societies are not to be regarded as coming within the operations of this Ordinance but are subject to the special laws or conditions by which they are authorized or regulated.

Date of operation and application.

140. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the first day of June 1923 and shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Repeal.

141. Ordinance No. 8 of 1898 is hereby repealed.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting No. 2, held on the 10th November, 1922.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 11th of August were read and confirmed.

2. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following paper:-

Non-disallowance of Ordinance No. 8 of 1921. (Secretary of State's despatch No. 66 of the 12th of June, 1922).

3. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable H. C. Harding, the Bill "To amend the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901. was read a first time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a second time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

Clause 2 was amended to read as follows-

The definition of infected sheep in section 1 of the principal Ordinance is repealed and replaced by the following:-

"Infected sheep" means any sheep infected with scab or other infectious or contagious disease or affected with any parasitic disease or which within six months have been exposed to disease as aforesaid.

Clauses 3, 4 and 5 were agreed to without amendment.

The Title and Enacting Clause were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable H. C. Harding, the Bill "To provide for the service of the year 1923," was read a first time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a second time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

The Title and Enacting Clause were agreed to.

The Estimates framed for the year 1923 were considered and passed.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a third time and passed.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable H. C. Harding, the Bill "To provide for Trading Companies and other Associations," was read a first time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a second time and committed.

Clauses 1, 2 and 3 were agreed to.

Clause 4 was amended to read as follows:-

- 1 The Governor in Executive Council may make rules for the more effectual working of the said Imperial Acts in the Colony. Such rules shall be published in the Gazette and shall come into operation as from the date of publication.
- 2 There shall be paid to the Registrar in respect of the several matters mentioned in schedule A to this Ordinance the several fees therein specified or such smaller fees as the Governor may from time to time direct.
- 3 All fees paid to the Registrar in pursuance of this Ordinance shall be paid into the Treasury.

Subsection (4) of Clause 5 was amended to read as follows:-

That there shall be paid to the Registrar for registering any document required by this section to be filed by him a fee of five shillings or as such smaller fee as may be prescribed by the Governor.

Provided always that paragraphs a and b of subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to any Company incorporated outside the Colony which shall carry on business within the Colony solely through the medium of a bona fide agent.

Clauses 6 to 22 were agreed to.

Part III. Private partnerships where the liability of the members is unlimited.

(1) The partnership property.

was deleted and reinserted after Clause 27.

Clauses 23 to 32 were agreed to.

Clause 33 was amended to read as follows:-

The property may form part of the partnership property although the title may be in the name of one or more of the partners and be liable for the debts of the partnership or be treated as personalty on the death of a partner.

Clauses 34 to 74 were agreed to.

Clause 75 was amended to read as follows:-

It may be stipulated that one or more of the partners shall have the direction of the business of the Company and these provisions will be enforced by a competent Court.

Clauses 76 to 91 were agreed to.

Clause 92 was amended to read as follows:-

When the time for which the partnership was originally formed has elapsed and no notice of dissolution has been given and no new articles of partnership entered into but the partners have continued the business without any change the association between them will be treated as a partnership at will under the same terms and conditions so far as applicable which are set forth in the original articles these for the purposes required by section twenty-five hereof being taken to be the articles of the continued partnership.

Clauses 93 to 106 were agreed to.

Clause 107 was amended to read as follows:-

The partnership as a trader may apply to be adjudicated bankrupt on the same grounds as a sole trader or the partnership may be made bankrupt compulsorily by creditors in the same manner as a sole trader.

Clauses 108 to 118 were agreed.

The rubric to Clause 119 was amended to read as follows:-

Form of partnership with limited liability of certain partners.

Clauses 119 to 125 were agreed to.

Clause 126 was amended to read as follows:-

Any partner or attorney who certifies to the correctness of any abstract which shall not truly disclose the facts required to be disclosed as the same are contained in such articles of partnership or which shall falsely set forth any of such facts shall be deemed guilty of an offence which shall be punishable on conviction thereof according to law by imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years.

Clauses 127 to 136 were agreed to.

Clause 137 was amended to read as follows:-

Any business which may be conducted under an ordinary partnership may be conducted under a partnership having partners whose liability is limited as hereinbefore defined including the holding of real property and the working of farms.

Clause 138 was agreed to.

The heading "Associations not for profit" was deleted and the word "Miscellaneous" was substituted.

Clause 139 was agreed to.

The rubric to Clause 140 was amended to read as follows:-

Date of commencement and application.

The word "repeal" was agreed to as the rubric to Clause 141.

Clause 141 was agreed to.

WHEREAS the importation into the Falkland Islands from Chile or Argentina of any animals except horses and dogs, of hay, chaff or other similar substance commonly used for food of animals, of straw or other similar substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals was prohibited by Proclamation of the twentieth day of May, One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-one,

AND WHEREAS it has been officially reported that an infectious or contagious disease of dogs is prevailing in South America,

NOW THEREFORE, in virtue of the powers vested in the Governor in Council by Section 44 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, be it ordered and proclaimed as follows, to wit :

The Proclamation of the twentieth day of May, One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-one is hereby repealed :

The importation into the Falkland Islands from South America of any animals except horses, of hay, chaff or other similar substance commonly used for food of animals, of straw or other similar substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals, is prohibited.

The Colonial Treasurer's report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September 1922.

In accordance with the provisions of section 13 of the Savings Bank Ordinance 1888, I have the honour to submit the following report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank for the period 1st October, 1921, to the 30th September, 1922.

Summary of Transactions.

2. During and in respect of the year ended 30th September 1922, the interest which had accrued to the various depositors amounted to £2,948 : 12 : 5. During the same period the withdrawals from the bank £26,335 : 11 : 2, exceeded the sums deposited therein £17,956 : 1 : 10, by a sum of £8,379 : 9 : 4, and the balance standing to the credit of the depositors on the 30th September, 1922, amounted to £123,891 : 4 : 0, as compared with the sum of £129,322 : 0 : 11, standing to their credit on the 1st October, 1921.

3. During the year, there were 666 deposits, as against 344 withdrawals; the deposits averaged a sum of £1,496 : 6 : 8 monthly, as against an average monthly withdrawal of £2,194 : 12 : 7. There were 74 new accounts opened during the year, as against 64 accounts closed, leaving 805 deposit accounts in the bank at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor was £153 : 18 : 0, or about £51 : 18 : 11 per head of the population of the Falkland Islands. A Monthly Summary of the transactions of the Bank is appended hereto. (Enclosure 1).

On the 1st October 1921, the amount expended by the Crown Agents in the purchase of approved securities under section 10 of the Ordinance, amounted to £115,766 : 4 : 2, during the year a further sum of £3,500 was placed on deposit at call, with the London County, Westminster & Parrs Bank, by the Crown Agents, leaving an uninvested cash balance in the Colonial Treasury of £4,624 : 19 : 10.

6. During and in respect of the year ended 30th September, 1922, the income derived from the securities and monies held in trust by the Crown Agents under section 10 of the Ordinance, amounted to	£ 4,826 : 19 : 8.

7. The Government Savings Bank was first started in April 1888. Since then and up to the 31st December, 1921, the income derived from the securities held in trust under section 10 of the Ordinance, has been shewn in the Accounts and the Estimates of the Colony, as forming part of the Ordinary Revenue of the Falkland Islands, under Head "V. Interest". This was changed in the Accounts and Estimates of the Colony for the year ending 31st December, 1922, and the interest to be derived from Savings Bank Investments was deleted; provision being made in the Estimates for a sum of £160, being transferred annually from Savings Bank Income to the Ordinary Revenue of the Colony, to meet the cost of management &c., under Head "VIII Miscellaneous" on the Estimates for the year 1922. The accounts of the Colony being changed accordingly.

8. In accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance, the Savings Bank year of account begins on the 1st October and ends on the following 30th September, whereas the Colony's financial year of accounts begins on the 1st January and ends on the 31st December.

9. During the period 1st October to the 31st December, 1921, the income derived from Savings Bank Securities amounted to £1,909 : 3 : 8, and this amount was credited in the accounts of the Colony to Ordinary Revenue under Head V Interest, and the income derived from Savings Bank Securities during the period 1st January to the 30th September, amounting to £2,917 : 16 : 0, was not so credited in the accounts of the Colony, but instead, it was credited under the line, to "Deposits, Savings Bank Dividends". The difference between the first named amount £1909 : 3 : 8 and the balance £1,878 : 7 : 3, mentioned in paragraph 6 above, amounts to £30 : 16 : 5; the amount by which the Savings Bank Income, as shewn by the accounts of the Colony, (not the Savings Bank Accounts), was short of the amount due to depositors in respect of accrued interest, for the period 1st October, 1921, to the 30th September, 1922,

Profit and Loss Account.

10. During the year ended 30th September, 1922, the accrued interest credited to the depositors, amounted to £2,948 : 12 : 5.
The Savings Bank dividends credited to Ordinary as explained in paragraph 9 above amounted to 1,909 : 3 : 8.

£4,857 : 16 : 1.

On the other hand the income of the bank, for the year, amounted to £4,826 : 19 : 8.

Shewing a loss on the year's transactions of £ 30 : 16 : 5.

Appended hereto is a detailed statement, shewing the dividends received from the various securities, and how credited in the accounts of the Colony. (Enclosure 2).

Savings Bank Depreciation Fund.

11. The Savings Bank Depreciation Fund, which was fully invested, on the 1st October, 1921, amounted to £3,110 : 5 : 4.
The dividends thereon, reinvested amounted to 237 : 10 : 3.
Transferred thereto and invested, during the year 2,199 : 7 : 5.
Balance to the credit of the fund £5,547 : 3 : 0.

A statement is appended hereto, shewing the "Face Value", the "Cost of", and the "Market Value", of the various Investments held in trust by the Crown Agents on behalf of "The Savings Bank Investment Fund" and "The Savings Bank Depreciation Fund". (Enclosure 3).

Assets and Liabilities.

12. The Savings Bank is liable for the payment in Cash of the whole amount standing to the credit of the various depositors, which amounted £123,891 : 4 : 0, on the 30th September, 1922, should it have been so desired. Of that amount, a sum of £115,766 : 4 : 2, has been expended in the purchase of approved securities under section 10 of the Ordinance. The Market Value of these securities on that date was £104,245., and had it been necessary to realize these Investments on that date, there would have been a deficit of £11,521 : 4 : 2, in cash, but in as much as the Market Value of the Investments held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Depreciation Fund amounted to £6,068, there would then be a net deficit in cash of £5,453 : 4 : 2, as shewn by the statement of assets and Liabilities of the Savings Bank on the 30th September, 1922, appended hereto. (Enclosure 4).

Sir,

I have the honour to submit herewith my Annual Report for the year ended 31st December, 1922.

Sheep

The general health of the sheep is good, but in some cases the stamina is not all that could be desired, this can be counteracted by careful culling of young stock and by casting the old ewes. The clip this year was on the whole lighter than last. The lambing on most stations appears to be good, but the percentage counted at lamb marking shows a serious loss. The lambing percentage is decreasing slowly but fairly regularly and in the majority of cases the cause cannot be attributed to climatic conditions. Probably a change of new blood will improve matters greatly. A step has been taken in the right direction by importing a large number of rams and ewes for use next season.

2. One station on the West was unfortunately, found to be affected with lice, but very stringent methods were employed and it is to be hoped that there will be no reappearance of this trouble. There were also several cases of lice reported in the East but there is every reason to believe that these have been dealt with satisfactorily. I am of the opinion that if practicable all flocks would benefit by being dipped twice at dipping time, with an interval of 14 days, and that any loss incurred would be more than compensated by improvement in the sheep and freedom from keds. Investigations were made with a view to discovering if Epizootic Abortion in ewes which was suspected to exist on the West Falklands was prevalent or not, after careful bacteriological examinations had been made this disease was proved to be non existent.

3. On some stations the death rate among ewes appears to be very considerable, I am of the opinion that this can be traced to the impaired vitality to a great extent due to inbreeding, also in some cases the ewes make very bad mothers not looking after their lambs as they should, due probably to the same cause.

4. Unfortunately for some time there has been no outlet for surplus stock, as the canning works have been closed down for the last two years, and there have been no exportations of live sheep. It is hoped that in the coming year there will be an outlet to South America.

Horses

5. There is practically no disease among the horses in the Colony, 284 horses and mares of a useful type were imported this year from Punta Arenas but arrived unfortunately rather late in the season and therefore were not acclimatised before the winter set in, causing a certain amount of loss. A few stallions of the hackney type might advantageously be introduced.

Cattle

6. A shorthorn bull and two heifers have now been obtained by the Colonial Government from England, these come of a good milking strain and it is hoped that the stock of the Colony may be benefited by this new blood. There are 8126 cattle in the Colony, an increase of 452 over last year. The general health appears to be good.

Fowls

7. A number of pedigree fowls were obtained by Government and 120 settings have been supplied to the residents of Stanley and the Camp, 93 to Stanley and 27 to the Camp.

Imports

8. 19 Romney Marsh rams were imported from England, 6 Corriedale rams from New Zealand, also 200 Corriedale rams and 300 Corriedale ewes from the coast, and 497 Romney Marsh rams from Tierra Del Fuego, these have all been quarantined on Great and Ruggles Islands for three months.

GOVERNMENT NURSES.

1. Section 17 of the King Edward Hospital Regulations, 1916, is repealed and replaced by the following :—

17. The following shall be the fees to be charged for private attendance or nursing at the residence of the patient :—

(a) WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF STANLEY.

For visits of attendance as shall be directed by the Medical Officer.

By the day, according to the number of visits, 1/- to 2/-.

For Nursing ; for any period not exceeding six hours,	s.	d.
Where the householder's income does not exceed £200,	3	0.
Where the householder's income exceeds £200,	6	0.

(b) BEYOND THE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF STANLEY.

For Nursing.

For first week or part thereof	£1	1	0.
After first week, per day		3	0.

In addition to which the Nurse shall be provided, free of charge, with suitable board and lodgings, and means of conveyance both from and to Stanley.

2. The above fees do not include charges in midwifery cases, for which a further fee of £1. 1. 0. shall be charged for services and attendance in each case.

3. For Government Officials and employees, members of their families (entirely dependent on them for maintenance) and their servants, the fees to be charged shall be in each case one half of the above rates.

HOSPITAL FEES.

4. Section 28 of the said Regulations as amended by Notice dated the 6th of November, 1920, and published in the Government Gazette of the 1st of December, 1920, is repealed and replaced by the following :—

28. The following shall be the Hospital Fees to be charged to Hospital patients :-

1. In the General Wards, including medical attendance, care and treatment.
 - (a) For residents in the Colony, subject nevertheless to a remission, either in whole or in part, by the Governor, in indigent cases, 4/- a day or £1 1s. 0d., per week.
 - (b) For non-residents, subject to any special considerations and recommendations for a less charge as may be approved by the Governor, 7/- a day.
 - (c) For every midwifery case, including stay in the Hospital, an inclusive fee of £2 0s. 0d.
2. In a Private Ward.

For Private Patients resident in the Colony, 6/- a day or £2 a week.

For Private Patients non-resident in the Colony, 10/- a day.
3. For Government Officials and employees and their families (entirely dependent upon them for maintenance) and servants, the fees shall in each case be one half of the rates for Residents in the Colony.

Half rates only shall also be charged for all children under 14 years of age.
4. In any case, including that of a Government Official or employee, in which any wine, spirit or extras be permitted by the Medical Officer, but not ordered by him and forming part of the medical treatment, the cost of the same shall, in addition to the Hospital fees, be paid for by the patient.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Provisions of Section 8 of the King Edward Hospital Ordinance, 1916.

NURSE PROBATIONERS.

1. Nurse Probationers may be admitted to the King Edward VII Hospital, Stanley, on satisfying the following conditions :-

- (a) They must be between 18 and 30 years of age.
- (b) They shall produce satisfactory evidence of sound health and good character.
- (c) They must have passed the 6th standard in an elementary school or its equivalent.

2. Applications shall be made in writing and candidates must, if selected, bind themselves to observe all rules and regulations relating to their service.

3. The period of attendance required to qualify as Nurse shall be three years.

4. (1) Probationers shall attend the Hospital daily between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. and they shall sign the attendance book in the morning on arriving and in the evening on leaving. They will be granted leave daily from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. or alternatively from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. and one half day weekly. They may in addition be granted two weeks leave in each year at such times as the Colonial Surgeon may arrange.

(2) They shall be punctual and regular in their attendance. Whenever absent they shall produce evidence satisfactorily accounting for their absence.

(3) They shall be quiet, clean and orderly both on and off duty.

(4) They shall strictly observe all the established rules of the Hospital.

5. They shall be under the control and supervision of the Matron or any other person acting for her, who shall see that all the regulations are observed and shall report to the Colonial Surgeon any infringement thereof on the part of a Probationer.

6. If after three months trial the probationer is found unsuitable she shall upon a report from the Colonial Surgeon be invited to resign.

7. (1) The course of instruction and training to be followed shall include Elementary Anatomy, Physiology and Hygiene, First Aid to the injured and sick, Clinical observations, Minor Surgery, Elementary Pharmacy, General and Special Nursing.

(2) Lectures on such courses shall be held as the Colonial Surgeon shall arrange, from which no Probationer shall absent herself except in case of illness.

8. Once a year an examination, both oral and written, on the above subjects shall be held by a Board appointed by the Colonial Surgeon. The candidates who have satisfied the Examiners on the subjects of the course and training as above, shall be granted a certificate. Any Certificate granted as above may, upon the report of the Colonial Surgeon, be suspended or withdrawn by the Governor in case the holder thereof shall have been guilty of a breach of the Hospital Regulations or gross carelessness in the discharge of her duties.

9. Probationers may be required to perform medical services outside the Hospital under the direction of a Government Nurse.

10. Probationers will be provided at the end of the first three months training and thereafter annually with the following uniform :

One outdoor cloak, two pairs of boots, two print dresses, three pairs of cuffs, six collars, three caps, and two pairs of ward shoes.

11. Probationers will receive pay as follows :-

(1) £2 a month.

(2) £12 at the completion of each year's service and no portion of the sum will be due or payable in respect of any period of less than one year.

Probationers will be provided with breakfast, lunch and tea at the Hospital.

12. Probationers may at times be called upon to perform night duty at the Hospital in which case meals and day rest will be arranged for.

Licence IS HEREBY GRANTED to _____ of _____
(hereinafter called the licensee) subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, during the term
or period commencing on the _____ day of _____ and terminating on the
day of _____ 19____

(1) to establish, instal and work at the stations specified in the Schedule hereto apparatus for Wireless Telegraphy (hereinafter called "the licensed apparatus") provided that the apparatus installed at such station shall be of the character specified in the said Schedule opposite to the name of such station; and

(2) to transmit and receive messages by means of Wireless Telegraphy at the said stations.

Provided that the licensed apparatus shall be worked and the messages shall be transmitted and received solely for the purposes of conducting private business and for no other purpose.

II. The licensed apparatus shall not be used by the licensee or by any other person either on his behalf or by his permission for any purpose except for the purpose of conducting private business.

III. (1) The licensed apparatus shall be so worked as not to interfere with the working of any Wireless Telegraph Station established in the Colony of the Falkland Islands or the territorial waters abutting on the coasts of the Falkland Islands by or for the purpose of the Government of the Falkland Islands or any department of His Majesty's Government or for commercial purposes and in particular with the transmission or receipt of any messages between or at Wireless Telegraph Stations established as aforesaid on land and Wireless Telegraph Stations established on ships at sea.

(2) With a view to preventing such interference as aforesaid the licensee and any person acting on his behalf or by his permission shall comply with all directions which shall be given to the licensee by the Colonial Secretary or prescribed by the Colonial Secretary with respect to avoiding interference between one Wireless Telegraph Station and another.

(3) The licensed apparatus shall not without the consent in writing of the Colonial Secretary be altered in respect of any of the particulars mentioned in the Schedule hereto.

(4) The licensee shall at all times indemnify the Government against all actions, claims and demands which may be brought or made by any corporation, company or person in respect of any injury arising from any act, licensed or permitted by these presents.

IV. (1) The licensee shall not (either by himself or by any person acting on his behalf or by his permission) by the transmission of any message by means of the licensed apparatus or otherwise by the use of the licensed apparatus, interfere with naval signalling.

(2) Whenever the operators at any of the said stations of the licensee perceive through the medium of the instruments used by them that naval signalling is proceeding, they shall refrain from using the licensed apparatus until all indication that naval signalling is proceeding shall have ceased.

(3) The licensee and any person acting on his behalf or by his permission shall, if so required in writing by the Colonial Secretary, cease to use the licensed apparatus for such period (not exceeding hours in any one day) as may be specified by the Admiralty.

(4) If the Governor is of opinion that the working of the licensed apparatus at any station specified in the Schedule hereto is inconsistent with the free use of naval signalling the licensee shall when required in writing by the Colonial Secretary close the said station.

(5) These provisions for the protection of naval signalling shall be construed to be without prejudice to the generality of any other provisions of this Indenture.

V. Neither the licensee nor any person on his behalf or working in conjunction with him shall divulge to any person (other than properly authorized officials of the Government or a competent legal tribunal) or make any use whatever of any message coming to the knowledge of the licensee or any such person as aforesaid and transmitted by naval signalling or by any system of Wireless Telegraphy provided or maintained by or for the purpose of the Government of the Falkland Islands, or by any licensee of the Colonial Secretary (other than the licensee).

VI. The Colonial Postmaster or any person authorized by him in writing may from time to time and at all reasonable times, enter upon any of the stations or other premises in the possession or occupation of the licensee, either solely or jointly with any other person or persons, for the purpose of inspecting and may inspect any apparatus fixed or being in such places respectively for the purpose of sending or receiving messages by Wireless Telegraphy, and all other telegraphic instruments and apparatus fixed or being in such stations respectively,

and the working and use of such apparatus and telegraphic instruments respectively, and the licensee shall afford all requisite and proper facilities for such inspection and shall secure to the Colonial Postmaster or any person authorized by him in writing the right for the purpose aforesaid of entry from time to time and on such of the stations and premises as may be in the possession or occupation of any person or persons other than the licensee.

VII. Except with the consent in writing of the Colonial Secretary the licensee shall not assign, underlet or otherwise dispose of or admit any other person or body to participate in the benefit of the licences, powers or authorities hereby granted or any of such licences, powers or authorities.

VIII. If and whenever in the opinion of the Governor an emergency shall have arisen in which it is expedient for the public service that His Majesty's Government shall have control over the transmission of messages by the licensed apparatus, it shall be lawful for the Governor by warrant under his hand to direct and cause so much of the licensed apparatus as is within the Colony of the Falkland Islands or the territorial waters thereof or any part of the licensed apparatus to be taken possession of in the name and on behalf of His Majesty and to be used for His Majesty's service, and in that event any person authorized by the Governor may enter upon stations specified in the Schedule hereto or any of them and take possession thereof and use the same as aforesaid.

IX. The Colonial Secretary may at any time in his absolute discretion give notice in writing to determine these presents and the licence or permission hereby given at the end of one calendar month from the date of such notice, and at the expiration of that period the licence or permission hereby granted shall cease and determine accordingly but without prejudice to any remedy of the Colonial Secretary under any covenant or provision herein contained on the part of the licensee to be observed and performed.

X. In case of any breach, non-observance or non-performance by or on the part of the licensee of any of the covenants or conditions herein contained and on the part of the licensee to be observed and performed, the Colonial Secretary may in writing revoke and determine these presents and the said licensed powers and authorities hereinbefore granted and each and every of them, and thereupon these presents and the said licences, powers and authorities and each and every of them shall absolutely cease, determine and become void.

Provided always that no such revocation or determination as aforesaid shall prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which shall have accrued or shall thereafter accrue to either of the parties hereto under the covenants herein contained.

XI. Nothing in these presents shall prejudice or affect the right of the Governor from time to time to establish, extend, maintain and work any system or systems of telegraphic communication (whether of a like nature to that hereby licensed or otherwise) in such manner as he shall in his discretion think fit, neither shall anything herein contained prejudice or affect the right of the Governor from time to time to enter into agreement for or to grant licences relative to the working and use of telegraphs (whether of a like nature to those hereby licensed or otherwise) or the transmission of messages in any part of the Colony of the Falkland Islands by means of Wireless Telegraphy or by any other means with or to any person or persons whomsoever upon such terms as he shall in his discretion think fit.

XII. Any notice, request or consent (whether expressed to be in writing or not) to be given to the licensee under these presents, may be served by sending the same by registered letter addressed to the licensee and any notice to be given by the licensee under these presents may be served by sending the same by registered letter addressed to the Colonial Secretary.

Ordinance No. of 19 .

A Bill

To validate the Liquidation of the contribution of the Colony towards the expenses of the late War.

WHEREAS it was enacted by the War Expenses Contribution Ordinance, 1917, as amended by the War Expenses Contribution Amendment Ordinance, 1920, that for a period of ten years commencing on the 1st day of January, 1917, there should be paid annually out of the public revenue and other funds of the Colony a sum of £1,440 (one thousand four hundred and forty pounds),

Preamble.

AND WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient that the foresaid annual payment should be liquidated in respect of the years 1922 to 1926 inclusive,

AND WHEREAS the said annual payment due in respect of the said years has been so liquidated,

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "War Contribution Liquidation Validity Ordinance, 1923." Short Title.

2. The sum of six thousand and sixty-five pounds, fifteen shillings and four pence having been expended for the purpose of liquidating the contribution of £1,440 (one thousand four hundred and forty pounds) payable under the provisions of the War Expenses Contribution Ordinance, 1917, as amended by the War Expenses Contribution Amendment Ordinance, 1920, to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for and in respect of the years 1922 to 1926 inclusive, the same is hereby declared to have been duly laid out and expended for the service of the Colony and is hereby approved, allowed and granted.

MINISTRY OF PENSIONS.

The Ministry of Pensions, London, desire to bring the following announcement to the notice of Ex-officers, Nurses, Non-commissioned Officers and Men of the Imperial Naval, Military and Air Forces who have been resident continuously overseas (i.e., outside the United Kingdom, Irish Free State, Channel Islands and Isle of Man) since the 1st April, 1922, and to whom awards have been made by the Ministry of Pensions in respect of disablement attributable to or aggravated by service in the Great War.

The British War Pensions Act, 1921 (Sec: 4), declares certain awards made BEFORE THE 19TH AUGUST, 1921, to be FINAL AWARDS in respect of the disablement due to Great War service, provided that they have not since that date been varied by the Ministry of Pensions. The Act provides for a right of appeal to an independent Tribunal against a final award; and the Tribunal has the power to confirm, increase, decrease or set aside such final award. The right of appeal must be exercised within certain specified time-limits which are indicated below. In the absence of a successful appeal to the Tribunal a final award cannot subsequently be altered.

For the purpose of the Act, and the Regulations made under it, a final award is a decision, declared to be final, as to the rate of disablement (if any) and also in the case of a final weekly allowance as to the period to which the rate of disablement applies, or as to the gratuity (if any) granted.

The awards now declared by the Statute to be final are of the following classes :-

- (1) Awards of PERMANENT RETIRED PAY or pension.
- (2) Awards of "NIL DISABLEMENT".
- (3) Awards where the rate of disablement is certified to be LESS THAN 1 PER CENT.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the 25th day of February, 1892, constituting the office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands, it was amongst other things declared that there should be an Executive Council in and for the said Colony which should consist of such persons as should be directed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet,

AND WHEREAS by Instructions under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date the 28th day of February, 1920, it was declared that if in the opinion of the Governor the number of members of the Executive Council available for business may at any time be likely to prove insufficient, the Governor may, by an Instrument under the Public Seal, appoint some fit person to be provisionally a member of the said Council for such period as shall be specified in such Instrument:

SCHEDULE.

- (a) All living plants with a persistent woody stem above ground, and parts of the same, except seeds, when for use in propagation - such as fruit trees, stocks and stools, forest trees, and ornamental shrubs and grafts, layers and cuttings thereof.
- (b) All potatoes; and all tubers, bulbs rhizomes, corms, and hop stocks for planting.
- (c) Seeds of onions and of leeks for sowing.
- (d) Gooseberries.

Hospital Dispensary.

It is notified, for general information, that the following rules are observed at the King Edward Memorial Hospital, with reference to the making up and delivery of medicines in the Dispensary:

Report on Education in the Colony for the year 1922.

General.

1. There is no secondary education in the Colony. The total number of children between the ages of 5 and 15 is 441. Of these 201 live in Stanley where there is compulsory education for all children between 5 and 14 years of age. In the Camp or country districts the children are taught by travelling teachers with the exception of 70 who receive instruction at stations from teachers supplied by the Falkland Islands Company.

2. There are two elementary schools in Stanley – the Government School supported from public funds and St. Mary's School managed by the Roman Catholic Sisters. The latter is not subject to Government control or supervision and receives no grant.

Government School.

3. The authorised establishment of the Government School is three teachers with Board of Education certificates, viz; a Headmaster, an Assistant Master and an Assistant Mistress, two Assistant Teachers and two Pupil Teachers. The school was understaffed during the first half of the year. It was necessary to employ a Travelling Teacher as acting Headmaster, as the Government Schoolmaster was absent on leave, and there was no certificated Master in the Colony until July, or Mistress until April. Only one pupil teacher was employed during the year.

4. The average attendance is shewn in the following table :—

5. There is much variation in the ages of the children in the different classes, due in part to the fact that backward children come in from the camp and have to be taught alongside those who are much younger.

The normal distribution of the classes is :— Headmaster, Standards VI and VII, Assistant Master, Standards IV and V, Assistant Teacher, Standards II and III, Assistant Mistress, Standard I, and an Assistant Teacher and one Pupil Teacher for the Infants.

6. The division of time devoted to the various subjects in 1922 was as follows :— English 36.3 per cent, Arithmetic 20.4 per cent, Drawing 14.7 per cent, Singing 7.3 per cent, Geography 6.9 per cent, History and Physical Training each 4.9 per cent, and Hygiene 4.5 per cent. The time allotted for Drawing and Singing was disproportionate.

7. The sum of £90 : 17 : 6 was received in fees and £25 : 2 : 8 by the sale of stationery. The Expenditure is shewn in the following table :—

There is no Government inspection or control of this school, and no information can be given concerning the course of study.

Government Travelling Teachers.

10. As has been mentioned in previous reports, the system of Travelling Teachers has not been a success recently, and the Government Schoolmaster submitted a scheme, towards the end of the year, to provide a more adequate means of education for children in the country districts.

11. At the beginning of the year the following Travelling Teachers were under engagement with the Government:—

Mr. Currie's services with the Government terminated on the 31st of March. Mr. Daer continued to be employed in Stanley to the end of the year, and Mr. Daillie to October, when he resumed his duties in the Camp.

DARWIN SCHOOL,

31st December, 1922.

ATTENDANCE.

The attendance throughout the year has been very good, and the number of pupils on the roll higher than for some years.

READING AND SPELLING.

Special attention is given to this, all the pupils each morning reading an unseen Bible lesson, which does more to improve the reading than the ordinary class books.

DICTATION.

A piece is taken daily from the different class books.

COMPOSITION.

The more advanced write short stories, essays and letters.

ARITHMETIC.

The pupils are taught in stages according to their abilities. The more advanced tackle vulgar and decimal fractions, stocks, mensuration, square root, &c.

MENTAL ARITHMETIC.

All the pupils come up together daily for this subject, and on alternate days, to attain speed and accuracy and instil notation, all the pupils devote a short time working sums in the simple rules.

MONEY.

A bag containing Treasury notes and the different coins is placed on a table and each pupil in turn counts the contents, setting the result down on a sheet of paper.

GEOGRAPHY.

For advanced pupils a Reader is used, but all receive instruction with Maps and Globe.

HISTORY.

A Reader is used by advanced pupils, but all are given an acquaintance with this subject through the medium of stories.

LATIN.

A class of four – ages from 11 to 12 – have mastered the Grammar to the end of the regular verbs, as well as doing numerous exercises. As soon as text books come this class will start reading Cæsar, Book 1.

The Falkland Islands Marine Insurance Fund.

17. During the year a sum of £106 was charged as expenditure Falklands Expenditure Head VI. Port and Marine (Harbour Department), in connection with the depreciation in the value of the Launch "Penguin", when transferred as the first amount to be credited to this fund in the accounts of the Colony.

The Falkland Islands Land Sales Fund.

18. On the 1st January, the Land Sales Fund amounted to £167,277 : 15 : 7. During the year a sum of £7,101 : 7 : 3 was received as instalments of land purchases and credited to the fund. No disbursements, other the purchase of approved securities, were made, and at the close of the year the fund amounted to £174,379 : 2 : 10. The Nominal Value of the Securities held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Land Sales Fund on the 31st December, 1922 amounted to £182,819 : 14 : 7.

Falkland Islands Surplus & Deficit Account.

19. On the 1st January, the Surplus Ordinary revenue that had accumulated to the credit of the Falkland Islands in the general account of the Colony amounted to £59,719 : 10 : 5, which added to the total Ordinary Revenue for the year, (£37,535 : 14 : 6.), makes a total of £97,255 : 4 : 11. This amount less the total expenditure for the same period (£51,733 : 1 : 9) leaves a Surplus balance of ordinary Revenue to the credit of the Falkland Islands at the close of the year of £45,522 : 3 : 2.

20. On the 1st of January, the total surplus assets standing to the credit of the Falkland Islands, in the accounts of the Colony, as calculated in accordance with the provisions of Colonial Regulation 344, amounted to £226,997 : 6 : 0 which added to the total Falkland revenue for the year (£44,743 : 1 : 9,) makes a sum of £271,740 : 7 : 9. This amount less the total Falkland expenditure for the same period, (£51,733 : 1 : 9) leaves Surplus assets to the credit of the Falkland Islands on the 31st December 1922, amounting to £220,007 : 6 : 0, and made up as follows:—

22. During the year a total sum of £49,434 : 2 : 7 was transferred to the credit of the Research Fund and entered in the accouts as a Charge on Dependencies Revenue.

Dependencies Revenue.

23. The Ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies for the year, amounted to £142,101 : 19 : 8. It was £42,269 : 11 : 7 more than that collected in 1921, and it exceeded the original estimate for 1922, by a sum of £76,626 : 19 : 8.

26. The increase under "Licences" and "Rents" was due to the collection of arrears of revenue in 1922. The increase under "Customs Exports Duties" and "Miscellaneous" was due to some misunderstanding, allowance having been made in the original estimate for refunds of whale oil duties and remittance charges. As regards "Interest" this was due to the fact that dividends on investments collected by the Crown Agents having being credited direct to the Research Fund, and in consequence, not appearing as Ordinary Revenue.

Dependencies Expenditure.

27. The total Expenditure for the Dependencies for the year, excluding "Charges on Dependencies Revenue" and disbursements made from the Research Fund, £12,938 : 19 : 11. 33. The Ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies for the year amounted to £142,102 : 19 : 8, as against a total Expenditure the same period of £12,938 : 19 : 11, leaving a Surplus of revenue over expenditure in respect of the year of account ended 31st December, 1922, amounting to £129,162 : 19 : 9.

34. During the year, a total sum of £49,434 : 2 : 7, was entered in the accounts as a "Charge on Dependencies Revenue", when transferred to the credit of the Research Fund.

35. The Surplus of accumulated Ordinary Revenue standing to the credit of the Dependencies in the General Account of the Colony on the 1st January amounted to £13,047 : 7 : 6, which added to the surplus for the year, (£129,162 : 19 : 9) mentioned in paragraph 32 above, makes a total of £142,210 : 7 : 3. The Government Savings Bank.

37. On the 1st January, 1922, the amount standing to the credit of the depositors in the Government Savings Bank amounted to £128,402 : 11 : 1. During the year a sum of £23,006 : 1 : 10, was credited to the depositors, as against a sum of £29,334 : 12 : 8 withdrawn from the Bank, leaving a balance to the credit of the depositors, at the end of the year of £122,074 : 0 : 3. The income derived from securities during the year amounted to £4,841 : 5 : 10, of which a sum of £3,108 : 12 : 5, was expended in the execution of the Savings Bank Ordinance 1888, leaving a balance at the close of the year of £1,732 : 13 : 5.

38. On the 1st January, the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund amounted to £5,551 : 8 : 9. During the year a sum of £307 : 9 : 9, was credited to the fund, making a total amount to the credit of the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund at the close of the year of £5,858 : 18 : 6. A copy of the Annual Report on the Government Savings Bank for the year ended 30th September, 1922, is included with the Returns furnished herewith.

The Currency Note Fund.

39. A copy of the Annual Report on the transactions of the Commissioners of Currency for the year ended 31st December, 1922, is also included with the Returns furnished herewith. At the close of the year the Face Value of the Currency Notes in circulation amounted to £20,000. The Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, in the hands of the Crown Agents, amounted to £12,000., and was fully invested. The Coin Portion of the same fund, held by the Commissioners, amounted to £8,000. The Note Depreciation Fund, in the hands of the Crown Agents amounted to £1,200 and was also fully invested.

40. Owing to the irregular and infrequent mail communication with South Georgia a certain amount of delay and inconvenience was caused in connection with the closing of the monthly accounts of the Colony. The last account from South Georgia, for the year 1922, did not reach Port Stanley until April 12th and in consequence it was not possible to close the accounts for the year at an earlier date. Annual Medical Report on the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies for the Year, 1922.

(A) FALKLAND ISLANDS.

GENERAL

There was no epidemic during the year. As has been mentioned in a previous report, the high standard of health which the Colony enjoys is due to the purifying agency of the constant winds. The prevalence and spread of minor ailments, such as cold, would be greatly reduced if the dwellings were better aired and more attention was paid to ventilation.

SANITATION.

The sanitary state of Stanley is practically the same as in past years, but an effort to effect improvements in the town is on foot, and is receiving the support of the people, who are anxious to have the primitive sanitary methods replaced by a modern system of sanitation.

HOSPITAL.

The number of attendances by out-patients at the hospital was 1765. The in-patients numbered 68 as shewn below:

GOVERNMENT SCHOOL.

The children were medically examined at intervals during the year. The general health of the school was good and the children were found to be clean and well cared for. The younger boys and girls are of an exceptionally intelligent type. There are signs, however, that the average child in the Falklands loses his alertness after a certain age. I am of opinion that this is due to the constant red meat diet and the lack of an adequate supply of fish food. It may also in some measure be due to the limited outlook which the child obtains from his surroundings.

PRISON.

The prison was visited and found to be clean and in good order. One prisoner was committed during the year but was subsequently removed as suffering from lunacy.

SHIPPING.

Fifty vessels were given pratique. Their total tonnage was 898,189 and crews 3,187. No quarantinable sickness was reported.

The following changes in the staff of the Medical Department occurred during the year. The Assistant Colonial Surgeon, Dr. H. Chadwick, left the Colony on the 28th of September, and was succeeded by Dr. B. J. Hallows who arrived on the same date. Mr. T. A. Hall was appointed Colonial Dental Surgeon on the 31st March.

(B) DEPENDENCIES.

The total resident population of South Georgia was 1337, and it is estimated that 1000 persons were employed at the South Shetlands during the whaling season. There is one medical officer at South Georgia and two medical officers accompany the whaling fleet to South Shetlands. These officers are employed by the whaling companies.

No cases of infectious disease occurred at South Georgia until December when a vessel arriving from Cardiff had on board a member of the crew suffering from typhoid. Seven cases were subsequently admitted to the hospital where two succumbed. The Dependency is now regarded as free from infection.

The health of the crews at the South Shetlands was reported good.

Regulations governing the Importation of Sheep from South America, made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 45 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Live Stock (Importation of sheep from South America) (Amendment) Regulations, 1923."

2. The regulations governing the importation and exportation of Live Stock, made by the Governor in Council on the 7th day of February, 1914, shall apply to the importation of sheep from South America subject to the following additional provisions:-

- (1) The importing vessel shall not import into the Colony any hay, fodder, straw, litter, or water for consumption.
- (2) The exporter of the sheep shall make a declaration in the form annexed hereto with respect to the sheep which it is intended to import and the declaration shall be made before a British Consular Officer and counter-signed by the Chief Inspector of Stock before the sheep are landed.
- (3) The sheep shall be landed on an island to be approved by the Governor and shall remain there in quarantine for a period of 90 days.
- (4) The sheep shall be dipped a first time on being landed at the quarantine station and a second time after an interval of ten days and dipped further, fourteen and again four days before being released from quarantine.
- (5) Before the sheep are released from quarantine they shall be marked with yellow ruddle.
- (6) The owner of any sheep imported under these regulations shall not permit any such sheep, for a period of twelve months from the date of importation, to be depastured or to stray on any land which is not separated by at least two fences from any lands not in the occupation of the said owner.
- (7) Any sheep marked with yellow ruddle which shall be found straying on lands not in the occupation of the owner of the sheep, so marked, may be destroyed or may be ordered to be destroyed forthwith by the owner or occupier of such lands and no compensation whatsoever shall be payable to any person in respect of the destruction of such sheep. This regulation (No. 2, sub-section 7) shall remain in force until its repeal shall have been published in the Government Gazette.

3. The Regulations made by the Governor in Council on the 3rd day of November, 1922, are hereby repealed.

6. The Club rooms and property shall be for the use of the Club members only, but any member who is in full privileges may bring in one guest, who, however, shall not be permitted to purchase any article of refreshment. Such member shall be responsible for the good behaviour of the guest introduced. Notwithstanding, no one shall be introduced as a guest more frequently than once within a period of thirty days, nor shall any member be entitled to introduce more than one guest within a like period. The "Guests' Book" shall be kept by the Steward and all names duly entered therein. No guests shall be admitted to the Club on Sundays.

7. Any member who is a defaulter, or who misconducts himself shall be deprived of the privileges of the Club if and for so long as the Commanding Officer directs.

8. During the months from March to September, inclusive, the Club rooms shall be open from 6 p.m. to midnight, and for the remainder of the year from 7 p.m. to midnight on weekdays and from noon to 6 p.m. on Sundays, subject to any extension made by the Committee or with the approval of the Commanding Officer and subject to any restriction that may be made by order of the Governor. Refreshments will not be served after 10 p.m. on weekdays and only between the hours of 12 noon and 1 p.m., and 4.30 p.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Sundays.

9. No liquor shall be taken away from the Club premises and no liquor supplied to anyone not being a member except as already provided in these rules.

10. All money matters shall be managed by the Committee and all orders for goods placed under their direction.

11. The Committee shall have power to deal with and decide upon any matter relating to the Falkland Islands Defence Force Club not embodied in these rules.

12. The Rules of the 29th of January, 1916, made under the provisions of the Volunteer Ordinance, 1893, are hereby superseded.

A Bill

To provide for the refund of a portion of the duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1922, and the 30th of September, 1923, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duty) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1923." Short Title.

2. In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of whale and seal oil for the period from the 1st day of October, 1922, to the 30th day of September, 1923. Definition.

3. A refund of a part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid in respect of whale and seal oil, between the first day of October, 1922, and the thirtieth day of September, 1923, shall be made in accordance with the following scale:— Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Whaling Regulations, 1923."

Conditions for use of
spare catcher.

2. The holder of a whaling licence in South Georgia authorizing the use of whale catchers may be allowed to maintain a spare whale catcher for use in the event of a licensed catcher being laid up for repairs, subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) Payment of a fee of £50 a season.
- (2) Such spare catcher shall be kept without a gun, whale rope or other similar necessities for whaling, when not in use.
- (3) Notification shall be given to a whaling officer before the spare catcher shall be used, with full particulars as to the nature of the repairs required for the licensed catcher and an estimate of the number of days required to effect repairs. During such period the gun and whaling gear shall be removed from the licensed catcher.

Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 45 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901 for the Prevention of the introduction of any Contagious or Infectious Disorder into the Colony.

1. These Regulations may be cited as "The Live Stock Regulations (Consolidation) 1923." Short Title.
2. Any person intending to import any animal enumerated in Schedule A hereto shall give two months' notice in writing to the Chief Inspector of Stock or to the Colonial Secretary, stating the number, description, from whence imported, where purchased, and probable date of arrival in the Colony. Two months' notice to be given of intended importation.
3. Ships carrying animals shall enter at Port Stanley for the purpose of examination, except where the importer of such animals or his agent has previously obtained special permission from the Government to enter at some other port. This special permission will only be granted when a definite date of arrival is stated. Importing vessels to enter at Port Stanley except by special permission.
4. The proposed port of entry and the first port at which it is intended to land any animal should be stated in the form of Schedule B hereto. Seven days of grace will be allowed, after which the permission so granted shall be cancelled and a fresh application made. Port of entry to be notified.
5. Every animal so imported into the Colony from a British or Colonial port shall be accompanied by a health certificate signed by a qualified veterinary surgeon of the district in which the animal was purchased, and if imported into the Colony from a foreign port, shall be accompanied by a written declaration from the exporter made before a British Consular Officer to the effect that the animal is free on embarkation from any infectious or contagious disease and has not, within thirty days of shipment, been in direct or indirect contact with infected stock. Certificates of health to be furnished.
6. Any person who shall import any animal without due notice as provided in Regulation 2 or without a health certificate as provided in Regulation 5 shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds in respect of each animal so imported. Penalty for importing animals without notice.
7. No hay, straw, fodder or other similar substance commonly used for the food or bedding of animals or otherwise for or about animals shall be imported from a foreign country except with the special permission of the Governor in writing, and all fodder and litter so imported shall be accompanied by a written declaration Importation of fodder and litter from a foreign country restricted.

from the exporter made before a British Consular Officer at the port of shipment to the effect that the produce did not originate in a disease infected area.

Duties of Inspectors.

8. An Inspector shall inspect any stock-carrying vessel and shall examine every animal imported enumerated in Schedule A hereto and all fodder and litter imported from a foreign country.

Powers of Inspectors.

9. An Inspector shall have power

- (1) to prohibit the landing of any animal which, in his opinion, would be a source of danger to other animals in the Colony.
- (2) to order any such animal to be destroyed, either on board ship or after being landed, but such order must in all cases be sanctioned by the Governor before being carried into effect.
- (3) to order any animal to be conveyed or driven to and confined in any area set apart as a quarantine paddock and such animal shall be retained in quarantine until a written order for its release has been given by him.
- (4) to order that all or any parts of any stock-carrying vessel shall be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected to his satisfaction.
- (5) to prohibit the landing of fittings, pens, hurdles, utensils or other articles which have been used for or about any animal.
- (6) to prohibit the landing of any article which in his opinion may carry disease and to order its destruction.

Expenses payable by importer.

10. All expenses incurred in the destruction or keeping in quarantine by order of an Inspector or in dipping, attendance on or feeding of any animal enumerated in Schedule A hereto, or in the destruction of any hay, straw or other article under these regulations, shall be payable by the importer, and the Government will not compensate the importer for any loss sustained thereby.

Importation of Sheep from South America.

11. The foregoing regulations shall apply to the importation of sheep from South America subject to the following additional provisions:-

- (1) The importing vessel shall not import into the Colony any hay, fodder, straw, litter, or water which has been used by the animals imported or shipped for use on the voyage to the Colony.
- (2) The exporter of the sheep shall make a declaration in the form annexed hereto (Schedule C) with respect to the sheep which it is intended to import and the declaration shall be made before a British Consular Officer and countersigned by the Chief Inspector of Stock before the sheep are landed.
- (3) The sheep shall be landed on an island to be approved by the Governor and shall remain there in quarantine for a period of 90 days.
- (4) The sheep shall be dipped a first time on being landed at the quarantine station and a second time after an interval of ten days and dipped further, fourteen and again four days before being released from quarantine.

- (5) Before the sheep are released from quarantine they shall be marked with yellow ruddle.
- (6) The owner of any sheep imported under these regulations shall not permit any such sheep, for a period of twelve months from the date of importation, to be depastured or to stray on any land which is not separated by at least two fences from any lands not in the occupation of the said owner.
- (7) Any sheep marked with yellow ruddle which shall be found within a period of twelve months from the date of importation to be straying on lands not in the occupation of the owner of the sheep, so marked, may be destroyed or may be ordered to be destroyed forthwith by the owner or occupier of such lands and no compensation whatsoever shall be payable to any person in respect of the destruction of such sheep.

12. The Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council on the 7th day of February, 1914, the 17th day of October, 1921, and the 3rd day of November, 1922, are hereby repealed.

EDUCATION.

A scheme for extending the educational facilities in the Colony has been approved by the Secretary of State for the Colonies. The following are the main points :

- (1) Parents living in the Camp who have children from 10 to 14 years old are invited to send them to the Government School in Stanley, and assistance will be given as shown in (2) and (3) below. Such assistance is limited to parents whose income is under £200 a year.
- (2) It is proposed to provide a Hostel in Stanley for Camp children. The charge for each child will be £1 a month or £10 a year. For this sum the child will receive board, lodging, washing, medical attendance and tuition at the Government School.
- (3) Parents living in the Camp who have relatives or friends living in Stanley may wish to arrange for their children to stay with them. In such cases Government will pay two-thirds of an approved charge for board and lodging, such grant not to exceed £2 a month.
- (4) The holidays during the year will be shortened, and the Christmas holiday extended to seven or eight weeks so that the children will be able to spend several weeks at home each year.
- (5) Parents receiving assistance will be expected to keep their children at least two years at the School.
- (6) From the 1st of January, 1924, all children attending the Government School and all Camp children will be supplied with books and stationery at half price. Lists of books and prices will be sent round the Camp periodically, and it is hoped that full advantage will be taken of this arrangement, so that the children may have a plentiful supply of books.
- (7) A station, not now containing a school, which provides an approved teacher to teach the children in the settlement will receive a grant not exceeding £75 a year or three-quarters of the salary paid to the teacher, whichever may be the lower. No grant will be made in respect of passages or board and lodging.
- (8) A "Continuation Class" providing a two years course of further education will be started at the Government School in January, 1924, if sufficient pupils are enrolled. The class will be held in the ordinary school hours and tuition will be given in English (Grammar, Composition and Literature), Latin, French, Geography, History, Drawing, Needlework, Singing, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry and Science. The fees will be £8 per pupil per annum, payable quarterly in advance.
- (9) The Head Boy and Head Girl of Standard VII each year will be awarded free Scholarships entitling them to two years' tuition in the Continuation Class.
- (10) Parents desiring to enter their children for the Continuation Class are requested to communicate with the Government Schoolmaster without delay.
- (11) The Government Schoolmaster will shortly be making a tour of the Colony to explain the scheme personally, and in the meantime will be glad to answer any inquiries in Stanley.

An Ordinance

To validate the Liquidation of the contribution of the Colony towards the expenses of the late War.

WHEREAS it was enacted by the War Expenses Contribution Ordinance, 1917, as amended by the War Expenses Contribution Amendment Ordinance, 1920, that for a period of ten years commencing on the 1st day of January, 1917, there should be paid annually out of the public revenue and other funds of the Colony a sum of £1,440 (one thousand four hundred and forty pounds),

Preamble.

My Lord Duke,

I have the honour to refer to the correspondence concluding with Viscount Milner's despatch No. 121 of the 24th of November, 1919, on the subject of the graduated tax on land which was imposed by the Land Tax Ordinance, 1918.

2. In a memorial addressed to the Secretary of State for the Colonies on the 15th of May, 1919, the Sheep Farmers resident in the Colony while "approving of the principle of a tax on land as against a tax on exports" protested against the measure on other grounds.

3. In June, 1921, verbal representations were made to me by a number of the Station Managers regarding the inequality of the tax and in support of their argument they furnished a statement shewing the amount of taxation payable per sheep carried by each station in the year 1920. Subsequently, in a letter, of which a copy is attached, the Managers of the principal stations expressed the opinion that the production of wool was a more equitable basis of taxation than the land. The Managers of two other stations later requested that their names should be added to this letter and it is assumed that all those, whose names appear as signatories, had due authority to commit the owners of the stations, which they represent, to the views expressed in the letter.

4. The basis of taxation and the principle of graduation were carefully considered before the introduction of a Land Tax was sanctioned and I was not in a position to recommend any alteration in the system of taxation without careful enquiry into the sheep farming industry. The absence of statistics and other information relating to the industry has made investigation difficult and protracted but the results of my enquiry, although incomplete in some respects, have now been reported in my despatch No. 42 of the 26th of March.

5. The Land Tax Ordinance, 1918, imposed on land a tax according to acreage, irrespective of value, at the following rates :

	Rate per acre.
Under 5,000 acres	One farthing.
Over 5,000 but under 50,000 acres	One half-penny.
Over 50,000 but under 100,000 acres	Three farthings.
Over 100,000 acres	One penny.

6. The Ordinance further provides that the tax shall be assessed on ;

- (1) The acreage ascertained by a survey made by a qualified land surveyor.
- (2) Where no survey has been made
 - (a) The acreage stated in the Crown grant or lease.
 - or (b) When the acreage is not stated in the Crown grant or lease, then on what the Governor in Council declares to be the acreage.

7. No land-survey of the Colony has, in fact, been made or is contemplated. It was estimated in 1893, that the work of merely running lines to mark the principal boundaries on the ground, if carried out by qualified surveyors, would then cost, in the most favourable circumstances, over £10,000.

8. In practice the tax is assessed

- (1) In the case of five small holdings, of which the total area is about 50,000 acres, on the acreage as ascertained by survey.
- (2) In the case of all the principal stations with one exception, on the area as stated in the Crown grant or lease.
- (3) In the case of one large station, of which the acreage is not stated in the Crown grant, on the acreage as calculated at the Admiralty from the Admiralty chart.

9. It has been recognised that there was great carelessness in estimating the acreage when leases were originally granted, and that the quantity of land comprised within the boundaries defined in the leases exceeds the quantity which was stated in the leases. The acreages of the stations as stated in the instruments of title and as calculated by measurement from the Admiralty chart are given in Appendix XII to the Memorandum which accompanies my despatch No. 42 of the 26th instant. The excess in area is large and is not uniformly distributed.

10. The land has been shewn by long experience to be adapted only to sheep farming on a large scale and the industry is almost entirely dependent on the production of wool. Whatever be the form of direct taxation imposed on the industry it is reducible ultimately to a tax on the wool produced which is dependent on the number and quality of the sheep. The extremes of inequality in the land tax are shewn in the attached statement which gives, in respect of the particular stations, the acreage as stated in the instrument of title, on which acreage the tax is, in most cases, assessed, the acreage as calculated from the Admiralty chart and the average number of sheep carried for the twelve years from 1910 to 1921. The amount of taxation payable per sheep varies between 0.79 of a penny in the case of San Carlos North and 4.84 pence in the case of Fox Bay East. The stations of San Carlos North and South are adjacent to each other. They are assessed on the acreage stated in the instruments of title, the rate being one half-penny per acre in one case and three farthings in the other. There is little difference in the areas of the stations as calculated from the Admiralty chart and they carry exactly the same number of sheep but in one case the amount of direct taxation payable per sheep is 0.79 of a penny and in the other 1.69 pence.

11. I am of opinion that in the absence of a land survey and valuation it is impracticable to levy a land tax in this Colony on an equitable basis and after careful enquiry into the sheep farming industry I recommend for Your Grace's favourable consideration that

- (1) An export duty on wool should be substituted for a Land tax with effect from the 1st of January, 1924.
- (2) The rate of the export duty should be fixed at 1/- for 25 lbs.

12. A duty at this rate will yield, on an average annual export of 4,500,000 lbs of wool, a revenue of £9,000. This sum is slightly in excess of the amount of revenue (£8,700) which it was anticipated, in 1918, would be received from the Land Tax but the rate proposed will prove convenient in calculating the amount payable in duty when the wool is shipped.

13. The members of the Executive Council concur in the view that an export tax on wool should be substituted for Land Tax and an extract from the minutes of the meeting, at which the subject was discussed, is attached.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting held on the 28th July, 1923.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 30th of December, 1922, were read and confirmed.

2. The Honourable M. C. Craigie-Halkett having taken the prescribed oaths assumed his seat at the Council.

3. Minute No. 1 of 1923 from the Acting Governor, submitting Supplementary Estimate of Expenditure, No. 1 of 1923, was read.

With reference to Item No. 12 of the schedule to the minute, the Hon. H. C. Harding asked that estimates of the comparative costs of stone and brick foundations, including the relative costs of mortar and labour necessary, might be obtained, as he considered that an economy could be effected by substituting local stone for brick.

The President stated that in compliance with the Honourable Member's request, the required figures would be furnished. His Excellency added that three thousand bricks were used in the foundation of the new double house, the landed cost of the bricks being £45.

On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the minute was adopted.

4. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers:-

- (1) Copies of all regulations and proclamations passed since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
- (2) Despatches from the Secretary of State for the Colonies intimating the non-disallowance of Ordinances Nos. 1 to 7 of 1922.
- (3) Correspondence regarding the cancellation of the claim on Naval Funds in respect of interest and cost of insurance in connection with the wireless apparatus taken over by the Admiralty during the war.
- (4) Schedules of Charges of an unusual or special description not covered by the Appropriation Law for the year 1922, incurred during the quarters ended the 30th June, 30th September and 31st December, 1922.
- (5) Schedule of Charges of an unusual or special description not covered by the Appropriation Law for the year 1923, incurred during the quarter ended 31st March, 1923.
- (6) Comparative Statements of Revenue and Expenditure for the quarters ended the 30th June, 30th September and 31st December, 1922, and 31st March, 1923.
- (7) The Treasurer's Financial Report and Statements for the year 1922.

5. The Honourable the Treasurer moved and the Honourable G. I. Turner seconded the adoption of rules amending the Standing Rules and Orders of the Legislative Council passed on the 17th of December, 1921.

The amendments were adopted.

6. On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the Bill "To legalise certain payments made in the year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-two in excess of the expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 5 of 1921," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2, the schedule, the preamble and title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

7. On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the Bill "To provide for the refund of a portion of the duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1922 and the 30th of September, 1923, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, if the market price of the Oil per ton, does not exceed £50," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 4 and the title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the Bill "To validate the Liquidation of the Contribution of the Colony towards the expenses of the late war," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 3 and the preamble and title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. The President intimated that a letter, dated the 10th of July, 1923, had been received from the Honourable H. C. Harding, tendering for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure, the resignation of his seat in the Legislative Council. The circumstances which had led Mr. Harding to this decision were due to the inaccessibility of Stanley from his residence at North Arm and his consequent difficulty in attending the meetings of Council and in keeping in touch with public affairs.

His Excellency said that while recognising that the reasons given were such that it was not possible to press Mr. Harding for a reconsideration of his decision, Honourable Members would view with much regret the severance of the Honourable Junior Unofficial member's connection with the Council. Mr. Harding had taken a keen interest in all questions affecting the welfare of the community and his advice had been of value to the Council.

Report on Seal Oil from the Falkland Islands.

The samples of Seal Oil which are the subject of this report were received at the Imperial Institute from the Crown Agents for the Colonies in March, 1923, and are referred to in a report by the Government Naturalist to the Colonial Secretary, dated the 19th January, 1922.

It was stated that the samples represented two grades of seal oil, one of which had been boiled once and the other twice.

Description :

The samples consisted of eight pint bottles of oil. On inspection it was found that the two grades could be readily distinguished by their colour.

The "single boiling" oil was slightly cloudy, pale yellow, and had a fairly strong fishy odour.

The "two boilings" oil was cloudy, golden yellow, and contained a considerable amount of stearin ; it had a stronger odour than the "single boiling" oil.

Results of Examination :

After hot filtration, the oils were examined with the following results, which are shown in comparison with corresponding figures recorded for commercial seal oil and whale oil :

These results show that, with the exception of the iodine value and the solidification point of the fatty acids, the analytical constants of the present oils are very similar to those recorded for commercial seal and whale oils.

Commercial Valuation.

Both the oils were regarded in the trade as of good quality, and very similar in appearance. If filtered cold they would be particularly suitable for the manufacture of leather oils. One of the firms consulted by the Imperial Institute stated that they would be prepared to purchase a trial shipment of 100 to 200 barrels of the oils at about £30 per ton, barrels included, ex quay, Liverpool, provided that the consignment proved to be of equal quality to the present samples.

Remarks.

These seal oils are of suitable quality for the United Kingdom market, and consignments would be readily saleable.

If it is possible to forward a trial shipment of the oils of the quality of the present samples, the Imperial Institute will be glad to arrange for their sale. Information should be furnished as to the quantities which could be regularly supplied, and the price at which the oils could be delivered, ex quay, Liverpool.

2. During the year there were 734 deposits and 375 withdrawals. The deposits averaged a sum of £1,634 : 6 : 7 monthly, as against an average monthly withdrawal of £2,119 : 10 : 2. During the year 81 new accounts were opened, and 65 accounts were closed, leaving 821 accounts at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor equaled a sum of £147 : 4 : 4, or about £50 per head of the population. Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 63 of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

1. These Regulations may be cited as "The Customs Short Title. (Export) Regulations, 1923."

2. The exporter of any whale oil, seal oil or wool, shall, within six calendar months from the date of the clearance of the exporting vessel, deliver to the Collector of Customs, Stanley, a Certificate in the form prescribed (that is in the case of oil, in the form of Schedule A hereto and in the case of wool in the form of Schedule B hereto) and shall make and subscribe a declaration to the truth of the said Certificate.

Certificate of Landing to be delivered to the Collector.

Provided that the said Certificate may be delivered by a duly authorized agent for and on behalf and at the risk of the exporter; and further, it shall be lawful for the Collector, when it shall not be reasonably possible, in the opinion of the Collector, for the exporter to deliver the said Certificate within the period above prescribed, to grant an extension of the period within which the said Certificate shall be delivered.

Collector may grant extension of the period required for delivery of Certificate.

3. The Certificate shall, in the case of oil, state clearly the number of barrels or drums landed, the quantity of oil in gallons contained therein, the quantity of bulk oil in gallons and the total quantity of oil in gallons, landed; and in the case of wool, the station mark on the bales and the number of bales landed, with the gross weight, tare and net weight in lbs., and the total weight of wool in lbs. landed.

Particulars required to be shown on Certificate.

4. If any whale oil or seal oil is landed or discharged from the exporting vessel at more than one port outside the Colony a separate Certificate shall be required in respect of each port of landing or discharge. No certificate in respect of a consignment of wool shall cover wool from more than one station.

Separate Certificates required in certain cases

5. If the exporter of any whale oil, seal oil, or wool shall fail to comply with any of the foregoing requirements he shall be liable to the penalty of Five Pounds for each day's default prescribed by article 31 of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Penalty.

6. The Regulations made by the Governor in Council on the 10th day of March, 1921 are hereby repealed.

THE COLONIAL AUXILIARY FORCES LONG SERVICE MEDAL.

His Excellency the Acting Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the Royal Warrant of the 25th January, 1923, promulgating new rules in substitution for those contained in previous Royal Warrants governing the issue of the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal, and of the Regulations issued by His Excellency in pursuance thereof :—

Royal Warrant of the 25th of January, 1923.

GEORGE, R.I.

GEORGE THE FIFTH by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India : To all whom these Presents shall come Greeting :

WHEREAS Her late Majesty, Queen Victoria, did, by Royal Warrant dated the 18th day of May, 1899, institute and create a medal entitled "The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal" (hereinafter referred to as "the Medal") to be awarded to members of Our Colonial Auxiliary Forces in recognition of long and meritorious service, and did lay down rules and ordinances for the governance of the same, which rules and ordinances were subsequently amended by Royal Warrant dated the 3rd day of August, 1902 :

AND WHEREAS We desire to recognise specially the meritorious service of members of Our Dominion and Colonial Auxiliary Forces during the late war :

AND WHEREAS We also deem it expedient to promulgate new rules and ordinances in substitution for those contained in the aforesaid Royal Warrants :

NOW THEREFORE We do declare that the rules and ordinances heretofore in force shall be abrogated, cancelled and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain and establish the following rules and ordinances in substitution for the same which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept :—

Firstly.—It is ordained that the Medal shall be awarded to duly qualified members of all authorised Auxiliary Military Forces (*i.e.*, other than Permanent Forces) of Our Dominions, Colonies and Dependencies (except India) and of countries under Our protection (hereinafter referred to as Protectorates), whether designated as Militia or Volunteers or otherwise.

Secondly.—It is ordained that the period of service requisite to qualify for the Medal shall be 20 years ; and that service on the West Coast of Africa shall reckon two-fold as qualifying service.

Thirdly.—It is ordained that service rendered wholly in the Auxiliary Forces of one or more of Our Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates ; or partly in the Auxiliary Forces of one or more of Our Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates ; partly in the Territorial Army of Great Britain, or partly in any Naval or Military Volunteer Force of any part of Our Empire (except service since 4th August, 1914, in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain raised under the Volunteer Acts, 1863—1916), shall be reckoned as qualifying service for the Medal.

Fourthly.—It is ordained that service on the Permanent Staff of the Auxiliary Forces of Our Dominions, Colonies, Dependencies or Protectorates by members of the Permanent Forces shall not reckon as qualifying service for the Medal.

Fifthly.—It is ordained that a member of the Auxiliary Forces of one of Our Dominions, Colonies, Dependencies or Protectorates who during the late war actually served, or accepted the obligation of serving, beyond the boundaries of the Dominion, Colony, Dependency or Protectorate, shall reckon all such embodied service on the active list two-fold as qualifying service towards the requisite 20 years, whether such service was in Our Naval Forces, Our Military Forces, or Our Air Forces.

PROVIDED that nothing in this Royal Warrant shall permit service to count more than two-fold towards the award of the Medal.

Sixthly.—It is ordained that service qualifying for the Medal shall also count towards the qualifying service necessary for "The Territorial Efficiency Medal," and *vice versa*.

Seventhly.—It is ordained that an officer who has served in the ranks of the Territorial Army of Great Britain, or of the Auxiliary Forces of a Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, but who is not qualified for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration, shall, on completing twenty years' service in all, be eligible to receive the Medal, but, should the aforesaid Decoration subsequently be conferred upon him, he shall not be called upon to surrender the medal, but shall not be permitted to wear it until such time as he has completed the full periods required for both Decoration and Medal.

Eighthly.—It is ordained that the Medal shall be conferred under such regulations as to grant, forfeiture, restoration, and other matters, in amplification of these Our rules and ordinances, as may with Our approval signified through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, be issued from time to time by the Governors-General, Governors or officers administering the government of Our Dominions, Colonies or Protectorates, as the case may be.

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourselves, Our Heirs and Successors full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these rules and ordinances, or any part thereof, by a notification under Our Royal Sign Manual.

Given at our Court at St. James's, this 25th day of January, 1923, in the thirteenth year of Our Reign.

Issued in pursuance of the Royal Warrant of the 25th January, 1923, as to the issue, surrender, forfeiture and restoration of the "Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal" (hereinafter referred to as "the Medal").

Persons Eligible :

1. Members of the Falkland Islands Defence Force of all ranks having 20 years service which need not be continuous.

Qualifying Service :

2. (a) Service rendered wholly in the Auxiliary Forces of one or more Dominion, Colony or Protectorate; or partly in the Auxiliary Forces of one or more Dominion, Colony or Protectorate; partly in the Territorial Army of Great Britain, or partly in any Naval or Military Volunteer Force of any part of the Empire (except service since 4th August, 1914, in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain raised under the Volunteer Acts, 1863—1916); service on the West Coast of Africa counting two-fold.
- (b) Service on the permanent staff by members of the Permanent Forces shall not be reckoned as qualifying service for the Medal.
- (c) An officer who has served in the ranks of the Territorial Army of Great Britain or of the Auxiliary Forces of a Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, but who is not qualified for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration, shall, on completion of 20 years service in all, be eligible to receive the Medal, but should the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration subsequently be conferred upon him, he shall not be called upon to surrender the Medal, but shall not be permitted to wear it until such time as he shall have completed the full periods required for both Decoration and Medal.
- (d) A member of the Auxiliary Forces who was serving on the 4th August, 1914, and did before the 11th November, 1918, actually serve or sign a written agreement to serve beyond the limits of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, may reckon all embodied service on the active list two-fold as qualifying service towards the requisite 20 years, whether such service was in the Naval Forces, Military Forces or Air Forces.
- (e) No service shall count more than two-fold towards the award of the Medal.

Applications :

3. Applications for the Medal shall be made in writing by the Officer Commanding the Falkland Islands Defence Force, through the usual channel of correspondence to the Governor, and they shall in each case be supported by a statement of the applicant's service on Form A.

Nominal Rolls :

4. The Officer Commanding the Falkland Islands Defence Force will forward with Form A a nominal Roll arranged alphabetically on Form B. This roll will be prepared in duplicate, one copy being retained by the Officer Commanding, and the other forwarded with Form A, to the Governor through the usual channel of correspondence.

Publication :

5. The grant of the Medal will be published in the Government Gazette.

Surrender :

6. Any officer who is subsequently awarded the "Colonial Auxiliary Force Officers' Decoration" will not be required to surrender the Medal, but will not be permitted to wear both except as provided for in paragraph 2, sub-paragraph (c).

Forfeiture :

7. A recipient of the Medal who suffers death by sentence of a Military Court, or who is dismissed or removed from his Corps for misconduct, or who is convicted by the Civil power shall forfeit the Medal unless the Governor shall otherwise direct.

Restoration :

8. A Medal forfeited by a member of the Falkland Islands Defence Force under the provisions of paragraph 7 may be restored to him by the Governor, and notice of forfeiture or restoration shall in every case be published in the Government Gazette.

Loss :

9. When a Medal has been lost and it is desired to replace it, a declaration shall be made before a Magistrate stating the circumstances under which the loss occurred, and the rank, name and unit of individual to whom the Medal belonged. The declaration will be forwarded to the Governor through the usual channel of correspondence in the case of an individual who is still serving, and direct to the Governor in the case of one who was retired. The Medal will be replaced on payment if the explanation as to the loss is considered satisfactory.
10. The Medal shall be worn after all British War Medals in such order as may from time to time be assigned to it, suspended from the left breast by a green riband of one inch and a quarter in width.

RULES GOVERNING THE APPORTIONMENT AND WORKING OF THE PEAT BANKS SITUATED ON CROWN LAND IN THE VICINITY OF STANLEY.

H. HENNIKER-HEATON,
Acting Governor.

Short title.

1. These Rules may be cited as "The Peat Banks Rules, 1924."

Officer responsible for observance of Rules.

2. There shall be an Officer-in-Charge of the Peat Banks, hereinafter referred to as the Officer-in-Charge, who shall be directly responsible to the Colonial Engineer for the satisfactory observance of these rules.

Apportionment of Peat Banks.

3. The use of the Peat Banks in the vicinity of Stanley is apportioned as follows :—

- (a) A Peat Bank is allotted to each dwelling house in Stanley. The present recognized allotment of Banks is recorded on a list which may be inspected at the office of the Colonial Engineer.
- (b) A limited number of Peat Banks is available for allotment to persons who are desirous of cutting peat for sale.

Quantity of Peat which can be cut in a Season.

4. The quantity of fuel which may be taken from any Peat Bank during a season shall be determined by the Colonial Engineer and shall be published in a list which may be inspected at the Colonial Engineer's Office,

Provided that, during the season following the allotment of a Bank, double the quantity stated in the list may be cut and stacked, in order to allow of one season's peat being in hand.

5. Except as hereinafter provided, the peat cut from any Bank allotted under Rule 3 (a) shall only be consumed within the premises to which the Bank has been allotted,

Peat to be consumed in premises to which Bank has been allotted.

Provided that the Officer-in-Charge may grant permission to a householder, on application, to cut from his Bank a quantity of peat for sale, not exceeding 75 cubic yards. This permission will only be granted in exceptional cases where neither the privileges of the owner of the house, nor the value of the neighbouring banks will be prejudicially affected.

6. The allotment of Peat Banks as provided for in Rule 3 (b) shall be made on application to the Officer-in-Charge, and, if approved, the applicant's name shall be registered. All such applications must be renewed annually, the Banks reverting to the Crown at the end of each season. The peat stacked on these Banks must be removed early in the season following that on which it is cut, if not previously disposed of.

Applications for Banks from which to cut peat for sale.

7. All peat must be cut out to bottom and the ends of Banks where the peat runs out must also be cut until a sound bottom is obtained. No bank shall be regarded as exhausted until all broken parts have been cleared and the ground left clear of peat. No new Bank will be finally allotted unless this Rule has been observed.

Banks must be exhausted before being abandoned.

8. The Peat Bank faces shall not be deeper than four feet. Where the Bank is over four feet, the face shall be worked back in step formation, the first cut being three feet deep and being carried back for a distance of fifteen feet before the second cut is commenced.

Depth of Bank faces.

9. Persons cutting in a bank, or opening a Bank, must rickle all the peat cut and, if unable to remove the peat during the season, must cause it to be stacked, clear of Banks and cart tracks. The peat so stacked must be removed during the next season. Failure to observe this Rule will render the Bank holder liable to the forfeiture of the peat cut and remaining on the ground.

Banks must be cleared of loose peat.

10. All top sods, after being removed from the top of the Bank, must be properly laid under foot, so as to form the top sod of the next cut or the top soil of a hard bottom.

Disposal of top sods.

11. Banks must be drained, as far as possible, and water in any quantity, which would become a source of danger, must not be allowed to lodge in the trenches. Neither must the trenches be left in such a condition as to render them liable to flood.

Water must not be allowed to accumulate in trenches.

12. If any person disobeys or fails to comply with any of these Rules or to carry out any proper directions of the Colonial Engineer in relation to the Peat Banks, the Governor in Council may order the reversion to the Crown of the use of the Peat Bank in respect of which an offence is committed.

Penalty for non-observance of Rules.

13. Nothing in these Rules shall limit, in any degree, the right of the Crown to resume any Peat Bank or part of a Peat Bank at any time and without compensation, where the public interest so requires.

Saving Clause.

Approved by the Governor in Executive Council at a meeting held on the 25th of April, 1924.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Meeting No. 2, held on the 20th November, 1923, at 11 a.m.

3. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :—

- (1) Copies of all Regulations and Proclamations passed since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
- (2) Estimates of comparative costs of stone and brick foundations, requested by the Honourable H. C. Harding at the meeting held on the 28th July, 1923.
- (3) Schedule of Charges of an unusual or special description not covered by the Appropriation Law, for the year 1923, incurred during the Quarter ended the 30th June, 1923.
- (4) Comparative Statement of Revenue and Expenditure for the Quarter ended the 30th June, 1923.

4. The Honourable the Treasurer moved and the Honourable G. I. Turner seconded the following resolution :—

"Be it resolved that under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, this Council hereby sanctions the following rate to be charged for the year 1924, on house property in the Town of Stanley, namely One Shilling and Three Pence for every Twenty Shillings of the annual value of such house property."

The Resolution was adopted.

5. On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer, seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the Bill "To amend the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded, the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 and the title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

6. On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the Bill "To repeal the third Schedule (Export Duties) of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, and to replace the same by an Amended Schedule," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded, the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 4 and the title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

7. On the motion of the Honourable the Treasurer, seconded by the Honourable G. I. Turner, the Bill "To provide for the Service of the Year 1924," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

Clause 2 was amended to read as follows :—

The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st December, 1924, a sum not exceeding Fifty-three Thousand, Nine Hundred and Forty-six pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1924.

Dependencies No. 1 of the Schedule was amended to read as follows :—

Ordinary Expenditure—£8,480.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. With reference to Items Nos. 4 and 6 of Head XVIII. (Public Works Extraordinary) of the Estimates for the year 1924, the Honourable G. I. Turner requested that attention should be given to the suggestion made by the Unofficial Members at the meeting held on the 17th of December, 1921, that landing steps should be constructed on the face of the Public Jetty, and that the portion of the track leading to the north Camp, already constructed, should be kept in repair.

To Provide for the Refund of a portion of the Duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1923, and the 30th of September, 1924, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :-

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Refund of Export Duty on Oil) Ordinance, 1924."

Definition.

2. In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of whale and seal oil for the period from the 1st day of October, 1923 to the 30th day of September, 1924.

Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

3. A refund of a part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid, in respect of whale and seal oil, between the first day of October, 1923 and the thirtieth day of September, 1924, shall be made in accordance with the following scale:-

If the average market price for the season of first grade oil,

Exceeds £45 but does not exceed £50 per ton, 6d per barrel.

Notes on Road Construction on Marshy or Mossy Areas in Scotland.

Roughly speaking, if at all possible, moss should be excavated and cleared to the hard. The original cost of this will be made good in the long run. If, however, the moss is of too great depth to permit of clearing it away (in this country we make about 4 to 6 feet the maximum for such clearance) then the method described below may be used, and, if carried out in a proper manner, should give satisfactory results. While the importance of drainage must not be underrated, it has frequently been found that roads which are laid over moss are stronger in wet weather than in dry. This is no doubt due to the superior resilience of the moss in a wet condition. It should, of course, be understood that this is no argument for allowing the road crust itself to retain water.

In forming a macadamised road, if the ground is firm and dry, the only preparation required is to bring its surface to a true level ; should it, however, be at all wet or of a marshy character, the portion upon which the road is to be formed should be first carefully and thoroughly drained, which may usually be most effectively done by cutting deep drains running parallel to the intended course of the road on either side of it, and, if it is found necessary, *forming cross-drains between them having a fall each way.* The ground having been thus drained, a covering of turf or of brushwood, the latter not less than 6 inches in thickness when compressed, should be laid over the surface of the soft ground and upon this should be spread a covering of not less than 3 or 4 inches of clean gravel, the upper surface of which should be level. The foundation of the road should now be formed by laying a kind of rough pavement consisting of rough stones of any kind that can be most readily procured, laid carefully by hand with their broadest faces on the ground. These stones should not be less than 7 inches in depths at the sides, and the interstices between them should be carefully filled in with chippings, so that the upper surface when finished shall form a regular curve with a convexity of about 4 inches. The material for forming the surface of the road should then be laid on, forming a uniform coat 6 inches in thickness. For the centre portion of the road care should be taken to select a stone which is hard and not friable ; granite whinstone, and the harder limestones are the best suited for the purpose, and they should be broken not larger than $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches, that is to say, they should pass through a $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch ring. For the sides of the road, well cleaned, strong gravel may be used. A good binding of clean gravel perfectly free from earth and clay about 2 inches in depth should then be laid over the entire surface of the road. It is better to put only 4 inches of the broken stone at first, and after this has become consolidated by the traffic, then to lay on the remaining 2 inches, care being taken, however, to fill up any ruts which may have been formed.

The Annual Medical and Sanitary Report on the Falkland Islands for the year 1923.

(A) FALKLAND ISLANDS.

I. Administrative.

STAFF.

- A. Qualified Medical Staff.—The Colonial Surgeon, the Assistant Colonial Surgeon and the Colonial Dental Surgeon.
- B. Nursing Staff, English Trained.—One Nurse Matron and Two Nursing Sisters.
- C. Undergoing Training.—Two Nurse Probationers and One Dental Mechanic Apprentice.
- D. Subordinate Medical and Sanitary Staff.—One Inspector of Nuisances.
- E. Clerical Staff.—None.

The qualified staff consists of:—

(1) The Colonial Surgeon, who is also Port Health Officer, Medical Officer of Health, Prison Surgeon and Surgeon in charge of the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital, Stanley.

(2) The Assistant Colonial Surgeon who is a temporary officer under a three years contract. He attends at the out-patient department of the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital and certain Sheep Stations on the East Falkland Island, and,

(3) The Colonial Dental Surgeon, who is also a temporary officer under agreement.

Both the Colonial Surgeon and the Assistant Colonial Surgeon attend, free of charge, all Government Officials, their wives, families and servants: also all persons, irrespective of their position, financial or otherwise, who present themselves at the Hospital. They are only allowed to charge for attendance upon any patient who is admitted into the private wards of the Hospital. The Dental Surgeon attends Officials and their families free of charge as well as all school children under the age of fourteen.

All patients, admitted into the General Wards, are under the sole charge of the Colonial Surgeon, and receive free treatment; they must, however, pay for their maintenance while in the hospital. Officials their wives, families and servants pay half rates.

There is a well equipped maternity ward and a private labour ward, the existence of which, under an English trained Staff does not appear to be known on the South American Coast, as, many British residents there, would, without a doubt, prefer to come to the Falkland Islands, instead of having to go to England, in order to retain British nationality for their children.

There is no Lunatic Asylum and no provision for paupers other than three rooms in the hospital annexe.

II. Public Health.

The general health of officials was good; none were invalided, none died.

GENERAL DISEASES. Rare as usual.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES. Insect borne. None.

INFECTIOUS AND EPIDEMIC DISEASES. There were seven cases of mild Chicken-Pox.

HELMINTHIC DISEASES. Oxyuris Vermicularis or threadworm is very prevalent here. Quite a large percentage of the native born inhabitants of Stanley suffer from this disease.

III. Sanitation.

The Colonial Surgeon and the Inspector of Nuisances inspect the condition of the town regularly.

The Sanitary condition of Stanley is deplorable, in fact one could justly say that there is no sanitary system other than that of dry earth and pails, which, while it fills the bill in other places; in a place so well adapted as this, for a water system, is much to be regretted.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FUTURE WORK.

Construction of proper roads, drains and a water supply, with a proper water sewage system.

The abolition of the present ash pits and the substitution of a proper scavenging system, with the use of covered garbage pails.

The erection of a refuse destructor by means of which the blue bottle pest will be got rid of.

IV. Meteorological.

The climate of the Falkland Islands has been compared to that of the North of Scotland. The average level of the Barometer in the Falkland Islands is rather low, being 29.6 inches at sea level (corrected for gravity) On the whole, the readings are highest in late winter and spring (July to October) and lowest in Summer (November to April). The comparatively low readings are due to the position of the Islands in the Southern Temperate Storm belt.

TEMPERATURE. The mean annual temperature is about 43 F. January is the warmest month (49 F.) and July the coldest (37 F.) giving an annual range of 12 F.

HUMIDITY AND CLOUDINESS. The number of overcast days is considerable and the average cloudiness is seven tenths of the sky covered. March and September have the clearest skies.

SUNSHINE. January and February are the Sunniest months, averaging 5½ hours per day, June is the dullest with an average of a little over 1½ hours per day. On a calm day the burning effect of the sun's rays upon the skin is worse than it is in tropical countries, but no cases of sunstroke have ever been recorded.

RAINFALL. The average fall is 26.43 inches per year. There are more rainy days in the Falkland Islands than in London.

WINDS. The prevailing wind direction is from the North-West, winds from the South-West and North are also frequent. During ten years there were 20 storms, with the barometer below 28.5. In 1923 conditions were far different from those of previous years; the winter being an exceptionally severe and long one; the summer not coming up to expectations.

V. Hospital.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT. There were 2319 attendances in the out-patient department of the King Edward Memorial Hospital during the year. As already mentioned above, these people were attended free of charge.

DENTAL DEPARTMENT.

The number of patients treated shows an increase over the previous year, in spite of the fact that the Colonial Dental Surgeon was absent for several weeks in the West Falkland Island. The figures also show a gratifying increase of approximately 10% in the proportion of teeth filled to that of the teeth extracted, compared with those of the previous year.

The number of children under 14 years of age, receiving free treatment was 37.

GOVERNMENT SCHOOL.

The children were frequently examined, and found to be healthy, clean and well cared for.

SHIPPING.

56 vessels were given pratique; their total tonnage was 91,618 and crews 2,801. No quarantinable disease was reported.

VI. Prisons.

One prisoner was admitted during the year, he enjoyed good health. The prison was inspected regularly and was found to be in good order.

VII. Scientific.

The X-Ray installation at the King Edward Memorial Hospital was brought into use for the first time in 1923, and was remarkably successful, when it is taken into consideration that no proper arrangements exist for its use; it is much to be regretted that there is no dark room installed at the hospital where skiagrams could be developed, as thereby this apparatus would be rendered very much more efficient, and records could be kept for future reference or for the more satisfactory observation of changes and improvement in cases undergoing treatment.

The provision of a microscope and the allocation of a portion of the hospital for the use of such scientific apparatus as is available are urgently needed reforms, and are recommended for future work. The exceptional distance of this colony from any centre of production of chemicals renders the replacement of reagents difficult.

(B) DEPENDENCIES.

The total population of South Georgia was 1,477 in 1923 and it is estimated that about 1500 persons were employed at the South Shetlands and 90 men on the floating factory "Orwell" at South Orkney, during the whaling season. There is no British Medical Officer at South Georgia; the whaling companies operating there provide a medical man for their own crews. Two medical men, not British, accompany the whaling fleet to the South Shetlands; these medical men are employed by the whaling companies.

As no medical reports are received from the Dependencies of the Falkland Islands, no definite information as to the health of the population, floating or permanent, is available.

So far as can be ascertained, serious accidents are rare in all the Dependencies. No cases of infectious disease were notified from any of the Dependencies during the year 1923.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

Of the cases undergoing major operation, the majority gave most gratifying results.

One of the cases upon which a laparotomy was performed had come under treatment several years too late. The patient had a history of chronic dyspepsia covering a period of seven years, and was of a very highly neurotic temperament; this patient had not sought medical advice but had been in the habit of taking patent medicines, although entitled to free medical treatment.

Immediately the abdomen was opened an extensive carcinoma of the transverse colon was discovered this was adherent to all the neighbouring structures, and moreover the mesenteric glands were involved; as no amelioration of the patient's condition was possible, the abdomen was closed and the patient returned to the ward where death ensued about 10 days later.

One of the breast cases, was a slow-growing sarcoma attached to the 7th costo-chondral junction. This had been treated as a corn, for a period of over two years. The patient recovered from the operation and was enabled to return home, but came under treatment eight months later suffering from the effects of metastasis. The disease terminated fatally.

Speech of His Excellency the Governor at the meeting of the Legislative Council held on 23rd July, 1924.

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN,

My absence from the Colony has been more prolonged than I anticipated when I left you in June of last year, but I have thus been enabled to devote a considerable time in England to matters of importance to the Colony and its Dependencies. This has only been rendered possible by the loyal co-operation of Mr. H. Henniker-Heaton, who during my absence acted as Governor with so marked acceptability and success, and I desire to make a very warm and sincere acknowledgment of the invaluable assistance which he has given me at all times.

It is my pleasant duty to inform you that, when, shortly after my arrival in England I had the honour of being received in audience by the King, His Majesty was graciously pleased to recall the manner in which all the resources of these islands had been exerted to furnish a worthy welcome to the Detached Squadron which visited Stanley over 40 years ago and in which He was serving at the time, and to express a deep interest in the welfare of His people in the Falkland Islands and in the industry in which they are engaged.

That industry, I trust, is emerging from a period of depression which began in 1920, and the time seems opportune for considering the possibilities of strengthening it by development along economic lines and of securing its future stability and prosperity. The geological survey which was carried out in 1921 & 1922 has finally dispelled the vague hopes, which had been for so long entertained, of the occurrence of coal, oil and other valuable minerals. It has shown conclusively that the Colony possesses no minerals of economic value, and I cannot too strongly emphasise the view that we must remain dependent, as we have always been, on sheep farming. The dangers of dependence on a single industry, which is subject to serious market fluctuations, are well known and, in this case, have been amply demonstrated by our experience of the last four years. For these reasons and, with the object of initiating discussion of the problems affecting the industry, I made it my duty to collect such information as I could with regard to it, and I take this opportunity of acknowledging my indebtedness to those who are engaged in farming in the Colony for the very valuable assistance which they so readily gave me in my task. The information, which was collected, has been embodied in a memorandum which has been laid before you, and an examination of it will shew that

- (1) The area of this group of islands, as calculated from the Admiralty Chart, is approximately 4,600 square miles and not 6,500 square miles as has been previously stated in official reports.
- (2) The climate and the character of the soil are not favourable to securing the most successful results from sheep farming, especially in the breeding and rearing of lambs.
- (3) The number of lambs reared bears a low ratio to the number of ewes carried.
- (4) The aggregate number of sheep carried has decreased by 150,000 in the last 25 years.
- (5) Practically no land which is not too exposed for winter use is freed from stock for any part of the year.
- (6) The profitable disposal of the surplus stock has been a serious difficulty.

In submitting this report to the Secretary of State, I asked that advice should be sought from the Ministry of Agriculture and the Government of New Zealand as to

- (1) What research or experimental work should be undertaken by the Colonial Government with a view to securing the fullest possible use of the land and developing the sheep farming industry, and
- (2) what measures could be taken to increase the prosperity of the industry.

Both the Ministry of Agriculture and the Government of New Zealand pointed out the difficulties of advising in these matters with only a written report to go on and without first hand information. As a result of further representations made by me to the Secretary of State, the Government of New Zealand has delegated Mr. Hugh Munro, who is one of the most experienced officials of the Dominion Agricultural Department and a leading authority

on breeding, to carry out an investigation of the industry, and has agreed to allow Mr. R. W. Carter to take up the post of Chief Inspector of Stock for a period of five years. We are greatly indebted to the Secretary of State for the steps which have been taken to bring about an arrangement of so great importance to the farming industry and also to the Government of New Zealand for the valuable assistance which it has rendered in so readily consenting to the loan of officials of its Agricultural Department.

Through the good offices of the Secretary for Scotland and the Chairman of the Board of Agriculture for Scotland, arrangements have been made whereby the research work, which is most urgently required in connection with the low lambing-percentages, will be undertaken by the Institute with which the name of Dr. I. Quiller Rowett is associated. This institution forms part of the scheme of the Development Commission for promoting scientific research in agriculture and for securing the foundation of Research Institutes, each of which makes a special study of one branch of agricultural science. These permanent institutions insure (1) continuity of work which is necessarily of considerable duration and into which men have to educate themselves, and (2) the concentration of several men, differently trained, on the same group of problems. The ROWETT Institute at Aberdeen, has been established for the special work of Research in animal nutrition and for some time has been engaged, in connection with sheep farming in Scotland, on problems somewhat similar to those which call for solution in this Colony. The Falkland Islands investigations will be carried through as a part of the regular work of the Institute, and, to enable this to be done, it has been necessary to add to its subordinate staff. To meet the expenditure in this connection, you will be invited to approve of a grant of £250 being made to the Institute for the year 1924.

Samples of grasses from a number of farms have already been forwarded for examination and additional samples will be sent at a later date. Samples of soils from all parts of the Colony are being collected and will be forwarded without delay in order that a general soil reconnaissance may be carried out. The pathological and chemical examination of the bones of sheep and lambs will form an important part of the investigation, and the collection of the specimens, which are required, will be undertaken next spring.

Some of the problems which affect the sheep farming industry are of considerable complexity, and their investigation may be protracted. An interim report will be furnished at the earliest possible date by Dr. J. B. Orr, the Director of the Institute, whose able work in this branch of Scientific Research is well known, and he will later advise whether the investigations, in which he is keenly interested, should be continued. In the event of it being found to be of practical advantage to continue the work, it is proposed that a further grant of £250 should be made to the Institute in 1925.

You will be invited to approve of the grant or grants to the Institute and the expenditure in connection with Mr. Munro's visit to the Colony being defrayed from the Land Sales Fund, which at present amounts to over £180,000 and which, in addition to being a Reserve Fund in case of emergency, is at the disposal of the Colony for its development.

I hope that the recent substantial and somewhat unexpected increase in the market value of wool may permit of measures being taken for carrying out farm improvements which have been deferred. It is within my knowledge that, in the case of some farms, considered schemes of improvement, involving relatively large expenditure, will be proceeded with at once. In other cases and in present circumstances, this may not be possible and, in the absence of a Bank in the Colony, a measure will be submitted for your consideration authorizing loans for farm improvements from the Land Sales Fund to an aggregate amount not exceeding £30,000. The rate of interest will be 4 per centum, and the period of repayment 10 years.

Whatever be the improvements which may be carried out in the future, I consider that they will fail in attaining their full effect unless accompanied by co-operation among the Farmers, and perhaps in no branch of the industry is this more important than in the marketing of its products. It is possible for the individual Farmer to market his wool, which must always be his principal source of profit, but evidence is not lacking that one of the chief obstacles to the disposal of surplus stock to the best advantage has been the absence of co-operation. The export of live sheep has made irregular and uncertain contributions to the aggregate receipts. For a brief period in abnormal conditions a canning factory absorbed a large proportion of the surplus sheep, but it was compelled for financial reasons, to discontinue its operations, when a favourable market for its products ceased to exist. The records of the industry show that, from the earliest period of its history, the custom of disposing of the surplus sheep of each farm independently and separately has enforced the adoption of the wasteful process of reducing valuable food to tallow. Although this has at times proved

profitable, it has long been abandoned, I believe, in other sheep farming countries. I venture to suggest that a more certain and advantageous outlet for surplus stock is required and that it may possibly be found in the establishment of a refrigerating factory. In the interests of the industry and with the object of encouraging co-operation, which I regard as essential to the prosperity of the industry, I am prepared to recommend to the Secretary of State that the Government should contribute in a substantial measure towards the initial cost of a refrigerating factory.

You will be glad to know that endeavours are being made to induce the Companies, whose ships pass close to these islands on the voyage from New Zealand to England, to allow their vessels to call here periodically, in order that opportunities may be afforded for importing stock and merchandise from that Dominion.

The Reserve Fund to which I have alluded, has been built up from the payments which have been made since 1891 for the purchase of land and which have been invested in approved securities. The interest from these investments has been applied to the reduction of taxation and the total amount which has been credited to revenue in the years from 1920 to 1923, is £27,700 or an average of approximately £7,000 a year. I am of opinion that, without reducing appreciably the amount by which the general revenue has benefited annually from this source, part of the fund might be used with greater and more direct advantage to the Colony than is derived from investment outside the Colony. I seek your concurrence in this view and I trust that, when the proposals which I have outlined for using a part of this Fund for the assistance and development of the farming industry are submitted for your consideration, they may meet with your approval.

Lest the existence of this substantial reserve may give a more favourable impression of the financial position of the Colony than the facts warrant, it is necessary that the actual situation should be made clear. The Secretary of State's directions that the surplus of revenue over expenditure in the Dependencies should cease to accrue, as previously, to the surplus balances of the Colony, became effective from the 1st of January, 1920. In that and the three succeeding years the revenue from normal sources, excluding the Dependencies' share in the cost of the Central Administration, has been £31,002, £34,585, £29,536 and £30,115, or an average of £31,300, while for the same years the recurrent expenditure, excluding that on the measures, which you approved in 1921, for the protection of the Fur Seals, has been £28,251, £30,783, £33,452 and £29,669 or an average of £30,000. The revenue from normal sources has exceeded the recurrent expenditure by only a small amount, but, as the Departmental Staff of the Colony is responsible for and controls the general administration of the Dependencies, a proportion of the expenditure on Administrative Services is properly a charge on the revenues raised in the Dependencies. The computation of the amount has presented considerable difficulty and the share in the cost of the Central Administration which should be borne by the Dependencies, has formed the subject of a lengthy correspondence with the Secretary of State. The Colony received credits, in respect of the years 1920 and 1921, of £1,470 and £3,000 which I regarded as an inadequate remuneration for services rendered. For a period of five years from the 1st of January, 1922, the amount to be paid annually from Dependencies funds was fixed at £5000, and as the result of further discussion, it has been increased to £9000 for a period of five years from the beginning of the current financial period, on the express condition that a Patrol Boat is maintained by the Colony. In addition, all the charges on remittances, for which facilities are afforded by means of the currency note issue, will be retained by the Colony, and it is estimated that a sum of £1000 will be derived from this source in 1924.

At the time when you approved of the purchase of a Patrol Boat, the reported increase in the number of Fur Seals indicated that, if effective measures for their protection could be devised, the Expenditure would not be un-remunerative, and it had been laid down by the Secretary of State that it would be incumbent on this Government to undertake their protection even although considerable expense should be involved. It was recognized, however, that the revenue which might be realised during the early stages of experimental farming would be insufficient to meet the whole of the expenditure, and approval was given to the net deficit being met from the surplus cash balances, to which the revenues of the Dependencies had contributed, prior to 1920, in a very substantial measure. The investigations which have been carried out during the past three years have shown that, although a considerable nucleus remains of the great herds of Fur Seals which formerly frequented the Southern Seas, the actual number of these animals is very much less than earlier reports had indicated, and cannot be expected, at present, to make any appreciable contribution towards the cost of the protective measures. Apart from its economic aspects, the protection of the Fur Seal in these waters is a matter of great scientific interest and importance, and it is satisfactory

that means have been found whereby the maintenance of the Patrol Boat for the purpose for which it was acquired is assured, and that the Colony will continue to have the benefit of a vessel which has already proved of great service.

It will, I am sure be a matter of gratification to you to learn that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has been graciously pleased to signify his willingness to accept from the people of the Falkland Islands a rug made from the first consignment of fur seal skins which has been sent to England by the Government.

The small amount by which the annual revenue exceeded recurrent expenditure compelled me, when submitting proposals to the Secretary of State for improving elementary education and providing instruction beyond the elementary stage, to seek approval for expenditure on Education, in excess of the amount voted by you for the year 1923, being met from surplus cash balances. I am glad that there is now no need to have recourse to so unusual a financial arrangement: its only justification, even as a temporary measure, was the importance and urgency of the matter. The necessity for employing travelling teachers to give instruction to the children in country districts arose from two distinct geographical causes—land remoteness and water isolation. In recent years difficulty was experienced in obtaining teachers with even modest attainments and no experience. The arrangements had proved inadequate and unsatisfactory. The scheme which was inaugurated at the beginning of this year is in harmony with the policy which Education Authorities in thinly populated areas in Scotland are encouraged to adopt by the Scottish Education Department, and the words of a recent report of that Department are so appropriate to our own conditions that I have taken the liberty of making use of them. The scheme gives to the severely handicapped children, who live in remote districts, advantages which have previously not been considered possible. It certainly calls for no little self-sacrifice on the part of the parents on account of the separation from their children which it entails. I can understand and sympathise with their feelings, but they have shown themselves eager in the past to help with the education of their children, and I hope that, recognizing the handicaps consequent on the feeble equipment which the previous system could give, they will make the self-sacrifice and consent to their children being boarded in Stanley. Our thanks are due to the Very Reverend Dean Stanley Smith and the Trustees of Christ Church Cathedral for the valuable assistance which they have given to the scheme in making the Church House available as a Hostel and to the Directors of the Falkland Islands Company for the generous manner in which they have agreed to pupils, who are boarded in Stanley in order to attend the Government school, being allowed to travel at half rates by the steamship "Falkland."

It is to be expected that after these and other recurrent charges for essential services have been met, the increase in the annual receipts, which I have explained, will leave a balance which will permit of the execution of necessary works. In addition, the Colony possesses surplus cash balances to which, as has been stated, the revenues of the Dependencies contributed in a substantial measure and which at the 31st of March last amounted to over £50,000. The Secretary of State, on being informed of the pressing need for a determined and sustained endeavour to improve local conditions, agreed, in 1922, to the principle that the Colony should benefit from the Dependencies' surpluses prior to 1920, either by way of Capital Expenditure on a programme of improvements or by retaining, in the accounts of the Colony, the whole of the interest revenue on such surplus balances as it accrued. Capital from this source has already been expended, in an endeavour to relieve the very serious difficulty of housing in Stanley, on the erection, as an experiment, of four houses of different types. The Government is desirous of affording to residents in Stanley an opportunity of becoming the owners of the houses in which they live and of purchasing them by instalments spread over a period of years. If a demand is shown for the acquisition of houses on these terms, their construction will be proceeded with on a site which has been acquired for that purpose.

Having regard to what has already been written and the many defects which are known to exist, it is unnecessary I feel certain, that I should discuss at length the need for the improvement of the sanitary condition of Stanley. It is more important that, with your advice, it should be determined what works are financially practicable and that means should be devised for carrying them out as expeditiously as possible. I am of opinion that the very low ratable value of the Town does not permit of the strict application of the general rule that the cost of local improvements should be paid for by those who benefit directly from them, and I therefore submit for your consideration that a part of the surplus cash balances, to which I have alluded, should be allocated, to the improvement of the Capital of the Colony. It is necessary to set a limit to the amount, but it is not yet possible to give you full information

on that point. Towards the end of 1922, Mr. A. A. P. Neave was good enough to consent, with the sanction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to report on the possibilities of improving the condition of the Town. He has given valuable assistance and advice and has put forward proposals for reconstructing the roads and drains, but the provision of a water supply has presented especial difficulties owing to the Town being situated on a narrow peninsula with a peculiar geological formation. Further investigations, however, are being carried out, and reports on the works proposed will be laid before you in due course.

Hitherto no expenditure has been incurred on public works outside the limits of the Town of Stanley. I am of opinion that the time has come when we should consider seriously the possibilities of improving the most frequented tracks and of building bridges where they are required. On representations made by the residents in West Falkland, materials have been ordered, at a cost of £500, for a bridge which is to be built over the Chartres River, and there are other localities in which bridges are no less needed. Apart from the convenience and advantages which a considered policy in this direction would prove to those engaged in the sheep farming industry, recent developments in motor vehicles, which are specially designed for use in roadless countries, indicate that it is possible that this type of vehicle may be found suitable as a means of transport in these islands.

You have already approved of expenditure being incurred on improving the approaches to the cemetery and the work will be proceeded with. The Imperial War Graves Commission has recently agreed to supply, in addition to headstones for those war graves which have no permanent mark, an Imperial War Cross of STANCLIFFE stone which is to be erected on the slope in front of the cemetery in memory of those who, having made the supreme sacrifice during the war, lie buried here. A number of these lost their lives in the naval engagement which took place near this island in 1914 and which is inseparable historically and geographically from the earlier engagement off Coronel. It will interest you to know that, in accordance with a scheme of the Imperial War Graves Commission under which the names of all those, who lost their lives in the war and have no known grave, are recorded on permanent memorials, the names of the crews of His Majesty's Ships "Good Hope" and "Monmouth" will be recorded on a memorial which will be erected at the port of commission of the ship in which they were serving. Their names will also appear in a special register, a copy of which will be obtained for record in the Colony.

Throughout the late war and especially during a critical and anxious period in the latter part of the year 1914, very valuable services were rendered by the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force. It has recently been reorganised with a view to maintaining and increasing its efficiency, but it has always been very seriously handicapped by not having any accommodation for drilling. Two separate buildings, the original object of which was to provide such accommodation, have been constructed in Stanley at different times, but both have been appropriated to other uses. I feel sure that you will agree that, apart from other reasons, the climatic and weather conditions, make it imperative in the interests of the efficiency of the Defence Force, that a Drill Hall should be provided for its use. Plans are accordingly being prepared by the Crown Agents for the Colonies, in consultation with the Department of Fortifications and Works at the War Office, for a modest building which will be suitable as a Drill Hall, and in which provision will be included for a miniature rifle range. I trust that the cost will prove to be within our means and that you will approve of this work being proceeded with.

I pass to a brief review of the finances of the Dependencies. Towards the end of 1919 the export duty on whale and seal oil was increased from 3½d to 1/6 a barrel in order to provide funds for Research and Development in the Dependencies, and in consequence the revenue rose to £28,668 in 1920. In that year the duty was further increased for the same object to 5/- a barrel. The revenue, collected in the years 1921, 1922 and 1923 respectively, amounted to £88,832, £142,102 and £160,222, but the full amount of the duty collected on oil at the rate of 5/- a barrel has not been retained. Owing to the collapse of the market for whale oil, one half of the duties, collected between October 1920 and September 1921, was refunded and from the latter date a system of rebates, based on the average market price of oil, has been in operation. A refund of 1/6 a barrel has been made in respect of each season subsequent to that of 1920-1921, making the effective duty 3/6 per barrel. The amounts refunded in the years 1921, 1922 and 1923 respectively were £35,418, £7,471 and £33,933 and during the current financial period a sum of £44,839 has been refunded in respect of the duties collected for the season 1922-1923. You will be invited to approve of a refund of duty being made at the same rate for the season 1923-1924.

The local expenditure in the Dependencies and their share in the cost of the Central Administration amounted in the four years from 1920 to 1923 to £1,901, £3,249, £12,939 and £7,219 respectively. In addition there was paid from Dependencies' funds in 1923 a sum of £4,584 being the balance of the purchase price of the "Discovery," and approximately £11,000 in connection with the reconditioning of this vessel. The completed accounts, for the year ending the 31st of December last, show that at that date there stood to the credit of the Research Fund and the general account of the Dependencies an aggregate sum of £315,795, but against this there was a liability of £44,800 in respect of the refund of customs duties. Since these accounts were made up a further sum of £11,770 has been paid for the reconditioning of the "Discovery," and some adjustments have been made of outstanding accounts between the Colony and the Dependencies. The bulk of the revenue of the Dependencies is collected in the first half of the financial year and it is estimated that, after allowing for the refund of customs duties in respect of the season 1923-24, the funds available, at the present time, for Research and Development in the Dependencies amount to approximately £300,000.

The accumulation of this considerable fund has enabled preparations to be proceeded with for carrying out the investigations which are recommended in the report of the Interdepartmental Committee on the Dependencies. That these investigations are about to be undertaken is due, in the first instance, to the initiative of Mr. E. R. Darnley of the Colonial Office who, in a series of memoranda prepared in 1917, drew the attention of the Secretary of State to the questions of the development of the Dependencies and the preservation of the whaling industry. It was pointed out that excessive hunting had resulted in the collapse of whaling in other waters and that the amount of the scientific knowledge available was insufficient to enable the industry to be controlled in such a way as to afford security against the depletion of the stock. In view of the interest which the proposed investigations have aroused in the scientific aspect of whaling, it is important to place on record that from an early stage in the development of the whaling industry in the Dependencies, as effective control as circumstances permitted has been exercised; the number of vessels licensed to hunt whales has been restricted; measures have been taken for protecting female whales accompanied by calves and species shewing a diminution in number; and regulations have been enforced to prevent the waste of raw material. While it has always been recognized that these measures "although framed in the light of the best technical opinion lack a firm basis of definite scientific knowledge" it is satisfactory to note that in a recent report the laws and regulations in force in the Dependencies are recommended as a model for consideration in relation to the whaling industry in South Africa.

An Executive Committee, of which Mr. E. R. Darnley is Chairman and on which the Admiralty, the British Museum, the Ministry of Fisheries and the Royal Geographical Society are represented, has been appointed to control the proposed investigations subject to the instructions of the Secretary of State for the Colonies. Full advantage has been taken of the power, which has been given to the Committee, to co-opt either for special purposes or for a limited period such experts as are best qualified to advise on the matters under deliberation. The Committee has not been empowered to incur any expenditure on its own authority, and every payment has been made on the express authority of the Secretary of State. This procedure will be continued until capital expenditure has been completed, and subsequently the Committee will be required to work to estimates, to be approved by the Secretary of State. It has accordingly become necessary to take steps to place the Fund for Research and Development in the Dependencies on a permanent footing, and it is proposed that the procedure of the Imperial Government in the case of the Development and Road Improvement Fund should be followed and adapted to local circumstances. A bill has therefore been drafted for this purpose and will be submitted for your consideration.

The scope of the investigations has been described at length in the Report of the Interdepartmental Committee, and in the correspondence which preceded the appointment of that body special stress was laid on the economic objects of the proposed research expedition as constituting its primary mission. At the outset the work will be directed mainly to the collection of information as to the distribution and movement of whales, their life history and their food, and the knowledge so acquired will indicate the lines on which subsequent investigations should be pursued. Hydrographic Survey, on the scale originally contemplated, is not immediately practicable as the Admiralty is unable to second for this service officers who have been trained in Marine Surveying and as only one vessel is at present being employed. The "Discovery" will, however, be provided with the equipment necessary for surveying, and such opportunities as the programme of work permits will be taken advantage of in surveying coasts and harbours. The possibility of the vessel carrying a full sized commercial trawl is being considered, and it is hoped that a beginning may be made with the important work of examining the possibilities of establishing a fishing industry in these waters where workable accumulations of marketable fish are reputed to exist.

An important part of the investigations will be carried out on shore and for this purpose a Marine Station will be established in South Georgia at Cumberland Bay with a staff composed of three Zoologists and a Hydrologist. The design for the building for the Marine Station is the outcome of the deliberations of a special committee, of which two members have had experience of antarctic weather conditions, and the plans, which are now submitted to you, show that the method of construction is a great improvement on any work which has previously been undertaken in the Dependencies.

After prolonged and careful consideration, Dr. Stanley W. Kemp, D.Sc., Superintendent of the Zoological Survey of India, has been appointed Director of Research and five Zoologists and two Hydrologists have been appointed to the Scientific Staff. Lieutenant J. R. Stenhouse, D.S.O., O.B.E., D.S.C., who has had practical experience of Antarctic navigation in peculiar difficulties, has been appointed Master of the "Discovery."

The reconditioning of the "Discovery," which was acquired in the early part of last year for the purposes of the investigations, is being pressed on. Owing to the quantity of wood-work affected by dry rot, the necessary repairs have proved far more extensive than could be ascertained until the ship had been opened up, and difficulty has been experienced in obtaining suitable timber of the high quality which alone can be used. A contract was made with Messrs. Vosper & Co. of Portsmouth for reconditioning the vessel at a cost of £33,758 and for the supply of spare gear to an amount of £4,529. In drawing up the specifications the Naval Architects provided a schedule of rates for work which it was anticipated would be executed but which could not be included in the contract. As the vessel has been opened out in the course of the work of reconditioning it has become apparent that further additional work is necessary and some of this does not come within the rates of the schedule to the contract, the work being of a more expensive character and in addition to that upon which the tender was based. It was estimated, in March last, that an expenditure of £7,243 would be incurred under the schedule to the contract and that a further sum of £7,316 would be required for work which does not come within either the contract or the schedule to it, bringing the total estimated expenditure on the reconditioning of the vessel to £52,846. Under the contract the work of reconditioning the "Discovery" should have been completed in January last but owing to the extent of the work which has had to be undertaken the vessel will not be ready to put to sea until towards the end of this year.

The question of the construction at Stanley of a slipway and workshops for the repair of whaleboats has been under consideration for a number of years and similar facilities for the "Discovery" and vessels employed in these islands are no less necessary. The Government is not prepared to undertake the management of such works but is anxious to assist in their establishment. With this object in view negotiations are proceeding with the Falkland Islands Company for the construction of a slipway, capable of taking the "Discovery," and suitable workshops, on the understanding that a site will be given free of rent and that a grant, upon which no interest will be payable, of one third of the capital cost, will be made from Dependencies' funds. It will be necessary to provide the slipway with hauling gear capable of dealing with approximately 1,400 tons and a fairly powerful generating plant will be required. As this will only be used in the day time I hope it may be found possible, if the project proceeds to completion, to supply power for lighting the streets and houses in Stanley.

Recent developments in Wireless Telegraphy have brought about a very great reduction in the initial cost of establishing communication by this means. After tests carried out over four years ago, it was estimated that the wireless equipment of a station in South Georgia which would give regular communication with Stanley would cost about £16,000 in England. The present cost of a six kilowatt valve transmitting plant, together with receiving gear and self supporting towers but exclusive of the station building, is approximately £5,500. This equipment is considered sufficiently powerful to give reliable communication both with Stanley and with Cerrito, which is distant 1,400 nautical miles, and the Secretary of State has approved of a contract being entered into with the Marconi Company for the installation of a station of this type at Cumberland Bay. The large increase in wireless traffic during the whaling season and especially with the South Shetlands calls for improvement in the station at Stanley, and proposals have been submitted to the Secretary of State for providing the station with the equipment necessary to enable the traffic to be dealt with more efficiently and expeditiously than has been possible hitherto. With a view to facilitating communication with England arrangements have been made with the Western Telegraph Company for a deferred telegram service at an inclusive charge of 2/6 $\frac{1}{2}$ a word and with the Marconi International Marine Communication Company for a postal radiotelegraphic service at specially low rates.

The establishment of direct communication between Stanley and the Dependencies is of primary importance and you will be invited to approve of a contract being entered into with the Tonsberg Whaling Company for a steamship service between Stanley and South Georgia and the South Shetlands. The terms of the proposed agreement are fully explained in a minute which I have addressed to you on the subject. In the first instance the whole of the proposed subsidy will be a charge on the revenue of the Dependencies but the incidence of the charge will be reconsidered at a later date if the service should prove an appreciable economic advantage to the Colony.

You will realize that the representation of the Colony and its Dependencies is only a small item in the "vast rallying of the Empire's life and product" at Wembley but we may justly feel some pride in the share which we have taken, so far as our resources have permitted, in the making of the "greatest exhibition which the world has ever known" and in being associated with all which that "picture of our Commonwealth of Nations" symbolizes. The photographs, which have been received, give a general idea of the Court of the Falkland Islands and their Dependencies at the British Empire Exhibition, and show how successful Mr. W. A. Thompson, the Commissioner, has been in displaying the exhibits to the best advantage and in making the Court attractive. The excellent collection of exhibits, which was sent from the Colony, has proved of great interest. The horse gear has been particularly admired and I trust that those who are skilled in this work will not allow this very useful craft to become forgotten. Models of whaleboats and samples of the gear used in, and of the products of whaling have been kindly lent by Companies which are engaged in that industry. The Council of the Royal Geographical Society has been good enough to allow its model of the "Discovery," as originally built, to be shewn, and there is also a model of the vessel as she will be when her reconstruction is completed.

A remarkable feature of the Exhibition will be observed in the vivid models of the art, industry, and history of the Empire. Those, which find a place in the British Government Pavilion, were constructed in a special branch of the Department of Overseas Trade, and the spacious accommodation required for its work was provided at the War Office. This Department very generously undertook to construct for the Court of the Colony a model of Stanley Harbour shewing the positions of the British and German Squadrons on the morning of the 8th of December, 1914. Our thanks are due to Captain STANLEY WILTON, R.N., the Controller of the Department, not only for the arrangements which have permitted of the model being made under the supervision of his highly skilled staff, but also for the personal interest which he has taken in it. It is intended that, at the close of the Exhibition, this model should be sent to the Colony, and when it was being constructed special measures were taken to strengthen it in order to lessen the risk of damage in transit. There has also been built up in the Court, by a firm which specializes in such work, a model representing a scene in the South Shetlands which has proved a great attraction.

We are greatly indebted to Mr. Vere Packe and Mr. W. A. Harding for the valuable work which they have done as representatives of the Colony on the West Indian and Atlantic Group Committee of the Exhibition. Mr. Packe has been a member of this Committee since it was constituted in 1922, and on behalf of the Colony I have asked him to accept a seal skin rug, which forms part of the exhibit, as a memento of the Colony's participation, for the first time, in an exhibition in England.

A book entitled "A Naturalist at the Falkland Islands," by Mr. H. Vallentin and Miss V. F. Boyson, is about to be published by the Clarendon Press. Mr. Vallentin's notes on Natural History have been edited and expanded by Miss Boyson who has added to the volume a section on the history of the Colony. The Delegates of the Oxford University Press regard the book as a "valuable contribution to Colonial History," but owing to the smallness of the Colony they cannot anticipate sufficient sale to cover the cost of production. In these circumstances, and in anticipation of your approval, I have agreed to a grant in aid of £100, being made towards the publication of the work.

I conclude with a reference to a matter which, although the Government is not directly concerned, is of great interest to all of us. The Committee of the Falkland Islands Battle Memorial Fund has asked for permission to erect a monument, in grey granite and bronze, on Victory Green, and with the concurrence of the residents in Stanley, I propose to accede to the request of the Committee.

By arrangement with the Marconi International Marine Communication Co., Ltd., London, a new class of traffic known as Postal Radiotelegrams may now be accepted at this Office for transmission.

Postal Radiotelegrams will be accepted for all parts of the World and will be transmitted by wireless to vessels bound in the desired direction and posted to their destination from the required port of call.

The address of postal radiotelegrams must be drawn up as follows:—

1. Paid instruction "poste" followed by the name of the port where the radiotelegram is to be posted.
2. Full name and address of the addressee.
3. Name of the Ship Station which is to carry out the posting.

Particulars required under 1 and 3 will be filled in by the Wireless Station.

Telegraphic addresses are not permissible.

Jones, 14 Castle St., Edinburgh (full name and address of the addressee).

"Ruapehu" (name of the ship which is to carry out the posting).

The sender must sign, when handing in the telegram, a declaration giving a formal assurance that the text is entirely plain language and that it does not bear any meaning other than that which appears on the face of it.

The sender of a Deferred Telegram at reduced rate must insert before the address the supplementary instruction "L.C.O." meaning (Language of the Country of Origin), which instruction is counted in the number of words charged for as one word.

FORM.—The text of a Deferred Telegram must be written entirely in plain language and must not contain any figures, commercial marks, groups of letters, or of signs of punctuation or abbreviated expressions (*Article VII. of International Regulations*). Any telegram containing a succession of isolated letters, of numbers, of names or of words without connected meaning and generally any telegram which does not in the opinion of the telegraph service bear an intelligible meaning on the face of it, is not admitted to the benefit of the reduced rate. Numbers must be written in words.

Telegrams must be written in English ; the use of two or more languages in the same telegram is not allowed.

The wording of the address and the signature of these telegrams is governed by the rules in force for ordinary telegrams.

An Ordinance

To Provide for the Refund of a portion of the Duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale and Seal Oil, between the 1st of October, 1923, and the 30th of September, 1924, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Refund of Export Duty on Oil) Ordinance, 1924." Short title.

2. In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of whale and seal oil for the period from the 1st day of October, 1923 to the 30th day of September, 1924. Definition.

3. A refund of a part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid, in respect of whale and seal oil, between the first day of October, 1923 and the thirtieth day of September, 1924, shall be made in accordance with the following scale:- Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

If the average market price for the season of first grade oil,
 Exceeds £45 but does not exceed £50 per ton, 6d per barrel.
 " £40 " " " " £45 " " 1/- " "
 Does not exceed ... " " £40 " " 1/6 " "

4. In the event of any difference of opinion arising as to the average market price for the season, the decision of the Governor in Council shall be final. Governor in Council to decide.

An Ordinance

To amend the Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance, 1889.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance, 1924."

Consent of young person to be no defence.

2. It shall be no defence to a charge or indictment for an indecent assault on a child or young person under the age of sixteen to prove that he or she consented to the act of indecency.

Amendment to sections 5 and 6 of Ordinance 3 of 1889 as to defence of reasonable belief.

3. Reasonable cause to believe that a girl was of or above the age of sixteen years shall not be a defence to a charge under Section five or six of the Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance, 1889, (in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.) The limit of time mentioned in the second proviso to Section five of the Principal Ordinance shall be nine months after the commission of the offence.

Repeal.

4. The first and second provisos to Section five and the proviso to Section six of the Principal Ordinance are hereby repealed.

I have the honour to submit herewith the Financial Returns and Statements called for under Colonial Regulation 396, in respect of the year of account ended 31st December, 1923.

The Falkland Islands.

2. The ordinary Revenue for the Falkland Islands, exclusive of the Dependencies share of the cost of Central Administration, amounted to £30,115 : 12 : 2. The ordinary Expenditure for the Falkland Islands (excluding "Extraordinary") amounted to £32,553 : 16 : 6.

3. During the year a sum of £5,000 was transferred from Dependencies Funds to Falklands Revenue under Head IX., "Contribution from Dependencies to cost of Administration."

4. The ordinary Revenue for the Falkland Islands, inclusive of the above-mentioned sum of £5,000, amounted to £35,115 : 12 : 2, as against the Ordinary Expenditure of £32,553 : 16 : 6, leaving a surplus of Revenue over Expenditure of £2,558 : 15 : 8.

5. The total Revenue for the Falklands for the year, including Land Sales (£12,573 : 14 : 4) and Marine Insurance Fund (£106) amounted to £47,795 : 6 : 6. The total Expenditure for the Falklands for the year, including "Extraordinary" payments (£10,313 : 18 : 2) and Land Sales (£4,500) amounted to £47,367 : 14 : 8.

7. The total Expenditure for the Falkland Islands, excluding the above-mentioned sum of £7,676 : 16 : 3, amounted to £35,190 : 18 : 5, as against a total ordinary Revenue of £35,115 : 12 : 2, leaving an excess of Expenditure over Revenue of £75 : 6 : 3.

8. Land Sales Fund. During the year a sum of £4,500 was authorized to be expended from this Fund on the purchase of House and Land property.

Falkland Islands Revenue.

9. The total ordinary Revenue for the Falkland Islands for the year excluding Dependencies contribution (£5000) amounted to £30,115 : 12 : 2. It was £579 : 17 : 8 more than that collected in 1922, and was under the original Estimate for 1923 by a sum of £2,462 : 7 : 10.

10. The following Heads of Revenue failed to realize the amounts originally estimated for 1923 by a sum of £2,509 : 16 : 4, viz. :—

11. Head I.—Custom Duties. Import Duties on Wine, Malt and Spirits failed to realize the original Estimate by a total sum of £349 : 8 : 11. On the other hand Import Duty on Tobacco exceeded the original Estimate by a sum of £318 : 6 : 5, leaving a net total decrease under Head I. of £31 : 2 : 6.

12. Head IV.—Fees, Fines, &c. Decrease under this Head is partly accounted for by the falling off of receipts under Item 1, Supreme Court (Probate Duties). Item 12, "Hospital Fees" and Item 15, "Sale of Medicines" would appear to have been over-estimated. Decrease under Item 9, "Launch Fees" is accounted for by the fact that certain fees payable in 1923 were not collected and paid in until 1924.

13. Head V.—Interest. During the year there was less surplus cash available for short Investment. Decrease under Item 3, "Bank Deposit, &c." is thus accounted for.

14. Head VI.—Post Office. Item 1, "Sale of Stamps" was under the original Estimate by a sum of £441 : 0 : 6. Decrease under this Item was mainly due to the new issue of Postage Stamps failing to realize anticipated sales. On the other hand other Items under this head, notably Item 6, "Wireless Messages," exceeded the original Estimate.

15. Head VIII.—Miscellaneous. The decrease of £992 : 18 : 10 under this Head is partly due to the fact that there were no receipts during the year under Item 7, "Sale of Sealskins" which was originally estimated at £1,600.

Falkland Islands Expenditure.

16. The total ordinary Expenditure for the Falkland Islands for the year amounted to £32,553 : 16 : 6. It was under that expended in 1922 by £4,606 : 4 : 7, and was under the original Estimate for 1923, by a sum of £5,036 : 3 : 6.

17. The total Expenditure for the Falkland Islands for the year amounted to £47,367 : 14 : 8. It was under the Expenditure for 1922 by a sum of £4,365 : 7 : 1, but exceeded the amount originally estimated for 1923, by a sum of £5,977 : 14 : 8.

20. Head 1.—Pensions. Increase due to Pensions payable in 1922 not having been paid until 1923.

21. Head IX.—Medical. Increase under "Assistant Colonial Surgeon" caused by leave salary of late Assistant Colonial Surgeon overlapping that of present holder. Increase under "Nurses" is similarly explained. Item 4, amount originally estimated insufficient to cover cost of maintenance of criminal lunatic in the United Kingdom. Item 8, original Estimate insufficient to cover cost of furniture needed for the Hospital. Item 9, original Estimate insufficient to cover cost of dental drugs and appliances. Item 10, Increase caused by purchase of necessary spares for X-Ray apparatus.

22. Head XII.—Scientific Department. Salary of Forest Officer for December, 1922, not paid until 1923. Payments amounting to £53 : 5 : 0 under "Geologist" not provided for in original Estimate. Savings effected under other Items reduce the net total increase under this Head to £4 : 7 : 10.

23. Head XIII.—Military. Allowance to Adjutant (£48 : 13 : 1) not provided for. Savings effected under other Items reduce the net total increase under this Head to £10 : 19 : 1.

24. Increase under Head XVIII., Public Works Extraordinary, is explained by the special Expenditure set out in para. 6.

The Falkland Islands Marine Insurance Fund.

25. During the year a sum of £106 was charged against Head VI., Port and Marine and credited to the Marine Insurance Fund. At the close of the year the Fund amounted to £212.

The Falkland Islands Land Sales Fund.

26. On the 1st of January, 1923, the Land Sales Fund amounted to £174,379 : 2 : 10. During the year a sum of £4,945 : 15 : 2 was received for Land purchased and a further sum of £7,627 : 19 : 2 as instalments of Land purchases, the total of £12,573 : 14 : 4 being credited to the Fund. During the year a sum of £4,500 was paid from the Fund (*vide* para. 8) leaving a balance standing to the credit of the Fund at the close of the year amounting to £182,452 : 17 : 2. The Securities held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Land Sales Fund on the 31st December, 1923, amounted to £186,548 : 7 : 9. The Fund was therefore over-invested on that date by a sum of £4,095 : 10 : 7. Action has been taken to effect adjustment.

Falkland Islands Surplus and Deficit Account.

27. On the 1st January, the Surplus ordinary Revenue that had accumulated to the credit of the Falkland Islands in the general account of the Colony amounted to £45,522 : 3 : 2, which added to the total ordinary Revenue for the year (£35,115 : 12 : 2) makes a total of £80,637 : 15 : 4. This amount less the total Expenditure for the same period (£42,867 : 14 : 8) leaves a surplus balance of ordinary Revenue to the credit of the Falkland Islands at the close of the year of £37,770 : 0 : 8.

28. On the 1st January, the total surplus Assets standing to the credit of the Falkland Islands, as calculated in accordance with the provisions of Colonial Regulation 344, amounted to £220,007 : 6 : 0, which added to the total Falklands Revenue for the year (£47,795 : 6 : 6), makes a total of £267,802 : 12 : 6. This amount less the total Falklands Expenditure for the same period (£47,367 : 14 : 8) leaves surplus Assets to the credit of Falkland Islands on the 31st December, 1923, amounting to £220,434 : 17 : 10, and made up as follows :—

Dependencies.

29. The ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies for the year exclusive of "Research Fund" amounted to £160,220 : 17 : 0, as against a total Expenditure for the same period amounting to £7,435 : 19 : 1, leaving a surplus Revenue over Expenditure of £152,784 : 17 : 11.

30. During the year a total sum of £230,068 : 2 : 3 was transferred to the credit of the Research Fund and entered in the accounts as a charge on the Dependencies Revenue.

Dependencies Revenue.

31. The ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies for the year amounted to £160,220 : 17 : 0. It was £18,118 : 17 : 4 more than that collected in 1922, and it exceeded the original Estimate for 1923, by a sum of £60,750 : 17 : 0.

Head VI.—Post Office. Stamp Stock at South Georgia is kept under a standing Advance account. As sales take place fresh supplies are periodically requisitioned from Headquarters and payment for same is credited to this Head under Dependencies Revenue. The decrease under this Head is explained by the fact that at the beginning of the year the stock of stamps in hand at South Georgia was sufficient to last for some months and in consequence the value of stamps requisitioned during the year was comparatively small.

34. Head I.—Custom Duties (b) Exports was under-estimated, allowance having been made in the original Estimate for refund of whale oil duties. Increase under VIII., Miscellaneous (Remittance Charges) is similarly explained.

Dependencies Expenditure.

35. The total Expenditure for the Dependencies for the year, excluding "Charges on Dependencies Revenue" and Disbursements made from the Research Fund amounted to £7,435 : 19 : 1. It was under that expended in 1922 by £5,503 : 0 : 10, and was under the original Estimate for 1923 by a sum of £2,783 : 0 : 11.

42. During the year a total sum of £230,068 : 2 : 3, "Charges on Dependencies' Revenue" was transferred to the credit of the Research Fund. In addition a sum of £4,394 : 3 : 1, representing Dividends on Investments, &c., was collected by the Crown Agents and credited direct to the Fund, making a total sum transferred amounting to £234,462 : 5 : 4, *vide* para. 39.

The Currency Note Fund.

47. On the 1st January the face value of the Currency Notes in circulation amounted to £20,000. During the year Currency Notes to the value of £2,000 were withdrawn from circulation and not replaced. At the close of the year the Face value of the Currency Notes in circulation amounted to £18,000. The Investment portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, in the hands of the Crown Agents, was reduced to £10,800, and was fully invested. The Coin portion of the same fund, held by the Commissioners in the Colony, was reduced to £7,200. At the close of the year the position of the Note Guarantee Fund was as follows:—

The Accounts for the year 1923 could not be closed until the South Georgia Accounts for the month of December were received. Owing to irregular and infrequent communication with that Dependency there was unavoidable delay in transmission of the accounts in question.

Ordinance No. of 1924.

A Bill

To provide for the establishment and administration of a Research and Development Fund for the Dependencies.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the “Dependencies Research and Development Fund Ordinance, 1924.”

Short title.

2. A Dependencies Research and Development Fund (hereinafter referred to as the Fund) shall be established for the following purposes :

Establishment and purposes of the Fund.

- (a) research in connection with the whaling industry and any purposes incidental thereto ;
- (b) the development of the resources of the Dependencies and research in connection therewith and any purposes incidental thereto ; and
- (c) such other purposes as the Governor may with the consent of the Legislative Council and the sanction of the Secretary of State from time to time direct.

3. The Treasurer shall pay into the Fund—

Sources of the Fund.

- (a) the amount standing in the Treasurer's accounts at the commencement of this Ordinance to the credit of the Dependencies Research Fund ;
- (b) the amount standing in the Treasurer's accounts on 1st January, 1924, to the credit of Dependencies General Account ;
- (c) the excess of the revenue over the expenditure of the Dependencies at the end of each financial year ;
- (d) any sums received by way of interest on investments held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Fund ;
- (e) such other sums (if any) as the Governor may with the approval of the Legislative Council direct.

Payments out of the
Fund and accounts.

4. Payments out of the Fund shall be made in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct, and an account of all receipts and payments in connection with the Fund shall be laid before the Legislative Council as soon as possible after the end of each financial year.

Ordinance No. of 1924.

A Bill

To provide for the Refund of a portion of the Duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale Oil and Seal Oil, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924."

Definition.

2. In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of whale oil and seal oil for the period from the 1st of October in any year to the 30th of September next following.

Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

3. A refund of the part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil, shall be made in accordance with the following scale:—

If the average market price of first grade oil for the season in which the oil was exported,

Sir,

In his Circular despatch of the 17th of June, 1911, the late Viscount Harcourt discountenanced attempts on the part of Colonial officials to seek the influence of Members of Parliament and others in this country as a means of bringing their services to the notice of the Secretary of State with a view to consideration for promotion.

2. Lord Harcourt pointed out that arrangements were in existence in the Colonial Office which ensured due consideration of the claims of all suitable officers on the occurrence of vacancies ; and observed that the attempts which had been made to obtain promotion by irregular means had not been of advantage to the officers concerned.

3. From recent correspondence which has reached me I have formed the opinion either that the warning issued by Lord Harcourt's directions is not now generally known, or that the grave view of the practice taken by the Secretary of State is insufficiently realized. I have to request, therefore, that steps may be taken, by the publication of this despatch in the Gazette and by any other means available, to warn public officers that a proceeding such as that which has been deprecated will serve no useful purpose and, on the other hand, may actually be detrimental to the interests of those concerned.

Sir,

As suggested by you I rode over the Common yesterday in company with the Chief Constable, in order to determine whether I could submit any suggestions that might be of assistance in connection with the Stanley milk supply.

At present the area is divided into two paddocks by a fence running from behind Government House to the easterly corner of Mullet Creek Farm, but this does not prevent the dry stock from crowding on to and eating out the camp immediately behind Stanley, which should, in my opinion, be completely reserved for cows that are actually being milked and those within say fourteen days from calving.

I am of opinion that substantial benefit would be derived by sub-dividing the area into four paddocks in a manner that would enable sufficient of the Stanley frontage to be reserved for the class of cattle referred to in the preceding paragraph.

This would also enable the best use to be made of the outlying portions of the area for grazing dry stock.

I suggest that no dry cattle, other than those close to calving, should be allowed on the front sub-divisions, and that persons desiring to graze horses on them should pay double the ordinary fee. The extra feed that should be available for horses under the altered conditions would justify this.

I suggest that the public should not be permitted to graze steers on any portion of the reserve, and that they should be strongly discouraged from grazing more or less useless animals of any kind.

In event of the grass getting ahead of requirements on the front sub-divisions at any time dry cattle could be turned in to clean it up, and it should be good policy therefore to make these sub-divisions sufficiently large to provide for all possible requirements.

I recommend that a certain percentage of the revenue, say Twenty-five Pounds, should be expended annually on improving the pastures of the front sub-divisions by surface sowing with suitable grasses, and that all areas so treated should be indicated on a plan of the block for future reference.

It would be very beneficial to have an area of good pasture where milking cows could be turned out to put on condition during the period of resting, and for this purpose I suggest that a sufficient area of the best pasture on the peninsular which is at present occupied by Mr. J. McGill should be set aside for this purpose. Providing the pasture on this area was not overstocked the Government would be justified in charging nine pence (9d.) per head per week for cattle grazing on it, notwithstanding that they might be licensed for grazing on the Common.

I would have liked to have gone into this matter more carefully and to have prepared a plan showing the proposed sub-divisions and submitted more definite recommendations, but unfortunately the time at my disposal will not permit this.

I have, however, discussed the matter at length with the Chief Constable who, I understand, is in charge of the reserve.

LIVE STOCK REPORT, 1923-1924.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit herewith the Annual Report for the year 1923-1924 :—

A number of Stock Returns having been late in coming to hand, my own report has in consequence been considerably delayed.

Having only arrived in the Colony on 5th April, 1924, I regret that I am not in a position to report more fully upon the stock industry for the past season. My report is, therefore, considerably curtailed.

Mr. Munro, whose valuable services have been kindly lent by the New Zealand Government, is making close investigations into the stock industry of the Colony, and his report as the result of his investigations is being looked forward to with great interest by all connected with the industry.

Sheep.

There has been a considerable decrease in the number of sheep carried for the past season as compared with the number of sheep carried in the three previous seasons. This fact is naturally causing a good deal of anxiety to the farmers and those interested in the sheep industry of the Colony. The Hogget returns, especially, show 114,920 as against 134,461 for the previous season, making a drop of 19,541. It is to be hoped, however, that this unfortunate decrease will be a temporary one only.

The winter has been rather a severe one, and on some stations sheep have suffered considerably. Bad weather interfered a good deal with the clipping operations on some places, and a good number of weakly hoggets died from the effects of the cold weather following the dipping.

Cattle.

As with sheep, there is a decrease in numbers as compared with the previous year's returns. The cattle generally are of poor quality and could, without doubt, be improved a great deal. On one or two stations only are efforts being made to introduce bulls of better quality and thereby produce a better class of cattle.

Horses.

According to the returns for the past season the numbers of horses have increased, but even so there is still a great demand in the Colony for horses of a good type. Quite a number of horses suffering from colic have been reported and dealt with. This complaint, although a fairly common and sometimes serious one, is not often attended by serious results if proper and immediate attention is given to the animal affected.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 4 and the title were agreed to without amendment.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

Minute from the Governor to the Legislative Council (No. 3 of 1924.)

(Adopted at a Meeting of the Legislative Council held on the 23rd July, 1924).

DIRECT MAIL AND TRADE COMMUNICATION WITH THE DEPENDENCIES.

The Governor has the honour to inform the Council that, as a result of protracted negotiations, the opportunity has arisen for the institution of direct mail and trade communication with the Dependencies. It is proposed, with the approval of the Council, to enter into an agreement with the Tonsberg Whaling Company for a service of five voyages to South Georgia and one to the South Shetlands during each whaling season. A copy of the draft of the agreement is attached. It is not yet possible to give full information regarding the vessel to be employed, but the contracting company proposed in April last to secure a vessel of 330 tons gross, fitted with wireless, with a speed of ten knots and accommodation for 8 passengers.

It will be observed that the contract is to be for a period of two years only in the first place. Whether it will be renewed at the conclusion of that time will depend to some extent on whether the people of the Colony are prepared to take full advantage of the opportunity for extending their trade by selling meat and provisions, - more particularly fresh vegetables - at reasonable rates, to the whaling communities in the Dependencies. It may very easily be understood that high charges, whether for freights or for the selling price of goods at the port of shipment, effectually kill any trade.

The Governor has now the honour to invite the Council to approve of the grant of a subsidy not exceeding £1,800 in any one year, towards the maintenance of direct steam service with the Dependencies. The service being mainly for the benefit of the Dependencies, the charge will be borne by monies derived from sources of revenue in the Dependencies.

2. During the year there were 878 deposits received as against 394 withdrawals. The average monthly deposits received amounted to £2,096 : 3 : 8½d. as against an average monthly withdrawal of £2,401 : 16 : 4½d.

3. During the year 69 new accounts were opened, and 56 accounts were closed, leaving 834 deposit accounts at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor equalled a sum of £143 : 19 : 7½d. or about £50 per head of the population. A monthly summary of the transactions of the bank is appended hereto.

4. The accrued interest which had been credited to the various accounts during the year amounted to £2,783 : 14 : 10. The withdrawals from the bank (£28,821 : 16 : 9) exceeded the deposits (£27,937 : 19 : 5) by a sum of £883 : 17 : 4, leaving a balance on the 30th of September, 1924, to the credit of the depositors of £120,080 : 14 : 0.

An Ordinance

To provide for the establishment and administration of a Research and Development Fund for the Dependencies.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Dependencies Research and Development Fund Ordinance, 1924." Short title.
2. A Dependencies Research and Development Fund (hereinafter referred to as the Fund) shall be established for the following purposes : Establishment and purposes of the Fund.
 - (a) research in connection with the whaling industry and any purposes incidental thereto ;
 - (b) the development of the resources of the Dependencies and research in connection therewith and any purposes incidental thereto ; and
 - (c) such other purposes as the Governor may with the consent of the Legislative Council and the sanction of the Secretary of State from time to time direct.
3. The Treasurer shall pay into the Fund— Sources of the Fund.
 - (a) the amount standing in the Treasurer's accounts at the commencement of this Ordinance to the credit of the Dependencies Research Fund ;
 - (b) the amount standing in the Treasurer's accounts on 1st January, 1924, to the credit of Dependencies General Account ;
 - (c) the excess of the revenue over the expenditure of the Dependencies at the end of each financial year ;

- (d) any sums received by way of interest on investments held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Fund ;
- (e) such other sums (if any) as the Governor may with the approval of the Legislative Council direct.

Payments out of the Fund and accounts.

4. Payments out of the Fund shall be made in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct, and an account of all receipts and payments in connection with the Fund shall be laid before the Legislative Council as soon as possible after the end of each financial year.

To provide for the Refund of a portion of the Duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale Oil and Seal Oil, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, if the market price of the Oil per ton does not exceed £50.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924." Short title.

2. In this Ordinance the term "average market price for the season" means the average market price per ton of whale oil and seal oil for the period from the 1st of October in any year to the 30th of September next following. Definition.

3. A refund of part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil, shall be made in accordance with the following scale :— Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

Report on Education in the Colony for the Years 1923 and 1924.

General.

It has long been recognized that the facilities for the education of the children in the Falkland Islands has been deficient in two main respects. There has been no form of secondary education available, and it has not in the past been found possible to provide teaching for the children of settlers in the outlying districts of the Colony, beyond a few weeks' tuition in the three Rs. from travelling teachers. There are two elementary schools in Stanley—a Government school supported from public funds and a convent school managed by the Roman Catholic Sisters. The latter is not subject to Government control and receives no subsidy. In the outside districts a small school is, and has for many years been, maintained by the Falkland Islands Company, with a resident master. In all other parts of the Colony the only education obtainable is from the uncertificated teachers referred to above. A scheme prepared by the Government Schoolmaster, Mr. A. R. Hoare, for improving the position, received the approval of the Secretary of State in 1923, and was brought into force on the 1st of January, 1924. The main features of the scheme are as follows:—

Secondary Education.

(a) The Education Ordinance provides that all children in Stanley between the ages of 6 and 14 shall attend an elementary school or receive an equivalent education. A continuation class has now been established providing for a two years' course of further education. The children, other than those who are granted scholarships, are required to pay £1 a month for their tuition in this class.

Education of Camp children.

(b) Government assistance is now provided towards the cost of education of children whose parents are willing to send them in to Stanley to be educated in the following forms:—

- (1) The children are boarded and lodged in a Government Hostel and taught in the School at an inclusive charge of £1 per month during residence, or
- (2) If boarded in private houses the Government contributes two thirds of the cost not exceeding £2 a month.

2. The number of children in the Continuation Class was 14 at the opening of the School year. The Government Schoolmaster believes that this was the full number of children in Stanley eligible for the class. There were 13 children in the Hostel during part of the year, the full accommodation being 16. There were in addition six outside boarders from the country districts. The Government Schoolmaster made a tour of the Colony during the latter part of 1923 in order to explain to the shepherds the advantages of giving their children the best education obtainable in the Colony. At the end of 1924 it was apparent that the numbers in the Hostel would decrease but that more parents would take advantage of the boarding out system. Observers from the outside stations were much impressed by the progress made by the camp children particularly those in the Hostel. Marked mental and physical alertness resulted from a few months training under good conditions.

Government School.

3. The authorised establishment of the Government School is now four teachers with Board of Education Certificates, viz: a Headmaster, an Assistant Master and two Assistant Mistresses, with two Assistant Teachers and two pupil teachers. One Assistant Mistress was added to the staff at the beginning of 1924 in view of the extension of the work in the School.

4. The number of children on the roll, in average attendance and examined are shewn in the following table :—

Apart from the effect of the new scheme, there is no doubt that progress in recent years has convinced parents of the soundness of the education provided at the school under the present régime, and this is reflected in the returns.

5. Throughout 1923 the school had its full complement of teachers for the first time since 1920. There is no doubt that the beneficial effects were felt. During 1924 the services of the Assistant Master were terminated and later in the year an Assistant Mistress had to resign owing to ill-health and an Assistant Teacher resigned on marriage. An epidemic of whooping cough during the third quarter of the year also interfered seriously with the progress of the school work. The examination results at the end of the year 1924, though not good, were much better than may have been expected and the discipline of the school, although the classes were abnormally large, was excellent.

6. As is commonly to be expected in an elementary school, composition is poorly learnt, as children have much difficulty in expressing themselves. Memorizing prose passages from good authors with explanations of the virtue of lucid and forcible writing would perhaps be of value in this connection. It would also be of advantage if history and geography were taken, as far as possible, as concurrent subjects. The mere learning by rote of historical facts and the names of places and rivers approximates as closely to waste of time as any form of education can do. The teaching of arithmetic, sewing, drawing and singing, appears to be of an excellent quality, and the results are highly creditable to the staff. A woodwork centre was established in 1923, and training given in it should be of great value. Homework would with advantage be confined to learning by heart. It would not, of course, be necessary to test every child every day in the set task.

7. The expenditure on the school and the revenue received in 1923 and 1924, respectively, were as follows :—

The additional expenditure in 1924 was due to the introduction of the new scheme. The net excess was some £338 only, but had the staff been maintained at its full numbers the difference would have been considerably greater.

Travelling Teachers.

8. There were two travelling teachers only employed throughout the two years under reference. It was hoped that the attractions of the new scheme would bring the majority of the 'camp' children into Stanley and that it might be unnecessary to continue the unsatisfactory system of employing travelling teachers, beyond one for the East and one for the West Falklands who would be able to reach such children as could not for one reason or another leave their homes. This has in practice been admittedly impossible of realization, and the Government Schoolmaster is now training additional pupil teachers with a view to their ultimate engagement in 'camp' work. It would be unfair to the travelling teachers and to the devisers of the system were an impression to be given of the experiment having failed through any fault on their part. The teachers were sent out without training and in some cases with little education themselves; they have had to live rough lives and undergo no little hardship at times in the performance of their work. They have given to a comparatively large proportion of the present farm population all the education these have; the services of a number of them have been warmly appreciated, and are often spoken of by the shepherds. Some of the travelling teachers have exchanged into the permanent service and have filled positions of responsibility with credit. The inherent errors in the system lay in the facts that education to be of real value must be by unceasing pressure and that it is no more fit to be taught by unqualified persons than any other science. The number of children taught in the camp during 1924 was 48, as against 55 in 1923 and 93 in 1922.

He is careful to keep the curriculum within comparatively narrow limits rather than aim at too wide a programme. Elementary Latin is taught in this school. During 1924 a small school was established at an outside station where the children of the resident families could be taught together, with manifest benefit. Mr. Moir has put forward a suggestion which merits careful consideration, that education should be made compulsory in districts outside Stanley where a school has been established.

The Annual Medical and Sanitary Report on the Falkland Islands for the Year 1924.

(A) FALKLAND ISLANDS.

I. ADMINISTRATIVE.

Staff.

- A. QUALIFIED MEDICAL STAFF.—The Colonial Surgeon, the Assistant Colonial Surgeon and the Dental Surgeon.
- B. NURSING STAFF, ENGLISH TRAINED.—One Nurse-Matron and one Nursing Sister.
- C. UNDERGOING TRAINING.—Two Nurse Probationers and one Dental Mechanic Apprentice.
- D. SUBORDINATE MEDICAL AND SANITARY STAFF.—One Inspector of Nuisances.
- E. CLERICAL STAFF.—None.

The qualified staff consists of :—

- (1) The Colonial Surgeon, who is also Port Health Officer, Medical Officer of Health, Prison Surgeon and Surgeon in charge of the King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital, Stanley.
- (2) The Assistant Colonial Surgeon is a temporary officer under a three years' contract. He attends at the out-patients' department of the King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital and on certain Sheep Stations on the East Falkland Island.
- (3) The Colonial Dental Surgeon—a temporary officer under a three years' contract.

All patients admitted into the General Wards are under the sole charge of the Colonial Surgeon.

There is no Lunatic Asylum and no provision for paupers, other than three rooms in the Hospital Annexe.

II. Public Health.

The general health of officials was good ; none were invalided, none died.

GENERAL DISEASES. Rare as usual.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES. Insect borne—none.

INFECTIOUS AND EPIDEMIC DISEASES. Whooping Cough and Mumps.

In three of the cases where the appendix was removed the appendix was found completely infested with *Oxyuris Vermicularis*. The suggestion of the Colonial Advisory Medical and Sanitary Committee as regards castor oil and chloroform treatment for the above disease is now being tried, but it is at present too early to express a decided opinion. I am of the opinion that the difficulty experienced in treating these cases is largely due to the appendix being diseased on account of the population being heavy meat-eaters.

III. Sanitation.

The Colonial Surgeon and the Inspector of Nuisances inspect the condition of the town regularly. A start has been made to improve the sanitary conditions of the town by the installation of proper roads, drains, water-supply and the erection of an incinerator which will effectually deal with the enormous amount of refuse and excreta.

IV. Meteorological.

The climate of the Falkland Islands has been compared with that of the north of Scotland. The average level of the barometer in the Falkland Islands is rather low, being 29.6 inches at sea-level (corrected for gravity). On the whole, the readings are highest in late winter and spring (July to October) and lowest in summer (November to April). The comparatively low readings are due to the position of the Islands in the Southern Temperate Storm Belt.

TEMPERATURE. The mean annual temperature is about 43° F. January is the warmest month (49° F.) and July the coldest (37° F.) giving an annual range of 12° F.

HUMIDITY AND CLOUDINESS. The number of overcast days is considerable and the average cloudiness is seven-tenths of the sky covered. March and September have the clearest skies.

SUNSHINE. January and February are the sunniest months, averaging 5½ hours per day; June is the duller with an average of a little over 1½ hours per day. On a calm day the burning effects of the sun's rays upon the skin is worse than it is in tropical countries, but no cases of sunstroke have ever been recorded.

RAINFALL. The average fall is 26.43 inches per year. There are more rainy days in the Falkland Islands than in London.

WINDS. The prevailing wind direction is from the north-west; winds from the south-west and north are also frequent.

V. Hospital.

OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT. There were about 5,000 attendances in the out-patients' department of the King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital during the year, due in a large measure to the epidemic of whooping cough.

A further cause of the increased ill-health of the population was in all probability the exceptionally mild winter and a distressing shortage of water: what rain there was, was only sufficient to stir up the filth which accumulates in the bottom of the tanks, which could not be washed out owing to the above-mentioned shortage of water.

Dental Department.

The number of patients treated shows a great increase over the previous year.

The number of children under 14 years of age receiving free treatment was 130.

Government School.

The children were frequently examined, and found clean and well cared for, although very many were found to be suffering from tonsils and adenoids.

Shipping.

Sixty vessels were given pratique ; their total tonnage was 115,189 and crews 3,426. No quarantinable disease was reported.

VI. Prisons.

Four prisoners were admitted during the year ; they enjoyed good health. The prison was inspected regularly and was found to be in good order.

VII. Scientific.

The X-Ray installation at the King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital was brought into use for the first time in 1923, and was remarkably successful, when it is taken into consideration that inadequate arrangements existed for its use ; the dark room installed temporarily in the isolation ward facilitates the work. Unfortunately funds were not available in 1924 for fitting the room out properly, but this work is being done this year. It will then be possible to take many more skiagrams and more efficient records can be kept for future reference and for the more satisfactory observation of changes and improvement in cases undergoing treatment.

(B) DEPENDENCIES.

The total population of South Georgia was 1,477 in 1924 and it is estimated that about 1,500 persons were employed at the South Shetlands and 90 men on the floating factory "Orwell" at South Orkney, during the whaling season. There is no British Medical Officer at South Georgia ; the whaling companies operating there provide a medical man for their own crews. Two medical men, not British, accompany the whaling fleet to the South Shetlands : these medical men were employed by the whaling companies.

As no medical reports are received from the Dependencies of the Falkland Islands, no definite information as to the health of the population, floating or permanent, is available.

So far as can be ascertained, serious accidents are rare in all the Dependencies. No cases of infectious diseases were notified from any of the Dependencies during the year 1924.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

The majority of the operations for appendectomy were cases of fulminating appendicitis, which had been diagnosed in the camp and were brought into the hospital by H.M.C.S. "Afterglow," as land transport is impossible in this country.

When the improvements in the sanitary conditions have been carried out, it is practically certain that many of the minor ailments from which the inhabitants suffer will be entirely eliminated.

Ordinance No. of 1925.

A Bill

To regulate the holding of land by
Aliens and Companies under Alien control.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Falkland Islands,
with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as
follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the “Aliens (Landholding
Regulation) Ordinance, 1925.”

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—

The expression “alien” means a person who is not a British subject, and includes a company registered in the Colony or in any other part of His Majesty’s dominions, if it is under alien control, and also every corporation incorporated in a foreign country, but shall not include any of the subjects or citizens of a foreign state upon whom there has been conferred by Treaty the right to hold land within the Colony;

The expression “land” includes tenements and hereditaments, both corporeal and incorporeal and every interest therein, but does not include money charged on land;

The expression “company” includes partnership or any association of persons joined together for the purposes of trade or mutual profit;

The expression “mortgage” includes every instrument creating a mortgage or charge on land;

The expression “unlicensed alien” means an alien who does not hold a licence granted under this Ordinance.

Forfeiture of land and
mortgages held by
unlicensed aliens.

3. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance neither land in the Colony nor a mortgage on land in the Colony shall, after the commencement of this Ordinance, be held by an unlicensed alien, and any land or mortgage so held shall be forfeited to the Crown.

(2) Provided that—

- (a) Land may be acquired and held by an unlicensed alien on an annual tenancy or for any less interest, for the purposes of his residence, trade or business but an unlicensed alien shall not hold more than five acres of land in all.
- (b) Land acquired by an unlicensed alien under a will or on an intestacy shall not be forfeited if, within one year from the death of the testator or intestate, or within such extended time (if any) as the Governor may decide to be reasonable, the land is sold or the alien obtains a licence to hold the land.
- (c) A mortgage acquired by an unlicensed alien under a will or on an intestacy shall not be forfeited; but the alien shall not, unless he obtains a licence to hold the mortgage, be entitled to foreclose or enter into possession of the mortgaged land.
- (d) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the interest of a judgment creditor in the land of his judgment debtor, but the debtor's land shall not be acquired by an unlicensed alien.
- (e) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the estate or interest of an alien in any land or mortgage held by him at the commencement of this Ordinance.

4. (1) The Governor may, if he thinks fit, from time to time grant to any alien a licence to hold land as owner or tenant or mortgagee for any estate or interest either subject to any conditions or not;

Licences for aliens to hold land or mortgages.

Provided that a licence shall be operative only as to the land described and as to the estate or interest specified therein, and shall be of no force or effect until registered in the office of the Registrar-General.

(2) On breach of any condition in a licence to hold land as owner or tenant or mortgagee, the estate and interest of the alien in the land or mortgage held under the authority thereof and also the estate and interest of the said alien in any other land in the Colony or mortgage thereon shall be forfeited to the Crown.

5. (1) Land or a mortgage, forfeited under this Ordinance, shall not vest in the Crown unless and until a judgment is obtained declaring the forfeiture; but on such judgment being obtained the title of the Crown shall relate back to and commence at the time when the forfeiture took place.

Effect of Forfeiture.

(2) A judgment declaring a forfeiture of land shall operate to vest in the Crown all the estate and interest of the alien in the forfeited land.

(3) A judgment declaring a forfeiture of a mortgage shall operate to vest in the Crown all the estate and interest of the alien in the mortgaged land, subject to any right of redemption subsisting therein, and also to vest in the Crown the right to recover and receive and to enforce all securities for the mortgage money.

Company under alien control an alien.

6. A company, which is under alien control, shall for the purposes of this Ordinance, be deemed to be an alien.

Proof of alien control.

7. For the purposes of this Ordinance a company shall be deemed to be under alien control if shewn to be under alien control to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council and so declared by order:

Provided that no such order shall be issued unless due notice has been given to such company of the intention of taking its status into consideration for the purpose of this Ordinance, and it shall be competent for the said company to make representations to the Governor in Council in person or by attorney as may be allowed by the Governor.

Restrictions on trusts in favour of an alien.

8. (1) This section applies to the following property only, namely, land situate in the Colony or any interest, title or estate in such land.

(2) With a view to preventing evasion of the foregoing provisions of this Ordinance, no person, partnership or company shall, without the licence of the Governor, hold any property to which this section applies in trust for an alien, and any such property so held shall be forfeited to the Crown.

(3) In this section the expression "trust" includes any arrangement whether written or oral, express or implied, and whether legally enforceable or not, whereby any property or any interest therein or any rights attached thereto is or are held for the benefit of or to the order or at the disposal of an alien; but does not include :

- (a) The duties incident to a mortgage ;
- (b) The duties of a satisfied mortgagee to the mortgager, if within three months after satisfaction of the mortgage the mortgaged property is revested in the mortgager or his interest therein is extinguished ;
- (c) The duties of a vendor to the purchaser pending payment of the purchase money, or after payment of the purchase money, if within three months after such payment the property sold is vested in the purchaser or his interest therein is extinguished ;
- (d) The duties of a trustee in bankruptcy to the bankrupt or his creditors ; or
- (e) The duties of a trustee for the purposes of any composition or scheme of arrangement for the payment of debts to the debtor or his creditors.

(4) Nothing in this section shall apply to a trust subsisting at the commencement of this Ordinance.

Transmission of licence.

9. (1) The Colonial Secretary shall send a copy of every licence, issued to an alien, to such alien and to the Registrar-General.

(2) Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Registrar-General to record on the deeds registered or submitted for registration, in respect of land or any interest in land held by an alien, the licence by virtue of which such alien holds, under the provisions of this Ordinance, his interest in the said land.

Licences to be recorded
on deeds.

10. For the purpose of establishing a forfeiture under the Ordinance, the Colonial Secretary may apply to the Supreme Court for a declaration that any right, title or interest sought to be effected is forfeited to the Crown.

Procedure.

11. (1) Without prejudice to any other right to discovery, the Colonial Secretary may, in proceedings for establishing a forfeiture under this Ordinance, administer interrogatories to and obtain discovery of documents from a defendant, as to any matter or document tending to prove his alienage or the alienage of any other person, or to discover any land or mortgage share or debentures held by him or in trust for him, as to any matter relevant or document.

Discovery.

(2) It shall not be a valid ground for refusing to answer any such interrogatory, or to disclose or produce any document that the answer or document might or would expose the defendant or any other person to the risk of a prosecution under this Ordinance.

(3) Provided that in the prosecution of a defendant under this Ordinance the fact that he has disclosed any matter in answer to an interrogatory administered under this section and disclosed or produced any document in compliance with an order for discovery obtained under this section, shall not be admissible in evidence.

12. The fee of 10/- shall be payable by any licensed alien for the registration of his licence.

Free.

13. Section 11 of the Alien Ordinance, 1900, is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

14. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1926, and shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

The last payment to the Depreciation Fund was in the year 1922, when a sum of £200, was credited thereto, and the Secretary of State has been satisfied, in accordance with paragraph 9 (2) of the Order, that it is unnecessary to further increase the Depreciation Fund by the annual payments thereto of the said one per cent, and in consequence, since that date, the income derived from the securities has been applied as part of the Ordinary Revenue of the Colony, and credited to Revenue Head V., in the Estimates. On the other hand, all expenses of and incidental to the execution of the Order, are provided for under Expenditure Head XV., Sub-head "Currency Expenses."

16. No change took place during the year in the Depreciation Fund, which amounted to £1,200, and was fully invested.

I have the honour to submit the following report on the financial transactions of the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, for and in respect of the year ended 31st December, 1924 :—

2. The total Revenue of the Colony was £324,211 : 17 : 0, as against total disbursements amounting to £309,866 : 3 : 5, leaving a surplus on the year's transactions amounting to £14,345 : 13 : 7. The surplus on the year's transactions, when added to the total surplus standing to the credit of the Colony on the 1st January (£536,229 : 13 : 5), makes a total Surplus of Assets over Liabilities on the 31st December, 1924, of £550,575 : 7 : 0.

Falkland Islands.

3. The Ordinary Revenue for the Falkland Islands for the year (£51,391 : 5 : 11), exceeded the total Falkland Islands Expenditure (£42,766 : 13 : 1), by a sum of £8,624 : 12 : 10.

4. Included in Falkland Islands Ordinary Revenue is a sum of £13,472 : 17 : 8, transferred thereto from Dependencies funds, being £9,000 towards the cost of Central Administration, and £4,472 : 17 : 8, as Dependencies contribution towards Imperial War Funds, under Ordinance No. 3 of 1923.

5. The Ordinary Revenue for the Falkland Islands, exclusive of contributions credited thereto from Dependencies funds, amounted to £37,918 : 8 : 3, and exceeded the average for the preceding four years (1920—1923), by £6,606. It exceeded the original estimate by £6,529 : 8 : 3, and was £7,802 : 16 : 1 over that for 1923.

6. The undermentioned six Heads of Falkland Islands Revenue exceeded the original estimate by a sum of £7,562 : 19 : 1, *viz.* :—

Ordinance No. of 1925.

A Bill

To legalize certain payments made in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-four in excess of the Expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 6 of 1923.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make further provision for the service of the Colony for the year 1924..

Enacting Clause.

WHEREAS by Section 4 of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922, it is provided that "where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the legislature of any British possession or any territory under His Majesty's protection for the enforcement within such possession or territory of maintenance orders made by Courts in the Falkland Islands, the Governor may by Proclamation extend the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921 to maintenance orders made by Courts within such possessions or territory, and thereupon the said Ordinance shall apply to such maintenance orders as if they had been made in England or Ireland,"

AND WHEREAS the Governor is satisfied that the Legislature of the State of New South Wales has made reciprocal provisions for the enforcement within New South Wales of maintenance orders made by Courts in the Falkland Islands,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Governor by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:

The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, as amended by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922, shall extend to maintenance orders made by Courts within the State of New South Wales in like manner as it applies to maintenance orders made in England or Ireland.

His Excellency the Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following Order by His Majesty the King in Council, made under Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, to enable Government ships in the service of the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands to be registered under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts.

AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE,

The 4th day of May, 1925.

PRESENT,

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, power is given to His Majesty by Order in Council to make Regulations with respect to the manner in which Government ships may be registered as British ships for the purpose of the Merchant Shipping Acts :

AND WHEREAS by the said Section it is provided that those Acts shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications which may be made by Order in Council, either generally or as respects any special class of Government ships, apply to Government ships registered in accordance with such Regulations as if they were registered in manner provided by those Acts :

AND WHEREAS it is necessary on account of the urgency of the matters dealt with by this Order, that this Order should come into operation forthwith :

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations shall have effect as regards any Government ships in the service of the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands (hereinafter referred to as the Colonial Government):—

1. An application for registry of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government shall be made in writing under the hand of the Colonial Secretary of the Falkland Islands or other officer of the Colonial Government nominated by the Governor, or by one of the Crown Agents for the Colonies. Such application shall contain the following particulars:—

- (i) A statement of the name and description of the ship.
- (ii) A statement of the time when and place where the ship was built, or, if the ship was foreign built and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect and of her foreign name.
- (iii) A statement of the nature of the title to the said ship, whether by original construction by or for the Colonial Government, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise, and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the Colonial Government.
- (iv) A statement of the name of the Master.

2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government, shall:—

- (i) enter the ship in the Register Book as belonging to "His Majesty, represented by the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands" and shall also enter therein:
- (ii) the name of the port to which she belongs:
- (iii) the particulars stated in the application for registration:
- (iv) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

3. On the registry of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry and any documents of title mentioned in such application.

4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government by Bill of Sale, the Colonial Government shall be the transferors, and the Bill of Sale shall be in Form A in the proper form prescribed under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, hereinafter called the principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Colonial Secretary or other officer or Crown Agent as aforesaid on behalf of the Colonial Government.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Section 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government by the Colonial Secretary or other officer or Crown Agent as aforesaid on behalf of the Colonial Government.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government is entrusted by the Colonial Government shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the principal Act.

7. Where any provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order in Council is applicable to Government ships in the service of the Colonial Government imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a ship such duty, liability, right, or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council be carried out, borne, or exercised by the Colonial Government on behalf of His Majesty.

8. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts, any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order applicable to Government ships.

9. The following sections and provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts shall not apply to Government ships in the service of the Colonial Government registered in pursuance of this Order, namely:—

- (i) *The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894.* - Sections 1, 8 to 12, 427 to 431.

The provisions of Part II of the Act relating to the requirement of officers to hold certificates of competency and the production of those certificates.

- (ii) *The Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898.* - Sections 3 and 5.

- (iii) *The Merchant Shipping Act, 1906.* - Sections 25 and 27.

Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Act which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government ships in the service of the Colonial Government, shall be deemed to apply to such ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

10. Anything required or authorised by this Order in Council to be done by the Colonial Government may be done by the Colonial Secretary or other officer or Crown Agent as aforesaid.

11. This Order shall come into operation provisionally as from the date hereof in accordance with the provisions of Section two of the Rules Publication Act, 1893.

Request that following message may be conveyed to Lady Sturdee:—

"People and Government of the Falkland Islands have learnt with deep regret of the death of Admiral of the Fleet Sir Doveton Sturdee. I beg to offer sincere condolences on behalf of the Colony and myself. The 8th of December is always observed as a day of grateful remembrance in the Falkland Islands in honour of the British Navy and in commemoration of Admiral Sturdee's victory which saved the Colony from attack by an overwhelming force."

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS the development of the sheep industry renders it necessary for farmers to incur capital expenditure for the development of their farms

AND WHEREAS it is in the opinion of this Council desirable in the interests of the Colony that in the absence of a Bank, facilities be afforded to farmers, who wish to improve their property, to obtain long term loans at an economic rate of interest

AND WHEREAS there has been invested to the credit of the Land Sales Fund a sum amounting to approximately £190,000 received from the sales of land and this sum is at the disposal of the Colony for its development or for an emergency

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED as follows :

Firstly The Governor in Executive Council shall have power to authorize advances being made to farmers from the Land Sales Fund, for the purposes of permanent farm improvements.

Secondly The aggregate sum to be lent shall not exceed £30,000.

Thirdly Such advances shall be made on the security of first mortgages.

Fourthly Such advances shall be repaid to the Treasurer in the Colony or to the Crown Agents for the Colonies in London by ten annual instalments which shall be calculated so as to include payment of annual interest at the rate of four per centum.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of the Meeting held on the 22nd December, 1924.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 23rd of July, 1924, were read and confirmed.

2. The Honourable H. H. R. Gresham, after taking the prescribed oath, assumed his seat at the Council.

3. Minute No. 5 of 1924, submitting Supplementary Estimate of Expenditure No. 3 of 1924, was read.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the minute was adopted.

4. Minute No. 6 of 1924, relating to a proposed application for a Grant of Arms to the Colony, was read.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved that the minute be adopted.

In seconding the motion, the Honourable H. H. R. Gresham expressed the opinion that the alternative motto proposed, "Desire the Right," should be accepted for embodiment in the Coat of Arms of the Colony.

This was agreed to and the minute was adopted.

5. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of Minute No. 7 of 1924 from the Governor, relating to the improvement of the Sanitary and Road condition of Stanley.

In seconding the adoption of the minute, the Honourable G. J. Felton expressed the view that the improvements outlined were urgently required and that the works proposed would be of great benefit to the community.

The minute was adopted.

6. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following papers:

- (1) Despatches from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating the non-disallowance by His Majesty of Ordinances Nos. 2 and 3 of 1924.
- (2) A letter, dated the 3rd of September, 1924, from Sir Godfrey Thomas, Private Secretary to the Prince of Wales, intimating the acceptance by His Royal Highness of the Colony's gift of a motor sealskin rug made from the skins of Falkland Islands seals.

7. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To provide for the service of the year 1925" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

The Schedule containing the Estimates of Expenditure of the Colony for the year 1925 was considered.

Number IX of the Schedule was amended to read as follows :

The Council concurred in the provision made under Head XII Scientific Department, B. Forest Officer, but the Honourable Mr. Felton and the Honourable Mr. Gresham, unofficial members expressed the opinion that the Colony could not afford to continue experiments in tree planting after the year 1925.

Clause 2 was recommitted and amended to read as follows :

The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st December, 1925, a sum not exceeding One hundred and eighteen thousand, five hundred pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purpose and to defray the charges of the several services

expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1925.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To provide for the establishment and administration of a Research and Development Fund for the Dependencies" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 4 and the title were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To provide for the refund of a portion of the Duties of Customs levied and collected in respect of Whale Oil and Seal Oil, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, if the market price of the oil per ton does not exceed £50, was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 5 and the title were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved and the Honourable the Treasurer seconded the adoption of the following resolution :

Whereas it is provided in Section 2 of the Dependencies Research and Development Fund Ordinance, 1924, that the Fund shall be established for certain specific purposes and also for such other purposes as the Governor may "with the consent of the Legislative Council and the sanction of the Secretary of State, from time to time direct."

Be it now resolved that the purposes for which the Research and Development Fund is established, be held to include all the researches whether recommended or not, referred to in the Report of the Interdepartmental Committee on Research and Development in the Dependencies of the Falklands which was presented to Parliament by Command of His Majesty in April, 1920, (Cmd.) 657.

The resolution was adopted.

11. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved and the Honourable the Treasurer seconded the adoption of the following resolution :

Be it resolved that, under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, this Council hereby sanctions the following rate to be charged for the year 1925 on house property in the town of Stanley, namely One shilling and Threepence for every Twenty Shillings of the annual value of such house property.

The resolution was adopted.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minute from the Governor No. 6 of 1924.

The Governor has the honour to inform the Legislative Council that the Government has recently been impressed with the desirability of a Coat of Arms being recorded to the Colony in the College of Arms and has renewed the consideration given to the question in 1906, when it was decided that an application for a grant of Arms should be deferred.

As the result of representations made to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the College of Arms has prepared the design which is exhibited, as a specimen to assist in the selection of a suitable device. The alterations in this design, recommended by the Executive Council, are stated in the attached extract from the minutes of a meeting of the Executive Council held on the 29th of September, 1924.

The Governor has now the honour to invite the Legislative Council to approve of an application being made for a grant of Arms to the Colony, and to submit that the recommendations of the Executive Council with regard to the device should be adopted.

Minute from the Governor No. 7 of 1924.

Improvement of the Sanitary and Road Condition of Stanley.

The Governor has the honour to invite the attention of the Honourable Members of the Legislative Council to the proposals which have been under consideration for the improvement of the sanitary and road condition of Stanley. A promise was made at the last meeting of the Council that when the investigations were completed, reports on the works proposed would be laid before the Council.

The Government has, after protracted examination of the requirements of the town, arrived at the conclusion that a supply of pure water is of primary importance, then follow drains, road-making, the provision of an incinerator for sanitary service, and of the plant for the execution of the works.

It was manifestly impossible on financial grounds to adopt projects on a scale which would have brought the conditions of the town to the perfection attained by wealthy communities in other countries. Mr. Neave, who was appointed Consulting Engineer to the Government, submitted proposals in a preliminary report which would have involved an expenditure of not less than £75,000. This was far beyond the limited resources at disposal. The total surplus balances of the Colony which are available at this date amount to little more than £44,000. A careful review of the financial position allowed of the conclusion that the most that could at present be allocated to works for the improvement of Stanley was £30,000. It was found that the provision of a reliable water supply was impracticable for a lower sum than £15,000, leaving £11,500 to be expended on roads and drains, £1,000 on an incinerator and £2,500 on plant. Schemes for procuring water from the Mile Pond, from Sappers Hill and from Moody Valley were all investigated in turn and discarded. Resource was had to proposals made by Mr. Messervy in 1901 for a water supply from Mount William Stone Run. Mr. Neave had considered and rejected this source of supply on the ground of the small amount of water found by him at this Run at the end of the dry spell in 1922. His object at the time he made the investigation was to obtain a supply of not less than 30,000 gallons a day, or 30 gallons a day per head of the population of Stanley throughout the year. As it must be a considerable time—probably many years—before a complete waterborne sewage system for the town can be considered a practical project, it must suffice for present requirements if a minimum supply of seven thousand gallons per day can be secured after prolonged drought.

To guard against the event of the failure of water from the Mount William Stone Run following a dry spell, it is proposed to construct two storage reservoirs with a total capacity of 350,000 gallons. Sufficient water would then be held in reserve to meet a drying up of the source for a period of fifty days. We have been fortunate in one respect in the recent dry weather, which has caused such general inconvenience to the people of Stanley, for whose benefit water has on several occasions had to be transported for a distance of five miles by boat. The proposed source of supply has been thoroughly tested for quantity. The total rainfall in Stanley in the months of August to October, inclusive, was under three inches, the mean daily fall being .05 of an inch in August, .01 in September and .02 in October, as against an average over 26 years of 2.03, 1.43 and 1.49 inches in the same months respectively. Gauge boards have shewn that at no time during the drought has the total supply fallen below five gallons a minute or 7,500 gallons a day. The capacity of the main and the proposed filter will enable 30,000 gallons a day to be delivered and for the greater part of the year the supply should not fall short of that quantity. The water is believed to be of good potable quality. Samples have been taken and sent to the United Kingdom for analysis. It is intended that house connections should be provided at the expense of the occupants of houses at their request, if they desire them. Under the scheme now submitted, the supply will be gravitational, the water being carried for a distance of three miles to the dairy paddock where two reservoirs will be constructed at a height of 130 feet above sea level. It is to be regretted that it will not be possible to provide facilities for house connections to the people living on the high ground above the level of the reservoirs. To meet their requirements in time of drought, and those of the people in other parts of the town who are unable to afford private house connections, six street fountains will be provided at suitable points. For protection against fire a number of fire hydrants will also be supplied. It is estimated that the pressure at Ross Road will be sufficient to throw a jet of water over the Town Hall.

The drainage works proposed are :—

- (a) Three main sewer outfalls of cast iron pipes.
- (b) Main drains to be laid in Ross Road and John Street.
- (c) Main drains to be laid in certain of the roads running south to north.
- (d) The existing channels and ditches to be regraded and lined to carry surface and slop water to the main drains.

The roads will, as far as funds permit, be regraded, resurfaced and made up where necessary.

Part of the plant has already been purchased from the Admiralty. It is proposed that a steam road roller and motor lorry should also be obtained for the works.

The total expenditure, including liabilities, to the present date on the schemes for the improvement of Stanley amounts to £2,950. This includes a fee of £300 to the Consulting Engineer and all minor incidental expenses in connection with his investigations. It also includes a sum of £1,240 for plant and material bought from the Admiralty, but not paid for pending the accounts being passed in London. It has been possible to effect considerable economy by purchasing second-hand material. Only such works have hitherto been taken in hand as will be necessary under any scheme which may be adopted.

The approval of the Council is now sought for the improvement works outlined in this minute and for the appropriation from the surplus balances of the Colony of the monies required for carrying the works to completion. The Council will be invited at a later stage in the present session to vote the specific sum of £15,000 for expenditure in this connection during the coming financial year.

Preamble.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Supplementary Appropriation (1924) Ordinance, 1925."

Short Title.

2. The sums of money set forth in the Schedule hereto having been expended for the Service therein mentioned beyond the amounts granted for those Services by the Ordinance providing for the Service of the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-four, the same are hereby declared to have been duly laid out and expended for the Service of the Colony in that year, and are hereby approved, allowed and granted in addition to the sums mentioned for those Services in the said Ordinance.

Appropriation of Excess of Expenditure for the year 1924.

An Ordinance To amend the Passports Ordinance, 1921.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Passports (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925.

Short title.

2. A person coming from any place out of the Colony shall not, without the special permission of the Governor or of some person deputed in writing by him, land at any place in the Colony unless he has in his possession a valid passport, issued to him by or on behalf of the Government of which he is a subject or citizen, or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality or identity.

Landing in Colony without passports forbidden.

3. Section 2 of the Passports Ordinance, 1921 is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

Passed by the Legislative Council this 29th day of July, 1925.

An Ordinance

To regulate the holding of land by Aliens and Companies under Alien control.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Aliens (Landholding regulation) Ordinance, 1925."

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance, unless the context otherwise requires—

The expression "alien" means a person who is not a British subject, and includes a company registered in the Colony or in any other part of His Majesty's dominions, if it is under alien control, and also every corporation incorporated in a foreign country, but shall not include any of the subjects or citizens of a foreign state upon whom there has been conferred by treaty the right to hold land within the Colony;

The expression "land" includes tenements and hereditaments, both corporeal and incorporeal and every interest therein, but does not include money charged on land;

The expression "company" includes partnership or any association of persons joined together for the purposes of trade or mutual profit;

The expression "mortgage" includes every instrument creating a mortgage or charge on land;

The expression "unlicensed alien" means an alien who does not hold a licence granted under this Ordinance.

Forfeiture of land and mortgages held by unlicensed aliens.

3. (1) Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance neither land in the Colony nor a mortgage on land in the Colony shall, after the commencement of this Ordinance, be held by an unlicensed alien, and any land or mortgage so held shall be forfeited to the Crown.

(2) Provided that—

- (a) Land may be acquired and held by an unlicensed alien on an annual tenancy or for any less interest, for the purposes of his residence, trade or business, but an unlicensed alien shall not hold more than five acres of land in all.
- (b) Land acquired by an unlicensed alien under a will or on an intestacy shall not be forfeited if, within one year from the death of the testator or intestate, or within such extended time (if any) as the Governor may decide to be reasonable, the land is sold or the alien obtains a licence to hold the land.
- (c) A mortgage acquired by an unlicensed alien under a will or on an intestacy shall not be forfeited; but the alien shall not, unless he obtains a licence to hold the mortgage, be entitled to foreclose or enter into possession of the mortgaged land.
- (d) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the interest of a judgment creditor in the land of his judgment debtor, but the debtor's land shall not be acquired by an unlicensed alien.
- (e) Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the estate or interest of an alien in any land or mortgage held by him at the commencement of this Ordinance.

4. (1) The Governor may, if he thinks fit, from time to time, grant to any alien a licence to hold land as owner or tenant or mortgagee for any estate or interest either subject to any conditions or not.

Licences for aliens to hold land or mortgages.

Provided that a licence shall be operative only as to the land described and as to the estate or interest specified therein, and shall be of no force or effect until registered in the office of the Registrar-General.

(2) On breach of any condition in a licence to hold land as owner or tenant or mortgagee, the estate and interest of the alien in the land or mortgage held under the authority thereof and also the estate and interest of the said alien in any other land in the Colony or mortgage thereon shall be forfeited to the Crown.

5. (1) Land or a mortgage, forfeited under this Ordinance, shall not vest in the Crown unless and until a judgment is obtained declaring the forfeiture; but on such judgment being obtained the title of the Crown shall relate back to and commence at the time when the forfeiture took place.

Effect of Forfeiture.

(2) A judgment declaring a forfeiture of land shall operate to vest in the Crown all the estate and interest of the alien in the forfeited land.

(3) A judgment declaring a forfeiture of a mortgage shall operate to vest in the Crown all the estate and interest of the alien in the mortgaged land, subject to any right of redemption subsisting therein, and also to vest in the Crown the right to recover and receive and to enforce all securities for the mortgage money.

Company under alien control an alien.

6. A company, which is under alien control, shall for the purposes of this Ordinance, be deemed to be an alien.

Proof of alien control.

7. For the purposes of this Ordinance a company shall be deemed to be under alien control if shewn to be under alien control to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council and so declared by order.

Provided that no such order shall be issued unless due notice has been given to such company of the intention of taking its status into consideration for the purpose of this Ordinance, and it shall be competent for the said company to make representations to the Governor in Council in person or by attorney as may be allowed by the Governor.

Restrictions on trusts in favour of an alien.

8. (1) This section applies to the following property only, namely, land situate in the Colony or any interest, title or estate in such land.

(2) With a view to preventing evasion of the foregoing provisions of this Ordinance, no person, partnership or company shall, without the licence of the Governor, hold any property to which this section applies in trust for an alien, and any such property so held shall be forfeited to the Crown.

(3) In this section the expression "trust" includes any arrangement whether written or oral, express or implied, and whether legally enforceable or not, whereby any property or any interest therein or any rights attached thereto is or are held for the benefit of or to the order or at the disposal of an alien; but does not include :

- (a) The duties incident to a mortgage ;
- (b) The duties of a satisfied mortgagee to the mortgager, if within three months after satisfaction of the mortgage the mortgaged property is revested in the mortgager or his interest therein is extinguished ;
- (c) The duties of a vendor to the purchaser pending payment of the purchase money, or after payment of the purchase money, if within three months after such payment the property sold is vested in the purchaser or his interest therein is extinguished ;
- (d) The duties of a trustee in bankruptcy to the bankrupt or his creditors; or
- (e) The duties of a trustee for the purposes of any composition or scheme of arrangement for the payment of debts to the debtor or his creditors.

(4) Nothing in this section shall apply to a trust subsisting at the commencement of this Ordinance.

Transmission of licence.

9. (1) The Colonial Secretary shall send a copy of every licence, issued to an alien, to such alien and to the Registrar-General.

(2) Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Registrar-General to record on the deeds registered or submitted for registration, in respect of land or any interest in land held by an alien, the licence by virtue of which such alien holds, under the provisions of this Ordinance, his interest in the said land.

Licences to be recorded on deeds.

10. For the purpose of establishing a forfeiture under this Ordinance, the Colonial Secretary may apply to the Supreme Court for a declaration that any right, title or interest sought to be effected is forfeited to the Crown.

Procedure.

11. (1) Without prejudice to any other right to discovery, the Colonial Secretary may, in proceedings for establishing a forfeiture under this Ordinance, administer interrogatories to and obtain discovery of documents from a defendant, as to any matter or document tending to prove his alienage or the alienage of any other person, or to discover any land, mortgage, share or debentures held by him or in trust for him or as to any relevant matter or document.

Discovery.

(2) It shall not be a valid ground for refusing to answer any such interrogatory, or to disclose or produce any document that the answer or document might or would expose the defendant or any other person to the risk of a prosecution under this Ordinance.

(3) Provided that in the prosecution of a defendant under this Ordinance the fact that he has disclosed any matter in answer to an interrogatory administered under this section and disclosed or produced any document in compliance with an order for discovery obtained under this section, shall not be admissible in evidence.

12. The fee of 10/- shall be payable by any licensed alien for the registration of his licence.

Fee.

13. Section 11 of the Alien Ordinance, 1900, is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

14. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1926, and shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Date of operation and extension to Dependencies.

Passed by the Legislative Council this 29th day of July, 1925.

An Ordinance

To amend The Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance, 1924.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance (Amendment) 1925."

Limit of time for commencement of prosecution.

2. No prosecution shall be commenced for an offence under sub-section (1) of section 5 of the Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance, 1889, more than nine months after the commission of the offence.

AND WHEREAS the Governor is satisfied that the Legislatures of the parts of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereinafter mentioned have made reciprocal provisions for the enforcement within those parts of judgments obtained in the Supreme Court of this Colony,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Governor, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Ordinance in the Governor vested, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :

The Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgments Ordinance, 1922, shall extend to judgments obtained in a superior court in the State of New South Wales and the Colony of Grenada in like manner as it extends to judgments obtained in a superior court in the United Kingdom.

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, power is given to His Majesty by Order in Council to make Regulations with respect to the manner in which Government ships may be registered as British ships for the purpose of the Merchant Shipping Acts :

AND WHEREAS by the said Section it is provided that those Acts shall, subject to any exceptions and modifications which may be made by Order in Council, either generally or as respects any special class of Government ships, apply to Government ships registered in accordance with such Regulations as if they were registered in manner provided by those Acts :

AND WHEREAS, the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, ^(a) have been complied with :

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations shall have effect as regards any Government ships in the service of the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands (hereinafter referred to as the Colonial Government) :—

1. An application for registry of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government shall be made in writing under the hand of the Colonial Secretary of the Falkland Islands or other officer of the Colonial Government nominated by the Governor, or by one of the Crown Agents for the Colonies. Such application shall contain the following particulars :—

- (i) A statement of the name and description of the ship.
- (ii) A statement of the time when and place where the ship was built, or, if the ship was foreign built and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect and of her foreign name.
- (iii) A statement of the nature of the title to the said ship, whether by original construction by or for the Colonial Government, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise, and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the Colonial Government.
- (iv) A statement of the name of the Master.

2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government, shall :—

- (i) enter the ship in the Register Book as belonging to "His Majesty, represented by the Government of the Colony of the Falkland Islands" and shall also enter therein :

- (ii) the name of the port to which she belongs :
- (iii) the particulars stated in the application for registration :
- (iv) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

3. On the registry of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry and any documents of title mentioned in such application.

4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government by Bill of Sale, the Colonial Government shall be the transferors, and the Bill of Sale shall be in form A in the proper form prescribed under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, hereinafter called the principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Colonial Secretary or other officer or Crown Agent as aforesaid on behalf of the Colonial Government.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Sections 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government by the Colonial Secretary or other officer or Crown Agent as aforesaid on behalf of the Colonial Government.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government ship in the service of the Colonial Government is entrusted by the Colonial Government shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the principal Act.

7. Where any provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1906, and this Order in Council, is applicable to Government ships in the service of the Colonial Government imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a ship such duty, liability, right or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council be carried out, borne, or exercised by the Colonial Government, on behalf of His Majesty.

8. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts, any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1906, and this Order, applicable to Government ships.

9. The following sections and provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts shall not apply to Government ships in the service of the Colonial Government registered in pursuance of this Order, namely :—

- (i) *The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894.* — Sections 1, 8 to 12, 427 to 431.
The provisions of Part II of the Act relating to the requirement of officers to hold certificates of competency and the production of those certificates.
- (ii) *The Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898.* — Sections 3 and 5.
- (iii) *The Merchant Shipping Act, 1906* — Sections 25 and 27.

Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Act which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government ships in the service of the Colonial Government, shall be deemed to apply to such ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

10. Anything required or authorized by this Order in Council to be done by the Colonial Government may be done by the Colonial Secretary or other officer or Crown Agent as aforesaid.

Ordinance No. of 1925.

A Bill

To amend the law relating to the
Administration of Justice.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the
Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Administration of Justice (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925." Short Title.

Sections 1, 2 and 3 of Ordinance No. 4 of 1901 amended.

2. Sections One, Two and Three of the Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1901 (No. 4 of 1901) are repealed and replaced by the following sections:—

1. In this Ordinance

"The Court" shall mean the Court or the Judge sitting in the Court Room or in Chambers.

"A Court" shall mean a sitting of the Supreme Court for the trial of any civil or criminal case.

"Judgment" shall include decree, order, sentence or rule.

2. The Supreme Court shall consist of the Judge, and if any assessors be summoned then of the Judge and such assessors.

3. The Judge shall be a Member of the Bar of England, Scotland or Ireland or some British possession, and of not less than seven years' standing, or shall have filled the office of Judge of some Court in the British Dominions and be nominated by the Secretary of State and appointed by the Governor under the Public Seal of the Colony and shall hold office during good behaviour:

Provided that whenever the office of Judge is vacant or if the Judge become incapable or be suspended or be absent from the Colony, then the Governor may do and execute or may appoint some other officer to do and execute all things that belong to the office of Judge.

Sections 4, 5, 6 and 7
of Ordinance No. 4 of
1901 repealed.

3. Sections Four, Five, Six and Seven of the Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1901 (No. 4 of 1901) are repealed.

Sections 16, 19, 20, 22,
25, 26 and 32 of
Ordinance No. 4 of
1901 amended.

4. In Section sixteen, line one, Section nineteen, line four, Section twenty, line two, Section twenty-two, line one, Section twenty-five, line six, Section twenty-nine, lines two and eight, and Section thirty-two, line eight of the Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1901 (No. 4 of 1901) in lieu of the words "Chief Justice" there shall be read the word "Judge."

**Section 3 of Ordinance
No. 5 of 1909 repealed.**

5. Section three of the Privy Council Appeals Ordinance (No. 5 of 1909) is repealed.

6. FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1925.

A Bill

To regulate Wireless Telegraphy and similar methods of communication.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the “Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1925.”

Definition.

2. The expression “Wireless telegraphy” means any system of communication by means of any apparatus for transmitting messages or other communications by means of electric signals without the aid of any wire connecting the points from and at which the messages or other communications are sent or received and shall include wireless telephony.

Wireless installations to be licensed.

3. (1) A person shall not establish or maintain any wireless telegraph station, or install or work or maintain any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in the Colony or on board any ship or aircraft registered in the Colony, except under and in accordance with a licence granted in that behalf by the Governor in Council.

Condition of licences to be fixed by Governor in Council.

(2) Every such licence shall be in such form and for such period as the Governor in Council may determine, and shall contain the terms, conditions and restrictions on and subject to which the licence is granted.

Experimental licences.

(3) Where an applicant for a licence proves to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council that the sole object of obtaining the licence is to enable him to conduct experiments in wireless telegraphy, a licence for that purpose may be granted, subject to such special terms, conditions and restrictions, as the Governor in Council may think proper.

Penalties for installing wireless apparatus without a licence.

(4) If any person establishes a wireless telegraph station without a licence, or installs or works any apparatus for wireless telegraphy without a licence, he shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment not exceeding six months and in either case be liable to forfeit any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or worked without a licence.

(5) If a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for suspecting that a wireless telegraph station has been established or maintained without a licence in that behalf, or that any apparatus for wireless telegraphy has been installed or worked or maintained in any place or in any ship or aircraft within his jurisdiction without a licence, or contrary to the provisions of any regulations made under this Ordinance, he may grant a search warrant, and a warrant so granted shall authorize the police officer or person named therein to enter and inspect the station, place or ship or aircraft, and to seize any apparatus which appears to him to be used or intended to be used for wireless telegraphy therein.

Power to issue search warrant.

4. (1) The Governor in Council may make regulations

Power of Governor in Council to make Regulations and prescribe fees.

- (a) prescribing the form and manner in which applications for licences under this Ordinance are to be made and the fees payable on the grant or renewal of any such licence :
- (b) requiring any operators or other persons engaged in the working of wireless telegraphy to be provided with certificates and making provision as to the manner and the conditions of the issue and renewal of such certificate, including examination and tests to be undergone.
- (c) as to the working of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed in ships and aircraft not registered in the Colony while such ships are in any harbour or the territorial waters of the Colony, and such aircraft are upon or over the territory or territorial waters of the Colony.
- (d) for giving effect to the provisions of any international convention to which the Government of the Colony has acceded and any regulation made thereunder so far as the same relate to wireless telegraphy.
- (e) generally for more effectually carrying into effect any of the purposes or provisions of this Ordinance.

(2) Any person acting in contravention of, or failing to comply with a regulation made under this Section, shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or both penalties, and in the case of a continued offence, a further fine not exceeding five pounds for each day during which the offence continued. He shall further be liable to forfeit any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in respect of which the offence is committed.

6. (1) Any person who:—

Penalties for improper use of wireless signalling and disclosure of messages.

- (a) sends or attempts to send by wireless telegraphy a signal of distress or a false or misleading message as to a vessel in distress ; or
- (b) improperly divulges the purport of any message sent or proposed to be sent by wireless telegraphy ; shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both penalties.

(2) Any person convicted of an offence under this Section shall further be liable to forfeit any licence granted under this Ordinance and any apparatus by means of which the offence was committed.

Emergency Control.

7. If at any time in the opinion of the Governor an emergency has arisen in which it is expedient for the public service that His Majesty's Government should have control over the transmission of messages by wireless telegraphy it shall be lawful for the Colonial Postmaster with the approval of the Governor or any other person authorized in that behalf by the Governor to take possession forthwith of any apparatus for any such purposes, and, during the continuance of the emergency, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to make such further rules as appear necessary with respect to the possession, sale, purchase, construction and use of apparatus for any such purpose or component parts of such apparatus.

Any person acting in contravention of any such regulation shall be liable on conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or both penalties.

Application of Ordinance.

8. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Repeal.

9. Ordinance No. 3 of 1912, "An Ordinance relating to Wireless Telegraphy," is hereby repealed.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1925.

A Bill

To regulate the Importation, Exportation, Manufacture, Sale and use of Opium and other dangerous Drugs.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Dangerous Drugs" Ordinance, 1925."

Short Title.

2. In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires the expression—

Definitions.

"Raw opium" means the spontaneously coagulated juice obtained from the capsules of the *Papaver Somniferum L.*, which has only been submitted to the necessary manipulations for packing and transport, whatever its content of morphine.

"Prepared opium" means opium prepared for smoking and includes dross and any other residues remaining after opium has been smoked.

"Medicinal opium" means raw opium which has undergone the processes necessary to adapt it for medicinal use in accordance with the requirements of the British pharmacopœia, whether in powder form or granulated or otherwise, or mixed with neutral materials.

"Morphine" means the principal alkaloid of opium having the chemical formula $C_{17}H_{19}NO_5$

"Diacetylmorphine" means diacetylmorphine (diamorphine heroin) having the formula $C_{21}H_{23}NO_5$

"Coca leaf" means the leaf of the *Erythroxylon Coca Lamarck* and the *Erythroxylon novo-granatense* (Morris) Hieronymus and their varieties, belonging to the family of Erythroxylaceæ and the leaf of other species of this genus from which it may be found possible to extract cocaine directly or by chemical transformation.

"Crude cocaine" means any extract of the coca leaf which can be used directly or indirectly for the manufacture of cocaine.

"Cocaine" means methyl-benzoyl lævo-ecgonine ($[\alpha]_{D20} = -16^{\circ}4$) in 20 per cent solution of chloroform, of which the formula is $C_{17}H_{21}NO_4$.

"Ecgonine" means lævo-ecgonine ($[\alpha]_{D20} = -45^{\circ}6$ in 5 per cent solution of water) of which the formula is $C_9H_{15}NO_3 \cdot H_2O$, and all other derivatives of lævo-ecgonine which might serve industrially for its recovery.

"Indian Hemp" means the dried flowering or fruiting tops of the pistillate plant *Cannabis Sativa* L., from which the resin has not been extracted, under whatever name they may be designated.

"Corresponding law" means any law stated in a certificate purporting to be issued by or on behalf of the government of any country outside the Colony to be a law providing for the control and regulation in that country of the manufacture, sale, use, export and import of drugs in accordance with the provisions of the Dangerous Drugs Convention Protocol and Final Act signed at Geneva on the nineteenth day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty-five, and any statement in any such certificate as to the effect of the law mentioned in the certificate, or any statement in any such certificate that any facts constitute an offence against that law, shall be conclusive.

PART I.

RAW OPIUM, PREPARED OPIUM, INDIAN HEMP.

Prohibition of cultivation of opium poppy and *cannabis sativa*.

3. It shall not be lawful for any person to cultivate the the opium poppy (*Papaver Somniferum*) or the plant (*Cannabis Sativa*) in the Colony.

Prohibition of importation of opium and resin of *cannabis sativa*.

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to import or to bring into the Colony or to export from the Colony any raw opium or resin of the plant *Cannabis Sativa*.

Penalties for dealing in opium and resin of *cannabis sativa*.

5. If any person

- (a) sells or otherwise deals in raw opium, or resin of the plant *cannabis sativa* ; or
- (b) manufactures, sells, or otherwise deals in prepared opium ; or
- (c) has in his possession any raw opium or prepared opium or resin of the plant *cannabis sativa* or the whole or any portion of the said plant (excluding its medical preparations)

he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

PART II.

COCAINE, MORPHINE, ETC.

Drugs to which Part II. applies.

6. (1) The drugs to which this part of this Ordinance applies are

- (a) Medicinal opium.
- (b) Crude cocaine and ecgonine.

- (c) Morphine, diacetylmorphine, cocaine and their respective salts.
- (d) All preparations, officinal or non-official (including the so called anti-opium remedies) containing more than 0.2 per cent of morphine, or more than 0.1 per cent of cocaine.
- (e) All preparations containing diacetylmorphine.
- (f) Galenical preparations (extract and tincture) of Indian Hemp.

(2) If it appears to the Governor in Council that any new derivative of morphine or cocaine, or of any salts of morphine or cocaine, any other alkaloid of opium, or any other drug of whatever kind is or is likely to be productive, if improperly used, of ill effects substantially of the same character or nature as or analagous to those produced by morphine or cocaine, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation declare that this Part of this Ordinance shall apply to that new derivative or alkaloid or other drug in the same manner as it applies to the drugs mentioned in subsection (1) of this section.

(3) In the event of the Health Committee of the League of Nations finding that any preparations containing any of the narcotic drugs, to which the provisions of this Part of this Ordinance, applies, cannot give rise to the drug habit on account of the medicaments with which the said drugs are compounded, the Governor in Council may by proclamation declare that such preparations shall be excluded from the provisions of this Part of this Ordinance.

7. It shall not be lawful for any person to import or bring into or to export from the Colony any drugs to which this Part of this Ordinance applies except under licence.

Restriction on import and export of cocaine, &c.

8. It shall not be lawful for any person to carry on any process in the manufacture of any drug to which this Part of this Ordinance applies.

Prohibition of manufacture of cocaine, &c.

9. It shall not be lawful to supply or procure or offer to supply or procure any drug to which this part of this Ordinance applies to or for any person in this Colony or elsewhere.

Restriction on sale and distribution of cocaine, &c.

Provided that administration of the drugs by or under the direct personal supervision of a Medical Practitioner, registered under the Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists Ordinance, 1914, or by or under the direct personal supervision of a Dentist, registered under the aforesaid Ordinance, in dental treatment or by or under the direct personal supervision of a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon in the treatment of any animal, shall not be deemed to be supplying the drug within the meaning of this section.

GENERAL.

10. It shall not be lawful to tranship or to convey from any vessel, ship, boat or lighter to another vessel, ship, boat or lighter in any harbour of the Colony or in the territorial waters thereof any drug to which this Ordinance applies.

Prohibition of transhipment.

Provided that this section shall not apply to any drugs imported into the Colony under a licence granted in accordance with this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder.

11. (1) If a Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for suspecting that any drugs to which this Ordinance applies are, in contravention of this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder, in the

Powers of search.

possession or under the control of any person or in any premises, or that any document directly or indirectly relating to or connected with any transaction or dealing which was, or any intended transaction or dealing which would if carried out to be, an offence against this Ordinance, or in the case of a transaction or dealing carried out or intended to be carried out in any place outside the Colony, an offence against the provisions of any corresponding law in force in that place, is in the possession, or under the control of any person in any premises, he may grant a search warrant authorising any constable named in the warrant, at any time or times within one month from the date of the warrant, to enter, if need be by force, the premises named in the warrant, and to search the premises and any persons found therein, and, if there is reasonable ground for suspecting that an offence against this Ordinance has been committed in relation to any such drugs which may be found in the premises or in the possession of any such persons, or that any document which may be so found is such a document as aforesaid, to seize and detain those drugs or that document, as the case may be.

Offences and penalties.

12. (1) Any person

- (a) who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with any regulation made under this Ordinance ; or
- (b) who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, the conditions of any licence issued or authority granted under or in pursuance of this Ordinance ; or
- (c) who for the purpose of obtaining, whether for himself or for any other person, the issue, grant or renewal, of any such licence or authority as aforesaid, makes any declaration or statement which is false in any particular, or knowingly utters, produces or makes use of any such declaration or statement or any document containing the same ; or
- (d) who in the Colony, aids, abets, counsels or procures the commission in any place outside the Colony of any offence punishable under the provisions of any corresponding law in force in that place, or does any act preparatory to, or in furtherance of, any act which if committed in the Colony would constitute an offence against this Ordinance ;

shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

(2) Every person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance shall, in respect of each offence, be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand pounds, or to penal servitude for a period not exceeding ten years, or to both such fine and penal servitude and shall, in every case on conviction for the offence forfeit to His Majesty all articles in respect of which the offence was committed, and the court before which the offender was convicted may order any forfeited articles to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the court thinks fit.

(3) If any person attempts to commit an offence against this Ordinance, or solicits or incites another person to commit such an offence, he shall, without prejudice to any other liability, be liable on conviction to the same punishment and forfeiture as if he had committed an offence under this Ordinance.

(4) Where a person convicted of an offence under this Ordinance is a company, the chairman and every director and every officer concerned in the management of the company shall be guilty of the like offence unless he proves that the act constituting the offence took place without his knowledge or consent.

13. Offences under this Ordinance or under any regulations made thereunder may be prosecuted and penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance, or any regulations made thereunder, may be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner or by action in the Supreme Court of the Colony together with full costs of suit ;

Prosecution of offences.

Provided that any penalty imposed by a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace shall not exceed One Hundred Pounds, exclusive of costs, and imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

14. In any proceedings against any person for an offence against this Ordinance it is not necessary to negative by evidence any licence, authority or other matter of exception or defence and the burden of proving any such matter lies on the person seeking to avail himself thereof.

Onus of proof.

15. Any constable may arrest without warrant any person who has committed, or attempted to commit, or is reasonably suspected by the constable of having committed or attempted to commit, an offence against this Ordinance, if he has reasonable ground for believing that person will abscond unless arrested, or if the name and address of that person are unknown to and cannot be ascertained by him.

Power of arrest.

16. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council to make regulations

- (a) For carrying into effect the purposes of this Ordinance
- (b) For the supply and distribution of drugs outside the limits of the Town of Stanley under the supervision of a Medical Practitioner registered under the Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists Ordinance, 1914.

17. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Application of Ordinance.

18. The Opium Ordinance, 1913, is hereby repealed.

Minutes of the Meeting held on the 29th July, 1925.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 22nd of December, 1924, were read and confirmed.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

The title was amended to read "A Bill to amend the Criminal Law Amendment Ordinance, 1924."

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

12. The Honourable the Treasurer moved and the Honourable M. C. Craigie-Halkett seconded the adoption of the following resolution :

“ WHEREAS the development of the sheep industry renders it necessary for farmers to incur capital expenditure for the development of their farms,

AND WHEREAS it is in the opinion of this Council desirable in the interests of the Colony that in the absence of a Bank, facilities be afforded to farmers who wish to improve their property, to obtain long term loans at an economic rate of interest,

AND WHEREAS there has been invested to the credit of the Land Sales Fund a sum amounting to approximately £190,000 received from the sales of land and this sum is at the disposal of the Colony for its development or for an emergency,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED as follows :

Firstly. The Governor in Executive Council shall have the power to authorize advances being made to farmers from the Land Sales Fund, for the purposes of permanent farm improvements.

Secondly. The aggregate sum to be lent shall not exceed £30,000.

Thirdly. Such advances shall be made on the security of first mortgages.

Fourthly. Such advances shall be repaid to the Treasurer in the Colony or to the Crown Agents for the Colonies in London by ten annual instalments which shall be calculated so as to include payment of annual interest at the rate of four per centum.

The resolution was adopted.

Minute to Legislative Council.

(No. 4 of 1925.)

The Governor has the honour to submit to the Legislative Council a report by Mr. Hugh Munro, Principal District Inspector of the Department of Agriculture of New Zealand, on his investigation into the conditions and practice of the sheep farming industry in the Falkland Islands and at the same time to place on record his high appreciation of the very important service which Mr. Munro has rendered to the Colony in carrying out this investigation in so thorough a manner and of the care and thought which he has bestowed on the problems with which the industry is faced.

2. The report contains practical suggestions which cannot fail to be of the utmost value in such efforts as may be made to establish the industry on sound and successful lines and deals at length with the experimental work which is considered to be necessary in the interests of the Colony.

3. Mr. Munro has recommended very strongly that an experimental farm should be established with the least possible delay, and in view of the urgency of the matter, arrangements have been made with the Falkland Islands Company for the area, which was selected for this purpose, to be taken over by the Government in exchange for Crown Lands which have been leased to the Company for a long period of years.

4. The cost of establishing the farm on the lines recommended in the report is estimated at £17,000. In addition to the capital expenditure involved this estimate allows for the maintenance of the farm at a total cost of £3,600 for the first three years, after which it is anticipated that the farm will become self-supporting, and it is proposed that the amount to be appropriated should be allocated in the following manner :—

Buildings, Fencing, Implements, &c.	£9,400.
Stock	3,000.
Contingencies	1,000.
Maintenance for 3 years	3,600.
				<u>£17,000.</u>

5. It is considered that this expenditure may properly be defrayed from the Land Sales Fund which is at the disposal of the Colony for its development and that this may be done without unduly depleting the Fund or causing loss to it through the sale of securities. The Fund amounted to £188,000 on the 1st of January, 1925, and there accrues to it annually a sum of approximately £7,000. The initial expenditure on the farm would be spread over a period of at least two years and the amount which is received annually in respect of land, which is in process of being purchased, can be appropriated to the equipment of the farm instead of being invested in securities.

6. The Governor has, accordingly, the honour to invite the Council to approve of an experimental farm being established on the lines recommended by Mr. Munro and of the initial expenditure not exceeding an aggregate sum of £17,000 being defrayed from the Land Sales Fund.

To amend the law relating to the
Administration of Justice.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Administration of Justice (Amendment) Ordinance, 1925."

Short Title.

2. Sections One, Two and Three of the Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1901 (No. 4 of 1901) are repealed and replaced by the following sections:—

Sections 1, 2 and 3 of Ordinance No. 4 of 1901 amended.

1. In this Ordinance

"The Court" shall mean the Court or the Judge sitting in the Court Room or in Chambers.

"A Court" shall mean a sitting of the Supreme Court for the trial of any civil or criminal case.

"Judgment" shall include decree, order, sentence or rule.

2. The Supreme Court shall consist of the Judge, and if any assessors be summoned then of the Judge and such assessors.

3. The Judge shall be a Member of the Bar of England, Scotland or Ireland or some British possession, and of not less than seven years' standing, or shall have filled the office of Judge of some Court in the British Dominions and be nominated by the Secretary of State and appointed by the Governor under the Public Seal of the Colony and shall hold office during good behaviour:

Provided that whenever the office of Judge is vacant or if the Judge become incapable or be suspended or be absent from the Colony, then the Governor may do and execute or may appoint some other officer to do and execute all things that belong to the office of Judge.

Sections 4, 5, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 4 of 1901 repealed.

3. Sections Four, Five, Six and Seven of the Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1901 (No. 4 of 1901) are repealed.

Sections 16, 19, 20, 22, 25, 29 and 32 of Ordinance No. 4 of 1901 amended.

4. In Section sixteen, line one, Section nineteen, line four, Section twenty, line two, Section twenty-two, line one, Section twenty-five, line six, Section twenty-nine, lines two and eight, and Section thirty-two, line eight of the Administration of Justice Ordinance, 1901 (No. 4 of 1901) in lieu of the words "Chief Justice" there shall be read the word "Judge."

Section 3 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1909 repealed.

5. Section three of the Privy Council Appeals Ordinance (No. 5 of 1909) is repealed.

Amendment of Ordinances mentioned in Schedule.

6. The jurisdiction powers and authorities vested in the "Chief Justice" by the Ordinances mentioned in the second column of the Schedule to this Ordinance are hereby vested in the "Judge," and in the sections of the aforesaid Ordinances which are mentioned in the third column of the Schedule to this Ordinance in lieu of the words "Chief Justice" there shall be read the word "Judge."

7. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

An Ordinance
To regulate Wireless Telegraphy and
similar methods of communication.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1925."

Definition.

2. The expression "Wireless telegraphy" means any system of communication by means of any apparatus for transmitting messages or other communications by means of electric signals without the aid of any wire connecting the points from and at which the messages or other communications are sent or received and shall include wireless telephony.

Wireless installations to be licensed.

3. (1) A person shall not establish or maintain any wireless telegraph station, or install or work or maintain any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in any place in the Colony or on board any ship or aircraft registered in the Colony, except under and in accordance with a licence granted in that behalf by the Governor in Council.

Conditions of licences to be fixed by Governor in Council.

(2) Every such licence shall be in such form and for such period as the Governor in Council may determine, and shall contain the terms, conditions and restrictions on and subject to which the licence is granted.

Experimental licences.

(3) Where an applicant for a licence proves to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council that the sole object of obtaining the licence is to enable him to conduct experiments in wireless telegraphy, a licence for that purpose may be granted, subject to such special terms, conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council may think proper.

(4) If any person establishes a wireless telegraph station without a licence, or installs or works any apparatus for wireless telegraphy without a licence, he shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment not exceeding six months and in either case be liable to forfeit any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed or worked without a licence.

Penalties for installing wireless apparatus without a licence.

(5) If a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for suspecting that a wireless telegraph station has been established or maintained without a licence in that behalf, or that any apparatus for wireless telegraphy has been installed or worked or maintained in any place or in any ship or aircraft within his jurisdiction without a licence, or contrary to the provisions of any regulations made under this Ordinance, he may grant a search warrant, and a warrant so granted shall authorize the police officer or person named therein to enter and inspect the station, place or ship or aircraft, and to seize any apparatus which appears to him to be used or intended to be used for wireless telegraphy therein.

Power to issue search warrant.

4. (1) The Governor in Council may make regulations

Power of Governor in Council to make Regulations and prescribe fees.

- (a) prescribing the form and manner in which applications for licences under this Ordinance are to be made and the fees payable on the grant or renewal of any such licence :
- (b) requiring any operators or other persons engaged in the working of wireless telegraphy to be provided with certificates and making provision as to the manner and the conditions of the issue and renewal of such certificate, including examination and tests to be undergone.
- (c) as to the working of any apparatus for wireless telegraphy installed in ships and aircraft not registered in the Colony while such ships are in any harbour or the territorial waters of the Colony, and such aircraft are upon or over the territory or territorial waters of the Colony.
- (d) for giving effect to the provisions of any international convention to which the Government of the Colony has acceded and any regulation made thereunder so far as the same relate to wireless telegraphy.
- (e) generally for more effectually carrying into effect any of the purposes or provisions of this Ordinance.

(2) Any person acting in contravention of, or failing to comply with a regulation made under this Section, shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or both penalties, and in the case of a continued offence, a further fine not exceeding five pounds for each day during which the offence continued. He shall further be liable to forfeit any apparatus for wireless telegraphy in respect of which the offence is committed.

5. (1) Any person who:—

Penalties for improper use of wireless signalling and disclosure of messages.

- (a) sends or attempts to send by wireless telegraphy a signal of distress or a false or misleading message as to a vessel in distress ; or

- (b) improperly divulges the purport of any message sent or proposed to be sent by wireless telegraphy ; shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both penalties.

(2) Any person convicted of an offence under this Section shall further be liable to forfeit any licence granted under this Ordinance and any apparatus by means of which the offence was committed.

Emergency Control.

6. If at any time in the opinion of the Governor an emergency has arisen in which it is expedient for the public service that His Majesty's Government should have control over the transmission of messages by wireless telegraphy it shall be lawful for the Colonial Postmaster with the approval of the Governor or any other person authorized in that behalf by the Governor to take possession forthwith of any apparatus for any such purposes, and, during the continuance of the emergency, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to make such further rules as appear necessary with respect to the possession, sale, purchase, construction and use of apparatus for any such purpose or component parts of such apparatus.

Any person acting in contravention of any such regulation shall be liable on conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or both penalties.

Application of Ordinance.

7. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Repeal.

8. Ordinance No. 3 of 1912, "An Ordinance relating to Wireless Telegraphy," is hereby repealed.

An Ordinance

To regulate the Importation, Exportation, Manufacture, Sale and use of Opium and other dangerous Drugs.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :— Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, 1925." Short Title.

2. In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires the expression— Definitions.

"Raw opium" means the spontaneously coagulated juice obtained from the capsules of the *Papaver somniferum* L., which has only been submitted to the necessary manipulations for packing and transport, whatever its content of morphine.

"Prepared opium" means opium prepared for smoking and includes dross and any other residues remaining after opium has been smoked.

"Medicinal opium" means raw opium which has undergone the processes necessary to adapt it for medicinal use in accordance with the requirements of the British pharmacopœia, whether in powder form or granulated or otherwise, or mixed with neutral materials.

"Morphine" means the principal alkaloid of opium having the chemical formula $C_{17}H_{19}NO_3$.

"Diacetylmorphine" means diacetylmorphine (diamorphine, heroin) having the formula $C_{21}H_{23}NO_5$

"Coca leaf" means the leaf of the *Erythroxylon Coca Lamarck* and the *Erythroxylon novo-granatense* (Morris) Hieronymus and their varieties, belonging to the family of Erythroxylaceæ and the leaf of other species of this genus from which it may be found possible to extract cocaine either directly or by chemical transformation.

"Crude cocaine" means any extract of the coca leaf which can be used directly or indirectly for the manufacture of cocaine.

"Cocaine" means methyl-benzoyl lævo-ecgonine ($[\alpha] D_{20}^{\circ} = -16^{\circ} 4$) in 20 per cent solution of chloroform, of which the formula is $C_{17}H_{21}NO_4$.

"Ecgonine" means lævo-ecgonine ($[\alpha] D_{20}^{\circ} = -45^{\circ} 6$ in 5 per cent solution of water) of which the formula is $C_9H_{15}NO_3 \cdot H_2O$, and all other derivatives of lævo-ecgonine which might serve industrially for its recovery.

"Indian Hemp" means the dried flowering or fruiting tops of the pistillate plant *Cannabis sativa* L. from which the resin has not been extracted, under whatever name they may be designated.

"Corresponding law" means any law stated in a certificate purporting to be issued by or on behalf of the government of any country outside the Colony to be a law providing for the control and regulation in that country of the manufacture, sale, use, export and import of drugs in accordance with the provisions of the Dangerous Drugs Convention Protocol and Final Act signed at Geneva on the nineteenth day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty-five, and any statement in any such certificate as to the effect of the law mentioned in the certificate, or any statement in any such certificate that any facts constitute an offence against that law, shall be conclusive.

PART I.

RAW OPIUM, PREPARED OPIUM, INDIAN HEMP.

Prohibition of cultivation of opium poppy and *Cannabis sativa*.

3. It shall not be lawful for any person to cultivate the the opium poppy *Papaver somniferum* or the plant *Cannabis sativa* in the Colony.

Prohibition of importation of opium and resin of *Cannabis sativa*.

4. It shall not be lawful for any person to import or to bring into the Colony or to export from the Colony any raw opium or resin of the plant *Cannabis sativa*.

Penalties for dealing in opium and resin of *Cannabis sativa*.

5. If any person

- (a) sells or otherwise deals in raw opium, or resin of the plant *Cannabis sativa*; or
- (b) manufactures, sells, or otherwise deals in prepared opium; or
- (c) has in his possession any raw opium or prepared opium or resin of the plant *Cannabis sativa* or the whole or any portion of the said plant (excluding its medical preparations)

he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

PART II.

COCAINE, MORPHINE, ETC.

6. (1) The drugs to which this part of this Ordinance applies are

Drugs to which
Part II. applies.

- (a) Medicinal opium.
- (b) Crude cocaine and ecgonine.
- (c) Morphine, diacetylmorphine, cocaine and their respective salts.
- (d) All preparations, official or non-official (including the so called anti-opium remedies) containing more than 0.2 per cent of morphine, or more than 0.1 per cent of cocaine.
- (e) All preparations containing diacetylmorphine.
- (f) Galenical preparations (extract and tincture) of Indian Hemp.

(2) If it appears to the Governor in Council that any new derivative of morphine or cocaine, or of any salts of morphine or cocaine, or any other alkaloid of opium, or any other drug of whatever kind is or is likely to be productive, if improperly used, of ill effects substantially of the same character or nature as or analagous to those produced by morphine or cocaine, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation declare that this Part of this Ordinance shall apply to that new derivative or alkaloid or other drug in the same manner as it applies to the drugs mentioned in subsection (1) of this section.

(3) In the event of the Health Committee of the League of Nations finding that any preparations containing any of the narcotic drugs to which the provisions of this Part of this Ordinance applies, cannot give rise to the drug habit on account of the medicaments with which the said drugs are compounded, the Governor in Council may by Proclamation declare that such preparations shall be excluded from the provisions of this Part of this Ordinance.

7. It shall not be lawful for any person to import or bring into or to export from the Colony any drugs to which this Part of this Ordinance applies except under licence.

Restriction on import
and export of cocaine,
&c.

8. It shall not be lawful for any person to carry on any process in the manufacture of any drug to which this Part of this Ordinance applies.

Prohibition of
manufacture of
cocaine, &c.

9. It shall not be lawful to supply or procure or offer to supply or procure any drug to which this part of this Ordinance applies to or for any person in this Colony or elsewhere.

Restriction on sale and
distribution of cocaine,
&c.

Provided that administration of the drugs by or under the direct personal supervision of a Medical Practitioner, registered under the Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists Ordinance, 1914, or by or under the direct personal supervision of a Dentist, registered under the aforesaid Ordinance, in dental treatment or by or under the direct personal supervision of a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon in the treatment of any animal, shall not be deemed to be supplying the drug within the meaning of this section.

GENERAL.

10. It shall not be lawful to tranship or to convey from any vessel, ship, boat or lighter to another vessel, ship, boat or lighter in any harbour of the Colony or in the territorial waters thereof any drug to which this Ordinance applies.

Prohibition of
transhipment.

Provided that this section shall not apply to any drugs imported into the Colony under a licence granted in accordance with this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder.

Powers of search.

11. If a Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace is satisfied by information on oath that there is reasonable ground for suspecting that any drugs to which this Ordinance applies are, in contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance or any regulations made thereunder, in the possession or under the control of any person in any premises, or that any document directly or indirectly relating to or connected with any transaction or dealing which was, or any intended transaction or dealing which would if carried out be, an offence against this Ordinance, or in the case of a transaction or dealing carried out or intended to be carried out in any place outside the Colony, an offence against the provisions of any corresponding law in force in that place, is in the possession, or under the control of any person in any premises, he may grant a search warrant authorising any constable named in the warrant, at any time or times within one month from the date of the warrant, to enter, if need be by force, the premises named in the warrant, and to search the premises and any persons found therein, and, if there is reasonable ground for suspecting that an offence against this Ordinance has been committed in relation to any such drugs which may be found in the premises or in the possession of any such persons, or that any document which may be so found is such a document as aforesaid, to seize and detain those drugs or that document, as the case may be.

Offences and penalties.

12. (1) Any person

- (a) who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with any regulation made under this Ordinance ; or
- (b) who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, the conditions of any licence issued or authority granted under or in pursuance of this Ordinance ; or
- (c) who for the purpose of obtaining, whether for himself or for any other person, the issue, grant or renewal, of any such licence or authority as aforesaid, makes any declaration or statement which is false in any particular, or knowingly utters, produces or makes use of any such declaration or statement or any document containing the same ; or
- (d) who in the Colony, aids, abets, counsels or procures the commission in any place outside the Colony of any offence punishable under the provisions of any corresponding law in force in that place, or does any act preparatory to, or in furtherance of, any act which if committed in the Colony would constitute an offence against this Ordinance ;

shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

(2) Every person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance shall, in respect of each offence, be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand pounds, or to penal servitude for a period not exceeding ten years, or to both such fine and penal servitude and shall, in every case on conviction for the offence forfeit to His Majesty all articles in respect of which the offence was committed, and the court before which the offender was convicted may order any forfeited articles to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the court thinks fit.

(3) If any person attempts to commit an offence against this Ordinance, or solicits or incites another person to commit such an offence, he shall, without prejudice to any other liability, be liable on conviction to the same punishment and forfeiture as if he had committed an offence under this Ordinance.

(4) Where a person convicted of an offence under this Ordinance is a company, the chairman and every director and every officer concerned in the management of the company shall be guilty of the like offence unless he proves that the act constituting the offence took place without his knowledge or consent.

13. Offences under this Ordinance or under any regulations made thereunder may be prosecuted and penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance, or any regulations made thereunder, may be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner or by action in the Supreme Court of the Colony together with full costs of suit ;

Prosecution of offences.

Provided that any penalty imposed by a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace shall not exceed One Hundred Pounds, exclusive of costs, and imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

14. In any proceedings against any person for an offence against this Ordinance it is not necessary to negative by evidence any licence, authority or other matter of exception or defence, and the burden of proving any such matter lies on the person seeking to avail himself thereof.

Onus of proof.

15. Any constable may arrest without warrant any person who has committed, or attempted to commit, or is reasonably suspected by the constable of having committed or attempted to commit, an offence against this Ordinance, if he has reasonable ground for believing that that person will abscond unless arrested, or if the name and address of that person are unknown to and cannot be ascertained by him.

Power of arrest.

16. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council to make regulations

Regulations.

(a) For carrying into effect the purposes of this Ordinance.

(b) For the supply and distribution of drugs outside the limits of the Town of Stanley under the supervision of a Medical Practitioner registered under the Medical Practitioners, Midwives and Dentists Ordinance, 1914.

17. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Application of Ordinance.

18. The Opium Ordinance, 1913, is hereby repealed.

Repeal.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1926.

A Bill

To repeal and replace Ordinance No. 2 of 1903 as amended by Ordinance No. 7 of 1913 relating to Patents for Inventions, registration of Designs, and of Trade Marks.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Registration of United Kingdom Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Ordinance, 1926."

Short Title.

2. Any person being the grantee of a patent or of a certificate of registration of any design or of any trade mark in the United Kingdom or any person deriving his right from such grantee by assignment, transmission or other operation of law may apply within three years from the date of issue of the patent or certificate of registration to have such patent or certificate of registration registered in the Colony. Where any partial assignment or transmission has been made, all proper parties shall be joined in the application of registration.

To whom certificates of registration may be granted.

Procedure.

3. Every application for the grant of letters patent or for the registration of a design or trade mark under this Ordinance shall be addressed to the Registrar-General, and there shall be transmitted with such application

(1) A certificate of the Comptroller-General of the United Kingdom Patent Office giving full particulars of the issue of the patent or the registration of the design or trade mark.

(2) Two certified copies of the complete specification (including the drawings if any) in relation to any patent.

(3) Two certified representations of the design or trade mark.

(4) An affidavit that the applicant is the assignee in respect of this Colony of the registered proprietor of the patent, design or trade mark in the United Kingdom.

(5) A fee of one pound.

Issue of certificates of registration.

4. Upon such application being received, together with the documents mentioned in Section 3 of this Ordinance, the Registrar-General shall issue a certificate of registration.

Privileges and rights conferred.

5. Such certificate of registration shall confer on the applicant privileges and rights subject to all conditions established by the law of this Colony as though the patent or certificate of registration had been issued in the United Kingdom with an extension to the Colony.

Certificates of registration in Colony to remain in force concurrently with certificates of registration in United Kingdom.

6. Privileges and rights so granted shall date from the date of the patent or certificate of registration in the United Kingdom and shall continue in force only so long as the patent or certificate of registration remains in force in the United Kingdom.

Provided that no action for infringement shall be entertained in respect of any manufacture, use or sale of the invention, design or trade mark prior to the date of issue of the certificate of registration in the Colony.

Supreme Court to afford all relief.

7. The Supreme Court shall have power, subject to the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Acts, for the time being in force in the United Kingdom, to grant, either absolutely or on such terms and conditions as shall seem just, all such remedies as either party may appear to be entitled to in respect of either claim to or defence of any right, title or interest in relation to any registration in force in this Colony under a certificate granted under this Ordinance.

Amendment of specification or drawings.

8. Whenever the specifications or drawings of a United Kingdom patent registered in this Colony has been amended by way of disclaimer, correction or explanation, according to the law of the United Kingdom, a request, accompanied by a copy of the specification and drawings (if any) as amended, duly certified by the Comptroller-General of the United Kingdom Patent Office, may be made to the Registrar to substitute a copy of the specification and drawings as amended, for the specification and drawings originally filed.

Registration of assignment.

9. Where a person becomes entitled by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law to the privileges and rights conferred by a certificate of registration or to any interest therein, he may make application in the prescribed manner to the Registrar-General for the entry on the Register of such assignment, transmission, or other instrument affecting the title, or giving an interest therein.

10. The Registrar may make such general rules and do such things as he may think expedient, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, for regulating procedure under this Ordinance. Registrar to make rules regulating procedure.

11. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to affect rights of action against any person for passing off goods as those of another person or the remedies in respect thereof.

12. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony and shall come into operation on the day of , 19 . Application to Dependencies and date of commencement

13. The Patents Ordinance, 1903, and the Patents Amendment Ordinance, 1913, are hereby repealed. Repeal.

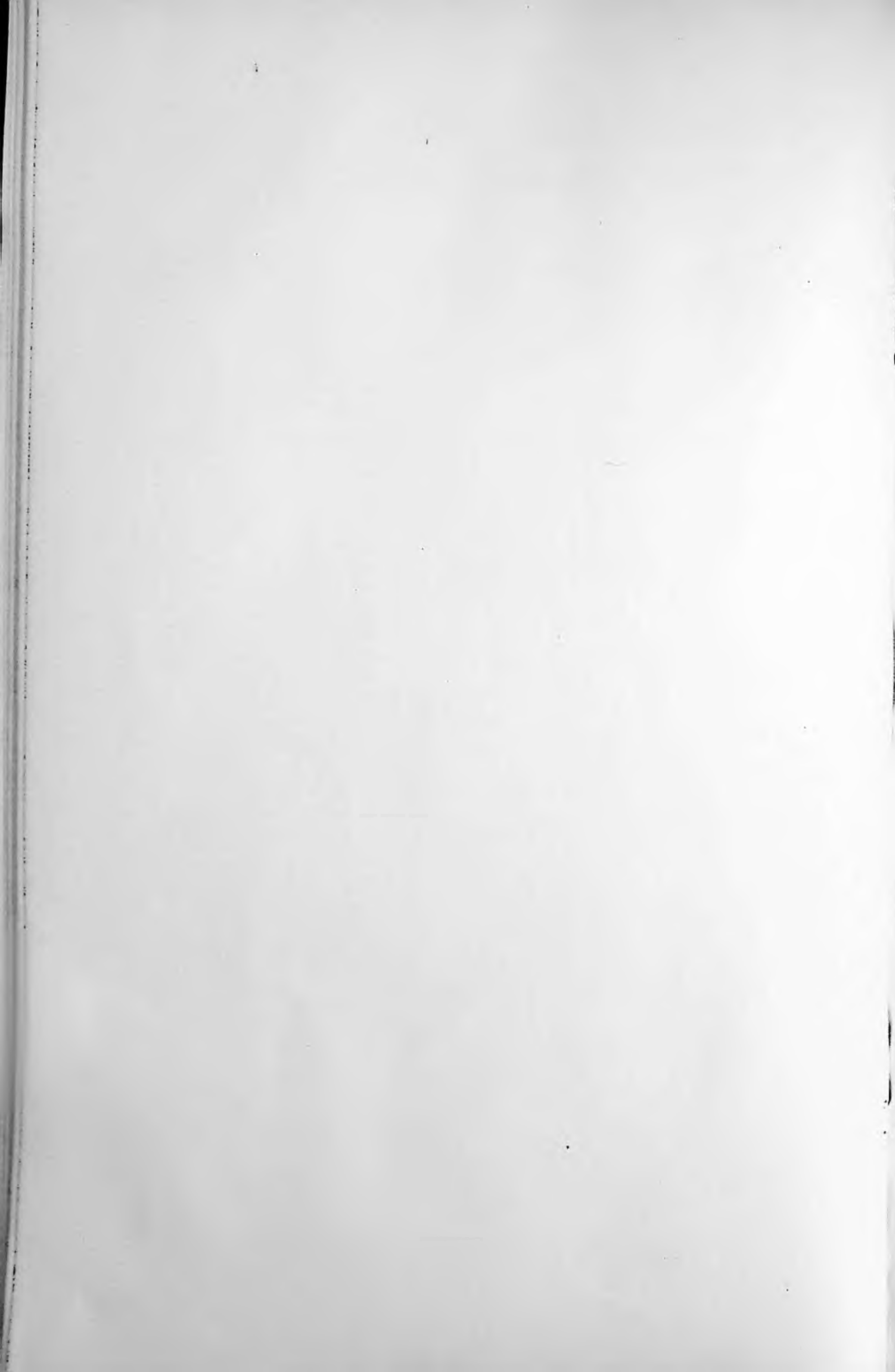

In accordance with the provisions of Section 13 of the Savings Bank Ordinance, 1888, I have the honour to submit the following report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank, in respect of the period 1st of October, 1924, to the 30th of September, 1925.

Summary of Transactions.

(Enclosure 1).

2. During the year there were 767 deposits as against 334 withdrawals. The average monthly deposits amounted to £2,273 : 11 : 3, as against average monthly withdrawals of £2,302 : 8 : 1.

3. During the year 78 new accounts were opened, 38 accounts were closed, leaving 874 deposit accounts at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor equalled a sum of £140 : 3 : 7, or about £50 per head of the population. A monthly summary of the transactions of the bank is appended hereto.

4. The accrued interest credited to the various accounts during the year amounts to £2,782 : 12 : 6. The Deposits during the year, with accrued interest, (£30,065 : 7 : 5), exceeded the Withdrawals, (£27,628 : 16 : 8), by a sum of £2,436 : 10 : 9, leaving a balance to the credit of the depositors on the 30th September, 1925, of £122,517 : 4 : 9.

Sir,

I beg to submit for the information of His Excellency the Governor my report for the year 1924—1925 :—

I regret that I should have to report that a number of Stock returns were very late in coming to hand this year.

Mr. Hugh Munro in his report on his investigations into the sheep farming industry of the Falkland Islands dealt fully with all important matters in connection with the industry. So well has his report been appreciated by all those who are interested that I will not call attention to any matters mentioned therein more than is necessary. Managers are already endeavouring to carry out many of the suggestions put forward by Mr. Munro.

Very valuable and important analytical work has been done by the Rowett Institute of Aberdeen, and the results obtained from the investigations made by the Institute will enable owners and managers to be guided to a great extent in their system of farming.

It is to be regretted that the stock carrying capacity of the Colony has been steadily on the decrease for a great many years, but I am sure all Falkland Islands farm owners and managers realize that the time has arrived when a united effort will have to be made to improve farming conditions generally.

The experimental farm which the Government has decided to establish at Anson will provide the means by which owners and managers can follow experiments carried out under a variety of conditions and can note the results acquired on land similar to the particular land in which they are interested.

Sheep.

The season has not been a favourable one for sheep and the heavy snow storms and frosts have accounted for quite a number. Considering the bad weather conditions with which the sheep have had to contend, their health and condition are fairly good.

Sheep have been imported from Tierra del Feugo into the Colony and these sheep should help considerably in beneficially changing the blood in the flock on the station for which they were imported. The imported sheep appear to be doing very well and although down a little in condition they are more robust than the sheep bred in the Falkland Islands on the same station.

The introduction of changes of blood into the flocks from one or two of the stations in Tierra del Fuego would be beneficial on a number of stations here but unfortunately there are extremely few stations in South America which grow a suitable class of wool and are entirely free from sheep scab, and the importations from most of the stations there would be attended with grave risks of importing sheep scab into the Colony. It is essential that a better type of sheep should be introduced into the Colony but the greatest difficulty with which a manager has to contend is the cost of importation. When ways and means are found by which a better class of sheep can be established the class and weight of wool and also the carcass here will be considerably improved.*

Lambing percentages have been very low for a great many years and no doubt this may be attributed to one or more of the causes referred to by Mr. Munro on page 18 of his report.

On a number of the stations owners and managers have cut down the number of sheep. This is no doubt a very wise move and the results gained by this move will be appreciated in the course of a few years.

* Arrangements have been made for the importation of 353 rams and ewes from New Zealand in April, 1926.

Disease.

There was an outbreak of scab on one of the smaller islands early last year. Every precaution was taken to eradicate and stop the disease spreading to the mainland. Although there is every reason to believe that the disease is eradicated care is being taken to ensure the safety of the flocks on the mainland. A certain amount of blindness has been reported this year but the disease has not been attended by serious results to the flocks.

Cattle.

There has been very little change in the quality or numbers of cattle carried for the past season. The general health of the cattle is good but a great many of them have suffered considerably on account of the bad season. A few of the station owners and managers intend importing a number of cattle from the United Kingdom and the imported stock should do a lot towards improving the breed of cattle on those particular stations.

Horses.

The numbers of horses in the Colony have increased from 2847 to 3188. 524 horses were imported from South America. The majority of these horses were of fairly good type for camp work and since arriving in the Colony they have remained in fairly good health and condition. It is unfortunate that large numbers of horses have to be imported periodically, but as it is difficult under the present conditions to breed horses in the Colony satisfactorily, the importations are necessary.

An attempt should be made on all stations to grow a certain amount of food for winter use for horses ; there is no doubt that this can be done. If horses can be fed properly for a month or two in winter fewer horses will be necessary for the working of the stations.

KNOW YE THEREFORE that reposing great trust and confidence in your zeal, industry, discretion and integrity We do by these Presents authorize and appoint you to make a diligent and full enquiry into the causes which led to and into the facts and circumstances incident to the aforesaid deficiency and We do by these Presents give and grant to you full power and authority to call before you any such persons, being in the Colony, as you shall judge necessary for the purpose of making the aforesaid enquiry and also to call for and have access to, and require the production before you of all official and other books, documents, papers and records as you may deem expedient and to examine witnesses on oath or otherwise and that within two months after the date of this Commission, you do certify to Us under your hands your several proceedings and your opinion on the premises ; and this Commission shall continue in full force, although the proceedings thereunder shall not be continued by adjournment from time to time, and you may, from time to time, if you shall see fit without waiting for your full and complete report, certify your several proceedings as the same shall be respectively perfected ; and We hereby command all Government officers and other persons whomsoever, within the Colony, that they be assistant to you, and each of you in the execution of these Presents and We appoint you The Honourable Lieutenant-Colonel Alexander Elder Beattie, Colonial Secretary, to be Chairman of this Commission and We do give power, at your discretion, to procure such clerical or other assistance as may be absolutely necessary for enabling you duly to execute this Commission.

AND any person examined as a witness by you who in your opinion, makes a full and true disclosure touching all matters in respect of which he is examined may receive a certificate under the hand of the Chairman stating that the witness has upon his examination made a full and true disclosure as aforesaid and no criminal proceedings shall at any time thereafter be instituted against such witness, to whom a certificate as aforesaid has been granted, in respect of any matter touching which he has been so examined.

HUMBLY SHEWETH

1. Your Petitioner on behalf of Michael Murphy, minor, applies to be registered as the owner in fee simple of one half the land in Stanley numbered and marked (88A) with all buildings etc. thereon which land and buildings is now in the hands of Messrs. Louis Williams Estate, Stanley.

2. The Claim of your Petitioner is based on the following facts:—

(1) By Deed of Conveyance of the 15th March 1865 the premises aforementioned were transferred to Catherine Carey and her heirs in trust for her two children Thomas Carey, born in 1861, and Michael Murphy, born in 1862.

(2) Catherine Carey was merely a Trustee for her two children Thomas Carey and Michael Murphy and had herself no beneficial interest whatever in the property.

(3) Thomas Carey died an infant and unmarried in 1877 and the claim of Your Petitioner is for the share of the property which devolved upon Michael Murphy and his successors upon the death of Catherine Carey.

(4) Michael Murphy died intestate in 1893 and his half share in the premises devolved upon his eldest son David Murphy, father of the Michael Murphy, minor, on whose behalf this claim is now submitted.

(5) Catherine Carey some time after 1865 married Charles Williams and with him resided in the house on the premises. Thomas Carey until his death in infancy, and Michael Murphy during infancy, resided with them and thus had the benefit of their interest in the property.

(6) Catherine Williams died intestate in 1884 having had issue by Charles Williams, four daughters and two sons, the eldest of the sons being Louis Williams.

(7) Charles Williams continued in occupation of the property until his death in 1907 when by his Will, dated 23rd December 1896, he bequeathed these premises amongst other property to his own children by Catherine Williams, ignoring the fact that the heirs of Michael Murphy were entitled to the one half of the property which is now the subject of the Claim of your Petitioner.

3. Your Petitioner also prays that Your Honour will grant such award as may seem meet from the profits derived from the half share of the property claimed, which has been successively in the possession of Charles Williams and Louis Williams (his eldest son, referred to in para. 2 Section 6) and is now in the hands of the Estate Louis Williams of Stanley.

WHEREFORE Your Petitioner prays that Your Honour will be pleased to make a Decree Nisi for the issue of a title to Michael Murphy, minor, of one half the land in question together with the buildings etc. thereon, and that Your Honour will grant Your Petitioner such further relief in the premises as to Your Honour may seem meet, and as in duty bound Your Petitioner will ever pray.

MEMORANDUM.

IMPORT INTO AND EXPORT FROM GREAT BRITAIN OR NORTHERN IRELAND OF FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION BY HOLDERS OF FIREARM CERTIFICATES.

1. The following arrangements have been made with effect from 1st January, 1926, regarding the import and export of firearms and ammunition by holders of Firearm Certificates issued to them by the Police Authorities in Great Britain or Northern Ireland under Section 1 (1) of the Firearms Act, 1920 :—

2. A holder of a valid Firearm Certificate may take with him out of Great Britain or Northern Ireland or bring back with him into Great Britain or Northern Ireland, the firearms and ammunition which the Firearm Certificate entitles him to hold in Great Britain or

Northern Ireland, provided that the Firearm Certificate is produced by him with the firearms and ammunition to the Customs Authorities at the port of departure at the time of export and at the port of entry at the time of import. No Licence will be required by the holder of the Firearm Certificate in such a case.

3. Import and export under the above arrangements will only be permitted if the following conditions are complied with :—

- (a) The firearms and ammunition must be covered by the Firearm Certificate. A Licence will be necessary in respect of any firearm and ammunition not covered by the Firearm Certificate ;
- (b) The Firearm Certificate must be valid. An out of date Firearm Certificate will not be accepted ; [Firearm Certificates are valid for 3 years only in Great Britain and for one year only in Northern Ireland.]
- (c) The firearms and ammunition must be carried by the owner. If they are carried by any person other than the owner, *e.g.*, by a relative of the owner or by a firm of forwarding agents, a Licence and not a Firearm Certificate must be produced to the Customs Authorities.
- (d) The Firearm Certificate must be produced to the Customs Authorities by the holder at the time of arrival or departure together with the firearms and ammunition covered by the Certificate in order that they can be checked against it by the Customs Authorities.

4. Smooth bore Shot Guns and Ammunition therefor. Although not necessary in Great Britain, a Firearm Certificate is required to authorise the possession of smooth bore shot guns and shot cartridges in Northern Ireland.

Smooth bore shot guns and ammunition therefor may only be exported to the following destinations under Board of Trade Licences [except in the case of shot guns and shot cartridges which are included on Firearm Certificates issued by the authorities in Northern Ireland. These cases will come under the provision set out in paragraphs 2 and 3 above] :—

- (a) The whole of the Continent of Africa, with the exception of Algeria, Libya and the Union of South Africa (within this area are included all islands situated within a hundred nautical miles of the coast, together with Prince's Island, St. Thomas Island, and the Islands of Annobon and Socotra).
- (b) Transcaucasia, Persia, Gwadar, the Arabian Peninsula, and such continental parts of Asia as were included in the Turkish Empire on August 4th, 1914.
- (c) A maritime zone including the Red Sea, the Gulf of Aden, the Persian Gulf and the Sea of Oman and bounded by a line drawn from Cape Guardafui following the latitude of that Cape to its intersection with longitude 57° east of Greenwich, and proceeding thence direct to the eastern frontier of Persia on the Gulf of Oman.

5. Holders of Firearm Certificates desirous of taking their firearms and ammunition abroad are warned that there are restrictions on the importation of certain goods into some countries and that they must comply with the regulations (if any) in force in the country of destination. The importation into India of rifles of .303 or .450 bore and of pistols and revolvers of calibre between .441 and .455, inclusive, is prohibited and inquiries in regard to this prohibition should be addressed to the High Commissioner for India, 42, Grosvenor Gardens, S.W. 1.

6. Applications for Firearm Certificates and Import and Export Licences.

- (a) Firearm Certificates. Applications should be addressed in the case of Great Britain to the police authorities nearest the applicant's residence and in the case of Northern Ireland to the Inspector-General, Royal Ulster Constabulary, Atlantic Buildings, Waring Street, Belfast.
- (b) Licences. Applications for Import and Export Licences should be addressed to the Imports and Exports Licensing Section, Board of Trade, Great George Street, London, S.W. 1, except in the case of Imports into Northern Ireland, in which case applications should be addressed to the Inspector-General, Royal Ulster Constabulary, Atlantic Buildings, Waring Street, Belfast.

2. The total revenue collected from all sources during the year, exclusive of transfers, amounted to £240,548 : 2 : 9, as described below, *viz*:—

4. The Colony's total expenditure for the year exceeded the revenue by £14,917 : 2 : 5, thereby reducing the Surplus Balances from £550,575 : 7 : 0, to £535,658 : 4 : 7.

Falkland Islands Accounts.

6. The Ordinary Revenue collected in the Falklands, as distinct from Dependencies' Revenue, and exclusive of £9,000, transferred thereto, amounted to £40,783 : 4 : 11. It exceeded the Ordinary Expenditure for the year by a sum of £3,716 : 17 : 0.

7. The total expenditure for the Falklands, exclusive of disbursements from the Land Sales Fund, amounted to £57,999 : 15 : 3 of which £49,783 : 4 : 11 was met from the Ordinary Revenue for the year, leaving a sum of £8,216 : 10 : 4, to be met from Surplus Balances. In consequence of which the balance standing to the credit of the Falkland Islands, in the General Account, was reduced from £46,394 : 13 : 6, to £38,178 : 3 : 2.

The Land Sales Fund.

8. During the year a sum of £7,121 : 12 : 7 was collected in respect of the sale of Country and Town Lands. Disbursements from the Land Sales Fund during the year, in connection with "Stock Investigation" and the Experimental Farm at Anson, amounted to £3,330 : 2 : 1.

9. The income credited to the Fund during the year exceeded the disbursements made therefrom by £3,791 : 10 : 6, and in consequence the balance standing to the credit of the Fund was increased from £188,276 : 1 : 9 to £192,067 : 12 : 3.

The Marine Insurance Fund.

10. During the year the usual sum of £606, when charged as Falklands Expenditure, was transferred to the credit of the Marine Insurance Fund, and the Fund was thereby increased from £818 to £1,424.

Dependencies' Accounts.

11. The Ordinary Revenue collected in the Dependencies, exclusive of the Research and Development Fund and the "Discovery" Pension Fund, amounted during the year to £180,098 : 4 : 3. It exceeded Dependencies' General Expenditure for the year by £102,169 : 16 : 6.

12. During the year a sum of £99,608 : 10 : 5 was entered as a Charge on Dependencies' Revenue when transferred to the credit of the Research and Development Fund. This amount, together with the sum of £2,561 : 6 : 1 overpaid to the credit of the Fund in the previous year, amounts to £102,169 : 16 : 6, and represents the amount authorised under the provisions of Section 3 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1924, to be so dealt with.

Dependencies Research & Development Fund.

13. The income derived from the securities and monies held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Research and Development Fund amounted to £12,393 : 3 : 0. This amount, together with the sum of £99,608 : 10 : 5, transferred thereto from Dependencies' Funds, makes a total of £112,001 : 13 : 5, and represents the total amount credited to the Fund during the year.

14. The disbursements made by the Crown Agents under the provisions of Section 4 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1924, amounted to £125,813 : 0 : 1, and includes a sum of £94,240 : 16 : 7, expended on behalf of the "Discovery" Committee. The "Discovery" Committee accounts are not embodied by the Treasurer in his accounts.

15. The disbursements from the Fund exceeded the receipts by a sum of £13,811 : 6 : 8, in consequence of which the balance standing to the credit of the Research and Development Fund was reduced from £316,639 : 11 : 0, to £302,828 : 4 : 4.

Dependencies "Discovery" Pension Fund.

16. During the year a sum of £151 : 18 : 0, was credited by the Crown Agents to the "Discovery" Pension Fund, and the Fund was thereby increased from £1,008 : 6 : 10 to £1,160 : 4 : 10.

Refund of Export Duties.

17. During the year a sum of £169,938 : 5 : 6, was collected in the Dependencies by way of Export Duties, under the provisions of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, in respect of which a sum of £51,158 : 7 : 8, was refunded during the year under the provisions of No. 7 of 1924.

General.

18. The following is a list of the returns and statements appended hereto, that it is at present possible to prepare from the Principal Books of Account kept personally by the Treasurer, viz:—

Report on Education in the Colony for the year 1925.

General.

The educational facilities available in the Falkland Islands fall, in view of the peculiar local conditions, into three groups :—

1. Those at Stanley, the only township in the Colony.
2. Those at Darwin, the Falkland Islands Company's main camp settlement.
3. Those in the outside country districts with their very scattered farm settlements.

STANLEY : There are two schools in Stanley. A Government School is maintained from public funds, and whilst being elementary in character, is now making provision for attendance at a Continuation Class for a two years' course of further education. Under a scheme instituted in 1924, this School now caters also for children from the "Camps" or country districts, whose parents are willing to send them to Stanley to be educated. These camp children are either boarded and lodged in a Government Hostel, and taught in the School at an inclusive charge of £1 a month during residence, or if boarded in private houses, the Government contributes two-thirds of the cost not exceeding £2 a month.

There is also a Convent School managed by Roman Catholic Sisters; this School, however, is not subject to Government control, and receives no subsidy.

DARWIN : Here for many years past, the Falkland Islands Company has maintained, in the interest of its employees, a small school with a resident certificated master.

CAMP DISTRICTS : Two travelling teachers are provided by Government—one for the East and one for the West Falkland. These teachers travel from settlement to settlement devoting a certain amount of time to each. The Falkland Islands Company, also, supports two Camp Teachers for the children of their employees in outlying districts.

4. The attendance for the first half of the year, and consequently the general progress of work, was seriously affected by an epidemic of mumps; this was followed by an outbreak of measles which necessitated the School being closed for nine weeks. It is satisfactory to be able to state, however, that the attendance figures for the latter part of the year were exceptionally good, and during the last twelve weeks the percentage of attendance never fell below 93, and averaged 94.8.

5. Periodical visits were paid to the School by the Colonial Surgeon, who in his Annual Report records that the children were found clean and well cared for.

6. Great improvement was made in the main school building by the erection of a wall across the central hall, which was thus converted into two large class rooms. Casement windows were fixed in two of the rooms with resulting improvement in light and ventilation: it is hoped in the near future to convert many of the other windows to this type. The paths at the east and west ends of the main building, and the terrace in front have been cemented with very satisfactory results, particularly in view of local climatic conditions.

8. My arrival in the Colony in November only did not permit of my paying but one short informal visit to the School before the end of the year under report. For this reason, I am unable on this occasion to make any observations of any value on the work or progress of the School. I was, however, not unfavourably impressed by the general tone which appeared to prevail. In the absence of a report on my part, I cannot do better than quote from one submitted by Mr. A. R. Hoare, the Headmaster :

"All the members of the assistant staff worked hard, and it was through no fault of theirs that the tests and examinations during and at the end of the year showed results which in happier circumstances would have been disappointing. In some respects the results were up to a first-rate standard. The work produced by the Infants in the rudiments of number, reading and script, and also their recreative work and games, reflect high credit on the locally trained assistant teacher in charge. Some subjects are less unsuitable than others to be taught to large and heterogeneous groups of pupils. The standard reached in history in the three top groups (Continuation Class, Standard 4-7, Standards 3-2) was very good, and in geography was up to normal. The singing was probably better than it has ever been. But in some other matters, as e.g. English composition and arithmetic, where the members of the group should be about the same stage of capacity and where individual attention is indispensable, the standard of attainment left much to be desired. Discipline was good ; there was nothing whatever in the nature of serious trouble, but inattention and carelessness were too prevalent, as is inevitable when classes have to be left in charge of young and unqualified teachers without constant supervision."

9. The working during the year of the main features of the new scheme instituted in 1924, of which details are given in the Report for that year, *viz.*, the introduction of a Continuation Class, and the provision of facilities for Camp children to receive part at least of their education in Stanley, call for some special reference. With regard to the former, the Headmaster writes—

“The Continuation Class had different teachers for different subjects, the work being shared between the two Assistant Mistresses and myself. The small number in the class enables a good deal of individual attention to be given, the good results of which are obvious. It is never grouped with another class except for physical training, drawing and sewing. As a rule there will probably be not more than about a dozen pupils in the class, but I consider the establishment of it has been a great educational benefit to the Colony.”

The Government Hostel for children from country districts has fully justified its provision: there were eight or nine children in residence most of the year. In addition the number of outside boarders, hailing from the country districts, varied from ten to thirteen—about double the number in 1924.

Travelling Teachers.

10. There was only one Government Travelling Teacher available during the year, and he had to confine himself to duties in the East Falkland. He had 28 children under tuition and from reports submitted and samples of work sent in, it appears that his pupils have made as satisfactory progress as circumstances will permit.

11. The Travelling Teacher employed for several years on the West Falkland left in January, 1925; and a successor could not be procured until after the end of the year.

12. The Headmaster of the Government School was unavoidably prevented from making his annual tour of inspection of the country districts during 1925.

SUBORDINATE MEDICAL AND SANITARY STAFF.—One Inspector of Nuisances.

CLERICAL STAFF.—One.

The qualified staff consists of :—

- (1) The Colonial Surgeon.
- (2) The Assistant Colonial Surgeon.
- (3) The Colonial Dental Surgeon.

All patients admitted into the General Wards of the Hospital are under the sole charge of the Colonial Surgeon.

The Assistant Colonial Surgeon's term of Office expired on the 4th November, 1925.

The Colonial Dental Surgeon's appointment terminated on the 5th June, 1925.

II. Public Health.

The general health of officials was good ; none were invalid, none died.

GENERAL DISEASES. Rare as usual.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES. Insect borne—none.

INFECTIOUS & EPIDEMIC DISEASES. Whooping Cough, Mumps, Scarletina and Measles. These cases were imported from Punta Arenas.

The Assistant Colonial Surgeon who was acting as Officer-in-charge of the Medical Department reports on the outbreak of measles as follows :—

“An outbreak of measles occurred in Stanley in June, 1925, and despite all precautions the disease rapidly spread. Towards the end of June it became necessary to open an Isolation Hospital and the Government Nurse was placed there in charge. The total number of cases notified in Stanley was 463. There was one death—a child aged five months.”

III. Hygiene and Sanitation.

The Colonial Surgeon and the Inspector of Nuisances inspect the condition of the town regularly. A start has been made to improve the sanitary conditions of the town by the installation of proper roads, drains and water supply.

GOVERNMENT SCHOOL.

The children were frequently examined, and found clean and well cared for.

IV. Port Health Work and Administration.

Fifty-five vessels were given pratique; their total tonnage was 79,732 and crews 2,194. No quarantinable disease was reported.

V. Maternity and Child Welfare.

There were eight Maternity Cases in the Hospital and nineteen cases in the District.

OUT-PATIENTS. It is estimated that attendances in the Out-Patients' Department of King Edward VII. Memorial Hospital were about four thousand.

VII. Prisons.

Two prisoners were admitted during the year; they enjoyed good health. The prison was inspected regularly, and was found to be in good order.

VIII. Meteorology.

The climate of the Falkland Islands has been compared with that of the north of Scotland. The average level of the barometer is rather low, being 29.6 inches at sea level. On the whole, the readings are highest in late winter and spring (July to October) and lowest in summer (November to April). The comparatively low readings are due to the position of the Islands in the Southern Temperate Storm Belt.

TEMPERATURE. The mean annual temperature is about 43°F. January is the warmest month (49°F.) and July the coldest (37°F.) giving an annual range of 12°F.

HUMIDITY AND CLOUDINESS. The number of overcast days is considerable and the average cloudiness is seven tenths of the sky covered. March and September have the clearest skies.

SUNSHINE. January and February are the sunniest months, averaging 5½ hours per day; June is the duller with an average of a little over 1½ hours per day. On a calm day the burning effects of the sun's rays upon the skin is worse than it is in tropical countries, but no cases of sunstroke have ever been recorded.

RAINFALL. The average rainfall is 26.43 inches per year. There are more rainy days in the Falkland Islands than in London.

WINDS. The prevailing wind direction is from the north-west; winds from the south-west and north are also frequent.

IX. Scientific.

The X-Ray installation at the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital has proved most useful.

(B) DEPENDENCIES.

The estimated total population of South Georgia is 1480. About 1,500 persons were employed at the South Shetlands and 90 men on the floating factory "Orwell" at South Orkney, during the whaling season. There is no British Medical Officer at South Georgia; the whaling companies operating there provide a medical man for their own crews. Two medical men, not British, accompany the whaling fleet to the South Shetlands; these medical men are employed by the whaling companies.

As no medical reports are received from the Dependencies of the Falkland Islands, no definite information as to the health of the population, floating or permanent, is available.

So far as can be ascertained, serious accidents are rare in all the Dependencies. No cases of infectious diseases were notified from any of the Dependencies during the year 1925.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

The Colonial Surgeon went on leave in April and returned on the 4th of November, 1925. From 4th November, 1925 to 31st December, 1925, several surgical cases were dealt with: four cases of appendectomy were operated upon in one day all of which were in a very bad condition. The prevalence of appendicitis is in a large measure due to bad teeth and an excessive meat diet. Sixteen cases were dealt with surgically during November and December, 1925, without a single death. The inhabitants are good surgical patients, and the absence of acute septic organisms contribute largely to the successful issue of the cases.

The Colonial Surgeon, in company with the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, visited the South Shetlands in February, 1925, and inspected the Hospital accommodation at Deception Harbour, and the Medical arrangements of the whaling fleet.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting held on the 25th November, 1925.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 29th July, 1925, were read and confirmed.
2. The Honourable Lieutenant-Colonel A. E. Beattie, C.B.E., M.C., after taking the prescribed oath, assumed his seat at the Council.
3. The Governor communicated to the Council the telegraphic correspondence exchanged on the occasion of the death of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra.
4. Minute from the Governor, No. 5 of 1925, submitting Supplementary Estimate of Expenditure, No. 2 of 1925, was read.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the minute was adopted.

5. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :

- (1) Proclamations issued since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
- (2) Estimates of the expenditure likely to be incurred for the service of the "Discovery" Expedition from the 1st June to the 31st December, 1925, with relative correspondence.

6. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :

- (1) Schedule of charges of an unusual or special description not covered by the Appropriation law for the year 1925, incurred during the quarter ended the 31st March, 1925.
- (2) Comparative Statement of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Colony for the quarter ended the 31st March, 1925.

7. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved and the Honourable the Treasurer seconded the adoption of the following resolution :

"Be it resolved that under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, this Council hereby sanctions the following rate to be charged for the year 1926, on house property in the town of Stanley, namely one shilling and threepence for every twenty shillings of the annual value of such house property."

The resolution was adopted.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To provide for the service of the year 1926" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

On motion made, the consideration of Clause 2 was postponed until after consideration of the Schedule.

The Schedule was considered in conjunction with the draft Estimates for the year 1926, and agreed to with the following amendments :

COLONY.

- (1) Under Head VI., 'Port and Marine' of the Estimates, the salary of the post of Harbour Master was increased from £300 a year to £400 a year, and the corresponding Number in the Schedule amended to read :

Number VI., Port and Marine £5,937.

- (2) Under Head X., 'Education' of the Estimates, the estimated expenditure under Personal Emoluments, 'Travelling teachers', was increased from £250 to £300 in order to provide for the salaries of two travelling teachers at the rate of £150 a year each, and the corresponding Number in the Schedule amended to read :

Number X., Education £2,832.

DEPENDENCIES.

- (3) Under Head II., 'Expenditure Extraordinary' of the Estimates a new item was inserted to provide for the further expenditure of £200 necessary for the purchase of a motor boat to replace the motor boat at present in service at South Georgia, and the corresponding Number in the Schedule amended to read :

Number II., Expenditure Extraordinary £1,450.

Clause 2 was recommitted and amended to read :

"The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st December, 1926, a sum not exceeding one hundred and twenty-one thousand, one hundred and twenty pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1926."

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To amend the law relating to the Administration of Justice" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 7 and the Schedule were agreed to without amendment.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To regulate Wireless Telegraphy and similar methods of Communication" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 4 were agreed to.

Clauses 6 to 9 of the Bill as published were agreed to and renumbered Clauses 5, 6, 7 and 8 respectively.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

11. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To regulate the Importation, Exportation, Manufacture, Sale and Use of Opium and other Dangerous Drugs" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 5 were agreed to.

Clause 6 was agreed to with the following amendment :

In line three of subsection (2) the insertion of the word "or" before the words "any other alkaloid of opium."

Clauses 7 to 10 were agreed to.

Clause 11 was agreed to with the following amendments :

In line four, the insertion of the words "of the provisions" before the words "of this Ordinance."

In line five, the omission of the word "or" before the words "in any premises."

In line eight, the omission of the word "to" before the word "be."

Clauses 12 to 14 were agreed to.

Clause 15 was agreed to with the following amendment :

In line five, the insertion of the word "that" before the words "that person."

Clauses 16 to 18 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

An Ordinance

To legalize certain payments made in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-five in excess of the Expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No 5 of 1924.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make further provision for the service of the Colony for the year 1925.

Preamble.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Supplementary Appropriation (1925) Ordinance, 1926."

Ordinance No. 2 of 1926.

An Ordinance

To repeal and replace Ordinance No. 2 of 1903 as amended by Ordinance No. 7 of 1913 relating to Patents for Inventions, registration of Designs, and of Trade Marks.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Registration of United Kingdom Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Ordinance, 1926."

Short Title.

2. Any person being the grantee of a patent or of a certificate of registration of any design or of any trade mark in the United Kingdom or any person deriving his right from such grantee by assignment, transmission or other operation of law may apply within three years from the date of issue of the patent or certificate of registration to have such patent or certificate of registration registered in the Colony. Where any partial assignment or transmission has been made, all proper parties shall be joined in the application for registration.

To whom certificates of registration may be granted.

3. Every application for the grant of letters patent or for the registration of a design or trade mark under this Ordinance shall be addressed to the Registrar-General, and there shall be transmitted with such application

Procedure.

(1) A certificate of the Comptroller General of the United Kingdom Patent Office giving full particulars of the issue of the patent or the registration of the design or trade mark.

(2) Two certified copies of the complete specification (including the drawings if any) in relation to any patent.

(3) Two certified representations of the design or trade mark.

(4) An affidavit that the applicant is the assignee in respect of this Colony of the registered proprietor of the patent, design or trade mark in the United Kingdom.

(5) A fee of One Pound.

- Issue of certificates of registration. 4. Upon such application being received, together with the documents mentioned in Section 3 of this Ordinance, the Registrar-General shall issue a certificate of registration.
- Privileges and rights conferred. 5. Such certificate of registration shall confer on the applicant privileges and rights subject to all conditions established by the law of this Colony as though the patent or certificate of registration had been issued in the United Kingdom with an extension to the Colony.
- Certificates of registration in Colony to remain in force concurrently with certificates of registration in United Kingdom. 6. Privileges and rights so granted shall date from the date of the patent or certificate of registration in the United Kingdom and shall continue in force only so long as the patent or certificate of registration remains in force in the United Kingdom.
- Supreme Court to afford all relief. Provided that no action for infringement shall be entertained in respect of any manufacture, use or sale of the invention, design or trade mark prior to the date of issue of the certificate of registration in the Colony.
- Amendment of specification or drawings. 7. The Supreme Court shall have power, subject to the Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Acts, for the time being in force in the United Kingdom, to grant, either absolutely or on such terms and conditions as shall seem just, all such remedies as either party may appear to be entitled to in respect of either claim to or defence of any right, title or interest in relation to any registration in force in this Colony under a certificate granted under this Ordinance.
- Registration of assignment. 8. Whenever the specification or drawings of a United Kingdom patent registered in this Colony has been amended by way of disclaimer, correction or explanation, according to the law of the United Kingdom, a request, accompanied by a copy of the specification and drawings (if any) as amended, duly certified by the Comptroller General of the United Kingdom Patent Office, may be made to the Registrar to substitute a copy of the specification and drawings as amended, for the specification and drawings originally filed.
- Registrar to make rules regulating procedure. 9. Where a person becomes entitled by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law to the privileges and rights conferred by a certificate of registration or to any interest therein, he may make application in the prescribed manner to the Registrar-General for the entry on the Register of such assignment, transmission, or other instrument affecting the title, or giving an interest therein.
- Saving Clause. 10. The Registrar may make such general rules and do such things as he may think expedient, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, for regulating procedure under this Ordinance.
- Application to Dependencies and date of commencement. 11. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to affect rights of action against any person for passing off goods as those of another person or the remedies in respect thereof.
- Repeal. 12. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony and shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1927.
13. The Patents Ordinance, 1903, and the Patents Amendment Ordinance, 1913, are hereby repealed.

Ordinance No. of 1926.

A Bill

To amend the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, 1925.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Dangerous Drugs (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926," and shall be read and construed as one with the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

Drugs in transit not to be conveyed out of territorial waters of the Colony except under license.

2. Where any drug to which the Principal Ordinance applies is consigned by sea under a through bill of lading from a place elsewhere than within the Colony to a place elsewhere than within the Colony and is conveyed in transit into the territorial waters of the Colony it shall not be lawful to convey such drug out of the territorial waters of the Colony except under license and in compliance with the following conditions:—

- (1) The drug shall be conveyed into and out of the territorial waters of the Colony in one and the same ship.
- (2) The drug shall not be removed from the said ship while the ship is within the territorial waters of the Colony.

- (3) The chest, box, case or package containing the drug shall while in the territorial waters of the Colony be maintained unopened and unbroken unless it be opened or broken during and for the purposes of some search authorized by the Principal Ordinance.
- (4) The presence of the drug on board the said ship shall be declared by the master of the said ship immediately upon arrival in any of the harbours of the Colony.

3. The granting of any license under the preceding section and the revocation of any license shall lie in the absolute discretion of the Governor who may impose any conditions which he may think fit upon the granting of such license.

Grant and revocation of License under Section 2 discretionary.

Ordinance No. of 1926.

A Bill

To provide for the grant of a Retiring Allowance to Nurses.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Retiring Allowance to Nurses Ordinance, 1926".

Interpretation.

2. In this Ordinance—

"Nurse" means any matron, nurse-matron, nurse, or nursing sister appointed to the public service in the Colony through the Overseas Nursing Association.

Retiring allowance to whom payable.

3. This Ordinance shall apply only in the case of a nurse who is not otherwise entitled to a pension under the Ordinances of the Colony, and who was in the public service in the Colony on the 1st day of January, 1926, or who has entered or shall enter the public service in the Colony after the 1st day of January, 1926.

Retiring allowance to be charged on the revenues of the Colony.

4. There shall be charged on and paid out of the revenues of the Colony all such sums of money as may from time to time be granted by way of retiring allowance in accordance with this Ordinance to nurses who have been in the public service in the Colony.

Age at which retiring allowance may be granted.

5. No retiring allowance shall be granted under this Ordinance to any nurse who has not attained the age of fifty years.

Provided that in the case of retirement on account of ill-health or infirmity such retiring allowance may be granted to a nurse who has not attained the age of fifty years.

6. It shall be lawful for the Governor, with the sanction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and subject to the provisions of the other sections of this Ordinance, to grant a retiring allowance to any nurse on her ultimate retirement from the public service at the rate of eight shillings and fourpence per annum for each month of her service in the Colony:

Retiring allowance at what rate to be granted, and after what service.
Certificates required as to conduct, etc.

Provided that she has served not less than three years in the Colony, and except in the case of retirement on account of ill-health or infirmity, fifteen years in all in the public service or in a public hospital to which she received an appointment through the Overseas Nursing Association, and in the case of retirement on account of ill-health or infirmity ten years in all ;

Provided further that the grant of a retiring allowance shall be dependant on the receipt by the Colonial Surgeon of an application from the nurse for such grant and on the production to the satisfaction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies of certificates that "the applicant has discharged her duties with diligence and fidelity, to the satisfaction of the head officer of her department" in respect of each period of total qualifying service (except that in the case of any period of service prior to the 1st day of January, 1926, it shall be lawful not to require such certificate), and that the total retiring allowance granted to the nurse shall not exceed the amount of pension which would have been granted to her if her whole service had been on the pensionable establishment of the Colony.

7. For the purposes of this Ordinance it shall not be required that the total service of fifteen years, or alternatively of ten years, specified in the preceding section shall have been continuous.

Continuity of Service.

8. The provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1906, and of amendments thereto, shall apply generally to the cases to which this Ordinance applies in every such respect as is not explicitly or implicitly precluded by the provisions of this Ordinance.

General application of

1906, as amended.

9. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

The King Edward Hospital Ordinance, 1916.

A. E. BEATTIE,

In pursuance of the powers vested in him by the King Edward Hospital Ordinance, 1916, and otherwise, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the consent of the Executive Council, is pleased to make the following regulations:—

1. These regulations may be cited as the "King Edward Hospital (Amendment) Regulations, 1926." Short title.

2. Section 28 of the King Edward Hospital Regulations, 1916, as amended by Section 4 of the Regulations, dated the 1st of February, 1923, and published in the Gazette of the 1st of March, 1923, is repealed and replaced by the following:— Repeal and Replacement of Section 28 of the King Edward Hospital Regulations, 1916, as amended.

28. The following shall be the hospital fees to be charged to hospital patients:—

1. For residents in the Colony.

A. In the general wards, including medical attendance, care and treatment:—

- (i) Subject nevertheless to a remission, either in whole or in part by the Governor, in indigent cases, 4/- per day or £1 : 1 : 0 per week.
- (ii) For every midwifery case, including stay in the hospital an inclusive fee of £2 : 2 : 0 per week.

B. In a private ward:—

For Private Patients, 6/- per day, or £2 : 0 : 0 per week.

2. For non-residents in the Colony.

A. In the general wards:—

- (i) Subject nevertheless to any special considerations and recommendations for a less charge as may be approved by the Governor, 7/- per day.

B. In a private ward:—

For Private Patients, 10/- per day.

In the case of non-residents in the Colony whether in a General or in a Private Ward, the fee to be charged by the Colonial Surgeon for operations shall be according to agreement.

3. For Government Officials and employees and their families (entirely dependent upon them for maintenance) and servants, the fees shall in each case be one half of the rates for Residents in the Colony.

Half rates only shall also be charged for all children under 14 years of age.

4. In any case, including that of a Government Official or employee, in which any wine, spirit, or extras be permitted by the Medical Officer, but not ordered by him and forming part of the medical treatment, the cost of the same shall, in addition to the Hospital fees, be paid for by the patient.

In line one the substitution of the word "specification" for the word "specifications".

Clauses 9 to 11 were agreed to.

Clause 12 was agreed with the insertion of the words "1st day of January, 1927" as the date on which the Ordinance should come into operation.

Clauses 13 and the title were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

Ordinance No. of 1926.

A Bill

To amend the Customs Ordinance (No. 6 of 1903) and to provide for the Regulation of the Coasting Trade in the Falkland Islands.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Customs Amendment (Coasting Trade) Ordinance, 1926," and shall be read and construed as one with the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Short Title.

2. All trade by sea from any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof shall be deemed to be a coasting trade and all vessels while employed therein shall be deemed to be coasting vessels and no part of the Falkland Islands however situated with regard to any other part shall be deemed in law, with reference to each other to be parts beyond the seas.

All trade by sea from part of the Falkland Islands to another to be deemed coastwise and no part to be deemed beyond the seas.

3. All vessels shall, when employed in the coasting trade have a licence from the Collector; and if any such vessel be so employed without such licence the owner of the vessel shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

Coasting vessels to be licensed.

4. Goods the produce of the Falkland Islands and goods upon which import duties have been paid in the Falkland Islands and goods duty free on importation into the Falkland Islands may be carried in any coasting vessel trading between any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof and the master of such coasting vessel shall answer all such questions concerning the vessel and the cargo and the voyage as shall be demanded of him by the

Description of goods which may be carried in coasting vessels.

Collector or Officer of Customs ; and in case of failure or refusal to answer such questions or answer truly the master shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £20.

Coasting ship confined to coasting voyage.

5. No goods to be carried coastwise shall be taken into or put out of any coasting vessel at sea or over the sea or if any coasting vessel shall touch at any place over the sea, or deviate from her voyage, unless forced by unavoidable circumstances ; and if the master of any coasting ship which shall have touched as aforesaid at any place over the sea shall not declare the same in writing under his hand to the Collector on the arrival of such ship at the Falkland Islands the master of such ship shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £100.

Proper Officer of Customs may go on board and examine any coasting vessel.

6. It shall be lawful in any case for the proper officer of Customs to go on board any coasting vessel in any port or place in the Falkland Islands, or at any period of her voyage and strictly to search such vessel and to examine all goods on board and all goods being laden or unladen and to demand all documents which ought to be on board such vessel.

Repeal.

7. Sections nine and thirty-five of the Customs Ordinance, 1903, and Section 10 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902, are hereby repealed.

Provisions of Ordinance not to apply to vessels bringing cargo or passengers from abroad or taking cargo or passengers for abroad.

8. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall prevent any vessel from proceeding without a licence of the Collector as aforesaid from any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof for the purpose either of landing the whole or part of its cargo or passengers brought from a place outside the Colony or of taking on board the whole or part of its cargo or passengers for a place outside the Colony.

Suspending Clause.

9. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be notified in the Gazette and in no case before His Majesty's pleasure thereon has been publicly signified by notification in the Gazette.

An Ordinance

To amend the Dangerous Drugs
Ordinance, 1925.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Dangerous Drugs (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926," and shall be read and construed as one with the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

Short Title.

2. Where any drug to which the Principal Ordinance applies is consigned by sea under a through bill of lading from a place elsewhere than within the Colony to a place elsewhere than within the Colony and is conveyed in transit into the territorial waters of the Colony it shall not be lawful to convey such drug out of the territorial waters of the Colony except under license and in compliance with the following conditions:—

Drugs in transit not to be conveyed out of territorial waters of the Colony except under license.

- (1) The drug shall be conveyed into and out of the territorial waters of the Colony in one and the same ship.
- (2) The drug shall not be removed from the said ship while the ship is within the territorial waters of the Colony.

- (3) The chest, box, case or package containing the drug shall while in the territorial waters of the Colony be maintained unopened and unbroken unless it be opened or broken during and for the purposes of some search authorized by the Principal Ordinance.
- (4) The presence of the drug on board the said ship shall be declared by the master of the said ship immediately upon arrival in any of the harbours of the Colony.

Grant and revocation
of License under Section 2 discretionary.

3. The granting of any license under the preceding section and the revocation of any license shall lie in the absolute discretion of the Governor who may impose any conditions which he may think fit upon the granting of such license.

An Ordinance

To provide for the grant of a Retiring Allowance to Nurses.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Retiring Allowance to Nurses Ordinance, 1926".

Short title.

2. In this Ordinance—

Interpretation.

"Nurse" means any matron, nurse-matron, nurse, or nursing sister appointed to the public service in the Colony through the Overseas Nursing Association.

3. This Ordinance shall apply only in the case of a nurse who is not otherwise entitled to a pension under the Ordinances of the Colony, and who was in the public service in the Colony on the 1st day of January, 1926, or who has entered or shall enter the public service in the Colony after the 1st day of January, 1926.

Retiring allowance to whom payable.

4. There shall be charged on and paid out of the revenues of the Colony all such sums of money as may from time to time be granted by way of retiring allowance in accordance with this Ordinance to nurses who have been in the public service in the Colony.

Retiring allowance to be charged on the revenues of the Colony.

5. No retiring allowance shall be granted under this Ordinance to any nurse who has not attained the age of fifty years.

Age at which retiring allowance may be granted.

Provided that in the case of retirement on account of ill-health or infirmity such retiring allowance may be granted to a nurse who has not attained the age of fifty years.

Retiring allowance at what rate to be granted, and after what service.
Certificates required as to conduct, etc.

6. It shall be lawful for the Governor, with the sanction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and subject to the provisions of the other sections of this Ordinance, to grant a retiring allowance to any nurse on her ultimate retirement from the public service at the rate of eight shillings and fourpence per annum for each month of her service in the Colony:

Provided that she has served not less than three years in the Colony, and except in the case of retirement on account of ill-health or infirmity, fifteen years in all in the public service or in a public hospital to which she received an appointment through the Overseas Nursing Association, and in the case of retirement on account of ill-health or infirmity ten years in all ;

Provided further that the grant of a retiring allowance shall be dependant on the receipt of an application from the nurse for such grant and on the production to the satisfaction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies of certificates that "the applicant has discharged her duties with diligence and fidelity, to the satisfaction of the head officer of her department" in respect of each period of total qualifying service (except that in the case of any period of service prior to the 1st day of January, 1926, it shall be lawful not to require such certificate), and that the total retiring allowance granted to the nurse shall not exceed the amount of pension which would have been granted to her if her whole service had been on the pensionable establishment of the Colony.

Continuity of Service.

7. For the purposes of this Ordinance it shall not be required that the total service of fifteen years, or alternatively of ten years, specified in the preceding section shall have been continuous.

General application of Ordinance No. 5 of 1906, as amended.

8. The provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1906, and of amendments thereto, shall apply generally to the cases to which this Ordinance applies in every such respect as is not explicitly or implicitly precluded by the provisions of this Ordinance.

Application to Dependencies.

9. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

3. In these regulations the term "Colonial Secretary" shall include any person duly authorised by the Colonial Secretary to act in his behalf for the purpose of these regulations.

Wireless telegraphy includes wireless telephony.

4. In these regulations where the context so admits or requires the term "Wireless Telegraphy" shall include Wireless Telephony.

Apparatus on merchant ships not to interfere with naval signalling or other established station.

5. All apparatus for Wireless Telegraphy on board a merchant ship in the territorial waters of the Colony shall be worked in such a way as not to interfere with (a) naval signalling; or (b) the working of any wireless telegraphy station lawfully established, installed, or worked in the Colony or the territorial waters thereof, and in particular the said apparatus shall be so worked as not to interrupt or interfere with the transmission of any messages between wireless telegraphy stations established on land and wireless telegraphy stations established on ships at sea.

Apparatus on merchant ships not to be worked in harbours of Colony without permission.

6. No apparatus for wireless telegraphy on board a merchant ship shall be worked or used whilst such ship is in any of the harbours of the Colony without a permit in writing from the Colonial Secretary.

Governor may make further regulations in emergency.

7. If at any time in the opinion of the Governor an emergency has arisen in which it is expedient for the public service that His Majesty's Government should have control over the transmission of messages by wireless telegraphy, the use of wireless telegraphy on board merchant ships whilst in the territorial waters of the Colony shall be subject to such further rules as may be made by the Governor from time to time, and such rules may prohibit or regulate such use in all cases or in such cases as may be deemed desirable.

Regulations not to apply in case of signals of distress.

8. These regulations shall not apply to the use of wireless telegraphy for the purpose of making or answering signals of distress.

Cancellation of Licence or Permit granted under Regulations.

9. Any Licence or Permit granted under these regulations shall be liable to modification, suspension or cancellation at any time by notice in writing from the Colonial Secretary.

Foreign warships in harbour of Colony to conform with special regulations.

10. Foreign men-of-war and service aircraft accompanying them lying in any harbour in the Colony shall conform with the following regulations:—

- (i) Transmission on 600 metres is forbidden except for the purpose of making or answering signals of distress.

- (ii) Interference with naval, army or air force signalling or with any fixed shore station must be avoided.
- (iii) Transmission must be discontinued on request from
 - (a) any naval authority; (b) the port authority; or
 - (c) any fixed shore station.
- (iv) Protracted signalling, using apparatus transmitting other than from continuous waves must be avoided.
- (v) If there is a British or Dominion fleet or warship lying in the harbour the Senior Naval Officer should be consulted.

11. Any person desirous of obtaining a Licence or Permit under the Wireless Telegraph Ordinance, 1925, or these regulations, shall apply in writing to the Colonial Secretary, stating full particulars :

Application for Licence etc. to be addressed to Colonial Secretary.

- (i) of the nature and purpose of the Licence sought ;
- (ii) of the place or ship in respect of which a Licence is desired; and
- (iii) of the apparatus which it is proposed to instal or work.

12. A Licence or Permit granted under these regulations shall be :

Form of Licence or Permit.

- (i) for a land station in the form of Schedule 1 hereto;
- (ii) for a ship station in the form of Schedule 2 hereto;
- (iii) for a broadcast receiving station in the form of Schedule 3 hereto; and
- (iv) under Section 6 of these regulations in the form of Schedule 4 hereto.

13. A Licence or Permit granted under these regulations shall be subject in all respects to the provisions of the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1925, and of the Regulations made thereunder, and to the conditions specified in the Licence or Permit, which shall be valid for a period of one year, unless otherwise stated, on payment of a fee of :—

Conditions, Validity, and Fees payable.

- (i) One Pound for a land station;
- (ii) One Pound for a ship station;
- (iii) Five Shillings for an experimental station;
- (iv) Ten Shillings for a broadcast receiving station; and
- (v) Ten Shillings under Section 6 of these regulations.

a Licence, subject in all respects to the provisions of the Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1925, and of the Regulations made thereunder, and to the conditions specified herein, to

- (i) Establish, instal and work for the purpose hereinafter mentioned at the ship station or stations specified in the Schedule hereto apparatus for Wireless Telegraphy of the kind specified in the Schedule hereto (which apparatus is hereinafter referred to as the licensed apparatus).

Provided that—

(a) Each ship station shall comply in all respects with the provisions of any Rules from time to time made by the Board of Trade under the Merchant Shipping (Wireless Telegraphy) Act, 1919.

(b) The apparatus installed at each ship station shall be of the character specified in the Schedule opposite to the name of each station.

(c) The sending apparatus used at each ship station shall be of such a character that the waves emitted are as pure and as little damped as possible and the receiving apparatus used at the said station or stations shall be of such a character as to afford the greatest possible protection from disturbance during the reception of signals.

(d) The licensed apparatus shall be so constructed as to be capable of using wave-lengths of 600 and 300 metres in length. The licensed apparatus may be so constructed as to use any of the wave-lengths specified in columns 5 and 6 of the Schedule hereto or any wave-lengths prescribed by any administration for communication with Direction Finding Stations and such other wave-lengths as may be authorised in writing by the Colonial Secretary. Provided always that the wave-length of 600 metres shall normally be used for communication and further that the wave-length of 1800 metres may be used for transmission in an exceptional case contemplated by Article XXXV (2) (a) of the Service Regulations annexed to the Radio-telegraph Convention 1912.

- (ii) Send and receive messages by means of the licensed apparatus between the said ship stations and also between the said ship stations and coast and other ship stations. Provided that the Licensee shall not, except with the permission in writing of the Colonial Secretary, at any time send spoken messages from the said ship stations or send or receive messages from and at the said ship stations when in any of the harbours of the Colony.

This Licence is valid during the period of one year terminating on the

until this Licence shall be determined by notice in writing from the Colonial Secretary to the Licensee.

In this Licence the term Apparatus for Wireless Telegraphy includes apparatus for Wireless Telephony where the context so admits or requires.

GENERAL CONDITIONS.

I. The licensed apparatus shall not be used by the Licensee or by any other person either on behalf or by permission of the Licensee for the despatch or receipt of messages except messages authorised by this licence.

II. (1) The licensed apparatus shall not without the permission in writing of the Colonial Secretary be altered in respect to any of the particulars mentioned in the Schedule hereto.

(2) The Licensee shall at all times indemnify the Government against all actions, claims or demands which may be brought or made by any corporation, company or person in respect of any injury arising from any act, licensed or permitted by these presents.

III. (1) The Licensee shall not (either by himself or by any person acting on his behalf or by his permission) by the transmission of any message by means of the licensed apparatus or otherwise by the use of the licensed apparatus interfere with naval signalling.

(2) Whenever the operators at any of the said ship stations of the Licensee perceive through the medium of the instruments used by them that Naval signalling is proceeding, they shall refrain from using the licensed apparatus until all indication that naval signalling is proceeding shall have ceased.

(3) The Licensee and any person acting on his behalf or by his permission shall if so required in writing by the Colonial Secretary, cease to use the licensed apparatus for such period (not exceeding _____ hours in any one day) as may be specified by the Admiralty.

(4) If the Governor is of opinion that the working of the licensed apparatus at any station specified in the Schedule hereto is inconsistent with the free use of naval signalling the Licensee shall when required in writing by the Colonial Secretary close the said station.

(5) These provisions for the protection of naval signalling shall be construed to be without prejudice to the generality of any other provisions of this Licence.

IV. For the purpose of this Licence the Licensee shall observe the International Telegraph Convention and the International Telegraph Regulations so far as the said Convention and Regulations are capable of being applied to Wireless Telegraphy in common with ordinary land and submarine telegraphy.

V. The Licensee shall observe the provisions of the Radiotelegraphic Convention, 1912.

VI. The Licensee shall so far as possible receive from ships and light stations all requests for assistance and all signals of distress and shall answer such requests and signals and send them with the least possible delay to the proper authorities by means of the licensed apparatus or any other means in the power of the Licensee.

VII. The Licensee shall not divulge to any person (other than properly authorised officials of the Government or a competent legal tribunal) or make any use whatever of any messages coming to the knowledge of the Licensee and not intended for receipt by means of the licensed apparatus.

VIII. The Superintendent of Telegraphs and Telephones or any person authorised by him in writing may from time to time and at all reasonable times, enter upon any of the stations in the possession or occupation of the Licensee, either solely or jointly with any other person or persons, for the purpose of inspecting and may inspect any apparatus fixed or being in such stations respectively for the purpose of sending or receiving messages by Wireless Telegraphy, and all other telegraphic instruments and apparatus fixed or being in such stations respectively, and the working and use of such apparatus and telegraphic instruments respectively, and the Licensee shall afford all requisite and proper facilities for such inspection and shall secure to the Superintendent of Telegraphs and Telephones or any person authorised by him in writing the right for the purpose aforesaid of entry from time to time and on such of the stations as may be in the possession or occupation of any person or persons other than the Licensee.

IX. The Colonial Secretary may at any time in his absolute discretion give notice in writing to determine these presents and the Licence or permission hereby given at the end of one calendar month from the date of such notice, and at the expiration of that period the Licence or permission hereby granted shall cease and determine accordingly but without prejudice or remedy of the Colonial Secretary under covenant or provision herein contained on the part of the Licensee to be observed and performed.

X. In case of any breach, non-observance, or non-performance by or on the part of the Licensee of any of the covenants or conditions herein contained and on the part of the Licensee to be observed and performed, the Colonial Secretary may in writing revoke and determine these presents and the said licensed powers and authorities hereinbefore granted and each and every of them, and thereupon these presents and the said licences, powers and authorities and each and every of them shall absolutely cease determine and become void. Provided always that no such revocation or determination as aforesaid shall prejudice or affect any right of action or remedy which shall have accrued or shall thereafter accrue to either of the parties hereto under the covenants herein contained.

XI. Nothing in these presents shall prejudice or affect the right of the Governor from time to time to establish, extend, maintain and work any system or systems of telegraphic communication (whether of a like nature to that hereby licensed or otherwise) in such manner as he shall in his discretion think fit, neither shall anything herein contained prejudice or affect the right of the Governor from time to time to enter into agreement for or to grant licences relative to the working and use of telegraphs (whether of a like nature to those hereby, licensed or otherwise) or the transmission of messages in any part of the Colony by means of Wireless telegraphy or by any other means with or to any person or persons whomsoever upon such terms as he shall in his discretion think fit.

XII. Subject to the provisions of this Licence the licensee shall transmit messages by means of the licensed apparatus on equal terms without favour or preference whether as regards rates of charges order of transmission or otherwise. Provided always that signals of distress and messages in connection therewith shall receive priority over all other messages and that the order of transmission of such other messages shall be governed by the International Telegraph Regulations.

XIII. The Licensee shall charge rates not in excess of half of the rates charged to the ordinary public in respect of messages transmitted on behalf of His Majesty's Government or the Government of any British Possession or Protectorate.

LIVE STOCK REPORT, 1925-1926.

STOCK DEPARTMENT,

Sir,

I beg to submit, for His Excellency the Acting Governor's information, my report for the year 1925-1926.

I find that it will be necessary to notify farmers and managers that Stock returns should if possible be sent into this office not later than 30th June in each year. It is I know difficult in some cases for farmers or managers to do this, but an accurate return of all stock cannot be submitted by me at the proper time unless I receive the individual returns not later than the 30th June.

The past season has not been a very good one for stock and on a number of stations the losses among stock, especially lambs, have been fairly considerable.

There was a fair amount of feed for stock at the beginning of the year but the growth of grass was checked by frost a good time before the winter set in. It is claimed, and I believe rightly, by many that the grass throughout the Falklands has not the feeding qualities nor the abundance that it had a few years back and for this reason the carrying capacity of the land has been affected to a great extent. Owing to the large size and the small number of paddocks on the stations in the Colony, it is difficult to carry out a satisfactory system of spelling land. It is necessary that land should be spelled periodically or it will, especially if heavily stocked, become "sheep sick." The cutting down of the number of sheep on a section helps a great deal towards improving the pasture on that section, but the full benefits to be derived by doing so are not obtained unless sheep are well shepherded and not allowed to graze as they naturally will upon the best pasture only. I am firmly convinced that on large portions of land on a number of stations in the Colony sheep are being carried a good deal in excess of the number that the land will at present carry satisfactorily.

It is in a good many cases for this reason that farmers have had to deplete their flocks very considerably of late years, and unless the position is realized and flocks cut down where required to the actual carrying capacity of the land, farmers will be obliged by force of circumstances to do so if they wish to keep their sheep in good condition and breed lambs of stronger constitution. In 1898 the number of sheep carried in the Colony was 807,000 and the number carried this year is 605,675. This means a decrease in 28 years of 201,325 sheep. It is understood that the sheep carried in the Colony in the past years were a good deal stronger than those carried at the present time.

The majority of farmers complain of the low lambing percentages and maintain that they find great difficulty in keeping up the numbers of their flocks. I have taken particular notice of newly born lambs and I have found large numbers of them in the Colony exceptionally weak in constitution. These weakly lambs I am sure would not be able to withstand a great deal of cold wet weather and as at about lambing time the weather is often very unsettled many of these weakly lambs must perish. I have also noticed that a good many lambs of weak constitution do not live even in fine weather for any length of time after they are born. Here again in the opinion of old residents the lambs bred in the past years were on the whole of decidedly stronger constitution than those bred at the present time. The reason for the loss of constitution has already been comprehensively dealt with by Mr. H. Munro in his report on the sheep farming industry of the Falkland Islands. Copies of this report have, I understand, been issued to all station owners and managers.

Although there is at the present time only a small percentage of the sheep in the Falklands suitable for freezing purposes, I am of the opinion that if a moderate sized freezing plant were established in a central position in the Colony it would help considerably towards improving the stock industry generally. This plant could treat cull sheep, fat sheep and cattle. In all progressive sheep breeding countries freezing works have contributed largely towards the progress of sheep farming in those countries. Where works are available farmers are able to obtain full value for their sheep and they can if they wish sell to the works unprofitable cull sheep after they have been shorn, instead of having to graze these sheep for another season to obtain only a portion of the full value of the sheep. When old ewes and wethers are shifted off the station in this way there remains on that station more

food for younger and more profitable sheep and it also gives a farmer an opportunity to increase his ewe flock. I am of the opinion that the question of establishing freezing works in the Colony is one which has not been given sufficient consideration by farmers.

Imported Sheep.

The importation of 372 sheep from the United Kingdom and New Zealand will it is hoped have a beneficial effect upon some of the flocks here. The quality of the imported sheep is with the exception of a few fairly good. It would be to the benefit of all sheep breeders in the Colony if a separate flock of pure stud sheep could be maintained. On all stations a separate flock is kept to breed rams for use with the general flock but unfortunately the ewes used in this separate flock are in most cases related and in some cases closely related to the general flock. This means of course a good deal of inbreeding which can only be carried on with grave risk to the constitution of the general flock. The importation of pure bred sheep will where ewes and rams have been imported for the same station give the owner of that station an opportunity to establish a stud flock unrelated to the general flock. It is hoped that within a few years more pure bred stud flocks will be established in the Colony and the present custom of inbreeding as practised on a number of the stations done away with.

Tussock.

Farmers who have realized the immense value of tussock have carried out a certain amount of planting of this grass on old tussock ground where the tussock had been destroyed in past years. There are, however, still thousands of acres of old tussock ground still available for planting. It is generally understood by farmers that sheep do a good deal of damage to tussock plantations, but I can find no record of any investigations having been carried out to discover why sheep cause the destruction of this grass. I might add that the opinions of the farmers here vary a good deal upon this point.

Cattle.

There were 8,421 cattle carried this year as against 8,778 carried last year. Bulls of different breeds have been imported within the last few years and these bulls have considerably improved the progeny of the herds of their importers. All stations would carry a great many more head of cattle than they do at present without doing damage to the sheep pastures. In fact on rough camp cattle would improve the sheep feed to a great extent although the opinion of many of the farmers is to the contrary. In the absense of cattle a certain amount of burning is necessary but the burning of camp indiscriminately as is practised on one or two of the stations is only another step towards lowering the sheep carrying capacity of the land in future years.

Horses.

The number of horses carried is a little less than last year.

On one or two stations a few acres of ground were cultivated and planted with oats and the resulting crops helped greatly towards keeping working horses on the stations in fair condition through the winter. More ground on each station however could be utilized successfully for the production of oats for winter feed for horses.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Ordinance No. of 1926.

A Bill

To amend the Customs Ordinance (No. 6 of 1903) and to provide for the Regulation of the Coasting Trade in the Falkland Islands.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Customs Amendment (Coasting Trade) Ordinance, 1926," and shall be read and construed as one with the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

All trade by sea from part of the Falkland Islands to another to be deemed coastwise and no part to be deemed beyond the seas.

2. All trade by sea from any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof shall be deemed to be a coasting trade and all vessels while employed therein shall be deemed to be coasting vessels and no part of the Falkland Islands however situated with regard to any other part shall be deemed in law, with reference to each other to be parts beyond the seas.

Coasting vessels to be licensed.

3. All vessels shall, when employed in the coasting trade have a licence from the Collector; and if any such vessel be so employed without such licence the owner of the vessel shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

Description of goods which may be carried in coasting vessels.

4. Goods the produce of the Falkland Islands and goods upon which import duties have been paid in the Falkland Islands and goods duty free on importation into the Falkland Islands may be carried in any coasting vessel trading between any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof and the master of such coasting vessel shall answer all such questions concerning the vessel and the cargo and the voyage as shall be demanded of him by the

Collector or Officer of Customs ; and in case of failure or refusal to answer such questions or answer truly the master shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £20.

5. No goods to be carried coastwise shall be taken into or put out of any coasting vessel at sea or over the sea or if any coasting vessel shall touch at any place over the sea, or deviate from her voyage, unless forced by unavoidable circumstances ; and if the master of any coasting ship which shall have touched as aforesaid at any place over the sea shall not declare the same in writing under his hand to the Collector on the arrival of such ship at the Falkland Islands the master of such ship shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £100.

Coasting ship confined to coasting voyage.

6. It shall be lawful in any case for the proper officer of Customs to go on board any coasting vessel in any port or place in the Falkland Islands, or at any period of her voyage and strictly to search such vessel and to examine all goods on board and all goods being laden or unladen and to demand all documents which ought to be on board such vessel.

Proper Officer of Customs may go on board and examine any coasting vessel.

7. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall prevent any vessel from proceeding without a licence of the Collector as aforesaid from any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof for the purpose either of landing the whole or part of its cargo or passengers brought from a place outside the Colony or of taking on board the whole or part of its cargo or passengers for a place outside the Colony.

Provisions of Ordinance not to apply to vessels bringing cargo or passengers from abroad or taking cargo or passengers for abroad.

8. Sections nine and thirty-five of the Customs Ordinance, 1903, are hereby amended by the addition thereto in either case of of the following proviso -

Amendment of sections 9 and 35 of Ordinance 6 of 1903.

Provided that the provisions of this section shall not apply to vessels employed in the coasting trade of the Falkland Islands under a licence from the Collector.

9. Section ten of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902, is hereby repealed.

Repeal of section 10 of Ordinance 2 of 1902.

10. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be notified in the Gazette and in no case before His Majesty's pleasure thereon has been publicly signified by notification in the Gazette.

His Excellency the Acting Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following report received from the Director of the Rowett Research Institute, Aberdeen, upon samples of whale products manufactured by the Tonsberg Whaling Company at South Georgia and sent to the Institute for examination. A copy of the chemical analyses is appended together with the latest prices quoted for a ton of each product delivered at Stanley or Grytviken.

"Two of the substances viz. guano and bone-meal appear to be very valuable feeding-stuffs in so far as they help to supply deficiencies in the pasture of the Falkland Islands. The third substance, cattle food (Kraft Foder) contains little of the mineral ingredients which are deficient in the Falkland Islands pastures and is therefore, not so valuable, although it would be of feeding value on account of the nitrogen which it contains.

"If these substances could be fed in large amounts, we believe that they would improve the nutrition of the sheep and at the same time gradually improve the pastures, though of course, this improvement would be a relatively slow process.

Report by Chief Inspector of Stock on Experiments carried out with artificial manures in Stanley.

Stock Department,

Sir,

I have the honour to submit for His Excellency the Acting Governor's information a report on the results of the experiments carried out with artificial manures in Stanley.

In November, 1924, two paddocks and portions of two other paddocks in the vicinity of Government House were top-dressed with a mixture of basic slag and superphosphate at the rate of approximately two cwt. per acre.

The paddocks used for the experiments were No. 1, the paddock to the west, and No. 2 the paddock to the east of Government House.

Paddock No. 1 two months after the dressing showed unmistakable signs of improvement. This marked result is not usual at such an early date after top-dressing. Twelve months after this paddock was dressed there was a great improvement in the growth of both the grass and clover on it, more especially the clover.

In paddock No. 2 the grass and clover did not improve as quickly as in No. 1 but there was certainly an increase at the end of twelve months. The greater portion of this paddock at the time when it was top-dressed was covered with a growth of rank grass which smothered the new grass growth. Cattle, however, have since eaten off a great deal of the rank growth, with the result that the clover and grasses have had a chance to improve. In this paddock also there were two large patches of ground covered with small fern with only a little grass showing through here and there. These patches were treated with a heavy dressing of the mixed manures.

In July 1926, a portion of paddock No. 1 was top-dressed with guano and the remainder of the paddock received a dressing of a mixture of superphosphate and basic slag at the rate of 1 cwt. per acre. After the dressing of guano, the clover growth increased wonderfully on the strip upon which it was sown and the difference between this portion of the paddock and the remainder of the paddock was quite noticeable even at a distance. The remainder of the paddock which was dressed with slag and super mixture had also improved considerably.

Paddock No. 2 has also improved, the grass and clover looking very much healthier than it did at the time of the dressing in 1924.

On the bare patches grass has become firmly established and has covered these patches very well; also the growth of small fern is not so strong now that the grass on these patches is spreading.

In this paddock in 1924 there were a number of small patches of a weed which is known locally as pig vine, I believe. The growth and spread of this weed has been very considerable within the last twelve months, and I am of the opinion that the dressing of artificial manures is responsible for their increase.

The portions of the two other paddocks dressed in 1924 have not up to date shown any marked increase in growth of grass or clover: a slight increase is however noticeable. As I have already stated in a previous report these pastures have been eaten down closely for a great many years, and I am of the opinion that it will be a long time before they recover unless they are treated with liberal dressings of manures.

In November 1924 gorse plants were planted in Paddock No. 2. The strip of ground in which they were planted was divided into three sections. No. 1 section was dressed with superphosphate, No 2 with a mixture of slag and superphosphate and No. 3 with slag. The section dressed with superphosphate is the only one which seems to have benefited by the dressing and even so the gorse on this section is not thriving as well as was expected.

I am of the opinion that if the paddocks which have been treated with artificial manures were to be thoroughly harrowed with grass harrows and again treated with 2 cwt. of superphosphate to the acre there would be a still greater improvement in the pasture in these paddocks.

In regard to the heavily grazed paddocks, I should also recommend the addition of lime at the rate of 6 cwt. to the acre. The lime should be applied after the paddocks have been harrowed and at least one month before the dressing of superphosphate.

His Excellency the Acting Governor directs the publication, for general information, of a Bill which it is intended to introduce before the Legislative Council at an early date entitled "A Bill to Amend the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905". The text of the Bill is set out at the foot of this notice.

His Excellency desires that it should be clearly appreciated by the owners of property in Stanley that an increase in the property rate will shortly be necessary in order to assist in meeting the cost of maintenance of the works now nearing completion under the Stanley Improvement Scheme. Such an increase has been foreseen from the inauguration of the Stanley Improvement Scheme and was in fact accepted at the meeting held under the presidency of the late Governor, Sir John Middleton, K.B.E., C.M.G., in the Town Hall, Stanley, on the 12th of August, 1924; the following extract from the Minutes of this meeting is given in full so that there may be no misapprehension in this regard:-

"The Very Reverend Dean Smith asked if an additional amount would be necessary for the maintenance of the schemes when completed. His Excellency replied that it would be necessary to increase the present rates on house property in Stanley. It was also anticipated that additional revenue would be derived from the sale of water."

It is not proposed at present at any rate that the full cost of the maintenance of the roads and drains, and of the conservancy and scavenging services in Stanley shall be met by direct taxation from this source but it is considered equitable that the rate-payers of Stanley should contribute an increased proportion of such maintenance in return for the increased benefits which they will enjoy as the result of the Stanley Improvement Scheme; nor is it proposed that the maximum rate of 5/- in the £ provided in the Bill shall be immediately imposed.

In any case the amount of rate to be levied will, as heretofore, rest with the Legislative Council to fix from year to year.

A Bill

To amend the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Repeal and replacement of section 2 of Ordinance No 4 of 1905.

1. Section 2 of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following section:—

“For all house property in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect thereof for every twenty shillings of its annual value the sum of nine pence or such further sum not exceeding in the aggregate five shillings as may be sanctioned annually by the Legislative Council, such value to be assessed in open Court in the first fortnight in January in every year by the Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley whose decision shall be final. All rates shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer before the 31st day of March in each year.”

Date of operation.

2. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 1st day of January, 1928.

Short Title.

3. This Ordinance shall be cited as “The Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927”, and shall be read and construed as one with The Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under Sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894, and approved by the Governor in Council.

1. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated (Amendment) Bye-laws, 1927." Short Title.

2. Sections 30 and 31 of The Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1921, are hereby repealed and replaced by the following sections: Repeal & replacement of Sections 30 and 31 of the Consolidated Bye-laws, 1921.

30. It shall be lawful for the Board, when it shall consider it necessary, to order any person licensed to keep cows for the purpose of selling milk to produce a certificate from the Chief Inspector of Stock or a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon to the effect that any cow or cows so kept have been examined by the said Chief Inspector of Stock or Veterinary Surgeon and found to be free from tuberculosis or any contagious or infectious disease.

31. (1) Any cow found by the Chief Inspector of Stock or a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon to be infected with tuberculosis may be destroyed by order of the Board.

(2) Provided that a compensation not exceeding £5 shall, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, be paid to the owner of such cow.

In accordance with Section 13 of the Savings Bank Ordinance, 1888, I have the honour to submit the following report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank in respect of the period 1st October, 1925 to 30th September, 1926.

Summary of Transactions.

2. During the year there were 741 deposits as against 258 withdrawals. The average monthly deposits amounted to £1,838 : 13 : 8 as against average monthly withdrawals of £1,514 : 12 : 4.

3. During the year 80 new accounts were opened and 44 accounts were closed, leaving 897 deposit accounts at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor equalled a sum of £144 : 3 : 11, or about £57 per head of the population (2271). A monthly summary of the transactions of the Bank is appended hereto.

4. The accrued interest credited to the various accounts during the year amounted to £2,939 : 2 : 1. The deposits during the year, with accrued interest (£25,003 : 6 : 2) exceeded the withdrawals (£18,175 : 8 : 0) by a sum of £6,827 : 18 : 2, leaving a balance to the credit of depositors on the 30th September, 1926, of £129,345 : 2 : 11.

In accordance with paragraph 10 (2) of the Falkland Islands Note Order, 1899, I beg to submit the following Report on the transactions of the Commissioners of Currency in respect of the year ended 31st December, 1926.

The Currency Note Guarantee Fund.

2. On the 1st January, 1926, the nominal value of the currency notes in circulation amounted to £18,000. During the year it was found necessary to increase the currency note issue from £18,000 to £20,000, and the £2,000 received by the Commissioners was allocated as follows:—

- (a) THE COIN PORTION. During the year the coin portion of the Note Guarantee Fund was increased from £7,200 to £8,000, which amount of £8,000, is deposited in the Commissioners Strong Room in the Colony.
- (b) THE INVESTMENT PORTION. On the 1st January, 1926, the investment portion of the Note Guarantee Fund amounted to £10,800. During the year a further sum of £1,200 was expended in the purchase of approved Securities and on the 31st December, 1926, the investment portion of the Fund amounted to £12,000.

Note Depreciation Fund.

3. On the 1st January, 1926, the Currency Note Depreciation Fund amounted to £1,200. No change was required to be made during the year either to increase or decrease this Fund as the total of the Fund equalled 10% of the cost price of the Securities forming the investment portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, in conformity with the provisions of the Principal Order, 1899.

Currency Note Issue.

4. On the 1st January, 1926, the face value of the notes in circulation amounted to £18,000. During the year a further issue of notes was made by the Commissioners amounting to a face value of £2,000, leaving in circulation on the 31st December, 1926, notes of a face value of £20,000.

Ordinance No. of 1927.

A Bill To Regulate the Supply of Water to Stanley.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

Enacting Clause.

1. In this Ordinance

Definitions.

“Connections” means all pipes, valves, cisterns, cocks or other appliances of any kind by which water is conducted or is intended to be conducted and which are used or are intended to be used for

supplying any land, premises or tenement with water from the Water Works and which are private property.

"Gathering Ground" means the surface of the land from which water is gathered and flows into the Water Works.

"Tenement" means any land with or without buildings which is held or occupied as a distinct and separate holding or tenancy.

"Water Authority" includes any duly authorised person acting for and on behalf of or on the order of the Water Authority to be appointed by the Governor as hereinafter provided.

"Water Works" means the Stanley Water Works and includes any reservoir, dam, filter-bed or other appliance used or intended to be used for collecting, storing or purifying water, and any pipe or other appliance used or intended to be used for conveying water which is or may hereafter become the property of the Government.

Water Authority.

2. The Governor may from time to time appoint any person to be or to act as Water Authority and when made may revoke such appointment.

Duties of Water Authority.

3. The duties of the Water Authority shall include the management of the Water Works and the control of all matters appertaining thereto. The Water Authority shall be responsible to the Governor for the proper performance of these duties and for the carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance and of the Regulations made thereunder.

Power of Water Authority to sue.

4. The Water Authority shall be competent with the approval of the Governor to bring an action in the Courts of the Colony in any matter affecting the management or control of the Water Works or in pursuance of any of the provisions of this Ordinance or of the Regulations made thereunder.

General Powers of Water Authority.

5. The Water Authority may

- (1) at any time enter on any land, premises or tenement where connections are laid and inspect and repair such connections.
- (2) after due notice to the owner or occupier thereof lay through any land mains or branch mains such as may be necessary.

Governor may make Regulations.

6. The Governor in Council may make regulations

- (1) As to the conditions on which and the manner in which connections may be laid from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement for the supply of water for domestic or for other than domestic purposes.
- (2) As to the price to be paid by private persons to the Water Authority for connections or for repairs thereto where such connections are laid or such repairs are effected by the Water Authority.
- (3) As to the price to be paid by private persons to the Water Authority for materials supplied by the Water Authority for connections or for repairs thereto where such connections are not laid and such repairs are not effected by the Water Authority.

- (4) As to the conditions including quantity and time of supply on which water may be supplied from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement for domestic or for other than domestic purposes.
- (5) As to the price at which water may be supplied from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement for domestic or for other than domestic purposes.
- (6) For the prevention of waste or abuse of water supplied from the Water Works and for the protection of the Water Works and of the water therein.
- (7) Generally for carrying into effect any of the purposes or provisions of this Ordinance.

7. Where any connection from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement shall have been laid by order of the Water Authority and any interruption or insufficiency of the supply of water from the Water Works to such connections shall be caused by drought or by any other unavoidable circumstance the Water Authority shall not be liable to any claim for compensation on account of such interruption or insufficiency.

Water Authority not liable for interruption or insufficiency of supply.

8. It shall not be lawful for any person to

Offences.

- (1) put or cause or allow to be put in any main or branch main forming a part of the Water Works any cock, valve or other contrivance for drawing water therefrom except on the order of the Water Authority.
- (2) put or cause or allow to be put into any source in the gathering ground or into any reservoir, dam or filter bed forming a part of the Water Works any foul or injurious matter liable to pollute or render the water therein unfit for use or to impede the flow of water therein.
- (3) allow any animal to graze or to stray within the area of the gathering ground except on the order of the Water Authority.
- (4) wilfully to damage or to cause or allow to be damaged any part of the Water Works.
- (5) open or close or in any way to interfere with or cause or allow to be opened or closed or in any way to be interfered with any cock, valve or sluice forming a part of the Water Works except on the order of the Water Authority.
- (6) alter or change or cause or allow to be altered or changed any cock, valve or other appliance forming a part of the Water Works with the intent to obtain more water thereby except on the order of the Water Authority.

9. Any person who shall be convicted of any of the offences set out in the preceding section or of any breach or violation of the provisions of this Ordinance or of the Regulations made thereunder shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding one year or to both such penalties.

Penalties.

Date of operation.

10. This Ordinance shall come into force on a date to be notified by notification in the Gazette.

Short Title.

11. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Water Supply Ordinance, 1927."

Minutes of Meeting held on the 9th November, 1926.

Clause 2 was recommitted and agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To amend the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, 1925" was read a *first* time.

Report on Education in the Colony for the year 1926.

—:O:—

General.

The educational facilities available in the Falkland Islands fall, in view of the peculiar local conditions, into three groups :—

1. Those at Stanley, the only township in the Colony.
2. Those at Darwin, the Falkland Islands Company's main camp settlement.
3. Those in the outside country districts with their very scattered farm settlements.

STANLEY : There are two schools in Stanley. A Government School is maintained from public funds, which, whilst being elementary in character, also makes provision for attendance at a Continuation Class for a two years' course of further education. Under a scheme instituted in 1924, the School further caters for children from the 'Camps' or country districts, whose parents are willing to send them to Stanley to be educated. These Camp children are either boarded and lodged in a Government Hostel, and taught in the School at an inclusive charge of £1 a month during residence, or if boarded in private houses, the Government contributes two-thirds of the cost not exceeding £2 a month.

There is also a Convent School managed by Roman Catholic Sisters; this School, however, is not subject to Government control, and receives no subsidy.

DARWIN : Here for many years past, the Falkland Islands Company has maintained, in the interest of its employees a small school with a resident certificated master.

CAMP DISTRICTS. Two travelling teachers are provided by Government — one for the East and one for the West Falkland. These teachers travel from settlement to settlement devoting a certain amount of time to each. The Falkland Islands Company, also, supports two Camp Teachers for the children of their employees in outlying districts.

During the period under review the Staff was short of its proper complement by the Headmaster and one Assistant Mistress who were absent on leave from 18th April to 2nd November and by the Assistant Master from the beginning of the year until his arrival to assume duty on the 3rd February.

4. The attendance at the School from the beginning of the year to the end of April was very good averaging over 91% and it continued to be good until the end of the first half of the year. From this time onwards to the end of the year the attendance fell off considerably on account of the extraordinary closures which were necessitated by recurrence of illness in Stanley.

5. The Colonial Surgeon visited the School as usual during the year and the Dental Surgeon also paid several visits. The children were reported to be suffering from bad teeth, tonsils and adenoids. Parents were invited to be present at these visits and where necessary were informed of the treatment required.

7. The Continuation Class instituted in 1924 was in operation throughout the year in spite of many difficulties and was attended at the end of the year by nine scholars three of whom were boys and six girls.

8. It is disappointing to record that the number of boarders at the School Hostel for children from country districts showed a decrease to seven during the year. A similar decrease to nine was also recorded in the number of outside boarders. Parents in the outlying parts of the Colony seem not to appreciate fully the benefits of the scheme for the boarding and education of their children at Stanley or at any rate not to desire to any extent to take advantage of them. The arrangements made for the upkeep of the School Hostel worked satisfactorily during the year.

9. I have to plead short residence in the Colony during 1926 as the reason of my inability to make any report in detail on the work or progress of the School. Moreover during this short residence the School was for the greater part closed and such visits as I had cause to pay to it were connected almost entirely with the question of its closing and reopening. The Government Schoolmaster has submitted a report from which I quote extracts giving, so far as I am in a position to judge, an accurate if not wholly satisfactory account of the School at the end of the year. I am satisfied, however, that the position therein revealed can properly be laid to the door of circumstance and should not be taken as implying any adverse criticism of Mr. Hoare or of the members of the Staff.—

“The work of the Government School suffered during 1926 from the prevalence of illness in Stanley and from the absense of myself and my wife who is one of the Assistant Mistresses on leave from the middle of April to the beginning of November.

"From my return on the 3rd of November to end of the School year in December the school was open only $16\frac{1}{2}$ days and even then the attendance averaged below 70%. During the year the School was closed $7\frac{1}{2}$ weeks in addition to the usual closures.

"As was to be expected from these circumstances the condition of the School at the end of the year was poor. The condition of things is such that it will require unceasing effort on the part of every member of the staff if the School is to be in a satisfactory position by the end of 1927."

It is reassuring to observe that the Government Schoolmaster is so keenly alive to the need of a special endeavour during the coming year and it is therefore unnecessary perhaps for me further to elaborate this section of my report.

Travelling Teachers.

10. The Government Travelling Teacher employed on the East Falkland was away on leave for a large portion of the year and it has not been practicable in the circumstances to form any real appreciation of the value of the work performed by him. A Travelling Teacher for the West Falkland arrived in February to fill the vacancy caused in the previous year. In view of the comparative lack of support for the scheme of the boarding and education in Stanley of children from the country districts, to which reference is made in a preceding section of this report, it has become apparent that the services of a second Travelling Teacher for the West Falkland are essentially required and the necessary steps in this direction are being taken.

7. The total Revenue for the Falklands for the year, including Land Sales (£7343 : 16 : 7) and Marine Insurance Fund (£606) amounted to £59,762 : 13 : 4.

8. The total Expenditure for the Falklands, exclusive of payments made from the Land Sales Fund, amounted to £48,099 : 3 : 11, which amount was met from the ordinary Revenue for the year, leaving an excess of Revenue over Expenditure amounting to £3,713 : 12 : 10.

9. On the 1st January 1926, the surplus ordinary Revenue that had accumulated to the credit of the Falklands in the general account of the Colony amounted to £38,178 : 3 : 2, which, added to the total ordinary Revenue for the year (£51,812 : 16 : 9) makes a total of £89,990 : 19 : 11. This amount less the total Expenditure for the same period (£48,099 : 3 : 11) leaves a surplus balance of ordinary Revenue to the credit of the Falklands on the 31st December 1926 of £41,891 : 16 : 0.

It will become automatically adjusted at an early date.

Farm Improvement Loans.

19. On the 1st January, 1926, the balance outstanding amounted to £1,000. During the year repayments amounting to £100 were received leaving a balance outstanding on the 31st December, 1926 of £900. Interest received during the year amounted to £37 : 12 : 7 and this amount was credited to Falklands Revenue under Head V (I) Land Sales Investment Fund.

The Marine Insurance Fund.

To legalize certain payments made in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-six in excess of the Expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 5 of 1925.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make further provision for the service of the Colony for the year 1926. Preamble.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :— Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Supplementary Appropriation (1926) Ordinance, 1927." Short Title.

2. The sums of money set forth in the Schedule hereto having been expended for the Service therein mentioned beyond the amounts granted for those Services by the Ordinance providing for the Service of the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-six, the same are hereby declared to have been duly laid out and expended for the Service of the Colony in that year, and are hereby approved, allowed and granted in addition to the sums mentioned for those Services in the said Ordinance. Appropriation of excess of Expenditure for the year 1926.

An Ordinance

To amend the Customs Ordinance (No. 6 of 1903) and to provide for the Regulation of the Coasting Trade in the Falkland Islands.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Customs Amendment (Coasting Trade) Ordinance, 1927," and shall be read and construed as one with the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Short Title.

2. All trade by sea from any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof shall be deemed to be a coasting trade and all vessels while employed therein shall be deemed to be coasting vessels and no part of the Falkland Islands however situated with regard to any other part shall be deemed in law with reference to each other to be parts beyond the seas.

All trade by sea from part of the Falkland Islands to another to be deemed coastwise and no part to be deemed beyond the seas.

3. All vessels shall, when employed in the coasting trade have a licence from the Collector ; and if any such vessel be so employed without such licence the owner of the vessel shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

Coasting vessels to be licensed.

4. Goods the produce of the Falkland Islands and goods upon which import duties have been paid in the Falkland Islands and goods duty free on importation into the Falkland Islands may be carried in any coasting vessel trading between any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof and the master of such coasting vessel shall answer all such questions concerning the vessel and the cargo and the voyage as shall be demanded of him by the Collector or Officer of Customs ; and in case of failure or refusal to answer such questions or answer truly the master shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £20.

Description of goods which may be carried in coasting vessels.

Coasting ship confined to coasting voyage.

5. No goods to be carried coastwise shall be taken into or put out of any coasting vessel at sea or over the sea and if any such goods shall be taken into or put out of any coasting vessel at sea or over the sea or if any coasting vessel shall touch at any place over the sea, or deviate from her voyage, unless forced by unavoidable circumstances, or if the master of any coasting ship which shall have touched as aforesaid at any place over the sea shall not declare the same in writing under his hand to the Collector on the arrival of such ship at the Falkland Islands the master of such ship shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £100.

Proper Officer of Customs may go on board and examine any coasting vessel.

6. It shall be lawful in any case for the proper officer of Customs to go on board any coasting vessel in any port or place in the Falkland Islands or at any period of her voyage and strictly to search such vessel and to examine all goods on board and all goods being laden or unladen and to demand all documents which ought to be on board such vessel.

Provisions of Ordinance not to apply to vessels bringing cargo or passengers from abroad or taking cargo or passengers for abroad.

7. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall prevent any vessel from proceeding without a licence of the Collector as aforesaid from any one part of the Falkland Islands to any other part thereof for the purpose either of landing the whole or part of its cargo or passengers brought from a place outside the Colony or of taking on board the whole or part of its cargo or passengers for a place outside the Colony.

Amendment of sections 9 and 35 of Ordinance 6 of 1903.

8. Sections nine and thirty-five of the Customs Ordinance, 1903, are hereby amended by the addition thereto in either case of of the following proviso -

Provided that the provisions of this section shall not apply to vessels employed in the coasting trade of the Falkland Islands under a licence from the Collector.

Repeal of section 10 of Ordinance 2 of 1902.

9. Section ten of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902, is hereby repealed.

Suspending Clause.

10. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be notified in the Gazette and in no case before His Majesty's pleasure thereon has been publicly signified by notification in the Gazette.

To amend the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. Section 2 of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following section:—

Repeal and replacement of section 2 of Ordinance No 4 of 1905.

“For all house property in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect thereof for every twenty shillings of its annual value the sum of nine pence or such further sum not exceeding in the aggregate five shillings as may be sanctioned annually by the Legislative Council, such value to be assessed in open Court in the first fortnight in January in every year by the Justices of the Peace resident in Stanley whose decision shall be final. All rates shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer before the 31st day of March in each year.”

2. This Ordinance shall come into force on the 1st day of January, 1928.

Date of operation.

3. This Ordinance shall be cited as “The Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927”, and shall be read and construed as one with The Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905.

Short Title.

An Ordinance
To Regulate the Supply of Water to Stanley.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

Definitions.

1. In this Ordinance

“Connections” means all pipes, valves, cisterns, cocks or other appliances of any kind by which water is conducted or is intended to be conducted and which are used or are intended to be used for supplying any land, premises or tenement with water from the Water Works and which are private property.

“Gathering Ground” means all that area of land from which water is gathered and flows into the Water Works and which is duly reserved for such purpose.

“Tenement” means any land with or without buildings which is held or occupied as a distinct and separate holding or tenancy.

“Water Authority” includes any duly authorised person acting for and on behalf of or on the order of the Water Authority to be appointed by the Governor as hereinafter provided.

“Water Works” means the Stanley Water Works and includes any reservoir, dam, filter-bed or other appliance used or intended to be used for collecting, storing or purifying water, and any pipe or other appliance used or intended to be used for conveying water which is or may hereafter become the property of the Government.

2. The Governor may from time to time appoint any person to be or to act as Water Authority and when made may revoke such appointment.

Water Authority.

3. The duties of the Water Authority shall include the management of the Water Works and the control of all matters appertaining thereto. The Water Authority shall be responsible to the Governor for the proper performance of these duties and for the carrying out of the provisions of this Ordinance and of the Regulations made thereunder.

Duties of Water Authority.

4. The Water Authority shall be competent with the approval of the Governor to bring an action in the Courts of the Colony in any matter affecting the management or control of the Water Works or in pursuance of any of the provisions of this Ordinance or of the Regulations made thereunder.

Power of Water Authority to sue.

5. The Water Authority may

General Powers of Water Authority.

- (1) at any time enter on any land, premises or tenement where connections are laid and inspect and repair such connections.
- (2) after due notice to the owner or occupier thereof lay through any land mains or branch mains such as may be necessary.

6. The Governor in Council may make regulations

Governor may make Regulations.

- (1) As to the conditions on which and the manner in which connections may be laid from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement for the supply of water for domestic or for other than domestic purposes.
- (2) As to the price to be paid by private persons to the Water Authority for connections or for repairs thereto where such connections are laid or such repairs are effected by the Water Authority.
- (3) As to the price to be paid by private persons to the Water Authority for materials supplied by the Water Authority for connections or for repairs thereto where such connections are not laid and such repairs are not effected by the Water Authority.
- (4) As to the conditions including quantity and time of supply on which water may be supplied from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement for domestic or for other than domestic purposes.
- (5) As to the price at which water may be supplied from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement for domestic or for other than domestic purposes.
- (6) For the prevention of waste or abuse of water supplied from the Water Works and for the protection of the Water Works and of the water therein.
- (7) Generally for carrying into effect any of the purposes or provisions of this Ordinance.

7. Where any connection from the Water Works to any private land, premises or tenement shall have been laid by order of the Water Authority and any interruption or insufficiency of the supply of water from the Water Works to such connections shall be caused by drought or by any other unavoidable circumstance the Water Authority shall not be liable to any claim for compensation on account of such interruption or insufficiency.

Water Authority not liable for interruption or insufficiency of supply.

Offences.

8. It shall not be lawful for any person to

- (1) put or cause or allow to be put in any main or branch main forming a part of the Water Works any cock, valve or other contrivance for drawing water therefrom except on the order of the Water Authority.
- (2) put or cause or allow to be put into any source in the gathering ground or into any reservoir, dam or filter bed forming a part of the Water Works any foul or injurious matter liable to pollute or render the water therein unfit for use or to impede the flow of water therein.
- (3) allow any animal to graze or to stray within the area of the gathering ground except on the order of the Water Authority.
- (4) wilfully to damage or to cause or allow to be damaged any part of the Water Works.
- (5) open or close or in any way to interfere with or cause or allow to be opened or closed or in any way to be interfered with any cock, valve or sluice forming a part of the Water Works except on the order of the Water Authority.
- (6) alter or change or cause or allow to be altered or changed any cock, valve or other appliance forming a part of the Water Works with the intent to obtain more water thereby except on the order of the Water Authority.

Penalties.

9. Any person who shall be convicted of any of the offences set out in the preceding section or of any breach or violation of the provisions of this Ordinance or of the Regulations made thereunder shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding one year or to both such penalties.

Short Title.

10. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Water Supply Ordinance, 1927."

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under The Stanley Water Supply Ordinance, 1927.

J. M. ELLIS,

Acting Governor.

Preamble.

In virtue of the powers vested in him by section 6 of the Stanley Water Supply Ordinance, 1927 and otherwise, His Excellency is hereby pleased, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, to make the following Regulations :-

Connections to private property for domestic purposes.

1. Connections for the supply of water from the Water Works to any private property for domestic purposes shall not be made except on the order of the Water Authority.

Application for connections how to be made.

2. Any owner of private property who is desirous of laying connections for the supply of water from the Water Works to his property for domestic purposes shall make an application in writing to the Water Authority and shall state full particulars of the property concerned and of the nature of the supply desired.

Grant of application subject to the approval of the Governor.

3. The Water Authority may grant or refuse any application for the supply of water from the Water Works to any private property for domestic purposes, subject to the approval of the Governor, and shall not be called upon to assign any reason for the grant or refusal of any such application.

Annual rate payable for connections to private property.

4. The annual rate to be paid by the owner of any private property in respect of connections for the supply of water from the Water Works to such private property for domestic purposes shall be the one-half of the annual rate paid by such owner in respect of such private property under section 2 of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, as amended by the Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927, and shall be additional thereto.

Connections to be at owner's expense.

5. Connections for the supply of water from the Water Works to any private property for domestic purposes shall be laid at the expense of the owner thereof and no expense whatsoever shall fall thereby on the Water Authority.

Connections where to be made.

6. The Water Authority shall convey water in the Water Works to the boundary of the private property and the owner of the private property shall lay the connections from the boundary, provided that the Water Authority shall make the junction between the Water Works and the connections and that the Water Authority may at his discretion and for his convenience lay on the private property any pipe, cock, valve or other appliance as may be required for the connections, that such pipe, cock, valve or other appliance shall remain the property of the Water Authority, and that the Water Authority shall at any reasonable time have ready access thereto.

Connections not to be laid or put into use except on order of Water Authority.

7. Connections for the supply of water from the Water Works to private property for domestic purposes shall conform in all respects with the requirements of the Water Authority and shall not be laid or put into use except on the order of the Water Authority.

Pipes and fittings to be of approved type.

8. Only pipes and fittings of a type approved by the Water Authority shall be permitted to be laid as part of any connections to private property from the Water Works.

Pipes and fittings to be protected.

9. All pipes and fittings being a part of any connections to private property from the Water Works shall be adequately protected against frost. Where any pipes or fittings are laid in the ground they shall be not less than one foot and six inches below the surface

of the ground and where any pipes or fittings are exposed they shall be lagged or boxed in with packing to the satisfaction of the Water Authority.

10. No person shall tap any main being a part of the Water Works or shall interfere in any way with any valve on any main being a part of the Water Works except on the order of the Water Authority.

Tapping of mains prohibited.

11. If any tap or any pipe being a part of any connections to private property from the Water Works shall be found to be leaky or defective the owner thereof shall be held responsible and shall cause such tap or pipe to be replaced or repaired within a reasonable period after the receipt of a written notice to such effect from the Water Authority.

Tap or pipe found leaky.

12. No person who shall have laid connections to his private property for the supply thereto of water from the Water Works for domestic purposes shall make use of the water thereby supplied for irrigation or gardening or for any purpose other than domestic.

Water not to be used for other purposes.

13. If the Water Authority shall perform any work on behalf of any person in respect of the installation, maintenance, replacement or repair of any connections for the supply of water from the Water Works to the private property of such person for domestic purposes the Water Authority shall receive in payment from such person for such work the actual cost thereof and in addition an amount not exceeding ten per cent of such actual cost.

Payment for work performed for private persons by Water Authority.

14. No person shall take water from the public fountains being part of the Water Works for irrigation or gardening or for any purpose other than domestic.

Water not be taken from public fountains for other than domestic use.

15. No person shall tamper or in any way interfere with any fire hydrant, cock, valve or other appliance forming part of the Water Works except on the order of the Water Authority or for some lawful and necessary purpose as on the outbreak of fire.

Interference with fire hydrants, valves, etc., prohibited.

16. The Water Authority may at any time and for any period cut off the supply of water from the Water Works to any connections to private property

Water Authority may cut off supply.

- (1) if he is satisfied that any nuisance liable to pollute the water in the Water Works or to cause damage to the Water Works exists on any private property or in any connections thereto until such time as the nuisance shall have been removed or remedied by the owner of such private property.
- (2) whenever any connections to private property are out of repair or are not in conformity with the provisions of these regulations and are liable to cause waste of the water from the Water Works or to pollute the water in the Water Works and the necessary repairs or alterations thereto have not been effected within a reasonable period after the receipt by the owner of such private property of a written notice to such effect from the Water Authority until such time as the necessary repairs or alterations shall have been effected by the owner of such private property.
- (3) whenever the available supply is insufficient by reason of drought or any other unavoidable circumstance.

- (4) whenever it shall be necessary or expedient for the purpose of repairing, cleaning or altering the Water Works or of carrying out any work on the Water Works or on any connections therefrom.
- (5) in any case of the continued breach or violation of any of the provisions of the Stanley Water Supply Ordinance, 1927, and of any regulations made thereunder.

Short title.

17. These Regulations may be cited as the "Stanley Water Supply Regulations, 1927."

George the Fifth by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India: To Our Trusty and Well-beloved ARNOLD WIENHOLT HODSON, Esquire, Companion of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Greeting.

WE do, by this Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet, appoint you, the said ARNOLD WIENHOLT HODSON, to be, during Our pleasure, Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, with all the powers, rights, privileges, and advantages to the said Office belonging or appertaining.

II. And We do hereby authorise, empower, and command you to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in certain Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster, the Twenty-fifth day of February 1892, constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our said Colony, together with certain other Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Nineteenth day of September, 1914, providing for the appointment in certain events of a Deputy to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Our said Colony, and in certain Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-first day of July 1908, declaring that the groups of Islands known as South Georgia, the South Orkneys, the South Shetlands and the Sandwich Islands, and the territory known as Graham Land, should become dependencies of Our said Colony, together with certain further Letters Patent bearing date at Westminster the Twenty-eighth day of March 1917, providing for the administration of the islands and territories therein defined, as dependencies of Our said Colony, or in any other Letters Patent adding to, amending, or substituted for the same, according to such Orders and Instructions as Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief hath already received, and to such further Orders and Instructions as you may hereafter receive from Us.

III. And further We do hereby appoint that, so soon as you shall have taken the prescribed Oaths and have entered upon the duties of your Office, this Our present Commission shall supersede Our Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date, the Sixteenth day of August 1920, appointing Our Trusty and Well-beloved JOHN MIDDLETON, Esquire (now SIR JOHN MIDDLETON, Knight Commander of Our Most Excellent Order of the British Empire), Companion of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.

IV. And We do hereby command all and singular Our Officers and loving subjects in Our said Colony and its Dependencies, and all others whom it may concern, to take due notice hereof, and to give their ready obedience accordingly.

A Bill

To declare the Law relating to Live Stock Marks.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

Enacting Clause.

1. In this Ordinance

Definitions.

"LIVE STOCK" means cattle, horses and sheep.

"MARK" means any mark or brand placed upon the skin, wool or ear of any live stock.

"OWNER" includes owner's manager or authorised agent.

2. All sheep shall be distinctly and legibly marked with the registered mark of the owner thereof and all lambs shall be distinctly and legibly marked with the registered mark of the owner thereof before the thirtieth day of April in each year and for every sheep and for every lamb not so marked and kept marked the owner thereof shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two shillings.

All sheep to be marked.

3. The registered mark for sheep shall be on the right or off ear for males and on the left or near ear for females and no mark other than the registered mark shall be placed on the ear as aforesaid.

Mark on sheep how to be placed.

4. Every owner of sheep and every owner of cattle and of horses who places a mark upon the cattle and horses owned by him shall register a mark and every such owner who neglects to register a mark shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

Mark to be registered.

5. The Governor may from time to time appoint any person to be or to act as Registrar of Live Stock Marks (hereinafter called the Registrar) and may revoke such appointment.

Registrar of Marks how appointed.

- Application for registration how to be made. 6. Every owner of live stock who desires to register a mark shall apply to the Registrar and shall deposit with the Registrar two correct copies of the mark which he desires to register on the form set out in the Schedule to this Ordinance provided that such form may be amended or replaced by order of the Governor on notification published in the Gazette.
- Registration when complete. 7. The registration of a mark shall be deemed to have been completed when the forms referred to in the preceding section have been duly signed and dated by the Registrar and such forms shall not thereafter be altered in any way.
- Fee for registration. 8. There shall be paid to the Registrar a fee of ten shillings by the owner of live stock who desires to register a mark, before the registration is completed.
- Mark may be relinquished. 9. Any owner of live stock having a mark registered may by notice in writing to the Registrar relinquish his right to such mark and may nominate some other owner of live stock in whose name such mark may be registered in manner aforesaid and on payment of the fee aforesaid.
- Mark may be deemed to be relinquished. 10. When the Registrar is satisfied that any registered mark has not been used for at least two years previously by the owner of live stock in whose name it has been registered such mark shall be deemed to have been relinquished and the registration of such mark shall be cancelled.
- Use of unregistered mark unlawful. 11. Any person who marks any live stock or causes or permits any live stock to be marked with a mark which is not registered shall be liable to a fine not exceeding ten shillings and to a fine not exceeding sixpence for every head of live stock so marked.
- Use of registered mark or of similar mark by other person unlawful. 12. Any person who marks any live stock or causes or permits any live stock to be marked with a mark registered in the name of any other person without the authority of such other person or with any mark so nearly similar to such registered mark as to be in the opinion of the Registrar not easily distinguishable therefrom shall be liable to a fine not exceeding ten shillings and to a fine not exceeding sixpence for every head of live stock so marked.
- Wrongful marking. 13. It shall not be lawful for any person wilfully or negligently to mark or to cause or permit to be marked with the mark registered in the name of such person any live stock of which he is not owner.
- Defacement of marks unlawful. 14. Any person who destroys, defaces or alters the mark on any live stock or who causes or permits the destruction defacement or alteration of the mark on any live stock except that he is the owner of such live stock shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds and to a fine not exceeding one pound for every head of live stock in respect of which such destruction defacement or alteration shall have been done caused or permitted, or alternatively, to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding two years.
- Approved instruments only to be used for ear marking. 15. No implements other than implements of a type approved by the Registrar shall be used for the marking of the ears of any sheep, horses or cattle.
- Mutilation of ear unlawful. 16. Any person who wilfully removes more than the one-fourth of the whole ear of any live stock whether he is the owner of such live stock or not shall be liable to a fine not exceeding ten pounds and to a fine not exceeding two shillings for every head of live stock so treated.
- Proof of ownership. 17. The mark or impression of a registered mark on any live stock shall be *prima facie* evidence of the ownership of the said live stock by the person in whose name such mark is registered.

18. Notwithstanding anything in this Ordinance contained to the contrary any owner on whose land or in whose shed any stragglers or stray sheep shall have been shorn shall forthwith distinctly and legibly mark such sheep on the head with his registered wool mark, or if he has no registered wool mark, with a distinguishing mark of paint or tar.

Stray sheep how to be marked.

19. An Inspector of Stock may at any time on stating his business call upon any person in possession of undressed skins or hides and may demand that such undressed skins or hides be produced for his inspection.

Inspector may demand to inspect skins or hides.

20. It shall not be lawful for any person

Offences.

- (i) to cut off remove or destroy any ear on the skin of any live stock or carcass :
- (ii) to cut off burn or otherwise destroy any mark on any such skin :
- (iii) to be in possession of any such skin from or on which the ear or mark has been cut off or removed burnt or otherwise destroyed : or
- (iv) knowingly to purchase a raw hide or skin from which any mark has been removed burnt or otherwise destroyed except that in every instance he is able to give a satisfactory account thereof whenever called upon so to do by any Inspector of Stock, Justice of the Peace, Police Officer or Court.

21. Any person who commits or attempts to commit or is party to the committing of or attempting to commit any breach or violation of the provisions of this Ordinance for which no special penalty is herein provided shall be liable for every such breach or violation committed or attempted to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding three years or to both such penalties.

Penalties.

22. Sections fourteen, thirty-five, thirty-six and thirty-seven of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, are hereby repealed.

Repeal of sections 14, 35, 36 and 37 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1901.

23. This Ordinance shall come into force on a date to be notified by notification published in the Gazette.

To amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, and by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

1. Section 3 of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following section :—

Repeal and replacement of Section 3 of Ordinance 7 of 1924.

A refund of part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil, shall be made in accordance with the following scale :—

Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

If the average market price of first grade oil for the season in which the oil was exported,

Exceeds £45 but does not exceed £50 per ton,
6d. per barrel.

Exceeds £40 but does not exceed £45 per ton,
1/- per barrel.

Exceeds £35 but does not exceed £40 per ton,
1/6 per barrel.

Exceeds £30 but does not exceed £35 per ton,
2/- per barrel.

Does not exceed £30 per ton,
2/6 per barrel.

2. This Ordinance shall have effect from the first day of October, 1926.

Short Title.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1927", and shall be read and construed as one with the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, and by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924.

It having been brought to the knowledge of the Governor that some uncertainty with consequent dissatisfaction prevails as to the conditions on which medical treatment including surgical operations is afforded to patients in the King Edward Memorial Hospital, His Excellency directs it to be notified, for general information, that by the terms of the King Edward Hospital (Amendment) Regulations, 1926, as published on page 133 of the Gazette for the year 1926, all residents in the Colony are entitled to receive medical treatment including surgical operations as patients in the general wards on payment of the prescribed hospital fees only, viz:- 4s. 0d. per day or £1. 1s. 0d. per week subject to a remission either in whole or in part by the Governor in indigent cases.

2. Residents in the Colony who prefer to be admitted to a private ward are required to pay the prescribed hospital fees, viz:- 6s. 0d. per day or £2. 0s. 0d. per week and in addition the medical officer's fee for treatment and attendance in accordance with the scale laid down by the Governor in Council on the 20th of February, 1923, and published on page 36 of the Gazette for the year 1923. The maximum fee to be taken under this scale for major operations performed on residents in the Colony is £20.

3. His Excellency desires that it should be clearly understood that treatment in a private ward is afforded only at the express wish of the patient and that if at any time by reason of the lack of

accommodation it is not possible to admit a patient into the general wards every effort will be made to arrange additional accommodation so as to permit of his admission to the hospital on the basis of the general wards.

4. Patients who are not residents in the Colony are required to pay the prescribed hospital fees and in addition the medical officer's fee by arrangement whether they are treated in the general wards or in a private ward.

NOTICE RESPECTING CLAIMS BY BRITISH NATIONALS UNDER PARAGRAPH 4 PART X SECTION IV OF THE TREATY OF VERSAILLES.

By a Notice published in the London Gazette on the 15th February 1927, the Arbitrator appointed under Clause 4 of the Annex to Section IV of Part X of the Treaty of Versailles to assess the amount of claims by British Nationals growing out of acts committed by the German Government, or by any German Authorities, since the 31st July, 1914, and before the 4th August, 1914, has prescribed that, in the case of claimants resident in any British Colony or Protectorate, all such claims must be lodged with him before the expiration of six months from the date of the publication of this notice.

After the expiration of the period prescribed by this notice the Arbitrator will not accept any claim for consideration unless the claimant has, prior to the date of publication of this notice, notified the claim to the Controller, Local Clearing Office in this Colony and is satisfied that the failure to lodge the claim within the prescribed period arose from circumstances from which the claimant cannot justly be held responsible.

All that area of land situated to the south of Moody Valley farmstead and to the north of Mount William enclosing a portion of the river of stones and the intake, filter, and draw-off pits of the Stanley Water Works, being in area sixty-one and a half acres more or less, and bounded on the east by the Common fence for a distance of 2,833 links, on the north by a new six-wire fence for a distance of 2,273 links, on the west by a new six-wire fence for a distance of 2,579 links, and on the south by a new six-wire fence for a distance of 2,273 links. The intake of the Stanley Water Works aforesaid lies 242 links to the south of the north fence, and 818 links from the junction of the north and east fences.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under Sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Burial of carcasses
compulsory.

1. The owner of any animal which dies within the limits of the Town or the Common of Stanley shall bury the carcass of such animal within forty-eight hours of death to a depth of at least three feet.

Action to be taken by
Inspector of Nuisances
in event of failure of
owner to bury carcass.

2. If the owner as aforesaid shall fail to bury the carcass within forty-eight hours the Inspector of Nuisances on receipt of information to such effect shall serve on him a notice in writing calling upon him to bury the carcass within a further period of forty-eight hours and if the owner as aforesaid shall still fail to bury the carcass within such period of forty-eight hours the Inspector of Nuisances shall forthwith cause the carcass to be buried.

Cost to be borne by
owner.

3. In any case under the preceding bye-law where the owner as aforesaid shall fail to bury the carcass within forty-eight hours of the receipt of a notice in writing from the Inspector of Nuisances and the Inspector of Nuisances shall cause the carcass to be buried the owner as aforesaid shall pay to the Inspector of Nuisances on demand the cost of such burial not exceeding £1 and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding £5.

Short title.

4. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Board of Health (East Falkland Island) (Disposal of Carcasses) Bye-laws, 1927."

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To provide for the grant of Pensions Gratuities and other Allowances to persons who have been in the public service of the Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Pensions Ordinance, 1927." Short Title.

2. The Pensions Ordinance, 1906, and all Ordinances enacted in amendment thereof, and the Pensions Increase Ordinance, 1920, are hereby repealed. Repeal.

3. In this Ordinance and in the Regulations made hereunder, Definitions.

"PENSIONABLE OFFICE" means an office which has been declared to be pensionable under section 7 of this Ordinance.

"PUBLIC SERVICE" means service in a civil capacity under the Government of the Colony or the Imperial Government or the Government of India or of a British Colony or Protectorate or a territory under a British mandate, and any such other service as the Secretary of State may determine to be "public service" for the purpose of any provision of this Ordinance or of the Regulations made hereunder.

Service as a Governor or High Commissioner of a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate or of a territory under a British mandate, or as a Governor in India shall be deemed to be public service for the purpose of computation of pension or gratuity and of Section 11 of this Ordinance.

"OTHER PUBLIC SERVICE" means public service not under the Government of the Colony.

"SALARY" includes personal allowance, house allowance or the estimated value of free quarters and fuel allowance or the estimated value of free fuel :

Provided that the amount to be allowed for house rent or the estimated value of free quarters together with the amount to be allowed for fuel or the estimated value of free fuel shall not exceed one-sixth of the actual salary of the office.

Extent.

4. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall either diminish the rights acquired by any persons before the enactment of this Ordinance or affect pensions already granted. Otherwise the provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all public officers now or hereafter serving in the Colony and to those who having so served have been transferred to public service elsewhere.

Pensions to be charged on the revenues of the of the Colony.

5. There shall be charged on and paid out of the revenues of the Colony all such sums of money as may, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, from time to time be granted by way of pension, gratuity, or other allowance in accordance with this Ordinance and with the Regulations made hereunder to persons who have been in the service of the Colony.

Governor in Council may make Regulations.

6. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, from time to time to make, and, when made, to vary and revoke, regulations for the granting of pensions, gratuities, and other allowances under this Ordinance.

Offices when pensionable.

7. The Governor may, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, by notification in the Gazette declare any office in the public service of the Colony to be pensionable :

Provided that any office so declared to be pensionable may be declared at any time by the Governor, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, by notification in manner aforesaid to be no longer pensionable, due regard being had to existing rights.

Age from which pension may be earned.

8. No public officer shall be eligible for the grant of any pension, gratuity, or other allowance in respect of service while under the age of twenty years.

Age at which pension may be granted. Certificates required as to conduct, etc., etc.

9. Except in the case of abolition or re-organization of office no pension, gratuity, or other allowance shall be granted to any public officer who has not attained the age of sixty years unless on medical evidence to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council or the Secretary of State that he is incapable, by reason of some infirmity of mind or body, of discharging the duties of his office, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent ; nor in any case without a certificate from the Governor that he has discharged the duties of his office with such diligence and fidelity as to justify the grant to him of a pension :

Provided that, if a public officer, though not suffering from any particular illness or infirmity of mind or body likely to be permanent, becomes unfit in the opinion of the Governor in Council for the discharge of the duties of the office to which he has been appointed, and such unfitness is not attributable to misconduct or

gross negligence, and when the Governor in Council considers that the special circumstances of the case justify the grant to him of a pension he may be pensioned at the rate not exceeding that for which he would be qualified if he were suffering from an illness or infirmity likely to be permanent ;

Provided further that if an officer is transferred to other public service and ultimately retires at an age less than sixty years at which he is permitted by the laws or regulations of that service to retire with a pension, the pension which may be granted to him from the revenues of the Colony under this Ordinance and the Regulations made hereunder shall be payable from the date of retirement of such officer notwithstanding that he shall not be sixty years of age.

10. Where an officer is removed from his office on the ground of his inability to discharge efficiently the duties thereof, and a pension, gratuity, or other allowance cannot otherwise be granted to him under the provisions of this Ordinance and of the Regulations made hereunder the Governor in Council with the approval of the Secretary of State may if he considers it justifiable, having regard to all circumstances of the case, grant such a pension, gratuity, or other allowance as he thinks just and proper but in no case exceeding in amount that for which the officer would be qualified if he were suffering from some infirmity of mind or body likely to be permanent.

Pension payable when officer is retired on grounds of inefficiency.

11. (1) A pension granted to an officer under this Ordinance shall not exceed two-thirds of the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by him at any time in the course of his service in the Colony.

Maximum pension from all public sources.

(2) Where the officer has been or is granted a pension or pensions in respect of other public service, he may be granted the full pension for which he is eligible in respect of his service in the Colony, but no person may at any time draw from the funds of the Colony an amount of pension which, when added to the amount of any pension or pensions drawn in respect of other public service, exceeds two-thirds of the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such person at any time in the course of his service in the Colony or in other public service :

Provided that where such a person receives, in respect of some period of public service, both a gratuity and a pension, the amount of such pension shall be deemed, for the purpose of this sub-section, to be four-thirds of its actual amount.

(3) In a case falling under the limitation laid down by sub-section (2) the amount of pension to be drawn from the funds of the Colony shall be subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, in order that it may be determined with due regard to the amount of any pension or pensions similarly to be drawn in respect of other public service.

(4) For the purpose of the preceding sub-sections an annual allowance granted in respect of injury shall not be taken into account ; but, where the officer is granted such an annual allowance the amount of such annual allowance which he may draw shall not exceed one-sixth of his highest pensionable emoluments at any time in the course

of his service by more than the sum by which the amount of his pension or pensions, apart from such annual allowance, falls short of two-thirds of such highest pensionable emoluments.

Age for compulsory retirement.

12. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, to require any public officer to retire from the public service of the Colony at any time after he attains the age of sixty years, and retirement shall be compulsory for every officer on attaining the age of sixty-five years except that, in special cases where the Secretary of State is satisfied that the retirement of an officer at sixty-five would be detrimental to the public service, his employment may be extended for a further specified period.

Increase of Pension in certain cases.

13. The pay and emoluments on which public officers have been pensioned or granted retiring gratuities or on which they would normally be pensioned or granted retiring gratuities may be increased by 25 per cent if such pay and emoluments do not exceed £300 per annum, and by 20 per cent if such pay and emoluments exceed £300 per annum subject to the following conditions :-

- (1) that the minimum additional amount on which the supplementary pension or gratuity is calculated shall be £26 per annum
- (2) that no officer with salary and emoluments exceeding £300 per annum shall receive a smaller supplementary pension or gratuity than he would have received if his salary and emoluments had been exactly £300 per annum.

Provided that nothing in this section contained shall entitle a person whose salary has been or is increased subsequent to the 1st day of January, 1920, to a pension or a retiring gratuity in excess of that which he would have received if his salary had not been increased or if this section were not in force whichever is greater.

Pensions not of right.

14. No officer shall have an absolute right to compensation for past service or to any pension, gratuity, or other allowance under this Ordinance or the Regulations made hereunder; nor shall anything in this Ordinance or such Regulations contained limit the right of the Crown to dismiss any officer without compensation.

Persons affected by re-employment.

15. If any officer to whom a pension has been granted under the provisions of this Ordinance, and of the regulations made hereunder, is appointed to another office in the service of the Colony, or in any other public service, then during his tenure of such office so much only (if any) of his pension from the funds of the Colony shall be paid to him per annum as together with

- (a) the annual emoluments of such office;
- (b) any annual amounts received on account of pension in respect of other public service; and
- (c) where the officer receives, in respect of some period of public service, both a gratuity and a pension, an annual amount equal to one-third of such pension;

make up an annual amount not greater than the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer at any time in the course of his public service :

Provided that

- (1) Where the officer retired or was transferred from the service of the Colony prior to the 1st January, 1920, the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer in the course of his service in the Colony, shall for the purposes of this section be deemed to be the highest pensionable emoluments actually so drawn by him plus fifty per cent. thereof ;
- (2) Where an officer in whose case an abatement of pension falls to be made under this section, has been granted a pension or pensions in respect of other public service, the amount of pension to be drawn from the funds of the Colony shall be subject to the approval of the Secretary of State in order that it may be determined with due regard to the amount of any pension or pensions similarly to be drawn in respect of other public service ;
- (3) Any bonus or temporary increase, whether on pension or on the salary of the new office, granted in view of the high cost of living, shall be added to such pension or salary, as the case may be, for the purpose of this section ; and
- (4) Where the new office is that of Governor or High Commissioner of a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, or of a territory under a British mandate, or that of a Governor in India, the amount to be taken as the annual emoluments of such office for the purpose of this section shall be determined by the Secretary of State.

16. When an officer holding a pensionable office who has completed five years' service and who is not serving on probation or agreement for a definite term, dies while in the service of the Colony it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to grant to his legal personal representative a gratuity not exceeding one year's pensionable emoluments.

Gratuity to estate where officer dies in the service of the Colony.

17. No pension granted under this Ordinance or under the Regulations made hereunder shall be assignable or transferable, or liable to be attached, sequestered, or levied upon, for or in respect of any debt or claims whatsoever.

Pensions not to be assignable.

18. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance, or under the Regulations made hereunder, is convicted before any Court in His Majesty's Dominions of any crime or offence for which he is sentenced to death or penal servitude or transportation, or any term of imprisonment with hard labour or exceeding twelve months, and does not within two months after such conviction receive His Majesty's free pardon, then in every such case such pension shall forthwith cease :

Pensions to cease on conviction.

Provided always, that the Governor in Council, with the consent of the Secretary of State, may, if he thinks fit, restore the pension in the case of a person who, after conviction as above described, receives His Majesty's free pardon at any time.

19. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance, or under the Regulations made hereunder, becomes a bankrupt, then such pension shall forthwith cease :

Pensions to cease on bankruptcy.

Provided always, that in any case where a pension ceases by reason of the bankruptcy of the pensioner it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, or, if such pensioner is resident in the Colony, then for the Governor in Council, from time to time during the remainder of such pensioner's life, or during such shorter period or periods, either continuous or discontinuous, as the Secretary of State or the Governor in Council shall think fit, to pay all or any part of the moneys to which such pensioner would have been entitled by way of pension had he not become a bankrupt to, or apply the same for the maintenance and personal support or benefit of, all or any, exclusive of the other or others, of the following persons, namely, such pensioner and any wife, child or children of his, in such proportions and manner as the Secretary of State or the Governor in Council thinks proper.

Conditions on which a retired officer may accept the directorship, etc., of a Company operating in the Colony.

20. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance or under the Regulations made hereunder, becomes, on his final retirement from the service of the Colony, either a Director of any Company the principal part of whose business is in any way directly concerned with the Colony, or an officer or a servant employed in the Colony by any such Company, without in every such case the permission of the Governor in writing first had and obtained, then in every case it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to direct that such pension shall forthwith cease :

Provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, on being satisfied that the person in respect of whose pension any such direction shall have been given has ceased to be a Director of such Company or to be employed as an officer or servant of such Company in the Colony, as the case may be, to give directions for the restoration of such pension, with retrospective effect, if he shall see fit, to such a date as he shall specify.

Application to Dependencies.

21. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Date of Operation.

22. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be signified by notification in the Gazette.

(A) FALKLAND ISLANDS.

I. Administration.

(a) The only change in the staff of the Medical department during 1926 was the resignation as from the 25th of April of the Assistant Colonial Surgeon, Dr. H. Morton Whitby, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. The vacancy had not been filled at the end of the year. The Colonial Surgeon was thus left single-handed to deal with the medical work except for the capable assistance of the Dental Surgeon in the administration of anæsthetics for operations performed in the Hospital.

(b) No Ordinances affecting the public health were enacted during the year.

II. Public Health.

General Remarks.

- (i) General Diseases as in previous years were rare.
- (ii) Communicable Diseases, mosquito or insect-borne, were entirely absent, but of the infectious and epidemic diseases, septic throats and bronchial catarrh had numerous victims.

Attention has been drawn in earlier reports to the number of school children in the Colony suffering from tonsillitis, adenoids, and bad teeth. This condition continues into adult life and with the prevalence of bad teeth and of a generally relaxed condition of the throat, septic infection is very common, resulting in some cases in the enlargement and even of the suppuration of the cervical glands. The affection proved readily amenable to treatment as soon as the source of the infection had been removed.

A severe epidemic of influenzal cold of the bronchial catarrh type attacked practically the whole population of Stanley in November; both old and young alike suffered and amongst those of over seventy years of age the mortality was high. The outbreak co-incided with the arrival of the R.M.S. "Oropesa" and is popularly supposed to have been introduced by this vessel. In my opinion this is not the case although it is true that many of the passengers on board had colds and coughs which were, however, of the nature commonly induced by the rapid change from the tropics to these degrees of latitude. I consider that the epidemic was of the same nature as those experienced in previous years but in a more aggravated and comprehensive form, and I would remark that the conditions under which the cargo in ships arriving at the port is worked predispose those engaged thereon to bronchial affections by the reason of the alternating heat in the holds and exposure to the cold and wet on deck.

Furthermore, the improvements in the sanitary system of the town carried out during the year have been in some degree accountable for the unusual virulence of the outbreak as the opening up of old drains and closet pits gave cause at times to the exhalation of most foul smelling effluvia. I anticipate, however, that when the works in progress are completed considerable benefit will result.

Vital Statistics.

The entire population of the Colony is of European descent and all the officials in the Government service are European.

The estimated population of the Colony on the 31st December, 1926, was 2,271. The birth rate during the year was 25.98 per 1,000 and the death rate 14.09 per 1,000. Registration of births, deaths, and marriages is compulsory under Ordinance No. 12 of 1853 and may be regarded as reliable.

Except as noted in the preceding paragraph, the general health of the population was good as also was that of the officials on the whole, of whom none died and two were invalided.

III. Hygiene and Sanitation.

The Colonial Surgeon and the Inspector of Nuisances inspected the condition of the town of Stanley at regular intervals. The roads, side-walks, and drains constructed under the Stanley Improvement Scheme have materially promoted sanitation in Stanley, and it is to be hoped that it will be found practicable to institute a public scavenging system as the natural corollary to the Scheme. Tar-spraying of the roads would be of further hygienic value, and it is understood that this is under the consideration of the executive.

Government School.

During the year the children at the Government School were inspected by the Colonial Surgeon accompanied by the Dental Surgeon and by the Hospital Matron. The Dental Surgeon also held a clinic at the Government School on several occasions, and treated many of the children. As previously reported, a large percentage were found to be suffering from tonsillitis, adenoids, and bad teeth. As a general rule they were clean and well clothed. A lack of physical development is, however, most marked in the majority of cases, and the

need of a gymnasium with a qualified instructor is much felt for the improvement of the condition and general health of the children in the Colony. By reason of the epidemic outbreaks to which reference has been made in a preceding section of this report, the Government School was closed for seven and a half weeks during the year in addition to the usual holidays.

IV. Port Health Work and Administration.

Fifty-nine vessels with a registered tonnage of 94,400 and with crews totalling 2,529, were given pratique during the year. No quarantinable diseases were reported.

V. Maternity and Child Welfare.

Eleven maternity cases were treated in the Hospital and thirteen cases in the district during the year. It is to be regretted that all cases do not avail themselves of the facilities afforded at the Hospital as it is there possible to deal with them under far more hygienic conditions than in private houses. With the introduction of a regular mail service between the Falkland Islands and the West Coast of South America I feel sure that many of the cases which at present go to England for confinement would come to the Colony where the children would be born British subjects.

Instruction is given to mothers as to the feeding and care of their infants by the certified nursing staff.

VI. Hospital.

All patients admitted to the general wards of the Hospital are under the sole charge of the Colonial Surgeon. The total number of admissions to the Hospital during 1926 was 165 of whom 155 were cured, 5 were relieved and 5 died. The number of surgical operations performed was 42.

The estimated number of outpatients treated was about 4,000 and in addition 243 visits to patients' homes were paid by the nursing staff.

VII. Prisons and Asylums.

One prisoner was in custody during the year; he enjoyed good health. The prison was inspected regularly and found to be in good order.

There were no lunatics under supervision.

VIII. Meteorology.

The climate of the Falkland Islands has been compared with that of the north of Scotland. The average level of the barometer is rather low being 29.6 inches at sea level. On the whole the readings are highest in late winter and spring, July to October, and the lowest in summer, November to April. The comparatively low readings are due to the position of the Islands in the Southern temperate storm belt.

The mean annual temperature is about 43°F. January is the warmest month, 49°F, and July the coldest, 37°F, giving an annual range of 12°F. The number of overcast days is considerable and the average cloudiness is seven tenths of the sky covered. March and September have the clearest skies. January and February are the most sunny months averaging five and a half hours of sunshine per day while June is the dullest with an average of little more than one and a half hours per day. On a calm day in summer the burning effects of the sun's rays is worse than in tropical countries but no cases of sunstroke have ever been recorded. The rainfall averages 26.43 inches per year and the prevailing wind is from the north-west with frequent winds from the south-west and north.

During 1926 the rainfall at Stanley was 25.49 inches and the mean temperature was 46.8°F, the absolute maximum, 71°F, being recorded on the 28th of February, and the absolute minimum, 18°F, on the 8th and 9th of July.

IX. Scientific.

The X-Ray apparatus at the Hospital is in good order and has proved of great value. The Boyle apparatus for the administration of chloroform, ether, and nitrous oxide gas and oxygen has rendered valuable service, but owing to the action of this climate on the rubber of the gas bag, its use had to be discontinued for a short period. Two new bags have been imported and a portion of the perished bag sent to the makers with the view to ascertaining means for the preservation locally of the composition. It is of interest to record that rubber has been observed to perish more rapidly in this climate than in the tropics.

(B) DEPENDENCIES.

The total population of South Georgia during the summer months is estimated at 1,500 approximately. There is no British medical officer at South Georgia but the whaling companies operating in the Dependency maintain their own medical men. Two medical officers also accompany the whaling fleet to the South Shetlands and the South Orkneys. No reports are available on medical and sanitary conditions in the Dependencies, but it is hoped that it may be found possible to remedy this lack in the future.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To amend the Merchant Shipping Ordinance, 1909.

Preamble.

WHEREAS by Ordinance No. 9 of 1909 (An Ordinance to extend to the Colony certain provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts of the Imperial Parliament) Part II of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, as amended by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, was applied to the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to define the expression "Home-trade ship" so far as the same shall be applicable to British ships registered in the Colony.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Definition of home-trade ship.

1. The expression "Home-trade ship" shall mean and include every ship registered in the Colony employed in trading or going within the following limits ; that is to say, the Falkland Islands, the Dependencies of the Falkland Islands, and the continent of South America between the Rio Santa Cruz, Argentine, and the Western limits of the Straits of Magellan.

Short Title.

2. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Merchant Shipping (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927."

Dear Mr. Hodson.

The King has conferred on me the G.C.M.G., evidently in recognition of the work of those responsible for the development of the Boy Scout movement and that of the Girl Guides in overseas States and Colonies.

I should like to congratulate all concerned, whether Commissioners, Scoutmasters, Guiders, Scouts or Guides, on this high mark of His Majesty's appreciation.

My only regret is that it is manifestly impossible for the King to decorate all those who deserve reward and therefore that it falls on me as the figurehead to bear the honour.

None the less I have little doubt that this fresh proof of His Majesty's interest will serve both as some return to them and as an encouragement to continued effort on their part.

As regards the Boy Scouts the most recent reports from all different parts of the Empire have been particularly satisfactory.

In India the strength of the movement has notably increased since last year; Canada shows most encouraging progress; Australia and New Zealand have been greatly to the fore during the visit of the Duke and Duchess of York; while in South Africa I have recently had personal experience of the good standing and promising development of Scouting.

Everywhere there has been strenuous work with successful results on the part of the Scouters and this expression of His Majesty's appreciation is therefore most opportune and appropriate.

I do not mean to infer by this that we have reached the acme of success. On the contrary I feel that we are only now on the threshold of greater possibilities if we go ahead and build on the foundations so well and truly laid.

I hope therefore that all will go forward with renewed determination to breed up or recruit new Scoutmasters and to gather in under the influence of the Movement not only a greater number but a larger proportion of the boys in each country so that in the coming generation a very perceptible leaven will have been trained in the elements of good citizenship.

In July and August 1929 we propose to hold our Imperial and International Scouts Jamboree to celebrate the coming of age of the Movement.

We greatly hope to see a goodly contingent of Scouts and Scouters from your Excellency's country and I need scarcely say how very warmly they will be welcomed by their brother Scouts at home.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

Relating to the Carriage of Goods by Sea.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Carriage of Goods by Sea Ordinance, 1927."

Short title.

2. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the Rules contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance, (hereinafter referred to as "the Rules") shall have effect in relation to and in connection with the carriage of goods by sea in ships carrying goods from any port in the Colony to any other port whether in or outside the Colony.

Application of Rules in Schedule.

Absolute warranty of seaworthiness not to be implied in contracts to which Rules apply.

Statement as to application of Rules to be included in bills of lading.

Modification of Article VI of Rules in relation to coasting trade.

Modification of Rules 4 and 5 of Article III in relation to bulk cargoes.

Saving Clause.

Operation.

Application to Dependencies.

3. There shall not be implied in any contract for the carriage of goods by sea to which the Rules apply any absolute undertaking by the carrier of the goods to provide a seaworthy ship.

4. Every bill of lading or similar document of title, issued in the Colony which contains or is evidence of any contract to which the Rules apply shall contain an express statement that it is to have effect subject to the provisions of the said Rules as applied by this Ordinance.

5. Article VI of the Rules shall, in relation to the carriage of goods by sea in ships carrying goods from any port in the Colony to any other port in the Colony, have effect as though the said Article referred to goods of any class instead of to particular goods and as though the proviso to the second paragraph of the said Article were omitted.

6. Where under the custom of any trade the weight of any bulk cargo inserted in the bill of lading is a weight ascertained or accepted by a third party other than the carrier or the shipper and the fact that the weight is so ascertained or accepted is stated in the bill of lading, then, notwithstanding anything in the Rules, the bill of lading shall not be deemed to be *prima facie* evidence against the carrier of the receipt of goods of the weight so inserted in the bill of lading, and the accuracy thereof at the time of shipment shall not be deemed to have been guaranteed by the shipper.

7. Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the liability of the owners of seagoing vessels as limited under the provisions of sections four hundred and forty-six to four hundred and fifty, both inclusive, five hundred and two, and five hundred and three of the Imperial Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, as amended by any subsequent enactment, or the liability of the owners of seagoing vessels as limited by any other Imperial enactment in force for the time being.

8. The Rules shall not by virtue of this Ordinance apply to any contract for the carriage of goods by sea made before such day, not being earlier than the thirty-first day of December, 1927, as the Governor in Council may direct by notification in the Gazette, nor to any bill of lading or similar document of title issued, whether before or after such day as aforesaid, in pursuance of any such contract as aforesaid.

9. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

SCHEDULE.

RULES RELATING TO BILLS OF LADING.

ARTICLE I.

DEFINITIONS.

In these Rules the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them respectively, that is to say —

- (a) "Carrier" includes the owner or the charterer who enters into a contract of carriage with a shipper :

- (b) "Contract of carriage" applies only to contracts of carriage covered by a bill of lading or any similar document of title, in so far as such document relates to the carriage of goods by sea, including any bill of lading or any similar document as aforesaid issued under or pursuant to a charterparty from the moment at which such bill of lading or similar document of title regulates the relations between a carrier and a holder of the same :
- (c) "Goods" includes goods, wares, merchandises, and articles of every kind whatsoever, except live animals and cargo which by the contract of carriage is stated as being carried on deck and is so carried :
- (d) "Ship" means any vessel used for the carriage of goods by sea :
- (e) "Carriage of goods" covers the period from the time when the goods are loaded on to the time when they are discharged from the ship.

ARTICLE II.

Risks.

Subject to the provisions of Article VI., under every contract of carriage of goods by sea the carrier, in relation to the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care, and discharge of such goods, shall be subject to the responsibilities and liabilities, and entitled to the rights and immunities hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE III.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LIABILITIES.

1. The carrier shall be bound, before and at the beginning of the voyage, to exercise due diligence to —

- (a) Make the ship seaworthy :
- (b) Properly man, equip, and supply the ship :
- (c) Make the holds, refrigerating and cool chambers, and all other parts of the ship in which goods are carried, fit and safe for their reception, carriage and preservation.

2. Subject to the provisions of Article IV., the carrier shall properly and carefully load, handle, stow, carry, keep, care for and discharge the goods carried.

3. After receiving the goods into his charge, the carrier, or the master or agent of the carrier, shall, on demand of the shipper, issue to the shipper a bill of lading showing among other things —

- (a) The leading marks necessary for identification of the goods as the same are furnished in writing by the shipper before the loading of such goods starts, provided such marks are stamped or otherwise shown clearly upon the goods if uncovered, or on the cases or coverings in which such goods are contained, in such a manner as should ordinarily remain legible until the end of the voyage ;
- (b) Either the number of packages or pieces, or the quantity, or weight, as the case may be, as furnished in writing by the shipper :
- (c) The apparent order and condition of the goods :

Provided that no carrier, master or agent of the carrier, shall be bound to state or show in the bill of lading any marks, number, quantity, or weight which he has reasonable ground for suspecting not accurately to represent the goods actually received, or which he has had no reasonable means of checking.

4. Such a bill of lading shall be *prima facie* evidence of the receipt by the carrier of the goods as therein described in accordance with paragraph 3 (a), (b), and (c).

5. The shipper shall be deemed to have guaranteed to the carrier the accuracy at the time of shipment of the marks, number, quantity, and weight, as furnished by him, and the shipper shall indemnify the carrier against all loss, damages, and expenses arising or resulting from inaccuracies in such particulars. The right of the carrier to such indemnity shall in no way limit his responsibility and liability under the contract of carriage to any person other than the shipper.

6. Unless notice of loss or damage and the general nature of such loss or damage be given in writing to the carrier or his agent at the port of discharge before or at the time of the removal of the goods into the custody of the person entitled to delivery thereof under the contract of carriage, or, if the loss or damage be not apparent, within three days such removal shall be *prima facie* evidence of the delivery by the carrier of the goods as described in the bill of lading.

The notice in writing need not be given if the state of the goods has at the time of their receipt been the subject of joint survey or inspection.

In any event the carrier and the ship shall be discharged from all liability in respect of loss or damage unless suit is brought within one year after delivery of the goods or the date when the goods should have been delivered.

In the case of any actual or apprehended loss or damage the carrier and the receiver shall give all reasonable facilities to each other for inspecting and tallying the goods.

7. After the goods are loaded the bill of lading to be issued by the carrier, master or agent of the carrier, to the shipper shall, if the shipper so demands, be a "shipped" bill of lading, provided that if the shipper shall have previously taken up any document of title to such goods, he shall surrender the same as against the issue of the "shipped" bill of lading, but at the option of the carrier such document of title may be noted at the port of shipment by the carrier, master, or agent with the name or names of the ship or ships upon which the goods have been shipped and the date or dates of shipment, and when so noted the same shall for the purpose of this Article be deemed to constitute a "shipped" bill of lading.

8. Any clause, covenant or agreement in a contract of carriage relieving the carrier or the ship from liability for loss or damage to or in connection with goods arising from negligence, fault or failure in the duties and obligations provided in this Article or lessening such liability otherwise than as provided in these Rules, shall be null and void and of no effect.

A benefit of insurance or similar clause shall be deemed to be a clause relieving the carrier from liability.

ARTICLE IV.

RIGHTS AND IMMUNITIES.

1. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be liable for loss or damage arising or resulting from unseaworthiness unless caused by want of due diligence on the part of the carrier to make the ship seaworthy, and to secure that the ship is properly manned, equipped and supplied, and to make the holds, refrigerating and cool chambers and all other parts of the ship in which goods are carried fit and safe for their reception, carriage and preservation in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article III.

Whenever loss or damage has resulted from unseaworthiness, the burden of proving the exercise of due diligence shall be on the carrier or other person claiming exemption under this section.

2. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be responsible for loss or damage arising or resulting from —

- (a) Act, neglect, or default of the master, mariner, pilot, or the servants of the carrier in the navigation or in the management of the ship :
- (b) Fire, unless caused by the actual fault or privity of the carrier :
- (c) Perils, dangers and accidents of the sea or other navigable waters :
- (d) Act of God :
- (e) Act of war :
- (f) Act of public enemies :
- (g) Arrest or restraint of princes, rulers or people, or seizure under legal process :
- (h) Quarantine restrictions :

- (i) Act or omission of the shipper or owner of the goods, his agent or representative :
- (j) Strikes or lock-outs or stoppage or restraint of labour from whatever cause, whether partial or general :
- (k) Riots and civil commotions :
- (l) Saving or attempting to save life or property at sea :
- (m) Wastage in bulk or weight or any other loss or damage arising from inherent defect, quality or vice of the goods :
- (n) Insufficiency of packing :
- (o) Insufficiency or inadequacy of marks :
- (p) Latent defects not discoverable by due diligence :
- (q) Any other cause arising without the actual fault or privity of the carrier, or without the fault or neglect of the agents or servants of the carrier, but the burden of proof shall be on the person claiming the benefit of this exception to show that neither the actual fault or privity of the carrier nor the fault or neglect of the agents or servants of the carrier contributed to the loss or damage.

3. The shipper shall not be responsible for loss or damage sustained by the carrier or the ship arising or resulting from any cause without the act, fault or neglect of the shipper, his agents or his servants.

4. Any deviation in saving or attempting to save life or property at sea, or any reasonable deviation shall not be deemed to be an infringement or breach of these Rules or of the contract of carriage, and the carrier shall not be liable for any loss or damage resulting therefrom.

5. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall in any event be or become liable for any loss or damage to or in connection with goods in an amount exceeding 100% per package or unit, or the equivalent of that sum in other currency, unless the nature and value of such goods have been declared by the shipper before shipment and inserted in the bill of lading.

This declaration if embodied in the bill of lading shall be *prima facie* evidence, but shall not be binding or conclusive on the carrier.

By agreement between the carrier, master or agent of the carrier and the shipper another maximum amount than that mentioned in this paragraph may be fixed, provided that such maximum shall not be less than the figure above named.

Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be responsible in any event for loss or damage to or in connection with goods if the nature or value thereof has been knowingly misstated by the shipper in the bill of lading.

6. Goods of an inflammable, explosive or dangerous nature to the shipment whereof the carrier, master or agent of the carrier, has not consented, with knowledge of their nature and character, may at any time before discharge be landed at any place or destroyed or rendered innocuous by the carrier without compensation, and the shipper of such goods shall be liable for all damages and expenses directly or indirectly arising out of or resulting from such shipment.

If any such goods shipped with such knowledge and consent shall become a danger to the ship or cargo, they may in like manner be landed at any place or destroyed or rendered innocuous by the carrier without liability on the part of the carrier except to general average, if any.

ARTICLE V.

SURRENDER OF RIGHTS AND IMMUNITIES, AND INCREASE OF RESPONSIBILITIES AND LIABILITIES.

A carrier shall be at liberty to surrender in whole or in part all or any of his rights and immunities or to increase any of his responsibilities and liabilities under the Rules contained in any of these Articles, provided such surrender or increase shall be embodied in the bill of lading issued to the shipper.

The provisions of these Rules shall not be applicable to charterparties, but if the bills of lading are issued in the case of a ship under a charterparty they shall comply with the terms of these Rules. Nothing in these Rules shall be held to prevent the insertion in a bill of lading of any lawful provision regarding general average.

ARTICLE VI.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS

Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding Articles, a carrier, master or agent of the carrier, and a shipper shall in regard to any particular goods be at liberty to enter into any agreement in any terms as to the responsibility and liability of the carrier for such goods, and as to the rights and immunities of the carrier in respect of such goods, or his obligation as to seaworthiness, so far as this stipulation is not contrary to public policy, or the care or diligence of his servants or agents in regard to the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care, and discharge of the goods carried by sea, provided that in this case no bill of lading has been or shall be issued and that the terms agreed shall be embodied in a receipt which shall be a non-negotiable document and shall be marked as such.

Any agreement so entered into shall have full legal effect :

Provided that this Article shall not apply to ordinary commercial shipments made in the ordinary course of trade, but only to other shipments where the character or condition of the property to be carried or the circumstances, terms and conditions under which the carriage is to be performed, are such as reasonably to justify a special agreement.

ARTICLE VII.

LIMITATIONS ON THE APPLICATION OF THE RULES.

Nothing herein contained shall prevent a carrier or a shipper from entering into any agreement, stipulation, condition, reservation or exemption as to the responsibility and liability of the carrier or the ship for the loss or damage to or in connection with the custody and care and handling of goods prior to the loading on and subsequent to the discharge from the ship on which the goods are carried by sea.

ARTICLE VIII.

LIMITATION OF LIABILITY.

The provisions of these Rules shall not affect the rights and obligations of the carrier under any statute for the time being in force relating to the limitation of the liability of owners of sea-going vessels.

ARTICLE IX.

The monetary units mentioned in these Rules are to be taken to be gold value.

LIVE STOCK REPORT, 1926-27.

Sir,

I beg to submit for the information of His Excellency the Governor, my report for the year 1926-1927.

At the beginning of the season a certain amount of bad weather accounted for a good number of lambs and weak sheep. The latter part of the season turned out to be good and the stock on the majority of stations improved and kept their condition well for the remainder of the season.

It has also been a good season for grass growth and the grass did not receive anything much in the way of a setback until towards the end of May. This will give all stock a chance to winter out well.

Sheep.

On one or two stations, farmers have realized that they have been carrying sheep in excess of the number which their land was capable of doing and they have wisely cut down the number of their sheep. There is an appreciable difference noticeable on these stations in the increased quantity of grass and improved condition of the sheep.

On the majority of stations the carrying capacity of the land has been considerably reduced by overstocking for a period extending over a number of years.

Nearly all farmers owning land in the Colony have given more consideration to the quantity of wool produced on their stations than they have done to the nursing of the land itself and it is therefore only natural that they should become very much inclined to overstock their land to increase the quantity of wool. Farmers here should give their land more consideration than has been done or it is only to be expected that the land will give them bad returns and decrease in value also.

One has only to refer to the returns from sheep farming since 1898 to realize the gradual reduction in the carrying capacity of the land. Lambing percentages have decreased to a great extent on nearly all stations. This has been brought about by consistent overstocking and in-and-in breeding, which has been, and still is, practised extensively throughout the Colony.

Farmers here are not required to pay a tax upon their land, the only tax imposed being a small one on wool exported it is quite natural for a farmer to be inclined to lose sight of the actual land valuation in his efforts to produce more wool.

The value of the reduction in the numbers of sheep was brought to my notice on a station in the West Falklands where overstocking had been carried out to a great extent. Within the last 2 years the numbers of sheep on this station were considerably reduced and I observed at the end of this period a very large increase in the quantity of grass and the much improved condition of the sheep.

I am strongly of the opinion that the reduction of the numbers of sheep and the erection of more subdivisional fences on all stations is the only possible way of improving the present condition of the land.

I have noticed on a large number of stations too many useless old sheep are still being carried. These sheep produce very little wool and do not pay for their keep as they deprive more profitable sheep of a good deal of food. Farmers who are running useless old sheep of this kind should not hesitate to cull them out from their flocks.

Imported Sheep.

There were 274 sheep imported from the United Kingdom and New Zealand during the past season and most of these sheep arrived in the Colony in time to become more or less used to the climate and food before the winter set in.

I am of the opinion that farmers would be well advised to take more care of imported pedigree sheep than it is customary to do in the Colony. Most of the importers do not provide sufficient food nor shelter for their imported sheep. Pedigree sheep are generally imported from countries where the climate and conditions for stock generally are very much better than they are here and these sheep require more attention when they arrive than locally bred sheep. I have heard it said by several of the farmers here that if sheep imported cannot hold their own, (meaning keeping in as good condition) with the sheep bred locally they will not be of much use as they are in all probability inferior to the local sheep in constitution. All imported animals are likely to lose condition unless they receive proper attention for the first year or two after their arrival. As imported pedigree sheep are really the foundation of the flocks which are bred later, it is most important that these pedigree sheep should when first imported receive every possible attention.

It is often necessary to treat imported sheep with medicines from time to time and farmers would be well advised to keep a supply always on hand.

Agriculture.

I am pleased to report that more efforts are being made by a number of farmers to extend their agricultural operations. From my observations of the work carried out and the results obtained I am firmly of the opinion that the cultivation and the growing of valuable stock food crops such as turnips, oats, hay, etc., can be satisfactorily carried out on a great many farms in the Colony.

On one station I happened to be present at the time when ground was being prepared for oats and although the methods of cultivation used were rather crude, the resulting crop was one which would have astonished many who are of the opinion that agricultural farming in the Colony is unprofitable. The crop on the station to which I refer was so satisfactory that it is intended that double the amount of agricultural work will be carried out this coming season.

Cattle.

The number of cattle carried in the Colony during the season was 101 more than last year. Taken on an average the cattle are better in condition than last year.

Horses.

Light and half draught horses were imported during the year and these horses were mostly of good type. The horses throughout the Colony have kept in very good condition and fewer cases of sickness among them have been reported. A Clydesdale stallion was imported for the Government Experimental Farm. This is an exceptionally good horse and of a type which should be most useful for the breeding of horses for team or any really heavy draught work.

Diseases.

A number of islands and a section on the East Falklands which were placed in quarantine on account of sheep scab were inspected and on being passed as being no longer infected places, they were released from quarantine.

Sheep lice were reported on the East Falklands and requisite action was taken to check the spread of these parasites. Station managers in the neighbourhood were instructed to muster and dip all sheep in the vicinity of the area where the outbreak occurred. The mustering and dipping was carried out thoroughly.

Sheep lice have made their appearance periodically in the Colony for a good number of years and it will be extremely difficult if not impossible to clean them out definitely. To minimize the risk of an outbreak it is essential that the annual mustering for dipping and the dipping itself should be carried out in a conscientious manner.

It is to be regretted that tuberculosis has been found to exist among the cattle in the Colony to exactly what extent I am not yet aware. If cattle owners throughout the Colony would make it their business to report any suspected animals a good deal could be done to keep the disease in check.

Stanley Common.

An effort is being made to improve the milk supply in Stanley. A subdivisional fence is being erected along a line from the eastern end of the town to Eliza Cove on the south coast thus dividing the common into 3 sections the centre of which is intended for milking cows only. It is to be hoped that by arranging the sections in this way more food will be available on the common for milk cows and the milk supply in Stanley will be increased. For the convenience of riders arriving and departing from Stanley and also owners of horses running on the Common it is intended that an effort will be made to provide two small holding or catching paddocks one at the east and the other at the western end of the Town. The establishment of these paddocks for horsemen will I believe supply a long felt want.

One of Lord Kitchener's sayings which has been treasured and acted upon by Boy Scouts all the world over was "Once a Scout always a Scout," and this has caused numbers of ex-Scouts not only to carry on the ideals of Scouting in their lives as men but also to retain connection with the Movement and to help the rising generation to enjoy the activities and lessons which they experienced in it.

Therefore I would ask these men of the Falkland Islands who have been Scouts to remember and to act upon this. It is a duty that you owe to

your younger brothers and to the Empire to show that the Falkland Islanders are not slackers and that Scouting is something more than a mere pastime with you. Give your help as Scoutmasters or Patrol Leaders to the younger fellows so that they may learn some of the joys of Scouting and become efficient members of our great brotherhood of Empire.

I would suggest that you lose no time in doing this. Do it now, for in 1929 we shall be holding our great Jamboree in England to mark the 21st birthday of the Movement.

There will be gathered contingents of Scouts from every part of the Empire and indeed from every civilised country in the world, and I shall hope to see the Falkland Islands represented by a contingent of smart and hefty Scouts to fraternise with their brother Scouts from other corners of the earth.

George the Fifth by the Grace of God of Great Britain Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas King Defender of the Faith Emperor of India to all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting :

WHEREAS by Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated the ninth day of June one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one we were graciously pleased to make ordain and establish rules and ordinances for the governance of The Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration reserving to Ourselves Our Heirs and Successors full power of annulling altering abrogating augmenting interpreting or dispensing with those rules and ordinances or any part thereof by a notification under Our Sign Manual :

AND WHEREAS the riband for the suspension of the said Decoration which was approved by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was one inch and a quarter in width and it is provided in Our said Warrant that the Decoration shall be suspended from the left breast by a green riband of one inch and a half in width from a silver brooch :

AND WHEREAS reproductions of the said Decoration known as Miniature Decorations are

worn on certain occasions and it appears to Us to be expedient that the size and pattern of such Miniature Decorations should be clearly defined:

NOW THEREFORE WE do by these Presents for Us Our Heirs and Successors ordain and appoint that the second rule and ordinance in Our said Warrant shall be cancelled and annulled and the following rule and ordinance shall be substituted therefor :

Secondly : It is ordained that the Decoration shall be worn after all British War Medals suspended from the left breast by a green riband of one inch and a quarter in width, from a silver brooch :

AND WE do further make ordain and establish the following additional rule and ordinance:-

It is ordained that reproductions of the Decoration in miniature which may be worn on certain occasions by those to whom the Decoration is awarded shall be half the size of the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration and that a Sealed Pattern of the said Miniature Decoration shall be deposited and kept in the Central Chancery of Our Orders of Knighthood.

Supplementary Feeding on Grassland.

Our ideas of the feeding value of grassland based upon some early analyses require considerable modification in view of recent research and of the steady deterioration of large areas of pasture by reason of neglect to return to the soil those constituents which have been removed by cropping and stocking.

It has been generally believed that an average cow, capable of consuming something like 160 lb. of good pasture daily, would receive sufficient nutriment for maintenance purposes and for the production of about four gallons of milk daily. An appreciable proportion of our grassland, however, is not sufficiently nutritious to do this and the dairy farmer will be advised to allow supplementary feeding to cows giving more than three gallons of milk daily.

Apart from the composition of the herbage in respect of the organic food constituents, proteins, carbohydrates and fats, the results of recent research work carried out by the Rowett Research Institute and the School of Nutrition of Cambridge have demonstrated that the mineral content of grassland is an important factor for consideration in connection with feeding value. The investigations have shown that there is not an appreciable variation in the caloric or starch values of pastures of known difference in feeding value, but that there is considerable variation in the contents of lime and other mineral matter to which may be attributed largely the difference in feeding value. Figures obtained from the analyses of a large number of samples indicate that the lime content of good cultivated pasture is appreciably less than has been assumed in the past, and it decreases at a comparatively high rate as one passes through good natural pastures to poor natural pastures. Similarly, the contents of other mineral elements and also of nitrogen (*i.e.*, protein) decrease appreciably in poorer pastures. Of further interest is the rise in lime content from May to about July, after which it again falls away to the end of the grazing season, a rise and fall which appears to bear some relation to the recognised feeding value of pasture and which is doubly interesting because there is not, apparently, any similar variation in the starch value. The effects of applications of lime and phosphatic manures to poor grassland have been well demonstrated at Cockle Park and at many other centres, and the more recent investigations have not only confirmed these but have shown how these applications have increased the contents of lime and other mineral matter in the herbage, bringing about not only an improved stocking capacity but also an earlier attainment of optimum feeding value. Thus a field treated with lime and basic slag attained its maximum lime content in July, when it was nearly three times as good as an untreated comparable field which reached its greatest lime content in August. Although there was little variation in the starch values of these pastures, the beef-producing capacity of the treated field became three or four times that of the untreated. Previous to the treatment the fields were about equally valuable for beef-production.

There is no need to emphasise to readers of this journal the importance of lime and other mineral matter in the feeding of the dairy cow, and it is important, therefore, to give consideration to the mineral content of grazing when this is the basis of feeding of milking cows. In practice, therefore, it would appear to be safe to assume that during spring and early summer the pasturage will supply efficient nutriment for maintenance and the production of three gallons of milk daily, above which amount supplementary feeding should commence. This is effected generally by the use of about 3½ lb. of a good dairy meal or of a milk-production concentrate mixture for each gallon of milk over three. As the season advances, supplementary feeding may commence with cows giving less than three gallons. Mr. Boulflour's suggestion that during August 1 lb. of palm kernel cake should be fed for each gallon of milk up to three, above which amount the supply of concentrates should be made in the usual way, is an excellent one. Palm kernel cake is well balanced in itself for milk production and serves as an excellent supplement to grass feeding at this period. Cows at grass during September and October should receive concentrates for each gallon of milk over two, and it may even be advisable to supplement the grass feeding of cows yielding less than this. Concentrated foods are, in general, markedly deficient in lime, and there seems to be little room for doubt that the use of some food supplement containing this constituent is an advantage, particularly with heavy milkers on pasture which is not of more than average feeding value. Many manufacturers of feeding cakes and meals are, of course, now including such material as finely ground limestone, feeding bone flour, and other mineral salts in their products, and unless this is done the dairy farmer will be well advised to make the supplementation for himself. Such supplements are in very wide use at the present time for all classes of stock and provide an excellent insurance against any malconditions or diseases which may result from deficiencies in feeding.

Readers who are interested, particularly in the subject of grassland, will do well to study the reports of the investigations that are now in progress which are issued from time to time by the authorities of the Rowett Research Institute at Aberdeen.

A Bill

Further to Declare the Law relating to
the Preservation of Wild Animals and Birds.

Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. It shall not be lawful for any person to use or to cause or to allow to be used poison in any form whatsoever for the purpose of killing or of attempting to kill any wild animal or bird.

Use of poison for the purpose of killing any wild animal or bird unlawful.

2. Any person who shall be convicted of an offence under this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both such penalties.

Penalties.

This Ordinance may be cited as the "Wild Animals and Birds Preservation Ordinance, 1927."

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting held on the 14th April, 1927.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 9th of November, 1926, were read and confirmed.

2. Minute from the Acting Governor, No. 1 of 1927, submitting Supplementary Estimate of Expenditure, No. 3 of 1926, was read.

On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable H. H. R. Gresham, the minute was adopted.

Felton, the Senior Unofficial Member, the further financial provision required for the establishment of the Experimental Farm as represented in His Excellency's minute, and that he desired that it should be placed on record that the increase of £7,000 in the estimate came as a surprise to both of them. In view, however, of the sum which had already been expended from the original estimate of £17,000, the Honourable G. J. Felton and himself quite agreed that the further sum of £7,000 required for the completion of the work should be provided.

The minute was adopted.

5. The Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :

- (2) Schedule of Charges of an unusual or special description or not covered by the Appropriation law for the year 1926, incurred during the quarters ended the 30th of September, 1926 and the 31st of December, 1926.
- (3) The Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements for the year ended the 31st of December, 1926.

7. On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To legalize certain payments made in the year One thousand nine hundred and twenty-six in excess of the expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 5 of 1925" was read a *first* time.

Minute to Legislative Council. (No. 3 of 1927.)

The Acting Governor has the honour to refer to the Governor's Minute No. 4 of 1925, adopted by the Legislative Council on the 29th of July, 1925, inviting the Council to approve of an experimental farm being established on the lines recommended by Mr. Hugh Munro and of the initial expenditure not exceeding an aggregate sum of £17,000 being defrayed from the Land Sales Fund.

2. As the Council is aware the establishment of the experimental farm has been undertaken and considerable progress has already been made with the approved scheme. Stud sheep have been purchased from New Zealand, the erection of houses for the farm staff and of the necessary buildings is well advanced, and the Farm Manager and the Farm Hand appointed from New Zealand have arrived in the Colony and have assumed their duties.

3. In the light of the experience gained and of the advice tendered by the Farm Manager it is now possible to make an estimate of the total expenditure required for the establishment of the experimental farm and for its maintenance for the first three years. This final estimate amounts to £24,000 and is broadly apportioned under the following heads:-

Buildings, furniture & fittings	£9,000
Fencing	£2,800
Jetty	£ 400
Dip	£ 200
Implements, tools, carts, etc.	£1,300
Stock	£3,210
Maintenance	£6,040
Contingencies	£1,000

4. The Acting Governor has previously consulted members of the Council and has explained in detail the manner in which the revised amounts now estimated to be required under the several heads have been calculated. His Excellency desires formally to assure the Council that the most careful control is being and will be kept on all expenditure on the Experimental Farm and that in no event will authority be granted to exceed the total sum of £24,000 which is now asked to meet all capital charges in connection with the establishment of the farm and to provide for its working up to the 31st December, 1929.

5. The Acting Governor has, accordingly, the honour to invite the Council to approve of a revised total expenditure not exceeding £24,000 for the establishment of the experimental farm and its maintenance for a period of three years commencing on the 1st of January, 1927, being defrayed from the Land Sales Fund.

To amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, and by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924. Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of Legislative Council thereof as follows :— Enacting Clause.

1. Section 3 of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following section :— Repeal and replacement of Section 3 of Ordinance 7 of 1924.

A refund of part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil, shall be made in accordance with the following scale :— Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.

If the average market price of first grade oil for the season in which the oil was exported,

Exceeds £45 but does not exceed £50 per ton,
6d. per barrel.

Exceeds £40 but does not exceed £45 per ton,
1/- per barrel.

Exceeds £35 but does not exceed £40 per ton,
1/6 per barrel.

Exceeds £30 but does not exceed £35 per ton,
2/- per barrel.

Does not exceed £30 per ton,
2/6 per barrel.

2. This Ordinance shall have effect from the first day of October, 1926. Commencement of Ordinance.

Short Title.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1927," and shall be read and construed as one with the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, and by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924.

An Ordinance Relating to the Carriage of Goods by Sea.

Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Carriage of Goods by Sea Ordinance, 1927."

Short title.

2. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the Rules contained in the Schedule to this Ordinance, (hereinafter referred to as "the Rules") shall have effect in relation to and in connection with the carriage of goods by sea in ships carrying goods from any port in the Colony to any other port whether in or outside the Colony.

Application of Rules in Schedule.

3. There shall not be implied in any contract for the carriage of goods by sea to which the Rules apply any absolute undertaking by the carrier of the goods to provide a seaworthy ship.

Absolute warranty of seaworthiness not to be implied in contracts to which Rules apply.

4. Every bill of lading or similar document of title, issued in the Colony which contains or is evidence of any contract to which the Rules apply shall contain an express statement that it is to have effect subject to the provisions of the said Rules as applied by this Ordinance.

Statement as to application of Rules to be included in bills of lading.

5. Article VI of the Rules shall, in relation to the carriage of goods by sea in ships carrying goods from any port in the Colony to any other port in the Colony, have effect as though the said Article referred to goods of any class instead of to particular goods and as though the proviso to the second paragraph of the said Article were omitted.

Modification of Article VI of Rules in relation to coasting trade.

Modification of Rules 4 and 5 of Article III in relation to bulk cargoes.

6. Where under the custom of any trade the weight of any bulk cargo inserted in the bill of lading is a weight ascertained or accepted by a third party other than the carrier or the shipper and the fact that the weight is so ascertained or accepted is stated in the bill of lading, then, notwithstanding anything in the Rules, the bill of lading shall not be deemed to be *prima facie* evidence against the carrier of the receipt of goods of the weight so inserted in the bill of lading, and the accuracy thereof at the time of shipment shall not be deemed to have been guaranteed by the shipper.

Saving Clause.

7. Nothing in this Ordinance shall affect the liability of the owners of seagoing vessels as limited under the provisions of sections four hundred and forty-six to four hundred and fifty, both inclusive, five hundred and two, and five hundred and three of the Imperial Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, as amended by any subsequent enactment, or the liability of the owners of seagoing vessels as limited by any other Imperial enactment in force for the time being.

Operation.

8. The Rules shall not by virtue of this Ordinance apply to any contract for the carriage of goods by sea made before such day, not being earlier than the thirty-first day of December, 1927, as the Governor in Council may direct by notification in the Gazette, nor to any bill of lading or similar document of title issued, whether before or after such day as aforesaid, in pursuance of any such contract as aforesaid.

Application to Dependencies.

9. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

SCHEDULE.

RULES RELATING TO BILLS OF LADING.

ARTICLE I.

DEFINITIONS.

In these Rules the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them respectively, that is to say —

- (a) "Carrier" includes the owner or the charterer who enters into a contract of carriage with a shipper :
- (b) "Contract of carriage" applies only to contracts of carriage covered by a bill of lading or any similar document of title, in so far as such document relates to the carriage of goods by sea, including any bill of lading or any similar document as aforesaid issued under or pursuant to a charterparty from the moment at which such bill of lading or similar document of title regulates the relations between a carrier and a holder of the same :
- (c) "Goods" includes goods, wares, merchandises, and articles of every kind whatsoever, except live animals and cargo which by the contract of carriage is stated as being carried on deck and is so carried :

- (d) "Ship" means any vessel used for the carriage of goods by sea :
- (e) "Carriage of goods" covers the period from the time when the goods are loaded on to the time when they are discharged from the ship.

ARTICLE II.

RISKS.

Subject to the provisions of Article VI., under every contract of carriage of goods by sea the carrier, in relation to the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care, and discharge of such goods, shall be subject to the responsibilities and liabilities, and entitled to the rights and immunities hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE III.

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LIABILITIES.

1. The carrier shall be bound, before and at the beginning of the voyage, to exercise due diligence to —

- (a) Make the ship seaworthy :
- (b) Properly man, equip, and supply the ship :
- (c) Make the holds, refrigerating and cool chambers, and all other parts of the ship in which goods are carried, fit and safe for their reception, carriage and preservation.

2. Subject to the provisions of Article IV., the carrier shall properly and carefully load, handle, stow, carry, keep, care for and discharge the goods carried.

3. After receiving the goods into his charge, the carrier, or the master or agent of the carrier, shall, on demand of the shipper, issue to the shipper a bill of lading showing among other things —

- (a) The leading marks necessary for identification of the goods as the same are furnished in writing by the shipper before the loading of such goods starts, provided such marks are stamped or otherwise shown clearly upon the goods if uncovered, or on the cases or coverings in which such goods are contained, in such a manner as should ordinarily remain legible until the end of the voyage ;
- (b) Either the number of packages or pieces, or the quantity, or weight, as the case may be, as furnished in writing by the shipper :
- (c) The apparent order and condition of the goods :

Provided that no carrier, master or agent of the carrier, shall be bound to state or show in the bill of lading any marks, number, quantity, or weight which he has reasonable ground for suspecting not accurately to represent the goods actually received, or which he has had no reasonable means of checking.

4. Such a bill of lading shall be *prima facie* evidence of the receipt by the carrier of the goods as therein described in accordance with paragraph 3 (a), (b), and (c).

5. The shipper shall be deemed to have guaranteed to the carrier the accuracy at the time of shipment of the marks, number, quantity, and weight, as furnished by him, and the shipper shall indemnify the carrier against all loss, damages, and expenses arising or resulting from inaccuracies in such particulars. The right of the carrier to such indemnity shall in no way limit his responsibility and liability under the contract of carriage to any person other than the shipper.

6. Unless notice of loss or damage and the general nature of such loss or damage be given in writing to the carrier or his agent at the port of discharge before or at the time of the removal of the goods into the custody of the person entitled to delivery thereof under the contract of carriage, or, if the loss or damage be not apparent, within three days such removal shall be *prima facie* evidence of the delivery by the carrier of the goods as described in the bill of lading.

The notice in writing need not be given if the state of the goods has at the time of their receipt been the subject of joint survey or inspection.

In any event the carrier and the ship shall be discharged from all liability in respect of loss or damage unless suit is brought within one year after delivery of the goods or the date when the goods should have been delivered.

In the case of any actual or apprehended loss or damage the carrier and the receiver shall give all reasonable facilities to each other for inspecting and tallying the goods.

7. After the goods are loaded the bill of lading to be issued by the carrier, master or agent of the carrier, to the shipper shall, if the shipper so demands, be a "shipped" bill of lading, provided that if the shipper shall have previously taken up any document of title to such goods, he shall surrender the same as against the issue of the "shipped" bill of lading, but at the option of the carrier such document of title may be noted at the port of shipment by the carrier, master, or agent with the name or names of the ship or ships upon which the goods have been shipped and the date or dates of shipment, and when so noted the same shall for the purpose of this Article be deemed to constitute a "shipped" bill of lading.

8. Any clause, covenant or agreement in a contract of carriage relieving the carrier or the ship from liability for loss or damage to or in connection with goods arising from negligence, fault or failure in the duties and obligations provided in this Article or lessening such liability otherwise than as provided in these Rules, shall be null and void and of no effect.

A benefit of insurance or similar clause shall be deemed to be a clause relieving the carrier from liability.

ARTICLE IV.

RIGHTS AND IMMUNITIES.

1. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be liable for loss or damage arising or resulting from unseaworthiness unless caused by want of due diligence on the part of the carrier to make the ship seaworthy, and to secure that the ship is properly manned, equipped and supplied, and to make the holds, refrigerating and cool chambers and all other parts of the ship in which goods are carried fit and safe for their reception, carriage and preservation in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article III.

Whenever loss or damage has resulted from unseaworthiness, the burden of proving the exercise of due diligence shall be on the carrier or other person claiming exemption under this section.

2. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be responsible for loss or damage arising or resulting from —

- (a) Act, neglect, or default of the master, mariner, pilot, or the servants of the carrier in the navigation or in the management of the ship :
- (b) Fire, unless caused by the actual fault or privity of the carrier :
- (c) Perils, dangers and accidents of the sea or other navigable waters :
- (d) Act of God :
- (e) Act of war :
- (f) Act of public enemies :
- (g) Arrest or restraint of princes, rulers or people, or seizure under legal process :
- (h) Quarantine restrictions :
- (i) Act or omission of the shipper or owner of the goods, his agent or representative :
- (j) Strikes or lock-outs or stoppage or restraint of labour from whatever cause, whether partial or general :
- (k) Riots and civil commotions :
- (l) Saving or attempting to save life or property at sea :

- (m) Wastage in bulk or weight or any other loss or damage arising from inherent defect, quality or vice of the goods :
- (n) Insufficiency of packing :
- (o) Insufficiency or inadequacy of marks :
- (p) Latent defects not discoverable by due diligence :
- (q) Any other cause arising without the actual fault or privity of the carrier, or without the fault or neglect of the agents or servants of the carrier, but the burden of proof shall be on the person claiming the benefit of this exception to show that neither the actual fault or privity of the carrier nor the fault or neglect of the agents or servants of the carrier contributed to the loss or damage.

3. The shipper shall not be responsible for loss or damage sustained by the carrier or the ship arising or resulting from any cause without the act, fault or neglect of the shipper, his agents or his servants.

4. Any deviation in saving or attempting to save life or property at sea, or any reasonable deviation shall not be deemed to be an infringement or breach of these Rules or of the contract of carriage, and the carrier shall not be liable for any loss or damage resulting therefrom.

5. Neither the carrier nor the ship shall in any event be or become liable for any loss or damage to or in connection with goods in an amount exceeding 100% per package or unit, or the equivalent of that sum in other currency, unless the nature and value of such goods have been declared by the shipper before shipment and inserted in the bill of lading.

This declaration if embodied in the bill of lading shall be *prima facie* evidence, but shall not be binding or conclusive on the carrier.

By agreement between the carrier, master or agent of the carrier and the shipper another maximum amount than that mentioned in this paragraph may be fixed, provided that such maximum shall not be less than the figure above named.

Neither the carrier nor the ship shall be responsible in any event for loss or damage to or in connection with goods if the nature or value thereof has been knowingly misstated by the shipper in the bill of lading.

6. Goods of an inflammable, explosive or dangerous nature to the shipment whereof the carrier, master or agent of the carrier, has not consented, with knowledge of their nature and character, may at any time before discharge be landed at any place or destroyed or rendered innocuous by the carrier without compensation, and the shipper of such goods shall be liable for all damages and expenses directly or indirectly arising out of or resulting from such shipment.

If any such goods shipped with such knowledge and consent shall become a danger to the ship or cargo, they may in like manner be landed at any place or destroyed or rendered innocuous by the carrier without liability on the part of the carrier except to general average, if any.

ARTICLE V.

SURRENDER OF RIGHTS AND IMMUNITIES, AND INCREASE OF RESPONSIBILITIES AND LIABILITIES.

A carrier shall be at liberty to surrender in whole or in part all or any of his rights and immunities or to increase any of his responsibilities and liabilities under the Rules contained in any of these Articles, provided such surrender or increase shall be embodied in the bill of lading issued to the shipper.

The provisions of these Rules shall not be applicable to charterparties, but if the bills of lading are issued in the case of a ship under a charterparty they shall comply with the terms of these Rules. Nothing in these Rules shall be held to prevent the insertion in a bill of lading of any lawful provision regarding general average.

ARTICLE VI.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

Notwithstanding the provisions of the preceding Articles, a carrier, master or agent of the carrier, and a shipper shall in regard to any particular goods be at liberty to enter into any agreement in any terms as to the responsibility and liability of the carrier for such goods, and as to the rights and immunities of the carrier in respect of such goods, or his obligation as to seaworthiness, so far as this stipulation is not contrary to public policy, or the care or diligence of his servants or agents in regard to the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care, and discharge of the goods carried by sea, provided that in this case no bill of lading has been or shall be issued and that the terms agreed shall be embodied in a receipt which shall be a non-negotiable document and shall be marked as such.

Any agreement so entered into shall have full legal effect :

Provided that this Article shall not apply to ordinary commercial shipments made in the ordinary course of trade, but only to other shipments where the character or condition of the property to be carried or the circumstances, terms and conditions under which the carriage is to be performed, are such as reasonably to justify a special agreement.

ARTICLE VII.

LIMITATIONS ON THE APPLICATION OF THE RULES.

Nothing herein contained shall prevent a carrier or a shipper from entering into any agreement, stipulation, condition, reservation or exemption as to the responsibility and liability of the carrier or the ship for the loss or damage to or in connection with the custody and care and handling of goods prior to the loading on and subsequent to the discharge from the ship on which the goods are carried by sea.

ARTICLE VIII.

LIMITATION OF LIABILITY.

The provisions of these Rules shall not affect the rights and obligations of the carrier under any statute for the time being in force relating to the limitation of the liability of owners of sea-going vessels.

ARTICLE IX.

The monetary units mentioned in these Rules are to be taken to be gold value.

An Ordinance

To provide for the grant of Pensions
Gratuities and other Allowances to persons
who have been in the public service of the
Colony.

Title.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the
Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Pensions Ordinance,
1927."

Short Title.

2. The Pensions Ordinance, 1906, and all Ordinances
enacted in amendment thereof, and the Pensions Increase Ordinance,
1920, are hereby repealed.

Repeal.

3. In this Ordinance and in the Regulations made here-
under,

Definitions.

"PENSIONABLE OFFICE" means an office which has been
declared to be pensionable under section 7 of this
Ordinance.

"PUBLIC SERVICE" means service in a civil capacity under
the Government of the Colony or the Imperial Govern-
ment or the Government of India or of a British
Colony or Protectorate or a territory under a British
mandate, and any such other service as the Secretary
of State may determine to be "public service" for the
purpose of any provision of this Ordinance or of the
Regulations made hereunder.

Service as a Governor or High Commissioner of a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate or of a territory under a British mandate, or as a Governor in India shall be deemed to be public service for the purpose of computation of pension or gratuity and of Section 11 of this Ordinance.

"OTHER PUBLIC SERVICE" means public service not under the Government of the Colony.

"SALARY" includes personal allowance, house allowance or the estimated value of free quarters and fuel allowance or the estimated value of free fuel :

Provided that the amount to be allowed for house rent or the estimated value of free quarters together with the amount to be allowed for fuel or the estimated value of free fuel shall not exceed one-sixth of the actual salary of the office.

Extent.

4. Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall either diminish the rights acquired by any persons before the enactment of this Ordinance or affect pensions already granted. Otherwise the provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all public officers now or hereafter serving in the Colony and to those who having so served have been transferred to public service elsewhere.

Pensions to be charged on the revenues of the Colony.

5. There shall be charged on and paid out of the revenues of the Colony all such sums of money as may, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, from time to time be granted by way of pension, gratuity, or other allowance in accordance with this Ordinance and with the Regulations made hereunder to persons who have been in the service of the Colony.

Governor in Council may make Regulations.

6. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, from time to time to make, and, when made, to vary and revoke, regulations for the granting of pensions, gratuities, and other allowances under this Ordinance.

Offices when pensionable.

7. The Governor may, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, by notification in the Gazette declare any office in the public service of the Colony to be pensionable :

Provided that any office so declared to be pensionable may be declared at any time by the Governor, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, by notification in manner aforesaid to be no longer pensionable, due regard being had to existing rights.

Age from which pension may be earned.

8. No public officer shall be eligible for the grant of any pension, gratuity, or other allowance in respect of service while under the age of twenty years.

Age at which pension may be granted.
Certificates required as to conduct, etc., etc.

9. Except in the case of abolition or re-organization of office no pension, gratuity, or other allowance shall be granted to any public officer who has not attained the age of sixty years unless on medical evidence to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council or the Secretary of State that he is incapable, by reason of some infirmity of mind or body, of discharging the duties of his office, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent ; nor in any case without a certificate from the Governor that he has discharged the duties of his office with such diligence and fidelity as to justify the grant to him of a pension :

Provided that, if a public officer, though not suffering from any particular illness or infirmity of mind or body likely to be permanent, becomes unfit in the opinion of the Governor in Council for the discharge of the duties of the office to which he has been appointed, and such unfitness is not attributable to misconduct or

gross negligence, and when the Governor in Council considers that the special circumstances of the case justify the grant to him of a pension he may be pensioned at the rate not exceeding that for which he would be qualified if he were suffering from an illness or infirmity likely to be permanent ;

Provided further that if an officer is transferred to other public service and ultimately retires at an age less than sixty years at which he is permitted by the laws or regulations of that service to retire with a pension, the pension which may be granted to him from the revenues of the Colony under this Ordinance and the Regulations made hereunder shall be payable from the date of retirement of such officer notwithstanding that he shall not be sixty years of age.

10. Where an officer is removed from his office on the ground of his inability to discharge efficiently the duties thereof, and a pension, gratuity, or other allowance cannot otherwise be granted to him under the provisions of this Ordinance and of the Regulations made hereunder the Governor in Council with the approval of the Secretary of State may if he considers it justifiable, having regard to all circumstances of the case, grant such a pension, gratuity, or other allowance as he thinks just and proper but in no case exceeding in amount that for which the officer would be qualified if he were suffering from some infirmity of mind or body likely to be permanent.

Pension payable when officer is retired on grounds of inefficiency.

11. (1) A pension granted to an officer under this Ordinance shall not exceed two-thirds of the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by him at any time in the course of his service in the Colony.

Maximum pension from all public sources.

(2) Where the officer has been or is granted a pension or pensions in respect of other public service, he may be granted the full pension for which he is eligible in respect of his service in the Colony, but no person may at any time draw from the funds of the Colony an amount of pension which, when added to the amount of any pension or pensions drawn in respect of other public service, exceeds two-thirds of the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such person at any time in the course of his service in the Colony or in other public service :

Provided that where such a person receives, in respect of some period of public service, both a gratuity and a pension, the amount of such pension shall be deemed, for the purpose of this sub-section, to be four-thirds of its actual amount.

(3) In a case falling under the limitation laid down by sub-section (2) the amount of pension to be drawn from the funds of the Colony shall be subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, in order that it may be determined with due regard to the amount of any pension or pensions similarly to be drawn in respect of other public service.

(4) For the purpose of the preceding sub-sections an annual allowance granted in respect of injury shall not be taken into account ; but, where the officer is granted such an annual allowance the amount of such annual allowance which he may draw shall not exceed one-sixth of his highest pensionable emoluments at any time in the course

of his service by more than the sum by which the amount of his pension or pensions, apart from such annual allowance, falls short of two-thirds of such highest pensionable emoluments.

Age for compulsory retirement.

12. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, to require any public officer to retire from the public service of the Colony at any time after he attains the age of sixty years, and retirement shall be compulsory for every officer on attaining the age of sixty-five years except that, in special cases where the Secretary of State is satisfied that the retirement of an officer at sixty-five would be detrimental to the public service, his employment may be extended for a further specified period.

Increase of Pension in certain cases.

13. The pay and emoluments on which public officers have been pensioned or granted retiring gratuities or on which they would normally be pensioned or granted retiring gratuities may be increased by 25 per cent if such pay and emoluments do not exceed £300 per annum, and by 20 per cent if such pay and emoluments exceed £300 per annum subject to the following conditions :—

- (1) that the minimum additional amount on which the supplementary pension or gratuity is calculated shall be £26 per annum
- (2) that no officer with salary and emoluments exceeding £300 per annum shall receive a smaller supplementary pension or gratuity than he would have received if his salary and emoluments had been exactly £300 per annum.

Provided that nothing in this section contained shall entitle a person whose salary has been or is increased subsequent to the 1st day of January, 1920, to a pension or a retiring gratuity in excess of that which he would have received if his salary had not been increased or if this section were not in force whichever is greater.

Pensions not of right.

14. No officer shall have an absolute right to compensation for past service or to any pension, gratuity, or other allowance under this Ordinance or the Regulations made hereunder; nor shall anything in this Ordinance or such Regulations contained limit the right of the Crown to dismiss any officer without compensation.

Persons affected by re-employment.

15. If any officer to whom a pension has been granted under the provisions of this Ordinance, and of the regulations made hereunder, is appointed to another office in the service of the Colony, or in any other public service, then during his tenure of such office so much only (if any) of his pension from the funds of the Colony shall be paid to him per annum as together with

- (a) the annual emoluments of such office;
- (b) any annual amounts received on account of pension in respect of other public service; and
- (c) where the officer receives, in respect of some period of public service, both a gratuity and a pension, an annual amount equal to one-third of such pension;

make up an annual amount not greater than the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer at any time in the course of his public service :

Provided that

- (1) Where the officer retired or was transferred from the service of the Colony prior to the 1st January, 1920, the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer in the course of his service in the Colony, shall for the purposes of this section be deemed to be the highest pensionable emoluments actually so drawn by him plus fifty per cent. thereof ;
- (2) Where an officer in whose case an abatement of pension falls to be made under this section, has been granted a pension or pensions in respect of other public service, the amount of pension to be drawn from the funds of the Colony shall be subject to the approval of the Secretary of State in order that it may be determined with due regard to the amount of any pension or pensions similarly to be drawn in respect of other public service ;
- (3) Any bonus or temporary increase, whether on pension or on the salary of the new office, granted in view of the high cost of living, shall be added to such pension or salary, as the case may be, for the purpose of this section ; and
- (4) Where the new office is that of Governor or High Commissioner of a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, or of a territory under a British mandate, or that of a Governor in India, the amount to be taken as the annual emoluments of such office for the purpose of this section shall be determined by the Secretary of State.

16. When an officer holding a pensionable office who has completed five years' service and who is not serving on probation or agreement for a definite term, dies while in the service of the Colony it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to grant to his legal personal representative a gratuity not exceeding one year's pensionable emoluments.

Gratuity to estate where officer dies in the service of the Colony.

17. No pension granted under this Ordinance or under the Regulations made hereunder shall be assignable or transferable, or liable to be attached, sequestered, or levied upon, for or in respect of any debt or claims whatsoever.

Pensions not to be assignable.

18. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance, or under the Regulations made hereunder, is convicted before any Court in His Majesty's Dominions of any crime or offence for which he is sentenced to death or penal servitude or transportation, or any term of imprisonment with hard labour or exceeding twelve months, and does not within two months after such conviction receive His Majesty's free pardon, then in every such case such pension shall forthwith cease :

Pensions to cease on conviction.

Provided always, that the Governor in Council, with the consent of the Secretary of State, may, if he thinks fit, restore the pension in the case of a person who, after conviction as above described, receives His Majesty's free pardon at any time.

19. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance, or under the Regulations made hereunder, becomes a bankrupt, then such pension shall forthwith cease :

Pensions to cease on bankruptcy.

Provided always, that in any case where a pension ceases by reason of the bankruptcy of the pensioner it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, or, if such pensioner is resident in the Colony, then for the Governor in Council, from time to time during the remainder of such pensioner's life, or during such shorter period or periods, either continuous or discontinuous, as the Secretary of State or the Governor in Council shall think fit, to pay all or any part of the moneys to which such pensioner would have been entitled by way of pension had he not become a bankrupt to, or apply the same for the maintenance and personal support or benefit of, all or any, exclusive of the other or others, of the following persons, namely, such pensioner and any wife, child or children of his, in such proportions and manner as the Secretary of State or the Governor in Council thinks proper.

Conditions on which a retired officer may accept the directorship, etc., of a Company operating in the Colony.

20. If any person to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance or under the Regulations made hereunder, becomes, on his final retirement from the service of the Colony, either a Director of any Company the principal part of whose business is in any way directly concerned with the Colony, or an officer or a servant employed in the Colony by any such Company, without in every such case the permission of the Governor in writing first had and obtained, then in every case it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the approval of the Secretary of State, to direct that such pension shall forthwith cease :

Provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Secretary of State, on being satisfied that the person in respect of whose pension any such direction shall have been given has ceased to be a Director of such Company or to be employed as an officer or servant of such Company in the Colony, as the case may be, to give directions for the restoration of such pension, with retrospective effect, if he shall see fit, to such a date as he shall specify.

Application to Dependencies.

21. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Date of Operation.

22. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be signified by notification in the Gazette.

AND WHEREAS I shall have occasion to leave the Colony on the 2nd of February, 1928, for the purpose of visiting the Dependencies thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ARNOLD HODSON, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, do hereby appoint you JOHN MEDLICOTT ELLIS, Colonial Secretary of the said Colony, to be my Deputy within the said Colony during my temporary absence from the Colony as aforesaid and in that capacity to exercise, perform and execute for me and on my behalf, during such temporary absence, all such powers and authorities by the above recited Letters Patent or otherwise vested in me, but subject always to the provisions of the said Letters Patent and to such Instructions as you shall receive from me from time to time for your guidance.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by the Dogs Ordinance, 1892, and otherwise, I, ARNOLD HODSON, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, do hereby proclaim and notify that, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, I have made this day the Order below set out for preventing the spread of Distemper among dogs within the Colony.

Order.

1. No dog shall be taken or caused or allowed to be taken from any place or station to any place or station within the Colony except on the authority of the Colonial Secretary under his hand or of the Chief Inspector of Stock under his hand acting for and on behalf of the Colonial Secretary.

2. Unless and until a case of distemper is notified as having occurred on the main West Falkland Island the provisions of the preceding section shall not apply to the main West Falkland Island, but immediately upon such notification the provisions of the preceding section shall so apply.

3. Every owner of a dog in the town of Stanley shall keep his or her dog securely tied or shut up at his or her place of residence or other suitable place and shall on no account allow his or her dog to be in a public place or at large within or around the limits of the town of Stanley whether or not the dog is on a lead or otherwise under control and whether or not the dog is infected with distemper except on the authority of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid or of the Chief Inspector of Stock acting for and on behalf of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid.

4. No dog shall be taken or caused or allowed to be taken on board of any vessel engaged on service or in trade between the several ports of the Colony except on the authority of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid or of the Chief Inspector of Stock acting for and on behalf of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid.

5. Any dog which is taken from any place or station to any place or station within the Colony or is allowed to be in a public place or at large or is taken on board of any vessel in contravention of the provisions of the preceding sections of this Order may forthwith be destroyed whether or not such dog is infected with distemper without compensation of any kind being paid or redress of any kind being made to the owner of such dog.

6. In accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of the Dogs Ordinance, 1892, the penalty for contravening any of the provisions of the preceding sections of this Order shall be a fine not exceeding the sum of FIVE POUNDS for each offence.

Title.

To provide for the Service of the Year, 1928.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as the "Appropriation (1928) Ordinance, 1927."

Appropriation
£143,294 for service
of year 1928.

2. The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st of December, 1928, a sum not exceeding One hundred and forty-three thousand, two hundred and ninety-four pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1928.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Pensions Ordinance, 1927.

ARNOLD HODSON,

Governor.

In pursuance of the powers vested in him by section 6 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, the Governor is pleased, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and with the sanction of the Secretary of State, to make the following regulations :—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Pensions Regulations, 1928." Short Title.

2. The Schedule to the Pensions Ordinance, 1906, and all regulations made in amendment thereof under section 4 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1906, are hereby repealed. Repeal of Schedule to Law 5 of 1906, and of Amending Regulations thereto.

PART I.

General Regulations.

3. Subject to the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations, every public officer holding a pensionable office in the Colony, who has been in the service of the Colony for ten years or upwards, may be granted on his retirement a pension at the rate of ten-sixtieths of his salary, with an addition of one-sixtieth in respect of each complete year of such service in excess of ten until forty years' service is reached, when a pension of two-thirds of such salary may be granted. Pensions to whom and at what rates to be granted.

4. Every officer, otherwise qualified for a pension, who has not completed the minimum period of service qualifying for a pension may be granted a gratuity, which will be at the rate of half a month's salary for each complete six months of service. Gratuities.

5. (i) An officer to whom a pension is granted under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations may, at his option exercisable as hereinafter provided, be paid, in lieu of such pension, a pension at the rate of three-fourths of such pension together with a gratuity equal to ten times the annual value of the reduction so made in the pension. Gratuity and Reduced Pension.

(ii) The option referred to in sub-section (i) shall be exercisable :—

(a) In the case of an officer who, if he had been retired on grounds of ill-health at the date of the publication of these regulations in the Gazette, might have been granted a pension under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations, not later than six months after the said date of publication.

(b) In the case of any other officer ; within one month after the earliest date on which, if retired on the grounds of ill-health, he might be awarded a pension under the

provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations or not later than six months after the publication of these regulations in the Gazette, whichever shall be the later date for exercising the option.

Provided always –

- (1) That an officer who has previously had the opportunity of exercising the option but has not done so, and who is still in the service of the Colony or in any other public service, may apply within one month of his subsequent marriage for permission to exercise the option, which permission may be granted at the discretion of the Governor after examination of the officer by a Government Medical Board ;
- (2) That the date of the exercise of the option shall be deemed to be the date of the receipt of his written notification addressed either to the Colonial Secretary in the Colony or to the Crown Agents for the Colonies ; or, in any case falling under the preceding proviso, the date on which the Governor grants permission to exercise the option ; and
- (3) That, if an officer has exercised the option, his decision shall be irrevocable so far as concerns any pension ultimately to be granted to him under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations.

Abolition of Office.

6. If any person holding a pensionable office retire or be removed from the public service in consequence of the abolition of his office, or for the purpose of facilitating improvements in the organization of the department to which he belongs, by which greater efficiency and economy can be effected, he may be granted a temporary pension, subject to the condition that he shall hold himself ready to be recalled to service :

Provided that if such person is not qualified for other employment, or if there is no reason, in the opinion of the Governor, to expect that he can be shortly re-employed, a pension may be granted to him free from the above-mentioned condition.

Rates of pension when offices are abolished.

7. In the case of an officer whose office is abolished, his pension may be increased by the addition of a certain number of sixtieths of his salary, that is to say :—

No addition shall be made under this section so as to render an officer eligible for a higher pension than the maximum of two-thirds, or for a higher pension than that for which he would have been eligible by reason of length of service on reaching the age of sixty years.

8. In the case of an officer whose office is abolished and whose length of service is not such as to render him eligible for a pension, a special gratuity not exceeding one and a half month's salary for every year of service may be granted.

Rate of gratuity on abolition when service less than 10 years.

9. Where a public officer, whether holding a pensionable or a non-pensionable office, has been permanently injured—

Officers retiring on account of injuries.

- (a) In the actual discharge of his duty, and
- (b) Without his own default, and
- (c) By some injury specifically attributable to the nature of his duty,

and his retirement is thereby necessitated or materially accelerated, he may receive, in addition to the pension, if any, granted to him under these regulations, an annual allowance in proportion to the extent of his injury, as follows:—

When his capacity to contribute to his support is—

Slightly impaired	...	Five-sixtieths.
Impaired	...	Ten-sixtieths.
Materially impaired	...	Fifteen-sixtieths.
Totally destroyed	...	Twenty-sixtieths.

Provided that in the case of a pensionable officer no such allowance shall, together with the pension, exceed fifty-sixtieths of his salary at the date of the injury. The allowance shall be less than the above-mentioned maximum by such amount as the Governor in Council shall think reasonable in the following cases:—

- (a) Where the injured man has continued to serve for not less than one year after the injury in respect of which he retires;
- (b) Where the injured man is fifty years of age and upwards at the date of the injury;
- (c) Where the injury is not the sole cause of retirement, *i.e.*, the retirement is caused partly by age and infirmity.

10. When the public officer so injured is a pensionable officer, but has less than ten years' service and he is not eligible for an ordinary pension, he may receive in lieu of a gratuity an annual allowance of so many sixtieths as the years he has actually served, in addition to the number of sixtieths that may be awarded to him under Section 9.

When pensionable officer retiring on account of injuries has less than 10 years' service.

11. For the purpose of computing pensions and gratuities, the salary of the permanent office held by the officer at the date of retirement will be taken if he has held such office, or an office with the same salary, for a period of three years immediately preceding such date; otherwise the average amount of the salary of the permanent offices held by the officer during the three years immediately preceding his retirement will be taken.

How salary to be computed for pension purposes.

12. The service in respect of which pensions or gratuities will be granted must be unbroken, except in cases where the service has been interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation.

Service to be unbroken.

13. No service other than service in a pensionable office, on full or half salary, will be taken into account in computing pensions or gratuities, except that where the service in a pensionable office has been immediately preceded by an unbroken period of service in an appointment other than a pensionable office, or of service paid for out

Non-pensionable service followed by pensionable service.

of an open vote, or of both such services, such period or any part of such period may be taken into account :

Provided always that of the period of service paid for out of an open vote, only two-thirds shall be counted for the purposes of these regulations.

Leave of absence with half salary.

14. The periods during which an officer shall hereafter be absent on leave with half salary shall, for the purpose of computing the amount of his pension, be counted at the rate of one month for every two months of such absence, but the period during which an officer has been absent on leave with full salary shall, under all circumstances, be counted at the full rate.

Leave of absence without salary.

15. Any periods during which an officer has been absent on leave without salary shall not be counted as service, unless such leave has been granted on grounds of public policy, in which case a period not exceeding one year may be counted, for the purpose of these regulations, as service on full salary.

Commencement of pensionable service.

16. Subject to the provisions of Section 8 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, service will be deemed to commence, for pension purposes, at the date on which an officer commences to draw salary or half salary.

Acting service.

17. Acting service in a pensionable office will, when continuous with permanent employment, be allowed to reckon as service for pension, provided that the period of such acting service has not been taken into account as part of the service of the previous holder of the office or as part of the officer's other public service.

Service on probation.

18. Every officer who has been appointed provisionally and subject to probation to a pensionable office, and whose appointment shall be afterwards confirmed, shall be eligible to have counted as service for the purpose of computing his pension the period during which he served provisionally and subject to probation.

Professional officers who are allowed private practice not eligible.

19. Except in cases where a claim to pension is sanctioned by the Secretary of State, officers whose whole time is not given to the public service, and professional officers who are allowed the private practice of their profession, shall not be eligible for pensions under these regulations.

Grant of pension to re-employed pensioner.

20. If any officer to whom a pension has been granted under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations, is appointed to another office in the service of the Colony, and subsequently retires in circumstances in which he may be granted a pension, he may be granted, in lieu of his previous pension a pension computed as if the periods of his service had been continuous, and such pension may be based on his pensionable emoluments on his previous or final retirement from the service of the Colony, whichever are the greater :

Provided that if, on his previous retirement, he was paid a gratuity and reduced pension, the gratuity to be paid to him on final retirement shall be reduced by the amount of the gratuity already paid.

Good conduct required.

21. (i) Pensions, gratuities and allowances, computed at the rates before mentioned, shall only be granted in cases of decidedly faithful and meritorious service.
- (ii) Where the fidelity and diligence of the officer fall short of the first degree of merit, the computation may be made at lower rates.

- (iii) Where the officer has been guilty of gross negligence, irregularity or misconduct, the grant of pension, gratuity or other allowance may be altogether withheld.

22. Every pension granted under these regulations on the ground of ill-health shall be subject to the condition that, should the officer's health be re-established, he will be bound to accept, in lieu of his pension, any office, not inferior in value to that from which he retired, which the Secretary of State may think proper to confer on him, due regard being had to circumstances of climate, and if a pensioner so called upon declines to accept the office for which he may have been selected, the payment of his pension may be suspended until he has attained the age of sixty years.

Regulations as to ill-health.

PART 2.

Special Regulations for Officers with other Public Service.

23. For the purpose of these Regulations—

Definitions.

“Scheduled Government” means any Government included in the Schedule to these Regulations.

“Service in the Group” means public service under the Government of the Colony and under a Scheduled Government or Governments.

24. Subject to the succeeding sections, the provisions of sections 5, 13 and 20, of these regulations shall apply to the case of an officer who has been transferred to or from the service of the Colony from or to other public service, and the provisions of sections 11, 12, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18, shall apply to the case of an officer so transferred as if his whole service had been in the Colony.

Application of Regulations in Part 1.

Provided that in the application of section 5 to cases falling under the limitation of section 11 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, the words “such pension” in that section shall be taken to mean the amount of pension which he might have drawn from the funds of the Colony if he had not elected for a gratuity and reduced pension.

25. (1) Where the other public service of an officer has been wholly under one or more of the scheduled Governments, and he has held a pensionable office in the Colony for a period of at least twelve months, and his aggregate service would have rendered him eligible, had it been wholly in the Colony, for a pension under the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, he may, on his ultimate retirement from the public service in circumstances in which he is permitted by the law or Regulations of the service in which he is last employed to retire on pension or gratuity, be granted a pension from the funds of the Colony of such amount as shall bear the same proportion to the amount of pension for which he would have been eligible had his service been wholly in the Colony, as the aggregate amount of his pensionable emoluments during his service in the Colony shall bear to the total amount made up of such aggregate amount together with the aggregate amount of his pensionable emoluments from any of the Scheduled Governments :

Pension for Service wholly within the group.

Provided that in determining the pension for which he would have been eligible if his service had been wholly in the Colony.—

- (a) The final pensionable emoluments shall be taken to be those of his last period of service in the group ;
- (b) No regard shall be had to sections 7 and 9 ;
- (c) Regard shall be had to the condition that pension may not exceed two-thirds of the highest pensionable emoluments.

Provided further that any period of other public service in respect of which pension is not granted by the Scheduled Government concerned shall not be taken into account either in determining the amount of the pension for which he would have been eligible if his service had been entirely in the Colony or in calculating the aggregate amount of his pensionable emoluments.

(2) The aggregate amount of his pensionable emoluments shall be taken as the total amount of salary which the officer would have drawn, and the total amount of the other pensionable emoluments which he would have enjoyed, had he been on duty on full pay in his substantive post throughout his period of service.

Pension where other Service not within the group.

26. Where the other public service of an officer has not included service under any of the Scheduled Governments, and he has held a pensionable office in the Colony for a period of at least twelve months, and his aggregate service would have rendered him eligible, had it been wholly in the Colony, for a pension under these Regulations, he may, on his ultimate retirement from the public service in circumstances in which he is permitted by the Law or Regulations of the service in which he is last employed to retire on a pension or gratuity be granted, in respect of his service in the Colony :—

- (a) If such retirement is from other public service, a pension at the rate of one seven-hundred-and-twentieth of the amount of his pensionable emoluments at the date of his transfer from the service of the Colony for each calendar month of his pensionable service in the Colony ;
- (b) If such retirement is from the service of the Colony, a pension at the rate of one seven-hundred-and-twentieth of the amount of his pensionable emoluments at the date of such retirement for each month of his pensionable service in the Colony ; and in every such case there may be added, at the discretion of the Governor in Council, in computing the period of the retiring officer's pensionable service in the Colony, a number of months not exceeding :—
 - (i) One-third of the number of months of his pensionable service in other public service; nor
 - (ii) Two-thirds of the number of months of his pensionable service in the Colony ; nor
 - (iii) In any case sixty months.

Pension where other service both within and not within the group.

27. Where a part only of the other public service of an officer has been under one or more of the Scheduled Governments the provisions of section 25 shall apply ; but in calculating the amount of pension regard shall be had only to service in the group.

Additional pension in respect of abolition or re-organisation of office.

28. Where an officer who has been transferred from other public service and whose aggregate service would have rendered him eligible, had it been wholly in the Colony for a pension under these Regulations, is compulsorily retired from the public service in circumstances mentioned in section 6 he may, if at the time he is in the service of the Colony, be granted from the funds of the Colony, in addition to the pension granted to him under section 25, 26, or 27, as the case may be, an additional pension equal to the additional pension which might have been granted to him if his total pensionable service had been in the Colony.

Annual allowance to officers retiring on account of injury.

29. Where an officer who has been transferred from other public service and whose aggregate service would have rendered him eligible, had it been wholly in the Colony, for a pension under these

Regulations, is compulsorily retired from the public service in circumstances mentioned in section 9, he may, if at the time he is in the service of the Colony, be granted from the funds of the Colony the annual allowance allowed by that section, as well as the pension granted under section 25, 26, or 27, as the case may be.

30. Where, by reason of the fact that an officer whose case falls under sections 28 and 29 has held a pensionable office in the Colony for less than twelve months, he is not eligible for a pension under section 25, 26 or 27, as the case may be, he may, nevertheless, if at the time of his retirement he is in the service of the Colony, be granted from the funds of the Colony a pension of the same amount as the additional pension or annual allowance allowed by section 28 or 29, as the case may be.

Pension in respect of abolition of office, and annual allowance in respect of injury after less than twelve months' service in Colony.

31. (1) Where an officer who has been transferred to or from the service of the Colony from or to other public service retires from the public service in circumstances in which he is permitted by the Law or Regulations of the service in which he is last employed to retire on pension or gratuity, but has not completed in the aggregate the minimum period of service qualifying him for a pension, he may be granted from the funds of the Colony a gratuity not exceeding five times the annual amount of the pension which, if there had been no qualifying period, might have been granted to him if his case had fallen under section 26.

Gratuities where length of service does not qualify for pension.

(2) Where such officer is compulsorily retired from the public service in circumstances mentioned in section 6 he may, if at the time he is in the service of the Colony, be granted a special gratuity equal to one-half of the gratuity which might have been granted to him if his total pensionable service had been in the Colony together with the gratuity, if any, which may be granted to him under sub-section (1) of this section.

Abolition or re-organisation of office.

(3) Where such an officer is compulsorily retired from the public service in circumstances mentioned in section 9, he may, if at the time he is in the service of the Colony, be treated as if he had no other public service, but he shall not be granted the gratuity for which he is eligible under sub-section (1) of this section.

Injury.

32. Where an officer who is transferred to other public service is not granted a pension or gratuity in respect of his employment in the service in which he is last employed, solely by reason of the fact that he has not completed twelve months' service therein, he shall not, on that account, be disqualified from receiving a pension or gratuity from the funds of the Colony, if otherwise eligible therefor.

Officers transferred to other public service and retiring after less than 12 months' employment in last service.

A Bill

To Provide for an Addition to the Pension granted on retirement to Reginald Bruce Baseley.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

Addition of five-sixtieths to be made to pension as computed under Ordinance 8 of 1927.

1. There shall be charged on and paid out of the revenues of the Colony to Reginald Bruce Baseley on retirement in respect of his services as Colonial Engineer in addition to the annual sum granted to him by way of pension under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of the Regulations made thereunder an annual sum equivalent to five-sixtieths of the amount on which the aforesaid pension has been computed.

Addition how payable.

2. The sum so payable shall be paid for such time and in such manner as the aforesaid pension with which it shall be deemed to make one total amount.

Short Title.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Baseley Pension Addition Ordinance, 1928."



FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To amend the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, 1898.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

1. The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations to ensure that adequate measures are taken for the prevention of and for the control of any outbreak of fire in any building or place commonly open to or used by the public for the purpose of work, business, education, recreation or amusement and when made may revoke such regulations.

Governor in Council
may make Regula-
tions.

2. Any person who shall commit any breach of any regulations made under the preceding section shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with hard labour for a term not exceeding six months or to both such penalties.

Penalties.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Fire Brigade (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928", and shall be read and construed as one with the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, 1898.

A PROCLAMATION

DETERMINING NEW DESIGNS FOR CERTAIN
SILVER COINS OF THE REALM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS under section eleven of the Coinage Act, 1870, We have power, with the advice of Our Privy Council, from time to time by proclamation to determine the design for any coin :

And whereas it appears to Us desirable to determine new designs for the silver coins hereinafter specified, being certain of the silver coins mentioned in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870 :

We, therefore, in pursuance of the said enactment and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows :—

1. The designs for the said silver coins shall be as follows :—

(1) *Crown*—Every Crown shall have for the obverse impression Our Effigy with the inscription "GEORGIUS V DEI GRA : BRITT :

OMN : REX " and for the reverse the Royal Crown with the date of the year encircled by a wreath composed of the national emblems of the rose, thistle and shamrock, with the inscription "FID. DEF. IND. IMP" together with the word "CROWN." The Coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

(2) *Half-Crown*—Every half-crown shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the crown, and for the reverse the Ensigns Armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield having on each side the initial letter of Our Name in duplicate and interlaced surmounted by the Royal Crown with the inscription "FID. DEF. IND. IMP" together with the words "HALF-CROWN" and the date of the year interspersed with the national emblems of the rose, thistle and shamrock. The Coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

(3) *Florin*—Every florin shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the crown and for the reverse the initial letter of Our Name in the centre interlaced by four crowned Sceptres in the form of a cross ; in the angles the Ensigns Armorial of the United Kingdom contained in four shields, with the inscription "FID. DEF. IND. IMP" together with the words "ONE FLORIN" and the date of the year. The Coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

(4) *Shilling*—Every shilling shall have the same obverse impression and inscription as the crown and for the reverse Our Royal Crest with the inscription "FID. DEF. IND. IMP" together with the words "ONE SHILLING" and the date of the year. The Coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

(5) *Sixpence*—Every sixpence shall have the same obverse impression as the crown with the inscription "GEORGIUS V D.G. BRITT : OMN : REX F.D. IND : IMP : " and for the reverse six acorns growing from interlaced oak branches with the words "SIX PENCE" and the date of the year. The Coin shall have a graining upon the edge.

(6) *Threepence*—Every threepence, not being a coin of the King's Maundy monies, shall have the same obverse impression as the crown, with the inscription "GEORGIUS V D.G. BRITT : OMN : REX F.D. IND : IMP" and for the reverse three acorns growing from interlaced oak twigs, with the words "THREE PENCE" and the date of the year. The Coin shall have a plain edge.

2. The Kings Maundy Monies—Every Maundy silver fourpence, threepence, twopence and penny shall have for the obverse impression Our aforesaid effigy, with the inscription "GEORGIUS V D.G. BRITT : OMN : REX F.D. IND : IMP : " and for the reverse the respective figures "4," "3," "2," "1", (according to the denomination or value of the piece) in the centre, with the date of the year placed across the figure, and encircled with an oak wreath surmounted by the Royal Crown. These Coins shall have a plain edge.

3. This Proclamation shall come into force and have effect as from the first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this third day of *November*, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, and in the eighteenth year of Our Reign.

A Bill

To Amend the Alien Ordinance, 1900.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Alien (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928," and shall be read and construed as one with the Alien Ordinance, 1900.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalisation.

2. (1) Where the Governor in Council is satisfied that a certificate of naturalisation granted by him has been obtained by false representation or fraud, or by concealment of material circumstances, or that the person to whom the certificate is granted has shown himself by act or speech to be disaffected or disloyal to His Majesty the King, the Governor shall by order revoke the certificate.

(2) Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions the Governor in Council shall by order revoke a certificate of naturalisation granted by him in any case in which he is satisfied that the person to whom the certificate was granted either—

(a) has during any war in which His Majesty is engaged unlawfully traded or communicated with the enemy or with the subject of an enemy state, or been engaged in or associated with any business which is to his knowledge carried on in such manner as to assist the enemy in such war; or

(b) has within five years of the date of the grant of the certificate been sentenced by any court in His Majesty's Dominions to imprisonment for a term of not less than twelve months, or to a term of penal servitude, or to a fine of not less than one hundred pounds; or

(c) was not of good character at the date of the grant of the certificate; or

(d) has since the date of the grant of the certificate been for a period of not less than seven years ordinarily resident out of His Majesty's Dominions otherwise than as a representative of a British subject, firm, or company carrying on business, or an institution established, in His Majesty's Dominions, or in the service of the Crown and has not maintained substantial connection with His Majesty's Dominions; or

(e) remains according to the law of a state at war with His Majesty a subject of that state; and that (in any case) the continuance of the certificate is not conducive to the public good.

(3) The Governor in Council may, if he thinks fit, before making an order under this section refer the case for such inquiry as is hereinafter specified, and in any case to which subsection (1) or paragraph (a), (c), or (e) of subsection (2) of this section applies, the Governor in Council shall, by notice given to or sent to the last-known address of the holder of the certificate, cause an opportunity to be given him of claiming that the case be referred for such inquiry, and if the holder so claims in accordance with the notice the Governor in Council shall refer the case for inquiry accordingly.

(4) An inquiry under this section shall be held by a committee constituted for the purpose by the Governor in Council and shall be conducted in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct :

Provided that any such inquiry may if the Governor in Council thinks fit, instead of being held as aforesaid be held by the Supreme Court, and the practice and procedure on any inquiry so held shall be regulated by rules of court.

A committee appointed under this section shall have all such powers, rights, and privileges as are vested in the Supreme Court or in any judge thereof on the occasion of any action, in respect of the following matters :—

- (a) the enforcing the attendance of witnesses and examining them on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, and the issue of a commission or a request to examine witnesses abroad ; and
- (b) the compelling the production of documents ; and
- (c) the punishing persons guilty of contempt ;

and a summons signed by one or more members of the committee may be substituted for and shall be equivalent to any formal process capable of being issued in any action for enforcing the attendance of witnesses and compelling the production of documents.

(5) Where a person to whom a certificate of naturalisation has been granted in this Colony is resident in the United Kingdom, the certificate may be revoked in accordance with this section by a Secretary of State, with the concurrence of the Governor in Council.

(6) Where the Governor in Council revokes a certificate of Naturalisation, the revocation shall have effect from such date as the Governor in Council may direct, and thereupon the certificate shall be given up and cancelled, and any person refusing or neglecting to give up his certificate shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

3. (1) Where a certificate of naturalisation is revoked the Governor in Council may by order direct that the wife and minor children (or any of them) of the person whose certificate is revoked shall cease to be British subjects, and any such person shall thereupon become an alien ; but except where the Governor in Council directs as aforesaid, the nationality of the wife and minor children of the person whose certificate is revoked shall not be affected by the revocation and they shall remain British subjects :

Effect of revocation of certificate of naturalisation.

Provided that —

- (a) it shall be lawful for the wife of any such person within six months after the date of the order of revocation to make a declaration of alienage, and thereupon she and any minor children of her husband and herself shall cease to be British subjects and shall become aliens ; and

- (b) The Governor in Council shall not make any such order as aforesaid in the case of a wife who was at birth a British subject, unless he is satisfied that if she had held a certificate of naturalisation in her own right the certificate could properly have been revoked under this Ordinance, and the provisions of this Ordinance as to referring cases for inquiry shall apply to the making of any such order as they apply to the revocation of a certificate.

(2) The provisions of this section shall, as respects persons affected thereby, have effect in substitution for any other provisions of this Ordinance as to the effect upon the wife and children of any person where the person ceases to be a British subject and such other provisions shall accordingly not apply in any such case.

(3) Where a certificate of naturalisation is revoked the former holder thereof shall be regarded as an alien and as a subject of the state to which he belonged at the time the certificate was granted.

Loss of British nationality by foreign naturalisation.

4. A British subject who, when in any foreign state and not under disability, by obtaining a certificate of naturalisation or by any other voluntary and formal act, becomes naturalised therein, shall thenceforth be deemed to have ceased to be a British subject.



FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923, 1924, and 1927.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1927, is hereby repealed. Repeal of Ordinance No. 6 of 1927.
2. Section 3 of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924, relating to the scale on which a refund of part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid, or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil, shall be made, shall stand in every way as though it had not been repealed by section 1 of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1927. Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.
3. A refund of 2s. 6d. per barrel of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid, or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil shall be made on all whale oil and seal oil exported during the 1926-1927 season. Special refund of part of duty in respect of 1926-1927 season.
4. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1928, and shall be read and construed as one with the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923, and 1924. Short Title.

In accordance with Section 13 of the Savings Bank Ordinance, 1888, I have the honour to submit the following report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank in respect of the period 1st October, 1926, to 30th September, 1927.

Summary of Transactions.

(ENCLOSURE 1.)

2. During the year there were 826 deposits as against 316 withdrawals. The average monthly deposits amounted to £1,800 : 6 : 6 as against average monthly withdrawals of £1,903 : 5 : 3.

3. During the year 61 new accounts were opened and 41 accounts were closed, leaving 927 deposit accounts at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor on the 30th September, 1927, was £141 : 9 : 11 or about £57 per head of the population (2286). A monthly summary of the transactions of the Bank is appended hereto.

4. The accrued interest credited to the various accounts during the year amounted to £3,056 : 14 : 9. The deposits during the year, with accrued interest, (£24,660 : 12 : 6) exceeded the withdrawals (£22,839 : 2 : 10) by a sum of £1,821 : 9 : 8, leaving a balance to the credit of depositors on the 30th September, 1927, of £131,166 : 12 : 7.

(Section 10 of the Ordinance.)

5. On the 1st October, 1926, the amount standing to the credit of the depositors amounted to	£129,345 : 2 : 11.
Deposits received during the year amounted to	21,603 : 17 : 9.

6. The total amount expended by the Crown Agents, under Section 10 of the Ordinance, in the purchase of approved securities amounted to £115,266 : 4 : 2, leaving an uninvested balance on the 30th September, 1927, of £15,900 : 8 : 5.

(Section 11 of the Ordinance.)

7. During the year the income derived from the securities forming the Savings Bank Investment Fund amounted to £4,910 : 19 : 9, of which sum the amount of £3,056 : 14 : 9 was credited to depositors' accounts in respect of accrued interest for the year, and the balance of £1,854 : 5 : 0 was transferred to the credit of the Colony's Revenue.

Savings Bank Depreciation Fund.

8. On the 1st October, 1926, the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund amounted to £11,125 : 6 : 7. During the year a sum of £608 : 18 : 8 was derived from the interest on the securities, and this sum was invested and placed to the credit of the Fund, making a total on the 30th September, 1927, of £11,734 : 5 : 3.

9. Appended hereto is a statement showing the nominal value, cost, and assumed market value of the securities held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Savings Bank Investment Fund and the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund (Enclosures 2 and 2a.)

Assets and Liabilities.

10. The Government of the Falkland Islands is liable for payment in cash of the total amount standing to the credit of the various depositors in the Government Savings Bank, which amounted to £131,166 : 12 : 7 on the 30th September, 1927. The total cash and the market value of the securities held by the Government on this date amounted to £135,020 : 8 : 5 which exceeded the liability by a sum of £3,853 : 15 : 10, as shown by the attached statement of Assets and Liabilities.

A Bill

To legalize certain payments made in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-seven in excess of the Expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 3 of 1926.

GOVERNOR'S CUP.

The entries for the Governor's Cup, a handsome trophy kindly presented by His Excellency Arnold Hodson, C.M.G., were exceptionally good and fifty-four competitors actually fired in the first stage of whom the one half passed by virtue of their scores into the second stage. Of these twenty-seven ten qualified to shoot in the third and last stage which was completed on the afternoon of Sunday, the 11th of March. The ultimate placings which were decided by the aggregate scores registered throughout the competition were as follows :-

His Excellency also won the Bronze Medal presented by the National Rifle Association for the winner of the competition which in accordance with the conditions of the award he was constrained to keep.

The weather on the two days of the competition was unusually fine from the spectators' point of view but the conditions for accurate marksmanship were rendered extremely difficult by the force of the wind which varied from 5 to 18 degrees during the course of the shoot. Some of the competitors on the first day were handicapped by the lateness of the hour which necessitated their firing in the gathering darkness.

The standard of marksmanship shewn throughout the competition was very high and the issue was in suspense until the very end. At the 500 yards distance in the final stage His Excellency put on the exceptional score of 34 out of a possible 35. The entire success of the Local Bisley Meeting as a whole has justified to the full the expectations and endeavours of those responsible for its promotion and it is hoped that it will become an annual event in the sporting life of the Colony.

A Bill

To amend the law relating to the Levying of Rates on house property in the town of Stanley.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1928."

Short Title.

2. The Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, and the Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927, are hereby repealed.

Repeal of Ordinances No. 4 of 1905, and No. 3 of 1927.

3. In this Ordinance

Definitions.

"BOARD OF ASSESSORS" means five persons resident in the Colony of whom two shall in the normal course be the Colonial Treasurer and the Colonial Engineer to be appointed annually for the purposes of this Ordinance by the Governor in Council.

"HOUSE" means and includes every erection or structure of whatever nature capable of being utilised for habitation, shelter, trade, work, storage, or for housing horses, cattle, stock, poultry, or any live bird or animal.

4. For all house property in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect thereof for every twenty shillings of its annual value the sum of one shilling or such further sum not exceeding in the aggregate five shillings as may be sanctioned annually by the Legislative Council.

Rates to be levied.

Rates how and by whom to be paid.

5. All rates shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer before the 1st day of July in each year and should any rates be unpaid on the 1st day of July in any year the same shall be recoverable by civil process in the Magistrate's Court. The owners of house property shall be responsible for the due payment of the rates.

Rateable value how to be assessed.

6. The value of house property for the purposes of this Ordinance shall be assessed annually by the Board of Assessors. Such assessment shall be completed and shall be made public in manner sufficient for the information of the owners of house property on or before the 15th day of January in each year and the owners of house property shall have the right to make an appeal to the Board of Assessors in respect of the whole or the part of the assessment not later than the 31st day of January in each year.

Assessment to be approved by the Governor in Council.

7. The Board of Assessors after due consideration of any appeals which may be made in pursuance of the preceding section shall cause the assessment to be submitted for approval to the Governor in Council not earlier than the 1st day of February and not later than the 15th day of February in each year and the Board of Assessors shall simultaneously with the submission of the assessment to the Governor in Council make public in manner aforesaid any alterations which may have been made in the assessment as first made public.

Order of the Governor in Council to be final.

8. The assessment shall be brought before the Governor in Council not earlier than the last day of February in each year and any owner of house property may make an appeal in writing to the Governor in Council in respect of the whole or the part of the assessment before that day. The Governor in Council is empowered to approve, disallow, or alter the assessment in the whole or in the part and any order whatever of the Governor in Council in respect of the whole or the part of the assessment shall be final.

Exemptions.

9. No rate whatever shall be levied upon any of the following descriptions of house property :

House property belonging to the Government;

Any church or place of public worship; and

Any hospital, asylum or building used exclusively for charitable purposes or any public school, museum or mechanics' institute.

And the Governor in Council is empowered to make provision from time to time for the exemption from the payment of any rate whatever of any other description of house property which the Governor in Council may think proper so to be exempted.

Assessment made under Ordinance No. 4 of 1905 as amended by Ordinance No. 3. of 1927 in respect of the year 1928 to be null and void.

10. The assessment made on the 4th day of January, 1928, under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905 as amended by the Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927 shall be null and void and no rate whatever shall be levied on any house property in virtue of such assessment.

New assessment to be made in respect of the year 1928.

11. The Board of Assessors shall make a new assessment of the value of house property in respect of the year 1928. The procedure to be observed in the making of such assessment and in the payment of the rates due in virtue thereof shall be that prescribed in the preceding sections of this Ordinance except that in place of the dates the 15th day of January, the 31st day of January, the 1st day of February, the 15th day of February, the last day of February, and the 1st day of July in each year there shall be read respectively the 15th day of July, the 31st day of July, the 1st day of August, the 15th day of August, the 31st day of August, and the 31st day of October, 1928.

Governor in Council may make regulations.

12. The Governor in Council may make regulations from time to time for the better prescription of the procedure to be followed in carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and generally for giving effect to the provisions of this Ordinance.

An Ordinance

Title.

To amend the Merchant Shipping Ordinance, 1909.

Preamble.

WHEREAS by Ordinance No. 9 of 1909 (An Ordinance to extend to the Colony certain provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts of the Imperial Parliament) Part II of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, as amended by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, was applied to the Colony of the Falkland Islands.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to define the expression "Home-trade ship" so far as the same shall be applicable to British ships registered in the Colony.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Definition of home-trade ship.

1. The expression "Home-trade ship" shall mean and include every ship registered in the Colony employed in trading or going within the following limits ; that is to say, the Falkland Islands, the Dependencies of the Falkland Islands, and the continent of South America between the Rio Santa Cruz, Argentine, and the Western limits of the Straits of Magellan.

Short Title.

2. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Merchant Shipping (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927."

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

1. In these Regulations

"Slaughterhouse" shall mean any licensed slaughterhouse or slaughtering-place including buildings and appurtenances used for the purpose of slaughtering stock.

"Stock" means cattle, sheep or swine.

"Meat" means the flesh or viscera of any slaughtered stock.

"Disease" means any disease or any defect or inferiority in the condition of any stock or meat which in the opinion of an Inspector renders it unfit for human consumption.

"Inspector" means any duly qualified person appointed by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island with the sanction of the Governor, to carry out the provisions of these Regulations.

"Farmer" means the owner of any stock outside the town of Stanley and also the manager, overseer, or person in charge of stock outside the town of Stanley.

"Implements" means any instruments used in or about a slaughterhouse for the purpose of slaughtering or dealing with slaughtered stock or carcasses.

2. Under these Regulations all slaughterhouse wherein human stock are slaughtered or dressed for human consumption in the Town of Stanley shall be licensed.

3. An application for a licence in respect of a slaughterhouse shall be made in the form of Schedule hereto.

4. For every slaughterhouse for which a licence has been granted there shall be payable to the Colonial Treasurer on or before the first day in January in each year the sum of One Pound.

5. Under these Regulations it shall be lawful for any farmer to slaughter stock for human consumption outside the town of Stanley providing such stock is free from disease.

6. It shall not be lawful knowingly to slaughter and allow to be used for human consumption, or to sell or offer for sale for human consumption any stock affected with any disease which in the the opinion of an Inspector renders the carcass or meat unfit for human consumption.

7. No calf weighing less than sixty pounds dressed weight (including the skin) shall be slaughtered and sold for human consumption.

8. It shall not be lawful for any person to slaughter in Stanley any stock for sale for human consumption excepting in a licenced slaughterhouse, or unless permission is given in writing by an Inspector for stock to be slaughtered on other premises.

9. An Inspector may at any time enter and inspect any slaughterhouse for the purpose of:-

(1) Preventing cruelty to any stock whether such cruelty is caused by overcrowding, insufficient shelter, insanitary conditions, want of food or drink or otherwise howsoever;

(2) Inspecting any stock intended for slaughter or any meat or carcass of stock;

(3) Inspecting any implement or implements used in any slaughterhouse;

(4) Examining any books relating to stock either slaughtered or intended for slaughter.

10. It shall not be lawful to remove, allow to be removed, or assist in removing from any slaughterhouse without the permission of an Inspector, any meat or the whole of any part of any carcass of stock which has been declared by an Inspector as unfit for human consumption.

11. An Inspector may order the destruction by fire or in any other efficient manner any meat or the whole or any part of a carcass of stock which is in the opinion of such Inspector unfit for human consumption.

12. A correct record of all diseased meat or carcass of stock condemned as unfit for human consumption shall be kept by the Inspector by whom such diseased meat or carcass of stock has been condemned.

13. In every slaughtering place the killing, dressing and hanging places shall be floored with concrete or other material approved by an Inspector and thoroughly ventilated.

14. The floor and lower portions of the walls, partitions and posts of the killing and dressing places shall be thoroughly cleaned after slaughtering for the day is finished.

15. Every part of the interior of the killing, dressing or hanging places shall be lime-washed at intervals of not less than four months.

16. Where any part is constructed of such materials as would in the opinion of an Inspector render lime-washing unnecessary he may by writing under his hand waive the fulfilment of this clause as to such part.

17. All implements used in or about a slaughterhouse including any carts, baskets or other equipment used for the transportation of meat shall be kept thoroughly clean.

18. The road leading to the slaughterhouse shall be paved metalled or boarded to the satisfaction of an Inspector.

19. No hide, skins, fat or other portion of any carcass likely to become a nuisance shall be stored in any killing, dressing or hanging place.

20. Proper and sufficient urinal and closet accommodation shall be provided to the satisfaction of the Inspector such accommodation to be contained in a separate structure apart from the main building.

21. Any person who commits or who is concerned in committing any breach of these regulations shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding two pounds for each offence and in case of continuing offence to a further fine of not exceeding five shillings for each day after written notice of the said offence from an Inspector.

22. These Regulations may be cited as the "Board of Health for the East Falkland Island (Slaughterhouse and Inspection of Stock) Regulations 1928".

PAINTER'S COLIC :

HOW CAUSED AND HOW BEST PREVENTED.

Lead poisoning from breathing the dust given off in dry rubbing down is the main occupational risk among painters.

The symptoms in the painter are usually colic and constipation, less frequently, "drop wrist" (loss of power to extend the fingers and wrists), although painters seem to suffer from this form of paralysis rather more than lead workers do in general, presumably because of the special strain the work places on the forearms. After years of work the constitution becomes undermined from the slow action of lead on the blood vessels and kidneys (chronic Bright's disease).

Remember these symptoms in the painter follow only on breathing in dust. What happens is that the dust sticks on the moist surfaces inside the mouth and is either swallowed or passes into the air tubes. You breathe 16 times a minute, and in and out the dust goes but always a little less out than in. So long as paint ready mixed with oil is used, and in a cleanly way, painting operations involving no dry sand papering ought to be harmless and not give rise to any poisoning.

You may be quite certain about this.

Lead paint never enters the system directly through the pores of the skin, but it can, of course collect on the hands and under the finger nails and be eaten by very careless painters. Incidentally, it may be said evidence is lacking that that breathing in dust from dry rubbing down zinc paints is hurtful.

A painter can help himself to keep fit. He should pay scrupulous attention to keeping his hands and teeth clean. Too much stress cannot be laid on the part played by bad teeth in lowering the health.

Never commence work on an empty stomach; foods containing fat, such as bacon and milk, are suitable.

Where there is a tendency to constipation, aperient medicine, such as Epsom Salts (one to two teaspoonfuls in water) can be taken with advantage once or twice a week.

Overall suits should never be shaken to rid them of dust, as this causes more dust in the air for you to breathe; they require washing at least once a week.

Medical advice should at once be sought if signs of lead poisoning present themselves.

Wrist drop will always incapacitate a man for months, and may prove *permanent* unless electrical treatment is obtained *in time*.

Though lead poisoning is the most serious risk to which painters are exposed, turpentine vapour also - as every painter knows - causes headache and giddiness and (when working in confined spaces) sometimes sickness and pains which may occasionally be confused with lead colic. These symptoms nearly always quickly disappear on going into the fresh air, and do not occur when the ventilation is good. Fresh air and good ventilation, therefore, constitute the antidote to fumes of turpentine. Turpentine has action on the kidneys, but chronic Bright's disease from it is not proven.

Annual Medical and Sanitary Report for the Year ended 31st December, 1927.

—:—:—

(A) FALKLAND ISLANDS.

I. Administration.

(a) The Colonial Surgeon was suspended from duty with effect from the 25th of October and until the arrival in the Colony of an Assistant Colonial Surgeon, Dr. W. B. R. Jones, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., on the 10th of December temporary arrangements for carrying out the duties of the joint Medical Officers were made by loan of the services of Dr. J. F. Craddock, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., and Dr. Bernt Longva through the courtesy, respectively, of the West Falkland Medical Association and the Southern Whaling and Sealing Company. Throughout the year the administration was thus short handed and was faced with considerable difficulties which were successfully overcome to the great credit of all concerned.

(b) No ordinances affecting the public health were enacted during the year.

II. Public Health.

1. GENERAL DISEASES. These as in previous years were rare with the one exception of Tuberculosis which was present to a degree that calls urgently for some form of action to prevent its further spread. The prevalence of this disease would appear to be aggravated to

a great extent by inadequate housing conditions and by close inter-marriage. Steps are being taken to alleviate the former. It is hoped to institute bacteriological work in this connection in the near future and that the efforts made will lead to successful discovery of the disease in its early state. Steps will also be taken to examine the sputum of all cases and by so doing make the possibility of cure or checking the course of the disease more easy. Chronic Appendicitis is prevalent amongst the Falkland Islanders, and on operation the Appendage has been discovered bound down by adhesion in the majority of cases, while in two cases there were definite signs of Tubercular disease of the Intestine. The evidence would tend to show although as yet there is no definite proof, that Tubercle may be the cause of the chronic attacks.

2. COMMUNICABLE DISEASE. Mosquito or Insect-borne, was entirely absent. No acute infectious condition was reported in the Colony during the year. Septic Throat and Cervical Adenitis are still troublesome but with the new system of drainage this should soon cease to be present. Bacteriological work is required before any definite satisfactory cure can be expected. No fatal cases have resulted but cure is slow and uncertain under the present method of treatment. For this further reason it is essential to have available the necessary material to find the organism to make use of specific serums for the condition. Teeth are still in bad condition but this will resolve itself when the new water system is generally adopted for I consider, as my predecessors before me considered, that most of the Dental trouble is due to lack of lime in the drinking water. The treatment of the outbreak of Catarrhal colds by means of stock vaccine was not met with much success. In this case again the specific serum might have yielded better results.

Vital Statistics.

The entire population is of European descent, and all the Officials are European.

The estimated population of the Colony on the 31st December, 1927 was 2,286. The estimated birth rate was 22.31 per 1,000 and the death rate 9.62 per 1,000. Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages is compulsory under Ordinance No. 12 of 1853 and may be regarded as reliable.

Except for the preceding paragraph the general health of the population is good, also that of the officials.

III. Hygiene and Sanitation.

Steps are still being taken to modernise the roads and the scavenging system in order to improve the sanitation of Stanley and during the past year such improvement has been marked.

Government School.

During the year the children at the Government School were inspected by the Colonial Surgeon, the Dental Surgeon and the Nurse Matron. The children were found generally clean and except for few cases well nourished. Tonsils and adenoids were dealt with as required, and as a whole the general health was good. The Dental Surgeon reports 125 cases as treated during the year, and states that there is a marked improvement in the teeth and mouths. The Dental Surgeon also agrees with the water theory as causing dental softening.

IV. Port Health Work and Administration.

Sixty two vessels with a registered tonnage of 99,398 and with crews totalling 2,759 were given pratique during the year. No quarantinable diseases were reported during the year.

V. Maternity and Child Welfare.

Fourteen cases were treated in the Hospital and nine in the district during the year. It is impossible for all cases to be treated in the Hospital but every effort is made for all who require care, especially cases which are likely to give rise to complications, to be in-patients, as such can only be satisfactorily dealt with in the Hospital when other cases generally can be made more comfortable. Instruction is given to mothers on infant feeding and child welfare by the certified nursing staff.

VI. Hospital.

All patients admitted to Hospital are under the sole charge of the Colonial Surgeon. The total number of admissions for the year was 139 of whom 128 were cured and 11 were relieved; two of these were sent to England for further treatment, and two died. The number of surgical operations performed was 73.

The estimated number of out-patients treated was 2,943 and in addition 131 visits to patients' homes were paid by the nursing staff.

VII. Prisons and Asylums.

Five prisoners were in custody during the year; they enjoyed good health. The prison was inspected regularly and found to be in good condition.

There were no lunatics under supervision.

VIII. Meteorology.

The climate of the Falkland Islands has been compared with that of the north of Scotland. The average level of the barometer is rather low being 29.55 at sea level in 1927. On the whole the readings are highest in late winter and spring, July to October, and the lowest in summer, November to April. The comparatively low readings are due to the position of the Islands in the Southern temperate storm belt.

The mean annual temperature in 1927 was 43°8'. December was the warmest month, 49°2' and September the coldest, 37°3'. The absolute maximum of 71°0 was recorded on the 27th of November and the absolute minimum of 18° on the 30th of August giving an annual range of 53°. The number of overcast days is considerable and the average cloudiness is seven-tenths of the sky covered. March and September as a rule have the clearest skies. January and February are the most sunny months averaging five and a half hours sunshine per day. The rainfall averages 19.45 per year and the prevailing wind is from the north-west with frequent winds from the south-west and north. These winds often attain gale force.

It should be explained that the above barometer temperature and rainfall figures are those recorded at Stanley. In the camp, for example at Darwin on the East Falkland, still lower temperatures were recorded during the winter.

IX. Scientific.

The X-Ray apparatus at the Hospital is in good condition and has proved of great value. The Boyle apparatus for the administration of chloroform, ether, and nitrous oxide gas and oxygen has rendered valuable service, but owing to the action of this climate on the rubber of the gas bag, its use has had to be discontinued for a short period. It is of interest to record that rubber has been observed to perish more rapidly in this climate than in the tropics.

(B) DEPENDENCIES.

The total population of South Georgia during the summer months is estimated at 1,500 approximately. There is no British Medical Officer at South Georgia but the Whaling Companies operating in the Dependencies maintain their own medical men. Two medical officers also accompany the Whaling Fleet to the South Shetlands and the South Orkneys. No reports are available on Medical and Sanitary conditions in the Dependencies, but it is hoped that it may be found possible to remedy this lack in the future.

This Annual Report has been compiled from reports kept by the Medical and Nursing Staff during the year, and I have added such observations as I have made during my short period of office.

In pursuance of the powers in him vested by section 7 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1913, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, is pleased to declare that the Order of His Excellency the Administrator in Council made under the aforesaid section of the aforesaid Ordinance on the 13th day of September, 1920, and relating to the grant of authority on application by the Colonial Secretary or the Stipendiary Magistrate, West Falkland, to kill or take the Red Breasted Starling (*Trupialis falklandicus*) during the months of April, May, and June, is hereby cancelled.

1. These Regulations may be cited as "The Live Stock (Amendment) Regulations, 1928" and shall be read and construed as one with the Live Stock Regulations (Consolidation) 1923.

2. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Live Stock Regulations (Consolidation) 1923 no dog shall be imported into the Colony from any country abroad except that such dog shall first have been kept for the period of six weeks at the least or for any longer period which the Chief Inspector of Stock may consider necessary in isolation in the Colony either at the Quarantine Station in Stanley or at any other place which the Chief Inspector of Stock may consider suitable.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

1. These Bye-Laws may be cited as the "Extermination of Rats and Mice Bye-laws, 1928."

2. The owner or occupier of any premises shall keep such premises free from rats and mice to the satisfaction of the Board.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of meeting held on the 16th November, 1927.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 14th of April, 1927, were read and confirmed.

2. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :

- (1) Copies of all Regulations, Orders, and Bye-laws, made or approved by the Governor in Executive Council since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
- (2) Copies of despatches received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating the non-disallowance by His Majesty of Ordinances No. 4 of 1926 and Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4 of 1927.

3. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :

- (1) Comparative Statements of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Colony and the Dependencies for the periods 1st January to 31st March, 1927, and 1st January to 30th June, 1927.
- (2) Schedules of all charges of an unusual or special description or not covered by the Appropriation law for the year 1927, incurred during the quarters ended the 31st of March, 1927 and the 30th June, 1927.
- (3) Monthly abstracts of Cash Receipts and Payments of the 'Discovery' Committee for the months of July to December, 1926.

4. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of the following Resolution:-

"Whereas further provision is required for the service of the Colony and its Dependencies for the year ending the 31st December, 1927.

Be it resolved -

This Council hereby sanctions the expenditure from public funds of the sum of Nine thousand, Seven hundred and Fifty-eight Pounds, Eighteen Shillings and Seven Pence (£9,758 18s. 7d.) to meet the several charges itemized in the accompanying schedule."

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

5. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of the following Resolution:-

"Be it resolved that under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, as amended by the Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927, this Council hereby sanctions the following rate to be charged for the year, 1928, on house property in the Town of Stanley, namely One Shilling and Nine Pence for every twenty shillings of the annual value of such house property."

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

6. The Honourable G. J. Felton moved the adoption of the following Resolution:-

"This Council having in view the refusal hitherto made by the Army Council to grant British War Medals to the members of the Falkland Islands Volunteers who served

during the Great War from the year 1914 onwards and the slight thereby cast upon the men who so served and upon the inhabitants of the Colony as a whole.

Resolves -

That steps be taken to approach the Secretary of State for the Colonies with the prayer that the Army Council may be moved, if possible, to re-open this question and to grant to the members of the Falkland Islands Volunteers above referred to British War Medals."

The Honourable H. H. R. Gresham seconded.

The Honourable J. M. Ellis stated that as an ex-service man, he wished strongly to support the Resolution. His Excellency said that he also wished to add his support to the motion. He felt that in this important matter an earnest appeal should be made to the Secretary of State as the slight had been very deeply felt by the inhabitants of the Colony who had been so loyal to the Empire during the Great War.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

7. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in introducing the Bill entitled, "A Bill to amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900," said that as Honourable Members were aware, there had been no alteration in the Customs import tariff since the year 1913, when under the Tariff Amendment Ordinance of that year, the import duty on spirits was raised from 12s. to 15s. a gallon: with this exception the rates at present levied on dutiable importations had been in force for the past twenty-seven years. It was now proposed to raise the duties on spirits and tobacco by $33\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. and the duty on wine by 50 per cent. With regard to the duty on spirits the actual increase would be from 15s. to £1 a gallon or from 2s. 6d. to 3s. 4d. a bottle. This would mean that the cost of a bottle of spirits would be increased by 10d. or at the outside by 1s., which worked out at less than 1d. a tot. In the case of wines, the consumption of which was not heavy locally, the increase in duty would be one-half the present rate, and on malt liquor, mum, spruce, &c., it would remain unchanged. On tobacco the present rate of 5s. per lb., for cigars would be raised to 6s. 9d. a lb., and in the case of cigarettes, cut and manufactured tobacco, and snuff from 3s. to 4s. a lb. For purposes of comparison it was interesting to refer to the Customs Tariff of Great Britain and Northern Ireland as given in Whitaker's Almanack for 1927, from which it would be seen that the average rates on spirits and tobacco leviable under the Imperial enactment were £3. 15s. a gallon and 12s. 7d. a lb., respectively, as against £1 a gallon and 4s. a lb., leviable under the Bill. The tariff as it was proposed to amend it would remain considerably below that paid at home and he did not think that any consumer would be unduly affected by the comparatively slight additions proposed.

The additional revenue which it was anticipated would accrue from the increase in the taxation proposed was estimated to amount to £2,000 annually. As Honourable Members were aware the Government had in contemplation various schemes for the general improvement and development of the Colony and for advancing the welfare and prosperity of its inhabitants, including schemes under the following heads:

The provision of adequate mail services, both foreign and local.

The improvement of tracks and the construction of bridges.

The general improvement of the existing wireless service and the introduction of broadcasting.

The encouragement of better housing and the construction of public baths in the town of Stanley.

The installation of electric lighting, in the first place in Government buildings and offices, and at a later date, if found practicable under Government direction, the extension of the electric service to the town of Stanley generally.

It should be borne in mind that progress was necessarily dependent on finance and while every avenue of economy was being explored it was only fair that the individual who

stood to benefit by the improvements to be effected should in some measure contribute to their cost.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved that the Bill be read a *first* time.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The first reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1, 2, and 3 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "to provide for the service of the year 1928." was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

On motion made, the consideration of Clause 2 was postponed until after consideration of the Schedule.

Referring to the draft Estimates for the year 1928, laid before the Council for consideration in Committee with the Schedule, the Honourable the Colonial Secretary said that it would be seen that the revenue anticipated during the year 1928 was £49,518 as compared with the estimate of the total ordinary expenditure amounting to £40,488, or an anticipated surplus of £9,030 out of which it was proposed to expend £7,850 under 'Public Works Extraordinary' leaving a net surplus of £1,180 for addition to the accumulated funds standing to the credit of the Colony's General Account. It was estimated that on the 31st of December, 1927, the balance of that account would amount to £33,527 as against £41,891 at the end of last year, the decrease of £8,364 being accounted for by the heavy expenditure during 1927 on works chargeable to surplus balances, primarily on the Stanley Improvement Works and the erection of the new Drill Hall for the Falkland Islands Defence Force. Against that expenditure there was available the excess of ordinary revenue over the total expenditure chargeable to revenue, which, as Honourable Members would remember, it was anticipated in the Estimates for the current year would amount to £1,775: the revised estimate raised this figure to £1,924, which though not large was from the point of view of sound budgeting very satisfactory and sufficient to enable all liabilities to be met without undue difficulty so long as care was exercised. To revert to the actual estimate of the expenditure for 1928, it was noteworthy that notwithstanding the several alterations, involving increased expenditure, which had been introduced under various heads of the Estimates, the estimate of ordinary expenditure was less by £125 than the figure provided for the current year. Under 'Public Works Extraordinary' an increase of £4,900 was provided for, the details of which would be explained when the several items of the Schedule were brought before Honourable Members for consideration. With regard to the estimated expenditure under Appendix I, he should like momentarily to deal with the provision of £6,000 inserted for the construction of Public Baths in Stanley. Time had not been sufficient to elaborate the scheme and to prepare a detailed estimate of the work and as it was desirable that Honourable Members should have something more definite put before them in the matter than it was at present possible to submit, he proposed when the relative item in the Schedule was being put to the vote, to move that the sum of £15,010 appearing thereunder should be reduced by the sum of £6,000 being the provision inserted in the draft Estimates for this work. If circumstances permitted and Honourable Members concurred the matter could be gone into later in the year and the cost of the work covered by supplementary appropriation.

With regard to the Estimates of the Dependencies, the only feature in the revenue that called for comment was in the matter of the increased receipts anticipated from duty on whale oil, the estimate of £150,000 having been inserted on the basis of the average revenue derived from this source during the past five years. In the Estimates of Expenditure there was shown and anticipated total increase of £8,925 during 1928, as compared with 1927, namely under ordinary expenditure, £79,335, as against £72,360, and under extraordinary expenditure, £1,950, as against no provision during the current year.

The Schedule was agreed to with the following amendment :

In place of the words and figures, 'Appendix I, 'Expenditure to be met from Surplus Balances, £15,010,' the insertion of the words and figures, 'Appendix I. 'Expenditure to be met from Surplus Balances, £9,010.'

Clause 2 was recommitted and amended to read as follows :

"The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on the 31st of December, 1928, a sum not exceeding One hundred and forty-three thousand, two hundred and ninety-four pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1928."

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

His Excellency stated that he was sure that it was the wish of Honourable Members that their appreciation of Mr. Ellis' valuable work in connection with the framing of the Estimates and the capable manner in which he had handled the Bill in its passage through the Council should be recorded.

His Excellency also stated that in view of the fact that the Estimates contained provision for certain alterations in the establishment of the Colony and for important works which had not yet received the approval of the Secretary of State, he proposed to reserve his assent to the Bill pending the signification of His Majesty's pleasure on the measure.

9. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "to amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1923, and by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924, was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 3 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. In moving the first reading of the Bill entitled, "A Bill relating to the Carriage of Goods by Sea," the Honourable the Colonial Secretary said that the measure had been framed on the lines of the Imperial Enactment of 1924, with a view to carrying into effect the recommendations of the Imperial Economic Conference of 1923 with respect to the operation of unified rules relating to Bills of Lading in all parts of the Empire. It would be seen that the Bill did not in any way affect vessels engaged in the coasting trade of the Colony.

The first reading of the Bill was seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer and agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 9 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

11. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the *first* reading of the Bill entitled, "A Bill to amend the Merchant Shipping Ordinance, 1909." In doing so he explained that the object of the measure was to define the expression "Home trade" ship as applicable to ships registered in the Colony, and thereby enable small vessels on which it was economically impossible to employ the services of certificated masters to engage in voyages to the neighbouring coast of South America from which under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, they were at present debarred.

The first reading of the Bill was seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer and agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

The preamble and title were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

12. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill, "to provide for the grant of Pensions, Gratuities and other Allowances to persons who have been in the public service of the Colony," was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 22 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

Read and confirmed this 22nd day of May, 1928.

Falkland Islands Revenue.

6. The ordinary Revenue for the Falklands amounted to £41,318 : 11 : 9. During the year a sum of £9,000 was transferred to Falklands Revenue Head IX, when transferred

from Dependencies Funds, towards the cost of the Central Administration of the Colony. With the above mentioned sum of £9,000 included therein the ordinary Revenue for the year amounted to £50,318 : 11 : 9.

7. The total Revenue for the Falklands for the year, including Land Sales (£11,144 : 16 : 6) and Marine Insurance Fund (£606) amounted to £62,069 : 8 : 3.

8. The total Expenditure for the Falklands, exclusive of payments made from the Land Sales Fund, amounted to £50,814, this amount exceeded the ordinary Revenue for the year by a sum of £495 : 8 : 3, which excess was met from Surplus Balances.

9. On the 1st January, 1927, the surplus ordinary Revenue that had accumulated to the credit of the Falklands in the General Account of the Colony amounted to £41,891 : 16 : 0, which added to the total ordinary Revenue for the year (£50,318 : 11 : 9) makes a total of £92,210 : 7 : 9. This amount less the total Expenditure for the same period (£50,814) leaves a surplus balance of ordinary Revenue to the credit of the Falklands on the 31st December, 1927, of £41,396 : 7 : 9.

10. The total ordinary Revenue for the Falklands, for the year (£41,318 : 11 : 6) excluding Dependencies contribution of £9,000, was less than the ordinary Revenue collected in the preceding year by a sum of £1,494 : 5 : 0. Land Sales Fund.

15. On the 1st January, 1927, the Land Sales Fund amounted to £191,780 : 19 : 0. During the year a further sum of £11,144 : 16 : 6 was received, or £4,111 : 16 : 6 more than the original estimate for 1927. The increase was due to the payment by the Honble. George Bonner of a sum of £4,134 to complete the purchase of the land known as San Carlos South, East Falkland.

17. The balance standing to the credit of the Land Sales Fund on the 31st December, 1927, was £194,123 : 7 : 9.

18. On the 31st December, 1927, the cost price of the Securities held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Land Sales Fund amounted to £193,570 : 17 : 7. The Fund was therefore under-invested on that date by a sum of £552 : 10 : 2. This sum is held in the General account of the Colony for the purpose of meeting expenditure in connection with the Experimental Farm.

19. During the year interest amounting to £8,339 : 19 : 3 was received from Land Sales Investments and credited to Revenue under Head V. It was over the original estimate for 1927, by £89 : 19 : 3.

Farm Improvement Loans.

20. On the 1st January, 1927, the balance outstanding was £900. During the year repayments amounting to £100 were received leaving a balance outstanding on the 31st December, 1927, of £800. Interest received during the year amounted to £35 and this amount was credited to Revenue under Head V.

The Marine Insurance Fund.

21. On the 1st January, 1927, the amount standing to the credit of the Marine Insurance Fund was £2,030. During the year, a sum of £606 was charged against Falklands Expenditure (Head VII Port and Marine) and credited to Falklands Revenue Head XII., bringing the total of the Fund up to £2,636 on the 31st December, 1927. The Fund is not invested.

The Dependencies.

22. The ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies, exclusive of the Research & Development Fund, amounted during the year to £206,059 : 0 : 3. It exceeded Dependencies Expenditure for the year (£111,306 : 0 : 10) by a sum of £94,752 : 19 : 5. This amount of £94,752 : 19 : 5 was transferred from Dependencies General Account to the credit of the Research and Development Fund during and in respect of the year ended 31st December, 1927.

23. The ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies for the year amounted to £206,059 : 0 : 3. It exceeded the original estimate by a sum of £55,839 : 0 : 3, but was £15,536 : 18 : 1 less than in 1926.

It was over that expended in 1926 by a sum of £10,980 : 18 : 9, and exceeded the original estimate for 1927 by a sum of £38,946 : 0 : 10.

The total amount so transferred was £94,752 : 19 : 5, being the amount mentioned in paragraph 22.

32. On the 1st January, 1927, the Dependencies Research and Development Fund amounted to £352,278 : 5 : 6. 42. The income derived from the Securities held on account of the Currency Note Investment Fund and the Currency Note Depreciation Fund amounted to £641 : 17 : 4. On the other hand the expenses during the year amounted to £88 : 6 : 6, leaving a net profit to the credit of Ordinary Revenue of £553 : 10 : 10.

An Ordinance

To amend the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, 1898.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations to ensure that adequate measures are taken for the prevention of and for the control of any outbreak of fire in any building or place commonly open to or used by the public for the purpose of work, business, education, recreation or amusement and when made may revoke such regulations.

Governor in Council
may make Regula-
tions.

2. Any person who shall commit any breach of any regulations made under the preceding section shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with hard labour for a term not exceeding six months or to both such penalties.

Penalties.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Fire Brigade (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928", and shall be read and construed as one with the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, 1898.

An Ordinance

To Provide for an Addition to the Pension granted on retirement to Reginald Bruce Baseley.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

Addition of five-sixtieths to be made to pension as computed under Ordinance 8 of 1927.

1. There shall be charged on and paid out of the revenues of the Colony to Reginald Bruce Baseley on retirement in respect of his services as Colonial Engineer in addition to the annual sum granted to him by way of pension under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of the Regulations made thereunder an annual sum equivalent to five-sixtieths of the amount on which the aforesaid pension has been computed.

Addition how payable.

2. The sum so payable shall be paid for such time and in such manner as the aforesaid pension with which it shall be deemed to make one total amount.

Short Title.

3. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Baseley Pension Addition Ordinance, 1928."

An Ordinance

To amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923, 1924, and 1927.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1927, is hereby repealed. Repeal of Ordinance No. 6 of 1927.
2. Section 3 of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1924, relating to the scale on which a refund of part of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid, or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil, shall be made, shall stand in every way as though it had not been repealed by section 1 of the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1927. Refund of part of duty if price of oil does not exceed £50 per ton.
3. A refund of 2s. 6d. per barrel of the duties of Customs levied, collected and paid, or due to be paid, in respect of whale oil and seal oil shall be made on all whale oil and seal oil exported during the 1926–1927 and 1927–1928 seasons. Special refund of part of duty in respect of 1926–1927 and 1927–1928 seasons.
4. This Ordinance may be cited as the “Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1928, and shall be read and construed as one with the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923, and 1924. Short Title.

An Ordinance
To Amend the Alien Ordinance, 1900.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Alien (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928," and shall be read and construed as one with the Alien Ordinance, 1900.

Revocation of Certificate of Naturalisation.

2. (1) Where the Governor in Council is satisfied that a certificate of naturalisation granted by him has been obtained by false representation or fraud, or by concealment of material circumstances, or that the person to whom the certificate is granted has shown himself by act or speech to be disaffected or disloyal to His Majesty the King, the Governor shall by order revoke the certificate.

(2) Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions the Governor in Council shall by order revoke a certificate of naturalisation granted by him in any case in which he is satisfied that the person to whom the certificate was granted either—

(a) has during any war in which His Majesty is engaged unlawfully traded or communicated with the enemy or with the subject of an enemy state, or been engaged in or associated with any business which is to his knowledge carried on in such manner as to assist the enemy in such war; or

(b) has within five years of the date of the grant of the certificate been sentenced by any court in His Majesty's Dominions to imprisonment for a term of not less than twelve months, or to a term of penal servitude, or to a fine of not less than one hundred pounds; or

(c) was not of good character at the date of the grant of the certificate; or

(d) has since the date of the grant of the certificate been for a period of not less than seven years ordinarily resident out of His Majesty's Dominions otherwise than as a

representative of a British subject, firm, or company carrying on business, or an institution established, in His Majesty's Dominions, or in the service of the Crown and has not maintained substantial connection with His Majesty's Dominions; or

(e) remains according to the law of a state at war with His Majesty a subject of that state; and that (in any case) the continuance of the certificate is not conducive to the public good.

(3) The Governor in Council may, if he thinks fit, before making an order under this section refer the case for such inquiry as is hereinafter specified, and in any case to which subsection (1) or paragraph (a), (c), or (e) of subsection (2) of this section applies, the Governor in Council shall, by notice given to or sent to the last-known address of the holder of the certificate, cause an opportunity to be given him of claiming that the case be referred for such inquiry, and if the holder so claims in accordance with the notice the Governor in Council shall refer the case for inquiry accordingly.

(4) An inquiry under this section shall be held by a committee constituted for the purpose by the Governor in Council and shall be conducted in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct:

Provided that any such inquiry may if the Governor in Council thinks fit, instead of being held as aforesaid be held by the Supreme Court, and the practice and procedure on any inquiry so held shall be regulated by rules of court.

A committee appointed under this section shall have all such powers, rights, and privileges as are vested in the Supreme Court or in any judge thereof on the occasion of any action, in respect of the following matters:—

(a) the enforcing the attendance of witnesses and examining them on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, and the issue of a commission or a request to examine witnesses abroad; and

(b) the compelling the production of documents; and

(c) the punishing persons guilty of contempt;

and a summons signed by one or more members of the committee may be substituted for and shall be equivalent to any formal process capable of being issued in any action for enforcing the attendance of witnesses and compelling the production of documents.

(5) Where a person to whom a certificate of naturalisation has been granted in this Colony is resident in the United Kingdom, the certificate may be revoked in accordance with this section by a Secretary of State, with the concurrence of the Governor in Council.

(6) Where the Governor in Council revokes a certificate of Naturalisation, the revocation shall have effect from such date as the Governor in Council may direct, and thereupon the certificate shall be given up and cancelled, and any person refusing or neglecting to give up his certificate shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds.

3. (1) Where a certificate of naturalisation is revoked the Governor in Council may by order direct that the wife and minor children (or any of them) of the person whose certificate is revoked shall cease to be British subjects, and any such person shall thereupon become an alien; but except where the Governor in Council directs as aforesaid, the nationality of the wife and minor children of the person whose certificate is revoked shall not be affected by the revocation and they shall remain British subjects:

Effect of revocation of certificate of naturalisation.

Provided that—

- (a) it shall be lawful for the wife of any such person within six months after the date of the order of revocation to make a declaration of alienage, and thereupon she and any minor children of her husband and herself shall cease to be British subjects and shall become aliens; and
- (b) The Governor in Council shall not make any such order as aforesaid in the case of a wife who was at birth a British subject, unless he is satisfied that if she had held a certificate of naturalisation in her own right the certificate could properly have been revoked under this Ordinance, and the provisions of this Ordinance as to referring cases for inquiry shall apply to the making of any such order as they apply to the revocation of a certificate.

(2) The provisions of this section shall, as respects persons affected thereby, have effect in substitution for any other provisions of this Ordinance as to the effect upon the wife and children of any person where the person ceases to be a British subject and such other provisions shall accordingly not apply in any such case.

(3) Where a certificate of naturalisation is revoked the former holder thereof shall be regarded as an alien and as a subject of the state to which he belonged at the time the certificate was granted.

Loss of British nationality by foreign naturalisation.

4. A British subject who, when in any foreign state and not under disability, by obtaining a certificate of naturalisation or by any other voluntary and formal act, becomes naturalised therein, shall thenceforth be deemed to have ceased to be a British subject.

Deportation Order.

5. (1) The Governor, with the previous approval of the Secretary of State, may if he deems it to be conducive to the public good make an order (hereinafter referred to as a deportation order) requiring an alien to leave and remain out of the Colony.

(2) An order made under this section may be made subject to any condition which the Governor may think proper.

(3) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made shall leave the Colony in accordance with the order and shall thereafter so long as the order is in force remain out of the Colony.

(4) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made may be detained in such manner as may be directed by the Governor and may be placed on a ship about to leave the Colony and shall be deemed to be in legal custody whilst so detained and until the ship finally leaves the Colony.

(5) The master of a ship about to call at any port outside the Colony shall, if so required by the Governor, receive any alien with respect to whom a deportation order has been made and his dependents, if any, on board the ship and afford him and them a passage to that port and proper accommodation and maintenance during the passage.

Offences and Penalties.

6. (1) If any person acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance or of the Aliens Ordinance, 1900, or of any order made thereunder he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against the Aliens Ordinance, 1900.

(2) If any person aids or abets any person in any contravention of this Ordinance or of the Aliens Ordinance, 1900, or knowingly harbours any person whom he knows or has reasonable

ground for believing to have acted in contravention of this Ordinance or of the Aliens Ordinance, 1900, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against the Aliens Ordinance, 1900.

(3) Where a person lands in the Colony in contravention of this Ordinance the master of the ship or the pilot or commander of the aircraft from which he lands shall unless he proves to the contrary be deemed to have aided and abetted the offence.

(4) A person who is guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against the Aliens Ordinance, 1900, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding six months, or on a second or subsequent conviction, twelve months, or in either case to both such fine and imprisonment.

An Ordinance

To amend the law relating to the Levying of Rates on house property in the town of Stanley.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1928."

Repeal of Ordinances
No. 4 of 1905. and
No. 3 of 1927.

2. The Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905, and the Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927, are hereby repealed.

Definitions.

3. In this Ordinance

"BOARD OF ASSESSORS" means five persons resident in the Colony of whom two shall in the normal course be the Colonial Treasurer and the Colonial Engineer to be appointed annually for the purposes of this Ordinance by the Governor in Council.

"HOUSE" means and includes every erection or structure of whatever nature capable of being utilised for habitation, shelter, trade, work, storage, or for housing horses, cattle, stock, poultry, or any live bird or animal.

Rates to be levied.

4. For all house property in the town of Stanley there shall be charged yearly in respect thereof for every twenty shillings of its annual value the sum of one shilling or such further sum not exceeding in the aggregate five shillings as may be sanctioned annually by the Legislative Council.

5. All rates shall be paid to the Colonial Treasurer before the 1st day of July in each year and should any rates be unpaid on the 1st day of July in any year the same shall be recoverable by civil process in the Magistrate's Court. The owners of house property shall be responsible for the due payment of the rates.

Rates how and by whom to be paid.

6. The value of house property for the purposes of this Ordinance shall be assessed annually by the Board of Assessors. Such assessment shall be completed and shall be made public in manner sufficient for the information of the owners of house property on or before the 15th day of January in each year and the owners of house property shall have the right to make an appeal to the Board of Assessors in respect of the whole or the part of the assessment not later than the 31st day of January in each year.

Rateable value how to be assessed.

7. The Board of Assessors after due consideration of any appeals which may be made in pursuance of the preceding section shall cause the assessment to be submitted for approval to the Governor in Council not earlier than the 1st day of February and not later than the 15th day of February in each year and the Board of Assessors shall simultaneously with the submission of the assessment to the Governor in Council make public in manner aforesaid any alterations which may have been made in the assessment as first made public.

Assessment to be approved by the Governor in Council.

8. The assessment shall be brought before the Governor in Council not earlier than the last day of February in each year and any owner of house property may make an appeal in writing to the Governor in Council in respect of the whole or the part of the assessment before that day. The Governor in Council is empowered to approve, disallow, or alter the assessment in the whole or in the part and any order whatever of the Governor in Council in respect of the whole or the part of the assessment shall be final.

Order of the Governor in Council to be final.

9. No rate whatever shall be levied upon any of the following descriptions of house property :

Exemptions.

House property belonging to the Government;

Any church or place of public worship; and

Any hospital, asylum or building used exclusively for charitable purposes or any public school, museum or mechanics' institute.

And the Governor in Council is empowered to make provision from time to time for the exemption from the payment of any rate whatever of any other description of house property which the Governor in Council may think proper so to be exempted.

10. The assessment made on the 4th day of January, 1928, under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1905 as amended by the Stanley Rating (Amendment) Ordinance, 1927 shall be null and void and no rate whatever shall be levied on any house property in virtue of such assessment.

Assessment made under Ordinance No. 4 of 1905 as amended by Ordinance No. 3. of 1927 in respect of the year 1928 to be null and void.

11. The Board of Assessors shall make a new assessment of the value of house property in respect of the year 1928. The procedure to be observed in the making of such assessment and in the payment of the rates due in virtue thereof shall be that prescribed in the preceding sections of this Ordinance except that in place of the dates the 15th day of January, the 31st day of January, the 1st day of February, the 15th day of February, the last day of February, and the 1st day of July in each year there shall be read respectively the 15th day of July, the 31st day of July, the 1st day of August, the 15th day of August, the 31st day of August, and the 31st day of October, 1928.

New assessment to be made in respect of the year 1928.

Governor in Council
may make regulations.

12. The Governor in Council may make regulations from time to time for the better prescription of the procedure to be followed in carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and generally for giving effect to the provisions of this Ordinance.

AND WHEREAS His Excellency ARNOLD WIENHOLT HODSON, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, has this day left the Colony for the United Kingdom on leave of absence;

AND WHEREAS there is no such officer as Lieutenant Governor in this Colony and no person has been appointed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet to administer the Government of this Colony in the absence of the Governor;

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Pensions Ordinance, 1927.

J. M. ELLIS,

Acting Governor.

In pursuance of the powers vested in him by section 6 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, the Governor is pleased, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and with the sanction of the Secretary of State, to make the following regulations :—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Pensions Short Title. (Amendment) Regulations, 1928."

2. Sub-section (ii) of section 5 of the Pensions Regulations, 1928, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following new sub-section (ii) :—

Repeal and replacement of sub-section (ii) of section 5 of the Pensions Regulations, 1928.

(ii) The option referred to in sub-section (i) shall be exercisable :—

- (a) In the case of an officer who, if he had been retired on grounds of ill-health at the date of the publication of these regulations in the Gazette, might have been granted a pension under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations, not later than the 31st of December, 1928.
- (b) In the case of any other officer, within one month after the earliest date on which, if retired on the grounds of ill-health, he might be granted a pension under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations or not later than the 31st of December, 1928, whichever shall be the later date for exercising the option.

Provided always—

- (1) That an officer who has previously had the opportunity of exercising the option but has not done so and who is still in the service of the Colony or in any other public service, may apply within one month of his subsequent marriage for permission

to exercise the option, which permission may be granted at the discretion of the Governor after examination of the officer by a Government Medical Board ;

- (2) That the date of the exercise of the option shall be deemed to be the date of the receipt of his written notification addressed either to the Colonial Secretary in the Colony or to the Crown Agents for the Colonies ; or in any case falling under the preceding proviso, the date on which the Governor grants permission to exercise the option ; and
- (3) That, if an officer has exercised the option, his decision shall be irrevocable so far as concerns any pension ultimately to be granted to him under the provisions of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, and of these regulations.

Amendment of section 14 of the Pensions Regulations, 1928.

3. Section 14 of the Pensions Regulations, 1928, is hereby amended by the substitution of the words "has been" for the words "shall hereafter be" in line 1 of the said section.

Repeal and replacement of sections 26 and 27 of the Pensions Regulations, 1928.

4. Sections 26 and 27 of the Pensions Regulations, 1928, are hereby repealed and replaced by the following :—

Pension where other service not within the group.

26. Where the other public service of an officer has not included service under any of the scheduled Governments, and he has held a pensionable office in the Colony for a period of at least twelve months, and his aggregate service would have rendered him eligible, had it been wholly in the Colony, for a pension under these Regulations, he may, on his ultimate retirement from the public service in circumstances in which he is permitted by the Law or Regulations of the service in which he is last employed to retire on pension or gratuity, be granted a pension from the funds of the Colony at the rate of one seven-hundred-and-twentieth of the amount of his pensionable emoluments at the date of his transfer or retirement from the service of the Colony for each calendar month of his pensionable service in the Colony.

Pension where other service both within and not within the group.

27. Where a part only of the other public service of an officer has been under one or more of the scheduled Governments, the provisions of section 25 shall apply ; but in calculating the amount of pension regard shall be had only to service in the group.

27. (a) Where the other public service of an officer has not been wholly under one or more of the scheduled Governments but has been in whole or in part under one or more of the following Governments, namely, the Government of

and the officer has held a pensionable office in the Colony for a period of at least twelve months and his aggregate service would have rendered him eligible, had it been wholly in the Colony, for a pension under these Regulations, he may, on his ultimate retirement from the public service in circumstances in which he is permitted by the Law or Regulations of the service in which he is last employed to retire on pension or gratuity, be granted, in lieu of the pension which might be granted to him under section 26 or 27 as the case may be, a pension from the funds of the Colony of an amount equal to the arithmetic mean between the pension which he would have been granted from the funds of the Colony if his service had been wholly under one or more of the scheduled Governments and the pension which he would receive from the funds of the Colony in the absence of this section.

Provided that the pension which may be granted under this section shall not exceed the pension which the officer would receive from the funds of the Colony in the absence of this section by more than one-third of the latter.

In pursuance of the powers vested in him by Section 2 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902, and otherwise. His Excellency the Governor is pleased to order, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Harbour (Amendment) Regulations, 1928, and shall be read and construed as one with the Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Harbour Ordinance 1902, on the 9th of September, 1921 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations), and the Harbour Regulations, 1922.

Prohibited area.

2. Notwithstanding any provisions in the principal Regulations contained no ship, vessel, boat, or hulk shall be moored or shall remain at anchor in that part of the Harbour bounded :

On the East by a line extending to the North to the middle of the Inner Harbour from the West side of Hebe Street.

On the West by a line extending to the North to the middle of the Inner Harbour from a point 100 yards distant to the West of the Town Jetty.

On the North by a line extending between the aforesaid limits along the middle of the Inner Harbour.

Light to be placed on
the hulk "Great Britain."

3. Notwithstanding any provisions in the principal Regulations contained a light or lights shall be maintained from sunset to sunrise on the hulk "Great Britain" by the owners thereof to the satisfaction of the Harbour Master for such period as the said hulk is moored or remains at anchor in the Inner Harbour.

2. No person shall smoke in the main hall or in the passages of the Town Hall, Stanley, or in any room in the Town Hall, Stanley, which may from time to time be declared by proper notices clearly displayed as prohibited for such purpose.

Smoking prohibited in the main hall and passages and in other rooms of the Town Hall, Stanley.

3. No person shall use or permit to be used streamers or other inflammable material at any dance or public assembly or entertainment held in the Town Hall, Stanley, or in any part thereof, except with the permission in writing of the Colonial Engineer, provided that this section shall not apply to the use of any streamers or other inflammable material on the stage of the main hall in the Town Hall, Stanley, for the sole purpose of a theatrical performance or representation.

Use of streamers and other inflammable material prohibited in the Town Hall, Stanley.

Report on Education in the Colony for the year, 1927.

—:0:—

General.

The educational facilities available in the Falkland Islands fall, in view of the peculiar local conditions, into three groups :—

1. Those at Stanley, the only township in the Colony.
2. Those at Darwin, the Falkland Islands Company's main camp settlement.
3. Those in the outside country districts with their very scattered farm settlements.

STANLEY : There are two schools in Stanley. A Government School is maintained from public funds, which, whilst being elementary in character, also makes provision for attendance at a Continuation Class for a two years' course of further education. Under a scheme instituted in 1924, the School further caters for children from the 'Camps' or country districts, whose parents are willing to send them to Stanley to be educated. These Camp children are either boarded and lodged in a Government Hostel, and taught in the School at an inclusive charge of 10/- a month during residence, or if boarded in private houses, the Government contributes two-thirds of the cost not exceeding £2 a month. There is also a Convent School managed by Roman Catholic Sisters ; this School, however, is not subject to Government control, and receives no subsidy.

DARWIN : Here for many years past, the Falkland Islands Company has maintained, in the interest of its employees a small school with a resident certificated master.

CAMP DISTRICTS : Two travelling teachers are provided by the Government — one for the East and one for the West Falkland — and a third — for the West Falkland — is being obtained. These teachers travel from settlement to settlement devoting a certain amount of time to each. The Falkland Islands Company, also, supports two Camp Teachers for the children of its employees in outlying districts.

During the period under review the Staff was short of its proper complement by the Assistant Master from March onwards.

3. The following table shows the number of children on the roll, examined, and in average attendance :—

4. The attendance at the School was exceptionally good throughout the year averaging the highest figure on record ; namely, 91.2 *per cent.* For the first year since 1922 it was not necessary to close the School on account of illness and the regular curriculum was carried out free of interruption.

5. The Colonial Surgeon accompanied by the Nurse-Matron of the Hospital visited the School as usual during the year and the Dental Surgeon also gave special attention to the

Children's teeth in the case of whom up to the age of fifteen years treatment is now provided without charge. It is gratifying to note that an improvement is already to be remarked both in the condition of the children's mouths and in their general state of health.

7. The Continuation Class was closed for three months in the earlier part of the year but was restarted in July and thenceforward remained in operation. On the 31st of December it was attended by six pupils, two boys and four girls.

8. The School Hostel for children from country districts was under the charge of Miss I. Begg, one of the Assistant Mistresses, and was admirably conducted. During the first half of the year eight boarders were in residence and this number had risen to eleven towards the end of the year as compared with seven only in 1926, an increase which may be in some degree accountable by a reduction of the inclusive fees charged from £10 to £5 *per annum*. No illness of a serious nature occurred and the tone of the children under Miss Begg's care was one of contented cheerfulness. It is hoped that still further advantage will be taken by parents of the facilities thus afforded. Monthly grants were made in addition in the case of eight children from the 'Camps' towards the cost of their maintenance in Stanley for the purpose of attending the School.

9. Bible reading of an entirely undenominational description was introduced for the first time into the curriculum of the School and appears generally to be appreciated.

10. In marked contrast to the preceding year the year under review has been most satisfactory and great credit is due to the Headmaster of the School, who serves also as Head of the Education Department, and to the staff for the successful endeavour exerted to make up the lee-way lost in the circumstances detailed in the Report for 1926. The improvement shewn has been achieved by steady effort and is all the more meritorious in the absence for the greater part of the period of the Assistant Master who resigned his appointment at short notice. Mr. Hoare is deserving furthermore of a meed of recognition for the excellent

atmosphere prevailing in the School. To the occasional visitor the tempered blend of discipline and happiness is at once apparent.

Travelling Teachers.

11. The Government Travelling Teachers, one on the East Falkland and one on the West Falkland, continued their useful work during the year. In view of the difficulty experienced and the reluctance hitherto exhibited by parents on the West Falkland to send their children into Stanley to be educated it was decided to obtain the services of a second Travelling Teacher for this area and the measures necessary to such end are actually in hand.

Saint Mary's Convent School.

In concluding this report I wish to pay a tribute to Mr. Alexander Moir, M.A., who has been obliged after many years of service to resign his appointment as Master at the Darwin School on the ground of failing health. Mr. Moir's influence will long continue to be felt in the Colony and the place he has left will be difficult adequately to fill.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To provide for the registration in the Colony of Trade Marks registered in the United Kingdom.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Registration of United Kingdom Trade Marks Ordinance, 1928.

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance -

The "COURT" means the Supreme Court of the Colony.

The "REGISTRAR" means the person from time to time performing the duties of Registrar-General.

The "REGISTER" means the register kept by the Registrar-General in pursuance of section 13 of this Ordinance.

Registration in Colony of trade-mark registered in United Kingdom.

3. Any person being the registered proprietor of a trade-mark registered in the United Kingdom under the Trade Marks Acts 1905 to 1919 or any Act amending or substituted for those Acts, or any person deriving his right from such registered proprietor by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law, may apply at any time during the existence of the registration in the United Kingdom to have such trade-mark registered in the Colony.

Application for registration how to be made.

4. An application for registration of a trade-mark under this Ordinance shall be made to the Registrar and accompanied by a certified representation of the trade-mark and a certificate of the Comptroller-General of the United Kingdom Patent Office giving full particulars of the registration of the trade-mark in the United Kingdom.

5. Upon such application being lodged, together with the documents mentioned in section 4 of this Ordinance, the Registrar shall issue a Certificate of Registration.

Issue of certificate of registration.

6. Such certificate of Registration shall confer on the applicant privileges and rights subject to all conditions established by the law of the Colony as though the Certificate of Registration in the United Kingdom had been issued with an extension to the Colony.

Privileges and rights conferred by certificate of registration.

7. Privileges and rights so granted shall date from the date of registration in the United Kingdom and shall continue in force only so long as the registration in the United Kingdom remains in force:

Privileges and rights continuance of.

Provided that no action for infringement of the trade-mark shall be entertained prior to the date of issue of the Certificate of Registration in the Colony.

8. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to affect rights of action against any person for passing off goods as those of another person or the remedies in respect thereof.

Rights of action against person passing off goods as those of another person not affected.

9. The Court shall have power upon the application of any person who alleges that his interests have been prejudicially affected by the issue of a Certificate of Registration to declare that the exclusive privileges and rights conferred by such Certificate have not been acquired upon any of the grounds upon which the United Kingdom registration might be cancelled under the law for the time being in force in the United Kingdom.

Court may declare privileges and rights not to have been acquired.

10. A trade-mark when registered under this Ordinance shall be assigned and transmitted only in connexion with the goodwill of the business concerned in the goods for which it has been registered and shall be determinable with that goodwill.

Assignment or transmission of registered trade-mark.

11. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, where a person becomes entitled by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law to the privileges and rights conferred by a Certificate of Registration issued under this Ordinance, the Registrar shall, on application being made in the prescribed manner, and on proof of title to his satisfaction, cause the name and address of such person to be entered on the Register as proprietor of the trade-mark.

Entry in register of assignment or transmission of registered trade-mark.

12. The Registrar may make such general rules and do such things as he may think expedient, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, for regulating procedure under this Ordinance and prescribing the fees to be paid in respect of proceedings under this Ordinance.

Registrar may make rules regulating procedure, and prescribing fees.

13. The Registrar shall keep a Register of all applications lodged and Certificates of Registration issued under this Ordinance and of all additions or alterations thereto and such Register shall be open at any reasonable time for public inspection in the Office of the Registrar.

Register how to be kept.

14. All renewals of the registration in the United Kingdom of a trade-mark registered under this Ordinance shall be notified to the Registrar, who shall, on sufficient evidence thereof and on payment of the prescribed fee, enter the same in the Register in the prescribed manner.

Notification of registration in United Kingdom to be made to the Registrar.

15. The Registrar may, on request in writing made by the registered proprietor and on payment of the prescribed fee,

Cancellation, correction, or alteration of registration.

- (1) cancel the registration of a trade-mark either wholly or in respect of any particular goods in connection with which the trade-mark is registered;



FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To provide for the protection in the Colony of Designs registered in the United Kingdom.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the United Kingdom Designs (Protection) Ordinance, 1928. Short Title.

2. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance the registered proprietor of any design registered in the United Kingdom under the Patents and Designs Acts 1907 and 1919 or any Act amending or substituted for those Acts shall enjoy in the Colony the like privileges and rights as though the Certificate of Registration in the United Kingdom had been issued with an extension to the Colony. Extension to Colony of Registration in United Kingdom.

3. The registered proprietor of a design shall not be entitled to recover any damages in respect of any infringement of copyright in a design from any defendant who proves that at the date of the infringement he was not aware nor had any reasonable means of making himself aware of the existence of the registration of the design : Damages not recoverable from innocent infringer.

Provided that nothing in this section shall affect any proceedings for an injunction.

4. The Supreme Court shall have power upon the application of any person who alleges that his interests have been prejudicially affected to declare that exclusive privileges and rights in a design have not been acquired in the Colony under the provisions of this Ordinance upon any of the grounds upon which the United Kingdom registration might be cancelled under the law for the time being in force in the United Kingdom. Supreme Court may declare registration not to be valid in Colony.

Date of Operation.

5. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be declared by notification in the Gazette.

Application to Dependencies.

6. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Repeal of Ordinance No. 2 of 1926.

7. The Registration of United Kingdom Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Ordinance, 1926, is hereby repealed.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, and otherwise, I, JOHN MEDLICOTT ELLIS, Acting Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, do hereby proclaim and notify that, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, I have made this day the Regulations below set out for prescribing the conditions under which Dogs shall be hereafter imported into the Colony.

Regulations.

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Dogs (Importation) Regulations, 1928.

Three weeks' notice to be given of intended importation.

2. Any person intending to import a dog into the Colony from any country abroad shall give at the least three weeks' notice in writing of such intended importation to the Chief Inspector of Stock or to the Colonial Secretary stating the description, the origin, and the destination of the dog intended to be imported and the proposed mode, place, and date of arrival in the Colony.

No dog to be landed unless consigned from port of embarkation to some person in the Colony.

3. No dog shall be permitted to be landed in the Colony from any country abroad unless such dog shall have been consigned from the port of embarkation to some person in the Colony.

No dog to be imported except after quarantine for six weeks.

4. No dog shall be imported into the Colony from any country abroad except that such dog shall first have been kept for the period of six weeks at the least or for any longer period which the Chief Inspector of Stock may consider necessary in isolation in the Colony either at the Quarantine Station in Stanley or at any other place which the Chief Inspector of Stock may consider suitable:

Provided that where any person intending to import a dog into the Colony from any country abroad shall have omitted to give the three weeks' notice of such intended importation prescribed by section 2 of these Regulations and where permission shall have been granted nevertheless to import a dog, subject to the satisfaction of the other requirements of these Regulations, the period of isolation as aforesaid shall be at the least two months.

Powers of Chief Inspector of Stock.

5. The Chief Inspector of Stock shall have power :

- (i) to prohibit the landing of any dog which, in his opinion, would be a source or possible source of danger to other dogs or animals in the Colony :

- (ii) to order any such dog to be destroyed either before or after being landed provided that the order shall be sanctioned in every case by the Colonial Secretary prior to being carried into effect :
- (iii) to prohibit the landing of fittings, kennels, utensils, bedding, straw, materials or other articles which have been used or about any dog :
- (iv) to prohibit the landing of any article which, in his opinion, may carry canine disease and to order its destruction.

6. All expenses incurred in the destruction, prohibition from landing or keeping in isolation or in attendance on or feeding of any dog or in the destruction or prohibition from landing of any fittings, kennels, bedding, straw, materials, or other articles under these Regulations, shall be payable by the importer or intending importer and the Government shall not be liable to pay to any importer or intending importer any sum by way of compensation for any loss sustained thereby.

Expenses payable by importer.

7. Any person who shall land or import or shall attempt to land or to import any dog contrary to the provisions of these Regulations shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds for each offence.

Offences and penalties.

8. The Live Stock Regulations (Consolidation) 1923 are hereby amended by the deletion from Schedule A thereto of the word "Dogs".

9. The Live Stock (Amendment) Regulations, 1928, are hereby repealed.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, relating to the slaughtering and inspection of stock intended for human consumption, under sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

1. In these Regulations

"Slaughterhouse" shall mean any licensed slaughterhouse or slaughtering-place including buildings and appurtenances used for the purpose of slaughtering stock.

"Stock" means cattle, sheep, or swine.

"Carcass of stock" includes the whole or any part of slaughtered stock.

"Meat" means the flesh or viscera of any slaughtered stock.

"Disease" means any disease or any defect or inferiority in the condition of any stock or meat which in the opinion of an Inspector renders it unfit for human consumption.

"Inspector" means any duly qualified person appointed by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, with the sanction of the Governor, to carry out the provisions of these Regulations.

"Farmer" means the owner of any stock outside the Town of Stanley and also includes the manager, overseer, or person in charge of stock outside the Town of Stanley.

"Implements" means any instruments used in or about a slaughterhouse for the purpose of slaughtering or dealing with slaughtered stock or carcasses.

2. Under these Regulations all slaughterhouses wherein stock are slaughtered or dressed for human consumption in the Town of Stanley shall be licensed.

3. An application for a license in respect of a slaughterhouse shall be made in the form of the Schedule hereto.

4. For every slaughterhouse for which a license has been granted there shall be payable to the Colonial Treasurer on or before the first day of January in each year the sum of One Pound.

5. Under these Regulations it shall be lawful for any farmer to slaughter stock for human consumption outside the Town of Stanley providing such stock is free from disease.

6. It shall not be lawful knowingly to slaughter and allow to be used for human consumption, or to sell or offer for sale for human consumption any stock affected with any disease which in the opinion of an Inspector renders the carcass or meat unfit for human consumption.

7. No calf weighing less than sixty pounds dressed weight (including the skin) shall be slaughtered and sold for human consumption.
8. It shall not be lawful for any person to slaughter in Stanley any stock for sale for human consumption excepting in a licensed slaughterhouse, or unless permission is given in writing by an Inspector for such stock to be slaughtered on other premises.
9. An Inspector may at any time enter and inspect any slaughterhouse for the purpose of:-
 - (1) Preventing cruelty to any stock whether such cruelty is caused by overcrowding, insufficient shelter, insanitary conditions, want of food or drink or otherwise howsoever;
 - (2) Inspecting any stock intended for slaughter or any meat or carcass of stock;
 - (3) Inspecting any implement or implements used in any slaughterhouse; or
 - (4) Examining any books relating to stock either slaughtered or intended for slaughter.
10. It shall not be lawful to remove, allow to be removed, or assist in removing from any slaughterhouse without the permission of an Inspector, any meat or the whole or any part of any carcass of stock which has been declared by an Inspector as unfit for human consumption.
11. An Inspector may order the destruction by fire or in any other efficient manner any meat or the whole or any part of any carcass of stock which is in the opinion of such Inspector unfit for human consumption.
12. A correct record of all diseased meat or carcasses of stock condemned as unfit for human consumption shall be kept by the Inspector by whom such diseased meat or carcasses of stock have been condemned.
13. In every slaughtering place the killing, dressing, and hanging places shall be floored with concrete or other material approved by an Inspector and thoroughly ventilated.
14. The floor and lower portions of the walls, partitions, and posts of the killing and dressing places shall be thoroughly cleaned after slaughtering for the day is finished.
15. Every part of the interior of the killing, dressing, or hanging places shall be lime-washed at intervals of not less than four months.
16. Where any part is constructed of such materials as would in the opinion of an Inspector render lime-washing unnecessary he may by writing under his hand waive the fulfilment of the requirements of this clause as to such part.
17. All implements used in or about a slaughterhouse including any carts, baskets, or other equipment used for the transportation of meat shall be kept thoroughly clean.
18. The road leading to the slaughterhouse shall be paved, metalled, or boarded to the satisfaction of an Inspector.
19. No hide, skins, fat or other portion of any carcass likely to become a nuisance shall be stored in any killing, dressing, or hanging place.
20. Proper and sufficient urinal and closet accommodation shall be provided to the satisfaction of the Inspector, such accommodation to be contained in a separate structure apart from the main building.
21. Any person who commits or who is concerned in committing any breach of these regulations shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding two pounds for each offence and in the case of a continuing offence to a further fine not exceeding five shillings for each day after written notice of the said offence from an Inspector.

22. These Regulations may be cited as the "Board of Health for the East Falkland Island (Slaughterhouse and Inspection of Stock) Regulations 1928".

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The Governor may, by proclamation, from time to time prohibit except on such terms and subject to such conditions as may be therein prescribed the exportation to any country or place therein named of gold coin or bullion.

Power to prohibit exportation of gold to any country.

2. Proceedings against any person who may be charged with any breach of the provisions of a proclamation made by the Governor under the preceding section of this Ordinance shall be taken and heard before a Magistrate.

Proceedings how to be taken.

3. Any person who may be charged with and convicted of any breach of the provisions of a proclamation made as aforesaid shall be liable to forfeit the amount of the gold coin or bullion in respect of which proceedings have been taken and heard before a Magistrate and in addition to pay a fine not exceeding £500.

Penalty.

4. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Customs (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928" and shall be read and construed as one with the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

In pursuance of the powers vested in him by section 6 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1927, the Governor is pleased with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and with the sanction of the Secretary of State, to make the following regulations :—

Short Title.

1. These regulations may be cited as the "Pensions (Amendment No. 2) Regulations, 1928" and shall be read and construed as one with the "Pensions Regulations, 1928", and the "Pensions (Amendment) Regulations, 1928."

Amendment of section 27A of the Pensions Regulations, 1928.

2. Section 27A of the Pensions Regulations, 1928, as amended by the Pensions (Amendment) Regulations, 1928, is hereby amended by the addition of the words "in the Colonial "Audit Department (Home Establishment), or in the Office of the "Crown Agents for the Colonies, or in the administration of the "Kenya and Uganda Railway, or" between the words "but has been in whole or in part" and the words "under one or more of the following Governments".

Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations.

(For Officers on the Permanent Establishment).

J. M. ELLIS,
Acting Governor.

LEAVE.

1. No officer shall be allowed to take full pay vacation leave before he has completed two consecutive years of resident service, except on the grounds of urgent private affairs or serious indisposition. Subject to this condition and to the necessities of the Service, officers on the Permanent Establishment may be granted four months' full pay vacation leave for each period of two and a half years' resident service. Such leave may not be accumulated and will in the ordinary course be granted at the end of each period of two and a half years' resident service. It may, at the discretion of the Governor, be granted after two years' resident service but in that case the officer concerned will not become entitled to a further period of vacation leave until he has completed a further period of three years' resident service.

2. In the case of officers who have completed two or more years' consecutive resident service spending their leave in some place other than the Colony or South America, the time necessarily taken on the journey to and from such place (not exceeding four weeks) shall not be reckoned as leave.

Provided that the time necessarily taken on a journey to or from the United Kingdom including any break of journey in South America or any other place shall be deemed to be four weeks.

3. Short periods of absence from duty owing to sickness or for purposes of relaxation will be allowed on full pay, in accordance with any special rules on the subject, without affecting full pay vacation leave.

4. An officer will be required to embark for the Falkland Islands by the first steamer leaving the place where he is spending his leave after the date on which his leave of absence expires, and will be allowed pay at the rate which he is then drawing for any days which may elapse between the expiration of his leave and the departure of the steamer, provided that if there is a later steamer which is timed to arrive at his destination before the first one, he will be required to proceed by the later one. Extension of leave will date from the expiration of the original leave, and not from the day on which the officer would have had to embark if his leave had not been extended.

5. Any circumstances not covered by these regulations will be governed by the Colonial Regulations.

PASSAGE.

6. Free passages to the United Kingdom for himself and for his wife and children up to a maximum of three full return passages will be allowed to an officer who has been granted leave under the above regulations and whose initial rate of salary is not less than £200 a year. Officers whose initial salary is less than £200 a year will be eligible to receive half the cost of such return passages, or, if they prefer it, to receive free passages on their return journey. Alternatively officers whose initial salary is less than £200 a year, if appointed from the United Kingdom, will be allowed by accumulation return passages after five years' resident service.

7. An officer spending his leave outside the Colony, but not in the United Kingdom, will be given free passages from and to the Colony for himself, his wife and his children, up to a maximum of three full return passages, and provided that the cost shall not exceed the amount that would have been payable under these regulations if the officer and his wife had proceeded to the United Kingdom.

8. The cost of passages for the members of an officer's family granted in accordance with the provisions of the preceding sections shall be payable only if they travel with him or shortly in advance of him, unless the Secretary of State or the Governor sees fit to make an exception to this rule for special reasons of health or otherwise.

9. In the case of officers with an initial rate of salary of not less than £300 the class of passage shall be first class and of other officers second class.

10. These regulations take effect on and from the 1st of May, 1928.

Special rate of duty
on export of whale

1. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained
in the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export
Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923 and 1924, the duty of Cus-
toms to be raised, levied, collected, and paid upon whale oil which
shall have been raised in the Colony or in the Dependencies thereof
and shall be shipped for places beyond the limits of the Colony or of
the Dependencies thereof during the 1928-1929 whaling season
shall be fixed at the rate of 2/- for each barrel of forty gallons.

Short Title.

2. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Tariff (Export
Duties) Amendment Ordinance, 1928", and shall be read and con-
strued as one with the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the
Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923 and 1924.

An Ordinance

To amend the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. The Governor may, by proclamation, from time to time prohibit except on such terms and subject to such conditions as may be therein prescribed the exportation to any country or place therein named of gold coin or bullion.

Power to prohibit exportation of gold to any country.

2. Proceedings against any person who may be charged with any breach of the provisions of a proclamation made by the Governor under the preceding section of this Ordinance shall be taken and heard before a Magistrate.

Proceedings how to be taken.

3. Any person who may be charged with and convicted of any breach of the provisions of a proclamation made as aforesaid shall be liable to forfeit the amount of the gold coin or bullion in respect of which proceedings have been taken and heard before a Magistrate and in addition to pay a fine not exceeding £500.

Penalty.

4. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Customs (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928" and shall be read and construed as one with the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

An Ordinance

To provide for the protection in the Colony of Designs registered in the United Kingdom.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the United Kingdom Designs (Protection) Ordinance, 1928.

Extension to Colony of Registration in United Kingdom.

2. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance the registered proprietor of any design registered in the United Kingdom under the Patents and Designs Acts 1907 and 1919 or any Act amending or substituted for those Acts shall enjoy in the Colony the like privileges and rights as though the Certificate of Registration in the United Kingdom had been issued with an extension to the Colony.

Damages not recoverable from innocent infringer.

3. The registered proprietor of a design shall not be entitled to recover any damages in respect of any infringement of copyright in a design from any defendant who proves that at the date of the infringement he was not aware nor had any reasonable means of making himself aware of the existence of the registration of the design :

Provided that nothing in this section shall affect any proceedings for an injunction.

Supreme Court may declare registration not to be valid in Colony.

4. The Supreme Court shall have power upon the application of any person who alleges that his interests have been prejudicially affected to declare that exclusive privileges and rights in a design have not been acquired in the Colony under the provisions of this Ordinance upon any of the grounds upon which the United Kingdom registration might be cancelled under the law for the time being in force in the United Kingdom.

5. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be declared by notification in the Gazette. Date of Operation.

6. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony. Application to Dependencies.

7. The Registration of United Kingdom Patents, Designs and Trade Marks Ordinance, 1926, is hereby repealed. Repeal of Ordinance No. 2 of 1926.

An Ordinance

To provide for the registration in the Colony of Trade Marks registered in the United Kingdom.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows :-

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Registration of United Kingdom Trade Marks Ordinance, 1928.

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance -

The "COURT" means the Supreme Court of the Colony.

The "REGISTRAR" means the person from time to time performing the duties of Registrar-General.

The "REGISTER" means the register kept by the Registrar-General in pursuance of section 13 of this Ordinance.

Registration in Colony of trade-mark registered in United Kingdom.

3. Any person being the registered proprietor of a trade-mark registered in the United Kingdom under the Trade Marks Acts 1905 to 1919 or any Act amending or substituted for those Acts, or any person deriving his right from such registered proprietor by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law, may apply at any time during the existence of the registration in the United Kingdom to have such trade-mark registered in the Colony.

Application for registration how to be made.

4. An application for registration of a trade-mark under this Ordinance shall be made to the Registrar and accompanied by a certified representation of the trade-mark and a certificate of the Comptroller-General of the United Kingdom Patent Office giving full particulars of the registration of the trade-mark in the United Kingdom.

5. Upon such application being lodged, together with the documents mentioned in section 4 of this Ordinance, the Registrar shall issue a Certificate of Registration.

Issue of certificate of registration.

6. Such certificate of Registration shall confer on the applicant privileges and rights subject to all conditions established by the law of the Colony as though the Certificate of Registration in the United Kingdom had been issued with an extension to the Colony.

Privileges and rights conferred by certificate of registration.

7. Privileges and rights so granted shall date from the date of registration in the United Kingdom and shall continue in force only so long as the registration in the United Kingdom remains in force:

Privileges and rights continuance of.

Provided that no action for infringement of the trade-mark shall be entertained prior to the date of issue of the Certificate of Registration in the Colony.

8. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to affect rights of action against any person for passing off goods as those of another person or the remedies in respect thereof.

Rights of action against person passing off goods as those of another person not affected.

9. The Court shall have power upon the application of any person who alleges that his interests have been prejudicially affected by the issue of a Certificate of Registration to declare that the exclusive privileges and rights conferred by such Certificate have not been acquired upon any of the grounds upon which the United Kingdom registration might be cancelled under the law for the time being in force in the United Kingdom.

Court may declare privileges and rights not to have been acquired.

10. A trade-mark when registered under this Ordinance shall be assigned and transmitted only in connexion with the goodwill of the business concerned in the goods for which it has been registered and shall be determinable with that goodwill.

Assignment or transmission of registered trade-mark.

11. Subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, where a person becomes entitled by assignment, transmission, or other operation of law to the privileges and rights conferred by a Certificate of Registration issued under this Ordinance, the Registrar shall, on application being made in the prescribed manner, and on proof of title to his satisfaction, cause the name and address of such person to be entered on the Register as proprietor of the trade-mark.

Entry in register of assignment or transmission of registered trade-mark.

12. The Registrar may make such general rules and do such things as he may think expedient, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, for regulating procedure under this Ordinance and prescribing the fees to be paid in respect of proceedings under this Ordinance.

Registrar may make rules regulating procedure, and prescribing fees.

13. The Registrar shall keep a Register of all applications lodged and Certificates of Registration issued under this Ordinance and of all additions or alterations thereto and such Register shall be open at any reasonable time for public inspection in the Office of the Registrar.

Register how to be kept.

14. All renewals of the registration in the United Kingdom of a trade-mark registered under this Ordinance shall be notified to the Registrar, who shall, on sufficient evidence thereof and on payment of the prescribed fee, enter the same in the Register in the prescribed manner.

Notification of registration in United Kingdom to be made to the Registrar.

15. The Registrar may, on request in writing made by the registered proprietor and on payment of the prescribed fee,

Cancellation, correction, or alteration of registration.

- (1) cancel the registration of a trade-mark either wholly or in respect of any particular goods in connection with which the trade-mark is registered;

- (2) correct any clerical error in or in connection with any application under this Ordinance or in any matter which is entered in the Register; and
- (3) enter in the Register any change in the name or address of the person who is registered as proprietor of a trade-mark.

Application to
Dependencies.

16. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Date of Operation.

17. This Ordinance shall come into operation on a date to be declared by notification in the Gazette.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of meeting held on the 22nd May, 1928.

1. The minutes of the meeting held on the 16th of November, 1927, were confirmed.
2. The Honourable Dr. J. Hope Reford, after taking the prescribed oath, assumed his seat at the Council.
3. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :
 - (1) Copies of all Regulations, Orders and Bye-laws, made or approved by the Governor in Executive Council since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
 - (2) Copies of despatches received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating the non-disallowance by His Majesty of Ordinances, Nos. 5, 7, and 8 of 1927, and No. 2 of 1928.
4. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers :
 - (1) Comparative Statements of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Colony and the Dependencies for the period 1st January to 30th September, 1927, and 1st January to 31st December, 1927.
 - (2) Schedule of all charges of an unusual or special description or not covered by the Appropriation law for the year 1927, incurred during the quarters ended the 30th September, 1927, and the 31st December, 1927.
 - (3) Monthly Abstracts of Cash Receipts and Payments of the 'Discovery' Committee for the January to May, 1927.
 - (4) Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements for the year ended the 31st of December, 1927.

5. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of the following Resolution :

"Whereas further provision is required for the service of the Colony and its Dependencies for the year ending the 31st of December, 1927.

Be it resolved -

This Council hereby sanctions the expenditure from public funds of the sum of Forty-one thousand Four hundred and Forty-nine Pounds Twelve Shillings and Seven Pence (£41,449 : 12 : 7.) to meet the several charges itemized in the accompanying schedule."

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

6. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of the following Resolution :

"Whereas further provision is required for the service of the Colony and its Dependencies for the year ending the 31st of December, 1928.

Be it resolved -

This Council hereby sanctions the expenditure from public funds of the sum of Eight thousand and Eighty-five Pounds Six Shillings and One Penny (£8,085 : 6 : 1) to meet the several charges itemized in the accompanying schedule."

In moving the adoption of the Resolution the Honourable J. M. Ellis stated that he regretted that the necessity had arisen so early in the year to ask the Honourable Members

to vote Supplementary Expenditure. The Honourable Members would see however that the main portion of the sum required appeared under HEAD VII, PORT & MARINE, of the schedule, in connection with the refit of H.M.C.S. "Afterglow" the payment for which service was really a "carry-over" from the year 1927.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded the adoption of the Resolution.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

7. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in introducing the Bill entitled, "A Bill to amend the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, 1898", said that as the Honourable Members were aware the majority of the buildings in the town of Stanley were wooden and the object of the Bill was to ensure that adequate measures are taken to guard against the outbreak of fire in buildings commonly used by the public. The Government had already taken such steps with regard to the Town Hall and other Government Buildings but statutory power was required so as to enable the rules made to be enforced if necessary by prosecution in the Courts.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary then moved that the Bill be read a *first* time.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

The first reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1, 2, and 3 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the *first* reading of the Bill entitled, "A Bill to Provide for an Addition to the Pension granted on retirement to Reginald Bruce Baseley". In doing so he explained that the Bill was intended to give legislative sanction on a permanent basis to the addition of five-sixtieths to the pension granted to Mr. Baseley under Ordinance No. 8 of 1927.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer the Bill was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1, 2 and 3 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in introducing the Bill entitled, "A Bill to amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923, 1924, and 1927" stated that the object of the measure was to provide for a special refund of duty during the 1926-27 and 1927-28 seasons at the rate of 2/6 a barrel when the market price of whale and seal oil fell below £30 per ton. The Bill was brought before the Council at the direction of the Secretary of State and he desired therefore to move the *first* reading.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The first reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

Clause 3 was agreed to with the following amendment :

Instead of the words and figures –

“during the 1926–1927 season”

the words and figures –

“during the 1926–1927 and 1927–1928 seasons.”

Clause 4 was agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the *first* reading of the Bill “To amend the Alien Ordinance, 1900.” In doing so he said that the Bill was being introduced in accordance with instructions received from the Secretary of State and that it provided for the revocation of certificates of naturalization in accordance with Imperial practice.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 4 were agreed to.

The following new clause was proposed and read a *first* time :

“5. (1) The Governor, with the previous approval of the Secretary of State, may if he deems it to be conducive to the public good make an order (hereinafter referred to as a deportation order) requiring an alien to leave and remain out of the Colony.

(2) An order made under this section may be made subject to any condition which the Governor may think proper.

(3) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made shall leave the Colony in accordance with the order and shall thereafter so long as the order is in force remain out of the Colony.

(4) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made may be detained in such manner as may be directed by the Governor and may be placed on a ship about to leave the Colony and shall be deemed to be in legal custody whilst so detained and until the ship finally leaves the Colony.

(5) The master of a ship about to call at any port outside the Colony shall, if so required by the Governor, receive any alien with respect to whom a deportation order has been made and his dependents, if any, on board the ship and afford him and them a passage to that port and proper accommodation and maintenance during the passage.

On question put the clause was read a *second* time and added to the Bill as clause 5.

The following new clause was proposed and read a *first* time :

“6. (1) If any person acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance or of the Alien Ordinance 1900, or of any order made thereunder he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against the Alien Ordinance 1900.

(2) If any person aids or abets any person in any contravention of this Ordinance or of the Alien Ordinance 1900, or knowingly harbours any person whom he knows or has reasonable grounds for believing to have acted in contravention of this Ordinance or of the Alien Ordinance 1900, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against the Alien Ordinance 1900.

(3) Where a person lands in the Colony in contravention of this Ordinance the master of the ship or the pilot or commander of the aircraft from which he lands shall unless he proves to the contrary be deemed to have aided and abetted the offence.

(4) A person who is guilty of an offence against this Ordinance or against the Alien Ordinance, 1900, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding six months, or on a second or subsequent conviction, twelve months, or in either case to both such fine and imprisonment.

On question put the clause was read a *second* time and added to the Bill as clause 6.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

11. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in introducing the Bill entitled "A Bill to amend the law relating to the Levying of Rates on house property in the town of Stanley", explained that the object of the measure was to remedy an injustice regarding the present assessment of house property in the town of Stanley. It was proposed to declare null and void the assessment made in 1928 and to have a fresh assessment made on a new system both for the current year and in future years by a Board of Assessors consisting of 5 persons to be appointed annually two of whom normally would be the Treasurer and the Colonial Engineer.

The Honourable J. M. Ellis then moved that the Bill be read a *first* time.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The first reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 12 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

12. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer, the Bill "To legalize certain payments made in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven in excess of the expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 3 of 1926" was read a *first* time.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

On motion made, the consideration of Clause 2 was postponed until after consideration of the Schedule.

The Schedule was agreed to.

Clause 2 was recommitted and agreed to.

The preamble and title were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

The Council accorded a vote of thanks to the Honourable the Treasurer for the most satisfactory manner in which he had prepared the financial statements.

LOANS TO ASSIST THE BUILDING OF HOUSES IN STANLEY BY PRIVATE ENTERPRISE.

The Governor with the sanction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies is pleased to cause it to be notified that application for loans to provide assistance for the building of houses in Stanley by private enterprise will be considered by His Excellency in Executive Council on the following general terms and conditions:—

1. The total amount available for loans for building houses in Stanley will not exceed at any one time £10,000. The amount of any one loan will in no case be more than £1000 or less than £100.

2. Application should be made in writing to the Colonial Secretary for consideration by the Governor in Executive Council. The Governor in Executive Council is not bound to grant any application and may refuse any application after consideration without cause assigned.

3. The application should give the full name, address, trade or calling, and particulars of the applicant. It should state the purpose for which it is proposed to build the projected house and should be accompanied by detailed plans and specifications of the projected house and of the intended site.

4. A valuation of the projected house and of the intended site will be made by the

Treasurer and Colonial Engineer and the sum to be advanced will not exceed 80% of the value thus ascertained.

5. Payment of the loan will be made by instalments as the work of building progresses so that for no time will the borrower be indebted for a sum greater than that represented by the value of the site and of the work already performed.

6. Security for the loan will be taken in the form of a mortgage on the property.

7. Interest on the loan will be charged at the rate of $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ *per annum* and the capital interest will be repayable over a period not exceeding twenty years.

8. The borrower may pay off at any time during the continuance of the mortgage the remaining instalments of the capital of the loan and proportionate interest due and the house will then become his absolute property for disposal as he pleases.

9. The borrower may transfer at any time during the continuance of the mortgage the payment of the remaining instalments of the capital and interest of the loan to any proper person of whom the Governor in Executive Council may first approve.

The general permission granted by Government Notice No. 37 of the 30th of January, 1928, to the owners of dogs in Stanley under Section 3 of the aforesaid order to exercise their dogs provided that the dogs are kept under proper control and are not taken or allowed to wander beyond the limits of Stanley is hereby cancelled and withdrawn.

The attention of the owners of dogs in Stanley is called in particular to the provisions of the following sections of the aforesaid Order.

1. No dog shall be taken or caused or allowed to be taken from any place or station to any place or station within the Colony except on the authority of the Colonial Secretary under his hand or of the Chief Inspector of Stock under his hand acting for and on behalf of the Colonial Secretary.

3. Every owner of a dog in the town of Stanley shall keep his or her dog securely tied or shut up at his or her place of residence or other suitable place and shall on no account allow his or her dog to be in a public place or at large within or around the limits of the town of Stanley whether or not the dog is on a lead or otherwise under control

and whether or not the dog is infected with distemper except on the authority of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid or of the Chief Inspector of Stock acting for and on behalf of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid.

4. No dog shall be taken or caused or allowed to be taken on board of any vessel engaged on service or in trade between the several ports of the Colony except on the authority of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid or of the Chief Inspector of Stock acting for and on behalf of the Colonial Secretary as aforesaid.

6. In accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of the Dogs Ordinance, 1892, the penalty for contravening any of the provisions of the preceding sections of this Order shall be a fine not exceeding the sum of FIVE POUNDS for each offence.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

—:O:—

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under Section 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894, and approved by the Governor in Council.

Short Title.

1. These bye-laws may be cited as "The Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Inspection of Buildings Bye-laws, 1928".

Appointment of sub-committee, and duties of same.

2. A sub-committee of the Board of Health may be appointed by the Board, subject to the approval of the Governor, for the following purposes with a view to the care and preservation of the public health :—

- (a) Consideration of plans and applications for new buildings.
- (b) Supervision of such buildings during the course of construction.
- (c) Inspection of completed buildings prior to occupation.
- (d) Inspection of houses and premises with a view to making recommendations as to their structural and sanitary condition.
- (e) Such other duties of a similar description as the Board of Health may think fit and proper for the care and preservation of the public health.

**Constitution.
Power of Entry.**

3. This sub-committee shall normally consist of the President of the Board of Health, the Colonial Engineer, and one other member, and the sub-committee shall be empowered to enter buildings or premises for the purposes specified at reasonable times between the hours of sunrise and sunset, due notice being given beforehand to the occupier.

Penalty for obstruction.

4. Any person wilfully obstructing the sub-committee in their discharge of these duties shall be guilty of an offence against these bye-laws, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings as provided in the Ordinance.

THE VACCINATION ORDINANCE, 1868.

The Governor directs it to be notified, for general information, that it having been brought to His Excellency's cognisance that a grave danger

to the public health exists from Small Pox which is prevalent in the neighbouring countries of South America and is liable to be introduced at any time through the medium of shipping calling at the Colony by reason of the fact that a large proportion of the population, both adult and juvenile, is unprotected by vaccination, His Excellency has considered it imperative in the interest of the public health effectively to put into operation the provisions of the Vaccination Ordinance, 1868, under which all children under the age of fourteen years and all children hereafter born are required to be successfully vaccinated.

The necessary steps are being taken therefore for the appointment of Public Vaccinators under the aforesaid Ordinance and generally for the enforcement of its provisions.

The matter has been discussed at a meeting of the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island and the unanimous decision was made by the Board that due measures should be undertaken for the proper protection of the community against this serious menace. The high value of vaccination as a prevention against Small Pox has long been accepted by the highest authorities. As a recent striking proof of its efficiency it is pointed out in the last Annual Medical Report for England that during 1927, 10,381 cases of Small Pox occurred in England among unvaccinated persons while there were only 41 cases among re-vaccinated persons.

The co-operation of the public and in particular of parents with the Medical Authorities in dealing with this problem is earnestly sought and confidently expected in order to safeguard the general welfare of the inhabitants of the Colony as a whole.

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Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, under sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894, and approved by the Governor in Council.

| Short Title. | 1. These Bye-laws may be cited as the "Stanley Milk Supply Protection Bye-laws, 1928." |
| Definition. | 2. In these Bye-laws the term "Milk or cream" shall mean cow's milk or cream and shall not include tinned or condensed milk or cream. |
| No person to sell milk or cream without registration by and a licence from the Board of Health. | 3. No person shall sell or expose for sale milk or cream or keep cows for the purpose of selling milk or cream in Stanley without being duly registered in the register kept by the Board of Health and without first having obtained a licence from the Board of Health to sell milk or cream. |
| Application for registration and licence. | 4. Any person desirous of selling milk or cream in Stanley shall apply in writing to the Clerk to the Board of Health who will submit the application to the Board of Health and if approved, will insert without charge the applicant's name and such particulars as may be necessary in the register. The Board of Health may grant a licence to sell milk or cream in Stanley upon such terms and subject to such conditions as may be considered desirable, but no fee shall be charged for a licence. |
| Requirements for sale of milk and cream. | 5. Any person who sells (a) Fresh milk containing less than 3 per centum of milk fat or less than 8.5 per centum of natural solids not fat : (b) Milk or cream which is dirty, adulterated, or diluted with water or other liquid : (c) Skimmed, separated, impoverished, or boiled milk for fresh milk : (d) Milk or cream from any cow which is or is suspected to be suffering from any form of tuberculosis or from any contagious or infectious disease: or (e) Milk or cream from any cow which is or is suspected to be in an unhealthy condition or from any cow which has calved less than three days previously, shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws. |
| Persons infected not to handle milk or cream. | 6. No person affected with tuberculosis or with any contagious, infectious, or cutaneous disease shall attend to or milk cows or carry or handle vessels or utensils used in the supply of milk or cream to Stanley or in any way take part in the handling or preparation of milk for sale. |
| All utensils to be kept properly clean. | 7. All vessels and utensils used in the supply of milk and cream to Stanley shall be thoroughly cleansed within four hours of having been used for any purpose whatsoever by first being well washed in cold water and then scalded with boiling water and thereafter hung in some suitable place to air. |
| Udder and teats of cow to be cleansed before milking. | 8. No person shall take milk from any cow of which the milk or cream is intended to be sold or exposed for sale for human consumption in Stanley unless the udder and teats of such cow have been thoroughly washed with water. |
| Milk and cream to be removed and strained immediately after milking. | 9. All milk or cream intended to be sold or exposed for sale for human consumption in Stanley shall be removed immediately after milking from the milking shed or yard and shall at least once be strained carefully through some apparatus sufficient for the purpose. |

10. It shall be the duty of every owner of a cow the milk or cream from which is intended to be sold or exposed for sale for human consumption in Stanley to notify the Board of Health or the Inspector appointed by the Board of Health under these Bye-laws if such cow appears to be suffering from tuberculosis or from any disease or disorder of any nature tending to contaminate or injuriously affect the milk or cream.

Owner of infected cow to notify the Board of Health or Inspector.

11. The Inspector appointed by the Board of Health under these Bye-laws shall inspect the cows, premises, and utensils of any description whatsoever kept or used for the purpose of supplying milk or cream to Stanley at regular intervals and shall submit a report to the Board of Health at the end of every quarter. If the conditions on inspection are not found satisfactory the Board of Health may withdraw or cancel the licence granted to the owner of such cows, premises or utensils, provided that the licence may be renewed at some later date when the conditions at fault are rectified.

Regular Inspection and cancellation of Licence if conditions not found satisfactory.

12. Any person failing to comply with or committing a breach of any of the provisions of these Bye-laws shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Two POUNDS for each offence and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty of five shillings for each day on which the offence continues after written notice of the said offence from the Board of Health.

Penalties.

13. Any cow found by the Inspector to be infected with tuberculosis may be destroyed by order of the Board of Health, provided that a compensation not exceeding £5 shall, with the sanction of the Governor, be paid to the owner of such cow.

Infected cow may be destroyed.

14. The Board of Health, may with the sanction of the Governor appoint any duly qualified person or persons from time to time to be an inspector or inspectors for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of these Bye-laws. The term "Inspector appointed by the Board of Health under these Bye-laws" used in the preceding sections of these Bye-laws shall be taken to mean any person so appointed.

Board of Health may appoint Inspector.

15. The Inspector so appointed shall be empowered to enter places where cows are kept for the purposes, as specified above, of inspecting cows, premises and utensils and of taking samples of milk for examination at reasonable hours between sunrise and sunset. Such samples of milk shall be paid for.

Power of Entry.

16. Any person obstructing a duly appointed Inspector in the discharge of his duties as aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws and shall be liable to a penalty as provided in section 12 of these Bye-laws.

Obstruction of Inspector an offence.

17. Sections 24 to 32, inclusive, of the "Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1921" and the "Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated (Amendment) Bye-laws 1927" are hereby repealed.

Repeal of sections 24 to 32 of the consolidated Bye-laws, 1921, (Amendment) Bye-laws, 1927.

A Bill

To amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Enacting Clause.
Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Licensing (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929, and shall be read and construed as one with the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

Repeal and replacement of Clause 8 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1882.

2. Clause 8 of the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following clause.

8. A wholesale license shall authorise the licensee to sell any liquor in any quantity on the premises specified in the licence, which, if more than one, must be contiguous to each other provided that no liquor so sold shall be consumed on the said premises.

3. Form No. 4 – Wholesale Licence – in the Schedule to the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, shall be amended by the omission of the words “not less than two gallons” after the words “to sell liquor in any quantity” and by the addition of the words “provided that no liquor sold under this license is consumed on the aforesaid premises” after the words (in brackets) “here describe the locality”.

In accordance with Section 13 of the Savings Bank Ordinance, 1888, I have the honour to submit the following report on the transactions of the Government Savings Bank in respect of the period 1st October, 1927, to 30th September, 1928.

Summary of Transactions.

(ENCLOSURE 1.)

2. During the year there were 894 deposits as against 352 withdrawals. The average monthly deposits amounted to £2,465 : 16 : 4 as against average monthly withdrawals of £2,450 : 4 : 7.

3. During the year 101 new accounts were opened and 73 accounts were closed, leaving 955 deposit accounts at the end of the year. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor on the 30th September, 1928, was £140 : 15 : 1 or about £59 per head of the population (2286). A monthly summary of the transactions of the Bank is appended hereto.

4. The accrued interest credited to the various accounts during the year amounted to £3,067 : 19 : 8. The deposits during the year, with accrued interest, (£32,657 : 15 : 6) exceeded the withdrawals (£29,402 : 15 : 5) by a sum of £3,255 : 0 : 1 leaving a balance to the credit of the depositors on the 30th September, 1928, of £134,421 : 12 : 8.

5. On the 1st October, 1927, the amount standing to the credit of the depositors

amounted to	£131,166 : 12 : 7.

6. The total amount expended by the Crown Agents, under Section 10 of the Ordinance, in the purchase of approved securities amounted to £115,266 : 4 : 2, leaving an uninvested balance on the 30th September, 1928, of £19,155 : 8 : 6.

(Section 11 of the Ordinance.)

7. During the year the income derived from the Securities forming the Savings Bank Investment Fund amounted to £4,920 : 19 : 9, of which sum the amount of £3,067 : 19 : 8 was credited to depositors' accounts in respect of accrued interest for the year, and the balance of £1,853 : 0 : 1 was transferred to the credit of the Colony's Revenue.

Savings Bank Depreciation Fund.

8. On the 1st October, 1927, the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund amounted to £11,734 : 5 : 3. During the year a sum of £639 : 14 : 8 was derived from the interest on the securities, and this sum was invested and placed to the credit of the Fund, making a total on the 30th September, 1928, of £12,373 : 19 : 11.

9. Appended hereto is a statement showing the nominal value, cost, and assumed market value of the securities held by the Crown Agents on behalf of Savings Bank Investment Fund and the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund (Enclosures 2 and 2a.)

10. The Government of the Falkland Islands is liable for the payment in cash of the total amount standing to the credit of the various depositors in the Government Savings Bank, which amounted to £134,421 : 12 : 8 on the 30th September, 1928. The total cash and the market value of the securities held by the Government on this date amounted to £140,019 : 8 : 6 which exceeded the liability by a sum of £5,567 : 15 : 10, as shown by the attached statement of Assets and Liabilities.

FALKLAND ISLANDS.

A Bill

To provide for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, 1929. Short Title.
2. In this Ordinance the term "Animal" shall mean any domestic or captured animal or bird. Definition.
3. Any person who cruelly beats, ill-treats, over-drives, over-rides, starves, grossly neglects, abuses or tortures any animal, or who works any animal when it is unfit for work or who causes or permits any animal being the owner thereof to be cruelly beaten, ill-treated, over-driven, over-ridden, starved, grossly neglected, abused or tortured, or to be worked when it is unfit for work shall be liable on conviction for the first offence to a fine not exceeding ten pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding three months and for the second and every subsequent offence to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment: Penalty for ill-treatment.
- Provided that where a person continues to use an animal as aforesaid for the purpose of completing a journey and has no reasonable opportunity of obtaining another animal for the purpose he shall not be deemed to have committed an offence under this Ordinance.
4. Any person who unlawfully and maliciously kills, maims, wounds or mutilates any animal shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment. Penalty for malicious killing and wounding.
5. If any person by committing an offence under this Ordinance causes any damage or injury to be done to any animal and is not the owner thereof he shall be liable on conviction under section 3 or 4 of this Ordinance to pay the owner of the animal such sum of money by way of compensation as the Court may adjudge in addition to any fine or imprisonment which the Court may inflict in respect of the offence. Compensation for damage done.

Reward to informer.

6. In any proceeding under this Ordinance the Court, if it so thinks fit, may order that a portion of the fine inflicted upon any person convicted of an offence under this Ordinance, not exceeding the one-half thereof, shall be paid to the person not being a police officer who has given the information leading to the conviction.

Power of Court to dispose of injured animal.

7. Where it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Court on a certificate signed by a qualified Veterinary Officer or in any proceeding under this Ordinance that any animal is mortally injured or so diseased or in such a physical condition that it is cruel to keep it alive the Court may order that the animal shall be destroyed in the manner which the Court directs and no compensation whatever shall be payable for or in respect of any animal so destroyed to the owner thereof or to any other person.

Power of Governor to dispose of stray or abandoned animal.

8. Where it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Governor that any animal is stray or abandoned such animal may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Governor may direct.

**Governor in Council
may make regulations.**

9. The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations for the following purposes and when made may repeal or amend such regulations:-

(1) For ensuring for animals carried by sea a proper supply of food and water and proper ventilation during the passage and on landing ;

(2) For securing for any animals a proper supply of food and water during any period of detention prior to or consequent on embarkation or disembarkation ;

(3) For protecting any animals from unnecessary suffering during embarkation or disembarkation ; and

(4) For the prevention of export of any diseased or wounded animals or of any animals suffering with broken or dislocated limbs.

A Bill

To declare the Law relating to Aliens and Destitute Immigrants.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Alien Ordinance. Short Title.
1929.
2. An alien coming from outside the Colony shall not land in the Colony unless he complies with the following conditions, that is to say:-
 - (1) He is in a position to support himself and his dependents;
 - (2) He is not a lunatic, idiot, or mentally deficient;
 - (3) He is not the subject of a certificate given by a medical officer in the service of the Government of the Colony that for medical reasons it is undesirable that he should be permitted to land in the Colony ;
 - (4) He has not been sentenced in a foreign country for any crime which would be a ground for extradition from the Colony; or
 - (5) He has not been prohibited from landing in the Colony by order of the Governor.
3. Every alien shall within a week after his landing in the Colony register his name, occupation, country and last residence at the office of the Police Magistrate. Registration of aliens.
4. When any person arrives in the Colony under an engagement to serve any person, firm, company, association or body of persons in any capacity and within a period of twelve months from the date of his arrival becomes chargeable to the Colony the person, firm, company, association or body of persons with whom the engagement as aforesaid was made shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred on behalf of such person including hospital costs and charges and the cost of his removal from the Colony. Liability of employers for bringing persons.

5. When any seaman is discharged from a ship in the Colony without the sanction of the Shipping Master and without reasonable provision having been made as to his subsistence or not being a deserter is wrongfully left behind in the Colony and within a period of six months from the date of being so discharged or wrongfully left behind becomes chargeable to the Colony the master of the ship from which such seaman has been so discharged or wrongfully left behind shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred on behalf of such seaman including hospital costs and charges and the cost of his removal from the Colony.

6. The master of any ship, British or foreign, which brings into the Colony any person, not having been shipwrecked, who at the time of his landing is destitute of means of subsistence shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred on behalf of such person unless the master of any ship aforesaid satisfies the Police Magistrate that he had made due enquiry and had sufficient reason to believe that such person was possessed of means of subsistence when he arrived in the Colony:

Provided that where the person so brought into the Colony came as a stowaway the master of any ship as aforesaid shall not be liable to repay the said costs and charges if such person is promptly handed over to the Chief Constable on the arrival of the ship and no money or compensation in respect of the passage of such person is paid or received.

7. In the absence of the master of any ship or if the master of any ship departs from the Colony before he repays the costs and charges as aforesaid in the two preceding sections of this Ordinance the owner, agent and consignee of the ship at the time of the discharging, wrongfully leaving behind or landing of the seaman or person as aforesaid shall be liable jointly and severally to repay the costs and charges as aforesaid to the Government of the Colony.

8. The costs and charges as aforesaid in the four preceding sections of this Ordinance shall be recoverable by suit as if an express agreement to repay them had been entered into with the Colonial Secretary by the person, firm, company, association, body, master, owner, agent or consignee chargeable.

9. Any person who acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment.

A Bill

To declare the Law relating to the Naturalization of Foreign Subjects.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Local Naturalization Ordinance, 1929". Short Title.
2. An alien who has resided in the Colony or in any Dependency thereof or who has been in the service of the Crown for a term in either case of not less than three years and who when locally naturalized intends to reside in the Colony or in any Dependency thereof or to serve under the Crown may apply to the Governor in Council for a certificate of local naturalization. Qualifications for naturalization.
3. The applicant shall make his application in the form of the first schedule to this Ordinance and shall support his application by such evidence as the Governor in Council may require, and the Governor in Council, if satisfied with the evidence adduced, shall take the case of the applicant into consideration, and may grant or withhold a certificate of local naturalization as he may think most conducive to the public good. The said certificate shall be in the form of the second schedule to this Ordinance and shall not be issued until it has been registered. Form of application, evidence required, and grant of certificate.
4. Before a certificate of local naturalization is granted the applicant shall take the oath of allegiance before the Governor and shall subscribe his name thereto in the oath book, and when such certificate is granted to him he shall to all intents and purposes whatsoever be entitled, within the limits of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof, to all the privileges and shall be subject to all the obligations of a British-born subject of His Majesty. Oath of allegiance to be taken.
5. There shall be paid to the Treasurer in respect of a certificate of local naturalization the sum of Three Pounds and for every certified copy of the same the sum of One Pound. Fees to be paid.
6. (1) Where the Governor in Council is satisfied that a certificate of local naturalization granted under this Ordinance has been obtained by false representations or fraud, or by concealment of material circumstances or that the person to whom the certificate is Revocation of certificate of local naturalization.

granted has shown himself by act or speech to be disaffected or disloyal to His Majesty, the Governor in Council shall by order revoke the certificate.

- (2) Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions the Governor in Council shall by order revoke a certificate of local naturalization granted under this Ordinance in any case in which he is satisfied that the person to whom the certificate was granted either -
- (a) has during any war in which His Majesty is engaged unlawfully traded or communicated with the enemy or with the subject of an enemy state, or been engaged in or associated with any business which is to his knowledge carried on in such manner as to assist the enemy in such war; or
 - (b) has within five years of the date of the grant of the certificate been sentenced by any court in His Majesty's dominions to imprisonment for a term of not less than twelve months, or to a term of penal servitude, or to a fine of not less than one hundred pounds; or
 - (c) was not of good character at the date of the grant of the certificate; or
 - (d) has since the date of the grant of the certificate been for a period of not less than seven years ordinarily resident out of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof otherwise than as a representative of a British subject, firm, or company carrying on business, or an institution established in His Majesty's dominions or in the service of the Crown, and has not maintained substantial connection with the Colony or with the Dependencies thereof; or
 - (e) remains according to the law of a state at war with His Majesty a subject of that state: and that (in any case) the continuance of the certificate is not conducive to the public good.
- (3) The Governor in Council may, if he thinks fit, before making an order under this section refer the case for such inquiry as is hereinafter specified and in any case to which subsection (1) or paragraph (a), (c), or (e) of subsection (2) of this section applies the Governor in Council shall, by notice given to or sent to the last-known address of the holder of the certificate give him an opportunity of claiming that the case be referred for such inquiry, and if the holder so claims in accordance with the notice the Governor in Council shall refer the case for inquiry accordingly.
- (4) An inquiry under this section shall be held by a committee constituted for the purpose by the Governor in Council and shall be conducted in such manner as the Governor in Council may direct :

Provided that any such inquiry may, if the Governor in Council thinks fit, instead of being held as aforesaid be held by a Judge of the Supreme Court and the practice and procedure on any inquiry so held shall be regulated by rules of court. A committee appointed under this section shall have all

such powers, rights, and privileges as are vested in the Supreme Court or in any Judge thereof on the occasion of any action, in respect of the following matters :—

(a) The enforcing the attendance of witnesses and examining them on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, and the issue of a commission or a request to examine witnesses abroad ; and

(b) the compelling the production of documents ; and

(c) The punishing persons guilty of contempt ; and a summons signed by one or more members of the committee may be substituted for and shall be equivalent to any formal process capable of being issued in any action for enforcing the attendance of witnesses and compelling the production of documents.

- (5) Where the Governor in Council revokes a certificate of local naturalization, the revocation shall have effect from such date as the Governor in Council may direct, and thereupon the certificate shall be given up and cancelled and any person refusing or neglecting to give up his certificate shall be liable on summary conviction before a Magistrate to a fine not exceeding One hundred pounds.

7. (1) Where a certificate of local naturalization is revoked the Governor in Council may by order direct that the wife and minor children (or any of them) of the person whose certificate is revoked shall cease to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof, and the wife or child, as the case may be, shall thereupon be regarded as an alien within the limits of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof, but, except where the Governor in Council directs as aforesaid, the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof possessed by the wife and minor children of the person whose certificate is revoked shall not be affected by the revocation and they shall continue to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof :

Effect of revocation of a certificate of local naturalization.

Provided that—

(a) It shall be lawful for the wife of any such person within six months after the date of the order of revocation to make a declaration of alienage and thereupon she and any minor children of her husband and herself shall cease to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof ;

(b) The Governor in Council shall not make any such order as aforesaid in the case of a wife who was at birth a British Subject unless he is satisfied that if she had held a certificate of local naturalization in her own right the certificate could properly have been revoked under this Ordinance, and the provisions of this Ordinance as to referring

cases for enquiry shall apply to the making of any such order as they apply to the revocation of a certificate.

(2) The provisions of this section shall, as respects persons affected thereby, have effect in substitution for the provisions of section 8 of this Ordinance as to the effect upon the wife and minor children of any person who ceases to possess the local status of British subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof in accordance with that section and the provisions of that section shall accordingly not apply in any such case.

(3) Where a certificate of local naturalization is revoked, the former holder thereof shall be regarded within the limits of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof as an alien and as a subject of the state to which he belonged at the time the certificate was granted.

Loss of nationality by foreign naturalization.

8. A person locally naturalized under this Ordinance who, when in any foreign state and not under disability, by obtaining a certificate of naturalization or by any other voluntary and formal act becomes naturalized therein, shall thenceforth be deemed to have ceased to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof, and the wife and every minor child of that person shall thereupon also cease to possess that status.

Repeal of Ordinance
No. 5 of 1900, and
No. 6 of 1928.

9. The Alien Ordinance, 1900, and the Alien (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928, are hereby repealed :

Provided that no rights or privileges as respects the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof acquired by any person under the Aliens Ordinance, 1900, shall be regarded as cancelled by this Ordinance except in the manner therein prescribed.

Application to Dependencies.

10. This Ordinance shall apply alike to the Colony and to the Dependencies thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Governor by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :

The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, as amended by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922, shall extend to maintenance orders made by Courts within the Territory for the Seat of Government of the Commonwealth of Australia in like manner as it applies to maintenance orders made in England or Ireland.

LEAVE.

6A. Passages to and from the United Kingdom will be provided in the normal course by the direct route and will not be provided except in special circumstances to be determined by the Governor by the longer route via the west coast of South America. When the officer desires in the absence of such special circumstances to proceed by the longer route he will be granted towards the cost of his passage the equivalent amount only of the cost of a passage by the direct route.

6B. Where the officer does not proceed to the United Kingdom by the direct route or by the longer route in the special circumstances above mentioned he will be granted towards the cost of his passage an amount not exceeding the equivalent amount of the cost of a passage by the direct route on the production of duly receipted vouchers in respect of the expenditure actually incurred. On no account will the officer be granted an amount in excess of the expenditure actually incurred on his passage by whatever route he may proceed.

6C. Where the officer proceeds to or from the United Kingdom and breaks his journey at Montevideo in transshipment he will be allowed passages from or to Montevideo at the ordinary first class rate by the "D" service of the Royal Mail Steam Packet or by a line not more expensive than such service, irrespective of the cost of his passages to or from Montevideo from or to the Colony.

GENERAL.

11. The Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations do not apply to officers engaged on agreement with the Crown Agents for the Colonies even though they hold offices on the permanent establishment.

12. In the case of an officer who holds an office on the permanent establishment either on probation or for a stated period the Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations do not apply unless and until the officer is confirmed in the office or is retained for a further period.

These Regulations are dated the 15th of March, 1929, and are to be read as forming part of the Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations which took effect on and from the 1st of May, 1928.

Report on Education in the Colony for the Year 1928.

—:O:—

General.

The educational facilities available in the Falkland Islands fall, in view of the peculiar local conditions, into three groups :—

1. Those at Stanley, the only township in the Colony.
2. Those at Darwin, the Falkland Islands Company's main camp settlement.
3. Those in the outside country districts with their very scattered farm settlements.

STANLEY : There are two schools in Stanley. A Government School is maintained from public funds, which, whilst being elementary in character, also make provision for attendance at a Continuation Class for a two years' course of further education. Under a scheme instituted in 1924 the School further caters for children from the 'Camps' or country districts, whose parents are willing to send them to Stanley to be educated. These Camp children are either boarded and lodged in a Government Hostel, and taught in the School at an inclusive charge of 10/- a month during residence, or, if boarded in private houses, the Government contributes two thirds of the cost not exceeding £2 a month. There is also a Convent School managed by Roman Catholic Sisters ; this School, however, is not subject to Government Control, and receives no subsidy.

DARWIN : Here for many years past the Falkland Islands Company has maintained, in the interest of its employees a small school with a resident master.

CAMP DISTRICTS : Three itinerant teachers are provided by the Government — one for the East and two for the West Falkland. These teachers travel from settlement to settlement devoting a certain amount of time to each. The Falkland Islands Company, also, supports two Camp Teachers for the children of its employees in outlying districts.

During the period under review the Staff was short of its proper complement by the Assistant Master until the middle of October, and by one Assistant Mistress from the end of August again until the middle of October.

4. The good progress made at the School in 1927 was maintained in 1928. The staff was at full strength for the last two months of the year for the first time for over two years, and for the second year in succession the School was not closed on account of illness among the pupils. The attendance although falling below the remarkable figure of 1927 was good, averaging 93 and 92 *per cent* for the first and last quarters and 88 *per cent* for the whole year. The examination results at the end of the year are reported by the Headmaster of the School to be satisfactory.

5. The Continuation Class was maintained as a separate class under the charge of a qualified teacher throughout the year. It started with an unusually large roll and finished with eight pupils, one boy and seven girls. Three of its members were taken into the employment of the Government in the course of the year and three left the Colony.

6. There was an increase in the number of medical visits paid to the School during 1928, when the arrangements for the inspection of the children were placed on a more systematic basis. The Dental Surgeon likewise continued his periodical visits and treatment. As stated above, the general health of the school, even through a hard winter, was never such as to require its closing while a definite improvement was observed in the condition of the children's mouths.

7. The teaching of woodwork to the elder boys was restarted after a lapse of four years. Difficulty has been experienced in obtaining an Assistant Master with the required qualifications for this subject which is now undertaken by a competent local carpenter.

8. Several useful structural alterations were made to the School premises during the year. More of the windows have been fitted with casement openings thus admitting fresh air and brightening the classrooms. The earth closets have been replaced with water closets and wash basins with taps and wastepipes have been installed, three in each cloakroom.

9. The School Hostel was, as in 1927, in charge of Miss I. Begg, Assistant Mistress, until the end of August from which time until the end of the year the Superintendent of Education and Headmaster of the School, Mr. A. R. Hoare, and Mrs. Hoare were personally in residence. There were eleven boarders for the greater part of the year. Unfortunately during the winter months a considerable amount of sickness occurred among them and the question of the further continuance of this institution is receiving attention. As in 1927 monthly grants were made in the case of eight children from the "Camps" towards the cost of their maintenance in Stanley for the purpose of attending the School.

10. A tribute is once more due to Mr. A. R. Hoare for the able manner in which he has kept the standard of teaching and of learning up to that of the preceding year in regard to which notice was recorded in the Report for 1927. No testimony to this standard is needed perhaps, other than the really admirable performance given by the pupils of the School at the annual prizegiving in December, which surprised and delighted all those privileged to be present at it. In his work Mr. Hoare has been worthily supported by his wife whose retirement from the staff at the end of the year has left a gap which it will not be easy adequately to fill.

Finance.

11. The expenditure under Head XI. "Education" of the annual estimate of the expenditure was £2,973 in 1928 as compared with £2,475 in 1927. The revenue collected in 1928 amounted to £170 or less by £11 than the amount of £181 collected in 1927. Details of the expenditure and revenue for 1928 are appended :-

Travelling Teachers.

12. The Government Travelling Teachers, one on the East Falkland and two on the West Falkland, continued to render useful service during the year. In addition a third Travelling Teacher has been temporarily engaged for work on the Port Stephens beat on the West Falkland. During 1928, 85 children were under instruction by the Government Travelling Teachers of whom 51 were boys, and the remaining 34 girls.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Harbour Ordinance, 1902.

In virtue of the powers in him vested by section 2 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902, and otherwise, the Governor with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, is pleased hereby to make the following Regulations.

Short Title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Harbour Regulations, 1929.

Fee to be paid for storage vessels and hulks.

2. For every vessel, lighter, barge, or hulk anchored or moored in the harbour of Stanley for a period exceeding one month there shall be paid to the Harbour Master by the owner of such vessel, lighter, barge or hulk in respect of each year or part of a year during which such vessel, lighter, barge, or hulk is so anchored or moored a fee of £10.

Floating docks not to be moored without permission and fee payable.

3. No floating dock shall be anchored or moored in the harbour of Stanley without the permission in writing of the Harbour Master and for every floating dock so anchored or moored there shall be paid to the Harbour Master by the owner of such floating dock in respect of each year or part of a year during which such floating dock is so anchored or moored a fee of £20.

Fee payable for sand, etc. removed from the harbour.

4. For every ton of sand, stone or gravel taken or removed by permission of the Harbour Master from the harbour of Stanley or from the beach thereof, there shall be paid to the Harbour Master the sum of One Shilling.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of meeting held on the 13th of November, 1928.

1. The Honourable H. C. Ley, after taking the prescribed oath, assumed his seat at the Council.

2. The minutes of the meeting held on the 22nd of May, 1928, were confirmed.

3. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer, by Command, laid on the table the following papers:

- (i) Copies of all Regulations, Orders and Bye-laws, made or approved by the Governor in Executive Council since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
- (ii) Copies of despatches received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating the non-disallowance by His Majesty of Ordinances, Nos. 1, 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8 of 1928.
- (iii) Comparative Statements of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Colony and the Dependencies for the periods 1st January to 31st March, 1928, and 1st January to 30th June, 1928.
- (iv) Schedules of all charges of an unusual or special description or not covered by the Appropriation law for the year 1928, incurred during the quarters ended the 31st of March, 1928, and the 30th of June, 1928.
- (v) Monthly Abstracts of Cash Receipts and Payments of the 'Discovery' Committee for the months of June to October, 1928.
- (vi) Estimate of the 'Discovery' Committee's Expenditure for the year 1928.

4. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer moved the adoption of the following Resolution:

"Whereas further provision is required for the service of the Colony and its Dependencies for the year ending the 31st of December, 1928.

Be it resolved-

This Council hereby sanctions the expenditure from public funds of the sum of seven thousand, three hundred and eighty-three Pounds, thirteen Shillings, and two Pence, (£7,383. 13s. 2d.) to meet the several charges itemized in the accompanying schedule."

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

5. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer moved the adoption of the following Resolution:

"Be it resolved that under the provisions of the Stanley Rating Ordinance, 1928, this Council hereby sanctions the following rate to be charged for the year, 1929, on house property in the town of Stanley, namely, One Shilling and Nine Pence for every Twenty Shillings of the annual value of such house property."

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

6. Minute from the Acting Governor, No. 1 of 1928, relating to the grant of half salary to His Excellency the Acting Governor during the absence on special leave of His Excellency the Governor, was read.

On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Treasurer, seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon, the minute was adopted.

7. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer moved the *first* reading of a Bill entitled, "A Bill to amend the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duties) Amendment Ordinances, 1923 and 1924. In doing so he explained that the object of the Bill was to fix the duty to be levied upon whale oil for the 1928-29 season at the rate of 2/- per barrel, which rate had been approved by the Secretary of State, and to provide for the collection of the duty in the *nett* amount payable instead of in the *gross* amount less a rebate subsequently refundable.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer in moving the *first* reading of a Bill "To amend the Customs Ordinance, 1903", stated that the measure was being introduced on instructions received from the Secretary of State with the object of taking power to prohibit the exportation of gold from the Colony in order to safeguard the gold coin reserve which is required to be kept in the Colony to back the Note Currency Issue.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

The *first* reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1, 2, and 4 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer in introducing a Bill "To provide for the protection in the Colony of Designs registered in the United Kingdom", explained that the Bill was being put forward in accordance with the suggestion of the Secretary of State for the Colonies so as to conform with Imperial Legislation and legislation which is either in force or being introduced in other parts of the British Empire.

On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Treasurer seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon the Bill was read a *first* time.

The *first* reading was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 7 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer moved the *first* reading of a Bill "To provide for the registration in the Colony of Trade Marks registered in the United Kingdom", and stated that the measure was being introduced in accordance with the suggestion of the Secretary of State so as to conform with Imperial Legislation and legislation in other parts of the British Empire, as in the case of the previous Bill relative to Designs.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon seconded.

The *first* reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 17 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

11. The Honourable the Acting Treasurer introduced a Bill "To provide for the service of the year 1929", and stated in reference to the draft Estimates of the Revenue and the Expenditure for the year 1929 laid before the Council for detailed consideration at the Committee stage together with the Schedule to the Bill, that it would be seen that the revenue anticipated to accrue during the year 1929 was £50,358 and the expenditure provided was £50,054 or a surplus of £304. In addition expenditure amounting to £6,550 was provided chargeable to the Surplus Balances which were estimated to amount at the end of the year to £26,000. He stated also that it was expected that on return from leave of His Excellency the Governor a further programme of public works involving expenditure of a capital nature chargeable against the Surplus Balances would be drawn up and laid before the Council in due course. The provision under "Personal Emoluments" for 1929 amounted to £18,984 as compared with £17,334 for 1928 or an increase of £1,650. This increase was found necessary to meet the cost of additions to the establishment and of the re-organization of the staff of certain departments, *e.g.* "Public Works" and "Telegraphs and Telephones" as well as to cover certain increases of salary, the majority of which alterations had already received the specific sanction of the Secretary of State. Under "Other Charges" the increases occurred principally under maintenance and repairs services in the same two departments. In the latter case a volume of traffic much in excess of previous years was expected to be handled with a proportionate increase in the revenue earned.

With regard to the Dependencies no real change was proposed except the altered procedure in regard to the collection of the duty on whale oil at the *nett* rate payable under Ordinance 9 of 1928 just enacted by the Council.

On the motion of the Honourable the Acting Treasurer seconded by the Honourable the Colonial Surgeon the Bill was read a *first* time.

The *first* reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motions made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

On motion made consideration of Clause 2 was postponed until after consideration of the Schedule.

The Honourable the Acting Treasurer moved the adoption of the Schedule item by item.

With regard to Head VI. "TELEGRAPHS & TELEPHONES" the Honourable G. J. Felton stated that he was of the opinion that the appointment of an additional linesman to the staff was unnecessary and that he did not consider that enough work could be found for such an officer in connection with the repairing and generally keeping in order of the camp lines.

His Excellency the Acting Governor replied that as the appointment of a second linesman for camp lines had received the sanction of the Secretary of State he could not see his way clear to accept an amendment if formally moved.

The Honourable the Colonial Surgeon stated in regard to the rates of salary provided

for the Medical and Dental officers under Head X. "MEDICAL", that he did not personally consider them sufficient to attract candidates of the best stamp to fill the offices in the event of vacancies occurring. He wished to adhere to his recommendation previously put forward that the rates should approximate more nearly to those obtaining in the East and West African Medical Services, *e.g.* for the Principal Medical Officer, £1,000 by £50 to £1,100, and for the Medical Officer and Dental Surgeon, £600 by £50 to £800 *per annum*. He would not of course propose an amendment to the Schedule but he would be grateful if his opinion could be placed on record for possible reconsideration at a later date.

His Excellency the Acting Governor pointed out that such an increase granted to the Medical Officers would be liable to raise a similar issue in the case of other officers in other Departments and that the Colony could not afford indefinitely to put up its expenditure under "Personal Emoluments". He found it difficult therefore either to agree or to disagree, as on a professional matter, with the Honourable Member. He directed that as requested Dr. Reford's view should be recorded and undertook to bring the matter forward on the return of His Excellency the Governor from leave.

Under Head XV. "Stock" the Honourable G. J. Felton stated that he was opposed to the appointment of a Veterinary Officer in contrast to a practical stockman, and expressed the hope that it would not be found necessary to employ a second officer in addition to the Veterinary officer, to carry out the duties of the Stock Inspector.

His Excellency the Acting Governor stated in reply that the post of Veterinary Officer with salary as provided had been inserted in pursuance of the telegraphic instructions of the Secretary of State; that he was inclined personally towards the view held by the Honourable Member although the matter, was, he considered, open to debate and that he desired to associate himself with his hope.

Referring to the Head XVIII. "PUBLIC WORKS RECURRENT", the Honourable G. J. Felton said that he was sorry to see that provision for the improvement of tracks has been deleted from the estimate of expenditure under that Head for the year 1929 as he considered that this work was of the utmost importance and would be a benefit to everybody. He suggested that future payments to the Land Sales Fund which now stood at over £200,000 might be applied to this purpose.

His Excellency the Acting Governor stated that provision under this Head had been omitted as it was felt that any work undertaken in this direction should be on a larger scale and of a capital nature. He assured the Honourable Member that he would not fail to bring the question forward on return from leave of His Excellency the Governor.

In reply to a further query from the Honourable G. J. Felton as to the dual expenditure now incurred on "Upkeep of Horses and Carts" and "Upkeep of Motor Lorries", His Excellency the Acting Governor undertook during the year to cause careful investigation to be made with the view, if possible, to the reduction of the expenditure on "Upkeep of Horses and Carts" consequent on the extended use of motor transport and the increased expenditure under "Upkeep of Motor Lorries". At the same time His Excellency pointed out that more work was being done at the present than was the case, say, two years ago.

The Schedule was then agreed to.

Clause 2 was recommitted and agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-Laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island under sections 18 and 19 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

1. These Bye-laws may be cited as the "Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated (Amendment) Bye-laws, 1929," and shall be read and construed as one with the Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1894. Short Title.
2. No horse, cow, sheep, pig, fowl, duck, goose or other similar domesticated animal or bird shall be kept within a distance of thirty feet from any dwelling house or in any place where in the opinion of the Board it is or is likely to become a nuisance or injurious to the public health. Animals.
3. The Back premises of any house or building in the Town of Stanley and the passage or passages leading to the same shall be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition and shall be properly drained to the satisfaction of the Board. If in the opinion of the Board the back premises or passage are or is in a dirty or insanitary condition or improperly drained or of such construction as to render a dirty or insanitary condition likely to exist the Board may serve upon the owner or the occupier of the premises or the passage a notice in writing requiring him to remedy the said condition or defect in drainage or construction within a time to be specified in the notice and if the owner or occupier as aforesaid fails to comply with the notice or with any part thereof he shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws. Yards.
4. The occupier of any premises in or on which there is any escape of night soil, urine or filth of similar description from any latrine, closet or urinal shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws. Escape of night soil prohibited.
5. Any person who deposits any night soil, urine or filth of similar description in any ashpit or in any hole or place or digs or constructs any hole or place for the reception of any night soil, urine or filth of similar description except with the permission of the Board in writing or throws any night soil, urine or filth of similar description or allows any night soil, urine or filth of similar description to be deposited or to flow on any yard, plot, street, footpath or public place or into any drain not constructed for the reception of night soil, urine, or filth of similar description shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws. Disposal of night soil prohibited.
6. Any persons who throws or deposits or causes to be thrown or deposited any accumulation of dust, refuse, garbage or decaying animal, vegetable or other noxious matter in or upon any street, footpath, or other public place shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws. The presence of any such accumulation in the immediate vicinity of any home, building or premises shall be evidence *prima facie* that it has been there thrown or deposited by the occupier of such home, building or premises. Disposal of refuse prohibited.
7. Any person who makes any quarry, excavation, or hole in the ground of such description as is likely to be injurious or dangerous to the public health or safety without the permission of the Board in writing shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws. Where the permission of the Board is given as aforesaid such quarry, excavation, or hole in the ground shall be made subject to any condition with regard to the fencing, lighting, filling up, or Quarries and Excavations.

otherwise making secure thereof which the Board may consider necessary in the interest of the public health and safety.

Damage to Streets and
Watermains.

8. Any person who wilfully or negligently damages or otherwise interferes with any public street, footpath, watermain, drain or sewer in such a manner as to cause injury or danger to the public health shall be guilty of an offence against these Bye-laws.

Amendment to
Clause 41.

9. Section 41 of the Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1894, is hereby amended by the substitution of the words "Two Pounds" for the words "Five Pounds."

Repeal.

10. Sections 10, 12, and 34 of the Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1894, are hereby repealed.

person erecting the building to make within a time to be specified in the notice such alterations as may be necessary to ensure compliance with the provisions of these Bye-laws.

Erection without or contrary to permit.

7. If any person erects or begins to erect any building in the town of Stanley and has not first obtained a Building Permit under these Bye-laws or if any person in the erection of any building in respect of which a Building Permit has been granted under these Bye-laws contravenes any of the provisions of these Bye-laws or fails to comply with any written notice duly served upon him, the Board may by written notice require him to demolish and remove the building or any portion thereof or to make any such alterations in the building as the Board may prescribe, within a time to be specified in the notice, and in the same or another notice the Board may notify him that if the requirements of the notice are not satisfied within the time specified the Board will enter upon the building and carry out the said demolition, removal, or alteration and will recover from him all costs and expenses rightly incurred by the Board on that behalf.

Building to be erected within reasonable time.

8. If any building in respect of which a Building Permit has been granted under these Bye-laws is not completed within a reasonable time in the opinion of the Board the Board may give notice in writing to the person to whom the said Building Permit has been granted that unless he completes the building on or before a date to be specified in the notice the said Building Permit shall be deemed to have lapsed; provided that nothing in this Bye-law shall prevent any person thereunder from making a fresh application for a Building Permit in the manner prescribed in these Bye-laws.

Occupation of new buildings.

9. No person shall occupy or shall allow to be occupied any new building until the building has been certified by the Board to be in the opinion of the Board in every respect fit for occupation and in the case of a domestic building fit for human habitation.

No building to be altered.

10. Where any building has been erected either precedent to or under these Bye-laws no person shall alter the building in such a way that the same as altered would, as at first so erected, have been in contravention of any of the provisions of these Bye-laws and no person shall, except with the permission in writing and upon such terms as the Board may prescribe, use the building or allow the building, being the owner thereof, to be used otherwise than for the purposes specified or indicated in the original application and plans in respect thereof as made and furnished to the Board.

No alteration in plans.

11. No alteration shall be made in the plans or details of any building to be erected in the town of Stanley as approved by the Board except with the permission in writing of the Board.

Preparation of site.

12. The site of a building in respect of which a Building Permit has been granted under these Bye-laws shall be prepared by removing all animal or vegetable matter and shall be dug out to such depth as may be considered necessary in the opinion of the Board.

Footings.

13. Any person who erects a building under these Bye-laws shall construct every wall thereof so as to rest upon proper footings.

Concrete.

14. All concrete used in the erection of a building under these Bye-laws shall be composed of clean gravel, broken hard brick, broken stone, or other hard material approved by the Board and shall be well mixed with freshly burned lime or good cement in the proportion of at least one to six.

Air space under floors.

15. The underside of any floor joist or plate of a building erected under these Bye-laws shall be at the least 6 inches above the

surface of the underlying gravel and shall be efficiently ventilated by the insertion of air bricks, gratings or two inch slots left in the concrete foundations of outer and sleeper walls.

16. When a timber framed building is erected under these Bye-laws the several timbers and materials used shall be of such size and strength as may be necessary in the opinion of the Board to secure due stability.

Stability of materials.

17. Any stone or brick building erected under these Bye-laws for use as a dwelling house shall be constructed with a damp proof course of durable material impervious to moisture. The damp proof course may consist of sheet lead, asphalt three quarters of an inch in thickness, neat cement three quarters of an inch in thickness, slabs embedded in the cement or such other materials as the Board may approve.

Damp Courses.

18. A person who erects a building under these Bye-laws shall not fix in the building any pipe for the purpose of conveying smoke or other products of combustion unless the pipe is fixed at a distance of at least eight inches from any combustible substance and such combustible substance furthermore is protected with asbestos sheeting or steel plate so as to leave an air space at the least of half an inch between such combustible substance and the said asbestos sheeting or steel plate.

Stove Piping.

19. Where a chimney is built against a wooden building (erected under these Bye-laws) the back of the chimney shall be built of brickwork not less than nine inches in thickness from the floor level to the height of one foot above the arch bar and the remaining portion of the back and the other sides of the chimney shall be built of brickwork not less than four and a half inches in thickness.

Chimneys.

20. The inside of every brick smoke flue in any building erected under these Bye-laws shall throughout the whole extent thereof be rendered, pargetted or lined with lime mortar.

Flues to be rendered pargetted or lined.

21. Where any brick smoke flue in any building erected under these Bye-laws passes through any floor or roof or behind or against any woodwork the outside of such brick flue shall be similarly rendered, pargetted, or lined with lime mortar or cement.

Flue against woodwork similarly to be treated.

22. In any building erected under these Bye-laws the floor under every oven, copper, steam boiler or stove for the combustion of solid fuel and the floor around the same shall for a space of one foot and three inches be formed of materials of an incombustible and non-heat conducting nature.

Floors under ovens, stoves, etc. etc.

23. In any building erected under these Bye-laws there shall be laid level with the floor before the opening of every chimney a slab of stone, tiles, bricks, or other incombustible substance for half the width at the least of the chimney breast jamb on either side of such opening and one foot four inches at the least wide at the breast thereof.

Hearths.

24. In any building erected under these Bye-laws for domestic use the backyard thereof shall be provided with a pathway extending along and adjacent to the back of the premises and such pathway shall be constructed of concrete flat bricks or rubble bedded in cement and sand or other approved materials and the width of such pathway shall not be less than four feet and shall slope half an inch to the foot from the building and shall be drained so as to discharge into the nearest public drain.

Backyard pavings.

Gutters and down
pipes.

25. Any building erected under these Bye-laws shall be provided with gutters, and down pipes which may be of cast iron, steel, zinc or wood and in every case shall be efficiently jointed with red lead or other suitable composition and shall be laid with a true and even fall of at least one inch in ten feet towards the outlet at the head of the down pipe. The gutters shall be supported at intervals of not more than four feet on strong brackets which shall be securely fixed. Every outlet for waste water shall be connected to the nearest public drain in such manner as may be directed by the Board.

Closets.

26. In any building erected under these Bye-laws the floor of every water-closet and of every earth-closet shall be smooth and made of non-absorbent materials, shall be in every part under or forming the bottom of the receptacle for filth at least three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground and shall have a fall of at least half an inch to the foot.

Water-Closets.

27. In any building erected under these Bye-laws every water-closet shall be so constructed so as to comply with the following requirements where applicable :—

(1) If the water-closet is within the building, one of its sides at least shall be an external wall.

(2) If the water-closet cannot be entered from the external air, it shall be provided with a window of an area not less than one and a half square feet exclusive of the frames set in a wall opening directly into the external air.

(3) If the water-closet can be entered from the external air it shall be provided with a sufficient opening for light and ventilation as near to the top as practicable and communicating directly with the external air.

(4) It shall be provided with a separate cistern or flushing box of adequate capacity.

(5) No part of the water-closet apparatus other than the cistern or flushing box shall be directly connected with any pipe leading from a public watermain.

(6) It shall be provided with a pan, basin or other suitable receptacle of non-absorbent material so constructed as to receive and retain a sufficient quantity of water adequately to seal or to trap such pan, basin or other receptacle and to allow any filth to fall free from the sides directly into the water.

(7) It shall be provided with suitable apparatus for the effectual application of the water in the cistern or flushing box to the pan, basin or other receptacle and for the prompt and effectual flushing and cleansing of the pan.

(8) No container or similar fitting shall be fitted under the pan, basin or other receptacle.

Earth-Closets.

28. In any building erected under these Bye-laws every closet for pails shall not be less than six feet distant from any dwelling house or public building or any building in which any person is employed in any trade or business, shall be provided with a window of an area not less than one and a half square feet, exclusive of the frame, set in a wall opening directly into the external air, shall be provided with a moveable metal pail for the deposit of filth of a capacity sufficient in the opinion of the Board to meet the requirements of the occupier of the building, and shall have facilities for the removal of filth without being carried through any dwelling house, public building or any building in which any person is employed in any trade or business.

Ashpits.

29. Any building erected under these Bye-laws shall be provided with an ashpit or receptacle for ashes and other non liquid

refuse to the satisfaction of the Board. Such ashpit shall be maintained by the owner of the building in good order to the satisfaction of the Board and shall meet with the following requirements.

(1) It shall be constructed at the least ten feet from any dwelling house, public building, or any building in which any person is employed in any trade or business.

(2) It shall be so constructed as to afford ready means for cleansing and removing its contents without being carried through any dwelling house, public building, or any building in which any person is employed in any trade or business.

(3) It shall be of such cubic capacity not less than twelve feet as is sufficient to contain all dust, ashes and dry refuse which may accumulate therein during the period of one month.

(4) It shall be constructed with walls made of metal, stones or brick bound together with mortar or cement or otherwise made of non-absorbent materials.

(5) It shall be constructed with doors so made, fitted as to admit of being securely closed and fastened and to prevent the escape of the contents.

(6) It shall be properly roofed over with non-inflammable materials.

30. In any building erected under these Bye-laws any room intended to be used as a living room shall not be less than seven feet from floor to ceiling and shall have a clear superficial floor area of not less than one hundred square feet and any room intended to be used as a sleeping room shall have a clear superficial floor area of not less than sixty square feet for every person sleeping therein subject to a total floor area of not less than one hundred square feet. For the purpose of this Bye-law two children under twelve years of age shall be reckoned as one person.

Height and area of rooms.

31. In any building erected under these Bye-laws any room intended to be used as a living or sleeping room shall be ventilated and lighted to the satisfaction of the Board, by means of a window or windows opening directly into the external air. The area of such window or windows clear of the frame or frames shall equal at the least one tenth of the superficial floor area. One half of every such window shall open and the opening shall extend to the top. Any room without a fireplace and flue which is intended to be used as a living or sleeping room shall have a special ventilation opening in size at the least one hundred square inches.

Light and ventilation.

32. Any drain constructed after the passing of these Bye-laws for the drainage of any building in the Town of Stanley, whether erected under these Bye-laws or already existing, shall be constructed of good sound pipes formed of glazed stoneware, heavy cast iron or other suitable material to the satisfaction of the Board. Such drain shall be of adequate size in the opinion of the Board and if constructed or adapted for the purpose of the conveyance of sewage shall have an internal diameter of not less than four inches and shall be laid with a sufficient fall in the opinion of the Board and with socketted or otherwise watertight joints. No such drain shall be so constructed as to pass under any building or part of a building except in a case where no other mode of construction is practicable, and if any such drain shall be so constructed as to pass under any building or part of a building such drain shall be so laid in the ground that there shall be a distance at the least to the full diameter thereof between the top of such drain and the surface of the ground under the building or part of the building aforesaid. No such drain shall be constructed in a manner so as to allow any inlet to be made to such drain within the building except any inlet which may be

Drains.

necessary from the apparatus of any water-closet or slop sink constructed to be used within the building for the reception of liquid or solid filth.

Drains to be approved by Colonial Engineer on behalf of the Board.

33. No drain constructed after the passing of these Bye-laws for the drainage of any building in the Town of Stanley, whether erected under these Bye-laws or already existing, shall be covered up unless it has been inspected, tested and approved by the Colonial Engineer on behalf of the Board to whom three days' notice at the least beforehand shall be given of the intention so to cover up.

Waste and overflow Pipes.

34. Any waste pipe from any bath or lavatory basin or any other pipe for the conveyance of foul or wash water constructed after the passing of these Bye-laws in any building in the Town of Stanley, whether erected under these Bye-laws or already existing, shall be trapped and taken through an external wall and shall discharge in the open air over a trapped gully with proper grating to the satisfaction of the Board, and any overflow pipe from any cistern or water-closet in the manner constructed shall be taken through an external wall and shall discharge in the open air.

Connections to Public Drain.

35. All connections made after the passing of these Bye-laws from any building in the Town of Stanley to any watermain drain or sewer shall be made by the Colonial Engineer or his duly authorised agent or agents on behalf of the Board and the cost of every such connection shall be payable to the Colonial Engineer by the owner of the building to which such connection is made and no unauthorised person shall interfere in any way with any public water-main, drain or sewer.

Stables.

36. No stable, cowshed, fowl house, fowl coup, pig sty or any building in which any animal or bird is intended to be kept shall be erected within a distance of thirty feet from any dwelling house or in any position where in the opinion of the Board it is or is likely to become a nuisance or injurious to the public health.

Tanks.

37. Any barrel, cistern or tank intended to hold water for drinking or domestic purposes shall be provided with a good and sufficient cover to the satisfaction of the Board and where any barrel, cistern or tank is constructed or adapted for the storage of water for drinking purposes it shall not be connected directly with any water closet.

Demolition of ruinous buildings.

38. Where it is shown to the satisfaction of the Board that any house, building or other structure of any kind is so ruinous as to be dangerous to the public safety the Board may serve upon the owner of such house, building or other structure a notice in writing requiring him to begin to shore up, secure or otherwise make safe such house, building or structure to the satisfaction of the Board or to begin to demolish and remove such house, building or structure within seven days of the receipt of the said notice, and to continue so to shore up, secure or otherwise make safe or to demolish and remove without intermission until the requirements of the Board is finally completed, and to complete finally the requirements of the Board within a time to be specified in the notice and, if after the lapse of seven days from the receipt of the said notice or of the time specified the owner of such house, building or structure fails in due manner to comply with the requirements of the Board, the Board may thereupon carry out the work of demolition and removal prescribed and may recover from the owner of such house, building or structure the cost properly incurred in connection with the work or demolition and removal.

Vacation of dangerous building.

39. Where any house, building or structure in the opinion of the Board is in a dangerous condition or is endangered by the

condition of any other building the Board may require the occupier of such house, building or structure to vacate it and if a requirement of the Board to vacate any house, building or structure under this Bye-law is not forthwith complied with the Board may bring the matter before a court of Summary Jurisdiction and upon sufficient cause being shown may obtain from the Court an order for the ejection from the house, building or structure of the occupier thereof.

40. Any person failing to comply with or committing an offence against the provisions of these Bye-laws shall be liable, where no other penalty is herein prescribed to a fine not exceeding Two POUNDS for each offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further fine not exceeding FIVE SHILLINGS for each day on which the breach or offence continues after written notice of the said breach or offence or order of the Board has been duly served upon him. Penalty.

41. Sections 5 to 9 of the Board of Health (East Falkland Island) Consolidated Bye-laws, 1921 are hereby repealed. Repeal.

An Ordinance

To amend the law relating to the grant of Pensions, Gratuities and other Allowances to persons who have been in the Public Service of the Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Enacting Clause.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Pensions (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929, and shall be read and construed as one with the Pensions Ordinance, 1927.

Short Title.

2. A public officer who has served in the Colony and who becomes subsequently a Governor or High Commissioner of a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate, or of a territory under a British mandate, or in India, shall be eligible to receive a pension in respect of his service in the Colony on his retirement in any circumstances rendering him eligible for a pension under the Imperial Pensions (Governors of Dominions, &c.) Acts, or any Act replacing or amending the same.

Officer who becomes a Governor may receive pension in circumstances rendering him eligible under the Imperial Pensions Acts.

To amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

Enacting Clause.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Licensing (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929, and shall be read and construed as one with the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

Repeal and replacement of Clause 8 of Ordinance No. 11 of 1882.

2. Clause 8 of the Licensing Ordinance, 1882. is hereby repealed and replaced by the following clause.

8. A wholesale license shall authorise the licensee to sell any liquor in any quantity on the premises specified in the licence, which, if more than one, must be contiguous to each other provided that no liquor so sold shall be consumed on the said premises.

Amendment of Schedule to Ordinance No. 11 of 1882.

3. Form No. 4 – Wholesale Licence – in the Schedule to the Licensing Ordinance, 1882, shall be amended by the omission of the words “not less than two gallons” after the words “to sell liquor in any quantity” and by the addition of the words “provided that no liquor sold under this license is consumed on the aforesaid premises” after the words (in brackets) “here describe the locality”.

An Ordinance

To declare the Law relating to the Naturalization of Foreign Subjects.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Local Naturalization Ordinance, 1929". Short Title.
2. An alien who has resided in the Colony or in any Dependency thereof or who has been in the service of the Crown for a term in either case of not less than three years and who when locally naturalized intends to reside in the Colony or in any Dependency thereof or to serve under the Crown may apply to the Governor in Council for a certificate of local naturalization. Qualifications for naturalization.
3. The applicant shall make his application in the form of the first schedule to this Ordinance and shall support his application by such evidence as the Governor in Council may require, and the Governor in Council, if satisfied with the evidence adduced, shall take the case of the applicant into consideration, and may grant or withhold a certificate of local naturalization as he may think most conducive to the public good. The said certificate shall be in the form of the second schedule to this Ordinance and shall not be issued until it has been registered. Form of application, evidence required, and grant of certificate.
4. Before a certificate of local naturalization is granted the applicant shall take the oath of allegiance before the Governor and shall subscribe his name thereto in the oath book, and when such certificate is granted to him he shall to all intents and purposes whatsoever be entitled, within the limits of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof, to all the privileges and shall be subject to all the obligations of a British-born subject of His Majesty. Oath of allegiance to be taken.

Fees to be paid.

5. There shall be paid to the Treasurer in respect of a certificate of local naturalization the sum of Three Pounds and for every certified copy of the same the sum of One Pound.

Revocation of certificate of local naturalization.

6. (1) Where the Governor in Council is satisfied that a certificate of local naturalization granted under this Ordinance has been obtained by false representations or fraud, or by concealment of material circumstances or that the person to whom the certificate is granted has shown himself by act or speech to be disaffected or disloyal to His Majesty, the Governor in Council shall by order revoke the certificate.

(2) Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions the Governor in Council shall by order revoke a certificate of local naturalization granted under this Ordinance in any case in which he is satisfied that the person to whom the certificate was granted either -

(a) has during any war in which His Majesty is engaged unlawfully traded or communicated with the enemy or with the subject of an enemy state, or been engaged in or associated with any business which is to his knowledge carried on in such manner as to assist the enemy in such war; or

(b) has within five years of the date of the grant of the certificate been sentenced by any court in His Majesty's dominions to imprisonment for a term of not less than twelve months, or to a term of penal servitude, or to a fine of not less than one hundred pounds; or

(c) was not of good character at the date of the grant of the certificate; or

(d) has since the date of the grant of the certificate been for a period of not less than seven years ordinarily resident out of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof otherwise than as a representative of a British subject, firm, or company carrying on business, or an institution established in His Majesty's dominions or in the service of the Crown, and has not maintained substantial connection with the Colony or with the Dependencies thereof; or

(e) remains according to the law of a state at war with His Majesty a subject of that state: and that (in any case) the continuance of the certificate is not conducive to the public good.

(3) The Governor in Council may, if he thinks fit, before making an order under this section refer the case for such inquiry as is hereinafter specified and in any case to which subsection (1) or paragraph (a), (c), or (e) of subsection (2) of this section applies the Governor in Council shall, by notice given to or sent to the last-known address of the holder of the certificate give him an opportunity of claiming that the case be referred for such inquiry, and if the holder so claims in accordance with the notice the Governor in Council shall refer the case for inquiry accordingly.

(4) An inquiry under this section shall be held by a committee constituted for the purpose by the

Governor in Council and shall be conducted in such manner as the Governor in Council may direct :

Provided that any such inquiry may, if the Governor in Council thinks fit, instead of being held as aforesaid be held by a Judge of the Supreme Court and the practice and procedure on any inquiry so held shall be regulated by rules of court. A committee appointed under this section shall have all such powers, rights, and privileges as are vested in the Supreme Court or in any Judge thereof on the occasion of any action, in respect of the following matters :—

(a) The enforcing the attendance of witnesses and examining them on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, and the issue of a commission or a request to examine witnesses abroad ; and

(b) the compelling the production of documents ; and

(c) The punishing persons guilty of contempt ; and a summons signed by one or more members of the committee may be substituted for and shall be equivalent to any formal process capable of being issued in any action for enforcing the attendance of witnesses and compelling the production of documents.

- (5) Where the Governor in Council revokes a certificate of local naturalization, the revocation shall have effect from such date as the Governor in Council may direct, and thereupon the certificate shall be given up and cancelled and any person refusing or neglecting to give up his certificate shall be liable on summary conviction before a Magistrate to a fine not exceeding One hundred pounds.

7. (1) Where a certificate of local naturalization is revoked the Governor in Council may by order direct that the wife and minor children (or any of them) of the person whose certificate is revoked shall cease to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof, and the wife or child, as the case may be, shall thereupon be regarded as an alien within the limits of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof, but, except where the Governor in Council directs as aforesaid, the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof possessed by the wife and minor children of the person whose certificate is revoked shall not be affected by the revocation and they shall continue to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof :

Effect of revocation of a certificate of local naturalization.

Provided that—

- (a) It shall be lawful for the wife of any such person within six months after the date of the order of revocation to make a declaration of alienage and thereupon she and any minor children of her husband and herself shall cease to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof ;

(b) The Governor in Council shall not make any such order as aforesaid in the case of a wife who was at birth a British Subject unless he is satisfied that if she had held a certificate of local naturalization in her own right the certificate could properly have been revoked under this Ordinance, and the provisions of this Ordinance as to referring cases for enquiry shall apply to the making of any such order as they apply to the revocation of a certificate.

(2) The provisions of this section shall, as respects persons affected thereby, have effect in substitution for the provisions of section 8 of this Ordinance as to the effect upon the wife and minor children of any person who ceases to possess the local status of British subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof in accordance with that section and the provisions of that section shall accordingly not apply in any such case.

(3) Where a certificate of local naturalization is revoked, the former holder thereof shall be regarded within the limits of the Colony and of the Dependencies thereof as an alien and as a subject of the state to which he belonged at the time the certificate was granted.

Loss of nationality by foreign naturalization.

8. A person locally naturalized under this Ordinance who, when in any foreign state and not under disability, by obtaining a certificate of naturalization or by any other voluntary and formal act becomes naturalized therein, shall thenceforth be deemed to have ceased to possess the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof, and the wife and every minor child of that person shall thereupon also cease to possess that status.

Repeal of Ordinance No. 5 of 1900. and No. 6 of 1928.

9. The Alien Ordinance, 1900, and the Alien (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928, are hereby repealed :

Provided that no rights or privileges as respects the local status of British Subject in the Colony and in the Dependencies thereof acquired by any person under the Aliens Ordinance, 1900, shall be regarded as cancelled by this Ordinance except in the manner therein prescribed.

Application to Dependencies.

10. This Ordinance shall apply alike to the Colony and to the Dependencies thereof.

An Ordinance

To declare the Law relating to Aliens and Destitute Immigrants.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Alien Ordinance, 1929. Short Title.
2. An alien coming from outside the Colony shall not land in the Colony unless he complies with the following conditions, that is to say:- Admission of aliens.
 - (1) He is in a position to support himself and his dependents;
 - (2) He is not a lunatic, idiot, or mentally deficient;
 - (3) He is not the subject of a certificate given by a medical officer in the service of the Government of the Colony that for medical reasons it is undesirable that he should be permitted to land in the Colony ;
 - (4) He has not been sentenced in a foreign country for any crime which would be a ground for extradition from the Colony ; or
 - (5) He has not been prohibited from landing in the Colony by order of the Governor.
3. Every alien shall within a week after his landing in the Colony register his name, occupation, country and last residence at the office of the Police Magistrate. Registration of aliens.
4. When any person arrives in the Colony under an engagement to serve any person, firm, company, association or body of persons in any capacity and within a period of twelve months from the date of his arrival becomes chargeable to the Colony the person, Liability of employers for bringing persons.

firm, company, association or body of persons with whom the engagement as aforesaid was made shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred on behalf of such person including hospital costs and charges and the cost of his removal from the Colony.

Liabilities of ship-masters for discharged or abandoned seamen.

5. When any seaman is discharged from a ship in the Colony without the sanction of the Shipping Master and without reasonable provision having been made as to his subsistence or not being a deserter is wrongfully left behind in the Colony and within a period of six months from the date of being so discharged or wrongfully left behind becomes chargeable to the Colony the master of the ship from which such seaman has been so discharged or wrongfully left behind shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred on behalf of such seaman including hospital costs and charges and the cost of his removal from the Colony.

Liability of ship-masters bringing destitute persons.

6. The master of any ship, British or foreign, which brings into the Colony any person, not having been shipwrecked, who at the time of his landing is destitute of means of subsistence shall be liable to repay to the Government of the Colony all costs and charges incurred on behalf of such person unless the master of any ship aforesaid satisfies the Police Magistrate that he had made due enquiry and had sufficient reason to believe that such person was possessed of means of subsistence when he arrived in the Colony:

Provided that where the person so brought into the Colony came as a stowaway the master of any ship as aforesaid shall not be liable to repay the said costs and charges if such person is promptly handed over to the Chief Constable on the arrival of the ship and no money or compensation in respect of the passage of such person is paid or received.

Liability of owner in absence of shipmaster.

7. In the absence of the master of any ship or if the master of any ship departs from the Colony before he repays the costs and charges as aforesaid in the two preceding sections of this Ordinance the owner, agent and consignee of the ship at the time of the discharging, wrongfully leaving behind or landing of the seaman or person as aforesaid shall be liable jointly and severally to repay the costs and charges as aforesaid to the Government of the Colony.

Recovery of costs.

8. The costs and charges as aforesaid in the four preceding sections of this Ordinance shall be recoverable by suit as if an express agreement to repay them had been entered into with the Colonial Secretary by the person, firm, company, association, body, master, owner, agent or consignee chargeable.

Penalty.

9. Any person who acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an offence under this Ordinance and shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment.

An Ordinance

To provide for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, 1929. Short Title.
2. In this Ordinance the term "Animal" shall mean any domestic or captured animal or bird. Definition.
3. Any person who cruelly beats, ill-treats, over-drives, over-rides, starves, grossly neglects, abuses or tortures any animal, or who works any animal when it is unfit for work or who causes or permits any animal being the owner thereof to be cruelly beaten, ill-treated, over-driven, over-ridden, starved, grossly neglected, abused or tortured, or to be worked when it is unfit for work shall be liable on conviction for the first offence to a fine not exceeding ten pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding three months and for the second and every subsequent offence to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment: Penalty for ill-treatment.
4. Any person who unlawfully and maliciously kills, maims, wounds or mutilates any animal shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment. Penalty for malicious killing and wounding.

Provided that where a person continues to use an animal as aforesaid for the purpose of completing a journey and has no reasonable opportunity of obtaining another animal for the purpose he shall not be deemed to have committed an offence under this Ordinance.

Penalty for brutal slaughtering.

5. Any person who slaughters or who causes or permits to be slaughtered any animal in such a way as to cause unnecessary suffering to the animal slaughtered shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment.

Compensation for damage done.

6. If any person by committing an offence under this Ordinance causes any damage or injury to be done to any animal and is not the owner thereof he shall be liable on conviction under section 3 or 4 of this Ordinance to pay the owner of the animal such sum of money by way of compensation as the Court may adjudge in addition to any fine or imprisonment which the Court may inflict in respect of the offence.

Reward to informer.

7. In any proceeding under this Ordinance the Court, if it so thinks fit, may order that a portion of the fine inflicted upon any person convicted of an offence under this Ordinance, not exceeding the one-half thereof, shall be paid to the person not being a police officer who has given the information leading to the conviction.

Power of Court to dispose of injured animal.

8. Where it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Court on a certificate signed by a qualified Veterinary Officer or in any proceeding under this Ordinance that any animal is mortally injured or so diseased or in such a physical condition that it is cruel to keep it alive the Court may order that the animal shall be destroyed in the manner which the Court directs and no compensation whatever shall be payable for or in respect of any animal so destroyed to the owner thereof or to any other person.

Power of Governor to dispose of stray or abandoned animal.

9. Where it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Governor that any animal is stray or abandoned such animal may be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Governor may direct.

Governor in Council may make regulations.

10. The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations for the following purposes and when made may repeal or amend such regulations:-

(1) For ensuring for animals carried by sea a proper supply of food and water and proper ventilation during the passage and on landing ;

(2) For securing for any animals a proper supply of food and water during any period of detention prior to or consequent on embarkation or disembarkation ;

(3) For protecting any animals from unnecessary suffering during embarkation or disembarkation ; and

(4) For the prevention of export of any diseased or wounded animals or of any animals suffering with broken or dislocated limbs.

During the year a sum of £9,000 was transferred to Falklands Revenue, Head X, from Dependencies funds towards the cost of Central Administration of the Colony. With the above-mentioned sum of £9,000 included therein the Ordinary Revenue for the year amounted to £51,011 : 7 : 6.

7. The total Revenue for the Falklands for the year, including Land Sales (£22,839 : 8 : 5) and Marine Insurance Fund (£106) amounted to £73,956 : 15 : 11.

8. The total Expenditure for the Falklands, exclusive of payments made from the Land Sales Fund, amounted to £68,902 : 13 : 2. This amount exceeded the Ordinary Revenue for the year by a sum of £17,891 : 5 : 8, which excess was met from Surplus Balances.

9. On the 1st January, 1928, the Surplus Ordinary Revenue that had accumulated to the credit of the Falklands in the General Account of the Colony amounted to £41,396 : 7 : 9, which added to the Ordinary Revenue for the year (£51,011 : 7 : 6) makes a total of £92,407 : 15 : 3. This amount less the total Expenditure for the year (£68,902 : 13 : 2) leaves a surplus balance of Ordinary Revenue to the credit of the Falklands on the 31st December, 1928, of £23,505 : 2 : 1.

10. The total Ordinary Revenue for the Falklands for the year (£42,011 : 7 : 6) excluding Dependencies contribution of £9,000, was more than the Ordinary Revenue collected in the preceding year by a sum of £692 : 15 : 9. The Revenue exceeded the original estimate for the year 1928 by a sum of £1,493 : 7 : 6. The following Heads of Revenue exceeded the original estimate for 1928 by a sum of £3,201 : 10 : 11.

15. On the 1st January, 1928, the Land Sales Fund amounted to £194,123 : 7 : 9. During the year a further sum of £22,839 : 8 : 5 was received, which was £16,216 : 8 : 5 over the original Estimate for 1928. The increase was due to the sale of the Experimental Farm, completion of sale of Carcass and Jason Islands, and sale of Passage Islands.

16. Disbursements from the Fund during the year amounted £1,360 : 14 : 7 or £3,300 : 5 : 5 less than the original Estimate for 1928, and were made up as follows:—

17. The balance standing to the credit of the Land Sales Fund on the 31st December, 1928, was £215,602 : 1 : 7.

18. On the 31st December, 1928, the cost price of the securities held by the Crown Agents on behalf of the Land Sales Fund amounted to £211,952 : 19 : 8. The Fund was therefore under-invested on that date by a sum of £3,649 : 1 : 11. £1,200 of this sum is on loan to sheep farmers for farm improvements, and the balance amounting to £2,449 : 1 : 11 is held in the General Account of the Colony in order to finance the scheme for granting loans to assist house building in Stanley.

19. During the year interest amounting to £8,761 : 10 : 6 was received from Land Sales Fund Investments and credited to Revenue under Head V. It was over the original Estimate for 1928 by £411 : 10 : 6.

Farm Improvement Loans.

20. On the 1st January, 1928, the balance outstanding was £800. During the year a further loan of £500 was made to Mr. C. P. W. Bender of Moody Valley, and repayments amounting to £100 were received, leaving a balance outstanding on the 31st December, 1928, of £1,200. Interest received during the year amounted to £31 and this amount was credited to Revenue under Head V.

Marine Insurance Fund.

21. On the 1st January, 1928, the amount standing to the credit of the Marine Insurance Fund was £2,636. During the year a sum of £106 was charged against Falklands Expenditure (Head VII Port & Marine, "A" Harbour) and credited to Falklands Revenue Head XIII, bringing the total of the Fund up to £2,742 on the 31st December, 1928. The Fund is not invested.

The Dependencies.

22. The Ordinary Revenue of the Dependencies, exclusive of the Research and Development Fund, amounted during the year to £194,153 : 9 : 11. It exceeded Dependencies Expenditure for the year (£122,102 : 16 : 11) by a sum of £72,050 : 13 : 0, and this amount was transferred from Dependencies General Account to the credit of the Research and Development Fund.

23. The Ordinary Revenue for the Dependencies for the year amounted to £194,153 : 9 : 11. It exceeded the original Estimate by a sum of £33,198 : 9 : 11, but was £11,905 : 10 : 4 less than in 1927.

29. Refunds of Export Duty on Whale Oil made to Whaling Companies during the year amounted to £106,786 : 16 : 4 or £46,586 : 16 : 4 more than the amount originally estimated. This excess was due to the fact that excess Revenue amounting to £31,195 : 12 : 0 was received during the same period, which involved a proportionate increase in refunds, and to the fact that certain refunds were made during the year in respect of Revenue received in 1927.

30. The total Expenditure in connection with the Dependencies for the year, exclusive of Refunds of Export Duty, amounted to £15,316 : 0 : 7.

31. During the year certain amounts were entered in the Dependencies General Account as "Charges on Dependencies Revenue" when transferred to the credit of the Research and Development Fund. The total so transferred was £72,050 : 13 : 0, being the amount mentioned in paragraph 22.

THE FALKLAND ISLANDS DEFENCE FORCE CLUB.

-:- Rules. -:-

1. The Club shall be called the Falkland Islands Defence Force Club, and shall consist of :-

- (a) Members at the date of the passing of these Rules.
- (b) Members of the Force, whether registered on the Active, Reserve, or Retired lists.
- (c) Holders of the Long Service Medal.
- (d) Members of the Falkland Islands Volunteer Force awarded the 1914 Service Badge.

Provided that the following may be admitted as temporary members :-

- (a) Warrant and Petty Officers of His Majesty's Navy, N.C.O's of the Army, the Royal Marines and Air Force being on full pay whilst in Stanley.
- (b) Persons not resident in the town of Stanley, with the approval of the Committee and on payment of a fee of 5/- per month or any part thereof.

2. The management of the property, finances and civil affairs of the Club shall be under a Committee composed of the Officer Commanding the Defence Force and six members

to be elected at the Annual General Meeting. The elected members of the Committee shall hold Office in the following manner. Two members shall retire each year in rotation, the order for retirement during the first three years to be decided by ballot. Retiring members shall be eligible for re-election. Casual vacancies during the course of a year may be filled by the Committee until the next Annual General Meeting. The Committee shall appoint two of their number to act respectively as Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer, and any four of the Committee shall form a quorum. The Commanding Officer shall be President and Chairman *ex-officio* of all Committees.

3. A Club Steward shall be appointed by the Committee, subject to the approval of the Officer Commanding, and acting under the orders of the Committee, the Steward shall be responsible for the due orderly conduct of the Club.

4. The Club rooms and property shall be for the use of the Club members only. No guests shall be admitted to the Club except with the approval of the Governor.

5. Any member who is a defaulter, or who misconducts himself as a member of the Club, shall be deprived of the privileges of the Club, for so long as the Commanding Officer directs.

6. During the months of March to September, inclusive, the Club rooms shall be open from 6.0 p.m. to midnight, and for the remainder of the year from 7 p.m. to midnight on weekdays and from noon to 6 p.m. on Sundays, subject to any extension made by the Committee or with the approval of the Commanding Officer and subject to any restriction that may be made by order of the Governor. Refreshments will not be served after 10.0 p.m. on weekdays and only between the hours of 12.0 noon and 1.0 p.m. and 4.30 p.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Sundays.

7. No liquor shall be taken away from the Club premises and no liquor supplied to anyone not being a member or temporary member.

8. All money matters shall be managed by the Committee and all orders for goods placed under their direction.

9. The Committee shall have power to deal with and decide upon any matter relating to the Falkland Islands Defence Force Club not embodied in these Rules.

10. The Rules of the 10th of April, 1923, made under the provisions of the Defence Force Ordinance, 1920, are hereby superseded.

A Bill

To amend the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, as amended by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :-

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929", and shall be read and construed as one with the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921, as amended by the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922.

Repeal and replacement of Section 4 of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922.

2. Section 4 of the Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, 1922, is hereby repealed and replaced by the following Section :-

"4. Where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the Legislature of any British possession or any territory under His Majesty's protection for the enforcement within such possession or territory of Maintenance Orders made by Courts in the Falkland Islands, the Governor may by Proclamation extend this Ordinance to such possession or territory, and this Ordinance shall thereupon apply in respect of such possession or territory as though the references to England or Ireland were references to such possession or territory and the references to the Secretary of State for the Colonies were references to the Governor of such possession or territory."

A Bill

To amend the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, 1929.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, thereof as follows:-

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Amendment) Ordinance, 1929", and shall be read and construed as one with the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, 1929. Short Title.

2. Any person convicted of a contravention of any regulation made by the Governor in Council under Section 10 of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance, No. 6 of 1929, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment. Penalty for breach of Regulations.

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Live Stock Report, 1928-29.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit the following report for the year 1928-1929.

The weather was good at the beginning of lambing; some rough weather was experienced during lamb-marking and many stations were held up during shearing owing to exceptionally bad weather at that time.

The season has been good as regards growth of grass, and where it has been given a chance, the grass has seeded well. As I have stated in a previous report (1st February, 1929) I consider that there is too much burning being done. I admit that the immediate result of burning is a good growth of tender green grass, for a short time, but the eventual result is general deterioration of the pasture. Much could also be done in the matter of fencing; if the runs were sub-divided into smaller paddocks the grazing could be systematically arranged, thereby giving the pasture a better chance to recover, and incidentally the shepherding could be done more easily and efficiently.

The Live Stock Ordinance 1901, makes necessary the dipping of all sheep *once* a year. I am of opinion that this dipping is insufficient. Four stations have, during this year been placed in quarantine for lice, the necessary instructions for dipping etc. have been given, and it will be necessary that these stations be again visited and the sheep examined in the coming spring. Most of the flocks, particularly on the East Falkland, are very "ticky". Sheep in this condition cannot be expected to thrive, and as the one dip does not seem to keep the flocks even passably clean I would suggest that dipping off the shears in addition to the one already enforced should be made compulsory as I feel sure that the farmers would benefit thereby.

On some stations quite a large number of old sheep are being carried, far better I think to cull these out and make room for younger and more vigorous sheep giving a greater return for their keep. Lambs should also be culled, and more frequent importations of rams would assist greatly in improving the type of sheep being run on many places.

The stock, implements, seed etc. on the Experimental Farm were disposed of by auction on 1st June 1928. The farmers availed themselves of this opportunity to acquire Pedigree Stock and modern farm implements. Some of the seed purchased at this sale was sown under my supervision and the results have so far been satisfactory. I have also been round to the different stations and instructed them in the use of the implements. It is gratifying to see that more land is being broken up.

The mustering of the Wickham Heights on the East, seems to have been a stumbling block for many years. Owing to the very rugged nature of the country it is practically impossible to take out and erect fencing on the boundary lines shown on the chart. The farmers holding sections running into these mountains are naturally unwilling to fence them off, as a sort of "no man's land". I would therefore suggest that co-operation at mustering would help in obtaining better and cleaner musters.

Stanley Common.

The position as regards grazing of the Common has become acute. A special report and recommendations regarding this matter has previously been submitted by me.

Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations.

(For Officers on the Permanent Establishment).

(Consolidating and amending the Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations dated the 1st of May, 1928, 15th of March, 1929 and 11th of September, 1929).

—:O:—

ARNOLD HODSON,

23rd September, 1929.

Leave.

1. No officer shall be allowed to take full pay vacation leave before he has completed two consecutive years of resident service, except on the grounds of urgent private affairs or serious indisposition. Subject to this condition and to the necessities of the Service, officers on the Permanent Establishment may be granted four months' full pay vacation leave for each period of two and a half years' resident service. Such leave may not be accumulated and will in the ordinary course be granted at the end of each period of two and a half years' resident service. It may, at the discretion of the Governor, be granted after two years' resident service but in that case the officer concerned will not become entitled to a further period of vacation leave until he has completed a further period of three years' resident service.

2. In the case of officers who have completed two or more years' consecutive resident service spending their leave in some place other than the Colony or South America, the time necessarily taken on the journey to and from such place (not exceeding four weeks) shall not be reckoned as leave.

Provided that the time necessarily taken on a journey to or from the United Kingdom including any break of journey in South America or any other place shall be deemed to be four weeks.

3. Short periods of absence from duty owing to sickness or for purposes of relaxation will be allowed on full pay, in accordance with any special rules on the subject, without affecting full pay vacation leave.

4. An officer will be required to embark for the Falkland Islands by the first steamer leaving the place where he is spending his leave after the date on which his leave of absence expires, and will be allowed pay at the rate which he is then drawing for any days which may elapse between the expiration of his leave and the departure of the steamer, provided that if there is a later steamer which is timed to arrive at his destination before the first one, he will be required to proceed by the later one. Extension of leave will date from the expiration of the original leave, and not from the day on which the officer would have had to embark if his leave had not been extended.

5. Any circumstances not covered by these regulations will be governed by the Colonial Regulations.

Passage.

6. Free passages to the United Kingdom for himself and for his wife and children up to a maximum of three full return passages will be allowed to an officer who has been granted leave under the above regulations and whose initial rate of salary is not less than £200 a year. Officers whose initial salary is less than £200 a year will be eligible to receive

half the cost of such return passages, or if they prefer it, to receive free passages on their return journey. Alternatively officers whose initial salary is less than £200 a year, if appointed from the United Kingdom, will be allowed by accumulation return passages after five years' resident service.

7. Passages to and from the United Kingdom will be provided in the normal course by the direct route and will not be provided except in special circumstances to be determined by the Governor by the longer route via the west coast of South America. When the officer desires in the absence of such special circumstances to proceed by the longer route he will be granted towards the cost of his passage the equivalent amount only of the cost of a passage by the direct route.

8. Where the officer does not proceed to the United Kingdom by the direct route or by the longer route in the special circumstances above mentioned he will be granted towards the cost of his passage an amount not exceeding the equivalent amount of the cost of a passage by the direct route on the production of duly receipted vouchers in respect of the expenditure actually incurred. On no account will the officer be granted an amount in excess of the expenditure actually incurred on his passage by whatever route he may proceed.

9. Where the officer proceeds to or from the United Kingdom and breaks his journey at Montevideo in transhipment he will be allowed passages from or to Montevideo at the ordinary first class rate by the "D" service of the Royal Mail Steam Packet or by a line not more expensive than such service, irrespective of the cost of his passages to or from Montevideo from or to the Colony.

10. An officer spending his leave outside the Colony, but not in the United Kingdom, will be given free passages from and to the Colony for himself, his wife and his children, up to a maximum of three full return passages, and provided that the cost shall not exceed the amount that would have been payable under these regulations if the officer and his wife had proceeded to the United Kingdom.

11. The cost of passages for the members of an officer's family granted in accordance with the provisions of the preceding sections shall be payable only if they travel with him or shortly in advance of him, unless the Secretary of State or the Governor sees fit to make an exception to this rule for special reasons of health or otherwise.

12. In the case of officers with an initial rate of salary of not less than £400 the class of passage shall be first class and of other officers second class.

General.

13. The Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations do not apply to officers engaged on agreement with the Crown Agents for the Colonies even though they hold offices on the permanent establishment.

14. In the case of an officer who holds an office on the permanent establishment either on probation or for a stated period the Vacation Leave and Passage Regulations do not apply unless and until the officer is confirmed in the office or is retained for a further period.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of meeting held on the 26th April, 1929.

1. The Honourable J. Innes Moir, after taking the prescribed oath, assumed his seat at the Council.

2. The minutes of the meeting held on the 13th of November, 1928, were confirmed.

3. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the Table the following papers :—

- (i) Copies of certain Regulations, Orders and Bye-laws, made or approved by the Governor in Executive Council since the last meeting of the Legislative Council.
- (ii) Copies of despatches received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating the non-disallowance by His Majesty of Ordinances, Nos. 9, 11 and 12 of 1928.

4. The Honourable the Treasurer, by Command, laid on the Table the following papers :—

- (i) Comparative Statements of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Colony and the Dependencies for the period 1st January to 30th September, 1928, and 1st January to 31st December, 1928.
- (ii) Schedules of all Charges of an unusual or special description or not covered by the Appropriation law for the year 1928, incurred during the quarters ended the 30th of September, 1928, and the 31st of December, 1928.
- (iii) Monthly Abstracts of Cash Receipts and Payments of the "Discovery" Committee for the months of November and December, 1927.

5. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of the following Resolution :

"Whereas further provision is required for the service of the Colony and its Dependencies for the year ending the 31st of December, 1928.

Be it resolved -

This Council hereby sanctions the expenditure from public funds of the sum of fifty thousand, seven hundred and ninety-four Pounds, seventeen Shillings and Sevenpence, (£50,794 : 17 : 7.) to meet the several charges itemized in the accompanying schedule."

With regard to Head VI. TELEGRAPHS AND TELEPHONES, item 4, the Honourable G. J. Felton suggested that all private telephone camp lines in the Colony should be taken over for maintenance by the Government.

His Excellency informed the Honourable Member that the matter would be referred to the Superintendent of Telegraphs and Telephones for report upon the receipt of which the matter would receive careful consideration.

The Honourable G. J. Felton referring to the grant of free passages to officials on leave under the Revised Leave and Passage Regulations stated that he was of opinion that the salary limit entitling officials to first class passages was unnecessarily low and that he considered that the privilege of the first class passage should be confined to Heads of Departments.

The Honourable the Principal Medical Officer said that there were officers in his department whom he considered should be provided with first class passages although they were not heads of departments, namely, the Medical Officer and the Dental Surgeon. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary stated that the question also affected the Assistant Colonial Secretary whom he was of opinion should be provided with first class passages.

His Excellency informed the Honourable G. J. Felton that this question which required careful consideration would be gone into further.

With regard to Appendix I, item 7, Public Baths, the Honourable G. J. Felton asked whether the Government intended to carry through the proposed erection of Public Baths in the town of Stanley. His Excellency informed the Honourable Member that it was not proposed to proceed further with the erection of swimming baths but that a scheme for the construction of a building capable of accommodating 8 hot baths and a gymnasium had already received the approval of the Secretary of State. The Honourable G. J. Felton said that he did not think that there was sufficient justification for such a large expenditure in addition to which there would be further expenses in connection with upkeep and maintenance. His Excellency stated that the erection of such a building would be in the interests of public health as it would provide a much needed means for the development of the physique of the children of the Colony. It would further be of decided convenience to shepherds and others arriving in Stanley after long journeys in the Camp as there was at present no place where they could obtain the comforts of a hot bath. It would also teach the rising generation cleanliness.

The Honourable the Treasurer then seconded the adoption of the Resolution.

The Resolution was agreed to.

6. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the adoption of the following Resolution :—

“Whereas further provision is required for the service of the Colony and its Dependencies for the year ending the 31st of December, 1929.

Be it resolved -

This Council hereby sanctions the expenditure from public funds of the sum of One thousand, six hundred and seventeen pounds, sixteen shillings (£1,617 : 16 : 0) to meet the several charges itemized in the accompanying schedule.”

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

7. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in introducing a Bill “To amend the law relating to the grant of Pensions, Gratuities and other Allowances to persons who have been in the Public Service of the Colony,” stated that the law related solely to pensions of Governors and that the measure was being introduced in accordance with instructions received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies in order to bring the practice into line with other Colonies.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer the Bill was read a *first* time.

The *first* reading was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 and 2 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

8. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the *first* reading of the Bill “To amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882”. In doing so he said that the Bill was being introduced with a view to authorising the holder of a wholesale licence to sell any liquor in any quantity on the premises specified in the licence.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The *first* reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1, 2, and 3 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

9. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in moving the *first* reading of a Bill "To declare the Law relating to the Naturalization of Foreign Subjects", stated that the measure was being introduced on instructions received from the Secretary of State so as to bring the law regarding the naturalization of Foreign Subjects in the Falkland Islands into line with the law of other Colonies. As the Honourable Members were aware an Ordinance had been passed in 1928 amending the Alien Ordinance, 1900, but this was not in accordance with the wishes of the Secretary of State and it had therefore been re-modelled.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The *first* reading of the Bill was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 10 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

10. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary in introducing a Bill "To declare the Law relating to Aliens and Destitute Immigrants" explained that the measure was being put forward in accordance with instructions received from the Secretary of State.

On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer the Bill was read a *first* time.

The *first* reading was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 9 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

11. The Honourable the Colonial Secretary moved the *first* reading of a Bill "To provide for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals". In doing so he stated that the need for such legislation in the Colony was self evident.

The Honourable the Treasurer seconded.

The *first* reading was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clauses 1 to 4 were agreed to.

The following new clause was proposed and read a *first* time :—

“ 5. Any person who slaughters or who causes or permits to be slaughtered any animal in such a way as to cause unnecessary suffering to the animal slaughtered shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months or to both such fine and imprisonment.”

On question put the clause was read a *second* time and added to the Bill as Clause 5.

Clauses 6 to 10 were agreed to.

The title was agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

12. On the motion of the Honourable the Colonial Secretary seconded by the Honourable the Treasurer a Bill “To legalize certain payments made in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-eight in excess of the Expenditure sanctioned by Ordinance No. 1 of 1928”, was read a *first* time.

The *first* reading was agreed to.

On further motion made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended and the Bill was read a *second* time and committed.

Clause 1 was agreed to.

On motion made the consideration of Clause 2 was postponed until after consideration of the Schedule.

The Schedule was agreed to.

Clause 3 was recommitted and agreed to.

The preamble and title were agreed to.

The Council resumed.

The Bill was then read a *third* time and passed.

13. The Honourable G. J. Felton spoke with reference to the cost of central administration and pointed out that the amount of £9,000 which was received annually from Dependencies funds towards the cost of central administration had been granted for a fixed term only and that he believed that it had now expired. He suggested that having regard to the increased cost of central administration representations should be made to the Secretary of State with a view to increasing the Dependencies share of this cost.

The Council agreed that it was desirable that the contribution should be increased but His Excellency pointed out that authority had already been given to include in the Estimates for the year 1929 a sum of £9,000 and that shortly after his arrival in the Colony he had made representations to the Secretary of State with regard to this and other matters concerning the Dependencies. He did not see therefore what useful purpose would be served by addressing the Secretary of State further in the matter.

14. The Honourable G. J. Felton asked whether it had been possible to take any action with regard to his suggestion put forward at the last meeting in connection with the improvement of tracks. His Excellency informed the Honourable Member that a scheme for the construction of a road to the Naval Wireless Station had been put forward, and that he

was awaiting the approval of the Secretary of State to proceed further with the matter.

15. His Excellency stated that the Honourable J. M. Ellis was about to proceed to the United Kingdom on leave of absence and that he wished to record his appreciation of the invaluable help he had at all times received from the Honourable Member during his term of office in the Colony.

The Honourable the Treasurer associated himself with the remarks made by His Excellency.

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-Laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, amending the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island (Slaughterhouse and Inspection of Stock) Regulations, 1928.

Short Title.

1. These regulations may be cited as the "Board of Health for the East Falkland Island (Slaughterhouse and Inspection of Stock) (Amendment) Regulations, 1929".

Repeal and replacement of Sections 13, 18, 19, and 20, of the Board of Health for East Falkland Island (Slaughterhouse and Inspection of Stock) Regulations, 1928.

2. Sections 13, 18, 19, and 20 of the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island (Slaughterhouse and Inspection of Stock) Regulations, 1928, are hereby repealed and replaced by the following :

"13. In every slaughtering place the killing, dressing and hanging places shall be floored with concrete and the walls constructed of impervious materials."

"18. The road leading to the slaughterhouse shall be paved, metalled or boarded to the satisfaction of the Board".

"19. No hide, skins, or other portion of any carcass likely to become a nuisance shall be stored in any killing, dressing or hanging place. An incinerator or refuse destructor shall be provided for the destruction of condemned carcasses or hide trimmings and other waste or noxious matter."

"20. Proper and sufficient urinal and closet accommodation shall be provided to the satisfaction of the Board, such accommodation to be contained in a separate structure apart from the main building."

The Public Health Ordinance, 1894.

Bye-laws made by the Board of Health for the East Falkland Island, amending the Stanley Milk Supply Protection Bye-laws, 1928.

1. These Bye-laws may be cited as the "Stanley Milk Supply Protection (Amendment) Bye-laws, 1929." Short Title.

2. Sections 5 and 15 of the Stanley Milk Supply Protection Bye-laws, 1928, are hereby repealed and replaced by the following : Repeal and replacement of Sections 5 and 15 of Stanley Milk Supply Protection Bye-laws 1928.

"5. Any person who sells (a) Fresh Milk containing "less than 3 per centum of milk fat or less than 8.5 per centum of natural solids not fat : (b) Milk or cream, which "is dirty, adulterated or diluted with water or other liquid : " (c) Skimmed, separated, impoverished, or boiled milk for "fresh milk : (d) Milk or cream from any cow which is or is "suspected to be suffering from any form of Tuberculosis or "from any contagious or infectious disease : (e) Milk which "contains more than 200,000 organisms per c.c. or b.c.c. in "1/100 of c.c. or which has been heated : or (f) Milk or cream "from any cow which is or is suspected to be in an unhealthy "condition or from any cow which has calved less than three "days previously shall be guilty of an offence against these "Bye-laws."

"15. The Inspector so appointed shall be empowered "to enter places where cows are kept for the purpose, as "specified above, of inspecting cows, premises and utensils "and of taking samples of milk for examination at any time "before delivery to customers at reasonable hours between "sunrise and sunset. Such samples of milk shall be paid for."
