





Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council, under Section 63 of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

1. The exporter of any Whale or Seal Oil shall, within six calendar months from the date of the clearance outwards of the exporting vessel, deliver to the collector a certificate, in the form annexed hereto, of the quantity of oil landed or discharged from such exporting vessel, and shall make and subscribe a declaration to the truth of the said certificate.

Provided that the said certificate may be delivered to the Collector by a duly authorised agent for and on behalf and at the risk of the exporter; and further, it shall be lawful for the Collector, when it shall not be reasonably possible, in the opinion of the Collector, for the exporter to deliver the said certificate within the period above prescribed, to grant an extension of the period within which the said certificate shall be delivered.

- 2. If any Whale or Seal Oil exported from the Colony is landed or discharged from the exporting vessel at more than one portoutside the Colony, a separate certificate shall be delivered of the quantity landed or discharged at each port of landing or discharge.
- 3. If the exporter of any Whale or Seal Oil shall fail to comply with any of the foregoing requirements, he shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by article 31 of the Customs Ordinance, 1903.

Summary of year's transactions.

- 1. During the year ended 30th September, 1920, there were 102 new accounts opened and 80 closed, leaving a total of 806 depositors amongst whom the balance in hand (£128.385 7 10) was distributed. The average for each account was £159 17 8 or £56 18 8, per head of the population of the Falkland Islands.
- 2. The moneys deposited during the year amounted to £32,312 9 9d. as against £33,435 9 9, in the year ended 30th September, 1919.
- 3. The withdrawals amounted to £20,600 4 3., as against £42,444 10 10 in the previous year.



By His Excellency JOHN MIDDLETON, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by Section 44 of the Live Stock Ordinance, 1901, power is given to the Governor in Executive Council by Proclamation to prohibit the importation or introduction into the Colony or into any particular port thereof, of any sheep, cattle, horses or other animals, or of any hay, straw, fodder or other article either generally or from any places that may be named in such Proclamation for such periods as he may deem necessary for the purpose of preventing the introduction of any infectious and contagious disorder among sheep, cattle, horses or other animals in this Colony,

AND WHEREAS it has been officially reported that an infectious and contagious disease is prevailing in Chile and Argentina and it is expedient to take measures to prevent the introduction of this disease into the Falkland Islands,

NOW THEREFORE, in virtue of the powers in me vested by the Ordinance aforesaid, I do hereby in Executive Council order and proclaim as follows:

The importation or introduction into the Falkland Islands from Chile or Argentina of any animals except horses and dogs, of hay, chaff or other similar substance commonly used for food of animals, of straw or other similar substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals is prohibited.

The Proclamation of the sixth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and Twenty is hereby repealed.

- (1) The issue of licences to take and capture the Fur Seal has been suspended by Proclamation No. 1 of the 23rd of March, 1921.
- (2) Under Section 5 of the Seal Fishery Ordinance, 1899, any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against the Ordinance and shall be liable upon conviction to a penalty not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for each such offence and to forfeiture of any seals or skins found in his possession.
 - (a) Kills or captures or attempts to kill or capture any seal or carries or has in his possession any club, firearm, or other lethal weapon, or any engine, net trap or other device with intent to kill or capture any seal without a licence.
 - (b) Is in or upon any seal reserve with intent to kill or capture any seal therein.
 - (c) Has in his possession or in any ship under his command any seal or skin of which he cannot give a satisfactory account.
- (3) It is provided by Section 12 of the Ordinance aforesaid that one half of any penalty and of the value of any forfeiture recovered under the Ordinance shall be paid to the person who shall prosecute any offender against it or sue for such penalty or upon whose information such penalty is imposed.
- (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Ordinance aforesaid, special consideration, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, will be given to the payment of rewards, on a liberal scale to the person who shall prosecute any offender against the Ordinance, or sue for any penalty, or upon whose information any penalty is imposed.

A Bill to facilitate the enforcement in the Colony of Maintenance Orders made by courts in England and Ireland and vice versa.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkand Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1920."

Definitions.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation, for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependants of the person against whom the order is made, and the expression "dependants" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain; the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy, and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Enforcement in the Colony of maintenance orders made in England and Ireland.

- 3.—(1) Where a maintenance order has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, been made against any person by any court in England or Ireland, and a certified copy of the order has been transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Governor, the Governor shall send a copy of the order to the prescribed officer of a court in the Colony for registration; and on receipt thereof the order shall be registered in the prescribed manner, and shall, from the date of such registration, be of the same force and effect, and, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, all proceedings may be taken on such order as if it had been an order originally obtained in the court in which it is so registered, and that court shall have power to enforce the order accordingly.
- (2) The court in which an order is to be so registered as aforesaid shall, if the court by which the order was made was a court of superior jurisdiction, be the Supreme Court, and, if the court was not a court of superior jurisdiction, be a court of summary jurisdiction.
- Transmission of maintenance orders made in the Colony.
- 4. Where a court in the Colony has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, made a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved to that court that the person against whom the order was made is resident in England or Ireland, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State a certified copy of the order.

- 5.—(1). Where an application is made to a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony for a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved that that person is resident in England or Ireland the court may, in the absence of that person, it after hearing the evidence it is satisfied of the justice of the application, make any such order as it might have made if a summons had been duly served on that person and he had failed to appear at the hearing, but in such case the order shall be provisional only, and shall have no effect unless and until confirmed by a competent court in England or Ireland.
- (2) The evidence of any witness who is examined on any such application shall be put into writing, and such deposition shall be read over to and signed by him.
- (3) Where such an order is made, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, the depositions so taken and a certified copy of the order, together with a statement of the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order is made had been duly served with a summous and had appeared at the hearing, and such information as the court possesses for facilitating the identification of that person, and ascertaining his whereabouts.
- (4) Where any such provisional order has come before a court in England or Ireland for confirmation, and the order has by that court been remitted to the court of summary jurisdiction which made the order for the purpose of taking further evidence, that court or any other court of summary jurisdiction sitting and acting for the same place shall, after giving the prescribed notice, proceed to take the evidence in like manner and subject to the like conditions as the evidence in support of the original application.

If upon the hearing of such evidence it appears to the court that the order ought not to have been made, the court may rescind the order, but in any other case the depositions shall be sent to the Secretary of State and dealt with in like manner as the original depositions.

- (5) The confirmation of an order made under this section shall not affect any power of a court of summary jurisdiction to vary or rescind that order: Provided that on the making of a varying or rescinding order the court shall send a certified copy thereof to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, and that in the case of an order varying the original order the order shall not have any effect unless and until confirmed in like manner as the original order.
- (6) The applicant shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against a refusal to make a provisional order as he would have had against a refusal to make the order had a summons been duly served on the person against whom the order is sought to be made.
- 6.—(1) Where a maintenance order has been made by a court in England or Ireland, and the order is provisional only and has no effect unless and until confirmed by a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony, and a certified copy of the order, together with the depositions of witnesses and a statement of the grounds on which the order might have been opposed has been transmitted to the Governor, and it appears to the Governor that the person against whom the order was made is resident in the Colony, the Governor may send the said documents to the prescribed officer of a court of summary jurisdiction, with a requisition that a summons be issued calling upon the person to show cause why that order should not be confirmed, and upon receipt of such documents and requisition the court shall issue such a summons and cause it to be served upon such person.

Power to make provisional orders of maintenance against persons resident in England or Ireland.

Power of court of summary jurisdiction to confirm maintenance order made by courts in England and Ireland.

- (2) A summons so issued may be served in the Colony in the same manner as if it had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the person happens to be.
- (3) At the hearing it shall be open to the person on whom the summons was served to raise any defence which he might have raised in the original proceedings had he been a party thereto, but no other defence, and the certificate from the court which made the provisional order stating the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order was made had been a party to the proceedings shall be conclusive evidence that those grounds are grounds on which objection may be taken.
- (4) If at the hearing the person served with the summons does not appear or, on appearing, fails to satisfy the court that the order ought not to be confirmed, the court may confirm the order either without modification or with such modifications as to the court after hearing the evidence may seem just.
- (5) If the person against whom the summons was issued appears at the hearing and satisfies the court that for the purpose of any defence it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the provisional order for the taking of any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.
- (6) Where a provisional order has been confirmed under this section, it may be varied or rescinded in like manner as if it had originally been made by the confirming court, and where on an application for recission or variation the court is satisfied that it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the order for the purpose of taking any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.
- (7) Where an order has been so confirmed, the person bound thereby shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against the confirmation of the order as he would have had against the making of the order had the order been an order made by the court confirming the order.
- 7. The Secretary of State may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.
- 8.—(1) A court of summary jurisdiction in which an order has been registered under this Ordinance or by which an order has been confirmed under this Ordinance, and the officers of such court, shall take all such steps for enforcing the order as may be
- (2) Every such order shall be enforceable in like manner as if the order were for the payment of a civil debt recoverable summarily:

Provided that if the order is of such a nature that if made by the court in which it is so registered, or by which it is so confirmed, it would be enforceable in like manner as an order of affiliation, the order shall be so enforceable.

(3) A warrant of distress or commitment issued by a court of summary jurisdiction for the purpose of enforcing any order so registered or confirmed may be executed in any part of the Colony in the same manner as if the warrant had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the warrant is executed.

Power of Secretary of State to make regulations for faciliating communications between courts.

9. The Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902 shall apply to proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance in like manner as it applies to proceedings under that Ordinance, and the power of the Chief Justice to make rules under section seventy of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, shall include power to make rules regulating the procedure of courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Application of Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

10. Any document purporting to be signed by a judge or officer of a court in England or Ireland shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been so signed without proof of the signature or judicial or official character of the person appearing to have signed it, and the officer of a court by whom a document is signed shall until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been the proper officer of the court to sign the document.

Proof of documents signed by officers of court.

11. Depositions taken in a court in England or Ireland for the purpose of this Ordinance may be received in evidence in proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.



- (3) Where such an order is made, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, the depositions so taken and a certified copy of the order, together with a statement of the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order is made had been duly served with a summons and had appeared at the hearing, and such information as the court possesses for facilitating the identification of that person, and ascertaining his whereabouts.
- Where any such provisional order has come before a court in England or Ireland for confirmation, and the order has by that court been remitted to the court of summary jurisdiction which made the order for the purpose of taking further evidence, that court or any other court of summary jurisdiction sitting and acting for the same place shall, after giving the prescribed notice, proceed to take the evidence in like manner and subject to the like conditions as the evidence in support of the original application.

If upon the hearing of such evidence it appears to the court that the order ought not to have been made, the court may rescind the order, but in any other case the depositions shall be sent to the Secretary of State and dealt with in like manner as the original depositions.

- (5) The confirmation of an order made under this section shall not affect any power of a court of summary jurisdiction to vary or rescind that order: Provided that on the making of a varying or rescinding order the court shall send a certified copy thereof to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, and that in the case of an order varying the original order the order shall not have any effect unless and until confirmed in like manner as the original order.
- (6) The applicant shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against a refusal to make a provisional order as he would have had against a refusal to make the order had a summons been duly served on the person against whom the order is sought to be made.
- 6.—(1) Where a maintenance order has been made by a court in England or Ireland, and the order is provisional only and has no effect unless and until confirmed by a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony, and a certified copy of the order, together with the depositions of witnesses and a statement of the grounds on which the order might have been opposed has been transmitted to the Governor, and it appears to the Governor that the person against whom the order was made is resident in the Colony, the Governor may send the said documents to the prescribed officer of a court of summary jurisdiction, with a requisition that a summons be issued calling upon the person to show cause why that order should not be confirmed, and upon receipt of such documents and requisition the court shall issue such a summons and cause it to be served upon such person.

Power of court of summary jurisdiction to confirm maintenance order made by courts in England and Ireland.

- (2) A summons so issued may be served in the Colony in the same manner as if it had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the person happens to be.
- (3) At the hearing it shall be open to the person on whom the summons was served to raise any defence which he might have raised in the original proceedings had he been a party thereto, but no other defence, and the certificate from the court which made the provisional order stating the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order was made had been a party to the proceedings shall be conclusive evidence that those grounds are grounds on which objection may be taken.
- (4) If at the hearing the person served with the summons does not appear or, on appearing, fails to satisfy the court that the order ought not to be confirmed, the court may confirm the order either without modification or with such modifications as to the court after hearing the evidence may seem just.
- (5) If the person against whom the summons was issued appears at the hearing and satisfies the court that for the purpose of any defence it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the provisional order for the taking of any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.
- (6) Where a provisional order has been confirmed under this section, it may be varied or rescinded in like manner as if it had originally been made by the confirming court, and where on an application for recission or variation the court is satisfied that it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the order for the purpose of taking any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.
- 7) Where an order has been so confirmed, the person bound thereby shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against the confirmation of the order as he would have had against the making of the order had the order been an order made by the court confirming the order.
- 7. The Secretary of State may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised
- to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.
- 8.-(1) A court of summary jurisdiction in which an order has been registered under this Ordinance or by which an order has been confirmed under this Ordinance, and the officers of such court, shall take all such steps for enforcing the order as may be prescribed.
- (2) Every such order shall be enforceable in like manner as if the order were for the payment of a civil debt recoverable summarily:

Provided that if the order is of such a nature that if made by the court in which it is so registered, or by which it is so confirmed, it would be enforceable in like manner as an order of affiliation, the order shall be so enforceable.

(3) A warrant of distress or commitment issued by a court of summary jurisdiction for the purpose of enforcing any order so registered or confirmed may be executed in any part of the Colony in the same manner as if the warrant had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the warrant is executed.

Power of Secretary of State to make regulations for faciliating communications between courts.

Mode of enforcing orders.

9. The Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1962 shall apply to proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance in like manner as it applies to proceedings under that Ordinance, and the power of the Chief Justice to make rules under section seventy of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, shall include power to make rules regulating the procedure of courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Application of Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

10. Any document purporting to be signed by a judge or officer of a court in England or Ireland shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been so signed without proof of the signature or judicial or official character of the person appearing to have signed it, and the officer of a court by whom a document is signed shall until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been the proper officer of the court to sign the document.

Proof of documents signed by officers of court.

11. Depositions taken in a court in England or Ireland for the purpose of this Ordinance may be received in evidence in proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.





The Imperial Bureau of Mycology is the outcome of a proposal unanimously adopted by the Imperial War Conference in 1918 that a central organisation should be established for the encouragement and co-ordination of work throughout the Empire on the diseases of plants caused by fungi, in relation to agriculture. The Committee of Management consist of some of the foremost biologists in the Country with Viscount Harcourt as their Chairman, and includes the following members:- Professor I. Bayley Balfour, M.D., D.SC., F.R.S., Mr. W. Bateson, F.R.S., Professor V. H. Blackman, F.R.S., Professor F. O. Bower, F.R.S., Mr. A. D. Cotton, F.L.S., Professor H. H. Dixon, F.R.S., Professor J. B. Farmer, F.R.S., Captain A. W. Hill, F.L.S., Professor W. H. Lang, F.R.S., Sir Daniel Morris, K.C.M.G., Mr. J. Murray, Mr. G. H. Pethybridge, B.SC., Sir David Prain, C.M.G., C.I.E., F.R.S., Dr. A. B. Rendle, F.R.S., Mr. H. N. Ridley, C.M.G., F.R.S., Professor R. A. Robertson, F.R.S.E., Sir A. E. Shipley, F.R.S., Professor W. Somerville, F.R.S., and Dr. H. W. T. Wager, F.R.S.

Dr. E. J. Butler, late Imperial Mycologist, Director of the Research Institute, Pusa, and Agricultural Adviser to the Government of India, has been appointed Director and has started work at the headquarters of the Bureau, No. 17, Kew Green, Kew (Telephone Richmond 603). This site has the advantage of proximity to the fine library and collections of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, with the Director and staff of which the Bureau will work in co-operation.

The funds of the Bureau are entirely provided by contributions from the various self-governing Dominions, India, Egypt, and Soudan, and the non-self-governing Colonies and Protectorates. It will work broadly on the lines of the existing Imperial Bureau of Entomology at South Kensington, and will aim at doing for the other great class of destructive agencies in agriculture, namely the diseases and blights of plants caused by fungi, what the older Bureau has so successfully done in regard to injurious insects. It will be a central agency for the accumulation and distribution of information and for the identification of specimens sent in from all parts of the Empire. It is proposed to issue, as soon as funds permit, a periodical journal through which those interested in mycological work in regard to agriculture will be kept informed of progress

elsewhere. There are at present over fifty officials engaged in this work in the overseas parts of the Empire, while the number of agriculturists, planters and the like practically interested is legion.

The effect of fungus diseases in reducing crop production is great beyond calculation. A Canadian scientist has estimated the loss caused by rust in wheat in the prairie region of Canada in 1917 at at 100,000,000 bushels, representing a value of between £25,000,000 and £50,000,000. For the same year the loss in the five chief cereals in the United States exceeded 400,000,000 bushels. The effect of this on the provisioning of the world may be easily imagined.

It is hereby notified, for general information, that an Anglo-German Mixed Arbitral Tribunal has been established under Article 304 of the treaty of Versailles, and is about to begin work in London.

A great part of the work of the Tribunal is to decide as to debts under Article 296 of the Treaty where a difference has arisen between an enemy debtor and an enemy creditor or between the British and German clearing offices. Under Article 297 the Tribunal can determine compensation to be borne by Germany in respect of damage or injury inflicted on the property, rights or interests of British Nationals in German territory as they existed on August 1, 1914, by the exceptional war measures or measures of transfer mentioned in the Annex to that Article. The other matters within the jurisdiction of the Tribunal are set out in Articles 299, 300, 304, 305, and 310 of the Treaty.

The proceedure before the Tribunal is to some extent regulated by Sections III to VII of part X of the Treaty, but the Tribunal has settled further and more detailed rules dealing with the manner in which claims must be submitted.

The following rules deal with the time for presentation of Claims:-

Rule 1. The time within which claims are to be submitted to the Tribunal shall be as follows:-

(a) Appeals under Article 296, Annex, paragraph 20.

Within thirty days of the communication of the joint decision of the two clearing offices to the Appellant.

(b) Claims under Article 297.

Within twelve months from the date of the publication of these rules in the place at which such claimant is residing, or within six months from the date on which the claimant learnt that damage or injury had been inflicted on his property, rights or interests, or within six months from the date on which the Claimant learnt that restitution under section (f) of the said Article had been made or refused, whichever period is the longer.

(c) Claims under Article 305.

Within twelve months of the publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, or within twelve months of the date on which the decision was given, or within six months of the date on which such decision came to the knowledge of the Claimant, whichever period is the longer.

(d) In all other cases.

Within twelve months from the date of the publication of these rules in the place at which such Claimant is residing, with the exception of those cases provided for in Rule 22 where the lim-

itations of time imposed by these rules are stated not to apply.

After the expiration of the times prescribed by this rule, no claim will be accepted without the special leave of the Tribunal.

Rule 2. All claims, answers and other written proceedings must be delivered or sent by post to the Tribunal Secretariat at 21 St. James's Square, London, S.W. 1.

Report on Currency Note Accounts for the year 1920.

The Note Guarantee Fund.

- I. Under the provisions of the Principal Order 1899, the coin received by the Commissioners in exchange for the notes issued, (put into circulation) has to form the Note Guarantee Fund,
- 2. On the 1st January 1920 this fund amounted to £18,000. During the year the "Note Issue" was increased to £20,000, and the £2,000 received in coin by the Commissioners was allocated as follows:—

- 3. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, the Note Guarantee Fund has to be divided into two parts (a) The Coin Portion, and (b) The Investment Portion. Under the provisions of the Currency Note (Amendment) Order 1920, there may be kept in the United Kingdom either in coin or invested in such manner as the Secretary of State shall approve, such part of the coin portion of the Note Guarantee Fund, not exceeding two-thirds thereof, as the Secretary of State from time to time may direct, notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Principal Order.
 - (a) The Coin Portion. During the year the coin portion was increased from £9,000 to £10,000, and is divided between the Commissioners and the Crown Agents. viz:—£4,000 in the Commissioners safe in the Colony, and £6,000 with the Crown Agents, deposited with the London County Westminster and Parrs' Bank.
 - (b) THE INVESTMENT PORTION. During the year the Investment portion was increased by a sum of £1,000, which was expended in the purchase of approved Securities, and the total sum so expended on behalf of the Fund amounts to £10,000.

The Note Depreciation Fund.

- 4. Under the provisions of the Principal Order, a sum equal to one per cent of the cost price of the Securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund has to be set aside annually to form a Depreciation Fund, until such time as the latter is not less than ten per cent of the cost price of the Securities forming the said Investment Portion. A separate account has to be kept of the Depreciation Fund to form part of the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.
- 5. During the year the Note Depreciation Fund was increased by a sum of £109:4:5, which was expended in the purchase of approved Securities. The total of the Fund now amounts to the sum of £1,000, which represents a sum equalling 10% of the cost price of the Securities forming the Investment Portion of the Note Guarantee Fund.

Summary of Year's Transactions.

6. On the 1st January 1920, the face value of the Notes in circulation amounted to £18,000. During the year a further issue of Notes was made by the Commissioners amounting to a face value of £2,000, leaving in circulation at the end of the year, £20,000, viz:—



A Bill

To provide for the refund of one half of the duties of Customs levied and collected, under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920, between the 1st of October, 1920 and the 30th September, 1921, on Whale and Seal Oil.

WHEREAS it is expedient that one half of the duties of customs levied and collected upon Whale Oil and Seal Oil raised in the Colony and Shipped beyond the limits of the the Colony between the first day of October in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty and the thirtieth day of September in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-one shall be refunded.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1921.

Short Title.

2. One half of the duties of Customs which were levied, collected and paid under Section 7 of the Tariff Ordinance, 1900, as amended by the Tariff (Export Duty) Amendment Ordinance, 1920 upon Whale Oil and Seal Oil, which was raised in this Colony and which was shipped for places beyond the limits of this Colony between the first day of October in the year One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty and the thirtieth day of September in the year One thousand Nine dundred and Twenty-one, shall be refunded.

Regulations made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 2 of the Harbour Ordinance, 1902.

- 1. No hulk shall be moored to swing to the North of the middle of the Inner harbour nor to the West of a line drawn north from the flagstaff on Victory Green nor to the East of a line drawn north from the East slaughter house.
- 2. No ship or hulk shall be moved in the Harbour save under the direction or with the permission in writing of the Harbour Master, and a fee of £1 shall be paid for every such permission, unless such removal has been ordered by the Harbour Master. Any hulk having fixed moorings may return thereto without additional fee.
- 3. In every case where it may be necessary to change the position of a vessel or hulk for the purpose of receiving or discharging cargo or for any other purpose, such vessel or hulk must be moved under the direction of the Harbour Master.
- 4. Vessels at anchor outside the limits assigned to hulks shall exhibit, from sunset to to sunrise, the following light or lights:-

A vessel under 150 feet in length, when at anchor, shall carry forward, where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a White Light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

A vessel of 150 feet or upwards in length, when at anchor, shall carry in the forward part of the vessel, at a height of not less than 20 feet and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, one such light, and at or near the stern of the vessel, and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light, another such light.

- 5. No person shall collect, remove or cause to be removed any timber or wood for any purpose whatsoever, from the foreshores of the Harbour without the written permission of the Harbour Master.
- 6. Permission in writing shall be obtained from the Harbour Master for the removal of any sand, stone or gravel from the foreshores of the Harbour.
- 7. The Masters of vessels who may require water shall apply to the Harbour Master. Water will be supplied on payment of 2/6 per ton of 220 gallons.
- 8. No ballast, dunnage, ashes or rubbish of any description whatever shall be thrown into the water of the Harbour.
- 9. Masters of vessels who may require a lighter for the disposal of ashes, dunnage, rubbish, &c. shall apply to the Harbour Master who will cause a lighter to be placed alongside the vessel for that purpose.
- 10. Masters of vessels who may wish to discharge ballast shall communicate with the Harbour Master who will direct the disposal of same.

- 11. Masters of vessels who may desire to haul up on the beaches of the Harbour any boat or craft shall apply to the Harbour Master who will direct where such boat or craft shall be placed.
- 12. No sand, shingle, gravel or tussac shall be allowed to remain upon any Government Jetty or landing place within Two Yards from the edge of such jetty or landing place.
 - 13. The Regulations made on the 23rd of December, 1902 are hereby repealed.

Regulation made by the Governor in Executive Council under Section 4 of the Pensions Ordinance, 1906.

Regulation No. 18 of the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the Pensions Ordinance 1906 is repealed and replaced by the following:-

18. If any officer to whom a pension has been granted under this Ordinance or under any previous Law or Regulations is appointed to another office in the service of the Colony, or in any other public service, then during his tenure of such office so much only (if any) of his pension shall be paid to him as, together with any pension received by him in respect of other public service, and with the salary and fees of such office, makes up an amount not greater than the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer at any time in the course of his service in the Colony or other public service; provided that where the officer retired or was transferred from the service of the Colony prior to the 1st January, 1920, the highest pensionable emoluments drawn by such officer in the course of his service in the Colony, shall for the purposes of this Regulation be deemed to be the highest pensionable emoluments actually so drawn by him plus fifty per cent thereof; and also provided that any bonus or temporary drawn by him plus fifty per cent thereof; and also provided that any bonus or temporary increase, whether on pension or on the salary of the new office, granted in view of cost of living, shall be added to such pension or salary, as the case may be, for the purposes of this Regulation.

By direction of His Excellency the Governor the following despatch from His Britannic Majesty's Minister at Buenos Aires to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs is published for general information.

3rd, September, 1921. C.S. 869/21.

BRITISH LEGATION,
Buenos Aires,
August 5th 1921.

My Lord,

Your Lordship is aware that owing to the claim of Argentina to the ownership of the Falkland Islands, or Islas Malvinas" as they are invariably called here, foreign vessels have not been allowed to trade between the Argentine and the Islands on the ground that such trade would be a violation of the Argentine law which confines the coastal trade to vessels flying the national flag.

The Ministry of Finance was consulted recently by the Representative of certain Shipping Companies as to whether vessels flying foreign flags may trade between Argentine ports and ports in the Falkland Islands and a reply in the form of an opinion by the Solicitor to the Treasury has been issued to the following effect:-

"However legitimate may be the rights of the Argentine Republic to the Malvinas Islands so long as these islands remain in the possession of the British Government, even though unlawfully so held, the ports of the islands, for the purposes of Argentine customs and coastal laws, must be considered as foreign. In consequence there is no legal obstacle in the way of vessels under foreign flags trading between Argentine ports and Port Stanley or any other port in the Malvinas Islands".

It remains to be seen whether the Argentine Government will accept this opinion and give effect to it by means of a Decree.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Minutes of Meeting held on the 1st April, 1921.

- 1. The Minutes of the Meeting held on the 6th December, 1920, were read and confirmed.
 - 2. The Hon. M. C. Craigie-Halkett took the prescribed oath as Acting Treasurer.
- 3. The Hon. the Acting Colonial Secretary, by Command, laid on the table the
 - (1) A telegraphic despatch from the Secretary of State, dated the 12th March, 1921, relative to the decision of the Admiralty to close the Submarine Cable.
 - (2) A telegraphic despatch from the Secretary of State, dated the 22nd of March, 1921, relative to the decision of the Admiralty to close down the Naval Wireless Station.
 - (3) A Statement of the imports of milk, butter, and cheese for the years, 1918, 1919, and 1920.

4. The Governor invited the Council to consider, having regard to the decision of the Admiralty notified in the Secretary of State's telegrams of the 12th and 22nd of March, the means by which telegraphic communication should be maintained.

The following resolutions were moved by the Hon. the Acting Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Hon. G. I. Turner:

- (1) That the cordial thanks of the Colony should be conveyed to His Majesty's Government for the generous proposal that the Naval Wireless Station should be transferred to the Colonial Government as a free gift.
- (2) That telegraphic communication should be maintained but at a less cost than would be incurred in working the Naval High Power Wireless Station.

The resolutions were adopted.

5. With reference to the Statement of the Imports of milk, butter and cheese, which had been laid on the table, the Governor invited the Council to consider the measures which should be adopted for the improvement of the milk supply of Stanley.

The following resolution was moved by the Hon. the Acting Colonial Secretary and seconded by the Hon. G. I. Turner:

The Council approves in principle of the following measures being adopted for the improvement of the milk supply of Stanley:-

- (1) The gradual improvement of the existing pasturage by the draining of marsh land and by the sowing of suitable grasses.
- (2) The provision of a larger area for grazing.
- (3) The importation of stock for crossing with local cattle.
- (4) The provision of winter food by planting of tussac grass on suitable areas on the coast.

The resolution was adopted.

6. The Governor invited the attention of the Council to the scale of fees payable, under the Regulations of the 6th of November, 1920, by patients in the King Edward Memorial Hospital. His Excellency stated that with the approval of the Council and pending reconsideration of the scale of fees, he proposed that the fee payable for midwifery cases should be fixed temporarily at £2 and that this fee should include care, treatment, and medical attendance, irrespective of the period for which the patient remained in hospital.

The Council concurred.

The Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following rules made under section 6 of the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance, No. 3 of 1898. C.S. 410/21.

Rules made by the Superintendent of the Stanley Volunteer Fire Brigade under Section 6 of the Stanley Fire Brigade Ordinance No. 3 of 1898.

- 1. Each Member shall promptly obey all orders which he may receive from those in authority over him, and shall conform to all rules which may from time to time be made by the Superintendent.
 - 2. The Brigade shall provide each Member with an armlet.
- 3. No member can be recognised at any drill or fire as a Member of the Fire Brigade unless wearing his armlet, and no Member shall appear in his armlet except he is on duty.
- 4. The Brigade shall meet for drill &c., not less than twelve times yearly, the time to be as directed by the Superintendent.
- 5. Members failing to attend such drills &c., shall pay the sum of Two SHILLINGS & SIXPENCE into the funds of the Brigade, unless such Members produce satisfactory evidence of inability to attend.
- 6. Members leaving Stanley, for any period of time whatsoever, shall inform the Superintendent 12 hours prior to their departure. Failure to report departure from Stanley shall entail a fine of Two SHILLINGS & SIXPENCE which shall be paid into the funds of the Brigade.
- 7. The Brigade when assembled for drill &c., shall be deemed to be on Active Duty and no Member shall leave such drill &c., without the permission of the Superintendent or Officer in Command. A Member leaving such drill &c. without permission shall be deemed to be in default and shall pay the sum of FIVE SHILLINGS into the funds of the Brigade.
- 8. Any matter of importance or general application, such as an alteration of the Rules &c., shall be decided at a Committee Meeting of the Brigade and then submitted to His Excellency the Governor for his consideration.
- 9. Nothing in these Rules contained shall affect the liability of any Member to any punishment or penalty to which he is liable at Common Law or under Ordinance No. 3 of 1898, Stanley Fire Brigade.

All previous Rules are hereby repealed.

To facilitate the enforcement in the Colony of Maintenance Orders made by courts in England and Ireland and vice verså.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkand Islands, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as the "Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, 1921."

Definitions.

2. For the purposes of this Ordinance, the expression "maintenance order" means an order, other than an order of affiliation, for the periodical payment of sums of money towards the maintenance of the wife or other dependants of the person against whom the order is made, and the expression "dependants" means such persons as that person is liable to maintain; the expression "certified copy" in relation to an order of a court means a copy of the order certified by the proper officer of the court to be a true copy, and the expression "prescribed" means prescribed by rules of court.

Enforcement in the Colony of maintenance orders made in England and Ireland.

- 3.—(1) Where a maintenance order has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, been made against any person by any court in England or Ireland, and a certified copy of the order has been transmitted by the Secretary of State to the Governor, the Governor shall send a copy of the order to the prescribed officer of a copy in the Colony for registration; and on receipt thereof the order shall be registered in the prescribed manner, and shall, from the date of such registration, be of the same force and effect, and, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, all proceedings may be taken on such order as if it had been an order originally obtained in the court in which it is so registered, and that court shall have power to enforce the order accordingly.
- (2) The court in which an order is to be so registered as aforesaid shall, if the court by which the order was made was a court of superior jurisdiction, be the Sullieme Court, and, if the court was not a court of superior jurisdiction, be a court of summary jurisdiction.

4. Where a court in the Colony has, whether before or after the passing of this Ordinance, made a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved to that court that the person against whom the order was made is resident in England or Ireland. the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State a certified copy of the order.

Transmission of maintenance orders made in the Colomy.

5.—(1). Where an application is made to a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony for a maintenance order against any person, and it is proved that that person is resident in England or Ireland the court may, in the absence of that person, if after hearing the evidence it is satisfied of the justice of the application, make any such order as it might have made if a summons had been duly served on that person and he had failed to appear at the hearing, but in such case the order shall be provisional only, and shall have no effect unless and until confirmed by a competent court in England or Ireland.

Power to make provisional orders of maintenance against persons resident in England or Ireland.

- (2) The evidence of any witness who is examined on any such application shall be put into writing, and such deposition shall be read over to and signed by him.
- (3) Where such an order is made, the court shall send to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, the depositions so taken and a certified copy of the order, together with a statement of the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order is made had been duly served with a summons and had appeared at the hearing, and such information as the court possesses for facilitating the identification of that person, and ascertaining his whereabouts.
- (4) Where any such provisional order has come before a court in England or Ireland for confirmation, and the order has by that court been remitted to the court of summary jurisdiction which made the order for the purpose of taking further evidence, that court or any other court of summary jurisdiction sitting and acting for the same place shall, after giving the prescribed notice, proceed to take the evidence in like manner and subject to the like conditions as the evidence in support of the original application.

If upon the hearing of such evidence it appears to the court that the order ought not to have been made, the court may rescind the order, but in any other case the depositions shall be sent to the Secretary of State and dealt with in like manner as the original depositions.

- (5) The confirmation of an order made under this section shall not affect any power of a court of summary jurisdiction to vary or rescind that order: Provided that on the making of a varying or rescinding order the court shall send a certified copy thereof to the Governor for transmission to the Secretary of State, and that in the case of an order varying the original order the order shall not have any effect unless and until confirmed in like manner as the original order.
- (6) The applicant shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against a refusal to make a provisional order as he would have had against a refusal to make the order had a summons been duly served on the person against whom the order is sought to be made.
- 6.—(1) Where a maintenance order has been made by a court in England or Ireland, and the order is provisional only and has no effect unless and until confirmed by a court of summary jurisdiction in the Colony, and a certified copy of the order, together with the depositions of witnesses and a statement of the grounds on which the order might have been opposed has been transmitted to the Governor, and it appears to the Governor that

Power of court of summary jurisdiction to confirm maintenance order made by courts in England and Ireland.

the person against whom the order was made is resident in the Colony, the Governor may send the said documents to the prescribed officer of a court of summary jurisdiction, with a requisition that a summons be issued calling upon the person to show cause why that order should not be confirmed, and upon receipt of such documents and requisition the court shall issue such a summons and cause it to be served upon such person.

- (2) A summons so issued may be served in the Colony in the same manner as if it had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the person happens to be.
- (3) At the hearing it shall be open to the person on whom the summons was served to raise any defence which he might have raised in the original proceedings had he been a party thereto, but no other defence, and the certificate from the court which made the provisional order stating the grounds on which the making of the order might have been opposed if the person against whom the order was made had been a party to the proceedings shall be conclusive evidence that those grounds are grounds on which objection may be taken.
- (4) If at the hearing the person served with the summons does not appear or, on appearing, fails to satisfy the court that the order ought not to be confirmed, the court may confirm the order either without modification or with such modifications as to the court after hearing the evidence may seem just.
- (5) If the person against whom the summons was issued appears at the hearing and satisfies the court that for the purpose of any defence it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the provisional order for the taking of any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.
- (6) Where a provisional order has been confirmed under this section, it may be varied or rescinded in like manner as if it had originally been made by the confirming court, and where on an application for recission or variation the court is satisfied that it is necessary to remit the case to the court which made the order for the purpose of taking any further evidence, the court may so remit the case and adjourn the proceedings for the purpose.
- 7) Where an order has been so confirmed, the person bound thereby shall have the same right of appeal, if any, against the confirmation of the order as he would have had against the making of the order had the order been an order made by the court confirming the order.
- 7. The Secretary of State may make regulations as to the manner in which a case can be remitted by a court authorised to confirm a provisional order to the court which made the provisional order, and generally for facilitating communications between such courts.
- 8.—(1) A court of summary jurisdiction in which an order has been registered under this Ordinance or by which an order has been confirmed under this Ordinance, and the officers of such court, shall take all such steps for enforcing the order as may be prescribed.
- (2) Every such order shall be enforceable in like manner as if the order were for the payment of a civil debt recoverable summarily:

Provided that if the order is of such a nature that if made by the court in which it is so registered, or by which it is so confirmed, it would be enforceable in like manner as an order of affiliation, the order shall be so enforceable.

Power of Secretary of State to make regulations for facilitating communications between courts.

Mode of enforcing orders.

- (3) A warrant of distress or commitment issued by a court of summary jurisdiction for the purpose of enforcing any order so registered or confirmed may be executed in any part of the Colony in the same manner as if the warrant had been originally issued or subsequently endorsed by a court of summary jurisdiction having jurisdiction in the place where the warrant is executed.
- 9. The Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902 shall apply to proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance in like manner as it applies to proceedings under that Ordinance, and the power of the Chief Justice to make rules under section seventy of the Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902, shall include power to make rules regulating the procedure of courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Application of Summary Jurisdiction Ordinance, 1902.

10. Any document purporting to be signed by a judge or officer of a court in England or Ireland shall, until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been so signed without proof of the signature or judicial or official character of the person appearing to have signed it, and the officer of a court by whom a document is signed shall until the contrary is proved, be deemed to have been the proper officer of the court to sign the document.

Proof of documents signed by officers of court.

11. Depositions taken in a court in England or Ireland for the purpose of this Ordinance may be received in evidence in proceedings before courts of summary jurisdiction under this Ordinance.

Depositions to be evidence.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under Section 3 of the Whale Fishery Ordinance No. 5 of 1908.

- 1. These regulations may be cited as the Whaling Regulations, 1921.
- 2. The expression "Whaling Officer" as used in these regulations shall mean such officer as the Governor may appoint to enforce the provisions of the Whale Fishery Ordinance, 1908.

- 3. Whaling licences in the form annexed may be issued for and in respect of the following places:-
 - (a) Falkland Islands.
 - (b) South Georgia.
 - (c) South Shetlands.
 - (d) South Orkneys.
 - (e) South Sandwich Islands.

and shall be valid for the period from 16th September to the 31st May next following.

- 4. Every person desiring to obtain a licence to kill, take, or hunt whales, shall apply in writing to the Colonial Secretary and shall give the following particulars:-
 - (a) If an individual, his full name, nationality, description and address.
 - (b) If a private company, the full name, nationality, description and address of each partner, and if a limited company, the same particulars regarding each director.
 - (c) The names of all vessels to be employed.
 - (d) The number and cubic capacity of all open and pressure boilers.
 - (e) The carrying capacity of the Floating factory in tanks and barrels.

The applicant shall shew to the satisfaction of the Governor that he possesses or commands sufficient working capital to ensure the proper working of the licence applied for.

- 5. Applications for licences shall be delivered at the Colonial Secretary's Office on or before the first day of May preceding the season during which the applicant proposes to operate.
- 6. The Governor may in the exercise of his discretion refuse to grant a licence to an applicant without giving any reason for refusal.
- 7. A licence shall not be transferable unless the approval of the Governor has been first applied for and obtained.
- 8. A licence in Form A of the Schedule may authorize the use of either one or two Floating Factories in conjunction with not more than two whale catchers provided that in special circumstances the use of an additional whale catcher may be authorized by separate licence in Form B. of the schedule.
 - 9. The following fees shall be payable for licences:-
 - (a) either one or two Floating Factories and two whale catchers £200.
 - (b) an additional whale catcher £100.
- 10. A whale catcher shall not be used, without the sanction of the whaling officer, to hunt or take whales, or attempt to hunt or take whales until such time as the floating factory or land station for which it operates is ready to utilize immediately any whales taken.
- 11. Floating Factories shall utilize the following parts of all whales taken und licence namely:-
 - (a) Head.
 - (b) Jawbones.
 - (c) Tongue.
 - (d) Tail (from the vent to the flukes)
 - (e) Inside fat.
- 12. The number of flensed whale carcasses waiting to be dealt with at one time, either at a land station, or attached to any vessel or mooring shall not exceed twenty.
- 13. The whaling officer may prohibit the use of any licensed whale catcher for taking whales, when, in his opinion the further taking of whales would lead to an accumulation of whale matter that could not be utilized without undue waste.

- 14. Pressure boilers shall not be used for storing oil until whale catching has ceased for the season.
- 15. No person shall kill, hunt, or take, or attempt to kill, hunt, or take any whale culf or female whale accompanied by a calf.
- 16. Returns shall be rendered to the whaling officer on or before the 10th day of June in each year giving the following particulars:-
 - (a) number and description of whales taken each month.
 - (b) number of barrels of oil of various grades produced each month.
 - (c) quantity of baleen obtained.
 - (d) quantity of guano manufactured.
- 17. The holder of a lease of a land site for whaling purposes shall not have the right to use any bays or anchorages for the purpose of mooring whales without the sanction of the whaling officer first being applied for and obtained.
- 18. The holder of a licence, shall, at his own expense remove or alter the position of any moorings laid down in the waters of the Colony or any Dependency of the Colony, or on land, on being required to do so by the whaling officer.
- 19. The holder of a licence who commits or allows or negligently suffers a person employed by him to commit a breach of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for each offence and any person employed by him who commits a breach of these regulations shall be liable to a fine not exceeding £10 for each offence.
- 20. Any person who refuses to obey the lawful order of the whaling officer shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these regulations and shall be liable to the penalties set forth in the preceding regulation.
- 21. These regulations shall apply to the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies.
- 22. The following regulations made under the Whale Fishery Ordinance No. 5 of 1908, as amended by No. 5 of 1912, are hereby repealed:-
 - (a) Whaling regulations made on the 28th day of July, 1913.
 - (b) Whaling regulations made for South Georgia on the 28th day of July, 1913.
 - (c) Whaling regulations made for South Georgia on the 24th day of June, 1920.

- 1. His Majesty the King has been pleased to approve of the privilege of wearing uniform, granted to ex-officers of Dominion Forces and Colonial Volunteers under local conditions, which is now effective only within local limits, being extended to cover the wearing of uniform on special occasions at home and elsewhere throughout His Majesty's Dominions.
- 2. His Majesty has also been pleased to approve that the privilege of retaining rank by such officers should be extended to be effective throughout His Majesty's Dominions.
- 3. These privileges will be limited to an officer who held a commission between the 5th August, 1914 and the date of the termination of the War, midnight of 31st August as notified to you in my telegram of 16th August.
- 4. Military officers in this country who have relinquished their commissions and who have been permitted to retain their rank, also officers who have been demobilised or disembodied, are permitted to wear uniform on special occasions when attending ceremonies and entertainments of a military nature, and on occasions when the wearing of uniform would appear appropriate, this limitation should be observed in respect of officers of the Colonial Volunteer Forces who have relinquished their commissions and have been permitted to retain their rank under due authority by notification in the local Gazette.
- 5. The uniform should be restricted to service dress and should be that of the unit or of the general list to which the officer belonged when he relinquished his commission or was demobilised. The badges of rank should be those of the rank he held when demoblised or that retained by him when he quitted the service.

REVENUE.

- 1. The Revenue for the Year 1920 amounted to the sum of £71,557:16:5. Included therein are sums received under the Land Ordinance 1903, in respect of Land Purchases.
- 2. The ordinary Revenue amounted to £64,165:16:7; representing £35,497 13:11 for "Falklands", and £28,688:2:8 for the "Dependencies".
- 3. The Revenue, exclusive of "Land Sales", exceeded the Expenditure by £10,590 17:0. The total Revenue was £4,444:16:5 over, and the total Expenditure £5,743 0:5, under the original Estimate for 1920.
- 4. The Falklands Revenue, exclusive of Land Sales, exceeded Falklands Expenditure by a sum of £2,177:9:4. The Dependencies Revenue exceeded Dependencies Expenditure by a sum of £8,433:7:8.
- 5. The following Table shows the actual amount of Revenue collected during the year from the Falklands and Dependencies, and the increase or decrease on the original Estimate for 1920:-

- 14. During the five years 1916-20, the total ordinary Revenue has exceeded the total ordinary Expenditure, during the same period by £76,889: 13:11, of which a sum of *£11,916:8:8 has been expended under "Public Works Extraordinary" since 1916, leaving a net saving on the past five years of £64,973:5:3. This amount when added to the accumulated savings of £4,037:8:10 at the beginning of the year 1915, makes a total net saving in ordinary Revenue over Expenditure up to the 31st December 1920, of £69,280:15:1.
- 15. There is no public Debt. On the other hand the Colony has a Land Sales Fund amounting to £159,394:5:11, and a Stock Fund amounting £2,280:14:9, which together with accumulated ordinary Revenue of £69,280:15:1, makes a total surplus of £230,955:15:9.

^{*(}includes a sum of £6,000 transferred to the Dependencies Research and Development Fund).

- 16. The sums received during the year in respect of Land purchases (transferred to the Land Sales Fund) amounted to £7,391:19:10. On the 31st December 1920, the Fund amounted to £159,394:5:11. The Securities held by the Fund amounted to £158,737:13:5, leaving an uninvested amount at the end of the year of £656:12:6. This amount has since been invested.
- 17. The monies standing to the credit of the Depositors in the Govt. Savings Bank at the end of the year amounted to £128,799:19:6, as against £118,270:7:11 on the 31st December, 1919, or an increase during the year of £10,529:11:7. All the money so deposited, with the exception of *£19,033:15:4, was invested in approved Securities. The dividends received from these Securities during the year, amounted to £4,485:7:1, of this amount a sum of £2,899:12:11 was expended during the year in payment of interest to Depositors, expenses of Management &c., also a sum of £100 as contribution General Revenue on working account of Savings Bank, and a sum of £1,240 in the purchase of Securities for Savings Bank Depreciation Fund, leaving a balance for investment on the years transactions of £245:14:2.
- 18. The Securities held on account of the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund at the beginning of the year amounted to £1,625:8:4. The dividends received during the year, including a sum of 13/4 remaining uninvested from the previous year, amounted to £121:16:3. The whole of this sum, together with the sum of £1,240 mentioned in para: 15 above, was expended in the purchase of Securities for the Savings Bank Depreciation Fund. The Securities held on account of the Fund on 31st December, 1920, amounted to £2,987:4:7.
- 19. Specie to the value of £7,010 (£7,000 in silver and £10 in copper) was imported by the Col. Govt., during the year. To meet local requirements the Currency Note issue was increased from £18,000 to £20,000. The arrangement made in 1901, between the Falkland Is. Co., Ltd., and the Col. Govt., is still in existence whereby One Thousand Pounds is paid to the Crown Agents in London at the end of each month, and a simultaneous repayment is made from the Colonial Treasury.

Chief Inspector of Stock.

Seasons.

The late spring and summer were much better than the previous year for stock. The winter has been more severe, with less rain but more snow than usual.

Sheep.

- 2. I am pleased to be able to report that the general health of the sheep continues to be good.
- There has been no infectious or contagious diseases among the animals in the Islands, and the sheep on the East Island are freer from parasitic disease than last year, there being only a few isolated cases of Lice, and this pest bids fair to be shortly stamped out. The West Falklands and the Islands are free from lice.
- The total number of sheep in the Islands is now 667,677 showing an increase of 21,939 over last years total, this is partly due to the better lambing season, also to there being no export of sheep, and to the fact that there was no Canning this year, owing to the factory at Goose Green being closed down for the season.
- The lambing season was good, some of the stations showing a high rate of increase.
- (d) 30 Rams were imported from England, the number would have been larger, but exportation was stopped owing to an outbreak of Foot and Mouth disease.
- There were no sheep canned this season, but a larger number were boiled down. the largest percentage being from the East Island.

Cattle.

4. The number of cattle in this years return is 7,674 showing an increase of 307 from last year. On some of the stations new blood is badly needed, and there does not seem sufficient care and thought taken in the production of milk and butter.

Horses.

This years return of horses shows the number to be 2,436, showing a decrease of 50 for the year. Last years return was 2,486, a decrease of 235 from the year previous, although 315 were imported in 1919-20. I consider it most important that the farmers should breed their own horses, and not trust too much to importations, as that is both unreliable and also the animals have to become aclimatised, which takes at least a year. If more stallions of useful breed were introduced, and larger and more productive manadas kept, it would certainly make the question of shortage of horses much easier than it is at present.

· Exports.

6. No live stock were exported this season owing to there being no boats coming from the Coast.

Cultiva ion.

7. It is pleasing to note that some stations have been trying new methods of cultivation, and that the cultivation of hay has been persevered with, also that some stations are planting more Tussac, which if planted and protected will give a quantity of valuable feed for the stock.

Ordinance No.

of 1921.

A Bill

To Amend the Licensing Ordinance, 1882.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

This Ordinance may be cited as "The Licensing Ordinance, (Amendment), 1921".

Definition.

Still means any apparatus susceptible of being used for the manufacture or rectifying of spirits and includes any portion of such apparatus.

Importation of Still without permit forbidden.

3. It shall not be lawful for any person to import or to have in his possession a still without having first received a permit in writing under the hand of the Colonial Secretary.

Enforcement of provisions of Ordinance

4. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance, it shall be lawful for any Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Officer of Customs or Constable to enter into and search without warrant any buildings, premises, vessel or boat where there is reasonable cause to suspect that an illicit still may be found and to make such examination or enquiry as may be proper to ascertain whether any offence against this Ordinance has been committed.

Persons unlawfully importing a Still guilty of an offence.

Any person unlawfully importing a still into the Colony or Colonial Waters thereof shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Making, erecting, or concealing, or using a Still an offence.

6. Any person found unlawfully in possession of, making, erecting, concealing, or using a still shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

Penalty for offences against this Ordinance.

7. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance and any person aiding or abetting in the commission of such offence shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Pounds, or in default of payment to imprisonment with hard labour for a term not exceeding six months.

Application to Dependencies.

8. This Ordinance shall apply to the Dependencies as well as to the Colony.

Ordinance No. of 1921.

A Bill

To Prohibit Persons not being in the Possession of Valid Passports from landing in the Colony.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Passports Ordinance, Short Title. 1921".
- 2. A person coming from any place out of the Colony shall not, without the special permission of the Governor or of some person deputed in writing by him, land at any place in the Colony unless he has in his possession a valid passport issued to him, not more than two years previously, by or on behalf of the Government of which he is a subject or citizen, or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality or identity.

Landing in Colony without passports forbidden.

3. Any person guilty of an offence against this Ordinance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and in addition to, or instead of such penalty to imprisonment not exceeding six months.

Penalty for offences against this Ordinance.

Ordinance No.

of 1921.

A Bill

To Consolidate and Amend the Laws relating to Seal Fishery in the Colony and its Dependencies.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Seal Fishery (Consolidation) Ordinance, 1921".

Definitions.

2. In this Ordinance:-

"Seal" means the fur seal, the hair seal, the sea otter, the sea elephant, the sea leopard, the sea bear, the sea lion, the sea dog and any animal of the seal kind.

"Skin" means the skin of any seal.

"Seal reserve" means any portion of land or water within the limits of the Colony set apart by the Governor in Council for the breeding of seals.

Appointment of Seal Fishery Officers.

- 3. (1) The provisions of this Ordinance shall be enforced by Seal Fishery Officers.
- (2) The following persons shall be seal fishery officers that is to say, every commissioned officer of any of His Majesty's ships on full pay, and every officer in the employ of the Government of the Colony authorised in that behalf by the Governor.

Unlawful to take seal in the Colony without a licence. 4. It shall not be lawful for any person to kill, take or hunt, or attempt to kill or take any seal in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof, unless he shall first have been duly licenced.

Granting of Sealing Licences.

5. (1) Such officer as the Governor may appoint for the purpose may grant licences to take seals in the Colony and the Colonial waters thereof, to such persons as may apply for them, for such periods and on such terms and conditions as may be approved by the Governor.

(2) In the case of the breach by the holder of a licence of any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or of the regulations made thereunder or of any of the conditions under which such licence may have been granted, the Governor may, by notice in writing, summarily revoke such licence, and thereupon all rights conferred thereby or enjoyed thereunder shall cease as from a date mentioned in such notice.

Power to revoke licences.

6. (1) The Governor in Council may from time to time make regulations for carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance and the intent and object thereof.

Regulations.

- (2) Any person guilty of an offence against any provision of the regulations made under this section shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Twenty-five Pounds.
- 7. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to declare, by notification in the Gazette, any Crown land or Colonial waters, or with the consent of the owner or lessee, any private land, to be a seal reserve, and, by notification in the Gazette, to revoke and declare to be no longer in force any such notification as aforesaid.

Seal Reserve.

8. Any owner or master or other person in charge of any vessel who shall permit such vessel, or any boat or canoe belonging to such vessel, to be employed in killing or taking seals in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance or contrary to the terms of or beyond the limits specified in any licence granted to him under this Ordinance, shall forfeit any seals so killed or taken, and any seals, seal-oil or skins found in his possession, and in addition thereto shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Three Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding twelve months for each offence.

Liability of an owner or master of a vessel.

9. Any person who does any of the following acts shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance, and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding six months for each such offence, and to forfeit any seals, seal-oil, or skins found in his possession:-

Offences and penalties and forfeitures consequent thereon.

- (a) Kills, takes or hunts, or attempts to kill or take, any seal in the Colony or the Colonial waters thereof without a licence under this Ordinance, or contrary to the terms of, or beyond the limits specified in, any licence granted to him under this Ordinance.
- (b) Has in his possession, or in any vessel under his command, any seal, seal-oil, skins, for the lawful possession of which he cannot account satisfactorily.
- 10. For the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance and of any regulation made by the Governor in Council under this Ordinance a seal flishery officer may, with respect to any vessel found within the limits of the territorial waters of the Colony engaged or believed to be engaged or concerned in seal fishing, exercise the following powers:-
- Powers of Seal Fishery Officers.

- (1) He may go on board at any time.
- (2) He may require the owner, master, or crew, or any of them to produce any certificates of registry, licences, official log books, official papers, articles of agreement, muster rolls, and other documents relating to the vessel, which are in their respective possession or control on board the vessel and may take copies thereof or of any part thereof.
 - (3) He may muster the crew of the vessel.
- (4) He may require the master to appear and to give any explanation concerning his vessel and the said certificates of registry,

official log books, official papers, articles of agreement, muster rolls and other documents or any of them.

- (5) He may make any examination or enquiry which he deems necessary to ascertain whether any contravention of the provisions of this Ordinance or of any regulation as aforesaid has been committed.
- (6) In the case of any person who appears to him to have committed any such contravention he may, without summons, warrant or other process, both take the offender and the vessel to which he belongs and the crew thereof to the nearest port of entry in the Colony or its Dependencies, as defined by the Customs Ordinance, 1903, and bring him or them before a competent court and detain him, it and them in the port until the alleged contravention has been adjudicated upon, or until the master of the said vessel has given security to be approved by the Chief Justice or a Magistrate of the Colony to abide the event of any action, suit, or other legal proceeding that may be instituted in respect of such vessel or of any person belonging thereto, and to pay all penalties, costs and damages that may be awarded them. In any legal proceeding under this subsection the person giving security may be deemed to be the owner of the detained vessel.

Protection of Seal Fishery Officers.

Vessel not bringing to when summoned or throwing overboard goods during chase to be forfeited. 12. If any vessel found in the waters of the Colony and suspected by a seal fishery officer to be engaged or concerned in seal fishing, shall not bring to upon signal made by any ship or boat in His Majesty's service or in the service of the Colonial Government, by hoisting the proper pendant or ensign, whereupon chase shall be given, and any person on board such vessel shall, during chase or before such vessel shall bring to, throw overboard any part of her lading, such vessel shall be forfeited.

11. No seal fishery officer shall be liable for any costs or

Vessel not bringing to when required to, penalty £50.

13. If any vessel liable to seizure or examination under this Ordinance shall not bring to when required to do so, the master of such vessel shall forfeit the sum of Fifty Pounds; and on such vessel being chased by any vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or duly employed for enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance, having a proper pendant or ensign hoisted, it shall be lawful for the captain, master or other person having the charge or command of such vessel in His Majesty's Navy, or employed as aforesaid (first causing a gun to be fired as a signal), to fire at or into such vessel, and such captain, master, or other person acting in his aid or by his direction shall be and is hereby indemnified and discharged from any indictment penalty, action, or other proceeding for so doing.

Arrest of persons committing an offence at a Seal Reserve.

14. A seal fishery officer may arrest, detain and bring before a competent Court any person committing or appearing to be about to commit an offence on land at any Seal Reserve against the provisions of this Ordinance or any Regulations made thereunder.

Armed Guard may be stationed at a Seal Reserve. 15. (1) The Governor may cause an armed guard to be stationed at or in the vicinity of any Seal Reserve for the purpose of the further enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance and may prescribe by order under his hand the manner in which such guard shall perform its duties.

Power of guard to arrest.

(2) The said guard shall have power to arrest, detain, and bring before a competent court any person committing, or appearing to be about to commit, an offence against the provisions of this Ordinance, or any regulation made thereunder.

- (3) The said guard may use such force as may be necessary to effect an arrest, or to overcome obstruction or to prevent an offence from being committed, and are hereby indemnified and discharged from any indictment, penalty, action, or other proceeding for so doing.
- 16. If any person obstructs any seal fishery officer or an armed guard acting under the powers conferred by this Ordinance, or refuses or neglects to comply with any requisition or direction lawfully made or given by, or to answer any question lawfully asked by any seal fishery officer or guard, such person shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding One Hundred Pounds and to imprisonment with hard labour for a period not exceeding six months.

Punishment for obstructing Seal Fishery Officers.

17. If any person shall maliciously shoot at any vessel or boat belonging to His Majesty's Navy, or in the service of the Colonial Government, or shall maliciously shoot at, maim, or wound any officer of the Navy or Colonial Government being duly employed in the prevention of offences against this Ordinance, or any person acting in his aid or assistance, in the execution of his office or duty, every person so offending, and every person aiding, abetting or assisting therein, shall, upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of felony and shall be liable to be imprisoned with hard labour for any period not exceeding three years.

Persons shooting at vessels or officers enforcing Ordinance, guilty of felony.

18. Offences under this Ordinance, or under any regulation made thereunder, may be prosecuted, and penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance, or any regulations thereunder, may be recovered before a Stipendiary Magistrate or any two Justices of the Peace in a summary manner, or by action in the Supreme Court of the Colony, together with full costs of suit;

Prosecution of Offences.

Provided that any penalty imposed by a Stipendiary Magistrate or two Justices of the Peace shall not exceed One Hundred Pounds, exclusive of costs, and imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

Venue.

19. For all purposes of and incidental to the trial and punishment of any person, accused of any offence under this Ordinance and the proceedings, and matters preliminary, and incidental to, and consequential on his trial and punishment, and for all purposes of and incidental to the jurisdiction of any Court, or any constable, or officer with reference to such offence, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was actually committed, or in any place in which the offender may for the time being be found.

Recovery of penalties.

20. Any penalty adjudged under this Ordinance to be paid by the owner or master, or other person in charge of a vessel may be recovered in the ordinary way, or, if the Court think fit so to order, by distress or arrest and sale of the vessel to which the offender belongs, and her tackle, apparel, and furniture, and any property on board thereof or belonging thereto, or any part thereof.

Service of summons.

21. Service of any summons or other matter in any legal proceedings under this Ordinance shall be good service if made personally on the person to be served, or at his last place of abode, or if made by leaving such summons, or other matter for him on board any vessel, to which he may belong, with the person being, or appearing to be, in command, or charge of such vessel.

Special exemption.

22. The Governor may authorize in writing any person to kill or take, for a scientific or any other special purpose, any seal in the Colony or Colonial waters thereof, and in so doing the person so authorized shall be exempt from any penalties and forfeitures under this Ordinance.

Application of Ordinance to Dependencies.

24. This Ordinance shall be in force in the Dependencies as well as in the Colony.

Ordinances 1 of 1899 and 6 of 1909 Repealed. 25. The Seal Fishery Ordinance, 1899, and the Seal Fishery Dependencies Ordinance, 1909, are hereby repealed.

Ordinance No. of 1921.

A Bill

To provide for the service of the Year 1922.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of the Falkland Islands, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short Title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited for all purposes as "The Appropriation Ordinance, 1922".

Appropriation £46,610 for service of year 1922.

2. The Governor may cause to be issued out of the Public Revenue and other funds of the Colony and applied to the service of the year ending on 31st December, 1922, a sum not exceeding Forty-six Thousand Six Hundred and Ten Pounds, which sum is granted and shall be appropriated for the purposes and to defray the charges of the several services expressed and particularly mentioned in the Schedule hereto which will come in course of payment during the year 1922.



THE RUSSIAN FAMINE.

His Excellency the Governor has received from the Lord Mayor of London a copy of the National Appeal, recently issued in view of the terrible calamity which has overwhelmed Russia:-

It is stated that "The Appeals from Russia are unparralleled in their urgency, and in the presence of such misery and want no humane man, whatever his opinion of recent events in Russia may be, will allow his instinct of sympathy to be silenced. Among these hungry and desperate peasants there are millions of children, and of the elders not one in a hundred belongs to any political party. The totally destitute population of the stricken districts, which will perish unless prompt help is rendered, numbers at the very lowest computation ten millions."

Members of the public are invited to contribute to the Fund to be raised locally. Subscriptions will be received by the Colonial Treasurer and forwarded to the Mansion House for the general fund, the administration of which will be under the control of the Joint Council of Red Cross.

The attention of intending importers is drawn to the "Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920" (Imperial) under which the importation and exportation of morphine, cocaine, ecgonine, and diamorphine (commonly known as heroin), and their respective salts, and medicinal opium, and any preparation, admixture, extract or other substance containing not less than one-fifth per cent of morphine or one-tenth per cent of cocaine, ecgonine or diamorphine, is prohibited except under certain conditions. It will therefore be necessary for the importer to furnish Government with a statement in quadruplicate of his requirements, guaranteeing that the consignment in question is required exclusively for legitimate scientific and medicinal purposes, and that re-export is not intended. The importer should also state the name of the firm who is to supply the drugs. These statements should reach the Colonial Surgeon. Stanley. before the 1st June and the 1st December, each year: at the time the importer sends his indent for transmission to the Board of Trade, he should send a copy of his indent to the supplying firm with his usual arrangements as to payments etc.; his firm will then in due course get from the Board of Trade a duplicate copy of the indent with a licence to export from England, the drugs mentioned therein.

His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, for general information, that in pursuance of Article 239 of the Treaty of Trianon the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal between the British Empire and Hungary has been constituted, and is about to commence work in London.

An important part of the work of the Tribunal will be to decide upon claims in respect of debts under Section III of Part X of the Treaty, where a difference arises between British and Hungarian Nationals or between the British and Hungarian Clearing Offices. The Tribunal has also jurisdiction under Section IV ("Property, Rights and Interests"), Section V ("Contracts, Prescriptions, Judgments"), Section VI ("Mixed Arbitral Tribunal") and Section VII ("Industrial Property") of Part X of the above Treaty.

By the Treaty, the High Contracting Powers have agreed that their Courts and authorities shall render to the Tribunal direct all the assistance in their power, particularly as regards transmitting notices and collecting evidence; and they have also agreed to regard the decisions of the Tribunal as final and conclusive and to render them binding upon their nationals.

In view of the petition of Messrs. W. Allinson Bell and Rodolfo E. Gomez for permission for the vessels of the Johnson Line and Pacific Steam Navigation Company to carry out operations between national ports and those of the Falkland Islands, as well as the reports thereon, and considering,

That as stated by the Solictor to the Treasury, the juridicial position of the Falkland Islands is in no way altered by treating them as foreign land for Customs purposes,

That, moreover, putting aside the aforementioned circumstance, the Coastwise Trade Law cannot be strictly applicable as the navigation between these islands is not carried on by national shipping and therefore this cannot suffer the competition which the said law seeks to prevent,

It is resolved

To temporarily authorize vessels under foreign flags to effect operations between the ports of the Falkland Islands and the others of the Republic.
