From Governor to Secretary of State for the Colunies.

Sent 29th August, 1915.

29th August. On behalf of the people of this remote Colony of Falkland Islands, linked to-day for the first time by cable to the Mother Country, I beg, by this first cable message transmitted, respectfully to tender His Majesty the King assurance of their loyalty and devotion to His Majesty's Person and Throne. This people with other His Majesty's subjects at home and throughout his vast Empire pray that the war which has been forced upon His Majesty may, by His Majesty's Naval and Military Forces, be brought to an early and successful termination.
